Concerns over herbicide used on P.G. dunes

THE CITY of Pacific Grove has halted spraying invasive iceplant with a well known herbicide because of concerns by environmentalists the chemical could harm endangered species and the coastal environment.

Pacific Grove is in the midst of a massive effort to restore some of the sand dunes around the city's golf course. A big portion of the project involves using the herbicide Roundup to kill about 20 acres of invasive iceplant that has overrun native plant species such as the federally protected Menzies' wallflower and Tidestrom's lupine.

But the P.G. City Council requested Rana Creek, the Carmel Valley environmental planning company hired to restore the dunes, provide a report that includes the effects of Roundup, a commercial herbicide, on the environment.

"To kill this much iceplant," said Lee Willoughby, one of several Pacific Grove residents concerned with the use of Roundup, "there has to be some runoff, and it goes right into the tidepools. I think it's a major concern."

Former Pacific Grove City Councilwoman Susan Goldbeck wrote a letter to the city requesting more information about the use of the herbicide.

"Of particular interest is," Goldbeck wrote, "who is doing the Roundup and when are the planned applications?"

The city stopped applying Roundup, a widely used,

Victim's dying words implicate shooting suspect

THE LAST words uttered by 55-year-old Elizabeth Ellington Grimes before she died of gunshot wounds Monday implicated her Carmel Valley neighbor, John Franklin Kenney, 72, in the shooting of her and her husband,

58-year-old Melvin Noble Grimes Jr., according to Monterey County Sheriff's Chief Deputy John Darling.

In what has become the county's most notorious double homicide, deputies arrested Kenney outside his home that evening, and he remains in Monterey County Jail without hail

"Mrs. Grimes was conscious and speaking," Darling said, "and told deputies Mr. Kenney was responsible for the shootings."

Darling wouldn't say specifically what she told them, however.

"I don't want to get into that kind of detail on a case that's still open," he said.

An obituary for Elizabeth and Mel Grimes is on page 8A

Struck by two or three bullets in the chest and arm, Elizabeth Grimes died while being transported to San Jose Medical Center. Shortly after the shootings, an ambulance crew drove her to the old airport in Carmel Valley Village, where a CalSTAR helicopter arrived to take her to San Jose

It was her statements, and other evidence at the scene, that led deputies to arrest Kenney on suspicion of the murders. Darling said his office filed a statement of probable cause when Kenney was jailed.

According to managing deputy district attorney Ed Hazel, Kenney

'Roll models' showcase wheelchair haute couture at New York gala

IT SEEMS like an oxymoron," said Carmel Highlands resident Marilyn Hamilton. "Fashion and wheelchairs — how do those go together?"

Hamilton, who invented a lightweight wheelchair shortly after a hang-gliding accident left her paralyzed from the waist down almost 30 years ago, knows they do.

Next week, during New York's big Fashion Week, her Quickie wheelchairs will drip with haute couture. Tuesday night, Hamilton and her co-chairs — Wendy Crawford of Miami, Fla., Julia Stockton Dorsett of Boca Raton, Fla., and Ashley Lauren Fisher of Morristown, N.J. — will present a black-tie event to raise money for paralysis research. And to

show women who use wheelchairs can be as

fashionable as anybody.

"We're combining glamour, fashion and

philanthropy," said Hamilton, who cofounded the nonprofit Discovery Through Design to raise awareness of disabled women's health initiatives and spinal cord injury research. "We decided we would go after couture designers in New York and ask them to create a fashion look for a wheelchair."

They bit. Lloyd Klein, St. John Knits, Zang Toi, Marc Bouwer, Kimora Simmons and others committed to creating "original designer wheelchairs and couture outfits to match." Hamilton said the gala reflects her motto: "If you can't stand up, then you should stand out!"

Among the designers is Stephanie Meyer of Stephan Cori in the Crossroads.

"She's doing a whole line of changeable wheelchair accessory looks — dress up your chair as well as dress yourself — all interchangeable," Hamilton said. "She's my designer and is taking a touch of Carmel to New York to compete with the couture designers in New York."

Attendees of the Feb. 6 gala at Cipriani on 42nd Street, with Leslie Stahl emceeing, will see the designers' cre-

ations in living color on four "roll models" selected in a national search: Jenny Smith, Melissa Holley, Michele Boardman and Rosemarie Rossetti. The four chairwomen, who are paraplegic and quadriplegic, will also receive custom-designed chairs.

"There's an 80-20 rule that 80 percent of people in wheelchairs are men, and there's not a lot of attention given to

After long days on their own, a crowded trip to Baja

WE HAD made it from Carmel to San Diego pretty much on our own, taking our 36-foot sailboat, Athena, through some of the most treacherous waters the coast of California offers. But our adventurous solitude was to be shortlived.

In fact, myself, my wife, Nellie, and our friend, Tracy Call, had more than enough company for the next leg of our journey — to Cabo San Lucas, at the southern tip of Baja California. We would make the voyage as part of the "Baja Ha Ha," an annual sailing rally from San Diego to Cabo San Lucas founded 13 years ago that is unsurpassed in terms of the number of participants.

Oct. 30, an amazing 163 vessels — 159 sailboats and four motor yachts — sailed out of San Diego Bay. It was the largest Ha Ha ever.

Although it is not truly a race, each of the three legs of the Ha Ha has a start and finish line, and all of the boats keep

their times.

The Ha Ha Race Committee divides the fleet into more or less comparable divisions, the names of which illustrate the event's jocular spirit. Examples are Burrito, Desperado, Enchilada, Guacamole, Huevos Rancheros, Margarita and, my favorite, No Comprende — for the motor yachts. We were in the Frijole Division.

Imagine the starting line in San Diego. It was probably a couple of miles long, a thrilling sight of sail and water spreading from Coronado Roads in the south all the way up to the entrance to the bay.

"Latitude 38," Northern California's popular sailing magazine, sponsors the event, and the publication's 65-foot catamaran, Profligate, served as the race committee boat and Ha Ha headquarters.

The right side of the line

In sailboat racing, there is always a favored side of the starting line. It may be apocryphal, but I once heard that legendary Carmel sailor, the late Harvey Kilpatrick, always said, "Stay on the Mexican side of the line." That we did, and we got off with the leaders. Thanks Harvey!

The rally is divided into three legs: Leg One is San Diego to Turtle Bay, a distance of 320 miles; Leg Two is Turtle Bay to Bahia Santa Maria, 240 miles: Leg Three, Bahia Santa Maria to Cabo San Lucas, 180 miles. At each stop there are numerous parties, the biggest of which are beach parties in Turtle Bay, Bahia Santa Maria and Cabo San Lucas. At these parties, participants have a chance to meet one another and build friendships,

We sailed the Ha Ha with an expanded crew of five. Nellie, Tracy and I were joined by Tela Favalaro of Corral de Tierra and Chris Blain of Sausalito.

Keeping track of 163 boats

The first leg was cold, especially at night. We sailed mostly well off shore, as the Baja coast bends away to the east. The second and third days we never sighted land during the day, picking up the coast only at the end of the third day as we approached Turtle Bay.

Sailing off shore is serious business with many inherent risks. Although the spirit of the Ha Ha is lighthearted and the goal is for everyone to have a good time, safety is the number-one priority. One of the great values of the rally is the potential for mutual support in case of emergencies. Besides the safety-in-numbers factor, there are hugely talented people in the fleet who can fix almost any-

In addition, the team on Profligate, headed by "Latitude 38" founder, Richard Spindler, runs a daily radio check in. Every morning each boat checks in reporting its position and any problems it might have. Keeping track of 163 boats is a tough job, but the team did it admirably.

Ron and Leslie Sherwin, who live in Carmel Valley, were part of the staff on Profligate. I had met Ron about five years ago when he was interested in buying our previous boat. They were a great resource for us.

Retirement dreams

In Carmel, we are all familiar with peoples' dreams of the ideal place to retire. Many of our neighbors have fulfilled their retirement goals in our exceptional village. The Ha Ha is filled with people realizing their retirement dreams. But these dreamers are all sailors, a breed who long for far away places arrived at by sea. Our "dream" for this trip was simply to do a season in Mexico and then go home.

> Many of our fellow sailors, it turned out were much more ambitious. Most were couples, some heading to the Caribbean, via the Panama Canal, others to the Marquesas in French Polynesia. Others really didn't know where they were off to. They planned just to go wherever the current whim took them.

What happens to many of these folks is that they get to La Paz, Mazatlan or Puerto Vallarta and never leave. The last port of call becomes their retirement home. Some will eventually sell their boats and move into condos.

The most fascinating



DMC calls for end to union picketing

THE PRESIDENT of DMC Construction, a company that's been the focus of intense picketing by the local carpenters union for nearly two years, is calling for an end to the

Since July 2005, Carpenters Union Local 605 has been involved in a picketing campaign against DMC, because

"We want it to stop," said Dan McAweeney, president of DMC Construction Inc. "It's obnoxious and embarrassing, and it's gone on long enough."

The picketers, mostly immigrants from Mexico and other Latin American countries, are not union members and are paid solely to picket.

Since July 2005, the sign holders have staked themselves in various Peninsula locations where DMC is working including several places in Pacific Grove and at the entrances to Pebble Beach. They arrive promptly at 7 a.m. and are usually gone by 3 p.m.

While McAweeney insists the picketing has not had a major impact on his business, he said the protest is annoying

"It's really an unsafe condition at our driveway," he said. "People come down Forest Avenue at 45 mph. We have seen near misses. We think it's a dangerous situation. They have been out there for so long people aren't seeing them any-

Most of the picketers don't create any problems, but there

Exploding stroller tire harms man, baby

We had some rain last weekend. But that barely put a dent in the deficit so far this year. In fact, since July 1, rainfall has been about 30 percent below average. For the Monterey Peninsula, that makes conserving water more urgent than usual.

If we don't all work together, we could exceed water usage limits intended to protect wildlife on the Carmel River. Our water supply is at stake, and so is the environment.

You have the power.

Please be extra careful to use water wisely. Here's how you can save hundreds of gallons each week:

- Water plants and lawns only when they really need it.
- Check sprinkler settings to avoid over-watering.Use low-flow hose nozzles whenever possible.
- Use dishwashers and washing machines only with full loads.
- Take a five-minute shower instead of a bath.
- Turn off the tap while brushing your teeth and save 10-20 gallons each day.

Thank you for doing your part.

Peninsula residents lead California in wise water use. Especially during these dry months, we hope you will continue conservation efforts to help protect the Carmel River and the wildlife that depends on it.

Carmel Valley B&B could lose its permit

IN A hearing overshadowed by the murders of two residents of the same neighborhood two days before, the owners of a Carmel Valley bed and breakfast were accused Wednesday of illegally hosting weddings, events and concerts and renting more units to overnight guests than allowed by their permit.

After hearing a slew of complaints, the Monterey County Planning Commission unanimously voted this week to schedule a public hearing March 28 that could result in the revocation of the bed and breakfast's use permit.

"Clearly there have been violations," said planning commissioner Jay Brown before asking, "Do we give these folks a chance to clean up their act.?"

At the March hearing, planning commissioners have an opportunity to revoke or modify the permit, which allows Frank and Sandy Dobronte to operate bed and breakfast at 350 Calle de Los Agrinemsors. The permit, which was issued in June 2005, allows for the conversion of an existing 6,300-square-foot home into four short-term rental units.

Numerous complaints

Planning commissioner Martha Diehl and code enforcement officer Cami Pelletier reported receiving numerous complaints about the B&B, which is now known as "Las Fuentes - A Concierge Villa." Among the concerns were congested traffic as a result of weddings on June 10 and Oct. 14, the hosting of a Carmel Valley Women's Club meeting Sept. 6 that was attended by about 60 people, the scheduling of a "wellness" seminar Oct. 30, and charges the Dobrontes were renting out five units. According the use permit, only four units can be rented, and to qualify as a B&B, the Dobrontes are required to live onsite. In marketing materials, the caretakers' unit is referred to as the "Carmel Cottage" and can be rented "upon special request."

In addition, the use permit states the B&B "shall not be affiliated with hotels or motels operating anywhere in the County of Monterey." During a lengthy e-mail correspondence with a county employee posing as a potential guest from Texas, Sandy Dobronte allegedly made references to the B&B's affiliation with the Bernardus Lodge and Quail Lodge and boasted of a "wonderful partnership"

Officials: Paramedics on fire engines will save minutes, lives

THE CARMEL Highlands and Cypress fire protection districts, which cover parts of Carmel and Pebble Beach, should hire paramedics to ride on their engines, their boards of directors unanimously decided last week after learning the change would get critical help to patients more quickly. The votes followed previous discussions of the concept by elected officials in both districts late last year.

Presently, fire engine crews can only provide patients with basic life support, such as first-aid, stabilization, CPR and administration of an automated external defibrillator. More complicated procedures have to wait until an ambulance

According to the staff report presented to the Highlands Fire board Jan. 16, November response times showed an engine from that station reached the scenes of emergencies three to 17 minutes earlier than the ambulance, and rarely later. Board member Jim Rossen said it appeared Highlands residents are getting "the short end of the stick" in regards to ambulance service.

"The citizens of the district would receive much faster

THE AMERICAN Heart Association's new protocols for cardiopulmonary resuscitation will be taught at a free class presented by the Carmel Fire Department Saturday, Feb. 24,

The course will run four to five hours and will ensure members of the public, as well as police and medical personnel, receive the AHA's practical updates and changes. Each student will be provided a copy of the American Heart emergency medical services if an ALS paramedic engine program was implemented," assistant chief Robert Taylor wrote in his report for the Highlands Fire board.

And even if the improvement is just a few minutes, that time could be critical, particularly when it comes to the health of heart or brain tissue affected by heart attacks and strokes, according to Capt. Skip Ratsep.

"It might be two minutes, but that can mean life or death," he said.

According to Ratsep, the cost of adding paramedics would be about \$100,000 per fire engine per year at the Highlands station. It could be lower at Cypress Fire's Rio Road and Carmel Hill stations.





Grimes, 58, along with his wife Elizabeth, 55, were shot to death at their Carmel Valley home Monday, reportedly by a neighbor over an apparent land dispute. A suspect, John Kenney, was taken into custody and is being held in

Monterey County jail without bail. Everyone The Pine Cone interviewed described Mel Grimes as a professional with a laid-back demeanor.

Grimes remembered

as 'laid-back' lawyer

with passion for surfing

Frank Dice, a friend of Grimes' with whom he shared a law office with on Gabilan Street in Salinas, said Grimes was always a pleasure to work with.

"He is one of the most underrated criminal defense lawyers I've ever met," Dice said, "and I've been in this business 30 years or more. He was really a remarkable human being full of life. I still haven't gotten my head around it. Everybody liked him."

Dice said the news of Grimes' death even affected two people Grimes represented.

"Two clients broke down in the office today," Dice said Tuesday. "When clients have that sort of reaction, it's pretty remarkable, actually."


Besides enjoying running and being a devout blues and jazz music fan, Grimes was an avid surfer known to many in the local community. The Hawaiian Island of Kauai was one of his favorite places to be, Dice said.

"Maybe some of the surfers could dedicate a wave to him," Dice said. "Or have a nice run and dedicate it to him. That's how he would like to be remembered."

Retired defense attorney Bob Hatcher was a legal partner with Grimes, and both shared an office in Pacific Grove years ago.


"We were friends for over 30 years," Hatcher said. "He and I were very, very close. We had a tradition of spending birthdays together. He was just a mellow kind of guy. It took a hell of a lot to make him angry. He was interested in practicing law, surfing and running.'

Grimes was a huge music fan and served on the Monterey Bay Blues Festival board of directors, Hatcher said.

"He was a a big music collector," he said. "When we were in P.G., there was a guy who used to come by in a flatbed truck with wooden sides on it. He traded and sold records, and Mel would sit there for hours looking through those records and he would by a whole box or two boxes of records."

When computers slowly made their way into their law office, Hatcher said Grimes, resisted the technology.

"We dragged him kicking and screaming into the 21st century," Hatcher said. "He didn't want anything to do with computers. Then he found out about eBay, and you couldn't get him off of there."

Grimes would often auction off records on eBay for much more than the pennies he bought them for, Hatcher said.

First death penalty case

Together, Hatcher and Grimes represented Kristin William Hughes, who was convicted in the 1989 stabbing death of masseuse Kim Hickman in her Pacific Grove apartment. The trial was one of the first death penalty cases on the

"I was lead council and he was second chair, as we say," Hatcher said. "He took the guilt phase and I took the punishment phase and sentencing."

Hatcher said Grimes and his wife Elizabeth complemented each other well. She was a nurse who had retired from the field. Hatcher said.

'She was a cute, little mellow thing," he said. "They tried to have a baby once but it didn't work. She couldn't carry it."

Attorney Jim Newhouse, a Carmel Valley resident who knew Grimes for 25 years, called Grimes a "client's lawyer" who would do anything to help those he represented.

"He took care of his people; he was just a good guy,"

Newhouse said. "He was one of those guys who left no stone unturned for his clients. A lot of lawyers do it an easy way ... cop a plea and get out. That was not his style. He would take it as long as it would go even if he lost money in the deal. Mel was a sweet guy."

Although Grimes had a heart attack a few years ago, Newhouse said he was still an avid surfer who went on surfing trips once in a while.

Billy DeBerry, president of the Monterey Bay Blues Festival board of directors, said the Blues Festival office was hit hard at news of the Grimes' deaths.

"I thought we might have to have grief [counselors] because of the impact it had on each of our members," DeBerry said. "We were walking around like zombies, not believing it."


Eventually the blues festival will replace the Grimes', but after they grieve their loss, DeBerry said.

Moody said his interaction with Grimes in the courtroom over the years was always pos-

"Mel was one of the best criminal lawyers in the county," Moody said Tuesday. "He was a very capable guy. He was real charismatic and interesting. He was a real low-key but very interesting person to have around. Everybody liked him. He was a straight shooter. I had a lot of respect for Mel."

If Grimes ever had a concern in court, there was usually a legitimate reason for it, Moody said.

"He was not one to blow smoke," he said. "He was a careful scholar. He was professional in his demeanor and presentation and was always very respectful.'

For a period of time, Grimes specialized in drug cases and specifically represented people charged with growing marijuana, Moody said.

"This is a real shock," he said. "He is is one of the good guys in the system. He will be deeply missed."

Mel Grimes also gained the respect and friendship of local law enforcement officers.

Warren "Pete" Poitras, a part-time investigator with the Carmel Police Department, described Grimes as a "straight shooter" and called him one of the best four criminal defense attorneys in the county.

"Even though he was on the opposite side," Poitras said, "he was always a gentleman and a real class act."

Carmel Police Sgt. John Nyunt said Grimes was never adversarial in court.

"Mel Grimes was a good guy, a good attorney and we had a good relationship with him," Nyunt said. "And he was friends with some of the people in our department, too. It's a shame, really a tragedy. He was a consummate professional."

'How could I defend him?'

Defense attorney Larry Biegel, who knew Grimes as a colleague and friendly competitor, was stunned to hear of his death Tuesday. Biegel learned of the homicides through his receptionist.

"I was shaking for a half-hour," Biegel said. "It's just awful. I have never felt so dev-

"You see, all of us deal with clients who have emotional, irrational reactions," he said. "But to get a gun and shoot somebody? I have seen so many handguns hurt so many people. I am so upset people have handguns in their houses. This is not Baghdad."

Grimes was unique among local defense attorneys, Biegel said.

"He was just the most relaxed and laidback of all of us," he said. "He always had a smile on his face. He wore these colorful ties and usually never had his collar buttoned to the top. He left it a little loose."

Grimes, who grew up in Carmel, attended Carmel High School, then University of California Santa Barbara, and had served on the Big Sur International Marathon board of directors.

"Always around March, he would say to me, 'Are you running the marathon this year?" Biegel said. "It became a yearly joke. He was a terrific lawyer."

Because of Grimes' many friends in the legal community — among prosecutors, defense attorneys and judges — Biegel said Kenney could have a challenging time finding legal counsel in the county.

"I don't know if it would be a conflict of interest," Biegel said. "But I wouldn't touch that case. I think that gentleman is going to have to find competent representation elsewhere. How can I defend a guy who killed a friend of mine?"



ping the conditions of their use permit.

"I want to speak about honesty and accountability," Robinson said. "An entire hearing in this chambers focused on whether events could be held. The owners have not earned your trust."

Planning commissioner Don Rochester said he was surprised to learn about the hosting of events at the facility.

"I was totally assured that this was nothing but a B&B," Rochester said, echoing Robinson's concerns about what was discussed at the previous planning commission hearing.

Owners apologize, vow no ill intent

Bessire said the couple is sorry for Sandy Dobronte's use of the word "affiliation." Bessire did, however, suggest "she was baited" by a county employee when she posed as a customer.

"The Dobrontes never wanted to do anything that doesn't comply with the conditions of their use permit," Bessire insisted.


Responding to charges that the Dobrontes can't live onsite when they've rented out their lodging, Bessire countered that "there has never been a case where they're rented out the caretakers' unit." He said the couple would simply move to another room onsite if they rented their unit.

After Bessire suggested some events were a reasonable use for the facility, supervisor Keith Vandevere countered that "the reason we said, "No," to events is because of traffic concerns."

When the project first came before the public at a land use advisory committee meeting Feb. 7, 2005, neighbors worried about the impact it would have on traffic, particularly on narrow, winding Southbank Road, which navigates Hitchcock Canyon.

In response to concerns about the traffic generated by the B&B, Bessire said the Dobrontes are paying \$80,000 in traffic impact fees to the county.

Unless there are additional violations of the use permit, the B&B will be allowed to remain open until the March 28 hearing. Van Horn said they will need a permit from his department if they serve food to guests.



have been a few incidents when union officials have been present, McAweeney said.

"They do their best to be intimidating to people coming in and out of our parking lot," he said, referring to the DMC headquarters on Forest Avenue in Pacific Grove. "When the [union's] business agents are around they are more aggressive. We have had people out here who have spit toward the office whenever someone drove out with a DMC truck."

Although not illegal, the union's picketing campaign has been less than tasteful at times. In 2005, Local 605 representatives placed a giant inflatable rat with fangs in front of Robert Louis Stevenson lower school, where DMC was working. Some parents were outraged by the stunt. Picketers also stood outside the Sally Griffin Active Living Center until work by DMC was completed last year.

The picketing, McAweeney said, is Local 605's last resort in trying to get DMC, a private company, to pay what the union considers the "prevailing wage." DMC says it pays its employees based on job experience and qualification.

"We have 150 employees," he said. "We have never had any of them decide they want to be part of the union."

The Pine Cone made numerous attempts to speak to union officials. Local 605 representatives declined to comment, and instead directed questions to union offices in the Bay Area. Messages left there were not returned.

DMC is the fourth local construction company Local 605 has targeted on the Peninsula. In earlier campaigns, the picketing lasted for exactly two years to the day it began, McAweeney said. If the union sticks to that schedule, the picketing at DMC will cease at the end of July.

The union does not provide its picketers with health insurance, retirement or other benefits. One picketer said he was paid less than \$9 per hour, far less than what the union demands DMC pay. Picketers are not provided bathroom facilities but are provided two breaks during their work day, according to picketers who spoke to The Pine Cone.

A long, contentious history

Although the picketing began less than two years ago, the union's dispute with DMC goes back long before that.

"The carpenters union has been trying to get DMC to sign an agreement with them for 30 years," McAweeney said.

In Fall 2005, frustrated with the picketing, McAweeney said he met with union officials in Oakland to discuss how working with the union could benefit his company. He said the union wouldn't discuss it and only came back with demands. "I got a phone call later that afternoon," according to McAweeney. "They said 'you have two weeks to sign a contract.' It was an 'our way or the highway attitude."

Although McAweeney said DMC has lost a couple of jobs because clients didn't want to risk being picketed, he also said his "business is stronger than its ever been."

"But in trying to discredit us the union has discredited themselves," he said. "It's embarrassing, obnoxious and somewhat comical."







Carmel winter a relief for Brazilian pianist

A FUNNY thing happened to Arnaldo Cohen on his way to being one of the world's greatest living classical pianists. It got really cold outside.

Cohen, a Brazilian-born piano virtuoso who will give a solo recital at Sunset Center Saturday, Feb. 3, recently relocated to the United States to accept a piano professorship with tenure at the University of Indiana. And the weather in Bloomington, Ind. — for anyone who has never spend a winter there — will never be confused with the sun-drenched climate of Rio de Janeiro.

"It's really cold outside," Cohen conceded in a phone



invited to appear as soloist with major orchestras, including the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Cleveland Orchestra and the Los Angeles Philharmonic. And his solo recitals routinely draw enthusiastic crowds.

From the violin to the piano

Remarkably, Cohen never expected to be a pianist. At an early age, his parents determined it was his sister who would become the pianist in the family. Cohen would be a violinist, because the violin is an instrument more suitable for a man, his father reasoned. So he learned the violin and also began studying engineering. But Cohen was always fascinated by the piano, and he began practicing the instrument in his spare time. "I had to practice like mad just to make my fingers work," recalled Cohen, who played violin professionally for the Rio de Janeiro Opera House Orchestra during that time.

After winning First Prize at the 1972 Busoni International Piano Competition, Cohen received critical praise for performing a solo recital at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam. He later moved to London, where he built a repertoire of some 50 concertos and performed with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, the Philharmonia, the Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra, Orchestra de la Suisse Romande, and the Santa Cecilia Orchestra of Rome. He lived in London for more than two decades.

In all genres of music, there are performers who are more comfortable in the studio than on stage, and others who shun the recording process for the spontaneity of playing before a live audience. Cohen falls in the second category.

"I prefer to play live," he said, because studio recordings — with the help of mixing, editing and computer enhancements — may not reflect a performer's actual ability. But the flawless music heard on CDs can leave audiences disappointed.

"You can not reproduce live what's in a recording," he explained. "The recording doesn't correspond to reality. The public goes to a concert and has an unrealistic expectation."

Perfectionism vs. satisfaction

Given his technical wizardry and his musical ambition, it comes as no surprise that Cohen is a perfectionist. And it's also clear from listening to him that he enjoys his work. So how is it possible to strive for perfection and be satisfied with what you've accomplished?

"Perfectionism has no limits," Cohen explained. "You are never, never going to catch it. Perfectionism is the idealized sound in your mind. But then you have to deal with human imperfection. And instruments are imperfect. So you have to learn what your limits are. What's the best I can do? Can I get better? How much more can I practice? I always think it's never enough. You can always practice more."

The concert, which is presented by the Carmel Musical Society, starts at 8 p.m. For tickets and more information, call (831) 625-9938.

PERHAPS THE greatest challenge facing a thriving restaurant's chef/owner, who is also a husband and father, is balancing a demanding work schedule with quality fam-

"The others" are daughters Reina, 7, and Noor, 5, and son Mohamed, 3.


Bill and Sue lived just a few

his degree in textile design, but he resumed studies when they immigrated to the United States. While finishing his credits at Monterey Peninsula College, he worked nights in restaurants, as he had in Lebanon, picking up experience in both the kitchen and front of the house. "I always was a natural born chef and I love cooking. Primarily, I'm self taught,"

After graduation, the restaurant trade won out over textiles, although Karaki said he loves fashion and the "creativity it requires."

He worked for more than five years at the Monterey Hyatt as a server, and then for another five years at the Monterey Plaza Hotel, where he worked his way up from server to assistant manager of The Duck Club.

From there he taught Arabic at the Defense Language

School in Monterey. This interlude lasted until Taste Cafe & Bistro became available in 1998.

Karaki does all of the fish and produce buying daily, selecting what looks best from the catch of the day at Monterey's wharf. orders meat and poultry by phone, and wine reps come by so he can taste the new releases. A good part of his extensive wine list is composed of fine California wines. Sue goes to the two farmers markets Monterey weekly, selecting fresh herbs Bill can use in his favorite dishes on the menu.

To help in the kitchen, Karaki has three line cooks, one prep cook and three dishwashers.

He describes the menu at Taste Cafe & Bistro as European. "We have a little bit of everything," he said. He offers, for instance, New York steak with pommes chicken apple sausages with braised red cabbage, chicken

Dijonnaise, tortellini Florentine, classic escargot Bourguignonne and Mediterranean crab cakes.

His signature dishes? He suggests the marinated lamb filet, grilled and served with a Cabernet shallot sauce with

sautéed fresh spinach, red peppers, pine nuts, and au gratin potatoes.

Another signature dish is fresh salmon filet on a bed of spinach, tomatoes, mushrooms, Kalamata olives, zucchini and artichokes — all baked in parchment paper and served with a basil beurre blanc sauce.

Eight starters and three salads appear on the menu, and Sue's signature dessert is warm brioch bread pudding. "You have to try it to believe it," he said.

"Locals bring in their children, too," he said, "and so we have a kids menu offering chicken nuggets and French fries, tortellini florentine, spinach and cheese ravioli, and hamburgers with French fries."

The restaurant, which seats 60, is light and airy — with yellow and white predominating and a two-story ceiling with sidelights. A Mediterranean mural fills a back wall, and hand-painted angels and cherubs look down from the ceiling. A 24-seat capac-

ity banquet room is located on the mezzanine and a six-seat full bar is toward the back of the restaurant on the main floor. The kitchen is an exhibition kitchen where diners can see the chef and his crew at work.

"Customers seem to like our six bistro tables with tall legs and chairs to match. The rest of the tables are square, of normal height," he said.

Karaki appears to thrive on his seven-daya-week job and his sizable family. He even finds time to handle catering. "I like the restaurant business very much; I enjoy the people and communicating with them," he said.

He and Sue and their children return to Lebanon to visit their parents every few years, and both sets of parents have returned the visits to keep abreast of their grandchildren's development in beautiful and peaceful Pacific Grove.





Cold weather — even Peninsula version — calls for crock pots

GROWING UP on the East Coast, I learned to cope with the icy winter months by creating home-cooked, comfort food. There's nothing like a warm, savory meal to lift your spirits when the wind chill is minus 10. Soups, chilis, chowders and stews, I discovered, were perfect during those depress-

On the Monterey Peninsula, wintry weather hardly exists, and daily comfort food is no longer essential to my survival.

But I'm writing this week's column from Yosemite National Park. After a long day of nose-numbing hiking and ice skating, I'm once again reminded that nothing could be better than a bowl of soup and a glass of

I am here for the Chefs' Holidays event at The Ahwahnee, and in between demos, receptions and dinners, I've taken full advantage of the snow-veiled valley.

Maybe the hours I've logged in front of The Ahwahnee's oversized fireplaces have sizzled a few brain cells, but instead of multi-course tasting menus, I'm craving plain and simple crock-pot cooking — pot roast, beef stew and chili con carne.

Once the stepchild of culinary tools (second only to the microwave), the crock pot is now considered the epitome of kitchen convenience and comfort fare. - Don't hover. While the crock pot is slowly cooking away, you really don't have to lift a finger. There's not need to stir it (unless you run across the rare recipe that specifically calls for basting).
- Put a lid on it. A well seasoned crock pot cooker once told me that every time you take the lid off, you lose half of your cooking time. Most crock pots have a glass lid, so impatient voyeurs can get a pretty good idea of what's going on inside. If you must remove the lid, be sure to increase your cooking time to minimize overall heat loss. A good rule of thumb I've found is to never remove the lid during the first two hours.
- Time it right. It is best to follow the recipe's instructions, but a general rule of thumb is one hour on high equals two hours on low. If you can't turn it off right on time, don't worry. The temperatures are really too low to burn or do any damage to your food.
- Temperatures. When it comes to crock pots, there are generally two temperature settings, low and high. Low is 200°F and high is 300°F.
- Thaw and defrost. If you use frozen foods in a recipe, it is essential to thaw them prior to adding them to the pot. I've known some people to cook frozen foods successfully with-

out any problems, but there's an increased possibility of damaging the ceramic pot liner. If you have a metal crock pot, frozen foods are fine — just be sure to add a few extras hours of cooking time.

- Spice it up. Because so little evaporation takes place when cooking with this method, the flavors of spices tend to be intensified. The easy way to avoid over-seasoning food is to add your salt, pepper and herbs in small doses just before serving and adjust as needed.
- Speed it up. To save time, aluminum foil can be placed under the crock pot's lid. The foil insulates the lid and keeps the precious heat from escaping.
- Eat your veggies. Vegetables should be cut into bitesized pieces (around 1/2 inch), not only for easier eating, but for better cooking, too.

Crock pot Extra Credit:

If you find yourself short on burners and the oven is full (like on Thanksgiving or when entertaining a crowd), a crock pot can double as an oven for breads, custards and a multitude of side dishes in a pinch.

Also, when it's cold outside, you can simmer hot beverages, which will stay at a perfect sipping temperature. Not only can guests self-serve (saving you time on bartending), but the aroma of mulled cider will make everyone feel cozy as soon as they walk in the room.

women," she said. "It seemed time to merge fashion and wheelchairs. We wanted to honor women's lifestyles and the ability of women getting out in their lives and doing some incredible things."

Wheelchair revolutionary

She speaks from experience. "In those first days, it was just shocking," to be dis-

abled, she said. "But it's amazing how the human spirit steps up with a great attitude and finds a better path."

A year after her accident, she revolutionized the conventional, cumbersome, 60pound wheelchair she found lacked "dignity, freedom of mobility, function or fit."

Using lightweight materials employed in hang-gliders, Hamilton developed the design for the Quickie wheelchair and cofounded Motion Designs Inc. in 1979 with two hanggliding experts. Sunrise Medical Inc. bought the company in 1986, but Hamilton stayed

on as vice president of global strategic planning, "because I am such a great advocate for change."

She also spent a decade skiing and playing tennis competitively, winning two silver medals in the International Disabled Ski Championships, and becoming six-time National Disabled Ski Champion and twice winner of the U.S. Women's Open Wheelchair Tennis Championships between 1980 and 1990.

"I don't ski competitively anymore, but I certainly ski and play tennis as much as I can between my travel and work schedules," she said last week, a few days before flying to New York for the Rolling With Style show.

In 1991, she founded the nonprofit Winners on Wheels, a coed scouting-type program that helps foster confidence, dedication and hope in children.

Hamilton also received the Business of the Year for the Western U.S. award and the California Business Woman of the Year award. She is a member of the California Governor's Hall of Fame for People with Disabilities and was given the Minerva Award by California First Lady Maria Shriver last year.

She and her husband, Bob, moved to Carmel Highlands from Fresno, where the Quickie wheelchair's manufacturing operations are, two years ago. "It's a little slice of paradise," she said.



expensive than spraying, and create a monstrous compost pile that would need to be hauled away in trucks.

"You might have emissions and fuel drip from trucks that could be even more toxic,' Regan said.

Warning labels on Roundup state it should not be used "where surface water is present" or where it might get into "intertidal areas." And a 2005 study by University of Pittsburgh assistant professor Rick Relyea found Roundup was "extremely lethal" to amphibians.

In his experiments, Relyea found that Roundup caused a "70 percent decline in amphibian biodiversity and an 86 percent decline in the total mass of tadpoles.

In addition to several rare and endangered plants, the dunes in Pacific Grove are home to an endangered animal, the black legless

Willoughby and Goldbeck said they merely want to know the effects of Roundup before it's too late.

"I think we need some answers before we go around doing these things," Willoughby said. "Not afterward."

Regan said it would take a large amount of Roundup for it to seep into groundwater or into the ocean. For the dunes project, Roundup is sprayed lightly enough it wouldn't have that effect, he said. And the herbicide won't be sprayed when there is heavy wind or rainfall.

"It clings to soil particles after passing from a plant," Regan said. "It binds to it and doesn't move. It really doesn't wash down into the ocean."

The dunes restoration project has already gone through scrutiny by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the California Coastal Commission, which approved it. The P.G. City Council approved it after that.

"The city council has asked us to prepare a report," said Pacific Grove golf course director Mike Leach, who is coordinating the project. "It's kind of going through an exercise we have already done."

Removing the iceplant will allow plants native to the dunes to return in large numbers and will also help increase the numbers of black legless lizards, Regan said.

The project, which began last year, will cost the city at least \$850,000.

Iceplant was originally planted in Pacific Grove for erosion control. New home owners for years have been required by the city to eradicate iceplant from their property. But this is the first time the city has removed the plant from its own land.



A definite maybe

TWO WEEKS ago, we printed a letter to the editor from LandWatch Monterey County's president, Michael DeLapa, "correcting" our editorial of Jan. 12 — an editorial that compared LandWatch's "Community General Plan Initiative" with a general plan passed by county supervisors last month.

In DeLapa's view, the editorial was wrong when it asserted that LandWatch's version of a new general plan would allow "little or no growth" in the unincorporated parts of Monterey County.

"The Community General Plan initiative allows for almost 11,000 additional building units in five community areas," DeLapa stated.

But let's assume for a moment the LandWatch general plan is passed by voters next June and becomes law. Will LandWatch be in favor of pouring concrete, hammering nails and putting up sheetrock for any of those 11,000 units?

DeLapa said the answer is a definite, "Maybe."

"LandWatch would support the creation of 10,500 new housing units ... provided they're consistent with other sensible land use policies in the Community General Plan Initiative."

In other words, LandWatch's board will support the creation of new housing under its general plan. Unless it decides to oppose it.

In fact, using the group's history as a guide, it seems likely that as soon as its general plan becomes law, LandWatch will resume fighting tooth and nail to prevent any housing — even the housing its own general plan specifically calls for — from actually being built.

Just this week, a LandWatch lawsuit was tossed out by a California appeals court. The suit sought to block construction of just 28 housing units in North Monterey County. After losing in Superior Court, LandWatch wasn't satisfied. Presumably the group thought stopping such a tiny project was worth a lot of expense and effort, and that's why it took it to a higher court. Imagine the opposition LandWatch would mount to a project ten times larger.

Not long ago, the owner of 73 lots in Spreckles asked the county for permission to build on them. At a key public hearing, former LandWatch executive director Gary Patton launched an angry denunciation of the board of supervisors for approving the plan. LandWatch also took that one to court.

Has there ever been a housing project LandWatch liked?

There is nothing wrong with the group being against the construction of new housing in Monterey County. But it should not pretend otherwise. It's general plan may "allow" 11,000 new "building units" in parts of the county. But other language in the plan provides all the ammunition LandWatch or any other activist group would need to torpedo an application to build some of that housing. A vote for the LandWatch general plan is, in effect, a vote for no new development in the unincorporated parts of Monterey. A vote for the supervisors' plan is a vote for a limited amount of new development. That is the difference.

Who pays for P.B. traffic cops

Dear Editor:

Several recently published letters to the editor, as well as comments I have heard in the community, have erroneously stated or implied that Pebble Beach Company is responsible for contracting and paying for the increased California Highway Patrol presence in the unincorporated Del Monte Forest/Pebble Beach area. That assumption is incorrect, and I would like to set the record straight on who is responsible for this increased enforcement and why.

Public, not private, funds are being used to pay for the increased CHP presence. The California Vehicle Code is the law in the Del Monte Forest/Pebble Beach. The Del Monte Forest Property Owners (the local residents organization) asked the Pebble Beach Community Services District (the local government agency) to become involved in making the Forest roads safer for all. Existing district funds are being used to increase the time CHP can spend in the Forest. While the district pays for the extra time, CHP uses the same enforcement standards in the Forest as in the rest of Monterey County, where the vehicle code also applies. So while speeding has been the primary focus of the CHP, they have also enforced other Vehicle Code provisions just as they do elsewhere, such as wearing seat belts, stopping at stop signs, and having the correct driving license for the vehicle being driven.

I drive to work in the Forest each day, and I have to admit it took a little getting used to driving the speed limit (actually I work hard to stay within 5 mph of the limit.) But in reality, it only adds a couple of minutes to my commute. All things being equal, I think several extra minutes are a good trade to avoid living with impacts of hitting someone on our Forest roads.

Pebble Beach is a beautiful place to live and work. Driving safely allows us all more time to enjoy its beauty.

Meanwhile, Kenney's attorney, Dennis Lempert told a news conference at the Montrey County courthouse Wednesday, "I can only say that there are many issues that are relevant to this case. I believe when fully aired, they will vindicate my client's position and he should be found not guilty."

Fight over property line

The argument that reportedly erupted Monday afternoon and ended in the fatal shootings stemmed from a long-running dispute. The Grimeses and Kenney owned land next to each other and had gone to court to complain about mutual harassment. They shared a driveway easement leading from nearby Hitchcock Canyon Road. Kenney had to cross Grimes' property to get to his own. And Kenney apparently believed Grimes was intruding on his land.

Darling said deputies responded to calls there several times, beginning in 2005, including to a reported fight between Elizabeth Grimes and Kenney, who said he was the victim

"He alleged he had sustained injuries," Darling said. "We did take an assault and battery report. The case was reviewed by the DA, and because it was basically a one-sided story against the other, it was not considered to be a prosecutable case."

(The sheriff's office also received complaints in 2005 from Elizabeth Grimes about another neighbor, Stephan Young, who also complained about being "verbally harassed" by her. And in 2004, a deputy took a report of \$34,000 in cash missing from the "personal stash" in the home at 82 Hitchcock Canyon Road, the Grimeses' address.)

A resident since 1997, neighbor Catherine Hudson was familiar with the neighborhood clashes and said the Grimeses "were intimidating if anything crossed their privacy, and what they would consider their privacy did go beyond the borders of their

According to documents filed with the Monterey County Planning and Building Department, the couple had also undertaken

illegal construction on their property, including building an art studio, adding a retaining wall, enclosing a carport, expanding onto a deck, building a new carport and making other changes without permits. Last July, a building inspector filed a notice of violation and fine in the property file at the county assessor's office.

The events leading to Monday's shooting began when an attorney, Nick Cvietkovich, apparently working for Kenney, requested a deputy provide a "civil standby" while a boulder was delivered to mark what Kenney believed was his property line. Darling said the deputy never arrived at Kenney's home, after encountering the truck driver on the road and learning the delivery was made without incident.

The big rock was placed next to the shared driveway, partially blocking a parked VW van. Contrary to published media reports that the rock blocked access to the Grimes' house and driveway, "photographs suggest the van could maneuver around it," Darling said. "But in many ways that's a moot point, because this property is at the center of the dispute.

'We would have no way or authority to determine whose property that is, and there is no way for us to stop a person from plunking this boulder down there."

Hudson commented, "It was not blocking their access to their home, it was not blocking access to their driving road, it was not blocking access their driveway. Yes, it was blocking the van. To me, it was a political statement."

Two 911 calls

A few hours after the boulder was placed, Elizabeth Grimes made a frantic call to 911, alarmed at a possible confrontation with her neighbor and that her husband was going to injure himself as he tried to break up the rock with a sledgehammer, according to Darling.

A sheriff's deputy was en route when another 911 call came in.

'Shortly after the shooting, Kenney called and reported he'd been involved in a battery with the neighbors but did not mention the shooting," Darling said.

A rescue engine and ambulance followed a sheriff's car onto the property after being dispatched at 5:45 p.m., according to Schuler. Darling said three sheriff's units ended up responding.

The victims were found on the ground outside next to the carport, and deputies contacted Kenney outside his home and took him into custody without incident, according to Darling. They also found a semiautomatic handgun that was "fired several times."

"He did not have a permit to carry a concealed weapon," Darling said. "We're not certain who it belongs to."

He said the investigation of the shootings will be extensive and time consuming. "Obviously, unfortunately we cannot interview the victims, so we will be working with the suspect's attorney to try to determine their side of the story, and witnesses - not people who saw it, but who live in the area and may have overheard things, who knew both of these parties and might be able to give more of the history," Darling said.

Investigators will also analyze physical evidence, such as the handgun, bullet casings and any blood collected at the scene.


Kenney appeared in court this week but did not enter a plea. Outside, his attorney, Lempert, criticized the sheriff's office for not being on scene when the rock was delivered and not requiring a deputy wait until the Grimeses arrived home to ensure no violence ensued.

Hudson said she is grieving the deaths of the Grimeses as well as for Kenney.

"I'm keeping an open mind, and people need to do that. They were not there, and there are so many things that led up to this it's not just one argument," she said. "I feel all the neighbors should speak up in both of their defenses. We haven't heard Jack's [Kenney's] side yet."

Backpacks, coolers, cellphones and cameras banned during tournament

THE NFL has prohibited backpacks, coolers, bottles, banners, noisemakers and horns at the Superbowl—and even in the parking lot—leading one commentator to complain that "real fans" won't be allowed at the game this year.

And now the backpack ban has made its way to professional golf tournaments, including the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. The following day, the 3M Celebrity Challenge will begin at 11 a.m. on the 1st Tee at Pebble Beach and feature Kevin Costner, Kenny G, Andy Garcia, Kevin James, Huey Lewis, Ray Romano, George Lopez, Bill Murray, newcomer Don Cheadle and others





Carmel, Pacific Grove promote selves by shuttling golf fans to Pebble Beach

By MARY BROWNFIELD

NCE AGAIN this year the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am is asking even local attendees to drive to Fort Ord to park. But fans can also jump on shuttles offered by the Carmel and Pacific Grove chambers of commerce. In addition to being more convenient for golf fans, the shuttles help area businesses by bringing more potential shoppers and diners into their towns.

In addition to Thursday-through-Sunday shuttles, this year the Carmel shuttle — arranged by the chamber of commerce and the Carmel Innkeepers Association — will run Wednesday to take riders to the 3M Celebrity Challenge.

"Last year, we didn't offer it on Wednesday. They used to allow people to park in the Forest for that, and this year, for the first time, they're not allowing people to park there," said chamber CEO Monta Potter. "That's why we extended it."

The buses, which also carry tournament volunteers into Pebble Beach,

run every 15 minutes, picking up passengers in front of Carmel Plaza at Ocean Avenue and Junipero Street, and dropping them off at the tournament gate. Operating hours will be Wednesday, Feb. 7, from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.; Thursday, Feb. 8, through Saturday, Feb. 10, from 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and Sunday, Feb. 11, from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The \$10 daily pass allows unlimited rides, just in case people want to return to town for lunch and then return to the fairways and greens in the afternoon. And for added convenience, fans can also purchase daily tournament tickets at the Carmel Plaza bus stop or the chamber's visitors center on San Carlos Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

But the bus ticket will get riders more than lifts in and out of the Forest, according to Potter. Some businesses are sponsoring buses and may give away coupons, goodie bags and other freebies to promote themselves.

Senior nonprofits on Peninsula thrive from AT&T donations

S THE number of elderly residents on the Monterey Peninsula increases, so does the need to help take care of them.

But Peninsula charities which provide services to seniors can have a hard time meeting their budgets. And that's why donations from the AT&T

Pebble Beach National Pro-Am generated by tickets sales and corporate sponsorships — are essential, according to three Peninsula nonprof-

■ Alliance on Aging

Incorporated in 1970, the Alliance on Aging is the largest and oldest

agency devoted exclusively to the welfare of Monterey County's older men and women - a growing population that is often vulnerable and invisible, the agency contends.

"The money that we receive from the AT&T is critical to the Alliance's ability to provide services in this county," said Teresa Sullivan, the Alliance's executive director. "Although we receive government funding for some of our programs, all of our programs are underfunded.'

The Alliance on Aging currently offers eight programs that form a network of support for seniors, their families, and caregivers, Sullivan said. All of its services are free.

Last year, the Alliance received \$50,000 from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation. Here are a few programs that benefit from the donation, according to Sullivan.

■ Senior HomeShare: Matches seniors looking for affordable housing with other seniors who "are willing to share their homes are seeking companionship and need some assistance with household chores."







- Friendly Visitors: Volunteers from the community who make regular visits or telephone contact with isolated homebound seniors. They assist with shopping, transportation, medical appointments, minor household chores and yard work.
- Senior Peer Counselors: Provide emotional support and counseling to other seniors who are experiencing some of the difficult transitions of aging including grief, loss, declining medical condition, increased dependence on

care giving. Counseling is provided one-on-one, in the home, in nursing homes and in support group settings.

■ Senior Outreach Luncheons: A weekly opportunity for seniors to experience a nutritious luncheon, live entertainment and a chance to socialize with other older adults.

"The most pivotal program of the Alliance is our Information and Assistance service," Sullivan said. "We maintain a database of all services and resources for older adults in Monterey County. Staff shares this information with the clients and or caregivers, helps them to assess their needs and provide guidance in how to access the appropriate service or resource."

Staff members with the program make visits to homebound clients as well as multiple senior sites through the county, she said.

The Alliance has an "outreach van" manned by bilingual staff that travels throughout the harder-to-reach areas of the county, providing portable access to the alliance's information and assistance services.

"The Peninsula Monterey Foundation has been one of the most important and loval sources of financial support to the Alliance for many years," Sullivan said.



Foundation has not only helped us start our services, but helped us maintain them. They have been vital. We couldn't do it without them. They are a wonderful group of committed folks."

Last year's donation from the foundation, for instance, was instrumental in getting the association's brain health program up and running, Williams said. The program offers exercises people can do to maintain a healthy brain, she said.

The Alzheimer's Association provides a variety of services, for patients, families and caregivers, including:

■ Helpline (800) 272-3900: For support, information and referrals. Caregivers can talk one-on-one with staff and volunteers who have expertise in Alzheimer's disease caregiving. Also, we have information about resources within the local chapter and throughout Northern California and Northern Nevada, such as residential and day care facilities, physicians, elder law attorneys, etc.

"The Helpline is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week," Williams said.

- Caregiver & Early Stage Support Groups: Held throughout the Peninsula, these groups offer participants the chance to express their feelings and learn coping techniques from one another.
- Respite Program: This program offers assistance for caregiving families. "Caregivers can always talk to someone who has an expertise in Alzheimer's Disease and caregiving," Williams said.

■ Meals on Wheels of the Monterey Peninsula

For many seniors on the on the Monterey Peninsula, Meals On Wheels is a lifeline. Every day, it feeds more than 300 frail, elderly and disabled local residents,

And Meals on Wheels benefits greatly from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, which donated \$30,000 to the program in 2006.

"We receive funding from Monterey Peninsula Foundation for the breadth of our programs," said Christine Capen-Frederick, development director for Meals on Wheels of the Monterey Peninsula.

The money pays for the home-delivery meal program, which is manned entirely by volunteers, who even pay for their own gasoline, Capen-Frederick said. Recipients of the meals pay \$5 for each delivery.

"All of our menus are nutritionally balanced," she said. "And we follow FDA guidelines so they are not only receiving a meal, but a nutritious meal."

Meals on Wheels serves residents from Carmel Valley to Marina. Many of the recipients would not be able to stay in their homes if they did not receive food from Meals on Wheels, Capen-Frederick said.

"We bring them three meals a day in a single delivery," she said. "They get the service five days a week and have an option of accepting a meal on the weekend. AT&T Pro-Am funds have helped support that program and we are profoundly welcome."

Capen-Frederick said the money from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation has also helped pay for the group's Sponsorship for Independence fund, which offers homedelivered meals to clients who cannot afford the \$5 daily donation, she said. "The fund helps to underwrite meals for low- and verylow income residents throughout the

Monterey Peninsula."

Harris Barton



Barton supports numerous civic and charitable organizations and, in 1995, he donated \$100,000 to his alma mater in honor of his father, Paul, who died in 1994 after a long battle with brain cancer. Chris Berman




Tom Brady











After graduating high school in St. Louis, Mo., Buck began his broadcasting career in 1989 while he was an undergraduate at Indiana University. In 1991, Buck followed in his father's footsteps by broadcasting for the Cardinals on local television and radio.

In 1994, Buck was hired by Fox, and at the age of 25 became the youngest man ever to announce a regular slate of National Football League games on network television. In 1996, he was named Fox's lead play-by-play voice for Major League Baseball, teaming with Tim McCarver, and that year, he became the youngest man to do a national broadcast for a World Series.

On September 8, 1998, Joe Buck called Mark McGwire's 62nd home run that broke Roger Maris' single-season record.

He became Fox Sports' lead NFL play-by-play man in 2002 (taking over for Pat Summerall).

Glen Campbell

Born in Delight, Ark., Campbell is the seventh son in a family of eight boys and four girls, all of whom played guitar and sang. At 14 he left home to pursue a career in music. He started with a three-piece band in Houston, then he moved to Albuquerque and joined a Western swing band led by his uncle, Dick Bills. At 24, Campbell moved to Los Angeles, where he quickly found studio work as a guitarist. He played on records by Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, Merle Haggard, Elvis Presley, Ray Charles and the Mamas and the Papas. In 1965, he

even toured as a member of the Beach Boys during the absence of Brian Wilson.

Finally, in 1967, Campbell made a breakthrough under his own name. He took a song that appeared to be all wrong for a pop hit, with a rambling lyric, no chorus and a folk-country feel. For the first of many times to come, he recorded a song simply because he thought it was a great song, and "Gentle on My Mind" went on to become not only his signature song, but one of the most played singles in history.




He hosted a summer replacement TV show for the Smothers

Brothers in 1968 which was so successful that he had his own show, "The Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour," through 1972. He earned a pair of gold singles in 1969 with "Wichita Lineman" and "Galveston."

Campbell hit No. 1 on the country, pop and easy-listening charts in 1975 with "Rhinestone Cowboy," and he topped the pop charts again in 1977 with "Southern Nights." He starred in two movies, "True Grit" (with John Wayne) and "Norwood," and recorded an album with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

Clint Eastwood

Mayor of Carmel-by-the-Sea from 1986 to 1988 and supporter of numerous local charitable and conservation causes, the indefatigable Eastwood is a familiar face on the Monterey Peninsula. Winner of Best Director and Best Actor Oscars for "Unforgiven" (1992), and Best Actor and Best Picture Oscars for "Million Dollar Baby" (2004), Eastwood has appeared in, produced and/or directed more than 50 motion pictures, beginning with "Revenge of the Creature" in 1955. His latest movie, "Letters From Iwo Jima," a companion piece to "Flags of Our Fathers," was nominated this year for Best Picture and Best Director Academy Awards. "Million Dollar Baby," starring Hilary Swank and Morgan Freeman, won four Academy Awards in 2005. In 2000, he was honored by President Bill Clinton with the Kennedy Center Medal for his lifetime achievements in the arts. Eastwood, a co-owner of the Pebble Beach Company, is chairman of the board of the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, the charity group that hosts the AT&T Pro-Am. He lives in Pebble Beach with his wife, Dina Ruiz Eastwood, and their daughter, Morgan.

Glenn Frey

Kenny G

Legendary saxophonist and the best-selling instrumentalist/musician in the world, Kenny G has been a constant presence on the Billboard charts for more than 15 years. His career as a saxophonist began at 17 when he backed up Barry White in a concert in Seattle, Kenny G's home town. When he signed his first recording contract in 1982, a new era in instrumental music was born.

Peter Gallagher

One of the stars of the Fox hit, The O.C., Gallagher has created some memorable characters in films such as , "The Player," opposite Tim Robbins, and "While You Were Sleeping," in which he was the





comatose "fiancé" of Sandra Bullock. He was also an egotistical real estate salesman having an affair with Annette Bening in American Beauty; a villainous media executive in Mr. Deeds; and a political reporter exposing media ethics during a presidential debate in "The Last Debate." His first major role was in 1989's "sex, lies, and videotape."

Danny Gans

One of the most successful headliners in Las Vegas, Danny Gans is a singer and comedian who has found success as a musical impressionist. At one time, Gans was a professional baseball player, playing for the Durham Bulls, and later holding a small role as a third baseman in the film, "Bull Durham." After an injury ended his sporting career, Gans turned to the entertainment industry. Gans began his career on the road, performing mostly at private corporate functions. In 1995, he moved to Broadway to perform a well-received one-man show, but then decided to move to Las Vegas to reduce time away from his family, which lived in Los Angeles.

Gans started his Las Vegas stay at the Stratosphere Hotel in 1996. He moved to the Rio Hotel shortly thereafter, and then on to The Mirage in 1997. Gans is a permanent performer at The Mirage, where the Danny Gans Theater was built for him. The Las Vegas Strip marquee now bearing Danny Gans' image is the largest freestanding marquee in the world.

Andy Garcia

Born in Cuba in 1956, Garcia's family fled to Miami Beach after Castro came to power. He studied acting in Florida before heading to Los Angeles, where his first role was as a gang member on the first episode of "Hill Street Blues." Garcia later starred in "The Untouchables," "The Godfather, Part III," "Desperate Measures" and "Ocean's Eleven."

Thomas Gibson

After winning a scholarship to the world-famous school, he began his acting career on the stage. His film career began with the 1992 Ron Howard film, "Far and Away." He also appeared on television in "The Kennedys of Massachusetts," "Tales of the City," and "A Will of Their Own."

Joe Gransden

Renowned for an unusual trumpet style and a singing voice that has been compared to Frank Sinatra, Joe Gransden has performed worldwide and released seven CDs under his own name.

Coming from a family full of musicians, Gransden's introduction to music came early on through his father, a gifted singer and pianist. His grandfather was a trumpeter of merit, playing professionally his whole life throughout New York. On his mother's side of the family was the piano virtuoso Carmen Cavallero.

Not long after high school, Gransden was on the road as a sideman with the big bands of Tommy Dorsey and Glenn Miller. Eventually moving to New York City, he performed with numerous groups, including sub work with Toshiko Akiyoshi and Chico O'Farrill. Meanwhile, Gransden formed his own group, which performed in Brooklyn each week and included the venerable guitarist Joe Cohn and ex-Betty Carter bassist, Matt Hughes. "Having my own group and being fortunate enough to travel, play, and record has been a dream come true," says Gransden.

Bob Griese

Known as the "thinking man's quarterback" during his brilliant 14-year NFL career with the Miami Dolphins (1967-1980), Bob Griese was renowned for his poised leadership and ingenious play-calling during the Dolphins' dominance of the NFL in the early 1970s. He led the Dolphins to three straight Super Bowl appearances and back-to-back Championships in '72 and '73. This year marks the 30th anniversary of the 1972 Miami Dolphins' perfect 17-0 season. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1990

Now one of network television's most respected football analysts, Bob Griese is in his 21st year of broadcasting and his 16th year as expert commentator on ABC's coverage of college football. He was a top analyst for NBC Sports' NFL coverage from 1982 through 1986.

Griese has three sons, the youngest of whom is Brian, who is a quarterback for the Chicago Bears. Bob and Brian are co-authors of the inspirational book, "Undefeated."

Kevin James

Comedian Kevin James stars as Doug Heffernan, the hard-working parcel delivery man who loves his big screen TV as much as his beautiful wife on the prime-time CBS comedy "The King of Queens." James is a native of Stony Brook, Long Island. He was born on April 26, 1965, and attended Cortland State University in N.Y. for three years and then got his start in stand-up comedy, which is his first love. George Lopez

The multitalented George Lopez stars, writes and co-produces the ABC Wednesday night sitcom, "George Lopez," which is a hit with critics and viewers. Lopez performs on stage, film and television and has earned kudos for his performance in the HBO Films drama, "Real Women Have Curves." Previously, Lopez was featured in the acclaimed drama "Bread and Roses." The film, directed by British filmmaker Ken Loach, received critical acclaim after its premiere at the Cannes Film Festival. Lopez also appeared in the Showtime film, "Fidel," and the comedy "Frank McKluskey, C.I." for Disney. His numerous television credits include appearances on "The Tonight Show," "Good Morning America," "The View," "Live with Regis and Kelly," "The Late Late Show with Craig Kilborn" and "Resurrection Boulevard." He frequently hosts Univision's "Loco Comedy Jam."

Bill Murray

Nelson began his career working with Barry Levinson as a radio writer/performer and stand-up comic. He added the "T" to his name because there was another actor registered with the Screen Actor's Guild that had the same name. His previous primetime show, "Coach," was a major hit from 1989 to 1997.

Chris O'Donnell

A native of Winnetka, Ill., O'Donnell is best known for his portrayal of Robin in "Batman Forever" and "Batman and Robin," and for "Scent of a Woman," which earned him a Best Supporting Actor Oscar nomination. He also got highly favorable reviews for "The Three Musketeers" in 1993. Recently, he appeared in "Vertical Limit," "29 Palms" and "Kinsey."

Stone Phillips

Co-anchor of Dateline NBC, Phillips is making his first appearance at the Pebble Beach Pro-Am. His athletic career peaked in college at Yale, where he was starting quarterback. Since graduating with a degree in philosophy, he has focused on journalism, getting his first big break when he joined the ABC newsmagazine, 20/20, in 1986.

Phillips was born in Texas City, Texas, in 1954. Besides his main gig on Dateline, he has filled in on NBC Nightly News and the Today Show.

Ray Romano

Ray Romano was star of the hit CBS comedy, "Everybody Loves Raymond," which finished a nine-year run as prime time's highest-rated comedy last Spring — the same year it won an Emmy for Best Comedy. Born in 1957 in New York City, Romano, who became one of the nation's highest paid actors, originally planned to become an accountant

Darius Rucker

Darius Rucker is the lead singer of Hootie & The Blowfish, a band formed by Rucker and other students at the University of South Carolina, and which stormed the charts with songs such as "I Only Want To Be with You" and "Hold My Hand." He has also released a solo R&B album, "Back to Then."

Kelly Slater

An eight-time world surfing champion, Kelly Slater is considered the most successful professional surfer in the history of the sport. In May 2005 in the final of the Billabong Tahiti Pro surfing contest, Slater became the first to score two perfect 10 rides. He has also been successful in other fields. In 1992-3, Slater acted on Baywatch. A videogame. Kelly Slater's Pro Surfer, was released. In 2003, he published an autobiography called, "Pipe Dreams: A Surfer's Journey." In 2004 Slater, who has modeled for Versace, was chosen by People magazine as one of the 50 Most Beautiful People in the World.

Emmitt Smith

Just 5' 9" tall, Emmitt Smith was one of football's preeminent players and its all-time leading runner, having rushed for 18,355 yard, including 164 touchdowns in 13 seasons with the Dallas Cowboys and two with the Arizona Cardinals. Smith is the only player in NFL history to win the rushing title and the Superbowl in the same season. Last fall, he gained new fame by being champion of the ABC series, "Dancing with the Stars."

Clay Walker

Singer/guitarist and one of the U.S.A.'s biggest Country and Western stars, Clay Walker began performing professionally at 16 in his native Beaumont, Texas. In the fall of 1993 his first single, "What's It To You," went straight to number one on the charts. His biggest selling albums are "Say No More" and "Live Laugh Love."

Walker is considered a modest individual and says he sees himself in the face of each and every fan. "When we make records," he says, "it's final. The records will always be the same, but it's the fans who give life to the music. On stage, you know immediately if you are really reaching people."

Pro Bobby Clampett held the record of 63 with player Mark Brooks on the 6,201-yard par 70 course for several years but was unseated by Kevin Streelman, who shot a 60 there last

Carmel Valley Ranch is located at 1 Old Ranch Road, off of Carmel Valley Road just east of Mid Valley Shopping Center. For more information, call 626-2510 (831)or www.cvrgolf.com.

■ Corral de Tierra Country Club, Salinas

This 6,683-yard par 72 course, situoff the Monterey-Salinas Highway and graced with some of the best weather on the Peninsula, was designed by Bob Baldock in 1960. It was redesigned in 1999 and 2000 by J. Michael Poellot, and now offers the added challenges of a multitude of bunkers. Its gentle elevation changes and tree-lined fairways also make it a great walking course. It has served as a site for U.S. Open qualifying rounds.

The course's record 63 was shot "by several players," according to the Northern California Golf Association. Corral de Tierra is located a few miles east of Los Laureles Grade on Highway 68 (Monterey-Salinas Highway) and is open only to members and guests. Reciprocal agreement with other private clubs. ■ Cypress Point Club, Pebble Beach

Designed in 1928 by renowned architect Alister MacKenzie, the 6,509-yard, par 72 Cypress Point course is known all over the world for its breathtaking scenery, typified by its par 3 16th Hole that entices players to take a shot over the ocean. Golfer Marion Hollins first conceived of the idea in 1924 and pursued the development of a first-class golf course and a clubhouse with a handful of sleeping rooms for a membership limited to 200 people who would pay about \$2,500 (in 1924 dollars) to subscribe. The club is open only to members and their guests. Longtime PGA Class A golf pro Jim Langley retired a year ago after heading the program there for years and still holds the course record 63, which he shares with Casey Reamer — the course's new PGA Class A Pro — and Ben Hogan. Cypress Point Club is located at 3150 17 Mile Drive. For information, contact the pro shop at (831) 624-2223.

■ Del Monte Golf Course, Monterey

Nicknamed by locals "Old Del Monte," the Del Monte Golf Course was designed by golf and polo enthusiast Charles Maud and built in 1897, making it the oldest continuously operated course west of the Mississippi River. (The course at the Presidio in San Francisco was built a year earlier but was temporarily converted to a drill field during the Spanish-American War.) Owned by the Pebble Beach Company, Old Del Monte -6,357 yards, par 72 — is open to the public and is home to the Monterev Bay Golf Club, founded in 1932. Last year, Nick Watney unseated longtime record holders Ken Venturi and Todd Giesvold by one stroke to set the new low score of 61.

Del Monte was the original host of the California State Amateur and still hosts the annual Callaway Golf Pebble Beach Invitational and The First Tee Open each fall. Green fee are \$105 to walk and \$125 to ride, with discounts available for twilight play. "Old D" is located at 1300 Sylvan Road, adjacent to the Hyatt Regency Monterey. ■ Laguna Seca Golf Ranch, Monterey

Robert Trent Jones Sr. and Robert Trent Jones Jr. designed this public course together in 1970 in their first joint venture, which yielded "18 beautiful holes that follow the natural terrain of the oak-studded coastal hills along the Monterey-Salinas corridor." Johnny Miller once held the record 64 on its 6,174-yards but relinquished that distinction to Mark Darby, who beat him by one shot for a total 8-under-par score of 63 a couple of years ago.

The course is located off of Highway 68 east of the Monterey Airport and can be reached by turning north on York Road and following it to the end. Rates for spring (February and March) range from \$35 to \$70, depending on the time of day. Cart fee is \$36. ■ The Links at Spanish Bay, Pebble Beach

A resort course open for public play, the 6,821-yard par 72 Spanish Bay links were jointly designed by Robert Trent Jones, Jr., former USGA president Sandy Tatum and Tom Watson, who once remarked, "Spanish Bay is so much like Scotland, you can almost hear the bagpipes."

"Links" refers to the old Scottish term for a sandy seaside wasteland with bristly grasses and stiff prevailing wind, and the Monterey coastline mirrors the rugged beauty of that country. The course overlays land once occupied by a sand mine and included extensive rehabilitation of the dunes



and native plants in the area. Tom Watson continues to hold the record 67 on the course he helped design. Guest fees are \$240 (including cart, for resort guests). Carts and caddies available. ■ Monterey Peninsula Country Club, Pebble Beach

The idea of Monterey Peninsula Country Club first arose in 1925 when Sam Morse, James Habbord and Thorwell Mullally decided to combine a golf club with housing. Two courses make up MPCC: The Dunes Course, designed by Seth Raynor in 1926, and redesigned by Rees Jones, and the Shore Course, designed by Bob Baldock in 1961 and recently remodeled by architect Michael Strantz. Open only to members and their guests, the Dunes Course runs a 6,762-yard par 72.

The Shore Course underwent major reconstruction that kept it closed for 18 months, but it reopened

in June 2005 with a par-72 yardage of 6,806. Course records include a 67 by Mike Driscoll on the Dunes Course and a 66 by David Swanson on the Shore Course. ■ Pacific Grove Golf Links, Pacific Grove

Affectionately known as the "Poor Man's Pebble Beach," and ranked among Golf Magazine's "Top 50 Golf Courses Under \$50," P.G. features a truly links-style back nine. ("Links" is an old Scottish word for "wasteland.") Designed by Jack Neville — who also designed Pebble Beach Golf Links and H. Chandler Egan in 1932, this 5,732-yard par 70 public course is situated on prime real estate near Asilomar State Beach and surrounds the historic Point Pinos Lighthouse. The ocean scenery is unsurpassed.

Sometimes plagued by Canada geese who enjoy the environs so much they refuse to migrate, the course superintendent hires a trainer and his herding dog to keep the birds off the

The new clubhouse, located at 77 Asilomar Blvd. in Pacific Grove, has a restaurant run by the owners of the beloved Red House Cafe downtown.

The course record, 60, is shared by Casey Boyns, Rich Hunter and Peter Vitarisi, who retired as longtime concessionaire when the city took over management of the links this year. Green fees are \$35-\$40, with discounts for 9-hole play, twilight rounds and junior players 17 and under; cart fee, \$20-\$30. Club rentals and lessons also available. ■ Pasadera Country Club, Monterey

One of the newest additions to premier golf courses on the Peninsula, Pasadera opened in spring 2000, just a few months before the U.S. Open was played at the Pebble Beach Golf Links.

Partners Fred Bates, Lee Newell and Tom deRegt opened Pasadera, and Paul Spengler, executive vice president of the Pebble Beach Company, is a managing partner. Jack Nicklaus designed the 6,743-yard par 71 course, which is only open to members and their guests, though it has a reciprocal agreement with other private clubs.

Taking advantage of the existing hills, canyons and old oak groves, Nicklaus used natural-style bunkering and incorporated splendid hazards, such as the awe-inspiring 14 par 3 over a deep chasm. Fred Shoemaker holds the course record 67.

Located at 100 Pasadera Drive off Highway 68, Pasadera lies just east of Laguna Seca Golf Ranch and west of the world-famous race track by the

■ Pebble Beach Golf Links, Pebble Beach

Situated on scenic coastal land originally slated for housing developments, Pebble Beach opened to the public in 1919 and is considered one of the greatest courses in the world. The 6,726-yard, par-72 course was designed by Jack Neville and Douglass Grant, but Jack Nicklaus designed the new par-3 5th Hole, which was dedicated in November 1998. Pebble Beach has been the site of four U.S. Open Championships and was ranked the No. 1 Public Course in America by "Golf Digest" in 2005. Although the course is open to the public, priority is given to resort guests.

Tom Kite, David Frost and David Duval share the course record 62.

■ The Preserve Golf Club, Carmel Valley

Tom Fazio designed this private, 6,974-yard par 72 course located among the "stands of massive ancient oaks, beautiful rolling meadows, ponds and streams" deep within the Santa Lucia Preserve and highlighted by the spectacular Santa Lucia Mountains. Fazio commented, "It's as if you are going on a grand hike and happen to have a golf club in your hand." The course opened in 1999, with membership limited to 300 owners of property within the preserve's gates. Contact (831) 626-8200 for more information or visit www.santaluciapreserve.com.

■ Quail Lodge Resort and Golf Club, Carmel Valley

The 6,449-yard par 71 Quail Lodge course - abundant with 10 lakes and lush, colorful landscaping — was designed in 1963 by Robert Muir Graves. It was honored by "Golf for Women" as one of America's most women-friendly facilities. Pro Bobby Clampett shares the course record 62 with Lennie Clements. The course is open to members, guests and the public. Green fees, including carts and range balls, run \$140-\$200, depending on day of week and time of year. Reduced rates available for 9 holes and twilight play, as well as for juniors. Practice facilities include a seven-acre driving range, a bunker, chipping areas and a 6,500-squarefoot bent grass putting green. Resort guests also have access to the new 9-hole executive putting course near the Quail Lodge guest rooms. Designed by Robert Trent Jones Sr. in 1966 as part of the master plan for the Pebble Beach oceanfront, this resort/semiprivate course measures 6,862 yards at par 72 and takes its name from Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island." Local legend has it he spent time walking in the area while brainstorming, and many of its holes bear notable names, such as Black Dog and Billy Bones. The year after the course was completed, Spyglass replaced Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course in the Bing Crosby Golf Tournament and has been part of the tournament — now the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am — ever since.

In 2003-2004, Golf Digest ranked it No. 5 on its list of America's 100 Greatest Public Courses. It is also one of the toughest, but the record 64 held by Dan Forsman and David Berganio fell last year when Phil Mickelson shot a blistering 62. ■ Tehama Golf Club, Carmel Valley






