## Intoxicated man learns how not to break into his own house

FIREFIGHTERS HAD to free a 21-year-old Oliver Road resident from a small window early March 29 after he became stuck trying to crawl through.

According to Monterey County Sheriff's Sgt. John

DiCarlo, a neighbor heard the man yelling for help and phoned authorities around 4 a.m. Deputies, an engine from the Cypress Fire Protection District's Rio Road station and a Westmed ambulance responded to find the man's legs dangling from a window in the front of the house.

DiCarlo said too many drinks likely marred the man's

judgment. When he arrived home and tried to get into the house, his key broke off in the lock. Rather than call a locksmith or otherwise try to find help, he decided to break a 6by-10-inch pane of glass in the side of a pop-out window.

## LandWatch will continue general plan battle in court

Appeals court turns deaf ear, but group doesn't plan to recirculate petition in Spanish

#### By KELLY NIX

BACKERS OF the troubled general plan initiative will not re-circulate petitions in hopes of placing the plan on the November ballot, and will focus their attention on amending the county supervisors' general plan, LandWatch Monterey County's executive director said this week.

On Tuesday, judges Alex Kozinski and Pamela Ann Rymer of the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals denied a request for an emergency injunction to place the LandWatch initiative on the June ballot. That means a full hearing on whether it has to be translated into Spanish is months away. But LandWatch thinks it will eventually prevail.

We want this to be decided by the courts because we feel the law is on our side," Chris Fitz said Wednesday. "In the meantime, we are very focused on the board of supervisors' fourth draft of the general plan, and we are going to be very involved in that."

The unexpected move by LandWatch to work with supervisors would seem to indicate initiative backers have, at least for now, lost hope for the initiative. But Fitz said they haven't given up yet.

'You don't concede when you are in the right," he said. "You hang in there. There hasn't been a decision

WHEN WORKERS at a Mission Street restaurant locked up last Thursday night, they inadvertently left an oven blazing at 500 degrees with trays of food inside, according to Carmel firefighters called by a neighboring restaurant to investigate smoke. Just after 10 p.m. March 30, a fire engine and ambulance arrived in the area of Mission Street between Ocean and Seventh avenues to search for the source, according to Carmel Fire reports. Finding the small Chinese restaurant full of smoke, they upgraded the call to a structure fire, summoning help from neighboring Cypress Fire Protection District, and broke into Tommy's Wok.

"Crews deployed a one-and-three-quarter-inch attack line, forced entry into the restaurant and discovered the oven had been left on to 500 degrees with trays of black beans inside, the smoke having filled the restaurant," Carmel Shift Commander Bruce Meyer wrote in his report. The blazing heat incinerated the contents and thoroughly charred the oven's interior and stovetop. Firefighters also found incense burning in holders near the back door. Crews shut off the gas, ventilated the restaurant and notified the Monterey County Health Department of the accident.

## Walbrun: It's going to be close

THREE MONTHS ago, he was a complete unknown in Carmel politics.

But support for Carmel City Council candidate Ryan Walbrun has piled up in recent weeks and, with the election just a few days away, Walbrun told The Pine Cone he thinks the race between him and incumbents Paula Hazdovac and Gerard Rose "is going to be close."

A rainy day could hurt him, said Walbrun, a meteorologist, because it could keep people away from the polls.

His last-minute support has come not only in letters to The Carmel Pine Cone but in cash gifts to his campaign fund. All of the contributions were \$99 or less, relieving him of the legal obligation to reveal his backers by name and gift amount in finance statements filed at city hall Monday. When he announced his candidacy, Walbrun said he planned to spend less than \$1,000 during his campaign, but he filed revised documents April 3 documenting \$1,348 in contributions and \$1,134.88 in expenditures. He is serving as his own treasurer.

"It just more or less happened — it's just a grassroots kind of thing," he said. Walbrun was unsure how many checks he received but estimated they numbered between 30 and 40 and ranged from \$10 to \$99.

'On my website I said I didn't want donations larger than that, because I didn't want to do the paperwork," he said. Most arrived in his post office box following the Carmel Residents Association's candidates forum March 23.

"It's very exhilarating to have people believe in you like that," said Walbrun, 32, who works for the National Weather Service. "It's very empowering."

#### **Disaster preparedness**

Walbrun has said he wants better disaster preparedness and to achieve a balance between residential and business concerns, though he has not articulated specific views regarding how the city should be run. He has never served on a board or commission and had not attended a council meeting before entering the race, but he has gained vocal support

game to do the most damage.

"I think the houses they picked were just random," Monterey County Sheriff's Deputy Rick Matthews said of the Lisbon Lane vandalism.

A stucco wall around a stately home on the 1400 block of Lisbon was spray-painted in red with the words "the game" and a swastika, while the pillar of another home on the 1200 block was spray-painted with a swastika and "TG." The vandals also tagged a directional sign with "TG."

At least one of the incidents of vandalism is believed to have occurred during March 31 and April 2, the sheriff's office said.

In late December, vandals marked several houses in Pebble Beach with swastikas, "the game," and "FU."

All of the swastikas vandals have painted have been leftfacing, or backward, in contrast to swastikas used in Nazi Germany, which were right-facing.

Believed by sheriff's investigators to be teenagers, vandals destroyed mailboxes, spray-painted houses and broken windows in Pebble Beach from October to December. From March 4 to 14, vandals shattered seven rear windows and two

A BUILDING inspector's lunchtime walk, a fire alarm and a nosy neighbor revealed illegal construction at four Carmel properties in the last two weeks. The projects were red tagged, according to building official Tim Meroney, and the owners face fines.

Two Ocean Avenue businesses were undergoing interior remodels, including new dressing rooms, electrical and lighting, without permits. Also, bathrooms were being upgraded

The municipal code requires building permits for almost all construction including replacing sinks, installing dishwashers, moving walls or tinkering with electrical and plumbing systems.

Building permit fees are based on the cost of work done, and anyone caught starting work without permits pays double. (For an interior remodel valued at \$75,000, the building permit would cost \$818.75.)

#### Alarm bells ring


A fire alarm sounding in the Comfort Inn at Ocean

and Torres at 10:30 a.m. March 28 summoned Carmel firefighters and Meroney, who also works as a reserve police officer. Inside, he discovered workers ripping out bathrooms in two units. Concluding the dust they generated triggered the alarm, Meroney radioed emergency crews to say it was "illegal construction," not a bona fide conflagration.


The two-man crew was installing new tubs, toilets, counters, sinks, cabinets, flooring, electrical and lighting, according to Meroney. He told them to stop and handed the red tag to the onsite manager.

The owner, Nilam Patel of PRS Hotel Group LLC in Monterey, later came to city hall to submit plans for remod-

## Electrical short ignites bedroom curtains in wood cottage

A SANTA Fe Street resident called 911, threw water at a fire burning a bedroom wall and ran out of her house into the rain

Tuesday morning. Within moments, police officers and firefighters arrived to find smoke pouring from the rear of the old wooden cottage, but the water had done the trick, according to Carmel Fire Shift

"It was out, but the house was full of smoke," he said. Using a thermal imager, the crew swept the house in search of victims and areas where the fire might be burning within the walls or roof. Finding neither, firefighters started a large fan to force the heavy smoke from inside and survey the scene more closely.

Meanwhile, an ambulance crew examined Sandy Don and took her to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula for possible smoke inhalation, according to Kastros.

David Brown, a Pacific Grove Fire assistant chief contracted to work for Carmel, arrived to investigate the cause. Kastros said Don reported seeing flames coming from an electric outlet beneath a bedroom window.

"We had the electrical and gas turned off and started checking the outlet and the pattern of the fire," which had charred part of the wall and the window frame, according to Kastros. "She described it as a flame shooting out and up, which may have ignited the curtain that was hanging there. That was where most of the charring was."

Firefighters suspect a short caused an estimated \$10,000 in damage to the structure and \$2,000 in damage to its contents, mostly due to the smoke.

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
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## Drunk sleeps it off in middle of road

A 35-YEAR-OLD Big Sur resident was arrested for possession of "concentrated cannabis" — better known as hash — and marijuana around 12:40 a.m. March 31 after he parked his truck in an Ocean Avenue intersection and turned off the headlights, according to Carmel Police Sgt. John Nyunt.

Derek Estes pulled up to the stop sign at Ocean Avenue and Carpenter Street and was stationary for a minute with only his parking lights on, then turned those off, Nyunt said. Officer Jeff Watkins, parked nearby to monitor the intersection, turned on his lights, at which point Estes turned on his and drove away.

After Estes turned onto a cross street without signaling, Watkins pulled him over.

"The subject said he stopped and was sit-

ting there because he was praying for the officer," Nyunt said. "He was trying to give the officer positive energy."

Watkins reported Estes looked like he was trying to hide something and said he smelled burnt marijuana in the vehicle. The officer questioned Estes, who "was very cooperative," and admitted having a small amount of dope in the truck, Nyunt said.

That revelation led to a vehicle search which turned up a glass vial of suspected hash oil, tin foil containing hash, three lumps of brown hash, and a film canister, a vial and several baggies of apparent marijuana, according to Nyunt. He also possessed illegal fireworks.

Estes was arrested for possession — but not driving under the influence — and lodged at Monterey County Jail.



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## Red Cross honors community heroes

A LIFESAVING Carmel Valley firefighter, a Carmel woman who feeds and clothes the needy, a C.V. teen whose heart is in India and a Monterey County Sheriff's deputy who risked his life to pull a man from an overturned car were among those recognized as "Ordinary People ... Extraordinary Heroes of Monterey and San Benito Counties" by local chapters of the American Red Cross March 29. The annual breakfast — a key fundraiser for the Carmel and Monterey County/San Benito County chapters — saw nine awards bestowed upon people and institutions.

Travis Alewine, a volunteer firefighter with the Carmel Valley Fire Protection District, was walking with his wife on Carmel Beach Dec. 26, 2005, when he encountered a woman worried about her young son, who had been Boogie boarding. Scanning the surf, Alewine spotted the board, but not the boy. He called Monterey County Fire Communications to dispatch emergency crews and then stripped off his shoes and outer clothes, plunging in to reach the cold, tired child struggling in the waves.

He also found a young girl in the same predicament and coached them to dive under the waves and swim parallel to the shore to escape a rip tide. As emergency crews arrived, nearby surfers who figured out what was going on helped them get to shore. "One of the surfers was the little girl's dad," Alewine said. She had planned to swim out to surf with him but never got there.

He thanked his chief, Sidney Reade, for nominating him for the "Medical Hero" award, but he did not want the credit. "Surfers do it all day long, every day," he said. "If you know a surfer, I'm sure he's saved somebody's life."

#### **Rice Plus Project**

Carmel resident Sandhya Kolar and her husband, Ramesh, have helped feed and clothe Monterey County's needy for more than 15 years. She started off dividing a 50-pound sack of rice for distribution to farm workers. Last month, she and a few dozen volunteers bagged hundreds of pounds of rice and beans, as they do each month. Every Christmas, they buy and wrap hundreds of gifts to hand out, and she regularly purchases blankets when it's cold, and clothes and toiletries for teenagers who arrive at school with nothing. Ramesh Kolar nominated his wife for the "Good Samaritan — Adult Hero" award.

"The most spiritual thing you can do is help people," she said. "It changes your life to think about someone else."

#### Passage to India

When she was 5, Kim Burwash saw a television show about starving kids in India and asked her dad to take her

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


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## Mother Nature supports Highway 1 project

m A}$ T A public hearing March 21, Caltrans officials urged Big Sur residents to support a \$30 million Highway 1 maintenance project at Pitkins Curve. Just two weeks later, the project received a boost more effective than any PowerPoint presentation.

The highway at Pitkins Curve - located about one mile south of the Lucia Lodge - is closed indefinitely after yet another rock slide April 4.

"We have no idea when the road will be open," said Caltrans public information officer Jim Shivers. "It's not the type of job that can be done overnight. There are some large rocks we need to remove. We're hoping for good weather."

Meanwhile, the Big Sur Chamber of Commerce has passed the word to local businesses. "Our immediate concern is to alert everybody," explained Stan Russell, the chamber's webmaster. "Everyone wants to know what's going on. Inns and resorts need to take care of their guests.'

Businesses are notified by a phone tree, while everybody on the chamber's mailing list receives e-mail updates.

"People have grown to depend on us sending them emails," Russell said. "Often people are out of town when



there is a slide. They check their messages to see if there's a problem."

The chamber's courtesy has saved South Coast residents countless gallons of gasoline. For instance, a local returning from Southern California would probably exit Highway 101 at San Luis Obispo if he didn't know the coast road was closed. But thanks to the efforts of the chamber, a wellinformed resident could make his way home through Jolon or, under particularly severe conditions, Carmel.


Caltrans has proposed building a bridge across across the highway at Pitkins Curve, allowing small rocks and debris to cascade beneath it. At Rain Rocks, located just south of Pitkins Curve, the state agency would construct a rock shed, which would resemble a tunnel.

## Pharmacy robber nabbed

THE MAN suspected of threatening a Central Avenue Pharmacy employee and fleeing with two large bottles of prescription drugs Feb. 9 was arrested in Salinas for attempting to rob another drug store April 3, according to Pacific Grove Police Sgt. Cameron White. An employee of Star Care Pharmacy jumped on 24-year-old Gonzales resident Kevin Stewart and wrestled him to the ground after he brandished a handgun, according to White, and the employee and other witnesses detained him until Salinas police arrived.

After the P.G. incident, PGPD Chief Carl Miller said similarities between it and the Jan. 23 robbery of a Salinas pharmacy indicated the same suspect."It was the same type of medication, and he took medicine only," Miller said then. He described it as "powerful analgesic pain killers," and said it's not uncommon for people addicted to prescription drugs to commit crimes to get them. Stewart was taken to Monterey County Jail and held on \$277,500 bail.

ing, it will consider a plan by ranch co-owner Jim Morgens to subdivide his 891 acres into 94 residential lots, 15 units of affordable housing, a 20-acre lot for an existing equestrian facility, with 783 acres as dedicated open space. Only about 9 percent of the ranch's total acreage would be developed, according Jim Morgens. And, he points out, everything Morgens is proposing is consistent with the longstanding zoning on the property, which his family has owned since 1966.

It has been more than a year since the Carmel Valley Land Use Advisory Committee unanimously recommended denial of the September Ranch project. Since then, a series of events far greater in scope than Morgens' plan - although certain-

ly inspired by it — have grabbed the headlines in the land use battle. The drive to incorporate Carmel Valley - which aims to slow development to a snail's pace and put land use decisions in the hands of local residents — has been bogged down as proponents and county officials wrangle over an amicable divorce settlement. And a campaign to place a slow-growth general plan initiative on the fall ballot stalled after a U.S. district court judge ruled activists violated the federal Voting Rights Act by circulating petitions in English only.

The Monterey County Board of Supervisors approved the September Ranch project in 1995, but lawsuits in 1999 derailed it on the grounds that traffic and water issues had not been adequately addressed in the original environmental impact report. Morgens spent more \$500,000 on a revised EIR

Opponents have tried to pokes holes in Morgens' assertion the ranch's aquifer has enough water to support his project. But some of the most vocal local residents say they dislike the plan's perceived threat to the valley's "rural character."

#### If you can't see it, is it there?

For the vast majority of locals, the greatest impact Morgens' plan could have on their daily activities, aside from a few extra cars on Carmel Valley Road, is their view of September Ranch as they zip past it at about 50 mph. The ranch's idyllic front pasture, with its rustic barn and frolicking horses, is one of the valley's prime examples of "rural character." So the question begs, what will Morgens' project do to change the way passersby view the ranch?

On a cool, blustery spring day between downpours, Morgens hiked along muddy ranch roads to point out 16 different building sites he said illustrated his intention to keep development out of the public viewshed.

"When we started the project, I came up here with realtor Skip Marquard and architect and land planner Steve Chidester," explained Morgens. "We walked all over the ranch and identified good sites that were invisible from Carmel Valley Road. We brought 15-foot flag poles, orange netting and walkie-talkies. We'd put the poles in the ground and then the guy on the road would say, 'I can see it,' and we'd pull it back until it disappeared from his view."

While some of the sites offer nice views to the west and to the south, others are ringed with oaks, Monterey pines and hedge-like clumps of dense foliage.


"We could have legally created as many as 209 lots," he said. "But we didn't want to pack that many in. Each of the lots has a lot of space around it. And none of them can be seen from the road.'

The same, though, can't be said for the views of a few neighbors who have grown accustomed to gazing upon a nature preserve larger than the city of Carmel.

"We see them, and they see us," he conceded. "If we tried to keep development out of their viewshed, we wouldn't have any land left. But given the topography, we're only talking about a few homes."

So as motorists zoom past the ranch, the biggest change they will notice is an extension of Brookdale Drive, which will serve as the entrance to the subdivision. After crossing the front pasture, the access road will soon disappear from view, Morgens said.

"We never even thought about putting lots on the front pasture," he insisted. "It wouldn't look like September Ranch then, would it?"

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## After 36 years, golf shop concessionaire to be replaced by P.G. city workers

IN A move Pacific Grove city staff say will increase profits and improve customer service at the municipal golf links clubhouse, city council members voted 4-3 Wednesday to take over management of the facility, ending an agreement with the pro shop's longtime operator.

The city will begin operating the clubhouse and golf shop at the end of December, when the lease runs out for Pete Vitarisi, who has run the golf concession for 36 years.

"We need the income and we need to serve our residents in this way," said Mayor Jim Costello at the council meeting. "I think this is a great proposal."

In a report to council members, city staff recommended the move, claiming the city could make an additional \$150,000 per year by running it on its own.

"I don't see the net result being any less than what we already receive," said the city's golf superintendent Mike Leach.

The report also cites complaints by golfers in regards to customer service.

"I think there is a historic understanding that people have been treated rudely [at the golf shop]," said councilman Scott Miller.

But Vitarisi, who said he first heard of the complaints after reading the council agenda on the city's website, said nobody from the city informed him about dissatisfaction from golfers.

"I was flabbergasted about seeing that on the Net," he said. "It's like airing your stuff on the Internet without having a discussion about it. When you do as much as 85,000

#### yet."

Kozinski and Rymer's ruling this week was in response to an appeal by supporters of the initiative after U.S. District Court Judge James Ware on March 23 ruled against placing the initiative on the June ballot because it violated the Voting Rights Act since the petitions were not circulated in English and Spanish.

In the latest order, dated April 4, Kozinski and Rymer also refused to set a hearing for the initiative until a rehearing is set for Padilla vs. Lever, a similar case in Orange County.

The initiative ran into trouble Feb. 28 when county supervisors voted 3-2 against placing it on the June ballot because of numerous legal questions.

Initiative supporters had collected about 15,000 signatures for the petitions, more than enough required by law to place it in front of voters.

Carlos Ramos, a member of the Latino Voting Rights

Coalition and a spokesman for two Latino litigants who sued because the process of gathering signatures for the initiative violated the Voting Rights Act, was pleased to hear of the decision, which was announced Wednesday.

"It makes a lot of sense," Ramos said. "There is a convergence throughout California, and an awareness of the Voting Rights Act."

#### Petitions as 'election materials'

In Padilla vs. Lever, the 9th Circuit determined Orange County election officials had a legal responsibility to ensure petitions seeking to recall a Santa Ana school board member were offered in English and Spanish. The ruling also indicated initiative petitions are considered election materials subject to the Voting Rights Act.

Because Ware in his order didn't include details about the process of translating the petitions into Spanish, recirculating them would be pointless, Fitz said.

"Ware's decision was so incomplete, it's unclear what we have to do to re-circulate," he said.

He also said supervisors would likely find fault with the recirculated petitions too.

"We're stuck," Fitz said.




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
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
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
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## Kids invited to honor **Beverly Cleary**

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## Right of first refusal water bill passes first hurdle in state senate

SENATE BILL 1630, which would give public agencies the right of first refusal in Monterey County to purchase a water company that's for sale, passed a senate committee Tuesday.

The bill would affect California American Water Co., which provides water to the Monterey Peninsula, and California Water Service Co., which provides water to the Salinas Valley.

Sen. Abel Maldonado, who sponsored the bill, said it offers local control of the water

supply, while Cal Am insists the bill is antibusiness and flies in the face of the resounding defeat last fall of a ballot initiative to study the takeover Cal Am.

Last week, Cal Am announced it was petitioning chambers of commerce in Monterey County to oppose the bill. Pacific Grove's chamber has spoken out against it.

The bill, which passed the Senate Energy, Utilities and Communications Committee, next go before the Senate will Appropriations committee for consideration.

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
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
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## Historian: Big Sur's Bohemians were different because they did it in the woods

HENRY MILLER wasn't the first creative soul to make Big Sur his home, but when the controversial author landed on Monterey County's South Coast in 1944, his arrival marked the beginning of what would soon be known by the readers of a 1947 Harper's Magazine article as "a cult of sex and anarchy" flourishing on Monterey County's rugged and remote coast.

Miller's Big Sur odyssey is just one of many fascinating tales told by Big Sur historian Jeff Norman in his latest work, "The Bohemians of Big Sur." Norman will present a talk on the subject Monday, April 10, at Sunset Center's Carpenter



Hall. The lecture begins at 7

p.m. and is free. "Most people think of Bohemians as an urban phenomenon," explained Norman, a longtime Big Sur resident. "One of the most interesting things about the Big Sur Bohemians is that they did it in the woods. It wasn't the cafe culture of cities."

According to Norman, the story of outside-themainstream artists and writers in Big Sur begins in the 1890s, when a handful of them began visiting a remote community that had been

settled for only one generation and could only be reached by horseback.

Poet Robinson Jeffers was one of the first, and his work is filled with references to Big Sur. Another early artistic adventurer was Harry Lafler, a writer, poet and editor who tried to establish an artist's colony. Appropriately, a creek adjacent to Big Sur's oldest art venue, Coast Gallery, bears his name.

The completion of Highway 1 in 1937 made the wild coast infinitely more accessible, and larger numbers of artists

## Local artist looks to the past for inspiration in depicting local fishermen and their boats

THE MONTEREY Bay fishing industry has lost some of its luster since its heyday in the decade immediately following World War II. Apparently, though, nobody bothered to tell Salinas artist Gerard Martin.

Martin — whose work will be on display in a new group exhibit opening Saturday, April 8, at the Carmel Art Association — breathes new life into the fading industry. Painting in a style that evokes a bygone era yet retains vibrancy, Martin has put together a collection of work that celebrates the unheralded hard work of local fisherman.

This isn't the first time Martin has found creative inspira-

tion in the labors of others. Just a year ago, the Carmel nonprofit gallery hosted an exhibit of his paintings depicting Salinas Valley farm workers. And like his new work, the images of farm workers take the viewer back to a simpler time.

Born in Monterey, Martin has long been fascinated by local history. And by employing the techniques of Early California artists, he has the uncanny knack of making his subjects appear timeless.

"I'm nostalgic," conceded Martin. "And I like the California impressionism of the 1920s and 1930s. I look up to painters of that era like Armin Hanson and Effie Fortune. I like the more traditional look in paintings."

Martin's exhibit features 18 paintings that provide a remarkable glimpse of an industry that seems as relevant as ever on his canvases. Even a decrepit fishing boat, long past its prime, stands proud against its maritime backdrop. "I made a half dozen trips to Moss Landing "he said "To me. seeking relics in disrepair," he said. "To me, they're beautiful in their decay. Most of the boats in my paintings are 60 years or older. They really knew how to build a better boat back then, or at a prettier one." To see more of Martin's work, visit the Galerie Plein Aire, which is located on the same block as the art association. Also featured at the art association will be new exhibits by Mark Farina, Fred Carvell, Sam Harris and Robert Reynolds Hewitt. Farina, a Pacific Grove resident who paints with both oils and watercolors, is a traditionalist who draws inspiration from early California artists. Carvell, who lives in Carmel Valley, uses bright colors and modern techniques to depict local landscapes. Harris, whose father (also known as

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## Monterey Wine Festival quickly turns novices into experts

T ISN'T easy to commit a faux pas these days. Hardly anything is off limits, and what once would have raised eyebrows - describing your fetishes or showing off your underwear - has today become lively cocktail party behavior.

But tolerance has its limits, and nothing makes one seem more of a rube than to be uneducated about one of California's most precious commodities: wine.

Wine appreciators — educated or not — learned a few lessons this past weekend from some world-class chefs and noted oenophiles at the 30th annual Monterey Wine Festival, known as "America's Original Wine Festival."

Part tourist-driven wine tasting experience and part genuine educational program, seminars such as Coastal Chardonnays Demystified and Merits of Merlot taught curious wine enthusiasts the basics of the mysterious presence of chocolate in a Merlot or the hints of honey in a Chardonnay.

A partial list of wine-savvy speakers included Bill

Anderson of Château Julien Wine Estate, Randall Graham of Bonny Doon Winery, Dan Lee of Morgan Winery and Chris Sawyer of Wine X Magazine.

On Friday and Saturday night, Grand Tasting events took place at the Monterey Conference Center. Whites and sparkling wines were discussed on Friday, and red wines on Saturday.

Attendees ranged from married couples to single folk, local wine and restaurant industry veterans to stockbrokers, young surfers to aging yuppies. Some people were pondering a career change to the wine industry, while others had been coming to the annual event for decades.

"Any excuse to come to Monterey — especially for the 30th anniversary," cooed one San Jose couple who has attended the affair for years.

Upon arrival, event goers were given a program and a gleaming wine tumbler (sans stem) - a glassware decision which received mixed reviews and sparked plenty of lively debate. The glass itself did not insult the integrity of the



wines, but sipping from its small mouth required an awkward tilt of the head. On the upside, I did not hear any glasses break during the event.

The crowds were also supplied with bottled water and a variety of cheeses from online retailer igourmet.com.

As well-dressed attendees meandered through the 50-plus tasting stations, winemakers eagerly shared information about each of the wines they were pouring. Unlike many wine-tasting events, the volume of guests did not prohibit personal one-on-one interaction with winemakers and pourers, and I found myself delighted to engage in interesting dialogue at almost every stop.

#### Making the connection

At Chalk Hill Estate Vineyards & Winery's table, an admitted wine novice gently swirled a glass of wine, taking verbal note of its clarity. Next, the middle-aged man inhaled the aromas. Finally, he took a sip and a smile spread across his face. He slowly performed this drill with each of the three offerings and enthusiastically talked about the different aromas.

The pourer shared insights on each wine, talking about the terroir and specific winemaking techniques, and advised that taking the time to swirl and sniff each wine helped "make the connection" when identifying its characteristics.

In no time, the increasingly confident novice was able to identify characteristics of black currant, plum, spice and tobacco.


The pourer then delved into the topics of brilliance, tone, and depth, almost as though the man had successfully completed his prerequisites and had amassed the tools to appreciate what he had to bring to the table next.


As the event drew to an end, the crowd was clearly relaxed and reveling in wine-induced buzzes. Not only did attendees gain an invaluable amount of information, they had the opportunity to engage in the art of wine small talk in an atmosphere that truly celebrated wine and "Ah hah!" learning experiences without snobbery.

from numerous city hall critics, frustrated at not being able to unseat Mayor Sue McCloud or her council allies in the last three elections.

Among Walbrun's emerging supporters are Ken White, a former four-term mayor who unsuccessfully ran for city council in 2002 after losing the mayor's race to Sue McCloud two years earlier, and his wife, Jean. In a letter last week, the Whites described Walbrun as "an intelligent and independent candidate for city council" and said he "appears wise for his age."

Former three-term city councilwoman Barbara Livingston, who retired in 2004 after trying to unseat McCloud in 2002, also favors Walbrun, and Carmel resident Hans Lehman called his thinking "fresh and unencumbered."

Having seized upon the issue of open government raised by the 2005 Monterey County Civil Grand Jury report, supporters said he would be an open-minded advocate for more transparency at city hall.

"That's very important to people to bring that in, and it's one of the reasons I have a lot of momentum right now," Walbrun said. "It's just basically the idea of keeping stuff out in the public and open, and having dialog."

According to his finance statements, Walbrun spent \$200.16 on "campaign paraphernalia" from a Louisville, Ky., business, \$686.29 on literature and mailings from Kinko's in Monterey, and \$105.60 on postage. He did not list his website operations or his filing fee with Monterey County Elections.

Walbrun said the gifts made the mailings possible. He is not purchasing print or television ads.

"Carmel is small enough that the most effective way is person to person," said Walbrun, who prefers going door to door, campaigning next to the post office and handing out cards in front of city hall.

#### Smaller war chests

Meanwhile, incumbent council members reported receiving more donations since filing their initial financial statements March 2. Though their year-to-date totals far exceed Walbrun's, the income and spending are well below those of previous elections. In more hotly contested races that had candidates battling in live debates and the media, campaign war chests reached five digits. In Mayor Sue McCloud's race against former city councilman Dick Ely two years ago, she amassed more than \$20,000 without soliciting, she said at the time.

Prior to taking the mayor's seat, McCloud served on the



Carmel City Council and the planning commission. A longtime Carmel resident who attended public schools here, she retired after a lengthy career in the CIA. Under her administration, the city adopted its decades-overdue Local Coastal Program and signed on with a private nonprofit to manage the recently renovated Sunset Center. Challenges she hopes to tackle during another term as mayor include contending with the state's ruling that stormwater cannot run into the ocean, the increased cost of ambulance service and the potential fallout from the failing county-run Natividad Medical Center.

According to statements compiled by campaign treasurer Richard Stewart and filed with the city March 30, the threeterm mayor received \$1,345.99 in cash contributions in March, for a total of \$7,086.99 this year. Gifts included \$100 from Earl and Catherine Power, and \$200 donations from Glenn and Marian Leidig, George and Patricia Walker and J.C. and M.B. Riksen. The balance of \$645.99 comprised smaller contributions.

McCloud reported spending \$1,058.48 — \$258 on Pine Cone ads, \$273 for postage and \$271 on the filing fee for Monterey County Elections, in addition to smaller costs not listed.

Her sole opponent, Dogman McBill, who has said he wants to keep Flanders Mansion, raise the hotel tax and provide more open government, signed a form pledging he would not raise nor spend more than \$1,000 on the campaign. He has not filed any campaign finance statements.

Councilwoman Paula Hazdovac, who grew up in Carmel and has served for 12 years — the same amount of time she has owned and run a Dolores Street store with her sister, Pat — said she remains determined to solve parking problems in town and wants to preserve the relationship between businesses and the city government. She also targeted the rising costs of ambulance service, favors spending more on capital projects and said some city laws need rethinking.

During March, Hazdovac received \$670 in contributions, for a total of \$3,614 this year, according to treasurer Karen Hunting, and she spent \$2,694.97. She listed a single contribution of \$100 from George and Patricia Walker, with the rest coming from smaller donations.

Expenses included \$858 to the U.S. Postal Service, \$249.45 to Office Depot in Sand City for printing her mailer



and \$1,444.80 on print ads.

Councilman Gerard Rose, who was appointed to the coun-

cil in 2000 to fill McCloud's seat when she became mayor and then won his seat outright two years later, said he advocates for environmental protection without too much government intervention. He has said he wants to see historic preservation issues and the Flanders Mansion lawsuit quickly resolved.

Rose, an attorney, received \$375 during the reporting period, for a total of \$7,743 so far this year. According to his treasurer, Merv Sutton, Rose received \$100 from Dennis Gambill, and \$275 in donations of less than \$100.

The Sunset Center polling place will be open Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., with results announced soon after at city hall

He spent \$2,926 during the period — \$1,651 on print ads

in The Pine Cone and \$1,275 to Comcast for television ads. The election will be held April 11, followed by announcements of the results during a gathering at Carmel City Hall. The newly elected officials will be sworn in April 18 in a ceremony at 3 p.m. in city hall.

there to help them. He said he would when she turned 10, and in 2000, the pair crossed the globe to aid the poor in that vast country. Since then, she raised and donated \$22,100 to the village of Vrindavan, helped drill a well, fed and provided medicine for more than 30,000 people and is helping construct a school and medical center. An aspiring actress, Burwash said she wants to produce documentary films about her favorite foreign country.

"There are tons of ways to make a difference," said Burwash, who received the "Good Samaritan - Youth Hero" award, including picking up trash, donating food or supporting other efforts. "A hero is someone who does all in their heart to help someone."

York School was named the "Educator Hero" for taking in two Hurricane Katrina evacuees, Devin Alexander and Steven Jackson, and making them feel at home. The boys, 15 and 16, came to live with their aunt and uncle in Salinas after their New Orleans house was destroyed, and the school's board unanimously voted to accept them in the middle of the term and cover the costs of their schooling.

Headmaster Chuck Harmon said bringing Alexander and Jackson into York's junior class also benefited everyone else who learned their story and found ways to help and befriend them.

We prepare students for a life of education and success, but also of service," he said.

#### Pets are people too

SPCA of Monterey County Executive Director Gary Tiscornia received the "Spirit of the Red Cross" award for his work as the head of the agency. The SPCA opened a shelter for pets during the 1995 floods in Carmel, and Tiscornia worked to significantly reduce the euthanasia of healthy and treatable companion animals throughout the nation. He helped reunite dogs rescued after last summer's hurricanes with their owners, and so far, more than half the pets cared for by the Monterey County SPCA have been returned — well above the national average of 15 percent.

"I was surprised and honored to be nominated by my staff," he said. "The spirit of the Red Cross is alive and well at the SPCA."

Also a help to animals is 91-year-old Pebble Beach resident Catherine Sherdan, who began sheltering, feeding, neutering and caring for stray cats in her neighborhood.

"I didn't set out to help them," she said. But a hungry black cat appeared at her back door, "so I gave him something to eat, and he never left." Same for the pregnant female



who soon bore four kittens.

"Word got around it was a pretty good restaurant," she said, "and others started dropping in."

She opened her home and wallet to help them all - saving "countless feline lives," according to the Red Cross - but Sherdan said she felt "ashamed" to be named the Animal Rescue Hero. "I haven't done that much. The animals give back as much as I give them," she said.

#### **Risking life and limb**

Monterey County Sheriff's Deputy Matthew Davis was named "Law Enforcement Hero" and will also receive the Award of Valor from the California State Attorney General for rescuing a San Benito County deputy from an overturned squad car involved in a high-speed chase. Davis was off duty and driving on Highway 156 when the deputy passed him in hot pursuit. Moments later, he came across the crashed squad car and saw it was filling with smoke as well as water from a broken main. The collision also took out a power pole, dropping live wires that presented the possibility of electrocution.

During the crash, the deputy's seat belt had become entangled in his duty belt and he couldn't escape from the car, so Davis crawled in, unlatched and unwrapped the belt and dragged the man free. (The fleeing felon was later found.)

"I don't know if I'm a hero," Davis said. "I did what most other people would do if they were in my spot."

"Military Heroes" Brian Steck, a professor at the Naval Postgraduate School, and U.S. Marine Capt. Steve Urrea were honored for helping install communications systems in the hurricane-ravaged South. They and their crews, along with other agencies, restored the first Internet and landline communications in the area.

Former Seaside High School Assistant Principal Bill Murphy received the "Workplace Hero" award for trying to protect students from two spectators who disrupted a basketball game between Seaside and Alisal high schools. Outside, when he asked the men to leave, they attacked and severely beat him.

Among numerous injuries, "the top half of my face was sort of ... disconnected," he said. A surgeon installed four titanium plates in his head and wired his jaw shut for six weeks - which he said served as an effective weight-loss plan. "My first concern was that the players weren't victimized by this event," he said, adding that all of them had been gentlemen on and off the court, and he worried they and their schools might inadvertently be blamed for the violence.

The Red Cross concluded, "He is an extraordinary hero and an outstanding example that doing the right thing is always the best thing."

## Council honors Eagle Scout

PACIFIC GROVE teenager Andrew Matonak received kudos and applause from the Carmel City Council Tuesday for his work restoring trails in the Lester Rowntree Native Plant Garden in February.

Matonak, who worked with city forester Mike Branson and garden chairman Gary Girard to develop his project, brought friends and fellow Boy Scouts Feb. 25-26 to lay wood chips along the badly eroded trails adjacent to Flanders Mansion. "They finished just in time for the rain to fall on Sunday afternoon," Branson said April 4. "And it still looks good."

Branson reported Matonak, a member of Troop 123, completed the necessary review last week to officially become an Eagle Scout, the highest possible rank.

rounds of golf a year you are going to have a certain percentage of customers that is going to say something. There are always two sides of a story."

#### Make more money for city?

Since 1932, when the golf course first opened, the clubhouse has operated as a concession, with the city leasing the space to private business owners.

Vitarisi, who will retire when his lease with the city ends, currently leases the golf shop for about \$100,000 per year.

"I had a good run at it," he said. "I've had some up times and I've had some down times. We built a good reputation with the golf course here." Operating the golf club-

Operating the golf clubhouse means the financially strapped Pacific Grove will have to hire at least four fulltime employees and be responsible for paying public employee retirement costs, something that concerns councilman Ron Schenk, who along with councilwomen Susan Goldbeck and Lisa Bennett, voted against the move.

"I am not comfortable with us taking this on," Schenk said at the meeting. "I don't know if the city should be in business." Bruce Obbink, a former member of the city's golf advisory committee, agreed. "I think it's a mistake," Obbink said.

But Mayor Pro Tem Dan Cort, Costello and Miller said it was an opportunity that shouldn't be missed because of the potential economic benefits to the city. Councilwoman Susan Nilmeier also voted in favor of running the clubhouse.

Leach said when the City of Sunnyvale took over operations of its own municipal golf course, it brought in \$300,000 more than the expected revenue in the first year alone.

The golf operations and concession revenue and expenses were part of the city's general fund until 1989 when the city's golf enterprise fund was established.

"It doesn't matter who runs it," Vitarisi said. "Golfers will still come here to play."

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
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


But, if missed, the memory of celebrating a special day with their peers will never be replaced.

- ever searching for a slice of unspoiled paradise - began to arrive. Miller was one of the first to establish roots in Big Sur, and others, like painter Emil White, soon followed. White's longtime Big Sur residence, located a guarter-mile south of the landmark Nepenthe restaurant, now houses the nonprofit Henry Miller Library, a museum and bookstore dedicated to Big Sur's Bohemian heritage.

By 21st century standards, the activities of Miller and his artistic friends were pretty tame. They wrote prose and poems, they painted and, by all accounts, they drank a lot of wine. But the media's descriptions of a Big Sur cult traveled far, and before long, scores of young people — "beatniks" in the

1950s and "hippies" in the 1960s descended upon Big Sur, seeking their own little slice of inconoclastic paradise and contributing to the region's reputation as a haven for artists.


"The Bohemians of Big Sur" is the latest installment in "Images of America," a popular series of paperback books by Arcadia Publishing Co. that focuses on the local histories of small towns and historical sites. Printed on high quality paper stock, the books are typically filled with hundreds of vintage photographs. "Bohemians" features photographs by Ansel Adams, Cole Weston, Robinson Jeffers and Man Ray.

And he staved that way for three hours. The Pine Cone isn't identifying the man so he doesn't die of embarrassment.


"We braced him so he wasn't leaning on the window," said firefighter Lou Ermigarat, "and then we cut the center post of the window out with a Sawzall."

"He declined further medical attention but agreed to have his parents take him to the hospital," DiCarlo reported.



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
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

eling the bathrooms in 18 units. Meroney will calculate his fine based not on the total, just the two units already under construction. He estimated it will be about \$250.

As he took a lunchtime walk March 24, John Hanson, who works for Meroney in building maintenance and also serves as an inspector, discovered two Ocean Avenue stores undergoing unpermitted remodels and issued red tags.

Workers had ripped out part of the sidewalk and the interior of Carmel Cashmere, owned by the Mieko Yoshida Trust, on the north side between Dolores and Lincoln, Meroney said. Plans calling for dressing rooms, lighting and electrical work were submitted and approved after the fact, carrying a fine of \$251.

A similar scenario played out across the street and up a block at the Old Scotch Shop on the south side between San Carlos and Dolores, which is owned by Chico-based Las Tiendas LLC, Meroney said.

It was by luck those business owners managed to have their plans approved and permits issued

within days of receiving red tags. Had Meroney not had a break in his schedule, they could have gone a month without any work.

"If you get red-tagged, and I come back the next day and you're working on it again, I'll write a citation," Meroney said. Violating the Carmel Municipal Code is an infraction punishable by a \$50 fine. "After that, I call the contractor's board and get your license revoked, so I have lots of avenues for making people unhappy. I don't usually do that, but I have a lot of power to get the job done to maintain safety and integrity within the community."

"You might actually reach them on an intellectual or at least an emotional level," Verbanec said. Verbanec has already met with Robert Louis Stevenson high school officials to discuss the topic.

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All told, three fire engines (two from Carmel and one from Cypress Fire), two ambulances, a battalion chief and an assistant chief responded. A meeting was under way in the station when police reported Don's 911 call, so most of the paid firefighters were there and able to immediately staff the Carmel engines without paging volunteers.

Led by Captain Tuan Flower, Cypress firefighters served as the rapid intervention crew, or RIC, whose job would have been to rescue any firefighter injured or trapped inside. RIC training began after the 2001 death of Phoenix firefighter Bret Tarver, who ran out of oxygen and became disoriented inside a burning supermarket.

At the time, the sheriff's office said solving the crimes was a "priority." Kanalakis devoted more investigative resources to find those responsible for the damage.

But deputies have been unable to crack the case. Nobody has identified the culprits, and it's difficult to catch people in the act when they can strike quickly, anywhere and at night. The sheriff's

office encouraged residents to report suspicious activity. 'We are trying to spend as much time in the

## Editorial

## Exit exam already a big success

MANY OF California's high school seniors who haven't passed the mandatory exam are studying hard to pass it.

The San Francisco Chronicle, for example, reported a few weeks ago about Richmond High School senior Iris Padilla, who begins each school day at 7:30 with an exit exam prep class. She takes another one after a full day of school, the paper said.

The Chronicle's take on the story was that it is obviously unfair to deny a diploma to Padilla, and many of the other 40,000 seniors statewide who have yet to pass the exit test (about 4,000 special education students have been granted exemptions). Her extra effort is proof of how deserving she is and dramatically illustrates how unjust it would be to keep her from graduating because she can't pass a simple test of English and math skills.

But there's another way of looking at Padilla's tale of woe: Her striving to pass is proof of how successful the exit exam already is. Because all that studying, while it might not produce a passing grade for her, is surely improving Padilla's education far beyond what it would be if the test did not exist.

For decades, California has graduated thousands of students who were nearly illiterate in English and could not do arithmetic, much less basic algebra or geometry. State Superintendent of Schools Jack O'Connell, a Democrat, authored the exit exam law while a state senator. He calls it "immoral" to award diplomas to students who can't pass the test. He's right.

And it's also counterproductive, not only for businesses suckered into hiring workers who lack basic skills, but for the students themselves, because low expectations beget low achievements.

Inevitably, having high educational standards — or any meaningful standards at all — means that some students won't meet them. In other words, they'll fail. And there has to be some sort of penalty for failure. Otherwise, many students won't see much reason to try to succeed. And that's why they haven't.

Giving them the tools they need to learn, encouraging them and praising their efforts are all important. But another component should also be present: If you don't pass, you will suffer.

Worrying about that is at least part of the reason why Iris Padilla is studying
