## La Playa owner Newton Cope dies at 83

NEWTON COPE, the San Francisco businessman who renovated Carmel's La Playa Hotel and prevented the demolition

of five cottages now known as Cottagesby-the-Sea, died Nov. 23 following a long battle with cancer. He was 83.

"La Playa is a special place because of the man," said general manager Tom Glidden, who came to work for Mr. Cope in 1988, six years after Cope's company, Nob Hill Properties, Inc., purchased the hotel. "Because of his attitude about preservation, we maintained the character the community appreciated, the sense of

Recognizing Mr. Cope's efforts, the National Trust for Historic Preservation asked La Playa to become a charter member of Historic Hotels of America in 1989, Glidden said. "They hand selected properties throughout the country that paid special attention to historic preservation."

#### High standards of hospitality

The owner of The Huntington Hotel and other San Francisco properties, Mr. Cope's family company set high standards, according to Glidden. A healthy budget kept La Playa clean, fresh and

"He understood that the definition of hospitality is good service," Glidden said. He paid and treated the hotel's 90 employees well, engendering dedication and longevity among them. On staff for 17 years, Glidden is one of 20 employees who have worked at La Playa for at least

### JELLYFISH SEASON CREATES FASCINATION FOR MOST, PROBLEMS FOR POWER PLANT

LARGE SWARMS of jellies responsible for a partial shutdown of the Moss Landing power plant are part of a natural proliferation of the animal this time of year,

In mid-October, Duke Energy had to shut down two turbines at the plant after jellies clogged the intake that draws cooling water from Monterey Bay.

"We will start to see more of them in this ind of weather," said George Matsumoto education and research specialist with the Monterey Bay Aquarium Research Institute.

The jellies responsible for the intake blockage were likely sea nettles or Chrysaora fuscescens, which inhabit Monterey Bay year-round. But abundant sunlight and still waters in October and November stimulate growth of phytoplankton, which jellies eat.

The swarms of jellies that obstructed the plant's intake didn't do any damage, but two of the plants four turbines had to be shut down Oct. 19 until the next afternoon, said David Hicks, spokesman for Duke Energy. "The intake screen got clogged up with jellyfish, and they had to clean it," Hicks said.


The Moss Landing power plant is where California American Water Co. wants to establish a desalination plant that would provide a drought-proof water source for the Monterey Peninsula. The desal plant would use the power plant's intake and outfall sys-

October's blockage wasn't the first time jellies impeded the intake, but it is not common, Hicks said.

In the spirit of jelly season, there are two new types of rare jellies on display at the Monterey Bay Aquarium, where jellies are not a nuisance but a popular attraction.

## LandWatch general plan would halt Rancho Cañada project

m W}$  HILE LANDWATCH Monterey County is using affordable housing as a selling point for its proposed general plan, the initiative would kill Rancho Cañada Village, the Peninsula's only promising affordable housing development.

The LandWatch general plan, now being circulated on petitions which aim to qualify it for the June ballot, is the group's alternative to an updated general plan being considered by the board of supervisors.

The very first rule for Carmel Valley in the LandWatch document states that development would be limited to "existing lots," which would kill the 280-home project proposed by Nick Lombardo before he died last

levels — providing what Lombardo said was badly needed housing for people who already work in Carmel Valley.

At his funeral May 7 at the Carmel Mission, Lombardo's son, land-use attorney Tony Lombardo, promised to see his father's vision come true.

'We owe it to my father for all he gave to this community to finish this work. And we will finish it." Nick Lombardo said.

But the LandWatch initiative would stand in the way. "It would require us to have another pub-

lic vote," said Keith McCoy, project manager for Rancho Cañada Village.

If the LandWatch initiative is enacted, all general plan amendments - typically handled by the board of supervisors — would require public approval, with the proponents of any amendment forced to bear the costs of the election.

In the case of Rancho Cañada, going back to the voters would cost \$1 million and delay the project for years, something McCoy said would raise the ire of families seeking affordable housing.

"I get calls every week from people who work on the Peninsula and in Carmel Valley who want to know when we are going to start building," he said. "I say it could be a year or two years or five years. That's the sad truth."

LandWatch executive director Chris Fitz and county supervisor Dave Potter, who is one of the initiative's principal backers, haven't publicly opposed Rancho Cañada, saying the project deserves a "serious look" and is "interesting." But both agreed the development would be a casualty of the ini-

"We have a representative government that is broken," Fitz said. "So faced with that, we have to make the tough decisions."

McCoy, who maintains that only "a vocal

## Rescue of stranded sea otter fails

A SICK and injured sea otter stranded Carmel Beach Nov. 25 died at the Monterey Bay Aquarium that night. Laboratory technicians with the state department of fish and game are conducting a

necropsy to determine what might have factored into the female otter's death, according to Emily Loufek, an animal care specialist at

"The call first came in on Thursday regarding an otter with a nose wound stranded on the rocks on Carmel Point, but she was

spooked back into the water before we could get a look at her," Loufek said.

The following day, the ailing otter, an adult, beached herself again. Passersby who spied her lying in a pile of seaweed in evident distress and with an injury on her nose notified the Marine Mammal Center and the aquarium, which handled the call.

"She was in pretty bad shape by the time we

## Just eight seniors have not passed exit exam as high school raises academic standards

TECHNOLOGY, NEW teaching methods and course requirements, outreach to atrisk students and freshmen, and drug testing should help Carmel High School students perform better, the Carmel Unified School District board of education was told Nov. 14.

At the meeting, principal Karl Pallastrini said faculty and staff are working to fulfill the goals developed by superintendent Marvin Biasotti.

To boost standardized test scores to the top 10 percent when compared with similar schools, the district plans to impose new course requirements based on the state university system's admissions standards, according to Pallastrini

Fifty-four percent of the CHS class of 2005 met the standards imposed by the UC and CSU systems, but administrators want that number to be closer to 90 percent. "If we

were doing what we could be doing, every kid could walk out of here and could go to college," Pallastrini opined.

Changes in curriculum to meet the state standards would include additional study in lab sciences, foreign languages and electives. The state also recommends more math.

Mary Bull, assistant superintendent of curriculum, said the change in course load would not only prepare students for college, but for the workplace that increasingly requires such skills. "Employers want read-

> ing comprehension, writing and research, and higher math," she said.

> Some educators worry more demanding courses would increase the dropout rate, but Bull said students perform better in a more challenging environment.

"Students don't drop out of school because it's hard," she said. "They drop out because they're bored and uninterested in their course-

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## Trees trimmed to keep the power on

TOWERING EUCALYPTUS along north San Antonio Avenue lost some limbs this week to the saws of crews hired by PG&E.

Eucalyptus branches break easily, and the pruning will help prevent power failures this winter, said Carmel City Forester Mike Branson. "They are cutting the longer, heavy limbs that extend over the high-voltage power lines."

The utility contracts with a vegetation management company to oversee tree trimming every few years, according to Branson

But he frequently finds fault with the work.

"Sometimes the contract might call for X feet of clearance, so they will stop there, but maybe one more foot would

have been a nicer cut," he said.

Branson said he worked with the contractor and believe his concerns have been addressed.

"We can't follow them around and tell them how to trim

Just up the street on Fourth Avenue, residents are still waiting for a plan to landscape the neighborhood where 32 eucalyptus were felled three years ago. The Carmel City Council recently voted to move ahead with the project, which includes revegetation, a new drainage channel and a pedestrian path along the narrow street, and a town hall meeting on the plan is set for 4 p.m. Friday, Dec. 9, in Carmel City Hall. Drawings depicting landscape architect Scott Hall's plans will be presented, and Branson, Hall and grant writer Carole



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## While residents wait for bulldozers, bulldozers wait for rain

AFTER LEADING the drive to convince public officials to abandon a repeat of last year's ill-fated northerly breach of the Carmel River Lagoon sandbar, Scenic Road resident Paul John is anxiously awaiting the return of bulldozers to the beach. He wants the sandy bluffs holding up the road fortified before winter storms hit.

Residents breathed a collective sigh of relief Nov. 1 when an ad-hoc group representing eight government regulatory agencies — the Carmel River Lagoon Management Technical Advisory Committee — revealed a plan to open a channel in the sandbar in a southerly direction this winter.

While John applauded the decision, he would like to see Monterey County Public Works take action now to minimize damage later this winter. He also wants the public to have easy access to the beach.

Currently, the parking lot is marooned by an encroaching lagoon. The only access to the beach off of Scenic Road is a stairway near Deadman's Curve that is badly in need

"The county has the ability to restore the beach and restore access to the beach. They

have all the time in the world to do it. For God's sake, fix it," John said.

He estimates because of damage to the beach and its accessibility, usage at the park was down by 75 percent to 80 percent this

According to interim public works maintenance manager Vic Lewis, the timing for the rehabilitation work just isn't right. For one thing, he said it is much easier for a bulldozer operator to work with wet sand.

"When sand is wet, you can move it better," Lewis explained. "Sand falls off a dozer blade when it's dry."

Lewis said his agency's plan is to wait until winter rains swell the lagoon, then declare an emergency before cutting a channel in the sandbar and buttressing the eroding banks that support Scenic Road.

Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter said the delay also makes good economic sense.


"It's more of a cost-saving issue than anything," Potter said. "If [public works] did the work now, it might erode away when the storm season arrives."

Prior to last winter, Monterey County Public Works had traditionally cut a channel in the southern section of the sandbar to help drain the lagoon and prevent flooding of nearby homes. Last winter, the agency tried a different strategy and cut to the north to accommodate a request by the National Marine Fisheries Service, which was concerned that cuts to the south were draining the lagoon too quickly, sweeping young

steelhead out to sea.

John and other residents argued the northerly opening of the sandbar was the cause of erosion that washed away a portion of Carmel River Beach, threatening Scenic Road and a landmark cypress tree.

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
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Most of Carmel River State Beach is inaccessible from the parking lot, due to encroachment of the adjacent lagoon in a channel leftover from last winter's river flow.

## Forest service, Big Sur locals closer to agreement on Brazil Ranch

A PROPOSAL by the U.S. Forest Service to host commercial activities at the 1,255-acre Brazil Ranch stirred up a hornet's nest of controversy in Big Sur and is slowly undergoing a transformation at a series of

meetings between representatives of the federal agency and the local community.

This week, a U.S. Forest Service official said his agency is willing to abandon plans to host weddings on the ranch.

Since purchasing the former Allen Funt Ranch in 2002 for \$23 million, the federal

agency has rented out its facilities for weddings, business meetings and other events in an effort to raise the \$150,000 needed annually to maintain the property. The forest service also hopes to use buildings on the ranch to host an environmental education center.

Those actvities — particularly the plan to promote the ranch as a wedding destination — has served as a rallying point for Big Sur residents who believe the federal agency has been ignoring land use rules. Specifically, locals have contended commercial activities at the ranch are prohibited by the Big Sur Coast Land Use Plan and represent unfair competition to businesses.

But Rich Tobin, director of conservation partnerships for Los Padres National Forest, told The Pine Cone his agency realizes the importance of the local land use plan.

"It's not about the Brazil Ranch," Tobin insisted. "It's about the integrity of the Big Sur Coast Land Use Plan. It is not our intention to ignore the plan. It's our intention to respect it."

That's good news for locals who worried

that the federal agency was being held to a different standard than local business owners.

"As long as they are willing to adhere to the same basic rules and regulations that an ordinary citizen goes through, then I am very optimistic," said Alan Perlmutter, a longtime Big Sur resident and business owner who has attended the discussions.

The California Coastal Commission was scheduled to consider the issue in San Francisco Dec. 14-16. But the state agency delayed its hearing so talks could continue. According to county supervisor Dave Potter, the agency will weigh in early next year.

Until then, representatives of the forest service and county government will continue to meet with Big Sur residents in an attempt to work out a compromise. Potter said he is encouraged by the progress the two sides have made.

"I'm pleased to see the forest service is recognizing the community's concerns." he said. "And I'm pleased to see the community isn't beating up on the forest service."



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


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







"Alcohol doesn't make people make good decisions," said officer Chris Johnson, who was on patrol with several other

cops late Nov. 23 and early Nov. 24. The Wednesday before Thanksgiving is one of busiest nights of the year for Carmel restaurants and bars. "I guarantee these people wouldn't have done what they did if they had been sober."

"If it weren't for the witnesses, we wouldn't have had anything to go by."

Armed with a license plate number, officers teamed up in groups of two to search alleys, walkways and alcoves.

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## Reward upped to \$6,500


"They [LandWatch] are telling people their plan is all about affordable housing, and sure, they promote that," McCoy said. "But you can't push all of the affordable housing into the cities. There's not enough room. And cities don't want all the affordable housing in their area."

In their draft general plan, supervisors have designated the area from Highway 1 to the end of the four-lane portion of Carmel Valley Road as a "rural center" which would be "allowed to develop in a semi-rural character."

Fitz said petitioners, some of whom are paid to collect signatures, are still gathering the required 9,000 names to place the LandWatch measure on the June ballot.









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

Dawson will provide information and answer questions. State tax dollars will cover \$373,000 of the work, with the city pitching in an estimated \$143,315.

#### Dead trees disappearing

Meanwhile, Iverson Tree Service, hired by the city in October to remove 37 trees and 22 stumps around town, is slowly finishing the work, according to Branson.

"They asked for an extension on the contract, because they had emergency work to do in Big Sur, but we just want to make sure they finish up here," Branson said. "They just have a handful of trees left," including a large dead pine near the parking lot at the post office and a skinnier tree behind the Carmel Youth Center.

On a Saturday morning a few weeks ago, the company closed one lane of Ocean Avenue for four hours to remove a large pine, prompting complaints from two businesses in the

"It's really hard to do something downtown, particularly on Ocean Avenue, no matter when you do it," Branson said.

He said grinding the stumps not only hastens their decomposition and removes them from public view, it might make parking in Carmel a bit easier.

"People drive into them or hit them while parking," he said. "We want to avoid that."

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

graduating with credentials acceptable to state universities because they are either not taking the right courses or are not getting the right grades, according to Bull. "A rigorous high school program is the single most important factor in college completion and levels the playing field for students with diverse backgrounds," she said.

#### A host of new programs

Another program aimed at raising academic standards at Carmel High, entitled "Literacy across the Curriculum," makes improving in students' reading and writing skills a goal of every class. "It's crucial they have advanced reading skills, no matter what their career goals are," English teacher

Barbara McBride said.

Teachers use scores on standardized tests to identify students reading below their grade level and will establish an afternoon or evening writing lab to help them catch up. "We want to see writing assignments increase in length," she said.

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
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

## Small art will play a big role Christmas morning

THIS HOLIDAY season, small is really big. From candy canes to iPods, the range of gifts that end up in Christmas stockings, instead of under the tree, seems to grow every year. And now, thanks to an innovative alliance between art and commerce, you can add fine art to that list.

In Big Sur, Carmel and Monterey, holiday art shows are celebrating the popularity of miniatures - paintings on canvases as small as 2 by 3 inches, where artists create what is literally a budget line of their work.

"Original art can be really expensive," explained Tom Birmingham, a photographer and co-director of the nonprofit Big Sur Arts Initiative. "Miniatures give people a chance to own an original without it

costing an arm and a leg."

There appears to be no shortage of holiday shoppers and art lovers thinking small.

"After we hang our miniatures, there is usually a line of people waiting to get in the next morning," said Susan Klusmire, director of the Carmel Art Association. She described the annual event as 'wildly successful."

#### **Starting small**

The CAA had its first miniature art show in 1927, the year the organization was founded.

More than a quarter century later, an 11-year-old Dick Crispo displayed his first painting in a Carmel art gallery. Before long, he was producing minia-

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

## Exec Chef Toby Jensen does it all at The Grill on Ocean Avenue

YOU EAT with your eyes first," said Executive Chef Toby Jensen, stressing the importance of how restaurant food is plated. "Presentation is the key. It's not everything, by any means, but it's so important because it shows the chef cares about what he's producing."

Chef Jensen has been caringly holding forth in the kitchen of The Grill on Ocean

Avenue for a year and two months after relocating from Lincoln, Neb., where he worked as sous chef at Wilderness Ridge Lodge.

Having graduated from Western Culinary School in Portland, Ore., in 1995, and interned at Tribeca Restaurant there, Chef Jensen fell under the spell of Asian-influenced cuisine, which he prepared as sous chef at the Gordon Biersch restaurant in Las Vegas, Nev., and at Brooklyn Restaurant in Seattle. Wash.

Here in Carmel, he serves Japanese togarashi chili-crusted ahi tuna and prawns tempura as an appetizer on the dinner menu, and an entrée of seared rare ahi tuna with an

orange/balsamic reduction, wasabi mashed potatoes and spicy Chinese broccoli with Japanese daikon sprouts.

Back in the '90s, he did a year of study at the University of Nebraska near his hometown of Lyon but was lured away from academic studies when he became interested in cooking as his chosen field.

Greatly influenced by the television cooking shows of charismatic Graham Kerr, known as the Galloping Gourmet, and the grande dame of French cooking, Julia Child, he went on to get his culinary credentials in Oregon.

"I can't imagine doing anything else," he

said of restaurant cooking, "and my parents are proud of me for following my special interest." His career choice took them by surprise, however, as Chef Jensen is the first and only member of his family to follow a culinary calling.

His philosophy of cooking incorporates using the freshest ingredients obtainable, "and not manipulating them too extensively," he said

Awed by the fresh, organic produce and fresh fish available practically on his doorstep, Chef Jensen is pleased he came to the Monterey Peninsula to accompany his girlfriend, a graduate student studying international environmental law at the Monterey Institute of International Studies.

The restaurant keeps him very busy cooking lunch and dinner at The Grill on Ocean Avenue, but he has the help of two line cooks in the day and three at night.

"I like making soups and sauces," he said, "because the end result is all due to combin-

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

ing ingredients in an imaginative way." Currently on the menu are turkey chili and cream of mushroom soup — the latter made with cultivated button mushrooms and dried porcini. Twice a year he prepares a shrimp bisque, which he considers very special.

"I really like doing everything," he said. "I do all the baking here, too — all the desserts are in-house.'

One of his favorite desserts is a warm chocolate cake made from a recipe he imported from the Midwest: A cola cake with a secret ingredient added to the flour, butter, sugar and rich cocoa powder — Pepsi

But cooking, rather than baking, is his preference, because cooking allows leeway for innovation and experimentation, whereas baking is more scientific.

If a person were to venture into The Grill on Ocean Avenue, never having dined there before, what would Chef Jensen recommend to allow the patron a sampling of the restaurant's style?

For lunch, he recommends the grilled salmon club sandwich: A thinly sliced

salmon fillet, cooked on an oakwood-fired grill and served on a hamburger bun with arugula, a slice of tomato and crisp bacon. A lime/cilantro aioli is the only condiment. Chef Jensen considers this a signature dish. "It signifies what I do," he said.

For dinner, Chef Jensen suggests oven-roasted duck breast, which is prepared medium rare to medium with a tamarind-hoisin

Accompanying the duck is a fennel/leek gratin. This subtly flavored vegetable side dish is prepared by sautéing in butter thinly

sliced fennel and leek until tender, flavoring them with thyme and topping them with cream and grated Asiago cheese. Prepared in a small soufflé dish, the gratin is then run under the broiler until browned.

A second side dish of fava bean and sweet corn risotto completes the presentation.



Studio One — which doubles as Gafill's open studio — is located in the Village Shops. Just south of the Big Sur River



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

## Libraries waive fines, seek food bank donations instead

KEEPING A library book past its due date is not only embarrassing, but the fines can really add up.

Even worse is the feeling you get when you find a library book that you'd long forgotten. Sometimes, people don't return them because they feel sheepish about owning up and paying the fines.

Again this year, in honor of the holidays, the Monterey and Pacific Grove public libraries are offering an opportunity to return past-due library items and pay no penalties, thanks to an amnesty program called "Food for Fines." All you have to do is donate a food instead.

Canned meats, fish, vegetables and fruits; pasta and rice, cereals and grains, dried beans and powdered milk are in especially great demand. The library forwards all donations to the Food Bank for Monterey County.

Monterey Public Library Special Services Coordinator Jeanne McCombs said the Food for Fines program gives patrons a chance to clear up the debt and get into the holiday

In its fifth year, Food for Fines has become a big success. "Last year, we gave approximately 800 pounds of food," McCombs said.

The Food Bank for Monterey County heavily depends upon the generosity of individuals, as well as grants and gifts from foundations, community organizations and businesses. Food and financial donations help low-income residents meet the ongoing challenge of providing food for themselves and their families.

These days, obesity is a much bigger health problem than hunger in the United States. Nevertheless, in 2002, UCLA's California Health Information Study estimated 20 percent of Monterey County and San Benito County residents are "food insecure" — which means they sometimes need held putting dinner on the table.

Between the Asian tsunami, hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Wilma, and the earthquake in Pakistan, people have been digging deep this year to help philanthropic organizations. The challenge to serve the basic needs of those in our local community is increasingly more difficult as a result. Programs such Food for Fines, as well as the work of the Food Bank for Monterey County, are hoping local residents won't forget the importance of keeping hunger and malnutrition out of their neighborhoods.

The libraries are offering the Food for Fines exchange through Jan. 2. Monterey will forgive any outstanding fines as well as fines for current overdue books. Pacific Grove's Food for Fines program includes only current overdue penalties. Contributions from those who have no fines will also be welcomed. 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
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
























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## Christmas trees to sparkle Friday

Monte Verde and Seventh, was built in 1929 but recently remodeled and upgraded. Visit the much-praised hotel to glimpse its interior courtyard and upscale restaurant, recently named among the world's top 10 by The Robb Report.

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

Chavira's Sept. 29 letter said a Sept. 21 investigation, requested by the city, revealed "grime and grease has accumulated along the grounds of the facility's garbage storage area," which "will result in the illegal dumping of polluted water into the city's storm drain system," in violation of California Uniform Retail Food Facilities and Regional Water Quality Control laws. It gave recipients two weeks to clean their garbage areas and develop a plan for compliance.

"We have two or three health department inspections a year," said Johnson, who has managed the restaurant for seven years. "We've never had an issue with grease here."

The restaurant has a gold seal from the health department, according to Johnson, and workers don't wash kitchen mats outside, they clean the grease trap daily, and a tallow company carts away the grease.

"We make very sure we don't make messes," he said. Johnson could not say what might have caused city building official Tim Meroney and county health to peg his restau-

> rant as a possible violator.

 $A \quad n \quad d$ county health did not investigate the restaurant Sept. 21 or followup on the matter, he said. An inspector visited Oct. 3 but did not look into the issues raised in the letter.

"Our corporate standards are higher than the city's, and for someone to come out and say we're not complying, with no proof, is exasperating," Johnson said.

Sutton had similar complaints. The market uses dumpsters and also pays a tallow company to haul meat scraps and used oil away. Workers do so little rinsing of greasy products that the market received permission years ago to remove the costly and large trap installed in its basement parking garage.

"They obviously didn't inspect, because there's no way they would have found anything," Sutton said. "We've been 70 years in Carmel and have a pretty good reputation."

As soon as he received the letter, Sutton said he contacted city administrator Rich Guillen and asked him to correct the error with the health department.

He suspects the mistake occurred when Meroney saw greasy water in the gutter in front of the San Carlos Street market and assumed it was generated by Nielsen's. Sutton said night crews cleaning nearby restaurants were probably responsible for the mess and pointed out that the market's drain leads to Seventh Avenue, not San Carlos.

"The health department comes two or three times a year," Sutton said. "And I've never had any problem with grease."

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

Johnson and reserve officer Tim Meroney spied Salinas resident Raymond "Uncle Ray" Vasquez' car parked on Dolores Street, and moments later they discovered a broken window at The Tuck Box restaurant.

"We could hear movement in the kitchen inside the business, so we set up a perimeter, and the sheriff's office responded as well," Johnson said. "We kept calling him and calling him."

Vasquez wouldn't come out, so police requested a K-9 from Salinas, but the man emerged five minutes later, before the dog arrived.

"He had some cash as well as a lot of change, which had been stolen from the register at Em Le's," Johnson said. Police charged Vasquez with two counts of burglary and may finger him in the attempted break-in at Merlot. Johnson said

he might also be responsible for a similar incident in the sheriff's jurisdiction.

"The fact that he was intoxicated probably factored into it," Johnson said.

Just before midnight, Johnson and officer Jeff Watkins arrested Philip and Morgan Borup following a reported drunken altercation and foot pursuit that led into a crowded bar.

"We were driving down

the street, and there were cars parked in the road," Johnson said. "When we got closer, we could hear people yelling, and it sounded like a fight."

A man told police Philip Borup had slapped him, and the suspect took off running from Dolores Street, through a walkway and into the crowded Hog's Breath Inn, according to Johnson. "By the time we caught up to him, he was grabbing patrons and pushing them in front of us," he said.

They arrested Borup for battery, fighting in public, resisting arrest and public intoxication, and while placing him in their squad car, Johnson said they heard a window break in a nearby alley.

"Witnesses said his sister smashed it, because she was so upset because we were arresting her brother," he said. "She said she threw her body against it." Morgan Borup, 22, was cited for vandalism and released. The Borups are from Carmel but have been away at school, according to Johnson.

On Tuesday, the aquarium announced it has Australian spotted jellies, or Phyllorhiza punctata, and the rarely-seen Leucothea pul*chra*, a type of comb jelly found in Monterey Bay, in its "Jellies: Living Art" exhibit.

"It's one of the most beautiful things you will see on earth," aquarium spokesman Ken Peterson said of the jellies. "It looks like something you would see at Tiffany's."

The display marks just the second time anywhere in the world the Leucothea pulchra species has been shown outside the wild, Peterson said. They were first displayed by the aquarium in 2002.

The Leucothea pulchra, Latin for "beautiful white spectacle," is a shallow-water species found only during late fall and winter between Central California and the Sea of Cortez.

Australian spotted jellies are new to "Jellies: Living Art" exhibit at the Monterey Bay Aquariumc



"They're incredibly beautiful, incredibly complex and incredibly fragile," said Matsumoto, who studied the species for his Ph.D. thesis.

> The colorful jelly creates flashing patterns of rainbow light when white light is diffracted as it passes through its pulsing ctene-rows, which help it move through water.

"It's the only ctenophore (comb jelly) to travel using jet propulsion, and the only one that can fly underwater," he said. "They can curl their oral lobes and squirt water between them at very high velocity."

The Australian spotted jellies have a striking pale sapphire bell patterned with tiny silvery-white dots, Peterson said.

The Australian jellies, unlike the comb jellies that were found in the wild, were raised by staff biologists from animals sent to the aquarium by Zoo-Aquarium Berlin.

The Monterey Bay Aquarium also has thousands of silvery anchovies in its three-story Kelp Forest exhibit, and in an abovehead, 15,000-gallon oval exhibit at the entrance to the Outer Bay Galleries.

more than 20.

"That's testimony to how he conducted

business," Glidden said. "We all knew him and respected him."

Mr. Cope visited Carmel every week. Staying at his Pebble Beach home on the 2nd Hole at Cypress Point, he would eat lunch at La Playa on Thursdays and bring family and friends to dine during the weekend.

"He wasn't checking on us but was proud enough to frequent the place," Glidden said.

Mr. Cope's fascination with history inspired him to decorate La Playa Hotel with maps, memorabilia and other Monterey Peninsula artifacts.

'The reason all those old gems are there is my father was really an Old West aficionado," said John Cope, who works in the family business. "He was very knowledgeable about it."

The Firehouse Restaurant, which Newton Cope opened 45 years ago in a circa-1853 Sacramento fire station and owned until 1999, had Wyatt Earp's gun and plenty of antique firefighting equipment in its collection. The Huntington Hotel showcases the history of San Francisco, and especially of the Big Four railroad barons (Leland Stanford, Mark Hopkins, Charles Crocker and Colis Huntington).

In 1967, Cope's Nob Hill Properties opened Tra Vigne restaurant in St. Helena. Later, it grew to include several San Francisco and Napa properties as well as the Carmel lodgings. He became president of the company in 1976 and was chairman of the board at the time of his death.

John Cope said family ties to Carmel motivated his father to buy La Playa in 1982 and Cottages-by-the-Sea, which other would-be purchasers wanted to demolish, in 1990. His first in-laws, J.J. and Marge Jacobs, lived on San Antonio Avenue. Mr. Cope married their daughter, Marilyn, in 1945; they divorced in 1967.

#### **Crash landing**

Born in Bakersfield in April 1922, Mr. Cope moved to Sacramento with his family shortly after the death of his father in 1932. He attended UC Berkeley and in 1942 entered the Army Air Force to become a pilot instructor. In 1950, as a captain in the Air Force Reserve, he was called up for the Korean War.

During a training exercise at McClellan Air Force Base in Sacramento in April 1951, an engine stalled, forcing him to crash land on the golf course at Del Paso Country Club.

Monterey Peninsula auto dealership owner Don Butts, who knew Mr. Cope 25 years, said he was a prankster who found himself on the receiving end of a practical joke following that accident.

The PBCSD serves users within the Del

Monte Forest area (a local area plan component of the Monterey County General Plan). The CAWD / PBCSD / Pebble Beach Company Recycled Water Project was constructed and began operation in 1994 and has resulted in reduced potable water use; however, the use of recycled water resulted in damage to the turf grass at the golf courses due to the high concentrations of sodium and other salts in the existing recycled water supply. To prevent that damage, the turf must be flushed with potable water to reduce the salt buildup. The primary purpose of the project is to meet the irrigation requirements of the golf courses and other open spaces in the Del Monte Forest by providing a high quality recycled water supply sufficient to eliminate the need for potable water use on the golf courses except in case of emergencies. The

- project would involve minor physical changes to the CAWD plant, including the following: • installation of microfiltration and reverse osmosis systems within a new two story buildwith a footprint not to exceed 10,000 square feet, with the first floor enclosed by walls and second floor open with a canopy cover,
  - trenching for and installation of new pipelines, and
  - changes to the treatment processes inside the existing facility buildings.

PROJECT LOCATION: The Project site is located within the County of Monterey, California The approximately 8-acre CAWD WWTP site is located south of the Carmel River and the Carmel Mission, and west of Highway 1.

# ADA the way it should be

FEARING THEY'D be targeted by the big city newspapers, where shallow journalism is much more common than it should be, legislators in Sacramento and Washington chickened out when it came to reforming state and federal handicapped accessibility laws. After years of inaction at the capitols, it seems obvious now that nothing will ever be done by the legislative branch to give owners of existing buildings a clue as to what they have to do to protect themselves from being held up at the courthouse.

Fortunately, a handful of federal judges figured out a way to stop the worst abusers of the ADA lawsuit mill. Numerous suits have been tossed out of court, with the most hopeful sign of all being the effort waged by U.S. District Court judges Edward Rafeedie and Stephen Wilson. In similar cases last summer, they ruled serial litigator Edward Molski couldn't sue businesses where he had been a one-time customer. Only restaurants, wineries and retail stores where he was a regular patron — or which were close enough to his home or office to make it likely he would be a legitimate customer — could be sued by him for alleged handicapped access violations.

Molski was a self-appointed ADA enforcement squad, traveling up and down the state, dropping in on businesses here and there, looking for the slightest violation of state or federal laws — something that's very easy to find, considering the complexity and ambiguity of the statutes in question. He filed more than 400 ADA lawsuits, profited very handsomely from the venture, and wasn't a bit ashamed of it. But since he was declared a vexatious litigant by Rafeedie in December 2004, he's filed no new suits.

We can only hope that an appeals court won't allow Molski to restart his corrupt venture. If the trial judges' rulings are allowed to stand, a bit of common sense will be restored to the question of handicapped accessibility by making it primarily a local issue. Disabled persons with legitimate complaints about ADA access at business in their own towns will still have a venue where their concerns can be addressed. But in most cases, knowing how controversial it can be to file a suit against one's neighbor, they'll only turn to the courthouse if their complaints are ignored when raised with the business owners themselves or at city hall. In other words, filing a lawsuit will be a last resort, not an opening, moneymaking gambit.

And that's the way it should be.

# How old?

UNLESS IT was the setting for an event of epic proportions, there is no way a building can be historic when it is just 34 years old. Fans of the former bank building at Dolores and Seventh may have perfectly good reasons to like the place. It may even be perfectly sensible to love it. But the building can in no way be considered historic and does not qualify for mandatory protection by the city's preservation ordinances. And, unfortunately for the building's defenders, the attachment a few citizens may feel for a new building has not (yet) been deemed a justification to pass a law requiring the owner to leave it alone. Therefore, there is only one recourse for the people who don't want to see the bank building torn down and replaced with stores and apartments: Buy it and invoke their rights as its owners to make sure it is kept just the way they like it.

# Democracy thwarted indeed Dear Editor,

The editor is quite right to point out that we have a court system to ensure that our constitution is being upheld (Nov. 18). But courts do more than that. They also determine whether laws have been broken. That's the reason the City of Carmel is being taken to court. To determine whether the city council broke the law by moving to sell Mission Trail parkland including the Flanders Mansion without a vote by the people. State law clearly requires that any sale of parkland has to be approved by popular vote. And that is where democracy has indeed been thwarted — not by any court — but by our very own city council.

It appears that the city council was quite aware of this issue and concluded that it might not win a popular vote. It's likely that the council rightfully concluded that a majority of Carmelites might not want the heart of its largest park removed from public use, and that they might not favor selling parklands for short-term financial gain. That's why it declared — against its own original EIR and against the vote of its own planning commission — that the land it was trying to sell was really not parkland at all. To most of us who have walked the park over the years, that seems a bit far fetched. It will

also be of great interest to the judge. After all, the piece of land in question lies in the heart of the park and was zoned as parkland shortly after it was incorporated into the Mission Trail park in the '70's. Since the only reason to declare that all of a sudden it is no longer parkland is to avoid a vote by the people, it is this action — above all — that will make the judge suspicious.

The courts now have to review whether the city has indeed broken the law. As residents, voters, and as the local watchdog newspaper, we should welcome that review. After all, I am sure we can all agree that the fact that the current city council was elected by a majority of Carmelites does not mean that a majority of Carmelites would condone that the council break the law.

The council could easily have prevented this lawsuit if it had followed its own land use laws and policies as well as state laws and simply gone to the voters to ask for approval of the sale. The process is simple and the result very powerful. In fact, the council can still do that. The decisions it has made on the sale of Mission Trail parkland are not irreversible yet. Once the sale proceeds, however, it cannot be undone.

Is the woman who sued Pacific Grove really doing this to help other handicapped people? Is she donating the money she has received to charity? Is her attorney donating


part of his proceeds to charity?
