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DUKE EXEMPT FROM STATE BAN OF ONCE-THROUGH COOLING SYSTEMS

IN WHAT'S likely to rile local environmentalists, Duke Energy said this week it has no plans to stop using ocean water to cool the Moss Landing power plant, even though a state agency passed a resolution Monday banning the method at most coastal power generating stations because it kills small fish and other organisms.

California State Lands Commission Monday passed a resolution prohibiting the use of once-through cooling systems at new power plants and requiring existing ones to come up with a new cooling method once their current permits expire.

But it turns out the Duke Energy power plant at Moss Landing is one of 10 major power plants in California which does not lease property from the state. As a result, it doesn't have to abide by the resolution.

Duke Energy's intake is on land leased from the Moss Landing Harbor District.

"Given the fact that other state regulators have determined once-through cooling is the best option for Moss Landing, we don't have any plans at this time to change that technology," said Duke spokesman David Hicks.

Environmental groups such as

Surfrider Foundation rallied the state to get rid of once-through cooling at California's 21 major power plants. The Pacific Grove-based Friends of the Sea Otter has been outspoken in its opposition

The unexpected news that Moss Landing won't change its cooling system pleased California American Water Co., which hopes to use the power plant's once-through system as a source of seawater for its desalination plant.

'Mouse Idol' in Carmel Valley

 Γ HANKS TO the wonders of animation, an amazing variety of cuddly and creepy creatures — from bugs and birds, to lizards and lions — can sing.

But what if they already do sing?

In a remarkable discovery that challenges notions about the ability of rodents to communicate, a researcher in Carmel Valley has recorded a singing mouse.



The shrill chirps recorded by field biologist Matina Kalcounis-Ruppell in December may not be likely to show up on your iPod anytime soon. But according to Mark Stromberg, resident director of the Hastings Natural History Reservation, the recordings are a big hit in the circles he travels in.

"This is the first time anybody has recorded mice making sounds like this,' explained Stromberg, described the "songs" as "complex" and "melodic."

The sounds, which resemble those of a typical songbird, are above the frequency range of the human ear. But they can be picked up with ultrasonic recording equipment designed to capture the highfrequency chirps of bats. Kalcounis-Ruppell, a bat researcher and an assistant professor at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, was visiting Hastings when she decided to try out some of the reservation's recording gear on local deer mice.

The results of the recording sesstartled and excited researchers. Stromberg recalled Kalcounis-Ruppell's reaction upon first listening to the recordings.

"She was literally jumping up and down," said Stromberg.

Like most scientific breakthroughs, the celebration over the recordings was short-lived. In the world of science, a discovery often

Burglary suspects nabbed after house-by-house search

■ Woman assaulted during escape attempt

WHEN RICHARD and Carole Fredericksen came home from lunchtime errands Tuesday, two burglars were in their

The first thing they noticed was an unfamiliar Toyota backed up to their garage on Carmel Point's Ocean View Avenue.

Immediately suspicious, they began to see other things amiss.

"I walked toward the kitchen, and I noticed the door to the apartment above the garage was open, and drawers and cupboards were open, too," Richard Fredericksen said. "And my wife noticed the drapes in the upstairs bedroom were pulled."

Looking through a window, he also saw their big TV sitting on the kitchen counter.

Realizing the burglars must still be inside, Fredericksen made a quick decision to try to keep them from escaping. He got back in his Porsche Cayenne and moved it to block the unfamiliar Toyota Sequoia. He called the police to report the intruder and the Toyota's license plate number.

While waiting for a deputy, Fredericksen and his wife started to worry about the doors

"We have an indoor cat, and we were anxious that she might have gotten out," he said. Suddenly the burglars — a man and a

woman — walked out of the house. "He looked at me and said. 'the lawn's all

done," Fredericksen recalled. "They jumped in their car, and I jumped in my car. I was damned if they were going to get away."

The crooks backed into the garage door of and drove over a planter to avoid being trapped. Fredericksen briefly gave chase and then pointed out the fleeing Toyota to Monterey County Sheriff's Sgt. Scott Ragan, who was just arriving.

The pair escaped with nothing from the Fredericksens' house, but almost everything of value — including TVs, computers, electronics and jewelry was packed in luggage or bundled, ready for loading into the SUV, which the sheriff's department discovered had been stolen in Salinas.

 $R \ a \ g \ a \ n$ picked up the pursuit but lost the speeding driver near the Carmel River Lagoon parking lot. Moments later, he spotted the Toyota parked at a home on Rio Road.

Running up the hill, the burglary suspects found a car in the garage of a home on Lazzaro Road with its keys in the ignition but failed to get it started, according to Ragan.

\$475,000 lawsuit over water P.G. says can't be used for home

A REAL estate investor from Carmel Valley is suing the City of Pacific Grove for more than \$475,000 because the city council denied him the use of his own water credits, which he said has left him with a piece of property that is undesirable and impossible to sell.

Larry Scholink contends he has fulfilled a 1999 agree-

ment with the city but hasn't been able to sell a portion of his property on the 500 block of Chestnut Street because the

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Blvd.; right on Carmel Rancho Lane.

council turned down his request to use his water on it.

"Since there is no argument about me owning the water, it's an existing legal lot of record, and I have agreed to put an affordable unit there," Scholink asked, "what would be the city's motivation to deny me the use of my water?"

Pacific Grove city manager Jim Colangelo said the city denied Scholink the water because he wanted to change the terms of the original contract.

"He was allowed to use the water credits for a single-family house," Colangelo said. "He built it in a such a way that, technically, he has water credits left over and he wants to build another house, and that wasn't the deal."

As part of the 1999 agreement unanimously approved by a previous P.G. council, the city allowed Scholink to build a single-family home on the property as long as he restored an early-1900s log cabin, one of only two historic log cabins in

Pacific Grove, and gave .057 acre-feet of water to the city.

The cabin was restored, the home was built and the city got its share of the water. But because he has water credits left over, he wants to build a second house on the five-lot par-

"There was residual water left and there is enough to build a modest one-bedroom, one-bath home and an attached affordable rental," Scholink said.

Scholink said he worked with city staff for nine months to work out an agreement so he could use the remaining water credits, which are precious because of the Peninsula's longterm moratorium on new water permits.

But despite a recommendation by city staff to approve a second house with an attached low-income rental unit, city council members in December turned down Scholink's

A man interested in buying Scholink's property backed out at the last minute when he found out the water couldn't be used for another home.

City attorney David Laredo said Scholink can still use the water, just not for another house.

"He could do a pool house, he could do a guest cottage, a caretaker's unit, a second and third bathroom," Laredo said. "The water credits are his to use."

The problem is, Scholink can't use the water credits for the original house because he no longer owns it.

"They have effectively confiscated my water," he said.

As a concession to the city, Scholink said he voluntarily reduced the rent of the attached unit to make it more affordable for families.

"I said I'll drop it from your policy of median to lowerincome housing so the maximum you could charge is \$851 per month," said Scholink, adding that the city's requirement was a \$1,064-per-month rental.

Scholink said he's done more than the city has required in fulfilling the contract and feels the council should do its part. Besides, he said the city would ultimately benefit because it



He thinks the city has ulterior motives for the

"I believe it's merited to have some constraints." Scholink said. "But I believe their constraints in this situation are self-serving. By them not allowing me to use my water, will they confiscate it de facto?"

Laredo, who also serves as attorney for the Monterey Peninsula Management District, said the city could not use the water and the only reason the

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
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
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Rains slow Laguna Seca work as summer racing season nears

WE HAD heavy equipment that had to try to get around on basically swamps," Gill Campbell, CEO and general manager of Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca, said this week. Despite the Peninsula's rainy March, the \$7 Million construction project to prepare for July's Red Bull U.S. Grand Prix motorcycle races is only about 10 days behind schedule. "It has slowed us down a little bit."

Though they undertook extensive safety work last year, track officials learned they would need to make more changes before this year's USGP. The work that began this winter and must be completed by July includes completely resurfacing the track, adding more runoff space in Turns 1, 3, 4, 6 and 7, and smoothing out a dip on the back straight approaching the signature Corkscrew.

The most massive undertaking involves carving away tons of steep hillside outside Turn 1, the high-speed bend at the top of the start-finish hill. The only way to expand the runoff area there was to excavate tons of dirt and raze the old media center.

"All the earth moving work on Turn 1 has been done," Campbell told The Pine Cone this week. "The old media center was torn down over the winter." A new media center is under construction, with the exterior being installed this week, "so that's moving along quite well."

But work isn't progressing according to plan at Turn 6, where workers "are literally moving a mountain," to provide more visibility through the corner.

"We've started moving dirt there but have had to wait on that so it could dry out," Campbell said.

Following the May 5-7 U.S. Sports Car Invitational, the track will be closed for construction that must be finished by

The weather may have been a hindrance, but at least the nonprofit track can pay the bills. Mazda and Yamaha announced this month they would re-up their support through 2010. To retain its naming rights, Mazda will provide an additional \$7.5 million to Laguna Seca during the next five years, according to Campbell. Yamaha, which wrote the \$2 million check for safety improvements that enabled last year's Red Bull U.S. Grand Prix, also agreed to deliver another \$3 million specifically for track work.

Ticket sales down

The Red Bull U.S. Grand Prix marks the only North American visit of MotoGP, which features some of the world's best racers on motorcycles capable of 200-plus mph speeds. Last year's event — the largest in the track's 50-year history — marked grand prix motorcycle racing's return to the United States following an 11-year absence.

This year, attendance will be capped at 48,000 spectators daily, compared with the 53,000 who swarmed the track last

"We need to do everything right this year, and once we get the comfort level back where we can control and accommodate our fans, we will readjust the numbers," Campbell said.

USGP ticket sales are down about 20 percent from 2005, according to Campbell, likely because the races lack the novelty of last year's event, some Peninsula hotels gouged fans who swore never to return and spread the bad news, and people have been waiting to see how organizers plan to resolve the heinous traffic gridlock that stranded fans at the track for

hours.

That last question was answered April 14, when Campbell released the traffic plan for race weekend, and she hopes fans will begin calling the ticket office in response.

Noting the success of the popular AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am's efforts to minimize traffic jams in Del Monte Forest by busing ticket holders from the former Fort Ord, officials decided all general admission parking should be offsite at California State University Monterey Bay. Visitors will park for free and take shuttles to and from the track, carrying their coolers, cameras, backpacks and other possessions on their laps.

But motorcycle-riding fans — and Campbell prays there are a lot of them — will still be allowed to park for free at Laguna Seca on Wolf Hill. The plan also calls for a motorcycle-only entrance and exit on Barloy Canyon Road from

Some car-driving members of the general public will also park on Wolf Hill during the weekend — if they act quickly to pay \$50 in advance for the privilege — and VIPs, teams, officials and media can still drive to the track.

And of course, as with all major Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca events, Monterey-Salinas Transit will let anyone with a ticket ride for free.

In addition to the U.S. Sports Car Invitational May 5-7 and the Red Bull U.S. Grand Prix July 21-23, the Rolex Monterey Historic Automobile Races featuring the Cooper marque are set for Aug. 18-20, and the Monterey Sports Car Championships featuring the American Le Mans Series will be held Oct. 20-22. 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
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
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Forced entry made to rescue burning dinner

Hard feelings over display of Jeffers bust in library garden

AFTER COMPLAINTS from the Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club that it wasn't consulted about installation of a bust of Robinson Jeffers in the library garden the club is renovating, the city's planning commission decided last week to rescind its approval of the idea — for now.

The move came after city administrator Rich Guillen also said he hadn't been asked whether it was OK to install the statue.



Mayflower Presbyterian Church 14th & Central • Pacific Grove Sundays 10:40 AM • 373-4705 "We found out we had erred in not consulting with the city administrator and city council regarding an installation on city property," said principal planner Brian Roseth. "It was much like approving a project without the property owner's consent."

The city failed to notify members of the garden club, which in the middle of an ambitious re-landscaping of the Harrison Memorial Library garden.

"Until that project is finished, it would be premature to consider the statue," Roseth said. According to his report, Guillen decided the garden club "has an approved design and should not be required to accept unwanted changes to the it at this time."

As a result, Roseth recommended denying the Jeffers display application "without prejudice."

Projects denied with prejudice are considered no good "and should never be brought back," he said. "In this case, it's not necessarily a poor project, and this allows for future consideration by the commission."

Alex Vardamis, president of the Tor House Foundation, argued the nonprofit followed the city's rules in proposing

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the installation of the Jeffers bust, a bronze copy of a piece by sculptor Jo Davidson.

"Clearly, the library is the most logical location for a bust of Carmel's most famous writer. Not only does it house the city's books, but it is the location where the most people pass daily — whether students, townsfolk or visitors," he wrote in a letter to the commission. "The sculpture is a contribution to public education and to the city's knowledge of itself."

John Hicks, former Tor House Foundation president and retired library board member, said the group, "faced weeks of vexation and annoyance, sullen silences and resentment" after getting the bust approved last December. He also decried the imposition of "bureaucratic technicalities that are rather arbitrary" and "unworthy of us."

"We offered the city what we thought was a work of art, and we didn't think it was such a big problem to put this into this beautiful garden being planned," Vardamis commented. He said Jeffers far exceeds the importance of any other writer tied to Carmel.


But the garden club also followed all the rules, and the topic of a sculpture or bust never came up during the approval process, president Carol Sullivan said in her letter. She asked commissioners to withdraw their approval.

The garden club's opposition had nothing to do with Jeffers or Tor House, but with the installation of any statue in the garden, according to Lee von Hasseln, who shepherded the landscape redesign through the forest and beach commission, the planning commission and the city council. She worried the commission's OK of the Jeffers bust would set a precedent that could have other organizations making similar requests.

Garden club member Gene Clifford said the library building is the intended focal point of the new garden's design and pointed out the city took up a no-sculpture position when potential donors wanted to place pieces in Piccadilly Park in exchange for gifts of cash.

Prior to the 4-0 vote to deny Tor House's application, commissioner Julie Culver characterized the discussion and necessary decision as regrettable and unfortunate.

"Mend fences, please," she pleaded. "Hopefully this could be resolved so that all benefit from it. I look forward to a beautiful garden, and we all agree on the importance of Robinson Jeffers to this town."

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


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York School wins county science fair for seventh year

WHEN YORK School senior and brainiac Bobby Wright won the Monterey County Science Fair in March, not only did he uphold his school's winning tradition, he netted himself a slot in a national science competition.

Wright, who won the March 17-19 competition with a hypothesis on optimizing rocket stability, will compete at the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair in Indianapolis, Ind. in May.

"I wasn't really expecting it," Wright said of the firstplace finish, which marks York School's seventh consecutive win in the county event. "It was kind of a shock."

Wright, 17, used a rocket simulation program and something called the "one caliber rule" to predict rocket stability. He built eight almost identical rockets with varying spin heights to test his hypothesis, which he said was "kind of complicated."

However, Wright said the testing wasn't all smooth sail-

"I had different predictions for each of the rockets and I launched them all," he said. "I had some faulty motors during testing. Some motors blew up. I was continually repairing rockets on launch day ... but I got enough up to get a valid

Wright beat about 400 students in the county competition, some of whom entered as teams. The competition is divided into junior and high school entries, and categories range from applied mechanics to plant biology.

During the annual fair, students display their research projects and present their findings orally and through written journals to a team of scientists who volunteer as judges.

The judges confirm students' understandings of the scientific concepts and the research methods involved in their pro-

At the Intel science fair May 7-13, Wright will face 1,400 students from more than 40 countries to compete for scholarships, tuition, grants, internships and the grand prize — a \$50,000 college scholarship.

"I'm sure the competition at the Intel fair will be very tough," Wright said.

Lance Wright, Bobby's father and a retired government accountant, said his son has always been fascinated with science and is very hands-on.

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"He likes to to build new things and try them out," Lance Wright said. "He has had a long-term desire to work for NASA as a space scientist." The younger Wright has already been accepted to UCLA and UC San Diego, and plans to study aerospace engineering.

Wright said his top finish in the county science fair is that much sweeter considering he missed winning last year's event by just a tad.

Pam Durkee, a teacher at York and a facilitator for the science fair, said there is a reason students at the private school continue to excel at the science fair, which is sponsored by the Monterey County Office of Education.

"Many of the kids are self-motivated and often conduct their projects outside of school," Durkee said. "I think we have a unique blend of curiosity and tenaciousness. They are just very committed to doing something, and doing some-

Wright offered his own explanation for the school's knack of producing talented young scientists.

"I guess everyone there works very hard," he said. "And everyone is very smart."



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Giant redwood on fire — for a month

LIGHTNING STRUCK a towering redwood tree in a remote canyon above Monastery Beach, igniting a fire that slowly burned in its core for more than a month, according to Cypress Fire Captain Ross Miller. He learned Thursday it might finally be out.

"When the tree got hit by lightning, it blew a bunch of the branches off," he said. "It split part of the tree open, and fire got inside the tree and started to burn. So nothing's burning on the outside, which helps, because it doesn't spread."

Soon after the weekend storm last month, passersby and an officer flying a California Highway Patrol helicopter



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reported the redwood tree, which is about 120 feet tall and 4 or 5 feet in diameter, was smoking.

"We went out and attempted to make access to it on foot, but it's in an inaccessible area, so we decided just to monitor it," Miller said. Making 10 separate trips during the weeks since the initial report, firefighters took a helicopter ride to examine the tree and drove as far as they could on remote mountain roads to peer at it through binoculars. They hoped the almost constant rainfall would extinguish the fire, but wind blowing through the canyon apparently kept it alive

"We just spent an hour out there looking at it and didn't see any smoke coming off of it," Miller reported April 20.

If the weather holds, a large California Department of Forestry helicopter will carry a 17-person hand crew to a landing zone near San Jose Canyon, where the tree is located. Fire officials and the inmates from the state Department of Correction's Gabilan Conservation Camp will hike down to the redwood to inspect it.

"They'll size it up and see if we have to take it down" Miller said. "It's on a pretty steep slope — it's going to be dangerous to have people in there."

Incorporation proponents anxiously await results of alimony talks

SUPPORTERS OF the drive to incorporate Carmel Valley, who have been delayed in their efforts by lengthy revenue neutrality talks with county officials, believe a fall vote is still possible.

"There's no reason we can't have an election in the fall," insisted Glenn Robinson, incorporation advocate and president of the Carmel Valley Association. "We expect to see the a revenue neutrality agreement on the board of supervisors agenda as early as May."

Local Agency Formation Commission staff will present a status report on the incorporation proposal at the agency's next meeting Monday, April 24, at 4 p.m. in the the board of supervisors chambers in Salinas.

Local Agency Formation Commission Executive Officer Kate McKenna was more cautious about projecting when a vote could occur. In a letter to LAFCO commissioners, she suggested June 2007 as a more realistic date for an election. In the same letter, she announced revenue neutrality nego-

tiations should be wrapping up soon.

"This process is nearing conclusion," McKenna explained. "A draft revenue neutrality agreement will be presented to the board of supervisors at an open session, possibly on May 16 or 23."

The negotiations, which were originally anticipated to take three months, have lasted for 16 months. A critical step in the incorporation process, the talks will determine how much money the new town would be required to pay Monterey County to offset lost revenues. The law is designed to discourage upscale unincorporated communities from leaving financially beleaguered county governments. The negotiations will also determine how long the new town would be required to make the payments.


According to a tentative LAFCO schedule based on supervisors endorsing a revenue neutrality agreement in May, a June 2007 vote favorable to proponents would result in the incorporation of the new town in January 2008.

The April 24 hearing will also offer updates on other critical pieces of the incorporation puzzle, such as its comprehensive fiscal analysis, its service plan, its compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act, and an analysis of the proposed boundaries of incorporation, which presently correspond to the boundaries of the Carmel Valley Master

For rural firefighters, what was old is new

CACHAGUA FIRE Protection District — comprising 29 volunteers who not only battle blazes, but rescue lost hikers, treat car crash victims and care for the sick and injured in the rural eastern Carmel Valley — received a new fire engine this week. Well, new to Cachagua.

The 1989 Ford, outfitted by manufacturer Emergency One to carry four firefighters, belonged to the Cypress Fire Protection District but was declared surplus after Cypress brought its brand new Pierce engine online in February. The E-One, equipped with a 500-gallon tank and 1,250 gpm pump and valued at \$20,000, is designed for fighting structure fires. Cypress also donated some fire hose, a generator and breathing apparatus to go along with it, according to Cypress Fire Battalion Chief Dennis Carreiro.

"All they're going to have to do is add some small hand tools and fire hose, and its going to be ready to go into service," he said.

And Cachagua Fire Chief Skee Stanley observed, "The only other difference between this engine and the others in our fleet is it's lime green. The others are red."

Funded by an assessment on residents' property tax bills and a small amount of state tax dollars, Cachagua Fire operates on just \$77,000 per year and is always on the lookout for equipment to add to its fleet.

"I'm not afraid to beg," Stanley said. Begging and good grant-writing have netted the district substantial new and used equipment. Last year, a U.S. Department of Homeland Security Assistance to Firefighters grant of \$130,000 from federal taxpayers paid for portable radios, 20 new self-contained breathing apparatus, 48 spare cylinders and an air compressor to refill them, while California taxpayers provided \$17,300 for new Jaws of Life and other rescue equipment. training and safety gear for responding to car wrecks.

In addition, the agency's auxiliary members and residents of the department's 110-square-mile coverage area purchased a Ford F-350 turbo diesel pickup truck, and this month, the U.S. Smokeless Tobacco Co. delivered a \$10,000 six-wheel off-road Polaris Ranger.

Cypress Fire has also provided a lot of surplus equipment to Cachagua over the years, including a 1995 Ford Bronco, fire hose and nozzles.

"We have a very good working relationship," said Stanley, who makes a point of knowing when neighboring districts are acquiring new equipment and will be ridding themselves of the old.

Cypress Fire board president David Bates said the district prefers giving surplus equipment to local agencies with less money, such as Cachagua and the Mid-Coast Volunteer Fire Brigade, rather than selling it outside the area.

And under the California mutual aid system, Cypress firefighters could end up working alongside a Cachagua crew during a major fire, Carreiro pointed out.

"There is a benefit back to us as well, knowing the neighbors have a better engine in their fleet," he said. "It will just have their people on it and their logo on the door.'

At Cypress Fire's Rio Road station Tuesday, Stanley bolted the new number, 7712, onto the rear of the rig, and engineer Mike Wecker prepared to drive it out to Cachagua. The E-One replaces a 35-year-old truck that Stanley hopes another department, perhaps staffed with volunteers like his, will




A wide selection of native shrubs, trees, flowering plants, ground cover, ferns, seeds and bulbs will be available for purchase.

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Assemblyman says taxpayers should pay for mountain lion attacks

EMBRACED BY environmentalists but feared by just about everybody else, mountain lions have a new adversary. Assemblyman Bill Maze, a Republican from Visalia (Tulare County), has introduced a bill (AB2273) that would make it a crime for a mountain lion to attack a human, thereby allowing victims of lion attacks to apply to the State Government Claims Board for reimbursement of medical costs.

Maze contends the expenses associated with attacks should be paid by taxpayers, who approved a 1990 initiative banning the hunting of mountain lions. Approved claims would be paid from the state's Wildlife Restoration Fund.

According to data provided by the California Department of Fish and Game, there are between 4,000 and 6,000 mountain lions in California. Since 1890, there have been 15 attacks recorded on humans, leading to six fatalities. No doubt influenced by California's exploding recent population boom, all but two of the preceding attacks have occurred since 1986. There has never been a mountain lion attack on a human in Monterey County and only one (Santa Barbara, 1992) on the central coast.

There's no word on whether a mountain lion charged with an attack would had the right to a trial by its peers.



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P.G. mayor says he's determined to beat rare form of cancer

PACIFIC GROVE'S mayor, Jim Costello, announced this week he has a rare form of cancer. The illness forced him to leave Wednesday's city council meeting prematurely.

Costello, a teacher at Pacific Grove Middle School, said he was diagnosed Tuesday with a type of lymphoma called Waldenstrom's macroglobulinemia, a disease he vows to overcome. "It's something that's beatable," he said. "And I'm going to beat it."

Costello, 62, said a recent doctor's checkup indicated something was wrong. "Amazingly, it came about because of a cholesterol test," he said. "It showed that my red blood cells weren't all there."

Following a series of other tests, doctors concluded he had the cancer, Costello said. His treatment, at a Monterey oncology center, will force him to miss only a small amount of work. "It's no big thing," he said. "The treatment is a half-day a week for four to eight weeks. It's a form of lymphoma one of these designer drugs can attack. It doesn't make your hair fall out."

Costello, who before mayor served as a P.G. councilman for nearly a decade, is scheduled to retire as a teacher in about two months.

The type of cancer Costello's been diagnosed with, named after the Swedish scientist who first recognized it, produces large amounts of an abnormal protein called macroglobulin, according to the American Cancer Society. The lymphoma cells grow mainly in the bone marrow but can grow in other organs such as the liver and the spleen. The cells can crowd out the normal blood-producing cells of the bone marrow.

Costello said he was often tired at council meetings and decided to have doctor check him out. He left Wednesday's meeting an hour early because of fatigue.

"We were all pretty shocked and saddened," said Mayor Pro Tem Dan Cort. "You sit next to this guy for a year-and-

"Jim is a battler and I think if anyone could beat this," Cort said. "Jim has a great chance to do it."



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Live musicians can play at Forge in the Forest, Jack London's

THE FORGE in the Forest and Jack London's are suitable for live music, the planning commission unanimously decided April 12. Last month, commissioners delayed a vote on the Forge application due to worries musicians would bother residents of the adjacent condos and apartments. They also wondered whether the law adopted last fall to allow live music in establishments that sell alcohol permits music outdoors, even though they had already OK'd it in the Cypress Inn's courtyard months ago.

In his report to the commission, associate planner Sean Conroy said the language of the ordinance was unclear, but its restrictions protect neighbors regardless of the perform-

"As long as the noise levels are not exceeded, staff has determined that the ordinance does allow for live music indoors, outdoors or both," he wrote.

Conroy reported staff conducted additional noise readings at the Forge following last month's hearing. He recommended approval of live music inside the restaurant and in the north courtyard, but not in the south, where no wall buffers neighboring residences from the sound. Permitted hours would be noon to 10 p.m. daily, the maximum allowed under

Commissioners could limit the days and hours, according to city staff, but commissioner Ken Talmage wondered who would keep track of and enforce every establishment's specific restrictions.

"I'm not sure the police department has time to look at the hours for each application," he said, wondering if the same hours should apply to every permit.

Principal planner Brian Roseth said commissioners could impose limits based on how noise-sensitive the surrounding uses are. Homes, libraries, medical facilities and a handful of others are considered sensitive.

Talmage suggested the planning department keep a roster showing which bars and restaurants are allowed to have live music when, and Roseth said he would also provide a copy to the police department.

Commissioners voted 4-0, with Robin Wilson absent, to approve the Forge in the Forest's use permit, which will

expire in three years.

They also OK'd live music inside at Jack London's. Owner Steve Whitfill had indicated musicians would likely play 4:30 to 7 p.m., sometimes to 10 p.m., Fridays and holidays. He also requested permission to have live performances in the pub's small outdoor seating area.

Although Conroy identified the site as "good" for live music since there are no noise-sensitive uses nearby, he recommended performances begin no earlier than 5 p.m. weekdays because some nearby offices and shops could find them

Whitfill said his neighbors had no problem with his proposal, and though he indicated the hours would probably be 4:30 to 7 p.m., sometimes until 10 p.m., he wanted more flex-

"The application asks when you might plan to be having music, but I didn't know that would restrict you," he explained. "I would like to have the opportunity to have music in the hours allotted by the ordinance, noon to 10 p.m."

Commissioners unanimously agreed but OK'd the permit for indoors only, as recommended by staff.

Following the vote, Talmage suggested the commission keep a working list of the use permits and their conditions of approval.

"It's important to have a sense of fairness," he said.

"We need to be uniform in our review and our discussions," planning commission chair Bill Strid agreed.

FOR YEARS, wishful tourists and locals have tossed coins into the Carmel Plaza fountain.

The old one is gone — recently replaced by a modern, stone fountain at the Ocean Avenue entrance — and with it has come a new mission. Every quarter, nickel, dime, penny and gold doubloon found in it will be donated to the Kinship Center, which helps children who are waiting to be adopted or need foster homes.

The shopping center's marketing manager, Ryan Williams, made the first delivery of four buckets totaling close to 600 pounds of coins this

"Every day we clean out the fountain, and we get lots of coins," he said. "We thought it would be nice to team up with a local organization that could use them, and we decided to donate to an organization that targeted children."

Kinship Center's overall mission is to create permanent, safe families for abused, abandoned and neglected children, and the Plaza's fountain coins will benefit its Family Ties program, which provides financial, psychological and other support for relatives mostly grandmothers — thrust into parenting roles by family tragedies.

Williams could not say how much money he dropped off at the River Road center, but the nonprofit has found a helper to sort, count and deposit the coins that will be delivered once a quarter.

And soon the fountain will display a plaque so people will know the destination of their coins and might be inclined to toss in even more of their spare change.

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New age bard transforms the harp and rejects critics' labels

WHEN NEW age instrumentalist and would-be Swiss mega-star Andreas Vollenweider released his first recording in 1979, there was little indication fame and fortune awaited him.

"Commercial success was never in my mind," recounted

rock and heavy metal added tension, anarchy and bad haircuts to the mix. Where in all that chaos was there room for the delicate and uplifting strains of an electrified harp?

Yet commercial success did find Vollenweider. New age music proved to be the perfect counterpoint to the excesses of pop music in that era, and the delicate and meditative recordings of a generation of instrumentalists — previously relegated to elevators and the dentist's office — were suddenly and surprisingly considered hip.

Even in the realm of instrumentalists, the piano and the guitar are more likely choices for aspiring musicians. Vollenweider, though, settled on the harn

"I played many instruments growing up," he recalled. "But I was looking for an instrument that would be an extension of myself. I knew one day I would find it."

Once he discovered the harp, Vollenweider decided he would use the instrument to tell stories. But unlike the traditional Celtic bard — who employs the harp to complement his poetry — Vollenweider chose to forgo words altogether.

"Words are so limited," he insisted. "You can convey so many more emotions with music."

Vollenweider attracted a huge following in the 1980s, marked by sold-out tours, a Grammy Award in 1987 for the recording, "Down to the Moon," and a series of hits that remarkably topped the pop, jazz and classical charts. His music has also proved to be a popular backdrop for many of the world's most acclaimed singers, including vocal gymnast Bobby McFerrin, Brazilian legend Milton Nacimiento and opera luminary Luciano Pavarotti.

Unfortunately, with fame and fortune comes the burden of being labeled. And in Vollenweider's case, the "new age" tag has followed him through-

out his career. For better or worse, he is considered perhaps the quintessential new age artist.

"When I was younger, I actively fought against the label," admitted Vollenweider, now 52. "Now that I'm older, I've mellowed. Ultimately, music is stronger than categories, which exclude people and possibilities. It's like putting a bird in a golden cage. It's still a cage."

From New Orleans to Carmel

Louis Armstrong, arguably the most important of all jazz musicians, once said, "Preservation Hall: Now that's where you'll find all the greats." The historic New Orleans jazz venue, closed since Hurricane Katrina, reopens next week. Meanwhile, the Preservation Hall Jazz Band — one of the

 I_{T} SEEMS only appropriate an art exhibit focusing on the role of women in photography would include Imogen Cunningham.

Cunningham's work will be featured in "A Celebration of Women Photographers," a group show opening Saturday, April 22, at Photography West Gallery in Carmel.

From her introduction to cameras in 1903 to her death in 1976, Cunningham enjoyed one of the longest careers of any photographer. What makes her longevity even more remarkable is the fact she began her quest to gain artistic recognition in a field dominated by men nearly two decades before women were even allowed to vote.

"Her floral work is extremely important in the history of American art," explained gallery owner Carol Williams of Cunningham's influence.

Along with Ansel Adams, Edward Weston and other members of the groundbreaking "f64" group, Cunningham was influential in steering photography away from its emphasis on romanticism and soft focus. The future of photography, Cunningham reasoned, was in the sharpness and clarity of form.

The exhibit will also present the work of Ruth Barnhard, a gifted Bay Area

No stage fright, but maybe multiple personality disorder, for county cop

THEY CALL him the quick-change artist.

John DiCarlo, known to most Pine Cone readers as a Monterey County Sheriff's sergeant, spends many weekends acting, usually alongside his daughter and a talented cast, at the small Wharf Theater in Monterey. The current show, "Annie," runs through May 7.

No Daddy Warbucks or redheaded orphan, DiCarlo is assigned not one role, or even two, but seven (or six, if the ventriloquist and his puppet are counted as one). DiCarlo plays Officer Ward, of course, but he is also an unnamed servant, ventriloquist Fred McCracken and his puppet Wacky, a john ("Yes, a john," he said.), Secretary of State Cordell Hull and a secret service agent.

"As you can see, I have a lot of costume changes," he said, adding that working with the diverse cast — Allison McNamara and Davis Goldstein as Annie, Howard Hinkley as Oliver Warbucks, Tyanne Goltz as Grace, and a dog, Amber, as Sandy — makes acting truly enjoyable.

Although his 13-year-old daughter, Danielle, has no role in this current production, DiCarlo began acting in 2002 after

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she took to the stage at the Wharf.

"I was always taking her to rehearsals, so I figured I might as well join her," he said, adding that he relishes the chance to share the stage with her. He has since acted in "The Mikado," "Oklahoma," "The Pirates of Penzance" and "My Fair Lady," for a total of more than 150 performances on stage. DiCarlo will audition for this summer's "The Sound of Music," as well.

Occasionally, his buddies from the sheriff's office come

"They throw tomatoes sometimes," DiCarlo said. "And they always make fun of me, because I have to wear makeup during the show."

They often suggest he might forget and wear it to work.

"Acting is a good getaway from law enforcement," he said. "And just doing something different helps me out with seeing people in a different light and relieves the stress of the job, so I enjoy it."

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

photographer who just turned 100.

"She started photographing nudes in the 1930s, which was considered quite radical at the time," said Williams. "This was during the depression and she had very little money. In fact, she had so little money she could only make one photograph at a time. She would spend a whole week setting up for it, and the lighting had to be perfect because she didn't have a second chance. She became a master at lighting because of this."

No less an authority than Adams called Barnhard, "The greatest photographer of the nude." Williams said Barnhard isn't making any promises, but she's hoping to attend the show's opening reception.

Also featured in the show will be the work of photographers Martha Casanave, Carol Henry, Olivia Parker, Elizabeth Murray, Lilo Raymond and Dar Spain.

Casanave, a Monterey resident, is a portrait photographer


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PacRep is 'Fully Committed' one more weekend; 'Ghosties' follows


"I just want to apologize," she said this week. "We're going to try to schedule it again."



raises more questions than it answers.

"We don't know what the sounds mean," Stromberg said.





"That's the big challenge for her now. She's trying to get funding for more research. It took people a long time before they figured out what bird calls meant."

While there is no shortage of mice in North Carolina, the abundance of noisy insects renders such a high-tech field recording impossible.

"There are so many more insects in North Carolina," Stromberg explained. "The forest is very quiet here."

The mice, a domestic variety common in Central California, populate semi-rural areas of Monterey County such as Carmel Valley, Pebble Beach and Big Sur. According to Stromberg, the mice in Carmel, Monterey and Pacific Grove tend to be of European decent.

"The Carmel Valley mice are really cute," he said. "They sit in your hand."

Stromberg offered up a couple of juicy tidbits of deer mouse trivia. First of all, they're monogamous.

"They mate for life," he explained. "The male takes care of the young and keeps them warm when the female goes out for food."

Also, they seem to have a strange affection for a plant that is noxious to people. In fact, Kalcounis-Ruppell set up her recording gear in what amounted to a poison oak patch.

"They seem to really like poison oak," said Stromberg, who conceded he can't explain why.

Thieves strike three times

April 6, breaking into the garage of a Via Mallorca residence and possibly taking advantage of unlocked doors in two Hacienda Carmel units, according to Monterey County Sheriff's Sgt. John DiCarlo.

"They forced their way into the garage and rifled through the three cars that were in there, but it doesn't look like anything was taken," he said of the Via Mallorca case. "The residents noticed in the morning that somebody had been in their garage. It happened sometime during the night, between 8 p.m. and 7 a.m. it could have been while they were home."

The same was true for the elderly Hacienda Carmel couple which reported someone entered their house sometime between 9 p.m. April 5 and 9 a.m. April 6.

"We're not sure if the doors were left unlocked," DiCarlo said. The culprits stole a stereo and a suitcase, abandoning the latter on the walkway near the river after evidently concluding it contained nothing of value.

Finally, another Hacienda Carmel woman reported her home was burglarized when she was gone for only 15 minutes.

'She walked away from her house at about 6:15 a.m. to do laundry, and someone went into her house, because when she got back at 6:30 a.m., she noticed it had been burglarized," DiCarlo said. The rear sliding doors were found open, and the victim later reported \$2,400 worth of jewelry was missing.

city has denied Scholink's request is that he wanted to change the terms of the original contract.


"He, by contract, made the limits that applied to the water credits, and that is for one single-family house," Laredo said.

Scholink already filed a claim with Pacific Grove, a legal step before filing a lawsuit, which he said will happen within a week or two.

'Is there something inherently evil in building a singlefamily home?" he asked. "It doesn't solve all the housing problems, but it solves them for one family."

"The owner heard something going on in the garage and confronted the people," he said. "One of the deputies was in the street at this point and took the girl into custody."

While locked in a squad car, the 19-yearold suspect, later identified by police as Jessica Rodriguez of Soledad, kicked out the rear window, Ragan added.

With the suspect still at large, deputies, Carmel police — including chief George Rawson — state park rangers and a Seaside P.D. K-9 officer searched the neighborhood north of Rio Road.

"We got a call from a woman who said a guy came into her house, demanded her car keys and assaulted her, and she didn't know if he was still inside," Ragan said.

Ramirez threw the woman to the floor of her kitchen and tried to bind her mouth and feet with clear packing tape, according to Ragan.

"He had told her he was going to kill her," he said. "But she fought him off and was able

to get away from him, run upstairs and call 911. We found her upstairs, really shaken up."

As paramedics treated the victim for minor injuries and convinced her to go to the hospital because she was so upset, reports poured in. Residents on Oliver Road and Birch Place said a man claimed he was the new gardener or was there to mow the lawn, according to Ragan, who suspected Ramirez was trying to hide or find a car to steal.

Suspect flushed out

Officers combed the area, but no reported sightings came in for about 45 minutes. Deputies were gathering evidence from the stolen car and checking homes when a resident reported seeing a man run through the backyard around 5 p.m., and a woman reported her dog barking at someone possibly hiding in the bushes.

Carmel police, including officer Tim Meroney and Cpl. Steve Rana, had been briefly pulled off the manhunt to control traffic in downtown Carmel for the swearing-in of the mayor and city council, but they returned to help deputies establish a perimeter on Highway 1 just north of Rio Road.

Back on the search, Rana entered the rear yard of a residence backing up to the highway. "Between the fence and Highway 1, there are overgrown bushes almost making a tunnel," he said. Peering through the slats of a fence, Rana spied a gray sweatshirt sleeve and arm.

"He had to know I was there, because I was making so much noise," Rana said. "The sheriff's units were on the other side of the fence not more than 20 feet away."

But they couldn't see the fugitive, so Rana yelled to them that he had the suspect in sight.

"He had nowhere to go. The deputies put a Taser light on him, explained to him what it was and told him to come out," Rana said. "He put his hands on his head and crawled out on his elbows."

A parolee from King City, 28-year-old Joe Ramirez, was arrested at gunpoint and handcuffed at 5:24 p.m., more than four hours after the Fredericksens' call. Ragan

said the Rio Road victim returned and positively identified the suspect, as did Carole Fredericksen and many of the neighbors.

"All the residents in that area were active participants and really helped out," Ragan said. "We wouldn't have gotten him without their help."

In addition to facing several new felonies resulting from the attempted burglary and chase, Ragan said Ramirez was wanted in Santa Cruz County for burglary and narcotics charges. He had also failed to check in with his parole officer.

"I think he'll be going away for a long time," Ragan said.

Rana advised Carmel residents, whose complacency frequently leads them to leave their homes and cars unlocked, to take heed.

"Don't think this can't happen in your neighborhood just because it's Carmel," he said. "It can happen, and it does happen. People need to know that."



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
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Mark David Hudgens


Hudgens of Anna.

sion's resolution," said Catherine Bowie, community relations manager for Cal Am. "It would be in the best interest of our customers if we are able to pursue our desal project."

But Duke may soon have other hurdles to jump over if it wants to use the traditional cooling method, one official predicted.

"The state is also going to come up with new rules for intake systems," said Paul Thayer, executive officer of the state lands commission, requiring Moss Landing to make major improvements to its oncethrough cooling facility.

The new rules, which are expected to be adopted sometime this year, will likely reduce the acceptable mortality rate of marine life in the filters of once-through cooling systems.

California's power plants draw nearly 17 billion gallons of water from the sea each day, killing small fish and other organisms. The state agency cited a study that showed 57 tons of fish were killed each year when all

of the units of the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station in San Diego County were operating.

Bowie said Cal Am is prepared to explore new alternatives for its desal plant, such as beach wells, which don't require a traditional intake system. But untested technology could lead to delays and extra expense that could be passed on to water customers.

"The examination of new paths adds time and expense to any project," Bowie said. "We think the people of the Monterey Peninsula have waited long enough for a drought-proof water supply.'

Even if Duke eventually shuts down or switches to a different cooling system, it's possible Cal Am could continue to use the once-through cooling system for its desal operation, Thayer said.

Pajaro/Sunny Mesa Community Services District, which has plans to build a desal plant at the old National Refractories site down the road from the power plant, may also use the Duke intake.


Coco was rescued from a home where she was more or less ignored and is now in need of a lot of loving attention, which she gets.

at their 10-acre homestead in Nevada City and play in a fragrant English rose garden of 157 bushes that Mom nurtures.



THE FATE OF "STEPPED-UP BASIS"

Clients have expressed some concern that we might lose our ability to "step-up" the adjusted basis in a home we inherit to market value at the time

of (or six months after) the death of the person from whom we inherit the property. This provision allows us to avoid any capital gains tax on the sale of a property (or other appreciated asset) so long as the selling price doesn't exceed the value of the property at the time of death or, as mentioned, six months thereafter. It does not, however, affect potential estate taxation in any way.

The question that has arisen, therefore, is whether outright elimination of estate taxation would likely be accompanied by elimination of the "stepped-up basis" privilege. The best answer—and any answer that seeks to predict what Congress may do to the tax code in the future is, at best, highly speculative—seems to be that the "stepped-up basis" privilege is probably here to stay. And here's the reason that most tax law experts are making that prediction: They sincerely doubt that the estate tax will ever be totally eradicated.

Odds are reasonably good, therefore, that tax planning can assume (though tentatively) that the stepped-up basis provision will be with us for many years to come. This means that appreciated real estate will continue to provide one of the best ways to pass wealth from one generation to the next. Leave Mark Twain out of it

A WELL known local cartoonist was fortunate enough to still be around when preservation activists tried to hijack his lifetime of accomplishments to serve their pet cause.

Five years ago they tried to have an undistinguished Carmel home declared an historic landmark — to prevent its current owner from tearing it down — because Gus Arriola once lived there. When Arriola heard about it, he was able to say, "Hold it!"

Explaining that the house never meant much to him, Arriola said, "It wouldn't be fair to stop somebody's plans because of me."

But poor Mark Twain has been in his grave almost 100 years and he is powerless to stop his name from being being attached to all sorts of causes without regard to what he might have thought.

In Carson City, Nevada, an old Presbyterian church is the subject of a pitched battle because Twain helped raise \$200 for its construction in the 1860s. Now, the congregation wants to build a new sanctuary, but the church mustn't be torn down, preservation advocates say.

Twain's brother was a member, and maybe the church deserves to be saved as an important relic of Nevada's early days. But Twain probably never set foot in the place. More importantly, he was famously contemptuous of organized religion and constantly derided what he saw as the naiveté, superficiality and hypocrisy of Christian preachers and their followers. His first book, "The Innocents Abroad," is descriptively named for them and was considered a great insult by the pilgrims whom Twain accompanied to the Holy Land in 1867. If he were alive today, it's hard to imagine Twain saying anything but, "tear the damn place down!"

Likewise, environmentalists have taken to lobbying for protection of the California red legged frog by insisting that the frog was the subject of Twain's early short story, "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County." When the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service last week declared only 450,288 California acres as the frog's "critical habitat" instead of the 4.1 million acres the environmentalists wanted, Twain's name was practically shouted from the rooftops as they warned the frog would surely become extinct.


"TWAIN'S FROG GETS REDUCED LIVING SPACE," was the headline on an April 13 press release from the Center for Biological Diversity. "Children should be able to see the frog Mark Twain made famous, not just read about it in books," the release said — a theme that was then parroted in dozens of news stories.

The first problem is that there's no way to know if Twain's story was about the red legged frog, some other species, or any particular frog at all. According to several Twain biographies, the humorous short story, originally entitled "Jim Smiley and his Jumping Frog," was based on a tall tale that circulated widely among miners in the Sierra Nevada, many of whom were freshly arrived from other parts of the country. It could have been about a species common in Mississippi or Alaska or anywhere.

But perhaps more relevant is the fact that Twain's story is about torturing a poor frog by forcing it to eat quail shot so it can no longer jump. It is not a celebration of the virtues of the frog, but rather of the clever ways swindlers can think of to make money. And this is much more in keeping with the young Mark Twain's interests: Striking it rich, gambling, drinking, carousing, and generally raising Cain.

His great works belong on everybody's bookshelf. But Mark Twain's name should be left out of politics.

What the county spends on roads Dear Editor,

Widely different figures have been quoted recently in your newspaper as to the maintenance costs for Carmel Valley roads. To ensure that Carmel Valley residents have the facts, I'd like to clarify what Monterey County actually spends on Carmel Valley road maintenance.

Over the past five years, the county has spent approximately \$350,000 per year in Carmel Valley for routine road maintenance.

In addition, over that same period the county has spent an average of \$165,000 per year on pavement management activities within the valley.

That averages about \$7,500 per mile, or \$515,000 per year for the 68.18 miles of road in the proposed Carmel Valley incorporation boundaries. The 1992 Carmel Valley Road Traffic Mitigation Fee Ordinance has provided additional funding specifically for road improvement purposes.

It is important to know that the county allocates the same dollars to pavement maintenance (such as maintenance, chip seal and paving) resources to all roads in the unincorporated areas, so Carmel Valley roads are maintained in balance with other county roads

In 2005, public works staff submitted data to consultants for use in preparation of financial reports for the proposed incorporation of Carmel Valley. This data included actual historical road expenditures by the county, as well as conceptual costs for enhanced maintenance programs and areawide road reconstruction costs.

It is important to note that Monterey County and its cities, like much of the state, do not have adequate financial resources to maintain their road systems and infrastructure in ideal condition. Incorporation,


Liked 'Full Monty' Dear Editor,
