THE SUN in the brilliant blue skies over Poppy Hills Thursday morning couldn't match the shine from Tom Brady's smile.

The 26 year old from San Mateo County, who vaulted to the top of the sports world Sunday with his second Super Bowl MVP trophy, is suddenly the biggest celebrity at this week's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. Bach worries about box office impact

A UNANIMOUS Carmel City Council decision Tuesday to impose a facility use fee on Sunset Center theatergoers is not sitting well with one major presenter.

Concerned the fee might hurt its box office, the Carmel Bach Festival board issued a statement Thursday saying it "has only started to recover somewhat from the extraordinary costs and loss of audience associated with having to move the festival in 2001 and 2002 to accommodate the renovation of Sunset Center."

But no one from the festival or any other user group opposed the fee when it was considered by the council Feb. 3.

During the hearing, acting Sunset Center General Manager Tom Bacchetti said the fee would offset the costs of operating the newly renovated theater. Based on figures proposed by the nonprofit corporation, Sunset Cultural Center, Inc., which might take over management of the center, Bacchetti said the facility use fee would add \$2 to tickets \$20 and higher and \$1 to tickets \$19.99 and under. The fee would be waived for school events with tickets priced lower than \$8.

"A facility use fee is not an uncommon device used by performing arts venues around the country," he told the

VAST P.B. EIR UNVEILED BY COUNTY PLANNERS

ALMOST FOUR years after Pebble Beach Co. officials announced dramatically scaled-back plans for development in Del Monte Forest — and more than three years after voters overwhelmingly Ok'd the broad outlines of their proposal — the county planning department has finally made public a vast study of the environmental impacts of building a new golf course, equestrian center, 33 homes, 170 hotel rooms and 60 units of employee housing.

The environmental impact report, 1,267 pages and prepared at a cost of more than \$100,000, was released Wednesday. With the AT&T pro-am getting under way Thursday, officials with the P.B. Co. weren't available to comment on the EIR, which encompasses what they have said is their vision for "final build-out" in the highly scenic neighborhood around the Pebble Beach Golf Links. According to the EIR, besides the golf course, homes, equestrian center and hotel rooms, the new plan: eliminates 856 homesites allowed by zoning approved by Monterey County and the California Coastal Commission in the 1980s; ■ increases dedicated open space by about 437 acres; and designates four new acres for "visitor-serving uses." But the EIR says the proposal also involves cutting almost 100 acres of Monterey pine forest and converting 28 acres of undeveloped forest to "suburban forest," - aspects which the staff of the coastal commission has already been campaigning to halt, long before the P.B. Co. project will be submitted to them.

EASTWOOD RE-UPS WITH STATE PARKS BOARD

DESPITE WORLD-WIDE speculation that Clint Eastwood was about to be fired by a vengeful Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, the former Carmel Mayor has been asked to serve another term on the State Park and Recreation Commission, Eastwood said last week. Schwarzenegger also asked him to serve on the state film commission, and he said he would accept both appointments.

The two Hollywood superstars, who have known each other for decades, discussed the appointments during the Christmas holidays when they and their families spent time together at an Idaho ski resort, according to Eastwood.

"He asked me to serve another term on the state parks

board, and I told him I would," Eastwood told The Pine Cone. "We're going to take it up at the next board meeting."

His previous term ended Jan. 15. Eastwood was first appointed to the state parks board in 2001 by then-governor Gray Davis.

Partly because of their friendship, and also because recall candidate Peter Ueberroth is one of his partners in the Pebble Beach Co., Eastwood decided not to make an endorsement in the Oct. 7 recall election, despite his longstanding association with Schwarzenegger.

Last summer, in a Pine Cone story that was circulated around the world, Eastwood also warned Schwarzenegger

With two outside patios available for dining in the company of pets, Buon Giorno is open daily from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. and offers





Post office street work riles some

They loved their bump-out

A DECISION to straighten out the sidewalk in front of the Fifth Avenue post office, reduce the size of a planter and realign a bench upset some Carmel residents, who appeared before the city council Tuesday afternoon to complain.

"I believe we've lost something important, and it saddens me," said Barbara Brooks, who lamented losing a safe place to tie up her dog, a community gathering spot and room to replace the previous towering pine which had died.

"It never was discussed," she said. "This is not the first time the public has been bypassed. Our government is disappearing behind a curtain." Brooks echoed what has become a main theme of city councilman Dick Ely's mayoral campaign.

Carmel Residents Association President Larry Rodocker condemned a decision he said "removes a little bit of Carmel's charm and uniqueness, all to obtain one parking space."

He also argued the community traffic safety commission and the forest and beach commission should have weighed in on the change.

"How could a development such as this take place without any justification or consideration?" he asked. He called for the city to rebuild the bumpout the way it was and then "take it through the process."

Because the Brown Act prohibits discussion of items not on the agenda, city administrator Rich Guillen said he wasn't able to respond at the city council meeting. Later, he told The Pine Cone he made the decision to remove the bump-out after talking with members of the public, former public works director Jim Cullem, city forester Mike Branson, police chief George Rawson and resident Clayton Anderson, whose group, Friends of Carmel Forest, had hoped to plant a cypress tree to replace the pine.



Illegal apartments given two-year amnesty in Pacific Grove

By A unanimous vote, the Pacific Grove City Council members decided Feb. 4 to legalize bootleg apartments in their city. They are offering a two-year amnesty in which landlords can register their illegal units with the city and bring them up to modern health and safety standards, in exchange for renting them to "very low income" tenants from now on. The city hopes the amnesty will increase the number of affordable housing units in P.G.

"What a difference four years of work can make," said Larry Scholink, landlord, real estate broker and affordable housing advocate, who began a campaign for amnesty in 1998 to help tenants and landlords come out of the shadows of the underground housing market.

"Butterfly Lady" Ro Vaccaro, Scholink's tenant and a beloved figure in Pacific Grove for her work to preserve monarch butterflies, agreed to allow The Pine Cone to use her case as a typical example: She pays \$471 per month for a tiny unit in what used to be the storage room of an apartment building. Now, instead of worrying that she'll be busted for living in an illegal apartment, Vaccaro can come and go without fear.

And Vaccaro's rent could actually be reduced, because she qualifies for federal Section 8 housing assistance and the P.G. Council also voted to include Section 8 tenants in the amnesty program. As Scholink explained, the HUD "market rate" for Vaccaro's one-bedroom apartment is \$841 per month. Under Section 8, a tenant like Vaccaro whose Social Security income is \$1,224 per month, would pay only one-third of that — \$367 — with the remainder paid to the landlord by the housing authority of Monterey County from taxpayers' funds. So both landlord and tenant would have more money in their pockets. The extra dollars could help landlords pay the huge costs required to bring their units into compliance under the program.

According to Rosie Anderson, director of assistance for the housing authority, 3,770 people receive Section 8 assistance in the county — 51 in P.G. — and 5,000 more are on the waiting list. The Pacific Grove amnesty won't make much of a dent in that number, but it's a start.

"We believe there are 350 to 400 illegal units in Pacific Grove that could qualify for amnesty, but that is just an estimate. Nobody knows the real number yet," said Julie Uretsky of the Pacific Grove Community Development Dept.

To qualify for amnesty, the owners of illegal units must:

have their units inspected and upgraded. Seriously damaged foundations must be repaired; stairs must have safe railings; hazardous wiring must be fixed; heaters must be vented; sewer lines must be flowing properly, and smoke detectors must be installed, among other upgrades.

Units must have been rented since at least March 1985 — before the water management district took jurisdiction over who is permitted to add plumbing fixtures — or obtain a new water permit.

• Owners must get a sewer permit from the Monterey Regional Water Pollution Control Agency.

■ Landlords have to rent to "very low income" tenants, as defined by Housing and Urban Development guidelines. A very low income tenant can make no more than \$20,000, or \$22,850 for a couple. The rent must be no higher than

\$500 per month for a single tenant, \$571 for a couple, unless Section 8 housing rules allow a higher, subsidized rent. If current tenants do not qualify as low income, they must move within six months, according to the amnesty ordinance.

Landlords cannot legalize a converted garage apartment if it was required parking for another unit.

They may not enlarge nor sublet the legalized unit.

Nor can the unit be rebuilt if more than 25 percent is damaged or destroyed. Landlords must record a deed restriction promising to keep the apartment

affordable as long as it is rented, and future owners must also comply.

They must allow the city to inspect the unit and monitor the rents charged and the income of the tenant, to make sure they continue to qualify as affordable.

The registration period begins May 1 and ends April 30, 2006. After that, any illegal units that are discovered must be removed by the landlord.

pated over the next 15 years, the water board was told during a workshop Monday.

Future water supply needs were one of the hot topics the board fleetingly delved into during the workshop, two-hour which the board called to begin revamping some of its regulations and clarifying others.

In anticipation of getting a new water supply project online in the nottoo-distant future, the asked board water demand manager Stephanie Pintar for recommendations on how the county, the airport district and the six cities within the water district should calculate their future water needs.

Pintar said a wide

variety of factors could be used, including historical average water use, maximum potential densities, and existing lots of record as of January 1997. Or the district could provide enough water for potential development allowed in current general plans.

The jurisdictions last reported their estimated needs in 1999 to cover development through 2020. Carmel projected 405 acrefeet; Del Rey Oaks, 196.5; Monterey, 766.8; Pacific Grove, 531.1; Sand City, 300; Seaside, 409; Monterey County, 893; and the Monterey Peninsula Airport District, 74.3, for a total of 3,572.7 acre-feet in addition to water needed to make up the state-imposed deficit. [An acre foot is approximately 325,000 gallons.]

But director Judi Lehman wondered if the figures were too high. "I don't see any rationale and would like to see the rationale for how they arrived at these numbers," she said.

Director David Pendergrass, the mayoral representative on the board, told Lehman the numbers were derived by the jurisdictions based on the development allowed by approved general plans.

These are not wish lists; these are estimates which need to be updated and if anything, there's probably more water needed," he said. "Goal number one is to augment the water supply. For the last four years, we've done nothing.

Lehman objected to that characterization and said the old water board, which lost its majority in the November election, had launched an effort to build a small desalination plant in Sand City.

But director Michelle Knight said the board needed to know "how much water we should be sizing a project to, and we can't get to step two until we get to step one."

She suggested the technical advisory committee get back to the board with recommendations on calculating future water needs within 90 days.

Wells and rates

In preparation for a possible streamlining and relaxation of permit requirements for wells, planner Henrietta Stern told directors the history of the district's increasing control over small, private water systems.

In 1988, the district began requiring all property owners with wells to report how much water they used. Parcels smaller than 2.5 acres could estimate their use, while larger parcels had to meter the output of their wells, or the amount of electricity used to operate them. There was no requirement to obtain a permit from the

water district to drill a well.

That changed in 2001, when the district began requiring a permit — including proof that a property owner also owned the water beneath the land — for any well drilled within certain parts of the district. A year later, it expanded the permit requirement to wells drilled in most of the Carmel River watershed. In February 2003, the board dramatically increased fees for those permits.

"The current permit process takes a minimum of roughly 35 staff hours and two to four months between receipt of an application and final approval," Stern told the board - and that's on top of the permit required by the Monterey County Health Department.

At the request of chairman Alvin Edwards, she suggested changes that would "lessen impact on property owners and reduce staff effort while continuing the district's mandate to protect water sources and the environment.'

Most owners of wells or other water systems permitted by the health department would file brief applications so staff could roughly determine water use, she suggested. Based on that screening, applications would be subjected to a level of scrutiny based on the "anticipated impact and sensitivity of the geographic area."

Level one would be a permit waiver for low-impact uses, such as a well on a small parcel in a non-sensitive area. Level two, the most common category, would require a permit granted by staff without public hearing. Level three would be "reserved for larger, potentially controversial projects, and/or

well location within known sensitive areas such as the Carmel River alluvial aquifer" and would require a public hearing before the board or a hearing officer.

With a \$2,450 application fee and additional staff time, if needed, billed at \$70 per hour, current permit applications are also expensive. Stern proposed a sliding scale based on complexity, starting with an initial \$50 screening. Level one would cost \$300, level two would cost \$1,500 plus \$70 an hour if needed, and level three applications would cost \$2,500 plus \$70 an hour.

"I think we need to make it a lot less cumbersome and not charge them so much,"

director Larry Foy said. "I think that's where we need to go.'

Acting general manager Fran Farina said it would take several months before staff could bring a detailed proposal on well permits to the board.

Water for adjacent lots

Most of Monday's discussion focused on if and when water on one lot can be moved to an adjacent lot owned by the same person in order to expand a home or build a new one. "Water credit reassignment" used to be a comparatively simple administrative task





Firemen respond to smoldering bank snack

POPCORN LEFT unattended in a microwave filled a Bank of America break room with smoke Tuesday morning, triggering an alarm which summoned the Carmel Fire Department.

Candidate/CPA Collins: 'I'll fix county budget'

A CERTIFIED public account from Salinas Valley highlighted his business expertise at a campaign forum in Carmel Wednesday night.

"We have no financial management in the leadership of the board of supervisors now," said Steve Collins, a CPA and college professor who is trying to unseat Dave Potter from his 5th District supervisorial seat. He said budget planning should be done not just on a yearly basis, but with an eye on the inevitable ups and downs in the economy.



"There is a real crisis in Monterey County," said tax collector Lou Solton. The state is taking an ever-bigger piece of local revenues - a trend that started after the passage of Prop. 13 in 1978 and which has accelerated ever since.

"The state has reneged on some of its commitments to fund county government,' Solton said. The county didn't receive about \$8 million in vehicle license fees it was supposed to get this year after Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger made good on a campaign pledge to repeal a tripling of the tax passed by the Democratic Legislature and former Governor Gray Davis last year. "And if the \$15 billion bond measure doesn't pass March 2, the state will have no choice but to dramatically cut the size of government," he said.

The state's problems have added to the county's budget shortfall, which could reach

> county's healthcare problems - something the two big, private hospitals will support because they don't want Natividad Medical Center to close.

"I've talked to Steve Packer [CEO of CHOMP] and Sam Downing [head of Salinas Valley Memorial] and they really want to help," Collins said.


In response to a question from the audience, Collins said the people of Carmel Valley should decide on their own whether to incorporate. "If 51 percent of the people want to form their own city, my job as a supervisor will be to facilitate that — but we also have to look at what's sticking in their craw. Maybe we haven't provided them with the level of ser-


vice that would encourage them to remain unincorporated. Basically, they feel ignored and they feel they have very little say what goes on in their valley.'

Another questioner asked how Collins could represent the Peninsula when he lives in the Salinas Valley.

"It's a question of leadership, not geography," Collins said. "Leadership means bringing diverse groups together to solve common problems, and I have broad support within this district. I can bring people from the ag community, the tourism industry, government and the environmental community together to solve problems on a regional basis.'

And he outlined his budget goals: "The priorities should be public safety and public health. We can reduce planning [costs] more than we can public health, and we can reduce parks, unfortunately, more than we can public safety."






\$40 million next year.

"The county only has \$120 million in discretionary spending, so \$40 million is a big chunk of that," Collins said. Also, more than 75 percent of county general fund expenditures are for staff salaries in benefits, making job cuts inevitable. The county has been too generous with its union employees, Collins implied.

"The county has reopened negotiations on a contract signed just last year," he said. "Employees will have to be let go because we signed that contract."

He also called for "regional solutions" to the

Beach pro-am. Keeping a close eye on the young superstar was Pebble Beach Company CEO Bill Perocchi, who is largely responsible for getting Brady to participate.

"Tommy is just an outstanding young man, and it's been my pleasure over the last two years to become a close friend of him and his family," Perocchi said.

His relationship with Brady began after the 2002 Super Bowl, when the Patriots also won in a squeaker over the St. Louis Rams.

"I was introduced to Tom through a mutual friend," Perocchi said. "I found out he grew up just an hour-and-a-half from here and was a golf fanatic. He told me, 'I always wanted to play Pebble, but I never got a chance."

A few months later, Brady and his parents, Tom and Galynn, were invited by Perocchi for their first ever round at Pebble Beach — and they asked Perocchi to join them.

"You hear a lot about Tommy's personality and how humble he is — and I can tell you, he gets it all from his parents," Perocchi said. And the whole family has great athletic talent, he added.

According to Perocchi, who grew up in Boston and is a diehard fan of the Patriots, Red Sox and Celtics, the young Brady is not only the biggest sports figure in Boston today, with his two Super Bowl MVP awards at such a young age, he could be the biggest ever.

"He's already being compared to Ted Williams and Larry Byrd," Perocchi said. "He's still just a kid, he's rich and he's single, and there's no telling what he can do."

Wednesday night Brady paid a visit to the football team at Robert Louis Stevenson School in Pebble Beach.

As he prepared to tee off the next morning — unshaven, but nevertheless looking very glamorous, female golf fans seemed to agree - he cheerfully told interviewers from ESPN, CBS Sports, the Golf Channel and

"Tommy threw an interception in the fourth quarter, but he just put it out of his mind and put together two flawless drives one for a touchdown and one for a field goal - to win the game. It was the most exciting thing I've ever seen," Perocchi said.

Tom Brady and most of the Hollywood stars in this year's tournament will play Friday at Spyglass and Saturday at Pebble Beach. Tee times are on page 16C of the special section.



REVENUES ARE down, but expenditures are down more, putting the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea a bit ahead in its 2003/2004 budget, city administrator Rich Guillen told the city council Feb. 3. But his rosier half-year report does not mean the fiscal year will end in the black, since the budget included a \$1 181 987 'People are coming

since the budget included a \$1,181,987 deficit to be covered by reserves. Of the total \$11,760,047 budget for this

fiscal year, which began July 1, the council anticipated spending \$5,878,618 by the end of December and taking in \$5,856,351.

In fact, the city spent \$5,697,024 and raised \$5,800,601, finishing the first six months \$125,844 higher than expected.


A busy housing market boosted property taxes. But sales taxes and transient occupancy taxes improved only slightly, city figures show.

"Sales taxes are still low, but better than we did a year ago, which indicates the economy is turning

around," Guillen said. "People are coming to Carmel and spending their money and the innkeepers are filling rooms, but they are giving very good rates."

Permit fees and money from other government agencies were below expectations, including the state vehicle license fee of \$260,000 which had been promised, then withdrawn by Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, then partially delivered in the amount of \$130,000.

Although the costs of workers compensation, property



and liability insurance and the regional ambulance subsidy were a combined \$178,109 over their budgeted \$614,398 for the first half of the year, the budgeted \$3,337,876 in salaries and wages dropped by \$174,989, and the accompanying \$311,753 in employee insurance program costs dropped by \$66,921.

Guillen cautioned the council against being too optimistic after finishing the first half of the year slightly ahead of expectations, given the vast uncertainty at the state level.

"That situation has been changing on a daily basis," he said. "I get e-mails [from the state] every two or three days on what's happening in the state budget."

The city may not receive the remainder of its VLF, could lose \$68,000 more in property taxes if they are shifted to the state's Education Relief Augmentation Fund, and might no longer receive the \$100,000 grant which pays for one police

officer position (though that loss would not mean firing anyone, since the department remains understaffed). Guillen said the city will not receive its \$8,400 in public safety funds which would have been supplied through Proposition 172.

Storms or sunshine ahead?

Planning commissioner and council candidate Mike Cunningham applauded the city for keeping its expenses under control.

"It's hardly a disastrous situation in my opinion, and I urge you to keep the faucet tight," he said, adding that a conservative second half could see a balanced budget at year's end.

Carol Hilburn, a member of the cultural commission, said finishing the first half "slightly to the good" does not foretell a balanced budget, but rather a year ending with the anticipated \$1.18 million deficit to be covered by reserves.

Who is Sunset Cultural Center, Inc.?

Tough questions for new group at town meeting

SUNSET CULTURAL Center, Inc., the nonprofit which may soon take over management of the newly renovated performing arts venue for the city, has a nine-member board filled with a diverse group of accomplished volunteers, according to chairman Jim Price, who recruited them. After making a presentation to a town meeting attended by more than 250 people last week, Price and other members of the SCC board are awaiting a decision from the city council on whether they will be chosen to operate the center.

After serving as chairman of the city's ad hoc Sunset Center management committee, which reviewed options and ultimately recommended an independent nonprofit run the center, Price thought his work was done. But last August, Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud asked Price to convene a group which might grow into a nonprofit.

"She didn't name the group, just asked me to take the initiative and get it together," he said. "I thought about it and thought someone needs to do this, and it should be someone independent rather than on the council or in city government. So I agreed to do it."

He compiled a list of 25 candidates, and with input from city officials and various interested parties, narrowed the group to the nine members who eventually incorporated as the private nonprofit SCC. They have all

since resigned from their positions on other boards "in order to have independent status," according to Price.

The group met weekly, then biweekly, to gather information and prepare the business plan it presented to the city council last month.

A graduate of Stanford University with a B.A. in American history, Price obtained a master's in divinity from the Pacific School of Religion and also studied at the UCLA School of Business. He is currently involved in commercial real estate investments and has worked as chairman and director of a bank. He is also former area director of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, was assistant to the Mayor of Oakland, developed and operated lowincome rental housing, and has served as treasurer/director of the Forest Theater Guild. Price and his wife, Jane, divide their time between Carmel and Alamo. She is a flutist and they are both classical music fans who subscribe to the Carmel Music Society and the Monterey Symphony.

Sarah Brown, treasurer

As treasurer of the SCC board, Brown, a certified public accountant, brings her financial know-how to the nonprofit. She holds a bachelor's degree in accounting from the University of Arkansas and has served as a corporate vice president.

"Jim was trying to put together a group that had different areas of expertise," said

countered Cunningham's optimism with his own prediction that the state would indeed deprive Carmel of much needed funds, while council candidate Erik Bethel said the city should focus on wooing more high-dollar tourists for longer stays in town, since property tax increases will slow if the Fed increases interest rates and TOT accounts for a third of the city's budget.

Councilwoman Barbara Livingston asked if Guillen's numbers included the items listed in former assistant city administrator Greg D'Ambrosio mid-year budget memo, which she said outlined more unbudgeted costs.

In his memo, D'Ambrosio mentioned several costs related to Sunset Center's staffing, remodel work, utilities and grand opening celebrations; salary increases for some city staff, building maintenance, and several other issues. He estimated an additional \$450,000 might have to be transferred from city reserves by the end of the fiscal year.

"Some are included and some aren't,"

Guillen responded. "He was trying to advise us about things looking at the entire year, but we did discuss it and everybody has taken a look at it."

In what has become a familiar refrain, councilman and mayoral candidate Dick Ely said he wanted more time to review and verify the mid-year numbers to determine whether they are real or simply "shells."

This is the way it's always been done," Mayor Sue McCloud responded.

In closing his presentation, Guillen recommended the council give him the go-ahead to place a hiring freeze on all vacant non-public-safety positions - of which there are currently six — authorize travel only for mandatory training and meetings on core priority projects such as the Local Coastal Program, pursue agreements with neighboring public agencies to augment staffing, and prepare a citywide management reorganization plan as part of the 2004/2005 budget process.

Although the council took no formal action, Guillen received tacit agreement and said he would unveil his reorganization plan at the April 27 workshop, which will be followed by further budget meetings set for May 13, May 25 and June 3.

Brown, who has divided her time between Carmel and San Francisco for the past seven years. "My background is in accounting and finance, and that was one of the pieces he wanted to plug into the group, so that's how this got started and how I got involved."

Brown has also worked for other nonprofits, namely the San Francisco Child Abuse Prevention Center and the Glaucoma Research Foundation.

"Although I do not have any specific business experience with a performing arts organization, I have been a director and served as treasurer of two other nonprofit organizations and do know something about nonprofit accounting, which is different from government and for-profit accounting," she said.

Desiring to be involved in a Carmel community project, Brown was delighted to accept a seat on the board when Price approached her.

Karen Kadushin, secretary

Kadushin, an attorney with a degree from the Golden Gate University School of Law, studied dance, music, art and theater arts at UCLA. A former dean at the Monterey College of Law, Kadushin also served as director of the Pacific Repertory Theatre and the Monterey Peninsula College Foundation. She has been a member of the Colleagues of the Arts and past president of the Bar Association of San Francisco and the Monterey County Women Lawyers Association.

Due to her moving out of her Pebble Beach home and problems with her telephone service, Kadushin was not available this week to talk to The Pine Cone about her membership in the SCC board.

Demi Briscoe

Briscoe, a Carmel Valley resident and vice president of First National Bank of Central California's Carmel branch, has served as president and treasurer of the Carmel Chamber of Commerce, past president and director of Soroptomist International of Carmel Bay, and director of Meals on Wheels of the Monterey Peninsula and Friends of Moss Landing Marine Laboratories. She holds a B.A. in psychology from California State University Los Angeles.

A subscriber to the Monterey Symphony who also served on the Carmel Bach Festival board, Briscoe said she had not met Price before he solicited her participation on the SCC board and suspects it is her role in local business that made her a candidate.

"I think that's the reason he approached me - to be a contact with the business community," she said.

Having attended Sunset Center events for years, Briscoe said she and other board members care deeply about making the renovated center a success.

'We're not selling anything and none of us have any vested interest in this whole project," she said. "We're all really involved with Sunset Center, and we've all made big contributions to see it go and really want to contribute personally to making a wonderful thing out of the cultural heart of the city."

Gary Luce

A Carmel resident for 18 years, Luce is also a longtime member of the city's hospitality industry. As the president of Carmel Inns by the Sea, Luce has served as president and/or director of many business and travel-

THE CATALYST Soccer Club is coming to the Monterey Peninsula this month to scout motivated young soccer players for whom the traditional fall soccer season isn't nearly long enough.

Catalyst, based in Santa Cruz County, has run a year-round soccer program for boys and girls ages 6 through 12 for five years and is now reaching south. Paul Holocher, director of Catalyst, has built a reputation for teaching the finer skills and tactics of the world's most popular sport at all levels. In addition to coaching the very young players at Catalyst, he is the head coach of the nationally ranked University of California at Santa Cruz men's team (21 - 2 last season). the rest of the year. Holocher hopes to change that.

"Many sports get a lot of attention in Monterey County, including basketball, football and baseball, but there are probably more kids playing youth soccer than any of these big three," he said. "These kids playing soccer deserve a program that will help them grow in this sport; otherwise, they stop playing."

Holocher doesn't want to lose these potential soccer stars, so he is offering two free "playdays/clinics" Feb. 21 and 22 to draw motivated young male and female soccer players in Monterey County to the Catalyst Club. The venue is the brand new athletic fields at York School, 9501 York Road in Monterey. The schedule for both days is:





haps, a slightly shorter escrow. So you decide to write up a counter

offer. Most people aren't truly aware of what a counter offer is. It is an offer to sell from a specific seller to a spe-cific buyer. Once written, it cancels the buyer's offer to buy, leaving the buyer with absolutely no further obligation to the seller.

All obligation now rests with the seller, who has made a legal statement that s/he will sell her or his home to a specific potential buyer under the price and terms detailed in the counter offer. Kemember, the buyer can simply walk from the deal at that point. Thus, it makes sense for the seller (1) to be certain it's worth throwing out an offer in order to try to obtain a slightly higher price and more favorable terms and (2) to be extremely careful in detail-ing exactly at what price and under what terms s/he will indeed sell (because a signed counter-offer means there can be no further negotiations). related associations, including the Carmel Chamber of Commerce, the Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce, Monterey County Visitor and Convention Bureau, and the Monterey County Hospitality Association. He has also filled those roles for Carmel-by-the-Sea Rotary and Leadership Monterey Peninsula.

As an innkeeper, Luce said he wants to see Sunset Center achieve its fullest potential and hopes the SCC will be given the task of helping the facility reach that goal.

"I think it has been underutilized, and from a business standpoint for the inns of Carmel, I'd like to see beyond the performing arts to see it utilized for conferences," he said.

When Luce received the call from Price, he said the importance of the venue prompted him to accept.

"I say no to a lot of stuff and am really stretched to the hilt, but I thought it was a really important step at the early stage to get someone on board who has been doing business in town," he said.

Michael McMahan

An attorney specializing in corporate and estate planning law, McMahan holds a bachelor's degree in economics from Stanford, an MBA in accounting from Columbia University and a J.D. from UC Berkeley's Boalt Hall. He has served as director of Friends of Moss Landing Marine Lab, has been a member of Chartwell School's campus development committee and is former director of Hopkins Marine Lab and the Central Coast YMCA.

A Carmel resident since 1974, McMahan and his wife, Nicki, regularly attended Sunset Center performances and contributed to the \$21.65 million renovation. She also attended school there as a child.

McMahan suspects Price called upon him to serve because of his participation in the community as well as his legal skills.

"I've had a lot of experience in a lot of areas, certainly as an attorney, but also with nonprofits and philanthropy in general," he said. "I will do whatever I can to help, if we're called upon to do it."

Frederick O'Such

O'Such, who lives in Clint Eastwood's former house on San Antonio Avenue, holds a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering from Lehigh University and obtained his MBA from Harvard Business School. The former chairman and CEO of Xertex Corporation, O'Such was also program chair of a public education group called The Partners of 63. He had a significant role in developing the SCC business plan, which he presented to the Carmel City Council during a special meeting Jan. 20.

Jim Sanders

A Carmel Point resident with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from the University of Kansas who did postgraduate work in economics at Stanford, Sanders founded his own insurance company in San Jose and later sold it to an international firm. He headed the U.S. Small Business Administration under then-President Ronald Reagan and is past president of The Beer Institute in Washington, D.C. He has been a director of the Monterey Institute of International Studies, past chairman and director of the Church in the Forest and director of the Carmel Foundation.

As a member of the Saratoga City Council in the 1960s, "I know a little bit about what you face on the city council," he said. That experience also gave him insight into why a nonprofit should run Sunset Center.

"A city council can't move quickly enough," said Sanders, who also served on the ad hoc committee formed to study management options for the center. "It must have an operation that understands the challenges and can move quickly."

Sanders agreed to join the SCC board so long as Price would be its chairman.

"I did it because I had been asked, and I felt it was very important," he said. "I knew Sunset Center was very expensive, that the city owes money, and it needed a lot of management energy."

Perry Walker

An agribusiness executive with a bachelor's in communications from CSU Hayward and a master's in the same field from CSU Humboldt, Walker spent the past six years deeply involved in the Carmel Music Society. He served as president, vice president, chairman of development, chairman of marketing and chairman of bookings.

"I was on my last term and resigned when Jim asked me to sit on the committee that later became the SCC board," said Walker, who has also been a member of the Carmel-bythe-Sea Rotary, director of the All Saints Foundation Trust and served as court-appointed special advocate for children.

"I'm most impressed with the quality of the board membership and the level of participation," he said. "Each is willing and prepared to give to the effort, and there is a great diversity of talents and perspectives," which adds to the quality of the decision making.

As a principal in the Carmel Music Society, Walker is a board member who has been on the user-group side of the relationship at Sunset, he said. "So I bring that perspective into our discussions, particularly about being sensitive to the challenges the presenter groups have."

What next?

During a town meeting held last Thursday at the Carmel Foundation, Price and O'Such presented their initial plan for taking over operation of Sunset Center — the same plan they presented to the city council two weeks ago — and fielded some tough questions about why their group should run the center and how they plan to reduce the subsidy the city pays to operate it without hurting the quality of performances.


"I keep asking the same question," said Olof Dahlstrand, whose wife, Lucia, is chair of the city's cultural commission. "Why is the management of Sunset Center by a nonprofit corporation deemed to be better than by a city department under the guidance of the cultural commission?"

He questioned whether a once-a-year public meeting would be enough input from the citizens of Carmel about the operation of Sunset Center, in which they invested so much of their tax dollars.

"The cultural commission would be more responsive to gripes and concerns — they meet once a month and would be able to act quickly and decisively," Dahlstrand said.

Former director of Sunset Center Richard Tyler also said management by the cultural commission would be better because that group "has the ear of the mayor."

Linda Anderson complimented Price on his presentation




but said the city could perform all the same functions proposed for the SCC, except raise funds. She said a group similar to the Public Library Foundation could do that for Sunset Center.

Mike Brown cited his own extensive survey of towns and small cities with performing arts centers, almost none of which rely on a nonprofit to run them.

"I encourage the Sunset Cultural Center people to contact these cities," Brown said. "I was shocked and scared."

Price said his group had surveyed many other cities, with completely different results. And some of the cities that didn't use a nonprofit to run their performing arts venue said, "We would love to do it as a nonprofit . . . separate from the city," Price said.

City administrator Rich Guillen told the audience that the question of who would manage Sunset Center would be decided by the city council. This week, the council decided to add a \$1 to \$2-per-ticket charge to most events at the center to help pay for operating costs (see story, front page). Further discussions have not been announcedj17

that being governor might be harder than it looked.

'When all the excitement dies down, he may decide this is a horrible time to be Governor of California. Huge deficits, the Senate and the Assembly dominated by Democrats — it's a very tough time to take over," Eastwood said Aug. 7.

His words of caution to candidate Schwarzenegger and his well-known friendship with Davis led to a series of speculative, if not completely invented, stories in various newspapers that Schwarzenegger would retaliate against Eastwood for not supporting the recall.

Sensational work of British fiction

One particularly notorious example, published last November in the Times of London and reported by the newspaper's arts correspondent John Harlow, claimed Schwarzenegger was "drawing up a hit list of officials who may be removed from their posts, and Clint Eastwood's name is on it."

Citing an unnamed source, Harlow reported that Schwarzenegger would "Terminate" Eastwood because he was "under pressure from right-wing donors and party activists to punish" him. Eastwood was "Unforgiven' for offering to film a campaign commercial for Davis," according to "political pundits," Harlow said.

Another anonymous source quoted in the story, this one "close to Eastwood," said he had been warned he might be "out of work" - a development to be regretted, according to the London Times, because the former Carmel mayor had "galvanized the previously moribund parks service" during his two years on the board.

Yet another unnamed source in Harlow's story called the impending firing "petty score settling at its worst.'

This week, an actual source close to Eastwood said the London story was "completely made up." Not only wasn't the story true, it could not be true, and anyone remotely familiar with California politics would know that, the source said. The fact that it relied entirely on unnamed sources made it evident that the reporter had intentionally penned a sensational work of fiction, the source concluded.

Eastwood agreed: "The British press is unbelievable," he said, using the word in its literal and figurative senses.

wing. But documents supporting that decision sternly argued against any more cutting of "native pine forest" in the Monterey Peninsula. Instead, nearly all remaining native Monterey pine trees should be protected under state law, the coastal commission staff has argued.

The biologist who helped prepare the EIR said the loss of the forest is offset by the dedication of hundreds of acres as forest preserves in Pebble Beach, and should also be mitigated by aggressive maintenance of the protected forest, reduction of "building envelopes" on new residential lots to onehalf acre, and dedication of additional acres of pine forest owned by the company, possi-

council.

The fee would be included on tickets to events scheduled for June 30 and after. "That gives the performing arts organizations time to include it in the printing of their tickets,

gives everyone time to adjust, and gives Sunset Center staff time to figure out how to administer and collect it on an ongoing basis.'

Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud wondered if the city could begin collecting fees sooner, but the Bacchetti said ticket holders would be confused if they were charged the fee for some shows and not others,

depending on when the performances were booked and the tickets printed.

"There would probably be little to gain and a lot of confusion to deal with," he warned.

Councilman and mayoral candidate Dick Ely wondered how SCC had arrived at the amount and whether it would be appropriate. He also asked if the cultural commission had discussed it.

SCC's research found the fees usually run

bly including 74 acres in the City of Monterey and 795 acres on the east side of Highway 1.

There are also extensive mitigation measures in the EIR to protect wetlands, rare plants and animals, possible archaeological sites and water and air quality, and to reduce traffic congestion and construction disruption.

Monterey County is soliciting public comments on the EIR, which will be presented along with the permits sought by the P.B. Co. to the county board of supervisors later this year. If supervisors approve it, the project will go to the coastal commission.

between \$1 and \$3 per ticket, according to Bacchetti. "In discussions with user groups, almost uniformly none of them thought this would be a major issue for them," he said. The commission did not have the fee placed on its agenda because there wasn't time.

Carol Hilburn, a cultural commissioner, said she did not oppose the fee as a method

of raising revenues, but wondered how the city council could support it when it did not want to increase transient occupancy taxes by 1 percent, which would be less of a blow to Carmel visitors than the use fee will be to people who buy theater tickets.

After resident Monte Miller said he'd already received his Bach Festival mailer and did not see a use

fee indicated, Bacchetti told the council the festival would "fund that fee underneath the price, rather than as an add-on to the ticket price."

The festival's statement Thursday confirmed its cast and programs were established and contracted last fall, have been published and cannot be changed.

Without further discussion, the council voted unanimously to impose the facility use fee.



LIFE'S A PARTY AT TUTTO MONDO TRATTORIA

ENTERING TUTTO MONDO Trattoria Saturday night was like arriving at a party in full swing: Every table was taken or reserved, music played over the speaker system and diners engaged in animated conversations which grew louder as the music volume swelled.

While one could fire a cannon down the center aisle of some Monterey Peninsula restaurants without injuring a patron, Tutto Mondo was packed and swinging. To what do they owe this good fortune?

Michelle Mondo is co-owner with her mother Nadia and father

John, and oversees all, serving as host. Mother Nadia cooks her Ligurian specialties in the kitchen and father John is everywhere. Olegario Valdez is the executive chef, and a beautifully trained and caring staff are all reasons why locals as well as visitors pack the restaurant to its 78 seat capacity, especially on weekends.

Tutto Mondo began its run here in Carmel-by-the-Sea 10 years ago as Mondo's, the family name, but was later changed to become more expansive: Tutto Mondo - All the World.

As for signature dishes, Michelle says anything coming out of the kitchen as a specialty qualifies as a signature dish:



Seafood cannelloni, chicken cannelloni, any veal dish. Regular patrons come in and ask for the pasta puttanesca (\$13.95) and pasta carbonara (\$13.95) over and over again, and many other regular dishes on the menu, which is surprisingly extensive.

About 50 percent of Tutto Mondo's clientele is local. Visitors return frequently when they are in Carmel, Michelle said.

Saturday night my dinner companion, visiting from Duruta, Italy, and I shared an

antipasto misto (\$8.95) which came to the table attractively arranged on a serving plate: red, sweet pimentos, grilled, thinly sliced eggplant, shrimp, julienned celery root salad, diced tomatoes, narrow calamari rings - all dressed with a good vinaigrette. Don't confuse this with the antipasto Mondo, which is also \$8.95, but is made up of prosciutto, mortadella, sopressata, marinated artichoke and marinated mushroom.

Fresh and succulent seafood

Following this appetizer I couldn't resist the frutti di mare (a term I have always loved) consisting of fresh and succulent



clams, mussels, prawns, bay scallops and white fish over linguine in a perfect thin, white sauce. We ordered home made ravioli verdi di carne (\$14.95) in a Bolognese sauce to share that was absolute perfection. It was so good we had an extra order made up to take home.

My companion ordered a roast chicken, almost a light mahogany in color that looked very appetizing, and was so generous in its two portions that she took half home, being unable to eat it all in the restaurant.

The wine list is relatively large and comprised of both California and Italian wines. From Italy: Tuscany, the Veneto, Alto Adige, and Piemonte are represented, and Michelle is trying to get some Italian white imports from along the Ligurian Coast — Cinqueterre and La Spezia in particular, because that is near her family's home which she visits from

time to time. From California, wines are listed from the Napa and Sonoma valleys, Santa Barbara, and of course, Monterey Country. Wines by the glass are first class and priced reasonably.

The ambiance at the restaurant is very much like a restaurant in the Italian Alps: lace curtains at the window, a lighted candle in a raffia-covered fiasca with a hurricane chimney on each butcher block-topped table, a great chandelier, wine bottles everywhere, padded banquets along one wall and booths along the other, and tables in the window and down the center of the trattoria, leading back to a crackling fire in the fireplace.




Tempting dessert tray

I am particularly fond of dessert trays (although not a fan of desserts) because they look so festive and tempting. At the end of the meal our very excellent busser, Armando, brought the prodigious tray of beautifully presented desserts, and told us the names of all of them. Hesitating between panna cotta and house-made cannoli filled with chocolate ricotta and white ricotta, we finally opted for a shared panna cotta, a light and silky egg custard topped with a judicious amount of whipped cream. It went well with the excellent espresso which we had to properly finish the meal.

The restaurant's motto is "Come home to Italy," and it's right on.

All in all, Tutto Mondo is an excellent trattoria with a happy and happening ambiance. If the music is too loud for you, just ask your server or Michelle to have it turned down they'll do so cheerfully.



developer by his own admission without conscience, but then, in a remarkable stroke of enlightenment, he took on the building and construction industry in relation to sustainability.

"He founded and helped build the most important green trade organization in the world," according to Paul Hawken, author of "Ecology of Commerce and Growing a Business." Hawkins goes out further on the limb concerning unding in the green community.

Gottfried's standing in the green community, and declares, "There is virtually no second place."

Gottfried learned as a young man from one of his Stanford professors that we Americans like to waste; we consume about 20 percent of the world's energy but comprise 5 percent of the population. It occurred to him that "we harm our planet because we don't feel a connection between our actions and the environmental impact." But that personal epiphany came later for Gottfried.

A good deal of the book is devoted to his early years durng which he became a successful developer — which makes not only fascinating reading but tells us of the driving force behind that business.

Then it was greed, for Gottfried the green came later and transformed him into a different person. He decided he could make a difference in the world "though sustainable buildings," and has since devoted his life to that ideal.

He is a founder of the green building movement and thus is trying to transform the building industry through environmentally responsible construction. It is as if Gottfried has done penance for his earlier cavalier response to our natural resources.

Gottfried will present a free lecture and booksigning at The Thunderbird Bookshop. The Barnyard, Carmel at 7 p.m.





Editorial

Unprofessional

ONE OF the top pros in the PGA announced Tuesday that he wouldn't be participating in this week's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

We're not talking about Tiger Woods, who said in Hawaii Jan. 11 that he doesn't like playing Pebble Beach because its "bumpy greens" make him think he can't "sink a one-foot putt," damaging his confidence at other events. His comment was somewhat inexplicable because Pebble Beach is not only the nation's most beautiful and most famous golf course, it was also the scene of Woods' greatest comeback — the 2000 pro-am — and his most dominant performance — the 2000 U.S. Open. Did the Y2K bug somehow smooth the greens that year?

This week's no-show was the less famous but still impressive Paul Azinger, who won the AT&T event in 1991. According to the San Francisco Chronicle, a miffed Azinger is skipping the pro-am this year because tournament organizers wouldn't let him bring his own amateur partner. Azinger's attitude seems childish but, hey, it's a free country. If he and Woods don't want to participate, that's up to them. We thank them for showing up in the past — Azinger has reportedly played the Pebble Beach pro-am 16 times - and look forward to seeing them in the future.

But what was completely unprofessional and incomprehensible was the San Francisco Chronicle reporter's version of Azinger's complaints in Tuesday's paper.

According to reporter Brian Murphy, Azinger said he missed the old "bonhomie" of the Crosby which has now been replaced with a tournament "driven by the need to take care of corporate executives who pour money into the PGA Tour."

Pardon us, but doesn't most of that money go to prizes for the golf pros? In just the first month of 2004, Azinger has won \$243,000 playing in PGA events. Shouldn't the Chronicle have asked him if he dislikes the "corporate executives" who ponied up a hefty portion of that money?

The story continued with more Azinger comments: "The previous tournament committee knew how to treat the players, but this recent group that has taken over — they're numbers crazy. It's who's spending the most money. They're looking at the sheet and rotating numbers."

And then a weak defense of the tournament attributed to (but not quoting) its director, Ollie Nutt who, Murphy wrote, "said he didn't want to get into a public debate with Azinger over the selection of amateurs" but "defended the need to conduct both a tournament and a business."

Hold it right there.

The AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am isn't a business. It's a *charity*.

Oh, some people are making money there, for sure, especially the golf pros. They share a \$5.3 million purse. (Two examples: This year, first place is worth \$954,000; 10th place, \$143,000.) CBS also presumably makes a profit televising the event to a nationwide audience. But Nutt's job (he draws a respectable salary, although nowhere near what an average golf pro makes) is to put on a successful tournament that maximizes the fundraising for hundreds of local charities — literally putting food on tables for the homeless at the Salvation Army's Good Sam Center in Seaside, providing comfort to the terminally ill at the Monterey Hospice, and making the last wishes of dying children come true through the efforts of the Greater Bay Area Make-a-Wish Foundation. (A complete list of the 135 charities and nonprofits supported by the pro-am in one recent year is printed on page 10C.) Nutt also has a small staff of paid assistants. But the tournament runs on the backs of hundreds of volunteers who show up year after year for free; plus the ticket-buying public, generous corporate sponsors, and civic-minded celebrities who are conscious of their own good fortune. There may be number-crunching going on, but it's number-crunching for a good cause.

Shouldn't the Chronicle (a for-profit, hard-nosed business) have pointed this out, instead of leaving its readers with the impression that the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am is run by a bunch of money-grubbing, inconsiderate capitalists?

Azinger may be so rich he isn't impressed any more with the chance to win almost \$1 million for playing four rounds of golf. He may not care about socializing with Kevin Costner or Tom Brady. It's up to him whether picking his own partner is more important than helping the poor of Monterey County. But the news media's obligation is clear: To tell the truth.

'A fraction of the personnel' **Dear Editor**,



In view of the small size of our condominium market, that figure is impressive. The big dollar markets, Carmel, Carmel Valley, Pebble Beach and Monterey have held their own. Carmel rebounded nicely from a weak year in 2002 ringing up over \$15 million in sales in 2003 as opposed to \$7 million the year before. Carmel Valley was off a little bit, but both Pebble Beach and Monterey had nice gains.

The market achieved this record-breaking number with an increase of only two sales — 221 transactions in 2003 as opposed to 219 in 2002. Higher prices drove the increase in dollar sales. Six

of the nine markets had increases in the median sales price. Monterey had the biggest gain at 17 percent.







CONDO REPORT

The strong barometer reading of 37 percent on January 1 assures us that the first quarter of 2004 will continue to be strong. A spot check on February 4th showed that the barometer had slipped a little bit. On that date there were 67 listings of which 19 were in escrow, or 28 percent. This is still a strong number demonstrating that there will be a significant number of closed transactions during the quarter.

A contradiction to these good numbers is the time that it took to get units sold in 2003. Look at the Days on Market chart, and you will find that the big money markets of Carmel, Carmel Valley and Pebble Beach had long selling periods: 295 days in Carmel, 233 days in Carmel Valley and 374 days in Pebble Beach, more than a year. This is in contrast to Del Rey

typically involving the demolition of an old home straddling a lot line and then the distribution of its water credits to new homes built on each parcel.

"With less water available [for development], staff noticed an increase in the number and complexity of the requests to reassign water credits," Pintar told the board. For example, a large parcel might be divided so that a house is on one lot and a garage and sink are on the other. A third parcel owned by the same person contains another home. The owner would like to cut water use at both full-sized homes to provide water for a new home on the middle lot, which would otherwise be unbuildable.

Last September, then-board chairman Zan Henson, who lost his seat to Foy two months later, asked Farina to impose a moratorium on such transfers while the board studied an ordinance to regulate them.

On Monday Pintar asked the board to consider what that ordinance should look like as well as determine what to do with requests already in the pipeline when Henson imposed the freeze.

Director Kristi Markey said water credit reassignments should be allowed only on already developed parcels - for example, to remove a sink and install a shower. Using water credits to build a new home on a vacant lot next door should not be allowed, she said.

Lehman wants to make sure developers can't buy adjacent parcels, move water credits around, build more homes and then sell them.

"We need to make sure we're not giving away water we don't have," she said.

Pendergrass countered that the board should be looking for ways to reduce, not add, restrictions.

"We need to free up the district of the excessive rules and regulations that have happened in last four years and be more creative in meeting water supply needs," he said.

Mitzi Dallas commented that an application she filed Sept. 5 had been held up for months because of the water district's uncertainty about how to proceed with a practice she said staff has handled for years.

"I don't understand why this is being questioned." she said.

Several other members of the public worried about their plans as well.

At its Feb. 19 meeting, the board is set to decide what will happen to Dallas' project and others that were affected by the moratorium.

A subcommittee of the board will take up the question of how water credits should be reassigned and make recommendations to the full board at a future date.







He said safety concerns dominated his decision and that he underestimated public reaction to it.

Since the bumped-out sidewalk did not have a curb, cars would often drive over it when parking or pulling into the street, and several people complained of near misses, according to Guillen. Cars pulling out of the narrow alley to the Eastwood Building parking lot were similarly jeopardized.

"We discussed it and it seemed like a good solution while still maintaining the bench and the tree," he said, adding that the city forester said the planter on the north side of the post office, where a large dead Monterey pine was removed in January 2003, would probably be too shady for a cypress. The city plants few Monterey pines because of pitch canker.

Guillen also said the he and the city staff make many such routine decisions without first passing them through city committees, commissions or the council.

'Obviously I misjudged the reaction to the decision," he said. "I didn't realize it meant that much to people. I'll have to be a little

more careful and learn from the experience."

Intersection to get facelift

To help stem the flow of wrong-way drivers on Scenic Road, the council voted 3-2 Feb. 3 to change the two-way stop at Scenic Road and Santa Lucia to a four-way stop and impose a no-parking zone along the 30-foot stretch of Santa Lucia approaching the intersection.

"The police department has received several complaints concerning wrong-way drivers traveling northbound on Scenic Road from Santa Lucia Avenue," Rawson told the council. Vehicles do not have to stop when traveling down Santa Lucia, and parked cars often block the no-right-turn sign at the intersection.

With the help of a traffic consultant and following lengthy discussion, the traffic safety commission voted Jan. 5 to recommend Rawson propose the changes to the city council.

"It's disappointing to me to see the solutions are only signage. There was no discussion of aesthetics," councilwoman Barbara Livingston said. She proposed a bump-out be added to increase the bottleneck on Scenic and dissuade drivers from turning

right onto the one-way street. "It would be done in the Carmel tradition and add greenery rather than put up signs to solve traffic problems."

Council member Paula Hazdovac disagreed, saying she recently encountered a wrong-way driver on Fifth Avenue who paid no heed to the bump-out there.

"They're not always effective, though they look nice," she said. "As for signage, in this case, I think that's the way we need to go."

Councilman Dick Ely sided with Livingston in asking that the project be sent back to the traffic commission for further review.

But Rawson reported the traffic commission had already looked closely at the signage issue. "They really cut back and are trying to be sensitive to this issue," he said.



Shuttles to Carmel, Pacific Grove

CHAMBERS OF Commerce in Pacific Grove and Carmel, with the help of Carmel innkeepers, will run shuttles between their cities and Pebble Beach during this year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

The Carmel shuttles, which offer unlimited trips for \$6 per day, run continuously between 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. during the tournament. Tickets can be purchased at the Carmel Chamber of Commerce, San Carlos between Fifth and Sixth, or in front of Carmel Plaza.

The Carmel buses will follow two routes. VEN BEFORE the New England Patriots' quarterback Tom Brady announced during the Super Bowl

postgame show that he'd play in this year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, ticket sales for the event were up 17 percent over 2003 thanks in part to a user-friendly way to order tickets via the Internet. But a legion of volunteers is ready to accommodate the crowds, tournament officials say.

In fact, from the moment spectators park their cars at California State University Monterey Bay on the former Fort Ord, they will be offered the attention expected from a world-class golfing event.

"When they get out to CSUMB, we'll have free coffee for them," said pro-am marketing director Cathy Scherzer. With hot-off-the-press pairing sheets in hand, ticketholders will board chartered buses for the seven-mile ride into Pebble Beach. "There's a video that tells them all about the tournament, which they'll watch as they drive in."

Once inside the forest, spectators will disembark in front of the AT&T Pebble

Beach National Pro-Am grand entrance where they can buy souvenirs, pick up a program and get answers to all sorts of questions.


"We have an information booth run by the Junior League of Monterey County," Scherzer said. The "Pro-Am-bassadors" furnish extensive information on the tournament and the three courses on which its played, as well as visitor services and other help.

Saturday. Each foursome (two pros and two amateurs) will play one day on each course: Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass. Play begins at 8 a.m. on these days at both the 1st and 10th tees, with foursomes teeing off every 10 minutes. Each day's total strokes are added to

the next for a 72-hole total. The pro-am team's scores are calculated on a betterball basis, including amateur's handicap. The pro's score is his individual score.

To keep things moving, the amateur contestant is requested to pick up his ball when he is out of the hole — in other words, as soon as his pro partner's score is better than his on an individual hole. Professionals may not pick up and remain in the competition.

PLAYER PROFILES

VIJAY SINGH 2003 PGA TOUR winnings: \$7,573,907 Age: 40 Hometown: Ponte Cedra Beach, Florida

2003 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

Last year Singh shattered personal records in virtually every category. A fourtime winner on the PGA Tour during the year, Singh clinched his first career PGA Tour money title at the season-ending Tour Championship, where a finish in a tie for fifth place was worth \$228,000 and brought his total money in 27 events to \$7,573,907, topping Tiger Woods by \$900,494. His 2003 season total was also second all-time to Woods' \$9,188,321 in 2000. Singh's total of 18 top-10 finishes was the highest on the PGA Tour since Tim Kite posted 21 top-10s in 26 starts in 1981. Singh's total was even more remarkable, considering he did not play between the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and the Bay Hill Invitational in March due to a rib iniurv. In June, Singh recorded his third top-10 finish at the Masters in the last four years with a tie for sixth place. He is one of 11 players to win on the PGA Tour over the age of 40 – which Singh achieved at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship in May, when he was also named PGA Tour Player of the Month. Later in the year, along with Jim Furyk, Singh set the U.S. Open record for best first 36 holes with a 7-under-par 133. His 7-under 63 during the second round tied Johnny Miller (1973), Jack Nicklaus and Tom Weiskopf (1980) for best 18-hole score in U.S. Open history. But he finished the event in 20th place. In October, he won his fourth PGA Tour event of the season by posting four rounds in the 60s at the Funai Classic at the Walt Disney World Resort, thus becoming only the third player (Tiger Woods-five, Davis Love III-four) in 2003 to win at least four times.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

Singh has won in Malaysia, France, Nigeria, Ivory Coast, Morocco, Zimbabwe, Singapore, Spain, Germany, England, South Africa, Sweden, Taiwan and United States. He has a Lifetime Exemption on the European Tour, following Ernie Els (1999) and Greg Norman (2000). In 1998, he began the season by



making his 48th consecutive cut at the Mercedes Championships. Later that year, he stretched the streak to 53 in a row before shooting 76-80 to miss the cut at the Masters. His previous missed cut had been at the 1995 PGA Championship. Singh also made 24 consecutive cuts in 1996 and 21 in a row in 1997. In 1993, Singh was named PGA Tour Rookie of the Year after winning the Buick Classic in a playoff over Mark Wiebe.

Singh is Fiji's only world-class golfer. He learned the game from his father, an airplane technician who also taught golf. The younger Singh admired Tom Weiskopf while growing up and used Weiskopf's swing as an early model for his own. Noted for his rigorous practice routine, Singh once held a club professional position in Borneo. Of Indian ancestry, his first name means "victory" in Hindi.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

In 2002, at the Disney Golf Classic, Love recorded a final-round hole-in-one on the 169-yard 12th hole with a 7-iron.

In 2001, Love returned to the winner's circle after a two-year drought by winning the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. He entered the final round seven strokes down and completed play one stroke up on Vijay Singh after shooting a 63, including a record-tying performance on the front nine: birdie, eagle, five birdies on holes 1 through 7. His seven-stroke comeback matched the best in tournament history. After that win, he decided to play in the Buick Invitational at the last minute and fell just short of achieving back-to-back wins. Later, he withdrew from three events in May due to neck pain and a disk problem that caused numbness in his left arm and fingers. After being off for two months, Love returned to finish in a tie for seventh at the U.S. Open. In 2000, he briefly moved past Greg Norman and into first place on the PGA Tour career money list. Tiger Woods took over first place shortly thereafter. In 1997, Love earned his first major championship at the PGA Championship at Winged Foot Country Club. His rounds of 66-71-66-66 gave him a fivestroke victory over Justin Leonard. In 1996, he won the World Cup individual title at TPC at Mission Hills in Shenzhen, China, defeating former PGA Tour player Hisayuki Sasaki of Japan in a playoff.


Love's father was a highly regarded teacher who died in a plane crash in 1988. Davis Love III was born shortly after his father competed at the 1964 Masters and he later wrote a book, "Every Shot I Take," to honor his dad's lessons and teachings on golf and life. The book was the recipient of the 1997 USGA International Book Award. In 1997, he was inducted into the University of North Carolina Order of Merit, and he was inducted into the Georgia Golf Hall of Fame in Augusta in 2001. Love owns and raises horses, with a seven-stall barn at home. His daughter is a nationally ranked competitive rider in the adult division on Paso Fino horses.

MIKE WEIR 2003 PGA TOUR winnings: \$4,918,910 Age: 33 Hometown: Draper, Utah

2003 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

Mike Weir had a breakthrough season on the PGA Tour in 2003 with three wins, including the Masters, matching his career win total before the season. He missed just one cut all year for the first time in his career. His fifth-place finish on the money list and total earnings topping \$4.8 million were career bests. He claimed his fourth PGA Tour title at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic at La Quinta in January with rounds of 67-64-65-67-67 (330). The victory was his first since the 2001 season when he won the Tour Championship - a span of 26 events between victories. The trophy was presented to Weir by former President Gerald Ford, a longtime Hope Pro-Am participant. Weir continued his strong play at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, finishing tied for third while paired with boyhood idol and hockey legend Wayne Gretzky in the pro-am portion of the event. After earning \$843,890 in 2002, Weir cracked the \$1 million mark in just the third event of 2003 with a \$290,000 AT&T Pro-Am payday. He was also named PGA Tour Player of the Month for February. His victory at



the Masters included just the fourth bogey-free final round by a winner in the 67-year history of the event (and the first since Doug Ford in 1957). The victory jumped him from 10th on the Official World Golf Ranking to fifth, and his \$1,080,000 Masters paycheck was the largest of his career and pushed him over the \$3 million mark for the season. After finishing in a tie for third place at the U.S. Open in June, he leapfrogged Davis Love III for the top spot on the money list and passed the \$4 million mark in season's earnings. He finished the year third in scoring average behind Tiger Woods and Vijay Singh.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

In 2002, Weir's 63 was the lowest first-round score in the history of the Mercedes Championship in Kapalua, Hawaii. In 2001 he earned more than \$2 million for the second consecutive season and picked up a victory for the third straight year. In 2000, he collected his second victory on the PGA Tour in the season-ending WGC-American Express Championship in Kilkenny, Ireland. A bogey-free 67 on Saturday and final-round 67 lifted him to his first WGC title and brought him a career-best \$1 million first prize, making him the seventh player to surpass the \$2.5 million mark in single-season earnings. His first PGA Tour title was the 1999 Air Canada Championship with a two-stroke victory over Fred Funk. The key to his victory was an eagle-2 from 147 yards on No. 14 during the final round, making him the first Canadian to win on native soil since Pat Fletcher won the 1954 Canadian Open. He also joined Phil Mickelson, Bob Charles, Ernie Gonzalez, Sam Adams and Russ Cochran as the only left-handers to win on the PGA Tour.

In 1998, as a rookie, Weir earned \$218,967 to rank 131st on money list. At age 13, Weir wrote a letter to Jack Nicklaus, asking whether he should switch to playing right-handed. Nicklaus advised him to stick to his natural swing.

Howell began the final round two strokes behind leader Brandt Jobe but a final-round 67 gave him the two-stroke victory. In 2002 he also made his first appearance in the Masters in his former hometown of Augusta, where he grew up near the Augusta National Golf Club. He was runner-up to Vijay Singh in the season-ending Tour Championship, which helped to earn Player of the Month honors for October/November 2002. He turned pro in June 2000, one week after turning in a secondplace finish at the Greensboro Open, the highest amateur finish in Tour history. Howell started playing golf at age 7 and won five tournaments before he was 11.

Last year Chris Riley finished in the top 30 for the second straight season and collected a career-high six top-10s, including three top-threes. He started the year with a tie for sixth place at the Mercedes Championship at Kapalua, Hawaii, making him one of four first-time participants to finish in the top 10 at the event. Later, he shared the 54-hole lead at the John Deere Classic and finished tied for second.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

In 2002, Riley earned his first PGA Tour victory in his 109th career start at the Reno-Tahoe Open after defeating Jonathan Kaye in a one-hole playoff. He came from two strokes down on the back nine on the final day to tie Kaye in regulation. With a two-putt par to win on the first hole of the playoff, Riley earned \$540,000, his largest career paycheck. He closed the year making 14 consecutive cuts. The year before, after a slow start, Riley eclipsed the \$1 million mark in season earnings for the first time in his career thanks to four top-10s. His best effort of the year was a runner-up finish at The International. In 2000, he had four top-10 finishes including two in fourthplace. Riley was in the top-10 in his first start as a member of the PGA Tour in 1999 when he finished tied for seventh at the Sony Open in Hawaii. Ironically, his first shot was out of bounds, but he recovered to shoot 67.

He is married to LPGA golfer Michelle Louviere.

TIM HERRON 2003 PGA TOUR winnings: \$2,176,390 Age: 33 (he'll turn 34 Feb. 6) Hometown: Scottsdale, Arizona

2003 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

Tim Herron has placed in the top 75 in seven seasons on the Tour dating back to 1996. In 2003, with four rounds in the 60s, and seven straight on the season, Herron picked up his first top-10, a tie for second, at the Greater Milwaukee Open. After the Milwaukee event, Herron did not play again until August due to the birth of daughter Carson Magne July 24.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

In 2001, Herron managed three top-10 finishes. In 2000, the first of four top-10 finishes was a tie for 10th at the Bay Hill Invitational. He tallied six birdies on the way to posting a 6-under-par 29 on the back nine at the Air Canada Championship, matching the PGA Tour season mark for a low nine. And he finished ninth in his final appearance of year at the Tampa Bay Classic. In 1999, Herron captured his third PGA Tour title in four years with a playoff victory over Tom Lehman at Bay Hill Invitational. The victory was the highlight of a season in which Herron finished among the top 25 on the Tour money list for the first time in his career. In 1998, Herron finished solo sixth at the U.S. Open, marking best career finish in a major championship. As an amateur, he went undefeated in three matches as a member of the victorious 1993 U.S. Walker Cup Team. And he defeated 15-year-old Tiger Woods in the second round of the 1992 U.S. Amateur, one of only two defeats Woods suffered in 23 U.S. Amateur matches

JERRY KELLEY 2003 PGA TOUR winnings: \$2,158,342 Age: 37 Hometown: Madison, Wisconsin


2003 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS:

Last year, Jerry Kelley collected more than \$2 million for the second straight season. In the first event of the season, he finished tied for 10th at the Mercedes Championships, one of four first-time participants to finish among the top 10. In an attempt to defend his title at the Sony Open in Hawaii, Kelley recorded four rounds in the 60s, including a final-round 65 to finish tied for fourth. He finished in a tie for eighth place at the Honda Classic, setting a course record at the Country Club at Mirasol Sunset Course with a second-round 10-under 62. His round of 62 also tied the 18-hole tournament record. Kelley was tied for third in his defense of the 100th Western Open title, placing seven shots behind champion Tiger Woods. And he tied the PGA Tour record for consecutive birdies with eight in the third round of the Las Vegas Invitational at the TPC at Summerlin, posting birdies on Nos. 7-14 on Friday. Bob Goalby set the record at the 1961 St. Petersburg Open and was later tied by Fuzzy Zoeller (1976 Quad Cities Open), Dewey Arnette (1987 Buick Open), Edward Fryatt (2000 Doral-Ryder Open) and J.P. Hayes (2003 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic). After a par on 15, Kelley then eagled No. 16.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

In 2002, Kelley finished in the top 10 on the Tour money list for the first time in his career. He earned his first career victory in his 200th career start at the Sony Open in Hawaii, where he shared the first-round lead and held the third-round lead outright on his way to defeating John Cook by one stroke. Kelley's second Tour victory came just 18 events after the first at the Advil Western Open in Lemont, Illinois. Four rounds in the 60s, including a final-round 65, gave him the come-from-behind win. Kelly began the day three strokes back of third-round leader Robert Allenby and finished two strokes ahead of runner-up Davis Love III. In 2001, Kelley made more than \$1 million in a season for the first time in his career, but for the sixth consecutive year, he played in 30-plus events. Kelley led the Players Championship through the second and third rounds, but a closing 73 dropped him to fourth, four strokes behind Tiger Woods. In 2000, Kelley finished 59th on the Tour money list with \$784,754. Early in the year, at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, he had his season-best finish, a tie for fourth. In 1999, Kelley played in 34 events and made the cut in 22 of those. He recorded the first of five double eagles at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic on the 14th hole at Indian Wells Country Club.

HILE GOLF fans all over the world revere the Pebble Beach Golf Links as one of the finest courses ever created, they may not realize the Monterey Peninsula is home to dozens of golf courses suitable for all levels of play and all budgets. Whether you're a scratch golfer looking for a challenge or a hacker more interested in just having a good time, there's a golf course worth playing. All yardage figures are calculated from the back tees and cited by the Northern California Golf Association, which also provided rates and contact information.

Bayonet and Black Horse golf courses, Seaside – Created in Fort Ord's heyday for military use, these two courses now belong to the City of Seaside and have undergone extensive renovation in recent years. Gen. Robert McClure, designer of Bayonet in 1954, was known for his left-handed slice and designed the course accordingly, so that the only severe doglegs on the course run right to left. In celebration of its 50th anniversary, Bayonet will offer special promotions all year long, as will its sister course, Black Horse, which was designed by Gen. Edwin Carns in 1967. The 7,116-yard par

72 Bayonet and the 7,009-yard par 72 Black Horse - both of which have hosted the PGA's Qualifying School - are open to the public and will host a new Champions Tour pro-am, the First Tee Open, Aug. 30-Sept. 5. The qualifying round for the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am was hosted by Bayonet this year. Course records include a 65 by Notah Begay on Bayonet and a 64 on Black Horse by Ted Oh. Carmel Valley Ranch, Carmel Valley A resort/private club course designed by Pete Dye and built in 1981, Carmel Valley Ranch sits just east of mid valley along the Carmel River and up onto the base of hills nearby. Touted as one of the most modern courses around - its reservations are handled in Scottsdale, Ariz., by Troon Golf and tee times are regularly offered for bid on eBay - C.V. Ranch seeks to offer the quintessential private country club experience to players. Pro Bobby Clampett holds the course record of 63 with player Mark Brooks. The 6,201-yard par 70 course can be played members and resort guests. bv



Del Monte Golf Course – Nicknamed by the locals "Old Del Monte" (or "Old D" for short), the Del Monte Golf Course was built in 1897, making it the oldest course west of the Mississippi. Owned and operated by

Rancho Cañada Golf Club, Carmel Valley – Situated along the Carmel River and on surrounding lands, Rancho Cañada features two 18-hole courses: the 6,349-yard par 71 West Course and the 6,109-yard par 71 East Course. Pro golfer Sam Snead once said the 15th Hole on Rancho Cañada's West Course was the narrowest hole he had ever played. Last fall, owner Nick Lombardo announced he wants to replace the West Course with a 280-unit housing development. Records include a 63 by Doug Sanders on the East Course and a 64 by John Kennaday on the West Course. Both designed by Robert Dean Putnam in 1970, these courses are open to the public. Spyglass Hill Golf Course, Pebble Beach – Designed in 1966 by Robert Trent Jones, Sr., this resort/semi-private course, measuring 6,867 yards with a par of 72, also accepts public play. The year after it was completed, Spyglass replaced Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course in the Bing Crosby Golf Tournament and has been part of the tournament – now the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am – ever since. 


Tehama Golf Club, Carmel Valley – Jay Morrish designed this 6,498-yard par 72 course high in the hills


