Trash collector wins hearts, aching backs in Big Sur

IF YOU live on the Monterey Peninsula, you probably don't know the name of your garbage collector.

But in Big Sur, if you ask locals the name of the man who hauls away their refuse, you will quickly discover that Mario Para has earned the affection of an entire community — people who supported him in his darkest hours.

"People down here are different," said Para, who has worked as Big Sur's garbage collector since 1978. "But I guess I'm different too, so I fit right in."

A resident of Castroville, Para has found a second home on the world-famous coast.

"The Big Sur community has sort of adopted me," said Para. "I feel very fortunate to be embraced by them the way I have. They make me feel very welcome."

For more than a quarter-century, Para has successfully

SKY-HIGH PRICE DOESN'T FAZE WATER BUYERS

■ High-tech treatment plant to go online in two years

WITH ALMOST 300 Pebble Beach residents already signed up to buy water that for decades irrigated the golf courses of Del Monte Forest, officials with three government agencies announced Thursday they've reached a final agreement to build a high-tech filtration plant by the end of 2006 that will "eliminate" the use of drinking water on the greens and fairways at Pebble Beach, Cypress Point and other famous local courses.

The first phase of the water reclamation project, completed in 1994, "cut the use of drinking water from 850 acre-feet to about 300," said Dick Andrews of the Pebble Beach Community Services District.

Under the agreement announced this week, some of that saved water will be sold to private property owners, producing enough revenue to build an advanced micro-filtration and reverse osmosis plant that will cut the use of potable water on golf courses in Del Monte Forest to zero, Andrews said.

"To date, we have more than 280 contracts with residents to sell a total of 72 acre-feet of water," said Mark Stilwell,

Just in time for end-of-year tax write-offs, city seeks gifts to pay Sunset Theater debt

THE RENOVATED Sunset Center reopened more than a year ago, and performances are in full swing. Now that people have had a chance to become enraptured by the city's crown jewel, Carmel officials hope they will help pay off the \$3.45 million short-term bond used to build it.

"Since it's open and running, people think everything's

copacetic," Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud said. "Now that they've seen it, and its potential, we hope this might entice people to step forward and give for the first time or increase their gifts."

The city has almost \$700,000 in an interest-bearing account and plans to use that sum — plus whatever other funds are raised — to make its first payment on the 10-year bond next March, according to city administrator Rich Guillen.

The city took out the loan in 2001 when contractors' bids for the renovation came in substantially higher than estimated costs. After holding the bond three years, Carmel can now begin paying it off without penalties.

Getting rid of the bond would reduce the city's debt service to the roughly \$6 million it planned to shoulder before the Sunset costs climbed, and it could free up funds for deferred maintenance, according to Guillen.

"The community has helped so much so far, with people wanting to see it finished," McCloud said. "Some of those people have stepped forward, and we thank them, but we hope others will come forward, too."

She outlined the options for giving.

Of the theater's 700-plus seats, 237 remain available for naming by donors. A gift

Jewelry store robber pleads guilty

■ Charges reduced because gun was fake

KEVAN THRANOW, the 28-year-old man arrested in July for robbing a Carmel jewelry store at gunpoint, pleaded guilty Wednesday to second-degree robbery, according to Carmel Police Detective Buck Melton. He also admitted to committing grand theft at a Crossroads jewelry store in April and is set to be sentenced Dec. 16.

The pleas were entered following several months of investigation by Thranow's defense attorney, who successfully proved that while the handgun his

client used in both crimes looked real enough, it was in fact an airgun that Carmel P.D. seized when Thranow was arrested, deputy district attorney Dennis LaBarbera told The Pine Cone.

"They never really disputed the guilt aspect of it," he said. "They just wanted to get rid of the firearm allegation."

As a condition of his pleas, Thranow will be sentenced to five years in state prison, according to LaBarbera, and he must serve at least 85 percent of that time.

But Melton said Thranow may also face charges for robberies in Saratoga and St. Helena, "so he might get a couple more down the road."

The guilty plea in the Carmel case marks the resolution of one of the most important investigations in Melton's few years as CPD's detective.

Fingerprints left by the robber who stole almost \$200,000 worth of jewelry from Kerry Lee Inc. June 30 led to the surveillance and arrest of Thranow at a Capitola mall in July.

COUNCIL OR VOTERS WILL DECIDE HOTEL TAX HIKE

THE CARMEL City Council must either decide on its own to raise the hotel tax from 10 to 12 percent or put the matter before voters next year, city clerk Karen Crouch announced Thursday after the county elections department certified petitions calling for the tax to be increased. The issue will be discussed at the next council meeting Dec. 7.

Transient occupancy tax hike proponents Mike Biele, Patricia Fairbank and Jim Brun needed 442 signatures from registered voters in the city. Of the 659 submitted in October, 570 were valid, Crouch learned from Monterey County Registrar of Voters Tony Anchundo Dec. 2.

Although he received the signed petitions more than a month ago, certification was delayed because his department was busy conducting and certifying the Nov. 2 presidential election.

Second teen suspect identified in valley burglaries

ANOTHER TEENAGER was arrested last week after he sold a stolen Sony PlayStation to a Monterey store for \$27 and then turned himself in at Carmel Police Department, according to Monterey County Sheriff's Investigator Mike Shapiro. He suspects 18-year-old Ryan Scully is involved with a group of burglars that includes the 17-year-old Carmel

Valley boy arrested Nov. 19 for allegedly stealing from several homes.

The victim of the video game theft, Laurel Road resident Jerry Cornish, called the sheriff's department Nov. 24 to report Scully had stolen the PlayStation from his home and was at a Del Monte Center store attempting to sell it, according to Shapiro. Cornish had called the shop after he discovered the gaming system missing and learned from the clerks that Scully was there.

By the time Shapiro and Monterey police officers arrived, however, their suspect was gone.

The clerks confirmed they bought the game system from him, Shapiro said, adding that Scully "got a whopping \$27" for the PlayStation.

"About an hour-and-a-half later, Scully called and said he wanted to turn himself in," Shapiro said. The investigator arrived at Carmel Police Department where Scully had been detained, and questioned him.

"He admitted going to Cornish's house with the intention of stealing the PlayStation," Shapiro said, adding that he knows from prior investigations that Scully and the victim's son are friends.

"He admitted to knowing his friend and Mr. Cornish weren't going to be home the day he went to their house," he said


Cornish's younger son, a 13 year old, and a friend were at the Laurel Road home and let Scully in, according to Shapiro. "He gave the story that Mr. Cornish had left some clothes for him to collect."

The boy and his friend then left Scully alone in the home, and he walked off with the video game system, according to the investigator.

Scully was arrested on burglary and selling stolen property, Shapiro said. He issued a citation to his suspect and let

him go. Scully is set to appear in court in January.

The teen also implicated himself as a co-conspirator in the burglary of Dave Nelson's Carmel Valley Road home, according to Shapiro. After having cash stolen from his house on multiple occasions, Nelson set up a digital surveillance camera that identified a juvenile involved in a Sept. 20 burglary. Deputies arrested that suspect in downtown Carmel on Nov. 19.



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Downtown raccoon faces off with yet another dog

A RACCOON tangled with a woman and her dogs as they walked downtown last Tuesday night, according to the Carmel Police Department.

Noradele Veronis, who lives near Monte Verde and Eighth — where two other raccoon attacks on dogs occurred in October — was a block closer to Ocean Avenue walking her boxer and her Great Pyrenees around 9 p.m. Nov. 23 when the canines spied the raccoon, Sgt. Mel Mukai said.

Caught by surprise because she had not noticed the animal as it crossed their path, Veronis was unprepared when her dogs began straining toward it on their leashes.

"She fell to the ground in the struggle to restrain her dogs," Mukai said, but other than a complaint of pain, she sustained no substantial injuries.

Before it scrambled out of the area, the raccoon apparently scratched the boxer. Mukai said the dog has been quarantined.

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Man suspected of choking girlfriend, stealing her car and burglarizing her home

A 36-YEAR-OLD Carmel resident with prior drug convictions was arrested again Nov. 28 on suspicion of battering his girlfriend, stealing her car and burglarizing her home, Monterey County Sheriff's Sgt. Scott Ragan reported. Michael Owens remains in custody at Monterey County Jail for violating probation.

The victim, a female of the same age, told deputies she and Owens had been dating for about 18 months — a third of which he had spent in jail for offenses related to crack cocaine, according to Ragan.

"He was up in the Sacramento area and came back around the 24th," Ragan said. She picked him up at Monterey Peninsula Airport, and the couple returned to the Via Mar Monte residence where Owens lives with his stepfather.

"He immediately started smoking crack, and they got into some arguments over

money and his drugs," Ragan said. "He pushed her, and she hit her head on the wall. She left."

But similar altercations occurred over the next few days, according to Ragan, and she was at the home again on Sunday when another argument ensued.

"He pushed her down and choked her, and she hit her head," he said. After the scuffle, "she felt groggy, so she lay down and went to sleep, and when she woke up, he was gone and so was her car."

She got a ride to her house and was able to get inside, but she found \$500 in rent money missing and suspected Owens had used her house keys to get in and steal the cash. When relating her story to deputies that day, she also reported he had stolen \$400 from her on an earlier occasion.

In addition, Owens reportedly threatened to kill her if she dated other men and said his influential stepfather would "make life difficult for her" if she called police, Ragan said. She did not seek medical attention for her injuries.

"We put out a BOL [be on the lookout] for the guy with all these charges," he said. "He still had her car."

Seaside police officers recognized the woman's Honda parked outside the home of another man who was also on probation, according to Ragan.

Deputies and Seaside police officers knocked on the door and after it was opened, entered to search the home as is their right under the terms of probation.

"We found our guy in a bathroom at that residence," Ragan said. "He was high at the time, and we found a crack pipe on him."

Owens was reportedly uncooperative but did not resist arrest and remains in custody at Monterey County Jail on charges of battery, car theft, burglary, violation of probation, making threats and drug offenses. The district attorney's office received the case Nov. 30, according to Ragan.

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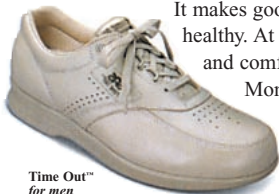
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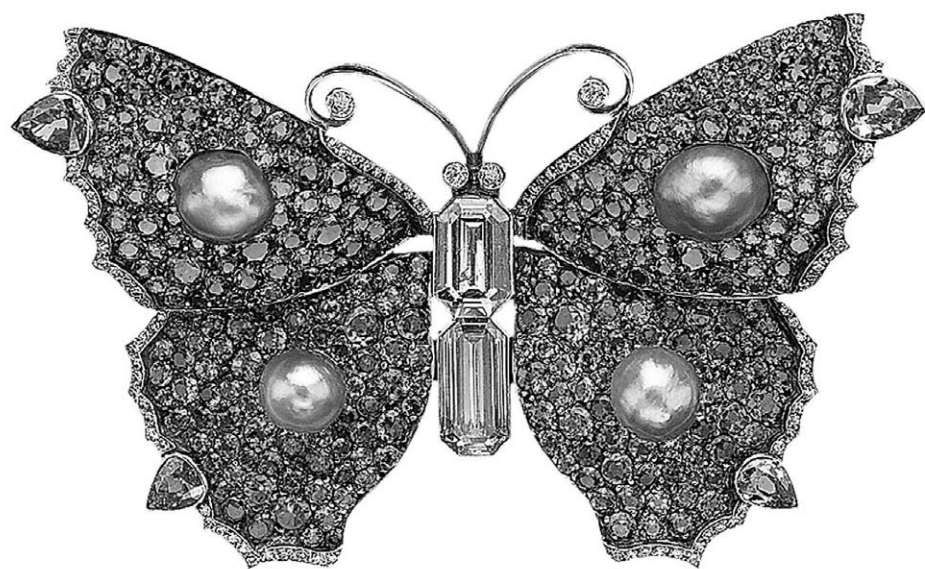
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Farr proposes 'Big Sur National Forest'

CONGRESSMAN SAM Farr's proposal to create a Big Sur National Forest could be a hot topic when the Big Sur Multi-Agency Council meets Friday at Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park.

Farr's press secretary Jessica Schaefer said there are two primary advantages to the proposal, which would divide the existing Los Padres National Forest into two separate national forests.

"First, the area would have increased access to resources," she said. "Second, because the Los Padres National Forest is so massive, budget decisions are made down in Santa Barbara for things happening in Monterey. If we had a Big Sur National Forest, budget decisions would be happening locally and that would be a positive for everyone."

Mike Caplin, president of the Coast Property Owners Association, isn't so sure that Farr's proposal would be "a positive for everyone" in Big Sur and the Monterey Peninsula. His biggest worry is that the redesignation of federal land is a step toward the creation of a Big Sur National Park, which he calls "Pac-Man National Park."

"The federal government is buying up Big Sur parcel by parcel," Caplin said.

In general, the CPOA is opposed to the federal government purchasing private property with the intention of converting it to open space.

"What concerns us is that there is a pattern emerging that the forest service continues to acquire property outside the boundaries of the national forest," said CPOA treasurer Lisa Kleissner.

Also on Friday's meeting agenda is an update on the Brazil Ranch, a 1,200-acre property located just south of Bixby Bridge. Formerly known as the Bixby Ranch and once owned by Candid Camera creator Alan Funt, the property was acquired by the forest service in 2002 and is managed by the nonprofit Brazil Ranch Institute. The ranch will host conferences, retreats, workshops and weddings.

The ranch has been the focus of criticism by neighbors who view it as another example of the federal government not abiding by the same local land use regulations that private property owners are required to follow.

"The federal government is promoting

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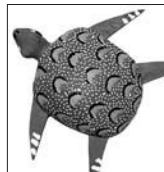

would be recognized with a small brass plaque on the arm of the seat.

A gift of \$25,000 or more earns plaques on two theater seats and listing on the board in the lobby, while gifts of \$50,000 purchase four seat plaques.

Donations of \$100,000 and up gain individual recognition.

Larger donations merit plaques throughout the center. Usually located on or near the item for which the gift paid, plaques bearing witness to the donations "for things you can't put a sign on," such as the heating and air conditioning systems, are found on a wall in the Green Room, McCloud said.

Several specific naming opportunities also remain, including makeup tables, mirrors and lights for \$100,000, theatrical lighting for \$100,000, the house curtain for \$250,000, the acoustic enhancement system for \$250,000, the proscenium arch for \$500,000 and the stage for \$1 million.

Gifts may be made in the names of other people, "and for smaller gifts, as of Dec. 1, we can take a credit card, so people can get airline miles in addition to the tax deduction," McCloud said. Donations should be made out to the city and sent to McCloud's attention at Carmel City Hall, P.O. Box CC, Carmel, CA 93921.

After it pays off the short-term bond, the city hopes to grow a small endowment that would help offset the operating costs of Sunset.

ONE OF Carmel's greatest philanthropists, Miller Outcalt, whose \$1 million donation to Carmel Foundation in 2003 was just the most well-known of his numerous gifts to local charities and churches, will be memorialized at the Church of the Wayfarer in Carmel Dec. 3 at 2 p.m. Outcalt died Nov. 16.

and-a-half days this week to verify the signatures.

With the threshold crossed, the matter must be placed on the next city council agenda, and members have three options for handling it, according to Crouch.

They can refer the matter to their staff, which would prepare a report on the potential impacts of the new ordinance and present the information to the council within 30 days, after which council members would vote on what to do.

The council could adopt the tax increase exactly as defined in the petition, which designates .05 percent of the new tax money for upkeep of the beach, parks, open space and forest; .05 percent to maintain the library, Forest Theater, Flanders Mansion and Scout House; .75 percent for the capital improvement program, and .25 percent to promote tourism.

Alternatively, the council may decide to put the matter to voters in a special election not less than 88 days and not more than 103 days from the date of the hearing. Because it allocates the money for specific uses, the initiative would require approval from two-thirds of participating voters.

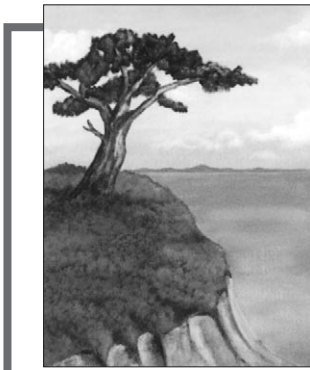
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Biele said the failure of voters in other nearby cities to approve tax hikes has already resulted in cuts in essential services, such as Salinas considering closure of its libraries.

"I'm as against raising taxes as anyone, but I think it's silly not to raise taxes when you have to have these services," he said. "Someone has to pay for them."

This particular tax would mainly fall on tourists, who would see the tax on a \$100 hotel bill increase by \$2.

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WITH BAUMAN HEADING COUNTY, REGISTRAR OF VOTERS WILL STAY

MONTEREY COUNTY Registrar of Voters Tony Anchundo, who last month led his department through the most demanding election in his 30-year career, has decided to remain on the job.

Last summer, faced with what he called "extremely difficult" cutbacks forced by the county's budget crisis, Anchundo said he might quit at the end of this year.

But when county administrative officer Sally Reed announced in July she would retire in December, Anchundo wondered if he would be included in the new administration.

After Election Day, with his main information technology specialist forced off the job by a life-threatening illness, Anchundo and his staff worked for 27 days straight — through holidays and weekends — to certify the results of the Nov. 2 vote, which had an

81 percent turnout countywide.

In the meantime, job offers rolled in from counties throughout the state, Anchundo said.

But then the board of supervisors announced Monterey County Public Works Director Lew Bauman would become CAO.

"Mr. Bauman is a man of integrity, a man whom I know I can talk to and work with, and he's respected and liked throughout the community," Anchundo said. "I met with him, and he assured me he wanted me to be part of his administration.

"But it's not about me or my salary — it's

my people, my staff — and I cannot operate unless I have the necessary resources and support to be effective," he continued. "Lew assured me things would be done the way they need to be done," including meeting complicated federal, state and local election statutes.

"I love being a public servant; I'm good at it, and my staff is great," he said. "But in order to do my job, I have to have the proper resources. It's about having the tools to make it work — my people deserve what they need to be efficient in their job."

Couple helps save fallen hiker's life

A PACIFIC Grove woman who fell 50 feet down a steep embankment on the Soberanes Creek Trail Sunday afternoon was found lying in a shallow creek by two hikers who wrapped her in their clothes and went for help, according to Cypress Fire Capt. Colin MacDonald.

"This guy came into our station and said

he and his wife found this lady in Soberanes Canyon and that she'd fallen off a cliff into the water."

State parks ranger Matt Buonaguidi was the first to hike the two miles into the canyon with the man, who led him and subsequent emergency workers to where Pat McDowell had fallen.

"The gentleman who came in, and his wife — they saved her life," MacDonald said.

In addition to MacDonald and his engine crew, an American Medical Response paramedic and an EMT, and members of the Monterey County Sheriff's Search and Rescue Team, including deputy coroner Mark Stevens and Sgt. Scott Ragan, responded.

After evaluating her condition, fire and ambulance crews loaded McDowell onto a stretcher and mounted it on a single-wheel gurney

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

garbage — braving wildfires, mudslides, fierce winter storms and tourist traffic. He said he never takes the highway for granted.

"You never know what's going to be around the next bend," said Para, who is married and has four children and four grandchildren.

In 1985, Para came around a bend in the highway near the town of Lucia to see firsthand the magnitude of the Rat Creek Fire, which eventually burned 50,000 acres.

"The fire was burning on both sides of the road," he remembered. "I rolled up my windows and just shot on through. I'm not sure they paid me to do that."

Ten years later, Para couldn't drive home after a day of collecting garbage because the Carmel River Bridge washed away in a downpour. "I had to catch a ride from a helicopter," he said.

When damage from El Niño storms closed the highway for three months in 1998, Para was forced to drive south to King City and west on the Nacimiento-Fergusson Road through Fort Hunter Liggett to reach the coast. The extended commute resulted in 16-hour days for Para. Thankfully, he was required to take the "scenic route" only about once a month because "tourists generate most of the garbage," and tourists were discouraged from entering Big Sur until extensive highway repairs were completed.

While passing through Fort Hunter Liggett, Para once had to use an Army tank crossing to drive through a flooded creek. His truck is outfitted with an extra fuel tank in case he must divert onto Monterey County back roads unexpectedly.

Courage tested

The biggest challenge Para has faced in his lengthy career as a garbage collector has not been the highway or the weath-

er, but his heart. In 1995, a clogged artery required open heart surgery and a new valve.

"I was scared, and I thought it was the end," he said. "When you have a big surgery, it really messes with your head. I would wake up in the middle of the night in tears. I was worried that I wouldn't be able to provide for my family."

Para's doctor offered him a choice between a mechanical valve and a pig's valve. He chose the mechanical valve because of its longer life span.

"I'm part mechanical now," he said. "You can hear my valve click. At first, it kept my wife awake at night."

During his recuperation from surgery, Para received support from an unexpected source — the Esalen Institute in Big Sur.

"Esalen offered me a free workshop," Para recalled. "I always wanted to learn how to do massage, but at the time, I was in too much pain. So I decided to take a workshop about courage. It changed my outlook on life. I didn't think I'd be able to open up my true feelings to others, but I did."

Para said he'll never forget Esalen's generosity.

"I really love that place," he said. "I'm hoping someday I'll be able to do something for them."

After recovering from surgery, Para returned to collecting garbage with a new philosophy.

"I look at life differently now," he said. "There is still a lot of garbage to pick up, so maybe God has a mission for me."

Para can retire with a pension in two years. But he won't stop working. Instead, he plans a second career as a massage therapist. He has been studying massage for several years and currently spends one day a week completing the requirements of Esalen's massage practitioner certification program. For now, though, he's still in the trash business. And that's OK with him.

"I'm not a sanitation engineer or whatever," he said, laughing. "I'm just a plain old garbage man."

Despite the challenges he faced collecting garbage in Big Sur, Para has no regrets.

"I have been very lucky," he said. "It's been a great ride. When I retire, I will have a lot of great memories and stories to tell my grandkids."

executive vice president of the Pebble Beach Company. "That's \$14.4 million so far."

The money is about 60 percent of the amount needed to fund the new treatment facility, which will be built at the Carmel sewage treatment plant on the south bank of the Carmel River, and upgrade a reservoir where the water can be stored. Stilwell said he is confident that enough other users will step forward to meet the \$24 million price tag.

In a joint press release, the government agencies that will receive the money and construct and operate the plant — the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, the Carmel Area Wastewater District and the Pebble Beach Community Services District — said they had engaged in "marathon" negotiations over the last several weeks to finalize the complex agreement.

"It took a long time because there's a lot at stake," said Ray von Dohren, general manager of the wastewater district. "The golf courses want guaranteed water, and we had to limit our ratepayers' liability" if there are problems with its quality.

But the final agreement apparently assuaged all those concerns and had the agencies crowing about the reclamation project's benefits for the public.

"The new plant will put about 300 acre-feet back into the Carmel River ecosystem," said water district general manager Dave Berger. "That may not sound like a lot, but you have to remember that during the last water year, Cal-Am came within 150 acre-feet of exceeding the state limit" on pumping from the river, a threshold that could bring multimillion dollar fines for Cal-Am's customers. (An acre-foot is the amount of water that would cover an acre to a depth of one foot, or about 326,000 gallons.)

"During the summer, Cal-Am runs on very narrow margins, because they're trying to protect the fish in the Carmel River," said Dick Andrews, general manager of the PBCSD. "They're on the line with us all the time, asking us to defer using water on the golf courses."

The new project, which will employ microfiltration and reverse osmosis to bring wastewater to a high state of purity, will completely eliminate the use of Carmel River water on the seven golf courses and other irrigated open spaces in Del Monte Forest, the officials said. For decades, that water use amounted to about 850 acre-feet per year — enough for more than 3,000 homes.

A 1994 reclamation project ("Phase I") was supposed to eliminate use of nearly all that water. But the recycled water had too much salt, resulting in continued use of about 300 acre-feet of potable water per year to keep the golf courses green.

"They are a very important part of the entire local economy," Stilwell said. "People flock here not only to play Pebble Beach, but to see it."

At \$200,000 per acre-foot, the water saved by the original reclamation project certainly won't be cheap. But with no new water like-

ly to become available from any other source for many years, property owners in Del Monte Forest who want to build on vacant lots, or homeowners who want to remodel, have few options.

"They don't want to wait," Stilwell said, explaining the surprisingly high demand for expensive water.

First step: Fix the reservoir

Reopening the former Cal-Am Forest Lake Reservoir in Pebble Beach is the first step in the new reclamation project, said Andrews. The reservoir, abandoned by Cal-Am when federal water quality rules required that drinking water supplies not be stored in the open, will receive surplus flows from the reclamation plant in the winter, storing up to 100 million gallons for irrigation in the summer.

But first, the entire reservoir must be recontoured, the north bank rebuilt, a heavy plastic liner installed, and a filtration plant constructed to remove algae before the water is pumped to the golf courses. "There will also be a monitoring system under the liner to detect any leaks," Andrews said, adding that he'll be opening bids for the \$12 million reservoir fix in January, with construction starting in March.

A pilot plant to test the filtration technology with the outflow of the Carmel sewer plant is already working, von Dohren said. "Every treatment plant has unique wastewater, and the pilot plant will allow us to design the actual plant, which is supposed to be ready in time to fill the Forest Lake Reservoir during the 2006-2007 winter," he explained.

In addition to leaving a large quantity of water in the Carmel River that otherwise would go to golf courses, a small amount of the reclamation plant's outflow will be available to pump into the Carmel River lagoon to help maintain its level during dry summer months.

But the primary purpose of the reclamation plant will be to keep the golf courses of Del Monte Forest green.

"The new reclamation project will assure us both quantity and quality," said Mike Bowhay, general manager of the Monterey Peninsula Country Club, who also represented Cypress Point and Poppy Hills during discussions about the new plant. "We're very much in favor of it, and we have been since the very beginning."

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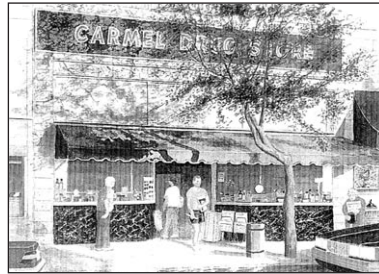
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Two competing organizations are proposing to build desalination plants in Moss Landing to fix our chronic water shortage. They are the California American Water Company, a privately owned and controlled company, and the Pajaro/Sunny Mesa (Monterey County) Community Services District, a publicity controlled government agency.

Cal-Am is a for-profit company. It is owned by R.W.E. Corp., which is headquartered in Berlin, Germany. The Monterey Peninsula Water Management District staff projects that the Cal-Am desalination facility will cost approximately \$260 million for the taxpayers (not including a 9.9 percent profit for Cal-Am).

The Pajaro/Sunny Mesa Community Services District is a non-profit, public agency that provides water services to residents of Monterey County and which is qualified to build and finance a desalination operation. It is run by a board of Monterey County citizens and employs one of the finest desal engineering firms in the State of California, Kennedy/Jenks Consultants. The Monterey Peninsula Water Management District staff projects that the estimated price of the Pajaro/Sunny Mesa desalination facility will be \$175 million — **at least \$85 million less for the taxpayers.** (Compare the real costs at www.mpwmd.dst.ca.us/asd/board/boardpacket/2004/20040929/07/item07_exh7a.htm).

We think taxpayers should be allowed to state their preference to their elected representatives.

Supervisors approve new rules for making tenants the landlord

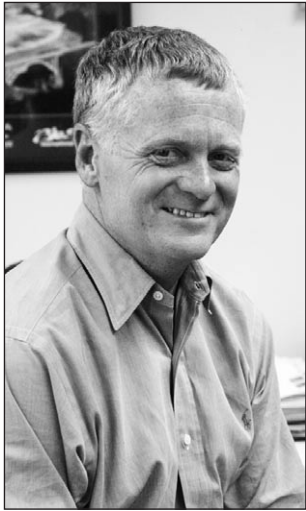
THE DEBATE was contentious, so it was a bit of a surprise when the vote was unanimous.

For two months, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors and the Monterey County Housing Authority have wrangled over procedures for screening and selecting tenants to serve on the housing authority's board.

But this week, they agreed on a process suggested by housing authority executive director Jim Nakashima that essentially gives the supervisors the power to appoint whomever they please.

"It puts it in our hands, which is what the public would like to see," Fourth District Supervisor Edith Johnsen said.

Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter agreed. "It will be a much simpler process. We will have a better opportunity to hear the tenants' concerns."

Potter also said the new appointment procedures will ultimately lead to better communication between the supervisors and the housing authority.

"Our concern was that tenant commissioners would be afraid to speak out for fear they might jeopardize their housing," he said. "Now, the politics will be removed and the tenant commissioners will have greater support."

Housing authority development director Starla Warren said the new process will not hurt relations between her agency and the supervisors.

"We don't have anything to hide," she said. "If they want to be more involved with the selection process, that's fine with us. We're trying to be as cooperative as possible."

Warren said the new process will provide the county with a greater appreciation for the work the authority does.

When police took him into custody, they found 34 loose diamonds in his possession which Lee later identified as those pried from jewelry stolen from his store. At the time, Melton said the case was strong. In the intervening months, he was never called to participate in the proceedings leading to Thranow's guilty plea Dec. 1.

"Deputy district attorney Dennis LaBarbera called and informed us that

yesterday he pleaded guilty to second-degree robbery in Carmel, and he also pleaded guilty to grand theft of a person for the robbery that occurred at Hesselbein's."

In that incident, Thranow also reportedly used a gun to steal two rings worth \$16,000 from Hesselbein's in the Crossroads on April 24. He asked to see two engagement rings and while examining them, pulled out what appeared to be a semiautomatic handgun and ran from the store with the rings, sheriff's Sgt. John DiCarlo reported at the time.

provided by the search and rescue team that could be navigated on the rough, steep trail.

Upon reaching the entrance to Garrapata State Park at Highway 1, they loaded her into the ambulance and rushed her to Community Hospital for treatment.

MacDonald could not specify the extent of her injuries but said she was conscious and talking to emergency workers a little as they carried her out of the canyon.

"That lady was so lucky," he said. "It was a really good coordinated rescue. All our agencies worked together, from the people who found her and kept her warm, to the crew who walked in, to the sheriff's search and rescue team who brought the equipment. It was pretty impressive."

Reached in her hospital room Thursday, McDowell was conversant but unavailable

for an interview, as she was being transferred to undergo X-rays.

How to make Carmel famous

WHILE THE chamber of commerce's economic development committee is searching high and low for ways to attract more upscale visitors to town, and wondering how to pay for the ad blitz they expect it will take to get them here, the city council is displaying a deft touch in spreading the fame of this fair city far and wide without spending a dime! How'd they do it? By banning new art galleries.

Already, Pine Cone reporters have been interviewed by Time Magazine, the San Francisco Chronicle and the Los Angeles Times about the city's surplus of painting and sculpture.

Last month, CBS News did a report, and just this morning a producer for World News Tonight with Peter Jennings (ABC) told our newsroom she'd be coming to town next week to investigate the gallery glut.

These hard-edged big city journalists (and their bosses who give them their assignments) live in a world where it is unimaginable that the number of galleries would be a subject for civic legislation. But their attentions aren't hostile or condescending. These people are fascinated.

This type of media attention also happened when the city considered banning ice cream cones. It happened on a colossal scale when Clint Eastwood was elected mayor. And the city also got plenty of notice when a homeowner was told he couldn't cut down a tree that was lifting the foundation of his garage. "Move the garage," he was told.

Accordingly, rather than try to come up with \$100,000 every year for out-of-town advertising, we'd like to encourage the city council to get creative with ideas that will seem really wacky to the outside world, but which make perfect sense here:

- Establish checkpoints at the entrances to town to make sure anyone wearing high heels has a permit.
- Require every home to have at least one raccoon.
- Make it illegal not only to open a fast food restaurant in town, but also for anyone who lives in Carmel to eat any fast food.
- Declare every building to be historic as soon as it is finished.
- Announce that henceforth it will be necessary to prepare an EIR before having sex.
- Keep Flanders mansion; sell the mayor.

They can't all be done at once, but carefully apportioned over the next few years, these steps would surely draw ever-increasing crowds. Soon, the problem wouldn't be how to raise revenue for retrofitting the fire house, but where to park the solid-gold fire engine.

LandWatch under 'increasing attack'

Dear Editor:

In the past several months, LandWatch has come under increasing attack from powerful special interests opposed to good planning. While not surprising, these attacks have taken on a particularly ugly face. Most recently, an unnamed coalition of developer interests, whose spokesperson was Juan Uranga of the Center for Community Advocacy (CCA), made baseless claims that LandWatch's policies are "racist." We have not responded publicly because the accusation is so ridiculous and offensive that even mentioning it might give it credence. Replying to slanderers is often just what they want. They then restate the charge, as they "respond to the response," giving the slander further press, and that's the last

thing we want.

But we do want our members to understand why these attacks are coming now and why we expect more may be coming in the future.

First, consider what's at stake in the Monterey County General Plan Update (GPU). Elite special interests want to convert 10,000 or more acres of prime farmland into sprawling subdivisions throughout Salinas Valley. This sprawl will generate enormous traffic impacts and strains on local government. In addition, such sprawling developments provide no guarantee that housing will be built that meets our community's needs. On the contrary, developments such as Seaside Highlands are often approved without regard to the

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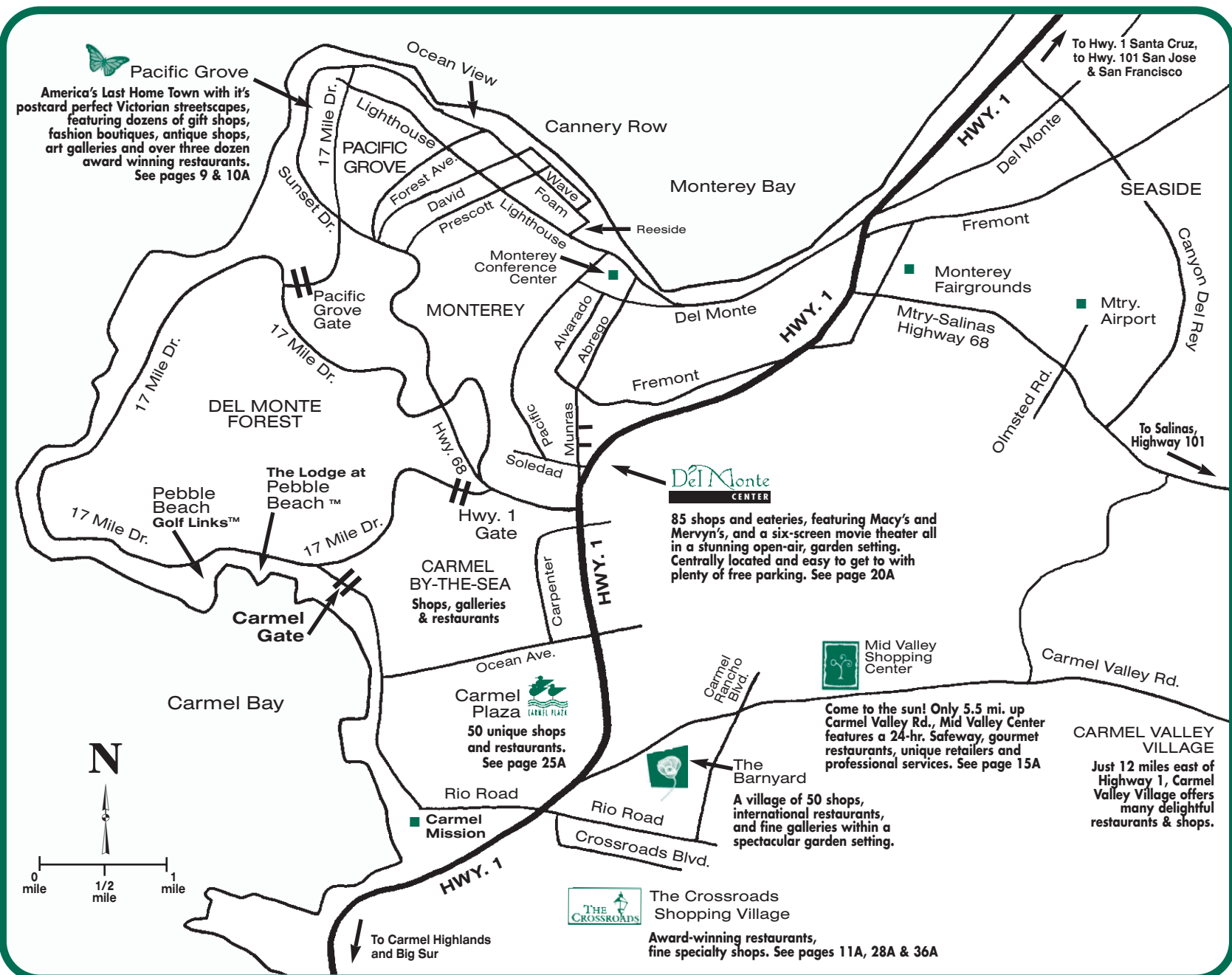

COMPELLING IMAGES OF AFRICANS ORPHANED BY AIDS

CHELLIE KEW's "African Journal — a child's continent" is a poignant photographic essay of children in Zimbabwe, Botswana, Namibia, Mozambique and South Africa. Smiling, extremely beautiful children — all with one thing in common. They are orphans. Their parents have died of AIDS.



It is predicted by 2010, African orphans may exceed 40 million. To bring this into perspective, there are 11 million AIDS affected orphans in sub-Saharan Africa alone. Compare this to a recent UK census that reports there are 11.8 million children living in the United Kingdom.

Another heinous offshoot of the AIDS epidemic is that many African men infected with HIV believe if they sleep with a virgin, their illness will be cured. To be sure the girl

is a virgin, they have been known to rape tiny, innocent girl children, thus probably infecting them, too.

Kew's mission is to transform world view and attitudes toward "the treatment of children orphaned by AIDS and to effecting lasting change by empowering those who will champion and carry this vision into the future."

Kew's photographs will tear at your heart. Her text is spare and to the point.

"African Journal" is a 72-page large format softcover published by The Q Fund, and retails for \$35. It is a beautiful book, and interspersed with the children's photos are color pictures of African wildlife. The book is available at The Thunderbird Bookshop, Bookworks and Bay Books.

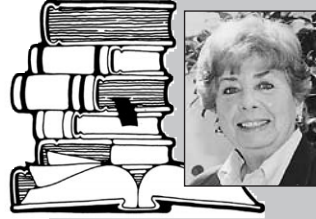
All proceeds from sales of Kew's book will go to the children of the Sub-Sahara orphaned by the AIDS virus through Kew's "Q-Fund for AIDS." In the Sub-Sahara, 470,000 children die every year from AIDS.

MORE THAN 30 years of research went into "Eselen Indians of The Big Sur Country — The Land and the People." Authors and archaeologists Gary Breschini and Trudy Haversat collaborated on this 232-page hardcover just published by Coyote Press of Salinas.

Research in the Big Sur mountains and adjacent areas led the authors to interview descendants of the Eselen Indians who shared knowledge of the wilderness. Eselens may have been the first inhabitants of the Big Sur country in now called the Ventana Wilderness of Los Padres National Forest. The Eselens were not numerous and were thought to be the first of the California Indian groups to become extinct, around 1840. But the authors believe that some Eselens didn't work at the missions, and thus may have escaped diseases brought by white men by taking refuge in the rugged interior mountains. There are hundreds of people alive today, the authors contend, that have Eselen

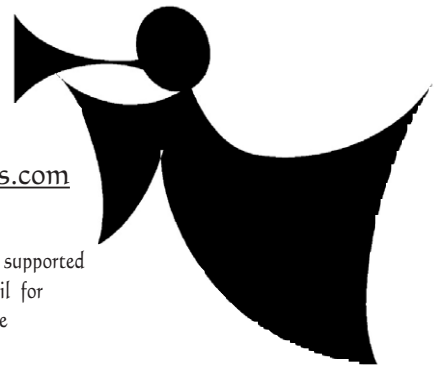
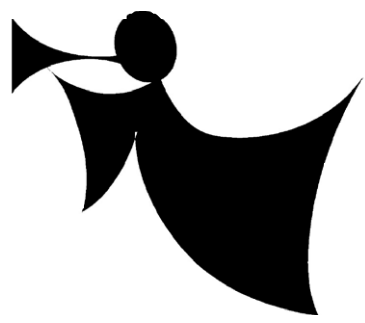

TYPICALLY, THE wine grape harvest in Monterey County takes place about 30 days after such premium grape-growing areas as Napa and Sonoma counties. But this year, local grapes were harvested much earlier due to extreme heat in late August and September. Most of the grapes were picked and taken to wineries for vinification by mid to late October. "It was the earliest harvest here in decades," according to **Rhonda Motil**, executive director of the **Monterey County Vintners and Growers Association**.

Rich Smith, of **Valley Farm Management**, Soledad, which farms 17 properties between Gonzales and Hames Valley, reports the first heat of the season hit in March, which resulted in not setting a full crop. This was followed by a normal growing season that was calculated to bring in the harvest two weeks early. But then a 10-day hot spell in September caused some dehydration and the crop was brought in, a total of four weeks early. Yield was down 10 to 25 percent, but the quality was good.

"We get paid by the pound, so financially, it wasn't so good," Smith said. In the northern end of the Salinas Valley, in the colder

climate of the Santa Lucia Highlands, "we had some of the best fruit ever," he said. "In the southern end, we had mixed results. It was a really good year for Merlot and Cabernet."

Smith, who with his wife Claudia, owns Paraiso Vineyards in Soledad with vineyards in the Santa Lucia Highlands, said their Chardonnay, Syrah and Riesling were the best ever this year.

Monterey Pacific, Inc. farms for 20 different wineries up and down the Salinas Valley from Chualar to King City. President of the firm, **Steve McIntyre**, said, "It was the perfect growing season — not too hot and not too cold — until Labor Day, when we had a heat wave that developed the grapes fast." This resulted in the Pinot Noirs and Chardonnays being "a little jammy." But then the weather cooled off and the later varieties — Merlot, Syrah, some Chardonnay blocks, Cabernet and Riesling "had enough hang time to develop physiological precursors for flavor, structure and aroma," McIntyre said. "Tannins and phenols develop with hang time."

McIntyre estimated the quantity of the harvest to be about average, with Chardonnay off a bit, from 10 to 15 percent.

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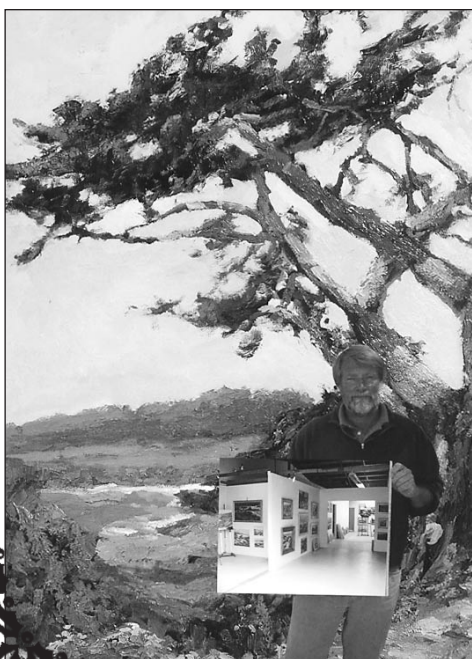

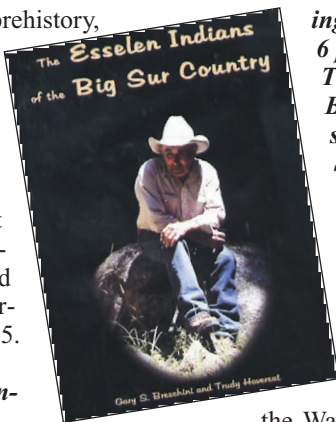
blood. Nearly all the photos in this book are published here for the first time. Some of them are stunning, and flora and fauna predominate. There are many sketches of Indians, and a few photographs of Esselen descendants.

The authors systematically describe the land, the people (there are genealogical charts of various Indian groups), rock paint-

ings, the mission era, prehistory, archeology and cultural resources — and in the appendix reveal common errors about the Esselens.

It is a stunning and scholarly book — but is written in an accessible style that should attract a wide readership. It retails for \$59.95.

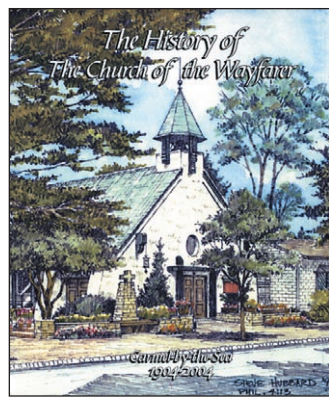

This is truly a labor of love and covers a great deal of Carmel-by-the-Sea's history, too.

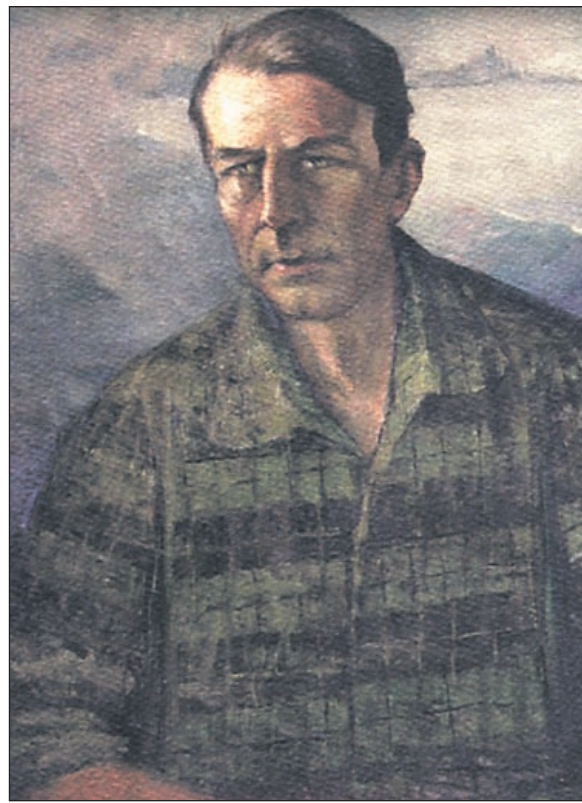

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Carew portrait given to Tor House Foundation

A PORTRAIT of Carmel poet Robinson Jeffers painted by Kate Carew has been donated to the Robinson Jeffers Tor House Foundation by an anonymous Carmel donor and the artist's granddaughters, Christine Chambers and Virginia Horning.

Carew and Jeffers were friends when the artist lived in the Monterey area. The 1939 painting depicts the poet with Point Lobos in the background. It is an unusual portrait in that Jeffers is portrayed wearing a green plaid shirt. He originally posed in a gray shirt, but Carew substituted the green shirt at the suggestion of artist Arthur Mathews.

In addition to being a portrait artist, Carew, also known as Mary Reed, painted landscapes and was a well-known caricaturist.

Her work appeared in magazines and newspapers, including the San Francisco Examiner, in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

In the 1890s, Carew sketched famous people for publisher Joseph Pulitzer's New York World newspaper. She died in California in 1960.

The anonymous donor and Steve Hauk of Hauk Fine Arts, Pacific Grove, presented the painting to Tor House Foundation President Alex Vardamis.

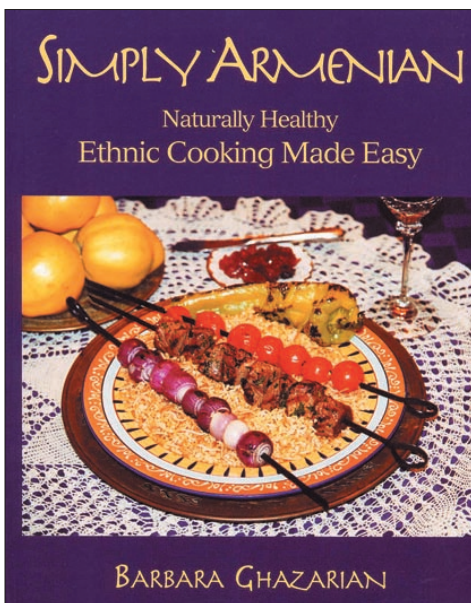

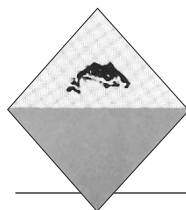

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Sunset Center named Business of the Year

THE NONPROFIT Sunset Cultural Center earned the title of Business of the Year Wednesday by vote of the Carmel Chamber of Commerce's past presidents. The honor was announced at the chamber's sold-out Green Ribbon of Excellence Awards dinner at Quail Lodge, and with it, Sunset joined past winners Carmel Art Association, Grasing's, Kocek Jewelers, La Playa Hotel, Nielsen Bros. Market and New Masters Gallery.

Formed more than a year ago and hired this summer by the city to run the center, the nonprofit SCC is "a corporation, and we are trying to run it like a business," said board chairman Jim Price, who did not attend the event but was thrilled with the win.

"The board certainly has been working very hard to establish policies that work with the community," he said. "The first six months have been preparation and the second six months, starting after the first of the year, will show tremendous results. Therefore, this recognition is extremely satisfying, and we thank the community for its support."

SCC board secretary Karen Kadushin, who accepted the honor on behalf of SCC Dec. 1, told The Pine Cone, "We look forward to earning the award with our future efforts. It's so amazing to get that, and we

feel like we've just begun."

The chamber's 515 members elected the 10 Green Ribbon Award category winners, who "excel in quality service and/or products; practice the highest business ethics; foster a beautiful environment, and exemplify enlightened customer service and staff relations." They selected:

- accommodations — La Playa Hotel;
- art galleries — Carmel Art Association;
- cultural organizations — Sunset Cultural Center;
- dining — Bahama Billy's Restaurant;

“The county is not in the housing business,” she said. “They may not be familiar with some of the difficulties we face. There are many guidelines we are required to follow.”

Five of the seven commissioners on the housing authority board are selected by the the supervisors — each representing one of Monterey County’s five districts. In addition, two tenant commissioners were screened by the housing authority and chosen by the supervisors, a process that led to the contentious debate.

After the board of supervisors appointed Rippling River activist Merri Bilek as a tenant commissioner, she was expecting to be sworn in on Nov. 9. But the housing authority objected on the grounds that supervisors had circumvented the authority’s screening process. Bilek’s appointment was delayed as supervisors and commissioners hashed out a new policy for selecting tenant commissioners.

Bilek agreed the supervisors should have the power to name new commissioners. “Their leadership and direction have been exemplary,” she said. “Some of the things done by the housing authority have been questionable.”

Next the supervisors will name the second tenant commissioner. In a curious twist, the housing authority voted on Monday to recommend that Carol Schneider, whose term recently expired, be reappointed. Schneider, a former Rippling River tenant, was criticized by her former neighbors for advocating that Rippling River be torn down and for questioning an Army Corps of Engineers

report that said it could be fixed. Potter hopes to name the second commissioner Dec. 7. “We don’t want to leave the position unfilled, because we are doing so many things right now that are important,” he said.

Preservationist: Flanders sale EIR should include other city lands, too

A HANDFUL of residents hoping to keep Flanders Mansion from becoming private property attended the first hearing in the lengthy environmental review process the city decided it had to undertake before selling the historic house.

The Carmel Planning Commission met Nov. 29 to outline what potential impacts should be addressed in the environmental study. Members of the city council, planning commission, and forest and beach commission have identified Flanders Mansion as the prime piece of city-owned real estate that could be sold to fund capital improvements,

such as the seismic retrofit of the Carmel Fire Station.

Principal planner Brian Roseth suggested four potential areas of study:

■ The sale could affect an historic resource, "depending on what happens to the property if it's sold," he said. Flanders Mansion was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1989.

■ Recreational activities could be threatened, since the property is currently zoned as park land but would likely be redesignated as residential property.

"The public has the opportunity to walk around and get up close and personal with the mansion itself," Roseth said. "If the property passes into private hands, it's assumed that access to the property and the mansion itself would be cut."

■ It could impact public access by cutting off some of the trails that lead into the surrounding Mission Trail Nature Preserve. Flanders Mansion was part of the 12-acre park until four years ago, when the planning commission approved a lot-line adjustment separating the 1.427-acre parcel, 5,559-square-foot home and part of its driveway from the rest of the park so it could be leased or sold.

■ The noise, light and general activity of using Flanders Mansion could damage flora and fauna in the surrounding park land, which the city designated environmentally sensitive habitat area.

■ Many policies in the city's general plan pertain to park land in general, and specifically to Mission Trail and Flanders, so an EIR would have to examine the potential sale's consistency with those laws.

Commissioner Ken Talmage wondered if the parcel on which the mansion sits could be smaller, and Roseth suggested the EIR consider that scenario, possibly to offset

some of the environmental impacts.

Other possible uses of Flanders should also be examined, according to commissioner Robin Wilson. Commissioner Julie Culver asked about specific boundaries and protection for the Lester Rowntree Native Plant

Garden, which is close to the mansion and protected under the city's Local Coastal Program.

"We should have good maps showing what's included and what isn't," Roseth responded. "We know the arboretum has been there for a long time and nurtured by volunteers and the forestry department — and it's been something the city has wanted to keep — but we don't know all the history."

Melanie Billig, president of the Flanders Foundation, which is trying to convince city officials and the public that the mansion should not be sold, offered to describe the garden's past and invited the commissioners to tour the mansion and its grounds.

"Several years ago, someone had the audacious idea of transplanting the arboretum to an area near Rio Road," she added. "But you don't move drought-tolerant natives down into a riparian habitat and expect them to survive."

In a letter to the commission, Billig listed several topics the EIR should study, including aesthetics, biological and cultural resources, land use and planning, noise, recreation and cumulative impacts.

She also commented on the importance of hiring the right EIR consultant and asked the city to allow a Flanders Foundation member to sit in on interviews with candidate firms.

Carmel Preservation Foundation's Enid Sales also wanted a representative present during interviews.

"This is a time to consider a combined EIR on [the sale of] all city property recently suggested as being surplus," she continued. "This would allow the community to look at the cumulative impacts."

The potential loss of public right of way through Flanders, including parking, should be studied, according to resident Monte Miller, and the property boundaries are not clearly marked.

"There are many parts of the general plan that do not allow the sale of park land," he said. "It seems like there would have to be a lot of changes to the general plan."

The scoping meeting was the first of many opportunities for the public to comment on the potential environmental impacts of selling Flanders Mansion to a private buyer.

In addition to soliciting EIR bids from consultants and signing a contract for the job, the city will issue a notice of preparation to regulatory agencies. The first draft of the study will be circulated for 30 days and then revised according to comments received during that period. When the final document is complete, city officials will use it in deciding if and how the mansion should be sold.

needs of working families of the county.

Those are just some of the public costs. Now consider the private gains. An acre of farmland is worth roughly \$20,000,

while an acre of residential property is worth 10 times that. If the elite special interests succeed, more than \$2 billion in windfall profits would be generated from rezoning alone.

So who are the special interests that have lined up to oppose LandWatch and the policies we advocate? Although they go by different names — "Common Ground," the developers' "Refinement Group" and "21st Century Solutions" — all of these organizations are composed of the same small group of private interests that want no constraints on their ability to profit from urban sprawl. For example, Tom Carvey, the executive director of Common Ground, sits on the boards of 21st Century Solutions and CCA and is the secretary of the developers' Refinement Group. Jeff Davi, now the state commissioner of real estate, chairs the 21st Century Solutions Group and sits on the board of Common Ground. And Juan Uranga, the executive director of CCA who leveled the charges of racism, is on the board of Common Ground and participated in the developers' Refinement Group.

Regrettably, it appears this coalition of special interests has co-opted important elected local officials, making LandWatch's work even more challenging. The Monterey County Weekly has documented the flow of money from special interests to four of the five current members of the Monterey County Board of Supervisors. This gives proof to late Jesse Unruh's maxim that "money is the mother's milk of politics."

Rest assured, LandWatch is working non-stop to ensure the public interest is represented. LandWatch came together with 17 other community groups to work on an alternative plan. This "Community General Plan" would accommodate all growth projected for Monterey County within the next 20 years by converting only 1,112 acres of prime farmland. LandWatch's report, "Room Enough," demonstrated there is plenty of undeveloped land within cities and already developed unincorporated areas to provide a total of 40,093 new housing units. This would accommodate the expected population increase of 126,000 people by 2020.

During lighter moments around LandWatch, we like to joke that the politics wouldn't be so ugly if we weren't so successful. If LandWatch hadn't attracted more than 1,000 members, if it hadn't helped educate and organize 300 low-income Latinos in Salinas to advocate for stronger affordable housing standards, if it hadn't led efforts to establish Monterey County's first urban growth boundary in Marina, and if it wasn't now suing Monterey County for repeated lawless behavior in approving subdivisions and other pro-

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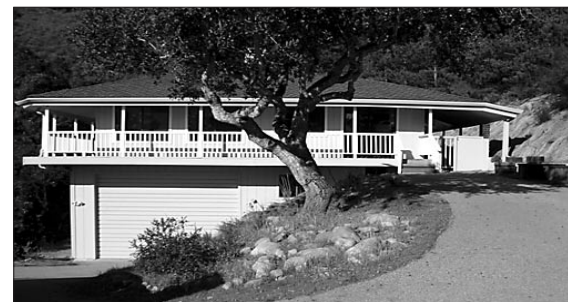

jects in blatant disregard of its own laws, then perhaps we would be better treated by the likes of CCA, Common Ground, 21st Century Solutions Group and their elected official cronies.

But LandWatch was established to advocate for the public interest and for land use policies that build healthy and safe communities, to guarantee workforce housing, conserve valuable natural resources and save taxpayer dollars. We want to improve the quality of life for everyone living in Monterey County, not just the elite few who, if allowed to prevail, will profit so handsomely.

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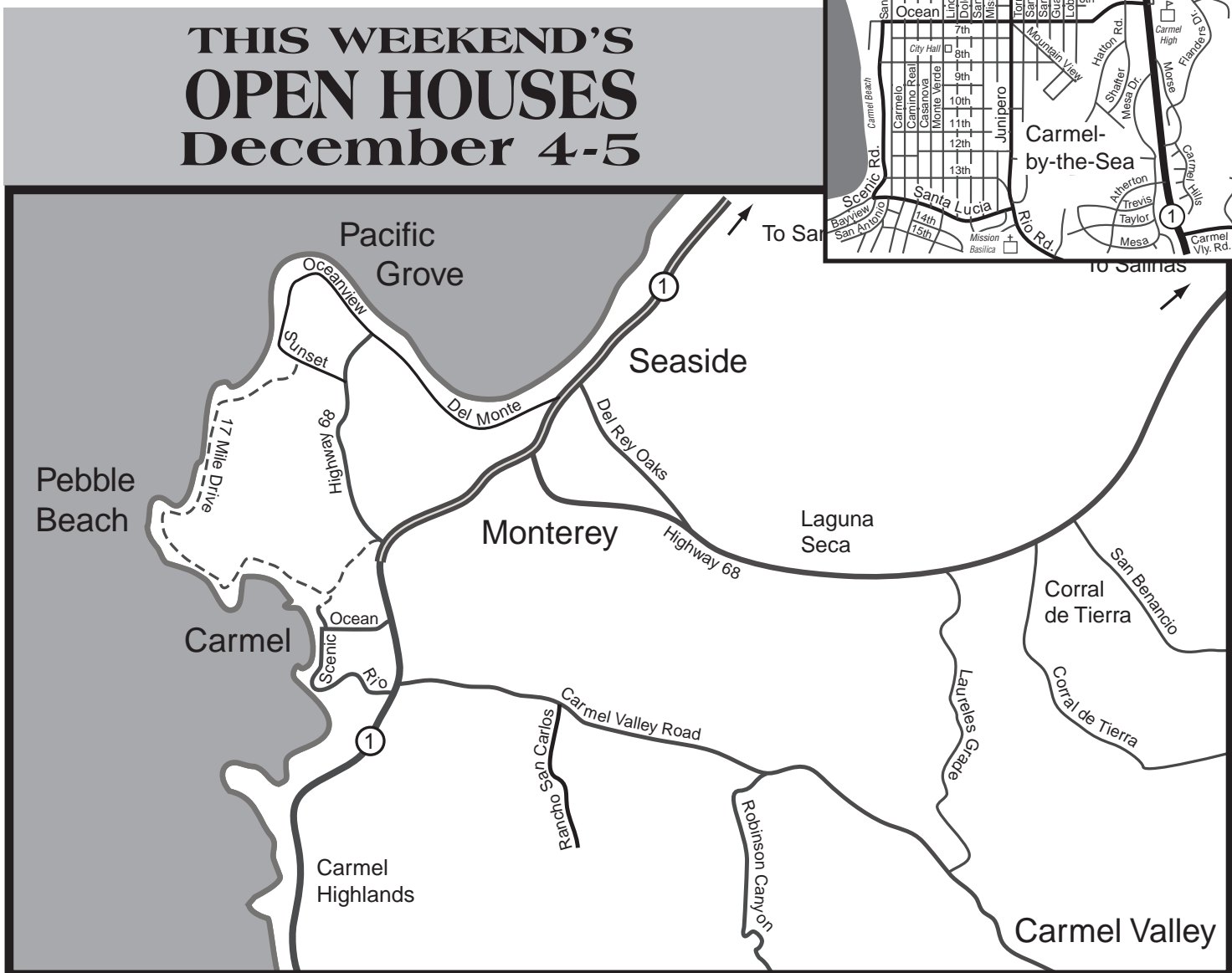

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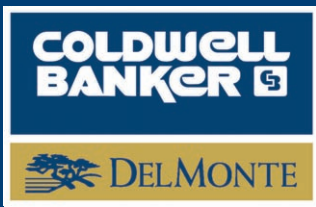
