KRML gets new owner and downtown studio

BUDGET PAIN WILL HIT JULY 1

WITH THE Carmel City Council's unanimous adoption of next year's \$10,950,340 budget, city officials are trying to determine how to implement it as gently as possible, considering 24 employee must now be fired.

"July 1 is the date when everything will change," said city administrator Rich Guillen, who is meeting with his department managers to figure out what the impacts will be and how best to handle them.

Many of the service changes will occur before most of the 24 workers being laid off arrive for their last day of work July 6

"Every reduction we talked about, such as shortening the library hours, will go into place on July 1," Guillen said. The public restrooms at city hall, the library and the public works building will be locked, leaving the only open public restrooms at First Murphy Park, Carmel Beach, Devendorf Park and, during certain hours, inside Lucy's restaurant adjacent to Piccadilly Park.

By July 7, the financial specialist and the administrative coordinator in city hall, the custodian, the building department's administrative coordinator and the vehicle maintenance supervisor in public works, all full-time workers, will be gone.

Part-time workers who will lose their jobs are the maintenance worker and office assistant in public works, the office assistant in community activities and recreation, and nine assistants and two librarians at Harrison Memorial Library and the Park Branch.

Council signs with Sunset Cultural Center, Inc.

THE CARMEL City Council voted unanimously Tuesday to sign an agreement with the private nonprofit Sunset Cultural Center, Inc., for management of the newly renovated theater for the next three years.

According to the contract reviewed last Tuesday and finalized June 8, SCC will oversee every aspect of running Sunset, including deciding which users may use it when and how

much they should pay, marketing the center, managing the groups that rent office space or hold meetings in the city-owned building, and taking responsibility for much of its care and maintenance. It will also run the city's Performance Carmel series.

In turn, the city will be responsible for the building's structural integrity, seismic safety and tree trimming.

Tax money will help cover Sunset's operating costs with an initial \$225,000 next week; additional annual "enabling grants" of unspecified amounts will cover the gap between revenues and

expenses, and emergency "shortfall grants" of no more than \$50,000 per year will cover unforeseen costs upon request from SCC.

Historic user groups — such as the Carmel Bach Festival and the Monterey Symphony — will be given preference in scheduling, though it will not be specifically tied to prior use or dates. SCC will set the rates.

THEY'RE STILL totaling up the receipts, but starry-eyed officials with Colleagues of the Arts said Sunday's sold-out performance by tenor José Carreras at Sunset Center was a smashing success, not only because of the quality of his singing, but because of his support for the group's efforts to raise money for local students of the arts.

New commissioners seated as coastal boss begins treatment for cancer

san pedro — The executive director of the California Coastal Commission, Peter Douglas, told the commission Wednesday that he expects a "full recovery" from tongue and neck cancer and plans to be back on the job full time sometime in August. A scan completed June 3 showed no other tumors in his body, "which came as great news," Douglas said in a memo delivered to commissioners at the beginning of their meeting here this week. Treatment will begin June 17 and continue for about six weeks, he added. Other senior staff, including Chuck Damm and Charles Lester, will cover for him while he is undergoing radiation and chemotherapy, the commission learned.

The news of Douglas' extended absence, after almost 20 years at the helm of the state's most powerful planning agency, came as three new commissioners appointed by Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger took on their duties.

One of them, Hollywood talent agent Steven Kram, was a complete unknown on coastal issues before this week's meeting. He moved quickly to assuage any concerns that his appointment might be part of Schwarzenegger's pro-business agenda.

"I'm an environmentalist," Kram told The Pine Cone. "Of course, there has to be some balance on the commission. But I love the coast and I am here to help protect it."

Kram is chief operating officer of the

"If it gets to the Assembly floor, it will pass," Senator Bruce McPherson predicted.

The bill, revised to eliminate the district rather than just replace its board, now reflects the will of the 66 percent of voters who decided the MPWMD should be flushed, according to McPherson.

"It's really to get as close as I can to doing what the people of the district want me to do," he said.

A replacement for the MPWMD - possibly a joint powers authority representing the six district cities and the county, the Monterey County Water Resources Agency or some other entity - would be decided

"I just want to give them the opportunity, presumably after the district is dissolved, to set up a water agency to oversee water needs to the general public's desire," McPherson

Wide-ranging support

SB 1529 has the support of the mayors of all six cities and four of the five Monterey County supervisors, as well as affordable housing advocates, members of the building trade and business owners, according to McPherson.

The Carmel City Council discussed SB 1529 June 3 before directing Mayor Sue McCloud to sign a letter supporting the dis-

The refusal by local public entities to implement the desire stated by voters was arrogant, undemocratic and wrong," councilman Gerard Rose said. "I urge this council to take action."

But some members of the public urged the mayor not to sign.

Calling the possible effects "disastrous," former city councilwoman Barbara Livingston said the current water board members are working well together and should be allowed to continue developing a decades-overdue water supply. Although the board voted earlier this year to shelve plans for a small desalination plant in Sand City after spending more than \$1.5 million on its environmental review, it did express interest in Cal-Am's proposed Moss Landing desal plant, which would at least make up for the overpumping of Carmel River and could provide water to many more areas of the county.

"Let the district continue," Livingston said. "Let it be managed by the directors and not the mayors or some nebulous organiza-

Resident Carolyn Hardy said SB 1529 would bring progress to a halt.

"At least the wheels are turning, and they are working to get something accomplished where other water boards have failed," she said. "The advisory vote is old news, especially since we voted in a new water board."

But the 27 years and \$60 million the district has spent without developing a new supply suggest the failure goes beyond any single board, according to a speaker who urged the mayor to sign the letter.


"This community is screaming for some type of solution to the end of the circle that we keep going in with this district," Virginia Lee said.

McCloud's signature joined those of Monterey Mayor Dan Albert, Pacific Grove Mayor Morris Fisher, Del Rey Oaks Mayor Jack Barlich, Seaside Mayor Jerry Smith and Sand City Mayor David Pendergrass on the June 8 letter to McPherson.

"We are in strong agreement with the voters that the MPWMD is not functioning in a way that meets the needs of the community," the letter reads. "A new governance system must be formed that is supportive of the community needs for a long-term, reliable source of water. This is a decision that ought

Estimated water needs to be based on general plan build-out

THE CARMEL City Council decided this week that if a new desal plant for the Monterey Peninsula is to provide water for future development, it should be big enough to supply all growth anticipated by the city's general plan for the next 20 years. That stand follows the lead of the Monterey

Similar estimates for the other five cities in the water district, as well as the county and the Monterey Peninsula Airport District, will be used to design Cal-Am's proposed desalination plant in Moss Landing.

The long-term estimates will also help determine the maximum carrying capacity of the pipeline from the plant. "The water board wants this information sooner rather than later," said city councilwoman Paula

Hazdovac, who represents Carmel on the water board's policy advisory committee.

Committee meeting set stage

The PAC agreed with the TAC on using the build-out method for calculating water needs during a joint meeting June 1. Those figures are expected in July.

"There's a one-time opportunity to build a pipeline," water board director Larry Foy said at that meeting. "We know Cal-Am has to retire the deficit [of 10,730 acre-feet, which the state ruled Cal-Am is illegally pumping from the Carmel River]. Where do we go beyond that?"

Planners and elected officials from each jurisdiction in the district were warned that inflated estimates could complicate the review process, stall the project and drive up construction costs. and water board director Dave Potter, who suggested breaking the anticipated needs into periods of two or three years. "I caution against being greedy. That's what killed projects in the past."

Monterey Mayor Dan Albert said his council favored using the general plan coupled with analysis of past trends.

"We didn't think the general plan needs would be fulfilled in 20 years," he said. "We just didn't think we would use that much water."

But a long period when water wasn't available can hardly be used to predict water needs in the future, some committee members responded.

"We've been suffering for the last 15 years," said Seaside City Councilman Darryl Choates. "Now we're ready to start taking off."

Ultimately, the committees decided each jurisdiction should calculate future residential, commercial and municipal water needs based on general plan build-out and then break them down over several shorter periods.

The presentation and program will take place 6:30 to 8 p.m. Monday, June 14, at the Santa Cruz Cannery Building, 7532 Sandholdt Road in Moss Landing.

The meeting is coordinated by the Monterey County Water Resources Agency, California-American Water Company and RBF Consulting, project engineers.

At the June 8 Carmel City Council meeting, members agreed with the strategy and asked staff to gather the figures, which will be reviewed by the Carmel Planning Commission before being turned over to the water district.

City administrator Rich Guillen said he would update the figures he and principal planner Brian Roseth calculated a year ago.

With environmental consultants already hired and preparing a study of Cal-Am's desal project, which is being overseen by the California Public Utilities Commission and designed in cooperation with Monterey County, Hazdovac said the desal plant could be up and running within five years.





Police Chiefs Decry Boosted Booking fees

FACING A 60 percent increase in the cost of booking a suspect into Monterey County Jail, Peninsula police chiefs are looking to the state to end the system that allows counties to charge "whatever they want" for incarceration services.

whenever a suspect arrested in a city without its own jail is housed at the county jail. "Basically, you're making the residents of cities pay to book the people who are victimizing them," said Seaside Police Chief Tony Sollecito,

president of the MCCLEO. "Fundamentally, I find that to be wrong. And the citizens already paying taxes for deputy sheriffs are now paying additionally for the bookings."

The issue didn't even exist 15 years ago. Then, county sheriffs covered the costs in their budgets, since lodging criminals was a statutory requirement, according to

But when the state began raiding property taxes in the early 1990s, it allowed counties to generate new revenue by charging booking fees. Nine years later, the state began reimbursing the cities for their county jail bookings, but the reimbursement rate has remained the same and is threatened in budget talks every year.

said. "I could lodge my prisoners at Embassy Suites for less money than at the county jail."

Board backs sheriff

On May 25, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors voted 4-1 to allow Kanalakis and his cash-strapped agency to recoup booking costs from the cities. The increase will generate an additional \$1.8 million to offset the \$4.24 million it costs to book prisoners, according to Kanalakis.

County administrative officer Sally Reed said her office "absolutely supports raising the fee to meet the costs of running the jail."

Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter also supported raising the fee. "This is a cost-recovery issue," he said.

Supervisor Fernando Armenta sided with Salinas Police Chief Daniel Ortega, who warned that having to pay \$1.1 million in booking fees annually would would hurt efforts to curb gang violence.

"As much as I want to support the sheriff, I cannot do it in good conscience at this time," Armenta said. "If I have to decide what's more important, a facility or protection in local neighborhoods, I will support the neighborhoods."

Rates run the gamut

With the increased fee of \$233 kicking in at the July 1 start of the next fiscal year, Monterey County Jail will become the second most expensive place to book prisoners in the state, behind Sonoma County, according to Sollecito. The lowest is Butte County, which charges \$40.



The employees will receive severance pay based on their number of years with the city, according to Guillen.

He said he has yet to meet with the union representing the four interim fire engineers whose jobs were cut in the budget, and the contract with the part-time information services worker has already been terminated.

On Wednesday, Guillen met with managers from every city department and asked them to reflect on the quotation: "Seek not to change the world, but seek to change your mind about the world."

With that mind set, he said, they should not focus on blaming anyone for the job cuts and bare-bones budget, but instead concentrate on solutions.

"We talked about how we have to improve communication and start thinking in terms of helping each other," he said.

The meeting spawned many questions and few answers,

- With two fewer clerical workers and a pool of the rest, how will work from each department be handled, and where will the clerks be?
- How will combining the public works and the forest, parks and beach departments be implemented, and will workers be assigned tasks outside their traditional areas of exper-
 - Without a janitor, who's going to take out the trash?

"Maybe you'll see me out there vacuuming one day after work, and the next day, it will be Karen," Guillen said, referring to city clerk Karen Crouch.

- With the termination of the city's contract with Carmel Valley Fire Protection District for the services of fire chief Sidney Reade, who will handle the fire prevention and plan check services that were also provided in that contract?
- Can some of the city's boards, commissions and committees meet less often, to reduce the amount of time staff spends on them?

to many of those questions.

They also made cost-cutting and time-saving suggestions, such as reducing paper use in favor of electronic communications; swapping services with other organizations, similar to the agreement between Carmel P.D. and Pacific Grove P.D., and centralizing the phone systems so that all phone calls are picked up at city hall, "instead of having all these satellite reception areas" in city buildings throughout town.

While the reorganization of city departments and staff includes a position for a public services director who would oversee public works, forest, parks and beach, the salary was not included in the 2004/2005 budget.

Guillen said Carmel Police Chief George Rawson will likely fill the role of public safety director and receive a stipend on top of his regular salary to oversee administration of the fire department.

On the revenue side, more money is already coming in from recently increased permit fees, and paid parking in the north lot of Sunset Center should begin within the next few months after the current vendor is given notice, according to Guillen. Tour bus operators will also soon pay for parking.

But selling Flanders Mansion, which the city council supports, will take longer to accomplish. The property must first be rezoned so that it's no longer park land, even though it has already been separated from the surrounding Mission Trail Park, and the mansion must first be offered to other park districts, according to Guillen.

On Tuesday, the city council also briefly discussed possible means of offsetting the budget cuts, principally the shortened library hours. Starting next month, the main branch will be open Tuesday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday from 1 to 5 p.m., and the Park Branch will be open Tuesday from 2 to 7 p.m., and Wednesday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. In addition, cuts in staff mean the end

or reduction of some library programs.

"I think a call for volunteers would get a tremendous response," councilman Gerard Rose said. "Carmelites have never been shy about coming forward when the need arises."







"Carmel is unique and KRML is unique as well," Kimball said. "We're going to break new ground in the world of broadcasting."

"It's a station that belongs downtown," said Clint Eastwood, whose 1971 directorial debut, "Play Misty for Me," featured the station. The former mayor sold the Hog's Breath in 2000, but Eastwood still owns the building where KRML's new studios will be located. "I love the music they play, and it will be a fun addition to the neighborhood."

Broadcasts from the new studio will begin in early July, said Kimball, who began his "Let's Dance" Saturday afternoon show on KRML in 1991. Over the years he has increasingly been involved in station operation. But he praised previous station owner Gil Wisdom for his "foresight and creativity in combining a radio station, retail store, record label and concert series into a thriving business."

Joining Kimball in managing the station

in its new location are Gary Hamada, who has extensive experience producing local concerts and will do the same for KRML, and Rhett Alan Smith, whose Pacific Grove business, "The Media Room," thrived as a concert venue in the 1990s until it was shut down by the city for lacking handicapped access.

Local businessman Don Bowen will also continue as on-air host of "Around Town," his 10 a.m. Saturday talk show on political and business events on the Monterey Peninsula.

"We're very excited about the future of Carmel's hometown radio station and the new vision we've created," Kimball said.

William Morris Agency which, he said, "has a long history of public service," and was "making time for me to attend coastal commission meetings," which usually run three days each month and are well-known for their arduousness.

Kram said he had previously attended just one coastal commission meeting. Why, then, was he appointed to such a high-profile, and possibly controversial, job?

"I supported the governor in the recall election and I contributed to his campaign," Kram said. "When he won, I asked him if there was an opportunity to serve, and the coastal commission seemed to be a good fit with my interest in the environment."

The other two new commissioners, Meg Caldwell and Bonnie Neely, have long records on coastal issues. Neely, a Humboldt County supervisor for 16 years, previously served on the coastal commission in the 1980s. Caldwell is a lecturer at the Stanford law school where she serves as director of the school's environmental and natural resources law and policy program

Kram, Neely and Caldwell were sworn in last week in Sacramento. None made any comments from the dais after being publicly welcomed by coastal commission chair Mike Reilly.

"It's better to sit and watch for awhile, because the commission's business is complicated," said coastal commissioner and Monterey County Supervisor Dave Potter.

Moss Landing, Pebble Beach, **Pacific Grove**

After being reassured that noise from pile-driving at a new pier at Moss Landing wouldn't disturb sea otters and other marine mammals, commissioners unanimously OK'd a permit for the project, which would

replace a pier destroyed by the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake and subsequent storms.

And, despite opposition from the League of Women Voters of the Monterey Peninsula, the commission also approved an amended permit for Murray and Carol Smith, who want to build a new home on 17 Mile Drive in Pebble Beach. The couple's original permit, approved last year, restricted them to 14 percent lot coverage — much smaller than other houses in their neighborhood, according to attorney John Bridges. The coastal staff restricted the lot coverage on the Smiths' property to protect sensitive habitat. The new permit, which increased lot coverage to about 21 percent, came after the Smiths filed a lawsuit challenging the commission's restrictions on their building plans.

And a Pacific Grove homeowner, Ed Kwiatkowski, got final approval to replace a ramshackle 1,776-square-foot house adjacent to the Asilomar Conference Grounds with a much larger home. He must restore native habitat on all the undeveloped portions of his site. Kwiatkowski was also represented by Bridges.

"For both clients it has been a very, very long road, and they're happy to finally be at the end so they can build their homes," Bridges told The Pine Cone.

There is still no schedule for final certification of the Carmel Local Coastal Program, which will give the city the right to issue its own coastal development permits.

Neither has the state Supreme Court scheduled oral arguments in a lawsuit brought by an Orange County environmental group, Marine Forest Society, that challenged the legality of the coastal commission. An appeals court ruled in late 2002 that the commission had to be restructured because it is an executive branch agency but is controlled by the Legislature, which violates the Separation of Powers clause of the state constitution.





to be made locally, with full public input, and among each of the stake holders in the region."

The mayors pledged their readiness and eagerness to "create a positive future for water governance on the Peninsula."

On the same date, the majority of the Monterey County Board of Supervisors also articulated its support. Supervisors Edith Johnsen, Fernando Armenta, Butch Lindley and Lou Calcagno decried the district's lack of

"This is in direct opposition of their enabling legislation," they wrote. "Instead, the district has chosen to act as a regional land use agency. Their failure has strangled growth and economic development within their agency's boundaries, resulting in major impacts on the County of Monterey."

Protection of the Carmel River, an increased water supply and adequate drought reserves are urgent, according to the supervisors. "A new governance system must be formed that supports community needs."

Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter, who represents the county on the water board, did not sign the letter and has said a board with forward momentum should not be stopped.

'Complete dissolution of the district without any alternative just seems to me to be oddly vague as to what we're supposed to be doing in the community," Potter said.

It wouldn't depoliticize water issues, either.

"More political blood has been spilled, more capital

expended, in the arena of water problems and solutions than in any other arena I've ever seen, and I've been in almost every one there is," said Potter, reached this week during a coastal commission meeting in San Pedro. "I've never seen more violent politics than in issues around water."

On Wednesday, the Assembly Local Committee, Government chaired by former Monterey County Supervisor and bill coauthor Assemblyman Simon Salinas, will consider the revised SB 1529.

With Salinas and the three Republicans on the committee presumably on board, McPherson will need to convince one more Democrat to vote in favor of passing the bill on to the full Assembly, according to McPherson's chief of staff,

James Jack. Since it is a non-fiscal bill, it will probably avoid the Assembly Committee on Appropriations, where an earlier version died last vear.

"We're making every effort to meet with the members to show them the merits of the bill. We feel like we have a pretty compelling case," Jack said. "It's a matter of convincing the Sacramento politicians that this is what the voters want.







Colleagues of the Arts. "José was very impressed with the new hall, and he said he will definitely come back.'

After finishing his early-evening program of Spanish and Neapolitan love songs, Carreras and his small entourage walked across San Carlos Street to the Carmel Woman's Club, which had been transformed into a gala banquet hall for a dinner, prepared by Kurt Grasing with wines by the Frank Family vineyards, in Carreras' honor. Wendy Brodie and Bernardus donated food



Pagrovia pleasingly melds Russian, Italian favorites

 ${f F}$ OR A little bit of atmospheric Bohemia on the Bay in the unconventional, artistic sense — try Pagrovia in Pacific Grove. It's an eclectic mix of Russia and Italy, with samovars as decoration, embroidered ecru net curtains at the windows, and Russian scenes in many original paintings . . . and sculptures, drawings and paintings copied from Italian

And why not? It's owned jointly by a St. Petersburg Russian, chef Valentina Rapisarda, who has been in the U.S.

for 13 years and is married to an Italian. Her business partner, Vicenzo D'Amigo — whose grandmother was Russian — is also a chef and the resident artist.

At first we thought Pagrovia was just a clever play on words for Pacific Grove, and while it is that, it also tips you off to the Russian fare. But it gives no hint of the Italian dishes that predom-

Chef Vicenzo was born in New York and learned Italian cooking in his mother's restaurant there, while Chef Valentina acquired her cooking skills at a culinary academy in St. Petersburg. She also owns the Bayview Deli on the Coast Guard pier in Monterey which

she opens at 5 a.m. After a stint there, she goes to Vicenzo's aid at Pagrovia. They opened Pagrovia together last October following D'Amigo's stints as chef at Brookdale Lodge in the Santa Cruz Mountains, La Strada in Los Gatos and Carniglia's in Santa Cruz.

Chef Valentina's 21-year-old twins, Vladimir and Larisa, will be arriving from Russia next month and will be an addition to the wait staff at Pagrovia.

Poultry and seafood dishes pretty well make up the menu, but there's a filetto al pepe for \$23 with gorgonzola butter, roasted vegetables and caramelized garlic smashed potatoes; a Russian lamb stew — which one of our dinner companions ordered — with roasted vegetables served over arborio rice or smashed potatoes for \$18 under the name Barashka; and a petit rack of lamb, for \$19, with prosciutto, onion and garlic country wine sauce with an accompaniment of polenta or the ubiquitous potatoes.

In case you aren't in-the-know about these potatoes, they're mashed, but with big chunks of potato too. They are the lazy man's mashed potatoes, and oh, so good.

As for the remainder of the Russian offerings, there's a starter of borscht, a traditional Ukrainian soup with meat or seafood. We assume the main vegetable is beets, but we've never heard of serving borscht with seafood before.

Then there's *Karcho* (\$8), described as a Georgian lamb soup with roasted vegetables and buckwheat kasha; Piroshki (\$12), unlike any other we've seen. Generally speaking,

piroshki is a turnover with a savory filling, but Pagrovia's version follows a very old Russian country tradition, prepared as a substantial crêpe stuffed with wild mushrooms, onions, hard boiled egg, sour cream, and served on a potato pancake (also smashed) with a mushroom sherry sauce. The three of us dining together Sunday night shared this as an appetizer (\$12), and found it tasty and fill-

Zareniki (\$10) is a homemade vegetable, mushroom or potatostuffed egg pasta pocket sautéed in butter, sour cream, and

napped with Parmesan or marinara sauce.

Siberian mushrooms consist of portobellos stuffed with smoked salmon, goat cheese and sun-dried tomatoes (\$12). And of course beef stroganoff (\$16) with sour cream served over fresh egg pasta or mashed potatoes is on the menu.

There is a preponderance of Italian dishes — from minestrone (\$7) to seafood and pasta — the chicken dishes are prepared parmigiano, cacciatore, roasted with rosemary and lemon, and piccata. And with an obvious political avoidance

of veal, even the saltimbocca, cannelloni and scaloppine are prepared with chicken. Italian entrées run from \$10.95 to \$13.95.

All of the dishes we ordered were very good, but the plating, in this era of pretty presentations, was rather plain Jane.

There are 24 items on the breakfast menu alone, which is extensive by any comparison and lists unusual items, such as Dungeness crab and shrimp potato cake, spinach, hollandaise (\$9.50); omelets and frit-

tatas in the style of Greek, Italian, Romanov, Muscovite, and Belgian (\$7.50 - \$9.50); blinis (\$7); Normandy toast stuffed with sweet ricotta and fresh berries (\$7.50); Russian buckwheat or buttermilk pancakes with sour cream and strawberries (\$7.50); or kasha, Russian hot buckwheat cereal with walnuts, prunes and bananas for \$6.50.

The bottom line is, if you seek a substantial breakfast or dinner a little out of the ordinary, set among Russian accoutrements and artwork produced by the chef, Pagrovia is the





Theater veterans serve punch lines with polished skill

WHAT A pleasure it is to watch three veterans of the local theater scene strut their stuff in "A Bench in the Sun." Morgan Stock, Edie Karas and Michael Robbins rock the house with laughter as three "inmates" of a retirement home where the food quality is his alr

can be a curse as well as a blessing.

Director Conrad Selvig starts off with an immediate sight gag and the audience never stops nodding its head in collective acknowledgement of the vicissitudes of aging gracefully. The actors, all skilled in the art of delivering a punch line, make the most of

every opportunity in this great collection of

one-liners about living as a senior citizen in

questionable and the company of old friends

today's world.

Center spotlight is on Karas who shines every time she is on stage as the oncefamous actress, Adrienne Bliss. She sparkles with gaiety as she flirts with both men, igniting a rivalry from an old, unsettled score between them.

Robbins (Harold) insistently
maintains his optimistic view of
life, and dresses up each morning to
greet the day. He is the first to succumb to Adrienne's attractions, and
his already good opinion of himself expands

in the light of her attention.

Stock (Burt), the curmudgeon of the group, just wants to be left alone to read his paper and complain about the world. He has suffered a deep loss and only begins to open up to life again when bathed in the warmth of Adrienne's affection.


The stage is set for a classic lovers' triangle, but the script is so full of jokes the tone of the play never darkens. Instead, we are treated to a waltz lesson by Harold, who walks unsteadily with a cane and cannot get up from the bench without assistance. We are admonished by Burt early on that, "It's

not boogie-woogie any more, it's rock with roll."

With more than a century of performing among the three of them, Karas, Robbins and Stock hold the audience in the palms of their collective hands. Their comic sense is impec-

cable and the pace of the first act could be tightened without losing either the exposition or the comedic effect. The announcements to the retirement home residents by Deirdre McCauley are often hilarious.





Editorial

Budget choices

WITH THE local economy rebounding, and the national economy getting so hot the Fed is thinking of raising interest rates to prevent inflation, it is especially painful for the city to be cutting library hours and laying off employees. The budget shortfall seems likely to be short-lived, making it possible city services will be restored in the near future. But that doesn't make it any easier to say goodbye to valued city workers, even while remaining employees have to start doing the work of two or three.

Building inspector and part-time police officer Tim Meroney, for example, already has one assistant serving his country in Iraq, while the other is on the layoff list. You can't blame the indefatigable Meroney for asking the city council to dip into reserves rather than put more work on his shoulders. But the council was right to save that money for emergencies, which the current budget deficit certainly isn't. City administrator Rich Guillen has warned of it for years. Various new revenue sources to forestall exactly the sort of dire budget shortfall Carmel is facing have been discussed at least since 2001. But none has come to fruition, mainly because of fears these ideas (paid parking, a surcharge on restaurant meals or higher taxes on hotel rooms) would backfire by driving customers and tourists away from local businesses. As councilman Erik Bethel pointed out recently, you can't tax your way out of a slow economy.

Meanwhile, the city has a huge amount of cash literally wasting away in the form of Flanders Mansion. Letting the old house continue to decay while not producing any public benefit is a grossly irresponsible use of the citizens' money. Last month, Carmel picked up a tidy sum — \$11,000 — renting the mansion to a clothing company for a photo shoot. But such windfalls are sure to be few and far between. The only way the old place could produce steady, reliable revenue would be to stage large-scale public events there, something the neighbors will never tolerate, and which the council has rejected in the past. With Sunset Center providing an ideal venue for exactly the sort of events foreseen for Flanders Mansion, the council is sure to continue vetoing cooking classes, art exhibits and weddings at Flanders in the future.

In the meantime, the \$4 million or \$5 million the sale of the mansion will likely generate could easily be put to good use. By freeing up other funds dedicated to capital improvements, it could have saved a few jobs this summer, or kept the library open on Sunday and Monday, for example.

Proponents of keeping Flanders Mansion say it's foolish and shortsighted to liquidate city property to underwrite operating expenses. That's true in most situations. But it's also true that clinging to an unused piece of property while handing out pink slips at city hall is just plain callous.

Flanders Museum? Dear Editor,

The city of Carmel-by-the-Sea has gained world renown for its beauty, and fame as a community devoted to the arts and artists, yet it has never created a museum of art. What is it waiting for? The city owns an ideal building that would be a perfect home for its large collection of works of art that sit unseen in storage areas and a vault at the main library. Very few residents even know about the extensive and valuable collection of paintings, photographs, etc. that have been given to the city over the years. Other than one brief showing of the Edward

Weston photographs, the other art works have seldom been seen. The perfect place to display and benefit from this valuable collection of art would be at the Flanders Mansion. The Flanders Foundation would like nothing better than to work with the city to turn that building into the Museum of Art and Natural History that our community has waited far too long to create.

With cooperative efforts, museums are created and sustained through dues-paying members, volunteers, docents, bequests, grants, etc. The city of Carmel-by-the-Sea has the building, the works of art and an organization that wants nothing more than to make this museum a reality. The only element lacking at this time is the approval of the city council to make Flanders into a truly beneficial city property for all to enjoy.

It is reasonable to believe that once Carmel-by-the-Sea has a museum of art it would attract a steady flow of donations of works of art that would never have been given if the donors knew their treasured pieces would be put in storage, never to be seen by the public. Just recently the Monterey Museum of Art received an extensive, valuable collection of paintings; since there are far more paintings than they have room for, they plan to sell a portion of the collection. If Carmel-by-the-Sea had a museum it could be the beneficiary of simi-





cognizant that home invasions are on the upswing in nearby cities. His vigil seems to be working, because when Harry continues on his way, the intruder disappears.



"Garmel Legends"

We keep a little file of legends which we wish had happened. But didn't. Among them is the non-visit to Carmel of SIR ARTHUR SULLIVAN on July 24, 1885. He had come from London to New York to conduct The Mikado, to fight against piracy of Gilbert and Sullivan operas in the States, and principally to visit the children of his deceased brother in Los Angeles! His train journey from New York to San Francisco took 9 days, including stops in Chicago, Iowa, Denver, Salt Lake City and Sacramento. Of Iowa he wrote: "No liquors to be sold in this state. Shall not dine in Iowa." He hated the food in Lincoln, Nebraska; he played the organ in Denver's opera house; repeated that impromptu recital at the Mormon Tabernacle; visited Chinatown and Alcatraz in San Francisco; and took the overnight train 428 miles to L.A. Presumably he by-passed Carmel in the night, probably a few miles inland. We are distressed that he lacked a better guide, especially because he did visit Madera, Fresno and Yosemite during his time in California. But maybe he was right: we had no opera, no Golden Bough, no Sunset Center, no Forest Theater in 1885. But what a difference he might have made in Carmel history! His "Pirates" might have operated from Carmel Bay instead of Penzance!







County refines rules for landscaping with graywater

REVERSING A recommendation they made last summer, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors this week voted to allow graywater to be used for landscaping at commercial and industrial buildings in unincorporated parts of the county. But permits for such systems will be subject to a full environmental review to ensure that they can

"Our current ordinance allows graywater which is wastewater from bathtubs, showers, bathroom sinks and washing machines, but not from toilets or kitchen sinks - only at at single-family homes," explained county health officer Laura Lawrence. "We know that some commercial uses are not appropriate if the water contains infectious agents," such as from a hospital. But other commercial projects could use graywater safely, she said, so long as the county retained jurisdiction to "require conditions to protect public health."

Currently, the county is evaluating a graywater proposal for a 78-bed assisted-care home the Gamboa family wants to build on its property behind Brinton's at the mouth of the valley. Concerns that viruses and bacteria could be present in graywater from such a facility, where some residents will probably be bedridden, led the county last summer recommend a ban on graywater systems at all commercial and industrial buildings.

But the Gamboas have subsequently offered to filter and disinfect the graywater at their proposed senior living complex, which doesn't have enough potable water rights to operate without using graywater on

As proposed, a collection tank would receive water from sinks, bathtubs and showers. After being filtered and disinfected, the water would be distributed to a network of shallow irrigation pipes to flower beds and lawn areas. Similar setups have been used successfully in other parts of the state, according to a company that builds them. Lawrence said San Diego County has issued 30 to 35 graywater permits since 1994.

"But in Monterey County, no permits have been issued for graywater systems, so we have no information on their success or failure," Lawrence said. That's why she recommended they should be approved only after going through the full permit process.

Supervisor Edith Johnsen said there may be no graywater systems in the county built with permits, but "every time there's a water crisis, people engage in ersatz graywater use especially using wash water, which they store out in their yards where it can be a breeding ground for mosquitoes." It's important that if people use graywater, they do it

Another supervisor, Butch Lindley, asked

if graywater included runoff from roofs and gutters. "The health department does not regulate the collection of rainwater for irrigation," Lawrence said.

The board voted unanimously to allow graywater systems at commercial and industrial buildings. An ordinance to implement the decision is expected later this summer.

"If I go to another county, what's so different?" Rawson asked. "I'm at a quandary to understand why there's such a huge discrepancy across the state."

The police chiefs hope the state will address that question next year. In a twopronged approach, the attorney general would investigate how current fees were established and whether cities should have to pay them, while legislators would work for a tiered system to apply statewide.

Accountants would determine the appropriate charges for booking prisoners in "rural, urban or metropolitan" county jails, according to Sollecito, who has already met with Assemblyman John Laird to request he "support any bill that gives any relief to the cities, as far as booking fees go.'

Standardizing the fee schedule would also help reduce the enmity that has developed between city and county law enforcement agencies over the years, according to Sollecito.

"The county and the cities should not be pitted against each other," he said. "That's a very bad situation."

In the meantime, police chiefs are praying the worst case scenario — in which the state yanks its reimbursements but continues to allow counties to charge unlimited booking fees — does not play out.

The state might cover only a third of the cost, Sollecito said, but "something is still better than nothing.'

While Seaside police make frequent trips transporting prisoners to Monterey County Jail each week, Carmel P.D. has far fewer arrests. In 2003, CPD had 39 bookings into county jail and 19 into Monterey P.D.'s jail, where it can lodge intoxicated people, drunken drivers and misdemeanor drug users who usually bail out or are released the following day. Monterey P.D. charges Carmel \$137 per booking.

"Our budget for booking fees is not very high," Rawson said, estimating the cost would increase from around \$8,000 this fiscal year to more than \$12,000 in 2004/2005.

"It's not a lot, but it's just more thousands of dollars [in costs] I've got to find out how to pay for," said Rawson, whose department has already seen cuts in supplies, services and staff.

HANKS TO Annette Funicello movies and their late 20th-century progeny ("Baywatch" comes to mind) the rest of the world thinks California beaches are places where hordes of bikini-clad models and their hunky, bronzed boyfriends frolic in the surf and loll on sun-splashed sand, their only worry being running out of Coppertone.



The city will retain the right to use the center and obtain the help of two members of SCC staff at no additional cost five days a year, while the Carmel Unified School District may use it 10 days a year, though it will have to pay for the SCC staff. Neither will be allowed to bump previous commitments. CUSD may continue using the pottery room at no cost, and city and support groups may use meeting rooms Monday through Thursday free of charge.

According to the contract, all revenues generated by the center will go to operating costs. SCC will also pursue grants, donations, sponsorships and other sources to help reduce the city's subsidy toward the operation of Sunset Center.

Following last week's unveiling of the contract, few changes were made, and Tuesday's hearing prompted only a handful of comments from the public.

Resident Cavan Hardy commented on the timing of the contract, which coincided with a party celebrating the dissolution of the Campaign for Sunset, the nonprofit that raised \$13.4 million from the community to help cover the \$21.65 million renovation.

"It's wonderful to be able to celebrate the completion of that," Hardy said, but it seemed unusual to be doing so as Sunset is placed in the hands of a private nonprofit that will operate it. "It's kind of like sending a child off to college," he said, when parents hope for the best but fear the worst.

Attorney Skip Lloyd said the city should have more say in deciding whether to renew the agreement after it ends June 30, 2007. As written, unless SCC has failed to meet its obligations, the nonprofit can extend the contract for two additional three-year terms.



Olof Dahlstrand worried about residents lacking control over the center.

"People will lose a say in what becomes of Sunset Center even though they continue to own it," he said. "They are required to back up financially this entire enterprise, even though they have no say in the risks and inefficiencies that come up over time."

After observing that the successful Campaign for Sunset was also a nonprofit formed by supporters who saw a need, much like SCC, cultural commissioner Denny Gambill said the "silent

majority" spoke in support of SCC when it elected Mayor Sue McCloud and councilmen Erik Bethel and Mike Cunningham in April.

"The candidates who wanted to scrap SCC and start all over again were not elected," he said. "I think that's how voters stand on this."

Responding to questions about the fate of Sunset Center employees, city administrator Rich Guillen said the city and SCC will now determine how to best orchestrate the transition of management of the center. The agreement takes effect July 1.

Meetings closed

SCC's board will not open its meetings to the public but will submit quarterly financial reports to the council, and its finances will be discussed each year when the budget is set, Guillen said. SCC will also conduct annual community meetings to seek input.

"Those are the meetings where the public would have the opportunity to challenge the budget figures and anything else that's in the contract," Guillen said.

Councilman Gerard Rose predicted "in a year, it will be all smiles," while Cunningham had a more subdued, though supportive, take.

"The central issue we're wrestling with is still the wisdom of having a nonprofit manage this like a business," he said. "I believe it's still the right choice, albeit not without risk."


Following the council's unanimous vote, McCloud invited SCC board chairman Jim Price and other board members in the audience to the podium.

"We look forward to the partnership that has been spawned this evening as we go forward," she said.

After commenting on the uniqueness of Carmelby-the-Sea and its Sunset Center, Price thanked the council, the staff and the community for their courage and commitment.

He encouraged residents and their friends to subscribe to the presentations and events at the center.

"The goal is to offer a rich and varied cultural life for Carmel, and for our Central Coast neighbors," he said. "SCC's job is to provide sound and responsible management. We can do that; however, the success of this venture relies on everyone."
