Doris Day wins Medal of Freedom

THE NATION'S highest civilian honor has been bestowed on Doris Day, Carmel Valley resident and international film and recording legend.

When informed by her son, Terry Melcher, that she would be the recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom, Day responded, "for what?" She expressed the same sentiment to



President George W. Bush when he telephoned her June 22, so the President told her it was for her two careers as an entertainment icon and for her animal welfare and public service work.

Day declined to collect the medal in person during a ceremony in Washington D.C. on June 23, citing a fear of flying.

According to Day's publicist, the President told her he is also an "animal person," and she used that opportunity to tell him about her home in Carmel Valley, her "four-leggers," and the pet-friendly ways of this community. Day co-owns the Cypress Inn in Carmelby-the-Sea, a hostelry which serves canine snacks and welcomes dogs to stay in rooms with their human companions.

Day shares the 2004 Presidential Medal of Freedom honors with 11 other distinguished individuals from a range of fields. Her fellow honorees include Pope John Paul II, golf champion and Pebble Beach Co. co-owner Arnold Palmer and Gilbert M. Grosvenor, chairman of the National Geographic Society.

When the Medal of Freedom was established in 1945 by

Cal-Am open to desal competitor

While Cal-Am and a north county water district debate the merits of their competing desal proposals, monitoring for toxic materials at the proposed site for one of the plants is already underway. Seven test wells to monitor groundwater contamination have been dug at property in Moss Landing owned by By PAUL MILLER

HIS COMPANY hopes to have a pilot desal plant operating at the Moss Landing power station by the beginning of 2005, but Cal-Am's Monterey division general manager, Steve Leonard, said this week he is open to the possibility that a desal plant on property owned by Nader Agha across the street might be a better option.

"We're moving forward, but if somebody else's project has a greater chance of success or can be done cheaper or smarter, we will get on board with that," Leonard told The Pine Cone. "I'm not a hidebound guy, and I'm always looking for new ways to do things."

He was responding to a story in last week's paper quoting Agha as promising that a plant on his land, which he has leased to the Pajaro-Sunny Mesa Community Services District for construction of a large desal operation, would produce "twice as much water at less than half the cost."

"We've met with Nader three or four times, and I enjoy our conversations," Leonard said. "In fact, we've heard his proposals in greater detail than he laid out in the news story."

He said that while Agha's cost estimates "sound interesting" — according to Agha, \$78 million to tear down a large complex of machinery at the old National Refractories brick works in Moss Landing and build a 20,000 to 30,000-acrefoot desal plant — Leonard demurred when asked what the price tag would be for his company's desal plant.

"We've been vague on cost for a lot of reasons," he said. "Our first obligation is to make good on the state's 1995 order to reduce pumping from the Carmel River by 10,730 acre-feet. Beyond that, we're not going to supply any more water than the people of this community say they want."

In a series of meetings with mayors, city councils and representatives from the board of supervisors, Cal-Am officials have been given rough production goals for a desal plant. "But if a city changes its mind about water for build-out, or somebody doesn't want water because it's too expensive, that

WATER BOARD RAIDS RESERVES TO BALANCE BUDGET

Directors decline to raise fees

WATER DISTRICT directors disagreed over how much money they should add to their 2004/2005 annual budget last Monday night, but they ultimately voted 5-2

to divert more than \$1 million from reserves to boost their budget to \$4,719,300.

Acting on a recommendation from its administrative committee, the board decided to spend \$140,000 for an Environmental Impact Report on injecting Carmel River water into the Seaside aquifer for storage and recovery.

"I am passionate about trying to find a project," director Michelle Knight said after board chairman Alvin Edwards made his motion to add the EIR costs to the budget. "Whether we're involved in a larger project [such as a Moss Landing desal plant] or not, this is a project we're working on - something we've shown we're committed to."

But not everyone agreed an EIR would be the wisest use of the public's money.

Director Dave Potter, who represents the county, recommended first looking for other agencies to help pay for the aquifer storage and recovery project. He also said many

Two car nuts tackle 4,000-mile Great Race in Fabulous Fifty

BY THE time Carmel residents Denny Paul and Andrew Spranza arrive at Custom House Plaza in Monterey Saturday, they will have traveled 4,000 miles, through thunderstorms and over mountain passes, in a 54-year-old Ford convertible.

The two are competing in the Great Race, a timed rally of vintage cars traveling from Jacksonville, Fla., to Monterey, using mostly two-lane roads. The goal is to complete each of the 14 stages as close as possible to the target time, which never requires drivers to exceed

Water conservation takes effect; PUC considers rate hikes

As CAL-AM Water Co. prepared to ask for a rate hike — which will be discussed at two public hearings in Monterey July 2 and considered by the California Public Utilities Commission July 8 — the general manager of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District enacted Stage 3 conservation measures last week, which can mean fines for "water wasters."

At a water board meeting June 21, outgoing GM Fran Farina said the district will begin enforcing water-cutting rules for most residents, businesses and cities within its

The move should help Cal-Am rein in production and avoid exceeding the stateimposed limit when the water year ends Sept. 30. Failure could draw up to \$3 million

in fines that would likely be shouldered by cus-

"What you are dealing with really is a fingerpointing issue," Farina told The Pine Cone Tuesday. If Cal-Am makes its best effort to get the community to cut back but still exceeds the limit, it can then ask the PUC for permission to pass fines on to ratepayers. If the company doesn't provide adequate

Steve Leonard, a Cal-Am vice president and the Monterey Division general manager, said the company is now 97 acre-feet above its target and needs to make up 328,000 gallons per day.

If each of its 40,000 customers cut use by a few and the larger users by a few thousand gallons the fines could be avoided.

"It isn't all that much a day per user," Leonard said. "Water use on the Peninsula is so finely tuned, there's not much give in it, but that doesn't mean there isn't any give."

The company's public outreach so far has not cut water use much, so Cal-Am will ask the PUC July 8 for permission to raise rates for its biggest consumers golf courses, public authorities and businesses with a lot of landscaping — and residents who go well over their allotments. Some would see their per-unit costs double or triple, and the rate hike would automatically end Nov. 1, when winter rates return. The extra revenues would be refunded to conscientious water users, according to Leonard.

The company is now auditing big users. At a house in Pebble Beach, Cal-Am found water use ranged from three units in the winter — about enough for a couple — to 172 units (128,656 gallons) in June, most of it for landscaping.

"We focus on big irrigators, because if they give back a little, that's still a lot of water," he said.

Leonard met Tuesday with area golf course super-

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
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Jewelry store robbed at gunpoint

A MAN with a gun forced a saleswoman to the floor at Kerry Lee Inc. Wednesday afternoon, cleaned out a display case and left with an unknown amount of jewelry, according to Carmel Police Detective Buck Melton.

"He entered the store and had a conversation with the saleswoman about rings and diamonds," he said. "Then the subject pulled out a gun, ordered her down behind the counter, went around the counter, pushed her to the floor and emptied one of the cases.

"Right now, it's undetermined exactly what he took and how much he took."

No one else was in the store when the robbery occurred around 2:30 p.m.

The robber was last seen fleeing on foot up San Carlos Street, cutting east through the courtyard between Fifth and Sixth

avenues. The clerk and the alarm company notified police, according to Melton, and Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance paramedics also responded but found the clerk was uninjured.

The saleswoman described the suspect as a slim, white male in his late 20s or early 30s, 5 feet 10 inches tall, with light hair and freckles, and wearing a tan baseball cap, a light-colored shirt, pants of an unknown color and light-colored shoes. He used a dark-colored handgun and might have been carrying a gray duffle bag.


Officers searched the city and notified other area law enforcement agencies but turned up nothing Wednesday.

Man cited for brandishing fake gun blames reckless driver

POLICE ARRESTED a 54-year-old Carmel resident late Sunday night after a driver reported he brandished a handgun during a minor road rage incident on San Antonio Avenue. But Dennis Zarrow said he should have been the one to call police after the reckless driver prompted his reaction. His gun turned out to be a convincing fake.

"The BB gun that the officers took as evidence is very realistic looking," said CPD Detective Buck Melton, who was called by on-duty officers that night because they believed they were pursuing an armed suspect. "They are made to look like a mini of the European-style handguns these days, such as Heckler & Koch and Glock.'

Melton called the replica pellet guns "extremely dangerous" because they could easily be mistaken for real firearms and cause someone to shoot.

Officers arrived at Zarrow's home shortly before midnight June 27 after a motorist told them the driver of a black fourdoor Mazda had pointed a gun at him. The motorist, who admitted trying to keep Zarrow from passing him on San Antonio Avenue because he thought the man was driving too fast, noted the Mazda's license plate number when Zarrow finally got around him, according to the detective.

Melton said officers confronted Zarrow at his home and the man admitted brandishing the weapon, saying, "It was a dumb thing to do."

Later Zarrow told The Pine Cone the other driver and his passenger were "a couple of punk kids who almost ran me off the road." As he was driving on San Antonio, they pulled in front of him and then wove slowly in and out of the oncoming traffic lane when he tried to pass them. On his second effort, he made it by. "They were very reckless. It was a situation where I had a pellet gun on the front seat — I had been at target practice — and I flashed it."

Zarrow said he stopped the driver and demanded an apology, but he and his passenger smirked in response.

"It wasn't like they were really mean, but they were stupid because they assaulted me with their vehicle," he said. "They were playing games on the road."

When police arrived at his home after 11 p.m., Zarrow said, he was handcuffed and taken to the department but later allowed to leave rather than spend the night in Monterey County Jail. "They said they appreciated how I was cooperating," he said.

Zarrow was cited for brandishing the gun, a misdemeanor, and is set to appear before a judge in August. He said he hopes to have the opportunity to challenge his accusers in



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

New water district general manager named

A CITY of San Ramon manager will run the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, the board decided last week, when it voted 5-2 to sign a \$125,000 contract with David Berger. He will assume the role July 12 as the fourth G.M. at the district in four years.

"I realize this is a critical moment," Berger told the board last Monday, after outgoing general manager Fran Farina announced she was enacting Stage 3 conservation measures to curb water use. "I'm looking forward to working with all of you and all the staff."

Currently the interim economic development director for San Ramon, Berger has worked in senior management positions in the public and private sectors for the last three decades. He was city manager for five California cities and also worked as vice president of a water engineering and

environmental services firm, according to a press release prepared by Berger and MPWMD board chairman Alvin Edwards. He holds a bachelor's degree from UC Santa Barbara and a master's degree from California State University Hayward. Residing in Piedmont and married for 30 years, the Bergers have two daughters, one living in Redondo Beach and the other attending CSU

As general manager, he will "plan, direct, manage and oversee the activities and operations of the MPWMD, including administrative services, planning and engineering, [and the] water resources and water demand divisions; coordinate with other agencies and organizations, and provide highly responsible and complex administrative support to the board of directors," according to his job description, which also lists 17 "essential functions" ranging from handling particularly unhappy citizens to developing the longrange water supply plan. In return, taxpayers will pay Berger \$125,000 plus bene-

fits, until Jan. 1, 2005, when he will receive a \$7,000 annual raise if the board decides he's doing a good job. A \$300 monthly automobile allowance, reimbursement of moving expenses, three months' temporary housing expenses at \$1,500 per month and deferred compensation are included. His two-year contract can be terminated early with six months' notice.

Berger replaces Farina, who was hired after Ernie Avila quit in March 2003. Avila replaced Darby Fuerst, who bowed out in 2000 to resume his current role as senior hydrologist.

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

President Truman, Day had already achieved fame as the singer of the iconic World War II hit, "Sentimental Journey." She entered films in 1948, and from that year until 1964 was listed among the top 10 box office attractions, the longest run of any female star in motion picture history.

Day also starred in two television series. "Doris Day's Best Friends" from the mid-1980s, shortly after she moved to Carmel Valley in 1979. A

press conference announcing the series at The Lodge at Pebble Beach turned out to be the final public appearance of her film and TV co-star and friend, Rock Hudson.

Today, Day's full-time career is her work with animals. The Doris Day Animal League, founded in 1987, lobbies for animal welfare legislation at local, state and federal

levels. The Doris Day Animal Foundation, established in 1998, promotes protection for

animals through educational and community outreach programs. The foundation's Spay Day USA is responsible for a landmark 1 million spay/neuters, helping to reduce euthanisia.




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
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
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


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CARMEL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE GETS INNOVATIVE

IN AN effort to do more with less, the Carmel Chamber of Commerce is hoping to free up its very small staff by recruiting volunteers to work in the visitor center.

"We need to serve more visitors more quickly, especially in the summertime, so we are trying to get up to speed as quickly as we can," said executive director Monta Potter.

People who know a lot about Carmel, would enjoy sharing information with tourists and could commit four hours a week are encouraged to apply.

The most common questions from visitors involve directions — especially to places like the Hog's Breath and public restrooms - recommended restaurants and hotels, and activities around town.

The volunteer work would begin Aug. 1 and might include events outside the visitor center as well. Potter said one or two volunteers with cars could deliver the "Guide to Carmel."

"We have a limited budget," Potter said. "But we need to do more. We want to do more."

To that end, other projects are in the works, including possibly opening a better located visitor center separate from the chamber's San Carlos Street office above the

"We are also looking at buying a cart, like an apple cart, so that somebody could be on the street and give out information," she said.

The city forbids blocking sidewalks, so locating the cart could be tricky, but Potter said the chamber and the city have been discussing possibilities.

"If there's a way to do it, I think they will try to help us," she said. "They understand we're in this together, and we have to get more visitors and serve them better."

A plan aired earlier this year to develop a Monterey-Salinas Transit trolley route through town still has potential, though no one has figured out how to pay for it. The chamber is researching clean-air and trafficcongestion-relief grants that could help foot the bill.

In addition, a company that specializes in

chambers of commerce websites is redesigning the Carmel chamber's site to be more eye-catching and feature specific events. Advertisers will be offered space at the bottom of the page when it is relaunched in mid-August.

In the 10 months since she was hired, Potter said she has learned a lot but has not vet managed to accomplish one of her goals: visiting every business in town.

"There are almost 500 businesses, and it's taking a while because I stop and talk to people," she said. "Eventually, I will meet every-

Carmel Valley residents don't support taking water from the river and injecting it into the Seaside aquifer.

"Let's pool our resources rather than spend money on an EIR that may go nowhere," Potter said.

At the urging of former water board member Molly Erickson, directors Judi Lehman and Kristi Markey proposed spending another \$160,000 to complete the EIR on a small Sand City desalination plant. The board shelved that study earlier this year, after it had already cost taxpayers more than

"If you don't pursue this, you're voting against the one viable project you have," Erickson said during the public comment period. "I urge you to walk your talk and fulfill your mandate."

The board majority rejected her argument, but Edwards successfully fought for the aquifer storage and recovery study funding.

"If it's not going to have money for an EIR on ASR, I'm not going to vote for the budget," he threatened.

After Potter made the motion to adopt the budget including \$2,585,200 in personnel costs, \$554,500 for services and supplies, \$1,029,400 for projects and the remainder for fixed assets, equipment, the Ryan Ranch office purchase and contingencies — Edwards offered a substitute motion including the \$140,000 for the EIR, which passed 4-3. The change brought the amount left in reserves to \$2,119,700.

The board then voted 5-2 on the full budget, which had been reduced by \$1.4 million since the first draft was released in April. Markey and Lehman dissented.

More money

During his discussion of the revenue side of the budget, chief financial officer Rick Dickhaut said the district has continued to lose property tax money to the state and stands to lose more over the next two years. According to Dickhaut, the district has missed out on \$4,855,114 million in property taxes since the state began shifting them to the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund in 1992/1993.

In response to flagging revenues, Dickhaut said the board could increase the current 7.125 percent user fee, charge a per-acre-foot "water distribution system fee" for the 15,285 acre-feet produced each year by Cal-Am or impose an "unlawful pumping fee" on the water company for the 7,909 acre-feet of illegally pumped Carmel River water.

With a 5 percent increase in the user fee, a \$100-per-acrefoot water distribution system fee or a \$200-per-acre-foot unlawful pumping fee, each option would generate between \$1.3 million and \$1.5 million for the district, according to Dickhaut, but he did not recommend the board adopt any of

Tex Irwin of the Monterey Peninsula Airport District pointed out that no part of the user fee pays for capital projects. Of the fee, a little bit more than 6 percent pays for mitigation efforts, while the remainder goes toward conserva-

"If you raise fees, it goes to mitigation and is not solving the problem," he said.

Nonetheless, Lehman suggested increasing the user fees by 2 percent or 3 percent, "to augment the budget and keep some of these projects online and moving forward."

Potter questioned how such an increase would affect the district's already dismal reputation.

"Support for this district is marginal on a good day and nonexistent on an average day," he said. "We need to show users we're not going to force them to pay for more bureau-

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


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

50 mph and includes three breaks, according to Paul, who owns the Fabulous Fifty that he is navigating and Spranza is driving. They are visiting 46 cities along the way.

The competition comes down to seconds, and the rules are strict. Failure to honor a stop sign is grounds for disqualification. A speedometer, clock, stop watch and directions are allowed, but no odometer, maps, computers or global positioning system.

"In order to hold an accurate overall time, they don't tell you how long it's going to take or how far you're going — just what speed to go and what direction to take," Spranza explained before the race began. "And if you go that speed and that direction, you will get there at the right time. Last year, after 4,100 miles, the winner was only 54 seconds off the target time."

Participating in the Great Race is a first for the men, both longtime car nuts who met when Spranza — an expert restorer of highend British cars — began working on Paul's collection, including the Ford.

"He mentioned he'd gotten the invitation and was wondering if it was too late to enter. He was hemming and having," Spranza said. Having already received his own and put it through the shredder "so it didn't tempt me," Spranza found himself offering to be Paul's partner in the cross-country race.

The following day, Paul asked if he was serious, but Spranza needed to check with his wife, Vicki, first.

"I asked if it was OK, and she said, 'When are you leaving?'" Spranza said.

Under the hood

The Fabulous Fifty convertible is one of a half-dozen collector cars in Paul's "garage with a small house attached" in Carmel Highlands. He bought it after leaving the high-tech industry in Silicon Valley to retire to the Peninsula with his wife, Dani.

"The Ford goes back to my college days," Paul said. At Cornell, he drove a 1949 Ford coupe. "I got married in it, went to school in it and brought our first child home from the hospital in it." He sold it and moved to California, but always longed for another.

He found his heart's desire in Oregon a nicely restored 1950 Ford convertible and fell in love. The body was near perfect, but Paul rebuilt the engine and electrical system. It's the most reliable car in his stable that meets the Great Race's 45-years-orolder age requirement, and it sports race number 41 — the year Paul and Spranza

To compete with more than 90 teams vying for \$260,000 in cash — and not get stranded along the way — Spranza and Paul prepared carefully. They removed the cylinder heads in search of a suspected leak; replaced the head gasket, springs and seals; pulled out the drive shaft, and installed "the biggest fan that would fit under the hood."

You drive, I'll direct

Deciding who would navigate and who would drive was not an issue. Spranza's auto rally experience includes the Panamericana, a reenactment of a 1,165-mile Mexican road race. Three times he drove a 1959 MGA, and he once served as *copiloto* in a Porsche.

With a finance and management background, Paul is "a numbers man and brilliant," Spranza said. "He's so well organized that it just dictated he tell me where to go, how to get there and when."

The men are doing some wrenching on the road — changing the carburetor in Colorado to adjust the car's fuel-air mixture for 11,000-foot elevations in the Rockies.

Instead of the 90-minute job of rejetting, they spent 10 minutes swapping the carburetor with one already jetted for high altitude.

He reported from the road June 26 that the local Ford shop in Colorado Springs generously provided lift space so he could service the Fab Fify, while Spranza worked on another team's 1957 Bentley.

"They also treated us to their employee Saturday free lunch and handwashed our cars, all at no cost to us," he said in an email. "Really nice people."

Work along the way is not uncommon.

"A lot of the guys are working on their cars all evening," every evening, Paul said. "Cars built in the '20s and '30s were not made to go those speeds at those distances."

Entries range from a 1909 Lozier Model J to a 1959 Cadillac convertible that weighs a hefty 5,000 pounds, and Paul said the older vehicles "were meant for dirt roads and had a 35 mph top speed."

Before they left, the men checked the forecast and found it was 91 degrees with thunderstorms — "perfect weather for a 1950 Ford" — and Spranza predicted,

"roasting, sunburns, leg cramps, just a heck of a lot of fun and great camaraderie."

Paul reported Saturday they were leaving the heat behind for the comfortable Rockies, but not before they had learned the trick of traveling in nasty weather.

"The thundershowers keep staying with us, mostly in the afternoon. At speed with the

windows open and the back window down, we get almost no water in the car."

As of Wednesday, Spranza and Paul had finished the 11th stage of the race in Elko, Nev., 40 seconds off the pace and in 35th place in their class. They are set to roll into Monterey July 3 for a celebration at Custom House Plaza.



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
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CHP to man holiday DUI checkpoints



intendents, whose water rates would triple, to remind them of the need to cut back.

If approved by the PUC next week, the rate hikes will not affect most residents, unless they use more than 150 percent of their allotments.

An administrative law judge will preside over the July 2 public hearings at the Portola Plaza Hotel in Monterey at 2 p.m. and 6 p.m., and comments will be used by the commission when it votes on the request July 8 in San Francisco. Cal-Am representatives and the PUC's independent Office of Ratepayer Advocates will also attend.

Water cops

Farina said residents have been doing a good job of alerting the district or Cal-Am to water wasters, such as those spraying down sidewalks or letting water run down

"Everyone cares about water here, and we appreciate that cooperation," she said of those who blow the whistle.

During Stage 3 conservation, residents, businesses and city governments caught wasting could be fined by the district.

Examples of nonessential water use that must now be cut are: restaurants serving water except on demand,

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watering outdoors between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. (except professional gardeners) by means other than drip irrigation, hand watering or car washing without a shutoff nozzle, and spraying off buildings, sidewalks and driveways.

Properties on the odd-numbered side of the street, or on the south or west sides of streets without numbers, may be watered only on Saturdays and Wednesdays between 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. Even-numbered properties, or those on the north or east sides of the street, may be watered Sundays and Thursdays only. No one may water, except by drip irrigation, on Mondays, Tuesdays or Fridays.

Carmel City Forester Mike Branson said seventy percent of the city's irrigation is served by drip systems, but some areas — Devendorf Park (the only park with turf) and portions of Scenic Road, Sunset Center and First Murphy use low-flow sprinklers that run in the early morning a few times a week. Much of the landscaping features native, drought-tolerant plants.

"The nice thing about drought-tolerant plants is that if you give them a little water, they look better, but if you cut back, they go into survival mode and will still look good," he said. "And you haven't lost your big investment."


Desal bill moves ahead

In Sacramento, Assemblyman John Laird's bill requiring the PUC to study the feasibility of providing cheaper energy to desalination plants passed through the Senate Energy, Utilities and Communications Committee this week and is headed to the Senate Appropriations Committee.

According to Laird staff member Bill Maxfield, AB 2918 received the committee's approval late June 29 with amendments allowing the PUC greater flexibility in analyz-

ing its energy and water policies as they relate to desalination. The commission would consult with the California Department of Water Resources, the State Water Resources Control Board, the California Department of Fish and Game, the energy commission and the coastal commission, and then report its findings to the governor and the Legislature by Jan. 1,

Meanwhile, Laird's bill allowing state approval and/or funding of an MPWMD project only if it would at least make up for over pumping of the Carmel River and provide 750 acrefeet of water for affordable housing has yet to be considered by a Senate committee. That bill, AB 1300, would also strip the district of its rights to develop water projects if the board has not authorized one by Jan. 1, 2010, though the district would retain its permit authority and its conservation and mitigation pro-

could make a significant difference in the price for everybody else," Leonard said. And while a Tuesday meeting with officials from Duke Energy, which owns the Moss Landing power plant, was "very productive," the price of energy to remove salt from seawater is a big unknown. Leonard said there were just too many other variables to pin down costs now. "We're talking about a lot of other facilities in the Cal-Am system to distribute the water — pipelines, pumping stations, filtration and aquifer injection. Comparing the costs gallon-to-gallon just doesn't work at this point."

Marc del Piero, lawyer for the Pajaro-Sunny Mesa service district which provides water for communities in North County, said his agency is in the process of selecting a consultant to write an Environmental Impact Report for the desal plant it wants to build on Agha's property. He added more details to the cost projections.

"These are subject to change when we go out to bid, but we are figuring between \$70 million and \$80 million to prepare the site and build the plant, plus \$40 million to \$50 million to construct a pipeline to the Monterey Peninsula, and another 20 to 25 percent on top for attorneys, consultants, mitigation costs and right of way," del Piero said.

One of the mitigations is already under way.

"We are drilling seven test wells around the National Refractories site to monitor groundwater contamination," said Sam Bose, an engineer working for Agha. "While the primary material to make the bricks was magnesium oxide, which was precipitated from seawater, chromium-6 was used in part of the process until 1984 and is considered a toxic material in the State of California.'

Small amounts of the metal are present in the groundwater under Moss Landing, he added, "but we're not sure where it came from — it could be from National Refractories, it could be Duke Energy or it could be natural."

The chromium-6 isn't a problem because it's all in the

ground and, because of seawater intrusion, nobody uses that water for anything — not for drinking, not for irrigation, not for anything," Agha said. "But anyway, we decided to investigate a way to clean it up."

The test wells will measure contamination at various sites on Agha's land and detect changes as huge machines are torn down at the old brickworks to make way for the desal plant.

"Whatever contaminants may exist above ground, we'll be taking them out," said Bose.

One of the potential problems Agha inherited when he bought the 200-acre National Refractories property out of bankruptcy court late last year was a 10,000-ton pile of chrome ore that had been there for more than 60 years.

"The federal government bought it in 1943 and stored it to use for armaments in World War II," Agha said. "But they didn't do anything with it, and they weren't paying rent to store it. So I told them, 'Come and get it or you have to start paying,' and they took it out right away."

Another large quantity of the ore, which now belongs to him, has value for manufacturing, Agha said. "We're negotiating right now to sell it to the Chinese, so I hope they'll buy it and we'll ship it to China."

An old landfill on the property was given a clean bill of health by the Environmental Protection Agency in the 1980s. "We can use it for a parking lot," Agha said.


Meanwhile, Leonard said a Spanish company, Pridesa, which is also owned by Cal-Am's parent company, RWE, is designing and constructing the pilot desal plant that should be in operation in Moss Landing next year.

trailers," Leonard said. "We need to test our techniques in the particular circumstances of Monterey Bay.'

And he said he took no umbrage at Agha's observation that "greed and egomania" could get in the way of solving the Monterey Peninsula's water shortage.

"We're here for the customers, and if we're a bit less optimistic than he is, it's just because we believe in taking things one step at a time," Leonard said.









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


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DO SCREW CAPS on wine bottles retain freshness and fruit character and allow more consistent aging than natural or synthetic corks? Following a four-year study, Jordan Ferrier, research enologist at Hogue Cellars, Prosser, Washington, determined that they do. Based on his study, Hogue will bottle its entire line of 2004 Fruit Forward wines, representing 70 percent of the winery's production, using Stelvin screw caps and Saranex liners. Hogue is the first winery to scientifically analyze the effects of various bottle closures and share its findings with the industry. Ferrier presented the winery's extensive study on June 30 at the 55th annual American Society of Enology and Viticulture Conference in San Diego.



IT LOOKS like the Magic Circle Center has another hit on its hands with "I Hate

Hamlet." This witty frolic is chock full of over-the-top characters whose verbal and physical athletics keeps the audience on its





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The six actors joust their way through a script bursting with zingers, puns and truisms as one of them faces opening night playing the Prince of Denmark in a Shakespeare in the Park production.

Inspired while living in the Greenwich Village apartment once inhabited by John Barrymore, Paul Rudnick wrote this play featuring the legendary actor as the latest in a long line of Hamlets to coach a woebegone successor in the difficult role.

Richard Boynton dominates the stage in the role of Barrymore, flaunting his theater magnetic voice and confident bearreview ing with aplomb. It's difficult to watch anyone else when he is pre-

sent, as his character guides the action to suit his plans and pleasures. His interaction with each of the others reveals that Barrymore is possibly more self-aware as a ghost than he was as a man.

Tim Hart as Andrew, the television star recently returned to NYC from Hollywood, demonstrates the range of his talent in one of his finest performances since he arrived on the local theater scene. He is onstage for almost the entire play — first agonizing over his situation, then frustrated at his lack of decision, and finally, enlightened with the recognition of his choices and his ability to make them.

Jane Press is spot on with her sharp rendition of Felicia, the New York real estate broker complete with born-in-the-Bronx accent. Her "bits" with hair, nails and mirror ring oh so true as she assures Andrew she is very familiar with outdoor productions of Shakespeare.

At the other end of the spectrum,

Deborah Curtis is perfect as Andrew's overly dramatic girlfriend. Still a virgin at 29, she's saving herself for her husband and waiting to marry until she finds the perfect man. Her flighty and theatrical Deirdre floats around the stage, uncertain of which romantic heroine she ought to play next.

Roo Hornady anchors the proceedings as Andrew's Germanic, no-nonsense agent, Lillian. An elegant presence, she is the quietest character in the play until we find out that she, too, has come under Barrymore's spell, albeit 40 years previously.

Then, just when we've settled into what we think the play is all about, D. Scott McQuiston arrives

as the Hollywood type to make Andrew an offer he can't refuse. He takes over the stage completely, reminding everyone "It's Shakespeare right? It's like algebra on stage."

Director Suzanne Sturn has brought out the best in her multi-talented cast, using creatively every inch of the wonderful gothic set designed by Laura Coté. And behind the scenes is a one-woman show starring Leslie Krautkraemer as stage manager, lighting designer, light and sound operator, scenic artist, costumer and prop master. You go,

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
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Families well served by this 'Sound of Music'

"The sound of Music," currently playing the Outdoor Forest Theater under the auspices of the Forest Theater Guild, warms your heart if not your toes. Under the stars and under a blanket, it's a perfect family

When it opened in November 1959, the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical was labeled as oversweetened lebkuchen by

theater major theater critics. review wrong when they made it

a long-running play and a megahit movie. And they aren't wrong now as they fill the hard seats at the Forest Theater, enjoying an evening's wholesome, melodious entertainment.

This story of an Austrian family of seven children and their widowed father, Captain von Trapp, who falls in love with the governess, Maria, is familiar indeed. The book is based on a true story, and while the musical ends with the von Trapps' dramatic escape from Austria, the real family made a good living in exile. The von Trapps now operate a Vermont ski lodge. This is pertinent to Carmel audiences because the Forest Theater Guild is raffling off a vacation at the lodge, with tickets offered for \$20 during intermis-

This production artfully balances performers ranging from experienced professionals with resonant voices to children so



small they have to walk through a leap frog number. Thanks to intuitive direction by Phyllis Davis, the hesitations and slight glitches made by the youngsters are natural and appealing, not over-directed.

This adroit direction extends to a scene where Liesl von Trapp, played by Sara McChesney, and her Hitler Youth boyfriend, Rolf (John David Whalen) sing a duet. They are self-conscious and not quite in harmony. But it works. They are, after all, teenagers and the song, "Sixteen going on Seventeen,"

is about adolescent love.

Superior singing prevails

The best voices carry the evening. Maria, played by Gracie Poletti, is the complete professional — graceful and talented. Stephen Poletti commandingly fills the role of Capt. von Trapp. They are married in real life and son Cameron plays the youngest von Trapp.

Rosanna Charles, as Mother Abbess, brings down the house, or in this case the sky, when she sings "Climb Every

Phyllis Davis interprets the part of Baroness Elsa Schrader well (slightly scheming, self absorbed). But the most effective bit of stage invention in the Elsa portrayal must be credited to the costume designer, Adrianna Wellisch. She dresses Elsa in a clinging cocktail dress and mink stole. That stole emphasizes the 1930s time frame, when fur was an international icon for affluence. The remaining costumes are pallid. The sailor suits the children wear need to be more realistically military to affirm von Trapp's affinity for raising children with regimented discipline until Maria enters his life.

Sets by Carey Crockett are appropriately baronial but colors chosen for the background are cumbrous, not in tune with the light-hearted music.





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






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Editorial

Ready for a solution

ALMOST 10 years after the State Water Resources Control Board declared most of the Monterey Peninsula's water supply illegal — and even longer since no-growth activists came up with the idea of using a water shortage to bring development to a halt without the bother of compensating property owners for taking away all use of their land — there are finally signs that new water will start flowing from local taps in the not-too-distant future.

This wouldn't necessarily be a welcome development if the Monterey Peninsula had permissive zoning rules, as other parts of the state have. If Carmel Valley, for example, were zoned for quarter-acre lots, apartment buildings and mini-malls, or if downtown Pacific Grove were zoned for a slew of high-rise apartment buildings, a water shortage would be viewed by most people as a necessary evil to preserve local scenery and quality of life, even if it meant depriving property owners of their rights.


But the land-use policies of the county and the cities of the Monterey Peninsula were long ago made so restrictive they eliminated any possibility of ruinous, urban-style development. (So strict are the rules that what passes for "controversy" in the current general plan debate is whether minimum lot sizes in most of the county should be 40 acres or 10 acres — both of which are a country mile from "urbanization.") With very few exceptions, the only thing people can do on their land these days is minimal development with due respect for the environment and the sensitivities of their neighbors.

Thus, the decade-old water "shortage" has outlived its usefulness. Meanwhile, with the threat of drought looming, and talk of big fines for wasting water on the front page of every newspaper, this community has made up its mind that it wants a reliable water supply.

That's why the question now being debated in Salinas, Sacramento and the headquarters of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District is no longer whether the people of Carmel, Pacific Grove, Monterey and the rest of the Peninsula will get new water, but how much? And who will supply it?

Suddenly, instead of the boring old dam, we have two utilities competing to build a desal plant. And whether the winner turns out to be the Pajaro-Sunny Mesa project on Nader Agha's property, or a Cal-Am plant somewhere else, the people of this community are ready to put their water problems behind them. Unless somebody like the California Coastal Commission gets in the way, we may actually be seeing the water at the end of the pipeline.

Give pines room to grow Dear Editor,

Regarding the theft of pine trees from Sunset Center: The city should consider not planting any pine trees at all. Healthy young pines should have a Christmas tree shape with a bushy, dark green needle-covered branches. Pines age gracefully, becoming majestic, bold, old soldiers with great character, reaching heights over 100 feet — but not if they have to compete for sunlight and water. Carmel's pines have to search for

water under paved streets and driveways and compete with other trees for sunlight, and as a result many are scraggly, misshapen, diseased and flat ugly. Too many are having a bad hair day. If that last tree at Sunset Center survives it will eventually break up the wall and sidewalk while searching for water with its shallow root system.

If the pines along Highway 1 north of Carpenter Street had been thinned to a spacing of 50 to 75 feet, we would now be looking at some beautiful, healthy trees. Ditto for the trees which sprang up along the Holman Highway after the Pebble Beach fire. These trees, like those in Carmel, need open space.

The city would be well advised to encourage property owners to remove any pine which is not a vigorous, healthy specimen with room to grow. Drive along that section of San Antonio, south of Ocean where, on the east side of the street, there are very few large trees. The sun pours in, it's bright and open, and the gardens are in full bloom. The city of Carmel should let a little more sun shine in.

Sewer rates increase July 2

RESIDENTS AND business owners in the Carmel Area Wastewater District will begin paying more for sewer services Friday, the board of directors decided 4-1 June 17. Based on higher operating costs at the sewage treatment plant, rate increases range from .05 percent for dentists to 21 percent for supermarkets — the smallest and largest changes among 20 business categories. Residential rates will increase 4 percent, to \$276 per dwelling.

The rates reflect estimated wastewater flow, biochemical oxygen demand and the amount of suspended solids in the wastewater, according to CAWD General Manager Ray von Dohren.

"Those three things are what we're basically treating to get the water cleaned," he said, adding that energy use is the major expense of making wastewater usable for irrigation. At this time of year, all the treated water goes to Pebble Beach golf courses.

Wastewater from restaurants, laundries and supermarkets costs more to clean than that flowing from homes and retail stores, according to von Dohren.

"This process is one part calculation, one part experience and several parts wisdom and finesse," von Dohren said. "It is never perfect, but we try to develop rates that are fair and reasonable for the vast majority."

Because the district sets its rates using estimates, a business can argue for a change based on actual water use. In addition, rates sometimes change due to "intangible factors," such as financial hardship or the economy. Last year, the district eased rates on hotels and restaurants because tourism was slow, according to von Dohren.
