Cal Poly students search for deadly fungus in Carmel Valley

THE GOLDEN rolling hills of Carmel Valley's Hastings Natural History Reservation look like a slice of pastoral

heaven. But students from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo are scouring those picturesque hills this week, and they're looking for something sinister in that idyllic California landscape—sudden oak death.

"It's a very dangerous disease," explained Mark

Stromberg, resident reserve director of Hastings. "In places like Australia, it has devastated hundreds of square miles."

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Single-car crash claims another young life

BENJAMIN WATSON, 20, spent the evening with friends and was on his way home when he attempted to pass a pickup truck, lost control of his 1997 Acura and crashed into a tree on Carmel Valley Road east of Cachagua Road around 12:45 a.m. Sunday, according to the California Highway Patrol. He died at the scene.

The accident occurred three months after speeding claimed the lives of RLS junior Stephan Nataf, who crashed his Chevy Tahoe into a tree on 17 Mile Drive in Pebble Beach, and Fremont teen Maheeth Daas, who was fatally injured when he smashed his Honda Civic into a phone pole on Highway 1 in Big Sur.

Officer Richard Richards said Watson, a Robert Louis

Stevenson graduate who was a junior at California State University Northridge and son of Joullian Vineyards general manager Ridge Watson, was following a friend in another car eastbound on Carmel Valley Road. Watson and Wyatt Huebner had eaten dinner at RG Burgers in the Crossroads with a third friend, and the three then spent a couple of hours at a Los Laureles Grade home.

Later, Huebner and Watson decided to go back to Watson's house to sleep, according to Richards. Driving his own car at about 65 mph in a 55 mph zone, Huebner was in front when he came up behind Kevin and Denise Dixon in their white pickup truck.

"He saw the slow-moving truck and knew he could pass," Richards said. "At 70 mph, he safely passed the pickup and noticed Watson also attempt to pass."

Kevin Dixon, who said he was driving at 45 mph when Huebner passed him, told officers he had seen headlights rapidly approaching from behind. Watson next attempted to pass, but his left wheels drifted off the shoulder. "And then he overcorrected and slid sideways into a tree," Richards said.

The Dixons immediately stopped and rushed to the

Grass greens where 300 cars roamed

SIXTY THOUSAND feet — many wearing high heels — stomped all over one of the world's most famous fairways Sunday during the 55th Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

And while the crowds strolled, some of the cars leaked oil and hydraulic fluid on the grass where Tiger Woods, Phil Mickelson and Vijay Singh have won big tournaments.

But the golfers arriving this Sunday for The First Tee Open should be unaware of the resulting wear and tear on the course, thanks to the 100 people who leapt to action as soon as the last car buff walked off the grass.

"On Sunday, there are 30,000 people, and it looks like one big, terrific, elegant carnival, and then the next day, it's gone," said Pebble Beach Co. Senior Vice President RJ Harper. He said the Concours' benefits in terms of charity and publicity far outweigh any negative impacts to the course.

"If you're into golf, you cringe when you see Pebble Beach taken over by cars and crowds," he said. But the P.B. Co. has six "swat teams," Harper said, that are dispatched to the 18th Hole, the lawns, the putting green and Peter Hay.

Starting Sunday evening, under the guidance of the course superintendent, workers quickly moved the 300 cars off the fairway, lawn and practice green. They broke down the dozens of tents, stages, concessions stands, display areas, sound systems, the driving ramp and other infrastructure that sprang up during historic car week.

"As the event grows, so too do the number of cars, tents, people and temporary structures," Harper said.

As soon as the grass was cleared, rehabilitation began. "The

■ Lone restaurant fights 'vexatious litigant' in court

SANTA MARIA — LAST DECEMBER, Jarek Molski and Thomas Frankovich were told they couldn't file any more ADA lawsuits in one of their favorite venues — Los Angeles federal court — without a judge's permission.

This week, the San Fernando Valley disabled man and his San Francisco attorney, who have sued hundreds of California businesses for alleged handicapped-accessibility problems — including several of Carmel's most prominent restaurants — tried to convince a Santa Barbara County judge not to declare them "vexatious litigants" in state court as well.

"The question is whether you're running a money-making business that smacks of fraud," said Santa Barbara County Superior Court Judge Zel Canter, who presided over the Michael Jackson child molestation trial this summer. "Nobody disagrees that the ADA should be enforced. But a federal judge said what you're doing is offensive."

"You may not like my client or his tactics," Frankovich

told Canter Wednesday morning. "But because he's gotten such intense media coverage, a lot of businesses have made ADA improvements, because they're worried they're going to be sued next."

He described Molski's habit of going back and forth between San Francisco and Los Angeles, "maybe 50 times in the course of a year," visiting restaurants and hotels, looking for ADA violations, acting as a self-

Mitchell Group becomes part of nation's biggest real estate co.

THE MOOD was jubilant at La Playa Hotel Tuesday morning when more than 100 agents and employees of the Mitchell Group — one of Carmel's most successful independent real estate firms — learned they had a new employer.

Sotheby's International Realty acquired the company in an asset purchase a few hours earlier.

"We'd heard the rumors and the denials for weeks, so I think a lot of people were relieved to have the uncertainty over with," said one veteran broker with the company who did not want to be identified because he wasn't sure he was allowed to talk to the press. "But when we heard the name 'Sotheby's,' we knew this would be a great opportunity for us."

Bill Mitchell started the Mitchell Group in 1975. His sister, Hallie Mitchell Dow, and Kent Nelson, vice president and managing broker, were also stockholders.

Jewelry-selling gallery stays open, fights city hall

THE CARMEL art gallery owner ordered to shut his doors after an inspection by the planning department found he was selling too much jewelry asked planning commissioners Aug. 10 to reconsider their decision to limit his busi-

Representing Ryan Mattonen, attorney Elizabeth Gianola argued the commission had no right to change the conditions of Romanoos Gallery's business license, because the store

had not violated it. The license stipulates 90 percent of the gallery's square footage must be used for artwork, and 10 percent can be used for jewelry. That breakdown follows the Carmel Municipal Code.

But after a neighboring jeweler complained Romanoos had only jewelry in its windows and few paintings on its walls, the city building official inspected the brand-new business and found it in violation of its license. The planning commission agreed, imposing new rules on Romanoos — in particular, barring its owner from displaying jewelry in the windows and adding an 18-inch buffer zone around each display case that had to be included when calculating the square footage used for jewelry displays - and suspending its license until the gallery was in compliance.

Principal planner Brian Roseth, who worked with Mattonen and artist Romanoos to make sure their business was in compliance, said at the Aug. 10 hearing that the planning commission had every right to impose the new conditions.

"Even if the 'footprint' of the display cases occupied only 10 percent of the floor space, the obvious violation of the window display limit in the municipal code and the near absence of art on the walls to counterbalance the abundance of jewelry provided more than sufficient evidence for the commission to determine that the business was in violation of the license and the municipal code," he wrote in his staff report Aug. 10.

As a result, the commission decided to ban the window displays of jewelry and require the gallery owner to include an 18-inch perimeter when figuring how much floor space could be dedicated to jewelry displays.

Gianola said the window ban conflicted with the city's code, and Roseth agreed. The condition was recommended because the jewelry had taken up so much of the windows

and forbidding it would be much easier to enforce than determining whether the amount displayed fell under 10 percent, Roseth said. But at the Aug. 10 meeting, he recommended Romanoos be permitted to use no more than 10 percent of each window display for jewelry.

Gianola also argued the 18-inch perimeter should not be used for display cases situated against the wall, but Roseth disagreed because the space was meant to reflect patrons' "visual impression," not the actual physical space required for clients and staff to maneuver around the cases.

The jewelry displays "should be discrete and minimal" in relation to the artwork, he wrote.

"I think the applicant needs to be careful to strictly comply," commissioner Julie Culver warned.


Otherwise, the commission could shut the new business down.

"If the owner is unwilling to accept the new conditions, the commission should instead revoke the license," Roseth concluded in his staff report.

Roseth also pointed out that Romanoos violated the planning commission's suspension of its business license by opening for busi-

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Firefighters may relocate to Vista Lobos

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notified users of Vista Lobos, such as Carmel Unified School District, that they might have to find new locations for their art classes and other activities while the firehouse is under construction. The seismic work involves shoring up walls and repairing the roof, as well as upgrading restrooms.

"They were caught a little off-guard, and, to be expected, a little surprised," Guillen said of the Vista Lobos users.

The seismic upgrade — discussed for years — should finally go to bid in September, according to Guillen, with the move set to occur the following month.

"The Vista Lobos main room would be used as offices, but we still have to deal with living quarters and housing an engine and other things we haven't looked at," said Guillen, who has not seen the plan or taken part in the committee's discussions.


"Those are the details the fire department and chief Rawson are trying to work out," Guillen said. "They will be bringing a study forward."



Cops nab alleged vodka burglar, but flat-screen thieves get away

WITH THE arrival of high-dollar vintage cars and crowds of spectators last week came opportunistic thieves - some successful, one not — intent upon taking some of that wealth for themselves. A Monterey resident was arrested Saturday night for allegedly trying to steal a \$1,620 case of vodka, and a few days earlier, burglars made off with \$13,000 worth of flat-screen plasma televi-

"A Pebble Beach Security guard observed him leaving one of the hospitality tents carrying a case of alcohol," Monterey County Sheriff's Sgt. Bill Cassara said of 23-yearold James Harrington. The alleged theft occurred around 9 p.m. Aug. 20, when the tent on the 18th Fairway was closed.

The guard signaled deputy Keith Wingo, who was on foot patrol as part of beefed-up security efforts during Concours week, to delay the suspect, but Harrington dropped the case of Ketel One Vodka and tried to meld into a group of people at the Lodge for a car-week event, according to Cassara. None of the \$135 bottles of booze broke.

Wingo caught hold of Harrington, who could provide no credentials indicating he had a right to be in the area, Cassara said. "He didn't have any other reasons for being there. He wasn't an employee or a visitor."

The security guard identified their suspect as the man who had left the tent carrying the case of vodka, though Cassara said the suspect denied having anything to do

the break-in. And another suspect might have been working in cahoots with him, as a w o m a n s t e p p e d between the guard and Harrington to

ask for directions just as he was leaving the

"That indicates there might have been a wholehearted effort to take advantage of these opportunities," Cassara said.

Harrington was arrested for burglary and taken to Monterey County Jail.

Ferrari loses TVs

Deputies weren't so successful in tracking down the burglars who broke into the Ferrari display tent near the 3rd Tee of the Pebble Beach Golf Links sometime between 7 p.m. Aug. 15 and 8 a.m. the following morning. Kurt Welsch of Ferrari North America notified the sheriff's office at 9:30 a.m. Aug. 17 that someone had broken into the tent and taken two 42-inch, NEC brand, flat-screen, plasma televisions worth a combined \$13,000.

"What's different about this case is that this took tools and technique - someone comfortable dismantling the plasma TVs and then taking them out," Cassara said. "You would need some sort of expertise and mode of transportation, and we'd like to find out how they did it."

He hopes anyone who might have seen the culprits or noticed something suspicious - or who knows a person who recently obtained two very expensive televisions will call the sheriff's tip line at (888) 833-4TIP (4847).

"There's always a chance someone will know something and forward the information to us," he said.

Deputies are also investigating the possible theft of high-tech networking equipment from a storage locker in the Lodge at Pebble Beach. The disappearance of a 48-port Paradigm ADSL switch was reported online Aug. 15 via the sheriff's department's website, and Cassara assigned a deputy to follow up. He has so far received no report and is unsure when the disappearance occurred.

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

TWELVE YEARS after setting out to subdivide his 65acre Robinson Canyon property into four lots, landowner Howard Liggett finally got his wish Tuesday.

By a 3-2 vote, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors decided Liggett's project is not subject to the 2000 Carmel Valley subdivision moratorium because he was given bad advice by county planners.

"Howard is pleased to see light at the end of a 12-year tunnel," said Liggett's attorney, John Bridges.

In approving the subdivision, the supervisors not only ignored a recommendation by county planning staff but testimony from Carmel Valley activists suggesting the case could be precedent-setting.

"This could put a big hole in the subdivision moratorium," said Paula Lotz of the Carmel Valley Association. "I don't come here often and agree with staff, but we have to hold the line and deny the application."

Margaret Robbins of Carmel Valley said approval of the project "would force planners to become mind readers," to make sure applicants understand what they're being told.

Bridges disagreed the case would set a precedent, arguing the key issue at stake was one of "moral fairness."

Over the past 12 years, Liggett has spent more than \$20,000 on a variety of studies, \$80,000 on road improvements and \$26,000 on wells, Bridges said. Liggett first tried to submit plans for the subdivision at 29001 Robinson Canyon Road in 1993. But due to information he received

from a county planner, a second phase of the project was jeopardized by the enactment of the moratorium in

According to Liggett, a planner told him he could only submit plans for a twolot split because he had insufficient water resources at the time for a four-lot split. Bridges said Liggett should have been informed by county staff that he could submit his plans, but they would be incomplete until he solved his water problems.

"Mr. Liggett believed what staff told him, for better or worse," Bridges said. "It was not the intent of the moratorium to harm anyone in the process at the time. This simple and honest man is now being pummeled by the system.'

After a lengthy discussion that ranged from the concerns of an adjacent gun club to the memories of county planning staff, the supervisors were ultimately swayed by Liggett's intentions.

"I want to support staff," lamented Supervisor Jerry Smith. "But I'm not sure I have the evidence. It's unfortunate that we're measuring integrity. It could have been an honest mistake. I'd like to give the benefit of the doubt in this case. There's a lot at stake here."

Originally, Liggett owned a 64.2-acre parcel. The original two-lot split divided his property into a 14-acre lot and a 50.2-acre lot. He then built a low-income rental unit on the

smaller parcel.

Bridges said Liggett has since abandoned his original goal of four parcels - he simply wanted to split the 50.2-acre parcel into one 19.7-acre lot (where he lives), and a vacant 30.5-acre lot.

Now the project will go back to the county subdivision committee where it will

be "processed on its merits," Bridges said. "We've already done environmental review, and staff concluded the project has no impact except on traffic, and that will be mitigated by payment of the Carmel Valley road impact fee."

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

Caused by a fungus that is related to the species responsible for the Irish potato famine of the 1840s, sudden oak death was first discovered in Mill Valley in 1995. From Big

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Sur to the southern coast of Oregon, tens of thousands of trees - including coast live oaks, tanbark oaks, black oaks and madrones — have perished during the past decade.

Stromberg is quick to point out that sudden oak death poses a much greater threat to the environment than pine pitch canker, a disease once believed to have the capacity to devastate the the local Monterey pine population. The pines later surprised experts with high levels of resistance to

"The pines sort of struggled through pine pitch canker," he said. "But trees don't get resistant to sudden oak death. Also, there are so many more coast live oaks."

While sudden oak death has killed thousands of live and tanbark oaks along the Big Sur Coast, it hasn't yet been dis-

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covered at Hastings. Cal Poly students will be looking for early signs of its arrival, which they believe will assist researchers at Sonoma State University in finding a cure for the disease.

"If one tree has it, other trees in the area are all at risk," warned Jason Dierberg, who's majoring in forestry and natural resource management. "We're trying to find an early detection method before it spreads."

Dierberg and another Cal Poly student, Karen Wells, are planning to spend the morning of Friday, Aug. 26, at Hastings, surveying an oak-studded parcel about the size of a football field. "It's like a forest laboratory," Dierberg said.

The students will examine the oaks at Hastings closely, searching for evidence such as a black ooze bleeding from the trunks of trees. "Other diseases can cause the same thing," Dierberg said. "So we'll chop into the bark and see if there are any signs of sudden oak death underneath, such as a red canker.'

While they are seeking a cure for the disease, researchers are urging the public to take precautions that can reduce the spread of sudden oak death.

"People should avoid carrying oak firewood from one area to another," recommended Dierberg. "Also, it can spread through water, so you need to be careful when they drive off road or hike in the mud. You can disinfect your tires and shoes with Lysol."

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
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Loutas' fans hurry to dine at L'Escargot

CHEF KERICOS Loutas is from Greek stock: His two grandfathers were from the small island of Zante.

Born in San Francisco and raised there and in Marin County, Loutas grew up wanting to be a writer but was intrigued by fine French cuisine.

His father, who had his own wholesale produce business in San Francisco, took the family out for dinner frequently, and it was during these family outings that he honed in on French fare. Loutas fondly recalls dining at such popular restaurants as the Blue Boar in San Francisco, Caprice in

Tiburon, Maurice et Charles in San Rafael and Guernica in Sausalito.

Curious as to the mystery of how veal sweetbreads were prepared and cooked, and how they were made to taste so good, he watched Julia Child, Pierre Franey and Jacques Pepin on television — and then experimented on his own. He learned all the basics of French technique in the preparation

of food and experimented in his mother's kitchen.

When he went off to

study communications at the University of Minnesota, his thoughts were on eventually writing screenplays. But while still in school, he courageously took a cooking job at Winfield Potter's restaurant in the warehouse district of Minneapolis.

That was exciting for the young aspiring writer, who already knew that no experience is ever wasted on novelists or playwrights. Later, Loutas went to Los Angeles to try his hand at the writing game. He stayed some time and gave it his best, but, finding the gates to Hollywood closed to novice scribners, Loutas returned to San Francisco to join his father in the wholesale produce business.

This also was not the goal of his life. What he secretly wanted was a small French restaurant of his own, with no partners, where he could practice "true cooking," concentrating on flavor as the essence of French cuisine — a restaurant where he could could cook "all French, all the time."

In 1999, he heard from his friend Jim Lowell, a Carmel realtor with whom he had been close friends since their fifth grade days in San Anselmo: A new tenant was needed for a longtime country French restaurant, L'Escargot, which Chef Yvan Nopert had established in 1958 on Dolores and Seventh

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movie stars were attracted to the secluded, charming and romantic restaurant.

Still the owner of the property but retired as chef. Nopert wanted someone as passionate about French cooking as he to take over, and so he had Loutas "try out."

He passed with flying colors and left the family wholesale produce business with his father's blessings. Nopert, to show his support, taught the younger chef the secret chicken in black truffle-Madeira cream, which is one of the highlights of the L'Escargot menu even today, appearing as a \$22 entrée.

For four years, Chef Loutas ran his restaurant under a new name, "Loutas on Mission," but in 2003 he changed the name back to L'Escargot, deeming it more appropriate. After all, it is a French restaurant, and even more to the point, the giant wood snail carved from an oak tree trunk that remained after the tree had to be cut down still predominates on the Mission Street sidewalk near the entrance to the restaurant.

As one of the best marché in Peninsula dining, Chef Loutas offers a purposely retro "Bistro Menu," which has proved popular with locals.

Diners are invited to choose one plate each from six appetizers, six entrées and five desserts — for \$29. A surcharge of \$3 is

added for a grilled rib-eye steak with truffle butter and pommes frites, and a \$2 surcharge for scallops of veal with wild mushrooms and white wine and for a dessert of crème brûlée. These dishes appear on the á la carte menu at a substantially increased cost (appetizers run from \$7.50 to \$10, salads and soups from \$5.50 to \$7.50, entrées from \$21 to \$33 and desserts from \$4.50 to \$7.50.)

"What I've tried to do with the menu is offer a wholesome, real meal, not overly produced, at a good price," Chef Loutas said. "The food has integrity."

This week the restaurant was reserved one night for a private birthday celebration. A local attorney arranged a party for 50 friends to celebrate his wife's 50th birthday.

"We had 50 live Maine lobsters flown in which we prepared and served as a main course with drawn butter, saffron risotto, a roasted chili and corn relish and a 2003 Napa Cellars dry, lean Chardonnay," he

He complimented his staff, who helped plate the lobsters and serve the celebrants without a hitch.

L'Escargot is currently open nightly from 5:30 to closing, but starting in October will be closed on Tuesdays. For reservations, call (831) 620-1942.





Scheid wins big at MoCo Fair wine competition [\$1 OFF ANY MEDIUM PIZZA (12")

WHILE PIGS and cows were judged at one end of the Monterey County Fair last week, and teenagers were enjoying themselves on rides at the other, a group of the county's top winemakers were up to something new: Competing in the inaugural Monterey County Wine Challenge, hosted by Fred Crummey of Friends of the Fair and Steve Pessagno of Pessagno Winery.

"The county fair never had a wine competition exclusively highlighting Monterey County wines. I thought it was a natural fit," Crummey said. "I felt that the hospitality industry needed more awareness of local wines, and that tourists who come to town deserve to have Monterey County wines offered to them."

He paired up with Pessagno, and they bantered around lots of ideas on how to pull

off the event.

"Fred's idea was to go to the general handle," said Pessagno. "But I wanted to go directly to the experts who are making the decisions about these wines."

He thought a little friendly competition among local winemakers would also help make the event a success.

The two men gathered a roster of 18 Monterey Peninsula restaurant, wine and hospitality luminaries who evaluated 115 wines of Monterey County and awarded winners in various categories. Wines were scored according to a Max Preference Scoring Sheet developed by Enologix, a Sonoma-based think tank for high-end winemaking (Pessagno is a consultant for it).

Pessagno's task was to tally everybody's score sheet and come up with the top 17 wines by category. The top 12 wines selected by the professionals were then presented

at an Aug. 17 dinner where attendees had an opportunity to vote.

"I like that this is a two-part event, because you get the professionals who know wine to whittle the list down, and then we get to present the wines to the consumer at a dinner-type environment during the fair. The consumers are the ultimate decision makers," said Pessagno.

During the first half of the dinner, five whites and one red were poured, and then wines seven through 12 (all reds) during the second half. Pessagno asked the room to pick their top four from the 12 selections.

Guests took the task very seriously as they swished and swirled glass after glass of wine and deliberated out loud amongst their peers. Crummey took to the microphone. This is the singularly most difficult thing I've ever tried to do," he said.



Congregation celebrates 50th year with annual Jewish food festival

 B_{Y} ABSORBING the cooking styles of a wide variety of cultures, Jewish food has come a long way over the past four thousand years. On Sunday, the odyssey stops at Congregation Beth Israel in Carmel Valley, which hosts its 18th annual Jewish Food Festival from 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Jewish cooking literally provides a historical road map for a religion and a culture without a place to call its own. Scattered throughout the Middle East, Europe and Russia by social and political events beyond their control, the Jewish people absorbed the distinctive cooking styles of their host countries, creating perhaps the world's first international cuisine.

"Jewish cooking is very tasty," said Renee Mayne, publicity director of the festival. "It has a lot of flavor."

Just don't expect to lose any weight at the food festival. "Unfortunately, it's not low fat," Mayne cautioned. "It's comfort food. It's very nourishing."

One of the distinguishing characteristics of Jewish food is the personal touch that goes into it, Mayne explained.

"All of the food we serve is homemade," she said. "Somebody hand rolled the dough. Someone else made the soup from scratch."

For those unfamiliar with Jewish cooking, the biggest challenge at the festival is not finishing a plate of food, but figuring out what's on it. Dishes are identified by a dizzying array of Yiddish, Greek, Ukrainian and German words. Here are just a couple of samples of popular Jewish treats you can find at the festival:

- A knish is a potato and flour dumpling typically filled with cheese, chopped liver or mashed potatoes and onion. It is baked until it turns brown on the outside. The word knish means dumpling in Ukrainian.
- Matzah ball soup is often described as the "Jewish penicillin" because of its restorative powers. Typically, it's a bowl of chicken stock with two or three matzah meal balls, which are called "sinkers" or "floaters" depending their weight. Matzah balls are traditionally known as knaydelach, a Yiddish word meaning "dumplings.

Other popular delicacies include bagels and lox, cholent, gefilte fish, holishkes, tzimmes and kugel — all familiar words to residents of New York City.

"I grew up in New York," she said. "Jewish food is easy to find there, but here in California it's a real treat."

The festival is clearly about much more than food. For the local Jewish community, it's an important event on the social and cultural calendar.

"It's an opportunity for us to connect with the rest of the community and share culture, entertainment and great food," she explained.

Music is traditionally a big part of the festival, and this year is no exception. Highlighting the event's entertainment schedule is the folk duo, Alisa Fineman and Kimball Hurd.

"Alisa is the cantorial soloist for our congregation," Mayne said. "We are so gifted to have her. She is really a treasure in the Jewish community, and especially for our synagogue."

Also performing at the festival will be the a capella group, Ya Elah.

This year's festival is part of yearlong celebration marking the Carmel Valley congregation's 50th anniversary.

All proceeds from the festival will benefit Jewish education programs at the synagogue.

Admission is free. Guests are asked to park at Carmel Middle School, which is located at 4380 Carmel Valley Road. A free shuttle will depart from the school every 5-10 minutes. For more information, call (831) 624-2015 or visit www.bethisrael.info.

"We were nervous about making the announcement, but we were thrilled with the response," Mitchell said. "We got a standing ovation from every member."

the Running Iron and numerous other local businesses one year later.)

Federal law allows no money damages to handicapped people who encounter ADA violations. But a parallel California law allows up to \$4,000 a day.

Molski routinely waits one year before filing his suits, hitting business owners with an accumulated \$1.5 million claim upfront.

"It's not for myself to say it's wrong if he receives \$4,000 a day if that's what the law provides," Frankovich said.

In papers filed with the Santa Barbara County court, Frankovich disclosed for the first time how lucrative Molski's venture has been.

"In 65 cases that were settled in just over a year, he collected \$835,000," Canter said after reviewing the documents. "That's a lot of money."

"If you don't like what the law is, change it," Frankovich responded.

Many injuries in a few days

Canter also questioned Frankovich about the multiple injuries Molski alleged he suffered when he visited restaurants with what he believed were inadequate handicapped facilities.

"In numerous cases, Molski claimed he suffered injuries multiple times on the same date, and sometimes six or eight times in just a couple of days," Canter said. "That's what struck [U.S. District Court] Judge Rafeedie as incredible."

"Rafeedie is extremely ignorant in terms of what paraplegics go through when they encounter architectural barriers," Frankovich said. "It's continuous and cumulative trauma to the upper extremities."

"But this fellow gets injured to the tune of \$100,000 in a week," Canter said. "Rafeedie said his motive was not only suspect, it was actually crooked."

Frankovich urged the judge not to declare Molski a vexatious litigant, which would make it much harder for him to file new lawsuits in state court, just because he has filed so many big-money lawsuits.

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"Would it be different if it was 100 different people filing 100 different cases?" he asked.

A lone opponent


The federal judge's declaration that Molski and Frankovich are vexatious litigants, and this week's debate between Frankovich and Canter, arose because the owners of a Solvang restaurant, the Mandarin Touch, decided not to settle when they were sued by Molski after he had dinner at their restaurant in January 2003 and claimed it didn't have ADA-compliant restrooms.

The case has enormous implications for thousands of restaurants. But the Mandarin Touch, owned by Phil Leo, an immigrant from Taiwan, fights on alone.

"My client decided not to settle because he thought it was wrong for someone to make money this way," said Robert C. Appert, who is representing the Mandarin Touch. "But he just wants this thing to end. He never anticipated that it would drag on this long and he doesn't have the budget or litigation appetite to go much further."

Appert seemed to be chided by Canter Wednesday for not doing enough research and not filing enough papers to support his argument that Molski and Frankovich are running a scam.

"I would think defense counsel would have done more," Canter said. "Have you analyzed the other cases Molski has filed? Or did Judge Rafeedie do all this work?"



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"I am the one who filed the original motion in federal court," Appert said. "I attached all the cases that had been filed at that time."

"What about these establishments [sued by Molski] ... have they been sued by any other disabled persons?" Canter asked.

"I am a sole practitioner, and that kind of research is beyond the scope of my practice," Appert said.

Earlier, Frankovich, who has presumably made a very handsome living from settling almost all his ADA claims before they could be heard by a judge, complained about the expense of a long court battle.

"Our photocopying bill in federal court is in excess of \$35,000," he said. "And that's not to mention the FedEx bill for shipping nine boxes to the court of appeal."

Canter, who was appointed to the bench by Governor Jerry Brown in 1981, said he would issue a ruling later.

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
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
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
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
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Carmel reads The Pine Cone

At home in Gilroy, Natasha has plenty of room to play in the backyard,





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

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door. They found Watson unresponsive, according to Richards.

Cachagua firefighters, the CHP and a Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance arrived at the scene, where Watson was pronounced dead. There was no evidence he had been drinking alcohol, according to Richards, though the coroner's office expects toxicology results in a few weeks.

Watson was the son of Ridge and D'Tim Watson of Carmel Valley and the nephew of professional golfer Tom Watson, according to the family. He had been studying business and art at CSUN and was an avid pianist and sailor, as well as technologically proficient with computers.

"He had the patience of a teacher and the drive and ambition of a young man with a bright future," according to his obituary. A memorial service was held in Pebble Beach Wednesday.

Golfer Tom Watson is scheduled to play in The First Tee Open Aug. 29 through Sept. 4.



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

Brenner's widow, Jeannie, who attended Wednesday's event,


will be involved in the presentation of the scholarships each year.

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

18th Hole and the putting green are our top priority — those operational pieces affecting guest play have to be remedied right away," he said.

A crew aerated the fairway by punching small holes, filling them with sand and seed, and fertilizing and irrigating the area to bring the battered turf back to life.

"Unfortunately the temperature has been low, so it's not the perfect growing conditions, and recovery time is a little bit longer than what you see when it's sunny," Harper

Despite the crews' best efforts, the fairway and putting green will show some signs of their use as a parking lot.

"If a motor's hot and it drips hot hydraulic fluid, it burns the grass," he said. "There's not much you can do to mask that, but time heals it."

Last year, workers had more time to bring the course back to tournament condition. The 2004 First Tee Open kicked off two weeks after the Concours, but car week was later this year, making it even more difficult to get the course back in shape.

Another factor that made the repair job tricky: The Lodge's ocean-view rooms were filled with guests Sunday night, requiring workers to call it a day before dark and then tiptoe back in early the next day.

"By Monday morning, all the cars were gone," Harper said. "And by the time golfers reached the 18th Hole at about 10 a.m., there was nothing there."

Palmer at Open

Crews are also busy preparing the course for competition, not just play. The 78 Champions Tour players, 78 junior golfers and 156 amateur golfers competing all week should not expect any easy breaks, as the Professional Golf Association determines how high the rough is, how narrow the fairways are and how fast the greens roll.

The First Tee Open raises money for The First Tee, a World Golf Foundation effort to "provide young people of all backgrounds an opportunity to develop life-enhancing

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Editorial

Ein roter Hering

SUDDENLY, THE 2003 acquisition of Cal Am Water by the German conglomerate RWE has become a hot local controversy.

Desperate for any issue that will support their ill-timed takeover effort — which has been launched at the precise moment everybody's attention should be focused instead on building a new water project — critics of Cal Am have decided to give xenophobia a try.

Without any specific public benefit to point to that would result from letting the water management district or some other government agency assume the job of delivering water to 40,000 local homes, takeover advocates have resorted to trying to make everybody afraid of Germany.

Thus, a May 4 letter to the editor in the Monterey County Herald contained this unforgettable warning:

"Cal Am's German masters may think they can lie, seduce our elected representatives with big money and break laws without any consequences"

Another letter, printed last year, blamed Cal Am's German owners for "stealing the dream of low-income housing forever."

But this isn't 1939. When RWE, based in Essen, Germany, bought Cal Am and nearly 800 other local water companies scattered around the United States and Canada, it wasn't invading Poland. It was just trying to get a piece of the vibrant American economy, as have hundreds of other German companies, including Bayer, T-Mobile and DHL, not to mention Mercedes, BMW and Volkswagen.

So deep is their reach, the Michigan Economic Development Corporation estimates that German-owned companies provide employment for 172,000 workers in that state alone.

This trend is not troublesome in the slightest. In fact, it is something to be celebrated. Because as the fates of nations become economically intertwined, their mutual desire for peace grows. The forces that made World War II possible have largely been forgotten in Europe and on this side of the Atlantic. Trying to revive them now is just *a red herring*.

Historic, it isn't

SINCE A Carmel activist is spearheading the effort to have the former Marsh art and antique store declared an historic monument, thereby preventing the Diocese of Monterey from tearing it down, we hope it's not presumptuous for us to weigh in with our counter-opinion on the subject:

This horrible building, at the corner of Camino el Estero and Fremont in Monterey, wouldn't be appropriate if it were in Peking or Tokyo. It's an eyesore and a blight, has little or no historic value, and creates no feelings of nostalgia among most long-time Peninsula residents — even those of Chinese ancestry!

Marsh's, which was built in the 1920s, should be given a decent burial and replaced with something attractive to the community and useful to its owners.

The California Historic Resources Commission and the National Park Service should leave it be.

It's your water Dear Editor,

We retired, nearly 13 years ago, to the home we owned in Carmel-by-the-Sea from Mendocino — a community with water problems which, while also unnecessary, are even more real than our own. Mendocino, of course, also has a tourist-driven economy, and for many years has had a sewer system (which we did not originally expect to find, having previously had a septic tank in San Mateo County), yet, Mendocino has never had a water system. All residents, and busi-

nesses, have private or shared wells; and annual rainfall of close to 40 inches is required to stave off drought conditions. There is no common aquifer underlying the community, and highly fractured sub-soil geology simply allows almost all the rainfall to run out to the headlands and then down to the sea.

What is the reason for no water system, and very little water storage, in a town that is basically all wood, sitting on the edge of ocean cliffs where the prevailing winds come in, and with nothing more than a highly efficient but all-volunteer fire department? The reason, of course, is the control of development by a few of the good old boys and girls. Sound familiar? However, (and I am not an attorney) it was a well-known fact that, in the state of California, it is illegal to limit or control a citizen's use of his own groundwater. And this was confirmed by the state's chief of ground-water, who visited the community!
