"I HOPE to see 100 angels walking around." Peninsula resident John Krasznekewicz isn't talking about the divine kind, necessarily, but individuals who will

step forward to help Youth Music Monterey survive.

By launching The Angel Network, the Youth Music Monterey board hopes to raise \$50,000 to support its youth orchestras, which teach classical music to 320 students from all over the county. The nonprofit was hit with a 40 percent

drop in grants and gifts last year.

RIPPLING RIVER **ACTIVIST JOINS BOARD** OF HOUSING AUTHORITY

■ Bilek will help oversee \$500,000 in emergency repairs

WHEN RIPPLING River resident Merri Bilek talks about her busy schedule, it is easy to forget she's an amputee who needs a wheelchair to get around.

As president of the Rippling River Resident's Association, Bilek has led her friends and neighbors in the four-year struggle to save their homes in Carmel Valley after county housing officials said they should be torn down. Rippling River eventually needs \$2.7 million in repairs. More critically, nearly a half-million dollars worth of work must be done by Dec. 7 to satisfy an insurance deadline.

The soft spoken but determined Bilek, 43, now has been asked by county supervisors Dave Potter and Edith Johnsen to join the very agency she campaigned against. Bilek's appointment to the board of the Housing Authority of the County of Monterey will become official Tuesday, according to Potter's office.

Bilek is also president of the nonprofit Friends of Rippling River, a community outreach group, and teaches Sunday school at the First Presbyterian Church of Monterey. The housing authority post comes on top of her involvement with so many committees, sometimes she has trouble remembering them all.

"I was surprised when I was nominated by the board of supervisors, but I felt that it was something I have the skills for and I believe I can make a difference," she said.

City budget in the black

Spending cuts more than balance shortfall

SINCE ITS leaner \$10.95 million budget took effect July 1, the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea has taken in less money than anticipated — \$27,000 below target for the first quarter — but it also cut spending by more than seven times that amount, city administrator Rich Guillen said Nov. 2.

Standard & Poor's recently sent a letter confirming the city's A+ bond rating due to a "stable outlook of the city's finances," Guillen told the council before breaking down the numbers. "I think that speaks well of council's and staff's actions during the last budget go 'round."

\$17K cleaning contract to unlock library restrooms

THE CITY council's resident punster, Gerard Rose, couldn't resist letting a few fly Tuesday night, when the council voted to pay a custodial company almost \$17,000 a year to clean the restrooms at Harrison Memorial Library.

"Is this a contract in lieu?" Rose asked, eliciting sighs and guffaws from fellow council members and the audience.

In all seriousness, Harrison Memorial Library Director Margaret Pelikan reported her board of trustees has received complaints ever since the custodian was laid off and the restrooms locked up after the 2004/2005 city budget took

"This situation posed an adverse effect on the public since there is a high volume of resident and visitor use," Pelikan

and building official Tim Meroney wrote in their joint staff report to the council. About 9,000 people visit the library every month — 6,000 use the main branch at Ocean and Lincoln, and 3,000 use the Park Branch at Sixth and Mission.

Signs directed patrons "across busy streets" downtown to public bathrooms in First Murphy and Devendorf parks, which created safety concerns, according to Pelikan and Meroney.

She contacted Servicemaster, the company that cleaned the restrooms whenever the city's custodian was on vacation or sick, and learned it would cost \$16,800 to have the main branch restroom cleaned four times a week and the Park Branch restroom cleaned three times weekly. The city would supply toilet paper, hand soap, towels and other materials.

Appeal halts tree removal project in Big Sur

AN APPEAL to the California Coastal Commission has stalled a plan to remove more than 4,000 nonnative trees and shrubs from Julia Pfeiffer Burns State Park and replace them with about 3,500 native plants.


Friends of the Big Sur Coast and Joseph Schoendorf filed the appeal Oct. 8, halting the project at least until the commission's January meeting in Los Angeles.

In the fall of 2002, state parks workers removed more than 1,000 trees, including 358 eucalyptus, from a hillside overlooking the park's famous McWay Neighbors said an EIR — or at least a permit — should have been required due to the risk of damaging seacliff

Council accepts foundation's help in Forest Theater renovation

m T}$ HE FOREST Theater Foundation can raise money and work out plans to repair the famous but aging theater, the Carmel City Council decided Tuesday.

"Our sole purpose is to preserve and enhance the Forest Theater," foundation president Walt deFaria told council members Nov. 2.

To that end, the foundation proposed combining architect Brian Congleton's 2001 Forest Theater Master Plan — which called for ADA upgrades and other repairs estimated to cost \$400,000 — with a study by R.F. McCann & Company evaluating improvements to lighting and sound, backstage areas and the logistical needs of producing live theater. The result

would be a list of needed work and a timeline, according to city administrator Rich Guillen. The Children's Experimental Theater's design plan will also figure into the mix.

'Our first goal is to raise money to do the preliminary work," deFaria said.

But the foundation wanted assurance the council would back those efforts.

"We're looking not for you to spend money, but to support us," he said, adding that the foundation would bring the matter to the council in phases,

"If everyone's happy [with the preliminary design work], we would then spend money on the next phase," he said. "We're not seeking to run the Forest Theater — we're seeking to help it."

In his staff report, Guillen reminded the council that although it had designated rehabilitating the Forest Theater as a top priority, it did not budget any money for the work.

Gas line break evacuates downtown apartments

Construc-TION WORKERS accidentally hacked through a 1-inch natural gas line while digging trenches at a Fifth Avenue construction site Nov. 1, requiring a brief evacuation of nearby apartments while Pacific Gas & Electric workers patched the leak.

Two businesses on the north side of Fifth were unoccupied, according to Carmel Fire Engineer August Beacham, and guests and workers remained inside a hotel next door. People in the hotel

were advised of the leak by police officers, who closed off the street and handled the evacuations, but they were not required to leave the area. Carmel Police Corporal Steve Rana reported at the scene that about eight people were temporarily evacuated.

Beacham's nose told him something was amiss before the emergency call came in to the fire station a block away.

"I walked outside about two minutes before the call came in and could smell" the

Two PG&E workers quickly worked to shut down and patch the natural gas line that was broken by construction workers Monday. Although the line was small, the leaking gas could be heard, seen and smelled in the surrounding area before repairs were made.

Within five minutes, PG&E workers arrived on scene and got to work stemming the flow of gas.

Beacham said the pipe construction workers broke while digging on the site of the former General Store restaurant was a service feed — a relatively small line, compared to the mains.





"I hear a collective sigh of relief," Rose commented after Pelikan finished her report.

When councilman Erik Bethel asked how she selected Servicemaster, she replied that she did not put the proposal out to bid because the vendor and the city already have a working relationship.

"I thought it would be a good budget number since we've used them in the past," she explained.

But Bethel said a request for proposals should have been issued to find the best price. "To a very large extent, we're custodians of the people's money," he said, apparently not intending the pun. "And I think it's imprudent of us to spend for something without putting it out to bid. That said, I think we need to open the restrooms."

Asking for bids would have taken too long, according to Guillen.

"From the library board's standpoint, we should have done this a month ago," he said, adding that issuing an RFP would delay the process

of hiring a custodian and reopening the bathrooms by several weeks.

"We'll sharpen our pencils for next time, but I recommend you go ahead," he said.

"This gives a whole new meaning to RFP," Rose quipped before the council voted unanimously to pay Servicemaster \$1,400 a month to clean the restrooms, which should reopen to library patrons next week.

PASTOR GLEN Fisk tried retiring once.

"They gave me six months' salary and benefits, and I couldn't stand it," he said, so he went back to work.

And this time, when Fisk retires as visitation pastor of Carmel Presbyterian Church Nov. 14 — four days before his 80th birthday — he won't really be leaving, either.

"I will continue to attend the church, to do weddings and memorial services, and to serve on the platform [leading prayer] when requested," he said. "I'll let the two pastors know I'm available in case they need me. It won't change a whole lot, but I can draw up my own schedule."

Fisk, who lives in Pacific Grove with his wife, Bettie, is fond of saving, "God's retirement plan is out of this world." In other words, he'll serve his flock for as long as he's able.

Go Navy

Fisk discovered his true calling to preach while serving in the U.S. Navy during World War II, when he had been a Christian for less than a year.

Wherever I went, I would start little Bible studies with fellows who were interested," he recalled. "And the skipper of the ship asked me if I wanted to be a minister one day. I was 19 and said, 'Yes, I think I do."

He applied for a transfer to the mainland to study, but the chaplain training quota was filled, so he was assigned to a

But that commission turned out to be a happy accident.

"That's where I met Bettie," he said, and three weeks later, they were engaged.

Since I was a child, I wanted very much to be a pastor's wife, so God was very good to let me," Bettie said. "I was a preacher's kid, so I knew what it was all about."

Fisk served overseas for seven months — during which the two wrote each other daily — before leaving the Navy in 1946. They were married by her father in Inglewood, after which Fisk attended San Francisco State University and then Fuller Theological Seminary, graduating in 1953.

He presided over his first two churches — one Hawaiian and one Caucasian — on the island of Kauai.





travel around the world. And it's probably one of the most racially diverse programs on the Peninsula."

Krasznekewicz, whose 13-year-old daughter and 9-yearold son play violin and cello with YMM, is passionate about the group and director Larry Granger.

After learning YMM could close for lack of finances, Krasznekewicz stepped forward to become an Archangel a \$1,000 donor. As of Monday, his group had raised \$20,000 and enlisted 30 angels, leaving another 70 donors to recruit.

These are people who love music but also love children," he said. "And getting children involved in classical music is critical for this community."

With the mission "to provide high-caliber opportunities and incentives for young people to enrich their lives and benefit the community," YMM has two orchestras — Youth and Honors — with 120 students ages 8 to 20 from 35 Monterey County schools. Musicians of all levels audition for the orchestras, practice Wednesday evenings at Monterey High School and perform four concerts a year. They also play in an

annual concerto competition. Mentors help them " see that they, too, can conquer their instruments," according to YMM, which tries to make up for nonexistent music in the schools.

"They just cut the music program right out of the Salinas school system, and the program in the Monterey Peninsula Unified School District has been devastated," Krasznekewicz

Students pay \$500 to attend the YMM program, with the nonprofit covering the remaining \$1,000 it costs per musician. Krasznekewicz is confident benefactors will recognize the importance of the program beyond the concert hall.

These kids who have stuck with music turn out to be leaders in the community," he said. "They go off and do great

YMM students are frequently admitted to top universities and play in principal positions. Some have pursued music on a professional level, and a statewide Bach competition in Berkeley featured five YMM musicians among 20 winners.

"This is a strong, rich music program in a small community," he said. "And they're not sitting in the back — they are competing for first chair positions."

He said the program also helps create and perpetuate interest in classical music, which benefits venues like Sunset Center. Krasznekewicz — not a musician himself, though he is attempting to learn the mandolin — said his children attend about 15 performances a year, often selecting concerts

in which their instruments are featured.

He credited director and orchestra conductor Granger, who has led the group for 11 years, with much of YMM students' success. His presence provides much-needed continuity, according to Krasznekewicz.

"I'm so touched by the dedication of Larry Granger," he said. "I'm a teacher myself [of an economics class at York School], and I'm so impressed when I see a great teacher."

Krasznekewicz hopes new angels will soon step forward to help Youth Music Monterey continue its efforts. In exchange for their \$500 donation, angels receive a silver pin, preferred seating for two at a concert and invitations to special events and post-concert receptions. Archangels who contribute \$1,000 receive the above, with preferred seating for two to all concerts, attendance at an Archangel appreciation event and a concert CD.

He hopes a party in a Pebble Beach home Nov. 12 — featuring live performances by young musicians — will attract new Angels and Archangels. Those interested in donating are invited, and anyone who wants to see the orchestras perform should plan to attend their next concert, "An Afternoon of Romantic Music" with guest cellist Sharon Bogas, at Sunset Center on Sunday, Nov. 21.



"From what I've heard, this guy's a really good con man and can talk a line," Wheelus said.

(During the same transaction, a fourth Ford was purchased but was returned by Shapiro's stepson in Fresno before it had been reported stolen, he added.)

Handicap placard clue

The stolen Thunderbird was found by Carmel Police Officer Rachelle Lightfoot Oct. 25, after an innkeeper telephoned police about a guest he feared would rip him off, according to CPD Detective Buck Melton.

The name furnished by the innkeeper belonged to Gale McMullan's deceased husband, Ron McMullan, but a handicap placard hanging from the Thunderbird's mirror belonged to Shapiro, according to Melton.

"We ran a history on him and got a half-inch-thick rap sheet," the detective said. "This person was famous for these kinds of things."

But Shapiro was not in town, having apparently chartered a limo to San Francisco and then, still using McMullan's name, checked into St. Francis Memorial Hospital.

Neither Melton nor Wheelus could say what illness or

injury their suspect has, but Wheelus said Shapiro had also written bad checks for in-home medical care and other healthcare services in Monterey County.

Wheelus also discovered Shapiro was out on parole for similar offenses. "I called his parole officer, and he had a world of information Wheelus said. already," "There were numerous checks he'd written - they were passing paper all over Monterey County."

With the help California State Parole Agent Robert Comstock and CHP officers, Wheelus learned the two other stolen vehicles were at a Hemet home. The Richardsons were taken into custody there Oct. 27, questioned and released pending further investigation, according to Wheelus.

Bad checks have continued to surface, he said,

including \$470 written to a Monterey business and \$400 to a Crossroads store. Salinas P.D. is handling the fraudulent check case at the Ford dealership.

Upon his release from the hospital in San Francisco, Shapiro was arrested by San Francisco P.D. and remains in custody for violating parole, according to Wheelus. Warrants for the Richardsons and McMullan have been issued, and he



HOWARD C. "KIP" NIEMAN, JR., a former longtime Carmelite who was appointed to the Carmel Planning Commission by then-mayor Clint Eastwood and also represented Carmel before the water board in the development of the Ryan Ranch project, died Oct. 15. He was 46.

Born in Berkeley, Nieman was a 1976 graduate of Carmel High and earned his B.A. at Claremont Men's College.

He was a futures and commodities trader who was also passionate about local government and frequently contributed letters to the editor and opinion pieces to The Carmel

In 1987, Eastwood praised Nieman's work on the Mayor's Advisory Committee, stating he'd done an excellent job as chairman. "He's the kind of guy who gives 190 percent to what he is doing," Eastwood told The Pine Cone at the time.

Nieman stated, "In this city, I don't think we have held the developers to a very high standard and that's not the way to get good development."

The following spring, he ran for Carmel city council because it offered "a new and interesting challenge." He came in third in that race and announced in April, 1988 he would resign from the planning commission for personal rea-

Nieman served as treasurer for Voice of Carmel, a private nonprofit group that commissioned a series of surveys to gauge the opinions of Carmel residents.





Barn owls and predatory wasps help Heller Estate go green

IF YOU were to take a stroll in Carmel Valley's Heller Estate vineyards, you might hear snores rumbling from a dozen boxes placed throughout the 100 acres of grapes.

The snores — along with loud hissing and long, drawn-out whistles — are audible characteristics of the gopher-eating barn owls that are nesting in vineyard boxes at Heller Estate during the day and patrolling the premises at night.

Gophers thrive under vineyards and play havoc with vine roots, and barn owls thrive on gophers.

According to viticulturist Gilbert Heller, who led an investment group in 1994 to buy the former Durney Vineyards, the damage caused by gophers doesn't just injure the plants, but can destroy them.

To counteract the burrowing creatures, Heller installed the owl nesting boxes in the vineyard, which produces only certified organic wine grapes. Utilizing natural methods of grape production has been a 10-year commitment by the Carmel Valley winery, and the barn owls complement these efforts by eating gophers and voles.

Providing nesting boxes for the barn owls will eventually increase the vineyard flock. Even before the baby barn owls are big enough to catch their own dinner - from nine to 12 weeks of age when flight feathers develop — parents increase their catch to feed the voracious babies. Nesting barn owls can eat their weight in food every night. Females weight about 24 ounces and males up to 20 ounces.

Nocturnal hunters, barn owls possess wings designed for silent flight, and their highly developed sense of hearing enables them to hunt in total darkness. They fly low over the ground in search of prey.

Barn owls are whitish or pale cinnamon birds with upper plumage of buff or rust. They have striking white, heart-shaped faces and 44-inch wingspans.

In its continuing dedication to organic

farming, Heller Estates utilizes no chemical sprays to rid the vineyards of undesirable insects. Instead, tiny predatory wasps have been released among grapevines to eat the eggs of leaf hoppers and mites. Happily, the tiny wasps do not bite humans.

To provide a home in the vineyards for these natural predators, viticulturists have planted French prune trees in which the wasps flourish.

Organic farming has been given priority at Heller Estates, which has led to it being certified 100 percent organic, a California certification shared by few vineyards.

To receive this certification, the vineyard must adhere to prescribed organic

farming methods. That is, not using pesticides or unapproved organic chemicals for insect control; eliminating herbicides for soil management; using organic matter left after the crushing and pressing of grapes, the lees, to enrich the soil, and controlling weeds by







Cork in fine wine bottles may go the way of the automobile crank

m ICTURE\,THIS:\,A}$ beautifully attired young woman and her impeccably dressed, but nervous escort, peruse the menu in the pricey restaurant where reservations were made a month in advance. It is a big night. Unknown to and unsuspected by the woman, she is going to receive a marriage proposal during dinner.

The order is taken with the discrete wine steward hovering in the background, awaiting the right moment to open the 1997 Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon from PlumpJack Vineyard, an Oakville, Napa Valley winery partly owned by philanthropist Gordon Getty. (At retail level, the wine sells for \$135 a fifth; restaurant markup can be as high as three times retail.)

The sommelier, white linen cradling the bottle, proffers the wine, label up, for his patron's approval, then steps back and unscrews an aluminum cap from the wine. The young

woman is not aghast. This is a knowledgeable couple, with wine savvy. They know that screw caps are "in" for technological reasons.

The airtight seal of this not-so-elegant closure is regarded by winemakers as superior to corks, which held sway in the vintner's trade for some four centuries. But for the past 15 years, alternate bottle closures have made tentative forays into winery bottling areas where frustrated winemakers fought a continuing battle with contaminated corks that result in tainted wine. It has been said, in the wine press, that one out of 12 bottles is "corked."

Synthetic corks, conglomerate corks, corks with end disks, crown caps and now screw tops have been tried and all but the screw top has been found lacking.

Forget the mystique of pulling the cork from the bottle. Forget the ritual of showing the cork to the wine drinker — just unscrew that aluminum cap with its Teflon film seal that allows 50 percent less oxygen transfer than a sound cork - and pour the wine.

Nearly gone are the days of splitting a cork with the cork screw, of bringing on a double hernia attempting to pull a synthetic cork from the bottle. Well, not quite gone, because only a few premium wineries have switched over to screw caps to date.

Bonny Doon Vineyard, north of Santa Cruz, was the pioneer in the field, screw capping their Big House Red and Big House White, but are now contemplating capping all their wines.

Bernabe de Luna, wine director of Highlands Inn Park Hyatt, Carmel, suggests that the perception of wine by customers is all important. He doesn't believe the time is yet ripe for screw tops among oenophiles who frequent Pacific's Edge restaurant "For me, it's personal," he said, and he personally doesn't like screw tops for high end dining rooms, except for wine by the glass, in which case the patron doesn't see the bottle. He was surprised to hear that Chicago's fourstar restaurant, Everest, is serving 1999 Sonoma-Cutrer Founders Reserve over \$100.

The Old Bath House, one of the most chic and highly regarded restaurants in Pacific Grove, has as its director of operations, Dorothy Maras-Ildiz. She told The Pine Cone her

Point Lobos continues to inspire, this time via book

ANSEL ADAMS, Edward and Cole Weston — and thousands of amateur lensmen — have taken photos of Point

Lobos' incredible, wild beauty.



Big Sur and Monterey Bay, can never be taken for granted, even by the most world-weary among Central Coast residents.

Monica Hudson and Suzanne Wood have collaborated in singing a paean of thanks for its magnificence in "Point Lobos," another book put out by Arcadia Publishing's "Images of America" series.

Hudson, who resides in Point Lobos and is a former interpreter for California State Parks, and Wood, a docent at Point

Lobos, have put together a pictorial history of this special area with more than 200 vintage photographs and detailed text.

Two families predominate in the book, Allan and Kodani, whose lives were researched by the authors in the local history archives of Carmel-by-the-Sea and Monterey public libraries and from family records. The patriarchs of both families were partners in the The Point Lobos Canning Company, which harvested, processed and canned abalone. There is reproduction of a Monterey brand canned abalone label with legible

recipes for abalone soup, salad, croquettes, chowder, fritters and cocktails. Whaling was a going industry, too, and flensing of blubber from the huge carcasses took

place at Whalers Cove before chunks of whale skin and blubber were dumped into blubber pots for rendering.

A.M. Allan, who bought the Point Lobos property in

1898, found he could charge 50 cents to visitors by putting up a gate, which was overseen by his children.

Celebrities, artists, writers, poets and movie stars all came to Point Lobos, and over the years, paintings, books, poems and films have all recorded its exquisite beauty.


Also, it is obvious she could count on highly favorable coverage by news organizations such as CBS and the New York Times. Equally obvious: She really wants to be president.

Don't punish galleries Dear Editor,

As the debate continues regarding the good and proper number of galleries an art destination should have, the city council passed Urgency Ordinance #2004-05. But let's look at a seemingly unrelated but significant economic issue in the Carmel landscape: the high number of second homes and part-time residents who have taken the place of yesteryear's fulltimers. Now our local shops are suffering, closing and leaving gaps for other retailers. Is there a business type that is somewhat responsible for this negative turn and should Council put a cap on them so as to maintain the essential economic mix? That business might be real estate brokers and investors.

Due somewhat to the successful efforts of real estate businesses, gone are the affordable homes that bohemian types bequeathed the city. Gone are the houses that service people (that guard our reputation for service) can afford. Should the council put a cap on real estate brokers and investment companies? It would never happen. And yet, real estate has had more to do with the economic mix in Carmel than the character of retail establishments in town. Which brings me to my conclusion. Let's not punish the ESTAB-

LISHED galleries that make Carmel a unique destination or stopping point, that have consistently brought hotel and restaurant business, clothing and antique business, liquor sales and entertainment dollars and that keep a vital link to the creative, bohemian, non-ordered joie de vivre that makes this the amazing paradise other cities can only

To increase revenues for more local services, don't tax your revenue providers; rather, invest in improving image and facilities. The tourist dollar, with its multiplier effect, is the most valuable you

can earn. So earn it.

buckwheat, the host plant of the endangered Smith's blue butterfly. Also, the steep hillside where the work was done is highly susceptible to erosion.

Their complaint went to the board of supervisors, which decided Sept. XX that state parks could proceed with the tree removal after paying a \$15,000 permit fee.

Gary Pike, spokesman for Friends of the Big Sur Coast, explained why they appealed that decision to the coastal commission.

"State parks has no erosion-control plan and no specific plan for habitat restoration, and there is no proof they will provide any of these plans before cutting down more trees," he said, adding the county should carefully monitor further work, because state parks can't be trusted.

"If any private citizen did what they did, they'd be sitting in jail right now," he argued. "Why should state parks be exempt from compliance with county, state and federal laws that are supposed to protect the environment?'

Pike also objected to the after-the-fact permit issued by the supervisors, and the reversal of an earlier decision to impose a penalty for starting work without a permit.

"How can you have faith in elected officials if they make a unanimous decision in one direction and then two weeks later they make a unanimous decision in another?" he mom are undertaking this adventure to raise attention and money to help other people injured by accidents, and I wish them all the success in the world.

said. "What happened in those two weeks?"

Pike described the area adjacent to the tree-cutting as "one of the most beautiful and pristine coves in the world." Initial work two years ago expanded views of the waterfall from a nearby trail, but felled trees and debris now litter the hillside.

Dave Schaechtele, spokesman for state parks, doesn't believe his agency did anything wrong. He said state parks has provided a resource management plan, a forest management plan, an erosion control and monitoring plan of the cleanup.

"We've complied all along," he said. "The county initially determined that a permit wasn't needed. Upon further review, it was determined that a permit was needed. We weren't trying to get away with anything."

Schaechtele said it is unfortunate that the project is now at a standstill.

"Once we were asked to stop working, we couldn't retrieve the trees we already cut," he said. "There's nothing we can do. We have about 3,500 native plants, included coastal sagebrush, black sage and coyote brush, that are ready to be planted. Now we'll just have to wait and see what the coastal commission does."

"If the commission determines that the county permit raises no substantial issues, then work can proceed according to the county permit," said coastal commission planner Rick Hyman. "But if the commission decides there is a substantial issue, then it will make its own decision of what can and cannot happen."

FIREHOUSE REMODEL PLANS REVEALED



PRELIMINARY STRUCTURAL drawings for the Carmel firehouse retrofit could be ready for review within a month, architect John Thodos told the city council Tuesday. He also distributed floor plans calling for new rooms and an elevator but no changes to the outside of the 67-year-old building.

"These plans are preliminary — kind of like a shot across the bow," Thodos said, explaining that Portland architect Ivars Lazdins' drawings estimated how much space might be needed for the kitchen and sleeping quarters.

The drawing include relocation of the downstairs restroom, removal of some walls and addition of others to convert two existing offices into storage and emergency medical services. Upstairs, the kitchen/dining room would be enlarged and a fitness room added at the rear of the building. Steel bracing and connectors would be installed inside to shore up the walls, according to Thodos.

A curious addition is the elevator, which Thodos said the council could decide to keep or eliminate. While making the firehouse accessible to the handicapped may seem silly since the public is not invited into the living quarters and there are no disabled firefighters, city administrator Rich Guillen later told The Pine Cone he would recommend keeping the elevator in case the building is ever sold or used for something else.

"This is not a major remodel," Thodos said. "I'm trying to serve the needs of the fire department and will meet with staff to go over the pros and cons of the preliminary idea," and refine the plans accordingly.

The structural work needed to make the firehouse safe during an earthquake "is not as onerous as we would have thought," Thodos said. "It's a very stout little building

and has gone through some shakes."

After the preliminary structural drawings are submitted, he said, it would be prudent to get a rough idea of the project's price tag.

"We have found in our office that costs in the last year have drastically changed," he said, particularly the soaring price of steel. "[We should] have someone we respect look at the drawings and give us a fair idea of costs. I don't think they will be prohibitive, but you don't want to be surprised."

A group of women calling themselves the Carmel Fire Belles has raised more than \$30,000 by selling calendars, but has so far been unsuccessful in convincing the city to accept the cash.

IF YOU were really bothered by recent news stories about cats being trapped in fumigation tents — and if you want to make sure something like that never happens at your house there's a brand-new home on Carmel Point that you may want to buy.

Framed entirely with steel, yet with an old-world, handcrafted appearance that fits perfectly in its surroundings, the home at 2579 14th Avenue is "vermin proof," according to its designer, Michael Bolton of the Bolton Design Group.

Because there are no wooden beams or studs, it will never need to be tented for termites.



With first-quarter revenues anticipated at \$1,099,873, the city's actual income was

\$1,072,763. It received more property taxes, state vehicle license fees and income from its properties than expected, but on the negative side, sales tax took the biggest hit, coming in \$79,647 below the firstquarter target of \$471,023.

Guillen cautioned against worrying about the drop in income, blaming the state's "triple flip" and anticipating the numbers will recover by midyear.

"Basically the state is taking away a quarter cent sales tax from the cities and then to backfill that, it's tak-

ing property taxes from schools and giving it to the cities, and then it's reimbursing schools through the state's general fund," he explained. "When we put the budget together, we weren't sure if the state would take that quarter cent, and they did."

Wages, insurance costs dip

On the expense side, salaries and wages dropped \$230,891 below the budgeted \$1,357,111 for the first quarter, with an accompanying decline in employee insurance costs. The city also spent less than anticipated on contract workers and purchased fewer materials and supplies.

But the city had to pay out more vacation time to laid off and retiring workers than planned — \$136,734 as opposed to the budgeted \$15,000 — and workers' compensation premiums also came in \$73,234 higher than the budgeted \$106,875. Guillen said the vacation payments to former employees should taper off since those laid off were paid when the job cuts took effect

in July 1, but he had no rosy forecast on workers' comp costs.

"Workers' compensation costs continue to rise, and rise, and rise," he said. "It doesn't matter if you're in the public or the private sector."

> On the expense side overall, Guillen said, "We have a surplus of \$204,041. That much on the plus-side in the first quarter is good news."

But the layoffs have also had their downside, as staff members take on more jobs. Police chief George Rawson, who now also runs the fire department, asked the council to sign a \$16,666 10month contract with Pacific Grove to share administrative services.

"For a number of reasons, it makes sense to reach out and get some

help," said Rawson, who has no formal training in the fire service and has spent months trying to learn while still running the police department. "The [Pacific Grove] fire chief can bring wisdom and knowledge that can help me determine how to fine tune some things."

Rawson said he could also use P.G.'s help to "evaluate, audit and identify particular problems/deficiencies," such as tracking and enforcing fire safety violations by businesses and residents, and bulking up the number of firefighters paid by the call. A decade ago, Carmel Fire could call upon any of 38 volunteers; that number has since dwindled to 10.

"Finding new paid-call staff who reside in or near Carmel will not be easy, due to the high cost of living," he said. The department can meet minimum requirements with its small pool, but recruiting more is a pri-

PGFD would also provide duty chiefs as needed if CFD is shorthanded during an

emergency, according to the contract. National firefighting guidelines dictate that a duty chief — also known as a battalion chief or duty officer — should be on scene at every serious incident, such as a fire, car crash, natural disaster, or gas or electric emergency. Carmel Fire has three battalion chiefs on call.

Rawson praised the CFD staff for welcoming him.

"I look forward as director of this department to working with these individuals," he said. "There are very talented people in this organization, but I do need some help.'

Standing in for an ill P.G. Fire Chief Andrew Miller, P.G. Division Chief Jim Gunter said the agreement would enable his agency to help Carmel.


"It's not Chief Miller's intention to come over and change Carmel Fire Department in any way," he said. "It's to look at and enhance the great potential you have."

No members of the public commented on the proposed contract, and the council unanimously approved it.

Parking help

The council also discussed how to get its newest revenue generator on track. Machines should be installed this month to collect \$2 an hour or \$14 per day to park a car in the north lot at Sunset Center and \$10 an hour for buses to park up to three hours alongside Carmel Plaza, but the city needs to find someone to monitor them.

On Tuesday, the council considered paying National Parking and Valet 35 percent of gross receipts or \$56,000 per year to patrol the lot and bus parking between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m., issue monthly parking permits, maintain the machines and collect the money on behalf of the city.

As an alternative, Guillen suggested hiring another Carmel P.D. parking officer to monitor the pay-and-display parking at a

A representative from National suggested the council did not realize the complexities of implementing pay-and-display parking and argued in favor of its proposed 60month contract.

"I personally would like to try this in house for a while to see how it works," councilwoman Paula Hazdovac responded.

Councilman Gerard Rose countered, "The biggest budget buster is employees. The more we can avoid hiring more employees, the city is better off."

The council agreed Guillen should try to negotiate a lower rate with National for a one-year contract.

Citing the apparent \$17,000 difference between the city's estimated costs and National's bid, Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud said, "I don't want to see us spend any more money on this."

Does Bilek ever feel buried by so much

responsibility?
"I attend several meetings a week and I have a tremendous amount of paperwork to organize," she said. "I try to keep everything in perspective and not get overwhelmed. Anything I do that helps others I do with pleasure and enjoy very much."

If Bilek's schedule seems daunting, consider the extent of her disabilities. She lives with a full-time attendant. She suffers from reflex sympathetic dystrophy, which swells her hands and causes severe pain. And she is afflicted by lymphedema, which causes abnormal swelling of the extremities.

As she described her disabilities, a Rippling River resident passing by added, "She also has a heart of gold." Bilek smiled at the compliment.

"In whatever I do, I give my whole heart and soul," she said.

Bilek has a bachelor's degree in journalism and public relations, and a master's in computer-based education from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. A native of Salinas, Bilek moved to Rippling River 10 years ago after a rent increase drove her out of Pacific Grove.

"Rippling River is a community of residents who work together as a family rather than 65 separate individuals," she said. "It's a blend of people with outstanding talents and skills.'

In her role as spokesperson for the residents of Rippling River, she tried to bridge the communication gap with the housing authority.

"We've had difficulties working with them in the past. It's important that the residents have a sense of what's going on around here. The housing authority previously received numerous calls from residents. But the questions are now filtered through me."

While Bilek's neighbors have provided her with a sense of family, she emphasizes the importance of her parents' role in her

'My parents are a very important part of my life," she said. "They don't hesitate to tell me how much they appreciate what I've done. It's made a big difference to have their support. They've been the rock in my life when things seemed to be falling apart.

Bilek's physical challenges have tempered her natural optimism only slightly.

"I'm not optimistic that the diseases afflicting me will get better and leave, but I'm optimistic about what I can do and what I would like to do if I am given the opportunity," she said. "I believe I can do what doctors and therapists believe is not possible."

With her own support system in place, Bilek's focus is on supporting others, particularly her friends and neighbors at Rippling River. Although her financial resources are quite limited, she donates all of her time.

'Money can be such a distraction," she said. "Making money is not my priority at this time. It can be a challenge, but I wouldn't want it any other way."





"That's the way they were doing it then," he said. "I tried to get them to merge, but they didn't think it was a good iden"

Later he moved to minister for seven churches on the Kona Coast.

"One of my big thrills and my only claim to fame was in 1961, when Dr. Billy Graham and his wife came to Kona," Fisk said. Graham had to cancel a crusade in Australia due to throat problems and was recovering on the island, when Fisk encountered him on a walk and invited him to preach.

"He said, 'I'll be there to hear you preach tomorrow," Fisk remembered. Sure enough, he spied the Grahams in the congregation.

"And the next day, the Honolulu Advertiser had on its front page: 'Congregational minister preaches to Billy Graham.'" The clipping is a treasured memento.

The couple returned to California in 1964, preaching first in Santa Rosa and then at Mayflower Presbyterian Church in Pacific Grove for eight years. They then opened a counseling center in Medford, Ore., a timber town suffering

from a poor economy.

But the Peninsula pulled on them again, when Cypress Community Church's founding pastor, Wayne Adams, called on Thanksgiving in 1984 to ask him to minister at the new church.

It was in 1990 that he first tried to retire but instead found a new calling at Carmel Presbyterian Church, handling weddings, memorial services, counseling and morning prayers. For most of his time there, he also served as adviser to the Board of Deacons.

Throughout her husband's ministry and their marriage, Bettie Fisk has worked alongside him. Eleven years ago she started a women's Bible study at the church and sang in the choir.

"And I try to always be available to Glen. His ministry is first, so I go wherever he wants me to be," she said. "That's been my joy. He's been so easy to get along with, and it's pretty good I can say that after 58 years."

The past three weeks have been hard work for Bettie: She has spent almost every moment in a hospital room at her husband's side as he struggles with a recent diagnosis of lymphoma.

He's undergoing chemotherapy, and she said the doctor is confident Fisk can attend church services in his honor Nov. 14 at 9 and 10:30 a.m. Refreshments will be served between the two services. Carmel Presbyterian Church is located at Ocean and Junipero in Carmel-bythe-Sea.

Fisk said he plans to thank the congregation and the church leadership for the times they have shared.

"I just want to express our appreciation for the privilege of serving with such a wonderful congregation in such a beautiful community," he said. "We love the Monterey Peninsula more than we loved Hawaii, even though our fond memories there will remain."

Following his "retirement," the Fisks hope to explore more of the United States and visit their three daughters, seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.



He recommended council members support the Forest Theater Foundation's proposal to seek grants for the design phase.
