

BBC films tagging of P.G.'s monarchs

WITH BRITISH TV cameras rolling and plenty of little bitty stickers on hand, volunteers and biologists from the Ventana Wildlife Society this week began a first-ever research project in Pacific Grove to track the migratory habits of the city's celebrated monarch butterflies.

An overnight rain cleared just in time early Thursday morning as the group began capturing the stillslumbering butterflies and very carefully placing small adhesive stickers — each with an 800 number and a unique five digit code on the insects' wings. People who find the tagged monarchs later are asked to call a center with the tag's information, which will help scientists track the butterflies' habits.

"The main reason we are tagging them this year is to study inter-site movement," said Ventana Wildlife Society biologist Jessica Griffiths. "We want to know if the butterflies that come to the monarch sanctuary in Pacific Grove stay there the whole winter, or do they go around to other overwintering sites?"

Each year in late October,

monarch butterflies in the thousands travel from as far as Canada to Pacific Grove for the winter because of the area's temperate weather. Although many butterflies cluster in the eucalyptus trees in the city's Monarch Grove Sanctuary, scientists have long suspected some travel to and from nearby Washington Park.

"Two years ago, there were like 5,000 monarchs at the sanctuary and a couple thousand at Washington Park," Griffiths said. "And

"It's so quiet," said Carrie Theis, president of the Carmel Innkeepers Association. "It's kind of unusual."

Theis submitted her argument in favor of the tax to the letters sections in local newspapers, placed it in the voting guide and appeared on television, but "I have not had anyone come out and say, 'What, are you crazy?'" she said.

City administrator Rich Guillen said no one raised objections when he approached the Carmel Chamber of Commerce and the innkeepers association with the idea months ago after the city council suggested pursuing it.

Some people preferred the money be used for marketing,

Mourning mother misses beach memorial

THE METAL bucket that held flowers for Alex Robbins and Ryan Field — the two Carmel High School students killed in a crash in Big Sur July 25 that left three other teens injured — and other precious mementos disappeared from the Scenic Road pathway near 11th Avenue sometime Halloween night.

They had been accumulating since shortly after the wreck, and Field's mother, Jennifer, is distraught not just for herself, but for everyone who stops there to remember the two surfers and leave tokens of love and affection.

"It was a beautiful thing for people who knew the boys," Field said Nov. 1. "The City of Carmel was past the spot Wednesday morning, as she does every day. She last saw it Halloween afternoon after paddling on a long board in the water along the surf line — part of her daily therapy in coping with her son's tragic death.

California Highway Patrol officers, in beefed-up patrols, have handed out more than 100 tickets to speeders, stop-sign runners and other vehicle code violators in less than three weeks.

"I believe the patrols are getting everybody's attention," said Rick Verbanec, president of the Del Monte Forest Property Owners.

The citations are part of a new \$135,000 agreement between the Pebble Beach Community Services District and the CHP to augment traffic control in the forest.

Since Oct. 16, CHP officers on BMW motorcycles and in patrol cars have cruised the Forest during the morning and afternoon commute times, said Craig Anthony, general manager of the Pebble Beach Community Services District.

"I sent a letter out to all the residents letting them know the CHP is going to be here and for them to be conscious of their speed," Anthony said. "They received the letter a week before officers started patrolling."

Although the increased police presence is likely annoying to some who think the 25 mph speed limit through most of Pebble Beach is wonderful to let that be."

No one knows who carefully removed the painted metal container and pitchers of flowers, the St. Christopher's medal hung from the railing, the beautiful piece of jade, the abalone shells, the bracelets and the two miniature pumpkins bearing the boys' names, according to Field.

Among the lost items was the heart-shaped rock she had painted and left in honor of her son, who used to collect the unusual stones for her.

"The message I left on it said, 'Love, Mom.' What are they going to do with that?" she asked. "I can't think of someone even touching that."

There was no order from city hall or the police department to remove the memorial, and the disappearance doesn't seem to be the work of vandals, she said.

"Someone took it on their own to destroy that memorial," she said. "Every single little thing was swept up and away, which makes me think some adult did it."

Field noticed the memorial missing when she ran



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

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Commission says stone can stay, even though wood was promised

WAS IT supposed to be stone or wood? The owner of a home at Carmelo and Seventh said she always believed the building would be faced in limestone, but plans approved by the City of Carmel more than eight years ago show shingle siding and stone columns, senior planner Sean Conroy told the planning commission Oct. 11.

"This application presents a serious violation of the city's design review/construction process," Conroy wrote in his staff report. "The planning commission approved a wood shingle-sided house. A cut limestone-sided house was built."

The change was discovered by planners during final inspection of the home.

"I'm the owner, and I never thought we had a wood shingle house," Elizabeth Moley said when it was her turn to speak. She recalled having the architect redo some of the drawings early on because they were too complicated, but she insisted the project approved in July 1998 called for limestone.

Though he could have recommended the

house be rebuilt in wood, Conroy suggested one bare stucco wall not visible from the street be covered in stone to match the rest of the house. Otherwise, he said, the home meets current design guidelines and fits in with the neighborhood.

Contractor Joshua Kroeker said he had worked on Moley's home for about two years, and during that time the plans did not change.

"That wall at the back is not visible from anywhere," he added. "It would be a huge expense [to cover it in limestone], and I can't see it has a value."

Commissioners worried about the lack of verifiable facts.

"There's no question that what exists was beautifully done — the question is how we got there," chairman Bill Strid said. "What was approved for your project was a wood shingle house, and what we're being asked to do now is review something that is very changed from the original."

He did not object to the limestone but said he was perplexed by "how we got from a wood house to a stone house without any-

Without the architect present and after such a long passage of time, the commission was reluctant to force Moley to change her home

"There is not a clearly understood set of facts," said commissioner Ken Talmage. "But the craftsmanship on this house is extraordinary and in keeping with Carmel's design traditions."

With so many ambiguities, Talmage said he would not want to burden the homeowner with the cost and work involved in adding more stone.

New planning commissioner Steve Hillyard agreed. "Requiring limestone on the north elevation is more than I'm prepared to do," he said.

"Going from shingles to limestone was clearly not a cheap way out," commissioner Robin Wilson added.

The commission voted unanimously to accept the changes to Moley's plans, which include limestone on the south, west and east elevations, stucco on the north side of the house, and wood posts instead of stone columns.

Commissioners also asked planning staff for ways to avoid such mixups in the future, especially when projects take a long time to complete.

"We're looking at a problem that could be recurring," Strid said.



THE RECENTLY released draft management plan for the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary will be the focus of a public workshop hosted by several conservation groups next week.

The workshop, entitled "Making Waves: An Evening Dedicated to Our Blue Backyard," will address issues affecting the sanctuary, including wastewater from cruise ships, seawalls and motorized personal watercraft.

The management plan, released Oct. 6, proposes changes, including adding the Davidson Seamount, a large underwater volcano southwest of Monterey Bay, within the

sanctuary's boundaries.

'With the draft out on the street, the public has the opportunity to provide us vital feedback on how well we captured their interests and concerns," in the draft, said Rachel Saunders, spokeswoman for the Monterey Bay sanctuary. "The plan, like much with the sanctuary, is really a community collaboration."

Officials from the National Marine Sanctuary Program, under the direction from the National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration, prepared the management plan and environmental impact statement for the Monterey Bay sanctuary as well as plans for the Cordell Bank and Gulf of the Farallones national marine sanctuaries, also

managed by NOAA.

There haven't been any changes to the Monterey Bay sanctuary's plan since its creation in 1992.

"The overall process is to make sure the sanctuary management has kept up with the times," said Kaitlin Gaffney, program manager for The Ocean Conservancy.

The draft plan also includes a review of resource protection, education and research programs, the National Marine Sanctuary Program's staffing needs, the regulatory goals and the sanctuary's boundaries.

"Hundreds of people participated in helping us identify the priority coastal development, water quality, ecosystem protection and wildlife disturbance issues that we address in the plan," Saunders said.

The Monterey Bay sanctuary includes more than 5,300 square miles from Marin County to San Simeon. It includes habitats ranging from tide pools and kelp forests to the Monterey submarine canyon. It is the the largest marine protected area in the Northern Hemisphere

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Sheriff's canine gets better protection from flying bullets

Paul, MDiv ~ Pastor 442 Central Avenue, Pacific Grove, CA 93950 crashed on Ocean Avenue during a car chase three years ago - is still on duty with the Monterey County Sheriff's Office. In fact, he's been on the job long enough to wear out his bulletproof vest, so a dog-food company gave him a brand new one last week during a ceremony in Salinas.

"We have vests for all of our dogs," said commander Alan Wheelus. The MCSO employs four "general service" K-9 officers and one specially trained to sniff out narcotics. Three of the dogs, including Yantz, are on regular patrol. The fourth is stationed at the jail, and the fifth works with the narcotics unit.

The ballistic vests they wear stop most commonly used ammunition and are made of the same materials as those worn by deputies but are shaped to shield canine bodies.

"They give our dogs a little bit of protection — much more than if they had nothing," Wheelus said.

And like the vests humans wear, the kevlar they're made from deteriorates after about five years, according to Wheelus. Yantz had worn his for seven

"It breaks down, and the level of protection diminishes," he said. Yantz's vest was getting very old and was broken down to the point where it wasn't even beneficial anymore."

Enter Breeder's Choice Pet Foods, whose Protect a Hero program set aside a portion of the sales proceeds from its Active Care dogfood to purchase bulletproof vests for K-9 officers around the country.

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New chief brings private-sector experience to top post

DARIUS ENGLES, a Pacific Grove native and eight-year veteran of the city's police department, was appointed its new chief by city manager Jim Colangelo. On Monday he replaced Carl Miller, who worked at the department 30 years, his final three in the top job.

Unlike Miller, Engles, 51, has not spent his career in law enforcement, though it began that way. After graduating from Pacific Grove High School and then California State University Sacramento with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice, he worked for a decade with the sheriff's department in Sacramento County.

"It was great experience, very high volume," Engles said of his first cop job out of college. Covering a territory with 89,000 people, he saw his share of action.

But he and his wife, whom he met at college, wanted to raise a family in a smaller town, and familiar Pacific Grove beckoned.

"When we moved back, I couldn't afford

to be a police officer, because the pay was pretty low," Engles recalled. "I got into real estate and started my own company [First City Real Estate], which my brother runs now.

For 14 years, Engles worked in the business world. He was a member of the Sunrise Rotary Club and commodore of the yacht club in Monterey.

"From that, I learned a lot about asset management and budgeting," he said. "Then I volunteered for Shoreline Community Church to be its business manager for a year."

While running the financial side of the fledgling church and serving with charitable organizations, Engles said he continued to meet a wide variety of people.

One of them worked for PGPD and in 1998 suggested he consider working there, and Engles decided he could finally afford to return to the career that captivated him in college.

The job attracts people who thrive in an "intellectually stimulating, challenging"

environment containing "very rapidly developing situations that are very different," Engles said. "You have to have a little bit of

knowledge about everything and are required to be almost an expert about a number of situations, circumstances and laws."

He joined PGPD and found he could put his work experience in the public and private sectors to use.

"From my previous law enforcement experience and business experience, there's a certain synergy between the two," he said. That breadth of knowledge helped Engles rise quickly through the ranks, from patrol officer, to corporal, to sergeant and then to commander, a position he held for three years. On Monday, he became chief.

He's gratified to be the head of an agency with a mission to protect people's lives, rights and property. "That is what we take an oath for, and I'm proud to say I work for an organization that works for that," he said.

Room for improving

New to the role and not yet accustomed to his phone ringing off the hook, Engles said his first tasks include finding officers to fill four vacancies in the department, which is budgeted for 25 sworn positions and seven non-sworn jobs. He plans to reach full



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
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Big Sur Day of the Dead event aims to build a 'cultural bridge'

IT IS understandable that many Americans would be wary of an occasion that bills itself as the "Day of the Dead." But far from the morbid affair its name conjures up, the ancient Aztec celebration and national Mexican holiday is much more like a wedding than a funeral.

"It's a celebration of life and death," explained Jayson Fann, who is co-organizing a Day of the Dead event at the Loma Vista Spirit Garden in Big Sur, Friday, Nov. 3, from 5 to 10 p.m.

The same week Americans commemorate Halloween by dressing up as ghouls and gorging themselves with candy, Latin Americans honor their ancestors with festive and joyful graveyard celebrations.

"They pay their respects to those who have passed by lighting candles," Fann said. "The mood is brighter than you'd expect, with an emphasis on honoring the lives of the deceased. They believe death is not the end, but rather the beginning of a new stage in life."

In recent years, Day of the Dead celebrations have become more commonplace in the U.S. This is due in part to a growing Latino population, but also because both hispanics and non-hispanics are becoming more interested in pre-



Random tourist's help and 100 cyclists brighten tree-planting

A GROUP of 14 workers that included a Carmel City Council member, a vacationing passerby and members of the Friends of Carmel Forest planted more than 30 cypress and Monterey pine trees on Carmel Beach at

the foot of Ocean Avenue and west of Camino Real Monday.

"We worked solidly for fiveand-a-half hours," said veteran treeplanter and Forest Friends board member **Plenty of** hard work and then an unexpected free lunch

Clayton Anderson.

"Most of us retired many, many years ago and aren't used to that kind of work."

Fellow board member Peter Quintanilla, also a certified arborist and master gardener, supervised the planting and instructed the volunteers, whose effort was aided by a \$2,300 grant from the nonprofit California ReLeaf. The charity requires recipients to

work an equivalent number of hours to earn the funds, and the Oct. 30 planting represented \$1,176 worth of labor, according to Anderson.

'One fellow who was vacationing from Chattanooga, Tenn., came by and said, 'What are you doing?" Anderson said. "We explained it, and he went back to the hotel, changed his clothes and came back to work with us."

The group planted, staked and watered the trees on public property, with Jaime Aquino, who works for the city's public works and forestry department, helping by transporting mulch and soil additive in an all-terrain vehicle.

City councilman Mike Cunningham dug holes, carried buckets of mulch and helped water the newly planted trees, according to Anderson, working from start to finish on the reforestation effort.

"The trees are in the north beach area, in the sand dunes behind the restrooms," Anderson said. "And the last three or four are in a patch of ice plant, so we're going to remove the ice plant and the California Native Plant Society people are going to help us restore it with native plants."

Apparently moved by the volunteers'

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
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labors - and possessing loads of extra food a group of 100 bicyclists pedaling from San Francisco to San Diego to raise money for the Challenged Athletes Foundation invited the planting crew to join them for lunch. Anderson said the CAF representative who arranged the meal stop in Carmel for the cycling group also donated trays of extra sandwiches to the police, fire and public works/forestry departments.

"It was an impressive work day," Anderson said.





"I even looked in the garbage cans to see if it had been thrown away," she said, but she found nothing. "It's extremely disturbing."

Unable to bear the empty spot, Field rushed to fill it with a plastic bottle containing flowers cut from the garden of her home near River School. She also replaced the two miniature pumpkins.

"I'm upset but almost feel more upset for the teenagers who go down there and hang out and talk about Ryan and Alex," she said. "It's so violating and disturbing for everyone. I've even met people in their 80s who put flowers in that bucket because it makes them feel better. It's not all about the teenagers — it's about everyone."



equipment, among other expenses.

"It helped move our sports programs up to the varsity level," he said. With the addition of boys and girls soccer teams, baseball and softball during the 2004/2005 school year, the athletic department now includes 10 sports, and plans are under way for an eight-man tackle football team to compete with other schools in the Central Coast Section next fall.

But CCHS kids have little in the way of home-field advantage. While they can practice baseball and softball on campus, the outfield is too dangerous to host games there, according to Blandin. Some of the money raised Friday will help remedy that.

He would also like to create space for soccer practice at school, and until the campus relocates to where it can build its own gymnasium, funds raised will also pay for rentals.

"We have to be very creative in how we have our athletic programs, without a gym on campus," he said. "We're like a traveling sideshow, in a way."

For example, CCHS volleyball players had to travel to the gym at Cypress Community Church on Highway 68 near Tierra Grande to face a team from Morgan Hill this week. They won and will be competing in the CCS championships.

But the funds raised will not pay for coaching stipends or other salaries, according to Blandin, "just for the overall expansion of the sports."

General plan initiative backers file motion to speed up court ruling

A SANTA Monica-based attorney for the backers of the general plan initiative has filed a motion with the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit to expedite a decision which would allow voters to decide on the plan.

In March, a U.S. District Court judge ruled the initiative,

CARMEL CREW HELPS FIGHT SO. CAL. FIRE

As THE arsonist-set blaze that killed five U.S. Forest Service firefighters raged last week, the California Office of Emergency Services summoned help from all over the state, and a team of four from Carmel Fire Department answered. The crew left Friday and returned late Monday night after seeing just 12 hours on the fire line.

With others willing and able to cover their shifts on the fire engine and ambulance at the Carmel station, Capt. Ian Watts, engineers Matt Gardner and Kenny Hutchinson, and firefighter Graham Evans jumped aboard the department's wildland engine for the drive to Southern California Oct. 27.

"They gave us about half an hour to get all our gear ready and respond," Watts said.

They drove to Bradley to meet the four other engines and the chief officer that made up the Monterey County strike team. All fire departments in the county eligible to respond to major incidents outside their jurisdictions are on a rotating list used by the OES and take turns filling the orders, according to Watts. CFD was already asked twice this year, but with so few employees, the engine couldn't go because no one was available to cover the shifts at home.

The strike team arrived in Riverside County at about 11 p.m. "When we're responding to a fire, we just keep going until we get there no matter what time it is," Watts said.

The Santa Ana winds that had fueled the violent flames had largely subsided by the time they arrived, and "the fire was starting to turn toward favorable conditions," he said.

The team reported for duty at 6 a.m. Saturday but ended up waiting 24 hours for an assignment.

"They had so many resources there, they had too many to process," Watts said. He learned as many as 10 strike teams had been canceled and were driving home as his headed south.

The glut may have been due to the urgent desire to get the fire out as soon as possible, considering the death toll and the grief suffered by forest service crews.

"They really wanted to get this behind them," Watts said.

Memorial posters to the men, the youngest of whom was 20 and the oldest 44, were hung in the dining area at the base camp. "As they went through the chow line, everyone signed them for the families to have," Watts said.

A chaplain and other counselors set up a tent nearby to help people who were grieving.

"I'd never seen that before," Watts said.

The strike team finally received its assignment at 6 a.m. Sunday and headed out to help the crews of state inmates and

an alternate plan to county supervisors' own proposed general plan, violated the Voting Rights Act.

The decision riled LandWatch Monterey County and other slow-growth supporters, who argue voters should decide whether or not the alternative plan should be implemented.

Attorney Fred Woocher seeks to have the 9th Circuit ruling reversed.

"The county is acting abysmally," said Woocher, who filed the motion Oct. 25. "They are essentially abusing their position of trust. They know there is no Voting Rights Act argument still."


In Padilla v. Lever, a case from Orange County involving the recall of a school board member, a full panel of the 9th Circuit ruled 14 to 1 the Voting Rights Act, which requires some election material to be distributed in minority languages, does not apply to recall petitions.

A message left with the county counsel's office was not returned Thursday. But county attorneys have argued Padilla is a different case and doesn't apply to the Monterey County General Plan initiative.

According to Woocher, however, Padilla clearly defines the rules Monterey County should follow.

"The decision came down that said, 'Petitions don't have to be circulated in Spanish,' and they [county] still refused to give credence to it," Woocher said.

Supporters of the initiative, led by LandWatch Monterey County, collected about 15,000 signatures to place the initiative on the ballot. But county supervisors refused to put it on the ballot.



In March, Judge James Ware issued a permanent injunction prohibiting the county from putting the initiative to voters in any election. Ware ruled, based solely upon the original ruling in Padilla, "that the initiative was presented to the voting public for signature in violation of the Voting Rights Act because it was printed and circulated only in English and not also in Spanish."


LandWatch filed an immediate appeal, seeking an emergency injunction to have the initiative appear on the June ballot which was denied. After the Padilla case was resolved, the 9th Circuit made its 14-to-1 ruling.

Woocher said 9th Circuit Court clerks acknowledged they received the LandWatch appeal but said it would likely be mid-November before the motion received a reply.

"Hopefully, we will find out in a couple of weeks if they will expedite it," Woocher said. "We are trying, but we can't force it on the ballot. We need some cooperation from the county."

According to Woocher's motion, "the injury in this case is especially irreparable, for without the managed growth and land use protections contained in the general plan initiative, uncontrolled development in Monterey County continues unabated and threatens to permanently destroy thousands of acres of of environmentally sensitive resources and irreplaceable agricultural lands."



learn new printmaking techniques."


In Maine, Giacometti discovered a technique that not only simplified the printmaking process, but took her on a fascinating creative journey.


A SMALL farming community in Western Canada would seem an unlikely birthplace for a musical chameleon like singer k.d. lang. But lang, who will perform at Sunset Center Nov. 8-9, insisted in an interview this week that people from small towns can be surprisingly open-minded.

"There's a misconception about small towns," lang explained. "You know people so well in a small town that no matter how eccentric they are, they seem normal. In a big city, like-minded people tend to stick together. I think I'm open-minded because I grew up in a small town."

In college, lang dabbled in punk rock, but the chance discovery of several old Patsy Cline records inspired her to start a country band. The Canadian press showered her efforts with praise, but Nashville's conservative musical establishment turned a deaf

"The essence of life is not being in control of how you shift," said lang, never one to be afraid of taking chances.

Ultimately, though, lang believes her singing career will take her back to where she started. When asked if she is ever tempted to record a traditional country album in the style of Patsy Cline, she doesn't hesitate to respond.

"I think it's inevitable," lang conceded. "Yes, it's definitely going to happen."

Until that day arrives, it seems only reasonable the unconventional lang would turn to unconventional sources for creative inspiration.

"I listen to a lot of National Public Radio," she said. "I also listen to a

IF YOU'VE got a passion for fashion and a penchant for fine food, come check out the Culinary Classique d'Elegance at Spanish Bay Resort in Pebble Beach Sunday, Nov. 5. Put together by the Sardine Factory's grand maestro, Bert Cutino, the amazing annual fundraiser for Meals on Wheels of the Monterey Peninsula is celebrating its 10th anniversary.

Before you sigh at the thought of another big function buffet-style meal, sit tight. Cutino's learned a little something about doing things differently in his 35-plus years in the restaurant biz. He takes 18 of the top local culinary talents and pairs them with 18 notable table designers. The headlining chef for this year's event is Michael Shafer of Depot Restaurant in Los Angeles. 
cool catch: Each table has an entirely different look and menu.

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

but when they learned specific designation of the funds would require twothirds majority approval of voters to pass, Guillen said, they didn't resist its benefiting the general fund instead. A tax increase for the general fund only requires 50 percent plus one to pass.

"It will help continue to provide what we do for residents as far as services, street maintenance, street sweeping, anything that makes the city look better," he said. The money could augment fire and police services, and help pay for marketing the city.

"It has a broad, general use that can go in a lot of directions," Guillen said. Nonetheless, he thought people might speak against it when the city council held public hearings in May and June to discuss placing the tax increase on the ballot. But even then, constituents remained uncritical. Only councilman Mike Cunningham, who favored more prudent spending over increasing revenues, voted against taking the tax measure to the polls.

"It's going to be interesting to see if the voters are going to support it or not, because there hasn't been a lot of publicity on it, positive or negative," Guillen said. "So we'll have to see how it plays out."

The decision might already be made, with the number of people voting by mail in Carmel. According to Monterey County Elections, 1,532 of the 2,899 registered voters use absentee ballots.

"I'm sure that a lot of people have already voted one way or the other, but I haven't heard anything negative," Theis said. "It just hasn't been a topic of conversation — it hasn't been something that people seem to be overly concerned about, because the increase is so minor. That's how I would characterize it."

And, Guillen pointed out, it's the business owners, not the residents, who will be paying it.

WHEN THE album "6- and 12-String Guitar" by a thenunknown solo acoustic guitarist named Leo Kottke showed up in record stores in 1969, paisley-clad and chest-baring electric guitar gods like Jimi Hendrix and Jimmy Page ruled the turntables and airwaves.

It is doubtful Kottke, who will play at Sunset Center Friday, Nov. 3, could have picked a worse time to unleash his somewhat obscure and certainly understated acoustic ramblings on the record-buying public. But he somehow managed to sell more than 500,000 copies of "6- and 12-String Guitar," a record that has earned almost mythic status among finger-picking instrumentalists.


In an interview this week, Kottke recalled the scene when he sat down and recorded the landmark album.

"I just played everything I knew, which wasn't very much at the time," Kottke remembered. "I was surrounded by sheets of paper in a warehouse. I was nervous, but I had a great time. It was blur. In another part of the warehouse, they were editing a promo film for the first [Boeing] 747."

Coincidentally, the jumbo jet and Kottke were first greeted by the public with skepticism. And remarkably, considering the fickle nature of aviation technology and contemporary musical tastes, each is still thriving today.

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

During exercises and demonstrations, deputies use paint pellets called Simunition in their guns, Wheelus said.

"We are shooting at them so they get used to gunfire, and we have a deputy who wears a bite suit," he said. "The dogs come up and grab him by the arms and legs and take him down."

During last week's scenarios, deputies pulled over a car containing a suspect who refused to obey, and they also confronted a man on the street who would not do as he was told. In both cases, the dogs did their thing, subduing the suspects and protecting their deputy handlers.

Though the dogs' behavior may sound violent and aggressive, Wheelus said ideal K-9 cops are not those inclined to

Sanchez also birdied the 17th, but his handicap gave him a stroke on the hole, so the team's written score was an eagle. "Nobody ever expected us to win this tournament," he

said. Sanchez also wanted to give his caddie (and son), Ryan Sanchez, kudos for the victory.

"Caddies don't get enough credit," he said. "Without them, I don't know what we'd do."

Jim Thorpe, who won the professional rounds to finish Sunday with a total score of 271, took home \$440,000. Because the tournament ended the Champions Tour for fight, but those who like to play.

"I've been playing golf since I was a caddie at Spyglass Hill when it was a brand new course," he recalled. "I wasn't even able to drive to work."


Now the owner of two busy markets, Sanchez said he gets rounds in as frequently as possible while still getting his jobs done.




USFS workers cutting foliage to stop the fire. The engines provided water, and the firefighters also helped mop up to ensure nothing was still burning.

"The fire was going so well that we worked it for 12 hours, and then they sent us home," Watts said.

The crew arrived in town late Monday night, and after ensuring the wildland engine was prepared to go on another call if needed, Watts, Gardner, Evans and Hutchinson left for their homes.


In its final online update at 7 a.m. Nov. 1, the state declared the Esperanza Fire, which started at 1:12 a.m. Oct. 26, 100 percent contained at a cost of \$9.9 million. A total 1.587 people worked on the fire in 54 crews, 92 engines, three helicopters, seven dozers and 10 water tenders.


It burned 40,200 acres, 34 homes and 20 outbuildings. In addition to the five who died in the fire, 12 people suffered minor injuries.

staffing soon.

He praised Miller and everyone in the department for doing "a really good job."

'The citizens seem to be pretty happy with what has been occurring," he said.

Part of the job entails determining what areas need improvement, though he resisted specifically describing what those might be.

"The real challenge for law enforcement across the board is to develop systems and protocols that are more efficient," he said. 'That's more easily said than done."

One tool for assessing PGPD's strengths and weaknesses may be the report presented to the city council this week that examines crime data and other information from the past five years, as well as results of a 2004 survey of residents and business people.

"It reinforces what we think we know but also points to some areas we think we can improve." And with the backing of his department, Engles said, "I look forward to the challenge."

The workshop is hosted by World Wildlife Fund, Surfrider Foundation, The Ocean Conservancy, Farallones Marine Sanctuary Association, Save Our Shores, Seaflow and The Marine Mammal Center.

The draft management plans for the sanctuaries were created after nearly three years of public input and recommendations from each site's sanctuary advisory council, according to The Ocean Conservancy.

In early 2002, public scoping meetings were held to develop action plans that addressed a wide variety of issues. Those plans formed the basis of the new management plan. Cruise ship pollution, stormwater runoff and invasive marine life species all make up a suite of problems that threaten the Monterey Bay sanctuary, Gaffney said.

Next week's educational workshop precedes a public hearing at the Monterey Conference Center Nov. 30.

"The first meeting is to get people involved," Gaffney said.

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

painfully too slow, it's already proved to be effective, according to Anthony.

"I'm almost certain the program is working," he said. "It appears to me speed within the Forest has slowed down appreciably.'

The CHP reported to the PBCSD at its Oct. 27 board meeting that there hadn't been a vehicle accident since the increased presence began.

Surprisingly, nobody has moaned to the district about the beefed-up police activity, Anthony said.

"I haven't received a single complaint," he said. "I have received a number of calls supporting the program."

Besides moving violations, officers have also handed out tickets to motorists for a variety of other infractions.

"The tickets actually include trucks for not having covered loads," Anthony said. "They also identified a few drivers of commercial vehicles without current drivers licenses."

"It's not like we are asking the CHP to do any different enforcement," Verbanec said. "We are asking them do their thing, and do it more often."


Although Pebble Beach roads are privately owned, the P.B. Co. has given the county the authority to set speed limits and determine traffic signage.

The PBCSD also contracts with the Monterey County Sheriff's Office, which handles mostly criminal incidents in Pebble Beach.

Anthony said it's possible the CHP will slow its activity in Del Monte Forest after the first of the year. Currently, CHP officers spend a few hours in the morning and afternoon commute times patrolling there.

"We'll either adjust down or adjust up," he said.

The district first looked at augmenting police presence after Pebble Beach residents cited speeding and vandalism as major concerns in a October 2005 survey.


The Local Agency Formation Commission this summer gave the PBCSD approval for the extra CHP patrol. That led the district to pass an ordinance in September to contract for supplemental police services.

'The authority that the PBCSD got was for law enforcement in general," Verbanec said. "They can do the same thing for vandalism if it pops up again."

The PBCSD also provides fire protection and emergency medical services, sewer maintenance and garbage pickup.

The money for the extra law enforcement, which comes mostly from property taxes, will be drawn from the part of the district's budget usually used for infrastructure upgrades. The CHP funding will last until June 30, 2007. After that, the PBCSD will evaluate the effectiveness of the program.

The CHP is working with the PBCSD through a reimbursement agreement since the final contract has not been finalized by the law enforcement agency. The contract should be completed by the first of the year, Anthony said.

mock death, which they viewed as simply another transition in life. The celebrants believed life was like a dream, and death an awakening. The Spanish called the tradition, "Día de los Muertos." The custom predated their arrival by an estimated 2,500 years.

Trio Alborado Mariachi will perform traditional Mexican folk music at the Big Sur event. Huichol artist Mariano Valadez, who Fann calls a "national treasure in Mexico," will present an exhibit of his work.

Learning the customs and the language

The Big Sur Day of the Dead event emerged as an outgrowth of the formation of Celebrado la Cultura, a local non-profit dedicated to bridging Big Sur's hispanic and non-hispanic communities.

In addition to sponsoring the Day of the Dead celebration, Celebrado la Cultura is offering ongoing "language" classes.

"What's really interesting about the classes is that there is an equal ratio of English speakers and Spanish speakers," Fann said. "So every student is also a teacher. The Spanish speakers teach Spanish and the English speakers teach English. It's really a beautiful thing.'

The language program is sponsored by the Community Foundation of Monterey County and the Big Sur International Marathon. The program has also received a big boost from the local business community. Celebrado la Cultura charges \$10 a class, but many students attend for free because employers like the Esalen Institute, the Post Ranch Inn, Fernwood Resort, Deetjen's Big Sur Inn and the Ventana Inn and Spa have picked up the tab.

the next week, there were 5,000 at Washington Park and only a couple thousand at the sanctuary. We were thinking that maybe they were using both sites. But we had no way of telling. With the tags, we can tell if they are moving. We will have proof."

The tagging will also help biologists determine the insect's dispersal patterns in the spring. Monarchs mate in the spring before females leave the area to look for milkweed to lay their pinhead-sized eggs. Some stay in California while others travel hundreds, even thousands of miles to other states

"Where do they go?" Griffiths said. "How high do they fly [in the mountains] to search for milkweed?'

Tag, they're it

At 6:30 a.m., Thursday more than 10 volunteers and biologists gathered at the monarch sanctuary to tag butterflies.

Griffiths used a pole net, which could be expanded to 9 meters, to gently wiggle the monarchs into the net. From there, the insects were quickly transferred to paper grocery bags. Working in teams of two, the volunteers, mostly docents for Pacific Grove-based Friends of the Monarchs, applied the stickers while their partners recorded the tag information onto a data sheet.

"The tagging needs to take place while the butterflies are cold and not flying around," Griffiths said.

A BBC film crew was in Pacific Grove Thursday to document the tagging process. While cameras rolled, Griffiths showed BBC reporter Kate Humble how to tag a butterfly. Although members of the Ventana Wildlife Society had planned to tag monarchs in Pacific Grove later in the season, enough had arrived by this week that they made concessions for the film crew, Griffiths said.

"The BBC is filming a 10-part series called 'Wild in California,' Griffiths said. "The butterfly tagging is one segment of an episode. They are looking at research projects all over, and were with the [Ventana Wildlife Society's] California condor crew Wednesday."

"It was great," said Humble, who hosts the program, scheduled to air on BBC TV in spring 2007.

While volunteers listened, Griffiths explained the delicate but relatively easy process of placing the tiny stickers on a monarch's wings. The goal was to tag 1,000 monarchs, although Griffiths said they might not tag that many.

"You want to hold it with the wings closed," she instructed. "You can determine [if it's male or female] by the two black dots on their wings."

"This is wonderful," said volunteer docent, Sharon Kirsch, as she placed a tag on a butterfly. "It's a totally magical experience. Nothing would get me up at 5:30 a.m. except to tag butterflies. It's so exciting I can't believe it."

Karen Richter and her friend, Paul Muldoon, both from Seattle, also volunteered. The couple was in the monarch sanctuary Wednesday when they heard about the research project. "A naturalist said there was going to be a butterfly tagging," Richter said. "And we thought, this would be a wonderful thing to do at dawn."

Months before the Ventana Wildlife Society received permission to conduct the experiment, it had to overcome a major hurdle - a Pacific Grove city ordinance prohibiting anyone from handling the protected insects.

"They asked us for permission to do it," said P.G. City Manager Jim Colangelo. "And a couple of meetings ago, the city council approved their doing the tagging.'

Tracking the movement of monarchs is important for biologists to determine why they choose a specific area over another.

'The information will tell us if we should protect other areas, not just the habitat where they [typically] cluster," Griffiths said.

Monarch alert

The butterfly monitoring program is a joint effort between California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo and the Ventana Wildlife Society.

Cal Poly is home to the Monarch Alert headquarters, where the 800 number is based. Callers get a voice mail message asking for the tag's details. No two tags are the same.

'When we tag a butterfly, we record that information, which is submitted to Cal Poly," Griffiths said. "So, when someone calls the toll-free number on the sticker, the researcher can look up that five-digit number and find out where the butterfly was tagged."

Usually, someone will call in the information after finding the unexpected tag on a dead monarch, Griffiths said.

The round, aspirin-size labels, placed on the underside of a monarch's hind wing, are made with a special adhesive that doesn't harm the insect, said Kelly Sorenson, Ventana Wildlife Society's executive director. The sticker is expected to remain on the monarch for the rest of its life.

"It doesn't affect the monarch's flight patterns and it's very lightweight and small," Sorenson said. "But it's large enough that the ID and toll-free number on it can be read."

The wildlife society has a budget of \$7,000 for the project, which allows for two days of tagging. The second day will be sometime in November, when the monarch

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population is greater. Sorenson said they are seeking more money to expand the program.

"There are very highly sophisticated tests we could do, like studying parasites and where they feed," Sorenson said. "But at this point we are just anticipating determining population size throughout the season, and finding out where they go."

Although this is the first tagging experiment to study monarchs that migrate to Pacific Grove, a program based at the University of Kansas, headed by ecologist Chip Taylor, has provided valuable information about monarchs since 1992. Taylor's program, Monarch Watch, tags as many as 100,000 monarchs annually.

'We track migratory butterflies that go all over the eastern states and go to Mexico," Taylor told The Pine Cone. "We have learned a lot ... when [migration] starts, peaks and ends. We have been learning differential mortality depending on where they originate."

Monarchs east of the Rocky Mountains spend the winters in mountains in central Mexico. Monarchs west of the Rockies migrate to the Central California coast. The butterflies may travel as far as 2,000 miles, covering 100

miles per day and flying as high as 10,000 feet. Although last year's monarch population in Pacific Grove was not as high as it's been in some

years, this year seems like it will be a good one for the insects.


"They are coming in rapidly, and they are looking healthy," said Ro Vaccaro, president of Friends of the Monarchs, also known as Pacific Grove's "Butterfly Lady."

Griffiths, who also thought there would be more monarchs in Pacific Grove this year than last, said the Ventana Wildlife Society will take the first official count of the season next week.

The tempest worsens

ON 60 Minutes two weeks ago, would-be Speaker of the House of Representatives Nancy Pelosi was asked about her pledge to restore civility to Washington politics if the Democrats become the majority party in the House next Tuesday.

"But you've called President Bush, 'incompetent.' If you become Speaker, you'll have to work with him. How does it help restore civility to call the President of the United States incompetent?" Lesley Stahl asked.

"Well, he is incompetent," Pelosi replied icily.

The exchange said as much as any other event in this election season about the hostility and contempt the national political parties feel for each other. And with the electorate so closely divided, it unfortunately seems things will have to get worse before they can get better.


On a smaller scale, the same thing is happening right here on the Monterey Peninsula. The diehards who want to see Carmel Valley become a city so they can have more say over what goes on there suffered a serious setback when a local commission decided an EIR will have to be prepared before the issue can go to voters. Some incorporation advocates responded not by pointing out why they felt the commissioners were wrong, but by accusing them of being in the pocket of local developers. In other words, incorporation proponents believe that no honest person could be concerned about the environmental impacts of creating a Town of Carmel Valley. Therefore, anyone who voted to require an EIR must have an ulterior motive. But don't the backers of incorporation know that hundreds of their own neighbors have the same concerns and want no part of the incorporation effort?

Likewise, in Carmel, when city councilmembers decided a 1970s bank building could be torn down, the ink was scarcely dry on the minutes before the name-calling started. And it hasn't abated.

But surely those calling for preservation of the bank building know that a great number of people who live in Carmel and surrounding communities think the historic preservation movement has gotten ridiculously out of control, and that it's ludicrous on its face to describe any building that's only 35 years old as "historic" unless it was the scene of a momentous event.

We understand why some people in Carmel Valley want it to be incorporated, believing its scenery will be better protected. Their concerns are honest. But so are the concerns of people who think a city government will be too expensive and will just be the object of a power grab by activists. Neither side deserves to have its motives questioned.

Likewise, we understand why some people think the government should intervene to protect a building they love. Their interest in such a building may be somewhat self-serving, but not any more so than hundreds of other subjects that are brought up at city hall. It's a suitable question to be put to the majority. But in the democratic process, there's no reason to become angry when you lose an honest vote.

the Pine Cone's endorsement of an election on Carmel Valley incorporation without an Environmental Impact Report. Big Sur man killed in Highway 1 crash

STEPHEN MOSES, a 58-year-old Big Sur resident who ran an import business in Carmel Valley, died in a wreck on Highway 1 in Big Sur Wednesday afternoon.

CHP officer John Yerace, the first emergency responder on the scene of the Nov. 1 accident, which occurred around 3:30 p.m., found two trucks blocking the serpentine section just south of the Little Sur River. Three occupants of a Ford flatbed said they were uninjured, but Moses was unconscious behind the steering wheel of the Nissan pickup that sustained major front-end damage and was blocking both lanes.

Yerace said Moses was southbound when he crossed the double-yellow lines and collided with the northbound Ford. It's unknown why Moses drifted into the other lane, Yerace said. "The person in the vehicle right behind him said he was drifting into the corners before the collision." He detected no odor of alcohol and said the investigation will reveal whether Moses was wearing his seat belt.

Highway 1 was closed in both directions for just under an hour, until the truck could be moved to open one lane for traffic to pass.
