BILL BATES, riding a bus to rejoin his cruise ship on the Atlantic coast of Morocco, asked the driver to stop and let

Dueling polls reveal opposite conclusions on desalination

Public wants plant built, but by whom?

A WASHINGTON, D.C., polling company says the people of the Monterey Peninsula, by a margin of 48 to 15 percent, want Cal-Am to build a desal plant in Moss Landing, the water company announced this week.

The company's November telephone survey of 500 registered voters was commissioned by Cal-Am.

But a survey conducted by Cal-Am's desal competitor, the Pajaro/Sunny Mesa Community Services District, reached the opposite conclusion. PSM's survey, based on 517 responses to advertisements in four local newspapers last December, found an amazing 96 percent of respondents prefer Pajaro/Sunny Mesa to build the plant.

"We got an overwhelming response from all over Monterey County," said Mark del Piero, general manager of the community services district, which provides water to residents of the Pajaro Valley. The agency is proposing to build a 20,000-acre-foot desal plant on land owned by Nader Agha in Moss Landing, with most of its water going to the Monterey Peninsula. "It was nice to get that kind of validation, because we're a small agency that isn't that well known outside North Monterey County," del Piero said.

things and issues unique to Carmel. His cartoons are ubiquitous in this village, up to and including the wallsized map-mural next to Nielsen Bros. market. In a city proclamation in 1998, a

two-mile radius around wherever Bates happened to be was officially dubbed the Walking Laughter Zone by Mayor Ken White. Anyone inside the zone was barred from having a bad day and required to understand the punch line.

So it may come as a surprise to many that the Bates' pen is not directed solely at our village. At last count, he has completed 5,000 pen and ink drawings — in a style far different from his signature cartoons — on location in 133 different

CARMEL HIGHLANDS firefighters and CalSTAR helicopter crews were busy Monday, first responding to a Highway 1 car wreck and then to a heavy equipment accident on Highlands Drive.


The solo driver of a GMC Envoy was heading south on Highway 1 at about 60 mph Monday morning when he skidded off the road, "hit a dirt berm, careened off a tree and swerved to the right, hitting a post" on Point Lobos property, said California State Parks Ranger Chuck Bancroft.

"For whatever reason, the post held the car up, so it was at a 45-degree angle with the front end in the ground and the rear end in the air," said Cypress Fire Captain Colin MacDonald, whose engine responded to the scene after someone walked into the station and reported the accident. "I knew we were going to need an air ambulance."

The driver, Eugene Karnaszewski of Tucson, Ariz., suffered a head injury, lacerations and internal injuries. He was loaded into an ambulance and taken to an open field nearby, where a CalSTAR helicopter landed to fly him to Santa Clara

WITH HIGHER revenues and lower costs than expected, the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea finished the first half of this fiscal year \$651,777 in the black, city administrator Rich Guillen told the mayor and city council Tuesday. But he recommended holding off on celebrating.

"We're fairly close to projections, but it's not a bullish type of year, yet," he said.

Total city revenues, estimated at \$4,845,995 for the first six months, came in at \$5,047,126 — \$201,131 above target, according to Guillen.

Of the three biggest sources of city income, two came in high and one low. Sales tax was up \$16,701 over the estimated \$965,120, and transient occupancy tax was \$30,304 above the expected \$1,202,379, but property taxes were \$8,566 less than the projected midyear total of \$1,689,631.

Other government agency payouts - specifically the state's Vehicle License Fee - rolled in much higher than the expected \$18,811, at \$157,427 for the first six months.

"During the budget meetings, we had elected to not put any money in for VLF," said Guillen, because the city did not expect to receive it. "We just got the check the other day."

On the negative side, traffic safety money generated \$8,731 less than the \$100,000 target, and gas tax also fell \$4,711 below the \$37,750 estimate.

Tighter purse strings

Meanwhile, expenses came in well below target, finishing \$450,646 under the budgeted \$5,678,398.

The city paid \$306,257 less than the estimated \$2,704,222 in salaries and wages, but retirements and the elimination of 24 jobs this year put six-month "benefit liability" payments \$116,906 higher than the budgeted \$30,000, according to Guillen. Unemployment payouts were also \$11,463 higher than the estimated \$5,500, since some of





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

Carmel High grads on board storm-battered ship

TWO CARMEL High graduates sought to satisfy their thirst for adventure by enrolling in Semester at Sea — the ultimate road trip for a college student — where they could explore the globe by ship while taking courses in an academic program sponsored

by the University of Pittsburgh.

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But in their first two weeks on the open sea, Evynn LeValley and Brittany Downing got more adventure than they ever expected, according to Evynn's mother, CHS guidance counselor Marikay LeValley.

After setting sail from Vancouver, Canada, Jan. 18, the 591-foot MV Explorer









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encountered days of stormy seas followed by brief calm.

"When they first went out, they had a pretty good storm, and a lot of the kids were seasick for the first four or five days," LeValley said. "Evynn e-mailed me and said a couple of kids had fallen out of their chairs and things were flying around the rooms."

Soon the fierce winter storms rose again, and last Wednesday the ship was struck by a 50-foot wave that smashed head-on into the bridge, breaking windows, injuring two crew members and flooding the circuits that controlled the engines, according to the U.S. Coast Guard.

With 990 people aboard - 681 students, 113 faculty and staff, and 196 crew members — the ship lost power to all four engines and was adrift in 35-foot seas with winds gusting above 50 mph.

Fortunately, except for the engine controls, the ship's electrical systems continued functioning and the captain was able to radio

for help. The Coast Guard dispatched a cut-

> ter, and three long-range HC-130 aircraft from bases in Alaska and Hawaii. Four merchant ships were also asked to rendezvous with the disabled passenger vessel packed with college kids.

LITTLE REST FOR NEW SUNSET C ENTER BOSS

 $J_{\mathrm{ACK}\ \mathrm{GLOBENFELT}\ \mathrm{hasn't}\ \mathrm{had}}$ much time to write poetry during his first month as executive director of Sunset Center, and he has yet to visit Tor House or go kayaking. That his hobbies go unpracticed is not surprising, considering he's been spending at least 60 hours a week on the job.

"But that's not a lot," Globenfelt said as he sat in his office Tuesday. A collection of miniature fire engines adorns his new work space, augmented by Sunset Theater posters from earlier eras that feature \$1 ticket prices and a remarkably youthful image of classical guitarist Andrés Segovia.

Following an extensive search, the nonprofit Sunset Cultural Center, Inc. hired Globenfelt away from his 20-year job as managing director of the Center for Performing Arts at Lehman College in New York.

The board might have expected him to start his new job

the fired employees have yet to find new jobs.

Guillen said he expects salaries and wages paid in the second half of the year will be closer to the budgeted amount, as several vacancies have been filled. Three jobs remained funded but unoccupied as of Dec. 31, 2004: a financial services coordinator, a police sergeant and a fire engineer.

"We're not hiring as many consultants as projected," Guillen continued. "We're \$91,456 ahead of the game, and I'm optimistic that trend will continue." The council had budgeted \$299,247 for "professional fees, out-side labor and contract services" in the first six months of the fiscal year.


Spending on materials and supplies came in \$52,792 under the budgeted \$250,135, and a new system will prevent last-minute purchases of wish-list items by employees aiming to use up their budgeted funds before the end of the year, according to Guillen.

"City staff is doing a good job watching pennies," he said.

He cautioned the council that the third-quarter months of January, February and March are historically the slowest of the year in terms of income and said, "I recommend staying the course."

Councilman Mike Cunningham found cause for optimism in the midyear budget numbers.

"We have every reason to believe that revenues might finish the year at or above target, and on the expenses side, there's considerably good news," he said. "Some people think they city's finances are on the rocks, and if you studied this report, you would not see that at all."



was going to be," he said after a month on the job. "It's a gorgeous facility in a beautiful place with people who enjoy the arts. We're trying to capitalize on all those values."

Reducing the heavily subsidized Sunset Center's dependence on city money is a daunting task that Globenfelt will use his four decades of show biz experience to undertake. A native Californian, Globenfelt graduated from Fresno State and took his first job as assistant manager of the convention center there, and he's been involved in entertainment in one way or another ever since

Globenfelt credited a dedicated and hardworking board of directors for laying the foundation for him.

"They've set up a good model for the

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operations of the facility," he said. "They've done a lot of work that boards don't traditionally do to make things happen.'

He's spent much of his time getting to know the staff and the operation of Sunset Center, as well as its long-time occupants — the Monterey Symphony, Chamber Music Monterey Bay and the Carmel Bach Festival. He's learning "what events have worked and will work," he said. Carmel residents

countries. Yes, 133.

The fruits of these efforts will be showcased in Bates first-ever one-man show at the Carmel Art Association, of which he's long been a member.

"Around the World in Pen and Ink" opens with a reception from 6 to 8 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 5, at the CAA, on Dolores between Fifth and Sixth in Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Bates winnowed through his 5,000 pen and inks to exhibit an even 50. The artist will make an appearance at the CAA from 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 12, when he will sketch onthe-spot caricatures, free of charge - a spontaneous spirit that is also evident in his international sketches.

Starting in 1979, Bates signed on as shipboard artist for such prestigious cruise lines as Royal Viking, Cunard, Seabourn and Radisson. Time flew and Bates illustrated 28 cruises, including 13 that went around the world.

"I have a standing invitation from these shipping lines. I'm the only one doing it in the world," Bates stated. "There was an artist who sailed with Darwin, and another with Captain Cook, but they're the latest ones I remember."

Accompanying him on many of these trips were his wife, Lei Lei, and daughter, Chelsea, now a seventh grader at Junipero Serra School at the Carmel Mission. She was home schooled by her mother for six hours a day at sea, via a correspondence course that featured a virtual classroom on a computer screen.

But the 12-year-old veteran world traveler is now enjoying her land-based school so much, Bates said, "We won't be cruising again until she finishes high school."

As with latter-day Monterey Peninsula artist Jo Mora, Bates is continually busy illustrating, be it in books, cartoons, or even the color signage for specials inside Trader Joe's market in Pacific Grove.

"I work four hours a day there and get complete medical and dental coverage for my whole family," he said.

The complete story of Bates' cruise drawings would be a book in itself - or, more precisely, 28 coffee-table-sized, hardbound, limited edition, numbered and signed volumes of his art.

'We would be in port usually for just a few hours," he explained. "I'd go out and sit anywhere, usually on a curb, an apple box, whatever, and sketch whatever turned me on.

"The main thing is to get the right composition. Composition is everywhere; it just depends where you crop it. Like the viewfinder of a camera, your eye can decipher composition."

Bates found endless inspiration in the fjords of Norway, the masses of people in China and India, in exotic architecture

"It took me 20 minutes to three hours per drawing. People come and look. I draw crowds everywhere. The one thing that impressed me about China, they allowed about a fourfoot ring of space around me. In other countries, they crowded right next to me."

Colorful individuals stand out in the artist's memory.


"In Naples, I was sitting on a curb, and a crowd gathered, looking down at the statue I was drawing. All of a sudden this man blurted out, 'Bravo,' 'Bellissimo,' 'Grand Artiste,' then he leaned over and said, 'You wanna buy a wristwatch?'

Or the money changer in Singapore, who asked me what I'd charge to do a picture of him, 'at today's price.' I asked him, 'You mean while I'm still alive?""

Bates previously had a show at the CAA, a joint exhibit with fellow Carmel cartoonists Gus Arriola and Eldon Dedini. He first visited this area in 1963 as part of a national cartoonist convention, and, like that, "was hooked."


He's a supremely busy artist.

"I'm writing my memoirs for my children. Maybe there's a book out of it. I'm printing it by hand," Bates mused.




The Pine Cone is 90 years old

ON FEB. 3, 1915, The Carmel Pine Cone was born as an unpretentious promotional tabloid, hand printed by its founder, W.L. Overstreet, on an early rotary printing press for the edification of what was then an unincorporated town of just 400 souls. Within a year, Overstreet would delve into complex local, national, and international political issues explaining why California should be divided into two states, exploring the effect of the burgeoning motion picture industry on saloons, and quoting extensively from a French general on the progress of the Great War. But the first edition was directed at tourists, carrying such items as "Carmel - How it Was Named," "Many Pleasures for a Vacation," and "Forest

Theater is World Famous."

This newsworthy tidbit, headlined "Week-end trips" was also on the front: "One can leave San Francisco on the coast train on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock and return Sunday night at 11:45 by procuring a round-trip ticket to Monterey for \$3. The round trip stage fare [from Monterey to Carmel] is 50 cents. Good hotel accommodations may be had for \$2.50. Incidentals will be covered by 25 cents, making the total for an opportunity to get a complete change of air in one of nature's garden spots for \$6.25." Happy birthday to The Pine Cone, along with our gratitude to all its readers, past and present, for making this newspaper possible.

Other reported missing man a mystery PASSERSBY RESCUE DIVER AT MONASTERY BEACH

AN EXHAUSTED scuba diver was saved by passersby at Monastery Beach Monday afternoon after they spotted him in the surf, but a friend he said he was diving with disappeared.

County 911 dispatcher David Liest had been shooting photographs at the beach Jan. 31 when he said he saw the man, later identified as 50-year-old Redwood City resident Daniel Murphy, don his scuba gear and enter the water alone.

About 25 minutes later, he saw him again, motionless and tangled in the kelp, and with a couple from South Dakota, a man from

Santa Cruz and ER nurse Diane Kester, pulled him out of the surf.

"We were in the water waist deep, and everything was wrapped around his legs," Liest said of Murphy's gear, which the man had apparently attempted to abandon as he struggled to reach the shore.

Fighting Monastery's notoriously strong undertow and the choppy surf, the group struggled to bring Murphy up onto the sand.

"Big waves kept coming in," Liest said later, his jeans and shoes still wet from the seawater, as an equally drenched Kester stood nearby. "I thought we were going to lose that guy."

Liest immediately alerted County emer-

gency communications dispatchers to the emergency, and an exhausted, shaking Murphy reported another diver, Steve Quinn, was still in the water.


California Department of Forestry firefighters, AMR ambulance, Pacific Grove Ocean Rescue, California State Parks rangers and lifeguards, and Monterey County Sheriff's Office responded. U.S. Coast Guard sent a cutter and a helicopter to assist in the search, and Carmel Highlands Fire launched its Zodiac.

As the two-man state parks lifeguard team searched the water closest to the coast,

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Public gets two months to review new September Ranch EIR

I O MAKE sure the public has plenty of opportunity to

weigh in on the latest version of the September Ranch subdivision, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors decided Tuesday the project has to go back to the beginning of the county permit process.

With the release of a new environmental impact report last month, Carmel Valley activists feared the project might be fasttracked, because it was already approved by the county in 1995.

September Ranch owner Jim Morgens hopes to subdivide 891 acres into 94 residential lots, 15 units of "affordable" housing, and a 20-acre lot for an existing equestrian facility. He also pro-

poses to dedicate 783 acres as open space. The supervisors approved the same project nine years ago, but lawsuits in 1999 derailed it on the grounds that traffic and water issues had not been adequately addressed in the original EIR. Morgens spent more than \$500,000 on a revised EIR.

Representing the September Ranch, attorney Tony Lombardo defended Morgens' plan.

"The new EIR reaches the same conclusions as the first EIR," Lombardo said. "The environmental impacts of this project can be mitigated."

Paula Lotz, land use chair of the Carmel Valley Association, encouraged supervisors to require a lengthy public hearing process.

"There is no doubt that if approved, this project will have major impacts our community," Lotz said.

Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter agreed that the public should have ample time to review the project, but he also lamented the project's "long history."

"I appreciate the applicant's willingness to go back to the

planning commission," Potter said. Such action "might not be required, but is appropriate given the contentiousness of the project."

Over the next two months, public hearings will be scheduled at meetings of the Carmel Valley LUAC, the Monterey County Subdivision Committee and the Monterey County Planning Committee.

Assistant Planning Director Alana Knaster commented such a schedule was "really tight."

Potter responded that he was committed to the two-month time frame for public comments on September Ranch.

"If you see a speed bump coming up, please advise us," he said.

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
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

the Highlands Fire Zodiac crew and the Coast Guard cutter looked farther out in the bay. When it arrived about an hourand-a-half after the initial call, the Coast Guard helicopter made multiple passes overhead.

Lifeguards and P.G. Ocean Rescue members recovered Murphy's scuba gear. But conflicting information complicated the search for Quinn. Liest said he saw no one other than Murphy enter the choppy water. And the vehicle Quinn was supposedly driving, a white pickup truck, could not be found parked near the beach, according to CDF battalion chief Steve Robertson, who was in charge of the rescue effort. "We determined at that point that it seemed like there wasn't really a missing diver," Robertson said.

But Murphy insisted his diving buddy had entered the sea before him.

Officers also tried to reach Quinn by cell phone, but were unsuccessful, according to the sheriff's office. Officials called off the search at around 5:10 p.m.

"If we'd had a vehicle there and were sure there was another person, we would not have called it off and would have stayed there as long as possible," Robertson said.

State Parks ranger Chuck Bancroft was still following up on the case the next day and said he had yet to confirm Quinn's whereabouts.





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


"There used to be eight used book-

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

"For awhile, it was really tense and sad around here," said Georgia Duke, grandmother of Brittany Downing. She sweated out the ordeal at the Downing household in Carmel along with Brittany's parents, Paula and Sam Downing. Her father is CEO of Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital.

"I was scared, knowing they were out there rocking





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around and had lost power," said LeValley, who had been monitoring the ship's progress on the Internet. She didn't realize it at the time, but the greatest risk for a ship without power is that, if it ends up parallel to the large swells, it could capsize.

"They were sending the Coast Guard boat from Alaska, and aircraft were on their way because there was a period of time when they thought they would have to evacuate," LeVallev said.

"It was scary, because Brittany and the other kids didn't know what was going to happen," Duke said. "They had to stand by lifeboats.'

The ship's crew advised passengers to don warm clothing and life vests and then directed them to the upper levels of the ship, where they were separated into groups of men and women, according to LeValley.

"They were being batted around from one side to the other, which was pretty terrifying," she said.

Thirty-second call

Fortunately, the crew was able to use emergency steering to keep the bow pointed into the waves. Within an hour, they had also regained control of one engine, according to the Coast Guard, which canceled two of the three heavy aircraft but kept one on scene to monitor the ship.

With e-mail and cell phone systems on board the ship disabled, LeValley received a half-minute call from her daughter via a satellite phone that night.

"She said she was terrified, but at least I heard her voice," LeValley said. "She didn't say anything like, 'Come get me. I want to come home!' and I think she might have said that if she felt that way."

Downing also called her parents and her grandmother to let them know she was OK. "I am so proud of her and so thankful she's safe," Duke said.

'There were a couple of kids on board with satellite phones and the captain had one, so the kids were sharing, LeValley said.

When each student was granted five minutes to use the

ship's phone, Evynn called again to further reassure her mother.

By 8 p.m., power was restored to a second engine and the ship was underway at 12-14 knots, close to its usual speed. According to Semester at Sea officials, all four engines are only used during high-speed travel; the ship typically runs on two.

Initially planning to head to Midway Island for assessment and repairs, the ship's captain ultimately chose Hawaii, and classes on board resumed Jan. 27. The Coast Guard continued monitoring the ship's progress and stationed an aircraft at Midway while keeping the cutter on track to meet with the ship.

Picking up the pieces

"The kids have been very helpful in trying to clean up the boat, including the baby grand piano that was thrown across the boat and broken," LeValley said. Together they restored the library and other rooms as they attempted to return to normal routines, including a hot meal in the cafeteria.

Semester at Sea administrators also reported the two injured crew members would be checked out in Hawaii.

The ship arrived at Honolulu, Hawaii, Monday afternoon, and students were provided field trip options for the next four days while its condition is evaluated and repairs are made. The Explorer has continued to serve as their lodging.


LeValley said the Downings flew to Hawaii to meet their daughter in port, but she decided to remain behind due to work obligations.

"If my daughter had said, 'I want you to be here,' I would have been there in a heartbeat," LeValley said. "But she's pretty resilient."

As CEO of Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital, Sam Downing is used to dealing with tragic circumstances. But it's different when it's your own daughter.

"My mom and dad were waiting on the pier when we got to Hawaii," said Downing. "And the first thing I did was go out on deck and wave to them." Their reunion was delayed for hours while the students went through U.S. Customs.

The Explorer had been bound for Japan when the wave



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hit, and due to the delays, schedule visits to that country and South Korea have been canceled. Semester at Sea organizers may fly students to planned ports in China or Vietnam if the ship cannot be repaired quickly.

After a few days' break, classes will resume on the ship Monday. And Downing says she'll definitely continue on the voyage, if it's able to resume.

"My brothers wanted me to come home, but my parents encouraged me to continue," Downing said. "They know how much I want to."

LeValley said her daughter wants to stick with the adventure she and Downing, who have been friends for years and graduated from CHS in 2003, had planned and worked for since last summer.

"I'm proud of them. I think they'll be different people after going through this," she said. "Not many kids have the opportunity to face their mortality in that way."

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Boogie boarder rescued in rough surf

A 17-YEAR-OLD Carmel High School student was pulled from rough winter seas off Carmel Beach by a two-man California State Parks lifeguard team Friday after she was knocked off her boogie board.

Carmel Valley resident Michelle Meyer and a friend were in the bay just before 4 p.m. when Meyer was swept off her board and out into the bay around 3:50 p.m. Witnesses told Carmel police officers and firefighters that the girl was in the water 300 to 400 yards off shore.



On the beach, medics



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determined Meyer was suffering severe hypothermia from her prolonged exposure to the chilly ocean water, despite wearing a wet suit, and she was taken to Community Hospital via ambulance. She was later released.










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Businessman claims new policies restrict access to public information

MONTEREY COUNTY Assessor Steve Vagnini believes recent changes in the way his office does business will lead to better public access to information and greater administrative efficiency.

But Gary Bailey views those same changes as restricting public access to information and a potential end to his livelihood.

Bailey is the owner of Abstract Information Service, a business that collects real estate sales data primarily for real estate professionals. His compilations of real estate sales also appear in newspapers, including The Carmel Pine Cone. For 15 years, the Pacific Grove resident has had liberal access to the files at the assessor's office, where he has scanned original documents and compiled data for a publication he sells.

Now Bailey stands on the other side of the counter as a customer who is required to pay the assessor's office \$2 per page for printed copies of documents or subscribe to a series of compact discs that could cost him as much as \$600 a month.



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"Does the public want the government to go into business selling information about the public?" asks Bailey, who believes the assessor's office is over-

charging for its services. Vagnini disagreed with Bailey's claims and said his agency charges fees that are competitive with agencies in other counties.

"We're just trying to provide the best public service possible," he said. "By law all we can do is recapture our expenses. Nobody else has complained."

In an effort to make it

easier for the public to

obtain records, the assessor's office is selling compact discs. Bailey is concerned the agency is catering to big companies compiling information about the public for marketing purposes.

"The government is not real good about protecting the privacy of its citizens," said Bailey.

Vagnini insisted his agency is not trying to accommodate information banks.

"Mr. Bailey wants it both ways," Vagnini said. "He wants access, but he doesn't want these big companies to have access."

Bailey also doesn't like the new policy that prohibits him from viewing original documents.

"To deny the public the right to inspect an original document is a disturbing trend," Bailey said. "You can learn a lot more from an original document than a poorly-copied scan."

Vagnini, though, said it's not practical to allow public access to original documents, which are generally returned to clients after they have been scanned.

"If everyone wanted to see an original, it would be very challenging for us," he said.

He said the new policy of restricting public access to original copies "gives us much more control over the process."

Where Vagnini sees control, Bailey sees secre-

"People in California want more openness in government," he said. "If you restrict access to information, you open the door to mischief."

Bailey believes the access he once had to records provided a great benefit to the public. As an example, he cites a \$140 million real estate scam he uncovered by his routine viewing of docu-

ments at the assessor's office. He stumbled across a "suspicious pattern" of inflated real estate transactions. Sale prices for 10 local homes were inflated by a Beverly Hills company to fool lenders into making loans that were much larger than necessary.

The scam would have been detected, Bailey said, "if the assessor's office was doing its job."


Vagnini said his staff would have eventually uncovered the scam.

Bailey believes the assessor's office imposed its new policies because the exposure of the real estate scam embarrassed the agency.


"I don't think I made any friends in the assessor's office," he said. "If I had minded my own business, the scam would probably still be going on and everybody would be happy."

Vagnini said the new policies his agency has implemented are nothing Bailey should take personally.

"We're just trying to improve the way we do business," he said. "it's a delicate balance. We're walking a fine line."

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BRIAN JAMES Love, a former Carmel High School student, was killed Feb. 1 when he struck a tree while snowboarding at Wintergreen Resort in Virginia, reported The Daily Progress, a Charlottesville newspaper.

A 2001 graduate of Carmel High School, Love was just months away from earning his B.A. in neuroscience and psychology from the University of Virginia.

"He was a very high achieving academic student," said Carol Wood, U.V. spokeswoman. Family friend Victoria Marr of Yankee Point, who spent Thanksgiving with Love and his family, told The Pine Cone the 22-year-old was an outstanding young man, well known around Carmel. His mother, Susan Love, is a teacher at River School and active in the Big Sur Marathon. His father is Jim Love of Monterey.

The younger Love was captain of the university's snowboarding team. In January, Love took first place in a competition at Sugar Mountain in North Carolina.

"He was the most vibrant person I knew," said teammate Alexis Day "He was incredibly outgoing, and always the first to extend his friendship to new members on the team."

The team was practicing at Wintergreen Resort when the accident occurred. There were no witnesses. Love never regained consciousness and died before he could be airlifted off the mountain. A private memorial service was held on Feb. 2 at St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic Church in Charlottesville, according to the university newspaper, The Cavalier Daily.

Flowers with black ribbons were placed on the doors to Brown College, his former residence. A candlelight vigil was also held by friends at Hereford College.


Valley Medical Center.

A second CalSTAR helicopter landed there hours later, when a worker driving a Bobcat overturned it and fell from a 15-foothigh retaining wall near the Highlands Inn.

A list of criteria called the MAP system is used to decide when an air ambulance is needed, according to firefighter Jake Hess.

MAP considers the mechanism of injury, such as the crushed car or the overturned Bobcat, if the injury is anatomical, such as broken bones or severe lacerations, and if there's a dangerous physiological condition.

"If you come across someone in a vehicle wreck or who fell from a roof, and their blood pressure is very, very low — 40/20 — that would be a physiological reason," Hess explained. Patients with at least two of the three MAP criteria are rushed to the nearest trauma center in an air ambulance.






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


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
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

FOLLOWING THE county's lead, the three-member Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance board — which provides ambulance service to Carmel and Carmel Valley — voted Jan. 20 to raise rates 4.13 percent.

"CRFA has historically adjusted its ambulance rates to match increases granted by the county" to other ambulance companies, Carmel Valley Fire Chief Sidney Reade wrote in her report to the board.

"In the past, with one very notable exception, we've always tracked the county's increase, which is based on Consumer Price Index factors," said Gerard Rose, a Carmel city councilman who sits on the CRFA board with Carmel Valley Fire directors Bob Rice and Pete Garneau. "And the figure they used this year was 4.13 percent."

County health director Len Foster approved the county's increase Jan. 6, and it took effect three days later. The base rate for that service moved from \$1,008 to \$1,049.59; per-mile charges from \$23.50 to \$24.47; Code-3 emergency response from \$65.27 to \$67.96; and oxygen from \$90 to \$93.71. Charges for standing by, which



decrease with the number of days' notice and ranged from \$91.37 to \$182.72 per hour, also increased.

Rates in Carmel are notably lower. The new base rate in town and in Carmel Valley increased to \$812.87 plus \$13.72 per mile

(\$67.97 if lights and sirens are used); oxygen administration will now cost \$65.58, with standby charges reaching \$95.15 per hour.

"I have been very reluctant — in fact, I have refused — to buckle under to other considerations, like what the market will bear," Rose said. "And fortunately, my other directors have agreed with me."

City ambulance costs stable

The City of Carmel, which pays for an ambulance and its accompanying paramedic and EMT to be stationed at Carmel Fire

Department, heavily subsidizes CRFA because many costs go unrecovered from Medicare, Medicaid and insurance companies.

"Much of the income that CRFA derives from services comes via government programs, and there are write-offs that result in there being very little consistency between the rates charged and what we actually get," Rose said of ambulance service revenues.

Last year, the city paid \$378,796 to cover CRFA costs — \$128,796 more than budgeted in 2003/2004.

In its 2004/2005 budget, the council allocated \$378,796 to CRFA. According to city clerk Karen Crouch, the city has paid the agency \$347,497 this fiscal year, covering most of the CRFA bills expected this year.

"I'm hoping we can keep it to about the same as last year," Rose said.

He also said CRFA is benefitting more from the mutual aid calls it runs outside its jurisdiction when AMR is not close enough to get there first.

"We have increased our service on behalf of areas or calls where the county's ambulance system can't respond," Rose said. "We do make money on those."


At home, Petey has three indoor siblings, all cats: Lodie, Oliver and Gracie. Lodie is only seven months old and has

The ad was in the papers one time only, and 517 responses is very impressive," said Agha. "People are fed up with Cal-Am, especially with the big rate increases it is asking for, and the public would like to see a change.'

Cal-Am general manager Steve Leonard acknowledged that his company's poll also unearthed some "historical issues of mistrust" of Cal-Am among its customers, but said the bad feelings didn't extend to the company's ability to build a desal plant to

solve the Peninsula's perennial water woes.

"They have reservations about our company but they don't have any reservations about our ability to satisfy the water needs of the area," Leonard said. "On a technological level, we're way ahead."

Another important conclusion of the Cal-Am survey: A vast majority of the public wants a desal plant built. According to Decision Research, three quarters of Monterey Peninsula voters support a desal plant to serve them, while "just 15 percent wouldn't support desalination anywhere in Monterey County."

Other findings of Cal-Am's survey:

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
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
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developing water supplies than about the risk of runaway growth. "Fully two-thirds of voters agree a desalination plant would provide a desperately needed source of water, compared to just 20 percent who fear that the danger of increased growth is too high," the survey said. "Furthermore, two-thirds of voters agree there has been too much emphasis on conservation, and not enough on developing additional supplies of water."

Two-thirds of voters also believe the desal plant would help the environment. "They're saying, 'We want water, but we also want the river back," Leonard concluded. "Our project will provide an big environmental gain for a modest environmental impact."

A large majority of voters say they're comfortable with private ownership of a desal plant. But while Cal-Am's survey found the company's Coastal Water Project has plenty of backing among the public, del Piero said his agency's plant has made more progress toward actual construction.

"Our site is practically cleared and we're going to be awarding a contract for the EIR within the next two weeks," del Piero said.

And he cautioned that too much delay in making a decision whether Monterey Peninsula water users will subscribe to the PSM plant could end up with them being left out, since only one desal plant is likely to be approved.

"The amount of water we can produce will be limited by environmental considerations, and those folks who are interested in participating early on are going to receive the benefit," he said. "Those who hold out could end up with nothing."


Mr. Schetter served in the U.S. Army from 1943 to 1946. His second wife, Diane, preceded him in death in 1988.

Burial will take place in the family plot at Lakewood Memorial Park, Hughson.



Runoff follies

WHEN MOST people heard the news that state officials ordered Carmel not to let any stormwater run into Carmel Bay, they laughed. It was a pained laugh, though. Because there's nothing funny about the government completely losing its mind.

Our ocean is precious, of course. Nearly everyone wants to see it preserved in its current, nearly pristine state, and reasonable measures to keep excess amounts of obnoxious chemicals out of water that runs through the city's storm drains are certainly in order. That's why we supported the city's proposed stormwater assessment fee when it was on the ballot in the fall of 2003. The voters turned it down, unfortunately — but not because they like pollution. They just wanted the city to foot the bill for the rather modest proposed stormwater cleanup program out of general city tax revenues. But Carmelites need not feel inadequate when it comes to stewardship of the environment.

In fact, almost every populated part of this state envies the Monterey Peninsula for its carefully preserved natural setting. Few places can boast the wildlife that populates local shores and forests, much less the clean air and water and plentiful food that allow our deer, raccoons, sea lions, harbor seals, sea otters, sea stars, sea gulls, pelicans, hawks and other creatures to thrive.

And why is this so? Partly because the human population of the Monterey Peninsula is rather small. The Carmel River, for example, drains an area occupied by no more than 30,000 souls. Contrast that to the Sacramento River, which flows through several large cities and hundreds of suburbs on its way to San Francisco Bay. And by the time that river's waters reach the Pacific Ocean, perhaps 10 million people have contributed something (noxious) to its contents.


Likewise the Los Angeles River — if you can call it a river. The water in this concrete channel flows through one of the most densely population regions in the United States. And their stuff, as we all know, goes downhill.

Is it too much to ask that, before they start imposing a zero-tolerance policy on this already conscientious community, state water quality officials make at least a bit of progress elsewhere?

The newsworthiness of prayer

NUMEROUS READERS thanked this newspaper for its nonjudgmental reporting of the story of young Matthew Scholink, whose severe head injuries in a car crash near Del Monte Center left him in a coma and near death for 13 days. Responding to his desperate struggle for life, his family and friends — and plenty of strangers — launched a prayer marathon at the hospital, in their homes and in churches, asking God to save Matthew's life. And when it was saved, they gave God the credit. And we reported their efforts and their beliefs straightforwardly.

In the big city newspapers, where phrases such as "born again Christian" are considered political epithets, it sometimes seems the only religion not considered legitimate is Christianity. The Carmel Pine Cone does not endorse any particular religion or any individual's beliefs. But we think it's fine that they have them, even if they come from the Bible.

MAYOR OBJECTS TO SPRINT ANTENNA ON SUNSET ROOF

By MARY BROWNFIELD

CARMEL CITY Council members sparred over a proposed lease with Sprint PCS Tuesday, but it wasn't about the money. The agreement, which would have cost the wireless company \$1,000 a month to put high-tech equipment on the roof of Sunset Center, went unsigned after Mayor Sue McCloud objected to the design.

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"We spent so much time working on this theater to keep it exactly the way it was, and this is not the way it was," she said, specifically taking exception to a triangle-shaped screen that would be placed on the front of one of the center's peaks to shield equipment behind it.

In his staff report, city administrator Rich Guillen told the council the design would have no aesthetic impact to the theater, but McCloud said, "I really think we're making a mistake to make a change of an architectural detail that is quite large that has never been there before."


The historic preservation committee recommended denial of the design, which calls for one antenna to be hidden behind a stucco plate and a grill below the eaves at the center's peak and the other painted to match the roof, because members felt wireless equipment had no place on such an important building. But the city's preservation consultant said the proposal meets federal standards for historic buildings.

The theater had been reconstructed from new materials, so even though it looks like

The planning commission agreed with the consultant and voted to approve the design last December.

McCloud said she could not understand how the planning commission could have OK'd the project.

"I don't personally see how we can do this," she told Sprint PCS representative David Mebane after looking at photo simulations of the project. "You have to come up with some alternative."


Mebane said his company's designers placed the equipment where it would be least obtrusive and would be sensitive to the building's importance, but that moving it could block part of the signal and defeat the purpose of the project.

Other council members said they failed to see the cause of McCloud's concern, citing the planning process, but councilman Mike Cunningham said the design should be revisited.

"I think everybody's done their job," councilman Erik Bethel countered. "I don't think it affects the aesthetic appeal of the building."

Councilman Gerard Rose moved approval of the lease, which would net the city \$1,000 a month plus a onetime fee of \$30,000 in exchange for the Sunset Center space.

and business people flocked to meet him at a reception last week.

Every day reveals another nuance.

"It's a little like a kaleidoscope: You think you have the picture, and the next day, someone jiggles it and it changes just slightly," he said.

Universal issues

In New York, Globenfelt oversaw a 2,300seat theater in an entertainment market that offered patrons countless choices every night of the week. His life and work in Carmel are

radically different: He rarely goes unrecognized on the street already; he can walk to work in minutes, and his job is to fill Sunset's 718 seats in a less competitive and much smaller market.

"The problems are pretty much the same, though," he said. "The artists' fees are high, and the costs of doing business and marketing are extraordinarily expensive."

Tapping into a changing audience is key to filling theater seats.

"The constituencies are different, and there are certain things they want to see," he said. "My stepchildren [Chloe and Chelsea, ages 11 and 15]

probably would not go to a symphony orchestra. You have to be prepared for change."

While the symphony, the Bach Festival and other traditional classical presenters will still figure large in the Sunset Center lineup, some changes are already afoot.

Better marketing helped sell out two recent Performance Carmel shows - the National Acrobats of Taiwan and Natalie MacMaster - and Globenfelt has been lining up new talent for this spring, including a

cabaret series of vocalists and musicians. "They emphasize the story content and the lyrics more than the music, and there's generally a great song component."

Weslia Whitfield will appear April 9, and on April 30, Andrea Marcovicci will perform "Andrea Sings Astaire."

"And I'll try to do some classic rock, maybe acoustical or slightly amplified," he said in a hint of things to come.

Open door policy

Globenfelt already has the habit of getting on stage prior to each performance to introduce himself and solicit ideas, questions or concerns from the audience.

"I try to be accessible to the patrons, whether they want to talk about ticket prices, or that the theater was too hot, or they didn't like a performance," he said.

He has also helped develop the center's website, which he predicted will be "the finest in Northern California, if not all of California," when it comes online Feb. 25.

He gave the Carmel City Council a sneak preview of www.sunsetcenter.org at its meeting Tuesday night. Borrowing expensive technology from Bass Hall in Ft. Worth, Texas, the site will offer not only online ticketing and a full schedule of events, but also photos of the stage

from certain seats in the audience, a "Spur of the Moment" feature to woo last-minute visitors, descriptions of the center's presenting partners along with links to their websites, and searches by entertainment type, category and month.

Globenfelt said 25 percent to 65 percent of patrons purchase their tickets online. That allows people to book whenever the mood strikes, such as after hearing a radio spot or spying an ad in The Pine Cone at 3 a.m. on a Sunday, when a phone call to the box office

would go unanswered.

"We're all impulsive buyers," he said. In creating the website and bringing a central box office online, Globenfelt said he's tried hard to articulate the benefits and address concerns of presenters accustomed to handling their own ticket sales.

'Sometimes it's hard to let go of the ways you've done things, and I think over time, they'll see the benefit of it," he said, "If people can come here to get tickets for everything, it will benefit everyone."


Outside Sunset, Globenfelt is looking for-

Carmel, P.G., Monterey offer shuttles to AT&T tournament

OLF FANS in town for the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and locals who enjoy the event need not drive all the way to Fort Ord and ride buses into Del Monte Forest each day. In fact, businesses in Carmel, Pacific Grove and Monterey hope they won't. Chambers of commerce in the three cities will run shuttles to the tournament Feb. 10-13.

After hearing from Carmel Valley residents and visitors who wanted a shuttle too, the Carmel chamber — in conjunction with the Carmel Innkeepers Association - extended the route this year to include pickup and drop-off at the Community Church of the Monterey Peninsula on Carmel Valley Road next to Rancho Cañada.

"That's the biggest change from last year," according to executive director Monta Potter.

The Carmel Chamber of Commerce will have four shuttle buses running

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

from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 10, through Sunday, Feb. 13. The downtown route will stop at several pickup and drop-off spots in Carmel, including at Ocean and Junipero in front of Carmel

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Plaza and on the east side of the Pine Inn on Lincoln Street between Sixth and Ocean avenues, every 20 minutes.

The outer route, which includes the community church, will leave there at 8 and 10 a.m. and leave the Pebble Beach Equestrian Center at 2 and 4 p.m. to return to the church Thursday through Saturday. The Carmel Valley shuttle service will not be available on Sunday.



To make the ride more enjoyable, volunteers will be on the buses to share local color and discuss Carmel's past and present, according to Potter.

Passes run \$5 per day if purchased before Feb. 10 and \$7 per day after the shuttle service begins. Tickets may be purchased at the chamber office on the west side of San Carlos Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues, at Carmel inns, at the Carmel Plaza shuttle stop and on the buses.

People parking their cars in town can do so for free in the city-owned Vista Lobos lot, located on Third Avenue between Torres and Junipero. Paid parking is also available at the Sunset Center lot on Eighth Avenue between Mission and San Carlos, and in the Carmel Plaza garage on Mission between Ocean and Seventh.

The shuttles barely paid for themselves last year, and Potter hopes for a repeat during the 2005 tournament. Last year, they provided almost 3,000 round-trip rides during the tournament's four days.

The service's affordability and flexibility should allow fans to shop and eat in Carmel when they're not watching golf, even if they arrived in the Forest by some other mode of transportation.

"They can buy a ticket in Pebble Beach and come into town and shop or eat lunch and then go back," she said. "We would love to have them do that."

Pacific Grove, Monterey service

Golf fans in Pacific Grove and Monterey won't be left out, as shuttles will also run from those cities Thursday through Sunday.

The Pacific Grove shuttle will pick up and drop off passengers at the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History at Fountain and Forest every 15 minutes between 6:30 a.m. and 6 p.m. Tickets are available at the P.G. Chamber office located near the museum at Forest and Central and cost \$5 per day or \$15 for all four days. For more information, call the Pacific Grove Chamber at (831) 373-3304.


The Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce trolleys, which cost \$5 per day, will pick up and drop off passengers at the Cannery Row Garage and at Portola Plaza at the foot of Alvarado Street in downtown Monterey, both of which have ample parking.

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Without 1,800 volunteers, golf tournament would grind to a halt

VER SINCE Bing Crosby brought his Clambake tournament to Pebble Beach right after World War II, volunteers have served as

its glue. Fifty years ago, they numbered around 100; this week's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am will depend on the help of 1.800 volunteers who travel from several western states.

"They're just such a combination of so many different personalities,' said volunteer coordinator Juanita Russo, who works with the 25 committee chairmen who are responsible for every aspect of the tournament. "It's part of what I love about the job - some are very serious and intense, and some are so funny."

A few dozen of those dedicated volunteers have worked every tournament for more than 40 years.

Del Rey Oaks resident Dick Searle's first job was ticket selling. The year was 1947 — the tournament's first year in Pebble Beach and the price of admission was \$5.

"I was an apprentice electrician and had just gotten out of the service, and when the tournament came my dad said, 'Do you want to help?' and I said, 'Sure," he recalled. "I reported to the Pebble Beach gate and sold tickets.'

Searle's father. Dan. was a close friend of Bing Crosby.

"He played golf with Bing all the time at Cypress and Pebble Beach, and he suggested one time they could

have the tournament up here — move it from Rancho Santa Fe" where Crosby had started it in 1937, Searle said.

Monterey Herald sportswriter Ted Durein and Dan Searle are credited with convincing Crosby to bring the tournament north after it was suspended during the war.

In the beginning, Cypress Point Club, Pebble Beach Golf Links and Monterey Peninsula Country Club hosted the tournament. Spyglass Hill replaced MPCC in 1968, and Poppy Hills took over from Cypress Point in 1991.

Technological advances

After selling tickets, the younger Searle helped out with scoring, and he fondly remembers Crosby and his efforts to make volunteering worthwhile.

"One time, I was flying down to Mexico, and he happened to be on the same plane," he said. "And he asked what he could do for the volunteers."

Searle told him they would appreciate having their photographs taken with Crosby — a request to which the actor readily agreed.

"He did that with anyone who wanted it," he said.

Bing Crosby died in October 1977 after finishing a round of golf in Spain. Nine years later, AT&T became the title sponsor of the famous pro-am tournament which by then had become the biggest event on the Monterey Peninsula calendar, a staple of local charity fundraising, and one of the nation's most popular golf tournaments, attracting millions of TV viewers who enjoyed watching the surf crashing on the sunny California coast from their snowbound homes. Searle's list of amusing anecdotes spans those eras.

"When we were using Cypress Point, Porky Oliver took a 22 on the 16th Hole," he said. "He wouldn't pick up.'


Searle saw the scoring technology and accommodations change over the years.

"It started out with just the basics: a card table with some score sheets on it and three of us sitting there doing the scoring. We had magnetic phones - you cranked them to generate electricity — and that's the way we communicated between the three courses."

Tents eventually shielded them from the weather, and they communicated by CB radio, then walkietalkies, and now the PGA's ShotLink system, the wireless system which records each golf shot electronically.

He moved from scoring to communications, which enabled him to use

his skills as an electrician to erect electronic signs and permanent towers. He oversees connecting the dozens of trailers that roll in to Pebble Beach in the days before the tournament and ensures everything works and keeps working.

The weather factor

Sometimes, the weather tries to get the better of volunteers' efforts.

"Once we had a river going through the tent at 18," he said. "And then there was the wind storm in the late '80s, when it blew all the tents apart and out into the Pacific Ocean. People don't understand how hard that wind blows."

The year it famously snowed on the tournament (1962), Searle was having an early breakfast with a friend when they looked out the window and saw the white stuff coming down.

"It just delayed everything, because it's impossible to play golf in the snow," he said.

Of course, Searle always hopes for good weather, since most of the work his communications committee does is outdoors.


"Outside work and storms don't go quite hand in hand, but we've seen all kinds, and the job always gets done," he said of his 168 committee members, many of whom have worked for him for 35 or 40 years. "We've had ice, snow, rain, wind, floods, slides, hundreds of trees down . . .'

Searle's decades of dedication have not gone unnoticed. Two years ago, out of 60,000 volunteers across the nation, he was named the PGA's Volunteer of the Year.

"I was really shocked," he said. "I

had no indication - they just dropped it on us at a meeting one day. I didn't realize it was of the whole United States."

One of his longtime committee members is Pebble Beach resident Tom Hefling, who joined the effort 50 years ago after he met Searle while working at Bank of America in Seaside. Searle had an appliance business and was a regular customer.

"I was assigned to the crew at Cypress Point Club," Hefling said. "And I was probably there for 20 or 25 years."

He started as a hole reporter behind the 16th Green, when only five scorers worked the entire course. They had no shelter from wind or rain.

"We had people collecting scores from us as players came through," he said. "Over the years, that has grown, and now we have a score reporter on every hole with computer gadgets to assist them."

Like Searle, Hefling shared a 16th Hole memory.

"I remember one player put a ball

him," he said.

When the pro-am moved to Poppy Hills, Hefling did too. But after deciding he no longer wanted to be committed to several days' work at a single course, Hefling began helping Searle's work with communications and electrical work.

After all the trailers, signs and other equipment are connected, he said, "We hang around and, if there's a problem with power, we try to fix it. I'm just sort of a gofer - I go where I'm needed.'

Hefling has found the work satisfying, though he may retire after this year's tournament, which will mark his 50th.

Mistaken for a cook

Carmel resident Sal Nicita pulled the plug on his volunteerism at the tournament two years ago, but he still attends and checks in on his successors. As a thank-you to Nicita for his 40-plus years of service, AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am organizers give him season tickets every year.

"Last year I went there and looked at the cooks — not that I have any authority anymore," said Nicita, who cooked for everyone involved in transportation for the tournament. "I had a good crew, and one of them took over."

Nicita began volunteering in the late 1950s at the urging of friends who worked the tournament and told him what fun it was.

"I was one of the conductors of the trolley cars [used to transport spectators among the courses]," he said. "There were a lot of people drinking and laughing, having a good time in these open streetcars. That's what got me started. I enjoyed it, and the atmosphere was a happy one, so I stayed with it."

It was through a simple misunderstanding that he came to cook for more than 100 people every day at the golf tournament. He had been standing in at a local restaurant for a week because the owners were involved in a dispute, and tournament organizers thought he owned the place and asked him to help out with their food operation.

Eventually, he became the cook for the transportation committee, responsible for feeding about 125 people a day — a job he kept for decades.

"It became a family," he said. The most noticeable change over

the years was the size of the event, according to Nicita, and the accompanying rules and structure.

"In the old days, because the tournament was so small, you could just walk with the players, and some of them were the well-known leaders in Hollywood," he said.

Now the professional golfers are more of a draw, and ropes keep the crowds off the fairways.

Nicita also gets nostalgic when he thinks about the volunteer dinners Crosby threw.

"The tables were always set with linen tablecloths and really beautiful glasses and china and everyone was waited on," he said. The tables brimmed with beer and wine, and "as as soon as your cup was empty, another one came." One year, Bing's brother, Larry, asked Nicita, "How's the food, Sal? Are the people happy? Is there anything else we can do?" Nicita assured him there wasn't. "He was concerned he wasn't doing enough. I couldn't believe that.'

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in the ocean. He had tried it with a 2iron, I believe, and he smashed the 2iron into a fence and broke it," he said. As Hefling took the player's score card at the 18th Green, a PGA official approached the player and said, "That will be five."

"I didn't know what that meant, but the player went and got his checkbook and wrote a check for a \$500 fine," Hefling recalled.

As the eventual head of scoring at Cypress, he also had the pleasure of frequently seeing Crosby, who took up residence in one of the upstairs rooms at the clubhouse when he was in town.

"I used to be able to talk with Bing occasionally, because he stayed there at Cypress and would visit our scoring area trying to get away from the people who would always crowd

The volunteer party, Saturday night before the tournament begins, is still a big deal, featuring top entertainers like Huey Lewis and Roy Romano.

"All the people who help out are invited as a thank you for working so hard," said volunteer coordinator

In vast volunteer network, Thomas is chairman of the chairmen

ON THOMAS, a Toro Park resident who has volunteered with the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am since 1990, heads the operations committee, which oversees the two tournaments presented by the nonprofit Monterey Peninsula Foundation. He was elected last year and oversaw The First Tee Open in the fall before gearing up for this week's AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am - a massive undertaking that depends on almost 2,000 volunteers.

A retired California Highway Patrol officer, Thomas was elected chairman of the nine-member committee, which includes chairs of subcommittees responsible for making sure all facets of the complicated tournament run smoothly.

"He's chairman of the chairmen," said volunteer coordinator Juanita Russo. She works closely with Thomas as he serves as liaison between all of the volunteer committees and the full-time foundation staff.

He also confers with Russo regarding monthly operations committee meeting agendas.

"If we're trying to make a decision and want their input, as far as what they think will be best for the volunteers and chairmen," foundation staff will bring the matter before the operations committee, Russo said.

"And the other chairmen can go to Don Thomas if they have a question if they have a problem, question or concern," she said.

It's an intense job, admitted Thomas, who is also chairman of the distribution committee, which handles all of the clothing offered for sale to volunteers, crystal trophies for the players, gifts for players and volunteers, and supplies.

"I just run the warehouse and then transport all this stuff out to the tournaments," he said. It's a yearround job.

A consequence of Thomas' level of dedication is that he doesn't get to see much of the action on the golf courses, but he said it's a worthwhile sacrifice.

"Everyone says, 'How come you do so much for free?"" he said. "I enjoy it - I wouldn't do it if I didn't."

Also, he says he's awed by the fact that since Bing Crosby brought his Clambake to Pebble Beach in 1947, the tournament has raised and distributed more than \$50 million to charities.

"That's a pat on the back for anybody who volunteers," he said. O

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

Juanita Russo. That especially includes old-timers like Searle, who have been mainstays of the tournament since its early days.

And what gives the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am its longevity? Is it the scenery, the celebrities or the topnotch golf? According to Searle, the pro-am's popularity is due to its unusual format.

"We're the only tournament where the amateurs get to play all four days," he said. "It's been a good draw for us." O

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

Jack London's 'Bruceski 3' to raise money in ALS fight

THEIR LONGTIME friend, caddie Bruce Edwards, succumbed to Lou Gehrig's Disease last year, but the owners of Jack London's Grill and Taproom will continue hosting a biannual fundraiser in his honor to help fight the disease and find relief for its victims and their families.

"The last year of Bruce's life once he found out he had this disease — people went out of their way to look for something to help save his life," said Steve Whitfill, who owns the pub with Jack Hill. "There wasn't time, but this event brought awareness of ALS to a lot of people."

ALS — amyotrophic lateral sclerosis — is a progressive neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and the spinal cord. As the motor neurons die, the brain loses its ability to control muscle movement, leading to paralysis and eventual death.

It is estimated that 5,600 people in the United States are diagnosed with ALS, and 30,000 are suffering from it nationwide at any given time, according to the ALS Association. More men contract the illness than women, and half of its victims live three years or longer following diagnosis. Professional golfer Jeff Julian also died of ALS last year.

Through hosting the Bruceski, which includes a week-long silent auction and a buffet dinner/reception for caddies, golfers, guests and the public on the Tuesday of tournament week, Whitfill and Hill came to work with the ALSA's Bay Area chapter.

"Bruce is gone, but he did a lot to

continue the effort to fight the disease," Whitfill said. This year, the ALSA is opening a new outpatient facility in Ryan Ranch.

"We're going to do a Bruceski in Bruce Edwards' honor to help find a cure and help the families," Whitfill said. "And we're going to do it in association with the two professional golf tournaments twice a year until we're no longer in this business."

Jack London's raised more than \$20,000 for ALS research and family support from its Bruceskis during last year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am in the winter and The First Tee Open in the fall, and Whitfill hopes this year's efforts will surpass that.

"We've been finding out more and more about what's really going on with ALS in this area, and we've met hundreds of people who have been personally affected by it," he said.

Whitfill and Hill have been soliciting donations of cash and auction items and continue to do so. Silent auction items will be listed in Jack London's menus beginning Feb. 6, and bids will be accepted until 10 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 12. Bidders also have the instantgratification option of buying the item outright for a price slightly above retail value. Bid sheets containing a photo, description and the name of the donor will be available at the bar.

The reception, which will run 5:30 to 8 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 8, will be free to invited caddies and professional golfers and will cost members of the public \$50 to attend.

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





THE AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am is unique on the PGA Tour, in that amateurs continue playing until the last putt on the final round.

The competition begins with 18-hole





rounds on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Each foursome (two pros and two amateurs) will play one day on each course: Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass. Play begins at 8 a.m. on these days at both the 1st and 10th tees, with foursomes teeing off every ten minutes.

Each day's total strokes are added to the next for a 72-hole total. The Pro-Am teams' scores are calculated on a better-ball basis, including amateurs' handicap. The pro's score is his individual score.

To keep things moving, amateur contestants are requested to pick up their ball when they are out of the hole — in other words, as soon as his pro partner's score is better than his on an individual hole. Professionals may not pick up and remain in the competition.

On Sunday, teams with the 25 lowest scores and the 60 lowest scoring professionals make the cut to the final round, which is played at the Pebble Beach Golf Links. In case of a tie after the final round, there will be a sudden-death playoff. Total purse for the pros is up to \$5 million this year, with \$900,000 for the winner (up from \$720,000 in 2002). An additional \$120,000 goes to the Pro-Am winner. O




The sunny hillside above the Sixth Fairway is a favorite spot to watch players make their approach shots with Stillwater Cove as a backdrop.

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

Star gazing at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am

AMERAS MAY may be banned during the tournament, and autographseeking is discouraged except when players have finished their rounds, but the AT&T National Pro-Am is nevertheless one of the best opportunities to get close to your favorite star. Whether you're addicted to movies, love prime-time drama, idolize professional athletes, get weak-kneed for rock stars, or thrill at the sight of gazillionaire businessmen,

the fairways of Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass are the place to be next week. Here's a rundown of the celebrities who have promised to play. We've also included two who may not play: Tom Brady, because the golf tournament starts just three days after he'll be quarterbacking the New England Patriots in the Superbowl, and Clint Eastwood who, as chairman of the foundation that sponsors the pro-am, is sure to be spotted around the links, even though he's busy promoting his successful new movie, "Million Dollar Baby."

Harris Barton

A tackle for the San Francisco 49ers from 1987 to 1998, Barton was drafted in the first round of the 1987 NFL draft after a stellar collegiate career at

the University of North Carolina where he earned a degree in business. Barton was regarded as one of the best-prepared and smartest linemen in the NFL. He also must have been one of the toughest: he was picked by John Madden for the All-Madden Team four times. After retiring, Barton joined Ronnie Lott is forming a venture capital firm, Champion Ventures. Barton supports numerous civic and charitable organizations and, in 1995, he donated \$100,000 to his alma mater in honor of his father, Paul, who died in 1994 after a long battle with brain cancer. Barton has also long supported

Chris Berman

Perhaps the nation's most colorful sportscaster, Berman was hired by ESPN one month after its inception in 1979. Six times selected National Sportscaster of the Year by the Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association, Berman has also won seven Emmys and 12 CableACE awards. This year was his 19th as host of the ESPN Sunday NFL studio show, and his 15th as a baseball play-by-play announcer for the cable network. But his greatest fame probably comes from his years on Sportscenter (when one of his coanchors was former Carmel resident Craig Kilborn), where his colorful nicknames for famous athletes became part of the national sports lore: Roberto "Remember the" Alomar, Bert "Be Home" Blyleven, Jim "Two Silhouettes On" Deshaies, and Fred "Crime Dog" McGriff, Andre "Bad Moon" Rison, Curtis "My Favorite" Martin, Steve "I've Got You Babe" Bono and Chris Fuamatu "Bad" Ma'afala, etc. etc.

Michael Bolton

One of the world's top-selling vocalists and song writers, Bolton grew up idolizing such pioneers of R&B as Ray Charles, Otis Redding and Marvin Gave. Blessed with an incomparable voice, Bolton has sold more than 45 million albums during his career. With two Grammys for Best



Rush Limbaugh

Male Vocalist, six American Music Awards, a string of No. 1 hits (including more than 100 songs he has written for other world-renowned artists), sold-out concerts for millions of people around the globe and many humanitarian and industry awards to his credit, Bolton continues to captivate.

Tom Brady

Quarterback for the New England Patriots, Tom Brady was the MVP in

both the 2002 and 2004 Superbowls and he is back in the NFL title game again this year after his team beat the Pittsburgh Steelers 40-24 in the AFC Championship Jan. 23. Last year, his appearance at the AT&T just days after winning the Superbowl came as a major surprise to many, but not to his good friend, Pebble Beach Co. CEO Bill Perocchi. A native of San Mateo, Brady first won the NFL championship in just his second year as a starter.

Glen Campbell

Born in Delight, Ark., Campbell is the seventh son in a family of eight boys and four girls, all of whom played guitar and sang. At 14 he left home to pursue a career in music. He started with a three-piece band in Houston, then he moved to Albuquerque and joined a Western swing band led by his uncle, Dick Bills. At 24, Campbell moved to Los Angeles, where he quickly found studio work as a guitarist. He played on records by Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, Merle Haggard, Elvis Presley, Rav Charles and the Mamas and the Papas. In 1965, he even toured as a member of the Beach Boys during the absence of Brian Wilson.

Finally, in 1967, Campbell made a breakthrough under his own name. He took a song that appeared to be all wrong for a pop hit, with a rambling lyric, no chorus and a folk-country feel. For the first of many times to come, he recorded a song simply because he thought it was a great song, and "Gentle on My Mind" went on to become not only his signature song, but one of the most played singles in history.

He hosted a summer replacement TV show for the Smothers Brothers in 1968 which was so successful that he had his own show, "The Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour," through 1972. He earned a pair of gold singles in 1969 with "Wichita Lineman" and "Galveston." Campbell hit No. 1 on the country, pop and easy-listening charts in 1975 with "Rhinestone Cowboy," and he topped the pop charts again in 1977 with "Southern Nights." He starred in two movies, "True Grit" (with John Wayne) and "Norwood," and recorded an album with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

Kevin Costner

Winner of the 1991 Best Director Oscar for "Dances with Wolves," Costner has starred in more than 20 motion pictures.

Born and raised in California, Costner has a degree in marketing from Cal-State Fullerton, where a local production of "Rumpelstiltskin" started a fairy tale career that made him into one of Hollywood's all-time leading men.

His first two attention-getting movies were "The Untouchables" and "No Way Out," followed by a pair of contrasting baseball films, the iconoclastic "Bull Durham" and the inspirational hit, "Field of Dreams.'

Costner then used his new Hollywood clout to make "Dances with Wolves."

Carson Daly

Winner of a golf scholarship to Loyola Marymount University and a one-time caddy for O.J. Simpson, Daly gained fame as host of the MTV show, "Total Request Live," and now has his own late-night talk show on

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





William Devane

Perhaps best known for his 10-year stint as a corporate cad on "Knot's Landing," Devane has appeared in numerous TV mini-series and more than 20 films, including "Marathon Man," "Yanks," "Payback" and "Hollow Man."

Tom Dreesen

A comedian who has played Vegas, Reno and Atlantic City with the likes of Liza Minelli and Sammy Davis, Jr., and who spent a decade as Frank Sinatra's opening act, has also appeared in many network television shows including more than 50 appearances on the "Tonight Show" and guest roles on TV shows such as "Columbo," "Gabriel's Fire," "Murder She Wrote" and "Touched By An Angel." To show his versatility, he once recorded a comedy album, "That White Boy's Crazy," before an all black audience. According to Dreesen, he never strayed too far from his old neighborhood, and to show appreciation, the city of Harvey, Ill. named a street after him, "Dreesen Street," on Aug. 22, 1992.

Clint Eastwood


Emmitt Smith



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
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records," he says, "it's final. The records will always be the same, but it's the fans who give life to the music. On stage, you know immediately if you are really reaching people."

HAT COULD be more appropriate for AT&T golfers and fans than a murder mystery novel set on the fairways? And most particularly, Pebble Beach fairways.

"Murder at Pebble Beach —A Shane O'Neill Mystery" by R. C. Coile, Jr., has just been released and is available at most local bookstores.

The time span of the book encompasses the day before the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am tournament begins through day four, with protagonist Shane O'Neill — a former Los Angeles cop five years into retirement — fulfilling his lifelong dream of a career on the PGA tour.

O'Neill is returning for the second year as a participant in the Pro-Am at Pebble Beach when a murder takes place before his eyes during an early morning practice the day before "the clambake" is set to commence. With him at the Monterey Peninsula Country Club is his caddy, Topflight.

Witnessing a car purposely pushed off an ocean cliff by a Dodge Ram truck, O'Neill attempts rescue of the driver. Pulling the dead body from the ocean, he discovers from his identification that the murdered man is the chief financial officer of McCoy Golf International, one of O'Neill's sponsors.

Pebble Beach security responds to Topflight's call to 911, and secures the scene. Recognizing O'Neill as a former policeman, the head of security contacts him the next day with a proposition: Secretly keep an eye on Japan's leading golfer, Tommy Toshiro, during the tournament because an attempt on Toshiro's life has already been made on the highway between San Francisco airport and Pebble Beach.

O'Neill agrees, and teamed with Julie McCoy, also of McCoy Golf International, and accompanied by Topflight, the trio play their way around three Pebble Beach courses, while trying to simultaneously investigate the murder mystery. Enough tension to throw O'Neill off his game? Add


Japanese gangsters to this mix along with industrial espionage between golf equipment manufacturers and 60year-old O'Neill finds himself right back in the stress levels he was working under in Los Angeles.

Following his investigative skills as he works toward solving the mystery and protecting Toshiro makes for an exciting read. The author's

descriptions of each scene in the book are wonderfully atmospheric and add to the verisimilitude and suspense of the well-plotted novel.

This is not the author's first book, but it is his first novel. Before he wrote "Murder at Pebble Beach," Russell C. Coile had penned 15 others. Coile was a leading healthcare management consultant, and his previous books were concerned with

trends and how the industry should plan for the future. He died in November 2003 of complications from brain cancer which he battled for seven months. He planned to continue his Shane O'Neill mysteries on a Murder on the Fairway series, a loss that will be felt by readers of this riveting, golf-oriented book. He was 60 years old.
