DISNEY SUPER HEROES CAN'T ABIDE OPEN AIR

THE FAMILY of super heroes scheduled to delight movie fans on Carmel Beach next month will be no shows. Disney, producer of "The Incredibles," yanked it from the free open-air showing because theater owners don't like the idea, according to show organizer Greg Cellitti. Despite the last-minute news, he found a couple of ogres to appear instead.

"Shrek 2" by Dreamworks will play in its place.

"There will be thousands of children crying on the beach because we're not showing 'The Incredibles,'" Cellitti predicted.

Although "Shrek 2" failed to beat the incredible five — Elastigirl, the invisible daughter, the lightning-fast boy, the super-strong dad and the baby who turns into fire — at the 77th Annual Academy Awards in February, its Mike Myers-voiced ogre, Cameron Diaz' Princess Fiona and Eddie Murphy's donkey should turn those tears to giggles.

Why would Disney pull "The Incredibles" after the same studio's "Monsters, Inc.," and "Finding Nemo" played on the white sands of Carmel Beach in years past?

"They said they don't allow any outdoor

Speeding blamed in teens' fatal wrecks

TWO TEENAGERS died in separate traffic accidents May 20 when they lost control while speeding, according to the California Highway Patrol. Fremont resident

Maheeth Dass, 19, smashed his Honda Civic into a telephone pole on Highway 1 in Big Sur just before 4 a.m. Robert Louis Stevenson School student Stephan Nataf, 18, hit a tree on 17 Mile Drive in his Chevy Tahoe around 10 that night.

Dass' impact with the pole caused "major intrusion damage between the passenger and driver-side seats," according to the CHP report. Nothing at the scene suggested he had been drinking, according to the Monterey County Sheriff's Office.

Eighteen hours later, Nataf was west-bound on 17 Mile Drive near the Highway 1 Gate when his 6,800-pound SUV hit the right curb. It careened across the road to broadside a tree several feet below the roadway, according to the CHP. Nataf was not wearing his seat belt and died instantly. The tree trunk shows major scarring along its first four feet and gashes as high as 10 feet.

"We haven't gotten the toxicology results back yet, so I don't know if anything else was at play there besides poor judgment," Monterey County Coroner's Commander Greg Clark said Wednesday.

Nataf's death marks the second for RLS in three years. In July 2002, summer school student Michelle Croke, 16, crashed into a tree on Ronda Road after speeding at an esti-

P.G. city manager faces opportunity and tragedy

FOR MONTEREY County Chief Assistant Administrative Officer Jim Colangelo, these are the best of times and the worst of times.

Colangelo, who is representing Monterey County in revenue neutrality negotiations with Carmel Valley incorporation proponents, was recently offered the position of city manager for Pacific Grove. But on the heels of that challenging new professional opportunity, Colangelo has been forced to cope with the tragic and unexpected death of his wife.

Candia Colangelo became ill May 10 and died May 14 at Stanford Medical Center. The cause of her death has yet to be determined. She was 50.

"She impacted a lot of people," Jim Colangelo said. "Certainly the staff at Community Hospital thought very highly of her. She will be missed by her family and the community."

River School kids put their hands where their hearts are

School first in country with national organization

"THIS MAY be the biggest event in our school's history!" exclaimed Carmel River School Principal Jay Marden. Under bright blue skies Tuesday afternoon, U.S. Secretary of the Interior Gale Norton named River the nation's first Take Pride in America School, adding its students to the hundreds of thousands of volunteers who work to preserve, protect and maintain public lands.

The connection between River School and Take Pride in America, a nonpartisan organization started by former Interior Secretary Donald Hodel after he became alarmed at the destruction and neglect of public lands, seems natural. Since its founding in 1985, Take Pride has grown to include partnerships with federal, state and local agencies in all 50 states and Guam, as well as 100 charter partners, from

No typical carpool for heroic girl

DRESSED IN tiny firefighter's turnouts and a matching helmet, 7-year-old Emily Frisone arrived at Robert Louis Stevenson lower school to a crowd of cheering classmates and teachers in a definitely-not-fuel-efficient-but-undeniably-cool rig Thursday morning. A Carmel fire truck, followed by an ambulance, gave Emily a lift to school in style to honor her for saving her mother's life.

Karen Frisone was putting dishes away and talking on the phone with a friend the evening of April 27 in the family's Monte Verde Street home when she fainted, collapsing into

the open dishwasher, according to shift commander Ian Watts. Upstairs, Emily heard the crash of shattering dishes and thump as her mother fell. Emily called out to her, and after receiving no answer, she ran downstairs to investigate.

Finding her mother unconscious and crumpled on the kitchen floor, she picked up the phone. The friend was still on the line but hung up so Emily could dial 911.

"She waved us down at the door and showed us where her mom was," Watts said. "She was a lot more mature than most 7 year olds I know. She said, 'I'm kind of nervous. I haven't done this before.'"

Watts kept Emily busy while a half-dozen paramedics and firefighters took care of her mother, who had suffered a seizure and passed out.

"She was totally unconscious and had injuries from falling into the dishwasher," Watts said.

Karen Frisone regained consciousness in her home but repeatedly fainted during her ambulance ride to the hospital, she said Thursday as she, Emily and husband Robert prepared to step aboard the engine for the ride to school.

With a pink ribbon tying a braid of her long chestnut hair and a gold locket from her grateful mother around her neck, the soft-spoken Emily took her position in the captain's seat in the Carmel fire engine, while her parents rode in the seats behind her.

At the end of the several-block trip, Emily was greeted by dozens of RLS students and faculty who waved signs and

applauded her quick thinking and calm head that April evening. Emily is also set to be honored by the mayor and Carmel City Council June 7, Watts said.

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Padres bid for two championships on the diamond

GUYS PLAY hardball and girls play softball, but the objective of the two sports is the same — score more runs than your opponent. And this week Carmel High's guys and girls will be looking to outscore their opponents for the

Central Coast Section championships.

The Padres face Palma High School 1 p.m. Saturday in San Jose for the CCS Division III championship. The CHS softball team dueled Notre Dame High School Thursday for the right to play in the equivalent game for the girls.

This isn't a tale of Cinderella squads that weren't supposed to make it this far. Quite the contrary — the boys are the top seed after winning the Mission Trail Athletic League championship for the 27th time, with a 30-4-1 record. The girls were also MTAL champions for the third time in four years, with a 23-6 record.

It is rare, however, when one school's boys' and girls' squads vie for a sectional title simultaneously. In fact, as many league titles as the two have won, Carmel's teams have never done it together.

The softball team, in fact,

Plaza's 'hideous' escalator, 'behemoth' fountain to get axed

PLANS TO beautify the Carmel Plaza courtyard were nearly held hostage by an elevator Wednesday, but the design review board ultimately voted to approve removal of the escalator and fountain without first requiring the owners to provide more access to disabled visitors.

Architect Bill Brigham presented plans Wednesday to replace the old and frequently inoperable escalator at the south end of the Plaza with a stairway.

"Staff is very supportive of this application," principal planner Brian Roseth said. "It removes a mechanical contraption that's un-village-like."

The adjacent fountain and the steps leading up to it would be torn out, and planters, landscaping, benches, chairs and umbrellas installed in its place.

Roseth said the new layout would "be much more characteristic of Old World plazas and of Carmel's courtyards."

The goal is to create a public gathering place.

"There will be informal seating areas with planters around them so people can actually have a place to relax, sit and chat," Brigham said. The new design could accommodate outdoor seating for a cafe, though he acknowledged a restaurant would require a separate application to the planning commission.

At least one board member won't miss the fountain or the escalator.

"The fountain is a behemoth," Leslie Kitselman said. "It could go in St. Peter's Square and still be a little bit outrageous."

She called the escalator "hideous."

But member Keith Paterson said the plans should not sacrifice access for aesthetics.

"I think more consideration should be given to ways of getting people between the floors, and I think it should be conditional before we approve this," Paterson said.

While an elevator at the south end carries shoppers to all three levels and the parking garage, another at the north side, which served the garage and two floors inside Saks Fifth Avenue, has been off limits since the store closed in January. The escalator does not provide access as defined by disability laws, but Paterson said, "It's something for the knee creakers like myself in this community."

Kitselman and member Mary Bell agreed the escalator should be replaced with another elevator. Brigham said The Macerich Co., owner of the Plaza, is working to address those concerns in its ongoing effort to revamp the shopping center.

The board considered requiring an elevator as a condition of approval, but chairman Michael LePage cautioned against it.

"We need to be fair to the applicant. There are a lot of problems with the Plaza, and we can't solve all of them," he said. "Personally, I think we are getting a little off the subject here. I can understand the concerns, but I'm not sure we should hold them hostage."

The rest of the board eventually agreed but made it clear they want action on the access issue. Bell moved approval, and the board voted unanimously in favor of the plans.

An earlier redesign of the Plaza was approved by the planning commission last October, and construction is nearly finished on a new store for Tiffany & Co. on the Mission and Ocean corner of the center.

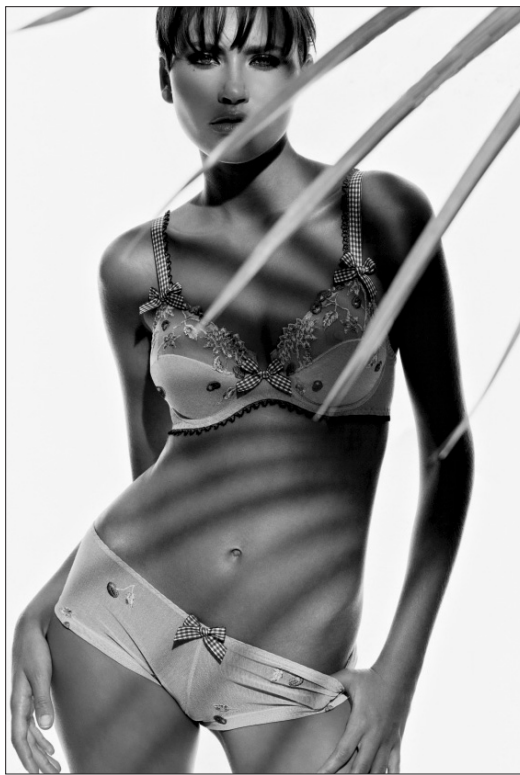

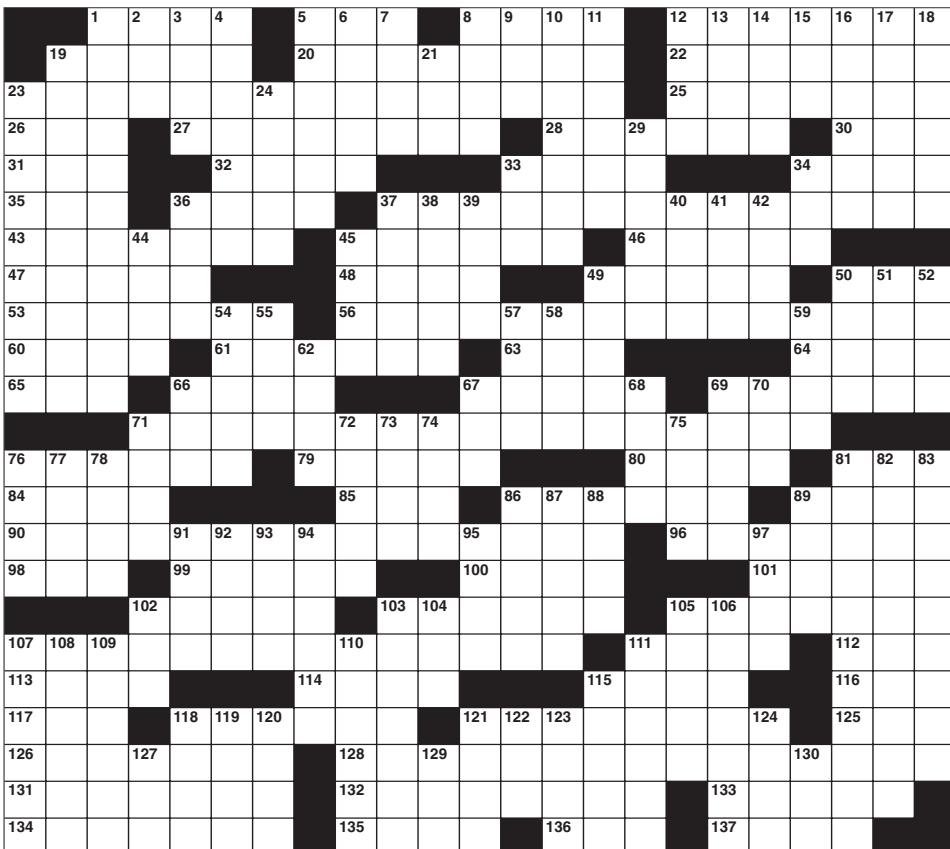

Landmark inns for sale

TWO DISTINCTIVE hotels on the Pacific Grove waterfront — including the world-famous Seven Gables Inn — are for sale.

The Flatley family, which has owned the Seven Gables for 33 years and acquired the building next door in 1994, renaming it the Grand View Inn, decided to sell because “20-plus years of seven-day weeks running them is enough,” said Ed Flatley, who owns the inns with his sister, Susan Wheelwright. His parents, John and Nora Flatley, bought the Seven Gables — at the time a rundown rooming house — in 1972.

The asking price for the inns — including 23 guest rooms and two historic cot-

tages — is \$13.9 million.

“It’s a world-class property with plenty of historic charm, and the views are just awesome,” said Tim Allen of Coldwell Banker Del Monte, who has the listing. “The buyer may want to continue operating the inns, but either building would also make an incredible single-family home.”

The Seven Gables Inn, with its immaculate, bright-yellow exterior, has been featured on numerous television programs and in a series of magazine and newspaper feature stories, Flatley said. It was also the centerpiece of a Visa credit card commercial that ran nationally in the 1990s.

“I don’t think there’s a match for it anywhere on the Peninsula,” Flatley said.

The immaculate Seven Gables Inn — the most famous of Pacific Grove’s oceanfront Victorians — is for sale. The Flatley family, which has owned and operated the inn for more than 20 years, has had enough seven-day workweeks, one family member said.

has never won a CCS title. The last time they even played in the finals was 1993. The baseball team, on the other hand, is quite familiar with sitting on top. It has won five titles, four under head coach Mike Kelly. The most recent was 2002, when this year's seniors were freshmen. But that doesn't mean they're heading into the final without experience. Three seniors — Jeff Foudy, Daniel Klienkopf and team captain Kyle Kretchmer — were on that championship team.

They will be without their starting second baseman, senior Carter Motley, who broke his hand in the first round of the playoffs.

"It's a big loss," said Kelly, "but we have other guys who can pick up the slack."

The Padres will be riding Kretchmer's arm on Saturday. The 6'5" senior led the

MTAL in home runs, has accepted a baseball scholarship to UNLV, and now looks to repeat his pitching performance from the first round, when he shut out Pacific Grove.

He also finished out Tuesday's semifinal game against Sacred Heart Prep, a nail-biting 3-2 victory. Now he faces a Palma team that handed his Padres their first loss of the season, also a 3-2 squeaker.

"Palma's a very solid team; they hit the ball well and they have a pitcher (Tyler Dinner) who is really hot," said Kelly.

While the girls haven't won it all, they're getting close.

This is the third straight year they've made it to the semifinals. They lost two years ago to Capuchino High (which is playing in the other semifinal game) and last year to Notre Dame, 1-0 in 10 innings. Thus, the girls headed into Thursday's game with revenge on the mind.

They faced one major obstacle, however: Notre Dame's senior pitcher, Kim Reeder,

"one of the best players in the country," according to Carmel High head coach Terry McGowan. Reeder is headed to Ohio State University next year on a full-ride scholarship.

Another obstacle for Carmel was the loss of star pitcher Quinnie Vandenberg. The senior, who is headed to Canisius College on a softball scholarship, was hit in the lip last week during practice drills, resulting in two hours of plastic surgery and a doctor's order to refrain from playing softball — even for a championship.

If the third time isn't a charm, the softball team expects to return seven starters next year, including six juniors and a freshman, giving them plenty of reason to

believe next year will be their year, even if this year isn't.

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Cal-Am releases lobbying records

AFTER ASKING the Public Utilities Commission to keep them confidential, California-American Water Co. this week released its lobbying records for 2003-2004, showing total expenditures of \$66,000 to try to influence legislation in Sacramento. Of that, \$20,000 was for "direct lobbying" while the rest went to business organizations that lobby on behalf of their members, according to Cal-Am spokesman Kevin Tilden.

"The fact that a corporation of our size spent that much money certainly isn't unusual," Tilden said. "We have customers from Sacramento to the Mexican border."

According to Tilden, Cal-Am has spent a total of \$4 million so far to try to get a desal plant and other new water facilities built. The company is trying to recover that money with a substantial rate increase over the next three years. But none of the lobbying money is part of the rate increase, Tilden said.

His comments came after the PUC's Office of Ratepayer Advocates Office asked for detailed records of Cal-Am's recent expenses toward developing a new water supply for the Monterey Peninsula. It's OK for Cal-Am to try to recover its "public-outreach" costs, but not lobbying costs, according to PUC ratepayer advocate Diana Brooks. Some of the \$1 million Cal-Am reported spending on public education may actually have been for lobbying, she implied.

"We'll be looking at everything they've spent to determine whether it's appropriate to support a rate increase," Brooks said at a public hearing May 12.

Records on file with the Secretary of State's office show that over the same two-year period when Cal-Am reported spending \$66,000 for lobbying, the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District spent \$70,946 to lobby in Sacramento, Monterey County spent \$145,302, the California Newspaper Publishers Association spent \$555,137 and several private utilities spent huge sums on lobbying: \$2,334,996 by PG&E and \$5,338,446 by SBC.

BIG SUR VISIONARY FINDS COMMON GROUND BETWEEN ARCHITECTURE AND ART

WHILE NUMEROUS celebrities, including media mogul Ted Turner, writer Henry Miller, Alan Jardine of the Beach Boys and Nobel Prize-winning scientist Linus Pauling, have chosen to make their homes in Big Sur, architect Mickey Muennig is perhaps the only person who has achieved international fame as a result of living and working on that stunning stretch of Monterey County shore.

Muennig, whose cliffhanging and hilltop concrete and glass homes dot the Big Sur coast, will be honored by the Monterey Bay chapter of the American Institute of Architects at the Maritime Museum in Monterey Friday for a lifetime of work that reflects its unique surroundings.

When he first came to Big Sur in 1971, Muennig could not have imagined the impact that visit would have on the rest of his life.

"I was living in Denver at the time," recalled Muennig, who turned 70 in April. "I came out to Big Sur for a gestalt therapy workshop at the Esalen Institute."

After a week, the workshop ended. But Muennig's stay in Big Sur was just beginning.

"I got here, and I couldn't leave," he said. "I liked the attitude of the people and the way they lived. Big Sur felt like home."

So Muennig left the architectural firm he worked for in Denver and opened up a private practice in Big Sur.

Concrete, glass and curves

There are few places on earth with a greater risk of forest fires than Big Sur. Observing this phenomenon, Muennig decided to minimize the use of wood in his building designs, replacing it with concrete.

"It's fireproof, and it's attractive," he explained.

To take advantage of Big Sur's endless ocean views, Muennig also makes liberal use of glass in his designs. And to blend in with Big Sur's twisting and turning landscape, his architectural renderings feature lots of curves.

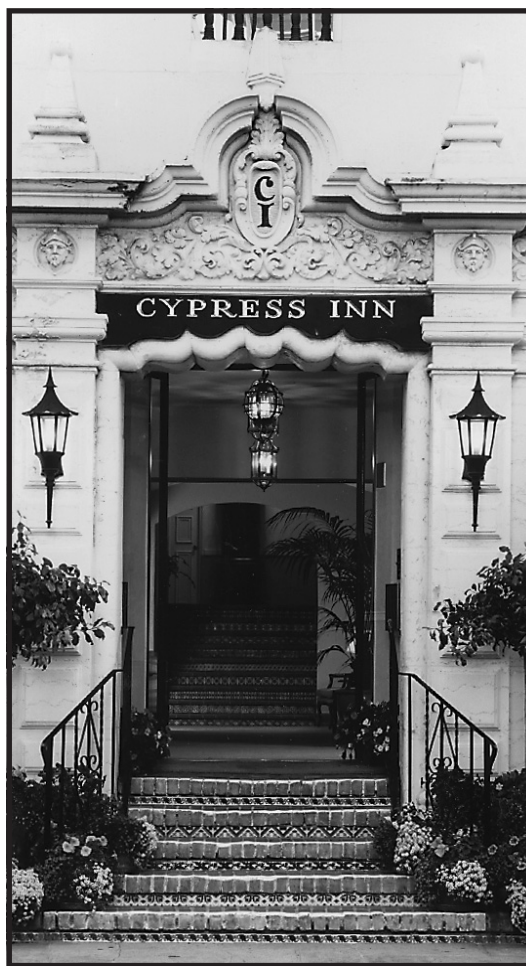
While most of Muennig's designs are outside of the public viewshed and often located up steep, gated dirt roads, a few are publicly accessible.

Perhaps his greatest achievement is the Post Ranch Inn. Located just off Highway 1 about 30 miles south of Carmel, the inn offers arguably the most spectacular setting, layout and design of any resort anywhere. For the inn, Muennig's imagination conjured up a wide range of inventive structures, including tree houses, subterranean dwellings (complete with landscaping on the roof) and a restaurant that appears to be dangling on edge of a 1,000-foot drop to the crashing waves below.

In 1998, El Niño storms caused mud slides that demolished the Esalen Institute's bath house. In response, Esalen turned to Muennig for a set of plans. Four years and \$5 million later, Esalen unveiled its new bath house, a massive concrete and glass structure.

The Post Ranch Inn and Esalen require reservations and discourage drop-in visits. Perhaps the most publicly-accessible example of Muennig's work in Big Sur is the Hawthorne Gallery. Located just across Highway 1 from the landmark Nepenthe restaurant, the gallery features the work of Big Sur artist Greg Hawthorne and his extended family.

Vote bolsters hopes for C.V. Village fire independence

Battalion chief and detachment proponent David Cummings said the May 23 LAFCO vote vindicates his position. "We never believed the staff report [against detachment] was fair," he said. "We always believed we had all the evidence on our side."

AFTER MONTEREY County's Local Agency Formation Commission ignored its staff's recommendation and seemingly approved the reorganization of the Carmel Valley Fire Protection District, a large contingent of Carmel Valley firefighters and residents erupted in applause.

The celebration at the meeting Monday, however, might have been premature. According to LAFCO executive officer Kate McKenna, the vote simply means the lengthy bureaucratic journey will continue.

"The process is still alive, but the commission has not taken action to approve or deny [the proposed reorganization]," she said.

Four years ago, three fire districts were consolidated to form the present Carmel Valley Fire Protection District. Carmel Valley Village volunteer firefighters are now seeking to regain their independence, claiming the merger resulted in decreased service, personnel problems and financial troubles for the consolidated district.

Volunteers lobby commissioners
Cummings said he and Lloyd Lowrey, an attorney representing proponents for independence, personally met with five different LAFCO commissioners.

"You can explain things better when you sit down and talk to somebody one on one," he said. "I'm very impressed with the process. It actually worked. The commissioners listened to us."

Anna Caballero, Jim Costello, Lou Calcagno and Vince DiMaggio voted for continuing the reorganization process. Commissioners Jerry Smith and Tom Perkins, and alternate commissioner Peggy Sherrill sided with the LAFCO staff recom-

mentation to end the process. Sherrill was sitting in for commissioner and CVFPD board member Anne McGowan, who was absent.

For fire chief Sidney Reade, the vote to continue the process was unexpected.

"We were surprised," she said. "The issue got very emotional. I would have preferred if the debate was focused on the extremely high level of service the district provides."

And Reade was unclear how the May 23 vote will ultimately affect the fire district.

"We need more facts before we decide what to do next," she said. "This period of not knowing is not easy."

More hoops to jump through

Cummings is confident his group will eventually regain its independence.

"It's still going to take months and months of work," he said. "It takes a while for all the paperwork, and there's a lot of legal work to do."

According to McKenna, the next step in the process will be to determine what the environmental consequences of the reorganization will be. An initial study could determine reorganization has little or no environmental impact, or it could trigger a full-fledged environmental impact report, which could cost hundreds of thousands of dollars and a significant delay in the drive to reorganize.

Before any reorganization of the district can take place, a municipal services review must be finished.

McKenna estimated that will be done this fall.

McKenna also said LAFCO staff needs to prepare a resolution "with the

findings, evidence, terms and conditions of the proposed reorganization."

Ultimately, McKenna said, LAFCO commissioners will

Park district challenges public to pony up for creaky fire engine

THE TINY Mid-Coast Fire Brigade, with its half-built station, aging fleet of vehicles and six volunteers, could get a much-needed capital injection from the Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District.

"We made a pledge with the community last year that we were going to try to increase efforts for fire prevention, and this was a good tie," MPRPD General Manager Joe Donofrio said this week, when he announced the district would offer a \$20,000 matching grant to fix one of the brigade's old trucks. The money comes from the property tax assessment approved by voters last summer.

If donors match the district's offer, the 33-year-old, 1-ton, four-wheel-drive Mid-Coast pickup, bought used and now showing 200,000 miles' worth of use, will get a new chassis.

"Basically everything under the pump [in the bed of the truck] would be replaced," volunteer Scott Bogen said.

Located in Palo Colorado Canyon, Mid-Coast serves 150 homes between Otter Cove and Hurricane Point, as well as countless visitors.

"We're hoping one of the auto dealers will come forward and want to work with us on the matching grant" as co-sponsor, Donofrio said.

A plaque on the truck's side would bear the donors' names.

The money would help remedy one of several problems Mid-Coast faces. Two other rigs are also failing, though brigade volunteers do all they can to fix air leaks, exhaust leaks, compressor and starter failures, and brake problems, among other mal-

adies. Finding parts for the 30-plus-year-old vehicles is a challenge, and when they're available, they're expensive.

"Overall, it's being held together with bailing wire and bubble gum," said brigade chief Cheryl Goetz.

Donofrio, whose agency last year fronted a \$50,000 matching grant to repair the Recreation Trail in Pacific Grove, is confident Carmel and Big Sur businesses and residents will also open their wallets. Helped by a rally from the chamber of commerce, the Pacific Grove campaign generated more cash than expected.

"I had no idea that \$50,000 grant would raise \$400,000," Donofrio said, "We're hoping for a similar result."

Brigade's efforts

Separately, the brigade is trying to recruit more volunteers and raise enough money to finish its firehouse, on which progress has stopped after half-a-million dollars and months of work.

The windows are in and the doors are waiting to be hung, but the brigade needs a volunteer to do the framing. And before the building can be stuccoed, wheelbarrows full of gravel have to be dumped for back fill.

"We're trying to organize a community labor day to help us get the back fill done," Goetz said. "That's a lot of work."

Finding more bodies to fill the brigade presents a greater challenge now that most residents work more and have less time to respond to calls, whether for an afternoon grassfire down the road or an injured hiker stranded up the Soberanes Point trail in the dead of night.

"The dynamics of our area are changing," she said. "Most people are working; the families work two jobs, and no one's home during the day."

As state and federal standards grow tighter, the training regimen for volunteer firefighters grows more intensive.

Goetz is grateful the county continues to supply money to volunteer fire companies through Proposition 172. The brigade's share this year is about \$22,000 — down \$6,000 from last year.

"It would be devastating to all the volunteer fire companies if those monies were taken away," she said. "They would all cease

to exist."

The creaky equipment and skeletal crew don't leave residents and visitors without fire protection and emergency services, Goetz said. Mid-Coast often calls upon the Carmel Highlands Fire Protection District to lend a hand when necessary.

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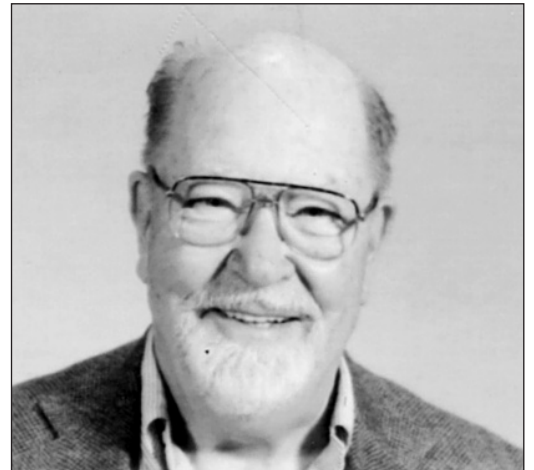
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Mark Twain Whittier

1913-2005

Navy Captain, Mark Twain Whittier, 92, died on May 18, 2005.

He was born in 1913 in Rice Lake, Wisconsin spending his youth in Winona, Minnesota where he was active in Boy Scouting eventually becoming an Eagle Scout. He was a 1936 graduate of the University of Minnesota after which he joined the U.S. Navy earning his Navy Gold wings. He reported to the Fleet as an Aviation Cadet aboard the USS Lexington (CV-2) in the summer of 1938. He first flew in combat a Douglass Dauntless dive bomber which was later lost in Lake Michigan in a training accident. Fifty years later, it was recovered and restored to a pristine showpiece. When this plan, one of two that survived WWII, was installed in the Museum of Naval Aviation in Pensacola, Florida, Captain Whittier was publicly recognized as the pilot who flew this plan in battle. He received the navy Cross for deeds of bravery in his beloved SBD 2106.

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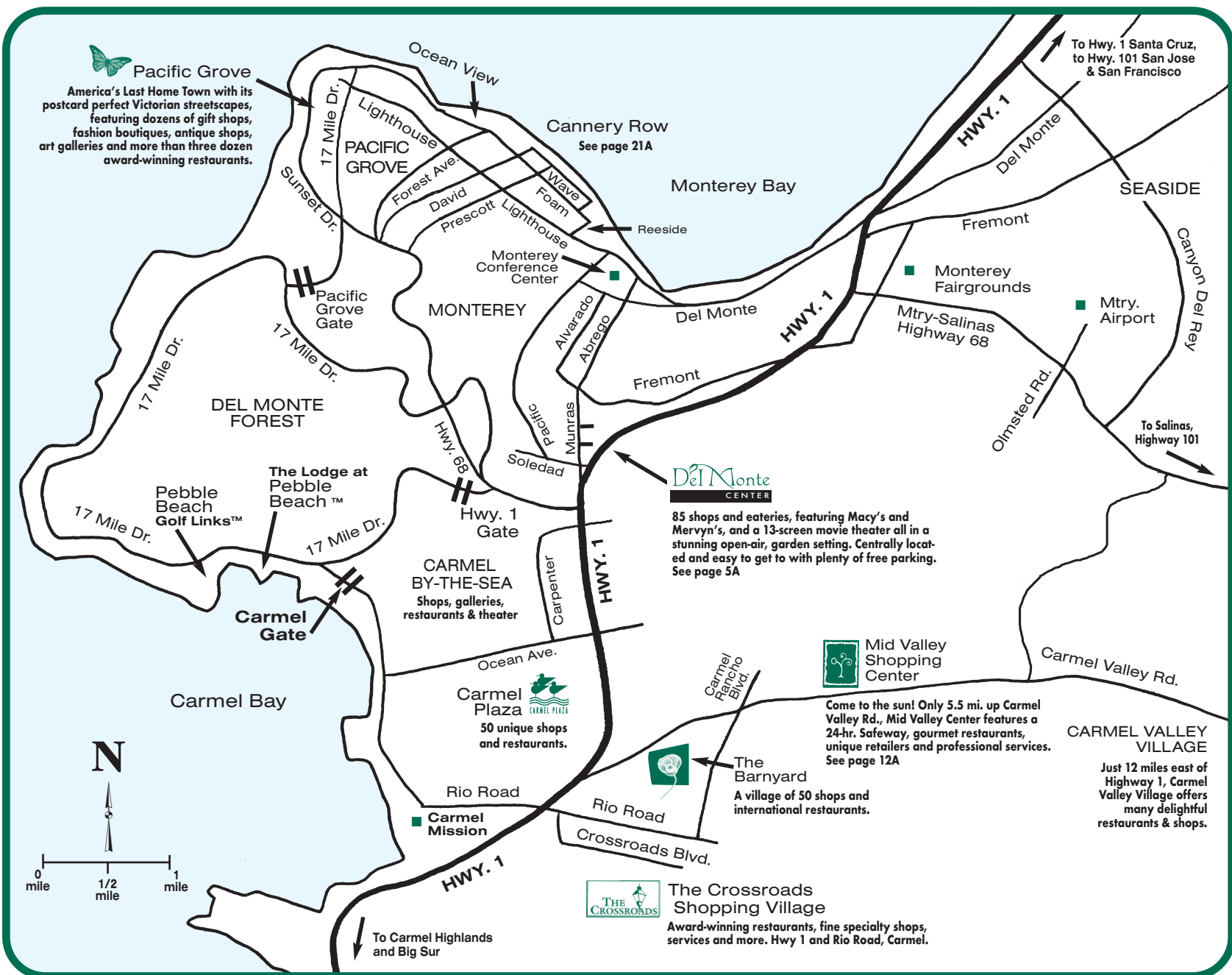

mated 50 mph, double the limit, and losing control of her vehicle.

Five months, 10 dead

Veteran CHP Officer Richard Richards said Dass and Nataf are the newest names on a tragic list. Drivers and passengers age 21 and younger represent almost half of the 22 people who have died in traffic accidents since Jan. 1.

Richards, whose office covers state and county roads in a region bordered by Santa Cruz and San Benito counties to the north and east, the Salinas River to the southeast, and San Luis Obispo County to the south on the coast, remembered those accidents.

■ Juvenal Garcia, an 18 year old from Castroville, was speeding on Molera Road west of Highway 1 when he crashed and died Jan. 31.

■ Watsonville resident Tomesina Uresti, 17, was unlicensed and intoxicated when she made an illegal U-turn in front of traffic on Highway 101 Feb. 5. The impact killed her and all four of her passengers: Matthew Escamilla, 18, of Aptos; Julio Prieto, 18, of Salinas; Evan Kuhn, 21, of Aptos, and Andrew Tibbitts, 19, of Watsonville.

■ David Calderon, a 17 year old from Castroville, also made an illegal U-turn on Highway 1 near Struve Road March 22. He and his passenger, 19-year-old Nicole Spence, were killed when his car was broadsided.

“That’s what we’ve had this year. That’s 10, if you include the ones this weekend,” Richards said. “And that does not include young drivers who have killed other people.”

The Saturday before Nataf and Dass died, a 17 year old from Napa reportedly fell asleep at the wheel of his Subaru on Highway 1 at 11:30 a.m. and killed a 50-year-old Fresno man walking along the shoulder near Garrapata Creek.

2004 tragedies

Last year paints a similarly grim picture. According to the county coroner’s annual report, 27 of the 93 people who died in traffic accidents were 21 years old and younger.

Richards recalled the wrecks his office reported:

■ On March 13 officers attempted to stop 19-year-old Salinas resident Francisco Estrada. He crashed the reportedly stolen car at Old Stage Road and Highway 101, and a 15-year-old girl was thrown from it and died. Estrada was charged with felony DUI, theft and vehicular manslaughter.

■ Seventeen-year-old Adriana Romero of Watsonville, who did not have a driver license, lost control of her mother’s Ford Explorer on Lewis Road in heavy drizzle April 20. Romero wasn’t wearing a seat belt and was killed when the Explorer overturned, partially ejecting her. Her 16-year-old sister had been wearing a seat belt and was uninjured.

■ A 17-year-old Moss Landing resident, Jacobo Ortiz, was driving south on Highway 1 approaching Jetty Road May 24, when he pulled the Honda to the side of the road and then made a U-turn directly into the path of a southbound pickup truck. The impact killed him and an 18-year-old passenger, Domingo Ortiz, while another teenager was moderately injured.

■ Salinas resident Eliu Serrano, 18, lost control of his vehicle while driving north on Highway 101 June 10 and hit

a power pole.

■ Fernando Lopez of Gonzales and Paola Guarnico of Salinas died on Foletta Road June 24. Driving his Ford Mustang, Lopez crossed into the oncoming traffic lane and hit a Freightliner big rig head on.

■ Arieh Abend, a 16 year old from Carmel Valley, was not wearing his seat belt when he crashed on Carmel Valley Road at Tassajara Road Aug. 4. His two teenage passengers wore seat belts and were uninjured. “Buckle up for Ari” bumper stickers appeared on Peninsula vehicles soon after.

■ Nineteen-year-old Christopher Soetaert of Castroville was northbound on Highway 1 near Del Monte Boulevard Sept. 7, when he lost control. He was ejected in the ensuing accident and was killed.

“It’s unbelievable when you look at this trend, isn’t it?” Richards asked.

How many does it take?

Law enforcement officers constantly try to convince young drivers not to speed or take other risks behind the wheel, reaching out to them at school.

The CHP oversees Every 15 Minutes, during which a fatal accident is staged on campus, and local police, firefighters, medics, CHP officers, sheriff’s deputies and coroners carry away “the dead” and free “the injured” from crushed cars. All day long, a student is “killed” by being removed from a classroom every 15 minutes to highlight the frequency of alcohol-related fatalities. The program concludes with a mock funeral the following day.

Richards and his former commander, Bill Leist, also initiated the Start Smart program which is spreading throughout the state. New drivers and their parents are invited to the station “to talk with local officers in a casual environment regarding accident-avoidance techniques and the common mistakes of new drivers,” according to the invitation.

While driver education programs in schools target students without experience, Start Smart has in mind those already on the road.

“We try to explain things like the importance of listening to your parents when it’s raining and you want to drive to San Francisco to go buy a new pair of jeans, and they say, ‘No,’” Richards said.

He took part in Every 15 Minutes at Carmel and North Salinas high schools this spring and gave recent Start Smart

talks at Santa Catalina and RLS. Any student or parent interested in the program should call (831) 796-2100.

“We’re doing all we can,” Richards said. “It’s up to them and the decisions they make.”

The coroner’s office does not have formal programs, but Clark said detectives and forensic autopsy technicians often visit schools to talk about what they do and see on the job.

“They tie it in with the message: ‘It can happen to you; nobody’s immune,’” Clark said.

And teen drivers cited for poor driving, including DUI, undergo education through the courts. A coroner’s detective “makes a presentation to the kids with some pretty graphic photographs,” he said. “They talk about how tough it is to have to go to the homes and notify the families of people who have been killed.”

YELL NOBLES, a descendant of pioneers, with his paternal and maternal ancestors migrating to America in the 17th century, the latter settling with William Penn, died April 16 at his Carmel home.

Members of both sides of his family served in the Revolutionary War and on opposite sides in the U.S. Civil

War. His maternal grandparents, Mr. & Mrs. J. S. Ornbaun and his father, Richard Yell Nobles, came to California in the 1850s and all eventually settled in Mendocino County. Mr. Nobles was born Oct. 16, 1906, at the home of his uncle, Vernon Ornbaun, in Cloverdale. He attended high school in Cloverdale and the University of Nevada, where he was a member of Alpha Tau Omega fraternity.

In 1927, Mr. Nobles was employed by the newly organized Cloverdale Commercial and Savings Bank. Shortly thereafter, the bank was purchased by Bank of Italy interests, and he was transferred to their San Francisco headquarters.

After several tours in headquarters, managing branches in Truckee,



Placerville and Merced, plus handling the business development responsibilities in the San Joaquin Valley, he was appointed the regional officer in charge of branches in southern San Joaquin Valley. Mr. Nobles initiated a pilot program in management decentralization, which was subsequently adopted statewide. His area was later enlarged to include all the San Joaquin Valley and adjacent mountain counties to the east. This was

his responsibility until he retired in 1971.

While in Cloverdale, he was active in community activities, serving as president of the Rotary Club, director and treasurer of the chamber of commerce and Chief Druid of the Placerville chapter of *E Clampus Vitus*. During his career, he took time off to join the U.S. Army in World War II and saw combat duty in the European Theater. At the time of his death, he was a member of F&AM Yosemite Lodge, No. 99, and the American Legion, and was a member of Monterey Peninsula Country Club for many years.

Seventy-five years ago, on July 10, 1929, Mr. Nobles married his high school sweetheart, Isabelle Catherine Murray, at Cloverdale's Congregational Church. His wife and one niece are his only survivors.

VIRGINIA "GINNY" RODGERS HEIGES, 78, died April 22 at her Carmel home.

A native of Long Island, N.Y., she lived for many years in Florida before moving here more than two years ago.

Mrs. Heiges was preceded in death by her husband, Jesse, in 1991.

She is survived by nephew Chris Rodgers and his wife and children, Christina, Connor and Cameron, all of Carmel. She also leaves her poodles, Oliver and Parker.

HENRY "HANK" CLAY OVERIN III of Ormond Beach, Fla., a Carmel High graduate who played baseball with the Baltimore Orioles, died May 17. He was 72.

Mr. Overin was born in Pacific Grove to Henry and Laura (Tedrow) Overin II and was a U.S. Army Veteran of the Korean War. He served as recreation director for the City of Wayne, Neb., for 33 years until his retirement in 1992.

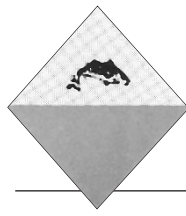
Mr. Overin grew up in Carmel and played professional baseball in the Baltimore Orioles chain until he suffered an arm injury. He and his wife started a youth center in 1961 in Wayne, and he was later hired as the first year-round recreation director. He coached men's basketball, adult volleyball, baseball for youth of all ages including American Legion baseball teams, men's baseball, girl's softball and basketball, and golf for boys and girls. Mr. Overin also taught P.E. at St. Mary's Catholic School in Wayne, and won many state championships in Legion and midget baseball.

After retirement in 1992 he took the job of assistant baseball coach for Haines City High School for two years, and worked the last 10 years for Polk Community College in Winter Haven, Fla. He was awarded the rank of honorary admiral for the "State of Nebraska Navy" and town team baseball manager of the year for the State of Nebraska. The mayor of Wayne honored him by declaring a Hank Overin Day and naming the city ballpark Hank Overin Field at a surprise dedication ceremony.

He is survived by his wife, Glenda; two sons, Earle of Port Orange, Fla., and Steven of Ormond Beach, Fla.; and three grandchildren, Henry Clay Overin IV of Maryland, Lucas Casey Overin of Florida and Alexandra Overin Fields of Idaho.

Mrs. Colangelo is also survived by two sons, Griffin and Dylan. She was supervisor of outpatient phlebotomy at Community Hospital. An accomplished musician who played piano, guitar and violin, she was the secretary of the P.G. High School Music Boosters and previously served on the board of directors of radio station KAZU.

As he continues to deal with the loss of his wife, Jim Colangelo is thankful for what he has.

"It's a great community," said the Pacific Grove resident. "That has really been evident with all the support we received in the last week. I'm looking forward to working closer to home."

Fifth District supervisor Dave Potter, a colleague and friend, said Colangelo's spirit has been buoyed by the love of county employees.

"Jim is going through one of the worst things that can happen to a man," Potter said. "The outpouring of support across the county says a lot about who Jim is as a man and a public servant. The county is a 4,200-member family. We can be as dysfunctional as any family, but when something like this happens, everybody really comes together."

Colangelo notified the county of his decision to take the P.G. job, and he hopes to begin work as city manager by July 1.

He replaces Ross Hubbard, who will retire July 7 after five years.

While Colangelo doesn't know who will replace him in negotiations with boosters of the Town of Carmel Valley, he believes Nick Chiulos will have a key role. Chiulos, a county analyst, has worked with Colangelo during past negotiations.

“They’ve known about it for six months,” he said. “They just made a fortune on DVDs. It’s not like it’s a new release; they’ve run the whole market.”

The Movie on the Beach is set for Saturday, June 18, at the foot of Ocean Avenue. The show begins at dusk, but people are urged to arrive early to grab a choice spot of sand and settle in for a picnic dinner and “Shrek 2.”

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PROP. 60 CLARIFICATION

PINE CONE STAFF REPORT

LAST WEEK'S story, "If grass isn't greener, Prop. 60 to the rescue" did not include all the limitations of Prop. 60, the state law which allows homeowners older than 54 to retain their property tax base when they sell their home and buy another with a higher tax base.

To qualify for Prop.60, the price of the replacement home must be:

- equal to or less than the price of the vacated home, or
- within 5 percent of the price of the vacated home if the new home is purchased between one day and 364 days of the sale of the vacated home, or
- within 10 percent of the price of the vacated home if the new home is purchased between 365 days and 730 days after the sale of the vacated home.

An application for Prop. 60 benefits must be filed with the assessor within three years of the purchase of the replacement home.

Prop. 60 was designed to protect older property owners who want to downsize, but whose present homes have appreciated so much that buying one of nearly equal, or even less value, would jack up their property tax bills so much they couldn't afford to move.

The examples in the May 20 story were correct: Charles

and Ali McDaniel sold their Carmel house at Torres near Fifth for \$1,295,000. Their property taxes were \$7,700 per year. After their fleeting home purchase and sale in Lahaina, Maui, they bought another Carmel home on Carpenter near Fifth for \$1.3 million. Although the homes were very similar, their property tax bill would have nearly doubled, to \$13,000. But since their replacement home on Carpenter was purchased within two years (720 days) of the sale of their Torres house, they were able to receive the Prop. 60 property tax benefit, and keep their annual property taxes at \$7,700.

It is not rare for a person who has owned a home for years to have a very low tax base, such as \$150,000, on a home now worth \$1.5 million. Without Prop. 60, that person's property taxes would jump from \$1,500 per year to \$15,000 per year if he sold his home and bought one of equal value.

Prop. 60 can be used only once. However, a different state law, Prop. 110, can be used to protect a lower property tax base in the event the owner has to move due to a physical disability, according to Steve Vagnini, Monterey County Assessor. The limitations on sale price and purchase price are the same as for Prop. 60.

Vagnini welcomes calls from people with questions about Prop. 60, Prop. 90 (the state law that allows a property tax base to be transferred between counties) or Prop 110. His phone is (831) 647-7719.

Can I Make an Oral Offer to Purchase?

The answer is NO. As a fine real estate law professor said endlessly, "If it isn't in writing, it isn't."

An oral agreement to buy and sell a home is non-enforceable. Thus, any discussion about selling price that occurs without a written offer in hand is dangerous territory. Consider, for example, a buyer who, walking through a home that is on the market for \$1,480,000, tells the seller he will pay \$1,460,000 for the house. If the seller agrees, he has absolutely nothing. The buyer, knowing the seller will accept \$1,460,000, can then make a written offer for \$1,425,000.

As you can see, any oral agreement a seller makes simply reduces the amount of money he or she is likely to receive from a potential buyer. This is one of many reasons that a home seller may save a tremendous amount of money by relying on his or her real estate professional to deal with all inquiries from all interested parties, including other real estate professionals.

The best answer, if asked what you will accept for your home or if offered a specific amount, is, "I will review all written offers." And indeed you will. Editorial

What a disgrace

IMAGINE THAT an initiative to reform the Americans with Disabilities Act was put on the ballot — an initiative either giving businesses a “right to cure” any alleged ADA deficiencies before they could be sued, or setting up crystal-clear requirements for handicapped accessibility, along with an inexpensive and legally binding way for the owners of restaurants, shops and the like to find out if they’re in compliance with the law.

Either way, the initiative would pass overwhelmingly, because anyone with a shred of common sense can see the present system is utterly unfair. And voters usually show remarkable common sense on election day.

That’s why, given the chance, they’d shout “no way” to the ridiculous system this state has now:

■ A federal law, adopted in parallel by the California Legislature, requires the owners of the nation’s “public accommodations” to do everything “reasonable” to remove “barriers to access” for anyone who is “limited in a major life activity.”

■ Having set out that incomprehensible mandate, the ADA leaves it up to private citizens to enforce it by filing lawsuits. There are no ADA cops to turn to for help complying with, or enforcing, the law.

■ Recognizing the potential for abuse of the law, Congress decided there could be no damage awards — except attorneys fees and court costs — to handicapped individuals who were denied reasonable access to public buildings. But state lawmakers weren’t that intelligent. According to hundreds of ADA lawsuits filed in California in the last two years, state law allows huge damage awards — up to \$4,000 per day — for even trivial ADA violations, such as parking spaces that are a bit too narrow, ramps that are slightly too steep, or signs printed with the wrong font size.

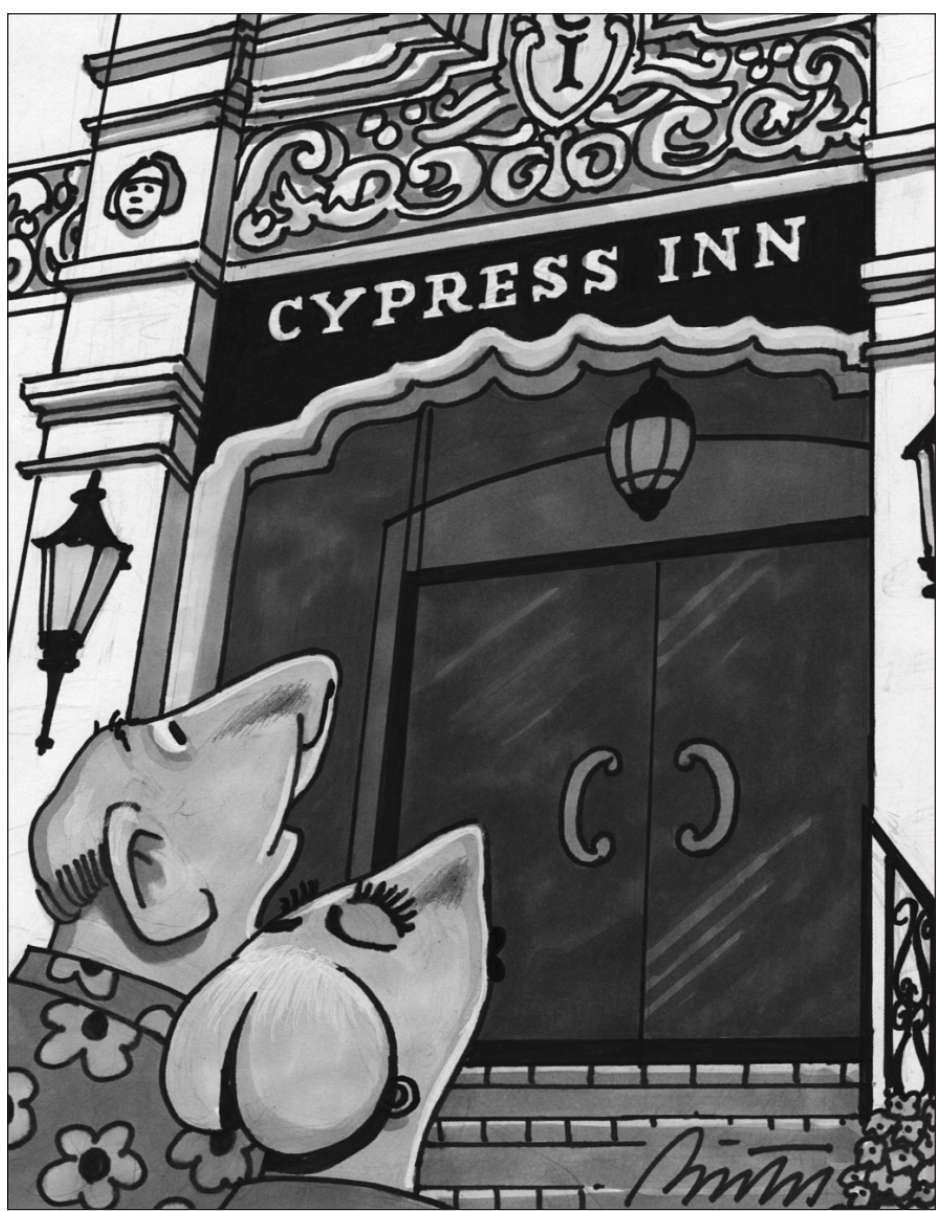
This Gordian knot of laws explains why California attracts more than its fair share of ADA litigants, who can go into court with a Federal civil rights violation claim and demand to be paid according this state’s ultra-liberal standards for damage awards.

But despite the obvious need to reform California’s handicapped-access laws, not only because simple fairness demands it, but because the onslaught of abusive lawsuits is undermining public support for disability rights in general, our state lawmakers are turning a deaf ear. Earlier this month, a Fresno lawmaker’s reform attempt was shot down in the Senate Judiciary Committee by three ultra-liberal Democrats. The more small businesses are sued, apparently, the better they like it.

We don’t think the latest reform bill, which would have provided a right to cure, is the best way to go. It would be better for state and federal handicapped access laws to be amended to give local building officials the power to decide what “reasonable” means when it comes to a business’ ADA obligations — especially in buildings that existed before the ADA was passed. And the building inspector’s determination that a particular business is in compliance must protect it from being sued. No such protection is available now, no matter what a restaurant or retail store does to welcome the disabled.

But what’s really a disgrace is that the Legislature does nothing.

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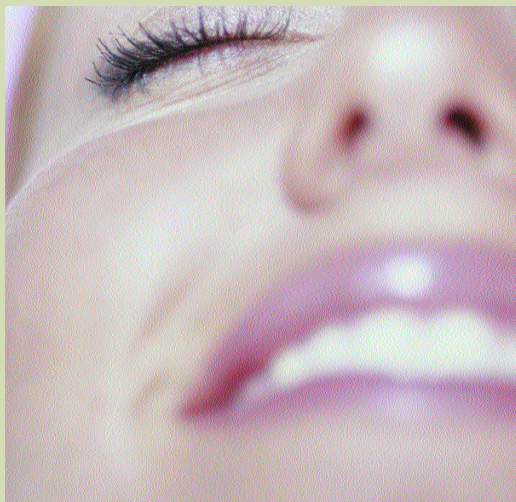
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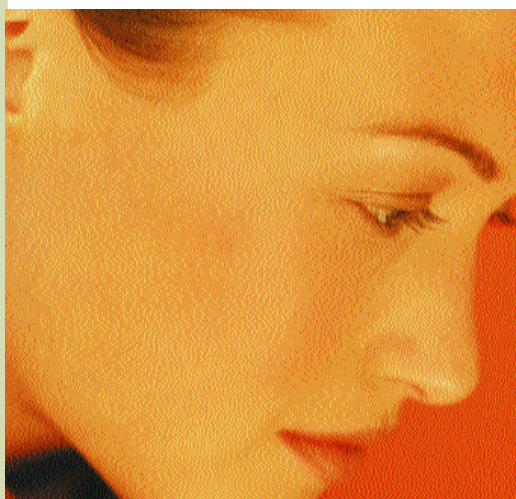

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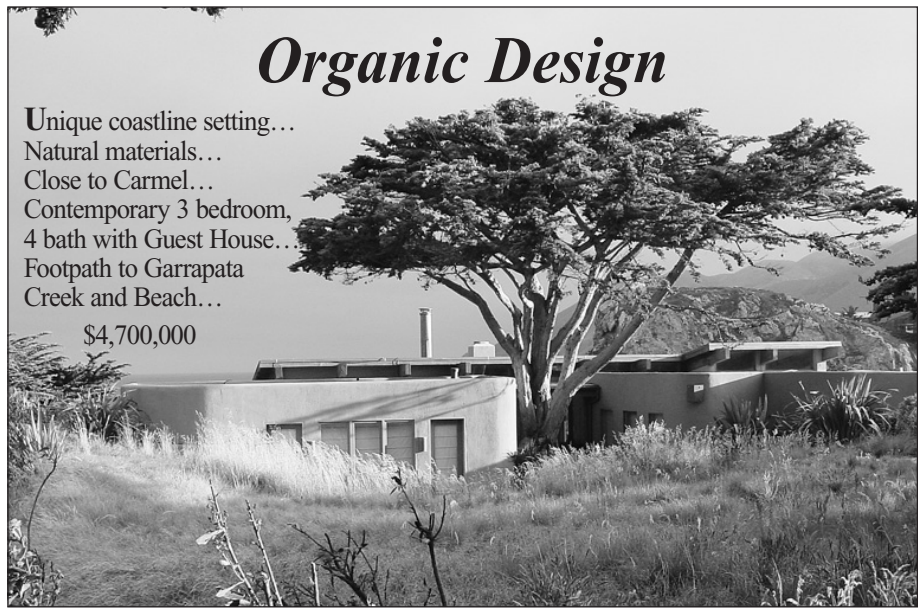
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Planning Commission says too much footage, not enough trees

WHEN IT comes to building a house, how big is too big? According to Monterey County Planning Commissioner Martha Deihl, a 14,182-square-foot residence in Pebble Beach steps over the line.

"It's the size of a sports center," said Deihl of the proposed project at a May 25 planning commission meeting in Salinas.

The commission voted 4-3 to deny the project that aimed to replace an historic 17 Mile Drive home known as Casa del Sol. That 9,300-square-foot oceanfront residence, located near the landmark Lone Cypress, burned down under suspicious circumstances in April 2002. Investigators concluded arson was the cause of the fire, and the case is unsolved.

Derinda Messenger, an attorney repre-

senting property owner George Roberts, was flummoxed by the denial.

"It was a complete surprise to me," she said.

Undeterred, she vowed to appeal the denial to the Monterey County Board of Supervisors.

Messenger believes the commissioners were swayed by misinformation. In particular, she said the property owner was justified in removing an estimated 47 Monterey pines and cypress trees felled or damaged by a storm in January. In addition to seeking a building permit, Roberts had sought an after-the-fact permit for the tree removal.

"It was a disaster," she said of the damage caused by the storm. "Trees were broken in half."

Planning commissioner Keith Vandevere said a permit was still required to remove the trees.

"I pass by there every other day," Vandevere said. "A lot of trees were cut down. It's disconcerting that on a parcel as sensitive as this, [the owner] didn't see fit to seek the appropriate permit."

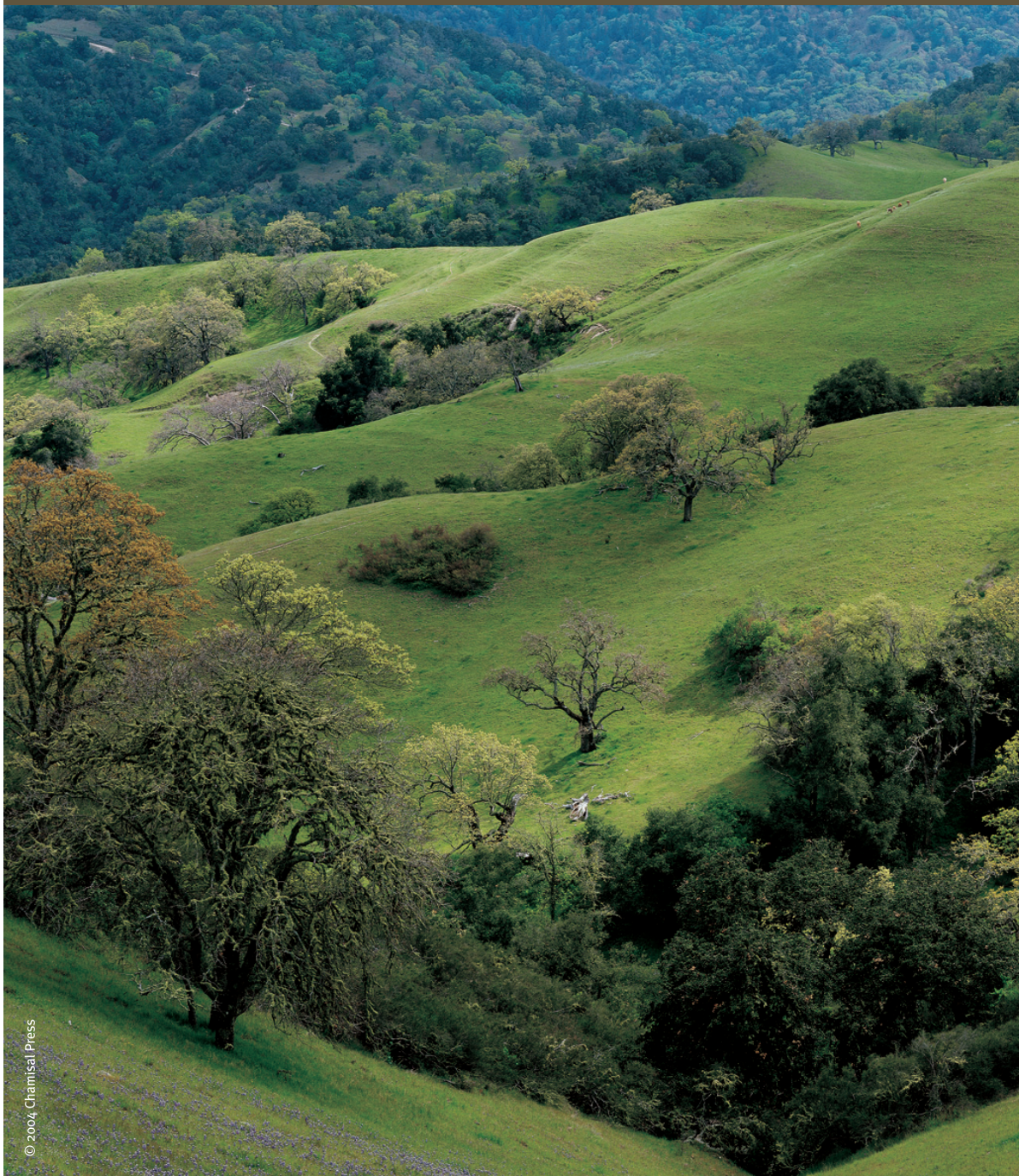
Vandevere described the area "as the most sensitive habitat in the county."

"Obviously, [the owner] has the right to make a reasonable use of his property," he said. "There are some extremely large residences in the area. But I don't think that is a reason to eliminate more Monterey cypress habitat."

Commissioner John Wilmot, who voted to approve the project, joked that Vandevere should buy the property and preserve it himself. Vandevere responded that he would, but only if Wilmot loaned him the money.

The size of the project also irritated several commissioners.

"It seems totally inappropriate for an area that is

already constrained," Vandevere said.

Deihl questioned the owner's decision to build a separate unit for a caretaker.

"I can see no sign of a need for a family to have 14,000 square feet," she said. "I strongly disagree on moral grounds."

Messenger defended her client's right to build a large home.

"It is not an atypical residence for the area," she said. "There are much larger homes in Pebble Beach. This is far from the largest home the planning commission has approved in the past. And it is sensitively placed [on the property] to mitigate its visual impact."

Images of the property displayed in a staff presentation gave a mistaken impression of the size of the proposed develop-

ment, Messenger said. A "before" drawing didn't include surface improvements like a driveway and a courtyard, while an "after" image included both.

Messenger also said the project aims to replant three trees for every one removed.

Ultimately, planning commissioners Deihl, Vandevere, Juan Sanchez and Cosme Padilla voted to deny the project. Planning commissioners Wilmot, Aurelio Sanchez Jr. and Don Rochester dissented. Planning commissioners Sharon Parsons, Miguel Errea and Laurence Hawkins were absent, perhaps tilting the decision against Roberts.

Roberts purchased the vacant lot for \$20.5 million in April 2004. His firm KKR — Kohlberg Kravis Roberts & Co. — grabbed headlines in 1980s with its innovative use of leveraged buyouts in purchasing Fortune 500 companies.

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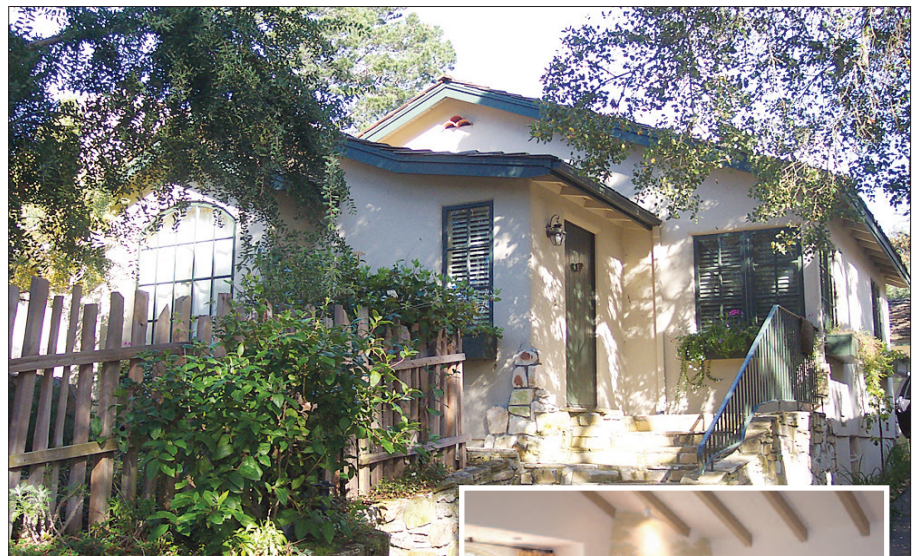

"This organization's goals fit very well with our desire to promote our students' involvement in community service,"

Marden told parents when he announced the union. "We are excited about the possibility of raising student awareness, respect and responsibility for the natural environment."

With its student-run garden and community projects — including raising more than \$5,000 for tsunami relief and collecting clothing for the needy — his students are already

well practiced in the art of helping others.

Fun in the mud

To demonstrate that talent, 50 of them had the pleasure of playing in the mud before Tuesday's assembly.

With the assistance of the California Conservation Corps and the California Department of Parks and Recreation, they dug holes and patted soil around native plants along a 100-foot, bare stretch of bank of the newly expanded Carmel River Lagoon. The old Odello artichoke field is now part of the habitat restored to benefit steelhead trout, red legged frogs and other native creatures.

"This is what we have been talking about all along — getting people involved in projects to protect the environment in their own neighborhoods," Norton said. Take Pride executive director Marti Allbright was also on hand and dug in.

National recognition

Back at school for a ceremony naming River as the nation's first Take Pride in America School, Norton commended the students for "putting your hands where your hearts are."

"It starts small right here at school, leading others in caring for the nation's treasures," she said. "You're already doing it."

"Everything you see around you is an extension of your own back yard," Marden reminded them as he accepted the Take Pride in America certificate for the school.

Eastwood, Take Pride in America's national spokesman, said he hopes schools across the country will follow.

"I'm pleased River School is there at the opening door," he said, prompting cheers and hoots from kids seated on the grass.

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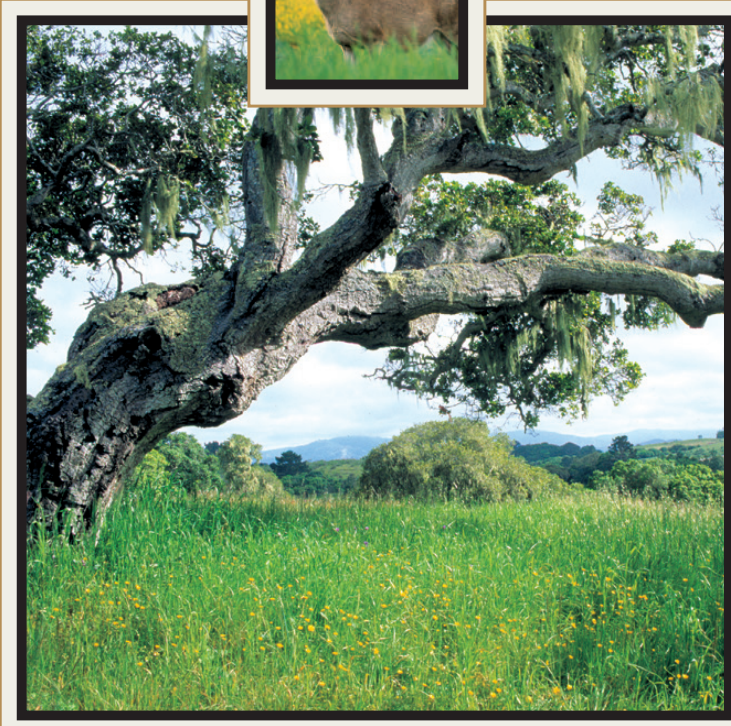

"Having kids go out for a morning and dig may not seem like a lot," Norton told The Pine Cone after the ceremony. "But it makes a big difference."

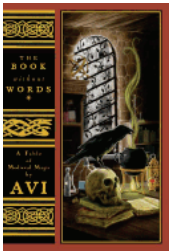


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August has Peninsula awash in automotive eye candy

THE MONTEREY Peninsula transforms into collector car heaven come August, when a week of events — from rallies and races to auctions and shows — tantalizes the eyes with offerings from just about every era of automotive history. And, as has become typical over the past half-century, each is trumpeting new and enticing aspects to attract spectators. Historic car week on the Monterey Peninsula, set for Aug. 15-21, is a car buff's dream.

The main events

While rallies, parties and sales occupy

the days leading up to the weekend's activities, it's the Monterey Historic Automobile Races, The Quail motorsports gathering, Concorso Italiano and the famed Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance that draw the crowds. All of the main events benefit various charities.

The 32nd Rolex Monterey Historic Automobile Races, held at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca Friday, Aug. 19 through Sunday, Aug. 21, will feature Great American Specials, including the legendary Chaparral as the weekend's featured mar-

with seven groups competing on Saturday and seven on Sunday, to ensure no two races are alike. 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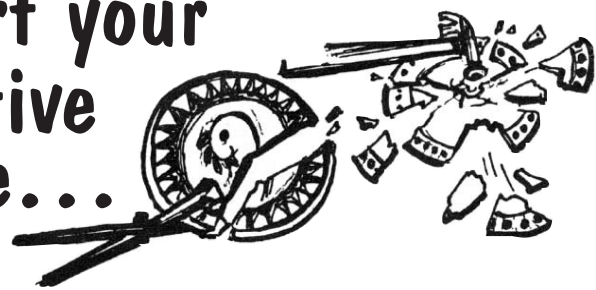

On the block at the 2005 sale will be a foursome of historic race cars — a 1960 Aston Martin DB4 GT Zagato, a 1964 Ford GT 40 Prototype, a 1932 Alfa Romeo P3 and a 1958 Ferrari 250 GT Tour de France — expected to draw more than \$1 million each.

Russo & Steele's Sports and Muscle in Monterey is set for Aug. 20 at the Monterey Marriott. Entering its fifth year of Peninsula automobile auctions, Russo & Steele is known for its uniquely casual and lively sale, which includes catered food and a format that "truly defines the words: 'Live auction excitement!'" Previews will be Friday and Saturday, with bidding running 6 to 10 p.m. Aug. 20.

Filling the spot previously occupied by Christie's, Gooding & Co. will hold its automobile auction Sunday, Aug. 21. Among this year's offerings of rare automobiles will be the 1967 Ferrari 275 GTS/4 NART Spyder, which after a brief racing career was driven by Steve McQueen in "The Thomas Crown Affair" and a one-of-a-kind, custom-designed 1952 Cadillac Two-Seat Roadster created for Harold Boyer, General Motors' chief engineer. Viewing scheduled from Thursday through Sunday morning, Aug. 18-21, with the auction commencing that evening.

With all of these and the myriad smaller events that surround the August historic car week on the Monterey Peninsula, it's impossible for a car fan to remain unsatisfied.

Considered by many to be the most prestigious of car auctions, the Christie's sale features extremely rare vehicles. This year's roster will include a 1961 Ferrari 250 GT Berlinetta known as the Breadvan that is expected to fetch as much as \$5 million.

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Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca promises adrenaline-inducing fun

RACE FANS all over the world know the Monterey Peninsula is endowed with one of the best racetracks ever built. Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca, the twisting, climbing and falling ribbon of tarmac that creates a 2.238-mile circuit, challenges racers of all levels and presents spectators with awesome views at every vantage point.

The country's only nonprofit racetrack, which will celebrate its 50th anniversary next year, Laguna Seca is owned by Monterey County and operated by the Sports Car Racing Association of the Monterey Peninsula. Volunteers from local charities help out during the year's main events, earning money for their respective groups.

The 2005 season opened April 29 with the U.S. Sports Car Invitational. But even if you missed that dramatic event, there are a bevy of opportunities remaining for you to get your racing fix this year.

Anticipated to draw more fans than any other event at the track in recent history, the Red Bull U.S. Grand Prix, set for July 8-10, will mark the return of world grand prix motorcycle racing to the United States after a decade.

This hotly contested MotoGP World Championship will include four American racers, among them national champion Nicky Hayden, riding for the Honda factory team, and world superbike champion Colin Edwards, known as the Texas Tornado. Both men are well familiar with Laguna Seca's 11 turns, including the signature Corkscrew that twists as it takes an extreme drop in elevation. John Hopkins and Kenny Roberts, Jr., are the other two American racers in the premier world championship motorcycle racing series.

The popular American Motorcycle Association Superbike Championship, Repsol Superstock Series and Pro Honda Oils Supersport Championship will also run that weekend. And the first ever Superstars of Super Karts races will pit some of the best Super Kart racers in the world against motorcycle racing legends Wayne Rainey (who lives locally), Eddie Lawson and others.

Monterey Historics

The unmistakable growl of vintage racecars will emanate from Laguna's hills Aug. 19-21 during the 32nd Annual Rolex Monterey Historic Automobile Races. Organized by Steve Earle and started with several dozen cars and a handful of spectators, the historics have grown to be considered the world's most notable vintage races.

This year's featured marque is Chaparral, part of an overall tribute to Great American Specials "paying homage to American ingenuity in the early days of big-time motor racing."

More than 400 drivers will compete in 14 different classes Saturday and Sunday, with the unique and always amusing awards ceremony bringing everything to a close Sunday afternoon. Paddock displays of vintage cars will also be open to spectators.

LeMans in the dark

Finally, the Monterey Sports Car Championships will be held Oct. 14-16. For the second year, the four-hour American LeMans Series race will end in the dark Saturday evening, providing a glimpse of what it might be like to attend the LeMans cars' 24-hour endurance race in France. Sleekly built and stunningly fast, the sensation of speed is heightened as dark falls and the lights come up.

The weekend schedule also includes the SPEED World Challenge GT and Touring Car Championships, as well as the Star Mazda Series.

Drive it yourself

And for anyone who has ever envied the racecar drivers and motorcycle racers as they scream around the track, several organizations host track days and racing schools at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca.

A handful of car clubs rent the track, allowing their members to play there for a day, but for drivers seeking lessons, Skip Barber driving school calls Laguna home. The school offers classes for aspiring racers, curious fans who would like to know what it's like behind the wheel of an open-wheel car, and drivers who simply want to improve their skills on the street. Motorcycle racing schools also rent out Laguna Seca and bring their instructors to teach riders the nuances and challenges of riding on a race track. Designed for street riders as well as would-be racers and their more experienced counterparts, track schools aim to improve every student's skills, benefiting safety as well as speed.
