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SHOPKEEPER **CHASES DOWN SHOPLIFTER**

A FLEET-FOOTED business owner saw a shoplifter swipe three trinkets from her Doud Arcade shop and gave chase through downtown Carmel Sunday evening, according to Carmel Police Sgt. Mel Mukai. The suspect, 52-year-old Janice Wahl of Venice Beach, returned the items to the victim, Vasana Jenson, before police arrested her and took her to jail.

"Ms. Jenson witnessed the suspect take something off the shelf and apparently put something in her pocket; she looked over and noticed some items missing," Mukai said, namely an Oriental handcarved wooden jewelry box and two wooden compasses, also carved by hand, with a total value of just

Leaving her husband and business partner in the store, Jenson ran after Wahl, according to Mukai, who with Cpl. Steve Rana began searching the commercial district after a bystander called 911 just before 6 p.m. Nov. 19 to report one woman was yelling and chasing another through town.

She was 'nervous'

Somewhere in the area of Ocean Avenue and Monte Verde, the two women confronted each other, Wahl handed the items over and left, according to

"That's where Ms. Jenson flagged me down and said the suspect was heading east on Sixth from Monte Verde," he said.

Confronted by the two officers, Wahl "was nervous," according to Mukai, and told police she had returned the stolen items to the victim.

"But Ms. Jenson wanted to pursue charges, so Wahl was lodged at Monterey County Jail," Mukai

John Waldroup, 80, Barnyard founder

JUST AS the Barnyard Shopping Center is no ordinary mall, its founder, John Waldroup, was clearly no ordinary shopping center developer.

Waldroup, who founded the popular local shopping center in 1972, died this week at 80. In his wake, he left behind a treasure trove of memories, some professional and others personal.

"He was a man of vision," recalled Hedi Movahedi, who along with his wife, Nancy, opened the Jewel Boutique in 1978 and Hedi's Shoes in 1980.

Movahedi owned a jewelry store in Washington D.C. and was simply visiting Carmel when a chance meeting with Waldroup led to a cross country move and new business venture.

THE SAN Clemente Dam in upper Carmel Valley is filling up with sludgy sediment at an alarming rate — a factor that could cause dangerous hillside erosion on either side of the dam, a spokeswoman with California American Water Co. said.

In just one year, engineers with California American Water Co. estimate sediment in the dam has advanced as much as 40 feet, a rate much quicker than before.

"I was shocked how much the sediment had advanced," said Catherine Bowie, community relations manager for Cal Am, who recently visited the dam. "It wasn't what I expected and it was amazing to see what can occur in one winter.'

If the silt is left to accumulate, it could cause big problems, Bowie

"If we had a big storm, the water could go right over the face," she said. "The danger of that is it would erode the hillside on either side of the dam, and if that happens, the dam could collapse."

The Army Corps of Engineers and the California Division of Safety of Dams have ordered an environmental impact report to determine the best way to deal with the 85-year-old dam, which does not conform to modern seismic stan-

Cal Am has proposed strengthening the dam, which the company contends is the most cost effective method of meeting seismic requirements. Other ideas include disman-

Mazatlan, Mexico — WE HAVE done it twice.

The first time was a June morning in 2003, and the second was in the wee hours of October 9 this year. Each time we had the thrill of departing Carmel-by-the-Sea by sea. Not only have these departures elicited the excitement that naturally comes with beginning an extended sea voyage. They have also created lingering memories that effect our daily lives when we are back on land.

On both journeys, we sailed out of Monterey harbor the preceding day and anchored our 36-foot sloop, Athena, in Stillwater Cove in the late afternoon.

Three years ago, Stillwater was filled with boats either at anchor or tied up to the Stillwater Yacht Club mooring balls. Last month, the cove was absolutely empty. That's because Stillwater Cove is open to the south and to the direct winds of our winter storms, making Stillwater an unsafe anchorage from October to April.

In late September, the yacht club, under the able direction of Charlie Kurtmen, removes the mooring balls and the cove is mostly empty of boats during the winter. In good weather, though, it isn't really hazardous, as long as one can maneu-



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Construction begins on high-tech project to recycle water

CONSTRUCTION OF a state-of-theart, \$22 million water treatment system that will eliminate the use of potable water to irrigate Pebble Beach's world-famous golf courses began at the Carmel sewage treatment plant last week.

The project, which is being paid for and constructed by the Pebble Beach Company, includes the installation of a micro filtration/reverse osmosis system that will improve the quality of recycled water produced by the Carmel Area Wastewater

The system, expected to be operating by Spring 2008, will provide a stable water source to irrigate the recreational open spaces in Del Monte Forest, including Pebble Beach Golf Links, Cypress Point and even the athletic fields of Robert Louis Stevenson

The existing reclamation project has already been saving the Monterey Peninsula about 700 acre-feet of potable water a year since it went online in 1994. But the mineral content of the reclaimed water has been too

high for the type of grass used on the courses. As a result, potable water has been used to rinse the greens to get rid of the salts that build up in the soil.

"The grasses at the golf courses started to get stressed and damaged because of the amount of sodium," said Ray von Dohren, CAWD general manager.

The new, advanced treatment system will reduce the salt content of the reclaimed water, eliminating the need to flush the courses with potable water. When used in combination with the recently reconstructed Forest Lake Reservoir it "will save 300 acrefeet of water we are using now on the golf courses," said von Dohren.

The reverse osmosis system will replace CAWD's existing tertiary facility, built in 1994. That system wasn't designed to reduce the sodium content of the recycled water, which has gotten progressively saltier as more and more water conservation measures have been implemented on the Monterey Peninsula, reducing the amount of water flowing the the sewage treatment plant.

"With the old system there was about 175 milligrams of sodium per liter, and the new

one will be about 55 milligrams of sodium per liter, said Sanford Veile, CAWD engineer. In comparison, potable water averages about 75 milligrams of sodium, he said.

Until the system is completed, Pebble Beach's greens will still have to be periodically flushed, von Dohren said. But once it is finished, "the golf courses will not have to use potable water to flush the courses unless there is an emergency."

The water from the CAWD plant travels through Carmel in an underground pipeline



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CHP crackdown sheds light on P.B. driving habits, hazards

DRIVING TOO fast and not wearing seat belts are the two most ticketed offenses in a new traffic enforcement effort in Pebble Beach. And speeding on Forest Lodge, Forest Lake or Lopez roads will draw the attention of California Highway Patrol officers more than other areas, according to figures from the law enforcement agency.

Since October, the CHP has beefed up enforcement as part of a \$135,000 agreement with the Pebble Beach Community Services District.

Since the beginning of the program, CHP officers have written about 350 tickets to drivers in Del Monte Forest not obeying the rules of the road.

"We aren't writing chicken tickets," said said CHP Sgt. Ray Faulk, who is in charge of

the Pebble Beach Traffic Safety project, as it's dubbed. "Officers are generally writing tickets if you are 10 mph or so over the

Officers have also issued about 100 verbal warnings to lucky drivers who avoided receiving tickets, said Faulk, who provided The Carmel Pine Cone with the statistics.

The PBCSD decided to augment the CHP's patrol of the Del Monte Forest after residents expressed through a survey that speeding was a major concern.

"We focus (enforcement) pretty much all over the forest," Faulk said. "But there are 12 areas that the residents were polled that they would like to have activity monitored."

Pebble Beach roads are privately owned, but the P.B. Company has given the county

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
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

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City backhoe to the rescue as CMS bids come in over budget

CARMEL MIDDLE School parents had hoped donations and district money would buy a new all-weather track for the campus this year, but two bids put the price far beyond what the Carmel Unified School District was prepared to pay. The board of education formally rejected the offers last Monday but liked an alternative plan that could see the project come to fruition by next summer for less money, according to chief business official Rick Blanckmeister.

To remedy extensive drainage problems in the school's

athletic fields and install the new track, Monterey Peninsula Engineering proposed a base bid of \$267,000, with an offer to also make the running surface accommodate 100-meter competition for another \$14,000. Granite Construction's numbers were \$326,797 for the basic track and \$22,800 for

But those were far higher than the board expected, so it rejected the bids and considered what could be done inhouse. Blanckmeister told The Pine Cone operations manager Dan Paul and some of his employees will take advantage of a service-sharing agreement with the City of Carmel to use its backhoe for the drainage work.

Then we can bid out the project and have the contractor do the track," Blanckmeister said. "So that's the game plan at

The school crew might tackle some of the labor this winter, but it's unlikely to be completed before track season begins in February. The project would then be sidelined until May, when the season ends and the weather is better.

That puts it several months behind what parents, school officials and the district anticipated, but parent-teacher association president and CMS track coach Matt King said he's simply happy to know progress is being made.

In spring 2005, King approached the administration with a proposal to help raise money to replace the decomposedgranite track with an all-weather surface, then estimated at about \$100,000.

"Raising the \$50,000 was pretty easy — that was done by the beginning of school last year," King said.

But the poor drainage — which affects not only the track, but the nearby tennis and basketball courts, and sports fields

- required spending more time to develop solutions and writing a bigger check.

"We raised an additional \$50,000, but the bids were too high," King said this

He's confident the drainage work can be accomplished by school staff with city equipment, and perhaps some help from parents, and that the reworked plan will prompt more palatable bids. The board agreed Nov. 13, directing Blanckmeister and Paul to move ahead with the plan.

"People have been very supportive, helpful with whole project, and we're going to take it forward," King said. "Running is part of the physical education curriculum for the middle school, so it's not just a track-team issue, it's an everybody-in-PE issue."

King said the new track could also be used for meets by other middle schools, which would relieve the high schools from having to make time available on their tracks for younger kids' competitions.

"When it's completed, it will be a really terrific community resource," King said. "Nobody's against it."

The PTA continues to accept donations for the track project, and anyone seeking information can contact King at the middle school at (831) 624-2785.

"John asked me why I don't live in Carmel," he said. "Then he grabbed my hand and showed me a space in the Barnyard. I signed the lease the next day."

The Movahedis credited Waldroup with helping to make their businesses successful.

"As a landlord, he not only gave us an opportunity, but he believed in us," explained Nancy Movahedi. "He believed in a lot of beginners because he remembered what it was like to start out. He knew what it took to make a business go."

But Nancy Movahedi said Waldroup was more than just a good businessman.

"He was smart, he was very compassionate and he was a doer," she remembered. "He was open and he was eager. He



would discuss anything and try anything. We have fond memories of him and we miss him dearly."

Jane Hudson, who has owned Hudson and Co. for 30 years, recalled his legacy as a businessman and as a person.

"He did a very good job with the Barnyard," Hudson said. "He was also a very nice person. I was very fond of him.

> His son, Marc Waldroup, called him "an inspiration" to those around him.

We all miss him very much."

"He treated people the way he wanted to be treated," he recalled. "He was tough, but he was fair. He did everything with tremendous heart."

The son of a farmer, Waldroup was born in Hayesville, North Carolina. An extraordinary student, he enrolled at the University of North Carolina at 15 and was class president at 18. He graduated with a business degree.

In 1972, Waldroup presented his plan for a "culturally oriented leisure and spe-

cialty center in which people, young and old, can enjoy themselves in a cultural, creative or physical activity" — an idea that eventually came to fruition with the completion of the Barnyard Shopping Center four years later. After being owned and operated by Waldroup and his ex-wife, May, for nearly 30 years, the distinctive and beautifully landscaped shopping center was sold to a Santa Barbara firm in 2004.

Waldroup leaves behind three children — sons Marc and Michael, and a daughter, Kristin — and six grandchildren.

A memorial service is scheduled Dec. 30 at the Community Church of the Monterey Peninsula.

tling the dam and removing the silt or leaving the dam in place and hauling away the silt, an "unrealistic" plan, according to Bowie, because it would cost too much.

Frank Emerson, vice president of the Carmel River Steelhead Association, said removing the dam is the only way to fully restore the steelhead trout's habitat. He opposes Cal Am's proposal to buttress the dam.

"It will remain a public nuisance for eons because it will continue to damage the river and be a block to the steelhead population," Emerson said. "And for what in return?"

"There are solutions," Bowie said of the increasing sediment buildup, "but it is still a big problem."

According to Cal Am, a consulting company's report concluded Camp Stephanie, a residential area three miles downstream from the dam, could be flooded up to 6 feet if the dam

failed, and there could be the potential for loss of life. Because the reservoir is now mostly filled with earth, failure of the dam probably wouldn't cause a massive flood.

Although the EIR won't be completed until next year, Bowie said a solution for the dam would probably be implemented before the structure poses any real danger.

"I don't think there are going to be any huge consequences we won't have time to prepare for and mitigate," Bowie said. "In Summer of 2008, construction of [some kind of] project is expected to begin."

Emergency plan

Cal Am, she said, has an emergency plan in place in case there are indications the dam is having problems.

"The dam is constantly being monitored and there are video cameras and a plan that Camp Stephanie could be evacuated immediately if there were any incident out there," Bowie said.

Currently, the sediment at the dam is about 20 feet from

the nearest discharge port through the face of the dam. Where

there was formerly open water, about 5,000 to 7,000 square feet of new land have appeared in the last year, according to Cal Am engineers.

Even if the ports that release the water become blocked, Bowie said there are other ways the company can keep the river flowing and ease the pressure, although those methods don't lower the water level very quickly, Bowie said.


More than 2.5 million cubic yards of sediment have accumulated behind the dam since it was constructed in 1921, according to Cal Am. The dam includes a fish ladder that allows steelhead trout to ascend 68 feet over the dam to use the watershed above. The California red-legged frog, a threatened species, also uses habitat at the reservoir and along the river and creek.



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

At the opening, two sculptures from Richard Mayer and another piece from Norma Lewis will be unveiled in the garden. The installations will be rotated on a regular basis, introducing visitors to a wide range of

contemporary sculpture.

The art center will also present an indoor sculpture show, with works from Robert Arneson, Henry Trinh, Gordon Newell, Barbara Spring, Gary Quinonez and Stefani Esta. The indoor exhibit will continue



jazz pianist Dick Whittington, though, success is something he no longer chases.

"It would be nice to play in New York with some famous names, but I don't really need to do that to validate my music," explained Whittington, who recently turned 70. "The possibilities of piano are endless, but if you don't enjoy the scenery, then you're just passing down the highway.'

"I'm trying to get away from looking at the next horizon," explained Whittington. "I'm realizing that what I have now is really wonderful. I'm trying to savor the moment. I look forward to my next gig."

A retired elementary school teacher, Whittington has loved music — and particularly jazz — for as long as he can remember.

"When I was little, I wanted to play something on the piano that swung," recalled Whittington. "When I was about six or seven, I started playing boogie woogie. All the big bands during the war were doing swing and jazz. You could hear Benny Goodman, Duke Ellington and all that stuff on the radio."

In high school, Whittington played rock 'n' roll, but

unlike most of his fellow students, jazz was his first love.

Now, a half century after Bill Haley introduced a generation of teenagers to rock, Whittington is living his teenage musical dreams, playing cool jazz for a living.

And he's turned another of his dreams into a reality — living in Big Sur. Whittington lives high atop Partington Ridge, where he shares a home with his wife of 30 years, Marilyn, and the couple's three Huskies, Lonso, Bete Noir and Leo.

Living in Big Sur can be challenging, especially when commuting to Carmel during stormy weather. But Whittington said Partington Ridge is a surprisingly civilized

"It's not like people might think," he said. "It's not like we're living in hut. Yes, there are a few inconveniences, but it's quiet, it's not congested, and the air is clean. It's a great trade-off.'

■ Creating a small piece can be a big challenge.



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

Iron Chef Cat Cora heads seven-chef 'Feast for Aids' Dec. 2

You've seen her as one of the embattled chefs on The Food Network's "Iron Chef America" show consistently holding her own against dynamic, sometimes intimidating icons of the culinary world.

But Cora will be here in person as lead chef at the 16th annual Feast for Aids benefit dinner here on the Monterey Peninsula at 6 p.m., Saturday, Dec. 2, at The Beach and Tennis Club, Pebble Beach.

Each of the chefs participating in the benefit is donating time and talent to prepare one course in the seven-course dinner paired with fine wines selected by the restaurants of Pebble Beach and Monterey County Weekly food writer Ray Napolitano.

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

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How to make Thanksgiving leftovers the best part of the weekend

DESPITE METICULOUS planning and years of practice, pulling off a Thanksgiving meal can induce performance anxiety for even world-class home chefs. I find you either nail it just right — moist breast meat, tender legs and thighs, golden brown skin and unforgettable flavor - or you're afflicted with dry turkey syndrome. There's really not much of an in between level of success when it comes to this finicky fowl. As much as I love Thanksgiving — a non-gifting holiday that's all about consumption and giving thanks it's the leftovers that really get my taste buds going. There are endless easy-to-execute options that extend beyond tired turkey sandwiches and microwaved mashed potatoes. In fact, I'm in favor of recycling Thanksgiving fare several times as long as the preparations are interesting.

To show just how interesting the days after Turkey Day can be, I asked some local friends and food-o-philes how they manage to get the most mileage out of the feast's traditional components; here's the dish:

Michael Mastrocola, owner of Millennium Travel in Carmel takes the sandwich concept to new (ahem) heights. He and his wife, Bonné, pack turkey sandwiches with cranberry, mayo, and yams on fresh bread in their carry-on luggage for their annual post-Thanksgiving flight to JFK for

having a separate belt drive around the various pulleys. The advantage to having the serpentine belt is that it is simpler and generally easier to replace than the multiple belts in older vehicles. However, if the serpentine belt were to fail, there would be an interruption in power to all accessories driven by the belt, Thus, it is very important to regularly check the condition of this important belt and replace it when recommend-

Franklin St. here Phone: 375-9571 Green Bu www.pacificmotorservice.com their New York theatre and art tour. "It doesn't get any better than that, and the other passengers around us are envious they didn't think of it!" says Michael.

Ken Peterson, public relations manager for Monterey Bay Aquarium is delegated by his family every year to make turkey soup, which he serves with leftover Irish soda bread that he makes for the main dinner. "It's always a big hit and there's still enough meat left over for sandwiches," he says.

Cindy and Ted Walter, owners of Passionfish in Pacific Grove chop up leftover turkey, add some leftover potatoes






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and stuffing, and form the mixture into patties before cooking it in a frying pan until crispy. "Put a poached or fried egg on top and you have a most yummy breakfast," Cindy shares.

Alan Mello, a.k.a., the Mello Chef dices dark turkey meat and sautés it in an iron skillet with onions and potatoes (diced the same size) to make a leftover hash. He adds his

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
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

favorite spice mix to give it some zip. You can precook the potatoes or dice them small and let them get cooked through in the hash (better flavor). "Don't be afraid to throw in some of the skin for flavor and make sure the pan is seasoned well so that it can brown without sticking," advises Alan. "The trick is to let it all brown evenly for a crisply feel." Alan also reheats cranberry sauce and adds jalapeños to use as a sauce on patés and roast meats. It keeps in the fridge for an appetizer condiment for later in the holidays. He also makes mini meals of leftovers with the gravy and all and freezes them in individual containers for homemade TV dinners.

Annette Hoff, winemaker for Cima Collina, makes creamed turkey with peas over toast. She combines some milk and gravy with maybe a little thickener, adds chopped turkey and peas and serves over toast. Although leftover mashed potatoes are a rarity in her house, when it does happen, Annette makes fried potato patties with eggs for breakfast or a variation on frittata by mixing the mashed potatoes into beaten eggs with some grated cheese. She cooks this mixture for a short time in a cast-iron skillet on the stovetop

and then puts it under the broiler until cooked through. She says the the mashed potatoes give this dish a nice creaminess without being heavy. Annette also makes turkey enchiladas.

Kari Bernardi-Ibsen, Farm to School program coordinator at CSUMB, thinks shepherds' pie is a great all-in-one dish to use up leftover mashed potatoes, turkey, peas and other veggies.

Teri Hunsdorfer of Salinas takes the leftover cranberries and makes muffins for breakfast. Her mother always prebakes her pie crusts and inevitably ends up with extras, so she also makes turkey pot pie with the left over turkey and veggies (green beans, broccoli, carrots etc.) and sweet potato pie with the remaining sweet potatoes.

Paul Miller, publisher of The Carmel Pine Cone, turns Thanksgiving leftovers into a classic casserole from his childhood called Turkey Sopa. Layer triangles of corn tortilla, cubed turkey, shredded colby cheese, diced jalapenos, onions, sliced mushrooms and cream of chicken/mushroom soup in a large Pyrex casserole. Add a final, double layer of tortilla triangles and decorate the top with black olive slices and bits of red bell pepper (be artistic!). Bake covered in a 375-degree oven until the edges bubble vigorously; remove the lid and bake another ten minutes to crisp the top. Serve with guacamole (don't forget to add fresh garlic), salsa and sour cream.

Kelly Baldwin, ceo/manager of Monterey County Fair has been known to make omelettes using all of the leftovers.

Karen Anne Murray, owner of Eddison & Melrose Catering in Sand City uses leftover bread and cranberry sauce to make her signature Cranberry Rum Bread Pudding.

■ Karen Anne's Cranberry Rum Bread Pudding:

- 2 tablespoons of butter, melted
- 1 teaspon of vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon of nutmeg
- 2 teaspon of cinnamon
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 3/4 cup maple syrup
- 4 eggs
- 3 cups of milk (your choice of skim or whole milk)
- Splash of Rum (optional)
- 2 cups of cranberry sauce
- 8 cups of day old bread (cut into large chunks)

Lightly grease a 2-quart baking pan. Pre heat the oven to 350 degrees.

In a large bowl combine the first 9 ingredients. Alternate layers of cranberry sauce and bread cubes in the

baking pan; pour the liquid ingredients on top of the cranberry bread mixture. Push down with a spoon to cover bread with liquid.

Bake for 50-60 minutes until puffed and golden brown. Delicious with vanilla ice cream or whipped cream.

■ Ken Peterson's Turkey Soup

Pick the meat off and boil the carcass with bay leaves; let it cool.

Pull out all the bones and cartilage, skimming the fat and reserving all the meat. Add to remaining meat and return to

Add vegetables of choice (often also left over — broccoli florets, carrots, onions, whatever's handy); and maybe a bit of grain, especially barley.

Season to taste with salt, pepper, and garlic powder. Cook over low heat so flavor develops.

Other optional addition: a bit of white wine.

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


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








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the authority to set speed limits and determine traffic signage. The Monterey County

According to numbers compiled by Faulk, drivers with lead feet might want to ease up in the following areas:

Sheriff's Office, also under contract with the company, handles mostly criminal incidents.

- Forest Lodge Road near Majella Road
- Forest Lake near Bristol Curve
- Lopez Road near Congress Road
- Sloat Road at the Wranglers intersection

Faulk said officers have given tickets in those areas more than other locations in Pebble Beach. But he cautioned officers could be anywhere at any time.

"Our main objective is to prevent the loss of life and injury and accidents, and it's working," he said. "What is the proof? The proof is we aren't having a bunch of people crash."

Pebble Beach officials have said vehicle speeds have diminished since the program began.

Of the 350 tickets, 275 have been for speeding.

Officers have also arrested a couple of drunk drivers and have come across other surprises in their enforcement efforts, Faulk said.

"We are towing a lot of cars for unlicensed drivers," he said. "One day, there were four trucks with dirt and uncovered loads. The (workers) were hired by one of the golf courses, and it turns out none of them had drivers licenses of any kind."

Officers have responded to four traffic collisions in Del Monte Forest while on patrol. That number, he said, is lower than usual for a one-month time period.

While Pebble Beach residents may grumble while trailing slower tourists in Del Monte Forest, Faulk said visitors are not the problem.

"From officers I've talked to, we are (ticketing) commuters," he said. "They are mostly residents who live and work in the area. I think that people who are visiting are uncomfortable driving faster."

The PBCSD has said it may keep the enforcement levels the same or increase or decrease them depending on how effective the program is working.

system to the 100-million-gallon Forest Lake Reservoir, which was completed this year, at a cost of \$12.6 million, also paid for by the P.B. Co. The reservoir allows recycled water to be stored during the winter months, when the demand is lowest, so it can be used to irrigate the golf courses and athletic fields in summer, when demand for water is at its neak.

Activists don't have a monopoly on democracy

AGAIN THIS week, local activists are harping on the Monterey County Board of Supervisors for being "anti-democractic" — this time, because the supervisors refuse to put the version of a new general plan backed by LandWatch before the voters until the courts have finished considering whether it is legal to do so.

We would like to remind these outspoken citizens that county supervisors are elected officials. Their very presence on the board is an example of democracy in action. Just because they don't take the "correct" positions on certain questions of the moment doesn't make them illegitimate.

It's been almost 10 years since people started called the Peninsula's supervisors, Dave Potter, "four-to-one Dave" for his constant isolation on votes at the board. If the four other supervisors — whose names have changed, but not their positions on important local issues — are constantly going against the wishes of their constituents, why haven't they been voted out of office? Put another way: if LandWatch and the Sierra Club know what the people want, why isn't the board of supervisors full of LandWatch and Sierra Club members?

Boom times are the time to spend your money at home

UNEMPLOYMENT IN California last month was just 4.5 percent — the lowest rate ever recorded in the state.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average is at an all-time high.

Gasoline prices are ridiculously low.

And so is inflation.

The only less-than-stellar economic news is the local housing market. But that's only down compared to the sky-high times we've had for the last 10 years. Over the last month, home sales in the Monterey Peninsula totaled \$200 million. That's nothing to be ashamed of for a region with only about 100,000 residents.

So when you're preparing your holiday shopping list, we hope you'll decide to spend a little more than you did last year, and that when you open your wallet, it won't be for online shopping, or at Costco or Wal-Mart. This year, make a pre-New Year's resolution to support local merchants — in downtown Carmel, Pacific Grove and Monterey, at nearby shopping centers, and in out-the-way places such as Carmel Valley Village. 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
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William Webster Downer

The family requests that any memorial gifts be sent to the Historic Garden League, 210 Oliver Street, Monterey, 93940.

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



VOYAGE

We had set a waypoint about a mile off Point Lobos to be sure that we gave the point a wide berth. Point Lobos is not lit, and it loomed vaguely off our port bow as we steamed by. We have looked at this amazing-

ly beautiful point of land so often over the

years that we could see what was not visible. A boat with a high-powered fishing lamp was well out to sea. We aimed for it until we were well clear of Point Lobos and the rocks that scatter out from it, before turning south toward the Point Sur light.

It turned out to be nearly a totally windless day so we powered all the way to San Simeon, rounding gorgeous Point Piedras Blancas late in the day and dropping our anchor in San Simeon just prior to night fall. In our 12-hour passage along the Big Sur coast, we did not meet a single vessel.

This lack of traffic made me laugh when I thought about the California Coastal Commission's concern a few years ago about the impact of Big Sur development on the viewshed of boaters along the coast. Not only were there no other vessels going down the coast that day, it was difficult to see any structures on land from the typical safe dis-


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Christmas tree lightings, holiday festivities in Carmel, P.G. and Monterey

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Feed a foodie's fantasy with these choice gastronomic gifts

F YOUR favorite gastronome already possesses every possible kitchen gadget; if his cupboards Lare packed with the latest in trendy, esoteric ingredients from faraway lands, or if her wine cellar overflows with bounty from the world's best vintners, perhaps the gift of experience — and calories — is the proper holiday choice.

The Monterey Peninsula provides a plethora of food-and-wine events, but a few stand out above the rest and would make any recipient of such generosity salivate in anticipation.

■ The final Masters

After two decades holding court at the spectacular Highlands Inn on Highway 1 south of Point Lobos, the decadent Masters of Food & Wine - which attracts visitors from all over the world for four days of eating, drinking, tasting and learning — will be held there for the final time Feb. 22-25, 2007, according to food and beverage director Robert Weakley.

While Hyatt may elect to present MF&Ws at its other hotels around the world, he said, "It's been a

Weakley began organizing the MF&W — his sixth

since joining the Highlands Inn — more than nine months ago. It takes a lot of research, planning, wooing and legwork to organize the opening night reception, lunches and dinners that have several chefs sharing the hotel kitchen, cooking demonstrations, wine tastings and the lavish Rarities Dinner.

"We bring in big-names chefs to anchor the dinners, but we also look for chefs doing something really different," Weakley said. "On the wine side, we try to find smaller wineries that are more obscure and are just making great wine."

Each year, more than 600 wineries request to participate, but only 60 are selected. "The wineries are included purely by invitation, so we can keep the reputation as high as everyone has come to know it," he said. "And for the chefs, we get hundreds also, but we only take 20."

Booking highly acclaimed culinary talent also

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



sometimes requires wooing. Weakley visited food and wine festivals across the country and traveled to Boston, New York and Chicago. Whenever a culinary

"We make sure to communicate with them all the time, so it's not just when we're calling and asking them to attend," he said.


The list of 20 chefs and 60 wineries, many of which are already confirmed, will read like a foodie's dream.

Deodeck will represent their New York City establishment, wd-50, and Michel Richard of Citronelle, in Washington, D.C.; Gina DePalma, pastry chef for Mario Batali at Babbo in New York; Michael Ginor, Hudson Valley Foie Gras; Charles Phan of San Francisco's Slanted Door; Daniel Humm, Eleven West Madison in New York City; Susan Spicer, Herbsaint/Bayona in New Orleans; Gary Danko of San Francisco, and Herve Fucho, executive chef of the Four Seasons, Punta Mita,

Mexico, have also committed.

Mark Ayers, executive chef at the Highlands Inn, will exercise his creative skills — and kitchen management talents, with all these chefs working in his domaine — as well.

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


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Picking and choosing

The MF&W packs in so much, it's impossible to take part of it all.

One of Weakley's favorites is the Feb. 22 opening night celebration, which is particularly popular with locals. Thirteen chefs will prepare and serve small bites out in the open for all to see, and all 60 wineries will pour.

"It's great, because the chefs are right out there in front of you putting food on your plate" he said. "It's a fun night, a great reception and an unbelievable

For the oenophile, he also recommends "vertical tastings," which offer rare opportunities to sample scarce wines and discuss them with winemakers and sommeliers. For 2007, Weakley arranged seminars featuring Opus One (the Napa Valley winery known for producing pricey Bordeaux blends); exquisite French white Burgundies, and a "Champagne tasting that's going to be incredible," including the 1976, 1985, 1988 and 1990 vintages of Krug, Dom Pérignon and Veuve Clicquot La Grande Dame.

"If you're a wine connoisseur, there's nothing better than to sit down and go through 10 vintages of some of the finest wines in the world," he said, and without the cost or the risk of spoilage.

"We have a team of 12 sommeliers who go through every single bottle to make sure they are in pristine condition," he continued. "They make sure they are what you're meant to taste and smell and experience."

Other Weakley favorites are demonstrations hosted by various chefs. There, they inform, entertain and tempt the palates of audience members — who don't get to taste but will leave with a new cookbook and valuable tricks of the trade. Weakley said he's still scheduling appearances.

Where the stars shine

The lunches and dinners are the true stages at the MF&W, with chefs assigned particular courses and matched with specific wines.

"When you get an opportunity to have five or six of the world's top chefs cook a meal, and they're all trying to outdo each other, it's amazing,' Weakley said. "And dinner at any one of their restaurants would run you an astronomical amount, especially with wine pairings."


To help the chefs prepare, Weakley sends each a bottle of the wine that will accompany their dish, and they begin forwarding their menus in early December so he can ensure there are no duplications.

We don't want any fights in the kitchen because two chefs have the same food item," he said.

It takes about seven weeks to locate and order all the ingredients, many of which are obscure and hard to find. "Sometimes we think it's a little game the chefs play with us," he said.

Supplies begin arriving the Monday before the event, and to shed a little light on the scale of the Masters of Food & Wine, Weakley said, "We go through

25 pounds of truffles a year, at about \$900 a pound, so we can't even find just one distributor who can accommodate the amount truffles we need."

One Masters offering is solely for the few who aren't put off by the words, "astronomical amount," when planning a night's outing.

At \$5,000 per plate, the Rarities Dinner is intimate and exclusive, with the culinary stars pulling out all the stops to wow a small group of fortunate guests. Mind-blowing wines — some worth as much as a new car — accompany each course.

But MF&W events are priced to accommodate almost any gift-giver's budget, running from \$100 to \$5,000. They will go on sale around Dec. 1, according to Weakley. Visit www.mfandw.com.

■ Truffle is your middle name

For anyone enticed by the aroma and taste of truffles — the sort rooted out by pigs and dogs in Italy and France, not those created by chocolatiers — Cal Stamenov, executive chef at Bernardus Lodge in Carmel Valley, will offer his 10th annual Truffle Dinner Friday, Dec. 8.

The chef first put a whole black truffle in his mouth — a very expensive bite — while working for famed chef Jan Louis Palladin, whose restaurant in Washington D.C.'s Watergate Hotel offered what was likely the most expen-

sive menu in the country in the early 1980s. His truffle-themed dinners cost \$110 per person.

"It's definitely an acquired taste. The first time, it tasted like dirt," Stamenov said. "But over the years, it takes over part of your brain, and you can smell truffle anywhere. The brain picks it up and desires it more and more."

That can be an expensive addiction, and anyone so afflicted would be in seventh heaven at Stamenov's six-course Truffle Dinner, which this year will include guest chef Nancy Oakes of Boulevard Restaurant in San Francisco. Mark Jensen will select the wines, and new pastry chef Ben Spungin will prepare the desserts.

"Last year, we had two guest chefs, and that got a little crazy," Stamenov

said, with three people "running around trying to outdo each other for only 40 people."

The evening will begin, as is tradition, with fine champagne and the chef's signature Black Truffle Infused Grey Goose Martini. "We always seem to have about a cup left from the year before," which is added to new Vodka, along with frozen and fresh truffles that macerate, imparting their flavor.

Stamenov adds new flair to traditional, sophisticated fare to keep his Truffle Dinner guests, many of whom return annually, captivated.

"We try to shake it up," he said. "We always try something different."

Last year's menu included white truffle fondue, which prompted guests to get "a little more interactive," while it also featured the must-have classical risotto with truffle shaved tableside.

"There are a lot of smells going on," he said. "We try to maintain that."

To illustrate, Stamenov provided past menus that listed bluefin tuna seared sashimi with black truffle-foie gras crostini, grilled squab over black truffle cassoulet, lamb rib-eye with celery root fondant and black truffle mirror sauce, and dover sole with truffle-leek emulsion.

Final courses have arrived in the form of black truffle panna cotta with sweet truffle chips, quince-black truffle pâte de fruit, white truffle Madeleines and truffle roasted apple with hazelnut cake and black truffle ice cream.


"We generally buy three to five pounds of black truffles and four pounds of white truffles," Stamenov said, from France and Italy. "I personally prefer black truffles, because they build their flavor when you cook with them. White are generally more delicately flavored, and you have to shave them over everything. I just like the bolder flavor of the black."

Jensen selects traditional wines, such as Riesling, French Bordeaux and Italian offerings, but he also searches out some unusual offerings. "He tries to use wines from around the world," Stamenov said.

Tickets to the 10th annual Truffle Dinner — possibly the last of its kind — are \$500.

"Next year we will just change the

DOWNTOWN SHOP owners are allowed to adorn their windows, doors, arches and trees with festive lights for seven weeks each year.


That's when the Carmel Municipal Code Grinch steps aside, allowing a temporary reprieve from the usual no-lights rule — provided people stick to a few simple rules:


- "Lights are not permitted on trees which have a trunk diameter of less than 3 inches, measured four-and-a-half feet above the ground."
- "Lights must be hung in a manner that will not damage a tree or other public property. Nothing

that will cause holes in trees — such as nails, pushpins or staples — may be used."

- "Lights shall be removed if, in opinion of the forest, parks and beach director, they are damaging a tree." (Due to budget cuts, Carmel no longer has a forest, parks and beach director, but city forester Mike Branson has the responsibility of enforcing the Holiday Lights policy.)
 - "Tracer or flashing lights are not permitted."
 - "Only lights may be installed on public trees.

Scott recalls rich moments watching her while she devotedly mixed chocolates, creams and sugars. After graduating college, Scott's career path included time working for Shell Oil in Houston Texas as a financial analyst and later in Salt Lake running several coin laundry businesses. These were both exciting and profitable endeavors, but soon he would embark on a career that drew upon both his entrepreneurial enthusiasm and his heartstrings.

When Grandma Lula's age prevented her from the continuing her robust candy business, she cut back on production and made chocolates exclusively for family and friends. Supportive of her efforts, Scott applied himself to learning the candy-making techniques behind her success. In time, his kitchen prowess was considerable. "What began as a fun hobby became my focused interest," says Lund.

When Lula passed away just before her 100th birthday, Scott and his wife, Jennifer commemorated her spirit of giving by picking up where she left off: making her famous chocolates for all of their family and friends. This gesture
