Forest Lake now irrigating P.B. golf courses

PEBBLE BEACH'S 100 million-gallon bathtub, the 22acre Forest Lake Reservoir, is now quenching the thirst of the community's famous golf courses with recycled wastewater after a massive rehabilitation effort more than a decade in the making.

The \$12.5 million Wastewater Reclamation Project allows reclaimed water to be stored during the winter months, when the demand is lowest, so it can be used to irrigate the golf courses and athletic fields in summer, when demand for water is at its peak.

"It's been in the planning and development stage for many years, so it is very gratifying to see where we are today," said Richard Andrews, general man-

ager of the Pebble Beach Community Services District.

Feeding water from the reservoir to Pebble Beach's seven golf courses will help eliminate use of drinking water provided by California American Water Company on the fairways, greens and open spaces of Del Monte Forest.

The reservoir — located northeast of Lopez Road underwent massive rehabilitation and is very close to being officially finished, Andrews said.

"It is virtually completed," he said. "We are still tweaking some of the controls and instruments, and finishing the reconstruction of the entrance road."

The project is working well, and the reservoir has been

> used to irrigate the courses during the recent warm weather, said Mike Niccum, district engineer with PBCSD, which built the project with the Carmel Area Wastewater District.

> The water is transported via pipeline from the CAWD plant on the south bank of the Carmel River to the reservoir, and from there is distributed to golf courses and fields.

> All but two of Pebble Beach's green spaces will be irrigated with wastewater from the reservoir.

Arrest in 1997 slaying brings anger, sadness, relief

W ITH SATURDAY'S arrest of Jacobo Ruelas Jr. for the September 1997 murder of 17-year-old Kristopher Olinger has come a tumult of emotions, and not much sleep, for Olinger's dad, Loren Phillips, and his half-brother, Travis. And it prompted the dead boy's uncle, Carmel police dispatcher Jeff Olinger, to remember his nephew's "good heart."

"Anger, sadness and most of all relief that finally something happened," Phillips, a Carmel realtor, said Tuesday just ter seeing his son's suspected killer for the first in a Monterey County courtroom. Olinger, a Monterey High senior, was killed in a turnout near Point Pinos while taking nighttime photographs of the ocean for a school project. Ruelas, 27, is suspected of stabbing him more than 20 times and stealing his car, which was found in San Jose almost two weeks after his death.

and CHP officers, P.G. police took Ruelas into custody around 10 p.m. May 13.

He has yet to enter a plea, and attorney Eugene Martinez has denied Ruelas was involved.

'We are grateful he was taken into custody before he had time to flee," Miller said. "We believe it was his intent to

Incorporation drive gets a boost from alimony settlement

Big week coming up for 'Town of Carmel Valley'

AFTER 18 months at the negotiating table, Monterey County officials and proponents of Carmel Valley's incorporation have agreed on a revenue neutrality settlement which allows the proposed town to pay off 10 years of lost county revenues over 16 years.

According to a Monterey County staff report released May 18, the proposed Town of Carmel Valley would pay the county a total of \$15,919,280 in alimony payments. A state law requires prospective cities to compensate county governments for revenues lost as a result of incorporation.

The deal is great news for backers of the new town, who are pushing for a November election. They would have been challenged to keep up with the payments on a more accelerated schedule.

"The agreement represents a compromise," explained Nick Chiulos, an administrative analyst who served as one of three county negotiators in the discussions. "It allows the proposed town to get off to a good financial start. To take a 10-year dollar amount and pay it off in 10 years would have been problematic."

The Monterey County Board of Supervisors will have an opportunity to weigh in on the agreement when they meet Tuesday, May 23, in Salinas. The item is scheduled for 11 a.m.

As part of the agreement, the Town of Carmel Valley would make no revenue neutrality payments for the first two years of its operation. At the end of its third year, the town would be required to make a payment of \$827,406. In its

Measure A would make Peninsula driving easier

WHILE BOTH sides debate the merits of Measure A, it's no doubt the road improvements provided by the new tax would make it easier for Monterey Peninsula residents to get from point A to point B.

Measure A, to be decided by voters June 6, would impose a half-cent sales tax in the county for 14 years in order to raise about \$350 million to improve county roads. The Transportation Agency for Monterey County, which proposed the plan, says the projects would increase road safety and reduce congestion, while the measure would also increase transportation funding beyond the sales tax itself.

"We must pass Measure A in order to be eligible to receive state and federal funds," said Chuck Della Sala, vice mayor of Monterey and the co-chair of the Monterey County Citizens for Safe Transportation, an independent organiza-



Building inspector warns real estate agents about illegal signs

AMONG CARMEL'S many laws is a restriction on placing real estate signs on public property — particularly in streets and sidewalks, where cars swerve to avoid them and pedestrians trip over them. The rules aren't changing, but their enforcement is.

For years, cops and the city building inspector have confiscated "for sale" and "open house" signs and stashed them



at city hall. Building official Tim Meroney would contact the scofflaw real estate agent, who would come retrieve the signs after paying a fee of \$15 each.

"It doesn't work," Meroney said this week. "We constantly have 20 to 30 signs in our possession."

If their owners fail to pick them up within 10 days, the signs end up in the dump. "We throw away 95 percent of them," he said. "It's costing us time and effort, and there's no payback."

He hopes stiffer fines and

immediate action will do the trick. Beginning June 1, real estate sales people who set up signs on public property will be cited for each violation of the municipal code, which carries a \$50 penalty.

(A sign on publicly owned land between the property line and the paved street directly in front of a house might be OK, according to Meroney, but only if the property owner has received an encroachment permit from the Carmel City Council.)

Placing real estate signs on street corners to direct people to open houses has become very common on the Monterey Peninsula. But in Carmel-by-the-Sea, "sales signs that are off premises, down the street, at the corner — anywhere other than at the house — are not permitted," Meroney said.

New rentals only. Valid thru May 31, 2006.

The Monterey County Association of Realtors warned its members of the impending sign crackdown, according to Meroney, and though he will give first-time offenders a warning, agents who continue to illegally place signs will face the per-sign fine.

"We're going to pick up the sign, take it to the house that's for sale and cite the agent immediately for putting it in the public right of way," he warned.






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Award, new job demonstrate town's love for its 12,000 trees

T'S COMMON knowledge trees are more important than people in Carmel-by-the-Sea, so it stands to reason the one-square-mile town should be designated a Tree City USA by the National Arbor Day Foundation.

The town, which is home to more than 12,000 trees on public property and thousands more on private land, last earned the distinction in 1993.

"It's been a while," said city forester Mike Branson, who campaigned for the honor.

In order to qualify for the Tree City USA plaque, flag, trinkets, literature and occasional advantage when vying for tax dollars, Carmel had to meet four criteria:

Host a formal Arbor Day event, which it did in 2005 and 2006. The city used to hold an annual tree giveaway for Arbor Day, but pine pitch canker put an end to that several years ago, according to Branson.

Have a set of ordinances protecting and regulating trees. With extensive rules on trimming, removing and planting trees, the city handily meets this requirement.

Appoint a tree-related body, such as the Carmel Forest and Beach Commission, which reviews residential, commercial and municipal projects.

■ Budget a minimum of \$2 per capita for forestry or trees. With Carmel's population just above 4,000, that doesn't seem a very high standard, but for a city like Los Angeles which has carried the Tree City USA designation for 20 years — it means spending at least \$7,728,800 on trees.

Branson said this year Carmel budgeted \$437,266 for his department, including salaries for him, two tree care specialists and one part-time worker, as well as supplies, materials and pruning contracts.

The Tree City USA status acknowledges Carmel values its pines, cypresses, oaks and others, according to Branson.

"It's a recognition from your peers that you take care of your trees, and the community takes some pride in having a forest and managing it," he said. "And it's national, not state or local."

Cities must reapply for the designation each year, and Branson plans to con-

tinue shepherding Carmel through the process. He said there are no fees to apply.

She's good for trees, too


With no single staffer dedicated to planting, watering and caring for city trees since 1998, their removal has outpaced replanting, Branson said. But on May 1, Kimberly Moscato who moved from Concord to Carmel to join the forestry crew — began working half days Monday through Thursday to replenish and keep an eye on Carmel's forest. The job pays a little more than \$17 per hour.

"She's extremely valuable," Branson said. "We hadn't had enough help managing the dying trees. We haven't had a regular planting program."

According to comments Branson made during a Carmel City Council budget hearing last month, only 95 of the 350plus trees removed by city workers, contractors and storms


And contrast, Burton explained, is what he was seeking when he chose the setting of this seascape.

Homeless woman arrested for ruckus in Ocean Avenue store

A FEMALE transient who reportedly demanded an employee at a Ocean Avenue clothing store hand over a fur coat was searched and questioned by Carmel police officers Wednesday afternoon, then released with a warning. But within minutes, she returned to the shop, tried to steal a shirt and then chased the same employee she had encountered earlier, according to detective Jesse Juarez. Deborah Gillespie, 43, was arrested for trespassing, attempted burglary and attempted theft. She may also be charged with intimidating a witness.

"This all started out with her seeing an employee going from one store to the other carrying a fur jacket," Juarez said. Gillespie said she wanted the jacket, and the woman, who





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was walking from one Augustina Leathers location to the other, refused and ran.

The store owner declined to pursue charges against the woman but wanted her warned to stay away or be arrested for trespassing.

"After she was admonished and allowed to leave, she went right back to the store and caused a disturbance," Juarez said. She grabbed a shirt, which the owner seized back, and then picked up a purse.

"The first girl who was carrying the jacket when she was on the street came into view, and the woman started chasing her [through the store]," Juarez said. "That generated a request for a quick response from Carmel P.D."

As soon as Sgt. Tom Nguyen and officer Joe Boucher arrived, Gillespie stopped and complied as they arrested her, according to Juarez. She was booked and lodged at Monterey County Jail.

All Saints' student places second in state history contest

A STUDENT at All Saints' Day School in Carmel Valley, Claire Margolis, placed second in a statewide history competition in Sacramento last week.


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THE MONTEREY Peninsula Regional Park District is offering grants for environmental preservation and protection projects within its boundaries.

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

CHP targets motorcyclists and drivers who endanger them

While California Highway Patrol officers target unlawful riders, they urge drivers to keep an especially sharp eye out for motorcycles, which are much harder to spot than automobiles.


According to CHP public information officer Larry

Paid for with \$150,000 of a \$1.5 million California Office of Traffic Safety grant, the campaign responds to increases in injuries and fatalities. Between 1999 and 2003, fatal collisions involving motorcycles statewide rose 38 percent, and

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

fourth year, the payment would drop to \$709,875 before slowly escalating each year until the 15th year, when a bill for \$1,656,571 would be due. The town would conclude the agreement with a payment to the county of \$120,377 in its 16th year of operation.

The duration of the agreement also represents a boon to incorporation proponents. The Carmel Valley Forum has long

reported on its website that, "The payments are for a specified period of time, typically about 5-10 years for a community the size of Carmel Valley." But a survey of recently incorporated cities indicates some county governments have taken a tougher stand on lost revenues. When Citrus Heights incorporated in 1997, proponents negotiated an annual payment to Sacramento County of \$5.6 million for 25 years.

Chiulos said the figures used in the negotiations were based on data from the 2002/2003 fiscal year.

Pacific Grove city manager and then-assistant county administrator Jim Colangelo initially represented the county in the negotiations. Chiulos replaced him after Colangelo accepted his present job, and county administrator Lew Bauman recently joined the talks. Former 5th District Supervisor Karin Strasser Kauffman led incorporation proponents in the discussions.

Proponents to pay lump sum for first-year county services

In addition to the revenue neutrality payment schedule, the town is required to compensate the county for providing services during its first year of operation. The county offered



to spread the \$5,501,740 payment over five years, but proponents decided to pay it off after just a year. State law requires the county to continue providing services — such as police protection and road repairs — to the new city for one year after its incorporation.

LAFCO considers accelerated schedule

The Local Agency Formation Commission will consider a revised timeline for the Carmel Valley incorporation process when the agency meets Monday, May 22, at 4 p.m. in Salinas.

Last month, the commission voted unanimously to accelerate the incorporation application process in an effort to get the issue on the November 2006 ballot, making it LAFCO's primary focus.

"My priorities have shifted," explained McKenna. "I'm assembling the staff and resources to accomplish a lot in a short period of time. We're working under a very tight timeline."

injury accidents increased 28 percent. In 2005, California contained more than 1 million licensed motorcyclists and more than 650,000 registered bikes.

"We're trying to reverse that trend of injuries and fatalities," Starkey said. "Our officers are out there being very attentive toward motorcyclists as well as those motorists who are causing undue hazards to motorcyclists."

Warmer weather and longer days mean more riders on state highways and county roads.

"Motorcyclists need to watch their speeds," said Starkey. "Even though they're on a vehicle that's capable of high speed, they need to keep it down and obey the law."

Monterey riders should be aware the CHP will have its helicopters and fixed-wing aircraft patrolling from above, as well as its squad of motorcycle officers on the ground. On particularly busy weekends, such as July's Red Bull U.S. Grand Prix at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca, officers from neighboring jurisdictions will add to their ranks.

And drivers should be mindful of motorcyclists, particularly when pulling out onto a road, proceeding into an intersection or turning left across an oncoming traffic lane, since they are often closer than they appear. Bikes also require more distance to stop, and riders risk losing control under hard braking.

Many drivers don't know motorcyclists can legally pass them in the same traffic lane as long as they do so with "reasonable safety." According to Starkey, a rider may share either side of a lane and should travel no more than 10 mph faster than the traffic, up to the speed limit. A rider cannot pass on the right shoulder or over a double yellow line.

In addition to enforcing the laws and educating the public, the CHP is urging riders of all experience levels to take specialized training offered by the California Motorcycle Safety Program. For information, call (877) RIDE-411.

With the purchase of Duke Energy North America's power plants, LS Power added approximately 6,300 megawatts of capacity to its electricity generation portfolio. 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


was able to turn off the water before the rest of the house went under.



Red Cross wants kid-friendly public speakers

AmeriCorps jobs will help with disaster preparedness

By MARY BROWNFIELD

 HavING SUCCESSFULLY competed for the privilege of hiring two full-time AmericCorps members to help educate people about disaster preparedness, the Carmel chapter of the American Red Cross is accepting applications for the 10-month jobs. Likened to a domestic Peace Corps, AmeriCorps is run by the federal Corporation for National and Community Service, which annually puts 70,000 people to work for nonprofits, public agencies and community groups focused on education, public safety, health and the environment.

"There are only 12 chapters in California that have been approved to place AmeriCorps members with them for this next fiscal year, and we're one" executive director Donna Duvin said. "The whole idea behind it is to create community preparedness as well as a sense of civic responsibility in AmeriCorps members."

Duvin envisions the two workers helping to reach "vulnerable populations" in remote areas, such as Cachagua and the Big Sur Coast, and students in Peninsula schools. Ideally, they will speak English and Spanish.

"We're hoping we can have them engage middle-school and high-school students and empower them to then be dis-



aster preparedness presenters," Duvin said.

In addition, the AmeriCorps members, who will receive a \$1,200 monthly stipend and start work Aug. 15, will be trained in emergency response so they can serve three-week assignments at any major disaster site in the nation.

"This is particularly important since we're coming up on hurricane season," Duvin said. "And the training they receive will strengthen our disaster response."

Qualified candidates must be at least 18 years old, and should enjoy public speaking and working with kids.

"It's an excellent opportunity for anyone who has graduated from high school and hasn't started college," she said. The chapter, located at Dolores Street and Eighth Avenue in downtown Carmel, will accept applications through the end of May, hopes to conduct interviews the first week in June and plans to make its selections by July 1. Duvin is grateful for the opportunity to put two motivated people to work.

"It means we're being entrusted with federal government resources in terms of really being able to develop leadership in the AmeriCorps members and enable them to have a satisfying experience not just in our four walls, but in this area, where they can truly make a difference in our more diverse communities.'

PACIFIC GROVE'S mayor and city council members will retain the extra pocket change they receive every month as a stipend for their community work.

Getting rid of pay for council members and the mayor would have saved the city \$38,640 per year.



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


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Girls looking for 1,000 women

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

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

tion promoting Measure A. "If it passes, we would be eligible and will likely get another \$200 million in and state and federal matching funds. That's almost a 60 percent return on our investment."

But opponents of the measure, including Lawrence Samuels, vice chair of the Libertarian Party of Monterey County, contend taxpayers shouldn't have to pay higher taxes to have good roads. "It's not a matter of roads," Samuels said. "It's a matter of government waste. The county has tons of money."

Measure A, which needs a two-thirds majority vote to pass, would provide funds for 16 road projects, improved local bus service, expansion of transportation services for elderly and disabled, and passenger train services.

Tax money from Measure A would go toward four major construction projects on the Peninsula:

■ Holman Highway — CHOMP. Estimated cost: \$16,741,000.

The project will widen Highway 68 (Holman Highway) from two to four lanes between Highway 1 and Skyline Forest Drive, and improve the Highway 68–Highway 1 interchange and. Construction would begin in 2010 and be completed in 2012.

The road improvements "would also provide the ability for people to pull over and allow an ambulance to go by easier," therefore reducing emergency response times, said Debbie Hale, deputy executive director of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County. ■ Highway 1 — Carmel Area. Estimated cost: \$3,090,000.

The project will expand work done in 2001, when Monterey County and Caltrans completed a climbing lane on Highway 1 between Carmel Valley Road and Ocean Avenue, greatly easing the overcrowded roadway. The new project will extend the truck climbing lane from Rio Road to Carmel Valley Road. It will also improve the intersections at Rio Road and Carmel Valley Road to allow for improved access. Construction would begin in 2008 and be completed in 2009.

The 2001 work "was a really low-cost, high-effectiveness project that needs to be extended to Rio Road," Hale said. "We are also going to pair that with a bike path along the east side of the highway."

■ Del Monte Avenue — Monterey. Estimated cost: \$38 million.

The project will add an eastbound lane from El Estero to Sloat Avenue in Monterey to improve safety and vehicle access to downtown Monterey, New Monterey and Pacific Grove via Del Monte. It includes intersection improvements at Sloat and Camino Aguajito, such as the addition of leftturn lanes and improvements to signal operations. It will also expand the coastal viewshed. Construction would begin in 2012 and be completed in 2013. "That traffic congestion must be relieved so we can get emergency vehicles through there when the need arises," Della Sala said. "Bear in mind it's not just the City of Monterey that uses that road, it's also

the residents of Pacific Grove, Carmel and Pebble Beach."

Hale said the money slated for the improvements there will have a peripheral benefit. "It will also involve buying the last piece of property on Window on the Bay," she said.
■ Highway 1 — Seaside/Sand City widening.

Estimated cost: \$63,528,000. The project will widen Highway 1 from Fremont Street to Canyon Del Rey in Seaside Also included are interchange

Canyon Del Rey in Seaside. Also included are interchange and local road improvements in the vicinity of Canyon Del Rey and Fremont, to improve access to and from Fremont, Canyon Del Rey and Highway 1. Construction would begin 2016 and be completed 2018.

The most expensive of the construction projects, TAMC said the improvements will greatly reduce the commute times to and from the Peninsula.

"I think the most important projects are not on the Peninsula but ones that connect us to the rest of the world," Cunningham said. "Such as the safety improvements on Highway 101 from Highway 156 to the county line. They are pretty important arteries for people who live here or who have businesses here."

The money raised by the tax could only be used for projects outlined in Measure A, which also includes a citizens oversight committee to monitor and audit funds to make sure they're spent appropriately.

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From Woodstock to Grease, Sha Na Na keeps hopping

T IS difficult to imagine anyone looking more out of place than Sha Na Na did at Woodstock.

Sporting greased-down duck-tail haircuts and dressed like they just stepped out of time capsule, the members of Sha Na Na — who will perform at Sunset Center Saturday, May 20 — were a group of Columbia University students who just happened to have an affection for the street-corner doo-wop vocal group sound of the late 1950s and and early 1960s.

And yet there they were, in August 1969, a completely unknown band with only six gigs under their collective belts, warming up for hippie guitar-god Jimi Hendrix at the biggest countercultural gathering in the history of humanity.

Besides being the only performers at Woodstock not in need of a haircut, Sha Na Na was also the only act without a record deal. They were paid a measly \$300 for their efforts, and to add insult to injury, the check bounced. But the popularity of the concert — and the film that followed — opened up a new world of possibilities for the band.

Old is in and new is out

Remarkably, Sha Na Na's timing was perfect. Just as the tumultuous 1960s faded into the 1970s, pop audiences became enamored with the sights and sounds of a more innocent time. In 1973, "American Graffiti" asked movie-goers, "Where were you in

'62?" A year later, "Happy Days" introduced suddenly nostalgic television audiences to the wholesome charms and humorous exploits of Richie, Potsy and Fonzie. Suddenly, the 1950s were hip.

Riding this wave of nostalgia, Sha Na Na got its own television variety show. Meanwhile, the producers of "Grease" went searching for a group to appear in their new film, a rock 'n' roll romance set in 1959.

"They asked us to be the band at the 'hop,'" recalled longtime Sha Na Na member Scott Simon in an interview this week. "They came to the set of our television show and told us they needed a 'stroll' number and a 'hand jive' number. We said, 'We can do that."

(For anyone too young to remember, a "hop" is short for "sock hop," a dance where you take your shoes off; the "stroll" and "hand jive" were dance crazes 50 years ago.)

"Grease" was as big a hit as Woodstock, and far more profitable for Sha Na Na. The landmark concert in Bethel, N.Y., gave the group credibility. But the film — which once ranked as the third-highest grossing of all time — made them movie stars.

The band's legacy in rock 'n' roll was now secure. Resisting the temptation to update its sound, the group stayed true to its roots and emerged as the industry's preeminent oldies-butgoodies act. Simon said the band exclusively covers songs that predate 1964, the year he insists (only halfjokingly), "the Beatles ruined everything."

On the road again ... and again

pop music's barometer of commercial success - have never been kind to Sha Na Na. For better or for worse,

there isn't much of a market for note-by-note covers of jukebox classics like Danny and Juniors' "At the Hop" or the Silhouettes' 'Get a Job."

But Baby Boomers seem to have an endless fascination with all things nostalgic. Despite the absence of a hit record, Sha Na Na remains one of the hardest working bands in the business, playing about 100 concerts a year.

"Performing has always been our mainstay," explained Simon. "The audience doesn't come to watch us play our hits. They come for the entertainment. They come to dance and party."


For 36 years, Sha Na Na has criss-crossed the country and circumnavigated the globe, performing in Paris, Tokyo and even Africa. Simon can't say how long the group will continue to tour, but he is convinced of one thing: Long after the band has gone the way of the Silhouettes and Danny and the Juniors, rock 'n' roll will still be going strong.

"Rock 'n' roll is truly timeless," he said. "It's here to stay."

The project also has peripheral benefits.

"One of the immediate payoffs is from an operational standpoint," he said. "CAWD won't have to worry about shutting the sewer plant down for maintenance now. In the past, they really had to keep that plant fine-tuned, and when they shut it down for routine maintenance we were short of water, so that is a big relief."

When the project to use reclaimed water to irrigate golf courses began in 1994, it was discovered the mineral content was too high for the type of grass used on the golf courses. Since then, drinking water has also been used to rinse the greens to get rid of the salt from the reclaimed water.

Phase II of the project includes constructing an advanced filtration system using reverse osmosis at the CAWD treatment plant to reduce the salt content of the water pumped to the reservoir. Until that is completed in 2007, the greens will still have to be periodically flushed.

The reservoir's rehabilitation was delayed about a month due to the heavy rains, and the project went slightly over budget.

"Most of that was due to requirements from the state's division of safety of dams," Andrews said.

The state agency, which had representatives on site during the rehabilitation, issued a permit for the reservoir to hold 325 acre-feet of water.

Ironically, the heavy precipitation also had its pluses, Niccum said.

"The late rainfall significantly reduced irrigation demand," he said.

In the summer, when demand is at its greatest, the golf courses will require up to 4.5 million gallons of water per day.

"It is always a challenge to operate a new facility during the startup phase," Niccum said. "Forest Lake Reservoir will store recycled water with a potential for algae growth due to the high nutrient content of the recycled water and exposure to sunlight in an open reservoir for a period of several months."

To offset algae growth, mixer and air bubble systems were

installed to allow the reservoir to remain naturally balanced and reduce the need to add chemicals to remove algae, Niccum said.

The 30-foot-deep reservoir also has potential safety hazards. Already, one deer has fallen into the reservoir but was fished out unharmed, said Rick Verbanec, president of the Del Monte Forest Property Owners.

"They have done a number of things for security," Verbanec said. "They are installing an 8-foot fence, not so much for kids but for deer."

Crews also installed bollards with ropes across the top of the reservoir that can be grabbed if a person falls in, he said.

"If anybody gets in, they can get a hold of the ropes and walk up the side to get out," Verbanec said. "They do have a small maintenance boat out there in case they need to get in and do repairs or fish out critters."

Rehabilitation of the reservoir required major excavation, including grading of the surface, reconstruction of the reservoir's north embankment, and shoring up and strengthening the reservoir to make sure it could withstand earthquakes.

To prevent it from leaking water, construction crews lined the entire surface of the 980,000-square-foot reservoir with Hypalon, a brand-name waterproof material, which will prevent most of the reservoir's water from seeping into the earth.

"The division of safety of dams has a requirement that in the event of an emergency, one-half of the permitted water storage volume of the reservoir can be released by gravity over a seven-day period," Niccum said. "This project will use a 24-inch emergency drain line from the reservoir to Sawmill

Gulch Creek to meet the requirement."

The reservoir, which was originally built in the late 1800s, was used by California American Water before the company sold it to the Pebble Beach Community Services District.

Funding for the project came from the reimbursement of the sale of potable water credits for residential remodels and construction of vacant lots in Pebble Beach, Andrews said.





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
Chef Sun Huh makes his dream come true

'EVERY RESTAURANT has something special on its menu," said Sushi Heaven's Soon Huh (known as Chef Sun), so he apprenticed in many restaurants to glean the best they had to offer.

He learned specialties from top chefs, such as the owner of Yuri Japanese restaurant in San Jose where he worked for four years, and coupled with work experience with other Japanese restaurants in Fremont, Oakland, Sacramento and Monterey, in 2003 he was ready to open his own restaurant. What he wanted more than anything else was a restaurant in Carmel-by-the-Sea. Finding a suitable space proved difficult, but when he looked over the former premises of Little Pizza Heaven on Dolores Street just north of Eighth Avenue, he thought it had definite possibilities. But two long blocks from Carmel's busy Ocean Avenue? He wrestled with that for a while, but decided eventually he could entice a following and



make a go of it off the beaten path.

For three months Sun and a handyman retrofitted the long, narrow restaurant, adding an eight-seat sushi bar, booths and tables to seat 36 indoors, and an outdoor patio for eight.

By installing decorative faux roof overhangs above the dining area and sushi bar, a Japanese architectural touch was created. Wall hangings, lanterns and walls painted wasabi green and ginger flower orange added a light, pleasing atmosphere to the interior. Exquisite pictures of Asian women in traditional dress, done in needlepoint by Sun's mother, Jung Hyee Choi of Korea, were framed and prominently displayed.

Outside, bright bougainvillea now cascades over the patio walls and planters of purple tibouchina edge the seating area.

Alterations which took three months to complete — a delay Chef Sun thought of as a detriment — turned out to be a plus: People stopped by to ask when Sushi Heaven would open and then continued to check on its progress. A good part of the restaurant's initial clientele was attracted before it even opened.

An astute business man, Sun retained part equity in the longstanding name, Little Pizza Heaven, by calling his Japanese restaurant Sushi Heaven.

Another fortuitous circumstance regarded by Sun as a handicap at the

time, but which proved to be in his favor, was his bare bones food preparation staff at the time of Sushi Heaven's opening. While his brother Jin cooked in the kitchen, Sun prepared raw fish at the sushi bar in full view and close proximity to

his customers. He became acquainted with his patrons, their likes and dislikes, and created special dishes for them of sushi, maki rolls, nigiri and sashimi, which he does to this day.

"I have hundreds of special dishes in my head," Sun said. Now two chefs — Chris Lee and Jacinto Perez — help Sun prepare the dishes ordered from his extensive menu of entrées, udon, donburi, appetizers, sushi, sashimi, nigiri, makimono rolls, salads and bento boxes.

Sun's wife, Hyeon Joo, and Jin's wife, Miyoung, were his first waitresses. He has eight part-time servers now. Hyeon Joo sometimes still helps out in the kitchen, but the couple's two children, Hannah, 6, and David, 5, keep her busy at home.

Fresh is a must

Sushi preparation requires the freshest of fresh fish. To this end, Sun deals with three fish companies. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, deliveries are made from Oakland, and on Wednesdays and Fridays, from San Francisco. Most of the fish is flash frozen to assure absolute freshness and flavor, but according to Sun, tuna, halibut and sea urchin must be fresh in order to prepare these gifts from the sea to the best possible advantage. Fresh salmon from Monterey is used for kitchen cooking.

Sushi Heaven is so highly regarded by other local restaurateurs Sun is asked to prepare and serve sushi at prestigious, large gatherings at Pebble Beach during the AT&T where annually he makes sushi for

300 at a time, while at the Highlands Inn he is called upon for sushi platters for 200.

Hundreds of photographs of happy customers are neatly displayed above the dining area, attesting to the restaurant's popularity. Look closely and you may be able to spot a number of local chefs in the photographs, a compliment to Sun's culinary acumen.

When Sun was still in his native Seoul, South Korea, he majored in English at university, always planning to come to America and start his own restaurant. Now in the United States for nine years, Sun has accomplished his dream.

The restaurant is open Monday through Saturday; it does an admirable luncheon trade from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 pm.,



flee."

"I'm satisfied with the way things went — I just wish it didn't take so long - but the wheels of justice grind slowly," said Phillips. "The big break was the palm print."

In frequent contact with police ever since the killing, Phillips said he was kept somewhat apprised, though officers were cautious to avoid sharing any information that could jeopardize their case. Sadly, the arrest came too late for


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Olinger's mother, Shell Phillips, who died in 2003 at the age of 48.

"I miss my wife; miss my boy," Phillips said. "And I just want to say how grateful Travis and I are for all the people in Carmel for their support. You couldn't ask for a better community.'

He said the kindness, unsolicited generosity and caring of friends, family and even strangers have helped father and son endure the pain of their loss.

Ruelas' arrest also brought thoughts of Olinger rushing back to his uncle, Jeff Olinger, a dispatcher with the Carmel Police Department. He recalled camping with the two boys, and he praised Kristopher's "good heart."

'I told Loren last night, 'As far as Kris is concerned, you were the one who was there when he needed somebody — you're really the only dad Kris knew," he said Wednesday night.

Jeff Olinger also told his 81-year-old father, Al, about the break in the case. The two brothers would spend weekends at their grandparents' Salinas home.

Reaching out

As the years have crept by, Phillips has coped with the pain by helping other victims with theirs. Appointed to the Monterey County Community Restorative Justice Commission by 5th District Supervisor Dave Potter a year-and-a-half ago, Phillips is using his experiences and grief to change the manner in which the justice system treats victims. The commission aims to bring victims, offenders and community members together to repair some of the damage and prevent crime.

"The whole concept is having victims more involved with the process," said Phillips, who has also worked with Parents

of Murdered Children and the Victims Impact Program. He's shared his painful story face to face with young offenders who might recognize the irrevocable hurt their actions cause and change the directions of their lives as a result.

With Ruelas' arrest and Miller's assurance others are imminent, Olinger's surviving family members are preparing for the next chapter in his sad story.

Jeff does not know whether he will attend Ruelas' trial.

"I have mixed emotions about it," he said. "I kind of

would like to know why it happened."

Phillips also would not say whether he plans to occupy a bench in the courtroom while the case is resolved.

"We have a long way to go," he said, and he prays finally having answers to some of the many questions surrounding his son's murder will bring him and his recently departed wife some peace.

Collaboration key

According to managing deputy district attorney Ed Hazel, Ruelas was charged with murder and use of a deadly or dangerous weapon, as well as special circumstances of robbery and carjacking. The case also carries a criminal street gang enhancement.

Ruelas is being held without bail. His arraignment was delayed to May 31 at 1:30 p.m. so he could hire legal coun-

sel or accept a court-appoint-

ed lawyer.

Miller said the case represents hundreds of work hours and the collaboration of numerous local and state agencies, including the police departments of San Jose, Monterey, Salinas, Soledad, Seaside and Carmel, as well as the California Department of Justice's DNA and latent fingerprint units, the sheriff's office and its gang task force and the Marina Department of Public Safety.

"That speaks to the cooperation that departments have in this area, working well with one another,' Miller said. "We don't have the resources to do this ourselves."

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

"I'm keeping the amount as a surprise," said Mary Pankonin, who spearheaded the project with friend Patty Ross. "The important issue is that they have now agreed to take the money. That is what we all care about --- that was the point of this."

The women, ranging in age from their 50s to their 80s, didn't know what they were getting into when they posed barely concealed for their Carmel Fire Belles calendar. Some photos were shot at the fire station, (which turned out to be a violation of the municipal code regarding use of public buildings), while others were taken elsewhere.

Pankonin and Ross believed they had the city's blessings for their project following a January 2004 meeting with McCloud and councilman Gerard Rose, but their calendar provoked a distinctly humorless response from city hall:

"It has come to my attention that you have used city equipment and facilities in the photographing and in the solicitation of funds for your calendar. As such, you should be aware that you do not have the city's permission or approval to use any photographs that were taken in the city's fire station. Nor do you have the city's permission or approval to use any photographs that display the name 'Carmel-by-the-Sea' or in any way give the public the impression that the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea endorses your calendar," city administrator Rich Guillen wrote in a July 27, 2004, letter to Ross. "In addition, the city will not accept any funds that you may consider donating to the city as a result of this venture. You are not permitted to use the city's name in soliciting any funds, and if you have already done so, you may wish to consider returning those funds to the donors.'

And city attorney Don Freeman prepared "media information" sheet for staff to

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respond to questions. "This particular matter has to do solely with the potential for legal exposure for the city. While some people may like or support this project, others may find it or the city's involvement objectionable," Freeman wrote. "For this reason, the city has advised the group that they may not use any city facilities or staff for this project,

nor may they indicate or imply the city's endorsement of the project in any way."

Now a 'non-issue'

But the Fire Belles continued to build momentum, the publicity fueled sales of their 2005 calendar, and the cash accrued in an interest-bearing account. Meanwhile, the





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women tried to figure out how to convince the city to accept the money, which according to the Friends of Carmel Firehouse bylaws must be used for maintenance and

improvements at the station.

"Now it's just a non-issue, and we're thrilled, of course," Pankonin said. "We don't want to go over past history."

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McCloud said Freeman's opinion remains unchanged, but she and councilwoman Paula Hazdovac thought it wise to acknowledge the Fire Belles' efforts and accept the gift in the spirit in which it was intended.

"Their intentions were honorable," she said. "And it seemed appropriate, since they are sponsoring the movie at the Forest Theater, that that would be the place."

(According to law, the mayor and city council must formally vote to accept the gift, which McCloud said she would place on the agenda of an upcoming meeting.)

Pankonin hopes her calendar companions will attend the show and the reception beforehand that will include their most generous donors, mostly Carmel businesses.

"We'll wait for Mayor Sue and her entourage to come over. Then we'll make the presentation of the check, and hopefully the place will erupt in applause, and that will be that," Pankonin said. "With all the hoopla that occurred, we're having a very pleasant and desired outcome. We're finally accomplishing our goal."

And as soon as darkness falls, the film that inspired them, "Calendar Girls," will roll.

Films in the Forest — an endeavor of the Forest Theater Guild to raise a little capital by showing movies from May to July - kicks off Monday, May 22, with "A Fistful of Dollars," sponsored by Mark Raway/Stahl Motors.

"Calendar Girls," will play Tuesday, May 23. Shows begin at sundown and cost \$5 per person (kids under 5 free). Don't become successful

EARTHBOUND FARM has taken some flak lately — in the New Yorker, the San Francisco Chronicle, the Monterey County Herald and other publications — for not being the "right" kind of organic farm.

It seems organic farmers, in the minds of some, are not only supposed to avoid artificial chemicals on their crops. They're also supposed to have long hair, wear sandals and not be interested in making money.

A Harvard professor, according to the Herald, went so far as to say Earthbound Farm, which started as a small, innovative organic operation in Carmel Valley, has "sold out" to "pure capitalism."

It's true Earthbound Farm has gotten huge. According to the Chronicle, EF ships 13.5 million servings of organic lettuce every week from its processing plant in San Juan Bautista. The company farms more than 26,000 organic acres.

"Consumers who think they're buying from a small local farm may actually be buying from a company moving up to half a million pounds of lettuce a day," the Chronicle noted.

And then the paper added this unforgettable paragraph:

"Critics of large-scale organics say that while mega-producers follow the letter of the law, not all follow its spirit. They worry that the movement is sacrificing its soul, that it's strayed from its original ideals of creating a new food system that helps small farms, connects consumers with producers, and cleans up the environment."

But how did Earthbound Farm get so big? By providing millions of consumers something they want to eat. The Chronicle and The New Yorker, which offer themselves as champions of the masses, should be happy that so many have decided to buy what Earthbound Farm sells. Indeed, the only way for Earthbound Farm to stay small would have been to keep its organic goods out of the hands of people who want them.

And if the company is making handsome profits, so what? Isn't that what newspapers and magazines try to do, too?

Somehow the news media manage to be against everybody's profits except their own. A company that makes money must be corrupt or a sell-out, they tell us constantly. But they never point that finger at themselves.

It's an old story: There's plenty of money to be made pretending to be against

according to Miller, and officer John Purdom, already in the area, saw three men get into a car and drive away.

He attempted to stop the driver, who was suspected of stealing a pair of shoes, but instead of slowing, Hardy allegedly fled, hitting speeds of 50 mph on a half-mile chase through town.

"He turned onto Junipero Avenue and, about that time, he either lost control or a tire blew out," Miller said. "He definitely went into the opposite lane."

Hardy crashed head-on into an oncoming car, and a parked vehicle was also hit. After the crash, Hardy and his two passengers got out of the car, according to Miller, and officers grabbed two of them. An off-duty firefighter who happened to be in the area chased and captured Hardy, he said.

Meanwhile, a dozen firefighters and medics freed the woman from her crushed car and summoned a CalSTAR helicopter from Salinas to take her to a trauma center, according to Pacific Grove Fire Division Chief Jim Gunter.

But where to land? After determining the soccer field at P.G. Middle School was free of hazards such as wires and debris and empty of the few people who had been tossing a frisbee, firefighters directed the helicopter in to land, according to Gunter. An ambulance carried the female victim to the improvised landing zone and crews loaded her into the aircraft for transport to Santa Clara Valley Medical Center.

Gunter said no one else was injured in the accident, and Miller reported Wednesday the woman's wounds were not as serious as previously thought.

Hardy — who faces charges of petty theft, driving under the influence, hit-and-run causing injury, evading a police officer causing injury and possession of marijuana for sale - was taken to Monterey County Jail and held on \$90,000 bail. One of his passengers, 25-year-old Carlo Francisco Aiken of Marina, was cited for obstructing a peace officer and released, according to Miller. The other man was released without charges.



ment or transportation to CHOMP and signed medical release forms with the ambulance. Police officers also responded to take a report.

Carmel Valley: On Saturday night, around midnight, the sheriff's search and rescue team was called out for a missing person in the Miller Canyon area of Carmel Valley. This is a very remote location in the Chews Ridge area, off Tassajara Road. The 61-year-old male had gone fishing on Saturday around 4:30 p.m. and had not returned. His wife was the reporting party.
