ADA lawyer's new strategy: Insult the judge

LOS ANGELES — THE LAWYER who's filed hundreds of nearly identical ADA lawsuits against restaurants, wineries and retail stores in central California over the last two years launched a bitter, personal attack this week against U.S. District Court Judge Edward Rafeedie, who is trying to stop the lawyer from filing "sham" suits based on what the judge called "contrived" injuries to his disabled clients.


"I would call the judge a Cro-Magnon, but that would be an insult to Cro-Magnons," said Stephen Yagman, an infamously outspoken civil rights lawyer, on behalf of the ADA specialist, Thomas Frankovich, who has been threatened with sanctions by Rafeedie for filing the lawsuits, including at least 18 against businesses in Monterey County.

Reading a statement from a yellow legal pad after Monday's hearing on the possibility that Frankovich could be fined, or even disbarred, Yagman continued: "Judge Rafeedie's mean-spiritedness, his cruelty, and his contempt for civil rights make Hitler look like a humanitarian."

Frankovich's disabled client, Jarek Molski, was declared a "vexatious litigant" and barred from filing new ADA claims by Rafeedie in December. This week's hearing was to determine whether Frankovich should be punished for filing those suits on Molski's behalf.

And while Yagman used the harshest possible words to condemn the judge's actions, and predicted Rafeedie would be "thrashed See ADA page 14A

 $\mathbf A$ FTER A year serving in Iraq with the U.S. Army National Guard, Staff Sgt. John Hanson finally returned home this week. The Carmel building maintenance worker spent Wednesday night in his Salinas house with his wife, Annette, and kids, Travis and Keely.

"It was wonderful to see him, and especially the look on TJ's face when he saw his dad," Annette reported Thursday morning. "He actually got to come home with us and spend the night."

It was at 10 p.m. that Keely reunited with her father, who will drive back to Camp Roberts each day "and will hopefully get to come home every night."

ten about longtime Monterey Peninsula resident Dorothy McEwen since she died at the age of 61 on Feb. 1. The Washington Post and the Boston Globe noted her passing, recognizing her role as a computer software pioneer. 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Carmelites to pay more for trash pickup

m HEN}$ THEY receive their bills, Carmel residents and business owners will notice higher garbage collection charges.

Last Tuesday the city council approved the 2.6 percent rate hike, which is retroactive to Jan. 1, to compensate for cost-of-living increases and new state clean-air rules.

According to the city's contract with the Marina Carmel Waste company. Management can request a rate increase equivalent to 75 percent of the Consumer Price Index for the San Francisco-Oakland-San Jose area each year.

General manager Mark Arsenault said county jurisdictions allow for the annual cost-of-living adjustment "because their populations are not growing.3

Carmel's rates are competitive, Arsenault told the council Feb. 1, especially considering what they pay for.

"I serve four counties, and there are not more extensive services that our people provide than here," he said. The average residential rate for a 35-gallon can is increasing from \$20.07 to \$20.59.

Carmel residents enjoy a privilege no other customers have: They can leave their garbage cans in their back yards, or elsewhere on their properties, and the trash col-

lectors will retrieve them. empty them and return them to their appropriate places. The city made that arrangement with Waste Management to avoid having the unsightly cans at curbside.

"We're paying for cans to be picked up and delivered back because of our large absentee population," Mayor

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Homeowners who are 62 or older may qualify and be eligible even if there is an existing first or second mortgage. The size of the reverse mortgage depends upon the borrowers age(s), the program selected, the Sue McCloud said, but many residents are unaware, so "a large number of [the cans] reside on the curb day in and day out."

She asked Arsenault if his company could do a better job of informing customers of the unique service, perhaps by placing stickers on the cans.

McCloud also wanted the company to remind residents and commercial customers of the importance of recycling. By law, the city must divert half of its waste to reuse programs or face stiff fines.

"We need the help of everybody in the city to do this," McCloud said.

Arsenault said the 2.6 percent increase also includes just under 1 percent to pay for retrofits required by the California Air Resources Board. In an April 2004 letter, CARB Chairman Alan Lloyd advised cities and counties they would be expected to help cut garbage trucks' diesel fumes.

"Since all California residents will enjoy the health benefits of this regulation, the board felt waste collection companies should not stand alone in shouldering the costs," he wrote.

Before the council voted unanimously to approve the rate hike, councilman Gerard Rose commented, "The rates are unusually low, and the service is unusually high. You don't get this kind of service anywhere."

CARMEL BEACH should be packed with pugs next Sunday, when their owners meet, greet and talk about canine news, including Spay Day USA - the Doris Day Animal Foundation's campaign to reduce pet overpopulation.

Organized by Linda Houts, the get together will also provide pet owners the opportunity to join the brand new Pug Club, which will meet monthly at the beach "for the purpose of pug information, socializing and encouraging support for pug rescue groups," such as the nonprofit Pug Savers.

Houts said all pugs are welcome, though large, unneutered, pugnacious canines should be left at home, as many dogs will be off-leash on the city's beach. She also encouraged dog owners to bring chairs and "pug-proof picnics" to the gathering set for noon to 4 p.m. Feb. 20 on Carmel Beach at Eighth Avenue.

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

YOGA AT 100, A PET SKUNK AND VEH

LORELEI BROCK has never been afraid to try the unconventional. Consider her time-tested solution for perfect teeth – brushing them with Ivory soap.

Two years ago, a 98-year-old Brock decided to try something "new" called yoga.

"I'd never heard of it before," said Brock, who recently turned 100. "Yoga keeps me supple. I'm so grateful when I can reach down and touch the floor."

Since her introduction to yoga, Brock has regularly attended weekly classes at Park Lane, a senior living community in Monterey. She praises the benefits of postures and breathing exercises that originated in India over 4,000 years ago.

"It's really a super class," said Brock, who has lived at Park Lane for 14 years. "I look forward to it every week. The routines are so helpful. I do them a lot at home."

Yoga instructor Gina Puccinelli is in awe of Brock's remarkable physi-

cal condition and spirit. "Lorelei was one of my

first students here and one of my most consistent 'yoginis," said Puccinelli. "I can count on her being here every week."

Brock's devotion to her yoga practice gives new meaning to the phrase, "late bloomer." Perhaps least impressed by her achievement is Brock, whose long life has been extraordinary from its start.

At the age of five, she was rescued from a fall into San Francisco Bay — by a dog.

"My mother couldn't swim," she recalled. "We

had an Irish water spaniel named "Dr. Boy" and he pulled me out of the water."

Perhaps because a dog saved her from drowning, Brock developed a lifelong affection for animals. Yet even in choosing a pet, she has opted for the unconventional.

A skunk called Chanel

"I once had a pet skunk named 'Chanel," she said with a sly smile. "She had a litter box and liked to stay in the house and sit in my lap. She was adorable."

Not content to settle for a vocation considered more appropriate for her gender, she graduated from Stanford University with a B.S. in microbiology in 1926. There were very few female microbiologists at the time, and her line of work took her to some interesting and unusual places, including a brothel in San Francisco's Chinatown where she took blood samples from the employees.

Brock's natural curiosity about people and places led to many travels abroad.

"I know more about Asia, South America and Africa than I do about my own country," she said. "I've never been to Chicago. But I once spent a month in Zanzibar."

Of all the places she has visited, China is her favorite.

"I worked at a Chinese hospital in the 1930s," she recalled. "I loved China. The people were great. I still think about them."

So much travel has imbued Brock with a great perspective of the Monterey Peninsula, where she has lived for the last 30 years.

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

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

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Homeless man accused of lewd acts and sexual battery

A 50-YEAR-OLD male transient was arrested last week on suspicion of indecent exposure, lewd conduct and sexual battery stemming from four separate incidents in Carmel-by-the-Sea.

Detective Jesse Juarez said he identified Randolph "Randy" Porter as a possible suspect after hearing him described by four adult victims whose identities are being protected.

The investigation began last month, after a female reported a man exposed himself to her while she was doing janitorial work at a downtown Carmel shop around 9 p.m. Dec. 16.

Other victims told police a man was masturbating in a public building during daylight hours on two different occasions. Juarez said the suspect was "partially obscured from view."

A fourth victim claimed a man inappropriately touched her against her will while they were driving in her car on Scenic Road. She told police she had been

Monterey to Carmel at the time. Police believe Porter briefly befriended some of his victims and that all were targeted at random.

giving him a ride from

"As a result of the investigation, his name came up as a possible suspect," Juarez said. Photos were obtained and photo lineups were compiled, and he was ultimately identified by the victims as the person responsible for the acts."

While conducting surveil-

lance in areas known to be frequented by Porter, Juarez spied him last

> Monday night. "He was walking past me

> in the street," Juarez said. Armed with a warrant issued by Monterey County Superior Court, Juarez arrested Porter Jan. 31 and booked him into county jail on charges of indecent exposure, engaging in lewd acts and sexual battery.

He is being held at Monterey County Jail on \$250,000 bail and is set to appear in court Feb. 16.

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Thieves break into C.V. Library, Big Sur beach gatehouse

BURGLARS HIT a Carmel Valley library and a Big Sur beach kiosk over the weekend, stealing equipment from one and cash from the other.

Monterey County Sheriff's Investigator Mike Shapiro learned Tuesday that thieves broke into the small library on Carmel Valley Road through a rear window under cover of darkness

"The cleaning crew found window slats partially removed from a back window but didn't realize anything had been taken," Shapiro said of the first people on the scene following the break-in.

But library employees arrived Feb. 8 to discover the thieves had taken a flat panel Gateway monitor and a 13-inch TV/VCR combination valued at a total of \$450, though the loss could creep higher depending on how much damage the suspects caused by ripping a communications cable from the wall, according to Shapiro.

He suspects the crime occurred sometime between 7:30 Saturday night and midnight Sunday.

"They had unscrewed three floodlights in the back to prevent being seen," he said.

He also has some clues that could help identify the culprits.

"I obtained quite a few latent fingerprints from the glass," Shapiro said, though due to a backlogged crime lab at the sheriff's office, it could be months before the prints are analyzed.





Pfeiffer Beach hit

On Saturday, Troy Tollefson told Shapiro a burglar had smashed the window of his fee collection kiosk at Pfeiffer Beach the night before to steal cash and a cash box.

Tollefson works for Parks Management Company — the vendor that collects the \$5-per-vehicle day-use fee at the beach — and he reported the burglar took \$125 from the small kiosk, according to Shapiro.

"It was a window smash with a rock that happened sometime during the night, and once they broke the window to the kiosk, they got inside and removed cash from one cash box and then took another cash box," he said.

The burglar apparently did not have to search long for the stash.

"That's a very, very small kiosk, and essentially there's a bunch of shelves with really no place to hide anything," he said. "It would be easy to ransack. I recommended to this guy that once he leaves the kiosk, he should not leave the cash there.'

Shapiro said no suspects were identified in the break-in.




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Volunteers keep under-appreciated Big Sur landmark open

IF THERE were an award for California's least appreciated scenic landmark, certainly Point Sur would win.

While several million visitors pass by Point Sur and its lighthouse on Highway 1 each year, scarcely 5,000 actually stop to visit. Its new steward, California State Parks, is over-

burdened with the management of local campgrounds and can only offer minimal support and attention to the massive rock and its 19th century navigational improvements.

Yet through the efforts of a dedicated group of volunteers, Point Sur State Historic Park, about 20 miles south of Carmel, is able to offer its somewhat sporadic visitors quite a memorable experience.



Mary Jane and Jack Hammerland are two of 64 active volunteers who help operate the park. Like most volunteers, they're quick to downplay the importance of their own individual roles. But ask them why they do what they do and it's obvious they are passionate about Point Sur.

"People come from all over the globe to see our lighthouse," said Jack Hammerland, a Carmel resident. "They're aficionados. They're just nuts about lighthouses. And we think our location is one of the most pristine in the world. It's really an incredible place."

While it is hard to imagine today, Point Sur once played a pivotal role in the history of California.

"Not everyone came to California in a covered wagon," explained Mary Jane Hammerland, a docent and board member of Central Coast Lighthouse Keepers. "Sailing vessels played an important role in the settlement of the state."

Especially after the discovery of gold at Sutter's Mill in 1848, and before the completion of the the transcontinental railroad in 1869, ships carrying new residents traveled around the southern tip of South America and up the coast to San Francisco. The journey was long and dangerous, and the mountainous, craggy coast now known as Big Sur was a particular navigational hazard.

After the wreck of the Ventura in 1875, mariners petitioned the U.S. Lighthouse Service to install a light at Point Sur. The wheels of bureaucracy turned slowly, but by 1889 the lighthouse was ready to operate. For the next 85 years, a series of caretakers and their families lived atop the windswept and often fogbound rocky promontory, managing day-to-day operations. In 1974, the last full-time resident left Point Sur and the facility was automated. Today, the U.S. Coast Guard services the lighthouse which, even in the era of global positioning satellites, is still a comfort to ships making their way along the California coast.

If it were not for the efforts of volunteers like the Hammerlands, the Point Sur lighthouse might be publicly inaccessible, as are many other silent reminders of the age of of sail and steam that dot the shores of the United States.

The volunteers lead guided tours of Point Sur and its lighthouse on Saturdays at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. and Sundays at 10 a.m. year-round. Tours are available at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Wednesdays from April through October, and 10 a.m. Thursdays in July and August. Tours are also available at sunset from April 23 through Oct. 17 when the moon is full.

"Sometimes the weather actually cooperates with us," said Mary Jane Hammerland of the full-moon tours. "Even in the fog, it's a quite remarkable experience."

To get an idea of how hard volunteers work to keep the lighthouse open to the public, consider the following numbers: In 2004, they provided 266 tours and contributed 12,300 hours of labor.

"It's not an easy job," said Mary Jane Hammerland. "It

A GENERAL contractor working in Carmel lost \$41,000 when someone forged checks from his business bank account, police learned Feb. 5.

Five checks — three for less than \$5,000, and two for more than \$10,000 — were cashed out of state between Jan. 24 and Feb. 4, according Carmel Police Detective Jesse Juarez. The checks were duplicates of originals issued on victim Fred Kern's account.

Kern learned of the fraud from his bank, Washington Mutual, and no one knows how the thieves obtained the original checks in order to make copies.

Information is thin, but Juarez hopes to find the answers. "If there's a way for me to establish that the crimes originated here, even though the checks were cashed elsewhere, then I'll continue the investigation as far as possible," he said. "I'm going to try to find out if these checks are being compromised here." The contractor should not be liable for the stolen cash, provided Washington Mutual Bank's internal investigation does not identify him as a suspect, or a client with poor financial management skills, rather than a victim.

"As long as the bank is satisfied that a forgery has been committed, they will honor what the victim is saying," Juarez said. "Then they themselves become the victim, because they take on the loss."


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
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

"All of the money we raise stays on the Monterey Peninsula," she said of one of her favorite local charities.

Brock keeps a busy schedule - between yoga classes and volunteering at the thrift store, she finds time to take a threeday-week exercise class with a fitness trainer that focuses on strength, flexibility and balance. And if there's any time left over, she mends clothes for her friends and neighbors.

She also likes to attend church services.

"I pray each day that I can hear and see," she said. To a visitor, her memory seems to be holding up just fine, but she doesn't think so.

"I can't remember people names and where I put things, but I remember rhymes," she said with a mischievous grin

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before reciting a line inspired by a recent meal at Park Lane. "The food is so great . . . you are bound to gain weight."

She then commented to a staff member, "I don't know how you put up with all these old people all day, always complaining about the food."

Living to 100 requires a certain amount of self-discipline Brock eats just twice a day and generally avoids snacks.

"I've been five-feet-tall and I've weighed 110 pounds most of my life," she said. "If I gain one pound, I take it right off. I'm a chocoholic, but I really have to watch it."

Regardless what she eats, Brock religiously brushes her teeth after each meal — with soap.

"I still have all my teeth," said Brock, flashing a 100-yearold smile that would win the admiration of any dentist.

While the Point Sur volunteers go about their business relatively quietly and their efforts have not gone unnoticed.



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

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Forest Lodge condominium plans raise no opposition

has been used as a hotel since 1948 and is bordered by houses on Torres Street, a hotel on Ocean, a church on Mountain View and the Carmel Plaza on Junipero.

California law "gives local jurisdictions the ability to develop a unique set of design standards for a particular property," principal planner Brian Roseth explained. The city has developed five or six specific plans, including Carmel Plaza's. "In each case, we have looked at the unique site constraints and the surrounding neighborhood, and then devel-

oped a plan that seemed to fit in. They are written into the municipal code and function like a special zoning district."

Planner Sean Conroy said the plan would likely combine the zoning rules for residential and residential-commercial districts. Under R-1 zoning, the 12,912-square-foot site could only contain three units totaling 3,350 square feet. Under RC zoning, it could

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

soundly" when the case reaches the 9th Circuit Court of Appeal, the judge didn't mince words about what he called Frankovich's "unethical" behavior.

"The court has reviewed 223 complaints filed by Mr. Frankovich in 2004, most of them on behalf of Mr. Molski," Rafeedie began. "Each of the 223 complaints states the same five causes of action, asks for the same damages, and is virtually identical to the other suits, even down to the typos."

All of the suits claim Molski, or another defendant, was injured because of handicapped access problems at the businesses being sued — injuries "the court believes are contrived to effectuate the defendants' insurance policies."

Rafeedie was more specific about Molski's alleged fakery: "In one four-day period, he claimed he was injured at 16 different establishments, and on nine separate occasions he filed four or more lawsuits for injuries allegedly sustained in one day."

The judge called these multiple injury claims, "a record of abuse that completely undercuts that he is a victim of discrimination."

Rafeedie also condemned Frankovich for sending letters to each of the businesses he sued, advising the businesses not to get outside counsel and to settle the lawsuits quickly.

"And Mr. Frankovich even offered to represent the businesses in lawsuits against their insurance companies if they wouldn't settle," according to Rafeedie. "These letters reinforce the court's conclusion that Frankovich and his client's objective is only to get money from the people they sue."

After the hearing, Frankovich referred reporters' questions to Yagman, who has a long record of criticizing federal

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judges with harsh language, and even drew a two-year suspension from a three-judge disciplinary panel in 1994 for calling one judge "an anti-semite, ignorant, dishonest and being drunk on the bench," according to the Los Angeles Times. (The suspension was overturned on appeal.)

But Frankovich personally defended the letters to the businesses he sued, including eight restaurants in Carmel, saying the judge quoted the letters "out of context."

Yagman also angrily stated that "there was absolutely nothing unethical in these letters."

In legal papers filed with Rafeedie, Frankovich and Yagman also defended the flood of ADA lawsuits, claiming that Frankovich is merely helping protect his clients from discrimination. And they said they had an affidavit from a doctor stating the multiple alleged injuries to Molski are real.

Rafeedie declined to impose sanctions this week, instead hinting that he might throw out all of Frankovich's suits because his clients didn't have standing to bring them — an issue

raised by the owners of the Mandarin Touch Restaurant in Solvang, and their attorney, Robert H. Appert of San Gabriel, who have vigorously challenged Molski's suit against the

others who weren't. She didn't make a distinction between the two. You don't meet that many individuals who leave such wonderful footprints."

Hagen said McEwen, who had brain cancer, faced death in much the same way as she faced life — with grace.

"She was a role model for meeting your maker," he said. Kathleen Tarp, a Carmel Valley resident since 1989, said it was McEwen's humility that set her apart from others.

"Everything she touched turned to gold," said Tarp. "But she never wanted kudos and she never wanted anything back. She just gave and gave. She never talked about what she did, she just did it. She was the most outstanding woman I have ever known."

Another Carmel Valley resident, Julia Harvey, discovered McEwen's generous nature while seeking homes for feral cats.

"I got on the phone with Dorothy and I asked her if there was a possibility she might be able to take a cat," Harvey remembered. "She said, 'Bring at least two.' I said to myself, 'I love this woman.' I knew her character from that moment."

Longtime Pebble Beach resident Judy Mervis was impressed with the ease in which McEwen made the transition from running a software company to running a ranch.

"Dorothy once invited my mom to visit her ranch," said Mervis, who worked at McEwen's company for four years. "She took us for a tour of the property in a golf cart. It was late in the afternoon, and she wanted to move a donkey into a barn. 'Corazon the Burro' was its name. Well, the donkey wouldn't budge, so without skipping a beat, Dorothy went into a field, grabbed a tall reed of grass, tapped the donkey on the flank, and up the hill went Corazon. That image of Dorothy — suntanned, smiling and embracing her new life — is how I'd like to remember her."

Born in Seattle, Wash., in 1943, McEwen attended the

To bring his claims in federal court, the judge explained, Molski might have to show he has been a regular customer at

the businesses he sues — which would be difficult for him, because he lives in the San Fernando Valley and sues businesses all over the state.

The tactic could be a blow to any disabled person's chances of filing multiple ADA claims in federal court, according to one expert on handicapped accessibility law.

Rafeedie scheduled a March 21 hearing on the standing issue.

"He's trying to block access for disabled people to federal courts," Yagman claimed. "His political beliefs are to the right of Atilla the Hun."

Rafeedie declined to respond to Yagman's attacks. But the roadblocks he's put in the way of the state's most notorious ADA litigant left at least one local businessman very encouraged.

"It's about time someone put a stop to what amounts to highway robbery," said the businessman,

who didn't want to be identified for fear of drawing more ADA claims.

University of Washington before moving with her husband, Gary Kildall, to Pacific Grove in 1969. He taught at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey.

In 1976, Kildall and McEwen started Digital Research, a company that designed floppy disk systems for several microcomputer manufacturers and developed software for the nascent personal computer industry.

In 1980, IBM was seeking an operating system for its first-generation PC and contacted Kildall after receiving a referral from Bill Gates, whose fledgling company, Microsoft, did not have an operating system it could sell to IBM. In one of Silicon Valley's most enduring legends, Kildall allegedly refused IBM's contract terms for his software, holding out for a better deal. McEwen supposedly played a significant role in the negotiations, according to several accounts.

Gates eventually came up an operating system and persuaded IBM to pay his company a fee for each computer sold with MS-DOS software, eventually turning him into the world's richest man.

By 1983, Kildall had developed a graphical user interface for personal computers. He was forced to alter its look after Apple threatened to sue for copyright infringement. Kildall's software never gained a foothold in the marketplace; two years later, Microsoft introduced Windows.

Digital Research once occupied a stately Victorian at 734 Lighthouse Ave. in Pacific Grove. That building was recently purchased by The Carmel Pine Cone and now houses its production and advertising offices. DR also owned a Victorian across the street.

McEwen and Kildall separated in 1983 and divorced in 1989. He died in 1994 after a fall outside a Monterey restaurant.


In 1989, McEwen purchased the Holman Ranch in Carmel Valley. Built in 1928, the ranch was once a center of Carmel Valley social life, as well as a hideaway for many Hollywood celebrities. McEwen refurbished the ranch, which now hosts weddings, corporate parties and charity events. It also features an equestrian center.

McEwen co-founded the Carmel Valley Angel Project following the floods of 1995. She also served as a volunteer for the Pacific Grove Heritage Society, the Pacific Grove Art Center, the Suicide Prevention Service, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, the SPCA of Monterey County and the Pacific Grove Unified School District.

The Holman Ranch hosted a memorial service for McEwen on Feb. 5. She is survived by her daughter, Kristin Kildall, her son Scott Kildall, her mother, Marion Strout, and her brother, Richard Strout.

That will be up to his superiors, who are overseeing the guardsmen's outprocessing. Before they can return to civilian life following active service, soldiers must undergo debriefing — a process that typically takes five to 10 days, though the powers-that-be are hoping to push Hanson and his fellow soldiers through in time for their official "separation ceremony" in Fresno Feb. 15, she said.

Hanson, who works for the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, joined the National Guard in 1998 after being away from the Army for 16 years. A trained tank commander, he was called up for active duty and stationed at Camp Roberts following the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. He later served a six-month security detail at Monterey Peninsula Airport. In November 2003 he was activated again, leading to a deployment to southern Iraq, where he spent the past year patrolling not in a tank, but in a Humvee.

"He's pretty good — pretty tired, pretty stressed and seriously happy to be on American soil," Annette said Tuesday night after talking to him on the phone from Vandenberg.

Wednesday night, the jet lag hit.

"His readjustment to the time difference - Iraq is 11 hours ahead of us — will take a while," she said. "He was up and ready to go at 3 a.m.'



(d) An administrative citation and all other notices required by this Ordinance to be served subsequent to service of a citation may be served either by personal delivery or by certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, addressed to a location reasonably calculated to give notice to the responsible party, and shall be deemed effective on the date of personal delivery or when the certified mail is either delivered or delivery is attempted.

If the certified mail receipt is returned unsigned, then service may instead be effected by regular first class mail, postage prepaid, provided that the notice sent by regular mail is not returned by the postal service as undeliverable, and shall be deemed effective on the date five days following deposit in the mail.

Where violation of provisions of Ordinance 91-03 concerning the condition of real property is involved, an administrative citation or subsequent writ-ten notices authorized by this Ordinance may be served by certified mail at

the address shown on the last equalized county assessment roll. Where a violation of provisions of Ordinance 91-03 concerning the con-dition of real property is involved and personal delivery or service by certified mail upon the property owner is unsuccessful, service may be effected alter-nately or additionally by posing a copy of the order at a conspicuous location on the property which is the subject of the order. Where service of any notice required by this Ordinance is effected in compliance with the requirement of this section and with due process the asserted failure of any person to receive the notice shall not affect the validity of any proceedings taken under this Ordinance.

(a) The amount of administrative fines for violation of Ordinance 91-03 imposed pursuant to this Ordinance shall be set forth in a schedule of admin-

(b) The schedule of administrative fines shall excit the appoint of a schedule of administrative citation.

(c) The schedule of administrative fines shall specify the amount of any late payment charges imposed for the payment of an administrative fine after its due date.

(a) The administrative fine for an administrative citation shall be paid to the District through its revenue collections official within thirty calendar days from the date the administrative citation is served. If a hearing is requested pursuant to Section 1.6, the amount of the administrative fine shall be deposited with the revenue collections official or a notice shall be filed with the revenue collections official that an advance deposit hardship waiver has (b) Any administrative citation fine shall be refunded in accordance with

Section 1.10 if it is determined, after a hearing, that the person charged in the administrative citation was not responsible for the violation or that there was no violation by the person charged in the administrative citation.

(c) Payment of an administrative fine under this Ordinance shall not bar enforcement proceedings for any continuation or repeated occurrence of any violation of Ordinance 91-03 that is the subject of an administrative citation.

(a) Any recipient of an administrative citation may contest that there was a violation of Ordinance 91-03 or that the contestant is responsible for the violation by completing a request for hearing form and returning it to the revenue collections official within thirty calendar days from the date of service of the administrative citation, together with an advance deposit of the amount of the administrative fine or notice that a request for an advance deposit hardship

 (b) A request for hearing form may be obtained from the revenue collections official

 (c) The person requesting the hearing shall be notified of the time and place set for the hearing at least ten days prior to the date of the hearing.
 (d) If the code enforcement officer submits an additional written report at the hearing, then a copy of this report shall be served on the person

requesting the hearing at least five days prior to the date of the hearing. (a) Any person who intends to request a hearing to contest an adminis-

trative citation and who claims to be financially unable to make the advance deposit of the fine as required in Section 1.6 may file a request for an advance deposit hardship waiver. (b) The request shall be filed with the finance officer within thirty days fol-

(b) The request shall be filed with the inflace officer within thirty days following the date of service of the administrative citation.
(c) The requirement of depositing the full amount of the administrative penalty shall be stayed unless or until the finance officer makes a determination not to issue the advance deposit hardship waiver.

Editorial

A small step

AT A community forum this week on the pros and cons of public ownership of water utilities an activist offered her assessment that a desalination plant – no matter who owns it - is not the answer to the Monterey Peninsula's water problems.

"The biggest desal plant in the country is in Tampa Bay, and it's a big failure," said Juliette Beck of Public Citizen. "The filters got clogged and it had to be shut down. Why invest all your money in an unproven technology?"

Instead, she argued that conservation and reclamation would solve our water woes — a boilerplate answer that may hold true in most communities. But not here.

The people of Carmel, Carmel Valley, Pebble Beach, Pacific Grove, Seaside and Monterey already use less water per capita than almost anybody else in the state.


Meanwhile, the company that provides them with the water they do use, Cal-Am, has been ordered by the state to reduce its pumping from the Carmel River by 10,730 acre-feet. That's almost two-thirds of our entire supply — an impossible amount to save by installing low-flow toilets and showerheads. Instead, we need a major water supply, and we need it as soon as possible. But with the redlegged frog and the steelhead trout listed as threatened species by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, building a dam in Carmel Valley has become all but impossible. Therefore, only one option presents itself: desal.

Fortunately, two ambitious and capable entities are working as hard as they can to make the desal option a reality. Cal-Am is studying a site at the Duke power plant in Moss Landing; meanwhile, the Pajaro/Sunny Mesa Community Services District is hard at work on plans for a desal plant across the street from Duke, at the location of an old magnesium brick plant now owned by Nader Agha.

It is too soon for the public or water officials to make up their minds which plant should get their support. But that uncertainty about the means should in no way be construed as uncertainty about the end. A recent public opinion poll commissioned by Cal-Am showed overwhelming support for a new desal plant — but that's not as important as the results of the last two water elections, which unmistakably demonstrated the public's demand for a reliable water supply that's big enough to take care of everyone's basic human needs.

Beck was right about one thing: The desal plant has to work. And for that to happen, a pilot plant — basically a couple of trailers with scientists working inside — has to be built first, to test the technology that will be used on a large scale in the operational plant.

Fortunately, some political roadblocks that stood in the way of Cal-Am's pilot plant have been removed. According to officials at Pajaro/Sunny Mesa, their pilot plant will also be operating soon. That's very good news. With all the environmental and regulatory hurdles to be overcome, getting a desal plant online will probably take at least 10 years. Given that, it's never too early to make a lit-

Is there justice in adding 20 percent to the hotel tax purporting that this will bring a great increase to the coffers of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea? The increase in the city's revenue would be just 7 percent, based on current occupancy rates. Realistically, a decrease is possible because inns and motels in neighboring cities would have lower overall prices, and today's visitors continue to seek the best value for their money. If we lose visitors in the future, the 7 percent gain may simply disappear, leaving us with a higher tax rate for tourists and zero gains for the city budget.

The proposed ballot measure also restricts the use of the additional revenue and fails to include a sunset clause - basic indicators of bad legislation. And, in the final analysis, it limits the city's ability to make well informed budget decisions.

ADA complaints 'misinformed' Dear Editor,

I am an attorney, disabled, and from 2000 to 2004, served as a member of the U.S. Access Board, which issues the guidelines on how to make buildings comply with the ADA. I have no sympathy for disabled persons who claim injury when none occurred and no sympathy for lawyers who file lawsuits on their behalf. However, your reporting is misinformed and your anger directed at Congressman Farr and the ADA is misplaced.

1. The bogus lawsuits filed by a few misguided disabled persons are seeking damages under state law. This is not a federal law problem that can be solved by Congressman Farr.

2. You suggest a 90-day period prior to a lawsuit for a business to comply with ADA before a lawsuit could be filed. Setting aside the fact that the law has been in effect for almost 15 years, which really should be enough time to comply, the reality is that if a business is sued in federal court, it can comply at any time up until trial and have the case dismissed without an award of damages or attorney's fees. Thus, a 90-day "cure" period is unnecessary.

3. You also suggest that the ADA be amended so that business owners have an "inexpensive and legally binding way to find out if they are in compliance." The only way that can be done on a federal basis is for the federal government to hire tens of thousands of ADA compliance officers to inspect every building in the country. This is a surprising recommendation from someone who repeatedly rails against the federal government "colossus." While the disability community would wholeheartedly support this, there is no way the Bush administration would even allow a vote on such a proposal.

4. In your recent editorial, and in many prior ones, you continually assert that the ADA is "clear as mud" and business owners don't know how to comply. This is simply not true. Here are the facts: The ADA is very specific for newly constructed buildings that were first occupied after 1992. It is also very specific for that portion of buildings altered or remodeled after 1991. For older buildings that don't fit into the above categories, a business should do an accessibility audit to determine where the building is not in compliance with the new construction standards. It then must make those

modifications that are "easily accomplished and able to be carried out without much difficulty or expense." For businesses with fewer than 30 full-time employees, the government pays half the cost with a tax credit. The government website, www.ada.gov, contains helpful guidelines as to how to conduct an accessibility audit and how to prioritize compliance measures.

Instead of directing criticism at Congressman Farr and the ADA, here are some positive steps that could be taken.

■ The Pine Cone, the chamber of commerce and the city council could sponsor a workshop on ADA compliance by an accessibility expert. If small businesses don't know how to comply, as you assert, hold a workshop so they can find out how to comply.

■ In San Luis Obisbo County, several cities streamlined the process and waived fees for any permits to do accessibility upgrades. Why can't the cities in Monterey County do the same?

■ Small businesses could create a common fund to hire an attorney specializing in defending ADA cases. There is no reason for businesses to pay a penny to settle these cases that are in federal court. All they need to do is comply and have the case dismissed. But they need an experienced attorney who has done this before and can do it again.

File a complaint with the State Bar Association against attorneys who bring lawsuits with allegations they know to be untrue, e.g., filing separate complaints alleging the exact same injury at different locations on the same day.

Finally, your characterization of the ADA as an "infamous

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

Charging tour buses *for parking = bad business?*

CHARGING BUSES to park on Junipero Street could cause tour companies to drop off and pick up passengers rather than park - increasing traffic hazards and adding wear and tear to city streets or worse yet, to not come at all, according to former Plaza Cafe owner Kent Spilfogel, a plaza tenant for many years who shared his concerns with the Carmel City Council last Tuesday.

"Many buses are already talking about not coming to Carmel," he said, which could cut business license fees, sales tax and TOT income, as some tour companies also arrange hotel stays. "I have a huge list of

reasons why we shouldn't do it," he said.


If buses pick up and drop off passengers but don't park in town, city streets could suffer more damage, he said, as the buses make an extra trip to retrieve passengers.

And if they decided to pay the hourly fees, but cut their stays short to keep the expense to a minimum, visitors won't have as much opportunity to spend

money while exploring downtown. Furthermore, if Carmel gets a reputation

of being unfriendly toward travelers, they may stop coming altogether, he said. Spilfogel said he led the opposition to

charging tour bus operators to park more than a decade ago, when the city council voted to levy the fees and then unanimously overturned its decision after numerous Carmel Plaza merchants said the policy

would cost them and the city money.

While no opposition arose during the current council's multiple discussions and eventual decision to raise revenues by charging tour buses to park — including discussions on ordering the parking meters, signing a contract with National Parking & Valet to operate them, and changing the city's code to allow the charges — Spilfogel told The Pine Cone he had made several phone calls to city administrator Rich Guillen conveying his concerns.

"I feel really upset about the situation," he said.

Following his comments Feb. 1, Mayor Sue McCloud said the city contacted some tour bus operators and learned the fees would not dissuade them from parking downtown.

"I received two phone calls on this issue — not many," Guillen added.

hold nine totaling 10,329 square feet.

"They don't look like the typical condominium housing you see in Carmel," builder Chris Tescher said of the proposed two-story homes designed by architect Eric Miller. They vary in size from 1,595 square feet to 1,868 square feet, and two share a wall.

Miller described them as a Spanish stone house, California craftsman, storybook, and board and batt with a slate roof. The condo on Mountain View would include the opening to the eight-space underground garage, which would keep cars off of crowded Torres Street.

The only historic building on the site — located at Torres and Mountain View - would remain intact, and the area at Ocean and Mountain View would be dedicated open space.

Conroy said the proposed buildings "are much taller than the existing Forest Lodge," but they apparently would not obstruct any significant views, and no neighbors raised privacy concerns.

No members of the public spoke at the hearing.

Although he said the condos would be larger than most Carmel homes and could create a "visual impact that's very negative," commissioner Alan Hewer suggested splitting them to accommodate even more families.

Tescher responded that more people would create more traffic — one of the neighbors' primary concerns.

Commissioner Robin Wilson called the proposal "a splendid use of this chunk of land," and said Conroy's recommendations - reducing wall offsets and simplifying roof lines, dropping plate height to cut mass and bulk, setting the maximum height at 24 feet and keeping them to two stories should be heeded.

Miller told the commission his plans could comply with the staff report's recommendations and said the homes would fit well with the neighborhood.

Wilson made a motion to accept the preliminary design concept and direct staff to draft the specific plan. In addition to staff's recommendations, he requested that if the two large oaks being relocated to accommodate the parking garage die, they should be replaced with other large trees. With Ken

Talmage and Julie Culver absent, the commission voted 3-0 in favor.

After the plan is drafted, the historic resources board and the forest and beach commission, as well as the planning commission, will review it and then forward it to the city council. The plan must also be approved by the California Coastal Commission.

WHEREAS, on October 14, 2004, the California Coastal Commission certified the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea Local Coastal Plan (LCP), which reestablished the overlay of Community Plan Districts under Division III - Chapter 17.20.20 M; and

WHEREAS, provisions of the LCP provide for parking regulations and restrictions on Scenic Road or in the Ocean Avenue/Del Mar Parking Lot from midnight until 5:00 a.m. without a City resident's parking permit; and

WHEREAS, in June 2004, the City Council authorized, as a new revenue program, the Pay & Display Parking Program for both the north Sunset Center parking lot and the tour bus parking area on Junipero between 7th and Ocean; and

WHEREAS, in order for the Police Department to enforce the time limits associated with the beach parking restrictions and regulations and the pay and display program, provisions must be made to allow the Department to enforce violations via parking citations(s).

It is unlawful for any person to park a tour bus or any other vehicle for hire, designed, used, or maintained for carrying more than 10 persons without first obtaining a paid parking coupon for a designated time limit and displaying said coupon in plain view on the driver's side dash. Any tour bus, or vehicle for hire, parked beyond the specified time limit or not displaying a valid parking coupon will be cited under this section. Any other vehicle parked in this tour bus zone that does not meet the above criteria will be cited and/or towed at the owner's expense when appropriate signs are posted.

Vijay Singh defends **Pro-**Am title after record-breaking year

HE 2005 AT&T Pebble **Beach National Pro-Am** brings a magical year full circle for Vijay Singh. Long playing in the shadow of the biggest star in the sports world - Tiger Woods -Singh headed into the 2004 PGA season with his sites on something Tiger had long held. He wasn't going to wrestle away any of Tiger's lucrative

endorsement deals, and there was really no chance that he would supplant him as the most famous golf pro. However, Singh was in position to take over as the number-one ranked player in the world. All he would have to do is play lights out for the whole year, and hope that Woods' laid-back schedule wouldn't change.

Tiger had held the top ranking in

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

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

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

golf for a record 264 consecutive weeks - a span of more than five years. But his game had been slipping as he'd played in fewer tournaments while pursuing other ventures - such as marriage (much to the chagrin of his father).

Woods' fall from the top came over Labor Day



Weekend, when Singh took the Deutsche Bank Championship — the first of three consecutive victories - giving him the points to pass Woods on the PGA Tour's official rankings.

Singh ended Woods' streak during a record-breaking year of his own, earning more money (\$10,905,166) than any pro in a single year. His nine tournament wins also tied for the fifth-most in a year. Tiger was the last to win nine, in 2000.

Already with a win on the

2005 Tour — The Sony Open — Singh returns to Pebble Beach for his first title defense of the year, after sweeping to a victory in last year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. This year, the AT&T defending champion will be facing off against several golfers who are striving to build on some notable successes of their own. But Woods will not be one of them.


Practically forgotten in Singh's amazing run in 2004 was the career year of Phil Mickelson, who had long been regarded as the best player never to win a Major.

The Boston Red Sox losing string — before they won the World Series last October — may have had more cosmic significance, but Mickelson's drought was spoken of with similar desperation in the golf world. He finally replaced the monkey on his back with a green jacket, taking the Masters at Augusta.

"Lefty," as he is aptly known, started 2004 with a flurry, finishing in the Top 10 in 10 of his first 11 tournaments, including a third place finish at the AT&T. He contended in two other majors - the U.S. Open and the British Open — but was otherwise unspectacular in the second half of the year while being overshadowed by Singh.

Mickelson did manage to have the last laugh, however, when he shot a 59 to run away with the PGA Grand Slam of Golf in late November. Since the Grand Slam isn't an official event, his score is not in the record books. It is recognized, however, as one of only five rounds of 59 ever recorded in competitive play.

Although he has gotten off to a slow start in 2005, Mickelson remains the fifth ranked player in the world. Davis Love III and Mike Weir are the two other golfers ranked in the Top 10 who will be in



Pebble Beach.


Love, the 2003 AT&T champion, finished that year ranked fourth in the world after winning five tournaments, but a winless 2004 caused a drop to eighth in the rankings.

Weir also slipped last year. Winner of four tournaments in 2003, he saw his world-ranking drop from sixth to eighth after just one win in 2004. Weir came in fourth in last year's AT&T.

Some of golf's other top names who will appear at the AT&T include: Paul Azinger; Ryder Cup captain Tom Lehman; John Daly, Craig Stadler and his son, Kevin; and the enigmatic David Duval.

Daly, who emerged on the scene in the early '90s only to fade after a struggle with alcoholism, re-emerged in 2004, being named the PGA Tour's Comeback Player of the Year. He had finished in the Top 10 in five tournaments, including winning the Buick Invitational in a playoff. It was his first win on the PGA tour since the 1995 British Open.

Craig Stadler now spends most of his time on the Champions Tour, where he

was named Player of the Year last year. In addition to his five wins on tour, the Walrus was winner of the Arnold Palmer Award, given to the top money winner.


> The younger Stadler, who will be celebrating his 25th birthday just days before the AT&T begins, makes up the second half of the only fatherson duo in the tournament. Since turning pro in 2002, Kevin has spent most of his time on the Nationwide Tour, where he won two tournaments last year, including the Lake Erie Charity Classic, which he won on the same day his father won the Champion Tour's Bank of America Champion-ship.

The last time a father-son duo won tournaments on the same day was in March 1999, when Bob Duval won the Emerald Coast Classic and son, David, won the Players Championship. The following week, David Duval moved ahead of Tiger Woods to become the top-ranked golfer in the world. He stayed on top for about three months, until Woods regained the position. He has since been known as the last player to be ranked No. 1 since Woods began his record run.

David Duval is also known as a once great player

who has fallen off the map. Not winning an event since the 2001 British Open, he made only three cuts in 20 starts in 2003, and after missing the cut for The Championship at Las Vegas in October 2003, Duval did not reappear on the PGA Tour until the 2004 U.S. Open, ending his seven-month hiatus.

2004 was only marginally better for Duval, as he made three of nine cuts. After missing the cut in his first three starts, he finally made it into the Deutsche Bank Championship, finishing 13th in the tournament. That was the same tournament Singh won to supplant Woods for the No. 1 ranking. Duval will be attempting to make his first cut of 2005 at Pebble Beach, after withdrawing from the Buick Invitational and missing the cut at the Bob Hope Classic. Also participating in the AT&T this year will be Jimmy Walker, the 2004 Nationwide Tour Player of the Year. At 25 years old (he is now 26) Walker was the second-youngest to ever be named the tour's top player. (The youngest was Stewart Cink, who accomplished it at 23 years old and is now ranked 10th in the world.) As the Nationwide Tour's top money winner last year, Walker earned full-exempt status on the PGA Tour in 2005. Two up-and-comers to look for this year at the AT&T are Joe Ogilvie and Geoff Ogilvy. Not only are the two associated because of their last names, they are both youngsters on the tour who are having similar success. Each had four Top-10 finishes in 2004 while earning well over \$1 million. While Ogilvy has yet to get rolling in 2005, Ogilvie took a lead into the final day of the Bob Hope Classic, only to fall into a second place tie with Tim Clark, who will also be appearing at the AT&T. The tournament winner, Justin Leonard, will not be in Pebble Beach. O



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



Top 10 restaurants to try during the AT&T

VEN DIEHARD golf fans have to take a break from the links to eat. And if they come to town this week to satisfy their palate as much as fill their auto-

graph book, they'll be in luck, because the Monterey Peninsula is almost as famous for its fine restaurants as for its annual celebrity golf tournament.

Selecting the top local dining establishments from a total of 304 tablecloth restaurants can be a harrowing ordeal for a food and wine writer, especially when the proprietors of those omitted from the list will surely feel snubbed.

But narrowing the field to just the Top 10 restaurants actually makes this writer's task easier. By defining Top 10 to encompass the very best in cuisine, service, elegance, atmosphere and views, it is possible to put together a list that very few will contest.

Of the 10 selected, four are in Carmel-by-the-Sea, two in Monterey, two in Pacific Grove, one in Pebble Beach, and one in Big Sur.

It goes without saying that the accomplished chefs at these superior kitchens use only the freshest of produce — often provided by local growers — each day's harvest from the sea, and choicest fowl and viandes. Prices are steep, in most cases, but refinement carries its own price; reservations are, in all cases, mandatory.

Visitors who plan to return often to the Carmel area may want to make our list their own "Must visit" agenda for the next year.



CARMEL HIGHLANDS —

Pacific's Edge Restaurant, Highway 1, four miles south of Carmel, at the Highlands Inn Park Hyatt, offers a breathtaking panorama of the Pacific Ocean through floor-toceiling windows. Plan to arrive early for an aperitif at the bar or at cocktail tables, or in the piano area off the hotel's main lounge — all the better to take in the view before sunset. In the dining room, each table offers an unobstructed view of the ocean. Dinner is served starting at 5:30 nightly. Mark Ayers is the executive chef, Bernabe De Luna is the wine director, and together they'll make your dinner a memorable event. A five-course Chef's Menu is offered at \$85 per person, or \$150 per person inclusive of wine selected by De Luna for the menu.

Here's a sampling from the Chef's Menu: Celery root flan, frisée, braised chestnut and balsamic gastrique. Potato crusted day boat scallop with braised brussel sprouts, and Dijononion coulis. Or perhaps a butter braised Maine lobster, potato risotto, pearl onion and sweet corn bisque. And so much more.

CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA — Anton & Michel, Mission Street

between Ocean and Seventh avenues, looks out picture windows to The Court of the Fountains, a sparkling blue pool with flowing fountains, greenery and an abundance of bright flowers. Mark Simpson is the chef de cuisine of this restaurant, which has long been a favorite of visitors and locals, and which is open seven days a week for lunch (from 11:30 a.m.) and dinner (from 5:30 p.m.). Seafood entrées run \$22 to \$27, and meat and

fowl entrées are \$20 to \$33. Such dishes as house cured duck prosciutto, fresh melon compote, with cracked black pepper and white truffle oil, French onion soup with crou-

tons and Gruyère cheese, Hawaiian ahi tuna, and classic rack of lamb are all favorites on a carefully crafted menu.

Three course Sunset Dinners (excluding Saturdays and holidays) are available before 6 p.m. for \$25. Another attraction: The very elegantly appointed bar off the foyer, one of the best kept secrets in Carmel. A lovely setting in which to meet friends.

C C C L'Auberge Carmel — Monte Verde The luxury inn that houses this unique, upscale restaurant, was built in 1929, of a stye often seen in France, and is one of the architectural jewels of Carmel. Owners David and Kathleen Fink are responsible for the sensitive restoration and decor completed in 2004. The restaurant is intimate, seating 30, and is elegantly furnished with comfortable seating for the three-hour dinner served in seven courses on scores of small dishes. dark-paneled, marble-topped barroom that is one of the most sophisticated on the Peninsula.

The dining room, open at 5 p.m., offers ocean views from every table. The service is impeccable, as befits a restaurant featuring classic cuisine. Executive Chef Boris Ilabaca has influenced the menu considerably.

If you choose one appetizer, choose the lobster bisque (\$9.75), one of the best in the area. The essence of the lobster is captured in the deep, rich flavor enhanced with a dollop of crème fraîche. From 12 entrées (\$25.50 to \$41.50), you might like to try the truffled breast of chicken or the Lovers Point rack of New Zealand lamb served with mushroom risotto cakes topped with chanterelles and arugula. Finishing off dinner with a Belgian chocolate soufflé (\$9) is a treat.

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The White House — 649 Lighthouse Ave.

It's not difficult to find this restaurant, because of its architectural renown. An old Victorian mansion, The White House rises in stately splendor from its gardens and front steps. Chef/owner Robert Kincaid is known for his culinary artistry. He founded Fresh Cream in Monterey years ago, and went on to establish Robert's Bistro at The Crossroads Shopping Village. Each of those restaurants drew a clientele that has followed Kincaid to The White House.

Through some unknown wizardry, Chef Kincaid is able to present a threecourse superb dinner for \$37, exclusive of dessert. The menu, printed daily, offers eight first-course choices, five

second-course choices and six maincourse selections. Kincaid's muchacclaimed onion tart is among the firstcourse listings, as is a delicious chicken Wellington with cranberry chutney. Among the second-course offerings are a tomato basil bisque and a Greek salad of organic arugula greens, kalamata olives, feta cheese and roasted almonds.

Entrées include a roast chipotle glazed pork loin, cranberry chutney, white wine butter sauce and gratin potatoes, and a New Year's crisp roast duckling half with black current sauce.

The interior is charming, with lace curtains and flowered wallpaper, and large windows with neighborhood views.

The White House is open six nights a week from 5:30, and is closed Mondays.

Club XIX — The Lodge at Pebble Beach.

Although the outstanding restaurants at Pebble Beach and Spanish Bay generally are sold out during the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, we are including Club XIX in our listing because it is open for lunch (as well as dinner) during the golf tournament. The decor and ambiance are of sophisticated elegance, and the dining room and bricked patio afford a perfect view of the 18th green of Pebble Beach Golf Links.

Luncheon at the club might begin with an appetizer of Anson Mills white polenta, roasted baby vegetables and Laura Chenel chevre (\$15), or a Maine lobster bisque with chive oil (\$14), while a second course might be a Club XIX prime burger with Yukon Gold French fries (\$21).

Chef Rick Edge pulls out all the stops at dinner. You might like to try his seared Hudson Valley foie gras, with black Mission figs, toasted brioche and fig butter; and, as an entrée, roasted Scottish salmon with speck ham, savoy cabbage with a Sauterne-mustard sauce.

The menu and wine list are tempting in the extreme.

Sierra Mar Restaurant at the Post Ranch Inn, Highway 1, Big Sur.

The restaurant is perched 1,200 feet above The Pacific Ocean, and the floor-to-ceiling windows looking down on the pounding surf afford a view that will literally take your breath away. Executive Chef Craig Von Foerster has held forth here for many years, specializing in California and Pacific Rim fusion cuisine.

Only 65 diners can be accommodated in the restaurant which features a four-course, prix fixe menu at \$78 per person. Braised Niman Ranch short ribs, oysters on the half shell and terrine of foie gras with quince marmalade are among the first-course choices.

Course two features a salad and two soups, while course three gets serious with, for example, New York Steak with foie gras braised leeks, Big Sur chanterelle mushroom Stroganoff or a roast Sike venison with butternut squash ravioli. Course four might be a pineapple upside-down cake with coconut sorbet.


The dinner menu is different every night, but the luncheon menu's à la carte choices, from \$6 to \$18, change only slightly with the seasons.

The wine cellar at Sierra Mar houses in excess of 3,900 bottles.




N 1937, Bing Crosby invited a group of friends to get together for a round of golf and a "clambake" at Rancho Santa Fe in Southern California. That gathering of Hollywood celebrities and golf greats gave birth to the first National Pro-Amateur Golf Championship, sponsored by Bing Crosby, with Sam Snead taking the top prize of \$500.

For five years, the tournament was played at Rancho Santa Fe before being discontinued during the war years. Meanwhile, 1946 was shaping up to be a bleak year for the Monterey Peninsula. Postwar Monterey was frantically scraping for income, the chief source having been packed into sardine tins for just about the last time. Cannery Row was heading into a long decline, Carmel wasn't a worldwide

tourist attraction, Pebble Beach had yet to classified the finest course in the world, and nobody had heard of a young, would-be actor named Clint Eastwood.

At this time, a newspaper reporter, Ted Durein, came up with the idea of attracting more tourists by bringing a major special event to the area. A good sporting event, once a year, perhaps garnished with celebrities, could anchor a drifting economy. Slowly an idea began to take shape, along with a worldwide household name: Crosby.

Durein solicited local merchants to see if they would pool money for a tournament purse - they would. Bravely, Durein wrote to Bing Crosby himself with the idea. That was in January of 1946. February and March passed. Nothing. April, May, still nothing. Then, in June, a letter from Bing's brother, Larry, arrived. Yes, Bing was interested. What's the offer? Durein didn't have one.

The deal is struck

He quickly rushed to see if Samuel F.B. Morse (president of Del Monte Properties, now known as Pebble Beach Company) would let the Pebble Beach golf course host the Crosby. Morse agreed. Ted met with Larry Crosby and the deal was struck.

Bing then decided he wanted the tournament spread out over three courses: Pebble Beach, Cypress Point and the Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course. The PGA Tour, the controlling body of the professional golfers' tournament, said this was unprecedented. Bing asked, "Why not? It's done in England." The PGA Tour consented and the Crosby Pro-Am broke new ground in American golf and was played for the first time on the Monterey Peninsula in January 1947.

Since then, the annual tournament at Pebble Beach has been a staple of the PGA Tour calendar. The tournament purse has increased from \$500 for first prize in 1937 to a first prize of \$900,000 in 2004. The monies for charity each year have continued to set new records as well, with total contributions hitting \$46 million.

Bing Crosby died in 1977. His wife and children continued to host the Crosby Pro-Am until 1986, when AT&T took over sponsorship of the event. Since 1991, the event has been played at Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass. Over the last 20 years, the event has provided some of the most dra-

matic moments in golf, including Hale Irwin's fantastically lucky tee shot in 1984, and Tiger Woods' amazing comeback in 2000.

It has also endured some of the worst weather ever for a major sporting event. Twice, after particularly cold and rainy spells, tournament organizers have talked about moving the Pro-Am to a different time of year. And on one occasion, when the hardy golfers refused to surrender to gale force winds and near-freezing temperatures, Crosby reminded everyone that, "We must not forget the players — those dauntless athletes, professionals and amateurs alike — who are willing to pit their skills, and in some instances their survival, against these challenging links in conditions which sometimes defy description."

But most years there have been glorious, only-in-California conditions for the Pebble Beach Pro-Am. And the memories have been golden, too.

1972 Winner: Jack Nicklaus 66-74-71-73 (284)

A 25-foot birdie putt on the first hole of a suddendeath playoff gave Jack Nicklaus the Crosby title and a \$28,000 first-place check. He beat Johnny Miller after both had poor rounds on the final day hitting bad tee shots and missing short putts all over the course. Miller even hit a ball into the ocean on 10. Nicklaus, who three-putted on 17 to set up the playoff, earned his fifth tour victory in six events. Lee Trevino took third place, as well as the Pro-Am title with partner Don Schwab.

According to a newspaper account, Clint Eastwood, then at the height of his "Dirty Harry" fame, playing in his seventh Crosby, missed the cut and spent Sunday watching the Super Bowl (Dallas 24, Miami 3) and playing tennis.

1973 Winner: Jack Nicklaus 71-69-71-71 (282)

Despite back-to-back bogies on 7 and 8 at Pebble during the final round, Jack Nicklaus won the tournament for the second straight year in a suddendeath playoff — and again with a birdie putt on the first sudden-death hole, 15. Robert Moody appeared to have the tournament won in regulation, but missed an easy two-and-a-half-foot putt on 18 that knocked him back into a tie with Nicklaus and Ray Floyd. "I missed a \$20,000 putt," Moody said. Not only that, he shot 76 on the final round, while Nicklaus and Floyd both shot 71. Instead of the top prize of \$36,000, Moody had to settle for second place money, \$16,650. Lanny Wadkins and Bill Satterfield won the Pro-Am title.

1974 Winner: Johnny Miller 68-70-70 (208)

After six straight days of rain, sleet and hail, and with Pebble Beach looking more like ocean than land, the final round of the Crosby had to be canceled after being delayed from Sunday to Monday (Jan. 8). With everyone in a miserable mood, tournament officials threatened not to hold the event again unless it could be moved later in the year. "If we don't get the third or fourth weekend in January next year, I'd say there won't be a tournament," said chairman Don Searle. Originally, the 1974 tournament was scheduled for Feb. 14-17, but Crosby officials and local business people were unhappy with the prospect of playing over Washington's birthday weekend, when tourists would flock to the Monterey Peninsula anyway. So they negotiated a date switch with the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open, but that still left everybody unhappy. After Sunday's round was postponed, defending champion Jack Nicklaus withdrew. He was suffering in the wet weather from back pain and had fallen 10 strokes behind leader Johnny Miller. When Monday's round was cancelled, Miller got a reduced winner's check of \$27,500. But he also received a check for \$2,250 for winning the Pro-Am side, with partner Locke de Bretteville.

triple bogeys. Littler's winning purse was \$37,000 and it came after 20 years of playing the Crosby, with his previous best finish having been second in 1959. Pro-Am winners were Bruce Devlin and former NFL quarterback Jacky Lee. The tournament was boycotted by Lee Trevino, who said he didn't like playing in the rain on the Monterey Peninsula. Perhaps because of his comment, it didn't rain a bit.

1976 Winner: Ben Crenshaw 75-67-70-69 (281)

The 35th Bing Crosby Pro-Am featured a rare meltdown by Jack Nicklaus, who shot 45 in warm sunshine on the back nine at Pebble Beach in the final round, including a double bogey and two triple bogeys, clearing the way for 24-year-old Ben Crenshaw to claim the \$37,000 first prize. With a record crowd on hand, Nicklaus led the field going into Sunday's play, but ended up tied for 18th place. Already out of the big money and in a hurry to catch a flight to Japan, Nicklaus tried to get to the 18th green in two, but pulled his wood shot into Carmel Bay and finished, in front of a national TV audience, with a triple-bogey eight. Johnny Miller, suffering through two rounds with the flu, tied with Nicklaus at 291. Pro-Am winners were Hale Irwin and Pebble Beach resident Darius Keaton, who was then chairman of Charter Oil Company.

1977 Winner: Tom Watson 66-69-67-71 (276)

Tom Watson picked up the first prize of \$40,000 with a dramatic one-stroke victory that included rounds of 66 at Pebble Beach on Thursday, 69 at Cypress Point on Friday, 67 at MPCC's Shore Course on Saturday, and a 71 in the final round at

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1975 Winner: Gene Littler 68-71-68-73 (280)

A former amateur boxing champ and winner of the 1961 U.S. Open, 44-year-old Gene Littler dented the aura of invincibility that had surrounded youthful Johnny Miller during the first two weeks of the 1975 PGA Tour. A final round of 73 gave him a total of 280, enough for a four-stroke victory over Hubert Green. Miller double-bogeyed 15 on the final round, played in frigid temperatures and gale force winds, and finished with 289, along with Jack Nicklaus. Pebble on Sunday, breaking the tournament record, set by Billy Casper in 1958, by four strokes. Saturday's gallery of 28,000 was also a thenrecord - helped by sunny skies and mild temperatures. Former President Gerald Ford, playing in the Pro-Am for the first time, had a birdie on 14 at Pebble Beach on Friday. Leonard Thompson and Jim Vickers, an oil man from Wichita, won the Pro-Am side.

1978 Winner: Tom Watson 66-74-71-69 (280) Becoming the fourth man to win February 11, 2005

back-to-back Crosbys, Tom Watson beat Ben Crenshaw on the second hole of sudden death on the final day of play, which was pushed back to Monday by rain. Shooting a torrid sixunder-par 30 on the front nine at Pebble on the final day, Watson finished with a 69, bringing him into an unexpected tie with Crenshaw, who shot a seemingly unbeatable 67. Watson's first-place finish was worth \$45,000. Pro Gibby Gilber and Richard Gelb, chairman of the board of Bristol-Myers, won the Pro-Am team title.

Bing Crosby and his wife, Kathryn, shepherded the tournament that bore his name until AT&T took over sponsorship of the event in 1986.


playoff between Bean and fellow PGA youngsters Mark Hayes and Lon Hinkle — a playoff ultimately decided in Hinkle's favor when he sank a 12foot birdie putt on 17. The winner's purse was \$54,000. Hinkle's dramatic finish wasn't seen by TV viewers, however, when CBS decided to end its coverage after 72 holes in favor of "60 Minutes" and "Rocky." Jack Nicklaus missed the Crosby in 1979 for the first time in his career, and Hale Irwin broke his string of making the cut in 87 straight tournaments. Pro-Am winners were Bean and Florida real estate developer Bill Bunting.

1980 **George Burns III** 71-69-71-69 (280)

Under crystal-clear skies, a record gallery of more than 10,000 watched Sunday's final round of the Crosby, when George Burns overcame a big lead by Jack Nicklaus to win. Nicklaus was at one point 10 under (including a 5-under performance on the first six holes Sunday) but faded on the back nine. Burns, meanwhile, was steadily making difficult putts, including a monster 40-footer on 16. "It surprised the hell out of me," said Burns who, at 30, had won almost \$500,000 in five years on the PGA Tour without a victory. He added another \$54,000 with his win at Pebble Beach. Pro-Am winners were George Cadle and Whizzer Farish of Pebble Beach, a pilot for Pan-Am playing in his 22nd Crosby.

1981 Winner: John Cook 66-71-72 (209)

A dramatic five-way playoff, the first-ever on the PGA Tour, ended in a stunning victory for unknown pro John Cook over 20-year-old Bobby Clampett, Hale Irwin, Ben Crenshaw and Barney Thompson. Cook won by making par on the third playoff hole after lapses by his opponents (including a bogey by Irwin) left the door wide open. Rain delayed the start of the Crosby to Saturday, and icy winds made things miserable throughout the weekend. Nevertheless, record crowds turned out to watch the tournament, which was shortened to 54 holes and ended on Monday. Clampett, who lived in Carmel Valley, missed the victory when he couldn't sink a three-foot par putt on his final hole at Cypress. Cook's winning purse was \$40,500 (reduced by 25 percent because the tournament was shortened). Pro-Am winners were again George Cadle and Whizzer Farish — the first and only Pro-Am team to repeat. Farish, who grew up on the Peninsula, said of the three Crosby courses, "I've played them a thousand times - each.'

holes to play - and foreshadowing the 2000 AT&T Pro-Am when Tiger Woods overcame an even bigger deficit - Craig Stadler let Jim Simons win the 1982 Crosby and its first prize of \$54,000. But Simons was no patsy; his final round of 66 was one of the finest finishes to date in the tournament, and he set a Crosby record with his total of 274, 14 under par. The great Jack Nicklaus might have won, but ended up in a five-way tie for third (with Johnny Miller and three others) after missing several key putts.

1983 Winner: Tom Kite 69-72-62-73 (276)

It rained all day during Sunday's final round, but play continued anyway as Tom Kite took the tournament despite a final round of 73. Saturday, when Kite also played Pebble, he set a course record of 62. The \$58,500 first prize was Kite's fifth PGA crown in 12 years. Despite four birdies on the back nine, Jack Nicklaus finished in sixth place — which earned him \$11,700 and made him the first golf pro to earn more than \$4 million in a career. Cal Peete was in second place, two strokes back. The Pro-Am winners were Gilder and Clark.

Cove when the ball improbably caromed off a rock and bounced back onto the fairway. "The entire tournament evolved around that tremendous break I had on 18," Irwin said. Mark O'Meara, with two eagles on the front nine, nearly caught Irwin. Even after Irwin birdied 18, Jim Nelford did catch him, forcing a playoff. But on the second playoff hole — 16 — Irwin made a tremendous second shot from a bunker 200 yards onto the green and just nine feet from the cup. When Nelford missed his birdie putt on the hole, Irwin calmly nailed his tournament-winning shot. O'Meara, paired with J.P. Diesel of Houston, won the Pro-Am team crown.

1985 Winner: Mark O'Meara 70-72-68-73 (273)

The final year of the Crosby saw the tournament begin under frosty skies with winds at 35 mph. But in the end, Mark O'Meara warmed up the crowd with clutch putting that, despite a final round of 73, gave him the \$90,000 first place check and a then-record 72-hole low Pebble Beach Pro-Am score of 273. Larry Rinker, Kikou Arai and Curtis Strange were all just one shot behind. Playing in the final group, O'Meara missed a birdie putt on 18, but so did Strange, ending any chance of a playoff. Dean Spanos, who lived in Stockton and was part-owner of the San Diego Chargers, and pro partner Hubert Green captured the Pro-Am crown.

1986 Winner: Fuzzy Zoeller 69-66-70 (205)

The first year with its new corporate sponsor was nearly a washout for the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Friday's round was canceled after heavy morning rains drenched the three courses. And so was the rescheduled final round on Monday, leaving Fuzzy Zoeller the winner of the \$108,000 first prize after just 54 holes. Crowds were sparse, but the tournament still generated a hefty sum for charity, with AT&T contributing \$750,000 in its first year backing the tournament. Zoeller, who was on Pebble Monday before play was suspended, called the weather, "the worst conditions I've ever played under." He was also winner of the Pro-Am team title, partnered with Coral de Tierra golfer Mike Evans.

1987 Winner: Johnny Miller 72-72-68-66 (278)

Taking advantage of a bogey on 17 by third-round leader Payne Stewart, Johnny Miller won the Pebble Beach Pro-Am for the second time. On a perfect Sunday at Pebble Beach, he shot a six-under 66, including seven birdies, for the \$108,000 first prize. "I can't believe I won," Miller was overheard to say to his caddy as the day wrapped up. Stewart finished just one stroke back. This was Miller's 19th appearance at the tournament he continued to call "The Crosby." In 1968, he launched his career with a victory at the California State Amateur, also at Pebble Beach, which he often referred to as his home course. And Miller wasn't through. He came back and won the Pro-Am again in 1994. The team victory in 1987 went to Fred Couples and baseball great George Brett, who capped the title with a three-inch putt on 18.

> 1988 Winner: Steve Jones

"I knew that whoever birdied 18 would win," Kite said. He finished just one stroke back. After the match, O'Meara sharply criticized the slow play during the tournament, saying it took his group three hours to finish the first nine holes during the final round. Pro-Am winners were Steve Jones and Carmel Valley doctor Jim Rheim, who birdied 18 with a 9-foot putt.

1990 Winner: Mark O'Meara 67-73-69-72 (281)

Winning for the second year in a row, Mark O'Meara became the first player to win back-to-back titles since Tom Watson in 1977 and 1978. Nicklaus also won consecutive titles; Cary Middlecoff was the first to do it back in '55 and '56. No one has done it since. O'Meara won the \$180,000 first prize with a final round of 72 at a windy Pebble Beach. Kenny Perry finished in second place, two strokes back. Payne Stewart seemed like the favorite to win until he bogeyed 12, 14, 16 and 18. Four groups had to finish their third round Sunday morning, after high winds at Cypress curtailed play on Saturday. Dean Spanos, co-owner of the San Diego Chargers, teamed with Hubert Green for the Pro-Am team title.

1991 Winner: Paul Azinger 67-67-73-67 (274)

After being frustrated with his play at Pebble Beach year after year, Azinger stormed to a final round score of 67 to take the tournament from gallery favorite Rocco Mediate. "Every year when I leave here, I say I'm not coming back," Azinger joked after taking the \$198,000 first prize. Before the 1991 Pro-Am, Azinger said he'd never shot better than a 70 at Pebble. On his way to the victory, he birdied 13 and 17, while Mediate was blowing his once-substantial tournament lead with a final round of 74. The Pro-Am team title went to John Cook and soap opera star Jack Wagner.

1991 was also the first year Poppy Hills was part of the Pro-Am play; it replaced Cypress Point golf club after PGA officials raised concerns about the club's exclusive membership policies.

1992 Winner: Mark O'Meara 69-68-68-70 (275)

With a dramatic 35-foot putt on 18 to force a playoff with Jeff Sluman, Mark O'Meara made perhaps his most dramatic shot in a run of three AT&T Pro-Am victories in four years. He captured the \$198,000 first-place prize by sinking another great putt — from 18 feet — on the first playoff hole. The day started poorly for O'Meara, who shot 38 on the 29 C

front nine. But he came storming back with a 32 on the back nine. Paul Azinger was just one back after regulation play finished, despite shooting 68 for the final round. Pro-Am winners Greg Norman and Kerry Packers set a tournament record with a 42under total of 246.

1993 Winner: Brett Ogle 68-68-69-71 (276)

Gregarious Australian Brett Ogle captured his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach with a threeshot triumph in the AT&T Pro-Am, despite four bogeys in six holes during the final round. With a steady rain falling through much of the day, Ogle birdied three of the last six holes to fend off challengers Billy Ray Brown and Greg Twigs. Ogle's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Tom Watson had the low round on the final day, with birdies on 10, 11, 18, 6, 7 and 9. Payne Stewart and Jim Morris won the Pro-Am title, after Mark McGwire knocked his team out of contention with a bogey on 18.

1994

Winner: Johnny Miller 68-72-67-74 (281)

Defying the calendar, 46-year-old Johnny Miller captured the AT&T Pro-Am, and even he had trouble believing it. "I play two tournaments a year . . . this is magic," he said. The win was Miller's third title in three different decades at the Pebble Beach charity event - he had previously won in 1974 and 1987. Jeff Maggert, Corey Pavin, Kirk Triplett and Tom Watson all finished just one stroke behind Miller, who sank a one-foot putt for par on 18 to avoid a possible five-way playoff. It rained nearly all day during the final round and, with a gale blowing from the south, Miller got to the green in two on 17 to preserve his lead while Watson was bogeying 14, 16 and 17. Miller's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Pro-Am winners were Dudley Hart and 18-year-old amateur Robert Floyd.

1995 Winner: Peter Jacobsen 67-73-66-65 (271)

With the best final round by a winner, Peter Jacobsen captured the \$252,000 winner's purse despite starting play at Pebble Beach on Sunday at three under. His total score, 271, was the lowest since Mark O'Meara's 273 in 1985, but with clean-and-place rules in effect because of a wet course, Jacobsen said his record score deserved "an aster-isk." With a bit of sun finally showing through the clouds, Jacobsen birdied 18 to seal his victory. David Duval, in his first full year on the PGA Tour, finished in second place, two strokes back. Pro-Am winners

With an 18-foot birdie putt on the second hole of a sudden-death playoff, Steve Jones capped a dramatic victory at Pebble Beach over a field that included five or six players with a shot at the title. Jones, a relative unknown, triumphed over 1988's top players, including Bob Tway, Greg Norman and Craig Stadler. Jones had a three-stroke lead as Sunday's round began, but bogeys on 15 and 17 opened the door for Tway, who tied the leader with a birdie on 18. But in the playoff, it was Jones who out-putted the veteran for a \$126,000 first-place check. The Pro-Am winners were Dan Pohl and Miami Dolphins quarterback Dan Marino.

1989 Winner; Mark O'Meara 66-68-73-70 (277)

With a dramatic 10-foot birdie putt on 18, Mark O'Meara edged out Tom Kite — who missed his chance for a tie on 18 when his 15-foot putt for a birdie fell short — for the 1989 first prize of \$180,000. February 11, 2005





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



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

1996 Winner: nobody

Tournament canceled due to unplayable conditions

The weather on Sunday was pleasant: low clouds, some sun, no rain. But heavy rains earlier in the week, including a torrential downpour on Saturday, left the courses - especially Spyglass - in unplayable condition, forcing outright cancellation of the AT&T Pro-Am due to weather for the first, and only, time in its history. (Play was suspended from 1942 to 1946 because of WWII.) In particular, one flooded spot on 16 at Spyglass was cited by PGA officials as requiring cancellation of the event. Jeff Maggert was the leader at 136 after 54 holes; he got \$5,000 in consolation money, just like all the other pros in the field.

1997 Winner: Mark O'Meara 67-67-67 (268)

Fighting off an amazing comeback by Tiger Woods — who was in 67th place on Friday and trailed by seven shots Sunday morning — Mark O'Meara won his fifth AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am by a single shot over Woods and David Duval. Woods, playing in a foursome one hole ahead of O'Meara, had six birdies in the first 12 holes but bogeyed 13. Two shots down on 18, Woods made a dramatic bid for an eagle on 18. His second shot, from 267 yards out, landed on the front of the green. But he missed a 35-foot putt and had to settle for a birdie. O'Meara's all-time low score at the event was worth \$342,000. Pro-Am champs were Paul Stankowski and Andy Garcia.

1998 Winner: Phil Mickelson 67-68-67 (202)

A torrential downpour on Sunday brought back memories of 1996, when the AT&T Pro-Am was canceled after 54 holes. But in 1998, with California again experiencing record-breaking rains, PGA officials looked for a way to squeeze in a third round at Pebble Beach sometime later in the year. First, they set the final round for March 2. Later, it was rescheduled again to Aug. 17. The winner's check was \$450,000. The Pro-Am portion of the tournament was canceled.

1999 Winner: Payne Stewart 69-64-73 (206)

With weather getting seriously in the way for the fourth time in five years, the 1999 tournament was shortened to just 54 holes, just like it had been the year before. Saturday leader Payne Stewart was declared the winner of the \$504,000 first prize after heavy rains Saturday night and Sunday forced cancellation of the final round. Stewart's final shot on Saturday, a tap-in birdie on 18 at Spyglass, turned out to be the winner over Frank Lickliter, just one shot back. Pro-Am winners were Lickliter and Robert MacDonnell. Later that vear, Stewart won the U.S. Open at Pinehurst, S.C. He died in a plane crash Oct. 25 when carbon monoxide rendered everyone on board his chartered airplane unconscious soon after takeoff from Orlando, Fla. The plane flew on autopilot until it ran out of fuel and crashed in South Dakota, depriving Stewart of the chance to defend his U.S. Open and AT&T Pro-Am titles — both at Pebble Beach — in 2000.

2000 Winner: Tiger Woods 68-73-68-64 (273)

Leaving the crowd and the sportswriters practically speechless, Tiger Woods gave the AT&T Pro-Am a finish unlike any other. Down five shots when play began on Sunday, and even further behind - seven shots - with just seven holes to play, Woods took complete control of his game and the tournament, capping his comeback with a 97-foot wedge shot on 15 that hit just to the right of the hole, took two bounces, and landed in the cup. He nearly did the same on 16 and finished two strokes ahead of Vijay Singh and Matt Gogel to take the first prize of \$720,000. The win was Woods' sixth in a row on the PGA Tour. Pro-Am champs were Skip Kendall and King City businessman David Gill. The tournament was the last Pebble Beach Pro-Am event for golf legend Jack Nicklaus.

2001 Winner: Davis Love III 71-69-69-63 (272)


Despite a seven-shot deficit when play started under sparkling, clear skies Sunday morning, Davis Love III put together an amazing round of 63, including five birdies and an eagle on the first six holes. On the front nine, he was an amazing eight under. Another birdie on 15 sealed his victory and the first-place money of \$720,000. Vijay Singh finished just one stroke back; Tiger Woods was eight strokes off the lead. Phil Mickelson and saxophonist Kenny G tied with Tiger Woods and Jerry Chang for the Pro-Am title. strokes off the lead (for the second year in a row). Pro-Am winners were Brian Claar and Randall Mays.

2003 Winner: Davis Love III 72-67-67-68 (274)

With nothing but blue skies and mild

temperatures throughout the tournament, talk of "Crosby Weather" and of moving the AT&T later in the year -acommon topic in the stormtossed 1990s - was completely forgotten. And with Tiger Woods sitting out the Pro-Am after consecutive years finishing eight strokes off the lead, all the attention was on less well known, but equally formidable, PGA stars. Davis Love III salvaged a victory with a birdie on 18 on the final day - holding off Tom Lehman by a single stroke. Love's win - his second in three years - came despite a bogey on 16 on the final round. In the group just ahead, Tom Lehman bogeved two holes in the front nine but then shot five birdies on the back nine and seemed poised to force a playoff. A missed birdie putt from less than six feet on 18 left him in second place. Love's win, worth \$900,000, came with some extraordinary luck: His tee shot on 12 hit a photographer (not from The Pine Cone) and rolled to within easy putting distance of the pin. The Pro-Am ended in a tie, with pros Phil Tataurangi

and Brad Faxon and their amateur partners Chris Heatley and Thomas Ryan ending up with 31-under scores of 257. Both pairings finished with final rounds of 64. Two Pro-Am teams were disqualified during the tournament for signing incorrect scorecards.O



2002 Winner: Matt Gogel 66-72-67-69 (274)

With his first PGA Tour victory, Gogel picked up a check for \$720,000 after shooting two under on the back nine during the final round. Two years earlier, Gogel had watched Tiger Woods stage an incredible comeback to take the tournament from him. This year, third-round leader Pat Perez, who was up by four strokes when play started Sunday, withered on the final day, shooting a triple-bogey on the 18th Hole, opening the door for Gogel who showed none of the nervousness of 2000. Tiger Woods shot 282, eight

Tiger Woods' AT&T win in 2000 was his sixth in a row on the PGA Tour that year.

HILE GOLF fans all over the world revere the Pebble Beach Golf Links as one of the finest courses ever creat-

ed, they may not realize the Monterey Peninsula is home to dozens of golf courses suitable for all levels of play and all budgets. Whether you're a scratch golfer looking for a challenge or a hacker more interested in just having a good time, there's a golf course worth playing.

Bayonet and Black Horse, Seaside –

Created in Fort Ord's heyday for military use, these two courses now belong to the City of Seaside and have undergone extensive renovation in recent years. Gen. Robert McClure, designer of Bayonet in 1954, was known for his left-handed slice and designed the course accordingly, so that the only severe doglegs on the course run right to left. The course is named for the 7th Infantry Light Fighter DIvision, nicknamed the Bayonet Division, and is infamous for its grueling Holes 11 though 15, known as Combat Corner. Gen. Edwin Carns designed Black Horse in 1963, and it was bestowed with the nickname of the 11th Calvary Regiment, which had been stationed on the other side of the bay at the Presidio of Monterey form 1919 to 1940. The 7,116-yard, par 72 Bayonet and the 7,009-yard, par 72 Black Horse - which have hosted the PGA's Qualifying School and are played during the AT&T's companion event, the First Tee Open, in the fall — are open




Cypress Point Club, Pebble Beach — Designed in 1928 by renowned course architect Alister Mackenzie, the 6,509vard, par 72 Cypress Point course is known all over the world, in part for its breathtaking par-3 16th Hole that requires a shot over the ocean. Golfer Marion Hollins first conceived of the idea in 1924 and pursued the development of a first-class golf course and a clubhouse with a handful of sleeping rooms for a membership limited to 200 people who would pay about \$2,500 (in 1924 dollars) to subscribe. The club is open only to members and their guests. PGA Class A golf pro Jim Langley, the course's pro, holds the course record 63. Cypress Point Club is located at 3150 17 Mile Drive. Nicknamed by locals "Old Del Monte," the Del Monte Golf Course was designed by golf and polo enthusiast Charles Maud and built in 1897, making it the oldest continuously operated course west of the Mississippi River. (The course at the Presidio in San Francisco was built a year earlier but was temporarily converted to a drill field during the Spanish-American War.) Owned and operated by the Pebble Beach Company, Old Del Monte — 6,357 yards, par 72 — is open to the public and is home to the Monterey Bay Golf Club, founded in 1932. Ken Venturi and Todd Gjesvold share the 62-shot record at the course, which was the original host of the California State Amateur and still hosts the annual Callaway Golf Pebble Beach Invitational. Green fees are \$95, \$58 for early twilight (beginning at 2:30 p.m.) and \$25 for 5 p.m. twilight. Cart fee, \$20, though pull carts are available for \$10. A set of Callaway rental clubs is \$45. 

It overlays land once occupied by a sand mine and included extensive rehabilitation of the dunes and native plants in the area. Tom Watson holds the record 67 on the course he helped design. Green fees are \$215 (including cart, for resort guests); twilight rate is \$110. Cart fee is \$25, and caddies are available for \$65. Clubs rent for \$70 a set. Two courses make up MPCC: The Dunes course, designed by Seth Raynor in 1926, and redesigned by Rees Jones, and the Shore course, designed by Bob Baldock in 1961. Open only to members and their guests, the Dunes course runs a 6,762vard par 72. The Shore Course had been closed for reconstruction but reopened in June with a yardage of 6,748 vards. Course architect for that project, which took 18 months to complete, was Michael Strantz. Chandler Egan in 1932, this 5,732-yard par 70 public course is situated on prime real estate near Asilomar State Beach and surrounds the historic Point Pinos Lighthouse. The ocean scenery is unsurpassed. Sometimes plagued by Canada geese who enjoy the environs so much they refuse to migrate, the course superintendent hired a trainer and his herding dog to keep the birds off the grass. Plans for a new clubhouse are under way at the course, located at 77 Asilomar Blvd. in Pacific Grove. Course record 60 shared by Casey Boyns, Rich Hunter and Peter Vitarisi. Pasadera Country Club, Monterey -

One of the newest additions to premier golf courses on the Peninsula, Pasadera opened in 2000. 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

Designed by Robert Trent Jones Sr. as part of the master plan for the Pebble Beach ocean front, this resort/semiprivate course measures 6,862 yards at par 72 and takes its name from Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island." Local legend has it the author spent time walking in the area while brainstorming. Many of its holes bear notable names, such as Black Dog and Billy Bones. The year after the course was completed, Spyglass replaced Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course in the Bing Crosby Golf Tournament in 1967 and has been part of the tournament — now the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am - ever since. Course record 64 is held by Dan Forsman and David Berganio. Green fees are \$275 (including cart, for resort for resort guests); \$160 for twilight. Cart fee is \$25, and caddies are available for \$65 a bag. The course is located at Stevenson Drive and Spyglass Hill Road in Pebble Beach. 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

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
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
