'The scope, brilliance and versatility of his career is unmatched in modern American film'



The official citation calls him "the iconic image of the Old West and its eternal values," and describes his Hollywood career as "unmatched in modern American film." But when Clint Eastwood was made part of the inaugural class of the California Hall of Fame Wednesday in Sacramento, his tenure as Mayor of Carmel-by-the-Sea was also on display. Coastal staff rejects pilot desal plant

THE COASTAL Commission's influential executive director, Peter Douglas, and his staff are recommending California American Water not be allowed to operate a test desal plant in Moss Landing, raising serious questions about the company's plans to provide the Monterey Peninsula with a drought-proof water supply and stop illegal pumping from the Carmel River.

The recommendation, if adopted by the commission at a meeting in San Francisco next week, could make it impossible for Cal Am, or anyone else, to follow through with plans for a large-scale desal plant to solve the Peninsula's water

Catherine Bowie, Cal Am's community relations manager, said Tuesday the water company was taken aback by the recommendation the permit for the company's pilot plant be denied.

"The sole reason for the [desal] project is to protect the Carmel River," said Bowie. "The coastal commission has approved other pilot desal facilities and as recently as October they were talking about giving us a waiver on this application."

The pilot plant, Cal Am contends, would provide necessary data and statistics for the company's Coastal Water Project, which includes a much larger desalination plant and aquifer storage and recovery system. The pilot plant is currently sitting unconstructed at the Moss Landing power plant.

Tom Luster, coastal commission analyst, downplayed the staff report's potential implications.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COORDINATOR CANNED

HIRED IN February to develop a strategy for boosting business in Carmel, Greg Sellers was fired Nov. 29 when city administrator Rich Guillen advised him the city will take its efforts to grow revenues in a new direction.

"We didn't really fire h just ended his contract," Guillen said this week. "What I told Greg was, if I could do this all over again, I would have first had the council and community define what they mean by 'economic development.' It's such a broad term."

In most communities, economic development refers to rebuilding blighted neighborhoods, filling vacancies, and retaining and recruiting businesses, according to Guillen.

Library's holly hoisted to new home

JUST IN time for Christmas, Dianne and Jim Brun planted holly in the front yard of their Camino Real home, but it didn't come in a portable plastic pot from a nursery. Instead, the 11,000pound, 20-foot tree arrived via crane and tractor trailer from the


garden at Harrison Memorial Library Wednesday morning.
"I've started calling her 'Holly," Brun said, as she watched crane operator Buddy Crafton carefully raise the tree, thread it through two Monterey pines, lower it onto the bed of the truck and then lay it on its side to pass safely through Carmel's streets. "It's become personal."

The Bruns hadn't initially planned on giving the holly a new home, but when Dianne learned the Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club's remodel of the library garden calls for its removal, she desperately wanted to save it. "The tree was going to be cut down and thrown away," city forester Mike Branson said, because it's nonnative and not large enough to be considered "significant."

In addition to demolition of the old planters and pathways to make way for new stone paths and benches, the library garden will be replanted with native, drought-tolerant species. (With construction set to begin Monday, the library entrance will move to Sixth Avenue.)

"One of the directives on the landscape plan is to create wheelchair-accessible paths from Lincoln Street to the reading room," Branson said. "The slope has to come down to accommodate that, and the tree was in the way."

In addition, Walter Guthrie, the landscape architect who designed the new garden, wanted to return the library garden to the way it looked before the holly was planted years ago, Branson said.

P.B. Co. asks that its permit be rescinded and supervisors comply

THE MONTEREY County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously Tuesday to rescind its approval of a Pebble

Beach development proposal so the voter-driven measure behind the plan can be sent back to the California Coastal Commission for review.

The rescission will allow coastal commissioners to independently review Measure A, overwhelmingly approved by voters in 2002. The measure had been submitted to the coastal commission alongside a development plan that calls for a new 18-hole golf course and 160-room hotel in Del Monte Forest. Together, the proposals seemed headed for certain defeat at the coastal commission last summer.

Alan Williams, president of Carmel Development Co., hired by the Pebble Beach Co. to shepherd the plan through the development process, told The Pine Cone he wanted supervisors to separate Measure A from the development proposal. Monterey County supervisors approved the entire plan in 2005.

"It turned out to be a chicken and egg problem," Williams said. "We have to separate the issues, because the coastal commission has it mixed up. It's more of a procedural step so the commission can deal with the measure separate from the project."

'What the staff recommended years ago'

Although the Pebble Beach Co.'s proposal would protect most undeveloped land in Del Monte Forest from future development and drew widespread support from county voters, environmental activists oppose any development — and especially a new golf course — on land they deem "environmentally sensitive habitat."

"This is what people in the community have been trying to communicate to the supervisors for many years," said North County resident Julie Engell. Her comments came despite a 60 percent Yes vote on the broad outlines of the P.B. Co. development plan, which includes a new golf course, driving range, equestrian center, hotel rooms, underground parking at the Lodge and Spanish Bay, 60 new employee residences, 34 residential lots, and road and infrastructure improvements.

The plan would also place more than 900 acres into conservation easements. In addition, the company would forgo creating hundreds of home lots, allowed under zoning approved by the coastal commission in the 1980s.

Mark Massara, attorney for Sierra Club, said the board should have heeded the commission's original recommendations to wait until it had a chance to review Measure A. Supervisors, ignoring the recommendation, approved the plan in 2005, prompting numerous environmental groups to file appeals.

"It's astounding," said Massara, who did not attend the meeting. "Here we are six years and millions of dollars in the process, and they [supervisors] decide to do what coastal commission staff recommended years ago."

In June, the Pebble Beach Co. withdrew its application for the development project a day before coastal commissioners were scheduled to vote on the plan.

Despite rescinding their earlier approval, supervisors Tuesday also voted for a resolution of intent to approve the project in the future. Supervisor Dave Potter, who sits on the coastal commission, was a lone dissenter. "I will be seeing this project again," he said, "and I don't want to give the impression it's perfect as is."

The coastal commission could take up the issue during its March 14-16 meeting in Monterey.

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Teens assaulted in dispute over girl

A BRAWL between two teenage boys fighting over a girl ended with one headed for Monterey County Juvenile Probation last week.

"It was an individual who was jealous and basically attacked this younger boy, and proceeded to throw him around and so forth. There were multiple witnesses to it," said Carmel Police Sgt. John Nyunt. "The younger boy was unable to do much of anything, because the other was so big, and he also made threats, such as, 'I'm going to kill you."

The fight occurred at Santa Rita and Fourth at around 3:30 p.m. Nov. 27 in front of about 10 other teens who "were rather shocked the whole thing occurred," according to Nyunt.

The group of kids helped the victim make his way to the nearby Carmel Youth Center, where they told the director what occurred, and youth center staff called police.

The victim, a Carmel High School student, sustained minor injuries, mostly scratches and minor abrasions, and Nyunt commended him for not losing control of his own emotions during the altercation. The suspect is a 16-year-old Carmel Valley High School student.

"It was not like a small scuffle," he said.
"This was clearly a situation where the individual was much bigger and much stronger than the younger boy. It was inappropriate and not tolerable, and he should be held accountable."

Nyunt said the parents were responsive and willing to help police try to prevent future conflicts.

"They wanted to do something, and we explained to the victim's parents how part of our job is to make sure these kinds of incidents don't escalate," he said. "It's a situation where you want to get it while it's small—put this fire out right now. It's just not tolerated."

Police cited the alleged aggressor, whose case is being processed by juvenile proba-

Motorcyclist killed after driver fails to see her

A CARMEL woman reportedly struck and killed a Salinas motorcyclist when she pulled out in front of the rider in Salinas Saturday. According to California Highway Patrol public information officer Larry Starkey, Diane Dawson, 77, did not see 51-year-old Cydney Casper riding her 2007 Harley-Davidson westbound on Davis Road, and drove into the road from the stop sign at Hitchcock Road.

"The motorcyclist was unable to avoid a collision with the vehicle and collided with the side of the Toyota right in front of the driver's door which ejected the motorcyclist onto the roadway," he said. "The only explanation we have at this time was she did not see the approaching traffic."



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There is no evidence Casper, who was following her husband on the ride, was speeding.

"Her husband was on the scene" after the collision, Starkey said. "He had recognized his wife was no longer behind him and turned around."

She sustained major injuries, including head trauma, internal injuries, a broken pelvis and compound fractures in her left leg. Casper was pronounced dead at 3:36 p.m. Dec. 2 at Salinas Valley Memorial Hospital.

The driver was also taken to SVMH after complaining of pain to the left side of her head and left shoulder, according to Starkey. He did not say whether Dawson would be cited.

Floor heater suspected in guesthouse fire

FIREFIGHTERS SUSPECT something left on top of a floor heater caused the fire

that scorched the floor of a Carmel Valley guesthouse last week.

A woman on El Camino Estrada saw smoke and flames inside the building and dialed 911 at 7:11 last Wednesday morning.

"She came out of her residence. It was a guesthouse on her property, and she saw smoke and some flames," said Carmel Valley Fire Capt. Jim Smith. "She called 911 and used a garden hose to knock it down."

Responding from the mid-valley station just down the road, firefighters declared it doused eight minutes later, according to Smith, and engines en route from neighboring jurisdictions were canceled before they even arrived.

"The homeowner on scene helped us," he said. "She acted very quickly, and the fire was basically confined to the floor area of the structure."

Division chief Ron Lemos said someone likely left a flammable item on top of a floor heater.

He estimated the resulting damage at \$5,000 to the structure and \$2,000 to its contents.

Lemos reminded residents to be mindful of placing anything that can burn near a wall or floor heater.


"Maybe we can prevent someone else from doing it," he said.



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Disabled tenant refuses to move out

AN ELDERLY and disabled resident at Rippling River is refusing to move out of her longtime home at the affordable living complex in Carmel Valley to make way for a major renovation project. In response, her landlord, the Monterey County housing authority, has issued a notice evicting the tenant, Carolyn Metcalf, from her unit.

"I like being on level ground," explained the 63-year-old Metcalf, who is wheelchair-bound. "I think that's a reasonable request. This is my home and I've been here for 30

While returning Metcalf to her unit after construction is finished might seem reasonable, the complexities of the renovation project could make it difficult.

"Since the timing of the construction is extremely critical, and there is very little room between phases and because of her refusal to move out of her unit, the housing authority had little choice but to proceed with the notice to terminate," countered Mary Jo Zenk, deputy executive director of the

According to John Dalessio, a longtime advocate of Rippling River and a now a housing authority commissioner, federal regulations require tenants to stay in a unit for at least a year before moving. The housing authority wants to move Metcalf into a unit in another building while her building is renovated. The agency is not able to set aside her former unit so she can return a year later.

Zenk insisted Metcalf is not being evicted from Rippling

"We are not evicting her from the Rippling River property, just from her current unit so that it can be rehabilitated,"

Zenk said Metcalf is being treated just like any other Rippling River tenant.

'No resident has been promised a return to their current unit at the end of the rehab," she insisted. "All residents have the ability to select a unit in their particular phase in the order of their move-in date. Since Ms. Metcalf is not No. 1 [based on her original move-in date] in her group, there is no guarantee that her current unit will not be selected by another resident who is above her in priority."

Zenk said the housing authority has not been able to offer this to any other resident with similar needs and




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
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Feds urged to stop buying up Big Sur land

THE IMPENDING purchase of a portion of Big Sur's Chapman Ranch by the United States Forest Service and the Trust for Public Lands brought new objections this week from residents who fear public ownership of large tracts will mean the end of their rural communities.

The TPL and the forest service announced their intention Nov. 22 to purchase 460 acres of the 1,100-acre Chapman property, which is also known as Ranch Calera. The property is located off the Old Coast Road, about 15 miles south of Carmel. A purchase price has not yet been determined.

The chilly response from residents at a meeting Dec. 5 was hardly unexpected. Since the idea of a Big Sur National Park was raised three decades ago, many locals have been vocal in their opposition to the continued public acquisition of private land in Big Sur they claim is destroying their community.

At this week's meeting, about 25 residents — most opposed to the purchase — met with Marc Landgraf of the the Trust for Public Land and U.S. Forest Service officials Bruce Emmons and John Bradford. For many who attended the meeting, the announcement of the impending purchase came as a surprise.



"People like to hear about deals like this before obligations are made," explained Mike Caplin, a longtime Big Sur resident and president of the Coast Property Owners Association.

Pacific Grove resident and land use consultant Arden Handshy echoed Caplin's comment.

"You're going to acquire the property and that's something we don't have a say in," said Handshy.

Landgraf responded that involving the public earlier in the process could have jeopardized the transaction.

"We want to be as open as we can," insisted Landgraf. "But if we opened up a public process too soon, the landowners would not have participated. We're not being secretive. We're trying to be as upfront as we can. We want to do what's right for the community."

Monterey attorney and avid hiker Aengus Jeffers questioned why public money is available for land acquisition and not for land stewardship.

"I don't think this transaction should go through if the funding is not available to manage it," suggested Jeffers. "The trails [in the Ventana Wilderness] are in horrible shape."

Big Sur resident Barbara Woyt agreed with Jeffers' assessment.

"This whole wilderness has been horribly neglected," declared Woyt, who accused the forest service of "not fulfilling its basic obligation" to maintain public lands.


Not all Big Sur residents oppose the land acquisition. Lorri Lockwood sent a letter this week to Landgraf which praised the impending purchase.

"The Trust for Public Land offers us the opportunity to preserve [the late Jo Chapman's] ranch for the plants and wildlife she loved," wrote Lockwood, who has long lobbied for the removal of exotic plants in Big Sur. "If Jo wanted mansions on it, she could have more easily subdivided and

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



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

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Draft general plan means status quo for Monterey Peninsula

 $W_{\rm HILE}$ THE Monterey County Board of Supervisors hopes to adopt its contentious and long-awaited draft general plan in less than two weeks, the document will have little impact on the Monterey Peninsula.

The plan, the county's 20-year outline for rural development, doesn't call for any changes to Peninsula zoning, most of which is set by coastal development rules.

"As far as the coastal areas," said 5th District Supervisor Dave Potter, the draft general plan "won't have any effect."

Carmel, Pebble Beach, Pacific Grove and Big Sur are largely bound by Local Coastal Programs, adopted by cities and the county under guidelines set by the California Coastal Commission

The LCPs contain ground rules for future growth and pro-

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tection of coastal resources on the Peninsula and more than 70 other coastal cities and counties.

Carmel Valley, which is in unincorporated Monterey County, is not covered by an LCP. However, the county's general plan leaves existing zoning in the valley basically unchanged. A few properties — including the mouth of the valley, Gardiner's Tennis

Ranch and the former Carmel Valley airport — are being considered for zoning changes.

"If it was to be determined that Carmel Valley Village should be an area for concentrated development," said Potter, "that would impact traffic on Carmel Valley Road, water use and water quality issues, and possibly septic issues."

Revising the county's 1982 general plan has been under way for six-years in a process that's cost millions of dollars. The latest draft was approved by the county's planning commission Oct. 25 after a series of public hearings. According to supporters, it protects the county's scenery, open space and ag lands while allowing enough growth to provide jobs and housing for its growing population.

Opponents of the supervisors' plan, led by slow-growth advocates LandWatch Monterey County, have proposed an alternative plan, an initiative they want taken to voters. The

group contends the supervisors' plan would allow too much growth.

The initiative limits substantial new development to five communities in the unincorporated part of the county — Boronda, Castroville, Chualar, Pajaro and Fort Ord.

While supervisors are expected to adopt the draft Dec. 19, Potter cautioned if supervisors deviate too much from the draft approved by the planning commission, there is risk the environmental impact report would need to be recirculated.

"If you mess with the recommendations from the planning commission, you will make it legally invalid," Potter said.

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
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"They have been warned about making those wholesale changes because that's what the EIR is based on."

A series of public hearings on the general plan have been going on since November. The last two hearings are set for Dec. 12 and Dec. 19 in the board of supervisors' chambers at 168 W. Alisal St., Salinas.

The students decided to form a local chapter of the Claremont-based nonprofit. They obtained seed money from Morgan Stanley in Monterey, and their four families contributed \$200 each.

The group worked with the IRS to obtain 501(c)3 nonprofit status, made signs publicizing their new charity and began soliciting donations of backpacks filled with shoes, clothes and other school supplies. By contacting school counselors to determine who needed what, they distributed some at the start of the academic year and plan to hand out more around Easter, according to Peres. The items are stored in a warehouse near Monterey airport until they can be given to the students who need them.

'We started with students in the Carmel Unified School District, but when we went around, we realized there wasn't as much need as we thought there would be," he said.

Consequently, the group is considering reaching out to other Peninsula public schools.

And knowing how judgmental people can be, the founders of Shoes That Fit Monterey Peninsula also learned the importance of discretion.

We discussed what would happen if we saw a kid wearing the shoes we gave them, and we came up with a confidentiality statement we all signed," Peres said. "If we see someone with shoes we supplied, we wouldn't say anything."

In a community known for its generosity, but where requests for charitable donations are frequent, Peres said it hasn't been difficult to ask for help, and people "have been pretty receptive so far."

The fledgling chapter is slowly accumulating the shoes, clothing and backpacks that will help students "attend school in comfort and dignity," meeting the nonprofit's mission.

"I'm just excited to see it unfold," Peres said. "And what we're going to be able to do for kids is going to be good."

AFTER WINNING two Grammy Awards and scoring a string of hit singles in the late 1970s and early 1980s, Rita Coolidge could be excused for resting on her laurels after turning 60 last year.

But Coolidge, who will perform at Sunset Center Monday, Dec. 11, clearly isn't ready for retirement. On the contrary, she appears to be just getting started. Thirty-seven years after her performance of "Superstar" on the Joe Cocker and Leon Russell "Mad Dogs and Englishmen" album put her on the road to pop stardom, Coolidge is reinventing herself as a jazz singer.

"Jazz has been the love of my life," explained Coolidge in an interview this week. "It's 'forever music.' Jazz goes everywhere. I always wanted to do a jazz record, but no one would let me."

Coolidge — once a familiar voice on the radio with singles like "(Your Love Has Lifted Me) Higher And Higher," "We're All Alone" and "All Time High," is a bit of a musical chameleon. She got her start in the music business as a background singer for rockers like Cocker, Russell and guitar heavyweight Eric Clapton. It was during this time her vocal abilities began to attract the attention of her contemporaries. Russell was so inspired by her that he wrote a hit song for Cocker about her, "Delta Lady." Russell evidently assumed anyone with such a soulful voice must be from the Mississippi Delta region.

"That was a lack of knowledge on Leon's part," laughed Coolidge, a Tennessee native who even today is sometimes referred to as the "Delta Lady." "There is no delta in the Smoky Mountains."

Coolidge's rock career was shortlived.

After meeting Kris Kristofferson, whom she married in 1973, Coolidge began recording country music. The pair recorded several duet albums and earned Grammy Awards for Best Country Performance by a Duo or Group with Vocals in 1974 for "From the Bottle to the Bottom," and in

1976 for "Lover Please." Other career highlights include the inclusion of her last big hit, "All Time High," in the 1983 James Bond film, "Octopussy," and her appearance on a series of recordings in the 1990s that explored her Native American musical heritage.

For Coolidge, the transition from rock to country to pop to Native American music

Bohler is a powerhouse blues woman who has been frequently compared to Tina Turner, Janis Joplin and Bette Midler for her genuine strength as a stage performer and rich vocal tones. seems natural. She credits the legendary vocalist Peggy Lee with inspiring her flexibility and versatility.

"When I was growing up, I loved listening to Peggy Lee," Coolidge recalled. "She went from pop and country, to jazz and big band. She did everything.'

Long an admirer of Lee, as well as vocalists Billie Holiday and Ella Fitzgerald, Coolidge finally decided last year to enter the recording studio with a jazz combo.

"It was very intimidating," she admitted. "It was a real challenge. I know I can sing, but in jazz, you need a pedigree just to get in the door. And the musicians I was playing with were just fantastic. In the back of my mind, I wondered how radio, and my fans, would accept the album."

The result of those recording sessions is "And So Is Love," 12 songs backed by a gifted, if somewhat understated, jazz group. The


players give Coolidge room to stretch out her vocals, and she delivers. While most of the selections on the recording are somewhat obscure covers, she puts her trademark on popular standards like "Cry Me a River," "I Thought About You" and "Come Rain or Come Shine." Coolidge also takes her hit, Boz Skaggs' "We're All Alone," and gives it the jazz treatment.

Like most jazz recordings, "And So Is Love" attained only modest sales, but it picked up some very favorable reviews. And perhaps most importantly, the recording satisfied Coolidge.

"Recording that album has been my greatest musical thrill," insisted Coolidge with no hesitation, no small statement for two-time Grammy winner.

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

describe how to implement city goals, their costs, a time line and the anticipated results. He would also generate new ideas on how to boost economic activity in town.

Sellers received his walking papers before he ever had a chance to make a presentation to the city council, though he turned over a draft report to Guillen.

"I was looking forward to presenting that to the council, and I hope they will at least consider some of those points," Sellers said, adding that the Carmel work was one of his favorite projects. "We were able to put into motion a lot of good things that will hopefully come to fruition."

Among them, Sellers said, is an attempt to bring more wine tasting into town, an idea embraced by several restaurateurs and newly offered by several businesses. The city also has dedicated wine-tasting venues, including Galante and Southern Latitudes, both on Lincoln Street.

Sellers also spent time asking business people what would make their jobs easier while preserving the city's character. Changing strict rules, such as those for signs, was a frequent suggestion and "one of the things I wanted to talk to the council about," he said. Sellers also said parking congestion downtown must be remedied.

But those concepts aren't new, according to Guillen. "It just rehashed things we already know," he said, such as improving parking, involving art galleries in city events and upgrading hotel rooms.

Chamber irked

Michael Adamson, a member of the Carmel Chamber of Commerce's economic development committee, said he was shocked the city let Sellers go. "I was surprised they wanted to get rid of him before he even presented his plan," he said.

As a member of the EDC, Sellers was always receptive to ideas and put the required legwork into researching them, according to Adamson.

"We all appreciated his input," he said. "He had a lot of good suggestions, and he knew everyone."

Guillen agreed Sellers attended numerous meetings and developed good contacts. "People were comfortable with him," he said.

Recently reelected to the Morgan Hill City Council, Sellers also understands municipal government and has a lot of experience in destination marketing, according to Adamson. "I hate to lose that expertise," he said.

But Guillen questioned the wisdom of continuing to pay

for Sellers' services. Since his contract took effect Feb. 9, Sellers received \$37,912.59, which also covered an exploratory trip to Aspen, Colo., with former city councilman Erik Bethel and other business leaders.

"I can't say it was entirely his fault — I need to take responsibility, too. Maybe I wasn't giving him exact direction," Guillen said, though that might have been difficult. "We identified we want something, but we haven't identified what we want, and that's a difficult position to put anybody in."

Adamson wondered at the timing of Sellers' dismissal, which coincided with the departure of Bethel for a job in Shanghai, China.

"We have Erik Bethel suddenly quitting, and the next thing we knew, Greg Sellers is gone, and they had been working very well together, too," he said. "It's disappointing to me, because I felt in the last two years, the chamber had developed a good relationship with the city."

He said some are also dismayed the city-hired advertising firm, Anda-Burghardt, has designed and implemented a city website similar to, and apparently in competition with, the chamber's.

But Guillen said he hopes there is no animosity between the chamber and city hall, and he credited Sellers with being part of the overall effort to improve business in Carmel.

"I do not want to lose the excitement that's been generated, and I hope we'll just build from there and keep the momentum going," he said. "There have been a lot of good things, and Greg was a good part of that."


Sellers hopes the termination of his contract isn't the end of his relationship with the city.


"I just appreciated the opportunity to work in Carmel," he said. "People were tremendous, and I hope to be able to work there again."

"I thought it would be such a shame to lose that tree — it's perfectly healthy and thriving," Dianne said. She hoped the city would find another location for it.

But "we weren't interested in paying to move it," Branson said, so Brun asked if she could.

Receiving the go-ahead from city hall, she and her gardener, Robert Luster, sought an estimate from David Teas of Environmental Design, the nationally known company that transported a 200-year-old cypress tree on the Pebble Beach Golf Links' 18th Hole four years ago and which regularly handles similarly heavy work at Pasadera and Tehama.

After the Bruns were quoted a price they were willing to pay (but which they wouldn't disclose to The Pine Cone), Luster's workers dug a hole in their front yard large enough for the mature tree's boxed roots.

Meanwhile, Teas' crews excavated the soil around the tree Tuesday and secured its root ball in a wooden box so Crafton, using a huge King Crane Service rig, could move the tree from the ground to the bed of a truck.

Crafton said the most difficult part of the job was not getting the tree onto the truck, but tipping it over for the ride through town.

With the holly safely lowered, driver James Vargas made his way to the couple's home at the south end of town, and Crafton uprighted the tree, then hoisted it up and over low-slung electrical lines and into the hole in the front yard.

"I asked what the chance of survival is, and David said we're moving the tree at a very good time of the year," Dianne said. "He's an expert and a genuinely nice guy."

said he is glad they wished to save the holly, even if it's not on the city's list of approved trees.

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
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Cal Am delays Carmel Valley water main project

The work on Carmel Valley Road between Scarlett and Rancho Fiesta roads is expected to lead to 10-minute delays. The project — which is just one phase of a much larger project aiming to replace 23 miles of aging water main — was scheduled to be completed by Christmas. Now it will resume Dec. 26.

With miles of water main needing replacement, Carmel Valley residents will likely be experiencing road delays for years.

Chef Trinidad is another Oaxacan cooking haute cuisine

OAXACA, MEXICO, is known historically for its export of chocolate to Europe, starting in 1502. Lately, it has become the chief exporter of cooks to Monterey County.

Drop in on any commercial kitchen in Carmel, Pacific Grove, Monterey, Marina and Seaside, and dollars to donuts — pesos

to churros — you'll find a Oaxacan. Or maybe even a kitchen full of Oaxacans.

Chef de cuisine Lorenzo Trinidad is

no exception. In the kitchen of da Giovanni Restaurant in downtown Carmel-by-the-Sea, he is in charge of two line cooks, a prep cook and a dishwasher. Trinidad has worked his way up from dishwasher to top chef in outstanding restaurants during the past 15 years here.

Trinidad, now 31, came to the Monterey Peninsula from Oaxaca as a teenager, a neophyte in the restaurant industry. He worked for nine years at Abalonetti Seafood Trattoria on Fisherman's Wharf in Monterey, then moved over to Robert Kincaid's Boulevard Bistro at the Crossroads in Carmel, where he worked as a prep cook for two years.

Then, four-and-a-half years ago, he was hired as a cook at da Giovanni, where he worked his way up to chef de cuisine.

As a young man in Mexico, he learned how to cook from his mother, but when he

came to the United States and found work in local restaurant kitchens, he knew nothing of our cuisine. He kept his eyes on the chefs, line and prep cooks, and little by little he learned the more sophisticated cooking for which the Monterey Peninsula is justly proud. He learned English, too. Chef Trinidad has been back to visit his mother and father in Oaxaca five times in the 15

years he has been on the Monterey Peninsula.

"I love to cook
— everything," he said. His signature dishes at da


Giovanni are cannelloni and halibut in filo.

The restaurant's owner, Firok Shields, who is of Sicilian, Greek and Turkish extraction, was raised and educated in England, where he was an aerospace engineer and later owned two successful restaurants. The most well known was Limelight Restaurant in Cheltenham, west of London.

Entrepreneur Shields has introduced old family recipes to the menus of both his Carmel-by-the-Sea restaurants — da Giovanni, on Lincoln Street, and his newest restaurant, Bistro Giovanni, two blocks east on San Carlos Street — both of which bear the appellation "ristorante Mediterraneo." Chef Trinidad helped create the menu for Bistro Giovanni.

To truly reproduce the inherited recipes,



Shields is a stickler for authentic ingredients, including the use of herbs and spices. He has instructed Chef Trinidad in his own special method of dry roasting spices individually in a heavy pan on the stovetop. He buys quality spices in San Francisco and San Jose on a regular basis.

Once a month Shields and Trinidad prepare 11 spices, including nutmeg, fennel seeds and cardamom. First dry

roasting them, being careful not to overroast, they then grind the spices when cool and incorporate them into a little olive oil. The prepared spices are then stored for use throughout

the month in many different dishes.

A dinner restaurant, da Giovanni features seven appetizers and six soups and salads. Pastas figure prominently on the menu, some with chicken, sausage, clams, jumbo tiger prawns, crab, and several vegetarian pastas of cheese or veg-

Entrees are varied: mousaka, involtini di pollo, salmone fresca, Jordanian style osso buco, veal piccata, Chilean sea bass, rack of lamb, New York strip steak and "filetto divino." Specials are introduced nightly, and desserts are all house-

Unlike many restaurant chefs who work a seven days a week, Trinidad works five days and has two days off to enjoy time with his wife, Elvira, and three children: 11-year-old daughter Veronica, 6-year-old Lorenzo Jr., and 6-month-old





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You don't have to be snowed in to enjoy a holiday cocktail

OUR HOLIDAY weather isn't exactly what a Christmas caroler would call frightful.

But your holiday guests will still enjoy having their spirits warmed. All you have to do is put up some decorations, start a fire in the fireplace and mix a batch of festive cocktails, such as Mistletoe Martinis, a Egg Nog Lattes, or Hot Angels (recipes below).

When you're entertaining a large group, maximize your mingling time by pre-mixing your cocktails whenever possible. Keep drinks in creative containers on ice — I like clear glass carafes. If you want to avoid the hassle (and expense) of stocking a complete bar, keep things simple by offering a limited menu of cocktails, plus an assortment of beer and wine (don't forget the champagne!), along with something (of course) for those who'd rather not imbibe. (Cranberry juice with a splash of sparkling water and a lime wedge is a pretty and refreshing alternative.)

■ Hot Angel

At Cielo at Ventana Inn & Spa, the delicious and oh-so decadent Hot Angel takes the edge off of the coastal fog or northwest wind on a Big Sur winter evening.

What you need:

1 cup low-fat milk or half and half (depending on the guest's preference)

3/4 ounce Frangelico 3/4 ounce Creme de Cacao Splash of simple syrup Nutmeg

How to make:

First, steam the milk to a frothy richness.

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

"Even if the commission denies the pilot plant, that doesn't put a halt to everything. It just may suggest a different direction," Luster said.

But the report — with its wide-ranging objections to even the smallest desal operation — clearly underscores the quandary Cal Am faces. On one hand, the State Water Resources Control Board, since 1995, has ordered Cal Am to find an alternative to pumping from the Carmel River because of impacts on the steelhead trout and threatened red-legged frog populations that inhabit it. If the water company doesn't comply, it faces heavy fines that will be passed onto water customers.

But a new dam on the Carmel River is blocked by federal wildlife officials protecting the habitat of the steelhead trout and redlegged frog.

In September 1998, then-Assemblyman Fred Keeley sponsored legislation requiring the state public utilities commission to study alternatives to a dam on the Carmel River. That recommendation, known as Plan B, was to build a desal plant on Monterey Bay — a recommendation that may be thwarted by the coastal commission.

"So it kind of puts us in the position of having contradictory regulators," Bowie

In August, Monterey County supervisors approved a permit for the pilot facility. That permit was appealed Sept. 15 by coastal commissioners Patrick Kruer and Mary Shallenberger. In October, the commission found the appeals raised "substantial issues."

The 23-page coastal commission staff report recommended commissioners deny Cal Am the coastal development permit for the pilot plant because it "does not conform to sections of the Coastal Act and the county local coastal programs related to public health and welfare, and protection of water quality and marine biological resources."

"One, is the county's requirement that desal be owned and operated by a public entity," Luster said.

County officials have said the public ownership requirement doesn't apply to the pilot plant because it won't produce water for human consumption. But the coastal commission report says the county doesn't understand its own ordinance.

"The ordinance, in fact, defines a desalination facility based on the quality of water it produces, not whether it is consumed by humans," according to the report.

'Very low contaminants'

According to the coastal commission staff report, discharges from the desal pilot plant would have "very low contaminant concentrations ... and would likely result in few adverse effects."

Still, "we also identified that there may be some mitigation measures that weren't included in the project that could be," Luster

Specifically, according to the report, Cal Am's proposal did not include "an assessment of water quality impacts to public health that may result from the discharge."

Bowie said the water company feels the staff analysis of the pilot facility represents an about-face in its position. In October, the commission approved a coastal permit for a pilot desal plant at the University of California Santa Cruz Long Marine Laboratory, she pointed out.

But Luster denied the coastal commission staff flip-flopped.

"All of these [projects] get a case-by-case review," Luster said. "It's hard to say it's an about-face, since each of these get their own analysis."

Cal Am's pilot facility would use up to 288,000 gallons per day of seawater pumped from the power plant's once-through seawater cooling system. In contrast, the power plant uses up to a billion gallons per day of seawater to cool its generating units, according to the staff report.

Cal Am would operate the pilot plant for up to one year. The testbed would draw seawater from the power plant's cooling system and treat it to drinking-water standards. The brine produced by the desal plant would be added to the power plant's outflow before being returned to Monterey Bay.

"The pilot facility would operate only when the power plant's cooling system operates, so it would not result in any additional seawater being drawn into the cooling system," the staff report indicates.

However, the pilot operation, which would process seawater through two parallel pretreatment trains and reverse osmosis systems, would discharge various treatment and cleaning chemicals, polymers, coagulants, and other similar water treatment chemicals. Most of the contaminants would be routed to a sanitary sewer system, although some would be discharged into nearby coastal waters, according to coastal commission


Cal Am is joined by two other companies proposing water solutions to the Peninsula's water problems. Poseidon Resources Corp., in partnership with Pajaro/Sunny Mesa Community Services, also wants to build a desal facility in Moss Landing.

A Florida-based outfit, Water Standard Company, has proposed using ship-based seawater conversion plants as a method of desalination.

"I think everyone is aware of all the water issues in Monterey," Luster said. "This is not going to say that Monterey is not going to have a chance to resolve the issue. It's just in this case, staff is recommending that pilot plant not be approved."

Coastal commissioners, including Monterey County Supervisor Dave Potter, will consider the pilot plant at their Dec. 14 meeting in San Francisco at the Hyatt Regency Embarcadero.


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Alleged bike thief tries to retrieve stolen wheels

sold parcels during her lifetime. As she did not, I feel we must respect her decision and keep it in open space."

For some residents who fear their community is being swallowed up by the federal government, the suspense of not knowing what properties the forest service is seeking to acquire is stressful. Resident Jeanne Ford suggested the forest service identify on a map which properties it is interested in. "I'd like to see what the plan is, and I'd like it to be clear," she said. "The community could then relax and we could end this adversarial relationship.'

But Landgraf said ending an adversarial relationship is a "two-way street."

Planning the future of Big Sur requires the government and the community to "work together," he reminded the audience.

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

Editorial

The fix is in

SO THE coastal commission's staff doesn't think even a test desal plant can be built on the shores of Monterey Bay without causing unacceptable environmental damage.

December 8, 2006

That news must come as quite a shock to former Assemblyman Fred Keeley, who surely doesn't consider himself a greedy developer or even a puppet of greedy developers.

Indeed, Keeley was the Environmental Hero of another era — that ancient time known as eight years ago.

In those innocent days, preventing a new dam from being built on the Carmel River was the true cause, and Keeley was its high priest.

Building a new dam — behind which would be stored the water Mother Nature desalinates from the ocean and delivers for free in the form of winter rain — was considered an urgent necessity by many after the State Water Resources Control Board issued its famous 1995 order that this community quit pumping the Carmel River dry every summer. A dam much larger than San Clemente or Los Padres would be the only way to keep the river flowing all year, while guaranteeing the people of the Monterey Peninsula a plentiful water supply even in drought years, they argued.

But Keeley felt there must be a better way — one that would cause less damage to the upper part of the river, where steelhead trout go to spawn. In 1998, he sponsored legislation that required the California Public Utilities Commission to study alternatives to the dam — a study that came to be known as Plan B.

Prepared by experts hired by the PUC and thoroughly reviewed by officials and the public — all at great expense to Peninsula water users — Plan B was unveiled in the summer of 2002. It's conclusion? Build a large desal plant on Monterey Bay. Remember: This was the environmentally superior alternative to building a dam.

Surely Keeley considered stopping the dam and sponsoring Plan B to be among his proudest achievements while he served in the state legislature.

But having the legislature and numerous state agencies sponsor the idea of a desal plant as the best way to supply water to the people of Carmel, Pebble Beach, Monterey, etc., while protecting the environment, apparently isn't worth a pile of beans as far as the coastal commission's staff is concerned.

Their report, made public last week, which condemns the idea of even a tiny pilot desal plant as being too damaging to the Monterey Bay environment, contains not a single word about the water shortage afflicting the Monterey Peninsula, the dire threat of a drought that hangs over this community, or of the destruction wrought in Carmel Valley by continual over-pumping of the river.

In fact, the report — on which so much depends — does not even contain the words "Carmel River." It also does not mention Plan B or the SWRCB's momentous Order 95-10.

The purpose of building a desal plant was to save the river — once the environmentalists' most treasured goal. But apparently all that has now been forgotten. And, despite all the effort expended by Keeley and so many others, we now find out that the fix is in. This community cannot have a water supply, the people who are truly in power have apparently decided. Because once we have one, our board of supervisors and city councils will be able to make their own rules for land use and development. And that, it turns out, cannot be permitted.

Counting on LAFCO Dear Editor,

I would like to comment on some of the public reactions to the decisions made by LAFCO at the Oct. 18 hearing on Carmel Valley incorporation.

For well over a month now, we have been bombarded by press reports about how LAFCO sold out the people's right to vote by imposing an "arbitrary" EIR requirement. The commissioners have been variously described as shills for developers, a disgrace to their office and hapless dupes of the Great Satan, Tony Lombardo.

In contrast, I recall the actual hearing, in which LAFCO commissioners discussed their obligations and the concerns they had with specific problem areas in the executive officer's report. To reinforce these recollections, I listened for hours to a tape recording of the entire proceedings, which is available through the LAFCO office.

After listening to public comments on the subject, commissioners discussed their own views on the incorporation and its report. They spoke of concerns about boundaries, about the adequacies of the fiscal data, about social and cultural differences in the valley, about the handling of requests for exclusion, about impacts on the county, about indemnification requirements, about meeting state housing mandates ... and about the inappropriateness of a negative declaration in the face of these complex and interrelated matters. Little or any of this has been mentioned in the letters and editorials that have been published so far.

The members of LAFCO need to know that not everyone has been taken in by these partisan attacks. They had a job to do and they did it. The design of LAFCO makes them responsible for approving the final incorporation proposal. The executive officer's report was the first comprehensive view of the project in its entirety. They found it wanting in several respects, and so voted. This was not arrogance on their part. It was an exercise in judgment born of their experience as mayors, county supervisors, district officials and the public at large. This is a

For this, LAFCO commissioners have



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
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Tony V. de Sugny
