## Ex-Judge alleges RETALIATION IN SUIT AGAINST COUNTY

THE BATTLE between Monterey County and a retired Superior Court judge over a caretaker's cottage in Big Sur has moved to the courthouse.

Former judge William Burleigh, who spent almost 30 years on the bench, countersued Monterey County last month, after the county sued him for allegedly violating the permit for a caretakers' unit.

According to Burleigh, the county retaliated against him for a commentary printed in The Carmel Pine Cone a year ago in which he stated that the Monterey County Planning and Building Department "has a well-deserved reputation for arrogance and abuse."

The article — which detailed the lengths to which he had gone to obtain a permit for the construction project prompted officials to conspire against him by placing a stop-work order on the site and devising a variety of reasons to justify that action, according to Burleigh's lawsuit.

Burleigh was unavailable for comment. His attorney, William McCrone, refused to discuss the suit.

In the complaint, Burleigh alleged various civil-rights violations and requested that the stop-work order placed on his project be lifted. Additionally, he asked a judge to declare that county zoning ordinances are "vague" and foster "arbitrary government action, in violation of protections provided by the U.S. Constitution."

"I don't think there are any grounds for his complaint," said deputy county counsel Irven Grant. "It seems like he wants to legislate how the planning department should



## Clean sweep for McCloud, **Cunningham and Bethel**

MAYOR SUE McCloud won a third term by a decisive margin Tuesday, beating challenger Dick Ely by 57 percent to

Voters also elected her apparent allies, council candidates Erik Bethel and Mike Cunningham. Next week, they'll join sitting council members Gerard Rose and Paula Hazdovac, who often side with McCloud, giving the mayor a 100 percent majority at city hall.

Barbara Livingston, a longtime opponent of McCloud's, decided not to seek reelection after 12 years on the council.

Ely ran against the mayor rather than try to keep his city council seat.

Many in the packed city council chambers cheered as results were read after precincts closed at 8 p.m. April 13. Official semifinal results showed McCloud received 873 votes to Ely's 653, while Cunningham netted 957, Bethel received 876, former city councilman David Maradei got 501 and former planning commissioner Jack Gorry received 405.

Gorry said he was not surprised by the result but lamented the potential loss of

## HOMEOWNER: CITY SHOULD PAY FOR TREE IN MY HOUSE

GUADALUPE STREET homeowner Marcia Green wants the city to pay for the damage caused by the 100-foot-tall Monterey pine that crashed through her roof during a Feb. 25 storm.

The city owned the tree, which had been growing on public property across the street from her home. But the city council voted April 6 not to pay Green's claim from city coffers, referring it to the city's insurance company.

"It's now been almost six weeks, and I do not have a roof or ceiling to cover the damage to my house — only a blue tarp," Green told the council when she delivered repair estimates from two contractors and an arborist's report. "I'm concerned further damage to this historic house may result in delaying the considerable repairs that are

"I hope the City of Carmel and this coun-

cil will do the best they can to expedite this claim to further mitigate the hardship, losses

and damage," she said. The 10-story pine measured almost 3 feet in diameter and snapped at the base in the high winds that swept through the Peninsula in late February. That same storm sent trees crashing through another house down the street, as well as on other buildings and cars throughout the city and the Peninsula.

The pine fell onto the center of her home, destroying the steeply pitched roof over the living room, bathroom, kitchen and bedroom, according to Green's claim. It cracked the walls in the house, shattered windows, bent window and door frames, wrecked the floors, chipped the fireplace and might have damaged the foundation. The falling debris and water ruined carpeting, furniture and other possessions, and "without a ceiling or roof, utility bills are increased."

the group's sponsors on the Monterey Peninsula will know they're at least scratching the surface of a worldwide problem that kills or injures thousands of innocent people

For two months, the de-mining team funded through the local chapter of Adopt-a-Minefield will search for long forgotten landmines overgrown with brush or hidden beneath layers of dirt.

Four team members were bred specifically for this purpose and spent the first year of their lives in a rigorous training program in

This canine bomb squad — usually German shepherds — is now certified to prowl around minefields, searching for the scent of explosives with noses that are up to 100 times more sensitive than their human counterparts'.

When they detect a suspicious scent, they are trained to immediately sit and stare until their handlers carefully approach.

A fully trained and experienced minedetection dog costs up to \$20,000, so dog lovers need not worry that they are used merely as cannon fodder.

"The reason they're using dogs is that many of the mines are made of plastic, so metal detectors won't find them," said Larry Levine, president of the Monterey Bay Chapter of the United Nations Association, which is raising funds to help get the team of 19 humans, four dogs and five handlers to

Monterey Institute of International Studies student Doune Porter is helping to raise awareness of the Adopt-a-Minefield campaign. She learned about de-mining while working for the United Nations in the Balkans, where leftover mines are a constant danger.

"I spent a lot of time learning about how mines are located and how de-mining dogs work. That's why I was interested in sponsoring a team in Afghanistan that included canine de-miners," said Porter, who hopes to continue her work with the U.N. after graduating next month.

Shortly after arriving in Bosnia in 1999, Porter and a friend inadvertently hiked into a minefield from the 1992-1995 civil war.

Porter said she glanced down and saw an

old, tattered piece of warning tape and knew they were in trouble.

"Once we realized where we were, we froze," she said. Fortunately, they were able to call for help with their cell phones. After waiting for hours in a lashing thunderstorm, they finally were rescued. They learned later that five people had already lost their lives in that same field.

> Since the Kunduz campaign began in January, Levine said, about 500 local donors have sent in \$27,000. Each \$23,320 funds the 19member team of canine mine-sniffers and Afghan de-miners and handlers to work in a minefield for eight

Other countries where mine-clearing is ongoing include Cambodia, Croatia, Iraq, Mozambique, Vietnam and Bosnia-Herzegovina.

In 1999, the Monterey Bay chapter of the U.N.A. — the second largest in the nation, according to campaign chairman Don Edgren raised \$35,000 through private donations. This money, along with a matching grant from the International Trust Fund for De-mining and Victims Assistance, was sent to clear mines in the Bosnian farming village of

Levine said it took more than a month to clear just 14 landmines from the village — mines left over from a war that ended four years

The Monterey Peninsula "is a very well-educated community, and I think there are a lot of people who are concerned about what's going on in the world, and this is one way they can make sure their voices are heard," Edgren said, adding that a variety of organiza-

## Hydrant tests in P.B.

"We also clear vegetation around the hydrants, replace the blue dots in the middle of the road, and paint the hydrants [based on gallons-per-minute flow]," she said.

# City publicity campaign worth \$ millions

FOR THE \$70,708 it is paying Graham & Associates for marketing this year, the City of Carmel has already received publicity worth millions, Lydia Graham told the city council April 6. Newspaper and magazine stories and a television spot totaled 148,966,839 in circulation and reached 446,900,517 people, for an equivalent advertising value of \$3,281,639, according to Graham.

Building on the momentum from last year, the firm continued to pitch its award-winning Dog Heaven on Earth theme and emphasized Carmel as a prime destination within driving distance. The centennial celebration campaign wrapped up at the end of 2003, and the "Bit of Culinary Heaven," theme is cooking, she said.

The largest story was in USA Today last July, when the 2.2 million-circulation paper published "Charming-by-the-Sea" on the cover of its Life section as well as on its website. Graham estimated the city would have had to pay \$475,860 to advertise on such a scale.

A "Food Finds" segment featuring the Cheese Shop, the Tuck Box and an interview with Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud aired three times on the Food Network, available in more than 66 million households throughout the country, as well as in Canada, Australia, France, Korea and the Philippines, she said. The paid advertising equivalent of those shows was \$1,657,800.

Additional stories in SkyWest magazine, the Contra Costa Times and other Knight-Ridder newspapers and smaller regional publications reached yet more readers.

Graham equated the results to a return 46 times the city's costs and said the number of circulation and "consumer impressions" increased 584 percent over last year.


City administrator Rich Guillen wondered if Graham & Associates actually made money on the contract, given the agency's investments of time and energy.

#### Calls in the wee hours

McCloud commented that one city business owner might not be so thrilled with the success.

"To add one comment on 'Food Finds,' Tuck Box owner Jody LeTowt is not wild about the campaign in that there's a three-hour time difference between here and the East Coast," she laughed. "So he's been getting calls all night long from people asking for scone mix."

"I enjoy doing it, but they're so old it's hard to get replacement parts for them," he said. "When something breaks, it can be a real problem. I have to cannibalize parts.'

Rinehart suspects the office will find an expert in San Jose to make necessary repairs after he leaves.

More than tinkering with broken locks and handling mail, Rinehart, 56, will miss the people he's come to know since transferring to Carmel from the Santa Barbara post office in 1981. He had sought a transfer so he could help care for his dying mother and, though the switch didn't come soon enough, he still decided to take it.


"I've made so many good friends here. I feel like I've shared so much of their lives and in many cases learned so much from them," he said.

A German lady taught him enough of her native language during his lunch hour that he could conduct basic transactions with German tourists.

"If anybody was from a foreign country, I tried to pick up a few phrases of their language," he said.

After he greeted a Romanian customer at the window one day with the single phrase in his repertoire, the man handed him two palm-sized dictionaries. Rinehart and a coworker soon began using a phrase meaning, "good investigatory procedures," to congratulate each other whenever one of them discovered the answer to a question or situation.

will continue.

"I used it one day, and I didn't know it, but the Romanian guy was in line," Rinehart recalled. "He laughed and said, 'Your Romanian has gotten so good!' I still keep those little dictionaries on my dresser at home."

Rinehart enjoyed taking mail to homebound customers, even visiting them in the hospital. He took heart in "seeing how people really try to pull together in this town."

While Rinehart enjoyed the dozen years he spent working at the counter, in 1996 he retreated to the more behind-thescenes role he had held during his first decade in the postal service in the San Francisco bay area, Santa Barbara and See RINEHART page 10A







# LandWatch discusses affordable housing, general plan



The county's new general plan has been "down-









graded and diluted" by "agriculture and development interests" since the first draft was released at the end of 2001, according to Gary Patton, the executive director of LandWatch Monterey County.

He spoke Wednesday evening to a group of 35 at Baja Cantina in Carmel Valley.

According to Patton, the proposed general plan was better after the first three stages of its development.

Stage one of the plan involved community outreach to find out what it wanted from the plan, Patton said. Stage two dealt with the formulation of general guiding principles, and the initial draft based on those principles was created during stage three.

But now, "the signs are not encouraging" that the plan will be a good one, Patton maintained.

The board of supervisors will probably decide in June or July whether to adopt it, he said, with the next public hearing set for April 21.

A large portion of the 90-minute meeting revolved around what Patton called the "design for housing affordability," which uses land-use policies to encourage construction of

affordable housing in already developed areas. Patton said communities in which residents can walk to and from work and school ultimately will cut costs as well as provide environmental benefits.

"The question is not whether we should grow, but how we should grow," he said.

One idea brought forward was encouraging developers to build affordable-housing units in commercial zones. Developers often want to upgrade shopping areas or change them in some way, Patton said, and they could build homes at the same time instead of acquiring new land.

"Urban infill" — creating more homes in an already established urban area — is better than "suburban sprawl," he said, and people need to learn to work with the new development within their communities instead of fighting it every step of the way.

The initial cost of development in urban areas will be greater simply because the cost of land is high, he admitted, but infrastructure savings would cut costs in the long run.

And with urban infill, "you'd have better cities 25 or 30 years from now," Patton asserted.

be organized, and this isn't the right forum for it."

Grant said the county has not yet decided how to respond to the suit but that officials do not believe Burleigh has the factual evidence to support his claims. Burleigh believes he's being treated unfairly, he added, but "the local law is being applied to him just like it would anybody else."

In 1999, the retired judge requested permission from the planning department to construct a small caretaker's cottage at the lower portion of his 10-acre property located in Big Sur.

He alleged the ensuing three-and-a-half years were marked by "unreasonable delays, inattention and arbitrary conduct" on the part of county officials, who granted him coastal development and building permits only after he spent more than \$30,000 for various county permits, as well as engineering and architectural services.

A month after he was issued the building permit, Burleigh penned an article entitled, "Why people who deal with county officials have no stomach lining," which was published April 11, 2003, in The Carmel Pine Cone. But before submitting the article, he sent copies to various county agencies — including the planning department — "in order that they could be prepared to respond to public inquiry" that was sure to ensue, according to the lawsuit.

"I am acutely aware that by writing this I have incurred

the wrath of the county and others, and I will probably be punished at some time in the future," he wrote in the article.

In a postscript written in the two weeks between the time he gave advance copies of the article to county officials and when it was published, Burleigh wrote: "The punishment has started . . . my job site was red-tagged, closed down, and my workers sent home . . . It was clearly done because of this article."

While other property owners who have been issued stopwork orders have later been allowed to contest the accuracy of the facts on which the orders were based, Burleigh alleges he never was given that opportunity — an intentional omission he said was meant to punish him and deny him equal protection.

Burleigh was appointed to the bench in 1973 after eight years as Carmel's city attorney.

The house was set to be rented out in March, and contractors estimated the cost of fixing everything at \$100,000 to \$125,000.

Upon investigating the damage, arborist Frank Ono discovered the pine had an old, deep crack and was sick.

"It is my professional opinion that the tree failure was due to several facts: 1) The tree had extensive heart rot, and 2) there was an old vertical crack in the tree prior to storm events that had compromised the tree's structural integrity," he wrote in the conclusion of his report. "Previous trenching done in the area some time in the past may have contributed to some loss of vigor in the tree."

But because the city had not known the tree was sick and damaged before it fell, city personnel manager Jane Miller recommended the council deny the homeowner's claim.

In most cases, local governments are protected by state laws from liability for dangers on public property of which they are not aware or haven't had time to fix.

"If it hasn't been brought to our attention and there's no obvious overt sign the tree is having a problem," Miller said, then the city has not received "constructive notice." The city's also not liable for "acts of God," she said.

Its insurance carrier, The St. Paul Company, is investigating the claim and will determine whether Green should be compensated for the damage to her home. If the company denies her claim as well, her next recourse is to take the issue to court.

"It will be interesting to see what happens with a 5-0 city council now," he said, adding that had he won, he probably would have replaced Livingston in the 4-1 votes.

Maradei encouraged the new councilmembers and mayor "to keep their promises in focus and gather community consensus or our objectives will linger and die." Among his continuing concerns, he said, was balance on the council.

McCloud downplayed the new council's make-up, instead emphasizing the diversity in ages — they span three decades, from Bethel's 34 to her 69 — as well as work backgrounds and time living in the city. Bethel and Cunningham are newcomers, while she moved to town when she was a small child.

The mayor attributed her successful bid for a third term to the support she built while in office.

"People want to see the two big projects — the Local Coastal Program and Sunset Center — finished," she said. "The other thing I've heard is, 'If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

McCloud said she also focused on "facts and substance" rather than attacking her opponent. "I've certainly not hesitated to correct factual things, but I just don't think this town is very supportive of negativity."

She didn't stump for funds, though McCloud was the holder of the largest campaign chest by far, with \$20,130 over Ely's \$4,826. (Ely said he deliberately kept the dollars down because he objected to raising and spending big money on a small-town campaign.)

"I don't ask for help and I don't ask for money, and it just seems to happen," McCloud said. "One man passed me on the beach and took out his wallet and handed me a check that was already made out. It's been truly amazing."

Ely, who departed city hall soon after the results were announced, said he had no regrets in how he ran his campaign, in which he criticized McCloud's style as heavy handed and secretive. He said the campaign afforded him the opportunity to meet and speak with many residents.

"I loved every minute," he said.

But he was dismayed and surprised by the turnout. With 913 ballots cast by mail, absentee voter turnout outpaced that at the polls, where 625 ballots were punched. The 52.7 percent turnout fell well below the contentious 2002 election's 60.12 percent, or 1,904 voters. "We were not able to really motivate or excite the voters," he said.

Although he'll soon be out of political office, Ely said he plans to ratchet up his involvement in local groups, including the Carmel Heritage Society, the Carmel Residents Association and Yes! for Carmel.

Cunningham, the highest vote-getter of the council candidates, said his campaign gave him an early start on his number-one priority of building relationships with the residents, visitors and businesses of Carmel.

"One of the dramatic lessons of the last three months has been how great local politics can be in a place where people care," he said. "The number of people I've met and their

# Anti-sub gunner to keep marathon in line

JOHN MUTTY, a retired U.S. Navy officer and former antisubmarine aircraft pilot who teaches financial management at the Naval Postgraduate School, spent Tuesday morning spray painting pavement on Highway 1.

Marking each of the 26.2 miles along the roadway is one among many varied tasks Mutty undertakes each year as course director of the Big Sur International Marathon, which will have thousands of athletes running and walking up the the scenic Big Sur and Carmel coastline next Sunday.

Mutty and his fellow volunteers are "responsible for everything between the start and the finish," he said.

As course director, a job he assumed in 1997, Mutty oversees the aid stations set up every couple of miles to supply water, Gatorade and other sustenance to participants. He ensures everyone has enough supplies. He provides set-up locations for the musicians. He coordinates the volunteers who call out runners' times and pace at each mile. He confers with the California Highway Patrol on traffic control and when and how convoys of motorists should travel while the highway is closed. He ensures the presence of the bicycleriding police officers with their portable automatic defibrillators, as well as the course marshals who keep everyone in place. He coordinates the ham radio operators who broadcast the race worldwide and offer the only source of reliable mobile communication in the miles-long cell phone dead

He even makes sure the highway is left cleaner than it was before the race.

"Last month, the Hartnell Physics Club picked up litter along the entire course and will do so again afterward," he said. "So the course is cleaner because of the marathon."

#### Marathoning muscle man

Like all of the volunteers on the BSIM board of directors, Mutty can run 26.2 miles without a hitch. He signed up for his first marathon while stationed in Newport, R.I., in 1976, because he wanted to try it and the city was hosting its inau-

"I actually have kind of a football player's physique more of a weightlifter, I guess — and I don't run very fast," he said.

He ran a dozen more marathons during the 27 years he flew Orion P-3s, hunting submarines and conducting maritime surveillance for the Navy, as well as after his retirement in 1994. He competed in the Boston Marathon, and the Marine Corps Marathon and races in Bermuda, Spain and Melbourne, Australia.

"They've run the gamut from very small fields to very large," he said.

But his favorite, of course, is Big Sur, which he ran for the first time in 1994, the year before he moved to the Peninsula to take the teaching job at NPS.

"I would be lying if I said anything other than it's the most spectacular one around," he said. "As far as scenery, there's no comparison."

Mutty volunteered to take on the role of course director

seven years ago at the request of friend and former Marine Wally Kastner, the race director.

The first race he helped organize was held in the wake of 1998's El Niño storms, which brought down the mountainside at Hurricane Point, closing the highway and cutting off the usual marathon route.

"Right after I became course director, we had the rain, hail and winds on Hurricane Point that gave it its name," he said. "With the landslide, we had to do an out-and-back course, so that was a very interesting experience, because all of the lessons learned and handed down didn't apply that year."

#### Armed Forces skills a plus

Mutty said his military background — organizing, delegating and following complex operational plans — prepared him well to be course director.

"A number of the volunteers are former military officers, and I think that has helped," he observed.


With the marathon and accompanying relay race beginning at the Big Sur Station south of the River Inn, and the 21mile PowerWalk, 10-mile Walk and 5k race all occurring concurrently, participants are bused to various starting points and volunteers are dropped off and picked up along the course.

It could be an organizational nightmare, but the field of more than 2,000 volunteers — many returning year after year — and a dedicated board help everything operate smoothly,

"Essentially 95 percent of the the people [overseeing the event] are part-time volunteers," he said. "The fact that it comes off as well as it does every year serves as a testimony to the people we have working on the board and the volun-

Since board members have to work on marathon day, their annual Directors Run will take place early April 17, without the benefit of traffic control.

"We start at about 5 a.m. so it's pitch black, and those of us who are slower runners end up fighting traffic the closer we get to the finish line," Mutty said. "That probably makes it more interesting than otherwise. It takes me almost five hours now, compared to the elite runners, who could run it forward and backward in the time it takes me to run it."

"The hours in the back [6 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.] suited me better, and also, as much as I enjoyed seeing the people at the window, I felt almost talked out by the end of day," he said.

He would arrive home to his wife, Marybeth, and son, Alex, without the desire to chat.

"I thought it might be better to spend more energy communicating at home than at the window," he said.

### More mail, fewer people

Over the decades, Rinehart has witnessed changes inside

and outside the post office. Increased mechanization has halved the workforce there, and the push to run the postal service more like a business has added a hurried edge.

"It still does have the flavor of an old-time post office," he said, adding that nowhere else will a person find Bill Bates cartoons all over the lobby. "It's a community gathering place - it and the library are the two main focal points for local

The amount of First Class mail seems stable, but the cheaper bulk business mail — advertising circulars, catalogs, solicitations and other junk mail — "has skyrocketed."

"Sometimes, in one day, someone will get so many catalogs that they won't fit in the box," he said.

Outside, Rinehart has watched the number of full-time residents decline. With increas-

ing frequency, people didn't pick up their mail for long periods of time, and lunchtime runs through town revealed more houses without cars out front.

The post office led him to running, in a way. A former coworker took up distance running at age 50, and Rinehart decided to join him. The man has since left, and Rinehart has run eight of the last 10 Big Sur International Marathons. He'd be in this year's race April 25, but he's lacked time to properly

"I feel like I could force myself to do it, but the enjoyment wouldn't be there," he said.

But come April 19 — Rinehart's last day after a total of 30 years with the postal service, including a year at the Via Nona Marie office and 22 on Fifth Avenue — he will have much more time.

"I had always planned to go at the earliest opportunity," he said. "I had enough health issues in the last year that just kind of cropped up suddenly, and it made me realize I really want to get out and do something different — to do the things I most love to do."

While his wife will remain a teacher of at-risk children in Pacific Grove for at least another year, Rinehart hopes they will soon be able to travel together, possibly to Tibet and China this summer with their son, now 22 and a student at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo.

Rinehart might eventually reenter the workforce, possibly teaching tai chi like he did before Alex was born, but whatever happens, he will always savor the relationships he built with the post office regulars.

"That's what I've liked about the job the most: being in some measure — although it may be a small measure — a part of their lives," he said.



## Poets show their stuff at second annual festival

THE MONTEREY Peninsula has historically been an artists' enclave and still draws more than its fair share of writers and painters, according to Ryan Masters, who is in his final stretch as Pacific Grove's Poet-in-Residence.

"It's the beauty of the place, but there's an intangible element, too, with the meeting of the land and sea," he speculated. "I think artists really feed off that."

With his tenure ending at the end of the month, Masters will perform one of his final official acts by reading selected poems from his collection during the 2nd Annual Monterey Bay Poetry Festival noon to 8 p.m. at Chautauqua Hall in Pacific Grove.

Masters, whose position initially was intended to last through 2003, said it was extended for one year so he could finish all the projects he had proposed to the city when he applied to be the city's Poet-in-Residence.

"The proposal I submitted to the city was pretty ambitious," he explained. "It included everything from conducting weekly workshops to creating a website to teaching at local schools, so they decided to keep me here another year to make sure everything was running on its own power."

In 2002, the Los Gatos native moved into a Pacific Grove residence left to the city by Pebble Beach resident Whitney Latham-Lechich on her death in 1996. In addition to his poetic duties, Masters is a freelance writer, editor for Excelligence Learning Corp. in Monterey, and recently published a chapbook entitled, "below the low-water mark."

#### Festival plans

While last year's festival was "extremely successful," with more than 500 people streaming throughout the venue for the day-long event, this year's is expected to be even better. It will kick off with a half-hour reading by students from Del Rey Oaks Elementary School led by poet Patrice Vecchione, followed by a half-hour reading by students from David Gitin's Monterey Peninsula College poetry class.

"I'm always happy to see good work come out of the students, and I always do," said Gitin, who has also taught at Hartnell College and Golden Gate University and published five books of poetry. Though he usually holds readings in the Bay Area and along the East Coast, he plans to read some of his own work — a mixture of old and new — during the fes-

"I like the compressed, concentrated form of words to bring people into themselves — and do it in a kind of lyrical form," he said.

A New York native, Gitin migrated to San Francisco's Haight-Ashbury district in 1967 for its intellectual stimulation. During his three years there, he rubbed shoulders with the likes of Janis Joplin and Beat poet Michael McClure.

In addition to his 30-year career at MPC, he is also the chairman of the college's Guest Authors' Committee, which arranges for established poets to come to the college and talk to students about the craft.

#### Upcoming anthology

The festival is free, but contributors to the upcoming "Anthology of Monterey Bay Poets" will have some of their works for sale during the program to help raise funds for the book. In fact, the public can get a preview between 1 and 6 p.m., when contributors will give short, five- to seven-minute readings of their work.

Among those contributors is Dan Linehan, a former student of Gitin's who said poetry is a perfect match for his love of nature and the environment. He recently completed a collection of poems called, "Spindrifting Through Ocean Archways: Poetry of Monterey," selections of which he read during a Valentine's Day reading at the Thunderbird Bookshop in Carmel.

"It celebrates the natural beauty of Monterey while emphasizing the need to protect and preserve the environ-

In 2000, Linehan — who holds degrees in physics and electrical and materials engineering — walked away from a six-figure position as a microchip engineer after deciding to make fiction and poetry his life's focus. To pay the bills, he works as a consultant for Riverside Publishing, where he edits and writes science-based educational material, and edits the program for the California International Airshow.

"When you write poetry, you're definitely not in it for the money," he said. "Your reward is when a reader really connects with your words in his or her own way."

Anyone who wishes to apply to be the city's next Poet-in-Residence — a position that is non-paying but does include low-cost housing — must turn in an application by April 30. Applications can be obtained at either city hall or the library.

those 'Sleeping Beauty' backgrounds come into being.

"I was trained as a fine painter, and didn't want to spend my life with a graphite pencil doing thousands and thousands of drawings. I wanted to get into the beautiful paintings behind the characters. Background is where I wanted to get paint under my nails."

Such was his talent, Dias found work not only in animation, but also painting backgrounds for live action films.

grounds for live action films.

"Pal Joey," "Cleopatra," "Rio Bravo,"
"Journey to the Center of the Earth," "Auntie
Mame." Dias ticks off the titles on his resumé.

The very nature of the business demanded that artists be versatile if they wanted to earn steady paychecks. Over the years, Dias has also drawn the book versions of several Disney titles. He illustrated the arcade game "Dragon's Lair," served as color stylist for Don Bluth's "The Secret of NIMH" and art director for the Toontown backgrounds for "Who Framed Roger Rabbit?"

He has painted more than 90 backgrounds for the limited edition animation cels marketed by Disney, created the art for Disney's interactive CD-ROMS — his credits roll ever onward.

In a desire to leave "beautiful downtown Burbank," Dias moved to Big Sur in 1998.

It was while watching "The Wizard of Oz," staged by deFaria and PacRep at the Outdoor Forest Theater, that Dias realized he wanted to help this enthusiastic group of troupers.

"I saw the local talent but the work done was not a lot in terms of scenery," he said. "When I saw the name Walt deFaria on the program, I went bonkers. Many, many years ago I worked on a project, an animated film called 'Metamorphosis,' and later it was called 'Winds of Change.' Walt was the producer."

Dias introduced himself and eventually found himself donating his design services to "The Cindy Diaries."

"It's a modern-day Cinderella. I designed the sets to have a decorative, childlike, catty-wampus look, based on the early Mr. Magoo's. The crew is absolutely wonderful. The person who's helped me a lot is [lighting designer] Steve Judge. Because the way the play is done, most of the stuff is right there on the stage, and the lighting puts a particular element in focus."

Dias is swamped, but displays the enthusiasm of a youth for his work.

"The Cindy Diaries" begins with a preview at 7:30 p.m. Friday, April 16 at the Golden Bough Theatre, Monte Verde between Eighth and Ninth, Carmel. Though the international Mine Ban Treaty was implemented in 1999, mines left in villages, farms and along roadsides continue to maim or kill an estimated 10,000 civilians each year. According to the Adopta-Minefield website (www.landmines.org), between 45 and 50 million landmines are believed to exist in 70 countries around the world — including 640,000 in Bosnia and 4 million in Afghanistan.

It costs only \$3 to \$30 to produce a landmine but up to \$1,000 to remove one — and this does not take into account the medical costs to treat survivors, according to the website.







## Editorial

## The new council's mission

WHEN THE first round of election results was announced at city hall Tuesday night, a loud gasp, followed by applause, came from most of the crowd.

The surprised reaction wasn't because of the results from the mayor's race. With her substantial lead in fundraising and with a Pine Cone poll showing nearly all her supporters from two years ago still in her corner, Sue McCloud was widely expected to defeat challenger Dick Ely. But nobody could be sure what would happen in the race for city council.

It was no secret that McCloud preferred Mike Cunningham and Erik Bethel for the two seats vacated by Ely and council veteran Barbara Livingston. In 2002, McCloud showed her coattails could help her council allies win new terms, when Paula Hazdovac and Gerard Rose beat Ken White and Jim Wright. But Bethel and Cunningham were virtually unknown when the campaign began. Their opponents — Dave Maradei and Jack Gorry — enjoyed strong name recognition, had lived in the Carmel area for years and served on boards and commissions. Maradei had even been elected to the city council in the 1980s.


Nevertheless, the newcomers won easily. Cunningham and Bethel triumphed by wide margins — much bigger margins, in fact, than McCloud's. Their overwhelming victory came as a big surprise, and a delightful one to their (it turned out) numerous supporters.

The election means that, starting Tuesday, the city hall dais will be occupied by a mayor and four councilmembers who see things pretty much the same way — a situation that hasn't prevailed in Carmel for many years, if ever. Unless something untoward happens, this council can be expected to sign a contract with a nonprofit, SCC, Inc., to manage Sunset Center, sell or lease Flanders Mansion as a private home, keep boards and commissions at their reduced membership levels, decline to impose a tax on restaurant meals, complete the LCP as is, etc., etc. — all things the voters have now endorsed.

But if the the absence of major dissent on the council provides an opportunity to get moving on things that were in dispute for the last two years, it also poses a danger that mistakes will be made because, as Lord Acton observed in the 19th Century, "Power tends to corrupt and absolute power corrupts absolutely."

Fortunately, our system of government provides so many checks and balances that there's no such thing as Absolute Power (except in Clint Eastwood movies). Still, we urge the members of the new council to make inclusiveness a hallmark of their tenure. Even people who voted for the losing side in this week's election deserve a strong voice at city hall.

- To balance the 2004-2005 budget when projected a year ago, the city council approved debiting the reserves to the tune of \$1.7 million if steps were not taken to cut expenditures and/or revenues did not pick up. Now that steps to cut expenses have been taken, this full amount will undoubtedly not be needed.

#### Annexation solution Dear Editor,

have yours" mindset; one only has to read the weekly "Police Log" in The Pine Cone to readily garner this. I would suggest there exists a close relationship between this so-called "mindset" and the city's financial concerns.

What is the solution, if there is one? From my vantage point (15 miles up Carmel Valley), it appears to me that Carmel-by-the-Sea desperately needs to increase its tax base. The city has attempted — without much success — to incorporate innovative ways of raising revenues for needed public services. Frequently opposition within the village ensues; cooperation is not achieved, and another proposal bites the dust. This is the view which is observed by many living in and around Carmel-by-the-Sea.

There is an enormous difference, however, between living "in" and "around" this picturesque village and it is called "taxes." Cutting to the chase, this is my recommendation: The City of Carmel should aggressively underwrite an action plan to annex all adjacent property roughly south of Pebble Beach, north of Carmel River, and bounded either by Highway 1 or a so-called "reasonable" westward distance of a mile beyond it in order to incorporate Carmel High School and the neighboring residences thereabouts into the city's tax base

I can well imagine the stir, to put it mildly, that such a course of action would create. I believe it is high time, however, for all of those non-Carmelites who use the services of Carmel-by-the-Sea to pony up their fair share of the needed tax revenues to compensate for their usage. This recommendation could be better realized if the Carmelites themselves would present an improved appearance, when it comes to their mindset, making it easier for the others to want to be Carmelites, too.

#### **How Much Disclosure?**

If this is a seller's market and you're a seller, do you need to be very precise when you fill out the statutory Transfer Disclosure Statement? After all, you know if the first buyers complain too much about the home



you're selling, there will likely be several others in line waiting to buy it.

In fact, there's no more important time to carefully fill out disclosures than in a seller's market. Buyers will need to act quickly, without the time to carefully think about the issues that might otherwise concern them in a slower-paced market.

To fully protect yourself from a disgruntled buyer after the close of escrow, you, as a seller, should take the time to carefully fill out the TDS (and any supplemental disclosures provided by your realtor) before a buyer brings you an offer. Take your time and answer each question thoroughly.

If, for example, you had a small amount of water that came in through a window frame once in a driving rain storm, and this event never repeated itself, indicate this on the TDS. If the buyers wish to evaluate this particular problem during their due diligence period, invite them to do so.

I'm not aware of too many lawsuits that were a result of excessive disclosure. But we're all painfully aware of the litigation that occurs when incomplete or inadequate disclosures were made.



good ideas and support are invaluable."

In addition to the 15 neighborhood coffees he attended in voters' homes, Cunningham credited his successful campaign to his endorsements, which included council members Hazdovac and Rose, and his newspaper ads.

April 16, 2004

Bethel, who garnered a higher percentage of votes at the polls than by mail, said his legwork yielded that result.

"I went through one pair of shoes and halfway through a second pair," said Bethel, who walked door to door through most of the city before election day. "People brought me into their homes, played the piano for me, gave me tea. They were very inviting and hospitable, and also very interested in the issues of our community."

Their comments and concerns ranged from the raccoons who killed a woman's dog and the bumps and potholes that jarred the bolts loose in a man's car, to the more frequent comments about the budget.

Following their 3 p.m. swearing-in at city hall April 20 — which will be broadcast live on KMST cable channel 26 —

the first task the returning mayor and council will tackle is the budget. An afternoon workshop is set for April 27.

#### Financial talents

McCloud expressed confidence in the two newest members, both of whom have strong business credentials. Bethel holds an M.B.A. and worked on Wall Street before heading west, and Cunningham spent his career with Hewlett-Packard.

"It should be a fairly smooth transition, and it should be good to have fresh looks," McCloud said, noting that Cunningham headed the ad-hoc group that reviewed Sunset Center's finances. Cunningham plans to apply a business perspective to the next three-year budget by asking each department where it would make cuts if necessary.

"Then it's the city management and the council's job to do the probing about what alternatives the departments have considered." he said.

"It doesn't take an M.B.A. to know you can't spend more money than you make," Bethel said, adding that budgeting requires "immediate tactical decisions" and a long-term approach agreed upon by residents, businesses and the city.

Both plan to study the issue before the budget workshop.

McCloud said city commissions, committees and boards will also provide information on what they believe is needed and where cuts can be made. City administrator Rich Guillen will give his forecast and suggestions as well. The session will begin at 4:30 p.m. in city council chambers.

With Livingston and Ely off the council, the election results also clear the way for a contract to be finalized with Sunset Cultural Center, Inc., the nonprofit organized at McCloud's request to take over management of Sunset Center. The two council members whose terms end Tuesday refused to participate in a closed session on the contract; with their replacement by Cunningham and Bethel, that opposition will presumably evaporate.

The election also virtually eliminates the possibility of any substantial, last-minute changes to the city's Local Coastal Program. The last half of the LCP awaiting final approval — the Coastal Implementation Plan — will have its second reading before the city council in May. It will then go back to the coastal commission for final certification, after which the city will regain the power to issue its own coastal development permits. Since the Coastal Act was passed in 1976, Carmel property owners have had to obtain permits from the California Coastal Commission.





## "Carmel Legends"

Several weeks ago, 80 men gathered for their annual weekend encampment at the Boy Scout Camp in the far reaches of Palo Colorado Canyon. Among them were the Sheriff, the District Attorney, several judges, and an assorted crew of ranchers, fishermen, doctors, lawyers and businessmen. This was THE BUCKEYE (not the Buckeyes), a motley group of Monterey County men, brought together in controversy in 1965 and continuing in harmony ever since. They care about this county, they love good food, drink and companionship, and they constitute a strong, if convivial force in this county. The ranchers and farmers bring their best tomatoes, artichokes and steaks. Insurance men man the barbecue and bar. State authorities talk about the ecology, forest fires and water supplies. Newspaper men reveal little known stories. Sportsmen talk about deer, trout and wild boar. # Cutting and dumping trees: Should state follow the rules?

NEITHER SIDE disputes that the eucalyptus trees in Big Sur's Julia Pfeiffer Burns State Park have to go.

Nor do they disagree that the non-native species is destructive to the environment.

At a Monterey County Planning Commission meeting Wednesday morning, the debate was not whether to give the state parks department carte blanche to get rid of the trees, but whether it should be required to undergo the same rigorous permitting process as private landowners whenever they want to do something on their land, including chopping down a eucalyptus tree.

Pacific Grove resident Arden Handshy said it is a matter of fairness.

"The Big Sur Land Use Advisory Committee said that state parks projects of this nature need to go through the same procedures as the general public," he said. "I think Commissioner [Martha] Diehl recognized that State Parks needs to follow the same rules as everyone else."


Monterey County Senior Planner Carl Holm outlined how more than 2,000 trees could be removed without a permit and dumped down a cliff onto the beach.

"In September 2002, state parks removed half of the [4,156] trees under the belief that they didn't need a permit," Holm said.

Department of Parks and Recreation Resource Planner Ken Gray said they were told the removal of non-native vegetation is exempt from the permit requirement. About a month later, the area was red-tagged after they realized a permit is, in fact, required for killing non-native trees on steep slopes or in environmentally sensitive habitat.

Handshy also criticized how state parks disposed of the 2,000 trees.

up on the beach," he said, adding that he would be in "big trouble" if he dumped trees from his own property in the same manner and questioned why the government workers had suffered no consequences.

As to whether state parks received preferential treatment, Gray said the comparison is not apt because private landowners rarely volunteer to do habitat restoration.

"They usually want to build a new house or something where the environmental impact will be greater, so you would expect there to be more scrutiny," he said.

Handshy requested a full Environmental Impact Report be required, but Gray said an EIR would be a waste of time.

"There are no permanent impacts on this project in regards to traffic, habitat destruction or species extinction," he added. "In fact, it'll have a positive impact by removing non-native trees, which will be replaced

"Those trees were dropped down a sleep slope and ended

with native species. We've already planted 1,500 natives." "The removal of non-natives is consistent with the Big Sur Land Use project," Gray said. "In essence, this is a weedremoval project."

However, Friends of the Big Sur Coast member William Sloan said since the trees exist in an environmentally sensitive habitat, the environmental review is far from complete.

sion and Monarch and Smith's blue butterflies — was produced by state parks ecologists, which Sloan considered a clear conflict of interest. Also, the study of the impact on the Monarchs was done during non-butterfly season, he said.

Commissioner Diehl requested a month's delay for more study. If the permit is approved as expected May 12, Gray said the rest of the trees would be chopped down in the fall after the summer tourist season is over.

#### **Step 1: Define your style**

Be sure to discuss finances with both families. Today, it is common that family members contribute to the wedding.


#### Step 4: Find the right vendors

Remember, value is more important than a bargain. When you find a great vendor, request and actually contact references. When comparing price quotes from vendors, be sure to compare details and quality. If you are having trouble finding the perfect vendors or aren't even sure where to begin, rely on the reception venue wedding coordinator or booking person to provide you with a list of wedding resources. **Step 5: Picture perfect** 

Believe it or not, the photographer can make or break your entire memory of the wedding day. Be sure to tell the photographer exactly what you want and when you want it. Make sure the bride and groom feel comfortable with the photographer's style and personality. If the photographer is not clear on what your expectations are, the entire wedding day can be off schedule. You don't want to show up an hour late for the reception because the photographer wanted to take more couples shots.

Work out a list of photo opportunities prior to the wedding day and select a family member or friend to be in charge of gathering people for photos. This will ensure the day runs smoothly.







# Focus on your wedding photographer

OU'VE GOT the ring and a date, but the challenge of organizing a perfect wedding is just beginning. Ahead lies a task somewhere between planning a Thanksgiving dinner and putting on the Macy's Parade.

Choosing your ceremony and reception site is first and foremost. After

you've nailed that down with deposits and contracts, you need to move on to picking the most important team member for your matrimonial day: the wedding photographer.

He or she will be an integral part of the wedding experience, not only because photographers create memories you'll cherish for years, but because he or she will be with you every step of





the way. While a florist or baker can deliver the most impressive cake or the most glorious roses, they don't stick with the couple from make-up to ceremony to reception to farewells.

And keep in mind that, while other vendors can work with several weddings per day, a photographer generally takes only one wedding a day. So, it's wise to book early for the best photographers in your area.

Get to know the photographers you interview. Since they are so important, you need to choose this person as carefully as you would choose a friend or a traveling companion. He or she will be

interacting with you, your bridal party, your family and your guests, and you want someone who can fit in with your rhythm and temperament. There is nothing more upsetting to the flow of a wedding day than a loud photographer pushing the guests around in circles. So ask potential vendors not only their style of photography, but their style of working. How do they get the photographs they need in a specified amount of time? How would they handle a situation, for instance, where the sister of the bride has disappeared for 20 minutes when the family photos need to be done? The way they answer will tell you a lot.

Currently the trend in wedding pho-



organized. Start a wedding binder or folder. Create tabs for each vendor you have hired. Put the contract, contact information and all of the details for each vendor behind each tab. If you have pictures or samples of what you are expecting the vendor to provide, include these items in the binder as well. Being organized can help reduce stress and ensure that perfect wedding.

#### Step 9: Confirm all details


Two weeks before your wedding, be sure all the vendors and the wedding party have a schedule for the wedding day (include directions). It is important that all vendors — and everyone in the


wedding party — know what is expected of them. Make sure all final deposits or payments have been paid. If payments need to be made on the wedding day, assign someone to handle final payments to the vendors.

## How to be the ultimate bridesmaid

emember: Planning a wedding is complicated and the bride can't do everything! The trick for a bridesmaid is to help

as much as possible without intruding.

Here are some basic guidelines.

② As soon as the engagement is announced and you have been asked to be a bridesmaid, start helping the bride get ready for the wedding. Ask your recently married friends for advice about local caterers, florists, musicians and photographers. Clip advertisements, peruse bridal magazines and visit local shops. Collect travel brochures for honeymoon ideas.

(b) When attending bridal fairs, be the one to collect the information, carry bags and fill out all the ballots for giveaways, allowing the bride to spend more time looking.

Offer to help stick address labels and stamps on the envelopes for wedding invitations and thank-you notes.

On the day of the wedding, show up at the bride's house with a tray of small snacks for everyone to nibble on. After all, you may not get time to eat all day.



- Bring along a camera or video camera to get a personal view of the bride as she gets ready for her big day.
- For photographs, help ensure the bride looks her best

by straightening her dress, puffing up her bouquet and touching up her makeup.

- ② Instead of just making a speech at the reception, show some slides from the bride's childhood, present her with a gift, sing a song or write a poem about your friendship.
- ② At the reception, designate yourself the official party maker and get people dancing. Be sure to dance with the single uncle or anyone else the bride is worried may not be having a good time.
- Don't leave early! The ideal bridesmaid is one of the last people to leave the party, so be prepared to stay as long as it takes.
- Help with the cleanup. Whether it is at 3 in the morning or the next day, don't leave this for the bride to do herself. When cleaning up, be sure to save some mementos for the bride such as a centerpiece, wedding favors left behind, etc.

NTHE recent movie, "Intolerable Cruelty," starring George Clooney and Catherine Zeta-Jones, couples prove their devotion to each other by ignoring the advice of high-priced lawyers and tearing up their prenuptial agreements just before they take their marital vows.

In the real world, while nobody wants to think about disagreements, family problems or divorce in the optimistic days of an engagement, these grim events

do happen, and it's always best to be prepared.

While some couples, as in the movie, may consider it unromantic or bad luck to sign a prenuptial agreement, others should seriously consider drafting up this important document. In fact, for couples in certain situations or circumstances, prenuptial agreements are almost necessary. You should consider a prenuptial agreement if:

You or your future spouse own a considerable estate, await a sizable inheritance or otherwise own large amounts of property.

When you are bringing large personal and/or real assets into a relationship, be sure to make an accounting of them before getting married. While no bride and groom want to think about divorce, the possibility is still present. And you certainly won't want to watch your own hard-earned assets disappear along with a marriage that unfortunately didn't work out.

You or your future spouse have children from

previous relationships. In order to balance the interests of your children with the interests of your future spouse, put everything in writing. In the event of death or divorce, a prenuptial agreement may help avoid either your children or your spouse being shortchanged.

© You and your future spouse plan to cohabit in a common-law marriage for a long period of time. Whether or not you're contemplating actually getting married in a civil union, legally speaking, common-law marriages aren't as simple as they are made out to be. In California, any couple presenting itself as married,

or acting married, may be considered legally married. In order to avoid ambiguity if and when the need arises for distribution of assets, be sure to put everything in writing with your common-law spouse.

You or your spouse anticipate future disability or other imminently dangerous circumstances. Be sure to account for those instances in a proper domestic agreement. After all, you wouldn't want to leave your love stranded, would you?

If any of these situations applies to you, it may be a good idea to draft a prenuptial agreement. It never hurts to be ready for the worst!

tography is part photojournalism (or candids) and part traditional, or posed, shots.

A good photographer will use photojournalism to capture the candid moments during the day. A lastminute phone call to someone who can't be there, the mother seeing her daughter in her gown for the first time, the bride reassuring a nervous flower girl. The candids will be a delightful part of your photo package — but you can't ignore the family poses. Everyone shudders at the thought of standing for what seems like hours at the altar for endless poses while the rest of the guests go on to the reception. Most wedding photographers do their best to move through these photos as quickly as possible, while keeping the atmosphere light and fun. These important photos will go quickly — as long as those involved know to stay after the ceremony. A list of important people and poses should be discussed by the bride and groom early in the planning stages.

A photographer can document your day from beginning to end or just be there for the ceremony and family photos only. Remember that when the day is over, the flowers will fade and the cake will be gone. Only the photographs will remain as a visible record and memory to be treasured for years.


Luckily for we photographers, Carmel and the surrounding areas abound in gorgeous scenery to use as backdrops for wedding photography. We have our choices of classic stone villas, open terraces, expansive lawns, rustic western ranches and the many bluffs and beaches that call to the bride and groom lucky enough to find themselves getting married here. If you can work it out ahead of time, getting to the beach at some point is always worth it. Depending on location of ceremony and reception, this may have to be done before the ceremony. Often, it can be done gracefully by having the groom wait in the garden near the bride's room or at the beach — thus the bride gets her wish of appearing as Cinderella to him, completely ready with flowers in hand and getting his unabashed reaction — which better be delightful!

So shop for your wedding support team carefully. Don't go by price alone. You should like the packages they offer, but you must have a rapport with them, especially your photographer. Once you have chosen your professionals, keep in contact with them concerning the details of your wedding day. It's a good thing to keep in mind that they've handled many wedding days

and let them do what they do best. When your day arrives, you can relax, get married and enjoy the magic of this very special day.
