IS IT STILL A DEBATE IF ONLY ONE SIDE SHOWS UP?

THE CARMEL Valley Library is scheduled to host a debate Saturday, Sept. 9, at 10 a.m. The question at stake is one that has perplexed and divided Carmel Valley residents for years: Should the valley incorporate?

Unfortunately, to qualify as a debate, two views of an argument must be represented. But at the 11th hour, organizers were still searching for someone to represent the anti-incorporation viewpoint.

"Something is going to happen," incorporation proponent Glenn Robinson said. He'll be debating on the "pro" side. But he may be talking to an empty chair.

And even Robinson claims he is not really a proponent of incorporation, but simply an advocate for putting the issue on the ballot. Nevertheless, he plans to show up Saturday armed with facts he believes support creating a Town of Carmel Valley.

"Three detailed and sophisticated financial analyses have all confirmed what common sense tells us: that Carmel Valley is an affluent community with a rich and diverse tax base that can easily afford to incorporate," Robinson said. "Since our local tax dollars will stay local instead of going to Salinas, the level of [services] in the Town of Carmel Valley will improve significantly."

Meanwhile, opponents have argued such studies are based on out-of-date data and the cost of maintaining Carmel Valley's extensive road network will place an unreasonable financial burden on the new city. They elected not to pay for

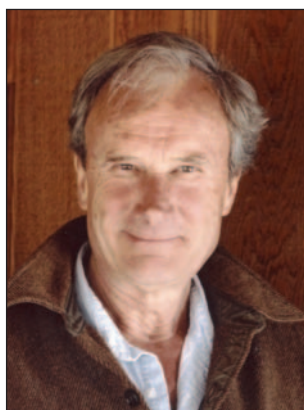
Gold Rush historian, CRA founder was an 'oversized slice of life'

"HE WAS a very forceful and outspoken person, but also very sensitive and very gentle, too," John Hicks said of his friend, Jim Holliday, the notable California historian and author who died of pulmonary fibrosis at home in Carmel last Thursday morning at the age of 82. "That made for an interesting paradox, I think."

Mr. Holliday, who helped found the Carmel Residents Association after Clint Eastwood was elected mayor of the town 20 years ago and was named the group's Citizen of the Year in 2001, was best known for his books and studies on the California Gold Rush.

In 1981, Simon & Schuster published "The World Rushed In," which described the Gold Rush and its impacts on California's development and American values. The book, heralded by fellow historians, underwent 13 printings. Its latest edition, published by the University of Oklahoma Press, remains available.

Forest Lake Reservoir cuts P.B. fire risk

WHEN THE great Pebble Beach fire raged through Del Monte Forest in May 1987, burning down more than 30 homes, the Forest Lake Reservoir was dry.

But with this year's fire season at its peak, homeowners can sleep better knowing the reservoir holds millions of gallons of recycled water in the event another major blaze breaks out.

The reservoir was put to the test July 21 when a wildfire broke out on Huckleberry Hill, the location of the 1987 fire. A California Department of Forestry helicopter used the 22-acre reservoir to draw 15,000 gallons of water and drop it on

the flames.

"The helicopter knocked down hot spots so the ground crews could extinguish it," said Craig Anthony, former chief of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection in Riverside County, and current general manager of the Pebble Beach Community Services District.

"If the helicopter hadn't been there, they probably would still have put it out," said Rick Verbanec, president of the Del Monte Forest Property Owners. "But it definitely helped."

This year's fire occurred about 5:30 p.m. at the Morse Botanical Reserve on Huckleberry Hill, a couple hundred yards from the origin of the devastating 1987 blaze that burned about 160 acres, destroyed 31 homes and injured 18 people.

In the 1987 blaze, started by an illegal campfire, firefighters did use helicopters to help put out the flames, but having the reservoir close by would have made their response times much quicker.

Anthony said in July the chopper made about 25 trips to the reservoir, using a hose to suck the water and douse the fire, which took about 30 minutes to contain.

Using the reservoir as a water supply to help extinguish fires was something former PBCSD general manager Dick Andrews touted before he retired earlier this year.

"I sent an e-mail to him, and he was very pleased that his baby came to fruition," Verbanec said.

Although using the helicopter to extinguish the fire went without a hitch, Verbanec said there will be further discussion about protocol if the same thing happens again. The main concern is that the hose used in drawing the water doesn't harm the impervious liner

Funds sought to keep four-legged cop on duty

WHEN CARMEL cops need a highly trained nose to sniff out criminals or illegal drugs, they summon a K9 officer from another city or the sheriff's office. Seaside P.D. often sends officer Jackie Meroney — daughter of Carmel building official and police officer Tim Meroney — and her German shepherd, Karo.

Meroney became Monterey County's first female K9 handler more than three years ago and has made annual pitches for funds to keep the Seaside program going ever since. This year, she hopes residents all over the Peninsula will help.

Training for Karo and Meroney is intensive and ongoing, and the pair often needs new equipment. They regularly travel to San Francisco to meet their professional trainers. Meroney also takes Karo through obedience exercises and other tasks every day. The commands are all in German, since that's where Karo was born.

But the rewards he gets for doing well would be familiar to any native-born American dog: A ball to play with for being obedient, treats for successful searches, "and sometimes he gets a couple rawhide bones to clean his teeth," Meroney said.

Community help is key to keeping Karo on the force. "Donations in the past have helped pay for just about all of our training and equipment," she said, including obstacles that challenge the dog's search abilities and training sessions for other officers. Last year's donations helped procure a full-body "bite suit" worn by people pretending to be suspects. In 2004, they also allowed her to compete

Tourist gets rabies shots after defending dog from raccoon

A VACATIONER suffered injuries and underwent rabies shots after a raccoon attacked her in the backyard of a rental house last week, according to Carmel police. Virginia Bodo was trying to protect her fully grown Bernese mountain dog from the raccoon, which had chased the dog across the yard.

The woman, a Southern California resident renting a home at Junipero and Eighth while on vacation, let her dog into the unlit backyard around 9:30 p.m. Sept. 1, according to

the city's animal control officer, Cindi Mitchell.

"Her dog went after something and then came running back to her," she said, with a raccoon close behind. As they reached the house, the raccoon caught up with the large, thickly furred dog.

"Then the woman grabbed the raccoon and threw it off her dog," Mitchell said.

At the same time, she yelled to other people inside the home for help, hoping to get herself and her dog safely indoors. But when one of them opened the back door, another

dog entered the yard. Fearing a second attack was imminent, Bodo removed her shoe and threw it at the raccoon, which finally left.

"She was protecting the dogs," Mitchell said.

Where they hide

Bodo sustained scratches and bites on her right wrist, according to Mitchell. She was treated at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula and decided to undergo the series of shots necessary to prevent rabies. She received no stitches.

Bodo reported the incident to Carmel P.D. the following morning, and Mitchell examined the yard to see if raccoons were living on the property. She found no signs, such as a latrine or spaces where the creatures could hide.

"I let her know about lighting the yard and some of the other things she could do, but this wasn't her home," Mitchell said. "She's aware now of the situation where we do have raccoons and foxes and other things that live here, and we have to be aware of our surroundings."

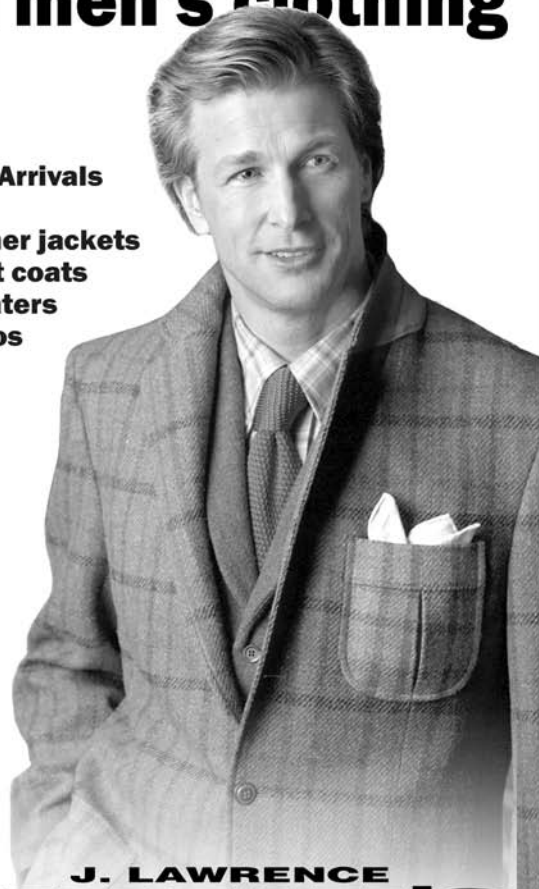
The SPCA of Monterey County's wildlife center also provides assistance throughout the county, particularly regarding injured or orphaned animals, and advises property owners to "focus on eliminating the attraction, not the animal," by sealing crawl spaces, keeping trash cans closed, feeding pets inside and lighting dark hiding spots. 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City accepts public bathroom gift, will find the water somewhere

NO ONE knows for certain whose water will run through it, but the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea is getting one more public restroom, courtesy of restaurateur David Fink. While renovating the building adjacent to Piccadilly Park for his latest culinary venture, Cantinetta Luca, set to open this month, Fink offered to pay for construction of a new restroom in the park. The much-needed facility would better serve the public than the current setup, which requires him to leave the restaurant's service door open for passersby to use the bathroom inside.

When Fink proposed the idea as part of his remodel application in May, city officials heralded the concept but said the restroom couldn't be built unless he wanted to give up three restaurant seats — each reportedly

worth \$25,000 to \$30,000 in annual gross revenues — to provide the water for it. He didn't.

Alternatively, the city could dedicate some of its meager reserves to the new bathroom, which would require public hearings before the planning commission and city council.

But because the city is sure it wants the restroom, which it will operate and maintain, building official Tim Meroney directed Fink to go ahead with it.

"We still have not worked out the water problem," Meroney said. "But in the middle of this construction, it makes no sense at all not to build it now and connect it later."

Building it later would require the return of construction crews, added expenses and further closure of the Dolores Street park.

Fink, who also owns L'Auberge Carmel

and Bouchée, described his offer as "about as no-brainer as they get." The city's residents and visitors will have access to a nice, new public restroom — of which there are few downtown — while Cantinetta Luca's back door will be used for deliveries, not potty breaks.

"We're happy to do it," Fink said.

Principal planner Brian Roseth said he will propose the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District allow the new bathroom without further debiting anyone's water allocation. Water for restaurants is based on the number of seats, and since that number is not changing, he will argue Fink should not have to provide more water for the new bathroom.

Failing that, another downtown property owner might donate water credits to the city for it.

"The water would have to be approved before we opened it up," Roseth said this week. "Unless the city wanted to use some of its precious supply."

However the water question is answered,

Fink is positive the bathroom will be greatly appreciated, as evidenced by the public's use of the portable toilet at the building site. On a July weekday, 93 people, excluding construction workers, took advantage of it, Fink said.

"It's just amazing how needed another public restroom is," he said.

Fink also said the new bathroom would relieve other merchants of the constant queries to use theirs.

"It will be finished in a month," he said. Once water is allocated and the facility is open to the public, "it will get a tremendous amount of use," Fink predicted.

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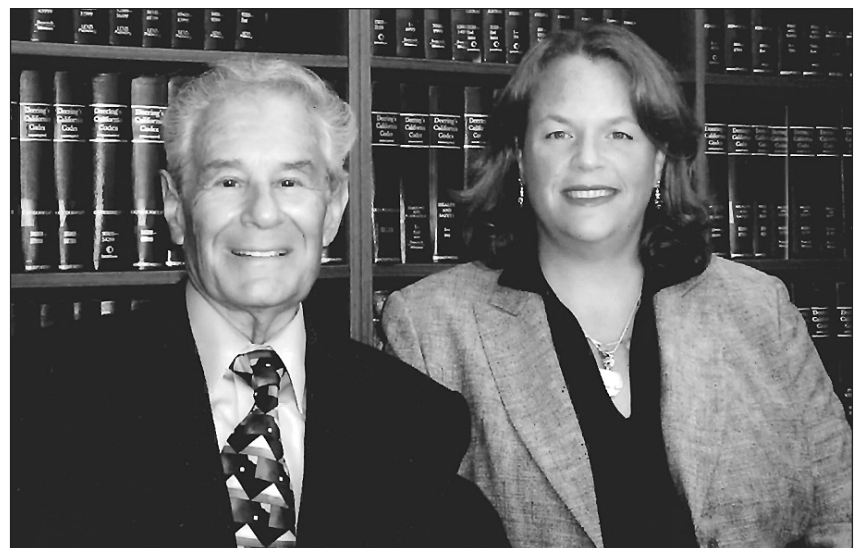
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PBCSD TO PAY CHP \$135,000 TO CATCH MORE SPEEDERS

LOOK OUT! Pebble Beach will soon have more black and white patrolling its mean streets.

A contract between the California Highway Patrol and the Pebble Beach Community Services District, in an effort to crack down on speeders, looks like a done deal.

According to the agreement, a CHP officer will be assigned to patrol Del Monte Forest for at least 80 hours per month.

"The CHP thinks that will get the results we want," said Craig Anthony, general manager of the Pebble Beach Community Services District. "We are going to follow their suggestion and see how the first three months work out."

The beefed-up enforcement is the result of a survey sent by the Del Monte Forest Property Owners to Pebble Beach households about a year ago that found speeding and vandalism were among residents' biggest concerns.

At the suggestion of the DMFPO, the PBCSD passed an ordinance this year authorizing more law enforcement. And the Monterey County Local Agency Formation Commission gave the authority to augment police services.

"We believe the real problem is the Monday-to-Friday commute time," Anthony said. "That's when folks are coming and going to work and dropping kids off to school, and construction workers are coming in and out."

And it's Pebble Beach residents and not tourists who speed more frequently, he said. As a result, the highest enforcement pri-

ority will be directed to weekday morning and afternoon commute hours. Additional enforcement efforts will routinely be scheduled during non-commute hours as CHP officers are available. And the CHP could use multiple patrol units to achieve the 80-hour patrol minimum, Anthony said.

Although vandalism in Pebble Beach has tapered off since last year, Anthony said if there is an upswing in property damage, and they have a plan to deal with it.

"If we feel the vandalism problem is becoming an issue for us we will contract for extra hours with the Monterey County Sheriff's Office," he said. "But they have done a great job of getting it under control."

The CHP and sheriff's office already maintain a limited police presence in Pebble Beach. The CHP is expected to sign the contract for increased patrol by mid October, Anthony said.

If it turns out the 80 hours of extra patrol isn't enough, the district will increase it, he said.

"We have enough money to have the equivalent of one extra CHP officer on duty a month," which would mean about 168 hours, Anthony said.

Firefighters take new, lightweight Jaws of Life for a test drive

CARMEL FIREFIGHTERS made quick work of a broken-down pickup truck last Thursday night, practicing cutting it to pieces with their newest gadget — a lightweight Hurst Jaws of Life combination tool used to free trapped victims of car crashes.

CFD bought its new Jaws with \$12,300 in

tax dollars distributed by the California Office of Traffic Safety.

“Monterey County fire chiefs made a little consortium of 15 different departments, and we all put in for a grant last year,” said Carmel Fire engineer August Beacham. When the grant was awarded, CFD’s share allowed the department to replace the 70-pound Jaws emergency workers have used for auto extrication since 1978.

“These are brand new and up to date and weigh about half of the old tool, so they’re much safer to use and easier to use,” he said.

All full-time and part-time firefighters are now qualified to deploy the new Hurst tool, which the department received in July.

The Aug. 31 practice on a truck donated by Carmel Chevron owner Andy Hill helped them become more familiar with how the new Jaws work compared with the old ones. The new gadget features blades that cut as well as spread, while the old tool had separate spreaders and cutters that had to be attached and detached as needed. For instance, spreaders force open doors, while cutters sever metal struts. A small, portable gas engine provides the power.

Their compactness and portability mean the tool and its power plant can be kept on the fire engine that responds first to every call, while the old tools were kept on a separate vehicle.

“Now we don’t have to wait to do extrication,” Beacham said. “That’s a huge change for us.”

After learning they would receive the grant, Carmel firefighters looked at five candidates for purchase and narrowed it to two,

which they tested in January on other vehicles donated by Carmel Chevron.

Beacham reported the Hurst was the hands-down winner, and last Thursday

night’s drill reaffirmed that.

“The weight and size are a significant difference,” he said. “Everyone commented how easy it was to use them.”

Rape suspect arrested

AFTER THE victim of an alleged rape that occurred more than two years ago notified the Monterey County Sheriff’s Office the suspect, construction worker Alberto Solano, was living in Carmel Valley, a deputy arrested him at his home Aug. 31.

Solano, 44, reportedly raped the woman, whose identity is protected, in February 2004. She became pregnant and delivered the child, according to the sheriff’s office, which would not provide any additional information, citing the fact the investigation remains open and the case is making its way through the criminal court.

Solano is being held in Monterey County Jail on \$130,000 bail. He faces charges of forcible rape and making threats of violence.

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Carmel schools set records, top county in standardized testing

CARMEL'S PUBLIC schools scored highest among public schools countywide on state tests, according to Academic Performance Index results released last week.

Carmel Unified School District Superintendent Marvin Biasotti also reported the five schools tested — three elementary schools, the middle school and the high school — received their best scores ever. He credited hardworking teachers and students, better curricula and more efforts to bring underachieving students up to speed.

Tularcitos Elementary School in Carmel Valley soared 57 points this year to 916, Captain Cooper School in Big Sur climbed by 56 points to 823, River School improved on last year's impressive 950 by one point, Carmel Middle School gained 31 points for a total of 866, and Carmel High School added 25 points, bringing its score to 816. (A perfect score is 1,000.)

The districtwide score of 867 marked a 31-point gain over last year — almost triple the state average increase of 11.

Several of the local scores marked the largest-ever gains

for the schools and put Cooper and CHS past the 800-mark for the first time. River, Tularcitos, Carmel Middle and Carmel High were the top-scoring schools in their categories for the entire county, and Cooper tied with another school for that honor.

"We're extremely pleased by the evidence of improved student learning reflected in these results," Biasotti said. "We sometimes get criticized as being focused entirely on test scores, but really our focus is on student learning. We use these scores as evidence of student learning."

He said schools districtwide aimed to align their instruction with state standards, entice students to be more engaged and intervene quickly when pupils struggle with learning.

"This confirms the hard work of our administration and

support staff, and most particularly our teachers," he said.

Making school fun

CMS Principal Edmund Gross said students benefit not only from a strong emphasis on academics, but access to a multitude of electives and extracurricular activities.

"Many schools have had to give up a lot of the comprehensiveness of a middle school education. Extracurricular activities, electives, field trips — anything not focusing on academics has been let go," he said. "My focus is on academics, but not at the expense of a well rounded middle school education."

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Moss Landing Marine Labs will let the public in on some secrets

ANY MYSTERIES surrounding the Moss Landing Marine Laboratories will be ceremoniously revealed when the research institute opens its doors to the public for an open house and 40th anniversary celebration Sept. 9-10.

The marine labs, established in 1966, offer courses for undergraduate and graduate students seeking to obtain a

masters degree in marine science. "We are kind of a low-key lab," said Lisa Uttal, executive director of Friends of Moss Landing Marine Laboratories. "Most people don't know about us."

The labs are operated by a consortium of seven California State University campuses, including Monterey Bay, San Francisco and San Jose. Since their inception, the marine labs, the second oldest marine lab on Monterey Bay, have gained an international reputation in marine science research and education.

"There are approximately 120 graduate students at any given time," Uttal said.

MLML was founded by a group of scientists who recognized the need for a California State University institute to conduct marine science on the Central Coast.

One of the founders was James Nybakken, a doctor of zoology who had been told about the marine lab while at California State University Hayward in the 1960s.

"In the fall of 1966 were the first classes," Nybakken said. "The resident faculty was myself and another guy."

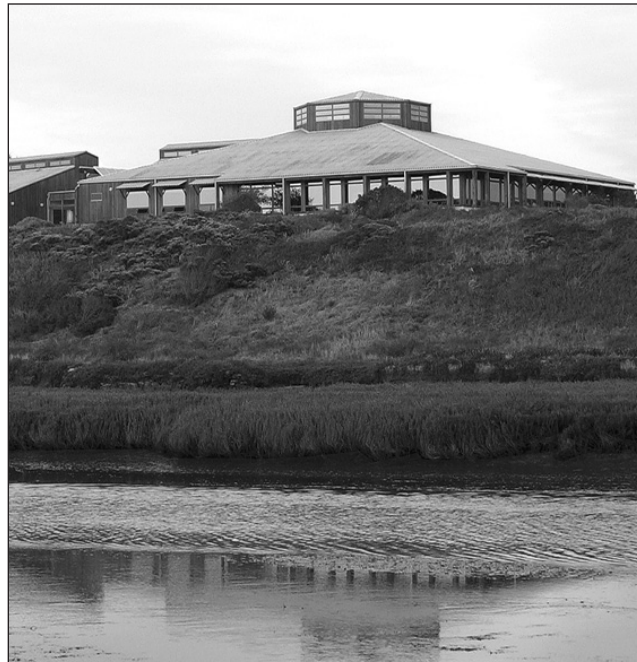
The labs started off a very small operation with barely enough tables and chairs for students.

"We had no vessel, no seawater system, and we had a partially finished building," Nybakken said. "The salvation was we had a pretty good library."

The MLML only had \$40,000 to kick off the institute, a pittance compared with today's budgets.

During the 1970's the marine labs began offering the masters degree program and obtained the Point Sur, the 85-foot-long ocean research vessel with a 4,000-mile range.

"That put us in league with the big guys," Nybakken said. To hear much more about the Moss Landing Marine Laboratories, attend this weekend's open house at the labs, located at 8272 Moss Landing Road, Moss Landing. Along with children's activities, there will be food and refreshments.

a state audit of the financial study to try to prove their point, however.

All dressed up and nobody to debate

In recent years, Bob Sinotte has been the leading voice for the anti-incorporation viewpoint. But this Saturday, he will be attending his 40th high school reunion.

"There's no debate Saturday," Sinotte said, "But I think [Robinson] is trying to create one."

Robinson, in response, accused his opponents of ducking the debate.

"It is most interesting why the opposition continues to refuse to debate," Robinson complained. "This has been going on for three years. It's an insult to our community. It's not about me or Bob. It's about the fact that the community

should have a whole series of debates so when people go to the polls, they can make an informed decision."

Regardless of whether an opponent of incorporation participates in a formal debate Saturday, something is scheduled to happen.

"At this point, it doesn't look like it will be a debate," said Sandra Schachter, a Carmel Valley resident and a coordinator of the event, which is the latest installment in the library's monthly lecture series. "We've been trying to find someone [who will represent incorporation opponents]. But there will be a presentation and a discussion. We already have about 50 people signed up."

Incorporation showdown

The Local Agency Formation Commission will host a special public hearing Oct. 18. The hearing will offer commissioners an opportunity to approve or deny the incorporation proposal. If they approve the proposal, they will set a date for a public election, likely in June 2007, although legal challenges from opponents could lead to further delays.

And for a lifesaving bargain, the chapter will offer a three-day Community First Aid and Safety class Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, Sept. 18-20, for \$55 total. The course will include CPR for adults, infants and children. Students will also learn how to identify and care for life-threatening bleeding, sudden illness and injuries. Upon successful completion, participants will receive certificates for adult CPR (valid one year), infant/child CPR (valid one year) and first aid (valid three years). Anyone who does not want to attend all three nights may pay \$40 per class.

The popular pet first aid class — "great for all pet owners, pet sitters, dog walkers or anyone who loves dogs and cats," according to the Red Cross — is scheduled for Wednesday, Sept. 27, from 6 to 9:30 p.m. Instructors will focus on immediate and temporary first aid for wounds, burns, fractures, shock and sudden illness. Participants will be asked to bring photos of their pets, and each student will receive a reference book summarizing the course contents. The cost for the class is \$40.

Finally, the chapter will offer its standard first aid class, which includes adult CPR and first aid with AED, Saturday, Sept. 30, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., for \$45.

All courses will be held at the chapter house at Dolores and Eighth, and all require preregistration by calling (831) 624-6921.



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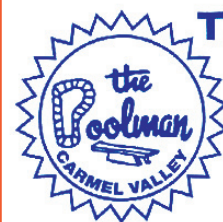
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Pacific Grove's 37th annual Historic Home Tour set for Oct. 1

PACIFIC GROVE will host its 37th annual Historic Home Tour Oct. 1, and this year the event features a 114-

year-old cottage maintained to look exactly as it did in 1892. About a dozen other Victorian houses and buildings in Pacific Grove will be open for tours between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Docents at each site will conduct tours and provide the histories of the structures.

Most of the buildings are still private homes, open only by invitation or during the annual Historic Home Tour organized by The Heritage Society of Pacific Grove, the Pacific Grove Arts Center and the Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce.

The city has about 1,300 houses and buildings listed as historic. They range from the simple board-and-batten construction typical of early Pacific Grove, to the beginnings of the Craftsman style.

Some of the larger Victorians have been converted to bed-and-breakfast inns, while some of the cottages are now restaurants.

The 114-year-old cottage on this year's tour looks the same from the street as it did when it was constructed. But the inside has been redone, which doubled the original floor space of 550 square feet to 1,200 square feet.

Several of the houses on this year's tour show different renovations that have allowed them to retain their looks outside while being converted inside to comfortable homes with modern conveniences.

The 1982 cottage, like hundreds of others in Pacific Grove, was built on a tent site used for housing in the original Methodist retreat. It retained the tent shape — a simple rectangle with a steep roof to let the rain run off.

Other houses on this year's tour include some turn-of-the-century Victorians redone inside to provide more living space and more openness than the original rooms did.

In addition to the houses, other historic structures in the city will be open as part of the annual tour, including the 1855 Point Pinos lighthouse, the oldest continually operating lighthouse on the West Coast; the 1887 St. Mary's-By-The-Sea Episcopal Church, an English Gothic structure made from redwood, natural pine, cedar and walnut; the 1891 Ketchums Barn behind P.G. City Hall, where the Heritage

Society will be celebrating its 25th anniversary; and the Phoebe A. Hearst Social Hall at the Asilomar Conference Center, which will be open from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The 1881 Chautauqua Hall, the original community center in Pacific Grove, will also be open during the Historic Home Tour, but tickets aren't required for admission. The hall will be filled with local artists offering home decorations, ceramics, fabrics, paintings and jewelry for sale. There will also be an auction of birdhouses fashioned after Pacific Grove's heritage houses, an annual fundraising event for the Heritage Society. Bidding will close at 2:45 p.m.

Tickets are \$20 each and are available from the Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce at 548 Central Ave. (Central and Forest avenues). 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Dunes restoration project will be valuable to P.G. ecologist says

FOR PAUL Kephart, the ecologist in charge of restoring Pacific Grove's sensitive beach dunes, replanting endangered species that have for years been overrun by invasive iceplant means more than rescuing native plants.

"From a philosophical standpoint," said Kephart, executive director of Rana Creek, the Carmel Valley environmental planning company hired by P.G. to restore the dunes, "it demonstrates we have reverence for the area, and that we respect creatures, plants and animals and their interrelationships. I can't think of a better reason why we should be doing this."

The restoration involves widespread spraying of herbicide to kill the Hottentot fig iceplant the government planted decades ago, when fighting erosion was considered the top priority on the constantly shifting Asilomar sand dunes.

"The iceplant does extremely well along the ocean," said P.G. golf course director Mike Leach. "It has taken off."

Now, the city will protect, propagate and monitor native plants, including the federally protected Menzies' wallflower and Tidestrom's lupine, in the dunes and along the back nine of the Pacific Grove Municipal

Golf Links. The 10-year project, which began last year, will cost the city at least \$850,000.

Despite the fact it occupies at least 10 acres of habitat for endangered species, the golf course will be allowed to stay.

"Essentially, the restoration is mitigation to offset potential impacts to federally listed rare and endangered plants" from the golf course and other development, Kephart said.

The handing over of the Point Pinos lighthouse to the city from the U.S. Coast Guard on Aug. 24 allowed the dunes project to go ahead, Kephart said. But the handover ceremony hardly recognized the fact.

"I have to say I was disappointed that the public agencies and the [Coast Guard] admiral and Congressman Farr forgot or neglected to talk about the importance of this habitat and the importance of this transfer," Kephart said.

The restoration plan, which encompasses about 13 acres, is required by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the federal agency that regulates protection of plant species, though the U.S. government never undertook its own restoration plan while it owned the property.

Kephart said his work goes beyond removing non-native plants and replacing them with native species.

"This goes beyond looking at plants,"

Kephart said. "It looks at a community of organisms that are working well together and are trying to survive everything we have done in the past to eliminate the habitat. We can still have our land and land use but still protect the environment."

It's hoped the restoration efforts will preserve the gene pool of the endangered plants, which have declined because of projects such as the Asilomar conference grounds, numerous homes and the golf course.

Grazing deer also pose a threat to the habitat, which is home to the black legless lizard.

"We will begin replanting some of the dune areas this fall and winter," said Patrick Regan, biological consultant for Rana Creek who has worked on the project for six years. "The decomposing iceplant will act as a bit of a blanket and slow-release fertilizer," helping protect some of the rare lupines and wallflowers.

The city has begun spraying iceplant with Roundup, which city manager Jim Colangelo said is a less environmentally damaging way to kill the iceplant than pulling it from the ground. Another threat to the native plant population, riggut brome grass, must be pulled.

The restoration project also includes building an interpretive garden on the grounds of the Point Pinos lighthouse.

"What they are hoping to do is have boardwalks so you can actually walk around the perimeter of the lighthouse," Leach said. "There will be plants with signage identifying them so people

know what they are looking at."

A similar project, at the south end of Asilomar State Beach, was undertaken in the early 1990s.

There will be roped areas off-limits to pedestrians and golfers in certain parts of the dunes, Kephart said. Native plants favored by deer will be protected with screens. "These are areas where there are seedlings and test plots in regards to reestablishing Menzies' wallflower," Kephart said. "There are certain areas we want to protect."

The plan calls for an educational campaign to inform people about the habitat and let people know the status of the restoration project, which includes some changes to the golf course itself. A pamphlet with information about the habitat will likely be available.

The city will seek additional funding for the restoration project in the form of tax grants.

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Great white shark at Monterey Bay Aquarium not eating

THE GREAT white shark that arrived at the Monterey Bay Aquarium last week has not eaten, which could force its release soon if the animal's health deteriorates, according to aquarium officials.

The 5-foot-8-inch, 104-pound shark was put on display at the aquarium Aug. 31 and has been a massive hit. But its failure to eat is cause for concern.

"If you want to see a white shark, you should see it sooner rather than later," Ken Peterson, the aquarium's senior public relations manager, said Thursday afternoon. "If our biologists are concerned its health isn't what it's supposed to be, they will release it back to the wild well before it becomes a problem."

Despite not having eaten, the shark is swimming strongly and has "shown interest" in food, Peterson said. Veterinarians

and biologists are monitoring it closely.

The shark is being tempted with mackerel, bonito and salmon but so far isn't biting.

Peterson said the white shark ate about 5 percent of its body weight in food the day before it was brought to the aquarium, which could explain why its energy level is still strong despite not having eaten.

This is the second white shark on display at the aquarium. The first white shark, which was 5 feet long and weighed 62 pounds, was at the aquarium for 198 days and was released March 2005. That animal's stint at the aquarium marked the longest period a white shark has been in captivity. The shark was released because it was becoming too large for the tank and was preying on other fish on display.

"The first [white shark] we had fed within 24 hours," Peterson said. "What we do know is that this one is larger and has more energy reserves to work with."

Peterson said veterinarians haven't put a timeline on when the shark should eat, but rather will determine whether to release the animal based on appearance and condition.

If the white shark needs to be released, it's possible it could be placed into Monterey Bay, Peterson said.

So where is the gallery? If you are standing on Dolores and looking up at the Carmel Art Association, you are very close. Simply walk north on Dolores until you reach an alley on your left. Turn into the alley, walk a few paces, and you'll see the Galerie Plein Aire on your left.

Off the beaten track

Bradford knows a little something about being off the beaten track. Her father, artist Howard Bradford, moved to Partington Ridge in Big Sur during the late 1950s when she was just six.

"Big Sur was more isolated than it is now," recalled Bradford. "It was a rather exciting time."

Partington Ridge was the epicenter of an artistic sub-culture that gained so much media attention Harpers Magazine dubbed it "Big Sur's Cult of Sex and Anarchy." While it was, in truth, a far tamer place than media reports indicated, it was a wonderful place for a young artist to be.

"Our neighbors were Henry Miller, [artist] Harry Dick Ross and [poet] Eric Barker," she said. "With all those influences and no television, it was only natural I became an artist."

Informal beginnings

At the time Bradford opened her gallery, she was

ed in Hollywood in 1934. For those unfamiliar with "Midsummer Night's Dream," Oberon is the King of the Faeries, while Puck is a "a shrewd and knavish sprite" who serves Oberon.

"Puck and Oberon magically appear on the set and hilarity ensues," explained Dawn Flood, publicist for Western Stage, a local non-profit theater group based out of Hartnell College in Salinas. "It's a wonderful little play."

According to Flood, Sunset Center typically presents one Western Stage production each year.

Football season is here, so why not take a trip to another food planet?

ARE YOU ready for football season to start? I am! The only thing that compares with Americans' obsession with sports is their passion for eating.

Whether you're hosting a pigskin party, taking in touchdowns at a bar or tailgating with your buddies (my mantra, is "Have parking lot; will cook"), football just isn't football without a winning lineup of food.

If you find yourself playing kitchen quarterback, there are two simple rules of thumb for food at a football gathering: There should be lots of it, and it has to be good. It doesn't have to be gourmet, although I've witnessed multi-course spreads served up in stadium parking lots that would put any catering company to shame.

Chicken wings are a standard must-have — and the spicier, the better. Also on the roster of tried-and-true football

favorites are burgers, brats, chips, dips, nachos and raw vegetables (crunching, I find, helps work out aggression). Hands down, the most impressive display of football fare I've experienced on the Peninsula was the nacho fountain Knuckles Historical Sports Bar unveiled during the 2006 Superbowl. The tri-tiered tower of flowing orange ooze left this Cheez-Whiz-lovin' Philly gal speechless, and this is coming from a woman who counts deep-frying turkey among her tailgating tricks. I only wish Knuckles would break it out for every Sunday game, instead of saving it only for special occasions — it's that incredible.

In the spirit of kicking off the season right, I turned to fellow football fans Stacy Hendricks, owner of Amplify Consulting in Carmel Valley, and her mother, Sherry Hendricks Martin, a medical social worker from Oklahoma City, Okla., for a few tips on what makes a standard hot-dog-and-beer party so special.

"We live in Football Country. We are die-hard University of Oklahoma fans (go Sooners!), so every Saturday during football season revolves around The Game," says Sherry. When it comes to the sport of football, both Hendrickses agree, "It's not just a game, it's not just food — it's the way those things remind us of family and the special memories we've shared throughout the years on game day. It's something we really cherish."

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Carmel gallery presents hot wax show

Is it a painting or is it a sculpture? Welcome to the mysterious world of encaustic art.

The Lauryn Taylor Gallery in Carmel offers a new exhibit, "Hot Wax," which celebrates the joys of "painting" with beeswax. The venue hosts an opening reception Saturday, Sept. 9, at 6 p.m. The show will continue through Nov. 19.

"I love Dale Lefler first as a human being and second as an artist," explained

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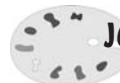


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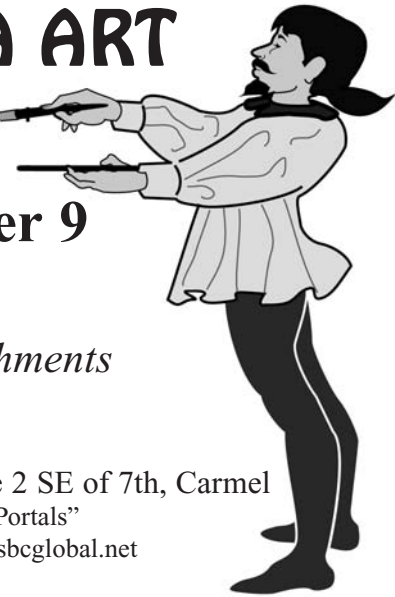

In 1999, assisted by Hicks, he wrote "Rush for Riches: Gold Fever and the Making of California," co-published by the Oakland Museum and the University of California Press in Berkeley.

His writing earned honors from the Library of Congress, the Commonwealth Club of California (silver medal), the Book Club of California and Western Writers of America, Inc. Known as a strong speaker, Mr. Holliday lectured throughout the state and nation.

In Carmel, Hicks and Mr. Holliday served on the board of trustees at Tor House. Hicks described his friend as a "big, vigorous person, but endlessly curious and a great listener," and said they agreed on the local and

national significance of Robinson Jeffers and his historic home on the point.

"He was a big, oversized slice of life and more than some people could take at times, but he was a good spirit," Hicks said. "The little town will be different without him."

Attorney and CRA cofounder Skip Lloyd first met Mr. Holliday in San Francisco, and the two became reacquainted years later when Mr. Holliday moved to Carmel. Lloyd also lauded his friend's public speaking skills and said, "He brought tremendous enthusiasm, energy, generosity, leadership and a wonderful spirit" to the residents group.

"He was a really accomplished person, but he never wore it on his sleeve," Lloyd said. "He was always friendly, helpful and generous to everybody."

Historian and longtime San Francisco Chronicle journalist Carl Nolte, who wrote Mr. Holliday's obituary for his newspaper,

read Mr. Holliday's books "with much admiration" and described the author as "a charmer."

"He was very, very impressive as an historian," Nolte said, "and also very kind with his praise, which is rare among authors."

Heading west

Born Jaquelin Smith Holliday II, on June 10, 1924, to steel magnate William J. Holliday and Martha Henley Holliday in Indianapolis, Ind., Mr. Holliday was most commonly known as J.S. — Jim to his friends.

He graduated from the Hill School in Pottstown, Penn., attended midshipman school at Northwestern University and served on the USS Santee in the Pacific during World War II. Mr. Holliday graduated from Yale University with a degree in history in 1948.

Drawn west, he undertook graduate studies in history at UC Berkeley in 1952 and received his Ph.D. in 1959, following a year as a research fellow at the Henry Huntington Library in San Marino. He also worked as an associate professor at San Francisco State University and a lecturer at other institutions.

He was editor of "American West" magazine and served as executive director of the Oakland Museum of California. From 1970-1977 and 1983-1985, he was director of the California Historical Society.

Socially, Mr. Holliday belonged to the Bohemian and Roxburge clubs in San Francisco, and the Zamorano Club in Los Angeles.

His first marriage, to Nancy Adams, ended in divorce in 1974, and he married Carmel resident Belinda Vidor Jones in 1983. She and three children from his first marriage — Timothy Holliday of New Orleans, La., Martha Brett Holliday of Farmington, Conn., and William J. Holliday of Menlo Park — survive him.

Activities such as drama, music, wood shop, and habitat and outdoor studies help students enjoy school.

"If kids are excited about their elective classes or look forward to going to music every day, they are going to have a more positive outlook toward school in general, and that absolutely spills over into their academic efforts," he said.

Gross also praised his teachers for covering their subjects in a manner that helps students learn well and test well. "They have to make sure they are preparing the kids to do the critical thinking the test requires," he said.

Serious about learning

Language arts figure prominently on the state's standardized tests, and department chair Liz Rathman, who oversees programs for seventh and eighth grades, said the district's support allowed teachers to collaborate and plan effectively.

"We've been able to map out where we're

headed and the goals we want to see students achieve. We've been able to stay on task and on target," she said. "The administration really wants the teachers to be able to do whatever it takes to get the material across to the students."

Getting new textbooks and designing curricula to follow state standards helped, and Rathman believes students want to do well because they recognize the tests' importance.

"The students know this is our report card, and when they care about their teachers and what they're learning, they do better," she said. "That's what it comes down to — the dedication of the students."

Madeline Franco, kindergarten teacher and principal at Captain Cooper, said her school's success largely hinges on teachers' abilities to effectively instruct English-language learners. Sixty-five percent of the school's 60 students are Latino.

"The first thing we're working on is just to get English under their belts," she said, "and the district has supported us with qualified people to be able to teach the kids. That's been the biggest part."

Annual tests assessing students' language acquisition showed improvement, suggesting academic success wasn't far behind, accord-

ing to Franco.

Cooper's six teachers also meet weekly to collaborate and fine-tune their lessons.

"It's a lot of hard work, good teaching here at the school and kids who take learning

seriously," she said.

"I just can't reinforce enough the commitment that we have down here from our parents and our staff for the education of the kids."

that stretches across the reservoir's entire floor, Verbanec said.

A discarded cigar was blamed for the fire, which burned less than a quarter acre.

The \$12.5 million reservoir, part of Phase 2 of the Wastewater Reclamation Project, allows reclaimed water to be stored during the winter months when the demand is lowest, so it can be used for the golf courses and athletic fields in summer, when demand for water is at its peak.

Feeding water from the reservoir to Pebble Beach's seven golf courses will help eliminate about 300 acre-feet of

drinking water currently provided by California American Water Company for use on golf courses and other open spaces in Del Monte Forest. Throughout the Monterey Peninsula, use of potable water on golf courses has dropped from 1,271 acre-feet a year in 1988 to less than 368 acre-feet in 2005, according to the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District.

The recycled water is transported via pipeline from the Carmel Area Wastewater District plant on the south bank of the Carmel River to the reservoir, and from there is distributed to golf courses and fields.

The reservoir, a project of the district and the CAWD, is located northeast of Lopez Road, west of Congress Road, and south of Bird Rock and Colton Roads.

Dedication ceremony
Sept. 15 at 11 a.m. the PBCSD will have a dedication ceremony to mark the completion of the Forest Lake Reservoir. The public is invited to attend. If it's not fighting a fire

somewhere, a CDF helicopter will be on hand to demonstrate the process of sucking water from the reservoir to help extinguish wildfires. Many of the district's past directors are expected to be present.

with about 60 other K9 handlers and their dogs in La Honda, doing mock drug searches, protection and "long stays" requiring muzzled dogs to hold their position for five minutes with their handlers out of sight. It's something she would like to do again.

Money and drugs for treats

The 3-year-old shepherd certainly keeps busy, responding to as many as 150 police calls per year for narcotics searches, help with alarm activations and open doors at businesses and homes, and pursuits of fleeing, hiding or uncooperative suspects. In short, "any situation that might be dangerous for us or the public," Meroney said. "People usually comply pretty quickly when the dog comes out."

In April, they spent hours searching yards near Carmel Mission for a suspect who allegedly attempted to burglarize homes and tied up a woman inside her house.

Last Thursday night, Karo searched a vehicle at a Presidio of Monterey DUI checkpoint and discovered more than a pound of marijuana.

For the sheriff's office, he once located \$15,000 in cash, 2 ounces of cocaine and an ounce of methamphetamine in a suspect's residence.

"We're always on call," Meroney said — even on days off and in the middle of the night — one of the few drawbacks of being Karo's handler. "You have to love dogs to do it."

Still, "I just think it's the best position, but almost every K9 handler you would talk to would say that," she said.

Meroney enjoys Karo's company on patrol but also admires his abilities. "His drug stuff always impresses me,"

she said. In November 2005, Karo became a certified narcotics search dog capable of sniffing out six different illegal drugs.

Of course, Karo lives with Meroney and her three other dogs: a pug, a bulldog and a Rottweiler.

"We get home, and he thinks he's a lap dog," she said, even though he weighs more than 75 pounds. "He's just so happy, and he hates to be in trouble. He's a big love."

Unless he's contending with a criminal.

CPD sees the value

Carmel Police Sgt. John Nyunt said he wishes Carmel P.D. had its own K9, but in the meantime, he's grateful for Meroney and Karo.

"It gives us the ability to do things such as locate suspects because of the dog's ability to sense all kinds of things human beings can't," he said. "And not only looking for suspects. For us, the big deal is looking for walkaways — elderly people who walk away from their homes. We have utilized K9s for that specific purpose."

Also, in May 2003, a dog was deployed to get a car-chase suspect out of his vehicle after he crashed on Ocean Avenue.

And they're good PR. "People love dogs, especially in this community, and it gives us an opportunity to interact with the community in a really positive way," Nyunt said.

Meroney said she and Karo have been doing more demonstrations, including visiting Peninsula schools. They sometimes do exhibitions for particularly dedicated supporters.

Meroney hopes donations will help grow SPD's K9 program so a dog can be on duty every

day of the week, and she said funds are vital for keeping Karo's skills honed and equipment up to date.

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Editorial

Simple facts clearly explained

AMONG LOCAL hot button issues, low-income housing and the water shortage are neck and neck for Most Misunderstood — by officials, by the media and by the public. Again this week, we will do our best to eliminate some of the popular misconceptions:

Q: Why isn't there enough affordable housing being built in Monterey County?

A: Because the government won't allow it.

That's all you need to know. Whether the public supports the choking off of new housing isn't clear. But what is clear is that, through a cleverly constructed and ever-increasing array of zoning rules, impact fees, open space requirements and environmental mitigations, the hydra we call government has made it impossible for anything to be built at a reasonable cost. The result is that, with hordes of people wanting to call Monterey County home, the small amount of new housing allowed to be built is too expensive for most people to afford.

The solution is simple: Take a 50-acre piece of ground somewhere in Monterey County. Zone it for densely packed condos and apartments in multi-story buildings. Make water available and use tax dollars to provide roads and sewers. Invite developers to make bids to buy the land. And then let them build 2,500 units on it.

Two years later, repeat the process. And every two years thereafter. Then there will be plenty of affordable places for everyone, from farmworkers to semiprofessionals, to live.

Of course, there would be major consequences for the quality of life in the county (traffic, crime, crowded schools, etc.). So whether this course of action should be undertaken is something for the democratic process to decide. But there's no sense pretending some uncontrollable forces are at work. If the people of Monterey County want affordable housing to be built, they can have it. All they have to do is tell the government to get out of the way.

Q: If there's a water shortage on the Monterey Peninsula, why do we have all this development?

A: The water shortage only applies to Cal Am's customers.

Back in 1995, the California State Water Resources Control Board decided Cal Am was pumping water from the Carmel River it didn't have the rights to, and the state board ordered the water company to stop. The result was a water moratorium for Cal Am's customers. They can't build on empty lots, add bathrooms or turn retail stores into restaurants.

But Order 95-10 placed no restrictions on other landowners making reasonable use of water they owned. In fact, for property owners in Carmel Valley, 95-10 had the effect of shoring up their water rights by making sure Cal Am wasn't pumping out from under them.

Thus, Tehama, September Ranch, Rancho San Carlos, Rancho Cañada, Pebble Beach and numerous other sizable projects were unaffected by 95-10. They have their own water, and so do lots of other small landowners with their own wells.

So if Grandma left you a vacant lot and Cal Am is your only possible water source, you're out of luck until a desal plant gets built. But maybe you haven't looked under your own feet?

Rushing like molasses

Dear Editor,

Recently, in its coverage of the county planning commission's approval of September Ranch, the Monterey County Herald reported that two commissioners and several long-time opponents accused the county of "rushing" review and consideration of the project.

Permit me to recount the major steps the county has taken.

In response to the 2001 court order to re-analyze a handful of issues relating to water, in 2002 the county contracted with Michael Brandman & Associates to prepare a revised EIR analyzing all aspects of the proposed project.

In December 2004 the county issued the draft REIR, containing a complete reanalysis of the water situation and all other aspects of the project.

After considering issues raised at the March 21, 2005, meeting of the Carmel Valley Land Use Advisory Committee and

written comments, including 30-plus pages from opposing attorney Michael Stamp, the county issued a recirculated DREIR in February 2006.

The county then received more comments, with another 30-plus pages from Stamp, and held an informal workshop on April 12, 2006, to familiarize planning commissioners with the project, eliciting questions and feedback.

The county then issued extensive responses to all comments.

The county's subdivision committee considered September Ranch on June 8 and recommended approval of a reduced project.

Only after this exhaustive and rigorous review of all relevant data and reams of public comment and response, did the county issue the final REIR on July 20.

The commission held its first formal hearing July 26, during which planning staff and consultants presented findings and recommendations.

The public spoke and commissioners asked questions. After hours of discussion, the commission continued the hearing for further review of the final REIR and staff response to questions raised during the hearing.

The hearing resumed August 9 and, after lengthy public comment and discussion, was continued yet again until August 16. After more hours of discussion, the commission voted to recommend approval of a reduced project.

Now, the definition of "rush" is to move forward, progress, or act with haste or eagerness or without preparation.

The county did anything but.

The PBCSD will spend an estimated \$75 per hour for the supplemental CHP service. It has recommended the contract cover the remainder of the fiscal year for an amount not to exceed \$135,000, Anthony said.

Rick Verbanec, president of the DMFPO, said to determine exactly where the speeding is occurring most in Pebble Beach, newly purchased radar units will be fixed in 12 locations. The units will be mounted on poles in various areas.

"The mobile radar units will show how many people pass and their speed," Verbanec said.

The radar units do not have cameras affixed so they will not identify individual drivers, he said.

"A lot of people complain about speed and one of the questions is, are they really speeding, or does it seem like they are speeding because the roads are so small?" Verbanec said. "The point we are trying to get across is it doesn't matter. If the police think you are going too fast, they are going to write you a ticket, period."

The radar data will be passed on to the CHP, which will concentrate on patrolling the identified problem areas.

The CHP will not hire another officer but will allow officers to work overtime in Pebble Beach, Anthony said.

The DMFPO recently drafted a letter for residents, which Verbanec said sums up the danger of speeding in Pebble Beach.

"Most of the roads within the Forest are residential, designed decades ago when normal speeds and car-handling characteristics were very different," a portion of the memo reads.

"Sam Morse, visionary though he was in development of the Forest, could not possibly have imagined the current volume and pace of traffic. What he left us is a set of country lanes meant to be traveled leisurely."

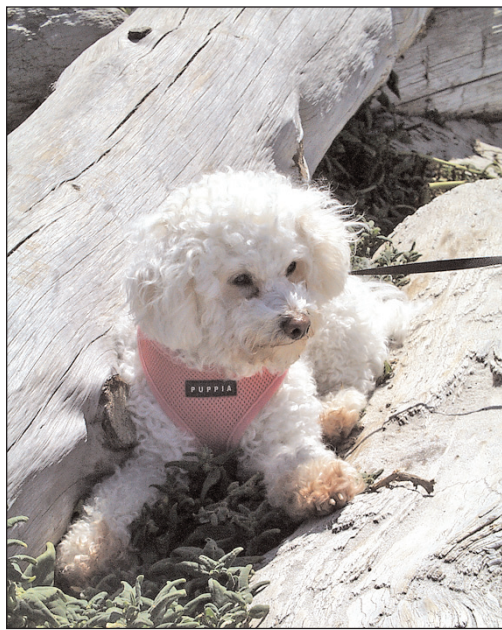
