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# AUTHOR: EASTWOOD'S IWO JIMA MOVIE IS A 'MASTERPIECE'

■ 'Flags of Our Fathers' to open even as work continues on second film

It's NOT unusual for an someone who writes a best-selling book to end up disavowing the movie made from it.

But that's certainly not the case with Clint Eastwood's new film, "Flags of Our Fathers," which will have its Hollywood premiere Oct. 9 and open on 1,800 screens nationwide 11 days later. Eastwood directed the movie for Warner Bros. and DreamWorks SKG.

"The film is a masterpiece, and Mr. Eastwood has gone beyond my book to capture the essence of a very important historical event," said James Bradley, who attended a special screening at Warner Bros. Studios in Burbank last week and visited shooting locations in Iceland and Chicago last fall. "It's a masterful job of direction, how he put the movie together. I expected perfection and that's what I got."

Bradley's 2000 book, "Flags of Our Fathers," tells the story of the iconic flag raising on Iwo Jima at the height of World War II's bloodiest battle.

Bradley's father, Navy corpsman John Bradley, was one of the young soldiers who helped raise the Stars and Stripes on Mt. Suribachi in February 1945.

"It was the bravest and most decorated month in the history of the United States, with more Medals of Honor and Navy Crosses awarded than anywhere else," Bradley observed. There were 5,391 American soldiers killed on Iwo Jima, along with more than 22,000 Japanese.

But Bradley's book is not just a combat story. It's a highly personal tale of six young men snatched from their ordinary lives, thrown into a maelstrom of combat and then, because of a single photograph, catapulted to national superstardom they didn't feel they deserved more than any of the other soldiers who fought Imperial Japan. It's also a story of the price paid for their courage by the families they

left behind.

"On behalf of myself and the families of the other flag raisers, I want to say that we're so proud that these heroes have been brought to life," Bradley said. "It was very emotional for me to write the book, so of course I had tears streaming down my face when I watched the film."

#### High anticipation

At 76, Eastwood's has seen his tenure as Carmel's mayor in the 1980s start to fade from memory — even for tourists. A new book about the history of Carmel, part of the "Images of America" series, mentions him on only one page. These days, he is best known locally as co-owner of the Pebble Beach Company and for his support, along with his wife, Dina, of numerous local charities. (This week, they'll receive the Distinguished Trustee Award from the Community Foundation for Monterey County.)

In Hollywood, however, Eastwood is at the peak of his

career — not as the action-movie star of the gritty Westerns and Dirty Harry films of decades gone by, but as a director. Three years ago, his "Mystic River" picked up seven Oscar nominations. In 2005, he won Best Director and Best Picture for "Million Dollar Baby."

But Eastwood doesn't brag. While he was shooting the boxing picture, which starred Morgan Freeman and Hilary Swank, he referred to it as a "modest little film."

This week, with his work on the movie finished, he was equally understated about "Flags of Our Fathers."

"It looks pretty good," he told The Pine Cone. And how did co-producer Steven Spielberg react when he saw the finished product?

"I think he liked it," Eastwood said.

A New York Times reporter wasn't as restrained.

"On credentials alone, a presumptive front runner [for next year's Oscars] has to be Clint Eastwood's 'Flags of Our Fathers'," wrote David Halbfinger last week. He noted that, besides Eastwood's and Spielberg's Hollywood successes, the screenplay for "Flags" is by Paul Haggis, who wrote the screenplay for "Million Dollar

## Steelhead trout: Endangered fish or tasty filet?

STEELHEAD TROUT in Monterey County are designated a "threatened species" by the federal government, placing severe restrictions on local water users, making it impos-

sible to build a new dam and costing ratepayers millions of dollars — perhaps hundreds of millions — to limit pumping from the Carmel River. It's also a federal offense to kill one.

Yet in Seattle, Wash., vendors at the Pike Place Market hawk steelhead for \$5.99 a pound.

How is it that a particular fish can be endangered and staunchly protected in one part of the country, and a tasty fish fillet somewhere else in the same time zone? Perhaps a better question is: Are steelhead trout truly in danger of extinction?

The answer is no. Wildlife officials admit the

Carmel River steelhead isn't a "threatened species." It's a threatened local population of a fish that exists in hundreds of rivers and streams along nearly the entire coast of North America

In other words, the fish you're not allowed to kill in the Carmel River are the same ones for sale in Seattle fish markets

"They're the same species, but for management purposes, we divide them into distinct populations," explained Dick

# Oldest restaurant to close Saturday

Most of the people who eat in Fred and Cecilia Fozounmayeh's Pernille Restaurant at San Carlos and Sixth don't even read the menu before placing their orders.

And in the 43 years they've owned the restaurant, the couple have seen people who first dined there as children grow up to become parents and grandparents.

But the restaurant fans describe as a Carmel institution will close its doors Sept. 30.

The Fozounmayehs' lease expired in January, but they continued renting the property. While dealing with a \$1,000 increase for a monthly rent of about \$8,000, Fozounmayeh said he learned the building is slated for development and will soon no longer accommodate a restaurant.

The landlord, Leidig-Draper Properties, about which Fozounmayeh has no complaints, offered to let him stay on until the building is under construction. But considering it wouldn't be for long, and with the higher rent, "We thought, 'OK this is the time to go'," he said.

His first concern was his 14 employees, but with his connections in the community, he obtained new restaurant jobs for almost all of them.

"But my chef after 43 years — I think he's going to retire,"

THE CITY'S consultant said the one-story, flat-roofed house built in 1940 should be protected as an historic resource because it "utilizes modern materials and prefabrication building techniques" and was designed by an architect, Jon Konigshofer, well known for his economical construction methods.

A consultant hired by property owners James and Kathleen Smart tried to persuade the historic resources board



otherwise during a Sept. 18 hearing.

Meta Bunse agreed Konigshofer was known for economical designs and affordable housing, and "was noted for some more adventurous designs in the area," she said. But the Smarts' house "was not one of them."

Historic preservation list loses four more houses, keeps one

The city's consultant, Rick Janick, linked Konigshofer with more than 150 buildings on the Monterey Peninsula, including at least 50 Pebble Beach homes. In Carmel, five of his designs, including some in the Sand and Sea complex on San Antonio Avenue, are on the historic list.

HRB member Erik Dyar argued the house should be saved. "Modernism and the Bay Area Tradition are certainly historically significant and are recognized by the state, and the nation and the world, basically," he said.

But board member Erling Lagerholm said the house struck him as "ordinary," and not particularly significant.

Chair Julie Wendt described Konigshofer as a handsome man with a pencil-thin mustache who liked to spend time at the Lodge at Pebble Beach and did some work for Bing Crosby. She suggested a third historian study the designer's importance to break the tie.

But, while the board could order another study, senior planner Sean Conroy said its job is to "make a determination based on the information we have." On a 4-1 vote, the HRB decided to keep the Smarts' house, located on Seventh Avenue between Forest and the city limit, on the historic list.

#### Not the neighbors

The HRB voted to remove an 80-plus-year-old Casanova

Street house from the historic inventory after learning consultant Kent Seavey apparently based his report on the neighbor's property file.

"I hope you can grant my appeal, because he used the wrong source of information," said Lada Kratky, adding that her home was condemned by the county health department three months after she bought it. "If he were to write it again, it would be totally different."

Seavey apparently confused Kratky's home with the one next door when he referred to a building permit from 1940, an owner named Ester Jones and builder Harvey Braunton. He wrote, "The house affords an opportunity for research into the possible changing social nature of residential design in Carmel between the roaring '20s and World War II."

Although the original building permit was lost, Kratky said city maps indicate her house was built sometime around 1924, well before Seavey's date.

"The primary basis for designation ... was that the residence was a [1940s] example of residential design in the city," Conroy said in his staff report. "This is inaccurate."

With the city council deciding last week to grant two appeals because of faulty reports, board member Paul Coss said Kratky's should also be granted because Seavey's "damaged" study "seems to be a mess."

#### Three more can go

In consecutive unanimous votes, the board also decided to remove from the historic list three properties preservation consultants had identified as a "good representative example

of the pronounced taste for individualism and creativity," an "unaltered example of the post-World War II design work" of architect Edwin Snyder, and "an example of Modern design and craftsmanship."

Rod and Sibyl Johnson's Guadalupe Street house is not a good example of vernacular architecture because it does not represent a particular style, according to Conroy. Regarding its "individualism," the city's more famous houses, such as Hugh Comstock's fairy-tale designs, the Bark House and

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## NASA astronaut, lots of jets, vintage aircraft promise thrills

AGILE JETS flown through complex maneuvers in tight formation. Daredevil pilots seeming to defy the laws of physics in their custom-built aircraft. A NASA astronaut with more than 14 million space miles and three Shuttle missions under his belt. A jet-powered car that reaches 400 mph in eight seconds. These acts, as well as other sky-high entertainers and numerous displays on the ground, should please the crowds at the 26th annual California International

"Our mission is to put on the very, very best airshow we can, all by volunteers, and then give all the proceeds to charity," said executive director Harry Wardwell, who works for Rabobank in Salinas when he's not talking about a production nationally recognized as "one of the best organized community-based airshows, and one of the largest charitable airshows, in the country." (Each year, about 450 civilian and military airshows are held in the United States.)

The airshow has given more than \$6.3 million to charities during the past quarter century, according to Wardwell, and about 700 volunteers ensure the event goes off right.

"The airshow is a fun event. When those military jets come into town, it's pretty exciting, and people get to meet some of the best pilots," Wardwell said. "Aviation is fascinating to lots of people."

While it lacks the big-name Blue Angels or Thunderbirds, this weekend will feature an awesome lineup. Aerobatic pilot and Salinas native Sean D. Tucker will show off his skills in his Oracle Challenger, as will Mike Goulian in his brand new, custom-built Extra EA-330SHP. Comedian Kent Pietsch and his 1942 Interstate Cadet are nationally known for crazy stunts, such as landing on top of RVs.

Those needing their military flight fix will get it with the U.S. Marines Harrier Jump Jet, the USAF's F-15 Eagle and F-16 Viper, and the Navy's F/A-18 Super Hornet.

New this year, the Patriots Aerobatic Jet Team — which comprises a former Russian MiG pilot, a pair of USAF

Thunderbirds and an Alaskan bush pilot — will demonstrate the maneuverability of their single-engine L-39s, the agile Czechoslovakian-built aircraft used abroad for training air forces.

And the Texan West aerial demonstration team, which represents the USAF Air Education and Training Command and pilots T-6A Texans, will dispand after its farewll performance this weekend.

On the ground, the USAF Smoke-N-Thunder Jet Car should wow audiences as well as earn publicity for a cardwriting campaign to benefit hospitalized soldiers.

Among the aircraft displayed on the tarmac, and vendors selling all sorts of treats and memorabilia, will be the NASA/Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital exhibit featuring Space Shuttle astronaut Steve Robinson, who performed three spacewalks, including an unprecedented emergency repair of the Shuttle's heat shield during last year's mission. He will chat with airshow guests all weekend.

Gates at the Salinas airport will open at 9 a.m. Saturday and Sunday, with flying commencing at 11 a.m. General admission will run \$17 for adults, \$13 for children and free for kids under 6. Grandstand seats available for additional fees. Fans might also check participating Shell stations for a coupon good for a child's admission with the purchase of an adult ticket.

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

## Birds dining illegally at downtown restaurant

These distinct populations, Butler explained, have adapted to specific conditions unique to their habitats. As a consequence, the populations have developed genetic traits. For instance, due to habitat factors, adults from one region will

leave the ocean and enter swim upriver earlier than adults from another region.

The distinctions between the isolated population groups offer steelhead a better chance of survival as a species.

"What we're trying to do is protect genetic diversity," said Butler, explaining why distinct populations are guarded by his agency. "Genetic diversity gives than an opportunity

to adapt to changing conditions. It gives them a better chance to survive."

#### Different status in different rivers

According to the National Marine Fisheries Service, there are 15 different steelhead "population segments" ranging from the Canadian border to Southern California. The term "population segments" might sound a bit academic, but it's a big improvement over the term it recently replaced, "evolutionary significant units."

Although steelhead are commonly considered "endangered," the only officially designated endangered population exists in Southern California.

"Malibu Creek was thought to be the end of their range, but now they're turning up even farther south," Butler said.

Nine different geographical regions are represented in the "threatened category," including three separate segments of the Columbia River, the Snake River Basin, the Upper Willamette River, Northern California, Central California, South-Central California and the California Central Valley. The Puget Sound, currently designated "proposed threatened," may soon be added to the list. All these fish, as well as rainbow trout found in lakes and streams throughout the United States and in many parts of the world, are the same species, Oncorhynchus mykiss.

#### Who's in charge?

So what's the difference between "endangered" and "threatened"? And how does the U.S. government get jurisdiction over a local population of such a plentiful species?

According to the Endangered Species Act, "endangered" describes any species that is in danger of extinction throughout all or part of its range, while "threatened" refers to any species that is likely to become an endangered species within the foreseeable future. While the difference between the two designations is simply a matter of degree, both population segments are afforded similar protection under the law.

The Oregon Coast steelhead have been designated a "species of concern," although "population segment of concern" would be a more accurate term. Like the Puget Sound steelhead, Oregon Coast steelhead are likely to be designated "threatened in the near future," Butler said.

That leaves just three population segments as "not warranted" for protection. It is likely the Pike Place fillets came from one of these segments, which include the Klamath Mountain Province, Southwest Washington and the Olympic Peninsula. Steelhead populations also exist along the west coast of Canada, Alaska and the Kamchatka Peninsula in

The fish are also very common in Canada and have been introduced in more than 50 countries for sport and commercial aquaculture. In some parts of the world, they are considered an invasive species.

#### Send in the feds

Butler said population segments of steelhead typically become listed after a private party raises a concern.

"Often, an outside entity will petition that a species be listed," he explained. "We do a status review, which paints a picture of the species' present condition. Then we'll assess what the threats are to the species."

Steelhead activists point to statistics as evidence of a declining local steelhead population. The California Advisory Committee on Salmon and Steelhead in 1988 estimated 20,000 steelhead existed in the Carmel River in 1928. The California Department of Fish and Game reported about 1,500 steelhead lived in the Carmel River in 1965. By the droughts of the early 1990s, several studies suggested only several hundred fish survived.

But the worldwide population is at least several hundred million, according to scientific literature.

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# \$100K grant to be spent for cop, programs

STATE TAXPAYERS provided another \$100,000 in Citizens Option for Public Safety grant funds to the City of

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Carmel-by-the-Sea, and the city council earlier this month approved the police department's plans for spending it.

As it has for the past four years, the council OK'd using the bulk of the grant, \$75,890, for a full-time contract police officer position, which reduces overtime and supports traffic enforcement duties when possible, according to CPD.

A little of the money, \$3,300, will cover stipend pay for Cpl. Steve Rana, who often patrols on the department's BMW motorcycle. The balance of \$20,810 will support volunteer and reserve officers programs, as well as other crime-prevention programs and specialized enforcement projects at

CPD. "This grant is extremely important to the department, so we can continue the level of law enforcement we provide," Sgt. John Nyunt told the council Sept. 12.

"This doesn't look like a tough call, does it?" asked councilman Mike Cunningham, who is known for carefully scrutinizing the spending of tax dollars. "There's not a lot of controversy."

With assurance there wasn't, he and the rest of the council voted to OK the spending plan for the COPS grant. Any dollars unspent by June 30, 2008, would have to be returned to the state.

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# For new Tuarcitos principal, CUSD is land of plenty

Brenda Barcellos is still growing used to getting what she asks for. As the new principal of Tularcitos Elementary School in Carmel Valley, she now works for the Carmel Unified School District, which has more resources and lacks the financial woes of her former employer, Monterey Peninsula Unified.

"This is a place where the sky's the limit," Barcellos said she told her staff and faculty soon after coming to work at Tularcitos this summer. "We can do whatever we need or want to do to benefit the children."

She previously worked as the principal of Walter Colton for three years, during which budget cuts necessitated it be reconfigured from a middle school to serve grades kindergarten through eighth.

There, and before that as an assistant principal in the Clovis Unified School District, she grew accustomed to being told programs couldn't be operated and materials couldn't be purchased due to lack of funds.

"Now, I'm encouraged that I can do it," she said. "It's a major paradigm shift."

She's giddy with the ability to "implement some programs with a high level of standards that really weren't possible at the other districts I worked in," she said, including a community garden and an art program. "It's great, but it makes me feel bad for the other districts."

It's not only the strong financial footing and supportive administration that make her so happy with her new job.

"The first time I visited the school as part

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

of the interview process, the warmth of the staff and the community and the students came through so clearly," she said. "They are compassionate people who are so passionate about what's best for the kids that they're willing to do amazing things. I know a lot of teachers, and they give a lot. The difference at Tularcitos is the way they give, with such warmth and generosity."

She said people in all positions "do their jobs at a very high level of ability and integrity."

#### Life calling

Born and raised in the San Joaquin Valley, Barcellos knew early on she wanted to work with kids.

"I loved the whole idea of being involved in the lives of children and all that encompasses," she said, particularly academics. She savored understanding how they learn to read and write, and discovering what interests and inspires them.

Her first teaching job was in a rural school, where she taught all elementary and middle school grade levels over the course of a dozen years. From there, she went to Clovis to become a vice principal, and the MPUSD job was her first as

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a principal.

"I was keeping my eye on Carmel. I knew about Carmel and that I wanted to be part of the team here," said Barcellos, who lives in Monterey with her 11-year-old son and 13-yearold daughter.

Until former principal Kim Williams announced he would retire this year, there were no jobs for principals available. "I thank Kim Williams for retiring and opening the door for me to apply," Barcellos said. "I was just thrilled to be offered the position.'

Before he left Tularcitos, Williams told The Pine Cone he had heard great things about his replacement from her MPUSD coworkers. "She comes very highly recommended and has a wonderful reputation," he said.

Her hiring followed substantial research and screening, according to Williams. CUSD Superintendent Marvin Biasotti interviewed teachers, staff and parents on the characteristics the district should look for in the new principal, and a team of school employees, parents and administrators interviewed candidates.

Barcellos acknowledged Williams is a tough act to follow, including his offering up his pride and appearance to motivate kids during the annual Read-a-Thons. Blue hair, a crazy haircut and a giant chicken suit followed the annual reading contests, as he kept his promises to the kids.

"I heard of the wonderful things Kim did," Barcellos said, so she told the parent-teacher organization she would step up as well, even if it means sitting in a dunk tank.

"I said, 'Let me know what it's going to be, and we'll make it happen," she said. "Whatever it takes, I'm willing to

## A week of jazz, folk and rock, from Monterey to Big Sur

ELAINE LUCIA, who performs this Saturday at the KRML Jazz and Blues Company, has earned a reputation among sidemen as a "musician's singer," a vocalist with an eclectic song list and her own unique arrangements and interpretations. And her many and varied musical endeavors have begun to pay dividends lately, earning her wider recognition and more engagements.

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

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



Attendance records were broken, and main-stage concerts were consistently filled with riveting performances by headliners joined by the likes of young lion Roy Hargrove and vocalist Kurt Elling.

Performances at Dizzy's Den, the Garden Stage, the Night Club and the Starbucks Coffee House Gallery all featured a significant number of the main-stage artists and were accented by a steady stream of promising new artists, including vocalists Sasha Dobson and Tierney Sutton plus young pianist Taylor Eigisti. ## Galante open house marks harvest season in the vineyards

THE CAREFULLY tended grapes are practically bursting with the concentrated essence of a long, hot summer, and as Monterey County's vintners prepare to reap their hard-won bounty, it's time for Galante Vineyards to swing open its doors and caves for its annual Harvest Open House.

"It's a casual afternoon of fun that attracts a lot of local folks," said owner Jack Galante. "The gathering is great for tasting new wines, connecting with neighbors in the community and best of all, it's free."

The Harvest Open House, Oct. 7, combines wine, hors d'oeuvres and music. This year, Jack's 16-year old son's rock band, Way Out West, will perform.

As of our conversation, Jack estimated the pinot noir harvest would begin Oct. 2, so

there should be plenty of activity taking place on the property for open house attendees to see.

"I don't know if we'll be pressing or fermenting grapes, but picking will have begun and it's a great opportunity for people to see what happens during harvest," he said.

Aside from sampling Galante Vineyard's estate wines, Jack is excited to release his very first vintage of petite sirah, a unique grape originally from the Rhône River Valley in France.

"It's a delightful wine with violet characteristics on the nose and a rich mouth feel," he said, clearly very pleased with his first vintage.

Typically a blending grape, more and more local winemakers, such as Annette Hoff of Cima Collina, are experimenting with petite sirah with robust results. Her 2004 Newell Vineyard Petite Sirah is absolutely lovely.

The Galante open house is also an opportunity to for curious wine enthusiasts and Galante Vineyards fans to meet the winemaker, Greg Vita, and vineyard manager,

Eliud Ortiz. Vita has more than 14 years' experience in winemaking in California, including 12 years at Spring Mountain.

While at Spring Mountain he customcrushed wine for Frog's Leap, Chimney Rock, Dunn Vineyards and others. Ortiz came to California from Guatemala in 1982. He has a degree in electronics but no formal agricultural training. He started working for Galante as a ranch hand in 1984 and is now a key part of the winemaking team.

And of course Jack and his partner, Dawn, will be ready to have some fun with guests.

The Galante Family purchased the rustic and remote 700-acre property located in Cachagua Valley as a cattle ranch when Jack was a years old. They planted wine grapes on 60 acres, specializing in Cabernet Sauvignon as a means to make the ranch financially viable. In 1993, Jack decided to build a winery and use some of his grapes to produce ultra-premium estate bottled wines.

In addition to the vineyards, winery and cattle, Galante is also one of the largest



## La Dolce Vita's Chef Melendez took his career one step at a time

LA DOLCE Vita, a picturesque Italian restaurant, is off the beaten path in Carmelby-the-Sea. "Off the beaten path" in our little town translates, in this case, to two blocks south of Ocean Avenue, the village's bustling main street.

But if visitors venture past Nielsen Bros. Market at San Carlos and Seventh and look across the street to La Dolce Vita's colorful outdoor terrace above Wittpenn's Antiques, "That's all it takes. People discover us, come in and then come back for more," according to Chef Miguel

Melendez. Situated Stonehouse Terrace, one of the most beautiful recessed enclaves in this

town of appealing courtyards and cul-desacs, La Dolce Vita is unique.

Branches of tall pines overhang the second floor terrace, while flowers, tall bushes and trees line the walkway leading to its entrance. Italian music, lightly playing on the restaurant's sound system, and appetizing aromas greet customers when they discover La Dolce Vita.

Chef Melendez, who came to the Monterey Peninsula from El Salvador in 1991 when he was a teenager, spoke no English but took two to three periods of English a day at Monterey High School as well as a regular academic program from

grades nine through 12, graduating after four years.

During his high school years, he worked as a bus boy at Marie Callender's in Monterey, his first restaurant experience. By the time he graduated, he had a good working knowledge of what goes on in front of and behind the scenes in a restaurant.

As for cooking, he feels he is 90 percent self-taught; and 10 percent schooled at Monterey Peninsula College. He also read gourmet cooking magazines, watched chefs on television such as Julia Child, and really started tasting food for its ingredients.

By then, speaking English and being particularly presentable, scored front-of-thehouse employment with the Pebble

Beach Company at The Beach and Tennis Club restaurant. He did his job well, learned it thoroughly and asked to be in the kitchen a few days a week to watch the preparation of food. "It gave me the chance to try something new," he said.

By this time, he felt his work was no longer challenging and decided "to take it to the next level." When the former owners closed La Dolce Vita in 2002, Melendez stepped in and in less than a month had the restaurant up and running again.

While he does most of the cooking, Chef Melendez has two other cooks on his staff. "I do about 50 percent in the kitchen, and 50

percent greeting my customers and seating them," he said. In this way, he has come to know his clientele well and welcomes regulars back personally. He has learned their likes and dislikes over the years and prepares special desserts not on the menu for local customers on request.

During the summer, on Tuesdays and Fridays, he books in groups of day-trippers who arrive in Carmel by bus for a day of sightseeing and shopping. He prepares prix fixe three-course luncheons for these groups

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
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

Sandwiched in between his daily work as a restaurateur and family life, Melendez is soccer coach in mid afternoon for the junior varsity at Carmel High School.



Fozounmayeh, who moved to the West Coast from Tehran a half century ago, said he gets choked up just thinking about closing the doors of the restaurant he came to work for as a

When the then-owners decided to sell it five years later, he and Cecilia decided to buy it. At the time, Pernille was one of about eight restaurants in town, compared with almost 10 times that many now, he said.

"The rent was \$168 a month," he recalled. "When it went up to \$250, I thought the world would end."

Over the decades, Pernille has attracted its devotees, some only visiting once a year because they live across the country or across the world.

"During the last AT&T, I had three generations here. I used to put the dad in a high chair, then the son, and now the son has a little girl," he said. "They've come here every single year for as long as I can remember."

He's worried about how they'll feel when they arrive for the 2007 tournament and find their favorite restaurant gone.

"I'm choked up already," he said.

And then there are those who stop in a few times a week, or every day.

"With 65 percent of my customers, we don't even give them a menu. They know what they want," he said. "So, Saturday the 30th is our last day here, and there will be just a lot of tears, I guess. Most of our customers who come here every day seem to have something in their throats. But what else can we do?'

Fozounmayeh also has long and deep involvement with service groups such as Kiwanis, of which he's been a member for almost 37 years. He recalled serving as president of the Carmel Business Association (now the Carmel Chamber of Commerce) when Clint Eastwood was elected mayor 20

"I was interviewed by the BBC. I couldn't believe it," he said. "There was a lot of excitement, and there have been so many things I could put them all in a book."

Married for as long as they've owned the restaurant, the Fozounmayehs have no plans to move out of their Pebble Beach home, but they plan to spend some of their new free time with their three children and four grandchildren, who live in Los Angeles and Concord. They may do some traveling as well, though they've already been all over the world.

"There's no rearview mirror — you can't look back," Fozounmayeh said. "You've got to pick it up and go."

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

Baby" and co-wrote last year's Best Picture Oscar winner,

Numerous other news stories have appeared predicting great things for "Flags," and an enthusiastic fan site, flagsofourfathers.net, has already sprung up, overflowing with enthusiasm for the film's essence and its minutiae. The site profiles the cast and crew, offers extensive essays on the history of Iwo Jima and World War II, hosts a "Pacific War Forum," closely monitors the shooting and post-production schedules, offers tips about the release of the soundtrack and trailers, and stays up to date on the film's PR.

"Scenes from 'Flags of Our Fathers' to be broadcast Oct. 4 at 9:45 p.m. on HBO!" the site trumpeted this week.

The N.Y. Times tried to imbue the film with modern political relevance, describing it as "a study of the callous ways in which heroes are created for public consumption, used and discarded with the news media's willing cooperation."

But Eastwood sees the film in more basic terms.

"I just want the people who see the picture to feel how the story happened, how these skinny kids were affected, and how they were a lot tougher than we are today," he said dur-

To make sure the audience isn't distracted from the unpretentious backgrounds of the soldiers who conquered Iwo Jima, he stayed away from big-name stars for "Flags of Our Fathers."

"The men who raised the flag were young — very young and that's why we used actors who are up and coming,

Ryan Phillipe plays John Bradley, with the other flag raisers portrayed by Adam Beach, Jesse Bradford, Jamie Bell, Ben Walker and Paul Walker.

#### Two movies at once

Eastwood's interest in the Iwo Jima project began as soon as he read Bradley's book six years ago. He immediately tried to buy the rights, only to learn Spielberg already had them. For two years, the director of "Saving Private Ryan" tried to

get a script for "Flags" he liked. Unsatisfied, he put the Iwo Jima story aside in 2003. But Eastwood's interest remained high, and at a party after the

children.

Academy Awards, Eastwood told Spielberg he would like to direct "Flags of Our Fathers." Within a few days, the two Hollywood giants had an agreement.

At the time, Eastwood was in production for "Million Dollar Baby." But when that project was finished in the fall of 2004, and with a screenplay from Haggis for "Flags" he liked, Eastwood soon threw himself into researching the allout battle for Iwo Jima. He met with veterans of the invasion and read numerous books and personal histories.

He also visited the island in April 2005 to discuss the project with Japanese officials and scout filming locations.

In the process, he became intrigued by the sacrifice of the defenders of Iwo Jima.

"They were dug in everywhere and they had an armada of 880 ships coming at them," Eastwood said.

The Japanese commander, Tadamichi Kuribayashi, sent a series of poignant letters to his family about his inevitable

After reading a special translation of Kuribayashi's correspondence, Eastwood decided to shoot an entirely separate movie telling the story of Iwo Jima from the Japanese perspective. That movie, due out Dec. 9, is called, "Letters from Iwo Jima."

Japanese newspapers published a note from Eastwood this fall, explaining his intentions: "Those who lose their lives in war, on both sides, are fully deserving of honor and respect. These two films are my tribute to them. Through these films that tell the story [of Iwo Jima] from both the U.S. and Japanese sides, I hope that you will be able to see a new perspective on an era that the people of both countries share and has made a deep impression on their hearts," he wrote.

But, no matter how worthy the project, directing the second Iwo Jima movie presented some unique challenges for him, especially since it is entirely in Japanese.

"The script was in both languages, and I had a couple of translators," Eastwood said. "And if you know what the scene is, and you know what the objectives are, then you just go ahead and do them."

One scene in "Letters" — with a small camera crew and Ken Watanabe, the actor who plays General Kuribayashi was filmed at the foot of Mt. Suribachi in April.

But the Japanese government put too many restrictions on filming to recreate the flag raising on Iwo Jima itself.

"It's sacred ground for them and, because of the memorial aspect, I couldn't use a bunch of pyrotechnics to show the mayhem the way it really was," Eastwood said after his first visit to the volcanic island.

That led him to decide to shoot the battle sequences for

"Flags" and "Letters" in Iceland, where black sand beaches and desolate countryside made a good substitute for a battlescarred Pacific island.

Other filming was done in New York, Chicago, Washington, D.C., and Los Angeles.

Eastwood edited the movie earlier this year at his offices at Mission Ranch. Digital effects were added by Digital Domain of Venice Beach. Finally, the audio mix for "Flags" was done at the Warner Bros. dubbing room in Burbank.

"Anything on the sound track you want to accentuate or de-accentuate is done at that time," Eastwood said. "We're doing the biggest battle in Marine Corps history, so it's complicated."

The audio for a war bond rally at Chicago's soldier field was also complex. "You have marching bands and drum rolls it's hard to explain until you've seen it."

While he's promoting "Flags" and attending the movie's premieres, Eastwood and his crew are working to meet the December deadline for "Letters." It's unprecedented to complete two movies so close together, but Eastwood prides himself on getting his movies finished on time and on budget.

"I started 'Flags' in the first week of August last year, and I delivered it the second week of August this year," he noted. The \$90 million production required a little less money than it was supposed to, Eastwood said.

"I think at the Stanford or Berkeley school of business, they should study the CEO skills of Mr. Eastwood," Bradley said. "They would find a superior manager with incredible motivational skills who manages a project on time and on budget."

In a story published Sept. 3, Daily Variety had this to say about Clint Eastwood's work habits:

"One exec who worked on the project acknowledges the challenges [of doing two movies at the same time], but has nothing but admiration for Eastwood. 'He's 76 years old, and he rose to a challenge that most guys couldn't get out of bed to do. And he does it with such ease. He's not worrying about what table he'll get at The Grill."

"Flags of Our Fathers" will open at Century Cinemas at Del Monte Center Oct. 20.

A private memorial will be held at the family home in Carmel. Any memorial donations may be made to the Carmel Foundation in honor of Thomas W. Wood.

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
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
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

the Ship House, better represent that diversity, he said. In addition, a bedroom built onto the house in 1943 "is not



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complementary" to the original house, Dyar said, and the board agreed to remove it from the inventory.

Even under stricter state standards, John Clayton's California Ranch-style house, designed by Snyder and built on Carmelo Street in 1948, is not historically significant, nor is its architect, according to the board.

While the prolific Carl Daniels designed Barry Long's stucco house at Torres and Second in 1940, the house is not a particularly good example of Modern housing in Carmel, the board decided.

In her evaluation of the property, consultant Sheila McElroy said it was, but Conroy disagreed. "Very little information is provided to support this statement or the historical significance of the residence," he wrote.

The board concluded the house displays a mix of styles, and Daniels was not a significant contributor to the development of the city.

Since the city declared in June 2005 it would begin recording historic designation on the deeds of 300 properties, about a third of the owners filed appeals. The board's Sept. 18 actions bring the total number of appeals granted to 29. The HRB has denied 15, but the city council has since overturned seven. Another 23 were closed for inactivity or withdrawn by the property owners, and about 35 remain unresolved.

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According to a recent improved safety for all. study, the second-generation air bags on most vehicles built in 1998 and afterward are safer than their predecessors. Designed to be less hazardous to children and small adults, the newer air bags are indeed safer for young children without putting adults at greater risk. Secondgeneration air bags include depowered models, which inflate with less force, and advanced air bags. While concerns had been raised that the depowered air bags could be unsafe for larger people, the new study found no trade-off in safety given to large and small passengers. # Enough with the picketing, already

WHEN WORKERS have a legitimate grievance against their employer, there is nothing wrong with them trying to get the public on their side. Picketing, by attracting the attention of passersby and the media, is a very common way to do this. The goal is to convince the public to take their patronage elsewhere, making it painful for the employer to continue doing whatever his employees don't like.

But just because somebody carries a picket sign doesn't mean he has a legitimate gripe. And if the picketing goes on too long, it seems more like harassment than negotiating.

Such it is with the never-ending picketing of DMC job sites by the Carpenters Union. After more than a year of seeing hired protesters (not union members) in Pacific Grove, Seaside, Carmel and the gates to Pebble Beach, the public has long ago gotten the point. Now, they're just getting annoyed, which means the union is doing more harm than good to itself. It's long past time for the pickets to declare victory and go home.

## What a real city looks like

DESPITE WHAT its opponents say, the housing project proposed for Carmel Valley's September Ranch isn't "urbanization." Nor will it turn Carmel Valley — as one letter to the editor in the Herald claimed last week — into the San Fernando Valley.

If owner Jim Morgens proposed 1,000 or 5,000 units per acre, he might be guilty of trying to create a new city. But the plan approved by the Monterey County Planning Commission, and which will be considered next week by the board of supervisors, allows him just 95 housing units on 891 acres of land. At the California average of 2.93 people per household, the built-out population density of September Ranch would be just 200 people per square mile

Here are some other average housing densities around the United States:

New York — 23,700 per square mile

San Francisco — 15,500

Los Angeles — 7,400


San Jose — 4,600

Carmel-by-the-Sea — 4,000

In fact, among all housing projects proposed in the Monterey Peninsula in the last 20 years, September Ranch has to be one of the most spacious. Only Rancho San Carlos, with fewer than 400 units on 20,000 acres (about 30 people per square mile) has it beat.

Supervisors may have legitimate concerns about water and traffic impacts of September Ranch. But one thing they don't have to worry about is whether it will bear any resemblance to a metropolis.

## Incorporation won't go away Dear Editor:

Carmel Valley incorporation activists claim they don't necessarily support incorporation, they just want it to go to an election. This seems sincere enough, until one studies the flawed LAFCO process: Once a question is taken to a vote, no matter how soundly it is defeated, it can be presented again every two years indefinitely.

What city proponents really mean is that they want to "Goleta-ize" us. It took eight years and four elections before that community, tired of seeing the same issue on the ballot, passed incorporation by a 3 percent margin. Today, Goleta is a sprawling urban cancer. In Elk Grove, incorporation supporters took six years (three elections) to pass the measure; in the subsequent five years, the city grew from 50,000 to 121,000.

City proponents in Carmel Valley know they will lose the first election, even the second or third. But a loss in this process doesn't mean "no" — it means "we'll see you again in two years, and again, and again if necessary!"

This is why LAFCO should not bend the rules to make it easier for this small group to get on the ballot in the first place. We the people will not tolerate, without legal challenge, LAFCO's built-in bias in favor of incorporation.

In November 2005, after spending a year and more than \$100,000 to find a way to meet the ADA requirements, coming up with estimates of more than \$2 million, I decided to close our labor of love and give legal notice to the city that I was not interested in

#### The right tools

#### Dear Editor:

Being in the trades, I know the importance of having the right tool for the job. Experience and knowledge can be useless without proper equipment. With that in mind I have been moved to help the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade acquire the right tools for their job.

The BSVFB is an all-volunteer fire department made up of men and women who work and live in Big Sur. They respond to emergency calls along 60 miles of the coast highway and on more than 600 square miles of rugged mountainous terrain — a job made difficult by the area's wild nature. They rely exclusively on private donations to fund their operations.

The Brigade has three stations along the coast. At this time, their extrication rescue equipment consists of only one Jaws of Life, two battery-powered Sawzalls, and one spreader with a power source. Most of this

equipment is kept at their Post Ranch Station.

In the event of an accident, response time depends on how far these tools must be transported. They would like to stock all three stations with extrication tools to help ensure quick response times for future rescue situations.

In the terrible accident that took two sons of Carmel in July, the rescuers needed time more than anything else. With the vehicle upside down at the base of a 400-foot cliff, smashed down to the doors, the waves crashing and the tide rising, all the tools in the world may not have made a difference.

Each year it seems that I read about another car going off a cliff along the Big Sur Coast. If ever something like this happens again (and I pray to God that it doesn't), we need to make sure the Brigade has all the rescue equipment that it might need close at hand.

The Brigade is a dedicated team that has trained along with the other agencies of the same kind here on the Peninsula. We are all one community and should help each other both financially and emotionally. Please join me and donate to the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade's rescue equipment fund.

- 4. If professional members with the required expertise cannot be found, the City Council may substitute one or more additional public members with a demonstrated interest in historic preservation.

Persons interested in applying for the position may pick up an application at City Hall, located on the east side of Monte Verde Street between Ocean and Seventh Avenues. Applications are available during normal business hours (8:00 a.m.- 5:00 p.m.).

Applications will be accepted until October 20, 2006.






