Scientists: 85 percent pitch canker mortality 'isn't true and never was'

A KEY assertion of the California Coastal Commission staff's campaign to stop the Pebble Beach Company from building a new golf course — that drastic steps are needed to protect the Monterey pine from extinction because most of the trees will be killed by the pine pitch canker epidemic — is not supported by scientific research, according to the state's foremost experts on the disease.


None of the scientific experts on pitch canker and the Monterey pine would attest to the figures used by the coastal commission.

Instead, the latest research shows that more than two-thirds of the trees will fend off the fungal infection on their own, ensuring survival of the prolific species.

However, in documents submitted to commissioners last month in San Diego, the coastal commission staff continued to assert that a very large percentage of native pines on the Monterey Peninsula will be killed by the disease that first appeared locally in 1992.

"Most estimates describe a mortality rate [from pitch canker] of up to 85 percent," said a report written to support a permit for a new wing at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula — but which was clearly aimed at the P.B. Co. golf course proposal. "The survival of the species

Candidates debate money, property issues

PROPERTY AND money dominated discussion among mayoral and city council candidates at an election forum Tuesday night, as they told a standing-room-only crowd their opinions on annexing Mission Ranch, managing Sunset Center, selling Flanders Mansion, redoing the post office street and increasing tourism dollars, among other topics.

During the forum hosted by The Pine Cone, council candidates Erik Bethel, Mike Cunningham, Jack Gorry and David Maradei, and mayoral candidates Dick Ely and Sue McCloud laid out their reasons for running and then responded to a startling suggestion from the audience that the city boost its sagging budget by annexing Clint Eastwood's Mission Ranch and capturing some of its hotel and sales tax revenues.

After the laughter died down, each candidate opined on the possibility. Several were dubious, given that annexation would have to be sought by the ranch and would require city compensation to the county for any net loss of revenue.

"There are so many other ways to raise money," Gorry said. "It's like stepping through the looking glass when you try to take that thing on."

Bethel said annexing any property must benefit all sides in order to overcome the legal issues.

"Mission Ranch is the only place that has live music," he

Stop signs and roundabout touted for safer streets

FOUR-WAY stops at every downtown Carmel intersection, better pruning and even a roundabout at Junipero and Ocean could make driving here safer, according to a city-commissioned traffic study by Higgins Associates.

Of the 450 accidents which occurred within the 1-square-mile city between Jan. 1, 1998, and July 27, 2003, 153 involved parked cars, 98 resulted in injuries, pedestrians were hit in 26 and bicyclists were struck in seven, principal associate Barbara van Heerden told the Carmel City Council last week.

Using previous studies, interviewing city officials and staff, and analyzing accident statistics, Higgins Associates developed a list of 20 unsafe "hot spots" within the city and recommended possible fixes.

Van Heerden highlighted the most frequent accident spots — the majority in the business district — but the study also mentioned Scenic Road, Dolores Street in front of Robert Louis Stevenson school, Rio Road at Santa Lucia and Junipero, Fourth Avenue at San Antonio and Monte Verde, and the drive from Highway 1 down Carpenter to Junipero.

"Twenty-six pedestrian accidents during the evaluation period is high, so looking at pedestrians and making it safe for them is a high priority," she said. "A lot of the accidents happened on Ocean, with a few on San Carlos and Dolores."

Statistics also revealed broadsides and sideswipes, at 124 and 151, respectively, were the most common types of accidents. While sideswipes might be the result of a lot of traffic, narrow streets, parked cars and

many pedestrians, broadsides more likely result from confusion, right-of-way violations and poor sight distances.

Highway plan goes too far, coast homeowners say

WHAT STARTED as an effort to secure a permit-in-advance for damage that will surely hit Highway 1 in future winter storms has turned into a hot potato as some Big Sur property owners accuse Caltrans of going far beyond its mandate.

"The Coast Highway Management Plan was supposed to ensure the road is kept in a safe condition, but some elements have crept in which aren't beneficial to our community," said Big Sur resident Alan Perlmutter at a meeting of the Coast Property Owners Association last month.

The plan, which is nearing final approval, affects property far from Highway 1. According to maps prepared by Caltrans, the management plan "corridor" stretches more than 20 miles inland and includes most of Carmel Valley and the watersheds of numerous rivers and streams in Big Sur.

"This plan is about the coast and what makes it so special, so we picked geographic boundaries," said Aileen Loe of Caltrans. But she said the agency wouldn't assert "any regulatory authority" over viewshed, property rights or erosion control outside the immediate, 80-foot-wide Highway 1 right of way.

That was little solace to some property

A CARMEL group hopes the public will want to see the city's forest for the trees Saturday, when it leads a one-hour walk in celebration of Arbor Day. The tour will feature some of Carmel's most important trees.

"We had a list of 61 trees and cut it down to 31, so it's a manageable walk, mostly level, and it takes about an hour," he said.



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Oregon specialist and Carmel firm team up on firehouse retrofit

A PORTLAND architect who specializes in retrofitting and designing firehouses will work with local architect John Thodos to develop a fix for the seismically unsafe Carmel Fire Station. The city council voted unanimously Tuesday to approve a \$60,000 contract with the team.

Ivars Lazdins, who opened his small Portland firm in 1971 and designed his first fire station in 1972, has worked on dozens more over the past 30 years. Thodos has known the Oregon designer for three decades and recommended him for the job.

CPA Paul Wood advised the council to work with Thodos and Lazdins as a team to save travel expenses for the Oregon architect.

The team's proposal includes structural upgrades to resist lateral force and effects from adjacent buildings, ADA accessibility, energy efficiency, community access, accommodation of female firefighters as well as emergency medical services and hazardous materials handling. The design team would also address the 67-year-old building's plumbing, mechanical, electrical and standby power systems, fire alarms, sprinklers and emergency shut-off of utilities.

Thodos made a "very preliminary esti-

mate" of \$500,000 in construction costs and said the design fee will be 12 percent — \$60,000 — while charges such as delivery, travel, reproduction, photos and as-built drawings will be billed at cost plus 10 percent.

Thodos and Lazdins "are prepared to move forward and prepare the bid documents and cost estimate for the seismic retrofit of the fire station," Wood said in his report to the council. "With the completion of the bid documents, staff will return to the city council for the construction funding of the project and to get authorization to bid the project."

City councilman Dick Ely wondered if Lazdins was the most qualified architect for the seismic upgrade and worried who would be accountable to the city, Lazdin or Thodos.

"I'm wondering who we're contracting with," he said. "Who's doing what to whom?"

He also pointed out that only part of the scope of work refers to seismic retrofit.

"All of a sudden, this project has taken on a life far beyond what the city council has asked for, and that concerns me," he said.

Councilman Gerard Rose responded that the problems with the firehouse go beyond seismic issues and everything should be handled together.

"If we're going to hire a professional outfit, I would have them address the issue comprehensively rather than piecemeal," he said.

City administrator Rich Guillen said items such as plumbing and electrical systems appear in the Lazdins/Thodos proposal because retrofitting an old building often reveals additional problems.

"Their approach makes more sense," he said.

Regardless of the long-term future of the firehouse — whether the department will continue operating there or if the building is used for something else — Guillen empha-

sized the importance of moving forward.

"How long have we been talking about retrofitting the fire station? How long would it take to build a new one?" he asked. "Our firefighters are in horrible living conditions right now."

The 2003/2004 budget has money set aside for the work, and the council has already identified the project as one of its top five priority projects. The council unanimously voted in favor of the contract.

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
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

FIRST PUBLIC HEARING ON PEBBLE BEACH CO. PLAN

MORE THAN three years after county voters approved the broad outlines of the Pebble Beach Company's plans for a new golf course, 150 new hotel rooms, 38 homes and a relocated equestrian center in Del Monte Forest, the first public hearing on permits for the complex proposal was held Thursday.

"This is a refinement of a plan that has been around for a long time," said Del Monte Forest Land Use Advisory Committee Chair Paul deLay. "In 1992, the company proposed 403 homes and a golf course in Pescadero Canyon. In 1997, that was reduced to 364 homes and the golf course was moved to the equestrian center site."

The current plan, announced in 2000 by Clint Eastwood and Peter Ueberroth, leaders of a group that bought the Pebble Beach Company the year before, cut the number of new homes to 38, added hotel rooms, and put wide swaths of Monterey pine forest into open space preserve.

"The project we're bringing to you today is consistent with what was approved by the voters and endorsed by the property owners association, and it is in keeping with the vision of the ownership for protection of open space in the forest," said Alan Williams, representing the P.B. Co. "It would have been real easy just to sell off lots — you take your money and you're gone — but this

ownership's goal is to make the preservation permanent."

Committee member Ted Hunter and deLay pointedly asked Williams for guarantees that, if the current plan is approved, no further development would be proposed for Pebble Beach.

"We need some assurance that this is the last project," Hunter said, "because we heard the same thing when the Inn at Spanish Bay was approved [in the early 1980s]."

"Does the company plan to expand the Lodge or the Inn at Spanish Bay beyond the language in this plan?" deLay asked.

Williams said the company would honor a contract signed by CEO Bill Perocchi in October 2000 putting an upper limit on development on company-owned land in Del Monte Forest. That contract only takes effect if the current development plan is approved.

With no more than 20 people in attendance — many of them showing concern over the realignment of one street — the committee's agenda moved much more quickly than anticipated. Only four members of the public made comments on the overall plan, which has been analyzed in an extensive EIR costing more than \$500,000.

A lot of people have the impression this is a done deal, but it's not," Hunter said. "It has a long way to go."

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Tiny house on tiny lot, wine shop approved

A PROPERTY owner can rebuild a small house on a small lot, and two women may open a wine shop and tasting room downtown, the Carmel Planning Commission decided Wednesday.

Jeff Britton, who owns a 2,000-square-foot lot on Monte Verde between Fourth and Fifth, asked the commission for permission to tear down the 838-square-foot, two-story home built on the property in 1927 and replace it with a single-story, 698-square-foot home.

The city is very restrictive on the kind of new construc-

tion it will approve on lots smaller than 4,000 square feet. But the planning department should allow a property owner to improve, maintain or replace an already built home so long as its nonconformities do not increase, principal planner Brian Roseth told Britton in a letter last April.

Since the 77-year-old house is not considered historic and the plans call for a smaller home of similar board-and-batt style, commissioners spent most of their time discussing Britton's request for permission to lay a parking pad at the southwest corner of the lot within a driveway easement from a neighboring property.

Representing the absent Britton, designer Bill Vasilovich said the owners of the two lots will legally document their agreement that a car could be parked in the easement, as requested by the planning commission. Commissioners unanimously approved the project, including the exceptions to setback requirements for the parking pad.

Southern Latitudes Wines

The commission also agreed to Annalisa Wood and Kerre Dubinsky's request for a use permit to open a wine shop and small tasting area on Lincoln Street in the Pine Inn courtyard.

The pair plan to sell wines from Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Chile and Argentina, and part of the shop will include tables for customers to use while sampling the wares for a fee.

"I as consumer would be more comfortable if I could sample a wine to know what I'm getting," Dubinsky told the commission. "We want it to be educational, informative and comfortable. We'll have three stand-up tables — and literature so people can take notes if they want to make a sport of it and have a nice time."

After receiving assurance that wine-sipping patrons would not be allowed to loiter in the courtyard with their glasses or stand around blocking the doorway to the shop, the commission unanimously approved the use permit.

owners who are concerned that such a wide-ranging document will inspire new permit conditions by Monterey County or the California Coastal Commission.

"The coastal commission staff is already on record saying they want anyone applying for a permit in Big Sur to show they're complying with the coast highway management plan," said Lisa Kleissner of the CPOA.

"I only heard about the thing last week," said Dan Keig, who owns several hundred acres on the east side of the highway. "Shouldn't somebody have notified me that these changes were being worked on?"

According to Loe, the wide-ranging scope of the highway management plan stems from lengthy closures of the road in 1983 and 1998, necessitating millions of dollars in repairs and cutting off residents for months at a time, which made a comprehensive plan for quick repairs to the road an obvious necessity. Also, the road's incomparable scenery led to its 1996 designation as an "All American Road" by the Federal Highway Administration.

"California's Big Sur Coast and the highway that brings people to it are national treasures," the draft report says. "Countless travelers cherish memories of their highway

experiences: scale-defying views from high above the boundless Pacific Ocean; dark and verdant passages lined with giant redwoods; stops at rustic facilities along the way."

... requires that each population [of native Monterey pine], and especially the Monterey Peninsula population, be protected," the coastal commission report continued. Similar language appears in another report recommending changes to the Monterey County General Plan, to be considered by the commission next Thursday.

The P.B. Co. wants to clear about 100 acres of Monterey pine forest to build a new golf course, while putting 492 acres of the forest into a preserve — a tradeoff which was approved by county voters in 2000 but which the coastal commission staff is apparently trying to stop in its tracks.

Tom Gordon, a plant pathologist at U.C. Davis who has studied pitch canker in Monterey and Santa Cruz counties for more than a decade, said the commission had its facts wrong.

"The 85 percent mortality figure is not true and never was true," he told The Pine Cone, adding that he was surprised the myth has "persisted this long."

It apparently started, Gordon said, after his early studies of pitch canker among planted Monterey pines in Santa Cruz County found that "up to 85 percent of trees showed signs of infection — which meant at least one branch was affected." Later, the probable infection rate was put even higher — at 98 percent, Gordon said.

Initially, pitch canker was seen as invariably fatal, and Gordon's alarming infection rate estimates were hyped far beyond their true significance.

In 1998, for example, Carmel City Forester Gary Kelly told the Monterey County Board of Supervisors that "only 15 percent" of the city's pines would survive the pitch canker epidemic.

"But we never equated the infection rate with mortality," said Gordon, whose papers from the 1990s are cited in coastal commission footnotes, purportedly underpinning the 85 percent prediction of pine deaths from pitch canker. Later research has put the mortality rate at "no more than 30 percent — and that's at the high end," Gordon said.

Another expert on the Monterey pine, Stephen Staub, head of the statewide pitch canker task force, said the 85 percent figure was "a bad extrapolation from an early result 10 years ago." He said even the 30 percent mortality figure cited by Gordon was probably too high.

"The disease is creeping out through the native stands, and it has increased its range," Staub said. "But the severity and the mortal-

District hands out free smoke detectors

SMOKE DETECTORS awakened a mother and daughter early Saturday after a fire ignited in a downstairs bedroom of their Fisher Place home. Fifteen firefighters from Cypress Fire Protection District and Carmel and Carmel Valley fire departments responded to the scene, where they found the residents outside, according to battalion chief Greg Furey. An ambulance took the girl to the hospital for treatment of minor smoke inhalation.

Fire investigator Cliff Williams estimated the damage at \$50,000, according to Furey, and the cause remains under investigation.

The incident illustrated the importance of home smoke detectors, and Cypress Fire is giving free detectors. Postcards about the giveaway have been mailed to every residence within its boundaries, according to fire captain Dan Frost.

"Cypress Fire Protection District purchased them because we felt it was of the utmost importance for us to provide the best protection to the residents in our district," Frost said. Anyone with questions should call the Rio Road station at 624-4511.

ity are not anywhere close to what we thought they would be." Many trees infected more than a decade ago are still thriving, while young trees are showing increasing signs of immunity, he said.

"The mortality from storms is higher than anything related to pitch canker," Staub concluded.

In a series of interviews with other experts on pitch canker and the Monterey pine, none would attest to the figures used by the coastal commission.

"The situation isn't as dire as was initially thought," said Deborah L. Rogers, a research geneticist with U.C. Davis. "There is resistance in the forest that we didn't see initially" — a happy conclusion that resulted from the forest's genetic diversity, she said.

Her 2002 paper, "In Situ Genetic Conservation of the Monterey Pine," called for maximum protection of native pine in Monterey County and outlined 18 steps for preservation of the remaining forest. "The healthier the forest is, and the more diverse it is, the better it will be able to withstand pitch canker, and future pitch cankers," she said.

Local pine activist Joyce Stevens also said the 85 percent figure wasn't valid.

"It definitely is not what has been observed on the ground," she said, making a statement that is probably obvious to anyone who lives on the Monterey Peninsula, where vibrant pine forests remain a ubiquitous backdrop more than 12 years after the pitch canker alarm was sounded. "People are encouraged by what's going on. I'm not sure the 85 percent was valid to begin with," Stevens said.

Pacific Grove City Forester Frank Ono said a very large percentage of that city's pines would be dead from pitch canker if not for the acquired resistance many older trees are showing and the apparent immunity of numerous young trees. "With the resistance we're seeing, [the death rate] is not even close to 85 percent," Ono said.

And Carmel's current city forester, Mike Branson, said some of the city's infected older trees have "put on more growth than they've lost to pitch canker." But, despite that improving trend, quite a few younger and middle-aged trees have been lost to pitch canker, a loss he called "tragic for the city's forest."

Gordon noted there has been a substantial change in the pitch canker outlook since 1999, when it was first noticed that some trees long infected had gone into remission.

"The disease severity seems to have leveled off," Gordon

said. "We saw pretty dramatic increases from 1996 to 2000, but it has apparently plateaued, especially in the last two years."

He said the pattern seems to be: A stand of trees is hit pretty hard when the pitch canker pathogen, a fungus called *Fusarium circinatum*, is introduced, and the most susceptible trees quickly succumb. But, as is usually the case with the process of natural selection, others are lightly impacted or not at all, and these come to dominate the forest, Gordon said.

That seems to be happening on Huckleberry Hill in Del Monte Forest, where a 160-acre pine forest was destroyed in a May 1987 fire.

The thick forest that has grown over the last decade, "looks like someone planted a whole bunch of seeds, but it's all natural regeneration," Ono said. "Monterey pines are prolific, and quite a few of those new trees are resistant to pitch canker."

"Rates of infection, especially over the last three years, have declined significantly," Staub said.

Petition to call pine threatened

The 85 percent mortality figure was headlined in a 1999 petition from the California Native Plant Society to list the Monterey pine as a threatened species. That petition was withdrawn in the face of withering criticism from scientists who pointed out that the tree is among the most common in the world, having been extensively planted in Argentina, New Zealand and other countries.

"There is hardly any chance that the Monterey pine will become extinct — in fact I don't think it would be possible to eradicate it if somebody wanted to," declared Andrew Storer, Ph.D., an assistant professor at the University of California at Berkeley, in January 2000, when the pitch canker epidemic was raging.

At that time, David Wood, Ph.D., a U.C. Berkeley professor of entomology who specializes in tree diseases spread by

bark beetles, said, "The Monterey pine isn't in danger of going extinct in California or anywhere else."

There are more than 2.75 million Monterey pines in Monterey County and about 4 billion worldwide, experts say.

The coastal commission will discuss measures to protect the Monterey pine at its meeting Thursday in Monterey. According to the documents produced by their staff at past meetings, commissioners' discussions will largely be based on pitch canker research from the 1990s.

"I think it would be a mistake to rely on information that is that old," Gordon said.

The California Coastal Commission will meet at The Hyatt Regency Monterey on Old Golf Course Road March 17-19. Monterey County issues, including possible changes to the general plan, are on Thursday's agenda.

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



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Call in the kitties: High-end thefts plague Molena Point

As in her previous books, Murphy sets the plot in Molena Point which bears a striking resemblance to Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Three very different and dramatic thefts take place in Molena: A painting, worth half a million dollars, is stolen from an oceanfront home; a million dollar diamond choker is the next theft; and the third, a mint condition vintage Packard roadster is driven away from an auto repair shop. All of the thefts were accomplished without any telltale evidence of who perpetrated the crimes.

Naturally the cats pad hot on the trail.

The murder comes in when Charlie Harper has a showing of her latest paintings. When a waiter drops dead at the opening reception, Murphy readers will know they're in for some super sleuthing by Joe Grey, private cat detective, his tabby *inamorata*, Dulcie, and their precocious foster kitten, named Kit.


A subplot, with Kate Osborne and evil black cat Azrael reemerging in this book in San Francisco, further the intricacies of Murphy's always well-plotted books. And as usual it's fast-paced and intriguing. Is it any wonder Murphy has received six national Cat Writers' Association awards for best novel of the year and for the Joe Grey books? Despite the fantasy angle in the Joe Grey series, these are adult books dealing with adult themes.

The 323-page hardcover, published by HarperCollins, is now available at local bookshops for \$24.95.

"LEFT IN GREENWICH" by Patricia Monroe Arnold, is a semi-autobiographical book of the author's Edgewood school years in Greenwich, Connecticut in the '40s and after, entering young adulthood with a job that paid \$25

a week, loving having a Social Security number and being independent while going through night school.



The book carries her into adulthood, marriage and childbearing and raising and eventually to her move to Santa Cruz where she publishes those ubiquitous blue maps seen throughout this area. She is the author of four books, "The Autobiography of an Activist," "Moving Up To Hollywoodland," and two mystery books with the game of bridge figuring prominently in both, "Murder in Duplicate," and "Ashland Psych Murder," both which received good reviews in this column.

The fifth book is well written, and if you like the nostalgic recollections of a young girl's life in those long ago and quite radically different years compared to the present, you'll like this one.

Watsonville Band slates free Carmel concert



"This is an issue that concerned us, and most occurred right in the commercial area," she said. "Carmel is such a beautiful place that driver concentration is not what it should be."

'Shopping basket'

Commissioned three years ago and completed in January, the Higgins study includes numerous possible fixes.

"We wanted to present Carmel with a shopping basket of little bite-sized proposals — improvements people could make," van Heerden explained.

Among potential changes for each of the 20 hot spots, the study recommended designating a few high-priority changes, including:

- implementing an annual "Pedestrian Route Improvement Program" to make popular walking routes safer;
- installing bike route signs;
- increasing sight distance and adding turn and merge lanes at Junipero and Seventh;
- acquiring and evaluating the accident data for the remaining five months of 2003 to see if additional hot spots appear; and
- installing four-way stops in the commercial district, from Monte Verde to Junipero and Fifth to Eighth avenues.

"Then people know everyone gets a turn," she said. "They will reduce the decision-making aspect and will enhance traffic safety."

Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud worried that on such short blocks, the additional stops might cause backups, while resident Clay Berling suggested posting "cross-traffic does not stop" signs to advise drivers when they should wait.

Rio Road roundabout?

While not designating it as a high priority, the consultant identified Rio Road at Junipero and Santa Lucia as a complicated and confusing area in need of a redo. The study suggested several fixes, such as closing off Ridgewood Road, installing a three-way stop at Rio and Santa Lucia, realigning the intersection at 13th Avenue and building a "mini-roundabout."

The five-way stop at Junipero and Ocean — which confounds even longtime local drivers trying to cross town — contains numerous potential vehicle-vs.-vehicle and vehi-

cle-vs.-pedestrian conflict points, according to the study. There were eight accidents there over the evaluation period compared with a high of 11 at Ocean and San Carlos, but the busy crossing would be safer if it had a traffic signal or a roundabout. Making Mountain View one way would reduce some of the potential conflicts.

Although Higgins Associates verified the controversy-ridden one-way block of Fifth Avenue in front of the post office as a hot spot, it concluded the area needs separate study, given the number of people who would be affected by changes there.

Throughout town, van Heerden recommended pruning the landscaping so drivers could see farther into the intersections.

Nonetheless, the report admitted, "a lot of the accidents could be attributed to bad driving, and it is not within the power of the city staff to change that."

Speeding is not an issue, according to the study. After surveying speeds in various spots, the consultant discovered that on most streets posted with a 25 mph limit, 85 percent of the drivers were traveling at less than 20 mph. On Sixth Avenue downtown, the median speed was 14 mph. On Rio Road on the way out of town, 85 percent of drivers travel at 26 mph or slower.

'Straight-line mentality'

Councilwoman Barbara Livingston condemned the report as having a "straight-line mentality and big city solutions," and asked if the consultant had considered removing all downtown stop signs and returning to the "you-go-I-go" method.

Van Heerden said she could not recommend such a broad-brush approach.

McCloud asked if some of the residential streets might be reduced to 15 mph, and van Heerden said the narrow, curving, hilly streets would warrant the reduced speed limit.

The mayor also wondered how to keep the numerous pedestrians — who bring Carmel's normal population of 4,081 up to 35,000 during the peak season — from clogging crosswalks and irritating drivers trying to get through town.

"The things we can't control are the way pedestrians behave and the way motorists behave," van Heerden commiserated. "But some places can accommodate an entirely pedestrian walk."

Councilman Dick Ely, who also sits on the board of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County, said TAMC has money available for pedestrian and bikeway projects and suggested the city pursue it.

Councilwoman Paula Hazdovac observed that large vehicles parked at street corners often impede drivers' sight and asked if they could be prevented from parking in such spots. Councilman Gerard Rose responded he'd seen that restriction in Chicago.

The council took no action after receiving the study, which is being reviewed by the community traffic safety commission.

added. "I don't know if I would want it to be annexed."

(According to the Carmel Municipal Code, it is illegal for live music to be played anywhere alcohol is sold, with the exception of Sunset Center.)

Cunningham said he could not answer the question without knowing how much each side would gain over the long term.

McCloud joked that tickets could be sold for a shootout between Eastwood and the "poor, defenseless, woman Mayor of Carmel," and then in seriousness reminded the audience that state law requires any annexation be "revenue neutral," meaning the county could not lose money in the deal.

Ely and Maradei took the matter seriously, the former saying he had already mentioned it to Eastwood business associate Alan Williams.

"I felt that opening a dialogue not only with Mission Ranch but other sphere-of-influence properties would significantly improve the long-term health of our city," he said.

Maradei researched it "some time ago" and found the county's tax receipts amounted to as much as \$200,000 from Mission Ranch, some of which he thought the city could get. An offer of annexation "would be a very generous act" on Eastwood's part, Maradei said. "And if that happened, I would like to see the uses there grandfathered in."

Sunset Center management

On running the most important property already in the city's hands, McCloud, Bethel, Gorry and Cunningham favor independent management such as that proposed by the private nonprofit Sunset Cultural Center, Inc., while Ely would not say and Maradei prefers city staff.

Maradei said the Carmel Cultural Commission should continue overseeing Sunset's management since that is its traditional role and members have proved their abilities. But the marketing director hired to run it is crucial, he said. "That's the individual who will make it a success or a failure."

Ely lamented that the matter is still not settled and worried about contract negotiations still to come if SCC is chosen.

"The bottom line is we have to get someone in there running it," he said. "The longer it is dark, the more difficult it is to get it filled with performers."

McCloud said a nonprofit like SCC would be able to manage the center effectively and efficiently, far better than "a bureaucratic approach" by the city. She agreed a marketing manager should be hired right away and blamed Ely for standing in the way by refusing to attend closed council sessions in which contracts are negotiated.

"It's very hard to hire somebody when that individual can't be told whom he or she will be working for," McCloud said.

Ely responded that two attorneys advised him it "would be inappropriate" for the council and SCC to talk about the contract behind closed doors.

"It's beyond me how we could put so much energy into building Sunset Center for two years and not figure out how to run it before it was finished," Gorry commented. While he called the SCC board "a blue-ribbon bunch of people" who know what they're doing, he advocated installing a few members of the cultural commission on the board to diffuse some of the controversy.

"I think we've kicked this thing around long enough," Gorry said.

The city cannot afford to mismanage the school-auditorium-turned-high-tech-theater, according to Bethel, and the nine-member SCC has the necessary focus, backgrounds, flexibility and stability.

"It doesn't fluctuate with the political currents in city hall," he said. "And it's going to be responsive."

"The key is to have a contract that paints the picture clearly to them, so they know what constitutes success in the eyes of the city," Cunningham agreed.

Tourist wooing

While they advocated attracting more tourists to boost sales and hotel tax income, the candidates differed on how to do it and whether to tax tourists more.

Rather than spending money on a marketing campaign to bring them to town — as former Mayor Ken White advocated during his 2002 council bid — Maradei said the city should first cut costs. Failing that, it could raise the transient occupancy tax or develop another revenue producer.

"If we raise the hostelry tax, some [of the money] should be returned to the hostelry and tourism industry to build the marketing of Carmel-by-the-Sea," he said.

Ely observed that sales tax and TOT pay for 60 percent of the city's expenses.

"We need to relook at the marketing program and figure out a better way to attract the kinds of tourists we want without taking away from the ambiance," he said.

McCloud touted Sunset. "It's hoped that Sunset, by increasing its use, will bring the type of people in who will be here overnight, eat in the restaurants and stay in hotels," she said.

The question should focus on quality rather than quantity, according to Bethel.

"I would encourage us to think outside of the box to make sure we attract the kind of people who stay longer," he said.

"One way to get more revenue is to get more tourists," Gorry admitted. "But you have a Catch-22: How do we get money to give to the business community to attract more

tourists when we don't have money for basic services?"

He favors raising the TOT to 12 percent to bring in \$800,000 more a year. Half could be used toward the debt on Sunset Center, \$200,000 for the Rio Park debt, \$100,000 for the business community's tourism advertising with another \$50,000 available to them through a matching grant program, and the remaining \$50,000 for whatever the city wanted.

Cunningham wondered how much should be spent to attract visitors.

"Despite the fact that it's difficult to define the dollars, it's like an investment that has to meet certain criteria," he said, including a strategy to increase TOT and sales tax dollars by more than the amount invested.

Flanders, etc.

The lines were more clearly drawn in the debate over Flanders Mansion, with Ely and Maradei opposed to its sale and McCloud and Bethel in favor of it. Gorry said he would consider selling if voters agreed and the money would help pay off Sunset, and Cunningham said the mansion should be analyzed just like any other city asset to see if it's worth keeping.

All said they would continue paying for home mail delivery to elderly and housebound Carmel residents, but Maradei, who used to run the post office and sees it as the town center, said he probably would not have voted for the program.

Asked whether the city council should study the recent straightening of the street in front of the post office — with an eye to putting the old bump-out back — Ely said a study is just a way to back-burner the controversy. He has said the street should be put back the way it was before the city administrator "unilaterally" decided to straighten the sidewalk.

He said the incident is a good indicator of the problems at city hall which inspired him to run for mayor.

Bethel, who sits on the traffic safety commission, favors studying the situation before any more construction is done.



Editorial

Finishing the LCP

MUCH OF what the government does is a mystery. If there's a pothole in your street and you call city hall and somebody comes and fixes it, that's easy to comprehend. But why is it such a big deal that Carmel has finished its Local Coastal Program and that, with just a few more pro forma steps, the city will have the power to issue coastal development permits?

In 1972 California voters, alarmed at the overdevelopment in places like Malibu and Orange County, voted to impose statewide standards for subdivisions and building permits along the coast. But imposing such standards meant taking planning authority away from local governments where it had long been held and which were very reluctant to let it go. In a classic urban-vs.-rural split, people in the less developed parts of California — with fewer people and, thus, less political clout at the state level — envisioned themselves being told what to do by their big-city brethren.

Responding to these concerns, the Legislature, when it codified Prop 20 in the California Coastal Act of 1976, made a compromise: Local governments would be stripped of final permit authority in favor of the Coastal Commission, but only temporarily. As soon as a city or county in the coastal zone revised its local ordinances, via a Local Coastal Program, to conform with the strict environmental policies in the Coastal Act, the power to issue permits would be returned.

Some local governments acted quickly to get their LCPs finished. The unincorporated parts of Monterey County have had LCPs for nearly 20 years. But other places dragged their feet. Carmel didn't complete its LCP until late 2001; only two weeks ago, the coastal commission accepted the document. Pacific Grove and Monterey still haven't finished theirs.

Citizens of a city without an LCP are put through permit double jeopardy. First, they have to take their plans for even small projects to city hall for a round of environment review, neighborhood comment, and permit hearings. Then they have to go through the same thing all over again at the coastal commission. Just getting rid of this redundant and expensive process is reason enough to celebrate completion of the Carmel LCP.

But an even grosser injustice is often suffered by permit applicants in cities without LCPs. At the local level, planning decisions are made by people with a stake in the community and local expertise. The standards applied are usually the community's standards, which is what they should be, when a small building project is at stake.

But at the coastal commission, even the smallest project is usually evaluated by people with a completely different, and often arbitrary, agenda. The result at that level can be — and often is — the opposite of what perfectly well-intentioned, and much better informed, people in local government decided. Activists without much clout at city hall — and even those who aren't taken the least bit seriously at the local level — often find their opinions treated with great deference by the coastal commission, where a unanimous vote of a city council is sometimes taken less seriously than an impassioned appeal from a single individual. This dynamic led some people, aware they were out of touch with majority opinion at the local level, to try to delay the adoption of LCPs in their cities.

But when an LCP takes effect — which will happen in Carmel very soon — the double jeopardy will disappear and the activists will lose their unfair advantage. That will be a happy day for nearly every citizen of this town.

SCC is a nonprofit

Dear Editor,

There were some misstatements in a recent letter to the editor concerning the status of the Sunset Cultural Center, Inc. SCC was incorporated under the laws of the State of California as a nonprofit public benefit corporation, and The Pine Cone correctly identified SCC as a nonprofit corporation. Also, the writer apparently confused "nonprofit" with "501(c)(3)," a status conferred by the Internal Revenue Service.

The Internal Revenue Service does not determine whether a corporation is for-profit or nonprofit, but rather whether the

corporation is required to pay income taxes and whether donations to that organization are deductible for income tax purposes. Most corporations applying to the IRS for non-taxable status are new organizations, and U.S. Treasury Department regulations have specific provisions dealing with new organizations including submission of projected budgets for two years.


New nonprofits seeking determination of tax-exempt sta-

tus must file IRS form 1023; that form, and the instructions to it are available online at www.irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/k1023.pdf. The SCC is in the process of preparing the form 1023 and its California equivalent.

"That's why we're here today," Williams said. "After we go through the county process, we have the entire coastal commission process. It's long and arduous, but the new ownership is committed to see this through."

Late Thursday, after just one day of hearings, the LUAC forwarded the P.B. Co. plan to the Monterey County subdivision committee. But, with two members abstaining, it voted 3-2 not to recommend approval of the new golf course.

After the subdivision committee, the proposal will be considered by the Monterey County Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors. Then the plan will go to the California Coastal Commission, where the staff has made no secret of its opposition to cutting Monterey pines to make way for a new golf course (see story, page 1A).

her folks stop to talk too long, she calls a halt to that by gently grabbing their hand in her mouth and pulling. They always take the hint.



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
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
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
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


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In Your Dreams

A way with wood

A STREAK of persistence pervades the life of William Schnute.

The son of a prominent orthopedic surgeon, Schnute was pegged as slow during his early school years because he failed to learn to read until fifth grade. Today such a child would be recognized as dyslexic and given special guidance, but to his parent's chagrin, young William was "stuck with a stigma. I was immediately branded as stupid in school."

With no encouragement in particular, the child discovered he possessed both an interest and a gift. He carved wood — not necessarily with a knife.

"They wouldn't let me have a knife because I was a little kid. I would pick up wood and a nail, and sharpen the nail, and see it as a tool."

Schnute eventually caught up academically with his cohorts in La Grange, Ill., a suburb of Chicago.

"In fifth grade it just clicked and I could read. We were supposed to read all of these different books and do reports on them. I decided that wasn't of interest to me. Instead I read the Encyclopedia Britannica from A to Z," remembered Schnute.


From that time until now, he has been driven by a curiosity to discover how things work, an urge to sidestep the 9-to-5 treadmill, and a love of carving in wood. Out of these raw materials, he constructed a life.

The illiterate Schnute has even written the book on his passion, "High-Relief Wood Carving," (Sterling Publishing Co.).

Schnute opened the original Oak Leaves Studio in the Midwest in 1974 and moved it and his family to Carmel Valley Village in 1987. Through storefront picture windows, he can be observed carving whatever project occupies him at present, from majestic double doors that harbor a frozen ocean wave, to a fireplace mantel replete with his trademark oak leaves and a squadron of black squirrels.


Because he had no choice, Schnute is essentially a self-

taught master woodcarver. He enjoyed minimal encouragement while learning the craft.

“There was a pretty active effort growing up to keep me from doing it. It was considered a nonessential thing, a silly thing to do.”

By way of contrast, in Europe, woodcarving is recognized as a revered and ancient artform. In the era of guilds, the woodcarvers’ guild was among the most prestigious.

To his surprise, Schnute discovered that no U.S. school offered a degree in woodcarving.

“You can get a master’s degree in pottery or basket weaving, but there is simply no program for woodcarving.”

Instead, Schnute earned a bachelor’s degree in general science and worked in a laboratory at the University of Iowa’s department of toxicology and pharmacology. But during this spell, as he helped build a microspectrofluorometer — a device used to discover and track the flow of neurotransmitters in tissue — he moonlighted as a woodcarver.

“I worked 8 to 5 at the university and worked 9 to 2 at night trying to build up a [woodcarving] business. By ’74 it was time to go full time, so I quit my job.

“I have no clear distinctions between science and art,” he observed. “I think both are searching for truth in knowledge. Most of my work in wood deals with interfaces between air, land and water. That is where some of the most interesting chemistry and things are happening. I like doors: the interface between the public and private side of a building.”

Schnute is a member of two groups: the Carmel Art Association and the Society of Animal Artists. But unlike many artists, he enjoys the challenge of filling a client’s request for a commission. In this way, his creations can be observed in homes and commercial buildings across the Monterey Peninsula and the nation.

“I’ve always enjoyed working with individual people. Most artists don’t like commissions, thinking they take some of their creativity away. It seems to me that there are really thousands of ideas, and the only question is, which are you going to do?”

He has a keen understanding of his personal skills and limitations.

“I really can only do one [project] at a time. A lot of painters can lay out a number of canvases and do two or three, paint on one for a while and

then the other.

“It took years to develop my hands and get the muscles and skills. The most important aspect is the mental view. I never realized there was anything unusual about how I thought until I saw people work on computers. With a computer, they can take an image and turn it around, look at it many ways. I can do that in my mind. Before you start cutting a board, you walk around it and have it memorized and realize how it should look, then I say it’s all ready except for the doing.”

Perhaps to rectify the dearth of instruction in woodcarving in this country, Schnute teaches the subject at the Carmel Adult School.

“It’s one of the most satisfying things I do,” he maintained.

Word of mouth and a degree of media attention have brought Schnute commissions from near and far. Photographs of owls serve as a reference as he carves a design for a fireplace in Emmaus, Penn.

“I almost always prefer to work with hardwoods. Cherry, walnut, white oak and maple are my favorites. I equate them with karat jewelry, and softwoods with costume jewelry. A painter will have a palette of colors; I call my gouges a palette of textures.”

While his years in Carmel Valley have been rewarding, Schnute is preparing to move Oak Leaves Studio to New England. His destination is Frye’s Measure Mill in Wilton, N.H. This water-powered mill has been the site of Shaker box making since 1858. The woodcarver said he intends to begin his move east in early April.

Schnute admitted he will miss Carmel Valley, but his move is partially born of economic necessity.

“In the 1980s there was an organization of Carmel Valley artists, and people were coming out to see what we did. With the Loma Prieta earthquake [in 1989], the traffic went down to zero. That’s what turned the village around. People stopped coming out and this place became very isolated again.”

He recalled that in the past, his workload was such he would be two or three projects behind. These days he is “caught up,” and seeks a greater number of commissions. So the call of New England is strong.

Tape marks the floor of Oak Leaves Studio in

Anna Beck: Ever in pursuit of beauty

IT TOOK a lucky 13 tries to get Anna Beck's living room the very shade of red she desired.

At some expense of dollars, time and pigment came into being a most sublime Carmel backdrop to a winning blend of family heirlooms, well-loved antiques and quirky keepsakes. And just what is the color of that living room painted in a soft Chinese red, with hints of peach? Anna Red, naturally.

Uprooted from her native Virginia and ensconced some years in France, Beck is now an established thread in the Monterey Peninsula cultural fabric. She can run an estate sale, roast a batch of parsnips and appraise a collection of Japanese chalkware dolls — and do so with a dollop of style.

For 27 years she has owned Anna Beck Antiques at 26358 Carmel Rancho Lane. And in her own words, "I get a high every time I walk in my door. That's a blessing."

Her tendency is to downplay accomplishments. A deep knowledge of the decorative arts is virtually dismissed as

"I walked into the living room and told the real estate agent, 'I can't buy it; it won't work. I cannot stand striated plywood.'"

"I just love all beautiful things."

And she has the enthusiasm of a young girl.

"I just adore what I do. Just yesterday I went down to a wonderful house on Lincoln Street. I'll do an estate sale there."

Beck formerly owned and operated Tassajara Hot Springs, that legendary resort straddling the Santa Lucia mountain range. Under Beck's discerning tutelage, working with her then-husband Robert, Tassajara became renowned for its serenity and delicious food.

A 1965 issue of Holiday magazine expressed it well:

"Only seven miles inland from the coast as a raven might fly, but nearly a day's drive by the area's precipitous roads, lies a cul-de-sac called Tassajara Hot Springs. There, at the end of a wonderfully primitive and tortuous road, are a bar, a

dining room with splendid food, and stone cabins with terraces over a rushing trout stream."

"We had gone there in the summer of '59," she recalled. "It was being so badly run, my husband and a friend said we should own it. We'd never done anything like it in our lives. He was a San Francisco school teacher and I was an antiques dealer."

Multi-tasking seems to be a phrase coined for Beck. Not one to shrink from challenge, she became the Tassajara Hot Springs doyenne while maintaining another home in Monterey and an antiques business in the Bay Area.

"I started my antiques business in San Francisco in 1956, and kept doing it. We had a buyer in France and one in England.

We would import things and had dock sales in San Francisco — rent a warehouse on the dock and just sell.”

The Becks made substantial improvements to Tassajara. A cookbook was spawned. The family grew.

“I always came out (to live on the Peninsula) in the wintertime. It was lovely in many ways, but hard. You could get snowbound at Tassajara in the wintertime. We wanted to improve the place, and our lawyer said, once you put your imprint on it, it will change.”

In 1966, with another child on the way, the Becks decided to sell Tassajara. It was bought by the San Francisco Zen Center, and one caveat the Becks insisted upon was that Tassajara remain open to the public.

“We were really a holding company for Buddha,” she quipped.

The Becks maintain a lifetime estate to visit the resort

they cultivated and still own 160 acres in that incredible setting.

With children in tow, they moved to a home at 12th and Carmelo, Carmel-by-the-Sea. The children requested a treehouse, and this was built for them, for as Beck said, “A treehouse is magical.”

When they moved away years later, the residence was given the name, The Treehouse, and it has stuck.

Carmel and antiques are constants in Anna Beck's world.

“I think there is a high level of sophistication in this very cottagey kind of area,” she said of her longtime hometown. “People around here are very sophisticated and have good taste. And there are a lot of wonderfully beautiful inherited antiques that I'm always looking to buy. As my husband used to say, ‘Anna, you can't sell from an empty wagon.’ In Carmel, I certainly don't have an empty wagon.”

She opened her first Carmel shop in the late '60s, in a

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
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little stone house on Mission near Third.

Her advice to antiques mavens in the making: “Buy what you love from a trusted dealer. Don't be afraid to pay for something, because good dealers know good things. You'll get your money's worth.”

Beck acquired her present home, it of the Anna Red living room, in 1982. At the time, it had stood unoccupied for several years, and it was smaller.

“I walked into the living room and told the real estate agent, ‘I can't buy it; it won't work. I cannot stand striated plywood.’”

The house, built in 1947, had living room walls paneled in that very material, which reminded Beck of “every motel in the 1940s.”

Somehow she was persuaded to take the plunge, and today those same wood walls exude warmth and style, coated in Anna Red and decorated with antiques and original artwork.

Beck's son, Adam, is an artist, and his watercolors and oils share space with Weston photographs, Sam Colburn paintings and other treasures. She is an aficionado of Japanese Kimekome dolls and set aside a glass-topped nightstand to display her collection.

She grew to love the house enough to enlarge it, adding 21 feet, two decks and an upgraded kitchen with

"European sensibility."

In 1995, while Beck was away, a tree fell on her house during a storm. A friend who was staying there was visited by a newspaper reporter who asked, "What did

it sound like when the tree hit the house?"

"She answered, 'It sounded like a tree hit the house,'" Beck laughed. The incident sparked Beck's decision to remodel.

European and Asian touches are here and there, which is fitting, for she is much-traveled.

In fact, it was during a mid-'50s sojourn in France that Beck was touched by the beauty of antiques.

This avowed Francophile was working in an advertising office when a fashion director from a store in her native Virginia asked, "Could you go to the bookstalls and flea markets and find props for us, things that could be sold?" That was the beginning.

She developed a love of the field and made lifelong friends while overseas. She continues to be a cultivator of friendships and a steward of beautiful objects.

No school gave her this insight. As Beck explained, "I operate from my own experience, which is pretty extensive." ✨

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


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
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Oops! The dog ate the oil painting

Time to call Ralph the restorer

WHAT TO do when the beautiful vase handed down from great grandma has a run-in with the wall and survives with a chipped lip? Or the oil painting over the mantel somehow gets ripped right down the middle? Or the Polynesian nude trips and falls off her pedestal? Or, as happened last week, five beautiful carved-wood panels pop their knotholes after being used to decorate a damp bathroom?

The solution to all this art gone awry just might be Carmel's Ralph McConnell, artist, designer and restorer.

He's been asked to do impossible things, and he hastens to warn, "I'm no magician." But when he made the ugly greenish knotholes virtually disappear from the translucent, pale peach, carved wood panels, this reporter thought she heard a faint abracadabra.

McConnell explained that he tried several combinations of chemicals to remove the discolored knots, which apparently absorbed moisture from being displayed in a too-moist environment and turned dark, as natural pine often does.

"I don't know why an artist would choose pine for a piece as beautiful as this in the first place," McConnell grumbled. But his is not to reason why; his is just to fix or die. So he gave up on bleaching out the knots and got to work painting them over.

McConnell's true talent, he believes, is his terrific eye for matching colors. To mask the dark knots, he had to mix a total

of six different acrylic colors and use a paint brush to recreate the look of the unblemished wood.

When he was finished, the imperfection was invisible. About 20 other knots waited to be erased, a job that he estimated would take another 20 hours and cost around \$700.

The broken and the precious

Most people who come to McConnell ask him to mend a broken antique or fix a precious memento.

"I don't like to work on very expensive pieces because there's no guarantee in this business, and I'm always afraid I'll goof it up," he said. "I like to work for the little guy who has a piece with real sentimental value."

So when the museum-quality vase from 500 B.C. was dashed to smithereens in a shipping accident, McConnell told the owner he could not put it back together. But after the owner gave him the pile of pieces, McConnell did give it a go. Today the ancient vase sits by his work desk, quite amazingly restored to its former self, but with a small piece missing.

"I like it this way," he said. "Better antiquity, don't you think?"

McConnell's only formal art training involved studying illustration for three years at the Art Center College of Design in Los Angeles. He has no formal education in chemistry, so his expertise with various glues, patching compounds, adhe-

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


sives, epoxies, acrylics and oils has been self-taught through experimentation. He has found a supplier in Colorado for something called restoration super glue which is extremely fine so joints in glued porcelain don't show after drying. A file cabinet next to his workbench bulges with paint samples, materials suppliers and records of successful projects from the past.

When the job is an oil painting with a rip or hole, he carefully trims away any exposed threads, epoxies a new piece of canvas on the back, steams it, compresses it with weights, fills the empty space between the torn sections with gelex and

then uses his color-matching skill to bridge the gap.

"I can say that I am very, very good at the trickiest part, which is matching paint. It tends to dry slightly darker, so as I work, I use a hair dryer to make sure the finished colors will be as seamless as possible. Nothing is 100 percent, but if I do my job well, the flaw won't be noticed by most people."

McConnell's decade of work as a contract artist for California Artist, a maker of Christmas cards in Southern California, ended when the company went belly up. He moving to Carmel in 1967 and continued to freelance card design. On the walls of his Carmel Knolls home are beautiful nativity scenes and madonna and child paintings from those days. "People won-

der if I am ultra-religious when they see my paintings, but I'm not. I just enjoyed them because they were more interesting, more challenging. You can just paint so many Santas without going crazy."

Fixing the fixer

McConnell's occupation as a restorer of broken treasures is apropos, considering that he, too, was a lost soul for a long time. He began suffering from debilitating panic attacks in the '80s — his condition deteriorated to the point that he couldn't even go to the grocery store because it would paralyze him with fear that someone/something was sneaking up behind

him to do him harm.

"I had difficulty going out, especially where there were crowds of people. I was afraid all the time; I was just in a frightful state," he admits. "I lost a decade to the panic attacks." Now recovered, he credits a seminal event in his life for the turnaround:

"After I got divorced, I felt much better!"

In the '90s, a renewed McConnell started a career fixing other people's prized possessions.

"Every job is different, which is what I

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


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

enjoy," he said. "The last one was Don Quixote and his sidekick Sancho Panza," who had suffered from a little too much windmill tilting. "I thought the sculpture was pewter, but the broken part turned out to be a kind of wax base coated with pewter-ware." After a bit of his specialty — using paint to mimic diverse substances — McConnell fixed up the pair to adventure another day.


One gets the feeling McConnell plies his craft more for the fun of it than as an occupation. He likes to be the "somebody out there who can fix these crazy little sentimental things."

He charges \$30 per hour, which, in at least one case, didn't pay for the pain.

"I was using beach sand and epoxy to fix a cast stone statue that weighed more than 50 pounds. It was really weather beaten and had missing parts — I needed to go to Monterey for coarse sand because Carmel beach sand was too fine for this job — and when I went to put on the rebar, I smashed my hand. It took a year for my nail to grow out. I came out the loser on that job."

And then there was the one disaster, which makes him feel bad to this day. He told of a delightful woman who lived on Partington Ridge. Her house had burned to the ground and she was able to rescue only two things: a brass statue of phoenix rising from the ashes and a jade Buddha. Both were discolored, "pretty cremated" as McConnell recalled.

"The only thing that will clean that is muriatic acid, diluted," he said. "The brass phoenix came out well, but, unfortunately, I left Buddha in there too long. It was a disaster; the soft parts of the jade

dissolved. I had to call her and say, 'I burned your burnt Buddha.'"

McConnell said the woman was "lovely and forgiving" and even offered to pay him. He declined, imploring, "Please don't sue me." He's regretted the failure ever since.

"That was one time I wanted a magic wand to wave and make it new again. My goal is always to do a good enough job on each precious thing that even I can't tell I fixed it." ✨

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
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


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

Ponds, not castles, lure these dragons and damsels

AS TIM Manolis aptly points out, there was a crying need for new field guides to the colorful, intricate creatures known as dragonflies and damselflies, because the last complete scientific treatment of the species was done in 1956. "The Internet has become a major forum for information and the exchange of ideas about dragonflies" of course, Manolis says, but somehow dragging your laptop through the countryside to identify one of the 108 different kinds of California *odonates* simply will not do.

Manolis' complete field guide to the "Dragonflies and Damselflies of California," a beautiful new volume with 40 color plates published by the University of California Press, is made for the blossoming interest in these exquisite creatures. That, combined with "Common Dragonflies of the Southwest, A Beginner's Guide" by Kathy Biggs,



due out in May, give the dragonfly hunter sufficient tools in the pocket to spy and identify with ease.

Nearly 200 million years old, the modern *odonates* date from the Jurassic era. Perhaps fortunately, the giant dragonflies of prehistory are gone, but their fossils remind us that they once buzzed by on wingspans of more than two feet. Their diminutive descendants are the dominant aerial predators of the bug community, "with their superb vision and unmatched agility on the wing that has undergone no significant modifications for millions of years," as Manolis observes.


The dragonfly's petite accomplice, the damselfly, boasts 40 species in California.

Lure them to your world

Since dragonflies breed in water, the best way to attract them to your garden is to build a pond, says Biggs. But not just any pond.

"A pond built to attract wildlife will allow them to successfully breed, while an exotic pond for koi or goldfish will attract them, but they will not survive since the fish are fierce predators on the nymph [juvenile stage.] And the mosquito fish we are often given to use in our ponds are very, very successful in eating dragonfly eggs and nymph - not counting the damage done to the tree frogs."

So if you want *odonates* you have to go natural. Biggs is happy to share her family's pond-building odyssey with anyone who goes to www.bigsnestpond.net. ✨

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

Comstock Houses Hansel and Gretel

BARBIE HAD her own townhouse with a splash 'n' slide pool but she never owned a Tudor fairytale cottage with pitched gable roof, simulated thatch shingles and half-timbered walls over stucco cladding. And I bet Barbie's townhouse didn't have mullioned windows, either.

But the army of Otsy Totsy rag and felt dolls handmade in the early '20s by Carmel's Mayotta Comstock had just such fairytale houses created especially for them by Mayotta's adoring husband, Hugh.

Few people living today have seen an Otsy Totsy doll, even though Mayotta stitched hundreds and hundreds of them for buyers in San Francisco and Los Angeles and countless Carmel residents and tourists.

How she turned out such quantities of dolls is unfathomable, but when Hugh Comstock, a tall, quiet rancher, originally from Illinois, met Mayotta Browne on a visit from Santa Rosa, the dolls were "strewn and stacked around her home," according to an early account.

Hugh's sister Catherine married George Seideneck, one of Carmel's illustrious painters, and on Hugh's visit here from Santa Rosa in 1924, he was introduced to Mayotta at the Seideneck home.


It must have been love at first sight, because they were married on April 14, 1924 in Salinas. Mayotta and Hugh shared space with the "strewn and stacked" dolls, until Mayotta asked Hugh to please build a dollhouse in which she could display them for visitors to Carmel to take home as souvenirs and for buyers who were becoming interested in them for stores in large cities.

It is commonly thought that "Hansel" cottage on Torres near Sixth was the first house Hugh created and built. But it was "Gretel," situated at the back of the lot-and-a-half on Assessor's Lot 10, Block 60, that was built first in 1924. It is located on Torres Street, third northeast of Sixth Avenue, in back of Bruno's and Surf and Sand on Junipero.

Honeymoon togetherness

It seems difficult to believe, but Mayotta and Hugh lived in the tiny kitchen of that tiny house while they built the remainder of it with their own hands, but as they were on their honeymoon, one may speculate that it was no hardship. They continued to live in Gretel when they built the more esthetically pleasing Hansel in 1925 as a display house for their Otsy Totsy family. As small as Gretel is, it is the larger of the two cottages.

Both folk Tudor homes resemble fairytale houses because Hugh styled them after cottages in the illustrations for Grimm's fairytales by famed British painter Arthur Rackham.

The houses have been called "Fairytale Tudor," "doll houses" and "Carmel Cotswold," "elfin architecture," and mistakenly, "Mother Goose," but whatever one wishes to call them, they set a style that to this day characterizes Carmel in the minds of many.

Hugh, a rancher, was no architect, but he could work with his hands, a bandsaw and a pocket knife. The charming little cottages he designed and built had no plumb-line regularity about them, result-

ing in an enchanting style resembling Hobbits' houses of Middle Earth in Tolkein's books exemplified in director Peter Jackson's Oscar-winning motion picture trilogy.

Comstock used rough-hewn timbers from logs for framing, joists and mullions. Both Mayotta and Hugh hand whittled trim boards around windows and doors. The couple roughly frosted the outer walls with thick layers of plaster, and the roofs were made of irregular hand-split cedar shakes, hand carved, or simulated thatch shingles. Door handles and hinges were hammered by the creative and industrious young marrieds.

Crooked chimneys, many-paned windows, arched doorways and exposed structural beams were also signature whimsies of a Comstock cottage. Steeply pitched gable roofs and later English coun-

try gardens, added to the "rightness" of style and scale. The scale can perhaps be described as Lilliputian. The kitchen can only accommodate one person at a time.

Wanting to maintain the sylvan charm of Carmel, he built the homes around existing trees on the lots — a sensitivity that Carmel's current planning commission, Cottage Society, the historic preservation committee and the forest and beach commission would applaud. Hugh and Mayotta left the landscape natural, in typical Carmel style. Some say the gardens were cultivated by a Gretel renter when it was owned much later by Joan Harding.

The charm of these two little houses was so admired by all who beheld them, people clamored for one of their own. Comstock built 20 homes and businesses in the Hansel style, although generally

more commodious — with the exception of the adored little Tuck Box on Dolores Street built in 1926 and its adjacent garden shop which is currently called "A Great Place" — all of which can be seen to this day, much beloved and well cared for by their current owners.

Hugh Comstock, builder of dreams

The Pine Cone, in a 1926 issue, referred to Comstock as Carmel's "builder of dreams." After establishing his reputation as an innovative and creative builder here in Carmel, Comstock built a larger home for Mayotta and himself on the corner of Sixth and Torres, facing south. It is named Ober's. It's one-and-a-half stories has three bedrooms and an open loft sleeping bal-

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

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

cony, a den and three and a half baths, kitchen and dining room — luxurious living after the stringent but intimate spaces of Gretel.

Hugh and Mayotta lived there until Hugh died at age 57 in 1950. Following his death, Mayotta moved into The Studio on the corner of Santa Fe and Sixth, an English style country home Hugh built in 1927. She lived there until ill-health took her to Sacramento where she lingered with a long illness. Mayotta outlived her husband by 20 years, passing away in 1979 at the age of 87, not too far from her native town of Forestville in Placer County. She is inurned at Mountain View Cemetery in Oakland.

Readers who would like to see an original Otsy Totsy doll have only to visit the Local History Room of the Park Branch of Harrison Memorial Library at Mission and Sixth in downtown Carmel. Kept in “the vault” under proper temperature and humidity control and behind glass to keep her dust free is “Little Iodine.” Jimmy Hatlo — the noted cartoonist who created the redhead trouble-maker for his nationally-syndicated cartoon strip of the same name — and his wife Eleanor were expecting a baby. Close friends of the Comstocks here in Carmel, the Hatlos were surprised and delighted to be presented with a baby gift of an Otsy Totsy Little Iodine standing on a swing. Many years later the doll was donated to the city’s history room by Eleanor Hatlo Lusignan.

On a house tour of the Comstock cottages in the 1980s, sponsored by the Carmel Heritage Society, visitors were thrilled to discover three Otsy Totsy dolls sitting in a woven leather chair in one of the cottages. One was a little red-haired boy doll in blue short pants, yellow jacket and blue hat (dispelling the common belief that Mayotta handmade only girl dolls); a Dutch girl in a green dress, white apron with a colorful border and red flower, a white Dutch cap and felt clogs; and a blonde girl doll in a white full length bunny costume with red trim and red feet — topped with bunny ears.

If any resident with an Otsy Totsy doll would care to donate it to the history room or sell it to the current owners of Hansel and Gretel, they can do so by contacting The Carmel Pine Cone Arts and Entertainment editorial department.

The current residents of Hansel and Gretel have done much to rectify deterioration caused by age and storms, but have kept faithfully to Comstock’s intent.

A white earless cat

“When I first saw Hansel and Gretel,



my heart skipped a beat,” said Bobbie Voris, who with her husband Mike had been looking for a Carmel lot with two houses. “Once I saw them, I had to have them,” she said. And so they bought the property from Joan Harding, who owned the quaint houses and lot from 1962 to 1992, living there with a white earless cat named Pablo. A woman from New Zealand was renting Gretel at that time and did the gardening, installing all the plants, which now grow in abundance. Mrs. Harding is still alive at 88 and living in South Carolina.

Gretel is kept as a permanent vacation rental, while the Vorises live in Hansel. In order to make it habitable, they put in a foundation. “Hansel had no foundation when we bought it, so we had a local contractor crawl under the house with a trowel and a garbage can lid tied to a rope so they could scoop out enough dirt to install piers. Then they jacked the house up to create a foundation.”

Bobbie Voris continued, “We had to have a new roof put on Hansel because we could see daylight through it — Hansel originally had wood shingles and where they overlapped it was paper thin.”

The Vorises also took out the bathtub and put in a shower. “We took that extra space, and that of the dressing area closet and we made an 8-by-9 foot bedroom with trundle beds. There was an attic, an unfinished crawl space which we opened up to the living room and it is now a loft. The little house can sleep four people now.”

They did it all themselves, emulating Hugh and Mayotta.

The Vorises have added about 80 bird-houses to the property, and passersby will see many of them hanging from the trees, and placed on tables and stands in the garden.

“We added the wooden garden chairs, benches and tables and the pot bellied garden stove to both Hansel and Gretel. We even have a view of Point Lobos from Hansel’s patio,” she said.

Daffodils and forget-me-nots are just coming into bloom, and a large ceanothus and larger Scotch broom bushes bloom in lavender-blue and yellow glory in front of the Carmel fence to the sides of the wooden hand-hewn gate that separates the property from Torres Street. The original hand-carved “Hansel” sign has been blown off in a recent storm, and is now affixed temporarily to the fence to the left of the gate. It is quickly being overgrown by a hardy, blooming geranium bush.

Can the 250-square foot cottage be comfortable for two people?

“Yes,” Bobbie Voris replied. “With two people there’s a togetherness. It’s so magical, I feel safe and cozy and content.” ✨

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

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
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Sunset in Bloom

THE BEAUTY and diversity of music will be expressed through flora of all sorts during the Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club's May 29-30 flower show, Sunset in Bloom. Representing the combined effort of the small club's membership and a serious devotion to all that grows in the garden, the show will feature a wide array of green-thumb creations competing for awards in more than a dozen classes.

With the idea of "stimulating the knowledge and love of gardening," — one of the primary objectives of the Garden Club of America, to which the Carmel club belongs — the free show will include flower arrange-



ments, horticulture, photography and special conservation displays to educate visitors about native plants and invasive species.

To help raise money toward the garden club's goal of maintaining and restoring public gardens, Sunset in Bloom will include a Friday night preview party for members and guests, a boutique full of the best of the best for gardening and flower fans, and lectures by an historic garden restorer and an award-winning, flower-arranging Presbyterian priest whose efforts were recognized by Britain's queen.



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Marriage with music

“It being Sunset Center, we decided to have the theme be music, so each one of the classes in horticulture and flower arranging has a musical theme or purpose,” explained Sunset in Bloom chairman Carol Sullivan.

The 10 classes in the flower arrangement division tap into myriad musical styles.

☺ Participants in Musicals will create a hat of fresh and/or dried plant materials to represent a musical production of their choosing. The hats will sit atop a mannequin head on a pedestal.

☺ Tables “suggesting an after-theater supper for two” will be decorated in Duets.

☺ Tiny Tunes arrangements no larger than 5 inches in any dimension will decorate shelves of various levels.

☺ All That Jazz, a novice class for Garden Club of America members who have not won a blue ribbon in a flower show, will test their flower arranging talents.

☺ Freestyle arrangements — “any contemporary style that will appropriately interpret the class” — will utilize a direct complementary color scheme and incorporate metal to illustrate Heavy Metal.

☺ Mass arrangements no wider than 36 inches but unlimited in height will be entered in A Symphony.

☺ An invitation-only “challenge class” called Back Stage will put exhibitors to the test on the spot. All they bring are clippers, while the committee supplies the plant material and containers.

Horticulture

The horticulture division, featuring plants grown by the exhibitors and held in their possession for certain amounts of time, will have seven classes.

☺ Spring is Here entries display at least four different flowering specimens cut from the exhibitor’s garden and arranged in a sprinkling can.

☺ Plants with colorful foliage in hues of lime, yellow-green, deep red, maroon, burgundy or

black will be shown in Somewhere Over the Rainbow.

☺ White, off-white or silvery foliage which stands out in a moonlit garden will be exhibited in Moonlight Becomes You.

☺ Entries in I’ll Follow the Sun will showcase a minimum of five different succulents and members of the cactus family grown on a 20-inch wreath.

☺ Que Sera, Sera (Whatever will be, will be), a class open only to Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club members, tests their abilities to grow an alpine lily (*lilium parvum f. crocatum*). Bulbs and growing containers were distributed by the committee prior to Nov. 13, 2003.

☺ Various categories in It’s Now or Never — flowering annuals/biennials/herbaceous perennials, bulbs/corms/rhizomes, roses, flowering branches, branches grown for foliage and other flowering specimens — will allow participants to show off the best cuts from their gardens.

☺ You’re the Top will be a catch-all class for exhibits of horticultural merit which do not qualify for any of the above. They will be judged against perfection.

Two dimensions, conservation

Photography may seem somewhat fabricated next to such living and recently living works of garden-grown beauty, but it is a common element in flower shows, according to Sullivan.

The three photography classes include:

- ☉ color photographs of rocks within a landscape — some showing growth, if desired — in Rock Around the Clock;
- ☉ color or black-and-white close-up photos of a rose in Yellow Rose of Texas; and
- ☉ digitally manipulated images containing some form of the sun in Sunrise, Sunset.

Two displays designed to educate the public on the best methods and reasons for cultivating native plant species will make up the conservation division.

A special Saturday-only display will showcase the life cycle of local native plants — from seed collection to propagation to planting in the community — presented by students of Carmel Middle School.

Also, the County of Monterey is collaborating with Sunset in Bloom organizers to illustrate the non-native, aggressive and invasive plant species which gardeners should avoid, as well as the more environmentally friendly alternatives they should plant.

“We have some species that are actually overtaking the surroundings, and we just want to bring attention to it,” said

conservation chairman Donna Dormody. “You want to educate people on what the problem plants are, and there are a lot of plants that look similar that people can plant.”

So long as people keep asking for them, nurseries will keep selling the invasive plants, such as the yellow-flowered genista and feathery pampas grass, so the garden show’s goal is to convince people to avoid them.

“It’s beginning to be a big problem all across the United States,” she said, adding that federal, state and county agencies are spending millions of dollars to eradicate the invaders.

Serious business

Anyone who thinks flower arranging is a casual pastime and flower shows are just a fun way to show off a particular talent need only read the extensive rules to appreciate the entries.

The general Garden Club of America rules stipulate everything, including the sort of notecard on which information should be written, which books constitute the authorities on plant identification (“The Royal Horticultural Society Index of Garden Plants” and “The American Horticultural Society A-Z Encyclopedia of Garden Plants”), how watering should be

handled and whether an entry can be touched again once it’s on display.

No entries can include federal or state protected or threatened species — unless cultivated in one’s garden and accompanied by a written explanation — nor can they feature any non-native, invasive plants such as iceplant, pampas grass, certain thistles, and French, Scotch and Spanish broom.

No artificial plant materials, live animals, taxidermy, birds, fish, natural birds’ nests, cut fruits or vegetables can appear in arrangements, and the exhibits “must be maintained in prime show condition or any award won may be withdrawn.”

Most horticultural entries must include the method of cultivation described on an unlined white card displayed adjacently and should be planted in terra cotta or terra-cotta-colored plastic pots. Another list of rules pertains to pesticide-free propagation.

And the Garden Club of America had to approve the show’s entire schedule, according to Sullivan.

“One of our purposes is education, and I think that’s one of the reasons for the detail,” she explained.

In addition, the 20 judges hailing from several states and selected by the GCA will use the comprehensive descriptions and

multitude of rules to select the winners in each class.

“They love to come to Carmel, of course, and there are many shows throughout the year,” Sullivan said. “So these judges are really quite busy.”

Help for public gardens

While the show is free and its primary goals are educating and fostering interest in flowers and plants, the Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club’s missions include helping to maintain and improve public gardens in Carmel, donating funds to like-minded conservation groups, and creating topiaries and arrangements for the library, Carmel Foundation and Hospice each December.

To raise money for public garden projects, Sunset in Bloom will include a boutique and guest lectures by two horticultural luminaries.

For months, boutique chairmen Jody Clark and Bridget Booth have been searching high and low for just the right items to include in their small store at Sunset.

“We have named our boutique Greatest Hits, with the idea that what we bring into the boutique will be very special items as good as we can find,” Clark said.

Handy tools for gardening and flower arranging — such as the thin but strong

gloves that extend well over the wrist to allow good dexterity as well as protection — and topiaries, potted herbs and perhaps even miniature citrus cultivated by a Central Coast aficionado, will be for sale.

Clark and Booth are closely guarding their sources, many of whom have asked to remain nameless.

"We found one who sells to top museums in the United States, and it's only because we live in Carmel, and they love Carmel, and we're giving money to public gardens, that they're they doing this," she said.

While its items will be top of the line, the prices in Greatest Hits won't be.

"We feel the items are very reasonably priced for the everyday man and woman," Clark said. "It's going to be small, but I believe all of the items we have are going to be as good as anyone can find."

Show chairman Sullivan also hopes the lectures by the Rev. Dr. William McMillan and Chip Callaway — which run \$20 each or \$30 for both — will attract many attendees.

She and club president Lucy Reno approached McMillan when he was honored at the GCA annual meeting in New York. They asked if the Belfast, Ireland, Presbyterian minister and renowned

flower arranger would be willing to speak at Sunset in Bloom, and "he said he would just be delighted."

McMillan, also known for his charm, wit and poetry, first dabbled in flower arranging when a bout of the flu wiped out the usual decorating contingent at his church. He has since won awards around the world and shown at the World Flower Show in Glasgow, Scotland, Boston's Museum of Fine Arts, and the Bouquets to Art show at the Palace of the Legion of Honor in San Francisco. He was even awarded a Member of the British Empire by Queen Elizabeth II in 2000 "for service to his country through flowers."

McMillan will discuss and demonstrate skillful flower arranging during his 1:30 p.m. Saturday lecture, which promises to be entertaining, poetic and informative, according to Sullivan.

Callaway, garden restorer extraordinaire and captivating speaker, will show slides demonstrating many of his notable projects, including the Roper House in Charleston, S.C., the Alexander Graham Bell House in Georgetown-Washington, D.C., Ayr Mount in Hillsborough, N.C., and the Hezekiah Alexander House for the Charlotte, N.C., Museum of History.

His 10:30 a.m. Saturday talk will be

entitled, "What's New in Old Gardens?" and will address different types of plants used in different ways, according to Sullivan.

In the works for almost a year, Sunset in Bloom is "probably an undertaking larger than we have done before," Sullivan said of the garden club, which was formed in 1979 by a group of enthusiasts and joined the GCA in 1986.

Thirty-one different committee chairmen are overseeing every detail of the event, from invitations, signage and staging, to judging, establishing the classes in each division and publicity.

The May 29-30 show also marks a return to Sunset Center for the Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club after 23 years. It held its first major fundraiser and flower show, Table Settings, there in 1981. The event showcased flower arrangements created by members in conjunction with local antique dealers and interior designers, and funds were raised for conservation and landscaping projects in Carmel.
