Chasing bad guys and building a school

■ Carmel employee on patrol in Iraq

NO TWO days are alike for Staff Sgt. John Hanson, a U.S. Army National Guardsman who, instead of fixing plumbing and heating problems at Carmel City Hall, works the night shift in an armored Humvee patrolling southern Iraq.

Stationed at Camp Cedar II, between the Tigris and Euphrates rivers near the prophet Abraham's biblical birthplace of Ur, Hanson called The Pine Cone a few hours before the start of his mid-night shift last Tuesday.

"Just about every night, we get something going on," he said from the brigade operations center, as communications equipment squawked in the background during a mortar attack near one of the compound's guard towers.

Hanson, a longtime Carmel city employee whose National Guard unit was called up last November, helps patrol a roughly 20-square-mile rural area that includes a major highway running to Baghdad and a large fueling station. Mud huts dot a nearby village, and nomadic Bedouins populate the surrounding area. The camp serves as a way station not only for American troops, but also soldiers from Italy, the Netherlands, Japan, England and other allied countries.

"I don't think I've had a 'typical' night since I've been here," Hanson said of the numerous 12-hour shifts he's

Sunset debate may climax June 8

THE NONPROFIT that wants to run Sunset Center would have full control over which groups use it when and how much they pay, according to a draft agreement presented to the city council Tuesday.

The subject of months of negotiation between the city and Sunset Cultural Center, Inc., the agreement would run through June 30, 2007, and is set to be considered for adoption by the council at a special meeting June 8.

Attorney Steve Pearson, hired by the city to help draft the contract, highlighted its major points:

■ All revenues generated at Sunset, including ticket surcharges and theater rental fees, would go to SCC to run the center. According to projections from the nonprofit, revenues would increase from \$377,000 next year to \$708,000 by the end of fiscal year 2006/2007.

■ The city would directly or indirectly pay all costs not covered by revenues. The first payment of \$225,000 in start-up and working capital would be due five days after the contract with SCC is signed. The city would pay unspecified "enabling grants" to bridge the gap between income and operating costs each year, as well as \$50,000 "shortfall grants" if the pre-approved budget is exceeded. The total amount Carmel will fork over next year is projected at \$952,000, \$860,000 the second year and \$805,000 in 2006/2007.

STAFF: RAID RESERVES TO SAVE OUR JOBS

CITY EMPLOYEES painted a picture of a dirty, unkempt town with an overwrought staff as the Carmel City Council considered adopting its 2004/2005 budget late Thursday afternoon.

The \$10,950,340 budget calls for eliminating 19 part-time and five full-time jobs, as well as four vacant positions, in order to avoid raiding the reserves to cover salaries.

Several speakers at the June 3 meeting advised the council to use money from reserves to keep the full-time workers on the payroll.

BASIC GEOGRAPHY DOESN'T DETER CONSPIRACY THEORISTS

■ It's the great circle route, not government mind control

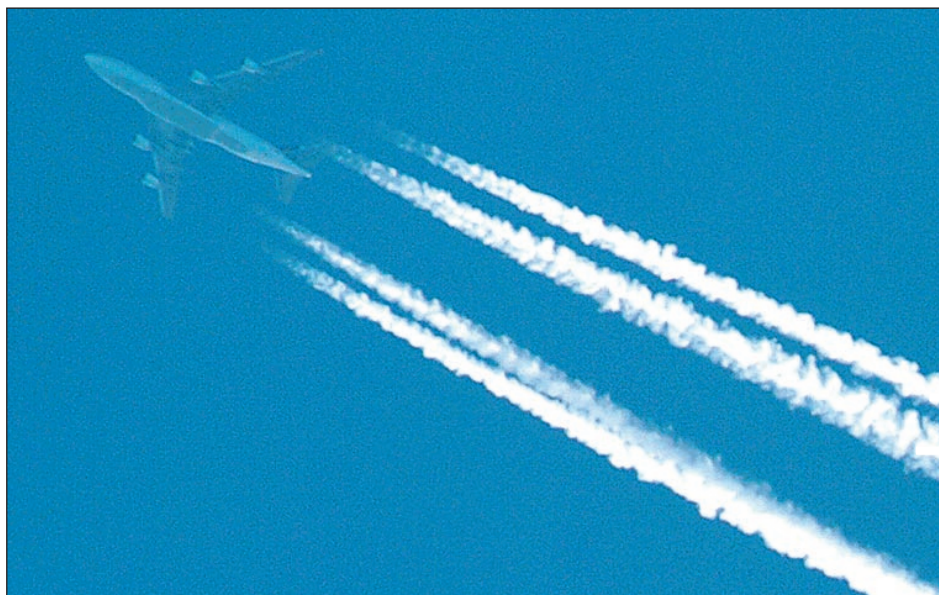
THE WOMAN with the charming southern accent was polite but determined when she called The Pine Cone office.

"Could you give me Doris Day's address?" she asked. "I have something to give her."

Thinking she was just a star-struck fan, we offered the woman a P.O. box number where she could mail something to the former Hollywood star, who lives in Carmel Valley.

"No, it's important I do it in person," she said.

We knew something was amiss when, less than half an hour after this phone conversation ended, the woman showed up at The Pine Cone office. Letting us in on her secret was as important as telling Doris Day, it turned out.

More than six miles above downtown Carmel, a Korean Airlines 747 on its way to LAX left behind four brilliant contrails on a late May afternoon. Should we all be alarmed?

"It's about all the contrails — you have so many of them here," she confided to this reporter. "They're part of a government project to control our minds."

She had a set of photos which she said had been taken in Carmel Valley, showing numerous contrails crossing a brilliant blue sky. "These are actually 'chemtrails,'" she said. A long list of web sites, she offered, expose the evil conspiracy behind the strokes in the sky — sites with titles such as, "The Mind-Altering Abilities of Chemtrails," and "Chemtrails: Culling the Useless Eater Population." One exposed a government patent for a device to generate contrails with various chemicals. Another linked the airborne trails to a host of maladies, including HIV, Gulf War Syndrome, attention deficit disorder and schizophrenia, which have appeared or grown much worse in the jet age.

And the woman believed it all. "You really should do a story about it." So did another

CARMEL P.D. ADDS TO NON-LETHAL ARSENAL

IT FEELS like being hit repeatedly with a metal pipe while totally paralyzed. But as soon as the Taser's 50,000 volts stop coursing through the body five seconds later, no pain remains.

That's how several Carmel Police officers described the sensation of being tased. They volunteered to be shot in the back during

training with the department's four new Tasers May 23. On-duty officers now carry the yellow-handled weapons on the opposite hip from their firearm.

"When that first hit me, all I could think of was, 'Stop! Get this to stop!' There was no resisting or reaching or anything," recalled Sgt. Mike Calhoun, who was in charge of acquiring the new weapons and arranging the training by Monterey County

Even tough guys with high pain thresholds like Carmel Police Sgt. John Nyunt (being shot, center right) can't overcome the agony and paralysis inflicted by a Taser, but as soon as the voltage stops, the pain ends, making the weapons ideal for subduing aggressive suspects without injury.

"Most agencies have gone to using Tasers because it is an option for us to use minimal force without injuring somebody to effect arrest," said Calhoun. "And they're very effective."

First developed in the late 1960s by NASA chief scientist Jack Cover, the Taser has advanced significantly over the years, becoming smaller, lighter, safer and more effective.

CPD's Advanced Taser M26 EMDs shoot barbed darts that embed in muscle and deliver 50,000 volts for five seconds. They employ 26-watt electro-muscular disruption technology to stop even the most focused aggressors — such as those on drugs who might remain undeterred by pain — by overriding the central nervous system.

"The feeling of pain is very, very strong and intense, and as long as the probes are connected and the Taser is being fired, that does not go away," Calhoun said. "The second part is your motor control system. You become stiff as a board and just fall."

"When it's released, you're back to normal," he said, so suspects must be subdued

while they are being tased.

Although the weapon's voltage is high, its low amperage is safe, according to Calhoun. Tasers do not damage nerve tissue, cause burns or carry the risk of electrocution in a wet environment, according to literature supplied by Irons. No one has died from being hit with a Taser.

"There are no recorded injuries in use of Tasers except for secondary injuries from falling," Calhoun said. Since the subject is paralyzed, he can't break his fall.

Tasers can also be used to subdue aggressive or attacking animals without injuring them.

Stopped suicide by cop

The training included CPD officers and sheriff's deputies, as well as Carmel firefighters who learned how to remove the barbed darts. Irons ensured the five Carmel cops who chose to be shot by the Taser were supported by a man on each side who slowly lowered the stiff and paralyzed officer to a mat on the ground.

In addition to fully comprehending the force they wield, police officers could use their training if called into court.

"If someone tried to take our Taser, would we be justified in using lethal force?" Calhoun asked. "I could testify that I've been tased and verify I was incapacitated."

Although they've just begun carrying the weapons, Calhoun said their usefulness has already been demonstrated in town.

In late February, a 72-year-old San Antonio Avenue man brandished a handgun in an apparent effort to draw fatal fire from police. Irons fired his Taser at the man and officers safely subdued him.

"We usually meet force with force, because if we shoot him with a Taser, that jolt could cause him to pull the trigger," Calhoun said. "But Brian saw an opportunity where the gun was pointed down. His concern was that [the suspect] might shoot himself in the foot, but he took the opportunity, and it was very effective."

The man suffered only lacerations from the darts and abrasions from falling.

One Taser was donated by a retired police officer and CPD used money targeted for safety to purchase the remaining three, which cost about \$700 apiece, including holsters.

"That's all we could afford right now," he said. "Eventually, we will get everyone their own."

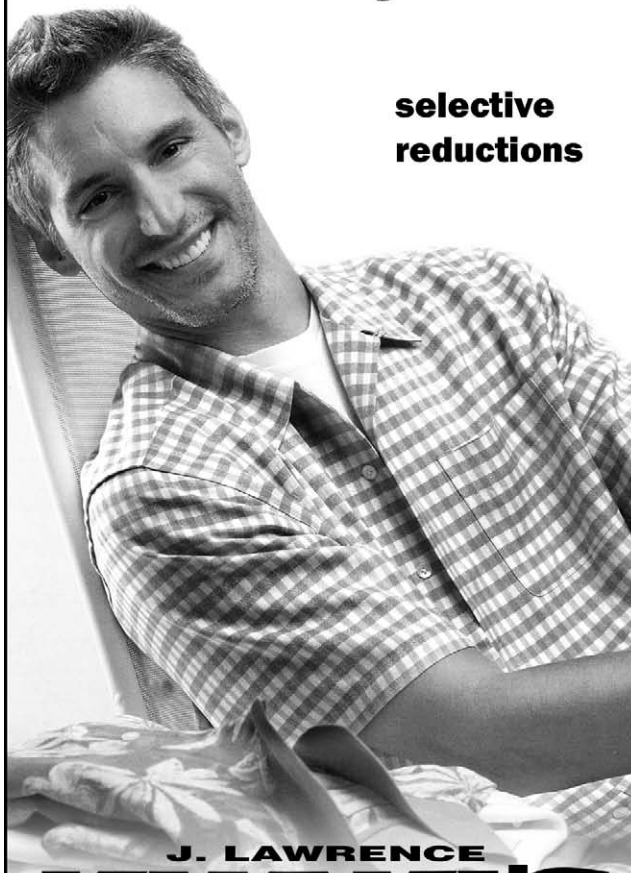

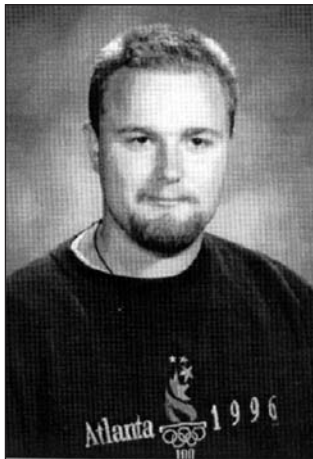

Governor offers reward in unsolved P.G. murder

GOVERNOR ARNOLD Schwarzenegger has posted a \$50,000 reward to help solve the 1997 murder of Kris Olinger, who was stabbed to death at a beach near Pt. Pinos in Pacific Grove.

"Norteño gang members from the Vario Horseshoe neighborhood in San Jose are suspected by law enforcement to be involved in this crime," Schwarzenegger said in announcing the reward, which he hopes will be enough to encourage someone to step forward with information about the killer or killers.

Olinger, a 17-year-old Monterey High student who

was taking moonlight photos the night he was killed, was found stabbed more than 30 times on Sept. 19, 1997. His camera, wallet, jewelry and his parents' 1986 silver Honda Accord were all missing. The car was later found abandoned in a gang neighborhood in San Jose, according to Lt. Tom Uretsky of the Pacific Grove Police Department, who is leading the investigation.

"There are not a lot of new leads, but my detectives are still working on the case quasi full time and they're being very diligent," Uretsky said. The reward was instigated by Olinger's father, Loren Phillips, a real estate broker associated with The Legacy Real Estate Group in downtown Carmel.

"I noticed in the newspaper that the governor offered rewards in six other cold cases, and I brought this to the attention of the P.G. Police Department along with some contact information for the governor's office, and they followed up on it very promptly," Phillips said. "Senator Bruce McPherson was also instrumental in lobbying the governor

to approve the reward in my son's case."

In 1998, Olinger's mother, Shell Phillips, raised \$13,000 in pledges for a reward to help find Olinger's murderers. She died last year of cancer, and had a "broken heart because she died before she could find out who savagely killed her son," Loren Phillips said.

Some of the people who made pledges for that reward have probably moved away by now, "but now there's \$50,000 waiting for someone who has the information we're looking for," Uretsky said.

"We have unfinished business, and it's the battle of my life," Phillips added, his voice cracking with emotion. "This reward is a milestone that may help break the case."

According to the Schwarzenegger's office, 158 rewards have been offered by California governors since they were first authorized by statute in 1965, and 18 have been paid.

CFD: Prune for your life!

DRIED-OUT, DAMAGED or dead trees are creating a fuel-heavy environment alarmingly similar to that which fed the Oakland Hills fire more than a decade ago, according to Carmel Fire Shift Commander Mitch Kastros. This week he asked residents to remove dead plants, trees, grass and debris from their homes.

"Our big concern here is with the topography of the land; if a fire were to get going, it would be devastating," he said.

Kastros advised residents to survey the vegetation in and around their yards, cut back any dead bushes and dried grass and remove debris from roofs and gutters. Residents must get permission from the city forester to remove dead trees, but there is no fee for the permit.

Firefighters who battled the raging Southern California wildfires last fall recalled trees killed by disease and infested by bark beetles exploding as they burned.

According to Margi Perotti at the department of forest, parks and beach, no permit is required to remove branches of any size as long as they are undeniably dead, showing absolutely no signs of greenery.

"This is the time of year when we all need to have our fire eyes on," Kastros said, adding that the city should do the same for its properties.

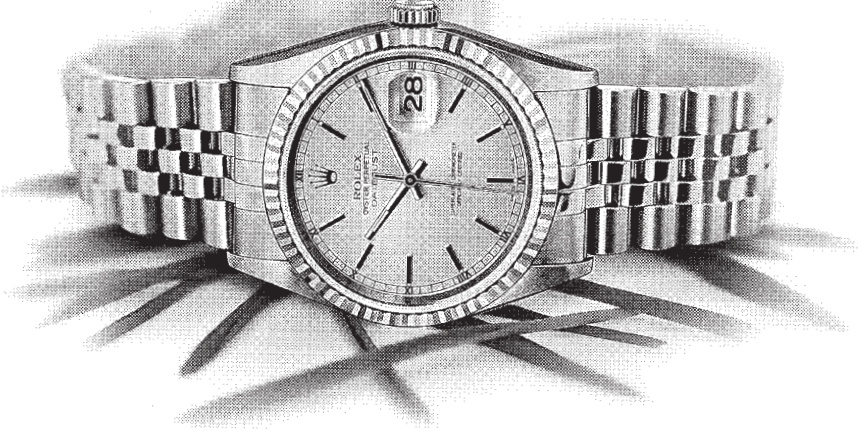

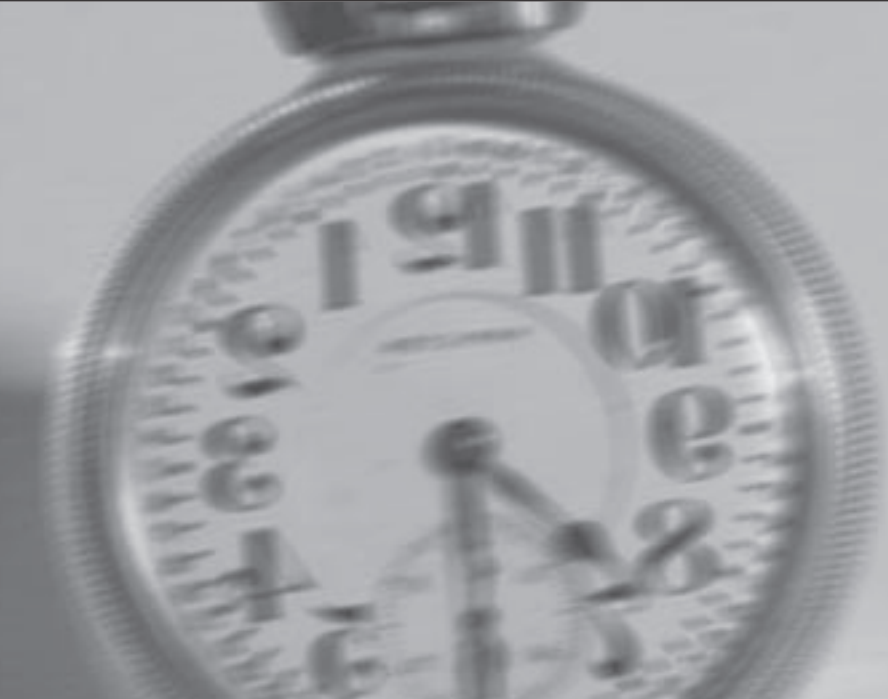

Broom blamed in Doud Arcade fire



CARMEL BATTALION Chief John Trenner inspected the ground floor of the Doud Arcade Wednesday after a fire sprinkler and hose were used to douse an electrical fire that filled the second floor with smoke.

According to Carmel Valley Fire Division Chief Ron Lemos, a broom left too close to the hot water heater, which was also missing the cover for its pilot light, caught fire inside the upstairs utility closet around noon.

He estimated damage at \$1,000 but said it could be more depending on damage to the wiring of an adjacent telephone system. Two Carmel Fire engines and a rescue rig, as well as one Cypress Fire engine and the Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance, responded to the scene while police blocked the eastbound lanes of Ocean Avenue and evacuated the building. No one was injured.

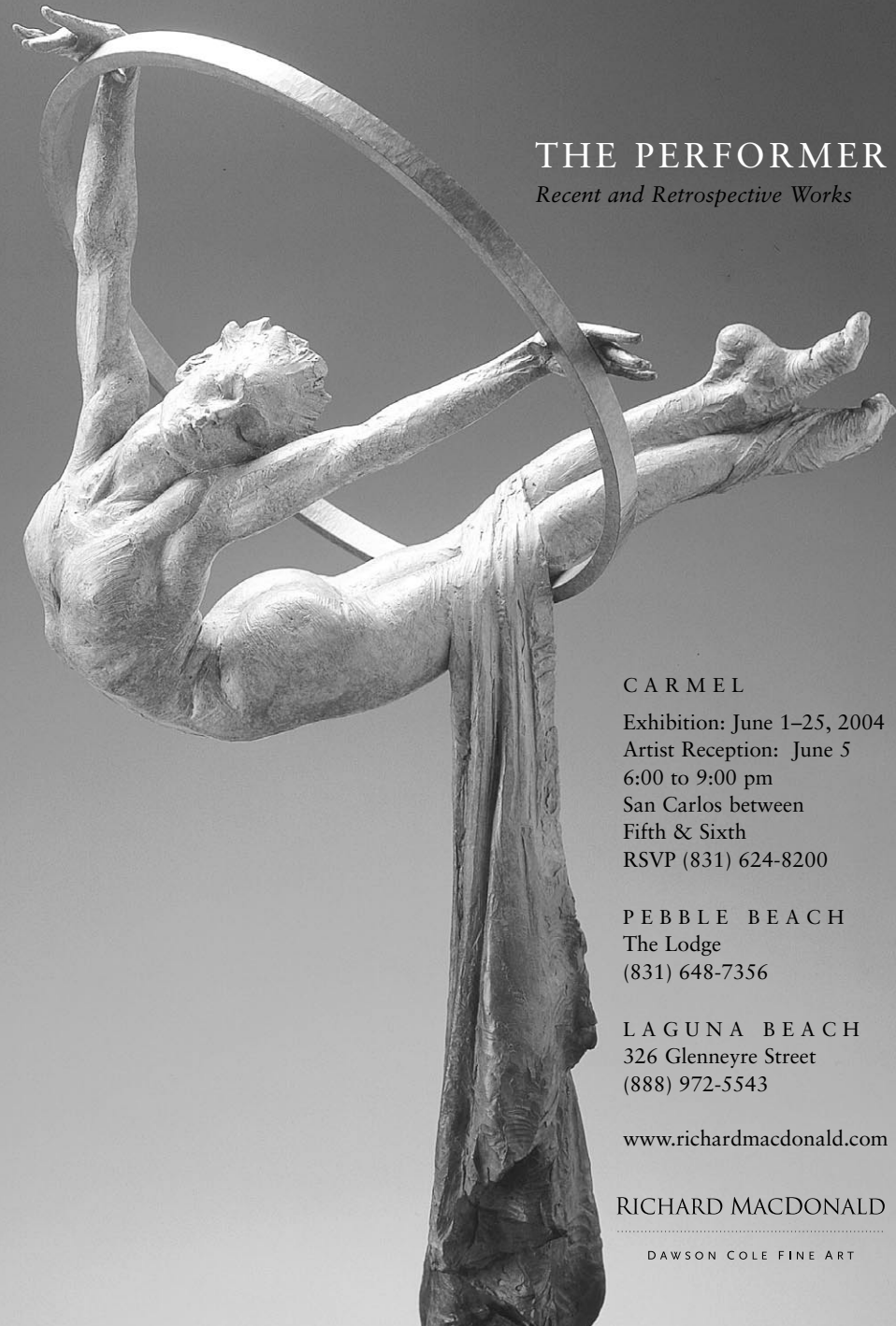

First Tee Open attracts top pros

NBC will televise inaugural

TICKETS FOR the inaugural golf tournament to benefit The First Tee — a program to teach children life skills through the game of golf — are now on sale online, according to organizers of The First Tee Open. Set for Aug. 31 to Sept. 5, the tournament will feature top pros, juniors and amateurs at Bayonet Golf Course and the Pebble Beach Golf Links.

Champions Tour players Lee Trevino and Craig Stadler, as well as former AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am champions Tom Watson, Ben Crenshaw, Fuzzy Zoeller, Hale Irwin, Tom Kite and Peter Jacobson, have already committed to playing, according to Monterey Peninsula Foundation Executive Vice President Ollie Nutt. MPF, which organizes the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am each winter, is also behind The First Tee Open.

"They're all looking forward to it," Nutt said, adding that he contacted some in person during a recent Champions Tour event in Austin, Texas. "They're all committing. We're going to have a terrific field."

Paired with the 78 pros will be 78 junior players ages 13-18 (but not in college) from around the country. Qualifying tournaments in five cities this summer determine 50 spots, with another 20 coming from qualifiers at The First Tee chapters across the nation. The foundation has eight junior spots to fill and is lining up amateur players by invitation.

Clint Eastwood will serve as event chairman, with fellow Pebble Beach Company co-owner Arnold Palmer and former President George Bush serving as honorary co-chairs.

"We're putting on a national championship for The First Tee chapters, and we don't even have a facility, yet," chuckled Nutt. But plans are moving on multiple fronts for the local chapter, with Seaside City Council approval and land acquisition under way on the former Fort Ord, and ongoing talks with the City of Salinas, where The First Tee hopes to run the city's nine-hole Twin Creeks golf course.

"Our charter with the national organization is for The First Tee of Monterey County, and we've always felt we needed a facility in Salinas and eventually in South County," Nutt said.

Tickets for the open went on sale in May. Daily tickets for tournament rounds Friday through Sunday are \$25 in advance and \$30 at the gate. A ticket to view all practice rounds is \$25 in advance and \$30 at the gate. Season badges, which include access to the grounds and grandstands all week, are \$65 in advance and \$75 at the gate. Books of 10 any-day tickets run \$225 and must be purchased in advance, and a package of four season badges and four ticket books sells for \$900. A \$150 Charity Patron badge will provide admission to The First Tee Open and next year's AT&T Pro-Am. Admission for spectators 18 and under is free with a paying adult.

The Golf Channel will cover play Friday and Saturday at Bayonet Golf Course in Seaside. NBC will pick up the coverage after the cut on Sunday, when the 10 leading amateur teams and 22 junior players will join all 78 pros for the final round on the Pebble Beach Golf Links.

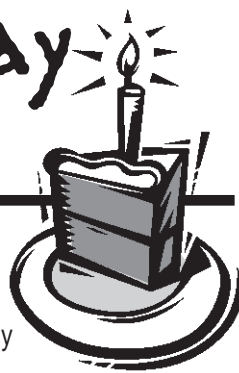

caller several months before — a man from Carmel Valley who said the contrail problem was worse there than anyplace else in the country. He urged this newspaper to tackle such an important, but obviously dangerous, exposé.

“I knew you’d be too chicken,” he said, when told we weren’t interested in the contrail conspiracy.

Who you calling chicken?

“I get these calls all the time,” said Paul Turk, a spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration in Los Angeles. “Some people just don’t want to believe basic scientific information.”

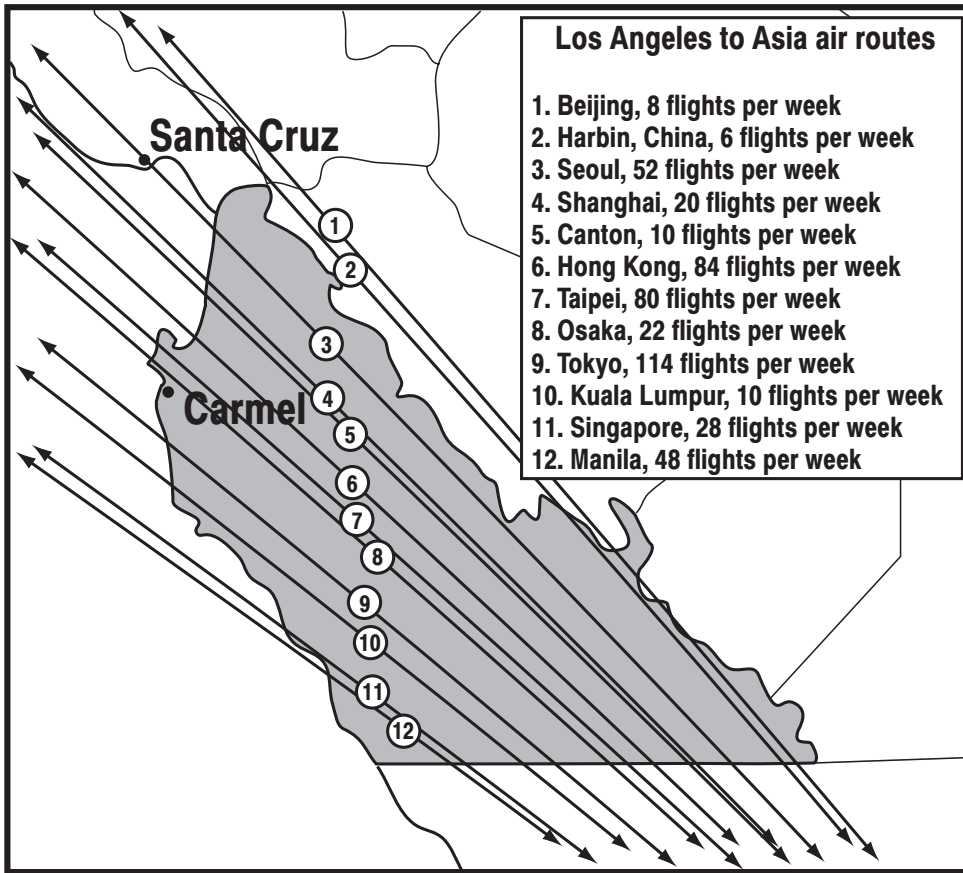
According to the Environmental Protection Agency, contrails form around the water vapor which is a normal byproduct of a jet engine in flight. “Depending on the temperature and the amount of water in the air at the aircraft altitude, contrails evaporate quickly (if the humidity is low) or persist and grow (if the humidity is high),” the EPA says.

But why do we have so many over the Monterey Peninsula?

“That’s because you’re right on the great circle route between Los Angeles and Asia,” said Captain J. Linde of Singapore Airlines after a recent flight across the Pacific. “If you don’t like it, you’ll have to move.”

Aircraft heading to China, Japan, the Philippines, Malaysia and Singapore from LAX, he explained, don’t fly west, the way you might expect from looking at a standard map of the world. The shortest route takes them to the northwest, over Monterey or San Francisco.

“Landfall in the United States for all those routes is over Central California,” Turk confirmed. “Then they head down

the Central Valley to Los Angeles.”

There are more than 400 nonstop flights between Los Angeles and Asia a week, according to Thomas Winfrey, a spokesman for Los Angeles International Airport. Most of the flights use the Boeing 747, which eliminated the need to stop in Alaska or Hawaii when its ultra-long-range version was introduced in the 1980s.

that kind of traffic you need an aircraft that can handle it,” said Zubin Daruwala, an official with Boeing’s 747 marketing group. More than 1,000 of the jumbo jets are in use around the world, Daruwala said, and the routes between Asia and the U.S. are “absolutely the principal market for them. A lot of airlines use the 747 as their flagship.”

A few of the airplanes flying the Pacific are twin-engine Boeing 777s. But the vast majority are 747s or Airbus 340s, which have four engines and produce distinctive quadruple contrails.

Routes can vary

Modern aircraft, equipped with satellite navigation equipment that allows them to pinpoint their position even when they are thousands of miles from land, don’t always follow great circle routes. Depending on the winds aloft, they may choose a longer track that will actually mean fewer hours in the air on a given day.

Also, while they are over land — and sometimes even when they are within a few hundred miles of the California coast — air traffic controllers at an FAA facility in Fremont require commercial flights to follow specific air pathways, Turk said, which deviate somewhat from true great-circle routes.

Nevertheless, when the winds are normal, planes packed with up to 400 passengers routinely fly over Monterey County between Los Angeles and 12 major cities in Asia.

When the circumstances are right, they can leave behind dozens of brilliant, but harmless, streaks in the sky on a single day.

Not surprisingly, the contrail conspiracy theorists weren’t mollified by information offered by officials with the government and the airlines.

“How naïve can you get?” asked a man from one of the websites. He declined to give his real name. “We’ve heard all their lies over and over again. Fortunately, a few of us haven’t been duped.”

“There’s a lot of passenger travel between Asia and the West Coast of the United States, and when you have

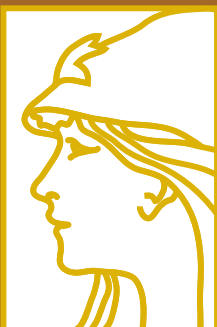

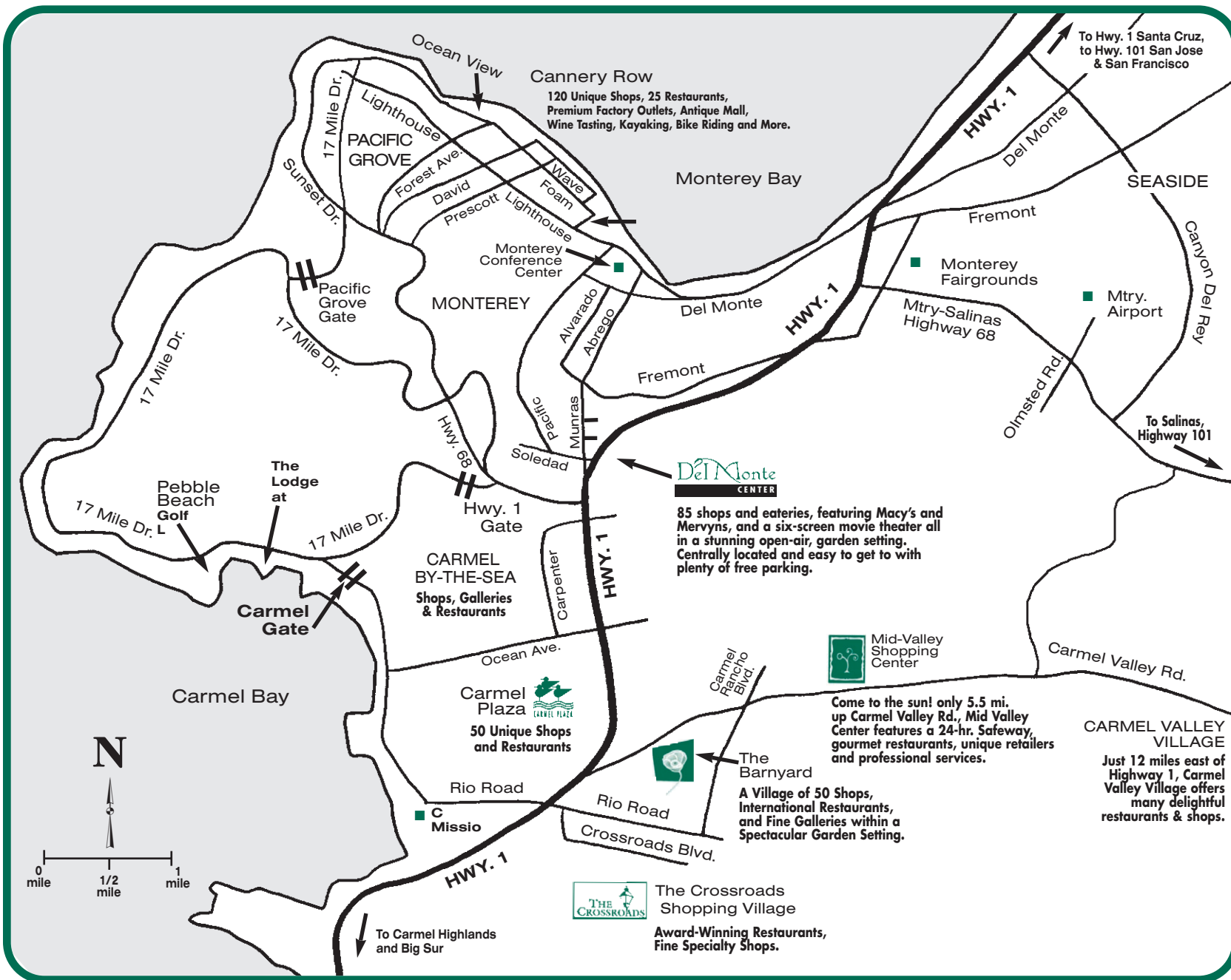

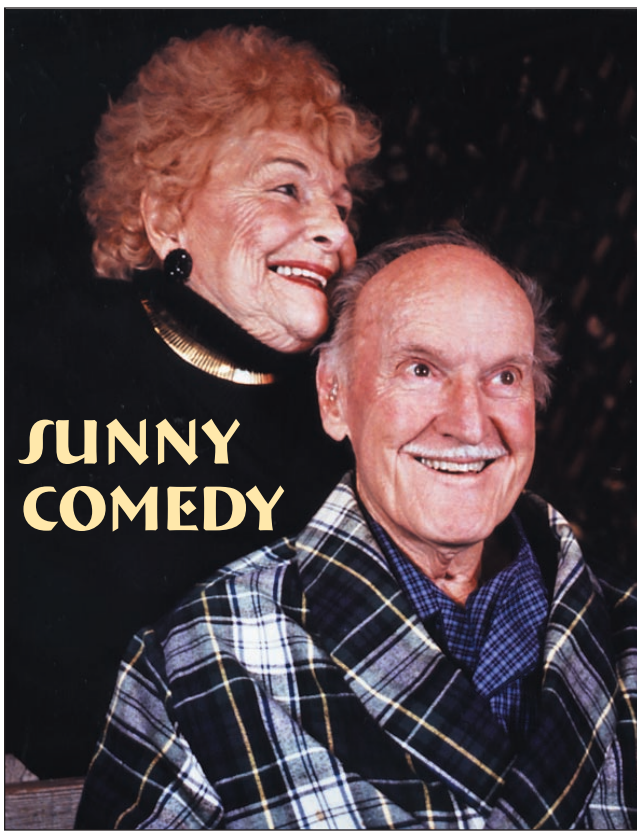

PICTORIAL BOOK SUMMONS MEMORIES OF FORT ORD

FORT ORD holds never-to-be-forgotten memories for many men and women who passed through its gates during World War II: The men speak of it to this day as their first

leap into manhood, perhaps their first time away from home. Then they went to war.

Harold E. Raugh Jr., Ph.D., author of "Images of America — Fort Ord," is command historian of the Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center and Presidio of Monterey. He retired from the U.S. Army in 1998 as a Lieutenant Colonel after 20 years service as an Infantry officer.

Dr. Raugh served twice at Fort Ord while on active duty, and is on the board of advisors for the Fort Ord Alumni Association. As such he has an abiding interest in helping preserve the military heritage and history of the fort, and has gone a long way in this direction in putting together this 127-page book published by Arcadia Publishing, an imprint of Tempus Publishing, Inc., San Francisco. It retails for \$19.99.

This is primarily a pictorial book with captions that tell the story of the training grounds for the 1917 military posted at The Presidio of Monterey's Gigling Reservation, a 15,690.5-acre area. Many thousands of acres were added to the vast expanse of housing and training areas, which became known as Fort Ord in 1940.

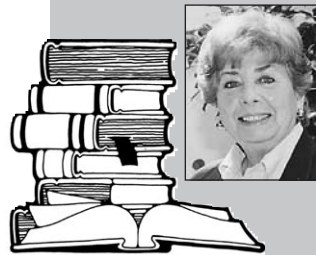
The black and white vintage photographs record soldiers being prepared for battle from 1940. Every phase of the fort is shown, from bivouacs to barracks, chapels to the USO and

soldiers' clubs. Rigorous military training is depicted in many photo, as well as visits from movie stars, radio personalities, and well known personages such as General of the Army Omar N. Bradley and Vice President Dan Quayle.

Some former barracks have been modernized and are currently used by CSUMB for classrooms and administrative offices, while other barracks have been boarded up since 1993 because they contain lead paint and pipes and asbestos insulation. Raugh says it would be too costly to renovate them now, and they will eventually be razed. Yet plans exist for the development of 1,400 homes with a major arts district in the East Garrison area, as well as a retirement community.

Ensemble energy shines in Forest Theater 'Evita'

HAMISH TYLER of the Forest Theater Guild provides an invaluable opportunity to Central Coast students: the chance to participate in professional theater. And if their natural talent isn't always completely up to the challenge, there's no doubt their willingness, commitment and hard work are. This year's cast of Andrew Lloyd Webber's musical, "Evita," at the Outdoor Forest Theater has clearly risen to the challenge of director and choreographer Laura Akard. They have come together as a polished ensemble of singers and dancers that doesn't miss a beat.

"Evita," the story of Eva Peron's rise to power, uses Che, a character modeled on Argentine revolutionary Che Guevara, as a counterweight to the soaring career of Eva. Che, played by Gabe de la Vega Tovar, appears in nearly every scene as a thorn in Eva's side, relentlessly taunting and reminding her of reality and her own frailties and mortality. Tovar has the sardonic personality of Che down pat. The only thing lacking is the kind of on-the-edge energy the character needs to match Eva.

Heather Smist provides that power in her astonishingly mature portrayal of Evita. Watching the young actress, it is sometimes hard to believe she is still a high school student. She has energy and stage presence to spare, and her voice, although sometimes forced, has impressive range. She commands the stage from the moment she appears as a star-struck 15-year-old following her first stepping-stone, the singer Migaldi, to Buenos Aires until the moment she dies at

33. Perhaps the most impressive thing about Smist's performance is the way she is able to portray the desperate fight of the super woman. The optimistic bravado of the adolescent becomes the steely determination of the 33-year-old First Lady who refuses to allow the frailty of her body to compromise her indefatigable spirit. It is a remarkable performance.

Equally remarkable is the precision and energy of the entire ensemble. Although their words were occasionally lost (partly the fault of a flawed sound system that repeated-

ly cut out during the first act of this performance), their dance steps and emotive power were not. They remained a constant, unified force throughout the production, reminding the audience of the power of any determined people, whether the Argentine aristocracy, the military junta, or Eva's devoted *descamisados*.

The other male leads, Colby Katz-Lapides as Peron and Josh Little as Migaldi, do well, but lack drive. In the case of Katz-Lapides, this is perhaps appropriate. Eva was clearly the power behind the dictator.

Two star members of the ensemble are Sam Givens and Katelyn Myer as Mario and Margarita, the tango dancers. Their two tan-

gos were as smooth and dramatic as one could wish. Rachel Williams also gives a strong solo as the mistress Eva boots out of Peron's bed. Her sweet voice captures the poignant moment well.

Adrianna Wellich worked her costume magic once again, and Carey Crockett's set design is an imaginative collection of movable structures the cast can manipulate. The story-high platform in the center of the action is especially effective for conveying the heights to which Eva and Peron were elevated.

The production, which plays Thursdays through Sundays at 7:30 p.m. until June 13, is a testament to the hard work of dedicated students of theater. It is well worth seeing.

PacRep's 'Meshuggah-Nuns!' over-the-top zany

IN DAN Goggin's latest nonsensical extravaganza "Meshuggah-Nuns!," the Order of the Little Sisters of Hoboken are at it again. This time they set sail on a "Faith of All Nations" cruise from the Pacific Repertory Theatre stage with frequently side-splitting and completely professional results.

The story excuse is the week-long storm which has decimated the cast of the scheduled shipboard entertainment, "Fiddler on the Roof."

The captain, knowing of the nuns' show business abilities, asks them to put on a revue with the only member of the Fiddler cast still left standing, and they agree. Eventually, it turns out, there is little recognizable left of that show except Tevye's milk cans, his cart and the actor playing Tevye.

"Meshuggah-Nuns" is pure entertainment ranging from ridiculous one-liners to delightful musical numbers which give cast members a chance to offer their best in solos, duets, trios and full company numbers. You simply can't take it seriously.

The audience is treated to a remarkable variety show which opens with their participation in a zany bingo game and continues in a manner to justify the word meshuggah (crazy) of the title.

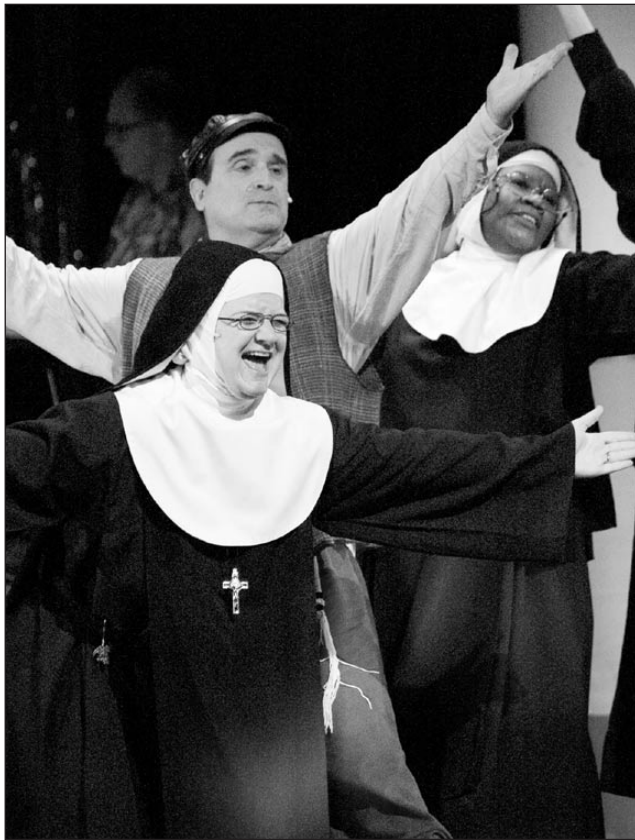
Except for a few well placed reflective and gentle songs, the show is over-the-top high energy and electricity, with the five thoroughly practiced and skillful actors proceeding at an almost breathless and hilariously funny pace.

Gary Bolen, the Tevye player from the original show, sings, dances, tells funny stories and interacts with different nuns in a variety of situations.

He does it all so deftly that his characterization comes over as sincere and very human. His song "If I were a Catholic" had warmth and charm.

Lindsay Faye as Sister Amnesia was riotously funny and audience captivating. She is hilariously comic in her attempt to put on a magic show. She is a great Country and Western singer and her Mae West puppet act was almost scandalous.

Maryann Schaupp-Rousseau is a fireball of a performer. She positively shoots off sparks as Sister Robert Anne, who

is a truly frustrated entertainer. She is the ultimate cheerleader and besides fine singing and graceful dancing, she never lets down on her involvement in the action.

Shirley Smallwood as Sister Hubert is also fighting frustration as second in command of the order, but she soldiers on, participating in various group numbers like the "Potchky Polka" and "Three Shayna Maidels," but her "Rock the Boat" is a rousing gospel number and she leads it very strongly.

As the overseer of all this madness, Amy Washburn is the Reverend Mother. She does an expert, flavorful Sophie Tucker imitation (each Nonsense show includes this star turn). She has some of the funniest one-liners in the show

and her "Say It in Yiddish" is another comic accomplishment.

Director Jack Stauffer used his excellent professional cast to their best advantage by giving them every opportunity to project their skills. The staging was fairly simple, but it made for smoothness and continuity.

Steve Tosh's stage band were great support in a wide range of musical styles.

This show was FUN.

Avoid Being Phished

Along with all the wonderful things brought to us by the Internet, a few terrible things have developed as well. Think: spam and scams.

Crooks, some of them very sophisticated, have developed ways of relieving us of our money and, worse, our financial identities through Internet trickery. One racket has come to be called "phishing." A message is designed that looks like it came from a large company—perhaps a bank, perhaps a stock brokerage, perhaps a dot-com firm like eBay. In rather urgent terms, the message asks us to help the company check and update its records. Please, the message says, fill in the following.

And included in "the following" are such items as social security number, PINs, and other very private and important personal financial codes. If you provide these numbers, you are likely to lose a great deal of money and, very possibly, your creditworthiness, not to mention a lot of sleep.

When should you send such figures through the mail? Almost never. Be completely certain you have checked out the company involved. Call the bank or stock brokerage or whatever. See if the request is legitimate. (If it asks for PINs and social security numbers, you can rest assured that it isn't.) And reported suspected phishermen to www.ftc.gov. Building official Tim Meroney warned the cuts to materials, services and staff would deprive those left of their ability to serve the public.

“What about the promises we made to provide the best service possible to the residents and the visitors?” he asked. “What are we going to tell them when we have failed miserably?”

With cuts to every department, Meroney said, “We have all given what we can, and now it’s time for you to dip into those reserves and keep those five positions.”

Forest, parks and beach administrative coordinator Margi Perotti, president of the employees association, listed potential impacts, from having no one at the front counter to answer questions, to trash-strewn streets, uneven sidewalks, fallen tree limbs and overgrown medians.

“There will not be enough employees to get the job done,”

she said. “It will reduce the quality and thoroughness of the work performed. It will simply burn us out.”

She implored the council not to “balance the budget on our backs. We have taken pride in our jobs and have done them well, but now morale is at an all-time low.”

Resident Monte Miller criticized the council for failing to enact new revenue sources over the last four years and also suggested using reserves to cover the \$275,000 cost of the full-time jobs.

“This is your fault,” he said. “It’s not the employees’ fault.”

Carmel Residents Association President Sherry Shollenbarger reiterated ways to take advantage of the city’s tourist revenue, such as increasing transient occupancy tax and imposing an epicurean tax, although they would not be enacted in time to shore up the fiscal year budget that begins July 1. She suggested holding a town hall meeting on paid parking now that residents are more aware of the dire financial picture.

“I would also encourage use of reserves at this time,” she said. “And I would hope assets are sold as a last resort.” The city council has directed staff to proceed with selling Flanders Mansion and the Scout House.

Developed over the last six months with input from the city treasurer, financial services coordinator, city manager and the heads of each city department, the proposed budget features the bare minimum of expenses for materials and services, according to city administrator Rich Guillen. Only after each department identified the least with which it could survive in terms of materials and services did the managers consider cutting jobs, Guillen reminded the council. The first round focused on part-timers but didn’t provide enough dollars, so the next time around, full-time jobs were targeted.

During the last budget meeting May 25, newly elected council members Erik Bethel and Mike Cunningham asked Guillen and the other department managers to find additional non-salary expenses they could cut.

Later that week, they submitted their own suggestions for possible cuts, such as eliminating the \$588,000 to be taken from capital reserves for repairs and new equipment, refinancing debt, cutting telephone and utility bills, reducing membership dues and training expenses, and cutting contractual costs.

Guillen received the suggestions and then met with department managers again June 2, but he opted not to make any adjustments to the proposed budget.

“If we could have reduced costs further, we would have,” Guillen told the council. “I’m standing behind the city managers and recommending this budget as is today.”

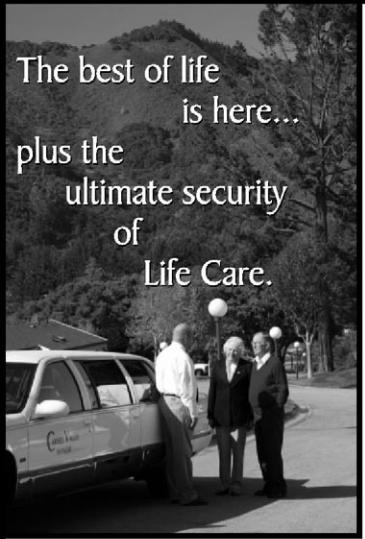

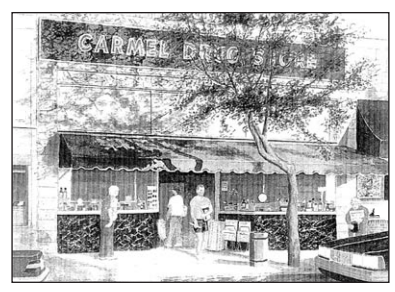

worked since arriving in Iraq. "We try to keep everybody away from the compound. Sometimes it will be going out and talking to local shepherds and telling them to move back. "Last night, we had a rocket attack. People shot at us."

Luckily the enemy are often poor shots. They hide in the darkness, fire their weapons into the compound and then run away.

"We pride ourselves on being better shots," Hanson said.

Another rocket attack that occurred at about 3 a.m. four days earlier had Hanson "wandering around the desert looking for bad guys with my night vision goggles and thermals," he said, referring to high-tech equipment that amplifies available light or creates an image by detecting body heat. The subjects weren't found.

"Things are starting to heat up in the south. They [pro-Saddam loyalists] have been run out of Fallujah, so they've started looking for easier targets," he said. "They blend in with the Bedouins."

Maintaining safety while respecting the

rights of the country's residents means striking a fine balance, he added.

"We're working hand-in-hand with the local Iraqi police. But they are really underfunded — they have very few bulletproof vests," he said.

Some of the Iraqi police officers, fearing reprisals, have defected from the force since "everyone knows they're working with us," Hanson said, but many have remained. "These guys are pretty brave."

He recalled a recent round of arrests that exemplified the finders-keepers-losers-weepers mentality that seems to pervade the countryside.

"There are convoys running all the time delivering fuel from Kuwait to Iraq, and if the truck breaks down, they send the Army to get it," he began. But a disabled truck is easy pickings before troops arrive.

"We were hiding off to the side of a road when we saw a fuel truck — a big semi — being towed by a little Datsun pickup," with five more cars surrounding it, he said. "I said it looked like they were stealing it."

Hanson and his men sprang from their

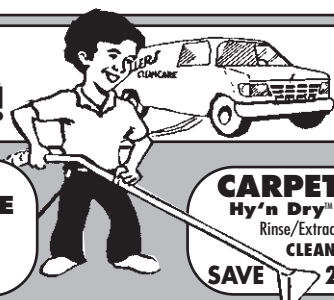

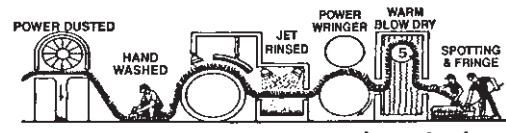

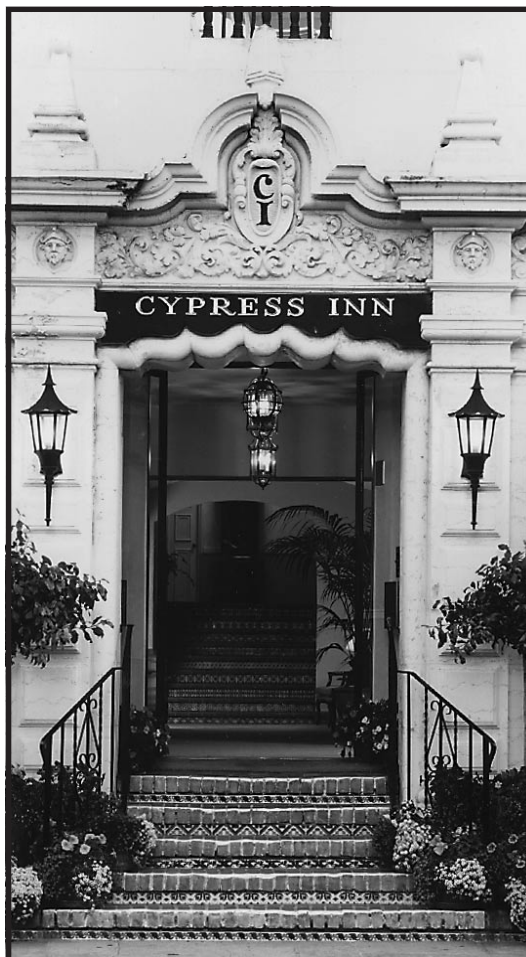

Most preposterous story of the week

AN ENVIRONMENTAL group out of Santa Monica released a report last week that rated California beaches for cleanliness — a report that was dutifully covered by the news media with the usual obsequiousness they reserve for such documents.

But had the reporters been familiar with their subject matter, they would have realized the report didn't pass the smell test when they saw Pebble Beach's Stillwater Cove listed as the sixth dirtiest beach out of 450 rated in the whole



state. This pristine spot, renowned by locals as one of the most beautiful on the Monterey Peninsula, sits at the north end of Carmel Bay. Except for a little-used boat dock and an upscale beach club, its natural beauty is undiminished by development. There are no power plants or industrial

facilities anywhere near the place, no oil tankers have crashed on its rocks and, according to officials with the Pebble Beach Community Services District, no sewage spills have occurred there. Nearby residents are mostly dedicated nature lovers and careful stewards of the environment — so much so that hardly any trash can be found washed up on the beach at Stillwater Cove. Truly, it is an idyllic spot where nature shows its unmitigated wonders.

Nevertheless, the web site where the report card was posted designates Stillwater Cove with a graphic image showing oil globs and a skeletal fish. But in the fine print, the site acknowledges that the alleged pollution at the cove is all natural: "As its name implies, Stillwater Cove has poor circulation and little tidal flushing. In addition, this location tends to be a favorite of marine mammals and birds."

In other words, because Stillwater Cove is so *unpolluted*, seals, pelicans, otters, cormorants and numerous other creatures love to call it home. These animals have digestive systems containing bacteria, which make their way into the sea, where well-meaning water quality officials can count them and write them up in reports, which then can be misrepresented by big city activists for the purpose of duping reporters and the public into thinking the environment is in much worse shape than it actually is.

The San Francisco Chronicle said summer vacationers "might want to avoid" Stillwater Cove this summer.

What a shame.

'They make this place work'

Dear Editor,

As is the case with towns across the country, hard times have descended on Carmel. The combination of a flagging economy, post-9/11 jitters, and inept state and federal fiscal policies has left the Carmel City Council with a budget that is like a three-person-wide blanket stretching to cover four bedmates: However much tossing and turning, someone's going to be out in the cold.

In the ensuing contention over remedies, everyone can agree that public safety — fire and police protection — must hold first place. Ah, but then . . . Do we cut back on

library service? Eliminate recreation opportunities? Forego necessary infrastructure maintenance? Run the city administration without skilled department managers? Sell off Flanders Mansion or the Scout House? Put up parking meters? Increase the transient occupancy tax? In sum, what are our alternatives? What are our priorities?

We love our trees and our beach and our parklands, revere our tradition of arts and letters and benign bohemianism, feel pride in our new, world-class concert hall, treasure the visitors who pay so many of our bills, but in doing so we must not neglect one great class of amenities — our city staff. From part-time librarians to foresters, from street pavers to fire engineers, from planners to clerical staff, they make this place work.

They should have top priority in any budget debate. The splendid ones we have would be very hard to replace.

hiding spot and chased after the thieves. They caught seven out of the 20 men who ran in all directions.

"They weren't really hardcore criminals and were mostly shepherders, but they saw an opportunity and they took it," he said. "If you leave anything unattended for more than 30 seconds, someone's going to take off with it."

When not out patrolling, Hanson maintains the weapons and works on the camp's short supply of Humvees, which are beat up by the pervasive dust and tough terrain.

"Truly, I'd like to have my tank back," admitted Hanson, who, when at home with his local guard unit, the 149th, usually commands a 70-ton, 120 mm-caliber M1, which has a top speed of 50 mph and hits targets three miles away. "In my heart, I'm still a tanker."

But the war in Iraq has long since moved from the heavy artillery phase to anti-insurgency.

Schoolhouse planned

Hanson remains undaunted by the treeless, scorching, inhospitable surroundings — where the bugs are big and the dust storms last for days — but he can't help comparing them to idyllic, verdant Carmel-by-the-Sea and missing his walks down Ocean Avenue.

"It's a very hard life, and I'm impressed with what the Iraqi people can do out here. I think about my 13-year-old son and his life in America, and I see boys here herding sheep when it's 120 degrees in the sun," he said.

Despite the country's vast oil wealth, the little village near Camp Cedar II lacks power and running water, and its 100 school chil-

dren study in a two-room mud hut without benefit of pencils, paper, chalkboard or books. The Army plans to build a schoolhouse there, Hanson said.

"It will be the only wooden building in the whole village," he added.

Carmel city employees have been shipping school supplies to Hanson for the project, as well as clothing and shoes for the impoverished residents.

The simple act of distributing the gifts has been a lesson in itself for the soldiers.

"We gave them coloring books, and we failed to show them what they're for," Hanson said. Entering the school later, he and his men found the uncolored images affixed to the walls. "They just thought they were books of pictures."

While on patrol, soldiers often encounter children begging alongside the road and make sure to carry extra water and food to share, he added.

City employees, as well as Hanson's friends, wife Annette, 16-year-old daughter Keely, and son Travis, have been regularly shipping care packages to him and his fellow soldiers.

Among the most highly sought-after items are AAA batteries, newspapers from home and AT&T phone cards.

Annette Hanson, who has learned that U.S. Postal Service Priority Mail is the best means of getting boxes to Camp Cedar II, added entertainment such as DVDs and CDs, ready-to-eat but non-melting snack foods, razors, toothpaste, toothbrushes, hand wipes and other toiletries to the list.

"He even had me send a paint-by-numbers set once," she said.

At home in Salinas, Hanson's wife and children miss him greatly, but close family and friends help ease the pain. The Hansons maintain contact with each other through e-mail and telephone, as well as the occasional letter by snail mail.

"I've said it many times over, and I'll say it a thousand times over again: My dad amazes me every day," said Keeley. "Patriotism is something that my father exemplifies to the utmost."

For his part, Hanson is equally impressed with his kids and how they've handled his absence.

"I never asked them — I just told them this was something Dad needs to do, and they took it to heart and never questioned it. They never gave me a bunch of grief about it," he said, adding that they understand the National Guard's purpose in Iraq. "I'm just

overwhelmed by that sometimes."

What he misses most is being with his kids and wife as they pass major milestones, like his wedding anniversary, Keely getting her driver license and Travis turning 13.

"I had to give up that part of their lives to come over here," he said.



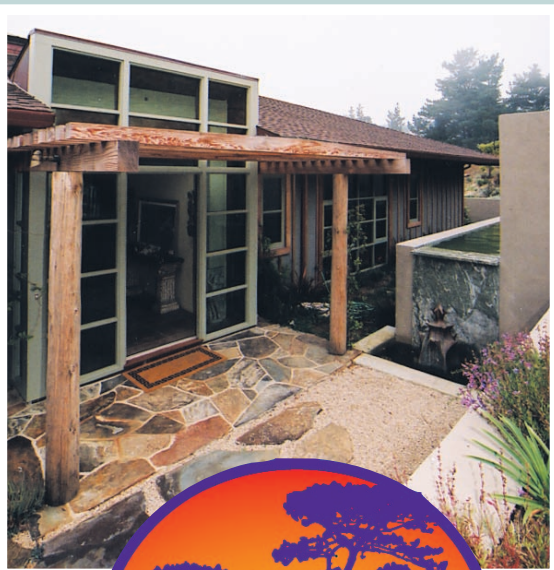

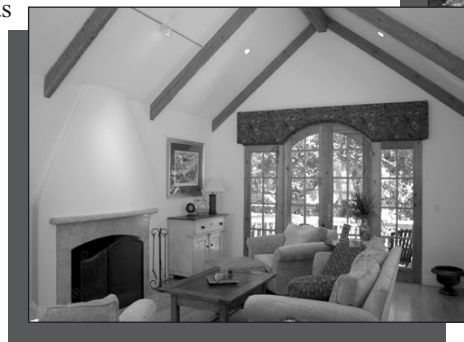

Permits — for stray dogs, grease traps, etc. — now cost more

UPDATING THE wiring in a quaint cottage, installing new toilets or repaving a driveway now cost significantly more under a new permit fee schedule approved by the city council Tuesday as Carmel tries to balance its budget for the fiscal year that starts next month.

Getting the dog out of lockup at Carmel P.D. and driving a taxi in town also cost more, but residents still pay only \$15 — not the proposed \$82 — for their right to occupy downtown parking spaces for twice the posted time limits.

During its February budget workshop, the city council asked staff to research what other Peninsula cities charge for various permits and then bring Carmel's in line to help boost flagging revenues.

The increase in income "won't be significant," city administrator Rich Guillen told the council before building official Tim Meroney and Carmel Police Chief George Rawson presented their recommended fee increases Tuesday. "But it's worthwhile to pursue." The new fees approved Tuesday night went into effect immediately.

Guillen suggested reviewing permit fees during budget discussions each year. "I was surprised to see some had not been changed since the early '90s," he said.

In his report, Meroney said fees for electrical, plumbing and mechanical code permits, for driveway replacement and overlay, and for certificate of occupancy inspections when a business changes owners, should increase to match the costs of issuing them.

Based on estimated staff time, salary and benefits, and materials, Meroney recommended increasing the basic permit from \$25 to \$70. Last month, the City of

Monterey raised its fee for the same type of permit from \$23.50 to \$69.25.

Fees for individual items, such as installing an oven, a garbage disposal or a wall heater, would increase by varying amounts, and the special hourly inspection rate would change from \$60 to \$75.

In 1989, the fee for driveway replacement and overlay was set at \$10 and remained unchanged until Meroney recommended it increase by \$65, and he said the fee for certificate of occupancy inspections should increase from \$30 to \$75.

City councilman Mike Cunningham wondered if the increases truly reflected the costs of issuing the permits and suggested other elements, such as the expenses associated with operating the building that houses the inspector's office and a fraction of the city administrator's salary,

be calculated.

"I think the public ought to be paying a legitimate fee based on what it truly costs to process these permits," he said.

Without much discussion, the council unanimously approved Meroney's recommended fee increases.

CPD fees up, too

It also raised fees for various services provided by Carmel Police Department, as suggested by chief Rawson.

Taxi drivers, who up until Tuesday night paid \$20 for their permits to pick up and drop off passengers in town, suffered the most significant hit when the fee jumped to \$181. Rawson based the proposed increase on the four hours it takes to conduct the required background check, materials for fingerprinting and sending mail to other agencies, and computer and printer usage.

their homes while out of town used to pay \$4 per day but now pay \$19. Demand for close patrol has declined significantly over the years, Cpl. Steve Rana said at the meeting.

“Back in the early '80s, it would take an officer four-and-a-half hours to do one side of the city, but now we only have two to four houses [per day], and those houses we do watch have alarms,” he said.

Rawson recommended the fees for obtaining a travel letter — which verifies that a resident traveling abroad has no criminal record here — increase from \$30 to \$47, and that the fees for impounding and transporting an at-large pet change from \$35 to \$62 and \$35 to \$57, respectively.

The costs of getting a towed vehicle back would jump from \$45 to \$90, and the fee for recovering a vehicle marked as abandoned and towed would rise from \$85 to \$114.

But Rawson’s suggestion of boosting the \$15 fee for an annual resident parking sticker to \$82 — based mostly on the value of occupying a downtown parking space for twice as much time as nonresidents — fell flat.

“It’s not supposed to be a revenue enhancer,” councilman Gerard Rose said. “It’s a special service to residents, and I think that’s its primary purpose.”

Mayor Sue McCloud worried a high charge would dissuade residents from shopping and dining downtown when they could go to a neighboring city where parking is less of a chore.

Ultimately, council members unanimously approved the remainder of Rawson’s recommended increases but left the residential parking permit fee at its current \$15.

"SCC as a nonprofit will also have the ability to obtain grants and do fundraising at the center, so these types of activities will mitigate or reduce the amounts of funding

that need to come from the city to support the operations of the center," Pearson said.

Historic users, such as the Carmel Bach Festival and Monterey Symphony, would receive priority in scheduling, though it would not be specifically tied to prior

dates and uses, and SCC would set the fees.

“The city would have no say in the charges to historic users,” Pearson explained, adding that any disputes between a user and the nonprofit would be resolved without the city’s involvement.

■ SCC would manage the center’s office space and deal with its tenants, including setting their rents.

■ SCC would take over management of the Performance Carmel series and maintain the existing bank account for its revenues and expenses.

■ The city could use the center “free” five days a year and be assigned two SCC staff members for those events, but beyond that would pay the nonprofit rate.

■ Carmel Unified School District would receive 10 free days, though it would have to pay for SCC staff. The district could continue using the pottery room without charge.

■ City and support groups could use meeting rooms free Monday through Thursday.

■ The free city and school uses could not bump prior commitments.

■ Carmel would be responsible for the center’s structural integrity, seismic soundness and tree trimming, while SCC would “maintain and repair everything else.”

■ Carmel would be solely responsible for capital improvements but SCC would supervise the work.

■ One-third of the SCC board membership must live within Carmel-by-the-Sea and another third must live within Monterey County.

■ The three-year agreement would provide two renewal options of three years each.

■ Any dispute between the city and SCC would be resolved through negotiation, mediation and then binding arbitration.

At Tuesday’s meeting, former cultural commissioner Carolyn Hardy said the agreement should offer more protection to historic users and the city.

“It’s fiscally irresponsible to commit to these subsidies without any oversight or control,” she said. “This gives you no say in the administering of public funds.”

Some questioned the lack of performance criteria other than those based on revenues and asked why certain requirements, like establishing a website and a central box office, were not specified.

The financial figures might be shocking, Clay Berling commented, but for years the city did not even keep track of how much money it spent on the center.

“These are real numbers, no matter who the management team is,” he said. “But I know that when you have a private corporation that wants to make something work, they have a better chance than the city.”

Councilman Erik Bethel acknowledged it is “disconcerting to see a shortfall,” but pointed out that historically, the arts depend on subsidies.

“I don’t think it’s something that can stand on its own without government support,” he said. “And although we have a subsidy, if we have world-class performances, we all benefit — the restaurants, the hotels and indirectly, the city.”

Councilman Mike Cunningham asked for language specifying how changes can be made to the agreement after it is signed, but Pearson said the parties in any contract maintain the right to propose and make changes so long as both agree.

Councilman Gerard Rose, a lawyer by trade, said he

would have asked for such a precaution but instead favored giving the agreement a year to see how it works.

Councilwoman Paula Hazdovac advocated letting SCC run the center as it sees fit.

“I feel very strongly that it is very important that SCC be allowed to make its own decisions about what goes on, without interference from the city,” she said.

The council took no action on the agreement Tuesday and is set to consider its adoption at a special meeting June 8.

Handing management of Sunset Center to a nonprofit was a major issue in April’s city election. Mayor Sue McCloud was an early backer of the idea and helped create SCC, Inc. Her opponent, former city councilman Dick Ely — defeated by McCloud 57 to 43 percent — said during the campaign he would “tear up” the proposed contract with the non-profit and start over with a new public hearing process on management of Sunset Center. At one point, Ely and councilwoman Barbara Livingston, who left the council in April after choosing not to run again, declined to participate in a closed council session to discuss the particulars of the proposed contract with SCC, Inc.

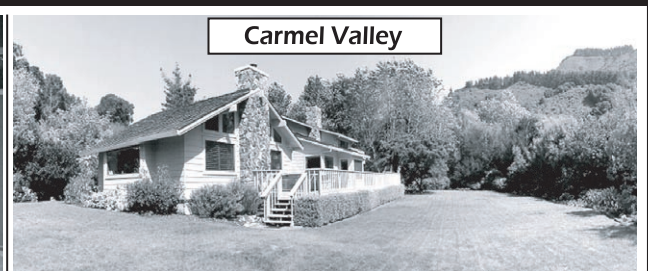

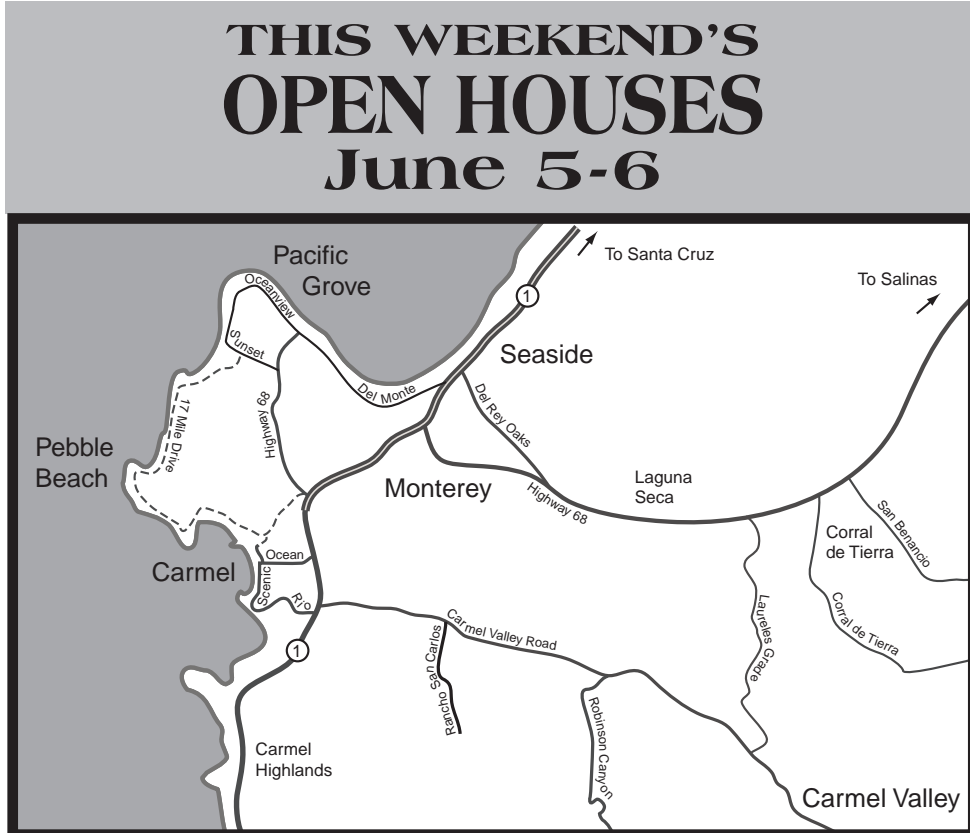

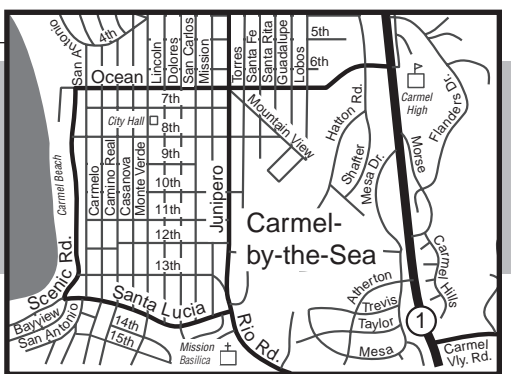

Harrison Memorial Library lost 100 percent of its city funding for books and materials. Since that time the City of Carmel has not purchased so much as a paper clip — let alone a book — for the library's use. Guillen is so used to our library contributing its share of the pain, he may have grown insensitive to its struggle. A browse through the stacks will attest to the slenderness of our library's aging resources, but considering that it has had to rely wholly on its own independent efforts of fundraising for 14 years, our library has done extraordinarily well in continuing to purchase books, magazine subscriptions, books on tape and CD, computers, and so on. Congratulations, library!

No city department exists for its own pleasure. All our city departments exist for the good our community. "The pain" that Guillen proposes our library bear will be the pain to the 83 percent of Carmel's citizens who are library patrons. It is our pain that will result from these proposed budget cuts to our library. While all budget cuts are unavoidably painful to some of the citizens, I cannot think that any such cuts will affect more people more painfully — will cut more nearly at the heart of what constitutes Carmel as the unique cultural community in which we have all chosen to live — than more budget cuts to our library.

The Harrison Memorial Library has been the true intellectual and cultural heart of Carmel for more than 75 years. To cut further into the library's already very straitened budget is to cut into the veriest heart of Carmel's life — the heart that has constituted Carmel as a true cultural community

Dear Editor,

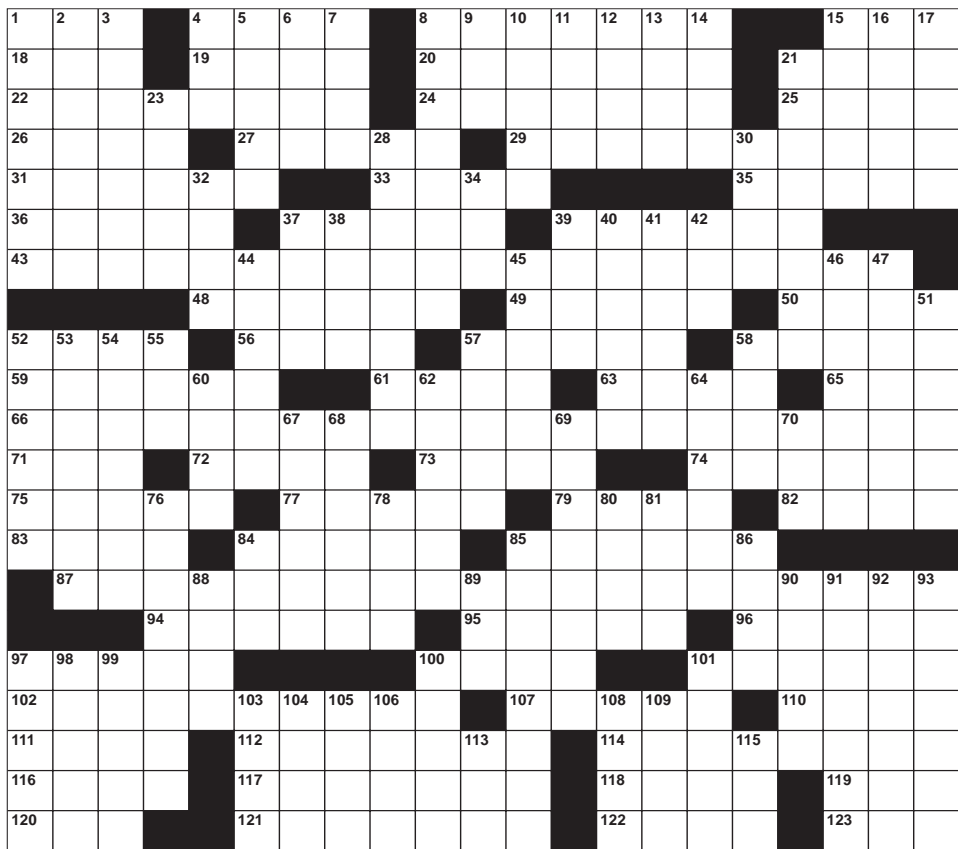
