RUTH WOOD, who was 97 when she passed away Saturday, always seemed younger than her years, according to her famous son, Clint Eastwood.

"When I was growing up, a lot of times, people would say, 'Is that your older sister?" Eastwood recalled this week. "She always looked extremely youthful."

Vivacious, outspoken and an enthusiastic traveler, Mrs.

Eastwood's homes in Pebble Beach and Maui.

"We went to Hawaii four times a year, and it was always with a huge cast of characters — kids, grandkids, in-laws, you name it — and she thrived on it," said Eastwood's wife, Dina. "She was our matriarch, our queen."

According to friends and family, Mrs. Wood took great joy in having a superstar son who could walk her down the red carpet at the Academy Awards or introduce her to movie legends. But she wasn't pretentious about it.

# Council to homebuilders: Please hurry up

Annual permit fees may penalize projects that drag on for years

**K**EQUIRING PROPERTY owners to renew their building permits every year would encourage them to finish projects more quickly and add cash to city coffers, building official Tim Meroney told the Carmel City Council Feb. 7. But members worried the new law would unnecessarily penalize permit holders making sincere efforts toward completion, so they decided to delay a decision for two months while Meroney tweaks the proposed ordinance.

"We currently have numerous construction projects that have been under way for a very long time — a couple have gone on for five years," Meroney said. "And if you call for an inspection every six months, no matter how minor the work, if you can show progress, the permit can continue in perpetuity."

Several building projects have been in the works for years, according to Meroney. A large home at the northern edge of town, now finished, took a full decade to remodel.

Under current rules, a building permit for a \$400,000

# Dog owners will be admonished to 'Pack it in, pack it out'

WHETHER IGNORANT or just plain lazy, more and more people leave their used Mutt Mitts — those handy plastic baggies for picking up after pups — on Carmel Beach and in city parks. Members of the forest and beach commission voted last week to try to eliminate any confusion about where they belong: in the trash.

Commissioners said some dog walkers probably believe the black baggies biodegrade, since stickers on the two dozen

Mutt Mitt dispensers around town indicate they do. (The name-brand mitts contain corn starch to help them break down in landfills, but the city no longer buys that type because they cost twice as much as regular plastic mitts.)

"The ones we use now are not degradable," city forester Mike Branson explained at the Feb. 2 meeting. He thinks dog walkers abandon their poop-filled bags because they are lazy, but he acknowledged some might think they will simply decompose.

"Regardless, it's something you don't want out in the bay," commissioner Tad Pritchett pointed out.

Clayton Anderson, a Carmel Residents Association member who organizes the group's monthly beach cleanups, said one seaside session turned up 27 Mutt Mitts that had been filled, knotted and left on the sand.

"It's horrible to see all those bags down there," he said.

#### In the parks, too

People ditch them throughout Mission Trail and other parks as well, Branson said. About half the dispensers are situated near the beach, with the remainder in parks, the business district and other spots popular with dogs.

Branson said people need to get the message: "Don't just leave them on the ground and expect that they'll decompose — or magically disappear."

And while he thinks signs should usually be as unobtrusive as possible, commissioner Bob Tierney advised against subtlety in this instance.

"It should be as obtrusive as possible — red or international orange or something like that," he said. "Otherwise, people especially people who don't live here — are going to miss it."

Commissioners unanimously decided city staff should create a sticker to paste over the "biodegradable" verbiage on the Mutt Mitt dispensers.

This week, Branson proposed yellow stickers with black and red lettering reading, "Please place used dog waste bags in trash cans. Pack it in, pack it out."

# Advisory group OKs competing desal pilot plant

PAJARO/SUNNY Mesa Community Services District is a step closer to hooking up its pilot desal plant after a citizens land use group approved it Monday.

The pilot plant will be located at the National Refractories site in Moss Landing owned by Nader Agha.

The North County Land Use Advisory Committee gave the thumbs-up to the plant, which will produce about 30,000 gallons of water per day and serve as a model for a much larger proposed desal plant.

"We are feeling very confident now, because we got a recommendation for approval with no conditions," Marc del Piero, attorney for the district, said Monday after the land use committee meeting.

The pilot plant is to be located off Highway 1, practically a stone's throw from the Duke Energy power plant, the intended site of California American Water Co.'s competing proposed desal pilot plant.

In the next two to three weeks, Pajaro Sunny Mesa will go before the county's zoning administrator, del Piero said. If he approves the pilot plant, the California Coastal Commission will also review it.

Del Piero said he's optimistic the coastal commission will approve the plant since the agency has given the go-ahead to the same type of facility at other locations on the California coast.

"I'm hoping that we won't have any problems, because they have had a significant amount of familiarity with these pilot projects in the past," he said.

The San Diego-based Poseidon Resources Corp., which Pajaro/Sunny Mesa has contracted to operate and manage the pilot plant, is planning to build a similar desal plant in Carlsbad.

The large-scale desal plant would produce up to 23,000 acre-feet of water per year at a cost of about \$1,100 to \$1,200 per acre-

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# Sick, old pines on Ocean Avenue to topple for median makeover

MORE THAN a dozen sick, dying or otherwise undesirable trees and shrubs on Ocean Avenue should be cut down, the Carmel Forest and Beach Commission decided Feb. 2, to make way for young, vital natives that will be planted when crews relandscape the main street's medians. And this week, Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud told the city council six people have stepped forward to help cover the costs of beautifying the five center islands between Junipero and Monte Verde streets.

'Right now we're trying to get the plans ready to go out to bid," she said Feb. 7. "Our objective is to have the work done no later than August, when Carmel Plaza will have its formal re-opening." Since the center is one of the major contributors, the city would like the landscaping to be completed at the same time.

The first group to step forward, Carmel Rotary, gave \$10,000. City forester Mike Branson said that money would be used to pay for pruning some trees and removing others, which "has been identified as an important first step.'

Prior to the forest and beach commission's Feb. 2 meeting, Branson and commissioner Kathleen Coss tagged pines ranging from 4 inches to 33 inches in diameter that

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# 'Indispensable' Sgt. Mel Mukai is CPD Officer of the Year

A 21-YEAR veteran known for his "outstanding leadership qualities" — and his martial arts skills — has been named the Carmel Police Department 2005 Officer of the Year, police chief George Rawson told the city council Tuesday.

'When we were deciding who our officer of the year was going to be," he said earlier this week, "it was clear to me Sgt. Mel Mukai should have that title this year. He's taken on additional responsibilities above and beyond the normal watch commander duties."

Promoted to sergeant in 2003, Mukai "displays outstanding character, integrity and an

orientation for service," Rawson reported to the council Feb. 7.

In addition to supervising other officers and going out on patrol, Mukai oversees the support services division, including the property/evidence room, background checks for cab drivers, crosstraining of desk officers for parking enforcement duties, records management and the 911 dispatch center.

"He as developed and maintained solid interpersonal relationships that have become the glue that holds the team together," Rawson said. Employees consider

Mukai approachable, willing to listen and quick to respond, while his fellow sergeants describe him as "a strong team player willing to make himself available anytime he is needed."

And as watch commander, Rawson told The Pine Cone, Mukai is never hesitant to assist the officers on the street.

"We talk about wanting to be a high-quality law enforcement agency driven by integrity, ethics and behavior, and he exemplifies those values," he said. "And not just once in a

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while — he's very consistent. People who meet Mel often comment about his demeanor, his calming style, and that he's a good listener with good communication techniques."

Rawson also said Mukai inspires others in the department to work hard.

"When people feel they're cared about and supported, they will want to do a good job most the time," he said. "That's the kind of stuff that makes us have a good reputation with our community and our employees."

Mukai will be officially honored as the CPD 2005 Officer of the Year at the California Peace Officers Association dinner Friday, Feb. 17, in Seaside.

"Mel has proved to be indispensable to his team, and it is a privilege and honor to recognize him as this year's officer of the year," Rawson said in his report to council members. "By the way, don't be misled by his modest demeanor. As a certified expert in martial arts, Sergeant Mukai can take you in a flash if necessary!"



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# Decrepit Hitchcock House torn down bit by bit

m A}$  DECADE and \$1.5 million later, Carmel developer John Mandurrago finally had the old Hitchcock House demolished this week. The deteriorating building - the subject of an unsuccessful 2001 lawsuit by historic preservation activist Enid Sales - was condemned a nuisance by city building official Tim Meroney last November.

A crew finally got to work Wednesday tearing the old building down by hand. A large holly tree in front prevented the use of heavy equipment on the site, and Mandurrago said he would have had to wait at least a month to get permission to cut the tree down.

"Besides, it's a beautiful tree," he commented while standing in front of the house Wednesday afternoon.

The Hitchcock House saga began in 1996, when Mandurrago and a business partner bought it and the lot behind it for \$700,000 to build a 13-unit residential care home where their own fathers and other seniors could live.

The planning department required Mandurrago to pay for an environmental impact report on his proposal, and the city approved the plans in 2000. Sales challenged the proposed demolition of Hitchcock House by suing the city, arguing the house was historic. A judge ruled against her in March 2001.

"I have not seen clear and convincing evidence Kristine made these calls," O'Farrell said. "There certainly is doubt."

## Butterfly alert: Monarchs will leave soon

THIS WEEK'S sunny weather is not only perfect for watching movie stars play Pebble Beach. It's also ideal to view hordes of monarch butterflies before the beautiful insects leave the Monterey Peninsula.

There are currently 7,000 to 10,000 butterflies in Pacific Grove's monarch sanctuary, where the insects travel every year from as far as Canada to escape harsh winter weather. They mate in Pacific Grove before departing north.

"It's very exciting watching the mating dance when the males pick the females up and carry them into the trees very romantically," said Ro Vaccaro, Pacific Grove's "Butterfly Lady."

The monarchs typically begin their north-

easterly migration in February, and most will be gone by the end of the month. The monarch population in Pacific Grove usually peaks at the end of November.

"At Thanksgiving, our count was 17,000, which is just about what it was last year," Vaccaro said. "In general, it's been a healthy season for them. They had three or four days in a row of rain, which was kind of dismal, but they held on for dear life, and they survived just fine this year."

Every year, monarchs take as long as six weeks to travel to Pacific Grove for the overwintering season. They have the ability to travel hundreds of miles per day and fly as high as 10,000 feet.

Monarchs cannot withstand freezing tem-

housing authority attorney Cheryl Carlson, received "at least four threatening calls" between Nov. 13 and Nov. 16, 2005, according to court papers. A female caller, who Bilek believed was Heric, made a variety of inflammatory statements, including "I hate you and I'm going to do everything I can do to get you, Miss Commissioner," "We're going to come after you and your job," "I have friends who can hurt you," and "You better watch your next step." The voice sounds like that of a woman.

While her attorney, Debra Tipton, insisted Heric had no motive to threaten Bilek, others apparently did. Even Bilek's caretaker, Linda Youngman, acknowledged local residents were upset with her.

"Everybody was aggravated at her," Youngman said. "They blamed her for what the housing authority was doing."

#### **Dueling experts and witnesses**

In an effort to clear herself, Heric hired an audio forensic specialist, Durand Begault, to analyze messages left on Bilek's answering machine. Begault, who works as an investigator for a NASA research center, insisted Heric's voice does not match the voice on a tape from Bilek's answering machine. He was not present in court Feb. 9 and submitted

A staff report issued for the Feb. 9 coastal commission meeting in Chula Vista recommended the forest service be required to open the ranch to "unguided hikers" no later than the end of March.

The report also calls for the "coastal terrace" at the ranch to be opened to the public later this year. And it recommends the forest service allow camping or open a youth hostel at the 1,255-acre Brazil Ranch.

The forest service, which scaled back on a plan to allow weddings at the ranch, thinks public access issues need more study.

The day before the coastal commission meeting, a forest service official told The Pine Cone he believed 11th-hour talks could result in a compromise, allowing the federal agency to simply offer scheduled guided hikes until the end of 2006. The agreement would require the forest service allow unguided hiking access by 2007. "We're still talking," said Rich Tobin, director of conservation partnerships for Los Padres National Forest. "We're very close."

#### Weddings, but not hikers?

After purchasing the former Allen Funt Ranch in 2002, the forest service announced a plan to use existing buildings on the ranch as an environmental education center. But in an effort to raise the \$150,000 needed annually to maintain the property, the federal agency began marketing its facilities for weddings, business meetings and other events. The plan to promote the ranch as a wedding destination served as a rallying point for Big Sur residents who believe the federal agency ignored local land use guidelines. Specifically, locals



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contended commercial activities such as weddings were in direct opposition to zoning regulations spelled out in the Big Sur Coast Land Use Plan and represented unfair competition to Big Sur businesses hosting weddings.

A coastal commission staff report offered no objections to the plan to engage in commercial activities but recommended the federal agency be required to allow unguided public hiking access to the ranch as soon as possible.

According to the staff report, the forest service initially agreed to the conditions but has not included them in its revised proposal to the state watchdog agency. The federal agency is hoping to simply offer scheduled guided hikes until a long-term access plan is developed by the end of 2006, the report indicates.

One of the biggest hurdles facing the federal and state agencies is developing a place for hikers to park their vehicles. Parking along Highway 1 comes with the risk of a

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# 'Agitators' worry about free speech and fire risk after sign torched

A GROUP of Carmel Highlands residents who regularly post anti-war and anti-President Bush signs alongside Highway 1 are accustomed to seeing people react — positively and negatively — to their politically charged handiwork.

An attempt to set fire to one of the signs — which occurred Jan. 31 at about 7 p.m. — left the group shaken but defiant.

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"Are we going to let this silence us?" asked Tasha Doner, who identified herself as an "agitator" and the calligrapher of the signs. "I don't think we can do that. Now, more than ever, we need to speak up."

The proximity of the Carmel Highlands Fire Station, located about 100 yards away, led to a speedy response by firefighters, who quickly doused the fire. The sign — adjacent to a rock garden with little vegetation — suffered little damage.





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Members of the group expressed concern over the risk such an act of arson could create for the heavily wooded and populated Carmel Highlands.

"I'm always concerned about fire," said Tey Roberts, who comes up with some of the slogans on the signs, such as "Bush lied. Bush spied."

The following evening, a neighbor witnessed a man take down a sign and speed away in a car with Nevada license plates. The Monterey County Sheriff's Office is investigating that case, while the California Department of Forestry's local division is looking into the cause of the fire.

Most of the signs, including the one that was torched, are located on the property of Cynthia Williams, a 90-year-old Carmel Highlands resident. Members of the group said the signs are often defaced, sometimes with pro-Bush stickers.

Boo Davis, the group's "engineer," said such attempts to silence the messages simply inspire them "to make better signs."

This isn't the first time law enforcement has been called to Carmel Highlands because of the signs. Two anti-war signs with the words, "Exit Iraq," were stolen from the property of resident Bill Stewart in early December.

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# County planning commission: 24-foot cupola has got to go

IS IT a tower or is it a cupola? And what exactly is a cupola? A lively debate centered around these two perplexing questions this week as Monterey County planning commissioners debated the merits of a Carmel Valley project.

The planning commission ultimately voted 5-4 Feb. 8 to OK a plan by John and Margaretta Caouette to build a 5,554-square-foot-single story dwelling at 5481 Covey Ct. But they placed a condition on their approval requiring the applicant to remove a prominent architectural feature.

Representing the applicant, attorney Brian Finegan described the 24-and-a-half-foot feature as a "tower." Planning department staff disagreed and called it a "cupola," insisting it exceeded a county building code limit of 20 feet. A county provision exists allowing for certain towers, primarily those housing communications equipment, to exceed the 20-foot maximum.

Finegan argued the feature was not a cupola, using a PowerPoint presentation to display images of cupolas he found at www.cupola.com. He said the 20-foot limit "allows very little room for design elements and requires a flat roof." Finegan described a neighboring house with a "flat top" as "not a pretty sight."

Planning commissioner Cosme Padilla, on his first day as new planning commission chair, agreed the feature is not a cupola but ultimately supported the motion requiring its removal.

"This is not a cupola," Padilla insisted. "A cupola is a round dome over a church. If you take out the word, 'cupola,' it's a tower."

By allowing the feature to be approved, planning commis-

sioner Martha Diehl was worried about setting a precedent. "It may be attractive, but we need to keep our zoning intact," Diehl said. "We have a sensitive area here."

Planning commissioner Keith Vandevere agreed with Diehl.

"We would be throwing away our height limitations," Vandevere said. "It would open a can of worms I'm not willing to open."

Commissioners Padilla, Diehl, Vandevere, Juan Sanchez and Don Rochester voted for requiring the condition, while Miguel Errea, Laurence Hawkins, Jay Brown and John

Wilmot opposed the motion. Aurelio Salazar, Jr. was absent.

The Caouettes' plan also proposes to build a 1,047square-foot attached three-car garage, a 599-square-foot guesthouse and two underground rainwater storage tanks in a visually sensitive zoning district. The project aims to remove 66 oak trees, which the applicant has described as "diseased and dying." es a driveway on a slope exceeding a 30 percent grade.

#### Pebble Beach, Big Sur

A 9-0 vote by the planning commission gave Robert Demerest the green light to construct a 3,693-square-foot home at 3089 Stevenson Drive in Pebble Beach. The project includes removal of nine oak trees and 20 pines, and proposes development on slopes exceeding a 30 percent grade. The planning commission placed a condition on its approval limiting the number of oaks removed to six.

Meanwhile, the commission delayed a decision on three other projects until at least Feb. 22.

Scott Parker is seeking approval to construct a 2,338square-foot house and a 660-square-foot garage on Sycamore Canyon Road in Big Sur. Parker wants to build on slopes exceeding a 30 percent grade and within 100 feet of an environmentally sensitive habitat, Sycamore Creek.

A project proposed by Mel Grimes at 82 Hitchcock Canyon Road in Carmel Valley was continued at the request of the applicant. Grimes is seeking approval to build a 143-



square-foot artist's studio, a 140-square-foot addition to an existing single family dwelling and a 591-square-foot carport. The plan also proposes development on slopes with more than a 30 percent grade.

Also delayed was a decision on a project proposed by Bill and Joan Probasco at 4073 Los Altos Drive in Pebble Beach due to "tree removal issues." The Probascos are seeking approval of a plan to construct a 4,485-square-foot singlefamily home and a 484-square-foot guesthouse. The development would remove 38 Monterey pines.



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# P.G. may charge more for golf, install 600 parking meters

HIGHER GREEN fees at the municipal golf course, the addition of more than  $\hat{600}$ parking meters and charging more for various city permits are recommendations Pacific Grove's city manager will make to council members later this month to offset the city's financial shortfall.

The suggestions will be aired at a Feb. 21 budget workshop.

"At this point we are not excluding anything," said city manager Jim Colangelo. "Everything will be put out there."

This year, the city's expenditures will exceed its revenues by \$150,000, and there will be about \$270,000 less in the city's bank accounts.

"Everything we look at, there is going to be opposition to," Colangelo said. "The easy stuff, the non-controversial stuff has already been done."

Parking meters would generate a whopping \$670,000 per year for Pacific Grove.

"The meters could be implemented in a month or two," he said. "And we are talking about an immediate revenue stream without any cash from the city."

In December, the city received a proposal from the same company that installed "smart meters" adjacent to the American Tin Cannery.

In the downtown area, the plan calls for 243 meters on Lighthouse Avenue, 63 on Forest Avenue and 146 in three city parking lots, which are currently free.

In addition, the proposal calls for 63 meters at Lovers Point, 56 on Ocean View Boulevard west of Lovers Point and 34 in the Lovers Point parking lot. Existing meters there rake in about \$160,000 a year.

Currently, there is 90-minute free parking in the downtown area of Lighthouse Avenue.

The company providing the meters gets about 30 percent of the revenue, but the city doesn't have to pay anything upfront, Colangelo said.

The meters could be installed within 60 days, he said.

But there will likely be opposition to the meters, which are considered by some to be an eyesore and a detriment to downtown

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Also, "if we have to go to the California Coastal Commission, we won't get those things installed this year," Colangelo said.

Sherrill Ash, owner of First Noel and the former chairman of the

Downtown Facing a Business Improvement budget shortfall, District, said the city looks installing meters could at some backfire on tried and true "I think revenue streams that one of the nice char-

acteristics about Pacific Grove is that the parking is free and it's plentiful compared to other cities on the Peninsula," Ash said. "I think it would create a negative feel for a lot of people who come here.'

#### Raising the price of golf

The Pacific Grove Municipal Golf Links, which offers sweeping ocean views similar to those at the pricey Pebble Beach courses, have long been considered a bargain among local and visiting golfers.

But that could change.

"What we may propose on the golf is a cost-of-living increase," Colangelo said. "If we had been doing this for the last 20 years, it would have been better and people wouldn't see such a big increase."

The revenue generated from the golf course will support the course itself before the city uses that money for its general fund.

"Once we have a course that is taken care of by those fees, then we can look at how that money can be used outside the golf course," he said.

#### Other money-making ideas

Colangelo said he'll also suggest the city look at charging more for city services, such as building permit and planning fees and tree removal permits.

"It looks like there might be some support there if we can tie the higher fees to enhanced services, like a quicker turnaround for inspections," he said.

Colangelo will also recommend the city pay its \$2.5 million in employee retirement fees upfront rather than per paycheck, which costs the city nearly 8 percent annually. That would save about \$54,000 a year, he said.

"It's like paying off a mortgage payment at the beginning of the year," Colangelo said.

The city's administrative services director, Carlos Olvera, is working on a cash-flow report to determine if the city can part with that kind of money at one time.

A follow up meeting Feb. 28 is planned if council members have further questions about the proposal, Colangelo said.

Commission OK's roadwork

Planning Commission voted Feb. 8 to let the city repave Mission Street between Third and Fourth avenues. The work would include widening the street at both ends of the block to make the intersections safer, and crews will install sand-set pavers in place of the current asphalt and concrete sidewalk. The east side of the street won't get a new sidewalk, because it is "too irregular and interrupted with grade changes, trees and driveways," according to the staff report. The project is called for in the city's capital improvement plan.

home project in Carmel carries a one-time fee of \$2,673.75, according to Meroney. But under his proposal, "If it takes two or three years to build, the city would get two or three times that amount," he said. "It would be better for them to put that \$5,000 into the house to get it done."

Councilman Gerard Rose wondered what would happen if property owners making bona fide efforts to finish are sidelined by factors out of their control.

As building official, Meroney said he has used his power under the Uniform Building Code to waive fees and extend building permits as needed for hardship cases.

Most construction projects take less than a year, though new homes often take longer — particularly complex designs such as the Scenic Road residence drawn by architect Eric Miller for fomer Oakland A's managing partner Steve Schott — Meroney said. Work there commenced in October 2004 with the demolition of an old house on the lot. The building permit for that house cost \$6,349, based on a construction value of \$1,235,000.

"We're not looking to penalize people who are pursuing the project and trying to get it done," he said. He proposed initial building permits be issued for 18 months and then require annual renewal.

Not only would the plan bring in more revenue, according to Meroney, it would encourage property owners to hurry up.

"Neighborhoods are under siege," he said. "I get resident calls quite often asking, 'When is it going to end?""

#### 'Too long to finish'

Describing his neighborhood as "a construction zone," councilman Erik Bethel said record low interest rates and an increase in retiring baby boomers triggered a surge of projects.

Resident and realtor Carla Ramsey said some simply take too long to finish.

"I certainly see where Tim's coming from, because there's a building in my neighborhood that's been going on ad infinitum," she said. She suggested permits be good for 18 months or two years before renewal is required.

#### Councilman Mike Cunningham doubted a few thousand dollars would compel timely completion, and he wondered why the city would want to rush construction when it seeks "architectural excellence."

"I agree with the goal — you want these projects to move along and not disrupt for any longer than necessary — but this mechanism may not be the right one," he said.

Bethel worried people might not be able to get their permits renewed, but Meroney said it's automatic unless so much time has lapsed without any work that the laws have changed. In that case, someone with a previously approved design could be forced to redraw it to conform to current codes.

Rose proposed abandoning the measure, but Mayor Sue McCloud objected.

"This is something we need desperately — I get comments about the continued war zone in town," she said, adding that the "total gut job" on her house took six months. "I think it can be done and should be done."

The council decided Meroney should fine-tune the ordinance to address the council's concerns and return with a new draft in April.

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## Council challenger says he offers 'fresh perspective and open mind'

PREPARING FOR disasters, lending an ear to business owners and making downtown Carmel wi-fi will top Ryan Walbrun's to-do list if residents elect him to the city council in April.

A 31-year-old meteorologist who works for the National Weather Service in Monterey, Walbrun said he offers "a fresh perspective and an open mind."

He's never served in public office and --until Tuesday — had never attended a Carmel City Council meeting in person. But the idea of seeking a council seat came to him two years ago, when then-34-year-old Erik Bethel was elected. When no one appeared ready to challenge incumbents

Gerard Rose and Paula Hazdovac — two council veterans - Walbrun decided to sign up. "I want to give people a choice," he said.

Originally from Wisconsin, he studied meteorology at the University of Wisconsin in Madison and worked on the East Coast and in the Midwest before arriving in Carmel in late 1999. His specialty is helping communities prepare for tsunamis, earthquakes, storms and other disasters, though he's most interested in wildfires, the topic of his thesis as he pursues a masters degree at the Naval Postgraduate School.

"It's kind of common sense that I'm going to bring my own life experience to the table, and a lot of my job deals with preparedness," he said. Carmel has the resources to be ready when disaster strikes, he said, and

seemingly insignificant occurrences - such as Caltrans crews recently working at Carpenter Street and Highway 1 - highlight some of the issues.

"Because of a minor construction project, you couldn't get out of town," he said.

Disseminating information regarding what to do during in an emergency is of prime importance and complicated by the fact that so many homeowners only spend part of the year in Carmel, he said. Likewise, business owners often live elsewhere on the Peninsula.

"It has been proved that there's some value in really talking about these issues," he said.

Vacancies = bad vibes The city needs to be more attractive to

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businesses, visitors and tourists, he said.

"I live downtown," said Walbrun, who lives in an apartment on Lincoln Street near the Cypress Inn. "I've talked to a lot of business owners. We need them to turn a profit, and right now there are empty storefronts downtown."

Unoccupied storefronts send "bad vibes," he said.

Many business owners resent not having a strong voice in city hall, according to Walbrun, since they cannot participate in Carmel elections unless they also reside in town.

"They may not own the building or may not have a vote, but they seem to have a lot to say, and I get the idea that decision makers aren't listening," said Walbrun, even though Hazdovac and her sister own a shop downtown, and attorney Gerard Rose's law firm is a block off Ocean Avenue. "People feel left out of the process — that's just the

a written declaration.

"I've been blamed for things I never caused," she said. "I've been placed in the middle of several complicated issues. I've been one of the primary supporters of Rippling River. I hope the residents are willing to see that."

Now Bilek is facing some major health challenges.

"The residents and the community have turned their backs on me when I need their help the most," she said. "This is probably the most difficult time in my life."

For Heric, the ruling is bittersweet.

"I feel mixed emotions," she said. "I am still saddened Merri could think I threatened



Heric said the challenges she has faced in the effort to clear her name have only strengthened her resolve to be an advocate for the residents of Rippling River.

"I'm still an advocate," she said. "Now more than ever.

way it is."

Walbrun said he would seek their opinions and let them approach him.

"I know traffic issues and parking issues are always worth reinvestigating, and I know a lot of work and time is spent just trying to figure out how to get people from the Monterey Peninsula to come into Carmel, let alone tourists from around the world," he said. "I'm all about fresh ideas."

If elected to the city council, Walbrun said he would push making wireless Internet access available throughout the business district. The council has considered wi-fi ser-

vices as one means of making the city more attractive to visitors.

While gathering signatures in January for his petition to run for office, Walbrun said he was overwhelmed by the public support and the much-repeated refrain the council needs someone new at the dais.

"There's clearly a desire for change in the city, and that's not my opinion, that's the opinion of the people," he said. "People keep telling me they would like to have new blood, fresh energy. It's a resounding theme, and the best thing for me is to take the pulse of the community."

But as the permit process crept forward, Mandurrago's and his partner's fathers died. Without their presence as incentive to build the care home, Mandurrago bought out his partner's share and proposed building two large homes on the parcels instead.

The city declined to give him the extra water the houses would require, however.

Last November, Meroney said the rotting house had become an unsafe nuisance and must be demolished.

**Worries about noise** A crew of six men wielding sledgehammers and crowbars took to the old building Wednesday morning, breaking it down bit by bit as dust and the smell of mold wafted through the air.

Some nearby innkeepers worried the noise would annoy guests in town for the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, but Mandurrago said he was eager to get the old building demolished and develop plans for something new — probably a single-family home — in its place.

Though he's \$1.5 million out of pocket without approved plans or a single nail of new construction, Mandurrago said the value of the property has risen enough to offset the setbacks and costs.

that she "was the first one in the theater every time" one of Eastwood's movies came out. And she offered comments until right before the end about which projects Eastwood should get involved in, family members said.

The extremely close relationship between Mrs. Wood and Eastwood extended to his personal relationships as well as his career, according to Dina Eastwood.

"I met her before I met him," she told The Pine Cone. In 1993, after "Unforgiven" won him Oscars for Best Director and Best Picture, the then-anchorwoman known as Dina Ruiz decided to do a congratulatory story about the achievement for KSBW including an interview with Eastwood's

mother.

"The first time I met her, she told me that she and Clint had extrasensory perception," Dina Eastwood said. "It was obvious they had an exceptional connection."

And before Dina Ruiz ever went on a date with Eastwood, Mrs. Wood seemed to believe something would happen between the newswoman and her son.

"Later, she became my biggest supporter," Dina Eastwood said. "She was an opinionated person, a flat-out person who would tell you what she thought, but she only reprimanded me once in 12 years!"

Born in 1909, Mrs. Wood had no ambition for her son — except for him to try his hardest.

"She just wanted me to do my best at whatever it was," said Eastwood, whose strong work ethic is part of his Hollywood reputation. "In my family, we were taught it

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Growing up during World War II, Eastwood remembers moving a lot as his father tried to find something that would click for him. When the family settled in Oakland, Eastwood's mother worked for IBM while his dad worked for Bethlehem Steel in San Francisco.

"I'm sure I wasn't the easiest child to raise, especially with both of them working," Eastwood said. "I was like most kids: It's amazing how much smarter your parents get after you turn 21."

After his success on the 1960s TV drama, "Rawhide," Eastwood bought his first home in the Monterey Peninsula — a fully furnished house on Sloat Road in Pebble Beach — for \$25,000.

When his parents retired, they also moved to Pebble Beach. And for the last 16 years, Mrs. Wood lived at Hacienda Carmel, which is very near Eastwood's Tehama golf resort, where he plays regularly. Eastwood's sister, Jeannie Bernhardt, also lives in Carmel Valley, as does actress Frances Fisher and another of Eastwood's children, Frannie, now 12. All that family around — Clint and Dina have a daughter, Morgan, 9 — was a great source of energy for Mrs. Wood. And so was the menagerie at Eastwood's home.

"We have a tortoise and a pig and a rabbit and some chickens — we've always been great animal people," he said. The most recent trip for the extended Eastwood family was to his home in Maui for New Year's. Afterward, there was a visit to Piedmont, where Eastwood's father, Clinton, who died in 1970, was inducted into The Piedmont High School Football Hall of Fame. "My mother got a big kick out of seeing everybody," Eastwood said.

"We had so much fun, and she entertained everyone," Dina Eastwood added.

Just ten days later, a big crowd gathered at the Eastwood home not far from The Lodge at Pebble Beach to celebrate Mrs. Wood's Jan. 18 birthday.

Earlier, she had suffered a slight compression fracture of her back and had experienced a lot of pain, but she seemed in good shape, according to people at the party.

On Jan. 30, however, Mrs. Wood suffered a serious stroke. She died at Community Hospital less than a week later. "You're never ready for it," Eastwood said. "Even though she was 97, we thought 98 would be great and in just three years she'd have been at the century mark ...."

His mother's death has curtailed Eastwood's public appearances at this week's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, where he has been a mainstay for decades. And he has not announced any plans for a memorial service.

"My sister and I decided we would take a few deep breaths and let everything settle down a bit before we decide," he said.



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# Ventana Inn offers mushroom tours of Big Sur backcountry

'WHAT IS it about this place that allows people to be so connected with it?" asked Stephen Copeland, owner and operator of Big Sur Guides and Hiking, as we zipped up Highway 1 from Ventana Inn & Spa to a secret location to go mushrooming. With whales spouting offshore to our left and craggy mountains looming to our right, it wasn't difficult to see what Copeland meant.

He was leading a "Let's Go 'Shroomin" event hosted by Ventana Inn & Spa. (The inn's general manager and mushroom enthusiast Paul O'Dowd usually leads the tours, but he was on vacation.)

A couple from Los Angeles, Copeland and I met up with Ventana chef Anthony Calamari, state park ranger Chuck Bancroft, and his wife and fellow avid mycologist, Sheryl, at an off-limits parcel of private property that I raised my right hand and pinky-swore not to divulge. (Hint: It wasn't exactly in Big Sur but was a 45-minute schlep into the most scenic backcountry this side of the Santa Lucia Mountains.)

I quickly learned mushroom foragers are known to take their obsession (and prized picking locations) very seriously.

As we eagerly hiked over damp, rolling hills (3 inches of rain had fallen the previous week), Bancroft gave us a quick lesson on chanterelles, porcinis, candy caps, black trumpet, cracked cap boletes and morels. There are about 3,000 to 4,000 varieties of mushrooms in California, and only a dozen or so of those are edible.

The coastal mountains of Big Sur, with their abundance of limestone and moisture from the winter rains, are prime terroir for fungi. Bancroft chortled like an eager child as he quoted his hobby's famous adage: "There are old mushroom hunters and there are bold mushroom hunters, but there are no old, bold mushroom hunters." While only a handful of mushroom varieties are poisonous (the death cap and destroving angel are two to watch out for, he said), Bancroft emphasized that you should not pick or eat any mushroom unless you absolutely know it is safe for consumption. I was confident we were in safe hands.

Once you are out in the woods looking for mushrooms in a Zen-like Easter-egg-hunt fashion, the main factors determining what you will find are the time of year and the habitat. Depending on the month and the weather, different seasons will yield different mushrooms (like flowers). It could be chanterelles or boletes, oyster mushrooms, matsutake, honey mushrooms, or LBMs (little brown mushrooms). We spied more varieties than I expected, mostly inedible, but

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managed to hit the mushroom motherlode and left with baskets overflowing with vibrantly colored chanterelles.

After scouting one more site and discovering a path lined with more chanterelles than we could possibly pick (reminiscent of the Yellow Brick Road), we drove back to Cielo Restaurant at Ventana. Chef Calamari prepared a spectacular lunch featuring the epicurean delicacies *du jour*; presented with a backdrop of the breathtaking coastline of Big Sur.

What could have been a rather dull, "just-the-facts, ma'am," adventure turned out to be full of Sheryl Bancroft's humorous observations and plant savviness, her husband's mental database of knowledge, Chef Calamari's food smarts and Copeland's historical storytelling. And, although we learned endless amounts of valuable information on how to find, gather, store and prepare mushrooms, the allure of the mushroom became much more than what meets the palate. Their beautiful shapes, sizes and colors, even the parasitic fungus, coupled with the fascinating scientific aspects of terminology, classification and habitats, truly sparked my interest. Although Bancroft claims mushrooming is just a hobby, not a way of life, he admitted, "During the season, I go out more than Sheryl would probably like." I could see how mushrooming could become addictive.

As I tearfully drove away from the beautiful Ventana property, I thought that Big Sur truly is the world's greatest meeting of land and sea. The land and ocean vistas I'd seen, coupled with the expertly prepared foraged finds I had just consumed, were a sensory experience unlike any other I've had. And like Copeland, and the other event participants, I felt fortunate.

show poor form, low vigor, disease, decline and poor potential, and during the meeting, commissioners added some large shrubs and a couple of other trees to the list.

"This will also give trees being encroached upon and crowded the opportunity to move forward with better growth more quickly," commissioner Tad Pritchett commented.

The plans being prepared pro-bono by landscape designer Michelle Comeau will include native, drought-tolerant plants and trees, as well as a new irrigation system.

"When you work in there, you find layers of irrigation: old galvanized pipe from the '50s, then PVC and then drip lines," Branson said.

The design may also include lighting — a concept which prompted former councilwoman Barbara Livingston to comment, "We've always had a light-from-within-not-light-fromwithout policy in Carmel."

"It's important not to lose sight of Carmel as a rustic, rural village — a village in a forest," she said. "That's an image that has served us very, very well here."

With the design still in the works, the forest and beach commission focused solely on what tree removal, pruning

Sauté mushrooms in olive oil and butter over a medium flame. Once mushrooms, are tender add Tartuffi Paste and some mushroom stock (or water).

Let simmer until a sauce-like consistency occurs, and add a touch of butter.

Season the mushrooms with salt and pepper.

Pan-sear two scallops on one side until a nice golden dark color appears (2 to 3 minutes).

Turn scallops and add sherry vinegar to pan (about 2 to 3 tablespoons).

Add butter and lower flame. Let scallops cook in liquid to absorb flavors.

Plating: Place a nice mound of the mushroom medley in the center of a plate. Drizzle the excess mushroom sauce from pan around the plate. Using a spoon, ladle some of the sherry and butter sauce on top of the scallops. Then transfer the scallops on top of the mushroom medley. Garnish with chervil.

and cleanup should be undertaken in anticipation of the relandscaping.

But some members worried the money might run out before the makeover is complete.

"The goal is that once we start, we will keep going," Coss responded. "And it's not going to take months." She said she would "do everything possible" to ensure the project doesn't stall too long between the tree removal and planting.

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# Council decides to spend money to make money

#### Members approve contract for city's first economic development manager

A MORGAN Hill City Council member who runs a public-policy consulting firm will help bring business to Carmel-by-the-Sea, the city council decided Tuesday. Greg Sellers' contract, which took effect Feb. 8 and expires June 30, 2007, includes \$22,500 in "startup costs" through June 30 and \$42,000 for the following year.

As economic development manager, Sellers will spend at least 12 hours per week meeting with business owners, elected officials, property owners, residents and others "with an interest in the economic health of the city's business area," according to city administrator Rich Guillen's report to the council. He will have an office in city hall.

During his first six months on the job, Sellers will draft a "strategic plan" to identify "major economic development goals that promote business retention and expansion," according to Guillen. The plan will also describe how to implement them, how much they will cost, how long they will take and what they will produce.

Sellers will shepherd the proposed plan through the approval process and see it put into action. Mayor Sue McCloud said he would also be responsible for generating new ideas on how to boost economic activity in town.

"I would like to express my extreme enthusiasm," said city councilman Erik Bethel, a champion of economic development in Carmel and participant in a chamber-led trip to several Northern California towns two years ago to check out the competition. "They all had individuals who work to promote businesses and economic development."

That trip prompted the proposal to create a similar position at Carmel City Hall. Ten firms responded to the city's request for proposals, and Guillen, Bethel and councilwoman Paula Hazdovac screened them to select the five best candidates.

Guillen, Hazdovac and Carmel Plaza general manager Tod Strain interviewed the finalists, narrowing the field to two.

"But we felt Mr. Sellers would best fit the needs of Carmel-by-the-Sea," said Guillen, who also spent some time working with him at the Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce.

"It will be a major challenge to define what 'economic development' means to Carmel-by-the-Sea's business and residential communities," Guillen concluded in his staff report. "Sellers Associates has the experience and knowledge to facilitate an economic development strategy." "The reason I'm so excited to work here

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# Coast Guard pier reopened to pedestrians

AFTER BEING closed to the public for four years, the U.S. Coast Guard pier in Monterey is open again for those who want to get up-close and personal with sea lions or get a better view of the bay.

The pier was initially closed to the public in 2001 because it was in much need of repair.

"They originally closed it not because of security [after 9/11], but because the pavement was in such bad condition," said Monterey City Manager Fred Meurer.

Pedestrians can walk the pier to a fence at the end, where hundreds of barking sea lions often congregate on the breakwater rocks below.

> CHANGE TO GIFT MAXIMUM

As of January 1, 2006, the maximum amount that a parent can give to a child (or spouse of a child) in one year will become \$12,000. This

amount rises when incremental inflation takes the limit at least \$1,000 higher—which is why we moved from the recent \$11,000 maximum.

What does this mean to us? Consider an example. Let's say a middle-aged couple wants to provide annual support to each of their three children and their children's spouses. (Their children's children qualify as well, but we'll leave that for another column.)

Each of the parents, husband and wife, can give up to \$12,000 to each child, meaning that each child can receive up to \$24,000 in a year. A child and his or her spouse can an annual gift or gifts of up to \$48,000, therefore, without triggering gift taxes. (And the parents can give up to a million dollars in their lifetime in this fashion without getting caught up in the expensive gift tax.)

This becomes particularly relevant when parents wish to help their children get into their own personal residences. Parents can loan a substantial amount, perhaps securing the loan as a second on the property, and then forgive the children up to \$48,000 in annual combined interest and principal payments—as a gift. Among the noticeable changes to the pier is a new securi-

ty fence installed along the Coast Guard's deployment area. Meanwhile, the Coast Guard is entertaining the idea of selling or leasing its property, which includes the pier and buildings on Foam Street and Lighthouse Avenue.

"The detachment in Monterey has gotten much smaller in recent years," Meurer said. "The facility they needed 25 years ago is different than what they need today."

The Coast Guard will still operate in Monterey, but the City of Monterey could lease the land from the Coast Guard and the money could be used to upgrade its facilities. The Coast Guard could also sell the land to developers.

But Meurer said there are hurdles the Coast Guard would have to jump before it can lease or sell the land, since the federal government doesn't currently allow it.

"There is no congressional authority in law to do what they want to do," he said. "If we were to do this, we would have to get the law changed to allow it to happen."



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## Local couple makes \$10M donation to San Jose State University

PEBBLE BEACH residents Donald and Sally Lucas donated \$10 million to the San Jose State University College of Business this month.

According to SJSU spokesperson Leah Williams, the donation represents the largest private gift the university has received in its 150-year history.

From 1964 to 2000, Donald Lucas owned 40 automobile dealerships in California and Hawaii, including a dealership in Monterey. He and his wife graduated from SJSU. While a student at the university, Lucas opened his first dealership — a used car lot — just seven blocks from the college.

The Lucases are noted for its philanthropy. In the past, they have made significant contributions to the Monterey Bay Aquarium and The First Tee of Monterey County.

foot, according to del Piero.

Peter MacLaggan, Poseidon's vice president, said the company has prefabricated the plant's reverse osmosis system and prefilters, which will be tested in Carlsbad before being shipped to Moss Landing.

"The objective is to find out what works best in local conditions," he said.

It will take about 60 days from the time the plant is given final approval until it is up and running, MacLaggan said. Much of that time will be spent on plumbing and electrical work.

The plant will be housed in an 8-by-8-by 40-foot container, which will be placed on a paved area near the entrance to the National Refractories property, just off of Highway 1 in Moss Landing.

The pilot plant will include:

two intake pump stations with a total capacity of 200 gallons per minute;

■ two 6-inch intake pipelines one to collect seawater from the existing intake area of the refractories site and one to collect water from the discharge of the Moss Landing power plant;

■ a sedimentation or dissolved-air flotation system to remove solids, oil, grease and algae from the seawater;

two pretreatment filters capable of producing up to 90 gallons per minute of filtered water;

two seawater reverse osmosis systems equipped with high-rejection membranes, each capable of producing up to 20 gallons per minute of fresh water, and

Water storage tanks.

Under normal conditions, the pilot plant intake pump will collect up to 200 gallons per minute of seawater from the Refractories intake just south of Dolan Road, or cooling water from Duke's power plant.

After the water travels through an initial

screen, raw seawater will be processed in two parallel treatment systems.

The first will consist of a sedimentation tank or dissolved air flotation clarifier followed by a granular media filtration system. The second will have a similar operation, but will be equipped with a microfiltration system to remove smaller particles.

Each pilot plant treatment system will be capable of producing 20 gallons per minute of fresh water. The discharge water will be returned to the ocean through the existing National Refractories outfall.

"One thing that is unique is we are using full-size components," MacLaggan said. "Eventually, the system will be two complete desal plants, so we can test different manufacturers to see that we have the most efficient plant."

Provided the plant is approved by the county and the coastal commission, MacLaggan estimated the first part of the pilot plant would be installed in the next two to three months, and the second constructed by mid-summer to fall. The pilot plant is expected to be in operation for two to four years. "We are making progress," he said, "and are soon going to be making water."

Agha purchased the roughly 200-acre National Refractories property three years ago for about \$7.5 million.

#### 'Optimistic and Hopeful'

While Pajaro/Sunny Mesa seems to be making progress, its competitor in the race to 4 build a desal plant, Cal Am, has been hindered because the water company is caught in a quandary between the planning department and Duke Energy, whose Moss Landing property will be used for Cal Am's pilot plant.

"We are still pursuing our own pilot program, but we are very happy for Pajaro/Sunny Mesa," said Catherine Bowie, Cal Am's spokeswoman, "because for anybody to get a pilot plant to study desal is good for the future of the water supply on the

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Before the county planning department will issue Cal Am its permit for a pilot plant, it is requiring Duke to meet all the requirements of a mitigation plan, which includes restoring wetlands on its property.

Duke and Cal Am believe those mitigation efforts have been completed, but the planning department insists they have not.

"Duke continues to work with the county and all the stakeholders involved to arrive at a final mitigation agreement," said Duke spokesman David Hicks. "It is our hope that we will have something finished relatively soon. Given that this work is ongoing, we don't want to get into any further detail at this time."

On Thursday, officials from Duke and the planning department met to discuss the mitigation efforts, said Maia Carroll, spokeswoman for the county.

"We are optimistic we will be able to resolve our issues," Carroll said before the meeting. "If the meeting is successful, we are likely to take the permit to a hearing in March.'

# The lagoon is not an either/or situation

THE CARMEL River Lagoon is turning out to be the Hatton Canyon Freeway of the 21st Century. In other words, a controversy that seemingly never goes away.

Managing the lagoon used to be a lot simpler: Nearly every winter, the rains fell, the river started to flow and the lagoon rose. If nearby homes were threatened with flooding — which they routinely were, except in the driest years — the sandbar that formed during the summer was bulldozed open, returning the lagoon to a safe level, and opening the river mouth to the running steelhead trout.

During the severe droughts of the later 1970s and early 1990s, however, the river stayed dry for years at a time, severely disrupting winter runs of the trout.

Simultaneously, the environmental movement took control in Washington and Sacramento, elevating the status of the fish to a matter of paramount concern for state and federal officials.

Suddenly, people were at each throats over what to do with the lagoon, who needed permits to do what, and who had the authority to tell whom where to go. By 2000, state and federal wildlife experts decided the county needed a permit to bulldoze the lagoon's sandbar — a permit they have never received. In the meantime, the county has been allowed to continue opening the lagoon as needed to protect public safety. But constant tinkering with exactly when the bulldozers can dig and what direction they should point their blades while they do so has still caused several near disasters.

Ten years ago, the same stalemate existed in Hatton Canyon. The existing Highway 1 corridor was horribly congested, gridlock beset the mouth of Carmel Valley nearly every afternoon, and nothing was done because the opposing camps refused to budge.

But when they finally were willing to meet each other halfway — Caltrans dropped its insistence that only a freeway would do while tree-huggers agreed that a few pines could be removed to widen the existing road — the traffic problems were quickly reduced practically to nothing.

The same thing is true at the lagoon. A solution will have to be found to ensure long-term protection for homes from flooding, even as the trout's survival is guaranteed.

#### Dancing kids have left the building Dear Editor,

The intimation in the Jan. 20 article in The Pine Cone that the Carmel Academy of Performing Arts (formerly Carmel Ballet Academy) and Dance Kids of Monterey County have not, in the past, "paid their way" at the Sunset Center is an error.

As the owner and directors of Carmel Academy of Performing Arts and Dance Kids of Monterey County, we are incensed at the lack of concern by the City of Carmel and the administration and board of directors of the Sunset Center when it comes to issues that affect the Carmel Academy of Performing Arts and Dance Kids of Monterey County, which have a combined Carmel community presence of sixty-eight years!

Dance Kids has performed the Nutcracker at Sunset Center for almost ten years. It became evident that, even though we were promised our fees would "not go up much" after the remodel, they would actually go up astronomically. (A Monday through Sunday rehearsal and performance period became \$16,000 to \$20,000, which is far too much for any small nonprofit with a modest annual budget!) They also require a rental fee for the tables used to set up a gift shop in the lobby and then retain 10 percent of the income of the items we sell as a fundraiser for the children!

Then Jack Globenfelt, the director of Sunset Center, named Smuin Ballet, a San Francisco-based ballet company, the "resident company" of Carmel. Never mind that there is a pre-professional company housed across the street from the Sunset Center which provides dance and theater opportunities for hundreds of young people of the Monterey Peninsula. Has Globenfelt or the board of directors of Sunset Center seen full length *Cinderella*, *Giselle* or *Coppelia*? In reference to The Pine Cone article, "Smuin attracted 1,900 people to three shows." Our

It should be noted that our productions attract local audiences.

Globenfelt admits that the people of Carmel are not coming to the theater. Many of the parents of the students who attend both of our programs are not happy with the management of Sunset Center with respect to the Carmel Ballet Academy and Dance Kids of Monterey County. Additionally, we have heard from dozens of Carmel Unified School District parents who have been disgusted with the changes in their Sunset Center events. It is unfortunate that Sunset Center has forgotten that these children are our community's future patrons of the arts. I believe that the citizens who gave their money for the retrofit of Sunset are NOT happy with the fact that many local nonprofits cannot afford the fees.

Carmel Ballet Academy had performed at the Sunset Center for 50 years! Thousands of our children and their families have enjoyed the beauty of the facility. We moved our annual recital showcase to another theater when Sunset Center wanted not only to raise the charges for the technical crew and house rental fees by nearly 400 percent (which we considered paying) but also restructured the rental arrangements so that each individual dressing room added hundreds of dollars to each day's rent. Additionally, should we set up a photo session with a professional photographer for the children during their rehearsal, the Sunset Center administration would retain 10 percent of his income, even though the Academy is paying the rent on the space and is retaining nothing.

I have written my letters and voiced my sadness at not being able to afford the new Sunset rates. There is a pathetic line from Globenfelt, "We hope to address those in the future, but we're not sure how." They will not be addressed. There is no future for the small, local, family-oriented businesses and nonprofit organizations of Carmel at our own community theater. Stop wasting your words. Carmel Academy of Performing Arts and Dance Kids have left the building!

## *Fishermen's story* **Dear Editor**,

This letter is in regard to the Jan. 27, 2006, article on the front page of The Pine Cone about the "Renegade fishermen." First off, let me say that we're not sure if this incident should be considered a "renegade" performance. The day started out as a beautiful, sunny, 70-degree day, in which a few of us decided to take the dogs for a walk on the beach and check out the river mouth. It is pretty clear to see that it was never our intention to breach the mouth of the river in broad daylight or without at least some real digging tools.

Second, the reason for this letter is to clear up a few things written in the Jan. 27 article that were written based on one sole view that is a bit of a hypocrite. A longtime resident who was supposedly attempting to inform us of the "illegal act" was, in fact, encouraging us to take the channel further to the south. Her words were, "I know it would be a bit more work for you, but if you would just dig the channel further to the south by those rocks, that is the natural course of the river and would be better."

Funny thing how she forgot to mention to the press about that comment, huh?

Now, who made this woman the queen of the river mouth, and why was it not OK to breach the mouth straight west, but OK to the south? Our comment to her during her arguments about where and why the mouth should be breached was simply that the sandbar would be breached anyway during the next high tide due at around 6 or 7 that evening.

Which brings us to our third point. It mentioned in the inset photo of the article that "a fisherman takes advantage Wednesday of the previous day's illegal breaching of the lagoon sandbar." There was only one attempt which the paper quickly dispelled as "failed." There was no further attempt! The river mouth was breached, just as we expected, on the incoming tide that evening. Not by us! Furthermore, if the natural course of the river, as the longtime resident suggested, was to the south, then why did Mother Nature open it via high tide straight west? Hmmmm. We attempted to explain to her that the river would take its path of least resistance, and that would be west. That's why we "weren't having any of it,"

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referring to her comment on trying to explain the situation to us. She was just being unrealistic about where the river would breach naturally.

Don't get us wrong. What we did we now know was not legal (though we did not know it at the time), but this was not done in any way, shape or form to be malicious or harmful to the smolt in the river. The smolt can take care of themselves just fine, as they have done in the past. The woman who spoke to us and probably many others who do not fish in any river do not realize that the smolt have many places in the river mouth and upstream to hide and keep themselves out of the current. Though we should be responsible for knowing the park rules, we believe that the park should post some of the more important rules in more than one place. The only place that it is posted not to breach the river is at the parking lot on the north side, when there are at least four different ways to access the beach.

### Modern stucco, copper and glass house finds place in cottage-y Carmel

'IT'S NOT our usual cottage, that's for sure."

That's how Carmel Design Review Board member Karen Sharp described a contemporary home designed by architect George Brook-Kothlow.

Clad in stucco, the 2,474-square-foot residence will be broken up into multiple one- and two-story sections situated among clusters of the Seventh Avenue lot's 17 trees. Comprising mostly right angles, the home will feature numerous copper-clad windows, doors and other accents. The board voted 4-0 Feb. 1 to approve Richard Woodward and Jacquelyn Smith's residence.

Brook-Kothlow originally proposed the curved roof over the main two-story element and the chimney also be copper, but planner Nathan Schmidt cited the residential design guideline that favors wood or other materials that fit better in Carmel. "Metal roofs are inappropriate in all neighborhoods," according to the code, and Schmidt recommended the board require a nonmetal roof and different cladding for

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the chimney.

Brook-Kothlow abandoned the copper, instead proposing the same "metacrylic waterproof membrane" that will cover the flat areas of the roof. He also agreed to clad the chimney in stucco.

Pointing out that the roof would not be visible from the street or neighbors' lots, Brook-Kothlow said the polyester seamless roofing material would have a texture similar to tar and gravel and be colored gray-brown to match the stucco.

But the architect objected to a condition limiting the house to 16-and-a-half feet in height, which he said would not allow enough space for the home's structure while still providing adequate headroom. The city code allows 18 feet.

'We need the diversity' but a copper roof goes too far

Chairman Michael LePage asked if Brook-Kothlow could dig into the sloping site more, but the architect said

the house is already stepped down along the hillside.

"The two-story section is toward the rear — it's probably in the ideal spot," he said. "The way it's drawn now conforms to the city's guidelines and is right at the limit of what is functional in terms of structure and space."

Board member Mary Bell commented, "It's an unusual house for this little town, but I'm not sure this area couldn't use a little diversity."

LePage expressed discomfort with deciding the fate of a proposal that seemed to fall outside the residential design



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guidelines, which are "slanted toward a traditional home."

"That puts us in a discretionary mode — a dangerous place for us to be — and I think these kinds of projects can come back to haunt us," he said. "But I agree with Mary we need the diversity."

LePage proposed an 18-foot height limit, since there are no privacy issues.

'If it's at the allowable amount, then I don't have a problem with it," he said, adding that the architect and the owners had already conceded to the planning department's other requests. "It was reduced initially because of mass, but this is a contemporary design, so I think we have to be a little more flexible. To make them do less will put an extraordinary hardship on them."

The board agreed, voting 4-0 in favor of the revised design. Member Leslie Kitselman was absent.

peratures nor intense heat.

They cluster in large masses in the eucalyptus trees in the sanctuary to conserve heat. The insects do not fly well unless the temperature is above 55 degrees.

The butterflies, which resemble dead leaves when they're clustered in trees, fly from the branches to seek nectar on warm days, then return before evening.

To make viewing easier, docents from the city's museum of natural history have a telescope on hand. Spectators can also use the telescope for photographs to get a close-up shot.

"Everybody should watch their feet, because there is a portion in the mating dance when the males and females are on the ground, and they are oblivious to people around," said Vaccaro, who is past president of Friends of the Monarchs, a group that provides education and monitors the butterflies.

The butterflies will leave Pacific Grove to find milkweed to lay their eggs. They can lay hundreds of pinhead-size eggs on the underside of the host plant. The eggs hatch in four to five days, depending on the temperature.

"They'll go over toward Gilroy, Hollister and the San Joaquin Valley if they can't find milkweed closer," Vaccaro

said. The monarch sanctuary reopened to the public Oct. 1. It had been closed since November 2004 after Anne

Dickinson Thomas of New

York was killed by a pine tree limb that broke off and struck her. As a result, the city removed 16 dead or dying pine trees from the sanctuary.

But the tragedy didn't seem to frighten anybody from viewing the monarchs this season.

"We didn't seem to see any fewer people come in," Vaccaro said.

The best time to view monarchs is between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Monarch butterfly docents provide tours of the sanctuary, which is located off Ridge Road near Lighthouse Avenue. For information, call museum director Paul Finnegan at (831) 648-5716, ext. 12, or Friends of the Monarchs at (831) 375-0982.

### Locals savor the privilege of playing in Pebble Beach pro-am

#### **By MARY BROWNFIELD**

T'S THE most coveted invitation in amateur sports," said Pebble Beach resident Geoff Couch, playing in his eighth AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am this week. "That it comes is just a blessing."

"It's probably the most difficult pro-am to gain entry to, and to be able to play in this tournament to fulfill that childhood dream — is just the best," said two-time pro-am contestant Mark House of Carmel Valley. "That's the only way to put it."

Couch and House, two talented golfers who frequently play together on Peninsula courses, are among the 180 amateurs competing alongside the pros in a tournament known for its field as well as its philanthropy.

Of those amateur spots, celebrities fill some, and many sponsors receive invitations to distribute as they see fit. Each June, a selection committee begins researching potential players to fill the remainder. According to tournament officials, the only set criterion is golfing ability, as the committee strives to select a variety of players with different backgrounds and experiences.

#### The father factor

Born in St. Louis, Mo., Couch whacked his first golf ball at the age of 8 but only had a short three years to play the game with his dad, an executive for Anheuser-Busch.

"I had a passion for the game from the moment I picked up a club," he said, and that passion only intensified after the older Couch died when his son was just 11 years old. "I don't have a lot of memories of him," said Couch, now 44. "But I know some of the greatest times we had were on the golf course."

Through high school and college, Couch — who has a scratch handicap — played competitively.

"It's one of those things you get hold of and keep rolling with almost naturally," he said. "It never occurred to me to stop."

Couch moved to Pebble Beach two decades ago and lives within walking distance of the golf links and down the street from the driving range. He and his brother, George Couch III, grew up in the "beer business" and own the Watsonville-based Couch Distributing, which handles beer and nonalcoholic beverages for more than 1,000 restaurants/bars and 575 stores in Monterey, San Benito and Santa Cruz counties.

It was the beer connection that first brought Couch to the pro-am in 1992. "Guinness did a deal with the AT&T for a sponsorship and were kind enough to let me have the playing spot," he said.

Eight years passed before he received another invitation, and now he's had the pleasure of playing in the last six.

Though he can't know for sure, Couch suspects he has been invited back because of his charitable work, which includes serving on the boards of the Boys & Girls Club and the local chapter of The First Tee, a nonprofit that uses golf to teach life skills to kids of all ages and backgrounds.

"George and I have chosen to be very philanthropic. This community has been so good to us, we feel compelled to give back," he said. "Just being part of the business community and part of the charitable community, I've gotten to know a lot of the folks."

He admits he didn't play well in the final round. when the weather was poor and conditions were tough. "No excuses," he said nonetheless. "But it was still just such an unbelievable experience."

Pebble Beach Golf Links may be world-famous, but Spyglass Hill is one of his favorite courses on the planet. "It's a very difficult golf course but a very fair golf course," said Couch, who has also been club champion at the nearby Monterey Peninsula Country Club. "If you play well, your score will reflect it — if you hit the shots that are necessary, you get rewarded.'

On Pebble, Couch favors the 8th Hole, a tough par 4 that doglegs to the right along the north end of Carmel Beach, "because of the physical beauty of the hole and the demanding nature of the second shot. "You have to stand up there and really commit and execute," he said.

Beyond the golf itself, Couch said he's privileged to have a part in an event that does so much for so many. Since its arrival in Pebble Beach as Bing Crosby's Clambake in 1947, the pro-am has generated \$55 million for charity. Last year alone, it distributed more than \$4.6 million to nonprofits.

"Everyone who gets involved in that tournament has a direct impact on this community, because the money stays here," he said. "I'm trying to think of the proper word to convey the importance of the Monterey Peninsula Foundation [which handles the charitable giving]. It's essential to support this tournament to keep these charities viable.'

#### **House of golfers**

Mark House also started swinging at a young age and was quickly smitten with the game. He began playing 33 years ago at the age of 12 after his grandfather gave him his first set of golf clubs. His freshman year at Palma High School in Salinas, House played on the golf and baseball teams although their seasons were concurrent. When he was a sophomore, a league rule forced him to choose.

"I loved baseball, but the chances of playing professionally were slim," he said. "So I chose golf, which I could play for the rest of my life."

House continued to compete for Palma and then for UC Davis, only slowing when he attended graduate school at Golden Gate University in San Francisco.

"Then I started playing more when I started the job at Laventhol & Horvath," he said. The accounting and business consulting firm put House to work doing feasibility studies and projections for development projects. Banks would use the information he presented to decide whether to loan developers money.

He left H&L in 1989, and - like Couch - went into business with his brother, Mike. They started House Properties, and he moved to Carmel Valley.

"Once I got back to the Monterey Peninsula — it being golf meeca of the world - I started playing a lot more," said House, who joined Corral de Tierra Country Club in 1994.

Growing up in Salinas and playing golf since he was a kid, House was "always around the tournament" and dreamed of playing in it. His first time inside the ropes was as a caddie, and he carried players' bags in five tournaments, including in 1979 and 1980 for the then-president of the Northern California Golf Association.

He finally received the invitation to play in it for the first time last year. The NCGA — one of the

And his love of the game must play a role.

"I've been unbelievably lucky," he concluded. Couch is no slouch off the tee, either, and can claim no strokes for his handicap - perhaps in part because of the physical fitness, muscle control and concentration he honed in obtaining a black belt in karate. "When fighting someone, the worst thing you can do is lose your focus," he said.

#### Making the cut

In the AT&T, his pro partners have included Sandy Lyle, Larry Rinker and Robert Gamez. But last year's tournament, when he ended up paired with friend Matt Gogel, particularly shined.

"From day one we played well," Couch said. "I'll never forget the whole experience of being in the hunt to make it to Sunday and pulling it off."

nation's largest amateur golf associations with 200,000 members — owns and runs Poppy Hills Golf Course. In exchange for offering its course for play during the AT&T, the NCGA board, on which House has served for six years, receives five amateur slots. "Something just happened to fall into place," and he ended up on the list for the 2005 pro-am.

"There were a lot of nerves," said House, who sought advice from Couch. He told House to enjoy the experience, even if he didn't play well.

"I don't think my feet hit the ground until about a week after the tournament," said House. His dad, Robert, caddied for him Thursday and Friday and brother Patrick carried for him at Spyglass Saturday.

"But on 18, I fired my caddie, and brought in my son, Marcus, who's 11," House said. "He was carrying the bag, and it was hitting the back of his ankles."

Although he was so thrilled by his son's presence that he can't remember his score on that final hole of the tournament, House could recall hitting the green in two strokes on the 14th Hole.

"I had never done that before," he said.

This year, House is secretary-treasurer on the NCGA board and so received the invitation to play in his second AT&T Pro-Am. He hopes his oldest son will again come out to watch, and maybe carry. House's two other children, Julianna and Max, have also shown a penchant for golf — as well they should, considering each has been out at Corral de Tierra with him since the age of 1, when he would bungee-cord their car seats to the golf cart.

He considers Corral de Tierra and Poppy Hills his home courses, and said the 10th at Poppy is one of the greatest risk/reward holes. "If you can hit a drive far enough, you can go for the green in two, and if you get it there, you have an eagle putt," he said. "And if not, you're going to battle for par."

Spyglass is among his favorite courses — particularly the deceivingly short par-4 4th Hole, "because it could give you a double or triple bogey as easily as a birdie."

And he's eagerly anticipating another round at the incomparable Pebble Beach Golf Links this week.

"I feel honored and privileged," he said. "I'm sure I'll have the adrenaline pumping, and my feet won't hit the ground again."

### For charities, the year's big golf event is more than just a game

OR NON-PROFIT organizations on the Monterey Peninsula, the AT&T National Pro-Am golf tournament is more than just a festive sporting event. Since 1947, the event has raised more than \$50 million for local charities. Those organizations in turn provide a remarkable array of services that benefit nearly every segment of our community. #### Music for the young at heart

For a generation hooked on iPods, music is just a click away. But for many seniors, even the music they loved best is a fading memory.

A group called Young at Heart is trying to change that. For two decades, the Santa Cruz-based non profit organization has brought live music to elderly residents in Monterey, Santa Cruz and Santa Clara counties.

Like so many charities, Young at Heart is dependent on the generosity of its donors. The group received \$20,000 from AT&T Charities last year.

"So many of these folks never get to hear music anymore," explained Michael Stamp, executive director. "Many never leave their rooms. So we're trying to brighten up their day by playing music.'

The inspiration for Young at Heart came after founder and musician Sean Seman performed an impromptu concert for an elderly resident in a nursing home. The man had not spoken for two years, but he

burst into song after listening to Seman play.

of "Many the seniors don't walk or move very well, but they'll tap their feet and hum along," said Stamp, who just happens to have the same name as a prominent

Monterey land use attorney. "Music brings up memories. It takes people back in time."

And from time to time, it does even more than that.

"Music speaks to a different part of the brain as language does," he said. "Sometimes people who can't even speak will remember the words to a song and sing them."

Featuring a roster of 10 professional musicians, Young at Heart offers seniors a wide variety of music, including jazz, folk, r&b, gospel, country, classical and traditional Irish music.

Starting out in nursing homes and convalescent hospitals, Young at Heart has expanded its services to include residential facilities and communities.

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and kids are faced with a mind-numbing variety of distractions, it's remarkable an organization like the Girl Scouts continues to thrive in the 21st century.

But Sharon Reece, CEO of the Girl Scouts of Monterey Bay, said they are thriving. According to Reece, there are over 1,000 girl scouts in Monterey County.

In Carmel and Carmel Valley, 74 Girl Scouts are supported by 58 volunteers.

In Monterey, Pacific Grove and Pebble Beach, 330 Girl Scouts are supported by 225 volunteers.

"We are even more relevant in a girl's life today because of all the stress and pressures girls now face," explained Reece, "Families are being pulled in so many directions."

Reece said the the Girls Scouts are still relevant because they have adapted well to change.

"We've been around for 94 years," she said. "Our mission has stayed the same but our programs are constantly changing to keep up with the times."

Because the Girl Scouts have to compete with so many other non-profit organizations for funding, the money the group receives annually from AT&T Charities is critical. They received \$35,000 last year for programs targeting under-served girls.

"We use that money to do community outreach in areas where it's not easy to bring in volunteers," Reece said. "We'll pay a local college student to be a troop leader if that's the only way we can serve girls in a migrant camp in Soledad."

Reaching under-served girls is now a big part of the Girl Scouts' focus.

"There's no reason that only girls lucky enough to have a mother who can volunteer can be Girl Scouts," Reece said. "Girl Scouts is for every girl."

Since 1950, the nonprofit organization has served the elderly residents of Carmel and its nearby communities. Eight pros of the PGA's choosing, since the group is also an event sponsor.

■ Winners of the World Golf Championship.

Winners of any PGA Tour event in the past two years.

Champion of the Northern California Section of PGA of America, plus four more players from the section's qualifying rounds.

■ The top 125 players on last year's

official money list.

The leading money winner from last year's Nationwide Tour.

The top 10 finishers from last year's AT&T.

■ The top 35 finishers from the qualifying tournament held last December in Southern California.

## A five-time AT&T champ and a superstar 23 year old

ARK O'MEARA has won the Pebble Beach pro-am five times. Joining him on the links this year will be six other past champions, along with most of the greats of the game today, including a 23-year-old who won almost \$2.5 million in 2005 during first year on the PGA Tour. Here are profiles of some of the top pros participating in this year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

#### Sean O'Hair

- **2005 PGA Tour winnings:** \$2,461,482
- Age: 23
- **Hometown:** Boothwyn, Penn.

Born in Lubbock, Tex., O'Hair turned professional before graduating from high school and was a rookie on the PGA Tour last year after making it through all three stages of the 2004 Qualifying Tournament. He's got family help to cope with the pressure: Steve Lucas, his father-in-law, is his caddie. And the results have been impressive.

2005 season highlights: O'Hair has had a stellar first season on the PGA Tour - a year that included his first victory and a runner-up finish. The \$2,461,482 he earned last year was the second-most by a rookie in PGA Tour history behind the \$3,063,778 by Todd Hamilton in 2004. O'Hair's first PGA Tour win came at the John Deere Classic July 10 - just one day shy of his 23rd birthday. During the event he posted four rounds in the 60s, including a final-round 6-under-par 65 that overcame a fivestroke J.L. Lewis lead, becoming the seventh firsttime winner on PGA Tour in 2005, including the first rookie to break through. In the John Deere event, he earned a career-high \$720,000 and a spot in the British Open field the following week, jumping to 16th on the PGA Tour money list. He also moved to World No. 53 from No. 93 and from No. 1155 at the end of 2004. The Wednesday evening prior to the first round after struggling with his swing. "I was so desperate, I went to a Borders down the road from my

hotel to get a couple Jack Nicklaus books. Thursday morning I woke up and was trying it in the hotel room. I tried it on the range before I went and played on Thursday and just hit the ball probably the best I've ever hit it."

Then, with assistance from John Deere & Co., he



obtained a last-minute passport so he could make the trip to the British Open at St. Andrews. After arriving on Wednesday, he finished tied for 15th at the British Open, his first career start in a major championship.

Earlier in the year, in just his 12th start of his rookie campaign, O'Hair finished second at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship. With his runner-up finish, collected \$669,600 and edged towards the \$1million mark for the season. In the event, he held the lead after 36 and 54 holes, but could not catch Ted Purdy who closed with a 5-under 65.

O'Hair tied for eighth at the Buick Open in August tied for tenth at the Chrysler Championship in late October.

Career PGA Tour victories (1): 2005, John Deere Classic.

#### **Tim Clark**

- 2005 PGA Tour winnings: \$2,310,037
- **Age:** 30
- Hometown: Scottsdale, Ariz.

Born in Durban, South Africa, Clark recorded his first hole-in-one when he was age 8. He donated his first-place share of approximately \$20,000 at the November 2005 Nelson Mandela Invitational to a deaf girl from the Carel du Toit School for the Hearing Impaired in Tygerberg, South Africa, who needed implant surgery. "It put into perspective what life is all about — and it's not about all those putts I'm able to put away or miss at the crucial stages of an event, but life in general," Clark said.

2005 season highlights: He captured two international victories, played in his second Presidents Cup and participated in The Tour Championship for the first time. Also, he captured the South African Airways Open in his native country for the second time, coming into the final round in a four-way tie for first and shooting a final-round 6-under 66, which was good for a six-stroke victory.

Clark followed the win and a 30-hour journey from South Africa to Palm Springs with a PGA Tour career-best tie for second at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic, topping his third-place finish at the 2003 PGA Championship.

In his next start — just two weeks later — Clark tied for fourth at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

Later, he finished tied for third at the U.S. Open thanks to a pair of even-par 70s on the weekend. His top-five finish moved him into the top-10 of the International Team for The Presidents Cup.

Later, he finished in a tie for sixth place at The International, eight points behind Retief Goosen in the Modified Stableford scoring system. And he posted a 2-2-1 record for International squad in second Presidents Cup appearance. In October, he collected his fifth top-10 of the season, tying for sixth at the Chrysler Classic of Greensboro, surpassing the \$2million mark with his \$156,500 payday.

Three weeks later, he shared the third-round lead at the FUNAI Classic at Walt Disney World Resort, but a closing even-par 72 dropped him to a tie for tenth, his sixth top-10 of the season Career international victories (3): 2002, Bell's South African Open. 2005, South African Airways Open, Barclays Scottish Open.

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#### Ted Purdy

#### ■ 2005 PGA Tour winnings: \$2,198,368 ■ Age: 32 ■ Hometown: Phoenix, Ariz.

Born in Phoenix, Purdy says his mother and grandfather started him in the game of golf while he was still in diapers. He lists Jimmy Buffett as his hero, and was coached for 25 years by Pam Barnett, one of the few female instructors on PGA Tour.

**2005 season highlights:** Purdy had a career year, earning more than \$2 million in prize money and his first PGA Tour title, which he collected at the May EDS Byron Nelson Championship in just his 82nd

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career start. He did not post a bogey over the last 27 holes, trailed by two strokes entering the final round, but closed with a 5-under 65 and won by one shot over 54-hole leader Sean O'Hair, collecting a career-best check for \$1,116,000 and surpassing the \$1million mark for the second consecutive season.

Purdy recorded his first top-10 finish in a major championship in August at the PGA Championship at Baltusrol Golf Club, where he finished tied for tenth with a 4-under-par 66 final-round score.

Later, he made his first appearance at the season-ending PGA Tour Championship, finishing tied for 17th. Believing he had missed the MCI Heritage cut, he flew to Atlanta on the way home to Phoenix, but learned in the Atlanta airport that he had made the cut, then rented a car and drove back to Hilton Head, S.C. His clubs were on flight home, so he borrowed Mark Hensby's clubs, purchased a shirt at a local drugstore and finished tied for 59th.

Career PGA Tour victories (1): 2005, EDS Byron Nelson Championship.

**Career international victories (1):** 1997, Indian Masters.

#### Olin Browne

**2005 PGA Tour winnings:** \$2,171,928

**Age:** 46

Hometown: Hobe Sound, Fla.

A native of Washington, D.C., Browne is fluent in Spanish — a language he knows because of his father's Chilean heritage. After winning the 1993 Monterrey Open in Mexico, he gave his victory speech in the language. He did not start playing golf until he was 19, and got hooked on the game while attending Occidental College in Los Angeles.

2005 season highlights: Enjoyed a career year with a victory in September at the Deutsche Bank Championship and his first invitation to The PGA Tour Championship. Browne also contended in June at the U.S. Open at Pinehurst. In his first major championship start since the 2003 U.S. Open, he shared the firstand second-round lead at Pinehurst No.2 and was three back of two-time U.S. Open champion Retief Goosen heading into the final round. But a closing 10-over 80 dropped him from a tie for second to a tie for 23rd. Browne earned his spot at the 2005 U.S. Open by firing 73-59 at Woodmont CC in Rockville, Md.

At the Deutsch Bank Championship, he captured his third career victory at the age of 46 years, three months and 13 days. He was tied for the lead after 54 holes with John Rollins, Jason Bohn, Carl Pettersson and Billy Andrade after opening 68-65-70. He broke the five-way tie with a final-round 4-under-par 67 to defeat Bohn by one stroke, earning a careerbest \$990,000 and surpassed \$1 million in season earnings for the first time.

Two weeks after winning in Boston, Browne finished second at the Valero Texas Open to earn a spot into the 2005 WGC-American Express Championship, only his second appearance in a WGC event (played in the 2000 WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship). He capped his season tied for 14th at The Tour

## Stargazing at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am

AMERAS MAY may be banned during the tournament, and autograph-seeking is discouraged except when players have finished their rounds, but the AT&T National Pro-Am is nevertheless one of the best opportunities to get close to your favorite star. Whether you're a movie buff, love prime-time drama, idolize professional athletes, get weak-kneed for rock stars, or thrill at the sight of gazillionaire businessmen, the fairways of Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass are the place to be next week.

Here's a rundown of the celebrities who have promised to play. We've also included one who is not playing: Clint Eastwood who, as chairman of the foundation that sponsors the pro-am, is sure to be spotted around the links, though not as a competitor.

#### Harris Barton

A tackle for the San Francisco 49ers from 1987 to 1998, Barton was drafted in the first round of the 1987 NFL draft after a stellar collegiate career at the University of North Carolina where he earned a degree in business. Barton was regarded as one of the best-prepared and smartest linemen in the NFL. He also must have been one of the toughest: he was picked by John Madden for the All-Madden Team four times. After retiring, Barton joined Ronnie Lott is forming a venture capital firm, Champion Ventures.

Barton supports numerous civic and charitable organizations and, in 1995, he donated \$100,000 to his alma mater in honor of his father, Paul, who died in 1994 after a long battle with brain cancer. Barton has also long supported the National Brain Tumor Foundation. At 6' 4", he'll surely be one of the biggest golfers at this year's Pro-Am.

#### **Michael Bolton**

One of the world's top-selling vocalists and song writers, Bolton grew up idolizing such pioneers of R&B as Ray Charles, Otis Redding and Marvin Gave. Blessed with an incomparable voice, Bolton has sold more than 45 million albums during his career. With two Grammys for Best Male Vocalist, six American Music Awards, a string of No. 1 hits (including more than 100 songs he has written for other worldrenowned artists), sold-out concerts for millions of people around the globe and many humanitarian and industry awards to his credit, Bolton continues to captivate.

#### **Tom Brady**

Quarterback for the New England Patriots, Tom Brady was the MVP in

both the 2002 and 2004 Superbowls and led the team to yet another

Superbowl victory last year. The last two years, his appearance at the AT&T just days after winning Superbowls came as major surprises to many, but not to his good friend, Pebble Beach Co. CEO Bill Perocchi. This year, his appearance was confirmed just two weeks ago, after he announced he would not play in the Pro Bowl. A native of San Mateo, Brady first won the NFL championship in just his second year as a starter.

#### Joe Buck

Son of Hall of Fame sportscaster Jack Buck, Joe Buck has won numerous Emmy Awards for his work with Fox Sports television.

After graduating high school in St. Louis, MO, Buck began his broadcasting career in 1989 while he was an undergraduate at Indiana University. In 1991, Buck followed in his father's footsteps by broadcasting for the Cardinals on local television and radio.

In 1994, Buck was hired by Fox, and at the age of 25 became the youngest man ever to announce a regular slate of National Football League games on network television. In 1996, he was named Fox's lead play-by-play voice for Major League Baseball, teaming with Tim McCarver, and that year, he became the youngest man to do a national broadcast for a World Series.

On September 8, 1998, Joe Buck called Mark McGwire's 62nd home run that broke Roger Maris' single-season record.

Buck became Fox Sports' lead NFL play-by-play man in 2002 (taking over for Pat Summerall).

#### Glen Campbell

Born in Delight, Ark., Campbell is the seventh son in a family of eight boys and four girls, all of whom played guitar and sang. At 14 he left home to pursue a career in music. He started with a three-piece band in Houston, then he moved to Albuquerque and joined a Western swing band led by his uncle, Dick Bills. At 24, Campbell moved to Los Angeles, where he quickly found studio work as a guitarist. He played on records by Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, Merle Haggard, Elvis Presley, Ray Charles and the Mamas and the Papas. In 1965, he even toured as a member of the Beach Boys during the absence of Brian Wilson.

Finally, in 1967, Campbell made a breakthrough under his own name. He took a song that appeared to be all wrong for a pop hit, with a rambling lyric, no chorus and a folk-country feel. For the first of many times to come, he recorded a song simply because he thought it was a great song, and "Gentle on My Mind" went on to become not only his signature song, but one of the most played singles in history.

He hosted a summer replacement TV show for the Smothers Brothers in 1968 which was so successful that he had his own show, "The Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour," through 1972. He earned a pair of gold singles in 1969 with "Wichita Lineman" and "Galveston." Campbell hit No. 1 on the country, pop and easy-listening charts in 1975 with "Rhinestone Cowboy," and he topped the pop charts again in 1977 with "Southern Nights." He starred in two movies, "True Grit" (with John Wayne) and "Norwood," and recorded an album with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

#### Eric Close

Star of "Without a Trace," (CBS, Thursdays at 10 p.m.) Eric Close has starred in the series "Now & Again" and "The Magnificent Seven" as well as "Dark Skies" and "McKenna." His other television credits include appearances in the series "Sisters" and "Santa Barbara." He also starred in the Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation "Follow the Stars Home" on CBS and the 20-hour, 10-part mini-series "Taken," which was executive-produced by Steven Spielberg and received a Golden Globe nomination. His feature film credits include "Liberty, Maine," "The Sky Is Falling," and "Safe House." Close was born in Staten Island, New York, and lives in Los Angeles with his wife and two daughters.

#### Carson Daly

Winner of a golf scholarship to Loyola Marymount University and a one-time caddy for O.J. Simpson, Daly gained fame as host of the MTV show, "Total Request Live," and now has his own late-night talk show on NBC, "Last Call With Carson Daly," which follows Jay Leno and Conan O'Brien.

#### **Bill Devane**

Perhaps best known for his 10-year stint as a corporate cad on "Knot's Landing," Devane has appeared in numerous TV mini-series and more than 20 films, including "Marathon Man," "Yanks," "Payback" and "Hollow Man."

#### Tom Dreesen

A comedian who has played Vegas, Reno and Atlantic City with the likes

of Liza Minelli and Sammy Davis, Jr., and who spent a decade as Frank Sinatra's opening act, has also appeared in many network television shows including more than 50 appear-ances on the "Tonight Show" and guest roles on TV shows such as "Columbo," "Gabriel's Fire," "Murder She Wrote" and "Touched By An Angel." To show his versatility, he once recorded a comedy album, "That White Boy's Crazy," before an all black audience. According to Dreesen, he never strayed too far from his old neighborhood, and to show appreciation, the city of Harvey, Ill. named a street after him, "Dreesen Street," on Aug. 22, 1992.

#### Clint Eastwood

Mayor of Carmel-by-the-Sea from 1986 to 1988 and supporter of numerous local charitable and conservation causes, the indefatigable Eastwood is a familiar face on the Monterey Peninsula. Winner of Best Director and Best Actor Oscars for "Unforgiven" (1992), and Best Actor and Best Picture Oscars for "Million Dollar Baby" (2004), Eastwood has appeared in, produced and/or directed more than 50 motion pictures, beginning with "Revenge of the Creature" in 1955. His latest movie, "Flags of Our Fathers," which tells the story of the men in the famous flag-raising photo of Iwo Jima, is currently in post production. "Million Dollar Baby,' starring Hilary Swank and Morgan Freeman, won four Academy Awards last year. In 2000, he was honored by President Bill Clinton with the Kennedy Center Medal for his lifetime achievements in the arts. Eastwood, a co-owner of the Pebble Beach

#### Craig T. Nelson

Star of the CBS show, "The District," where he portrayed Chief Jack Mannion, Craig Richard Nelson was born April 4, 1946, in Spokane, Wash. He attended the University of Arizona and studied acting at the Oxford Theater in Los Angeles. Nelson began his career working with Barry Levinson as a radio writer/performer and stand-up comic. He added the "T" to his name because there was another actor registered with the Screen Actor's Guild that had the same name. His previous prime-time show, "Coach," was a major hit from 1989 to 1997.

#### Chris O'Donnell

A native of Winnetka, Ill., O'Donnell is best known for his portrayal of Robin in "Batman Forever" and "Batman and Robin," and for "Scent of a Woman," which earned him a Best Supporting Actor Oscar nomination. He also got highly favorable reviews for "The Three Musketeers" in 1993. Recently, he appeared in "Vertical Limit," "29 Palms" and "Kinsey."

#### **Ray Romano**

Ray Romano was star of the hit CBS comedy, "Everybody Loves Raymond," which finished a nine-year run as prime time's highest-rated comedy last Spring — the same year it won an Emmy for Best Comedy. Born in 1957 in New York City, Romano, who became one of the nation's highest paid actors, originally planned to become an accountant.

#### **Emmitt Smith**

Just 5' 9" tall, Smith is one of football's preeminent players and the alltime leading runner, having rushed for 18,355 yard, including 164 touchdowns in 13 seasons with the Dallas Cowboys and two with the Arizona Cardinals. Smith is the only player in NFL history to win the rushing title and the Superbowl in the same season.

#### **Ozzie Smith**

Known as "The Wizard of Oz," Ozzie Smith combined athletic ability with acrobatic skill to become one of major league baseball's great defensive shortstops. In 19 seasons with the Padres and Cardinals, the 13-time

They had their own prime time comedy shows in the 1960s, 1970s and 1980s, produced 12 top-selling albums and have made countless appearances in Las Vegas and around the country.

According to his official bio, Tom's "passion is for golf," which is no surprise to fans of the AT&T who, during lulls in play, have also been treated to his amazing yo-yo tricks.

#### Donald Trump

One of New York's dominant personalities, Trump has altered the Manhattan skyline with numerous distinctive building projects (which he often names for himself), including Fifth Avenue's "Trump Tower." In 1984, Mark's brother, Donnie, began singing with New Kids On The Block, which became an international success. Later, under the guidance of his famous brother, Mark formed the band Marky Mark and the Funky Bunch and recorded the album Music For The People, with Donnie as producer. It achieved platinum status thanks to the first single "Good Vibrations," which was a number one hit.

In 1993, Wahlberg accepted a small role in the film "The Substitute." Although it went straight to video, his performance did not go unnoticed. He scored parts in Renaissance Man starring Danny DeVito and The

Herron, Tom Lehman and Lee Janzen are Minnesotans who have won more than once on the PGA Tour. His sister, Alissa, won the 1999 U.S. Mid-Amateur and is a three-time Minnesota Amateur champion.

2005 season highlights: Herron finished the season inside the top 30 for the third time in his 10-year career and went over the \$2-million mark for the second time. His seven top-10s matched his career high set in 1999.

He recorded his second top-10 in the last three years at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic in January with a tied for sixth.

A week later, he opened with a 1-over 73 but came back with three rounds in the 60s to finish tied for fourth at the FBR Open in Phoenix.

In September, Herron finished fourth at the 84 Lumber Classic. And in October, he finished in a season-best tied for third at the Chrysler Championship (\$216,164) moving him into the top 30 on the PGA Tour money list to qualify for The Tour Championship the next week, where he finished tied for 14th.

In the fall of 1993 his first single, "What's It To You," went straight to number one on the charts. His biggest selling albums are "Say No More" and "Live Laugh Love." Walker is considered a modest individual and says he sees himself in the face of each and every fan. "When we make records," he says, "it's final. The records will always be the same, but it's the fans who give life to the music. On stage, you know immediately if you are really reaching people."

#### **Charles Howell III**

Born in Augusta, Georgia, and raised near Augusta National, his next-door neighbor was the first person who introduced him to golf, which he started playing at age 7, winning five tournaments before his 11th birthday. Howell shot his first sub-70 tournament round at age 10, the same age at which he began taking lessons from instructor David Leadbetter. His father is a pediatric surgeon.

2005 season highlights: Recorded six top-10s and finished in the top 30 overall for the third time in his five-year career. In his first start, Howell closed 64-67 to finish tied for third at the Sony Open in Hawaii, two shots behind Vijay Singh. The following week, he added a tie for second at the Buick Invitational in La Jolla, finishing three strokes behind Tiger Woods. On the 72nd hole, his approach shot hit the base of the flag for a near eagle, then bounced out and spun back into the water. He made a bogey. "I didn't know whether to laugh or cry," Howell said. "Obviously, it's a crazy game."

O'Meara took up the game at age 13, when his family moved near a golf course in California. He teamed with PGA Tour Design Services to build TPC of Valencia (CA), which opened in 2003.

2005 season highlights: Started the season playing on a Major Medical Extension, but was unable to earn enough money to get back into the top-125 category with the eight events. Will use his one time 10p-50 Gareer Money List exemption for the 2006 season. Last year, he finished outside the top-150 (No. 198) on the money list for the first time in his 25-year career. Perhaps the most intense actor in America, Woods has frightened or fascinated audiences in movies like "The Onion Field," "Once Upon a Time in America," "Salvador," "Ghosts of Mississippi" and "Any Given Sunday." He has been the voice of Hades, Lord of the Dead, in two "Hercules" animated films for Disney and portrayed former N.Y. Mayor Rudy Giuliani in a 2003 biographical TV movie. In 1999, he costarred in the Clint Eastwooddirected "True Crime." His most recent projects, not yet released, are the films, "End Game" and "Surf's Up."

Born in Denver, Colo., Gogel's dad purchased tickets for Matt and his brother to attend the 1982 PGA Championship at Southern Hills CC in Tulsa where he watched Tom Watson and became hooked on golf. Honorary Coach of the Kansas delegation to the 2003 Special Olympics in Dublin, Ireland, Gogel is also involved in many Kansas City community activities, including Turning Point, an outreach and counseling program for people whose relatives have been stricken with cancer.

In 2002, he captured his first PGA Tour victory at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am two years after finishing tied for second and being overtaken by Tiger Woods on the back nine. In 2002, he came from four back after 54 holes to overtake Pat Perez, making a 35-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole at Pebble Beach to tie Perez for the lead and winning the event moments later after Perez triple-bogeyed the hole. Gogel earned full exempt status in 2001 on the strength of four top-10s and seven top-25s. He shared the third-round lead with Mark Brooks at



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
