Patisserie Bechler closed by gas leak, explosion

A NATURAL gas leak led to a large oven explosion at Patisserie Bechler in Pacific Grove Wednesday morning, causing two minor injuries, an evacuation of the area and at least \$150,000 damage, fire officials said.

The blast, which occurred at about 11 a.m. when patrons were eating in the bakery at 1225 Forest Ave., led Pacific Grove firefighters to evacuate buildings within 1,000 feet of the bakery because of the gas leak.

"There was a guy rolling croissants when it happened," said chef Polo Razo, who was around the corner from the large oven when it exploded. "I tried to get everyone out of the kitchen."

The man making croissants and another worker went to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula with minor injuries, including singed hair and ringing ears. Both were released from CHOMP, said Pacific Grove Fire Capt. Fred McAlister.

Owner Gerard Bechler said it appears a cracked pipe leading to the oven caused the gas leak which triggered the large industrial oven to explode. The explosion did not cause a fire.

Monterey blaze causes \$2M damage

A FIVE-ALARM fire that started in the basement of an Alvarado Street sandwich shop late Wednesday night gutted the building despite the best efforts of the 100 firefighters from 20 local agencies who fought to put it out, City of Monterey spokeswoman Anne McGrath said Thursday. The fire, which remains under investigation, caused an estimated \$2 million damage and destroyed Quizno's, Starbucks and Goomba's Italian Restaurant, more than a dozen offices on the second floor.

The fire started in the basement underneath Quizno's at about 10:15 p.m. and spread

Council: Zoning should encourage affordable housing

CARMEL SHOULD make it as easy as possible to construct affordable housing projects in town, the city council decided this week.

A new law that received initial approval from the council Tuesday would permit low-income projects to seek exceptions to zoning standards for floor area

ratio, height, setbacks, parking, building coverage and density.

Such projects could only be built downtown and in the city's multifamily districts — would have to be exclusively devoted to affordable housing and could only be built in the commercial district. Councilman

Michael Cunningham worried the change could result in developments unfit for Carmel.

"The goal is noble. More affordable housing is something we would all like to see, but it seems to me there's some question whether this is the right move," he said. "It puts the planning commission in the awkward position of having to approve a project that might be an eyesore."

He envisioned low-income housing constructed in the form of "big boxes" built edge-to-edge to cover their lots and without parking.

But new city councilman Ken Talmage said the ordinance doesn't require the city to grant the exceptions.

And senior planner Sean Conroy said the commission would still have to follow the city's design

PRIVACY RULES 'PROTECT' PATIENTS FROM FRIENDS

Urging people

to think ahead

may not be able

to when they

to speak

WHEN MONTEREY resident Vicki Wilde learned that a neighbor at a local retirement home had been taken to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula last summer after a bad fall, she tried to visit her. But when Wilde got to CHOMP, the hospital staff wouldn't allow her to visit the elderly woman and wouldn't even confirm she was a patient.

"According to them," Wilde said, "they didn't have any record of her at the hospital."

In fact, Wilde's friend, who had no relatives in the area to look after her, was being treated at CHOMP, but died later. Wilde can only guess what a visit from a friend might have meant during her last hours.

As concerns over healthcare privacy increase, the elderly woman's dilemma is becoming more common. In fact, a federal law, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, prohibits hospitals from revealing a patient's "protected health information" without that person's consent to anyone except a spouse or, if the patient is a minor, to a parent.

"Essentially, HIPAA is a federal consumer protection law that protects patient privacy rights," said CHOMP spokeswoman Mary Barker. "It's designed to keep everyone's personal information secure and private."

While HIPAA protects patients, it's also a powerful blockade

that can prevent close friends and some family members from obtaining information about a patient — especially if the patient is unconscious.

"The patient has to specifically tell a hospital, either orally or through a signed document, that someone other than a spouse or

parent is someone they want information disclosed to," said Kellie Morgantini, an attorney for Legal Services for Seniors, based in Seaside and Salinas.

When a patient is admitted to a hospital, he can make his wishes known about who can receive information. But what if the patient is already incapacitated when they arrive at the hospital?

One answer is to draw up an "Advance Health Care Directive,"

designating someone to make your medical decisions for you if you can't.

"It says, 'If I'm sick, my brother can make my health decisions for me, or, 'If I'm in a coma, please don't turn the [life support] machine off," Barker said.

Council denies appeal, backs staff on Pine Terrace paint

A CONDO owner who didn't like the colors her building is going to be painted failed to get the city council to intervene.

This week, the council unanimously denied Joanna Pfeister's appeal and decided the Pine Terrace Apartments could be covered in shades of Ivoire, Restrained Gold and Blonde. The council had been set to vote on the appeal last month but delayed until Feb. 6 because Pfeister was out of

town. She had requested it wait until March.

One of 19 condo owners in the complex at Mission Street and Third Avenue, Pfeister said the paint colors are too similar to nearby structures. She also objected to some stonework slated for the exterior of one of the buildings.

The planning department approved the changes last November, and Pfeister unsuccessfully appealed to the design review board in December. Senior planner Sean Conroy recommended the council also deny her appeal and allow the Pine Terrace makeover to continue.

"The commercial design guidelines encourage the use of natural, muted colors that blend with the natural surroundings and are compatible with neighboring structures," Conroy wrote in his staff report. "The design review board determined that the approved colors are consistent with the guidelines and are similar to the colors of neighboring build-

But that similarity was cause for objection, Pfeister told the council, because the proposed paint colors do not provide the diversity called for in the city code. She also said Pine Terrace has been green for 50 years and should stay that way to honor its historical significance, tradition and "forest char-

Pfeister concluded her presentation with a reference to Rosa Parks' decision to sit at the front of an Alabama bus in

Attorney David Bowie, president of the Pine Terrace Management Company's board of directors, said the other 18 owners supported painting over the "institutional green" as part of an "overall effort to address deferred maintenance" at the complex. He said Pfeister's appeal unnecessarily delayed the work.

"We retained a Carmel firm to come up with a color

scheme appropriate for Carmel," Bowie said. "Your staff found it was consistent. It was appealed to the design review board and found to be consistent with the ordinances. There's no dissonance."

Little argument

Conroy said Pfeister cited code sections pertaining to the residential district, not the "residential and limited commercial" district in which Pine Terrace is located. None of the CMC sections she cited specifically addresses paint color.

"We certainly don't want to see the same style of building on every corner of every street," he said, but the paint colors don't create that kind of uniformity.

Councilman Mike Cunningham said he understood Pfeister's concerns but could find no reason to grant her appeal.

"I don't think there's anything for staff, the design review board or us to apply to say the choices put forward by the Pine Terrace Homeowners Association were anything but appropriate," he said.

Councilman Gerard Rose said he and others embrace diversity in architectural styles.

"But I'm troubled by the notion that someone's choice of a color for a condo structure in town can be thrown off track because there happens to be a similar use nearby," he said. "I don't think that's what we're talking about when we're talking about diversity."

Councilman Ken Talmage and councilwoman Paula Hazdovac said the color meets the city's codes, and the council unanimously voted to deny Pfeister's appeal.

According to Conrov's report, if Pfeister sues the city over the paint color and stonework, Pine Terrace will have to pay the legal bills to defend it.



Suspect in double slaying delays entering plea

THE CARMEL Valley man held without bail on charges of murdering his neighbors, Mel and Elizabeth Grimes, over a long-running property dispute appeared in court Tuesday but did not enter a plea.

John Franklin Kenney, 72, has yet to officially hire a lawyer to defend him and cannot plead innocence or guilt until an attorney of record takes the case, according to managing deputy district attorney Ed Hazel.

Dennis Lempert of Santa Clara has accompanied Kenney in court — and aggressively defended him in comments to the media — since his arrest Jan. 29 shortly after the shooting in Hitchcock Canyon.


Lempert made a "special appearance" before Monterey County Superior Court Presiding Judge Russell Scott Tuesday on behalf of Kenney. At the hearing, Lempert asked

the judge to let Kenney wear civilian clothing in court instead of a prison jumpsuit. He also argued all Monterey County judges should be disqualified from hearing the case, since many of them knew Mel Grimes, a prominent criminal defense lawyer.

The lack of an attorney of record slows the proceedings, according to Hazel. He also said prison garb and shackling are standard for suspects who are jailed while their cases proceed, but it would be up to the judge to determine whether Kenney can wear civilian clothing and be unshackled instead.

"Security certainly is always a concern, and we would rather be able to take all the normal steps for security, including shackling, but obviously it's not our decision to make, and the judge will have to make that decision," Monterey County Sheriff's Chief Deputy John Darling said, "He's being held on no bail, and that substantiates to us there's a flight risk, so we feel appropriate security measures are war-

Meanwhile, the sheriff's office continues to investigate the circumstances surrounding the shooting, which occurred after Kenney had a boulder delivered and placed on property he believed was his. The rock was located behind a van parked in the Grimes' driveway, and Elizabeth Grimes

called 911 as her husband tried to break it apart with a sledgehammer. She reported fearing for his health and a possible confrontation with her neighbor, Darling reported last



911 dialer gets arrested for meth

HERE'S A look at some of the significant calls logged by the Carmel-by-the-Sea Police Department, the Carmel Fire Department and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office last week. This week's log was compiled by Mary Brownfield.



Nagai died at home of cancer Jan. 20 at the age of 59. A memorial service is planned for Feb. 17 at Calvary Chapel in Monterey.

With a voice that always carried a cheerful tone, Nagai had a knack for convincing people to follow fire prevention rules, according to David Jones, a fire marshal who knew Nagai for almost 20 years and worked closely with her for the last five.

"That's why I think so many contractors will miss her," he said. "She was cheerful with them, and they didn't feel like they were burnt when she told them they had to meet additional requirements."

Her youngest son, Dustin Nagai, agreed. "She was always one to make things work," he said. Even when she delivered bad news, "it wasn't just her shutting someone down just because she could." One Salinas

contractor even invited Nagai to his daughter's wedding, "because he appreciated her."

Nagai also adored teaching fire safety to children, often visiting students at Bay and River schools.

"Public service was a mainstay for her," Jones said. "She was really active with the kids." She also helped teens with Sober Grad nights and a program called Every 15 Minutes — the elaborate, graphic reenactment of a fatal car accident meant to illustrate the far-reaching ramifications of driving drunk.

"I'd probably call her the kindest person I've ever met," said Capt. Rick Scott, who worked with Nagai at the Carmel Highlands Fire Department from 1988 until 2000. Even during disputes in the workplace, "she was always the one who smoothed out the details."

Jones said she also captured the hearts of people living in retirement homes and the nuns at the Carmelite Monastery. "I know the nuns really loved her at that monastery—she had a special desire for keeping them safe," he said.

Positive role model

Kathleen Battaglia, who works in admin-

istration and fire prevention for the Monterey Fire Department but spent more than 10 years with Nagai at the Highlands, said she liked Nagai so much she convinced Nagai to hire her despite a long commute from Toro Park.

"I convinced her it would be no problem," Battaglia said, and the women soon became best friends.

"I saw a lot of me in her," Battaglia said, and she described Nagai as "family oriented," and a good mother.

Salinas Rural Fire's deputy fire marshal, Dorothy Priolo, said, "Cindy was a very important part of my professional life."

The women became acquainted when Priolo joined Salinas Rural in 1990. "She was very inspirational to me, being a woman in the fire service," she said. "I found it was really valuable to learn to achieve that balance between career and family life, and do both of them very well."

Although they didn't work in the same fire department, Priolo said she and Nagai met frequently during meetings of the county fire prevention officers association and worked on projects and in classes together.

The fire service was the perfect home for Nagai, according to her son. After her first

son, Christian, and daughter, Jennifer, were born, Nagai and her husband moved to Carmel Valley from Garden Grove (Orange

Council seeks more comments on bank demolition EIR

DEFENDERS OF the former bank building at Dolores and Seventh lined up in city hall Tuesday for another chance to proclaim its virtues and decry its proposed demolition. Developer John Mandurrago

asked the Carmel City Council to overturn a planning commission decision to send the environmental impact report on his downtown project out for further public comment, but the council voted 4-0 not to grant his

decided the EIR should be circulated again after it identified a new "significant impact." The Modern-style building, designed by architect Walter Burde, has "special character-defining features that make it architecturally and visually distinctive," according to the EIR, and demolishing it would result in a major impact on the surrounding area.

Mandurrago plans to construct a new building containing condos, apartments, retail space and a two-level underground parking garage. He recently pledged to make some of the residential units affordable.

"At issue is whether the EIR should be set aside, recirculated or certified," planning services manager Brian Roseth wrote in his report to the council. "The appellant challenges a determination made by the planning commission that the existing building is of exceptional architectural merit and that its loss from demolition would be a significant impact on visual quality."

Mandurrago also argued the project requires no environmental review, his proposal includes affordable housing and therefore warrants a concession from the city in the form of waiving the planning commission's determination, and "loss of visual quality cannot be used in an EIR because an affordable housing statute narrowly defines what qualifies as an impact."

Roseth disagreed and recommended the council support the commission's decisions and deny Mandurrago's appeal.

"Would the loss of this building create a significant impact on this community? The commission decided it would," he said, through "careful judgment" and public testimony, including statements by members of the local chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

Broad or narrow?

Councilman Mike Cunningham said soliciting more comments on the EIR would not necessarily make a difference in the project's outcome.

"It gives another round of review to document a significant impact with regard to architectural merit," he said. "It doesn't yet decide whether a proposed project is good or not good."

But Roseth said identification of a new significant impact obligates the city to determine how it might be offset, or at least diminished. Planners came up with two options requiring use and preservation of the existing building, but Mandurrago told the

city he could not afford to

"You're stuck," Roseth said. "You either deny the project or approve it with findings of overriding consideration: 'We understand the environmental effects and are approving it anyway, because it does good things."

He asked the council to



Point Sur Lightstation needs more volunteer help on the rock

STANDING LIKE a medieval fortress atop an intimidating cliff and backed by one of the world's most famous land-scapes, the Point Sur Lightstation is truly impressive. And while the formerly vital beacon once belonged to federal government and is now owned by the California Department of Parks and Recreation, it is staffed entirely by local volunteers.

Central Coast Lighthouse Keepers, the local nonprofit group that oversees the lightstation's day-to-day operations, will present an orientation meeting for new volunteers Sunday, Feb. 11, at the California state parks district office at 2211 Garden Road in Monterey. The meeting starts at 1 p.m.

Recruiting volunteers is an essential part of the lightstation's operations, explained Mary Jane Hammerland of Carmel, who works as a docent at the state historic park.

"If we don't recruit volunteers," Hammerland said, "peo-

ple won't be able to see the lightstation."

Meanwhile, the nonprofit group will also offer an orientation tour of the lightstation for prospective volunteers Sunday, Feb. 25. The time and meeting place will be announced

A 32-hour volunteer training program — which meets twice weekly for eight weeks — begins March 1.

"The training is a tremendous educational opportunity to learn more about this area," Hammerland said. "Anyone who loves history will really enjoy it."

In 2006, volunteers gave 248 tours to 4,493 visitors. Volunteers contributed more than 12,500 hours leading tours, operating the lightstation's gift shop, and doing preservation and restoration work.

"We must really like what we do," Hammerland exclaimed.

The lighthouse, built in 1889 on a 361-foot-tall volcanic rock, is located 19 miles south of Carmel. It is the only com-

plete turn-of-the-century lightstation open to the public in California. Lighthouse keepers and their families lived at the site until 1974, when the station was automated. The light-station was entered into the National Register of Historic Places in 1991.

The volunteers lead visitors on guided tours of Point Sur and its lighthouse year-round on Saturdays at 10~a.m. and 2~p.m., and Sundays at 10~a.m. From April through October, tours are available at 10~a.m. and 2~p.m. on Wednesdays. In July and August, tours are also offered on Thursdays at 10~a.m.

Volunteers will also offer 12 moonlight tours this year, weather permitting. The first late-night visit of the season is scheduled for Sunday, April 1 at 6:45 p.m.



The document also specifies who can acquire information about a patient's condition.

"If I've filled out an advance health care directive and I'm taken to the hospital and I'm unconscious, and I've designated my brother as my agent," Barker said, "friends and family can call my brother and get any information they want."

Wilde said when she went to CHOMP to visit her friend, she was given no information about the woman.

Barker said the way it's supposed to work is hospital staff will give a one-word condition of a patient, such as "critical" or "stable" if someone can provide the first and last name of a patient. Barker was unaware of the specific circumstances surrounding Wilde's friend, and therefore was unable to determine why hospital staff would have denied Wilde information about the woman.

Carmel attorney Sidney Morris said he encourages clients to fill out a "HIPAA release authority" as a precaution. "The waiver authorizes a medical provider to release information about your condition to someone you have designated," Morris said.

Morris relayed a story in which a young man, about six weeks before being married, was in a severe car accident in Santa Rosa and was transported to a hospital in the San Francisco Bay area.

"For four days, his fiancee was told only that, 'He is a patient at the hospital," he said. "The staff said, 'You are not a family member, so we can't let you see him.' Only after the parents got themselves to California was the fiance given permission to see him and find out about his condition.

The HIPAA release — if it had named her — would have allowed the woman to see her fiance and get detailed information about his medical condition.

Everyone The Pine Cone interviewed agreed filling out an advance health care directive is crucial. They are readily available at CHOMP and most physicians' offices.

"When you finally need this document, you'll be stuck if you haven't already filled it out," Morgantini said.

Although there are boiler-plate advance health care directives, the language can vary from document to document, Morgantini said. The document Legal Services for Seniors offers clients is about 10 pages, takes about 30 minutes to fill out and requires a witness present at signing, something all directives require. LSS provides the service free for seniors 60 years and older who can't afford an attorney.

Healthcare providers are subject to severe monetary penalties up to \$50,000 and a year in jail if they wrongfully disclose a patient's health information.

"Most healthcare providers are very concerned they are going to be giving out information to the wrong person because of all the penalties HIPAA can impose," Morgantini

But despite the consequences, Morgantini and Ron Gaasch, CHOMP's privacy officer and director of compliance, said they have not heard of a healthcare provider on the Peninsula having been fined for violating HIPAA.

"There have been upward of 20,000 to 30,000 complaints [nationwide]," Gaasch said. "But less than one half of 1 percent had any substance to them, according to the government."

And there have been some common sense changes to HIPAA which allow for some concessions.

"In the last couple of years, there has been a lot of relaxation on what can be given out," Gaasch said. "One of the guidelines now states that if a healthcare provider believes it's in the best interest of the patient to communicate health care information with someone else, then the provider can do that without authorization."

Steven Packer, CHOMP's president and CEO, provided The Pine Cone with an example of that give and take.

'You have a daughter who is halfway across the country, and her mother is hospitalized with a stroke," Packer said. "And the mom is 80 years old and the daughter wants information. The Draconian way is, 'How do I know who you are, and I'm sorry I can't tell you anything about your mom.' Obviously, our job is to be compliant with the law, but also to use some common sense. We want to be able to provide them with enough information."


Still, close friends and unmarried couples are not legally entitled to their partners' health care information unless specifically authorized by the patient to get it.

One of the biggest challenges is making people aware of the importance the health care directive, Morgantini said.

"I can't stress how important it is" she said. "How disturbed do you think your sister or aunt or good friend would be that you are laying in the hospital, and they want to help you, and the doctors are telling them, 'We can't tell you any-



determine whether its decision last fall to declare the 35-year-old former bank not historic also meant it was not architecturally important

R e p r e s e n t i n g Mandurrago, attorney Miriam Schakat said the city council's findings on the historical significance issue covered architectural merit, since they concluded the building does not make "an unusually strong contribution to history, architecture, engineering or culture."

"There may be a lot of sentiment for this building, but this project has the right to move forward," she said.

Before the council voted, several members of the public, including local architects, stood up to disagree.

Richard Barrett said Burde personally told him the Palo Alto Savings & Loan building was the architect's best project.

"Personally, I would go with the opinions of the architectural community, architectural historians and the residents of Carmel over the opinions of attorneys, developers and the out-of-town EIR firm," he said.

Olof Dahlstrand, who with preservation activist Enid Sales formed a group called Citizens of Carmel, which is represented by attorney Susan Brandt-Hawley, said the old bank — now occupied by the Homescapes Carmel store — "is without question a community treasure."

He also told the council it's government's responsibility "to slow or stop the deterioration of community character that results from bowing to the pressures of commercialism."

Narrow

Cunningham said the council "labored long and hard on the question of this building's historic designation on its architectural merit" and concluded it could not be considered historic, especially in light of its young age.

"But we did not conclude the building does not have architectural significance," he said.

Councilman Gerard Rose, who also voted against declaring the bank building historic last year, said, "If we're going to follow our law, if we're going to follow the statues, we have to support the decision of the commission."

The council voted 4-0 to deny Mandurrago's appeal and allow recirculation of the part of the EIR that addresses "visual quality."

Councilman Ken Talmage stepped down, since he was a member of the planning commission when it addressed the issue of visual quality and architectural significance in December. By the time the commission voted to recirculate the EIR in January, Talmage had joined the city council.

guidelines to ensure a project would fit in with the surrounding buildings.

"I don't think anyone's talking about building Cabrini

Green in Carmel," councilman Gerard Rose said, referring to the notorious Chicago housing development known for its gangs, drugs and violence. "And the design guidelines don't go out the window."

Councilwoman Paula Hazdovac said rents will continue to increase, causing even greater need for affordable housing for seniors.

According to the proposed ordinance, only projects serving people with low or very low incomes would qualify. The law was inspired by an application from the Carmel Foundation to construct 14 units of low-cost senior housing at Trevvett Court on Dolores Street.

"Most developers wouldn't be interested in doing this type of housing," Hazdovac said. "When we find people who will do it, we should encourage it."

Mayor Sue McCloud also doubted people would line up to take advantage of the added flexibility and said, "We should do everything we can to facilitate moving ahead with this."

Talmage, who served on the planning commission when it considered the ordinance last September and recommended it for council approval, said, "I think the protections are in here, and I'm comfortable with it."

Cunningham asked for a continuance, but McCloud said a delay "could jeopardize the [Foundation's] project."

When he then objected to establishing an ordinance to address the needs of only one project, city administrator Rich Guillen said the law can always be changed if necessary.

City attorney Don Freeman reminded the council Tuesday's vote would only relate to the first reading of the ordinance. The language can be modified before the final adoption slated for next month's council meeting.

The council voted 4-0 in favor of the ordinance and certified a study concluding it would have no environmental impacts. Cunningham abstained.

As lagoon swells, public works bulldozers take aim at sandbar

WITH RAIN falling intermittently over the last few days, and more rain in the forecast, Monterey County Public Works is preparing for the annual breaching of the Carmel River Lagoon sandbar. The breaching is necessary to help avert flooding in a nearby residential neighborhood.

According to public works maintenance manager Vic Lewis, the water level in the lagoon was at 8.3 feet Thursday

"When it reaches 8.9 feet, we'll mobilize our equipment," Lewis said. "When it gets above 9 feet, we'll start operations if there is an imminent threat of flooding."

In recent years, the action by public works has raised controversy as local officials have tried to balance the concerns of residents with those of steelhead advocates. In 2001, they delayed opening the lagoon so long that several homes flooded. After that incident, members of the Carmel River Steelhead Association and officials at the National Marine Fisheries Service shifted their strategy, arguing that a breach at the south of the beach — long the preferred strategy of the county — harms steelhead, which have been designated a threatened species by the federal government even though the fish is one of the most plentiful in the world.

Three winters ago, public works cut a northerly channel in the sandbar at the request of steelhead advocates, who claimed juvenile fish were being swept out to sea by the fastmoving southerly channel. Residents blamed the northerly cut for erosion that threatened Scenic Road and washed away a large section of Carmel River State Beach. Since then, public works has cut a southerly channel in the sandbar.

Neighbors and agencies to discuss long-term plan

As public works gears up to cut a channel in the sandbar, a variety of interested parties are getting ready to voice their concerns about its long-term management. The Mission Ranch Barn will host a meeting on the subject Thursday, Feb.

The public meeting is sponsored by the Carmel River and Lagoon Coalition, an umbrella group consisting of representatives from the Carmel River Watershed Conservancy, the steelhead association, Homeowners for Effective Lagoon Management, the Carmel Point & Lagoon Preservation Association and Save Carmel River Beach. Though not officially a member of the coalition, a representative from the Big Sur Land Trust will also be at the talks.

Monterey Peninsula Water Management District General Manager David Berger, representing a technical advisory committee composed of government agencies with a stake in the management of the sandbar, will make a presentation.

"We're going to talk about the status of the river, the beach and the lagoon," explained Lorin Letendre, who lives near the lagoon.

While Letendre supports the southerly breach of the sandbar, he is lobbying public works to focus more attention on the ongoing maintenance of the sandbar.

"The breach keeps shifting toward the center of the sandbar and empties the lagoon too fast," he said.

walls are still standing," McGrath said.

A structural engineer will determine how best to secure the building, and until it is safe to enter, investigators cannot sift through physical evidence to determine the cause, McGrath said.

In the meantime, businesses on either side and across the street were shut down to protect people's safety, and McGrath said the stretch of Alvarado Street between Pearl and Bonifacio could remain closed for another day or two.

through the common underfloor area, then into the walls, McGrath said. Thirty engines, including crews from Pacific Grove, Carmel Valley and Carmel, responded and worked through the night. High-flow nozzles atop ladders continued pouring water onto the building during the early morning hours, and firefighters remained on scene Thursday to extinguish hot spots and clean up debris. One firefighter suffered a minor laceration.

"It's huge," Pacific Grove Fire Capt. Fred McAlister said of the blaze. "We don't how it happened. The roof collapsed, and the entire building was destroyed."

"There's nothing to hold the building up, even though the

"I left two minutes before to go to MPCC when they called me," Bechler said. "It will probably be next week when we can reopen."

"The blast actually blew out windows and knocked the front wall off the foundation," McAlister said. "The oven door was about a 7-foot-by-3-foot-wide, half-foot-thick metal. It blew that door about six feet away off its hinges."

McAlister said the fire department placed a ballpark estimate of \$150,000 on the damage, although the amount could exceed that. Bechler said representatives from his insurance company were expected to arrive from the San Francisco area on Friday to provide an accurate assessment of the damage.



Cold hard facts and mental rewiring help fight

JEANNE MCELHATTON and Fran Grant know all about fear of flying. Not that either struggles with it - in fact, both women obtained their pilot licenses decades ago. But a shared desire to help people unlearn their jitters led to their creating a clinic that celebrated its 30th birthday last year. The nonprofit Fear of Flying Clinic will hold its next two-weekend course at San Francisco International Airport in February and March.

When they first decided to try to help aviophobes overcome their fears, the women hadn't intended the effort to become a threedecade venture.

It was Grant's husband, Norm, who got them started. A former Navy pilot who had lived through a few "air emergencies," he had vowed he "wouldn't fly again unless the Navy made him do it," McElhatton said. So the women set about strategizing how to help him and other fearful flyers "find their wings and to abandon old beliefs and anxieties about flying." They gathered a group in San Mateo and shared their knowledge and passion for aviation.

It worked for Norm Grant. "His big problem was turbulence," McElhatton said. By the end, he was sleeping through the bumpiest of flights, and the couple took a longawaited trip Down Under.

Those early meetings did more than get Grant on an airplane without the Navy's force. Soon, the Fear of Flying Clinic took off to "inform people about all aspects of aviation and to replace fears with solid beliefs."

"We thought we would just do it a couple of times, but now it's been 30 years," said McElhatton, who is also a flight instructor, commuter pilot and NASA aviation safety

The clinics take a two-pronged approach: education and behavioral modification. The nonprofit is mostly staffed by volunteer female pilots. Instructors from the Federal Aviation Administration and major air carriers, including United, also donate time.

They come because they love to share their love of aviation with other people," McElhatton said. Pilots, flight attendants, airline mechanics and air traffic controllers explain safety procedures, training and airplane control systems, as well as basic principles of aerodynamics and weather.

The clinic also employs a licensed behavioral therapist who helps participants develop techniques and learn the keys to overcoming their fears and anxieties.

"You can teach people everything in the world, and if they don't change their attitude about how they look at and think about fly-



After the Grimeses were shot, Kenney also dialed 911 and reported being involved in a battery, according to Darling. Deputies arrived to find Mel Grimes dead outside the house near a carport and his wife suffering from gunshot wounds in the chest and arm, but conscious and speaking. She reportedly told them Kenney had shot her and her husband.

Deputies found Kenney standing outside his own home nearby and arrested him without incident. Elizabeth Grimes later died while being airlifted to San Jose Medical Center.


One issue in the investigation is the ownership of the semiautomatic handgun used in the shooting.

"We're still tracking that down and trying to confirm it," Darling said. "It could take several weeks," because if investigators determine through records who the owner is, they will still need to find out when that person last had custody of it. "And I'm not sure that if we do nail down the ownership that we're going to release that information."

Darling said detectives are also interviewing neighbors and waiting for test results on physical evidence.

"There have been no startling revelations of any sort," he said.

Kenney is next set to appear in court Feb.



Taylor content to leave stardom to older brother James



"If you have to sound like somebody, thank God it's James Taylor and not Tom Waits," joked the singer/songwriter, who counts gravel-voiced Waits as a friend.

Despite not having a hit single since "I Will Be In Love With You" reached No.30 on the Billboard charts in 1978, Taylor maintains a busy touring schedule. With his engaging personality and warm stage presence, Taylor is right at home in front of a live audience. He is also in the midst of an unusually prolific period of songwriting.

"I've never experienced the creative burst I've been in for the last five years," he beamed." I have a one brand new CD and another one half done. It's so wonderful to go up on stage with a flood of new songs."

When he's not recording or touring, Taylor is immersed in his second occupation, teaching at the prestigious Berklee College of Music in Boston.

"I started lecturing there about 20 years ago," recalled Taylor, who teaches, among other subjects, a class called, "Stage Presence." "Somebody suggested I join the staff, and I was on it like a cop on a donut."

Over the years, Taylor has surprised his music students by bringing in pop stars such



OR TRADITIONAL IRA?

SHOULD YOU CHOOSE ROTH

If you are eligible to choose between IRAs, which one should you pick? The traditional tax-deferred IRA? Or the Roth IRA, which offers the potential for tax-free earnings?

Generally speaking, tax-free beats tax-deferred. But if you can make deductible contributions to a traditional IRA and you wil be in a lower tax bracket upon retirement, you could come out ahead by selecting the traditional IRA.

Keep in mind, though, that with a traditional IRA, you must start taking withdrawals when you reach 70 - 1/2. If you own a Roth IRA, you are never required to take withdrawals. This difference can be an important factor in determining how you'll manage your taxes and income during retirement.

sides of the case and read them. I found the Flanders' counsel's briefs to be very well written, cogent and convincing. They countered the city council's legal argument which could deny to the citizens of Carmel their opportunity, provided by the California Government Code, to have the question of sale of part of their Mission Trail park placed on a ballot. Flander's counsel opposed the city's argument that the Flanders Mansion and the parcel of land surrounding it, surveyed off by the city council to be sold with it, are not "parkland". The city argued that the mansion and the parcel were not part of Mission Trail park because they were never "used" as part of that park (even though they are in the park and zoned by the city as part of the park). Therefore, the city argued, the Government Code's provisions concerning the citizens' right to vote on sales of their parkland do not apply.

The ultimate measure of the presentations of the Flanders Foundation's legal counsel in this case may be found in the judge's ruling, which should come soon.

Eventually she made her way into aviation as a profession, becoming an instructor who taught flying in the plane and








ground school at two colleges. McElhatton also received her instrument and commercial ratings, which allowed her to fly for a small commuter airline.

She said she's gratified by the ability and opportunity to help other people overcome their fears and even learn to enjoy air travel.



County) because they didn't want to raise their children in the congestion of Southern California.

Later, Nagai went to work as an assistant at Carmelo preschool and took a part-time job as secretary at the Mid Valley Fire Department in 1982.

She became a volunteer firefighter and then passed the tests to join the paid ranks. She spent time as an EMT on the ambulance and took more courses to become a fire prevention officer, signing on part-time with Carmel Highlands and working for both departments until going to the Highlands full time in 1988. After the CDF was contracted to run the Highlands station in 2000, she also helped handle fire mar-

"What most impressed me about her was that no matter what was going on around her in the fire agency she was working with, whether changes in the organization or changes in personnel, she always understood what she needed to do and took the measures needed to get those things accomplished," Priolo said. "I'm going to miss her a whole lot."

Nagai's son said his mother remained optimistic even after a tumor on her lung caused it to collapse and forced her to seek treatment. When his parents arrived at their son's chiropractic office to tell him the news, she remained quiet and then told him she would beat the illness and how proud she was of him.

Carmel reads The Pine Cone

"She was the most positive person I know," he said. "Whatever came up, she always had an answer for it and turned it into a positive. My first phone call about anything was always to her."

Refusing to take a bed in the hospital or hospice, Nagai died at home Jan. 20. "She hated hospitals," her son said. 'My brother, sister, dad and I were all holding onto her when she took her last breath."

She is survived by her husband, David; her sons, Christian and David; her daughter, Jennifer Borgen; and her grandson, Lucas Borgen.





Editorial

Placing the blame

A MAN shoots his neighbors in a dispute over a small piece of land. Whose fault is that?

The killer's, of course. No matter what the neighbors did, or how ill-mannered they were about doing it, there is only one possible justification for using deadly violence against them. Unless he was in immediate danger of great bodily harm himself, nothing could make the man's actions right.

Nevertheless, the aftermath of events in Carmel Valley last week included a lot of hand-wringing about who was really to blame for the killings, and who should have done what to stop them.

- A lawyer hired to defend the alleged killer, John Kenney, did not deny his client pulled the trigger. Nor did he claim the shootings were done in self defense. But he cryptically blamed the victims, saying, "There are many issues that are relevant to this case. I believe when fully aired, they will vindicate my client's position and he should be found not guilty."
- Another lawyer working for Kenney blamed sheriff's deputies for not being on the scene to prevent the killings.

"If there is a police officer or a deputy standing by, most normal, sane people would not go off," he said.

Indeed, law enforcement had been asked to stand by at the scene several hours before the shootings, because of concerns over possible violence when Kenney's neighbor, Mel Grimes, learned Kenney had placed a large rock on the disputed property. The deputies went off to other duties when they were told by a delivery man that everything had gone peacefully when the boulder

■ Acquaintances of Kenney and Grimes described Kenney in glowing terms. "He was just an angel," said one. They didn't see how he could kill two people, thereby implying that someone else must have been responsible.


Based on the facts that have so far come to light, none of these claims amounts to a hill of beans.

When a gang member shoots someone for wearing the wrong colors or being disrespectful, it isn't anybody's fault except the shooter — not the victim, not the shooter's family or church or school, and not a police officer who didn't happen to be on the scene.

When a drunk driver kills an innocent bystander, it is only the drunk driver's fault — not his family, or the bartender who served him drinks or the company that made his car.

When a robber shoots his victim for not handing over the loot fast enough, it isn't the victim's fault, or the fault of somebody who may have mistreated the criminal when he was a child.

Of course, there are many factors that can contribute to a crime being committed. Society does, and should, work very hard to reduce or eliminate those factors. But we also should work just as hard to quit telling criminals, "It's not your fault."

'At it again' Dear Editor,

The FUD [fear, uncertainty, and doubt] mongers of Pacific Grove appear to be at it again (Pine Cone, Feb. 2, "Questions raised about herbicide use on P.G. dunes"). This time, they have questioned a perfectly reasonable restoration project. Perhaps a brief description of the facts about the restoration tools used would enlighten.

What does glyphosphate do? It is an enzyme inhibitor in the photosynthetic pathway (shikimic acid pathway) that prevents the formation of lignins. Plants normally convert sugars (simple carbohydrates made in photosynthesis) to complex chains of carbohydrates (cellulose, lignin). Animals do not make cellulose or have cellulose in their tissue structure; it is only found in plants, fungi and bacteria. Without cellulose or lignins, plants collapse and die. Animals don't have cellulose or that photosynthetic pathway, so glyphosphate is without effect. Further, as an enzyme inhibitor, glyphos-

phate only works when plants are actively photosynthesizing. That is, the molecule must go into the plant's tissue, and it must be warm and sunny and wet enough for active plant photosynthesis. As a delicate molecule, glyphosphate rapidly breaks down in daylight. Even storing it in a clear container will deactivate it. In sunlight, glyphosphate will break down within an hour or so into ammonia, water and other harmless components. When applied at label rates, glyphosphate is a relatively safe compound; it affects only plants, and only those that are actively growing, and is broken down rapidly in sunlight and by soil microbes so it does not "wash off" or stay in the soil, lurking in the dark underbelly of civilization. In fact, it has been used many times on dune restoration projects because it rapidly kills only the living plants and in many cases the dune soil has ample seed banks of the native, rare plants, and they sprout and come back once the choking cover of iceplant is gone. Native plants use the nutrients of the dead weeds for new growth. For these reasons, and for the economics of using a safe herbicide compared to hand weeding, glyphosphate has been used for many years in dune restoration in California (see: Pickart, A.J., and J.O. Sawyer. 1998. Ecology and restoration of Northern California coastal dunes. California Native Plant Society Press, Sacramento.)

Commercial compounds of glyphosphate

have additives that various companies claim will improve the performance; compounds (surfactants—soap) that are indeed harmful to amphibians if the soaps are applied at 4x label rates directly into standing water as has been done in some studies. Thus, the label for the compound restricts the use of many brand names to terrestrial situations. Professional applicators, like those from Rana Creek Habitat Restoration, are careful, and follow label instructions, so when spraying iceplant on a dry, calm day, there is very little risk other than to the targeted weeds.

Of real concern to Pagrovians should be tons of soap, grease, brake linings, particles from worn tires, excess yard and house chemicals, etc. washed each month into the streets and then the oceans from their town. Without stormwater treatment, and the continued, repeated failure of sewage lines, P.G. has many more important, proven threats to the environment than a careful use of an her-

bicide in an effort to protect four endangered species from being swamped to extinction by weeds.

'Give it a chance' Dear Editor,

I can provide some helpful information regarding concerns about ice-plant control and endangered species (Pine Cone, Feb. 2). Starting at Asilomar in 1968, I worked on various projects such as this for over 35

Large Hottentot fig ice plant, introduced from South Africa, stabilizes dunes but is very aggressive. Healthy patches can spread three feet a year in every direction, smothering native plants, including the endangered Menzies wallflowers and Tidestrom's lupines found

only in the Asilomar/17 Mile Drive dunes area. It also spreads by seeds ingested by deer and birds which eat the fruits. By the 1970s, ice plant had completely taken over dunes and coastal bluffs at Asilomar State Beach. Ice plant was later killed by the California Department of Parks and Recreation, native plants were grown and planted, and the native vegetation has recovered. To look at it now, there is no hint that it had mostly been carpeted with ice plant three decades ago.

For over 10 years, I worked on Monterey Bay dunes belonging to the Naval Postgraduate School. Roundup (glyphosate) was used to spray ice plant, European beach grass, invasive annual ripgut grass and some other weeds. Light dosages were applied carefully to the targeted foliage, with virtually no harm to native plants. There was no runoff into the bay or anywhere. More than 100,000 additional native plants were planted in the dead ice plant mulch. In some

dunes where native plants, including two endangered species — dune gilia and Monterey spine flower — were still well represented, little or no planting was needed. As the ice plant mulch gradually disappeared, the native plants filled in. Surveys showed significant increases of the endangered species, plus improved habitat for rare legless lizards and endangered Smith's blue butterflies. Old landfill areas on the property required a lot more planting and weed control than the dunes, but now it looks so natural a visitor would not know work had been done at all, which is how it is supposed to look. This successful project has recently become a model for restoration of native vegetation to Naval bases throughout the

While early stages of restoration look terrible — like peeling old paint from a build-

ing — it is temporary. Give it chance. In a few years it can be as successful as the dunes and bluffs at Asilomar where nature has made a comeback.

Pro-Am \$\$ go a long way for local charities

OR SOME local residents, the annual arrival of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am is an opportunity to rub elbows with movie stars and golf pros. For others, the AT&T means crowded roads and booked-up restaurants. But for dozens of local charities, the event is far more than a fun weekend or an inconvenience. For them, the annual winter golf tournament is a lifeline.

Since its inception in 1947, the Pro-Am has raised more than \$50 million for Monterey County nonprofit groups. Here are some of the very worthy charities — each a benefactor of the AT&T Pebble Beach pro-am — that make a big difference in in our local community.

■ Homes for neglected pets

The Animal Friends Rescue Project is nonprofit organization dedicated to finding permanent homes for abandoned, stray and abused pets. The organization is also committed to ending the pet overpopulation crisis through aggressive spaying and neutering programs. If the numbers are any indication, the group has been remarkably successful in its efforts.

"In a little over eight years, we've rescued more than 9,600 animals that would have been euthanized," said Jeanne Huber, executive director for the nonprofit group. "We work closely with other organizations — shelters, rescue groups and veterinarians — to fill a gap in animal wel-

Gate) and at the CSUMB parking area (follow signs from Highway 1 exit to CSUMB, approximately 10 miles north of Pebble Beach).

Parking: During tournament rounds, complimentary spectator parking is available on the CSUMB campus at the former Fort Ord, about 10 miles north of Pebble Beach on Highway 1, with frequent shuttle buses to deliver spectators to the competition courses, where other shuttle buses will also take them between courses. Handicapped parking is available throughout the practice and tournament rounds inside Pebble Beach.

Shuttles: Since the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am is again asking even

local attendees to drive to Fort Ord to park, several local cities are offering shuttle buses to make the trip to Pebble Beach more convenient for locals, while benefitting area businesses by bringing more potential shoppers and diners into their towns.

The Carmel shuttle — arranged by the chamber of commerce and the Carmel Innkeepers Association — will run every 15 minutes, picking up passengers in front of Carmel Plaza at Ocean Avenue and Junipero Street, and dropping them off at the tournament gate. Operating hours will be Thursday, Feb. 8, through Saturday, Feb. 10, from 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and Sunday, Feb. 11, from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The \$10 daily pass allows unlimited rides, just in case people want to return to town for lunch and then return to the fairways and greens in the afternoon. And for added convenience, fans can also purchase daily tournament tickets at the Carmel Plaza bus stop or the chamber's visitors center on San Carlos Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

Also, some local businesses are sponsoring buses and will give away coupons, goodie bags and other freebies to promote themselves.

In addition, business representatives on the shuttles can answer riders' questions about Carmel, the tournament, where to eat dinner, or almost anything else they might want to know.

People wanting to ride the Carmel shuttle can park their cars for free all day in the city's Vista Lobos parking lot at Third Avenue and Junipero Street. Paid parking is available at the Sunset Center lot at the corner of Eighth Avenue and Mission Street, and in the Carmel Plaza's garage on Mission between Ocean and Seventh avenues.

Shuttle tickets and tournament anyday tickets can be purchased at the many Carmel inns, the Carmel Plaza bus stop or on the bus. The chamber's visitors center, located on San Carlos Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues, will also be open to field questions and provide information.

In an "effort to provide the maximum in hospitality to the visitors for the golf tournament and to showcase the many charms of Pacific Grove," the P.G. Chamber of Commerce will also offer shuttle service to the tournament. In addition, hotels are promoting package deals for golf fans, and many businesses are staying open late Friday and Saturday nights for those who want to get some shopping in without missing any of the action on the golf courses.

Three 59-passenger Pacific Monarch buses will ferry riders, who will also receive special gift bags containing coupons, post cards and brochures. Shuttle tickets will run \$10 per day or \$30 for a five-day pass.

Tournament-goers can leave their cars parked all day for free on Ocean View Boulevard a block away from the shuttle pickup spot in front of the P.G. Museum of Natural History,

located at the corner of Forest and Central avenues downtown. Buses will depart every 20 minutes beginning at 6:30 a.m., with the ride to Pebble Beach taking approximately 20 minutes.

Bus passes, as well as tournament tickets, will be sold at the Pacific Grove chamber office located at 584 Central Ave., catty-corner from the natural history museum. For more information, call (831) 373-3304 or visit www.pacificgrove.org.

Security: A backpack ban has been spreading through professional sports and has now made its way to professional golf tournaments, including the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. For the first time this year all bags larger than 8-by-8-by-8 inches will not be allowed on tournament grounds this year, in accordance with the PGA Tour's newly adopted security regulations. Umbrellas and folding chairs will be permitted.

fare."

In addition to helping to pay the medical expenses of animals in its care, proceeds from the golf tournament have also been used to help finance a new van, as well as purchase "cat condos" for the felines in the AFRP's care.


"They create a kinder and gentler home for the cats," said Huber of the modular car houses. "And they create a better environment for people to socialize with them."

Finding homes for thousands of neglected or abandoned pets is no easy task, but it's a challenge that AFRP's staff is committed to meet.

"The animals are just looking for a second chance," Huber said. "That's what we're here for."

■ Keeping food on the table

Despite the amazing affluence of some parts of the county, a surprisingly large number of people ranging from small children to seniors — rely on the Food Bank of Monterey County to help put food on their tables. The largest supplier of emergency food in Monterey County, the Salinas-based group distributes more than 6 million pounds of food each year. One in five county residents receives at least part of their food from the charity, according to food bank officials.

"There's a high incidence of poverty in Monterey County that many people are not aware of," said Leslie Sunny, executive director.

But, thanks to groups such as the food bank, there isn't much hunger. According to Sunny, the group's success is partly due to its low overhead. The organization is almost entirely dependent of volunteer labor and donated food.

"When someone gives us a dollar, we are able to

distribute eight dollars of food," she said. "The value of a donation is extraordinary. Financial contributions go a long way."


Last year, the food bank received a substantial donation from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, which distributes proceeds from the AT&T pro-am and other fundraising events. Sunny said more than 50,000 people in Monterey

County either directly or indirectly receive food from the group each month. The food bank supplies food to at least 65 different organizations, including youth groups, civic groups, senior centers and churches.

Despite record-low unemployment and very vigorous national economy, the food bank says it needs help now more than ever.

'In the past two years, there has been a significant decrease in the amount of food we receive," Sunny explained. "At the same time, we've received more

Army of laser pointers ensures plentiful, accurate stats

IF YOU enjoy knowing all kinds of

statistics about the professionals playing on the Pebble Beach Golf Links during the AT&T Pebble Beach

National Pro-Am, you should be grateful for the PGA Tour's ShotLink system. But all the data it collects

about this week's tournament — such as who had the longest drives or the most accurate putts — would be unknown if it weren't for the group of 130 volunteers who spend their days at Pebble shooting golf balls with lasers.

Newest Carmel City Councilman Ken Talmage and Salinas business owner Gene Snuggs are in charge of the laser committee, recruiting and organizing the volunteers who come from all over the country. The cochairs assign them to specific duties on each of Pebble's 18 famous holes to ensure the TV networks, the PGA Tour Internet site, and the millions of people who rely on them get all the information they need.

Talmage said the PGA Tour worked with IBM to develop the high-tech system about five years ago. At each hole, two-person teams of laser operators stationed on the fairways and on platforms above the greens laser targeting devices at the pros' golf balls once they land, and then input the coordinates for each shot in Palm Pilots. They coordinate with the scorers following the groups to make sure the information is connected to the proper player.

The PGA Tour employs the ShotLink system at many major events. During the AT&T, it's only used on the P.B. Golf Links, not at Spyglass Hill or Poppy Hills.

"To laser every shot hit by any pro golfer at Pebble Beach takes 130 volunteers every day during all four days of the tournament," Talmage said.

Short par 3s require only laser volunteers at the green, while longer holes have the teams on the fairways. Par 5 holes require two fairway teams. Other volunteers remain on the tee to identify the players.

"The greenside lasers are accurate to inches over a distance of three or four miles," Talmage said. "You send that data off through cyberspace, and then it's used live on the Internet and by TV networks. Command Central for all this data is a huge truck with wall to wall electronics, screens and computers, and that's where the PGA Tour staff takes the data and tracks them all.'

The information appears in television broadcasts, online and on ShotLink kiosks situated around the three golf courses and main fan areas where spectators can check out live leader boards, schedules, pairings, player highlights and statistics, and even the weather.

ShotLink also provides more statistics than even the most devoted golf fans would ever need or want. For less than \$100 a year, you can even subscribe to the PGA Tour's online service that provides answers to all sorts of

alone," he explained. "We are very grateful to the community organizations that help support us."


Today, the festival offers music lovers dozens of performances, concerts, recitals, master classes, lectures, symposia and educational and and a variety of outreach programs.

questions, such as which player is best on a certain hole, how two pros compare when it comes to 300-yard drives, or the percentage of successful putts when the ball lies more than 15 feet from the pin.

Spectators can follow their favorite golfer, or keep track of their favorite hole and watch how every player performs there, Talmage said. "It becomes an historical archive, and most of the tour players have laptops and are subscribers to the service, so for them it becomes a database of information." Caddies use it as well.

All that technology and information marks huge progress compared with the greenside scoring Talmage did when he began volunteering for the tournament in 1992.

"There were some very simple computers, and a greenside reporter sat at each green at all three of the golf courses and punched in the scores and statistics recorded by the walking scorers," Talmage said. The greenside scoring committee had only 36 volunteers. "There was a walking scorer with each group, and the scorer would tear off a piece of paper."

The greenside scorers would input that data into a computer that transmitted it back to the trailer, where it was used for scoreboards throughout the tournament and PGA statistics.

Golf makes a difference

A self-proclaimed hacker, Talmage has played the game for about 40 years and loves it. He haunts multiple courses around the Peninsula, Rancho Cañada and Spanish Bay among them, and is a volunteer coach for The First Tee youth golf program at Twin Creeks in Salinas.

"You never master it," he said. "But here on the Peninsula, it's probably the sport of choice, and it's a chance to get together with friends, get some exercise and have a good time."

Talmage began volunteering for the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am not only because he loves the game, but because the tournament has such a huge impact on local nonprofits.

"Last year, the AT&T raised close to \$6 million for more than 100 local charities, and I don't think it's widely recognized in this community that the AT&T golf tournament over the last dozen years has raised \$50 million for local charities. It's one of the principle sources of charity moneys in Monterey County. It's extraordinary."

Talmage pointed out the \$6 million sum amounts to \$15 per person living in Monterey County, which has a population of about 400,000.

As longtime volunteers, Talmage and Snuggs were asked to co-chair the laser committee when ShotLink came online.

"The hardest part was getting 130 volunteers coordinated," including what size jackets they need, where they should be on the golf course, who wants to work with whom, and what events they want to attend — "all the administrative aspects of organizing 130 people for four days."

Many return year after year to help during the AT&T, as well as in its newer sister tournament, The First Tee Open, played over Labor Day weekend with pros from the Champions Tour and junior players. That tournament raises money for The First Tee, which helps children develop life skills through the game of golf. Talmage and Snuggs run the laser committee for that as well.

Often coming from other states, the volunteers pay for their own travel and lodging to contribute their time and energy, and Talmage said they make up "a dynamic group, including a retired Navy test pilot, a Silicon Valley executive, a woman who spends most of the year doing volunteer work in Eastern Europe, a couple from Ohio, a CISCO executive from Austin, Texas, etc.

"This is a way they give back to this community, even though many of them don't live here," he said.

Talmage said his group includes Lt. Col. Dave Overton, head Marine at the Naval Postgraduate School whose wife, Susanne, coordinates the 2,000 volunteers at the AT&T and 1,000 volunteers at The First Tee Open.

Laser committee volunteer Steve Shultis is the chair of a similar committee at the Reno-Tahoe Open, and Pebble Beach resident Vicki Nelson is the executive director of Compassionate Care Alliance when she's not shooting golf balls with lasers.

Retired Naval officer Barry Phillips is general manager of The First Tee of Monterey County, while Rich Roll (chair of the laser committee at the Charles Schwab Cup in Sonoma) and his wife, Gail, volunteer at several PGA tournaments each year in California and Hawaii.

"I could go on, but you get my point," Talmage said. "It's a dynamic, can-do, committed team."

And it's not always sitting outside in nice, warm, dry weather enjoying a little golf, either, he said. "We're out there in whatever weather, as long as the golf tournament is being played. The last five or six years, we've had sun, but there were years before that where it was raining and the wind was blowing 35 or 40 mph."

Talmage recalled being posted one year at Pebble's 7th Tee, an exposed, short hole that curves around a point jutting into Carmel Bay.


"The wind was coming out of the south with the rain. It's a 100-yard hole, so most people will be hitting pitching wedges or sand wedges, and because of the weather, the pros were hitting 4-irons," he recalled.

In addition to the gratification of helping raise so much money for so many charities, Talmage said volunteers receive a lot of positive input, which further motivates them to return each year.


During The First Tee, the laser committee brings some of the Twin Creeks students to Pebble to help the volunteers while watching some of the pros they admire.

"At the end of the day, one of these kids walked up afterward, took off his hat and looked me in the eye, and said, "Thank you very much, Coach Ken," and as he walked away, he turned and looked back and said, "This is the best day of my life." I can do a lot of volunteer work when I get a little feedback like that," Talmage said.



HISTORY OF THE PRO-AM

PINE CONE STAFF REPORT

N 1937, Bing Crosby invited a group of friends to get together for a round of golf and a "clambake" at Rancho Santa Fe in Southern California. That gathering of Hollywood celebrities and golf greats gave birth to the first National Pro-Amateur Golf Championship, sponsored by Bing Crosby, with Sam Snead taking the top prize of \$500.

For five years, the tournament was played at Rancho Santa Fe before being discontinued during the war years. Meanwhile, 1946 was shaping up to be a bleak year for the Monterey Peninsula. Postwar Monterey was frantically scraping for income, the chief source having been packed into sardine tins for just about the last time. Cannery Row was heading into a long decline, Carmel wasn't a worldwide tourist attraction, Pebble Beach had yet to classified the finest course in the world, and nobody had heard of a young, would-be actor named Clint Eastwood.

At this time, a young newspaper reporter, Ted Durein, came up with the idea of attracting more tourists by bringing a major special event to the area. A good sporting event, once a year, perhaps garnished with celebrities, could anchor a drifting economy. Slowly an idea began to take shape, along with a worldwide household name: Crosbv.

Durein solicited local merchants to see if they would pool money for a tournament purse — they would. Bravely, Durein wrote to Bing Crosby himself with the idea. That was in January of 1946. February and March passed. Nothing. April, May, still nothing. Then, in June, a letter from Bing's brother, Larry, arrived. Yes, Bing was interested. What's the offer? Durein didn't have one.

The deal is struck

He quickly rushed to see if Samuel F.B. Morse (president of Del Monte Properties, now known as Pebble Beach Company) would let the Pebble Beach golf course host the Crosby. Morse agreed. Ted met with Larry Crosby and the deal was struck.

Bing then decided he wanted the tournament spread out over three courses: Pebble Beach, Cypress Point and the Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course. The PGA Tour, the controlling body of the professional golfers' tournament, said this was unprecedented. Bing asked, "Why not? It's done in England." The PGA Tour consented and the Crosby Pro-Am broke new ground in American golf and was played for the first time on the Monterey Peninsula in January 1947.

Since then, the annual tournament at Pebble Beach has been a staple of the PGA Tour calendar. The tournament purse has increased from \$500 for first prize in 1937 to a first prize of \$900,000 in 2004. The monies for charity each year have continued to set new records as well, with total contributions hitting \$46 million.

Bing Crosby died in 1977. His wife and children continued to host the Crosby Pro-Am until 1986, when AT&T took over sponsorship of the event. Since 1991, the event has been played at Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass. Over the last 20 years, the event has provided some of the most dramatic moments in golf, including Hale Irwin's fantastically lucky tee shot in 1984, and Tiger Woods' amazing comeback in 2000.

It has also endured some of the worst weather ever for a major sporting event. Twice, after particularly cold and rainy spells, tournament organizers have talked about moving the Pro-Am to a different time of year. And on one occasion, when the hardy golfers refused to surrender to gale force winds and near-freezing temperatures, Crosby reminded everyone that, "We must not forget the players - those dauntless athletes, professionals and amateurs alike who are willing to pit their skills, and in some instances their survival, against these challenging links in conditions which sometimes defy descrip-

But most years there have been glorious, only-in-California conditions for the Pebble Beach Pro-Am. And the memories have been golden, too.

Winner: Jack Nicklaus 66-74-71-73 (284)

A 25-foot birdie putt on the first hole of a suddendeath playoff gave Jack Nicklaus the Crosbv title and a \$28,000 first-place check. He beat Johnny Miller after both had poor rounds on the final day hitting bad tee shots and missing short putts all over the course. Miller even hit a ball into the ocean on 10. Nicklaus, who three-putted on 17 to set up the playoff, earned his fifth tour victory in six events. Lee Trevino took third place, as well as the Pro-Am title with partner Don Schwab.

According to a newspaper account, Clint Eastwood, then at the height of his "Dirty Harry" fame, playing in his seventh Crosby, missed the cut and spent Sunday watching the Super Bowl (Dallas 24, Miami 3) and playing tennis.

1973 **Winner: Jack Nicklaus** 71-69-71-71 (282)

Despite back-to-back bogies on 7 and 8 at Pebble during the final round, Jack Nicklaus won the tournament for the second straight year in a suddendeath playoff — and again with a birdie putt on the first sudden-death hole, 15. Robert Moody appeared to have the tournament won in regulation, but missed an easy two-and-a-half-foot putt on 18 that knocked him back into a tie with Nicklaus and Ray Floyd. "I missed a \$20,000 putt," Moody said. Not



The best of the PGA Tour at the Pebble Beach Pro-Am

■ Jim Furyk — 2006 PGA Tour earnings: \$7,482,275

A NATIVE of West Chester, Penn., Jim Furyk had a career-best on the money list last year, finishing second to Tiger Woods. He had two victories on the 2006 PGA Tour, only the second time he has had that many victories. But he has now won at least one tournament in 10 of his 13 seasons.

One of this 2006 victories was the Wachovia Championship, which he took in a one-hole playoff over Trevor Immelman. He had a one-shot lead through 54 holes, closed with a 1-under 71, and earned \$1.134 million for his 11th career victory. Furyk made an 8-foot par putt on the 72nd hole to force the playoff and made a 6-foot par putt on 18 to win.

Later, at THE PLAYERS Championship, he was the leader after 18 and 36 holes, but weekend rounds of 75-72 dropped him to a tie for third. He was runner-up at the Verizon Heritage for the second consecutive year, having shared the 54-hole lead with Aaron Baddeley, but finishing one stroke back. And he also finished as runner-up at the U.S. Open. (Furyk has made cuts in 11 of 12 U.S. Opens in his career and has collected four top-10 finishes, including a victory in 2003 victory.) He was fourth at the

British Open, after missing the cut the previous five times. His third runner-up finish of the season came at the Buick Open, where he was three strokes behind Tiger Woods after a final-round 8-under 64. He finished third at the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational, one stroke out of a Tiger

Woods-Stewart Cink playoff. On the way, Furyk made an ace on the 206-yard, par-3 15th hole with a 6-iron in the second round, his second career Tour hole-in-one. The finish was Furyk's sixth top-10 in eight starts at the Akron tournament.

Two weeks later, he captured his 12th career Tour victory at the Canadian Open with rounds of 63-71-67-65—266 to edge Bart Bryant by one stroke, moving to No. 2 in the Official World Golf Ranking. With the

\$900,000 payday, Furyk cracked \$6 million in single-season earnings for the first time and \$30 million for his career.

Jim Furyk qualified for the PGA Tour in 1993 after an outstanding college career at the University of Arizona.

■ Vijay Singh (AT&T Pro-Am winner, 2004) — 2006 PGA Tour earnings: \$4,718,526

A NATIVE of Fiji, Vijay Singh was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame on October 30 last year. For the season, he finished among the top five on the PGA Tour money list for the ninth consecutive time and also won for the fifth consecutive season. His 13 top-10s matched Jim Furyk for most on the Tour in 2006.

At the Mercedes Championships, he fired final-round 7-under 66, one of only two rounds in the 60s posted by the entire 28-man field, to catch Stuart Appleby and force a playoff. But Singh's lifetime playoff record dropped to 7-3 after Appleby birdied the first extra hole. It was Singh's second runner-up finish at Kapalua in the last three years. At last year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, Singh finished tied for seventh, thanks to his closing 4-under 68. It was his 12th appearance at Pebble Beach, totaling six top-10s, all six in the last eight years.

He also finished in the top 10 at the World Golf Championships-Accenture Match Play Championship, at the Bay Hill Invitational presented by MasterCard, and at THE PLAYERS Championship, where he was tied for 8th.

At the Masters, Singh was one the first-round leader after posting a 5-under-par 67, but finished tied for 8th, his sixth top-10 in 13 starts in Augusta.

He won the Barclays Classic for a victory in a fifth consecutive season, the second-longest streak on the PGA Tour, behind Tiger Woods, who has 11. The win was also his 17th since turning 40, tying him with Sam Snead for most wins by a player after turning 40.

Also in 2006, Singh finished tied for 6th at the U.S. Open at Winged Foot, his seventh consecutive top-10 at a major championship, beginning with the 2004 PGA Championship. He has not missed a cut in a major since the

2002 British Open, a string of 15 straight. Also extended his consecutive U.S. Open cut streak to 12, and is 12-for-13 in his career, the lone missed cut being his debut in 1993.

With Singh finished tied for 8th at THE TOUR Championship, he recorded his 11th top-10 in 13 starts at the PGA Tour's season-ending event.

■ Phil Mickelson (AT&T Pro-Am champion, 1998, 2005) — 2006 PGA Tour earnings: \$4,256,505

THE HIGHLIGHT of the 2006 season for left-hander Phil Mickelson was his second Masters Tournament title. One week before, he accomplished an amazing 13-shot blowout of the field at the BellSouth Classic. His 260 total (63-65-67-65) defeated runners-up Zach Johnson and Jose Maria Olazabal by the largest margin of victory since Tiger Woods won the 2000 U.S. Open by 15.

Later, playing in his 14th U.S. Open as a professional, Mickelson was looking to join Tiger Woods (2000-01) and Ben Hogan (1953) as the only players in modern era (since inception of the Masters in 1934) to win three consecutive majors. He held a share of the 54-hole lead with England's Kenneth Ferrie at 2-over. And in the final round, he held a two-stroke lead after No. 15, but fell into a three-way tie for second, behind winner Geoff Ogilvy, with Jim Furyk and Colin Montgomerie, after a bogey on No. 16 and a double bogey on the 18th.

For the season, Mickelson finished among the top-10 money-winners for the sixth time in last seven seasons.

■ Luke Donald — 2006 PGA Tour earnings: \$4,252,954

2006 was a career year for Luke Donald, a native of Hemel Hempstead, England. He made 16 cuts in 18 starts, had 10 top-10s, and earned more than \$4 million.

He opened the season by shooting 10-under 62 at Spyglass Hill Golf Club and was the first-round leader at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro Am. At the end of the tournament, he







was tied for 7th.

Later, he captured his second career PGA Tour title at The Honda Classic with rounds of 72-67-68-69-276 (12-under). Nursing a one-stroke lead over Geoff Ogilvy on the 72nd hole, Donald hit a 5-iron approach to 4 feet from 199 yards and converted the birdie for a two-shot victory. The feat earned him a career-best paycheck of \$990,000 and jumped him into the top-10 in the Official World Golf Ranking for the first time in his career.

Donald posted a final-round 66 to finish tied for

10th at the BellSouth Classic, but then withdrew from the Wachovia Championship citing a back injury. The next week, he returned at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship and finished tied for 6th with four rounds in the 60s. He finished tied for 2nd at The Barclays Scottish Open the week before the British Open, thanks to a final-round 66. At the PGA Championship, Donald shared the 54-hold lead (14-under 202) with Tiger Woods, but a final-round 2-over 74 left him tied for third, six strokes behind Woods — a finish that matched his career-best finish in a major (2005 Masters).

Donald was one of only 10 players who managed to make the cut in all four majors during the season.

Playing in his second Ryder Cup, he had a 3-0-0 record for the victorious European Team. His career record in Ryder Cup is 5-1-1.

Donald earned a spot in the field at THE TOUR Championship for the second time in his five-year career, finishing tied for 5th.

And the end of the year, he ranked fourth in scoring average, 69.17 and led the PGA Tour in par-3 scoring average, 2.96. Only seven players were below par in par-3 scoring average for the season.

■ Padraig Harrington — 2006 PGA **Tour earnings: \$4,209,434**


A NATIVE of Dublin, Ireland, Padraig Harrington posted three top-10s in 15 starts on the 2006 PGA Tour, including a runner-up at the Booz Allen Classic in June. In his first Tour start of the season, he finished tied for 5th at the WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship, defeating Rod Pampling, Angel Cabrera and Vijay Singh before falling in the quarterfinals to Davis Love III, who holed out on No. 18 from the fairway to win 1up. Harrington finished 5th at the U.S. Open at Winged Foot, his fourth top-10 in nine starts at the U.S. Open. It was his seventh top-10 in a major championship. One week later, he finished tied for 2nd at the rain-soaked Booz Allen Classic. A win at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship and a tie for 2nd place at the season-ending Volvo Masters enabled him to edge Paul Casey for top honors on the European Tour.

■ Brett Wetterich — 2006 PGA Tour earnings: \$3,023,185

A WHIRLWIND 2006 season saw Brett Wetterich earn his first PGA Tour victory at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship, compete for the United States at the Ryder Cup and claim 10th place on the TOUR's money list.

His first top-10, a tie for 6th at the Shell Houston Open, came in his sixth start of the season. One week later, aided by three rounds in the 60s, Wetterich finished tied for 4th at the Zurich Classic of New

THE 180 professional golfers accompanying their amateur partners in the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am must also qualify to play, and the PGA TOUR runs through an exhaustive list of candidates based mostly on previous finishes and money earned, according to Pro-Am officials.

The pros playing in this year's Pro-Am include these active PGA Tour players:

- winners of previous AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-
- winners of "the majors," including the Masters, the U.S. Open, the Players Championship, British Open and the PGA Championship;
- eight pros of the PGA's choosing, since the group is also an event sponsor;
 - winners of the World Golf Championship;
- winners of any PGA Tour event in the past two
- section champion of the Northern California Section of PGA of America, plus four more players from the section's qualifying rounds on Feb. 3;
- the top 125 players on last year's official money
- the leading money winner from last year's Nationwide Tour (formerly the Buy.com Tour);
 - the top 10 finishers from last year's AT&T;
- the top 35 finishers from the qualifying tournament held last December in Southern California;
- a PGA TOUR-issued major medical exemption for a player who suffered health problems or else would have finished more strongly; and
- additional players on the official money list below the earlier 125-name cutoff.

only that, he shot 76 on the final round, while Nicklaus and Floyd both shot 71. Instead of the top prize of \$36,000, Moody had to settle for second place money, \$16,650. Lanny Wadkins and Bill Satterfield won the Pro-Am title.

1974 Winner: Johnny Miller 68-70-70 (208) After six straight days of rain, sleet and hail, and with Pebble Beach looking more like ocean than land, the final round of the Crosby had to be canceled after being delayed from Sunday to Monday (Jan. 8). With everyone in a miserable mood, tournament officials threatened not to hold the event again unless it could be moved later in the year. "If we don't get the third or fourth weekend in January next year, I'd say there won't be a tournament," said chairman Don Searle. Originally, the 1974 tournament was scheduled for Feb. 14-17, but Crosby officials and local business people were unhappy with the

prospect of playing over Washington's birthday weekend, when tourists would flock to the Monterey Peninsula anyway. So they negotiated a date switch with the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open, but that still left everybody unhappy. After Sunday's round was postponed, defending champion Jack Nicklaus withdrew. He was suffering in the wet weather from back pain and had fallen 10 strokes behind leader Johnny Miller. When Monday's round was canceled,



His first top-10, a tie for 6th at the Shell Houston Open, came in his sixth start of the season. One week later, aided by three rounds in the 60s, Wetterich finished tied for 4th at the Zurich Classic of New Orleans and earned \$248,000.

Two weeks after that, Wetterich earned his first Tour victory at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship by one shot over Trevor Immelman and dedicated the emotional win to his older brother, Mark, who was killed by a drunk driver in Chicago in 2003. He has had his brother's initials, MTW, in bold letters on his bag the last three years as a memorial. The first-place check of \$1.1 million was nearly as much as Wetterich had made since turning pro in 1994.

He picked up his fourth top-10 in his last six starts with a tie for 2nd at the Memorial Tournament. Prior to the Shell Houston Open, Metterich had just three career top-10s in 76 starts. He finished 10th on the U.S. Ryder Cup team list to make his first Ryder Cup team.

One week after the Ryder Cup, he finished tied for 6th at the World Golf Championships-American Express Championship in London.

■ Rory Sabbatini — 2006 PGA Tour earnings: \$2,861,751

Last year was the best year of Rory Sabbatini's career, with a win at the Nissan Open and a 12th-place finish on season-ending money list. He started 2006 with a pair of top-10s and closed with a career-best 8-under 62 to finish runner-up at the Sony Open in Hawaii, his first top-10 in eight starts in Honolulu.

Sabbatini held the first round lead at the Sony Open in Hawaii thanks to a 5-under 65. It was his best effort since finishing tied for 2nd at the 2004 World Golf Championships-NEC Invitational. One week later, he posted his second consecutive top-10 with a tie for 10th at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. Then he finished 2nd place at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, posting his third top-10 of the season in just five starts, including his second runner-up effort. At Pebble, he collected \$583,200, enough to push him over the \$1-million mark for the season.

The following week, Sabbatini picked up his third career win at the Nissan Open. He held second- and third-round leads, including a four-stroke advantage heading into Sunday's final round, but the tied with three others at 12-under after bogeying

the 15th hole. Then he took the lead for good when he birdied the par-3 16th hole and Fred Couples and Craig Barlow bogeyed the hole. At the Nissan Open, he was the first winner of the tournament to post an over-par final round since Tom Purtzer in 1977. He moved to No. 1 on the PGA Tour money list for the first time in his career with more than \$2 million in earnings through six starts. His paycheck of \$918,000 was \$2,988 less than he made in 2005. Sabbatini posted rounds of 68-66 on the weekend to finish tied for 5th at the Canadian Open, his first top-10 since winning the Nissan Open in February. In his second appearance at THE TOUR Championship, finished tied for 22nd.

■ Davis Love III — 2006 PGA Tour earnings: \$2,747,206


DAVIS LOVE III moved back into the winner's circle last year for the first time since 2003 with a win in his home state of North Carolina at the Chrysler Classic. The win moved him from 39th on the PGA Tour 2006 money list to 15th, qualifying him for his 16th TOUR Championship. Love ended the season 16th on the Tour money list, the 15th time in 21-year career he has finished in the top 20.

He was runner-up to Geoff Ogilvy at the World Golf Championships-Accenture Match Play Championship in February, losing the 36-hole championship match 3 and 2. This was his second career runner-up finish at the event, having lost to Tiger Woods 4 and 3 in 2004. His highlight of the week was holing out on the 18th hole of the fourth-round match for eagle with a pitching wedge from 111 yards to defeat Padraig Harrington by one stroke. His career record in seven starts at the event is 18-8, including a 10-3 mark in last three years.

At THE PLAYERS Championship, Love went from an opening 7-under 65 and first-round lead to a second-round 11-over 83 and a missed the cut. His next top-10 came in August, with a tie for fourth at the World Golf Championships-Bridgestone Invitational. Love trailed by one after 36 holes, then shot 70-71 to finish three strokes out of the Tiger Woods-Stewart Cink playoff.

Later, he picked up his first win in more than three years at the Chrysler Classic of Greensboro in October at a course he redesigned three years prior. Love has won five tournaments more than once and his second victory at Forest Oaks Country Club made him the eighth multiple winner of the Greensboro, NC, tournament. The win came 14 years, five months and 12 days after his last Greensboro victory in April 1992. Love shared the thirdround lead with Chris Couch prior to defeating Jason Bohn by two strokes.







He also became the 10th player since the tournament moved to Forest Oaks CC in 1977 to shoot four rounds in the 60s. This was his 19th PGA Tour victory in 21 years on Tour, tying him for 37th on the Career Win List with Ben Crenshaw, Doug Ford, Hubert Green and Tom Kite.

Following his victory in Greensboro, Love finished tied for 5th at the FUNAI Classic at Walt Disney World Resort with four rounds in the 60s.

■ Brett Quigley — 2006 PGA Tour earnings: \$2,617,419

2006 WAS a career year in the 10th full season on the PGA Tour for Brett Quigley. He set personal bests for earnings (\$2,617,419) and top-10s (10) and played in his first TOUR Championship. The 10 top-10s were tied for fourth-most on the Tour.

Quigley posted his first top-10 of the season with a tie for 5th finish at the Verizon Heritage. His second top-10 was a tie for 4th at the Bank of America Colonial, aided by rounds of 67-66 on the weekend. One week later, Quigley logged a second consecutive top-10 at the FedEx St. Jude Classic.

He then added his third top-10 in four starts with a tie for 3rd at the Barclays Classic. That paycheck pushed him over the \$1-million mark for the first time in his 10-year career. Two weeks later, Quigley contended most of the week at the rain-soaked Booz Allen Classic before finishing tied for 6th, six strokes behind Ben Curtis. He finished tied for 9th at the World Golf Championships-American Express Championship in London, his first start in a World Golf Championships event. And Quigley played in first TOUR Championship, finishing tied for 12th.

■ K. J. Choi — 2006 PGA Tour earnings: \$2,606,367

A NATIVE of Wando, South Korea, and the first Korean to earn a PGA Tour card, K.J. Choi shot a 4under 69 at the 2006 Mercedes-Benz Championship to share the first-round lead with four other players, including eventual champion Vijay Singh. Choi finished tied for 8th, his second top-10 in three starts at Kapalua. In 2005, Choi won the Chrysler Classic of Greensboro — his fourth consecutive top-10 at Forest Oaks CC - and finished a career-best tie for 15th at the U.S. Open. He also won the SK Telecom Open by five strokes on the Asian PGA in early May, an event he won in 2003. In 2004, he tied for 4th at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and, in his second Masters


appearance, Choi finished a solo third, three strokes behind champion Phil Mickelson. 2002, his third season on PGA Tour, proved to be the breakthrough in Choi's career, as he was one of three first-time winners to win twice. He became the first South

Korean winner in Tour history, closing with 5-under-par 67 for a four-stroke victory in the Compaq Classic of New Orleans. He donated 10 percent of his





Miller got a reduced winner's check of \$27,500. But he also received a check for \$2,250 for winning the Pro-Am side, with partner Locke de Bretteville.

1975 **Winner: Gene Littler** 68-71-68-73 (280)

A former amateur boxing champ and winner of the 1961 U.S. Open, 44vear-old Gene Littler dented the aura of invincibility that had surrounded youthful Johnny Miller during the first two weeks of the 1975 PGA Tour. A final round of 73 gave him a total of 280, enough for a four-stroke victory over Hubert Green. Miller doublebogeyed 15 on the final round, played in frigid temperatures and gale force winds, and finished with 289, along with Jack Nicklaus. Tom Watson shot 81 on the final day, including two triple bogeys. Littler's winning purse was \$37,000 and it came after 20 years of playing the Crosby, with his previous best finish having been second in 1959. Pro-Am winners were Bruce Devlin and former NFL quarterback Jacky Lee. The tournament was boycotted by Lee Trevino, who said he didn't like playing in the rain on the Monterey Peninsula. Perhaps because of his comment, it didn't rain a bit.

1976 **Winner: Ben Crenshaw** 75-67-70-69 (281)

The 35th Bing Crosby Pro-Am featured a rare meltdown by Jack Nicklaus, who shot 45 in warm sunshine on the back nine at Pebble Beach in the final round, including a double bogey and two triple bogeys, clearing the way for 24-year-old Ben Crenshaw to claim the \$37,000 first prize.

With a record crowd on hand, Nicklaus led the field going into Sunday's play, but ended up tied for 18th place. Already out of the big


money and in a hurry to catch a flight to Japan, Nicklaus tried to get to the 18th green in two, but pulled his wood shot into Carmel Bay and finished, in front of a national TV audience, with a triple-bogey eight. Johnny Miller, suffering through two rounds with the flu, tied with Nicklaus at 291. Pro-Am winners were Hale Irwin and Pebble Beach resident Darius Keaton, who was then chairman of Charter Oil Company.

1977 **Winner: Tom Watson** 66-69-67-71 (276)

Tom Watson picked up the first prize of \$40,000 with a dramatic onestroke victory that included rounds of 66 at Pebble Beach on Thursday, 69 at Cypress Point on Friday, 67 at MPCC's Shore Course on Saturday and a 71 in the final round at Pebble on Sunday, breaking the tournament record, set by Billy Casper in 1958, by four strokes. Saturday's gallery of 28,000 was also a then-record helped by sunny skies and mild temperatures. Former President Gerald Ford, playing in the Pro-Am for the first time, had a birdie on 14 at Pebble Beach on Friday. Leonard Thompson and Jim Vickers, an oil man from Wichita, won the Pro-Am side.

1978 Winner: Tom Watson 66-74-71-69 (280)

Becoming the fourth man to win back-to-back Crosbys, Tom Watson beat Ben Crenshaw on the second hole of sudden death on the final day of play, which was pushed back to Monday by rain. Shooting a torrid sixunder-par 30 on the front nine at Pebble on the final day, Watson finished with a 69, bringing him into an unexpected tie with Crenshaw, who shot a seemingly unbeatable 67. Watson's first-place finish was worth \$45,000. Pro Gibby Gilber and Richard Gelb, chairman of the board of Bristol-Myers, won the Pro-Am team title.



Pro-Am founder Bing Crosby with Arnold Palmer at Pebble Beach in the 1960s. For all his accomplishments on the golf course, Palmer never won the Crosby. But he is now a partowner of the resort company that owns it, along with partners Clint Eastwood, Peter Ueberroth, and a select group of stockholders.

1979 **Winner: Lon Hinkle** 70-68-69-77 (284)

After Andy Bean missed a 20-foot putt on 18, a three-way tie forced a playoff between Bean and fellow PGA youngsters Mark Hayes and Lon Hinkle — a playoff ultimately decided in Hinkle's favor when he sank a 12foot birdie putt on 17. The winner's purse was \$54,000. Hinkle's dramatic

\$810,000 check to underprivileged South Koreans back home and to the Christian church his family attends near Houston. Choi then earned his second victory in wire-to-wire fashion in his 86th career start at the Tampa Bay Classic.

■ Also playing this year is the 2002 AT&T Pro-Am Champion, Matt Gogel

IN 2006, this former champion of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am finished outside the top 125 on the money list for first time in his sixyear PGA Tour career, with just 10 made cuts in 28 starts. His lone top-10 was a tie for 7th at the Booz Allen Classic. In 2004, Gogel had two top-10s and finished 98th on money list, with a tie for 6th at the Buick Championship and tie for 8th at the Chrysler Classic of Greensboro, In 2003, he posted his best finish on the PGA Tour since his victory at the 2002 Pebble Beach National Pro-Am with a third at the Chrysler Classic of Greensboro. In 2003, he posted two aces on the Tour. In 2002, captured his first PGA Tour victory at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am two years after finishing tied for 2nd and being overtaken by Tiger Woods on the back nine on the final round. In 2002, he came from four back after 54 holes to overtake Pat Perez, making a 35foot birdie putt on the 18th hole at Pebble Beach to tie Perez for the lead and winning moments later after Perez triple-bogeyed the hole. In 2000, Gogel shared the third-round lead with Mark Brooks at AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. Due to weather, the final round was played on Monday and Gogel opened with three straight birdies, but a back-nine 40 and Tiger Woods' dramatic eagle-birdie-parbirdie finish earned Woods the victory and left Gogle in a tie for 2nd one stroke back.

finish wasn't seen by TV viewers, however, when CBS decided to end its coverage after 72 holes in favor of "60 Minutes" and "Rocky." Jack Nicklaus missed the Crosby in 1979 for the first time in his career, and Hale Irwin broke his string of making the cut in 87 straight tournaments. Pro-Am winners were Bean and Florida real estate developer Bill Bunting.

1980 **George Burns III** 71-69-71-69 (280)

Under crystal-clear skies, a record gallery of more than 10,000 watched Sunday's final round of the Crosby, when George Burns overcame a big lead by Jack Nicklaus to win. Nicklaus was at one point 10 under (including a 5-under performance on the first six holes Sunday) but faded on the back nine. Burns. meanwhile, was steadily making difficult putts, including a monster 40-footer on 16. "It surprised the hell out of me," said Burns who, at 30, had won almost \$500,000 in five years on the PGA Tour without a victory. He added another \$54,000 with his win at Pebble Beach. Pro-Am winners were George Cadle and Whizzer Farish of Pebble Beach, a pilot for Pan-Am playing in his 22nd Crosby.

1981 **Winner: John Cook** 66-71-72 (209)

A dramatic five-way playoff, the first-ever on the PGA Tour, ended in a stunning victory for unknown pro John Cook over 20-year-old Bobby Clampett, Hale Irwin, Ben Crenshaw and Barney Thompson. Cook won by making par on the third playoff hole after lapses by his opponents (including a bogey by Irwin) left the door wide open. Rain delayed the start of the Crosby to Saturday, and icy winds made things miserable throughout the weekend. Nevertheless, record crowds turned out to watch the tournament, which was shortened to 54 holes and ended on Monday. Clampett, who lived in Carmel Valley, missed the victory when he couldn't sink a three-foot par putt on his final hole at Cypress. Cook's winning purse was \$40,500 (reduced by 25 percent because the tournament was shortened). Pro-Am winners were again George Cadle and Whizzer Farish — the first and only Pro-Am team to repeat. Farish, who grew up on the Peninsula, said of the three Crosby courses, "I've played them a thousand times each."

1982 **Winner: Jim Simons** 71-66-71-66 (274)

Blowing a five-stroke lead with 10 holes to play and foreshadowing the 2000 AT&T Pro-Am when Tiger Woods overcame an even bigger deficit — Craig Stadler let Jim Simons win the 1982 Crosby and its first prize of \$54,000. But Simons was no patsy; his final round of 66 was one of the finest finishes to date in the tournament, and he set a Crosby record with his total of 274, 14 under par. The great Jack Nicklaus might have won, but ended up in a five-way tie for third (with Johnny Miller and three others) after missing several key putts.

1983 **Winner: Tom Kite** 69-72-62-73 (276)

It rained all day during Sunday's final round, but play continued anyway as Tom Kite took the tournament despite a final round of 73. Saturday, when Kite also played Pebble, he set a course record of 62. The \$58,500 first prize was Kite's fifth PGA crown in 12 years. Despite four birdies on the back nine, Jack Nicklaus finished in sixth place — which earned him \$11,700 and made him the first golf pro to earn more than \$4 million in a career. Cal Peete was in second place, two strokes back. The Pro-Am winners were Gilder and Clark.

1984 **Winner: Hale Irwin** 69-69-68-72 (278)

With the most improbable shot in Pebble Beach history, Hale Irwin captured the 1984 Crosby title and the \$72,000 check that came with it. Even Tiger Woods couldn't hope to pull off the shot Irwin made on 18 at Pebble during the final round Sunday. Irwin's tee shot was headed out into Stillwater Cove when the ball improbably caromed off a rock and bounced back onto the fairway. "The entire tournament evolved around that tremendous break I had on 18,' Irwin said. Mark O'Meara, with two eagles on the front nine, nearly caught Irwin. Even after Irwin birdied 18, Jim Nelford did catch him, forcing a playoff. But on the second playoff hole — 16 — Irwin made a tremendous second shot from a bunker 200 yards onto the green and just nine feet from the cup. When Nelford missed his birdie putt on the hole, Irwin calmly nailed his tournament-winning shot. O'Meara, paired with J.P. Diesel of Houston, won the Pro-Am team crown.

1985 Winner: Mark O'Meara 70-72-68-73 (273)

The final year of the Crosby saw the tournament begin under frosty skies with winds at 35 mph. But in the end, Mark O'Meara warmed up the crowd with clutch putting that, despite a final round of 73, gave him the \$90,000 first place check and a then-record 72-hole





low Pebble Beach Pro-Am score of 273. Larry Rinker, Kikou Arai and Curtis Strange were all just one shot behind. Playing in the final group, O'Meara missed a birdie putt on 18, but so did Strange, ending any chance of a playoff. Dean Spanos, who lived in Stockton and was part-owner of the San Diego Chargers, and pro partner Hubert Green captured the Pro-Am

Winner: Fuzzy Zoeller 69-66-70 (205)

The first year with its new corporate sponsor was nearly a washout for the AT&T Pebble Pro-Am. Friday's round was canceled after morning rains drenched the three courses. And so was the rescheduled final round on Monday, leaving Fuzzy Zoeller the winner of the \$108,000 first prize after just 54 holes. Crowds were sparse, but the tournament still generated a hefty sum for charity, with AT&T contributing \$750,000 in its first year backing the tournament. Zoeller, who was Pebble Monday before play was suspended, called the weather, "The worst conditions I've ever played under." He was also winner of the Pro-Am team title, partnered with Coral de Tierra golfer Mike Evans.

1987 Winner: Johnny Miller 72-72-68-66 (278)

Taking advantage of a bogey on 17 by third-round leader Payne Stewart, Johnny Miller won the Pebble Beach Pro-Am for the second time. On a perfect Sunday at Pebble Beach, he shot a six-under 66, including seven birdies, for the \$108,000 first prize. "I can't believe I won," Miller was overheard to say to his caddy as the day wrapped up. Stewart finished just one stroke back. This was Miller's 19th appearance at the tournament he continued to call The Crosby. In 1968, he launched his career with a victory at the California State Amateur, also at Pebble Beach, which he often referred to as his home course. And Miller wasn't through. He came back and won the Pro-Am again in 1994. The team victory in 1987 went to Fred Couples and baseball great George Brett, who capped the title with a three-inch putt on 18.

1988 Winner: Steve Jones 72-64-70-74 (280)

With an 18-foot birdie putt on the second hole of a sudden-death playoff, Steve Jones capped a dramatic victory

at Pebble Beach over a field that included five or six players with a shot at the title. Jones, a relative unknown, triumphed over 1988's top players, including Bob Tway, Greg Norman and Craig Stadler. Jones had a threestroke lead as Sunday's round began, but bogeys on 15 and 17 opened the door for Tway, who tied the leader with a birdie on 18. But in the playoff,

it was Jones who out-putted the veteran for a \$126,000 first-place check. The Pro-Am winners were Dan Pohl and Miami Dolphins quarterback Dan Marino.

1989 Winner; Mark O'Meara 66-68-73-70 (277)


round. Pro-Am winners were Steve Jones and Carmel Valley doctor Jim Rheim, who birdied 18 with a 9-foot putt.

1990 Winner: Mark O'Meara 67-73-69-72 (281)

Winning for the second year in a row, Mark O'Meara became the first player to win back-to-back titles since Tom Watson in 1977 and 1978. Nicklaus also won consecutive titles; Cory Middlecoff was the first to do it back in '55 and '56. O'Meara won the \$180,000 first prize with a final round of 72 at a windy Pebble Beach. No one has done it since. Kenny Perry finished in second place, two strokes back. Payne Stewart seemed like the favorite to win until he bogeyed 12, 14, 16 and 18. Four groups had to finish their third round Sunday morning, after high winds at Cypress curtailed play on Saturday. Dean Spanos, co-owner of the San Diego Chargers, teamed with Hubert Green for the Pro-Am team title.

1991 Winner: Paul Azinger 67-67-73-67 (274)

After being frustrated with his play

at Pebble Beach year after year, Azinger stormed to a final round score of 67 to take the tournament from gallery favorite Rocco Mediate. "Every year when I leave here, I say I'm not coming back," Azinger joked after taking the \$198,000 first prize. Before the 1991 Pro-Am, Azinger said he'd never shot better than a 70 at Pebble. On his way to the victory, he birdied 13 and 17, while Mediate was blowing his once-substantial tournament lead with a final round of 74. The Pro-Am team title went to John Cook and soap opera star Jack Wagner.

1991 was also the first year Poppy Hills was part of the Pro-Am play; it replaced Cypress Point golf club after PGA officials raised concerns about the club's exclusive membership policies.

1992 Winner: Mark O'Meara 69-68-68-70 (275)

With a dramatic 35-foot putt on 18 to force a playoff with Jeff Sluman, Mark O'Meara made perhaps his most dramatic shot in a run of three AT&T Pro-Am victories in four years. He captured the \$198,000 first-place prize

by sinking another great putt — from 18 feet — on the first playoff hole. The day started poorly for O'Meara, who shot 38 on the front nine. But he came storming back with a 32 on the back nine. Paul Azinger was just one back after regulation play finished, despite shooting 68 for the final round. Pro-Am winners Greg Norman and Kerry Packers set a tournament record with a 42-under total of 246.


1993 Winner: Brett Ogle 68-68-69-71 (276)

Gregarious Australian Brett Ogle captured his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach with a three-shot triumph in the AT&T Pro-Am, despite four bogeys in six holes during the final round. With a steady rain falling through much of the day, Ogle birdied three of the last six holes to fend off challengers Billy Ray Brown and Greg Twigs. Ogle's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Tom Watson had the low round on the final day, with birdies on 10, 11, 18, 6, 7 and 9, Payne



Stewart and Jim Morris won the Pro-Am title, after Mark McGwire knocked his team out of contention with a bogey on 18.

1994 **Winner: Johnny Miller** 68-72-67-74 (281)

Defying the calendar, 46-year-old Johnny Miller captured the AT&T Pro-Am, and even he had trouble believing it. "I play two tournaments a year . . . this is magic," he said. The win was Miller's third title in three different decades at the Pebble Beach charity event — he had previously won in 1974 and 1987. Jeff Maggert, Corey Pavin, Kirk Triplett and Tom Watson all finished just one stroke behind Miller, who sank a one-foot putt for par on 18 to avoid a possible five-way playoff. It rained nearly all day during the final round and, with a gale blowing from the south, Miller got to the green in two on 17 to preserve his lead while Watson was bogeving 14, 16 and 17. Miller's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Pro-Am winners were Dudley Hart and 18-year-old amateur Robert Floyd.

1995 **Winner: Peter Jacobsen** 67-73-66-65 (271)

With the best final round by a winner, Peter Jacobsen captured the \$252,000 winner's purse despite starting play at Pebble Beach on Sunday at three under. His total score, 271, was the lowest since Mark O'Meara's 273 in 1985, but with clean-and-place rules in effect because of a wet course, Jacobsen said his record score deserved "an asterisk." With a bit of sun finally showing through the clouds, Jacobsen birdied 18 to seal his victory. David Duval, in his first full year on the PGA Tour, finished in second place, two strokes back. Pro-Am winners were Bruce Vaughn and amateur Masahi Yamada.

1996 Winner: nobody **Tournament canceled due to** unplayable conditions

The weather on Sunday was pleasant: low clouds, some sun, no rain. But heavy rains earlier in the week, including a torrential downpour on Saturday, left the courses — especially Spyglass — in unplayable condition, forcing outright cancellation of the AT&T Pro-Am due to weather for the first, and only, time in its history. (Play was suspended from 1942 to 1946 because of WWII.) In particular, one flooded spot on 16 at Spyglass was cited by PGA officials as requiring cancellation of the event. Jeff Maggert was the leader at 136 after 54 holes; he got \$5,000 in consolation money, just like all the other pros in the field.

Winner: Mark O'Meara 67-67-67 (268)

Fighting off an amazing comeback by Tiger Woods — who was in 67th place on Friday and trailed by seven shots Sunday morning — Mark O'Meara won his fifth AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am by a single shot over Woods and David Duval. Woods, playing in a foursome one hole ahead of O'Meara, had six birdies in the first 12 holes but bogeyed 13. Two shots down on 18, Woods made a dramatic bid for an eagle on 18. His second shot, from 267 yards out, landed on the front of the green. But he missed a 35-foot putt and had to settle for a birdie. O'Meara's all-time low score at the event was worth \$342,000. Pro-Am champs were Paul Stankowski and Andy Garcia.

1998 **Winner: Phil Mickelson** 67-68-67 (202)

A torrential downpour on Sunday brought back memories of 1996, when the AT&T Pro-Am was canceled after 54 holes. But in 1998, with California again experiencing record-breaking rains, PGA officials looked for a way to squeeze in a third round at Pebble Beach sometime later in the year. First, they set the final round for March 2. Later, it was rescheduled again to Aug. 17. The winner's check was \$450,000. The Pro-Am portion of the tournament was canceled.

1999 **Winner: Payne Stewart** 69-64-73 (206)

With weather getting seriously in the way for the fourth time in five years, the 1999 tournament was shortened to just 54 holes, just like it had been the year before. Saturday leader Payne Stewart was declared the winner of the \$504,000 first prize after heavy rains Saturday night and Sunday forced cancellation of the final round. Stewart's final shot on Saturday, a tap-in birdie on 18 at Spyglass, turned out to be the winner over Frank Lickliter, just one shot back. Pro-Am winners were Lickliter and Robert MacDonnell. Later that year, Stewart won the U.S. Open at Pinehurst, S.C. He died in a plane crash Oct. 25 when carbon monoxide

rendered everyone on board his chartered airplane unconscious soon after takeoff from Orlando, Fla. The plane flew on autopilot until it ran out of fuel and crashed in South Dakota, depriving Stewart of the chance to defend his U.S. Open and AT&T Pro-Am titles — both at Pebble Beach — in 2000.


2000 **Winner: Tiger Woods** 68-73-68-64 (273)

Leaving the crowd and the sportswriters practically speechless, Tiger Woods gave the AT&T Pro-Am a finish unlike any other. Down five shots when play began on Sunday, and even further behind — seven shots — with just seven holes to play, Woods took complete control of his game and the tournament, capping his comeback with a 97-foot wedge shot on 15 that hit just to the right of the hole, took two bounces, and landed in the cup. He nearly did the same on 16 and finished two strokes ahead of Vijay Singh and Matt Gogel to take the first prize of \$720,000. The win was Woods' sixth in a row on the PGA Tour. Pro-Am champs were Skip Kendall and King City businessman David Gill. The tournament was the last Pebble Beach Pro-Am event for golf legend Jack Nicklaus.

2001 **Winner: Davis Love III** 71-69-69-63 (272)

Despite a seven-shot deficit when play started under sparkling, clear skies Sunday morning, Davis Love III put together an amazing round of 63, including five birdies and an eagle on the first six holes. On the front nine, he was an amazing eight under. Another birdie on 15 sealed his victory and the first-place money of \$720,000. Vijay Singh finished just one stroke back; Tiger Woods was eight strokes off the

lead. Pro-Am champs were Phil Mickelson and saxophonist Kenny G.

2002 Winner: Matt Gogel 66-72-67-69 (274)

With his first PGA Tour victory, Gogel picked up a check for \$720,000 after shooting two under on the back nine during the final round. Two years earlier, Gogel had watched Tiger Woods stage an incredible comeback to take the tournament from him. This year, third-round leader Pat Perez. who was up by four strokes when play started Sunday, withered on the final day, shooting a triple-bogey on the 18th Hole, opening the door for Gogel who showed none of the nervousness of 2000. Tiger Woods shot 282, eight strokes off the lead (for the second year in a row). Pro-Am winners were Brian Claar and Randall Mays.

2003 Winner: Davis Love III 72-67-68 (274)

With nothing but blue skies and mild temperatures throughout the tournament, talk of "Crosby Weather" and of moving the AT&T later in the year a common topic in the storm-tossed 1990s — was completely forgotten. And with Tiger Woods sitting out the Pro-Am after consecutive years finishing eight strokes off the lead, all the attention was on less well known, but equally formidable, PGA stars. Davis Love III salvaged a victory with a birdie on 18 on the final day — holding off Tom Lehman by a single stroke. Love's win — his second in three years — came despite a bogey on 16 on the final round. In the group just ahead, Tom Lehman bogeved two holes in the front nine but then shot five birdies on the back nine and seemed poised to force a playoff. A missed birdie putt from less than six feet on 18 left him in second place. Love's win, worth \$900,000, came with some extraordinary luck: His tee shot on 12 hit a photographer (not from The Pine Cone) and rolled to within easy putting distance of the pin. The Pro-Am ended in a tie, with pros Phil Tataurangi and Brad Faxon and their amateur partners Chris Heatley and Thomas Ryan ending up with 31-under scores of 257. Both pairings finished with final rounds of 64. Two Pro-Am teams were

disqualified during the tournament for signing incorrect scorecards.

2004 Winner: Vijay Singh 67-68-68-69

With four rounds in the 60s, Vijay Singh had little serious competition in the 2004 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. His dominating, three-stroke victory came with 25 birdies and earned him \$954,000. After 54 sun-drenched holes, it appeared that San Jose State graduate Arron Oberholser (who would win the tournament in 2006) had a chance to beat Singh. In the same group for the final round, they were tied at 13 under when play began Sunday. On the first three holes, Singh's tee shots were errant: one going into the rough, one missing the fairway and another missing the green by 60 yards. But Singh managed to turn all three into birdies. Another birdie for Singh on 8, coupled with a double-bogey for Oberholser on the same hole, gave Singh an unbeatable six stroke lead. The winning proam team was Jerry Kelly and Robert Halmi, Jr.

2005 Winner: Phil Mickelson 62-67-67-73 (269)

Phil Mickelson started his week on the Monterey Peninsula being inducted into the California Golf Hall of Fame and finished it breaking records on his way to a four-stroke victory in the 2005 Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Fellow lefty Mike Weir was the runner-up.

In the process, Mickelson became the first wire-to-wire winner since the tournament was lengthened from 54 holes to 72 holes in 1958. He matched the tournament record with a 10-under-par 62 in his opening round at Spyglass Hill Golf Course. The amazing performance also set a record for Spyglass. And then, Mickelson set the tournament 36-hole record at 129 with his second-round 67 at Poppy Hills. And he set the tournament 54-hole record at 196 with his third-round 67 at Pebble Beach.

Although a final-round 73, 1-overpar at Pebble Beach, left him one shot off the tournament record of 268 set by Mark O'Meara in 1997, it nonetheless was a solid finish, given that Weir's 67 was the only sub-70 round posted in a light rain, with some gusty wind. When the final round began,

Mickelson held a seven-shot lead through 54 holes, making Sunday's play little more than a formality. His winnings were \$954,000.

Bill Murray and longtime pro partner Scott Simpson were in the running for the pro-am title, but their closing 67 gave them a 258 total, good for fourth. The victory went to Barry McCollam and pro partner Joel Kribel.

2006 Winner: Arron Oberholser 65-68-66-72 (271)

Two years after failing to catch Vijay Singh, Arron Oberholser closed the deal on his first PGA Tour victory to the delight of his family and friends from San Jose.

"Growing up, I always watched guys win the golf tournament and just the walk up 18 at Pebble Beach is unlike anything else," said Oberholser, a former San Jose State standout who played numerous amateur events on the Monterey Peninsula. "Even when you're playing here by yourself or with a foursome, it's still an incredible walk. But to walk up knowing that you are the champion ... I wish everybody could feel that way. It's incredible."

Oberholser shot a final-round 72, even par, on the Pebble Beach Golf Links for a 271, 17-under-par — enough for a tournament record-tying five-shot cushion over runner-up Rory Sabbatini, whose 70 gave him a 276.

Mike Weir, who came into Sunday tied with Oberholser at 199, crashed early – with a double-bogey at the second hole and bogey on the third – and shot 78 to tie for third at 277 with Jonathan Byrd.

The victory, which Oberholser locked up with a dramatic birdie out of the trees on the par-4 15th, was a distinctly different sequel to his final round in 2004, when he went into the final round tied for the lead with Vijay Singh, but then seemed to succumb to the pressure of facing one of the top players in the game.

There was a lot of smiling and good times in 2006, as record crowds enjoyed a sixth straight year with no rain problems. Sunshine pushed temperatures into the high 70s as more than 155,000 fans overall attended the four rounds of competition.

Oberholser, whose first place finish was worth \$972,000, became only the fifth player to earn his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach, joining John Cook (1981), Steve Jones (1988), Brett Ogle (1993) and Matt Gogel (2002).

Oberholser he was also the fifth pro to sweep both the individual and team titles, as he and amateur partner Michael McCallister, the president and CEO of Humana Inc., tied for first in the pro-am, at 255, 33-under-par. They shared the championship with pro Hunter Mahan and Alan Heuer, the COO of Mastercard International, who shot 66 in the final round, while Oberholser and McCallister shot 68.

Seaside, Carmel Valley courses get major overhauls

AYONET AND Black Horse — the Seaside golf courses designed by military men and played only by armed forces personnel for decades before they came under public ownership — are undergoing a full face-lift. Meanwhile, Carmel Valley Ranch, the 25-year-old resort managed by LXR Luxury Resorts, has been closed since May for full renovation and is set to reopen in late spring.

■ Swinging in Seaside

"Both of our golf courses are being renovated over the next two-and-a-half years," said Dick Fitzgerald, project director for Seaside Resort Development, under the direction of The Bates Golf Design Group of Orlando, Fla. Founder Gene Bates has more than 25 years experience in golf course design and construction, including the Kelly Plantation resort course in Destin, Fla., and San Juan Oaks in San Juan Bautista.

Gen. Robert McClure designed Bayonet in 1954 and was known for his left-handed slice, so the only severe doglegs on the course run right to left. It's named for the 7th Infantry Light Fighter Division, nicknamed the Bayonet Division, and its grueling Holes 11 though 15 are known as Combat Corner.

In 1963, Gen. Edwin Carns designed Black Horse, the nickname of the 11th Calvary Regiment that had been stationed across the bay at the Presidio of Monterey from 1919 to 1940.

By the time the current renovation is complete, all 36 greens will be up to United States Golf Association standards and planted with bentgrass, which provides a uniform, smooth putting surface. Bentgrass will also be used, along with rye grass, for the roughs along the fairways, according to Fitzgerald.

"The biggest thing is the elimination of kikuyu and Poa annua," Fitzgerald said. Those grasses are invasive and tend to make less-than-ideal golfing surfaces.

The courses are also receiving new irrigation sys-

tems. And the redesign calls for a number of new bunkers, making the already tough courses even more challenging.

"When we do each nine, we effectively strip off all the features of each hole and start over, so it's a complete remodel of the hole," he said. "Generally, the only thing that is preserved is the corridor the hole was in."

Plans call for shutting down nine holes at a time, ensuring 27 remain open for active play. The front nine holes of Bayonet, the longer of the two courses, have been renovated but remain closed while their


grasses grow enough to sustain play.


"We anticipate opening them in April," Fitzgerald said.

The buildings

The golf course makeover is just one part of the huge project slated for the Seaside Black Horse/Bayonet property. The company plans to construct a resort hotel, condominiums and a new club-



house. In addition, more than 100 residential lots will be sold to private buyers who will develop them individually.

"We have been approved to build a 300-room resort hotel and have announced that Fairmont will manage it," Fitzgerald said. Hill Glazier Architects, a Palo Alto firm specializing in designing resorts, hotels, golf clubs and spas, will draw the plans for the hotel to be constructed on the site of the current golf driving range.

"We hope to break ground on the hotel by the end of the year," Fitzgerald said. "It should take about two years to complete." In addition to 300 guest rooms, the hotel will feature 24,000 square feet of meeting space, a 15,000-square-foot spa area and a restaurant.

Project approval also included construction of 170 condominiums near the golf courses and hotel, but Fitzgerald said design work has yet to begin on those. Ownership is also undecided, as they could be sold as timeshares or be purchased by small groups of partners.

Finally, Seaside Resort Development received permission to create 125 residential lots along the golf courses.

"Right now our plan is just to sell the finished lots and let the buyers, under very strict design guidelines, build their respective homes," he said.

■ Carmel Valley Ranch makeover

"Carmel Valley Ranch has had a wonderful, long history, and with the new ownership, we have the capital to really bring that property back to what I call its former glory," said general manager Joseph Violi. "It has great DNA, so we're bringing it back to what it once was, and the position it once had on the Peninsula."

The course, designed by Pete Dye and built in the early 1980s, needed upgrading, so LXR Luxury Resorts, hired by owner Blackstone to manage the ranch, also enlisted The Bates Golf Design Group to assess its shortcomings and develop a rehabilitation plan. LXR is familiar with the Bates Group, which oversaw restoration of the course at Carmel Valley Ranch's sister property, the Boca Raton Resort & Club in Florida.

The Bates report identified "poor drainage and irrigation throughout the course, inconsistencies in turf quality, bunker sand contamination, and undersized tees and greens complexes," according to golf director Rob Turner's letter to members advising them the course would be closed for renovation.

Throughout the planning process, the Bates Design Group consulted with Dye to ensure his original design would retain its integrity, according to Violi.

The extensive work included:

- enlarging all greens to allow for additional hole locations;
 - leveling and enlarging tee areas;
- improving drainage and irrigation systems;
 - reshaping bunkers;
 - adding new sand; and
- replacing approximately 8,000 feet of cart path.

"Keep in mind the routing of the course did not change," Violi said.

Holes 3, 10 and 18 underwent some alteration, with increased yardage, hills removed, trees brought into play and new bunkers.

And the entire course was reseeded

with a combination of grasses to improve playing quality and provide color variations among tees, greens and rough. Bentgrass will cover all tees, fairways and putting surfaces, while the rough will be a combination of bluegrass and rye grass. The redesign also includes about 15 acres of drought-tolerant native grasses to help cut water use.

"It's really more of an upgrade of the functionality of the course," Violi said. "The irrigation and the drainage are a big deal, because it had not been maintained over the years."

Poor drainage made parts of the course unplayable at times. When it reopens, the golf course will "play a little more difficult than before, but more importantly, people will be able to play it 12 months of the year."

Originally anticipated to take seven to nine months, the remodel will have had the course closed for a year if it meets its May target for reopening.

"That's what we're shooting for, and I'm always hesitant in quoting dates, because I put in a call in to Mother Nature and she hasn't called me back," Violi said.

Condo-hotel units

But the ranch's full makeover will run until early to mid-2008.

"We're doing everything — the main lodge, a new restaurant in the main lodge — and all the guest rooms will be started this summer," Violi said. "The clubhouse will reopen in the next two

or three weeks, and that's gotten a nice facelift, a new members lounge and a new pro shop."

New director of culinary operations Chef Anthony Keene was hired to oversee restaurant operations at the club, and The Oaks restaurant in the lodge will be replaced.


In an innovative plan that's reportedly the first of its kind in Monterey County, Carmel Valley Ranch will convert its 144 hotel rooms, ranging in size from 800 square feet to 1,400 square feet, into condominium-hotel units.

"This provides a unique opportunity to own an elegantly appointed, luxury suite within a world-class resort," according to Sarah Andrus of Armanasco Public Relations, which represents Carmel Valley Ranch. When not in use by their owners, the condo-hotel units can be rented out to guests directly by the owners or through the hotel management company.


PMG Architects was hired to handle the design, and once completed, the suites will include flat-screen televisions, raindrop shower heads and modern bath fixtures, as well as outdoor decks or patios, and wood-burning fireplaces.

Violi reported the full project should be done by the middle of next year.

"We will stay open throughout the renovation process," he said. "We will not close the whole resort at any point."
