

International bike race headed for Big Sur

IMAGINE A local sporting event as big as the Super Bowl or the World Series. It isn't as far-fetched as it might seem. Organizers of a Tour de France-style bicycle race they are calling the Amgen Tour of California predict it "will become one of the nation's largest and most recognized annual special events."

For the Monterey Peninsula business community, the Feb. 19-26 race promises to be another off-season boon to the local economy. But when race volunteers gave a presentation on the event at the Dec. 9 Big Sur Multi-Agency Council meeting, they received a lukewarm reception.

The biggest concern some Big Sur residents have about the race is that it will attract more bicyclists to a stretch of asphalt with bicycle lanes ranging from narrow to nonexistent.

"It's very, very unsafe," explained Jeannie Ford, a longtime Big Sur resident. "A couple of times every month, I see a situation that's extremely dangerous for a bicyclist."

Unsafe, but appealing

For 70 miles, Highway 1 twists and turns along the western edge of the Santa Lucia mountains, offering motorists a bounty of jaw-dropping vistas and heart-pounding blind curves. Stan Russell, Big Sur Chamber of Commerce board member and web master, agreed the highway is unsafe, but he understands its appeal to cyclists.

"The highway is treacherous," Russell said. "And I

LAFCO says no to incorporation EIR, faces litigation threat

I ESTIFYING BEFORE the Local Agency Formation Commission Dec. 14, Carmel Valley incorporation proponent Max Chaplin called his group's argument against the requirement of an environmental impact report a "slam dunk." And with as much unambiguity as Shaquille O'Neal driving for the hoop, the commission unanimously agreed, tossing aside a legal threat by opponents.

"There has to be a fair argument that this project will impact the environment," insisted commissioner Anne McGowan. "Just because there is public controversy is not a reason to require an EIR."

About 70 people attended the meeting, which featured impassioned testimony from both sides. Proponents cheered after 14-year-old Julia Robinson pleaded with commissioners to not allow any more delays in asking the people of Carmel Valley if they want to be a town.

"I was 8 when the incorporation process began," said the daughter of high-profile proponent and Carmel Valley Association president Glenn Robinson. "I have been living it for nearly half my life. I would like to see the process completed before I go off to college. At this rate, there will be a functioning democracy in Iraq before there is one in Carmel Valley."

Laughter and tension

While Robinson's testimony drew laughter and applause, the tension between the two sides was apparent throughout the hearing.

Proponents accused the opposition of simply using the California Environmental Quality Act to stall the incorporation drive.

"There is no expert opinion calling for an EIR," said Glenn Robinson. "There is a small group of hardcore opponents trying to keep the issue from coming before the voters and seeking to thwart democracy."

Lauren Samuels, an opponent, suggested litigation as an alternative to requiring an EIR.

"We have our attorneys, and they will sue," Samuels said. "It will be costly for LAFCO."

LAFCO chair Lou Calcagno asked counsel Dennis LeClere how litigation would affect the incorporation process. LeClere responded that proponents could expect up to a one-year delay.

General plan opposition

In August 2003, the Carmel Art Board recommended the planning commission OK the pedestalmounted, 14inch-tall sculpture designed by Jo Davidson, but commissioners said in May 2004 that the Tor House Foundation should first confer with the garden club to incorporate the piece into the redesign.

into the redesign. Garden club members voted the sculpture created many of his well-known works here.

"A world famous poet lived from 1914 to 1962 in Carmel and was so transformed by the natural beauty of this area that he [was inspired to write] powerful poetry," Tor House docent John Courtney said, adding that the library contains an incomparable collection of Jeffers' writings.

"The argument that others might claim to deserve equal memorialization in Carmel would be akin to Stratford on Avon saying they shouldn't memorialize Shakespeare," commented Alex Vardamis, president of the Tor House Foundation.

'No approval or denial authority'

Former Carmel Mayor Jean Grace called Jeffers "the poet of California" and noted his works have been translated into many foreign languages.

She also said the garden club should have no say in whether the sculpture is installed.

"My recollection was we asked them to work together," chairman Bill Strid said. "Certainly the garden club does not have any approval or denial authority here."

A DIVERSE coalition is getting ready to campaign against the Community General Plan initiative, which coalition organizers say doesn't represent the county's best interests.

The group, Plan for the People, was formed to oppose the the LandWatch Monterey County-led general plan amendment.

"You will see much, much more of us," said Jay Brown, a rancher and the group's co-chairman. "It will be after Christmas when the battle heats up."

Members include the Monterey County Farm Bureau, Common Ground Monterey County, The Center for

Son's search for his parents leads him back to Carmel

Two pieces of paper represent Robert Greenspan's link to a past he never knew. And that pair of documents a birth certificate dated June 6, 1967, and a handwritten note scrawled with only vague physical descriptions of his natural parents — lead to more questions than answers.

Greenspan was adopted by a Santa Clara couple just weeks after his birth and has no recollection of his natural parents. But the one thing he does know is the name of his

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hometown. His birth certificate indicates he was born at "Community Hospital" on the "Pacific Grove Highway" in Carmel.

Greenspan recently contacted The Pine Cone for assistance in the search for his parents, who presumably lived on the Monterey Peninsula in the late '60s.

"I always wanted to find out about my background," said Greenspan, who lives in Rapid City, S.D., with his wife of three years, Heather, and two daughters: Megan, who is 3, and Hailee, who turns 2 in February. He also has 17-year-old daughter and a 14-year-old son who live in Alabama with his first wife.

"There was always this connection between my brother and my sister," said Greenspan of his desire to track down his parents. "They're the natural kids of my adopted parents. They have dark hair, and I was this towheaded kid who stuck out in my family."

Greenspan began his quest to find his parents in 1997.

"I've done a lot of research on my own," he said. "I have done just about everything I can do online, but all of it has pretty much ended up in dead ends."

He even managed to track down the physician who signed

"Unfortunately, he told me, 'I can't even remember what I had for breakfast, much less what happened 40 years ago," Greenspan said.

In addition to the birth certificate, the handwritten note offers physical descriptions of his parents. Each was a high school graduate, his mother was about 5 feet 5 inches tall



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Firstly, for furniture to fit the definition of "High Quality" you have to consider how well the design has been executed. What I mean by that is, are there elements in the design that have been accomplished in a way that cuts manufacturing cost at the expense of aesthetics. For example, in the Winsome sleigh bed design the foot and head boards follow the profile of the scrolls that create the Sleigh Form. We take great pains to accomplish the curvatures of our panels. Numerous hours of sanding and hand shaping are required to create these fluid shapes out of what was once flat square wood planks.

Craftsmanship

Beauty is truly only skin deep, and all the beautiful wood in the world will not guarantee a piece of furniture is truly "High Quality". For this reason, the third most significant issue in creating fine furniture is using the right joinery methods for every aspect of assembly. Without question, dovetail joinery in drawer construction is the first feature to look for when looking for quality. However, don't stop there. Also look at the drawer body thickness for both the sides and bottom. The sides should range from 1/2" thick on drawers 12" or smaller, and 5/8" thick on larger drawers. Drawer bottoms should be 1/2" thick, 7-layer veneer core ply. No particle board or MDF (medium density fiber board). The other joint important in drawer construction is how the drawer bottom is fixed to the sides. It should be "Dado" into the sides so that being pushed down by weight won't ever cause the bottom to drop out (If only the stock market could learn that one). Also, the drawer guide should be determined by the use of the drawer. In some cases wood side mounted guides work great and are aesthetically attractive, especially in small cubby drawers in desk and armoire pieces. In other cases, using high quality German or Swiss made mechanical guides may be a better choice. These mechanical guides can allow for full extension and can carry loads far more smoothly than wood guides.

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Wood Selection

Next, wood selection is critical. At Exquisite Designs our buyers travel the world to search out the very best woods and exotic veneers available, and of course all our materials come from managed forest growth suppliers. Searching out materials with exemplary grain figure which enables us to produce work that has a rich and luxurious look throughout. We don't have to work around flaws in materials since we acquire near perfect wood to begin with. In addition to grain figure, color is equally important. Typically grain color changes drastically from the outer layers of the tree trunk, otherwise known as sap wood, to the interior areas known as the heartwood. The heartwood is far more consistent in color and does not require staining or dying to match it to other boards. The reason stains or dyes should be avoided (if possible), is they tend to fade or change with time varying by several shades in severe cases, especially when exposed to sun light, direct or indirect.


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

Man accused of shooting at woman who followed him home

A 62-YEAR-OLD Carmel Valley Road resident was arrested Dec. 8 for allegedly firing his pistol at a woman after the two were involved in a minor traffic accident, according to Monterey County Sheriff's Sgt. John DiCarlo.

Eugene Bradley's Jeep collided with Jana Apaydin's Cadillac where Carmel Valley Road's two lanes merge into one just east of Via Mallorca, DiCarlo said, but the damage was minor, and he kept driving. She flashed her lights to get his attention, hoping he

would stop so they could exchange information. But he didn't, so she followed him a quarter mile up a dirt road.

"He stopped, and she stopped and got out and asked him why he didn't stop," DiCarlo said. "She said he pulled a pistol from underneath his seat, pointed it at her - he was within five feet of her — and told her to leave or he was going to kill her."

Reportedly fearing for her life, she fled down the road in her car, hearing the two shots as she drove away, according to DiCarlo. Neither hit her car.

After interviewing Apaydin at her home, deputies arrived at Bradley's residence to question him. They confiscated a Browning Buck Mark .22-caliber long rifle pistol as evidence and arrested him for attempted murder, brandishing a weapon and discharging a firearm. They took Bradley to Monterey County Jail.

"I don't know what the D.A. will file,"

DiCarlo said. "It depends on intent --whether he was trying to shoot her or fire off the side to scare her — and that's part of the investigation."

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
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School board forced to solicit architects for \$21.5M bond work

CARMEL UNIFIED School District board members believed they were in the clear last month when they voted to hire the Monterey architectural firm of Wald, Ruhnke & Dost to handle projects covered by the \$21.5 million bond approved in November. But because the bond only needed 55 percent approval to pass, the district must request proposals from qualified architects and then select the best firm for the job, they were told this week.

Director of business services Judy Long outlined the process, which will begin with a request for proposals from local architectural firms with "significant experience in the design of school facilities."

Long said the board could appoint one of its members to join her, superintendent Marvin Biasotti and operations manager Dan Paul in scrutinizing the proposals. Trustee Ernie Lostrom, who last month argued strongly for hiring Wald, Ruhnke & Dost, said he would help.

But the district will not seek proposals from construction management firms. Instead, an in-house "construction oversight team" comprising Long, Paul, quality control inspector Cameron Edwards, contract administrator Maureen Oliver and network administrator Calvin Mitchell will keep the projects on track and interested parties informed.

Five years ago, voters approved a \$20 million bond. In the interim, the school board and its staff have learned a lot about planning and building, according to Long.

"We propose a team within the district that can handle construction oversight," she said.

No members of the public commented on either matter, though John Biason of BMR Construction Management, Inc., in Carmel later told The Pine Cone he thought the district should request proposals from firms like his.

"Wouldn't they want to get the best deal they can and the best work they can?" asked Biason, a general contractor. BMR's other principals are architect Brian Rasmussen and Kent Munro, quality control inspector, estimator and sched-

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uler. "We've all been in this business for many, many, many years and know this area."

According to law, the school board must also appoint a citizens oversight committee to monitor how bond funds are spent. Board members have discussed the various groups that should be represented, including businesses, seniors, taxpayers, parents and guardians, and the general public, but they have yet to find the individuals to serve.



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Ambulance service gives best bang for \$377,289, council decides

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City of Carmel and the Carmel Valley fire district — will continue to receive city money through June 30, 2006, the city council decided Dec. 6 when it voted to pay the rest of its \$377,289 subsidy for this year.

But council members asked city administrator Rich Guillen to examine the ever-rising costs of the ambulance and research other options.

They briefly discussed contracting with the county's new ambulance service provider, Westmed, or operating a cityowned ambulance. Both would use city-paid workers (Westmed would provide the equipment and administrative services, but not the employees) and would cost more than CRFA, according to city administrator Rich Guillen. He estimated the Westmed arrangement would cost \$484,320 and the Carmel ambulance would cost \$583,012.

"Ambulance service is expensive," he said. "Is CRFA providing the best service for the price you're paying, or is there a better way to do that?"

Councilman Gerard Rose, who for six years has represented the city on the CRFA board, made an impassioned argument for keeping the jointly run agency intact.

"Does it serve people well? Yes. Is it a good deal? Yes," he said.

During an emergency, a CRFA ambulance often arrives on scene in town in less than a minute and averages three to four minutes, according to valley fire chief Sidney Reade. Occasionally, it takes as long as eight minutes, because the ambulance might be on another call.



Distressed to hear the ambulance stationed at Carmel Fire Department downtown ever takes longer than three minutes, Mayor Sue McCloud said the council has assured its constituents of low response times, but Reade said ambulances are constantly on the move.

"There is no way to always guarantee the next ambulance will be there in three minutes," she said. For example, the ambulance stationed at the Carmel firehouse sometimes picks up patients in Pebble Beach when the county's ambulances are farther away.

Stay, or 'cut and run'?

Councilman Mike Cunningham said CRFA undoubtedly provides good service, but financial questions need answering. He did not favor a Westmed contract or a city-run ambulance.

"We had this discussion in August because we had the feeling it was costing the taxpayers of the City of Carmel more than was right, and it was heading upward," he said.

Cunningham pointed to the greatest expenses — salaries and write-offs because Medicare won't pay CRFA's prices and wondered if Carmel Valley Fire should pay a bigger share. According to the most recent preliminary budget for 2005/2006, Carmel pays 77 percent of the personnel expenses, or \$656,073, while CVFPD pays 23 percent, or \$205,637. (Most of the staff on the Carmel Valley ambulances are also firefighters whose salaries are covered by the fire department's budget, according to Reade.) The city covers \$156,261 in write-offs; C.V. pays \$53,240.

Community Advocacy, the Monterey County Cattlemen's/Women's Association and a host of others, Brown said.

"It's time for the community to come together and decide on a plan that benefits the entire community," said Tom Carvey, executive director of Common Ground. "And not just a few folks who can gather \$400,000."

Plan for the People has criticized the Community General Plan — a 79-page alternative to the plan being worked on by county supervisors — on several key points.

The group is currently working on a detailed analysis of the LandWatch plan that will scrutinize its policies on housing, land use and other issues, Brown said.

But Plan for the People might have some catching up to do, since LandWatch announced last week it had raised more than enough signatures to place its general plan amendment on the June ballot. The Community General Plan committee has also raised hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The LandWatch plan would ban subdivisions — including those offering affordable housing — in the unincorporated areas of the Monterey Peninsula except for five small areas, and it would require a vote of the people, a time-consuming and costly process, for significant general plan amendments.

With the LandWatch plan, "if I wanted to have a house and create a parcel," Brown said, "I would literally have to go to the entire county for a vote, which would cost probably a half million dollars."

Plan for the People was formed months ago, but the coalition has remained under the radar until now. "We are going to be more public and make a stand," Brown said.

The group had several meetings in November and December to discuss ways to fight the initiative, including

press conferences and public outreach, Brown said.

Alfred Diaz-Infante, president of Community Housing Improvement Systems and Planning Association, Inc., a lowincome housing developer, said he's going to do all he can to educate people about what he says are the ills of the LandWatch plan.

Diaz-Infante contends the LandWatch plan would make it nearly impossible for CHISPA to provide affordable housing since it would require a public vote for most new developments, something CHISPA couldn't afford.

LandWatch collected nearly 16,000 signatures, far more than the roughly 9,000 it needed to place its general plan on the ballot. But Carvey and other critics contend most people didn't read the lengthy document and probably didn't really know what they were signing. "People were signing it because they were told it would create affordable housing and save farmland," Carvey said. "That's a great selling technique, but LandWatch doesn't have a record of providing any of that."


While the LandWatch general plan might seem appealing to some voters on the Peninsula, Brown said, it's a wolf in sheep's clothing.

"Salinas voters basically could vote on issues detrimental to the Peninsula, and vice versa," he said.

For example, the LandWatch plan would prohibit Rancho Cañada Village, a development that would offer 140 affordable homes in Carmel Valley. Despite that, voters in Prunedale, King City and every other area of the county could cast their vote on the issue.

County supervisor Dave Potter, who represents the Monterey Peninsula and is a signatory of the initiative, has drawn criticism from three supervisors who oppose the initiative. And last week, Jyl Lutes, a Salinas city councilwoman and signatory of the LandWatch plan, expressed doubts about it.









"A 'furnishing' is an accessory or article of dress, an object that increases comfort or utility. It seems to me the unifying theme here, European or not, is women's furnishings. Saying he was playing devil's advocate, commissioner Alan Hewer wondered if Anthropologie's theme was too broad.

"Will this cause us trouble in the future, because we can call it 'men's furnishings' or 'women's furnishings,' and anything could fall into that?" he asked, adding that Costco or Sears could claim a family-oriented category

But Talmage said Anthropologie sells

unique items that set it apart from big-box businesses. According to the store's website, it has carried "one-of-a-kind hand-beaded and dip-dyed vintage cashmere cardigans; sandals hand-built from the wooden heels up with vintage tie material and embroidered buttons; and the first quilt ever printed with 100 hand-cut blocks by artisans in Jaipur, India.

"What we're trying to do is protect the community against someone who may be in the same categories but not have the creative, one-of-a-kind items," Strid said.

The commission voted unanimously to grant Anthropologie's use permit to open in the space previously occupied by Saks Fifth Avenue and the store presently rented by Ann Taylor at the south end of the Plaza. It will

not become final until commissioners adopt findings and conditions next month.


Facade changes

Anthropologie also asked for permission to install a metal sign and resurface part of its storefront with plaster stained light blue. Schmidt said metal signs don't fit in Carmel and suggested a natural material, such as wood. And though the shade of blue is allowed under the Plaza's design scheme, he suggested a shade of brown to better blend with neighboring shops.

Commissioners agreed the sign should be wood but decided to let the store have blue plaster, as long as a little more grav was added to the tone.

"The idea for that area is not to have everything exactly the same," Strid said.

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Big Sur Catahoula hound survives terrifying mountain lion attack

IT WAS just past midnight on a foggy Halloween morning when longtime Big Sur resident Peter Harding heard a terrible shrill pierce the silence hanging over his garden. He was immediately struck by the implications of the sound.

"It was the sound of an animal being consumed alive," explained Harding, who twice previously had witnessed a

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coyote attacking its prey.

Suddenly his thoughts turned to his 4-year-old female Catahoula hound, Shady, who had accompanied him on an early morning stroll through his garden.

"As I listened, I began to hear vocal tones that sounded like Shady's," recalled Harding, who has lived in Big Sur for 35 years. "I hurried up my driveway, seizing a 2-and-a-halffoot piece of PVC pipe with a T-joint on the end."

Harding's oceanfront property, which is located just north of the Esalen Institute, is adjacent to Highway 1. When he reached the end of his driveway with his makeshift weapon, he turned to his left and gasped.


"I stepped out of my gate, and about 20 feet to the north, on the shoulder of the road, was an obviously surprised adult mountain lion," said Harding, who estimated the cat was 8 feet in length, including its tail. "The lion was lying flat to the ground with Shady's head in its mouth."

Harding's and the lion's eyes met.

"Its eyes were illuminated amber orbs glowing back at my flashlight," he remembered. "It was truly a beautiful cat."

Fueled by adrenaline, Harding charged the mountain lion. While a piece of PVC pipe probably isn't the best weapon Harding could have had, it proved to be remarkably effective. His first blow smacked the lion in the head.




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
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Cal Am trial over Seaside basin water rights resumes Monday

A TRIAL over who has water rights to the Seaside basin will resume Monday in a Marina courtroom.

California American Water Co. in 2003 sued Monterey, Seaside, Sand City and Del Rey Oaks over how much water will be pumped from the basin and who will control it

Steve Leonard, Cal Am's vice president, testified Dec. 13 that the company's proposed desalination plant in Moss Landing which would provide a drought-free water source for the Monterey Peninsula — is behind schedule.

"As a second whack connected, I saw Shady had escaped and was running down the hill toward my house," he recounted.

So that left just Harding and the lion facing each other. The man growled, swung his PVC pipe and tried blinding the lion with his flashlight. Evidently, that was more than the cat cared to deal with. It slunk off into the night.

When Harding got back to his house,

Leonard said it has lagged since Duke announced it was selling the Moss Landing power plant, the site of the proposed desal plant.

In 1995 the state ordered Cal Am to pump more water from the Seaside basin as an alternative to pumping from the Carmel River, which the state said Cal Am didn't have the right to do.

Cal Am and the other cities believe they can pump from the basin for another seven years before the basin experiences saltwater intrusion. But the county and the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District contend pumping should be reduced immediately.

Shady was waiting for him.

"Her head was a bloody mess," he explained. "She had been bitten four times and had 16 holes in her head. One bite cracked her skull," said Harding. "She almost lost an eye, but she's fine now. She's a survivor." Veterinarian bills were about \$3,000, he said.

The mountain lion was the first Harding had ever seen, and the attack set him on edge. "I had about two days of acute post traumatic stress disorder, fearing the dark like I never had before," he admitted. "I'm still a little bit nervous going out at night."



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
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Oceanfront property remains condemned, drawing frustration from neighbors

THREE MONTHS after a 97-year-old Pacific Grove woman was taken from her oceanfront home because of squalid living conditions, her property remains condemned.

Lillian King was removed from her house Sept. 16 after police officers found her living in deplorable conditions, which included trash piled to the ceiling.

"The neighbors have complained to me they are disappointed the clean up effort is going very slowly," said Carl Miller, Pacific Grove's police chief. "It's definitely in a holding pattern right now."

The Monterey County Health Department red-tagged the home, on the 200 block of Asilomar Boulevard, prohibiting anyone from staying there until it was deemed livable.

But the 3-plus-acre property, nestled among a string of homes facing Asilomar State Beach, remains untenable and is still cluttered with trash, debris and an old car.

"Normally the property owner will say, 'We've made corrections and we want to move back in the house," said Morris Wolford, senior environmental health specialist with the county's health department.

But King nor her attorney, Robert Rosenthal, have contacted the health department for a re-inspection of the home, Wolford said, so the property remains redtagged.

Rosenthal, whom police said is handling King's business affairs, didn't return phone messages left by the Pine Cone.

Jon Biggs, the city's community development director, said apart from a few building code violations that need to be remedied, there is nothing more the city requires to make the place tenable. So far, his department hasn't received any formal complaints about the appearance of the property, Biggs said.

But Miller said the city has options if the property isn't eventually cleaned.

"In a worst-case scenario," Miller said, "if the city deems the property is a public nuisance or a health hazard, it could direct the cleanup and bill the property owner. And if they don't pay for it, they could put a lien on the property.'

Police discovered King's living conditions after the department's SWAT team had gone to the home looking for drugs. They

found a small amount of marijuana, which did not belong to King, police said.

That same day, the county's adult protective services took King into custody, the first time the agency had been to the home, contrary to earlier reports by neighbors. King was deemed mentally competent and left the agency's custody shortly after.

Also unresolved is whether King's grand niece, Cynthia Hurley, will face elder neglect charges as a result of King's living conditions. Hurley lived on the property in a ramshackle adobe, also condemned for violating city code for poor electrical wiring, city officials said.

The Monterey County District Attorney's Office reviewed the results of a police investigation but sent the case back for further inquiry, said police Sgt. Cameron White.

King is living with Hurley at another one of King's homes in Pacific Grove, White said.

King nor Hurley could be reached for comment, but neighbors described Hurley as friendly and said they believed she had good intentions of caring for King.



"It's the longest stage of the race," Martin said. But he described it as "not that difficult" because Big Sur's hills are not as steep as other parts of the race.



P.G. code only allows alcohol to be consumed in an establishment that serves food, which means free-standing bars and wine tasting shops are not allowed.

"It's a huge deal for the last dry town to allow wine sales without food," said Moe Ammar, president of the chamber of commerce.

The city's economic advisory committee will ask the council Dec. 21 to amend the municipal code to allow alcohol to be sold and consumed in businesses that are not "bona fide eating places.'

Ammar said the decision to approach the council came after two wineries told him they wanted to open tasting rooms in the American Tin Cannery shopping center, which is across the street from the Monterey Bay Aquarium.

"I have not spoken to a single person who has been opposed to the idea," he said.

Pacific Grove was the last dry town in the state until 1969

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





NEW HOME SALES

As you probably know, there is a report on the sales of existing homes and the sales of new homes released every month. You wouldn't expect them to differ very much, but their numbers are



often far apart. How can that be? And which report should we believe if we're told that the number of existing homes sold last month rose by 3% but the number of new homes sold fell by 16%?

For its report on existing home sales, the National Association of Realtors® compiles a huge amount of data regarding home sale closings. For new home sales, the U.S. Bureau of Census gathers the numbers and crunches them with its own formulae. Be aware that the data is modified based on seasonal adjustments (because more homes get sold in August, generally, than in October, for example), and each organization handles this fact in its own way.

Further, the Bureau of Census is gathering the data on contracts to purchase new homes, not on closed (or completed) sales. This makes a huge difference. As we have noted in another column, a report on closed sales tells us about the state of the market two to three months ago. A report on new contracts (or just-opened sales) tells us more about what is happening right now, and what is happening right now may differ sizably from what was happening three months past.

Be forewarned, too, that the New Home Sales report is notably volatile, and is subject to potentially large revisions over time. Though helpful as an indication of the state of the current market for new homes, its figures should always be taken with at least a small grain of salt, and we need always to watch for future revisions to today's data. The signature red kettle will also be strategically located to accept monetary donations during the open house, which will run 4 to 8 p.m.



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

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Chef Christopher Caul runs an eclectic kitchen

SO EBULLIENT was Executive Chef Christopher Caul while he was being interviewed Wednesday, it was difficult to believe he had undergone back surgery the previous week.

Those who know Chef Christopher well say he's always effervescent when talking about food — particularly the dishes he has created for Christopher's on Lincoln in Carmelby-the-Sea.

Terming his menu "eclectic," this former upstate New York chef sprinkles dishes that speak of Italy, Asia and Latin America throughout his otherwise American fare.

For example, he created "Rollotino Giuliano" in the mid-'90s when he was chef/proprietor of a small local favorite restaurant, Giuliano's, on San Carlos. (It is an appetizer favorite to this day, consisting of prosciutto, spinach, eggplant and gorgonzola cream rolled in a fresh pasta sheet.)

A Latin influence is evident another of his offerings: Grilled wild salmon tostado entrée with crisp tortilla, jicama slaw, and mango and black bean salsa.

And a regional Southern dish is exemplified in his fettuccine Louisiana with sautéed sea scallops, tasso ham, fresh

tomato, and a light lobster sauce.

Versatile in his culinary accomplishments, Chef Christopher has an extensive bi-coastal background which encompasses upstate New York and the Central Coast of California.

He was executive chef of Giuliano's from 1982 to 1988 but decided to return to New York, the native state of Chef Christopher and his wife, Catherine. They wanted their baby daughter to know her grandparents.

They stayed on the East Coast for five years, during which time Chef Christopher worked his culinary skills in Coldspring, N.Y., where he won Zagat raves and a Critics Choice Award for his Vintage Cafe which he later operated in tandem with North Street Grill in Fishbill.

But when he and his wife and daughter returned to Carmel Valley on vacation, they wondered why they had ever left. Deciding to return, Chef Christopher reopened Giuliano's, where he cooked for three years, until he was approached by the owners of The Post Ranch Inn, who convinced him to open the shortlived Zig Zag Cafe.

Following this, he was chef at the elegant Stonepine Resort in Carmel Valley for two years before signing on as consultant, kitchen and menu designer of Nonna Rose at Fisherman's Wharf in San Francisco. He stayed on as chef, commuting back and forth from Carmel Valley to the Bay Area until a son was born.

It was at this juncture in his culinary career that he opened the Corkscrew Cafe in Carmel Valley Village for the Georis family, managing the front of the house and subsequently running the kitchen as chef and doubling as general manager.

Three years later, in April 2004, he pur-



chased his own restaurant — the second in his career — naming it Christopher's on Lincoln. The property has seen three other restaurants come and go: the long-lived Sans Souci, and shorter-lived Lincoln Court and Wagner's.

He and Catherine changed the decor to be "more clubby." They had a cozy, four-seat, mahogany full bar installed where "Mojito Mojos," "Grape-Tinis," and "Hang Time Cosmos" are served, the latter made with Hanger One Vodka.

On the walls, giclée prints of artist Michael Flohr's paintings of restaurant



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scenes are hung, including the Buena Vista in San Francisco, Waldorf Astoria in Manhattan and the Auberge du Soleil in the Napa Valley.

The restaurant seats about 65 patrons, with a heated courtyard section for not-socold nights and for diners who like to be accompanied by their canines.

Chef Christopher considers his signature dishes to include crispy soft-shell crabs in season, butternut squash ravioli with brown butter and fresh sage, and Niman Ranch barbecued beef short ribs served with fresh horseradish, roasted garlic mashed potatoes and braised red cabbage.

Catherine Caul generally runs the front of the house, and sous chef Philippe Isidro, who worked alongside Chef Christopher at Giuliano's and the Corkscrew Cafe, is still at his side at Christopher's on Lincoln.

The restaurant is located between Fifth and Sixth avenues on Lincoln in Carmel-bythe-Sea, and opens nightly except Tuesdays at 5:30. Reservations can be made by calling (831) 626-8000.



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
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

T GETS a little bleak at 5 a.m.," Mike McKinley said. But considering he was talking about Bop 'til you Drop, the 25-hour music marathon to raise money for the free JazzMasters Workshop, even the bleak moments probably won't be all that bad.

The event begins at 7 p.m. Dec. 19 at the Carmel Youth Center and concludes at 8 the following evening, with many participants staying all night.

The kids take turns keeping the tunes going, but they get a little help, too. "All kinds of musicians and bands come in and volunteer their time," McKinley said. KSBW weatherman Jim Vanderzwaan, for example, is a mean drummer.

"It's a well-attended affair," McKinley said. After about 9 or 10 p.m., acoustical instruments will dominate to avoid raising the ire of the neighbors - which include police officers at the station next door.

"And then the next morning, we start again with the bands," McKinley said. Expected guests include the Magic 63 all-stars, Lee Durley, Bob Phillips and Dennis Murphy. Some groups travel from out of town to jam alongside the students.

Bop 'til you Drop marks the final fundraiser of the year for the free JazzMasters Workshop, which world-famous guitarist Bruce Forman founded at the youth center five years ago to unite curious kids and talented artists. JazzMasters instructors now lead workshops up and down the state, as well as in New York and Chicago.

"Our mission is to get together and have free music workshops for students that are mentored by professional musicians," said McKinley, a professional drummer and KRML broadcaster who also works as JazzMasters regional director for Central California.

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"We do five workshops [in Monterey County] a week for the kids," he said. In addition to the youth center, the workshops are held at the Boys & Girls clubs in Seaside and Salinas, and at Tularcitos and Captain Cooper schools.

"We provide the instruments and the instructors," said McKinley. "Some of those students have never even been close to an instrument before, and we have them jamming within minutes."



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Dorothy DeMass Berne, a long-term resident of Carmel, died here surrounded by family on October 27. She was 93. She grew up in Washington D.C., where she was born on June 26, 1912. She moved to Carmel in 1947 with her three children by a previous marriage, She married the psychiatrist and best-selling author of Games People Play, Eric Berne on Christmas eve. 1948. They lived in the house on Carpenter Street just south of Second which Eric had purchased the previous year and which would be Dorothy's home for the next 58 years. It was the oldest residential house in Carmel, built in 1888 by the surveyor hired to plot the new town. Dorothy and Eric had two sons. They divorced in 1962, and Dorothy dedicated herself to her five children, and to maintaining her large garden. She also worked as a counselor for the local chapter of Suicide Prevention for several years. 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
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

when residents voted to allow alcohol in the city. Municipal code section 23.64.290 states a business that serves alcohol must have a kitchen that serves "complete, hot meals."

Ammar said it's time the city change the zoning regulation so Pacific Grove can join other Peninsula cities in offering wine tasting, which he said would increase much-needed revenue for the Pacific Grove.

"Why shouldn't we be allowed to capture that market seg-



ment," he said.

There are several liquor stores in Pacific Grove, and there's even WineMarket, a shop that sells fine wine, but none are allowed to offer wine tasting.

Amrish Patel, owner of Centrella Inn in Pacific Grove and member of the economic advisory committee, said he often has guests interested in wine tasting and are surprised the city doesn't allow it.

"They typically go out of town, out of Pacific Grove for wine tasting," Patel said. "It would be nice for them to walk from the place they are staying."

He also believes wine tasting would be good for Pacific Grove's economy and would attract the type of clientele appropriate for the city.

"We need a place where people can hang out and have fun without the financial obligation of buying a meal," Ammar said. "It would be nice where people could just go and meet people, and I don't mean a singles place."

It's not yet been determined how much revenue a wine tasting business would bring to the city.

The process to change the city ordinance, if council members approve, could take months.

"The city council would probably end up referring it to the planning commission to study it, who would send it back to the council," Ammar said.

While Bohannan said children searching for missing parents represent only 1-to-2 percent of his business, he spends up to 40 percent of his time looking for missing people in general. He said a typical search will cost a client about \$500.

So how hard is it to find someone?

"A lot of it has to do with what kind of information you have to begin with," Bohannan explained. "I've had a pretty good success rate, up to 90 percent, when I have good information."

And what constitutes good information?

"Just give me an address," he said, "Give me a little something to hang my hat on."

Hesistant to give hope

Bohannan said he located the mother of a 52-year-old client by tracing her through a piece of property her parents owned in Washington state at the time he was born.

"I eventually found her in another state," he said.

Recently Bohannan located the parents of a man from the San Francisco Bay Area.

"He was born in Haight-Ashbury in 1964," he said. "He was a true love child. I found the mother on the West Coast and the father on the East Coast. He is now communicating with his mother."

So what advice can Bohannan offer Greenspan?

"Accumulate every piece of information you can find," the private investigator suggested. "Even if it doesn't seem significant."

Despite his successful track record, Bohannan is hesitant to give Greenspan too much hope.

'With so little information, it's difficult to find anyone," he said. "But I don't have a crystal ball. If I did, I'd figure out the next lottery numbers, and I'd be out of here."



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

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

Free speech for everybody

A CARMEL Highlands resident's vehement opposition to the Bush administration has made his property something of a local landmark. It's been decorated with "Exit Iraq" and similar banners for years. But his political voice was temporarily silenced by vandals last week.

According to a police report filed by 88-year-old World War II vet Bill Stewart, two signs calling for a U.S. pullout from Iraq were ripped from his fence overnight Dec. 5 — an act he called a "despicable" violation of his First Amendment rights.


It wasn't quite that. There's nothing in the Constitution itself about private individuals interfering in each other's speech. But destroying someone else's property certainly violates state laws. (If the perpetrators are caught, that is what they will be punished for.) More importantly, ripping down political signs is a violation of the deeply rooted American tradition of free public discourse on even the most controversial topics — a tradition that wasn't created here easily and doesn't exist in many countries.

In Saddam Hussein's Iraq, for example, a poster criticizing the dictator would have brought a nighttime visit from the secret police, who had the power to make not only the poster disappear, but its author, too. And it would all have been perfectly legal.

That changed when the U.S. military booted Saddam out of his palaces in early 2003. No longer is the government of that country in the business of telling its citizens what they are allowed to think or say. This week's election - with its hundreds of candidates freely representing dozens of political parties - proved that beyond any doubt.

In fact, according to reporters in Iraq, the country had been plastered with political posters and banners in the weeks before the election. And there have been lots of complaints all over Iraq of posters and signs being destroyed, not by the police, but by ordinary people who don't like the messages. While that vandalism is to be regretted, the fact that it can take place at all in an atmosphere of vigorous, public debate is something to be celebrated.

So while Bill Stewart may rightfully demand his right to express the opinion that our Army should be withdrawn from Iraq ASAP, surely even he recognizes that it was the presence of that very Army that has allowed the Iraqi people a bit

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Papers for Carmel council, mayor's race available Monday

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Carmel reads the Pine Cone.

THE FILING period for the City of Carmel's municipal election next April opens Monday, but no one has declared an intent to challenge any of the three incumbents.

Mayor Sue McCloud has announced she will seek a fourth term at the head of the dais. Threeterm council member Paula Hazdovac also said she plans to run again, and Gerard Rose, who was appointed in 2000 to finish McCloud's city council term and won his seat outright two years later, said he hopes to be reelected.

Prior to the last city election in April 2004, then-city councilman Dick Ely declared in November he would challenge McCloud in the race for mayor. But since the city council adopted a resolution in November declaring the election

would be held April 11, 2006, only a few rumors have surfaced, and the city received one letter from a San Francisco Bay Area resident who said he would give \$1 million to each person who voted for him.

Barbara Livingston, who lost the mayor's race to McCloud in 2002 and retired in 2004 after serving 12 years on the city council, commented this week, "There is great dissatisfaction among the loyal opposition, but so far no one I know has indicated a willingness to take on the incumbents."

The filing period for the mayor's race and two city council seats opens Monday, Dec. 19, and will close Friday, Jan. 13. Papers will be available at Carmel City Hall on Monte Verde Street between Ocean and Seventh avenues
