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# SEARCHING FOR A FALLEN FRIEND

#### Memorial replica seen by more than original


IT TRAVELS by big rig to communities across the United States, and organizers say the traveling version of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall may be seen by more people than the original on the Mall in Washington. D.C. Thanks to the sponsorship of the City of Seaside and The Carpenter's House church, the traveling wall was installed at Laguna Grande Park in Seaside this week for Memorial Day observances.

"We want to make sure as many people as possible come to see it," said Michael Bloom of the Carmel chapter of the American Legion. "It's very important for our servicemen who fell in combat to be remembered."

The wall contains the names of all 58.235 soldiers killed between 1959 and 1975 in our nation's failed effort to prevent the spread of communism to South Vietnam. Included are six servicemen from Carmel: Frank Antone, Charles De Amaral Jr., Philippe Fales, Larry Larson, Mark Serrem and Klaus Warrelmann, according to a computer database that can be accessed at a tent adjacent to the temporary wall. They were all killed at the height of the war, between 1967 and 1979. There are also six names from Pacific Grove, 10 from Seaside, five from Monterey, one from Marina and 10 from Salinas.

In addition to the wall itself, which will be open 24 hours a day through Monday evening, are an art exhibit of works by Vietnam vet Norm Bergsma, a walk of fame

# Flood of water bills at capital

THE MONTEREY Peninsula's perennial water shortage was a hot topic in Sacramento this week, as Senator Bruce McPherson proposed to dissolve the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District and Assemblyman John Laird readied his bill seeking cheaper energy rates for desal plants for the Senate after it passed the Assembly.

Since early last year, Peninsula mayors have pushed McPherson to change the makeup of the district's board and eliminate the public vote on water projects, but McPherson went further with SB 1529, which would kill the district altogether. He said his bill does exactly what voters demanded in 2002 when they overwhelmingly passed an advisory measure that said the district should be dissolved.

"So let's do that and then let the locals decide [what should replace it]," McPherson told The Pine Cone. Whether it becomes a joint powers authority of city and county officials or is absorbed by the Monterey County Water Resources Agency, and which agencies take over its mandated programs, should be determined here, not in Sacramento, he said.

Citing the \$60 million the district has spent while failing to provide any water since its formation in 1978, as well as its apparent lack of a role in the proposed region-

al desalination plant at Moss Landing, McPherson said officials, residents and business people support SB 1529. "This district is unproductive and very costly," he said.

McPherson's chief of staff, James Jack, predicted the revised bill will be heard by an Assembly committee next month and could be passed by the Legislature before it recesses in August. The bill's effective date is Jan. 1, 2005.

"We're going to be prepared for a good, healthy debate," Jack said. "It's very difficult to refute the fact that this is the will of the voters.'

McPherson predicted the battle will be tough and that Laird will fight the bill as he has in the past.

"It's going to be difficult for him to say he's against what two-thirds of the people want," McPherson said.

Speaking at a Carmel Valley Chamber of Commerce lunch Wednesday, Monterey Mayor Dan Albert said he supports SB 1529. MPWMD director Larry Foy instead favors a deadline for the district to provide water or be dissolved, but worried six months is too soon. If given a chance, Foy said, the current board could make progress where past boards have faltered.

#### Desal bill advances

Meanwhile, Laird's AB 2918, which would require the California Public Utilities Commission to spend a year studying the feasibility of selling cheaper energy to desalination plants brought online after Jan. 1, 2006, passed the Assembly May 20 and is headed to the Senate.

Among the bill's supporters are Sand City, the Marina Coast Water District, the Fort Ord Reuse Authority and

# Council divided over layoffs

■ Fight to save full-time workers, but 19 part-timers would go

CAN PAPER clips, toilet paper and photographic supplies be cut by another \$250,000 to keep five full-time workers on the payroll?

The city council strenuously debated the point Tuesday night in an argument that pitted two new council members against the veterans.

"I'm trying to be fair to them [the city workers] and the - that's all I'm trying to do," said Mike Cunningham, who took office last month. "I want to take another whack at the numbers."

"I agree," fellow newcomer Erik Bethel added. "It's not unreasonable to ask if we can cut fat to save a few more

But three-term Mayor Sue McCloud and council members Gerard Rose and Paula Hazdovac supported city administrator Rich Guillen's assertion that he and the managers of each department had already cut to the bone on the non-payroll side of the budget.

"We're at the point where we're asking our employees to conduct their own janitorial services," Hazdovac said.

# Douglas tells coastal commission he has throat cancer



PETER DOUGLAS, the executive director of the California Coastal Commission for nearly 20 years, during which time he has become the darling of environmental activists and the bane of property owners, told commissioners at their meeting in San Rafael last month that he has been diagnosed with throat cancer.

According to several people who heard Douglas'

announcement, he said he would be kept away from the commission's June meeting to begin chemotherapy and radiation treatments. He didn't offer any prognosis except to say that the illness is "one of those things life throws at you, and we're going to deal with it."

According to his official biography, Douglas was a "principal author" of the Coastal Act of 1976 and has been widely called the most

powerful planning official in the state, if not the nation. Sources said his duties would probably be assumed temporarily by Charles Lester, director of the commission's Santa Cruz office.

The news of Douglas' illness comes at a time of other major changes at the coastal commission. At the June meeting in Los Angeles, three new commissioners appointed by Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger will be sworn in. (See story, page 4B.) The California Supreme Court is also expected to schedule arguments very soon on a case, Marine Forests Society vs. California Coastal Commission, that could force a complete restructuring of the commission to comply with the state constitution's Separation of Powers clause.

A LUCKY York School senior, Cambria Minott-Gaines, who led her school's team in the SPCA Wag 'n' Walk fundraiser last summer, set a great horned owl free outside the school's chapel Tuesday.

The owl, badly injured in a collision with power lines March 10 at Fort Ord, was nursed back to health by specialists at the SPCA, according to Shawn Wilson, wildlife coordinator.

"Because it was an electrocution, we had a lot of work to do," Wilson explained. "First, we treated him with steroids and tubefed him fluids, but he wasn't even able to stand for several days."


bird was released at the school was that it was basically the site where he was found," Wilson said. York School is just outside the southern boundary of the former Army base. Wednesday afternoon,

after a brief talk to students about the owl's history, Wilson fitted Minott-Gaines with heavy gloves and prepared her for handling the powerful raptor: "Just hold onto his legs. If he sinks his claws in, you'll feel it, but it won't hurt!"

With about 100 students and faculty looking on, Wilson gently removed the owl from his small cage and handed him to Gaines, who briefly held the owl with both hands, letting him survey his new domain before releasing him to the oakstudded hillside.

"It didn't hurt at all," Gaines said.

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
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# Burglary suspect returns to scene for dropped cell phone

 $F_{\rm AR}$  FROM exemplifying the criminal mastermind, a suspected car burglar was arrested in Pebble Beach last week after he left his cell phone behind and then arranged a meet-

ing with the victim to get it back, according to the Monterey County Sheriff's Office.

Pacific Grove resident Sean Connors, 18, pleaded not guilty in Monterey County Superior Court Thursday to felony charges of vehicle burglary, grand theft and possession of stolen property — though he apparently didn't possess it for long.

Carmel Valley resident Mark Nottenkamper, a caddie at Cypress Point Club, called the sheriff's office just before 11 a.m. May 19 after dis-

covering his Toyota Tundra had been burglarized.

"He found a cell phone inside that did not belong to him," said Sgt. John DiCarlo. "The phone rang, so the victim answered it, and the suspect said, 'I left my cell phone in the car, and I'll give you your property back if you give me my cell phone back."

Nottenkamper agreed, hung up, and then promptly called the sheriff to report his truck had been broken into, his wallet — including \$185 cash — and day planner stolen, and the suspect was on his way back to the scene of the crime.

Deputy John Pellerin arrived at the caddie parking lot off 17 Mile Drive 10 minutes later.



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"When the deputy arrived, the suspect was there with the victim and he was arrested," DiCarlo said. Nottenkamper recovered his planner and wallet, complete with cash and credit cards.


Connors reportedly broke into the truck through the slid-

ing window on the camper shell, according to DiCarlo. "The guy said he broke in because he needed the cash," he said.

According to the district attorney's office, Connors was released from Monterey County Jail on \$10,000 bail May 24 and pleaded not guilty at his arraignment May 27.

# Potter: I don't know what they were thinking

REACTING WITH disbelief after the board of supervisors voted Tuesday to throw out most of the proposed general plan and look for ways to update the existing plan, 5th District Supervisor said he doesn't "know what the majority of the board was thinking."

Potter was on the losing end, with Moss Landing supervisor Lou Calcagno, of the 3-2 vote to dump the 700-page General Plan Update, which was prepared over more than four years at a cost of \$4.5 million.

"I'm completely mystified," Potter said. "In an era when we're trying to save every dollar we can, we're going to spend more on the general plan? I don't know how we can say we're trustworthy stewards of the public's money.'

Tuesday's vote came in response to concerns from property owners that the proposed general plan was too restrictive - limiting new subdivisions in South County, for example, to 40-acre minimums.

"But why throw out the whole plan?" Potter asked. "If they don't want 40-acre minimums in South County, I say fine, take it out. We'd still have a plan I could live with."

But Edith Johnsen, Butch Lindley and Fernando Armenta didn't see it that way. They joined forces to ask county staff to find ways to simplify changes to the existing general plan. "We wanted an update and what we got was the Taj Mahal,"

Their vote came after more public testimony on the plan, with people coming down firmly on opposite sides.

"The best alternative is one that hasn't even been presented to you, and that is: Adopt the general plan that's in front of you," said Gary Patton of LandWatch Monterey County, a group which favors strict zoning laws and is backed with money from the Packard Foundation.

But Tom Carvey of Common Ground, which wants property owners to have more options for their land, called the proposed general plan an "environmental lawyer's paradise. Anything you wanted to stop with a lawsuit you could stop with a lawsuit." He said it was "an attempt to control every facet of the economic life of this county.'

Potter said the political divide between the Salinas Valley, where many people want growth to provide jobs and housing, and the Monterey Peninsula, where a significant number of wealthy people likes things just the way they are, had become virtually unbridgeable. "I'm not saying there's anything wrong with the ideology of the Salinas Valley; they're just diametrically opposed," Potter said. "It argues not necessarily for incorporating Carmel Valley, but maybe for dividing Monterey County into two counties.

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# AT&T Pebble Beach Charities gifts this year hit \$3.1 million







Although the patient should anticipate a return to normal activities within several days, it may take a couple of weeks for him to experience the full benefit of the procedure — namely, a marked increase in efficiency of urination.

"This is a wonderful procedure," according to Dr. Goldman who notes that nearly 90 percent of patients require no more than one photovaporization treatment. "To my knowledge, we are the only ones near this area offering it."

# Council appoints new planning, traffic commissioners

ONE OF the few Carmel residents who live in the middle of the commercial district — in a small apartment overlooking the Harrison Memorial Library garden — was appointed to the planning commission by the city council May 13. Ken Talmage, owner of a water purification business, replaces commissioner Mike Cunningham, who was elected to the city council last month.

"Carmel is such a special place," Talmage said last week, explaining why he sought the appointment. "I have a keen interest in design and architecture, and I'm very familiar with the planning process because of my business.

Based in Manteca — though he admits he only visits his office there when he must — Talmage's Monterey Water Company provides free-standing water purification stations at which people fill bottles for 25 cents per gallon. He has no plans for stations on the Peninsula but has shepherded more

\*And we need to watch for credit fraud, for charges made against our accounts by someone other than ourselves.



'People are very prone to polarization right now, and I'm very much hoping we can move away from that but still be completely loyal to our concerns," she said.



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




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
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# Former maestro lauded by Bach patrons

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



"MAMA SAYS, 'Money Doesn't Grow on Trees!" by Iris Marie Mack, MBA/Ph.D., is a phenomenal book by a phenomenal woman. She has been titled "Dr. Mackamatrix" in her role as a math teacher to her multicultural, hip-hop characters in the book, all of whom actually like mathematics. Frequently students are not interested in math because they see no practical application of it in their lives. Professor Zero (a math teacher in the book) dispels this misconception by explaining how money grows in a bank savings account, with a general compound interest formula. He illustrates the higher the frequency of compounding, the more the saving account grows. Thus, the lesson is brought home that money doesn't grow on trees and that a knowledge of math is applicable to students' lives.

Dr. Mack earned her doctorate in applied mathematics from Harvard and was a mathematics and business professor at MIT while simultaneously running her own consulting company. She was a semifinalist for the NASA astronaut program, moved to Europe and earned an executive MBA at the London Business School before working in the stock market in London.

Aside from looking like a movie star, Dr. Mack is passionately concerned with making math accessible to all. This book is brilliant in its concept, and with the exception of having a typeface for titles and headings that is difficult to read, it's a winner. Dr. Mack said the font will be changed in the next edition. The 47-page paperback sells for \$18.95 and is published by Xlibris. 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# Tita's Café summons happy memories of Mexico

**D**URING A luncheon visit to Tita's on a limpid spring day recently with the sunny, flowered patio punctuated with shade from umbrellas, I felt as if I were in Mexico. The quiet, recessed courtyard with bright geraniums and lemon trees was a-hum with happy lunchers, many of them visitors, which added a vacation-like quality to the atmosphere.

The bright monotone pottery plates and cobalt blue water

glasses were set at each white-clothed table, both inside and out. They were a joy to behold, as was the three dimensional folk art on the interior walls.

Chef Francisco Silva — brother and brother-in-law respectively of owners Esther and Steven Hudson — rules the kitchen, with an occasional assist from sis Esther, specializing in Oaxacan and Mexico City fare. And excellent fare it is.

> We so enjoyed the enfrijoladas (\$9.95) at the luncheon, we persuaded our dinner guest this week to try them (\$13.95 at dinner): Two white corn tortillas, coated with creamy bean

sauce and filled with shredded beef, were topped with Mexican cream and queso fresco. This dish is very tasty and mildly spicy. Our dinner companion

opted for an appetizer (large enough for an entrée), of tuna seviche (\$8.95), and while she found it very tasty and spicy, she was disappointed it wasn't made of fresh tuna, but tinned alba-

core. But fresh tuna will

soon be used in the dish, according to the friendly owner.

I was thrilled with my appetizer of shrimp and avocado (\$6.95), which was served on a large navy blue plate in such an appetizing manner, I consumed it all with gusto.

Wedges of avocado were interspersed with large shrimp,

with tails on, with a spicy dressing drizzled over all. It was deli-

For my entrée I ordered the owner's favorite: Two pork chops fried and seasoned with garlic, topped with sun dried chili and prune sauce and served with rice and salad (\$14.95). Pork chops are a yardstick by which a chef's kitchen acumen can be measured. Too many times the chops are fried to a frazzle or to a shoeleather tough consistency. Chef Francisco's pork chops were tender, juicy, nicely browned and flavorful.

Ventana Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon (\$7.75 a glass) complemented the entrées very nicely. We are pleased to see Ventana By MORGAN

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

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

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

The council took no action when it discussed the proposed \$10.95 million budget May 25, though members directed Guillen to reexamine expenses in hopes of culling enough cash to save even one full-time job among the five on the chopping block. Council members reluctantly conceded 19 part-time employees — including 11 from the library — would probably have to go.

May 25 marked the council's first discus-

sion of the proposed budget, developed by Guillen, city treasurer Charles Reiman, CPA Paul Wood and acting financial services coordinator Cheryl Panattoni. The budget calls for a 10 percent cut in supplies and services to each department and a \$1 million reduction in city jobs beyond those already vacated through attrition.

"This is what I feel is necessary to keep this city financially stable," Guillen said.

Several in the standing-room-only audience pleaded with the council to avoid depriving visitors and residents of services and hurting city workers and their families.

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Calling the library "the heart of the city," several people decried the job losses, which would lead to cuts in hours and programs. Others protested selling Flanders Mansion.

"It's Economics 101: To sell assets that are appreciating to support assets that are depreciating is financially irresponsible," former mayor Charlotte

Townsend said. "Not to mention the enormous cultural loss."

But two speakers supported selling the aging house because keeping it costs the city more as it continues to deteriorate.

"Every time I come to a council meeting, I find a concerted effort to make Flanders look like a silk purse," Clay Berling commented. "After 30-plus years, five committees have looked at Flanders to find a reasonable use, and all came up with nothing."

Larry Rodocker's lengthy list of suggestions included saving \$40,000 in courier services by having police officers deliver mail to housebound residents three times a week.

#### Pleading for jobs

One vacant job that won't be filled is for a full-time police officer. Carmel Police Cpl. Steve Rana told the council it should keep in mind the importance of a strong police force.

"There are times when police work is unpredictable," he said, adding that dedicated officers have helped prevent tragedy.

Public works and forestry administrative coordinator Margi Perotti asked the council to remember those who fill potholes, trim trees and assist other departments.

"We're the little people who take care of the things you don't see," such as setting up tables for recreation department events, she said. "We support everyone."

Speakers also pitched new revenue sources, such as increasing the hotel tax, but council members said any new income generators would not affect the 2004/2005 budget, which takes effect July 1. Instead, the council pledged to discuss all possible moneymakers after the budget is adopted.

"We're not going to find something that pleases everyone," McCloud said, adding that paid parking would have raised \$1.4 million a year for the city, but the plan was unpopular and got shelved as a result. "That would have solved all of these problems."

She said she hopes city residents would be more receptive in light of the current economy and urged them to "look at what will work and not at why they don't work."

After accepting Guillen's projected rev-

enues - mostly from sales tax, transient occupancy tax and property tax — the council sparred over proposed cuts.

"Are you satisfied, as I am, that Rich brought in the department heads and hammered to the point where there is nothing left to cut?" Rose asked. "We can stay here all

night and talk about each item, but I don't think that needs to be done. It's already been done."

Cunningham said the \$4.58 million materials and services budget should be reduced. "I haven't seen a budget yet that's \$4 million that couldn't be \$3.75 million without sinking the ship."

Guillen said there's simply nowhere left to cut and said the council would be "micromanaging" if it began scrutinizing amounts of paper supplies or other lesser expenses.

"I would feel better with another round of scrubbing every dollar," Cunningham said.

"I would feel better, too, but I don't think the outcome will be different," Hazdovac replied. "The numbers have been scrubbed and scrubbed and scrubbed, and we're fooling ourselves if we think we will just come up with the extra money.'

Council members decided not to cut the city's discretionary expenses, such as mail delivery, the Carmel Youth Center grant and destination marketing, though they asked Guillen to research how past councils had spent the \$50,000 specifically earmarked for the council's own discretion.

The council also supported the budget's use of \$588,000 from capital reserves to replace old equipment and take care of deferred maintenance projects, several of which will bring matching grants. "If we have a town that's falling apart, nobody's going to want to come here," Bethel said. 'We have to invest in our infrastructure."

Upon questioning, Guillen said the firehouse retrofit was not included because its costs are unknown, but the council reserves the right to amend the budget later.

McCloud argued against cutting the cleaning of public restrooms, since their state is already a top-five complaint from residents and visitors.

Ultimately, the council acknowledged the need to lay off part-time workers and asked Guillen to examine expenses again.

"After that, something of this magnitude will require a unanimous vote," McCloud said before asking Bethel and Cunningham to comb through the budget and give their suggested cuts to Guillen before the next budget hearing at 4:30 p.m. June 3.

"I don't come with any agenda — just to listen carefully and decide fairly," he said. "Those words are Mike Cunningham's, but this is his seat. That's what he did, and that's what I will attempt to do."

#### Tom Conmy on traffic

The council also appointed Crespi resident Tom Conmy to replace newly elected councilman Erik Bethel on the Carmel Community Traffic Safety Commission.

A retired packaging materials broker, Conmy has lived in Carmel for 14 years. He said he first encountered the commission when he reported the dangers of turning from Mountain View onto Crespi, where parked cars made it a blind intersection too narrow for emergency vehicles to pass.

"I contacted the commission and they came right out and fixed it, and I was so impressed," he said.


And as vehicles get larger, traffic safety on Carmel's narrow streets is a growing concern, while parking and speeding are perennial problems.

"It's not new, but it's something they have to always work on, and my goal is just to contribute as best I can — to observe and bring to the attention of the commission things I see that they might not," he said.

Prior to his retirement last year, Conmy was president of Tom Conmy & Associates. He worked in sales and marketing for Crown Zellerback/James River Corp. from 1967 to 1989 and before that assisted Pacific National Bank in business development. He has volunteered as a server at a soup kitchen in Seaside for two years. His term on the traffic safety commission will end in September 2006.



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

"We need to be very active in this city and where we differ, allow for differences," she said.


As co-chair of the CRA's issues committee for the last two years, Shollenbarger has helped select monthly speakers and keep the group's 344 members informed.

# What's the truth about California?

EVERY ONCE in a while, a news story appears that undermines pretty much everything else we've learned from the media on a given subject.

That was certainly true with a May 12 story in the San Francisco Chronicle and again in the May 27 Monterey County Herald that immigrants from Mexico to the United States have longer life expectancies than whites who are born in this country, according to a study by the National Institutes of Health. A first-generation Mexican immigrant can expect to live 81.1 years, The Chronicle reported, while a native-born white, on average, gets just 77.7 years, based on mortality rates from 1986-1994.

The news stories called the study "surprising," "astonishing," "counterintuitive," and said it "challenges some common beliefs."

Perhaps that's because those same media outlets feed their readers a steady diet of stories of new Hispanic immigrants to this country being mistreated, underpaid, undernourished and poisoned with pesticides on the job while living in overcrowded, substandard housing, being murdered by criminal gangs and denied access to health care.

"People have a misconception that immigrants have poorer health, but when you look at the empirical data, you almost always find they do better than their native counterparts," said Gopal K. Singh, an NIH statistician, according to the Herald.

How to explain this? The Chronicle has carried dozens of stories over the years about Mexican immigrant farmworkers sickened by exposure to pesticides in the fields. Just this week, an item from Bakersfield told of 18 workers hit with "pesticide drift" in a peach orchard. The chemical was related to nervegas and can cause "unconsciousness, seizures and death," the paper reported. And the incident was by no means unusual. In 2002, the story continued, more than 1,300 "poor, Hispanic immigrants who speak little English ... and are afraid to ask the government for help," were poisoned with pesticides as 172 million pounds of the chemicals were used around the state.


Another story last year reported that "about 30 percent of Hispanic Americans lack a usual source of health care ... compared with less than 16 percent of whites," and that far fewer elderly Mexicans in California reported they were in good health, compared to whites and Asians.

Obviously, either the life-expectancy study is wrong, or many of the other news stories have been exaggerated. Perhaps tales of hard-working, law-abiding, church-going, non-smoking Mexican families who exercise and watch what they eat should start to be considered news.

Americans have a tendency to believe the worst about their own country, and the news media are all too willing to be their enablers.

But maybe things aren't as bad as we've been told all these years.





# "Carmel Legends"

A curious character who keeps flitting in and out of Carmel history is MARY AUSTIN. Well, perhaps "flit" is not quite the right verb for her activities, because she is described as a "dumpy little woman" who walked the beaches and let her long brown hair dangle to her shoulders. Instinctively we don't like her much, but we admire her independence and her success in competing with the macho men fronted by George Sterling and Jack London. In a time (1900-1915) when women were supposed to be seen and not heard, she was a worthy successor to Eve, Cleopatra, Queen Victoria, Carrie Chapman Catt, Florence Nightingale and Carrie Nation. And possibly an inspiration to Gloria Steinem, Eleanor Roosevelt and Jane Fonda. She came to Carmel in 1905, already the author of a successful book. The Land of Little Rain. In Carmel, she finished her first novel, Isidro, polishing its phrases in a tree house behind her home, which she called a 'wick-i-up." She battled Sterling and London on even terms, hit home runs in the Abalone league, and wrote 35 verses for "The Abalone Song." Late in 1907, after less than 2 intense years in Carmel, she became convinced that she was terminally ill and moved to italy to die. That didn't come off. She recovered and drifted back to Carmel through England and New York, arriving in 1913, She was always a storm center and departed finally in 1924 to Santa Fe where she ended her days.

# GOVERNOR APPOINTS THREE COASTAL COMMISSIONERS

MORE THAN six months after he took office, Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger made his first appointments to the California Coastal Commission Tuesday, proclaiming that his three commissioners — the first Republicans on the powerful agency in more than five years will "represent the interests of all Californians as we strive to protect and restore our coast for the sake of future generations."

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One of the new commissioners, Margaret Caldwell, has perhaps the most impressive credentials of anybody to serve on the coastal commission. She is a Stanford University Law lecturer and director of the school's Environmental and Natural Resources Law and Policy Program. She was endorsed for the coastal commission seat by the Natural Resources Defense Council and the Sierra Club, according to the San Francisco Chronicle.

Coastal commissioner and Monterey County Supervisor Dave Potter said that Caldwell, even with her impressive legal credentials, will still have a "big learning curve" when she takes her seat on the commission June 9.

"Law and politics are not synonymous," Potter said, "and there's a lot of politics at the coastal commission, unfortunately."

The two other appointees are Steven H. Kram, chief oper-



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ations officer of the William Morris Agency, a major Hollywood talent agency which formerly represented Schwarzenegger, and Bonnie Neely, a Humboldt County supervisor for 16 years who served on the coastal commission in the 1980s.

Kram's background on coastal development issues is unknown and his office referred all calls to the governor's office. But as head of a major Hollywood talent agency, he is likely aware of numerous controversies involving the coastal commission and celebrities who own beachfront property.

One of the biggest moguls in Hollywood, David Geffen, for example, sued the commission for trying to open an access easement to the beach in front of his house in Malibu, claiming the easement should be covered by a 1986 U.S. Supreme Court decision that such easements were an unconstitutional taking of private property. The commission defended the easement, saying it was exempt from the Supreme Court decision because it was dedicated before the court ruled. Geffen lost the case in 2002.

And singer Barbra Streisand sued a conservation group for posting on the Internet aerial photos of her cliff-top mansion just west of Malibu. The photo project has been widely praised at coastal commission meetings for its potential to help the commission monitor shoreline development. Streisand, who claimed the photos invaded her privacy, failed to persuade a judge, who dismissed the suit last year.

Neely, previously appointed to the commission in 1988 by Governor George Deukmejian, was considered a moderate by environmental and property owners' groups.

The new commissioners replace three appointees of former Governor Gray Davis: Cynthia McClain-Hill, who Potter called "one of the brightest legal minds we had," John Wooley and Mary Nichols.

Potter said despite the sharp ideological differences that have sometimes split the commission, "we inevitably become friends" and he'll miss colleagues who are leaving.

A fourth seat to be filled by the governor remains vacant. Eight other coastal commissioners are appointed by the President of the Senate, John Burton, and the Speaker of the Assembly, Fabian Nunez.

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

# THE BEST HOUSE: With a basement

UNLIKE THEIR counterparts back east, most California houses don't have basements. But that's changing, especially in highly scenic areas such as Carmel, Pebble Beach and Big Sur, where height restrictions sometimes force architects, builders and homeowners to put some of their precious buildable square-footage below grade. In these upscale neighborhoods, however, painted cement block, a rickety wooden staircase and a bare bulb hanging from the rafters just won't do.

To see just how beautiful a basement can be, all you have to do is visit a home for sale on Ocean View Avenue on Carmel Point. Designed by John Mandurrago and Claudio Ortiz and built by Frank Bruno (the owner), the Mediterranean-style home has many modern, upscale touches — limestone countertops, Viking range, Carmel stone and redwood exterior, copper gutters and downspouts, security system and satellite dish but also some unique features, especially on the lower level.

"What I think is outstanding about this project is how we intermingled the old with the new," said Bruno, who calls the home "Marebello." One example: The doors leading to the basement media room (which comes complete with a big-screen TV) are antiques from France. The stairway to the lower level is finished with Jerusalem stone from Israel. A wine storage vault stands just outside, along with a powder room and laundry room. And even though the area is below grade, a light well, decorated with a trompe *l'oeil* painting, keeps it from being gloomy.

"I've seen a lot of basements, and this is

the best one I've seen," said Paul Brocchini, who has the listing for Coldwell Banker Del Monte Realty.

Other features in the house, for sale at \$4.895 million, are highly unusual. The floors are pecan that was "hewed and chewed," in Bruno's words, giving them a fascinating texture. The bathroom vanities are antiques, as are the stained glass windows. The handmade arched doors are nearly two inches thick.

Bruno said his favorite projects are rebuilding old Carmel cottages. But the new house on Ocean View Avenue is "without question the best I've done." He thanked his former employer, Don McBride, for teaching him how to build quality homes.

"He taught me, and I've taken it a bit further," Bruno said.

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
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



Supervisors voted 3-2 on Tuesday to look at other ways of coming up with a workable General Plan Update, putting the brakes on its previous schedule of adoption by August.

Some call the supes' vote a waste of \$5 million already spent on the planning process; others call it "cowardice." They've missed the point that it took more guts than any politician has shown in living memory for the supervisors to stop this disaster before we bleed more tax dollars.

Divided among themselves, the supervisors recognized how divisive the draft plan had become and that it would prove to be unworkable in the future. They saw this as not a compromise GPU but rather a GPU that compromised the community.

It's better to show clear leadership and foresight now, rather than wake up and find the county in a permit-process quagmire and without the ability by the county and the cities to create the revenue to provide services for growth that is inevitable no matter what GPU you have.

Special interest groups, including developers and environmentalists, oppose the proposed GPU. You may ask why.

The environmentalists say the plan is not restrictive enough, while their opponents say the plan tramples property rights and shuts the gate on opportunities for residents and their offspring to work here and, perhaps, fulfill the American dream of buying their own homes here.

Groups in the community representing agribusiness, the hospitality industry, labor unions and low-cost housing proponents thanked the supervisors – Edith Johnsen, Fernando Armenta and Butch Lindley – for having the courage to demand a workable planning process. And, the groups have urged supervisors Lou Calcagno and Dave Potter to take another look at the process so that the final product will be one that all of us in the community can embrace.

We pay in loss of services like education, police, fire and healthcare when money is diverted from them to buy and maintain land.

If voters don't have enough money to fund Natividad Medical Center, how can we have enough to fund ongoing acquisition of land?

The district should consider selling some of its unused holdings back into private ownership to recover misspent funds. A good place to start would be the Mill Creek Preserve. Over six-thousand district voters petitioned for a referendum on the corruption-laden acquisition of the preserve, but the district refused to process the petitions or let the people vote on the acquisition.

Which reminds me, who is overseeing this election? Why isn't there a voter pamphlet with arguments for and against the measure, and an objective analysis?
