Unconscious driver crashes through home

SANTA FE Street resident Tom Sinclair was taking in a little late-night television Sunday when he heard what sounded like a bomb exploding and ran outside to find a Honda had crashed through his house.

"There's a lot of traffic, so we don't even hear the cars anymore — we just blank them out," said Sinclair, a Village Corner waiter who rents the home at Santa Fe and Third with his wife, ER nurse Lourdes, and two teenagers. "When this hit, it was a complete shock."

Thinking someone had hit a tree, he ran out onto the back deck but couldn't see anything, "because the car was under the deck and completely underneath

Live music OK every night, narrow council majority decides

A DIVIDED Carmel City Council approved a new ordinance Tuesday to allow live music in restaurants and bars, including venues outside the commercial district, seven days a week.

The new ordinance, which has to be approved a second time next month before taking effect, overturns a 66-year-old ban on live music where alcohol is served within the city limits. Businesses will be able to get the new permits from the planning department after preparing an acoustical evaluation and filing a noise management plan.

Once the law goes into effect, noise limits will be set at 55 decibels, with violations bringing the offender before the planning commission for possible revocation of the permit.

When they discussed the proposed ordinance last month, council members preferred a more limited law that allowed live music five days a week from noon to 10 p.m.

"I think you've come up with an ordinance that will satis-

Trails to open soon at scenic Brazil Ranch

■ Coastal commission to rule whether weddings will disrupt Big Sur community

A NEW California Coastal Commission staff report offers no objections to plans by the U.S. Forest Service to host weddings and other commercial activities at the Brazil Ranch, but it recommends the federal agency be required to allow public hiking access as soon as possible to the highly scenic, 1,200-acre Big Sur property just south of the Bixby

When the commission meets Aug. 9 in Costa Mesa, the agency will decide whether plans by the forest service to host special events at the property are in compliance with the California Coastal Act.

The forest service acquired the ranch in 2002 for \$23 million in tax dollars. Since then, neighbors have objected that such plans, and other proposals for public use of the ranch, are in direct opposition to zoning regulations spelled out in the Big Sur Coast Land Use Plan.

Mike Caplin, president of the Coast Property Owners Association, said the ranch is an example of how the federal government is being held to a different standard than private

"If you owned the Brazil Ranch and wanted to do what the forest service is doing, the coastal commission would be pointing to the zoning laws," said Caplin, a longtime resident of nearby Palo Colorado Canyon.

Rich Tobin, director of conservation partnerships for Los Padres National Forest, said activities proposed at the Brazil Ranch comply with local land use regulations.

"Our activities are fully in compliance with the Coastal Act and the Big Sur LUP," Tobin insisted.

And Liz Fuchs, a planner with the coastal commission, disagreed that the federal government is being held to a different standard. "It's just a slightly different process," Fuchs

John Bowers, an attorney who works for the coastal commission, said an agreement between state and federal governments gives his agency jurisdiction over the forest service proposed uses of Brazil Ranch. But the detailed rules in the Big Sur LUP may not

"The local plan is not applicable to the federal government," explained

So does such a distinction represent a different standard? Fuchs said no, but she admitted, "I can see why there is

According to Caplin, by requiring the Brazil Ranch to comply with regulations in the coastal act and not the Big Sur LUP, the Forest Service is getting off easy.

Homeowners vow to fight historic listing

PROPERTY OWNERS are lining up to protest the city's historic designation of their homes — a distinction to be permanently recorded with the county at the end of the month and Carmel City Administrator Rich Guillen said Tuesday the city will host a workshop to tell people how the designations came about, what they mean, what the benefits are and how to appeal them.

At city council meetings and in letters, many have decried the listing of their homes on the historic inventory and have pledged to fight it. Designation subjects buildings to strict preservation standards that limit construction and remodels, and costly environmental studies are required for demolition.

\$100K for Flanders EIR

DENISE DUFFY & Associates will be paid another \$29,835 to finish the environmental impact report on the proposed sale of the historic Flanders Mansion, the Carmel City Council unanimously decided without discussion Aug. 2, though the city administrator already told the consultant to proceed.

The council wants to sell the mansion to pay for capital projects and agreed last December to pay the consultant \$69,724 for the first phase of the EIR. The additional money - bringing the total to more than \$100,000 — will cover the costs of responding to public comments and circulating the final version for review. After the council certifies the report, it can take action on the sale.

"In order to keep the project moving forward in a timely manner, the city administrator reviewed the proposed con-


Pricey sculptures grabbed in broad-daylight, late-night crimes

ART-HUNGRY THIEVES struck two Carmel galleries this week, taking valuable sculptures.

A short, heavyset white man in his 30s walked out of Hanson Gallery with a \$22,500 Frederick Hart acrylic sculpture entitled "Mother and Child" Sunday afternoon, according to Carmel Police Sgt. John Nyunt.

"Apparently the store clerk in there saw a guy lifting it up earlier, but she didn't say anything to him," Nyunt said. "Then he left, and a little bit later in the day, she noticed it was gone."



Nyunt said a witness from the Sharper Image store up the street saw a man carrying something heavy, possibly a sculpture, covered with a sweater. It was likely "Mother and Child," which is 25 inches tall, 18 inches wide and 11 inches deep. It weighs about 30 pounds.

The suspect was described as a white male adult, 5 feet 6 inches tall, heavyset and in his mid-30s, Nyunt said. He was last seen "carrying a heavy acrylic item under a pink sweater and walking with a female.'

The Hanson Gallery employee reported the theft around 2 p.m. July 31.

The works of Frederick Hart, who died in 1999 and is best known for the "Three Soldiers" of the Vietnam War Memorial and the "Creation" sculptures that adorn the Washington National Cathedral, are popular with thieves. Hanson Gallery was previously hit by acrylic-nabbing criminals in November and July 2000, as well as in July 1998.

Someone took advantage of the cover of darkness to smash the front window of the Classic Art Gallery on Sixth Avenue at 3:37 a.m. July 29. The culprit grabbed a bronze sculpture valued at \$5,800, according to Nyunt.

Police arrived about 30 seconds after the alarm company notified them of the activation, but the thief was long gone, according to Nyunt. He said there is always a delay between an alarm sounding and police learning of the activation.

The bronze statue of a woman balancing a ball on her arm was sculpted by artist Paige Bradley and is called, "Balance." It is 19 inches tall, 15 inches wide and 9 inches deep and weighs 25 pounds.

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
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Council has second thoughts about accepting water for apartments

AFTER BEING warned by the city administrator that its earlier decision might violate the municipal code and general plan, the city council voted 4-1 Tuesday not to accept water credits from the Carmel Inn for Seniors after all. They will schedule another public hearing on the matter.

The valuable credits would have gone to the city in exchange for freeing the owner of the former senior home from a requirement to build rental housing alongside upscale condos he wants to create at the San Carlos Street building.

On June 7, the council accepted 42 water credits from Dr. Ron Chaplan, who owns the now-defunct Carmel Inn for Seniors. Under that deal, he would have turned the old Spanish-style building into three condos, and the surplus water from the days when more than a dozen seniors lived there could be allocated to someone to build three apartments elsewhere in the city. According to the general plan, a remodel project with condos must include an equal number of apartments on site.

Guillen said the quid pro quo approved last month would violate that requirement, and would conflict with the municipal code rule that at least a quarter of the residences in any multifamily development with three or more units be small between 400 and 650 square feet.

"I am reasonably certain the owners do not intend to split the (roughly) 6,000 square feet of floor space into three condominiums and have one of them just 400 to 650 square feet," Guillen wrote in his Aug. 2 staff report to the council.

Also, if the condo project were approved, the site's inadequate parking would become a permanent feature, he said.

"If the building is ever demolished or destroyed by calamity, the owners have the right to fully rebuild the condominiums without ever conforming to parking standards," he wrote. "The nonconformity never gets corrected."

He said the council lacked much of that information when it voted in June. It also didn't have adequate legal counsel, according to Guillen, since city attorney Don Freeman had to step down due to a conflict of interest (his office building is next door to the Carmel Inn).

Councilman Gerard Rose, an attorney, was unconvinced. "I'd like to register not only a 'No,' but a 'Heck no," he

said, adding that reconsidering a vote is rarely appropriate and could set a "terrible precedent."

"There has to be finality to our decisions," he continued. "With all due respect to the reasons presented by our city

administrator, I will vote no and strongly urge my colleagues to do the same.'

But none of them did.

Councilman Cunningham said the council does not have a habit of reconsidering its votes and that, on this occasion, doing so would be warranted.

"We would also be in very vulnerable position if we made a decision and didn't have all the information," Mayor Sue McCloud said.

"If we find something egregious that we didn't know, maybe we should reconsider," councilman Erik Bethel commented.

Rose countered that new

information could always be forthcoming following a vote, especially after two months.

"It's unfair and unwise public policy," he said.

"I think we made a tremendous mistake in allowing these water transfers to be picked up and someone else having to pick up the tab for the apartments," councilwoman Paula Hazdovac said. "I would like to reconsider it."

This week's vote cancels the earlier decision to accept the credits, and sets up another public hearing to reexamine the issue, likely in September.



BRAC to meet Monday in Monterey

MEMBERS OF the Base Closure and Realignment Commission will host a public hearing at the Monterey Conference Center Monday, when they will hear testimony from representatives of states west of the Mississippi where military facilities have been proposed for closure or realignment.

Monterey City Manager Fred Meurer, who will testify on behalf of the Naval Postgraduate School and the Defense Language Institute, will be accompanied by former White House Chief of Staff and U.S. Congressman Leon Panetta and Congressman Sam Farr. Meurer said someone from the governor's office will also speak.

Meurer said he plans to impress upon BRAC Chairman Anthony Principi and four other commissioners the importance of the Monterey installations.

"What they are doing is in direct support of the national security effort and is not being undertaken currently by any civilian university," he said. "And it's highly doubtful any university would be able to undertake it if they wanted to."

Representatives from San Diego, Alaska and Colorado will testify on behalf of installations in their areas as well.

Following the hearing, commissioners will depart for Washington D.C. where they will hear from representatives on the east side of the Mississippi.

"Early next month, they will begin voting to close, realign or leave installations alone," Meurer said.

The hearing, set for 1 p.m. Aug. 8, is open to the public, but there will be no public testimony. The Monterey Conference Center is located at 2 Portola Plaza in Monterey.

Two suspected of gunfire at dad's house, drunken abuse of mom

TWO CARMEL residents were arrested in separate incidents last week after their parents called the cops.

Kent Gurries, 40, is suspected of waving a gun and firing it in front of his father's house Friday afternoon, and Karen Terrell, 48, allegedly battered her mother while drunk the following day.

Gurries pulled his truck up in front of his

father's Highway 1 home around 3 p.m. July 29, prompting Ronald Gurries to come out and tell him to leave, according to the report filed by Monterey County Sheriff's Deputy


"Kent grabbed a pistol from the front seat of his truck, waved it around in a careless manner and fired two shots toward the house," Wise wrote.

Robert Gurries called 911, and Kent Gurries left for his doublewide trailer a quarter mile away, according to sheriff's Sgt. John DiCarlo.

At the father's residence, they found one

bullet in the front fence but could not locate the other.

"The deputies went to the son's house and eventually confronted him there," DiCarlo said. They arrested him and confiscated three guns — a .38 Special, a 9 mm Glock and a rifle.

Gurries was booked into Monterey County Jail on charges of shooting at an inhabited dwelling and discharging a firearm in a negligent manner.

"They didn't book him for shooting at the dad," DiCarlo said. "There wasn't enough to charge him with that."

Daughter arrested

The following afternoon, Carmel police arrested Karen Terrell and took her to Monterey County Jail.

"She slapped her mother and pushed her down," said officer Chris Johnson, who responded, with Cpl. John Nyunt, to a 2 p.m. call from Terrell's mother.

"We found her walking down the street,

and she was intoxicated," Johnson said. Terrel1

was at Monte Verde Ocean when Johnson and Nyunt picked her according to Johnson. She and her mother, who asked police withhold her name, share a home down the street.

It was not their first contact with Terrell, who was arrested for a DUI accident last month after she was found asleep at the wheel of her crashed car and blew a breathalyzer test of .26 percent. Johnson said this week that the district attorney's office downgraded the charge to public intoxication since she was not seen driving.

She now faces charges of battery on an elderly person, elder abuse and public intoxication.

"Alcohol definitely played a part," Johnson said.





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Wesley Snuggs, 34, dies suddenly at his Lime Creek home

LONGTIME BIG Sur resident and 1989 Carmel High School graduate Wesley Snuggs died Saturday, July 30, in his

Snuggs, who worked as a massage therapist at the Esalen Institute in Big Sur, was remembered by coworkers for his positive, upbeat personality.

"He made time for everyone," recalled Jessica Cooper, who works as supervisor in the Esalen office. "He was very sensitive to the needs of others. He had a radar for when someone needed help. And he was an extremely valued member of the Esalen massage crew."

Margaret Grahame, massage crew coordinator and Snuggs' immediate supervisor at work, said he "was someone who was universally loved."

"He was fully present," Grahame said. "He was very honest and he was very direct with who he was. When you were with him, he was definitely with you.'

Snuggs' mother, Stephanie Purcell of New York, traveled to California after learning of his passing. She said she was amazed by the impact he had on people.

"You can't believe all the stories I'm hearing," Purcell said. "I don't know how he connected with so many people."

She said his circle of friends wasn't limited to Big Sur and the Monterey Peninsula.

"People are traveling to his memorial service from places like Texas, Oregon, Idaho, Indiana, Kentucky and New York," she said. "People just adored him. We have found hundreds of notes from women. He just had that way about him."

A native of Murray, Ken., Snuggs moved with his parents to Carmel when he was 15. During his time at Carmel High, he was captain of the ski team, a member of the football team and a student representative to Congress. After graduation, he traveled throughout Europe for a year with, in his mother's words, "only his backpack and his sense of adventure."



Contractor will get \$73,000 a year to keep city restrooms clean

THE COMPANY that has cleaned the city's restrooms for a decade will keep handling the task, according to a \$72,995.52 contract approved by the Carmel City Council Tuesday. The council had been set to renew the contract last month but delayed a decision to see if a lower bidder might come forward.

Building official Tim Meroney said only two companies responded to a request for proposals, and one was tens of thousands of dollars lower because the San Jose-based contractor did not read the specifications of the city job.

"It would be cheap, but your restrooms wouldn't get cleaned," he told the council.

Meroney explained the scope of work for cleaning restrooms in Devendorf Park, First Murphy Park, Del Mar at Carmel Beach, Forest Theater, Forest Hill Park and the Vista Lobos meeting room.

"They come three or four times a day, seven days a week,

and at times at night," he said.

While the council hoped someone would do the job for less money, Meroney said, "You've heard complaints about our restrooms. They're the number-one source of complaints out of any of our city facilities."

Crews pressure wash and sanitize the restrooms several times a year, Meroney said after the meeting, and two years ago a company steam-cleaned the stone walls of the restrooms in Devendorf Park and Carmel Beach — a job that hadn't been done in 20 years.

"Because the walls absorb so much liquid, they stunk really bad," Meroney said. Also, people regularly abuse the facilities, shoving rolls of toilet paper down the pipes to stop them up. The contractor or a city crew — whichever gets there first — gets stuck cleaning up the awful mess.

"It happens a couple times a week," Meroney said. "Those restrooms take a beating."

The \$73,000 bid came in below the \$85,550 budgeted for the work, he added.

He also said the contractor, Professional Property Management, "has an excellent record for providing this service," and the money would be well spent.

Councilman Mike Cunningham said he "did the math, and it's \$15 a cleaning," which he found satisfactory.

Councilman Erik Bethel asked if the contractor might take the city job for granted after a decade. Meroney said the work performed showed no evidence of that.

Former councilwoman Barbara Livingston asked why the city wouldn't hire a full-time employee to clean the bathrooms, but Meroney said it takes more than one person and is best handled by an outside contractor, as it has been for more than 20 years.

"It's an industry that's limited in our area, and it's expensive," he said.

Before the unanimous vote to OK the contract, Bethel said, "When the public comes and sees bathrooms that are dirty, it reflects poorly on us. I just hope that for \$73,000, we have the cleanest bathrooms in the state."

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Fear of jail leads to police chase — and jail


Police Chased and arrested a 20-year-old Carmel man who took off in his car Saturday morning because he was afraid to go to jail, according to officer Chris Johnson.

Johnson was using radar to nab speeders on Carpenter Street south of First Avenue around 9:30 a.m. July 30 when

he spotted Chris Elliott behind the wheel of a passing car. He said he recognized the man he had arrested in May for marijuana possession and driving on a suspended license for a prior DUI.

Johnson knew Elliott should not be driving and decided to pull him over.

"As soon as I made the U-turn, he pretty much took off. We were doing speeds of 75 to 80 mph down Valley Way toward Highway 1," the officer said. "He had no

regard for anybody, and he went through the stop sign at 65 or 70 mph, right onto Highway 1. It was lucky there was no traffic coming."

Carmel Police Sgt. John Nyunt, who was also on patrol Saturday, said Elliott had a passenger who apparently didn't like the idea of fleeing police at high speed.

"Officer Johnson could see the girl and tell she was

frantic," Nyunt said.

Her pleas apparently resonated with Elliott, who turned back toward town on Ocean Avenue and finally pulled over at Hatton Road. The chase lasted about a minute, according to Johnson.

"His passenger was asking him to stop — she was really scared," he said. "I'm glad it ended well, with nobody getting hurt."

Had the suspect continued fleeing, Nyunt said they would have abandoned a chase that could endanger the drivers and tourists likely to be crowding Carmel streets on a summer Saturday morning.

"The pursuit would have been ended if it went into town," he said.

CPD Sgt. Mel Mukai said many suspects can't handle their cars at such speeds in such situations, while police officers have training and skill on their side.

"It depends on the driver's experience level," he said.

"A lot of times, these kids crash or stop."

Elliott fled because he was afraid of gains to icil.

Elliott fled because he was afraid of going to jail, according to Johnson.

"But if he was just driving while suspended, if that was the only thing, he would have been issued a citation and the car would have been impounded."

He might have forfeited the car for being a habitual offender, Johnson said, but he would not have gone to jail.

Instead, Elliott was arrested for driving on a suspended license and evading arrest. According to the state-issued bail schedule, "fleeing peace officer — reckless driving with disregard for safety involved" is a misdemeanor, as is "driving while suspended or revoked for driving under the influence of alcohol/drugs."

Elliott's car was towed and impounded, and he was taken to Monterey County Jail.

Gregory Dale Wild, a 57-year-old Carmel resident, plowed his wife's Honda into Sinclair's house just after 11 p.m. Sunday night, according to police. Three-quarters of the car penetrated the wall and was in the crawl space below.

"I called 911 right away, and while I was on the phone, I contacted the guy and asked if he was OK," Sinclair said. "He didn't respond right away. He was out of it."

Carmel Police Sgt. John Nyunt said that when he arrived, "People were screaming that there were people trapped in the vehicle." He said someone reported six people were stuck inside.

As the fire engine, rescue rig and ambulance arrived, Nyunt and Sinclair crawled under the house and freed Wild from the wreckage.

"No one else was in the car," Nyunt said. "The driver was totally incoherent and disoriented. I wasn't sure if it was the injury that caused it or if he was under the influence."

An ambulance rushed Wild to Community Hospital for treatment of minor injuries, and he was released a few hours later to return to Carmel Police Department for evaluation.

"He was zero for alcohol but admitted using prescription medication," said Nyunt, who cited Wild for DUI and marijuana possession. "He blacked out."

A witness reported Wild had been driving eastbound on Third at a high rate of speed without the headlights on, according to Nyunt. Perhaps already unconscious, he never braked before leaving the roadway and launching into the side of Sinclair's home.

"He had no idea where he had been prior to the accident, and he didn't know where he was," Nyunt said. "He didn't even know what he was driving — he thought he was driving his truck, but he was driving his wife's car."

Nearly fatal


The 6-foot-7-inch Wild would have had his "head taken right off" had he not slumped over into the passenger seat before hitting the house, Nyunt speculated. "It should have been a fatality."

It also could have resulted in someone else's death, Sinclair said. Friends of his teenage children walk to and from the house along the side that Wild hit. He also pointed out that had she not been on vacation, his wife might have ended up working on Wild in the ER.

"I really don't like uninvited guests," Sinclair deadpanned. "And I at least like them to call before they come over."

Nyunt reported "it took forever" to extricate the car from the house, and he praised the work of Carmel Chevron's AAA towing crew. Building official Tim Meroney arrived and pronounced the home structurally sound.

"He couldn't have hit it any better," Sinclair said. "He missed all the important parts."

The California Coastal Commission's certification of the Local Coastal Program last year made official Carmel's inventory of historic properties and obligated the city to record a "resolution designating an historic resource" with the county for each property listed, principal planner Brian Roseth explained to the council last month. Historian Kent Seavey and others spent several years surveying the city and filing reports on properties they deemed historic.

To have a property removed from the list, the owner must file an appeal with the city, pay \$1,500 to hire another historian to evaluate the building and appear before the Carmel Historic Resources Board. If the HRB decides the building should remain on the list, that decision can be appealed to the city council.

"It is unfair for the city, without prior notice to the property owner, to summarily designate property as historic after only a reconnaissance survey, known as a windshield survey, and force the property owner to pay an exorbitant fee of \$1,500 to challenge that determination," George Schroeder, who owns a home at Carmelo and Second, told the city council Tuesday. "Finally, it seems to me incredulous that 300 sites have been designated historic within the 1 square mile area of the city limits of the City of Carmel."

He requested the home be removed from the inventory

and that nothing be attached to the deed "that gives any suggestion that my house is an historic resource, because such document would greatly diminish the value of my house, and I would look to the City of Carmel to reimburse me for such loss"

Doreen Silva, who owns a home called The Barn on Carpenter near Fourth, also said the designation would negatively affect its value and questioned Seavey's 2002 report, which she did not know existed until last month. She has hired an attorney since receiving it.

"Mr. Seavey's report is filled with supposition, hearsay and references that for the most part are insubstantial, undocumented and contain little fact," she testified Tuesday. "In his report, he uses such phrases as 'The Barn may have been associated with...,' and, 'It is possible that it may have also been...' It's just not right that such a weighty decision is based on a grossly substandard report."

She said she appreciates her home's uniqueness, "but Ben Franklin never slept there," and asked if the city planned to help pay for the upkeep of all the homes it has deemed historic.

Joan Hudson-Miller drove from Los Angeles to Carmel to

address the city council regarding the historic designation of the San Carlos Street home her parents had occupied before they died. She and her brother had hoped to keep it but can't afford to, so they put it on the market.

"What a shock. Lots of people walked through that house, and no one would touch it when they found out it was 'historic,'" she said Tuesday.

In an Aug. 1 letter to the city, Hudson-Miller said she and her brother found "most, if not all, of the historical rhetoric written by Kent Seavey very questionable." She said the home was apparently remodeled over the years to resemble 1920s Craftsman style and asked the city to remove it from the inventory or compensate the family for the loss in property value.

"We find this a reprehensible invasion of and total disregard for our rights as private property owners in this city," she wrote.



Just Run organizers urge children to move their feet

As KIDS head back to school this month, a community group wants to keep them moving. Just Run — a collaborative effort between the Big Sur International Marathon and Team USA Monterey Bay long-distance runners — helps schools and youth groups get kids in grades two through eight interested in running. The group will hold an informational meeting on its free program for interested teachers and parents Aug. 11 at Carmel Middle School.

"The marathon board took up the chal-

appeals with the city, according to planner Sean Conroy: David and Audrey Hall, who own a Tudor Revival house on Carmelo at 11th, and Joseph and Julie Villarreal, whose house is on Second Avenue north of Santa

Conroy said the Villarreals' appeal did not specify what flaws they found in Seavey's review of their "one-story, woodframed, pre-World War II modern vernacular hip-roofed cottage," built in 1941 by Carl Daniels, who also worked on Hearst Castle, Community Hospital and the Carmel Middle

School and founded the construction firm of Daniels & House.

But the Halls argued their Tudor Revival home, designed in 1926 by Robert Stanton - "the first 'professional' architect to run a major practice in Carmel," according to Seavey — was not considered historic in 1998 when they received approval for remodel plans.

"We purchased the property in 1991, when it was in a ramshackle, tear-down condition," they wrote in a July 12 letter to Conroy. In a remodel that took two years, they expanded the floor area and elevation, changed the roof line and fenestration, and added decks, among other changes. They said the only original remaining parts of the cottage are the living room, master bedroom and chimney, and those were modified.

"The remodel is a significant departure

from the architect's design and now severely different from its neighbor," the Halls concluded, comparing their home to another Stanton design next door. That house, which had the same footprint but is Spanish Eclectic style, has not changed. "Today they are sharply different in size and character."

Conroy said the two appeals will probably be heard by the Carmel Historic Resources Board in September.

The city administrator has not yet announced the date of the workshop he plans to hold on the topic.

'We're complying with the certification of our LCP that we're prescribed to follow — that's one of the things we need to explain at the workshop," Guillen said at the council meeting. "People are shooting the messenger — the council — and we had to include this in the LCP to get that certified."



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

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
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Food, music, firetrucks and plenty of dancing highlight Carmel Valley Fiesta





Dove and the elite runners, including an Olympian, have visited 20 schools since the program began last year and hope to further boost interest now that students are return-

"That's a big part of it: getting them motivated in seeing these great athletes and

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being able to run with them," Dove said.

Once a school, youth group, church or any other kid-oriented organization decides to participate, leaders there take on the responsibility of implementing the program.

'It's up to an active leader, a teacher or parent, to take the reins," Dove said. The Just Run website provides the tools, though Dove and others still give advice and make site visits when needed. "It's set up so anybody who wants to get involved can. It doesn't cost anything. We give away stuff."

A main feature, Just Run Across the USA, allows kids to track their mileage on the website and shows their progress across the nation, past notable landmarks and interesting stops, like the Jelly Belly factory in Northern California. Their miles add up for their school, so it's a collaborative effort.

"Kids can run with their family and chart their miles and run across the country and learn about the geography of the United States," Ferlito said.

And as they rack up miles, kids are also challenged to do good deeds, such has helping to clean up the play ground, doing something nice for a neighbor or giving water to runners at the end of a race. When they accumulate 26 of each, they get a Just Run T-shirt, Dove said.

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
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

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

general terms," he said. "The LUP is more specific."

A more immediate concern for Caplin is the effect commercial activities at the Brazil Ranch will have on Big Sur

"It's unfair competition," he said. "The forest service can have a commercial activity where a private entity couldn't. Put yourself in the position of the owner of a local business like the Big Sur River Inn. They have to be zoned commercial and get special event permits that cost a significant amount of money."

Where to park?

While plans to host commercial activities at the ranch have stirred up the Big Sur business community, a tentative agreement between the coastal commission and the forest







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service to offer public access to trails at the ranch is good news for hikers. Tobin said "it is possible" some trails could be opened on the west side of Highway 1 by the end of the summer, and hiking in the interior could be available next spring. But he urged patience.

"We want to measure twice and cut once," he said, using a carpenter's cliché. "There's still a great deal of work that needs to be done.'

At this point, the biggest obstacle to opening the trails is the development of short-term and long-term parking plans.

"The model we have in mind is Garrapata State Park," Tobin said.

At Garrapata State Park, hikers accessing the Soberanes Canyon trail and Garrapata Beach park their vehicles on wide dirt shoulders adjacent to Highway 1. Tobin said his agency is committed to providing "safe access" for hikers, but he declined to give specifics because discussions with the California Department of Transportation have not been completed.

The need for providing safe access for hikers was underscored when Jose Luis Corrall, a Fresno resident, was killed by a passing car May 14 while walking along the dirt shoulder near Garrapata Beach.

Bethel called the restriction "ridiculous," and suggested singing "Happy Birthday" in a restaurant could exceed 40 db as heard in an upstairs apartment.

"Should we ban 'Happy Birthday' singing in restaurants?"

McCloud worried too much live music could interfere with the city's goal of wooing people to live in the 600 condos and apartments downtown.



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MATTRESS MONEY

"Mattress money" is an actual financial term, not just something this writer thought up while in a funny mood. It's money that bor-




Thus, people who save their money under a mattress or in a sock or in a jar in the backyard (and there are, indeed such people) have been discriminated against, in a very real sense, because it is so difficult to differentiate them from people who came up with down payment money illicitly.

This is a relevant move, given that about 13% of all Americans, according to a Federal Reserve study, do not have checking or savings

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PINE CONE STAFF REPORT

AT ITS meeting next week in Orange County, the California Coastal Commission will consider an application from Caltrans to establish several permanent disposal sites along Highway 1 in Big Sur.

"The purpose of this project is to facilitate the reopening of the Big Sur Coast Highway when it is disrupted by landslides or other naturally-occurring events," such as happen almost every winter, according to a report prepared by the coastal commission staff.

Not only will the sites provide a temporary dumping area for cleared debris, they will allow Caltrans to sort material for reuse elsewhere, the report says.

The proposed locations — including two within the Los Padres National Forest — were selected because they would protect public views, "environmentally sensitive habitat areas," archeological features and public access, according to the coastal commission.

Compared to hauling landslide debris long distances, the new sites within Big Sur would require less energy use, have less impact on traffic, cut the costs for the state, and make it possible to reopen the highway

more quickly after a storm.

But the coastal commission staff warns that stockpiling heavy debris within the Highway 1 Big Sur corridor could also add to the likelihood of additional landslides, by causing "renewed movement of the underlying landslide mass." This increased risk could be offset by installation of a subsurface drainage system at the disposal sites, the coastal commission staff believes. It recommends the commission, which meets in Costa Mesa Aug. 9 - 11, approve the Caltrans proposal with some safety modifications.

Also on the agenda at next week's meeting is a 3,588-square-foot home proposed for San Remo Drive in the Carmel Highlands by Michael and Patricia Moeller.

The county approved their proposal in April, but a neighbor appealed it to the commission, contending that it does not comply with coastal development rules. In particular, the appellant, Mary J. Whitney, maintains the new home would not be "subordinate to" or "blend in" with the environment.

In addition to building the home, the Moellers want to construct a 1,164-square-foot garage, a circular driveway and a septic system. The project will require extensive grading and also the removal of nine Monterey pine and six coast live oaks,


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according to the coastal commission's staff, which recommends the commission approve the house because it is "sited and designed in keeping with the rural character of the surrounding area."

The commission will also consider an appeal by two of its own members of a lotline adjustment proposed by a property owner in southern Monterey County Jana Weston wants to make four similarsized parcels out of four existing parcels that range from .15 to 75 acres.

"The adjustment will increase the density beyond that which is allowed" by local land use rules, the appellants contend.

The coastal commission's meeting begins Tuesday at 9 a.m. at the Westin South Coast Plaza in Costa Mesa.



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

tract amendment and authorized the consultant to proceed in advance of the council's authorization of funding," principal planner Brian Roseth wrote in his staff report to the council. City administrator Rich Guillen also authorized \$5,000 to complete the staking and flagging of the property so the public could see its boundaries.

"Given the large number of public comments received and the controversial nature of this project, the city administrator considered the scope of work proposed and the contract amounts for both the document preparation and survey work appropriate," Roseth concluded.

The decision came a day after the council and several

members of the public toured the Flanders Mansion and grounds with Roseth, who has also taken planning commissioners and historic resources board members through the

Stakes and pink tape indicated the boundaries between the parcel and the surrounding Mission Trail park, which is also owned by the city. Participants were shown which public trails would dead-end into the private property and heard options for maintaining access to them.

'Appalling conditions'

Inside the mansion, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and features high ceilings, rooms great and small (one containing a mural painted in 1933), heavy wooden doors and a multitude of fireplaces, tour members witnessed the telltale signs of decay and vacancy: peeling paint, the smell of mold, cracked plaster and even a bat or two flying around upstairs.

At the council meeting, several tour participants — most of whom are opponents of the proposed sale — decried the home's deterioration.

"The conditions inside are appalling," Roberta Miller said. "How embarrassing it must be for you to see what gross neglect can create."

She said the city is obligated to care for the old mansion. "It appears to me that the city has deliberately allowed

Flanders, an historic house, to deteriorate," she said. After decades of trying to find an appropriate public use

for the property, only to see every proposal shot down by neighborhood opposition, Mayor Sue McCloud and several of her council allies decided the best way to restore Flanders Mansion and pay for much-needed capital projects would be to sell it to a private buyer. The issue was a major one in the last municipal election, when McCloud defeated Dick Ely for mayor. Ely was an outspoken proponent of keeping the mansion in public ownership.



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
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Highlands games offer everything but lousy Scottish weather

PERHAPS THE green rolling hills of Toro County Park in February bear a certain resemblance to the misty Scottish Highlands. But in August they seem much too sundrenched and parched to be a suitable backdrop for bagpipers in wool kilts.

For the organizers of the 38th annual Monterey Highland Games and Celtic Festival Aug. 6-7, though, the golden California countryside makes a perfect setting the popular local event.

'There's actually a nice breeze that blows through the park," said Jeff Craig, a former festival "chieftan" who has lived in Pebble Beach for 34 years. "It's not nearly as hot as it was when we had the event at the Monterey Fairgrounds."

For three decades, the fairgrounds hosted the festival during the first week of August. But a scheduling conflict forced organizers to move the event to a less desirable weekend. Eventually, they decided to relocate to

The move to the picturesque park alongside Highway 68 has been a big success this year Craig estimates 5,000 people will attend the festival.

Amazingly, Highland games are more popular in California than in Scotland, explained Craig. In fact, you're almost as

Who said real men don't wear kilts? A local highlander gears up for this weekend's Scottish games at Toro Park by "putting the stone."

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

likely to see a kilt in California as you would in the old country. "In Scotland, kilts are usually worn only for ceremonial purposes," Craig said. "They like to say they're for marrying and burying."

Californians have developed a remarkable affinity for Highland Games and the requisite costumes. Pleasanton, in fact, hosted the first Highland festival in the U.S.

And while the Monterey festival started as a Scottish affair, as time passed, Irish and Welsh traditions became part of the event. "There has always been a mixing of the Scots and the Irish," said Craig. "It wasn't that far to swim from Scotland to Ireland if you were in love."

The games will begin Saturday at 9 a.m. with a morning of piping and drumming contests, Irish and Scottish dancing, and athletic events including traditional Scottish sports like the caber toss and the hammer throw.

"The Scots were known as warriors,"

Craig said. "They developed the games when the King of England outlawed their weapons."

On Saturday at noon, a "Gathering of the Clans" sets the stage for the weekend's opening ceremonies. The afternoon will offer the lively mix of a drum major competition, live pipe bands and games for kids.

Throughout the weekend, Scottish military buffs donning elaborate uniforms and period weapons will participate in reenactments of marches and battles.

Three traditional Celtic musical acts — Hamewith, the Wicked Tinkers and Switchback — will perform twice a day on Saturday and Sunday. And even between sets, the sound of bagpipes is never far away.

"Once I hear those bagpipes, I'm ready to do anything except a Highland jig," joked Peggy Davis, a retired Monterey High School teacher and the festival's first female chieftan.

Craig agreed. "Everyone loves a pipe

band," he said with the certainty of a man who has been a chieftan.

Sunday's highlights include a morning of piping and drum events, and a full day of



athletic events, Irish and Scottish country dancing, and Highland dancing. At 12:30 p.m., festival goers will be treated to a classic drum major exhibition. At 4 p.m., a grand finale will include a parade of pipe bands and a presentation of trophies.

"The first day focuses more on competition, while the second day is more of a festival," explained Craig.

Food vendors will complement the fun and games throughout the weekend, providing tradition Scottish favorites like meat pies, bangers, and fish 'n chips. A bustling faire-like marketplace provides a marketcase for everything from bagpipe compact discs and "Kiss Me, I'm Irish" T-shirts to medieval swords and authentic kilts.

Proceeds from the event benefit a variety of local nonprofit organizations, including the Monterey Elks, the Cypress Community Church and the Alliance on Aging.

The nearly 5,000-acre park is located just off Highway 68, about 13 miles east of the Monterey Peninsula. General admission is \$16 a day or \$20 for a two-day pass. For seniors or kids 8 to 16, it's \$12 a day or \$16 for the weekend. Children under 7 get in free. Camping is also available. He also attended the College of the Redwoods in Humboldt County.

He loved music — he learned to play the piano and the violin in elementary and middle school, and later became proficient on the guitar and the bass. In recent years he developed a passion for African drumming, and he regularly played drums with friends at Esalen. He was a human database on the history of music.

"It was unbelievable how much he knew," Purcell recalled. "He could tell you about a 100-year-old bluegrass band or the latest

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

Making the punishment fit the abalone

ONE HUNDRED fifty years ago, when the world was much poorer than it is now, a French novelist made a hero out of a man who got 19 years in prison for stealing a loaf of bread.

Victor Hugo, in his book, "Les Miserables," invented the noble, persecuted Jean Valjean as a commentary on the injustice of the barely reformed medieval economy of Europe in the early 19th century — when a small group of men controlled the wealth of nations, and the masses toiled for their benefit.

Such gross economic disparities helped inspire the democratic revolutions that swept the Western world from 1650 to 1850 — revolutions that, as William Bernstein pointed out in his brilliant book, "The Birth of Plenty," published last year, provided the final, essential element that would make possible the incredible, widespread wealth that exists in those same countries today. In France, Germany, Great Britain, the United States and other Western democracies, life expectancies set new records every year, high-tech inventions that would have seemed miraculous just a few years ago have become commonplace, and obesity has replaced malnourishment as a common health problem, even among the poor.

So plentiful is food in these places, it is hard to imagine Jean Valjean getting more than a slap on the wrist were he to steal a loaf of bread in any Western country today.

But if the Draconian legal system that protected shopkeepers two centuries ago is no longer necessary, it has been replaced by a new orthodoxy — one that demands harsh punishments, not for stealing from other people, but for stealing from nature. Thus, the California Legislature has decreed, and some judges are apparently in agreement, that a man should get eight months in jail for taking a few abalone from public tidelands of the vast California shore.

Obviously, it must be illegal to usurp common resources for personal gain, even if only to feed one's family, which is what the abalone poacher caught red-handed by a Carmel police officer June 9 said he was trying to do. But the penalty must fit the crime. The jail term meted out to Ty Van Lieu for taking abalone from Carmel Point would surely make Inspector Javert proud. But it should make the rest of us ashamed.

Looking up to San Francisco

WE WOULD hardly ever recommend that Monterey County politicians look to their San Francisco counterparts for lessons in how to govern.

But this week, San Francisco Mayor Gavin Newsome showed a great deal of common sense when it comes to providing affordable housing for his constituents.


Seeking a solution to the ultra-high real estate values that keep working-class residents from being able to own a home in the city by the bay, Newsome did not call for price controls or new regulations over what private developers are allowed to build.

Instead, he called for the construction of 15,000 new housing units in San Francisco over the next five years, and he proposed to help make this possible by streamlining the permit process and increasing staffing at the planning and building department.

In other words, less regulation and government red tape — not the opposite — are the key to making housing accessible to more people, according to the ultra-liberal mayor of San Francisco.

Are you listening, Monterey County supervisors and city council members?

The offending party left town before the police could get there. This was not the fault of our police department. The only two officers on duty that day were involved elsewhere in the city and couldn't respond in time.

It is clear that we need more staffing in all departments, but first we need to take care of our valued employees by restoring their health benefits. This is now possible with the property tax windfall.

As a resident of the village in Carmel Valley, I paid close attention to the recent application, spearheaded by the Valley Volunteers, Inc., for reorganization of CVFPD back to the two separate districts that were present before the merger. I also have a keen interest in the application, currently before LAFCO, to create an incorporated municipality of the Carmel Valley Master Plan area.

It is my belief that most residents of the greater Carmel area, Mid Valley and the Upper Valley (including the Village, Cachagua and Jamesburg), have formed some sort of opinion on where they stand on this issue. Does anyone care? Dear Editor,

Is the average Carmel visitor less caring and less concerned, or is our city administration less caring and less concerned, or is it both? We hear lots of talk here in town about saving this historical home, landmark or that. Lots of attention on Sunset Center, loads of fundraisers for this charity or that, when, in fact, Carmel has one superb historical landmark; one superb, unique treasure; one true gem in its ever-tarnishing crown; one precious commodity that puts it light

years ahead of any other petite village in the U.S. or, perhaps, the world. That gem is our magnificent beach. Far too few locals visit it and far too many out-of-towners DO visit and unfortunately trash it.

Here in Carmel, we indeed have a "No fires on the beach" ordinance, which, for the most part is being ignored by renegade barbecuers and trashers. These people come here in large groups, light fires all over our beautiful white sand, unchallenged by any law enforcement, finish their day or evening by dumping their hibachis or grills full of burned, burning or still black briquettes in our pristine white sand, cover it up if they want to hide their crime like putting a body in a shallow grave, and leave it for whom to clean up. Our law states that fires are permissible south of 10th, but I refer here to our main Carmel beach atop the hill under the tired old Cypress trees close to the bathrooms and the stretch of beach at sea level way before 10th. Along with the charcoal remains usually is an abundance of garbage, including broken bottles, oyster shells, wrappers with labels from San Jose markets, corn cobs, bags, napkins on and on ... and, of course, countless cigarette butts and unmentionables. It is a disgrace that our city permits this, but read on because it gets worse.

Our trash receptacles, while fairly plentiful and available to the public, are so putrid and crusted in filth that the stench of just the recycle bin is enough to make one ill. The thought of touching any of them to deposit garbage makes a conscientious, well-intentioned visitor cringe. In short, all our beach bins are disgusting, dirty and they stink! SO! Our beach is littered with charcoal and garbage. Our waste receptacles filthy, and usually have as much trash laying around the exterior of the bin as inside, not picked up by waste management people ... and how do I know all this, you might ask? I'll tell you. I go to the beach to exercise every day and do volunteer beach cleanup once a month with the Carmel Residents Association, a group of dedicated beach enthusiasts who truly earn the generous coffee Cafe Cardinale donates to our cause and wonderful pastries donated by Carmel Bakery. Thanks, guys! So many join us, and thank God they do. If it weren't for this effort our beach might well be a total loss. My husband is 84 years young and he hauls, as do most of us kids, bags full of trash and charcoal as heavy as the bag will hold. It's rewarding and good exercise, but it's getting beyond us now.

So, what is the answer? Is there an answer? I believe there is. I believe it is simple and doable. The city will tell us they don't have the funds for people to patrol the beach and spot illegal fires. They will say the residents don't want more signs on the beach. Were we asked if we wanted Tiffany or any of the other chain stores that now invade our quaint little town? Yes, the times are-a-changin', not always for the better, so rules must change too. Signs must say "Pack

it in, pack it out!" in no uncertain terms. "No Fires" must be enforced. Our beach is being destroyed, and we the people are sitting back in our complacency and permitting it. Which is worse: a few well placed signs or the trashing and devastation of our magnificent beach?

I propose the installation of parking meters at the beach, the revenue from which would serve to pay full-time beach patrol people (I'll apply for a shift!) at least during the summer months. Nowhere that I know can you park for free, stay all day, buy noth-

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

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Tim Allen & Greg Linder Al Smith's "Carmel Legends"


We keep a little file of legends which we wish had happened. But didn't. Among them is the non-visit to Carmel of SIR ARTHUR SULLIVAN on July 24, 1885. He had come from London to New York to conduct The Mikado, to fight against piracy of Gilbert and Sullivan operas in the States, and principally to visit the children of his deceased brother in Los Angeles! His train journey from New York to San Francisco took 9 days, including stops in Chicago, Iowa, Denver, Salt Lake City and Sacramento. Of Iowa he wrote: "No liquors to be sold in this state. Shall not dine in Iowa." He hated the food in Lincoln, Nebraska; he played the organ in Denver's opera house; repeated that impromptu recital at the Mormon Tabernacle; visited Chinatown and Alcatraz in San Francisco; and took the overnight train 428 miles to L.A. Presumably he by-passed Carmel in the night, probably a few miles inland. We are distressed that he lacked a better guide, especially because he did visit Madera, Fresno and Yosemite during his time in California. But maybe he was right: we had no opera, no Golden Bough, no Sunset Center, no Forest Theater in 1885. But what a difference he might have made in Carmel history! His "Pirates" might have operated from Carmel Bay instead of Penzance!

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





Condo market cools a bit

■ Second Quarter Report

SALES OF condominiums in the Monterey Peninsula were down in the second quarter of the year — in the number of units and the gross dollar volume — but the level of inventory and the supply/demand index have been remarkably steady.

For the last year, the Market Barometer

(the percentage of listings in escrow) has been within a 12 percent range, with a low of 44 percent and a high in the past quarter of 56 percent.

During that period, the number of condominiums available to buyers in the nine local condo markets has ranged from a low of 24 units on Oct. 1, 2004, to a high of 31 on April 1. And the number of units sold declined from 92 in the second quarter of last year to

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



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

70 this year, a drop of 24 percent.

Dollar volume was down from \$55,708,000 last year to \$47,630,000 this year, a decline of 14.5 percent. The biggest drops were in Carmel, Carmel Valley and Pacific Grove.

Five of the nine markets had higher median sales prices this year than last, and four were down. Most of the changes were relatively minor, with the exception of Marina, up 34 percent; Monterey, up 32 percent, and Seaside, up an amazing 98 percent. There were only two sales in Seaside, one at \$559,000 and the other at \$789,000, so the median sales price for the quarter does not reflect the entire market. Still, even with only two transactions, those numbers are impressive for Seaside.

If the inventory continues at the current tight levels, prices should remain steady or continue to move up.
