

## Opportunities for giving continue to abound

## AN ARTIST'S TOUCH

WITH MISSISSIPPI, Louisiana and Texas struggling to recover from two major hurricanes, local efforts to aid survivors continue and more helpers plan to leave the Monterey Peninsula for the muddy, muggy, storm-ravaged South.

Carmel Presbyterian Church will send 21 students from Carmel High and Robert Louis Stevenson to Mississippi Oct. 8, with the church picking up most of the tab for travel and other expenses during the week-long trip that will also include seven adults, according to Erica Murray, co-director of student ministries.

"We're going down to Gautier, Miss., just to help them clean up, mucking out and taking down drywall," she said. Their efforts will be coordinated through the Presbyterian Church (USA), which set up a tent city and is working with the Salvation Army to feed the workers. "We're helping lay the foundation for the rebuild."

Murray said the camp is primarily for adults, but she convinced organizers her group of teens would be ready, willing and able workers.

"It will be tons of work in the mud, so we have to bring galoshes, and face masks and work gloves and work boots, and lots of stuff for heat rash and mosquito bites," she said. "It sounds pretty awful, actually, but it will be a good learning experience. We are really privileged, and with that privilege comes the responsibility to help when we can."

To help pay for the trip, middle-schoolers who belong to the church hosted a car wash last weekend that raised \$480, but with an anticipated price tag of \$10,000, the fundraising has a long way to go. Murray said the church's missions board has already set aside some money, and members of the congregation have donated. Anyone who wants to support

## NANA FARIDANY, 64, LONG TIME BACH FEST DIRECTOR

LAST JULY, during the final Bach Festival she would see in her life, Nana Faridany was smiling, happy and nostalgic.

"I was standing off to the side of the stage at Sunset



Center, looking at Bruno and the orchestra, and it felt like home," she said as the festival prepared for its 68th season — 20 of them with Faridany at the helm. "It is just the best to hear the musicians take a few black marks on a

piece of paper and turn them into something sublime."

Less than three months later, she was dead from cancer. Faridany passed away Sept. 23 at her home in Carmel Valley, surrounded by family and friends, who

Next round in court?

WITH THE Carmel City Council's unanimous vote last Thursday to sell an historic mansion the city has owned for more than three decades, a group of residents is considering filing a lawsuit to try to stop the sale.

We're exploring all our options and haven't settled on anything yet," said Flanders Foundation board member Roberta Miller.

She would not say what recourse the foundation might take, though the council's vote cannot be appealed to any other government agency, making the courthouse the next likely battleground.

The group could not meet this week, as president Melanie Billig was out of town, but Miller said the board will soon discuss its options for stopping the city council from fulfilling its yearlong pledge to sell the mansion.

"We assumed the council would vote the way they did, so we weren't surprised," she said.

Writing a Sept. 22 letter to the council on the foundation's behalf, Sonoma County attorney Susan Brandt-Hawley opposed "the unlawful sale" of the mansion.

"I know that the council is in receipt of voluminous information explaining that the proposed sale of the Flanders Mansion cannot be justified under state law," she wrote.

She also disagreed with attorney Bill Conners and sided with the planning commission's view of the mansion and surrounding grounds as a park. In order to sell it, she said the city would have to declare it surplus property and hold a public vote. Finally, she argued the federal government should have OK'd the lot-line adjustment that separated the mansion and its 1.25-acre parcel from the rest of Mission Trail Nature Preserve five years ago. The mansion is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, which is administered by the National Park Service.

Brandt-Hawley deemed the 348-page environmental impact report on the proposed sale inadequate and asked the

## Landwatch to appeal ruling on old parcels

said they wanted her remembered for many things.

"She always leaned forward into her life in the most courageous way," said daughter Francesca Faridany, an actress who lives in Los Angeles. "She made a lot of difficult decisions in her life, and that left me a legacy of what it means to carve your own way in the world."

#### Virtually every job

Nana Faridany started her career with the Bach Festival in 1984 and worked there in virtually every capacity, including housing and travel administrator, backstage coordinator, program editor, scheduler, producer of the off-season Bravissimo concert series, coordinator of budgeting and development, and Executive Director from 1991 to 1997. "She was a key player in the transition

attorney who unsuccessfully fought the subdivision in Monterey County Superior Court last summer.

"We think it's a very important issue, and we think we have a strong case," said Jonathan Wittwer.

During the trial last July, Judge Kay Kingsley made repeated references from the bench to the likelihood of an appeal.

"Whatever I decide, I know it's going up," she said at one point. "The Supreme Court should decide this issue."

But her Aug. 2 ruling was a powerful endorsement of the county's decision that the Tanimura family, which owns the old parcels and the surrounding farm land, had a legal entitlement to develop the parcels. The lots were subdivided in 1907 at the same time as the rest of the town of Spreckles, the judge noted.

"It looks like she closed every door," said Mike Cling, an attorney for the Tanimura family, after he read Kingley's decision.

Tuesday, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors approved a grading permit for the property, which will allow


## Incorporation opponents argue for costly 'silver bullet'

TESTIFYING BEFORE the Local Agency Formation  $\label{eq:estimate}$ Commission Sept. 26, Paul Ingram of Carmel Valley called an environmental impact report the "silver bullet" that could end the drive to incorporate Carmel Valley.

The requirement of a costly EIR has proved to be a substantial obstacle for countless development projects in Monterey County and a major tool for no-growth activists.

Yet, in an ironic twist, the proponents of incorporation -

who argue creating a town is the best way to control the pace of development in Carmel Valley - could find their slowgrowth efforts defeated by a tool that has traditionally benefited environmental activists.

At Monday's hearing, LAFCO commissioners voted 6-2 to extend the public comment period from 30 to 60 days on a possible EIR for the proposed new town.

For opponents of incorporation like Bob Sinotte, president of Save Carmel Valley, the extension provides a greater window of opportunity to lobby for the requirement of a fullblown EIR after a study prepared for LAFCO showed an EIR wasn't necessary.

"The study does not even begin to address this proposed city's reliance on tourism and the increased traffic it would produce as it promotes itself," claimed Sinotte in a letter to

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LAFCO commissioners. At the hearing, he said tourism revenues for the Town of Carmel Valley "would be like heroin to a drug addict."

Sinotte, who estimates visitor services would account for nearly 70 percent of the city's revenues, said tourism isn't the only threat to the overdevelopment of Carmel Valley. He predicted state mandates would

eventually require the new town to build low-income housing.

"We need to create a longterm conservation vision ... not a giant tourist-driven city, especially without an extensive EIR," insisted Sinotte.

Lawrence Samuels, a Carmel Valley resident, agreed with Sinotte.

"Flanders Mansion is only an acre, and it needed a full EIR," Samuels said. "We really need a full EIR for Carmel Valley. It's such a sensitive area."

But in response to Sinotte's charges that incorporation would lead to a requirement to construct low-income housing, Max Chaplin of the Carmel Valley Forum maintained "low-income housing has nothing to do with an EIR. It's simply not relevant to the issue."

Chaplin asked commissioners not to impose any further delays in the drive to put the incorporation issue on the ballot.

"We want to keep this moving along," Chaplin said. "We've been working on it for six years."

While Chaplin would not concede the requirement of an EIR would end the incorporation effort, he admitted it would present a serious challenge to bringing the issue to a vote. "In Sacramento County, EIRs have been used as devices

for delaying votes," he said.

"It's an expensive, timeconsuming operation."

Chaplin, a former president of the Big Sur Land Trust, is a board member of the Carmel Valley Forum, a nonprofit organization that is spearheading the drive to put incorporation before voters. The forum is also funding the costs of the incorporation process and would be responsible for paying for the EIR, if commissioners were to require

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## Carmel cops target double-parkers, U-turners

AFTER NUMEROUS complaints, Carmel police are cracking down on illegal double-parkers and drivers who make U-turns mid-block in the business district, Cpl. Steve Rana warned this week. Only commercial vehicles may double-park to load and unload, and all U-turns have to be made at intersections. Three-point turns are banned downtown.

Drivers of trucks with special commercial license plates may double-park on the north side and the east side of downtown streets, according to law, though they are allowed the privilege on both sides of the city's two divided streets, Ocean and Junipero.

"The only stipulation is they have to be actively loading and unloading — not unloading a package and then talking for 20 minutes," said Rana, who recently ticketed a producetruck driver who double-parked in front of the post office, turned on his hazard lights and hurried inside to retrieve his mail.

A citation for double-parking runs \$25, he said.

#### Parking spot not worth it

But a driver busted for making a U-turn mid-block might pay \$150 or more, depending on his driving record. It's against the law to change direction in the middle of a business-district block, either by making a U-turn or by pulling into a driveway and backing out again to head the opposite way in the popular three-point turn. The commercial area of town is bordered by Fourth and Eighth avenues, and Torres and Monte Verde streets.

"It has become a real problem in town, especially when people see an empty parking space from the opposite side of the street," he said. "It stacks up traffic, and that's what we can't have. We've been getting complaints all the time."

U-turns can only be legally made in intersections. Rana advised drivers to pull slightly to the right and signal to the left before turning the wheel, and he said cross traffic should be allowed to cross before completing the maneuver, if those drivers appear unaware of the intention to make a U-turn.

On residential streets, a driver can change direction midblock if she has a clear line of sight for 200 feet in each direction and doesn't pose a hazard to other vehicles in the area. U-turns are never allowed in front of a fire station.



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## Council appoints slew of board members

TWO NEWCOMERS joined a host of return appointees on five city commissions and boards when the Carmel City Council approved their new terms Sept. 6. Eric Dyar, an architect who lives on 12th Avenue, obtained a seat on the historic resources board, and retiree Bob Tierney, a Pine Ridge Way resident, now occupies a spot on the forest and beach commission.

In his application for the historic

resources board, Dyar said his "deep love and appreciation" of the city, its character, its community and its historic architecture inspired him.

"How our village is preserved and is transformed in the future are very important to me," he wrote. "By participating on this board I feel I can, in a small way, positively affect this process."

Tierney said the forest and beach "are



important city assets" that benefit from citizens' oversight. Before retiring, he worked as the associate director of an organization focusing on global ethics and also owned a bed and breakfast in Maine. He also worked in foreign services for the U.S. Department of State for nearly 20 years.

In addition to Dyar and Tierney, the council voted to reappoint Julie Wendt to the HRB, Julie Culver and Ken Talmage to the planning commission, Bob Irvine to the library board, and Leslie Kitselman, Karen Sharp, Michael LePage and Keith Paterson to the design review board.

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## Volunteers defect as commission rejects C.V. Fire split

HOURS AFTER the Local Agency Formation Commission voted 4-3 Monday night to keep the Carmel Valley Fire Protection District intact, many of the district's volunteer firefighters followed through with their threats to quit, according to David Cummings, a longtime volunteer and vocal supporter of the village station's effort to detach from the fire district that consolidated almost five years ago.

"Yesterday, five quit, and I heard from another 10, easily, who will be going," he said. "The big loser in this is the community."

Only a handful of the village station's 23 volunteers will remain, he speculated. "I'm a battalion chief, and I may not have a battalion." Carmel Valley Fire Division Chief Miles Schuler said Wednesday the district has a plan to staff the village station if a large number of its volunteers leave, but he hopes it won't come to that.

"Of course we don't want to lose volunteers, by any means," he said. "They are the backbone of the organization." The mid-valley and Santa Lucia Preserve stations also have volunteer groups.

The LAFCO vote Sept. 26 followed months of hearings and meetings prompted by the Valley Volunteers, Inc., after it gathered 1,600 signatures to force the issue. Condemning consolidation as a failure, volunteers asked the commission to sever the village station from the fire district that includes Carmel Valley and the Santa Lucia Preserve.

Citing lack of evidence that two districts would provide





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better fire service and be more financially solid than the existing district, executive officer Kate McKenna recommended LAFCO deny the split.

"Based on the testimony and correspondence we have received, I continue to believe there is insufficient evidence that the two proposed districts would be financially and otherwise viable entities," she said.

At the hearing, several uniformed firefighters and chief Sidney Reade sat on one side of the large chambers, while many volunteers stuck together on the other side, occasionally breaking into applause or catcalls as members of the public and commissioners discussed their fate.

Representing the volunteers who favored detachment, attorney Lloyd Lowrey said the petitions show village residents are dissatisfied. He Five volunteers have already quit, and more plan to leave, says David Cummings.

called the conflict between the village station, which had been largely volunteer-run for 50 years, and the leadership of the consolidated district "a festering sore."

Opposing detachment, Carmel Valley Fire board member Bob Rice said consolidation brought newer equipment and more full-time staff to the village station and helped firefighters respond to emergencies more quickly.

"This is not a district that is broken," he argued.

Some suggested the issue was more about personality conflicts between the volunteers and Reade and her paid staff than it was about levels of service.

Board member Bill Parham, a 40-year fire department veteran who spent 37 of those years as a volunteer, said he supported consolidation five years ago and still believes it's the best option.

"I've given my whole life to this department, and it pains me to see it torn apart," he said. "I hope you make your decision tonight, because this situation is disrupting families and relationships."

Dennis Law encouraged LAFCO to do the residents' bidding and OK the split. "We're talking about restoring a respected, very much appreciated fire service organization that had been operating more than 50 years," he said.

#### Dueling numbers

Members of each side have repeatedly accused the other of lying about financial figures, response times and hours of training to support their positions.

Arguing that McKenna based her recommendation to LAFCO on "misstatements of fact," Lowrey said, "Financially, this is a district that's upside down and going south fast."

But Reade argued the district is solvent and said response times were backed by county records.

Vince DiMaggio, the public representative on LAFCO, admonished the district's leadership for not sitting down with the volunteers as soon as their unhappiness became apparent.

"If this commission votes against detachment, you couldn't pay me enough money to be a volunteer tomorrow morning," he said, adding that their problems "could have been addressed when we were going through this nine months of nonsense."

Commissioners Jim Costello, mayor of Pacific Grove, and Lou Calcagno, county supervisor, sided with DiMaggio in voting for detachment.

But the four-member majority — county supervisor Jerry Smith, King City Cemetery District board member Tom Perkins, Salinas Mayor Anna Caballero and Carmel Valley Fire board member Anne McGowan — said proponents failed to prove the consolidated district's shortcomings or that having their own station would better serve the residents.

"What I heard tonight was allegations of mismanagement, with nothing being substantiated," Smith said. He encouraged the volunteers to stick with their mission of providing lifesaving services, no matter who's in charge of the department, and said the district had purchased more equipment, increased staffing and improved safety since consolidating. "Change is always difficult," Caballero commented. "You have to be willing to sit at the table and say you're going to give up something that you want for the good of the people."

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#### The fight may continue

On Wednesday, Cummings said volunteers might continue their fight, perhaps by asking LAFCO to reconsider its decision or suggesting the county grand jury or district attorney's office to look into the district's finances and the information provided to LAFCO.

Division chief Schuler said neither side won Monday and pledged the district would work to mend fences with the volunteers.

"I sure didn't feel like there was any victory," he said. "I think there are going to be some volunteers who do leave, and that's unfortunate, but hopefully we'll have the majority of them stay. We'll utilize them and work with them and develop the organization to what their expectations are and what our expectations are." Artists' genius, sweat touch Carmel Middle School

ONE FLOURISHING a paint brush and the other wielding a welder's torch, two artists helped beautify Carmel Middle School.

Painter Christina Miles restored the massive mural that spans a gymnasium wall, finishing work this week, and heavy-metal sculptor Amy Blackstone created a gate of cattails to grace the native habitat project.

"Every day last year, when I would drop off my youngest son at school, I noticed the mural, because it was really falling into disrepair," Miles said. Students chipped pieces from it as they ambled past, and concrete dripped onto it when the windows above were repaired. "It's an incredible feat, this piece of art, and I didn't want to see it disappear."

Miles, a Carmel resident and fine artist whose three children attended the middle school, said she received administrators' permission to restore the mural this summer and hoped to finish before classes began in August. "Little did I know what an enormous task I was taking on," she said. "Matching the existing colors has been the biggest challenge."

The maintenance department helped buy

the paint, a patron paid a helper to do some of the patching and painting, and Miles enlisted the help of her daughter, interior designer Maya Freedman. But repairing the five-panel, 1,200-square-foot mural still took longer than anticipated.

"I absolutely had no idea," she said. "I thought it would take a couple of days, not a couple of months."

To make sure she didn't give up part way, Miles applied primer to all the areas she would paint.

"Consequently, it looked really scary, with all those white blotches, but I knew I had to finish it," she said. Teacher Jose Ortiz and his students created the mural, entitled "Hijos del Sol" ("Children of the Sun"), in 1997.

A full-time artist with works hanging in local galleries and in private collections all over the world, Miles had to carve out time to work at the school. She spent hours mixing paints and climbing up and down a folding ladder. Sometimes, chilly afternoon winds would dry the paint so quickly she couldn't blend it properly, but only one day were conditions so bad she had to pack up and leave. She finally finished repairing the massive

sioners to support the findings of the initial study. "The last half-dozen cities in California to incorporate did not require full EIRs," Dalessio said. "Let the citizens determine their destiny."

In a memorable comment he made to LAFCO commissioners last December, Dalessio said, "One minute we are not a town and the next minute we are a town. What possible environmental impact could happen in that minute?"

#### 'Driving us crazy'

Because of the extension of the public review period, commissioners will be unable to make any decision on an EIR when they meet again Dec. 6. LAFCO executive officer Kate McKenna said the earliest opportunity they will have to consider the issue is sometime in January

Barring the requirement of an EIR, voters could have an opportunity to weigh in on incorporation as early as November 2006. If the commission were to require an EIR, an election would be delayed indefinitely, if not permanently.

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Overshadowed by the debate surrounding the environmental study, the hearing also featured a presentation on the draft service plan, a document that details how the proposed city's services - from public works and law enforcement to garbage collection and animal control - would operate.

And while proponents and opponents debate the necessity of an EIR, former 5th District Supervisor Karin Strasser-Kauffman and administrative analyst Nick Chiulos continue their revenue neutrality discussions. They have been negotiating for nine months, and McKenna estimated they will continue talks for another three months.

The revenue discussions represent another hurdle for incorporation proponents. For the Town of Carmel Valley to be viable, proponents need to prove the new city can covers its expenses without detracting from the county's revenues.

"We've had a terrible time getting the numbers straight," Chaplin said. "It's been driving us crazy. The process is taking much longer than it should."

Chaplin is confident the numbers will ultimately prove the aspiring town is financially viable.

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

council to abandon its plans to sell the mansion.

"Fortunately, the record amply demonstrates feasible alternatives to the sale of the historic Flanders Mansion," she wrote.


#### Sale moves forward

During a five-hour meeting Sept. 22 that included comments from 39 speakers, the council declared the sale's benefits would override the two significant, unavoidable environmental impacts of selling it identified in the EIR.

"Clearly, at this point, doing nothing is not an option," principal planner Brian Roseth said at the start of the hearing. "The mansion is deteriorating, and the city has an obligation to see that this historic resource is preserved and maintained."

Since the city bought it, along with 15 acres, in 1972, councils and committees have haggled over how the mansion should be used, turning down proposals for a school, a library and a hostel, Roseth said. It was originally zoned residential but later changed to "improved parkland," and for most of the years the city has owned it, Flanders served as a residence. The last caretaker moved out a year ago.

On Sept. 14, the planning commission said the city should lease the house to someone rather than sell it. Commissioners



also said the property should be considered parkland and, if it were to be sold, the surrounding parcel should be made smaller.

"How reasonable is it that someone would lease that building, knowing they would put \$1 million into it and pay the city \$200,000 a year?" councilman Mike Cunningham asked. "If we're going to wait for that person, we'll wait for Santa Claus. I think the lease option is financially irresponsible."

#### Park and \$ debates

A unanimous council supported the sale, with the only dissenting votes coming during the parkland-or-not debate and discussion of the mitigation measures and "statement of overriding considerations."

Despite attorney Bill Conners' arguments that the house is not a park — it has been used as a home, the city has not spent money to make it a park, no signs call it a park, no documents suggest it is used as a park, and the "improved parkland" zoning enables it to be used for many purposes other than a park - councilman Erik Bethel said he was uncomfortable with that conclusion and voted against the rest of the council in a straw vote on the issue.

Bethel also worried the EIR's 21 mitigation measures to offset the sale's impacts would make the mansion difficult to sell. The council voted in favor of most of them but eliminated two as recommended by the planning commission: one that would require the owners to hire a consultant to document the mansion's history and another to require admittance of the public on occasion. Council members altered a third regarding exterior changes that would affect the public's view of the mansion.

Bethel urged his fellow councilmembers to promise that money from the sale of Flanders Mansion would be used for improvements to other city-owned property, not "for a brush chipper or a police car."

The council's action Thursday included a statement that the "sale would raise funds for various capital projects in the city," but Conners urged members to avoid anything more specific, and the majority agreed.





A WELL-ROUNDED APPROACH

The body relies on two complex systems to maintain balance - the vestibular sys tem in the inner ear and the somatosensory system that connects skin and muscles. Normally, people depend on the somatosensory system for about 70% of their balance control and 30% on the inner ear. As we age, it is common to lose receptors in the vestibular system, but researchers may have found a way to preserve what we have. Inspired by elderly Chinese people who regularly take to walking, dancing, and exercising on cobblestone paths, researchers tested volunteers on cobblestone paths here. They found that walking on the rounded river stones produced better balance, believed to the result of challenging the vestibular system with an uneven surface. Those who have vestibular disease are often plagued with dizziness, which can range in severity from a sense of lightheadedness or disorientation to a violent spinning sensation. 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





With the release of "Tom Dooley" in 1958 The Kingston Trio helped set the stage for a renaissance in American folk music. During the late '50s and early '60s, the group released a string of successful recordings and achieved international stardom. Still on the road 30 weeks a year, The Kingston Trio today comprises Bill Zorn, George Grove and Rick Dougherty. Call (831) 620-2048.

Monday, Oct. 10, Americana folk legend Tom Russell makes a rare local appearance accompanied by guitarist Andrew Hardin at Monterey Live in downtown Monterey. Russell, a prolific songwriter, has recorded 18 albums of original material. His songs have been recorded by Johnny Cash, Nanci Griffith, Dave Alvin, Joe Ely, Ian Tyson, Guy Clark, Sylvia Tyson and others. to the modern Bach Festival," said Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud. "And thanks to her, it happened in a seamless way, which helped make the festival the success it is today."

After Sandor Salgo's abrupt departure, Faridany was instrumental in bringing Bruno Weil to the festival as music director in 1991.

"Without Nana I wouldn't be here, that's for sure 100 percent," Weil told The Pine Cone last summer. "She brought me over, and she showed me the potential and the spirit, and that's why I decided to come here."

Faridany was also a key player in the renovation and 2003 reopening of the Sunset Center, where 57 years earlier she had started school. The Artistic Manager Golden Chair was established in her honor at the festival in 1997.

Her appreciation for the musicians made her invaluable, Bach Festival officials agree, and she kept their concerns, both artistic and practical, at the center of her work. Often, they recognized in her a fellow artist (she was an accomplished pianist), and she earned their love and devotion.

"The relationship she had with the musicians through all the years was just fantastic," said former board president Jack Buffington, a volunteer with the festival since the 1970s. "She nurtured them and provided for them while they were in town every summer."

"Nana was a treasure who always made all of us feel incredibly welcome," said Elizabeth Wallfisch, concertmaster. "She took care of everything for us, and she did it with such a loving heart."

People were drawn to her humor, tenderness and intellect, to her dedication, practicality and tact, and to her beauty and poise.

"I had a crush on her from the very beginning," said Bach Fest bassoonist and managing director Jesse Read.

When she retired in 2004 due to illness, she received a standing ovation from a packed house at the close of that year's concert series. Weil, baritone Sanford Sylvan and Wallfisch, all close friends, then performed an aria from Bach's "St. Matthew Passion" with the orchestra. There wasn't a dry eye in the house, according to family members who were there.

"Nana Faridany was one of my closest friends," Weil said after he heard the news of her death. "Her spirit will keep uniting us and inspiring me forever."

She was born Nancy Macdonald Lofton in 1941 in Winston-Salem, N.C., to Richard Lofton, the painter, and Nancy Schallert Lofton, an aspiring actress who later became a respected teacher at Monte Vista School in Monterey. The family moved to Pacific Grove in 1943 and to Carmel in 1945, and Faridany attended Sunset School, St. John's College in Annapolis, Md., and the University of California at Berkeley, where she earned a B.A. in English. She was later accredited as a teacher in Massachusetts and

California.

She met her first husband, Edward Faridany, at Berkeley while acting opposite him in a play by the classical Greek playwright, Menander. They were married in Carmel in 1964 and lived in Cambridge, Mass., and San Francisco until moving to England in 1970. They had two daughters, Francesca, and Lucy, a musician. They divorced in 1984. Earlier this year, she married Lawrence Crapo, a professor of medicine at Stanford University School of Medicine.

She remained throughout her life a formidable intellect; an athlete and passionate equestrienne; a gifted pianist, draftsman and painter; a writer, gardener and accepting friend, family members said.

"I think Nana was a true Carmel renaissance woman," McCloud said, "because she had a deep appreciation for the arts, and she also loved the outdoors — especially riding her horses." "It was impossible not to want to be

Nana's friend," said writer Jane Smiley, a Carmel Valley neighbor. "Her regard was so kind and intelligent and honest. Nana had scores of friends, and we all miss her."

Faridany is survived by her husband; her mother, Nancy Morrow of Carmel Valley; her sister, painter Melissa Lofton, of Big Sur; her daughters, and a son-in-law, Stephen Wadsworth Zinsser, of Los Angeles.

A memorial service will be held Sunday, Oct. 9, at 4 p.m., at All Saints Episcopal Church in Carmel. 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## Chef Jon Magnusson cooks with sincerity and passion at Bistro 211

"I HAVE a deep passion for soups," Chef Jon Magnusson of Bistro 211 said. "Soups are who you are at that time, and every time they are different."

Such fervor for soups is not uncommon among dedicated chefs, as they provide a varied and colorful palette for ongoing unique creativity.

As Chef Magnusson rhapsodized over autumn pumpkins and squash becoming available now for hearty soups that "make you feel good," he said he feels great joy in creating a soup because he can pass along that joy to his clientele. "People come here to feel nurtured. It's my way of life."



But a perennial soup on the 211 menu, a favorite with locals, is the cappuccino of mushrooms — fresh forest mushrooms simmered in a flavorful chicken broth, finished with sherry and "floated" with whipped cream (\$6.95) so that the finished product does indeed look like a cup of cappuccino coffee.

Bistro 211, in a flower-filled courtyard at 211 Crossroads Blvd., Carmel, has a loyal local following that makes up 90 percent of its patronage. Then there are out-of-town first-time diners who return again and again — such as movie star and golfer Bill Murray.

He came back five times during AT&T Pro-Amweek at Pebble Beach this year.

Chef Magnusson's philosophy of cuisine is exemplified in the restaurant's slogan: "Where it is all from scratch and always from the heart." He said, "This is my passion; diners can feel the sincerity of what we do here."

Although aided by three cooks, he presides in the 211 kitchen six days out of seven and oversees everything that comes from it. His Brazilian wife, Carmen, co-owner of the restaurant, minds the front of the house, greeting diners and making them feel at home.

A colorful food and flower mural painted by Gerrica Connelly covers one entire wall of the restaurant, and three canvasses depicting amusing chefs are hung on other walls. The entire front of the restaurant is made up of mullioned windows that look out on the courtyard of brightly painted tables and equipped with umbrellas for shade and heat lamps for warmth. Diners can enjoy breakfast, lunch or dinner al fresco in almost any weather. The patio is dog friendly.

"We wanted a neighborhood restaurant, where people could come and feel at home. It adds quality to our lives to have such a place," he said.

All in all, Bistro 211 — celebrating its 10th year in business — is a treat for the eye as well as the palate.

The menus, featuring a number of Atkinscompatible dishes, remain virtually the same year in and year out, with an occasional new dish. Nightly specials, consisting of an

entrée and soup or salad for \$18.95, change throughout the year according to season and availability of ingredients But it's not the same old, same old at 211. Chef Magnusson has created each dish himself. Take, for instance, the chicken and prawns on the dinner menu: This unusual combination is composed of grilled chicken breast served with prawns and a lemon caper sauce (\$19.95), or grilled halibut served with portabello mushrooms in a garlic lemon court bouillon with Pernod (\$18.95). Or the braised lamb shank with sun-dried fruits in red wine sauce and bleu cheese (\$16.95).

Two unique dishes that appear on the luncheon and dinner menus are the smoked salmon platter of the chef's own ice-smoked salmon served with capers, onions, tomatoes, alfalfa sprouts, cream cheese and a toasted bagel (\$13.95), and an ice-smoked salmon quesadilla with jack cheese and roasted red peppers, served open faced with



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

salsa fresca, sour cream and avocado (\$12.95).

If you've never heard of ice-smoked salmon, this is how Chef Magnusson prepares it at home in his back garden in an unusual Scandinavian smoker: Glowing briquets of charcoal and hickory wood provide the smoke, which is drawn into a larger rectangular chamber packed with a bed of ice over which the fresh salmon is placed on a rack — after marinat-

The resulting ice-smoked salmon can be purchased sliced or whole by the pound from the restaurant, or ordered in dishes prepared in the 211 kitchen.

As for seafood, Chef follows the guidelines laid out by the Monterey Bay Aquarium's Seafood Watch program, which recommends fish choices to keep oceans sustainable. Currently on the menu are salmon, halibut, calamari and prawns.

If you are looking for a good buy in dining out, try the Bistro 211 sunset specials served for \$14.95 from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday: One entrée is served each evening, augmented by a Caesar salad, house salad or soup. Sunday brunch is available from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Chef Magnusson is originally from Akranes, Iceland, a small town of 5,000. As a youngster, he fished off the piers and watched freighters and passenger ships coming and going. He dreamed of becoming a ship's captain. When he was 15, he signed on for sea duty but instead became the chef's galley helper. The chef's skills so impressed young Jon during two summers of sailing to distant ports that he enrolled in a four-year culinary school and apprenticeship in Reykjavik, where he learned the preparation of classic French cuisine.

In 1980, a school friend who had emigrated to the United

States, and who worked for Quail Lodge, invited Magnusson to come to Carmel Valley, where the late Edgar Haber hired him as a sous chef at the lodge. Later, he was transferred to Quail's Carmel Fish House on the Park as sous chef, and then later to The Covey at the lodge as chef.

After five years' time, he was hired as chef at Monterey Peninsula Country Club at Pebble Beach, where he reigned for six years. He was also the banquet chef at Monterey Plaza Hotel and a partner/manager at Brazilian Cafe in Pacific Grove.

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## Sparky's root beer is a local, national and international favorite

#### CAROL KNOX is a winner.

When I arrived at her home in Pacific Grove, Carol was all fired up about the upcoming "Cook Like a California Chicken" recipe contest.

Seeing that she won the Monterey County Hospitality Association's Papa Vince Award in 2000, first place for her artichoke corn salsa at the Castroville Artichoke Festival in 2001, and the California State Foodservice Association's Employee of the Year award in 2002, the enthusiastic Knox had every reason to think big.

I instantly warmed up to the engaging woman, dishing with her on the virtues of grits, gravy and my personal favorite, scrapple. Aside from being an aspiring chickencooking champ and longtime server at the Fishwife, Carol is co-proprietor, with her husband, Kevin, of Sparky's Fresh Draft Root Beer.

Being from Philadelphia, the home of the original Hires Root Beer, I happen to know a thing or two about root beer.

The original 1800s concoction by a Philadelphia pharmacist was a low-alcohol, naturally effervescent beverage made by fermenting a blend of sugar and yeast with various roots, herbs and barks such as sarsaparilla, sassafras, wild cherry, wintergreen and ginger.


Although many classic brands are still

being made, including A&W, Dad's, Frostie, Hires and Mason's, today's commercial varieties are completely nonalcoholic and generally contain sugar, caramel coloring and a

combination of artificial and natural flavorings (including some of those originally used). They are usually artificially carbonated.

The reigning local root-beer connoisseurs have strong ties to Pacific Grove. Kevin moved here before his first birthday from





Nevada. His father managed what is now the Bay Park Hotel on Munras. After spending two summer breaks working on the Peninsula, Carol moved here from North Carolina at the impressionable age of 18. She fondly recalled, "When I got off the plane, I knew this is exactly where I wanted to be." After meeting at the Fishwife, (Carol was a server and Kevin was manager), the two got hitched, raised three lovely daughters (now grown) and started the little family business that could.

After almost a decade managing the Fishwife, Kevin started toying with the idea of owning his own brewpub, and he began making beer at home. His brews were an instant success, winning gold and silver medals at the American Homebrewer's Association Annual Competition, (the largest home-brew competition in the world).

The recognition was nice, but perhaps







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
2. Sweet basil & Chili-saute meat with spicy chili sauce and vegetables


3. Mixed Vegetables-saute meat with veggie and garlic



more important was the opportunity for feedback and troubleshooting from other brewers. In the process, Kevin honed his beer-making skills and ended up designing his own brewing equipment. Next, he experimented with new recipes, including a cranberry and apple cider he dubbed, "crapple."

Kevin then discovered a root beer-recipe in an old book and floated the idea with Carol, who agreed that, yes, everybody loves root beer. They made countless varieties of 5-gallon batches over a 10-year span — and utilized the conve-

nient built-in test palates of three willing daughters - until they perfected the frothy formula.

The Knoxes then rented a commercial kitchen, upped production to 25-gallon batches and launched Sparky's (named for their deceased cat, R.I.P.) as a retail product on April Fool's Day 2000, debuting at Pacific Grove's Good Old Days.

Word of mouth and lots of sampling created a cult-like following for Sparky's. Business boomed, and they moved production to The Coast Range Brewing Company in Gilroy, where their pre-prohibition bottling machine has the capacity to bottle 1,000 plus cases per day. It used to take Carol and Kevin a tedious five minutes to bottle and label each case by hand.

Now, Kevin goes to Gilroy every two to three months to mix double batches of 2,000 to 2,400 cases (less a few casualties for breakage and spillage). The nearby facility and hands-on involvement allow him to precisely control the process

The Knoxes hand-serve their root beer at the Monterey Farmer's Market on Tuesdays (try the float with a scoop of Blue Bunny vanilla). The bottled version is available at dozens of retailers on the Peninsula. Los Angeles-based beverage distributor, Real Soda, offers Sparky's throughout the West, and even Scotto's Market in Auckland, New Zealand, carries the stuff.

For the most part, Sparky's has stayed true to its smalltown roots. Carol handles the sales every Wednesday, and Kevin does the deliveries in Monterey and Santa Cruz counties. "This is our stomping ground," said Kevin. "We have worked hard to build a solid foundation locally."

"People value a personal connection around here and tend to appreciate and support a family-run business," Carol chimed in.

skyrocketing Despite glass and ingredient costs, their product has had the same price for five years. Carol wants their gourmet, high-end root beer to be available to the public at an affordable price, but where it still makes sense in running a viable business. "We don't want to compromise. We want to stay a mom-and-pop operation but make a respectable living," she said. In Pacific Grove, get Sparky's Root Beer at Cork N' Bottle Liquors, the Fishwife, Goodie's Delicatessen, Grove Market, Red House Café, 17th Street Grill and Pepper's Mexicali Café. Sparky's will be hand serving root beer at Monterey Seafood Festival Oct. 8 and 9. They're also slated to be featured in an upcoming Travel Channel 13-part series entitled "America's Best Products."

the Tanimuras to lay the groundwork for new homes, which will expand the city by 40 percent.

"I think you are doing a great injustice to a beautifully historic, basically almost virgin, company town," Spreckels resident Jim Riley told supervisors at Tuesday's board meeting. "It's one of the few towns left west of the Mississippi River that is still intact."

Supervisor Dave Potter was the only dissenter, voting against an amendment to the county's general plan redesignating the farmland as residential space. Supervisor Fernando Armenta did not attend the meeting.

Supervisors approved the grading permit on condition that a 100-foot buffer, or easement, be maintained between the houses and surrounding farmland.

Construction could begin as early as Oct. 29, when the county is expected to provide the Tanimuras with the grading permit, although Cling said, "I don't think they've made a decision on when they're going to run the bulldozers."

For two years, some Spreckels residents and LandWatch have contended that the old map establishing the undeveloped parcels was invalid. LandWatch and the Association of Spreckels Residents filed suit, challenging the map.

In a June 2004 letter to county board of supervisors, LandWatch outlined its con-

of Monterey County, and not just in Spreckels."

Gary Tanimura, a family spokesman, wouldn't specify Wednesday how much the land was worth, although LandWatch has estimated it to be about \$18 million.

The tract-style houses on the 16 acres will be from 1,300 to 3,000 square feet, with most in the 2,000-to-2,400-square-foot range, Tanimura said. Fifteen percent will be set aside as affordable housing.

Wednesday night, a group of Spreckles residents were featured on KCBA's Fox News at Ten, saying they had dropped their opposition to the new homes and were looking forward to them as an enhancement of their town.

But Riley, who is also the president of the Spreckels Community Service District, said the new "cookie-cutter" houses would inevitably change Spreckels' small-town ambiance, and he complained the new houses would make the rest of the town look bad by comparison.

"The new houses will put other homes in the area in a slump," said Riley. "Five families have moved out of town in anticipation of these new houses."


Another Spreckels resident, Sandy Ferguson, told supervisors she's concerned the new development would create traffic problems. A study done by the county found, however, that the extra traffic flow through Spreckels would not impact or change the characteristics of the community.

Riley told supervisors the Spreckels Sugar Co., which originally owned the property, never intended to develop it and it wasn't part of the town, but project planner Paul Mugan insisted otherwise.

"These lots have always been considered part of the town of Spreckels," Mugan said.

LandWatch Executive Director Chris Fitz urged supervisors to require an environmental impact report before construction begins, but Cling said it was too late to request one.





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
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

## 1889 Holman house featured at this year's P.G. historic tour

#### By KELLY NIX

A 116-year-old, 10-room mansion will be featured on this year's 36th Annual Historic Home Tour in Pacific Grove.

The annual event Sunday, Oct. 2, will allow the curious to take an inside look a small portion of the historic homes in Pacific Grove.

"We get people from all over California to come for the tour," said Moe Ammar, president of the P.G. Chamber of Commerce. This year, six homes will be open for the tour, which costs \$20 a person. Some of P.G.'s 1,250 historic homes been converted to bedand-breakfast inns, while others are now restaurants. But most of the structures are still private homes, Ammar said.

The tour will offer a peek into Victorians, craftsman-style houses and California bungalows. Also included in the tour is an

English-style Gothic church built in 1887 the 150-year-old Point Pinos and Lighthouse, the oldest continually operating lighthouse on the West Coast.

"We have hundreds of homes in Pacific Grove that were built before 1926," Ammar said.

Featured on the tour is a home on Lighthouse Avenue built in 1889 by R.L. Holman, who owned the largest department store between San Francisco and Los Angeles, located in downtown P.G.

The oceanview mansion was constructed as a three-story, 10-room Victorian with a cook's cottage and barn in the back. Two generations of Holmans lived in the house until 1985 when the department store was sold and the house was deeded to the Monterey Peninsula Museum of Art.

The home's appearance has gone through a transformation through the years. In the

1920s its owners converted the classic Victorian motif to Spanish Colonial Revival, a trend at the time. The original gables were replaced with a parapet roof rimmed with clay tiles. The fish-scale like shingles and clapboards were covered in stucco, and the front porch was converted to a solarium with arched windows, Ammar said.

The home's new owners in 2003 brought back some of its original charm by adding Victorian-era woodwork, French doors, and 1920s Spanish Colonial light fixtures and Moroccan tiles, along with modern amenities such as an updated kitchen and master bedroom

Architect James McCord, who lives in a 1916 Pacific Grove bungalow and co-

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
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authored "The New Bungalow" will provide narrative context and insight during presentations at noon and 2 p.m. at Pacific Grove's Museum of Natural History.

Local artists will gather in Chautauqua Hall, built in 1881, to sell paintings, jewelry, photographs and crafts. There will be an auction of birdhouses designed and constructed by Pacific Grove architects, builders and artists to raise money for the Heritage Society of Pacific Grove.


Proceeds from the tour benefit the Heritage Society, the Pacific Grove Arts Center and the Chamber of Commerce.

## The stories were wrong — and it wasn't an accident

THE IMMEDIATE aftermath of Hurricane Katrina was painted as Armageddon for the people of New Orleans.

On Sept. 1, with desperate evacuees crammed into the Superdome, the New Orleans police chief told reporters that the stadium, where city officials had somehow neglected to stockpile emergency supplies, was the scene of mayhem. "Individuals are getting raped, individuals are getting beaten," chief Eddie Compass said.

Five days later, during a tear-jerking appearance on the Oprah Winfrey Show, New Orleans Mayor Ray Nagin went further.

"There are babies being raped," Nagin said. "People have been in that frickin' Superdome for five days watching dead bodies, watching hooligans killing people, raping people."

The mayor also predicted thousands of drowning victims would be found once the floodwaters receded.

And before too long, reports were surfacing in the media that the freezer at the New Orleans Convention Center held "30 to 40 bodies," many of them supposedly murder victims.

To say these gruesome reports were widely reported would be a gross understatement. In this country and around the world they were cited by nearly every news outlet as unquestioned truths.

However, it now turns out they were all either completely wrong or colossally exaggerated. According to officials responsible for cleaning up the mess left behind in New Orleans:

■ There were only four bodies found at the convention center — all people who died of natural causes.

■ During the week the hurricane hit, there were fewer murders (two) than during an average week in the Big Easy (four).

■ No credible reports of child rape have been made; indeed, there have been no reports of rape at all, city officials now say.

People all across the country are entitled to ask: Why did officials and reporters rush to report things that were completely untrue?

According to the Associated Press, a journalism professor at the Poynter Institute in St. Petersburg, Fla., says it's because of the chaos that prevailed in New Orleans.

"You get so hung up as a reporter on what the big picture is that you use generalizations that become untrue," Kelly McBride said.

But there's another reason. Many reporters repeated the myths because they wanted them to be true. For them, a tragedy is exciting. And the worse the tragedy, the more their adrenalin flows. And if it's a tragedy that makes the United State look bad ... well, that's like Christmas and Thanksgiving combined.

Here's a lesson for young journalists out there who would like to report the truth: When somebody says there are 30 or 40 bodies someplace, ask to see

People who purchase a million-dollarplus home in Carmel may wonder what their tens of thousands of dollars in annual property taxes get them in fire protection. If their home is outside the city limits, they'll be happy to hear their taxes allowed the doubling of firefighting personnel at Cypress Fire. In Carmel-by-the-Sea, however, the increase in million-dollar home sales has done nothing to prevent the city administrators from dismantling the fire department, which has seen its budget steadily decreased and the city's public safety capacity drastically decreased.

has some parallels with the levees around New Orleans. Yes, you can save money in the short run by cutting personnel and equipment to support Sunset or the Scenic walkway. Fires, tsunamis and major earthquakes are rare but, like hurricanes, you'd better be ready for them. When the Big One comes, you can't depend on your neighbors. You have to depend on what you created at home.

The city should be ashamed at their mismanagement of their proud, old fire service. **Roy Thomas,** *Carmel*
