

No plea yet in C.V. double homicide

MONTEREY COUNTY Superior Court Judge Russell Scott is still considering whether to allow Carmel Valley resident John Kenney, jailed on charges of shooting his neighbors to death Jan. 29 following a long-running property dispute, to appear in court in street clothes.

On Tuesday, he decided Kenney could be handcuffed rather than shackled and issued a gag order preventing everyone involved in the case from talking to journalists about it.

Once again, Kenney did not enter the expected notguilty plea, and Scott directed him and defense attorney Dennis Lempert to return Feb. 28 for arraignment.

Kenney arrived in court Feb. 20 in coat and tie instead of the orange striped jumpsuit he wore at earlier hearings. But the issue was far from settled. Monterey County Sheriff's Cmdr. Pat Hunton told Scott her office has standards for jailed defendants attending court, and allowing Kenney to wear civilian clothing would be unfair to the 50 other suspects in custody on murder and attemptedmurder charges. She also worried it would set a precedent and said special clothing arrangements take up deputies' time in the busy jail. In addition, street clothes make it easier to sneak in contraband. Also, a prisoner who managed to escape while wearing a coat and tie would be

harder to track down.

Scott said he shared Hunton's concerns.

But Lempert argued his 72year-old client, a Korean War veteran who was injured and still suffers pain as a result, had never had police contact before his arrest last month and "does not present any risk" due to his age and injury. He remains in jail without bail on charges of shooting defense attorney Mel Grimes and his wife, Elizabeth, outside their home on Hitchcock Canyon Road above

Emergency plan to keep ambulances on duty

IF THE private company that provides ambulance service in Monterey County suddenly goes out of business - or is kicked out because its service isn't good enough - medically trained firefighters and ambulance workers from Carmel and Carmel Valley will have to fill the void until a new provider steps in, according to Monterey County Emergency Medical Services Director Tom Lynch.

Questions regarding Westmed's ability to provide ambu-

lance service arose after the company announced it was losing money every month and could not meet the demands of its contract.

contract Westmed's requires strict ambulance response times without a county subsidy. With just 17 percent of its patients possessing private insurance and most of the rest covered by government medical programs, the company is unable to recoup its operating costs,

Carmel's service may help fill a big void if the county's ambulances are no more

according to Carmel Valley Fire Chief Sidney Reade.

"We were trying to provide a Cadillac level of service and don't have enough money to keep this Cadillac running," she said at meeting of the Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance board. "That's what the crisis is all about."

Westmed has asked for financial help from the county and last month requested several changes to its contract, including removing its full-time ambulance from Big Sur. The board of supervisors will consider its requests next week.

daughter suspected in burglary, thefts

GOOD, HARD police work" by Pacific Grove officers led to the arrest of 18-year-old Mary Goldbeck — daughter of former city councilwoman Susan Goldbeck — and two 15-year-old boys on suspicion of burglarizing a Fountain Avenue house and possession of stolen property, detective Sgt. Cameron White said Wednesday.

"We have been having a lot of incidents where kids are going into unlocked cars," he said, including thefts from more than 50 vehicles last fall, so police began keeping tabs on certain youths in town.

When Cmdr. Tom Uretsky contacted the younger Goldbeck last week, he discovered she was carrying a stolen cell phone. That led to the identification of two 15-year-old

HIGHER WATER BILLS

HOTELS, RESTAURANTS and art galleries are among the 200 businesses in Carmel that will have to pay three times their regular water rate if they use more water than the California Public Utilities Commission thinks they should. Acting at the PUC's request, since early February, California American Water Co. has been notifying nearly 1,200 commercial customers on the Monterey Peninsula they will have their water use audited. Businesses were also told

they will have to pay a much higher rate if they exceed their water use limits.

"We hope everybody will stay within their allotment," said Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie. "They won't get penalized unless they are using more than a reasonable amount for their business.'

In 2000, Cal Am began using a two-tiered rate structure

WHILE THE troubles facing Westmed ambulance service could adversely effect the quality of emergency medical care throughout Monterey County, Big Sur residents are worried their remote community will be hit the hardest.

A handful of residents - including Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade Chief Frank Pinney and Big Sur Chamber of Commerce representative Kirk Gafill - plan to be at the Monterey County Board of Supervisors meeting Feb. 27 to weigh in on a proposal by Westmed to remove its emergency medical technician from Big Sur. Pinney said the move would essentially end ambulance service there.

"The EMT makes it possible to drive a patient to town," Pinney explained. "The fire brigade can pick them up, we can pack them, but we can't ship them."

Without a full-time ambulance stationed in Big Sur, emergency medical transportation would have to come from Monterey — up to an hour's drive each way, which can be far too long for someone in dire need of a hospital's care.

Assistant fire chief Martha Karstens knows how difficult it is to provide emergency medical services to a community dependent on a narrow, winding and occasionally treacher-

FIGHT AT ART GALLERY SENDS ONE TO HOSPITAL, ANOTHER TO JAIL

POLICE ARRESTED a 31-year-old Seaside resident and took him to Monterey County Jail Tuesday night for allegedly beating a coworker at Simic Galleries hours earlier, according to Carmel Police Sgt. John Nyunt. The victim was hospitalized with severe injuries to his face.

The fight erupted at the San Carlos Street gallery around 3:45 p.m. Feb. 20, Nyunt said, though police weren't called until about 20 minutes later, after a coworker drove the vic-

tim to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula and the suspect, Desrick Amaral, left the business.

Nyunt could not say what sparked the fight, and a gallery director said, "We have no comments regarding that."

"Apparently there were some indicators this was going to happen," Nyunt said. Amaral reportedly told other employees and the manager he was upset, and later, "the suspect hit the victim in the head numerous times with his fist."

Nyunt said the victim sustained "significant facial

injuries," but he would not elaborate, citing restrictions imposed by the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act.

At the hospital, police officers interviewed the injured employee about the altercation. His statements, along with information supplied by witnesses, led them to Amaral.

Seaside police found the suspect at a location on Trinity Avenue. Carmel P.D. officers were called to take Amaral back to town for booking and questioning at the station.

While talking to officer Chris Johnson and detective Jesse



Juarez, "the guy confessed to the crime," Nyunt said. "He said he was upset and hit the victim numerous times. It's clear in this case his emotions got the best of him and it resulted in violence.'

Nyunt did not know how long the conflict between Amaral and the victim had been brewing. But he said the violent confrontation might have been avoided.

"It's imperative that employers, if there is some sort of tension in the workplace, that they do something proactive to mitigate that and assist their employees," Nyunt said.

He advised employers to be aware of conflicts among coworkers.

Carmel police drove Amaral to Monterey County Jail Tuesday night where he was taken into custody on a charge of battery causing great bodily injury.

Nyunt said the victim was still at the hospital at 10 p.m.

Man arrested in cyclist's death pleads not guilty

CHARLES SEABORN, the 52-year-old Carmel Highlands resident arrested Feb. 9 on suspicion of hitting and killing bicyclist Daniel Vasquez on Highway 1 and leaving his body by the side of the road, entered a plea of not guilty at his arraignment before Monterey County Superior Court Judge Russell Scott Feb. 20.

Out of jail on \$130,000 bail and dressed in a red and black North Face jacket and jeans, Seaborn attended court with Santa Cruz defense attorney Paul

Meltzer and stood beside him during the brief appearance Tuesday.

Scott assigned the case to Judge Terrance Duncan, and Seaborn was ordered to return to court Feb. 28, when a date will be set for the preliminary hearing in his case.

According to the California Highway Patrol, Seaborn struck and killed Vasquez, a 48-year-old musician and Carmel Highlands caregiver, with his Range Rover sometime around 2:30 a.m. Feb. 9 and continued driving to his home a few miles away in the Yankee Point area.

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Diners will get a little music with their champagne and caviar

BUBBLY FISH, the caviar and champagne restaurant that opened on San Carlos Street last December, will soon complement its fare with flamenco.

The Carmel Planning Commission approved a use permit last Tuesday that allows the restaurant to host live musicians inside and in its outdoor courtyard between noon and 10 p.m. daily.

'We opened Bubbly Fish to offer an enhancement to the dining experience in Carmel," said Deborah Pearcy, who co-owns the restaurant with Claude Poisson. Bubbly Fish — which replaced a Mexican cafe offers caviar, champagne, chocolate, cheeses and pâtés. On top of that, Pearcy asked permission to have musicians perform "soft,

relaxing, enjoyable music," such as flamenco guitar.

The city's planning staff recommended approval of the permit, which would allow live music under 55 decibels (as measured from the property line) daily, but asked commissioners if they wished to further limit hours of outdoor performances.

"There are very few noise-sensitive uses in the area, and the location appears to be appropriate for live music, assuming the noise levels remain within the allowed limits of the code," senior planner Sean Conroy wrote in his report.

Resident Robert Armstead worried the music would be too loud. "I've been around too much amplified music to think it's a good idea in the neighborhood," he said.

But resident Chris McKay — a noted

inventor who also played with the Carmel Rotary Club Band - said it would be too hard to hear guitar without the help of amplifiers.

"I would recommend they be allowed to play guitars or upright basses with amplification, if it's within city noise limits," McKay said.

Planning services manager Brian Roseth said the city's ordinance allowing live music in restaurants and bars is based on noise levels, not amplification, since unamplified instruments can create a lot of sound, while amplified instruments may be played softly.

"It doesn't matter if the music is ampli-

fied or not. If it's above the limit, it's not permitted," Roseth said.

Commissioner Alan Hewer recommended approving the permit to allow live music inside and outside the restaurant daily, with no additional restrictions on hours for outdoor playing. The commission unanimously agreed.

The restaurant is the ninth to receive a permit since the city lifted its ban on live music in October 2005. Other venues include the Cypress Inn, Anton & Michel, Forge in the Forest, Jack London's, Carmel Plaza, Zillo's and Ocean's Sports Bar & Grill.

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Pacific Grove to lay off three employees

THE PACIFIC Grove City Council took steps Wednesday to lay off three employees, including public works director Steve Leiker, an account clerk and an office assistant.

The council also voted to add three new positions: principal analyst, management analyst and senior accountant.

The layoffs won't save the city money but

will help the city's operation run more efficiently, city manager Jim Colangelo said.

"We are going reallocate resources where we need help," he said.

Council members voted unanimously for an ordinance to lay off the employees. It's expected the city council will approve the ordinance again at its March 7 meeting.



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Appeals court hammers once-through cooling at power plants

ENVIRONMENTALISTS OPPOSED to California American Water Co.'s efforts to build a desalination plant at Moss Landing power plant are lauding a New York court ruling that, if applied to federal courts in the western United States, could prevent the water company's use of the plant's once-through cooling system.

A panel of three judges with the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals found the Environmental Protection Agency must force power plants to protect billions of fish and other organisms, despite the cost to power facilities.

"With this ruling, desalination plants should no longer be considered for co-locating with power plants," said Joe Geever, Surfrider Foundation's Southern California regional manager. "It doesn't make sense to prevent the destruction of marine life by the power industry just to have desalination step in and continue the destruction."

The federal appellate court in New York on Jan. 25 found the EPA in 2004 issued inadequate regulations that were contrary to the Clean Water Act's mandate to force power plants, water companies and other industries toward using the "best technology available" for reducing environmental impacts to aquatic systems. The court said the EPA weighed cost too heavily when issuing permits for once-through cooling systems for power plants and ordered the agency to clarify or change its laws on power plants' cooling systems.

The lawsuit was filed by Surfrider and 16 other plaintiffs

An ambulance was sent to the scene around 7 a.m. on report of a body on Highway 1 just north of Point Lobos. Three police officers from Carmel P.D. also responded after they overheard scanner traffic about the incident. According to Sgt. John Nyunt, someone also called the Carmel police

about that same time to report seeing a body in the area. Monterey County Chief Assistant District Attorney Terry Spitz said reports indicate someone from Seaborn's Yankee Point residence also alerted authorities that morning.

"There was a police agency that did get a call that originated out of the home," he said, though he would not say whether Seaborn or his wife made it. "I don't want to comment on that. We have an ethical rule preventing us from talking about evidence."

CHP officers arrested Seaborn at his home just before 9 a.m. on charges of felony hit-and-run, vehicular manslaughter and driving under the influence. Last week, officer Art Carbonel said Seaborn's 2003 Range Rover bore substantial evidence of the fatal collision, and officers found Vasquez' bicycle there.

In court Feb. 20, Seaborn answered to only one charge, felony hit-and-run, as the DA's office is awaiting completion of the CHP investigation to determine if there is basis for additional allegations, according to Spitz.



opposed to once-through cooling because it kills scores of small fish and other organisms when they become impinged and entrained on screens used as filters.

In their decision, the justices also ruled power plants can-

Judges say EPA is not allowed to consider costs when regulating power plants not pay to offset the loss of marine life in once-through cooling and must do everything they can to prevent harm to marine life.

The ruling could affect Cal Am, which has proposed building what it calls the Coastal Water Project. The project includes a desalination plant at the Moss Landing power plant, which would use the power facility's cool its operation

once-through cooling system to cool its operation.

But it could take some time for the court decision to be turned into new federal regulations. And it's unclear how the ruling might affect Cal Am's Coastal Water Project.

"Until the EPA promulgates a new rule, it is impossible to know what will be required of the Moss Landing power plant," said Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie. "The rule-making process is lengthy and likely to take years."

Still, Geever said the ruling will likely push power and water companies to seek other desalination sources, such as drawing water from beach wells, a method which is more expensive but doesn't kill marine life.

Cal Am is proposing a test well about 300 feet inland from Marina State Beach. The well would be diagonally drilled to draw water beneath the ocean floor. The technology could be up and running as early as July.

Although his opinion isn't popular with environmentalists, John Steinbeck, vice president of the San Luis Obispobased Tenera Environmental, said studies have not shown a single case in California where entrainment has had a direct effect on adult fish populations. According to Steinbeck, even if millions of larvae and eggs are killed every day in entrainment, they're just a drop in the bucket.

"There are so many larvae in the water that it doesn't have any effect on the fish population," he told The Pine Cone. "In a sense, fish have adapted to a fairly high level of mortality. And the additional mortality from the power plants is very small compared to their natural mortality."

C.V. resident suspected of fraudulent use of caregiver's ID

MONTEREY COUNTY Sheriff's deputies arrested a 71year-old Rippling River resident Wednesday morning following an 18-month investigation into alleged grand theft via forgery and fraud. Investigator Mike Shapiro reported Frederick Richard Ledbetter had used a former caregiver's personal information to seek California Department of Social Services reimbursement for caregiver fees totaling \$16,510.09 since June 2003.

The sheriff's office obtained a search warrant for Ledbetter's bank account information, which yielded corroborating deposit records verifying the amount taken, according to Shapiro.

He also said the ongoing fraud caused difficulties for the care provider who was supposedly receiving the reimbursements, since the money paid by the DSS was reported to the IRS as the caregiver's income.

A Monterey County Superior Court judge issued a felony arrest warrant for Ledbetter, and deputies took him into custody just after 9 a.m. Feb. 21. He was transported to the Monterey County Jail and booked on charges of grand theft and forgery.

Act now to select your spacious home

Cities consider shared firefighters

CITY COUNCILS in Monterey and Pacific Grove this month approved a contract to have Monterey fire supervisors take charge at fires in other Peninsula cities.

Officials said the arrangement, which could take effect next week, will keep the public safe, save money and test the waters for creating Peninsula-wide management of fire departments.

According to the deal unanimously OKd by the Monterey City Council Feb. 6 and narrowly approved by the P.G. council Feb. 7, a Monterey fire division chief — on duty every hour of every day — would respond to fires, mass casualty incidents, ocean rescues and other major emergencies in Carmel and Pacific Grove, in addition to Monterey.

P.G. Fire Chief Andrew Miller estimated that would break down to 62 calls in his city and 23 calls in Carmel each year. Even though they'll travel from Monterey, Miller said they should still be able to meet the national standard of arriving at an emergency within eight minutes 90 percent of the time.

Also, Monterey Fire Chief Sam Mazza doubted the arrangement would hurt firefighting capabilities in Monterey. Few of the calls in other cities would "require more than just a few minutes," he said.

The contract approved by the Monterey and Pacific Grove city councils includes a 30-day cancellation provision, "so if Monterey or P.G. decided it was not in our best interest, either party could say, 'Thanks, but no thanks," Miller said. "We felt that should give both parties the confidence they're not stuck with something they don't like." The arrangement will cost P.G. \$40,000 per year.

The Monterey City Council approved the idea 5-0. But the P.G. City Council divided narrowly, voting 4-3 in favor of the agree-

ment, with council members Scott Miller, Daniel Davis and Lisa Bennett dissenting.

After the vote, Pacific Grove resident and former firefighter Al Borges wrote a letter condemning the idea of P.G. sharing its firefighters with other cities.

"I feel that maybe what they should do is drop Carmel and take care of the City of P.G.," he wrote. "I think Carmel should get off their butts and get their own chief."

Carmel yet to sign up

While the idea of having Monterey division chiefs respond to incidents in other cities has been approved by Monterey and Pacific Grove, the Carmel City Council has yet to weigh in on the idea.

Carmel City Administrator Rich Guillen said he is in the process of meeting and conferring with the firefighters association and could not say if and when Carmel's part-time duty chiefs — John Trenner, Bill Cox and Tim Connell — would be taken off the job and replaced with a Monterey division chief. The city might develop a "succession plan" to phase them out.

"The biggest difference is we would have full-time duty chiefs, even if they're coming from Monterey," Guillen said.


He agreed with Miller and Mazza that sharing services also makes sense in light of the impending release of a study on the possible consolidation of the departments' administrations.

The populations of Monterey, Pacific Grove and Carmel combined are about 55,000, Guillen said. "That's still considered a small city in California, so there's really no need to have all these separate chiefs."

Miller said sharing coverage with Monterey would provide a glimpse of what consolidation might be like.

"We can dip our toe in the water and see how it feels before we jump into this thing," he said. "In this day and age, we have to look





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Owner: Griggs Nursery won't become homes for several years

EVEN THOUGH the Pacific Grove City Council voted Wednesday to change the zoning of Griggs Nursery so eight houses could be built in its place, the garden shop's owner said he's in no hurry to sell the property and will continue to operate the business, maybe for years.

With only Lisa Bennett dissenting, the city council voted 6-1 to change the zoning of the Griggs Nursery property at 1021 David Ave. from neighborhood commercial to medium density residential so homes can be built there. The property was long ago divided into eight lots. Owner Dean Griggs wants to sell them to developers but said it might be awhile before he does so.

"We are waiting for someone capable of doing the developing," Griggs said after the council's decision. "Until that happens, we will remain a nursery. We are not in a position of a fire sale."

Griggs, 65, tried two years ago to sell the property, but found it was zoned for commercial use, not residential. Griggs stands to make about \$4 million from the sale.

Besides reducing traffic from delivery trucks and out-oftown customers, Griggs' attorney Pam Silkwood told the city council Pacific Grove would also benefit from the zoning change because it would receive a big boost in property taxes when the lots are sold for houses, plus subsequent increases in property taxes of about 2 percent per year. However, the homes would not generate sales tax revenue the way the nursery does.

Griggs can't sell the nursery business because of a con-

tract he has with his two sons, who own nurseries under the family name in Carmel Valley.

"The value of the property [for homes] is greater than the value someone could receive by operating a small business there," Griggs said.

He estimated he could sell each lot for about \$465,000 to \$495,000. Griggs said a five-year sales slump and his desire to retire are the reasons he wants to sell the land. He hasn't said when he'll close shop, but said it could be in 2009.

Single family?

Bennett said she wanted to support the general plan amendment but couldn't because she would rather see affordable housing on the land.

"I do have some problems with the single-family residential model which is a pattern in our community, but hasn't been a successful model in California for affordable housing or transportation,"

Mayor Dan Cort moved to approve the resolution for the general plan amendment.

"I really enjoy Griggs Nursery and I enjoy the products they have," Cort said. "But I think he's within his rights."

> During public comment at the council meeting, two people opposed the rezoning, including one speaker who said traffic during rush hour would increase by as many as four vehicle trips per hour with homes there.

> Griggs collected signatures from all of the nursery's surrounding neighbors, who said they didn't mind if homes were built in place of the business.

Because Griggs Nursery uses much more water than eight homes would use, there will be a surplus of water credits when the nursery shuts down.

But Jon Biggs, the city's community development director, said the city hasn't decided exactly how to handle the extra water credits. Thirty-eight people in Pacific Grove are on a waiting list to receive water.

"We really don't know what will happen to that excess water at this stage," Biggs said. "The owner said water could be used as credits to the water waiting list. But based on recent court action, I think that proposal would have to go through an Environmental Impact Report process to fully evaluate the cumulative effects of all that water being available at one time."

for all its commercial customers and a five-tiered rate structure for its residential customers. The system, ordered by the PUC, was intended to improve water conservation.

at more innovative ways of providing these services - we can't always afford to each have our own fire chief, training officer, etc.'

Monterey and P.G. already work closely together, since they automatically send engines to each other's cities to help fight structure fires. A similar arrangement exists between Carmel and neighboring Cypress Fire Protection District, which is run by the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (now called "Cal Fire").

"I'm really proud of the Monterey County fire services," Miller said. "We all work closely together."

The Feb. 7 fire that destroyed a building on Alvarado Street was a case in point, with almost 20 agencies participating. Pacific Grove sent its ladder truck, a chief and five volunteers. A Carmel engine crew also responded and spent the night helping to battle the five-alarm blaze.

"We're really looking forward to this as an opportunity to model what a consolidated command structure will look like," Mazza said. "It's a really excellent opportunity."

"We did that for all of our residential customers and for about 80 percent of the commercial customers," Bowie said. "The 20 percent of businesses that we didn't get done are the ones the Public Utilities Commission is requiring us to audit now.'

Monta Potter, chief executive officer of the Carmel Chamber of Commerce, said she hasn't gotten much feedback from Carmel shops about the ongoing audits, but she encouraged businesses to attend an upcoming meeting hosted by Cal Am to explain the allotment process.

"It's unfortunate," Potter said. "I'm sure some people's rates will go up."

Dirt cheap

Peninsula businesses now pay less than half a cent per gallon but would pay as much as 1.3 cents per gallon if they exceed their allotment. Residential customers pay just twotenths of a cent per gallon for their initial allotment. That can increase to as much as 1.7 cents per gallon for water wasters.

"There is a different formula for each type of business," Bowie said. "If you are a hair salon or a restaurant, obviously you will be using more water than an office. The formula, which has been developed by the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, takes that into account.'

Cal Am has until May 1 to complete the audit of its remaining 1,172 commercial customers.

"We started making the calls to customers in early February," Bowie said. "We have about 150 done so far." Cal Am will host a meeting to show its commercial cus-

tomers how the allotment formula works.

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
'Shark Days' at the aquarium

boys who admitted burglarizing a home on Fountain Avenue, according to White.

The suspects did not force entry to the home, but ransacked it and stole two iPod Nanos, a laptop computer, an Xbox console and games, a digital camera, money and jewelry, according to White.

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

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

"My daughter is 9," he explained. "She's our test market." According to Moorer, the Disney Channel film went over big not only with his daughter, but with her classmates at River School. With such an endorsement, Moorer predicts audiences "will be dancing in the aisles, just like like they did

at The Buddy Holly Story.'" Moorer is also excited about the venue that will host "High School Musical" — Santa Catalina's state-of-the-art performing arts center.

'Happy Together' again, the Turtles play Sunset Center

OVER A two-year span from 1965 to 1967, the Turtles managed to record two certified pop gems — "It Ain't Me Babe" and "Happy Together" — that exemplified how quickly the times were a-changing during that tumultuous decade.

But what is perhaps most remarkable about the Turtles, who will perform at Sunset Center Saturday, Feb. 24, wasn't their success. It was that they existed at all.

"We started as the Crossfires back in 1962," recalled Mark Volman, an original member who now teaches music history and music business classes at Belmont University in Nashville, Tenn. "We played surf music because that's what everyone was playing in West L.A. at the time. We recorded 15 or 16 songs. We had pretty much run the gamut [by 1965], and we were getting ready to break up."

Sunset Center San Carlos btwn. 8th and 10th (831) 620-2048 The Crossfires, while they were in high school, were content to simply play rock 'n' roll at fraternity parties for fun and a little money. Once graduation came and went, the

pressures of jobs and families seemed to be too Dreamin'," and the Animals' "House of the Rising Sun" — the Turtles' version of "It Ain't Me Babe" stands as one of the finest recordings of the folk-rock era.

The song reached number five on the Billboard charts, propelling the group to stardom. In their very first concert appearance (opening for Herman's Hermits), they played in front of 50,000 screaming fans at the Hollywood Bowl.

Flower power anthem

The pressure to follow up their initial success was enormous, Volman conceded, and after two years of touring and recording, the Turtles were on the fast track to becoming yesterday's news. But in 1967, the band's career was saved by the discovery of an irresistible song, the soon-to-be flower power anthem, "Happy Together."


"We were always looking for a good song," Volman explained. "We never sat around thinking we were great songwriters. 'Happy Together' was sent to us by a couple of songwriters from a group called the Magicians. We really liked it, so we took it out on the road for a few months to test

much to keep the group together. But just as the its members were preparing for Crossfires' demise, they received an unex-

pected break.

"We had a chance to go into the studio and record a few songs, and one of those songs was, 'It Ain't Me Babe.""

A year earlier, the Beatles took America and pop music by storm. Then, in 1965, a new face arrived on pop scene — folksinger Bob Dylan — with equally earth-shattering results.

"Everybody was recording Dylan," Volman recounted. "The Byrds had just had a Top 10 record with 'Mr. Tambourine Man.' Our record company said, 'Listen to Bob.' In a matter of months, we became the Turtles and we were on the road."

Along with a handful of other singles — the Byrds' "Mr. Tambourine Man" and "Turn, Turn, Turn," the Mamas and the Papas' "California PHOTO/TURL

ous 70-mile stretch of highway.

But if Westmed continues losing money and has to pull out, or if it's declared unfit, Lynch said the county should be ready with an immediate plan to keep ambulances rolling throughout the county. Westmed responds to about 2,000 calls per month.

If Westmed disappears, Lynch said the county would call on emergency medical technicians and paramedics who work for fire departments throughout the county to staff the ambulances. "We have fleshed out an organizational chart showing what everyone would need to do," he told The Pine Cone. "I'm confident we have a plan in place for that period."

At the CRFA meeting, Reade asked Carmel Valley Fire board members Bob Rice and Pete Garneau, and Carmel City Councilman Gerard Rose, for permission to participate.

'Anything we do would have to be at absolutely no cost to CRFA, the City of Carmel or Carmel Valley Fire Protection District," she said. "If we provided personnel to assist with running the ambulances in the short term, the county would pay us for that."

CRFA already picks up some Westmed calls. Last year, it took over the Carmel area previously served by a county ambulance stationed at the fire department on Rio Road.

Rose wanted assurance extending assistance would not affect residents, visitors and business people in Carmel and Carmel Valley. Reade said off-duty personnel would be asked - not required - to work, and those on duty would continue with their regular responsibilities. She said emergency crews who volunteered to help could staff the Westmed ambulances and ensure supplies remain up to date during the 72-hour period.





care they can only receive in a hospital, people will die."

Dr. Bill Benda, a Big Sur resident who works as an emergency physician at Natividad Medical Center, agreed with Karstens' assessment.

"The most important factor in critical medical/trauma situations is transport time," explained Benda, former medical director of the Big Sur Health Center and past director of emergency services at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula.

While barely 1,000 people live in Big Sur, an estimated 2

"My feeling is CRFA is a model for ambulance delivery service in the county, and we would be extremely insular were we not to work with the county," Rose said. "I would advocate we do precisely that."

Rice, representing valley residents, asked how his constituents would benefit.

And Trish Hastings, who works for CRFA, wondered about training, since Westmed ambulances are different and carry different equipment than CRFA rigs.

This week, CRFA obtained a Westmed ambulance to ensure everyone knows how to work on one.

The county also has a plan for what would follow the 72hour window, according to Lynch.


By then, another company would have to come in and hire all the former Westmed employees to work on its ambulances through the end of the year. But finding such a company might not be possible, unless the county makes changes in its service requirements or payment terms.

"We have come to the conclusion that any ambulance provider must have revised operating parameters to be fiscally viable," he said.

"If Westmed went away and we went out with the same contract, nobody would bid it," Reade told the CRFA board. "We have to do something about it."

The balance do not collect either estate or inheritance taxes. Worthy of a half hour or so of your estate tax attorney's time? You bet! 
"Everybody wants tourists to come here," Karstens observed. "They're the lifeblood of the county. It's important we provide them with emergency medical services.'

Karstens would like to see the county pay for keeping an ambulance in Big Sur. "We receive very few services for the TOT tax the county gets from Big Sur. The previous ambulance company received an annual \$400,000 subsidy. Westmed isn't getting any," he said.

Benda ultimately believes the ambulance crisis in Big Sur will be resolved. "I fully believe this situation will be reversed, given the current level of concern and action," he predicted. "But we must continue to participate in the democratic process until it is reversed."

Pinney also believes a solution is within reach. "I can't believe the county administrator in his right mind would pull the ambulance from Big Sur," he said. "The money is there. It's just a question of the supervisors biting the bullet and making it happen."

In the meantime, Karstens reminded Big Sur locals to get involved with the political process. "Anyone who travels this highway could be affected," she explained. "It's just not acceptable to lower the level of care down here. We don't deserve it. The tourists don't deserve it. We're encouraging everyone to contact their elected representatives. That's the only way we can make a difference."

from your vehicle's tailpipe, water and antifreeze are probably entering the cylinder, creating steam. If so, this most likely means that the engine has overheated, which caused the head gasket to fail, thereby allowing antifreeze and water to leak out. Blue smoke coming out of the tailpipe is caused by engine oil entering the cylinder, where it is being burned along with the fuel mixture. If so, the auto technician must test to see which seal, gasket, and/or O-ring failed and is allowing the oil to seep through to the cylinder. Finally, black smoke is an indication of excess fuel in the cylinder that cannot be completely burned.

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The final irony

Editorial

MEL GRIMES loved the ocean. A lifelong surfer, friends say he practically lived at the beach when he was a Carmel High student in the 1960s. In those heady days of peace, love and rock 'n' roll, Grimes even presided over something called the Inter-Peninsula Surfing Club, which had its headquarters on a patch of sand at the foot of 11th Avenue. In more recent years, as he grew into a middle-aged lawyer with heart trouble, Grimes retained a youthful enthusiasm for the beach culture he grew up in. Acquaintances say his house was practically a museum of 1960s. To understand how heartfelt was his interest in California beach culture, all you have to do is look at the aging VW microbus parked in his driveway.

Ironically, it was a boulder dropped behind that bus that cost Grimes his life. The neighbor who placed the boulder shot Grimes as he tried to smash the offending boulder with a sledgehammer, police say. But those bitterly ironic circumstances weren't the most ironic thing about his death, it turned out.

Because Grimes spent so much time riding the waves of the Pacific Ocean, his friends and family thought it would be a ideal tribute for his ashes to be scattered at sea. They planned what promised to be a perfect memorial: A service at the Carmel Mission, a run along the shore to the very cove where he surfed so much, a gathering of friends, and dispersal of his ashes, along with those of his wife, Elizabeth, in the ocean they loved so much.

But hold it! Scattering ashes at sea is not allowed in the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary. On the morning of the memorial, Carmel police said, "there will be no scattering of ashes." The ban wasn't their idea, of course, but came from some bureaucrat with a federal government ID in his wallet.

It may be pointless to ask this question now, but we'll go ahead and do it anyway: If fires are allowed on Carmel Beach, which they are, and those fires are required by city ordinance to be built below the high tide line so the ashes will be regularly cleaned up and washed out to sea, how the heck can casting a small quantity of cremated human remains among the waves hurt anything?

Or maybe this one is more to the point: If millions of fish die at sea every year, and their remains are left to decompose in the deep, how can a tiny of amount of human tissue (reduced to ash) possibly make any difference to the

'Just too many' Dear Editor,

I would like to thank you for your recent coverage of the planning commission meeting regarding the proposed development at the Carmel Convalescent Hospital. Our neighborhood, and indeed all of Carmel, should be concerned. We are not just talking about annexing almost four acres to the city of Carmel. I respectfully beg to differ with Carmel's planning service manager, Brian Roseth's statement that "It's really drawing a line on a map, and there are few effects from that.

The city is not just drawing a line on the the map; the zoning is being changed to create an entitlement of a much larger community in Carmel to benefit a developer. This entitlement threatens a neighborhood of single family dwellings. This annexation with rezoning from Monterey County's M-2 (one house per half acre with a total of 7 residences) to Carmel's R-4 (latest planning commission revision down from 44 units per acre to 1 1 per acre with a total of 44 condos) would set a very bad precedent, changing the entire nature of one neighborhood in Carmel. Whose neighborhood is next? If Carmel annexed the Convalescent Hospital property with its current zoning I don't think there would be as much concern.

CHP presence in P.B. widely supported Dear Editor,

A letter writer from Pebble Beach is misinformed on several points in his letter published in the Feb 16 Pine Cone. "Heavy" California Highway Patrol enforcement in Del Monte Forest is an inappropriate term. CHP enforces the same vehicle code in the same way inside the Forest as it does outside. What the Del Monte Forest Property Owners asked the Community Services District to do in 2006 is simply hire the CHP to do enforcement for more hours than they can afford to do within their own budget.

Commute hour violations are the most frequent, and commuters travel both directions into and out of the Forest, so the conclusion that it is only 10 percent of residents as opposed to both residents and outside nor is it relevant. its response."

"Happy Together," the perfect synthesis of feel-good pop and feed-your-head psychedelia, struck a chord with listeners who were quickly discarding folk rock for newer, more experimental sounds best exemplified by the Beatles' "Revolver," the Beach Boys' "Pet Sounds" and the Byrds' space-age single, "Eight Miles High."

In the spring that preceded San Francisco's Summer of Love — when young people flocked to Haight Ashbury and the hippie movement was born — "Happy Together" rose to the top of charts, replacing the Beatles' "Penny Lane" at No. 1. But as countless rock 'n' rollers have discovered, fame often comes at a steep price.

'Quite honestly, we never got to enjoy the success of the song very much," Volman admitted. "We never got to experience the Summer of Love. We were a very hard working group. We were constantly on the road." From a commercial standpoint, "Happy

Chimney fire causes \$75K in damage

A FIRE that started in the area surrounding the chimney of a Phoenix Avenue home in Pacific Grove Sunday night resulted in substantial damage to the house after firefighters had to tear the walls apart to put it out.

Pacific Grove Assistant Fire Chief David Brown said the resident called 911 just after 10 p.m. Feb. 18, "and said they had some sort of fire in their wall."

When firefighters arrived, nothing appeared amiss from outside the two-story home, according to Brown. Inside, they determined the fire was burning in the open area between the wall and the chimney.

Crews on two Pacific Grove engines, with backup engines from Monterey and Pebble

Beach, used a thermal imager to determine what was burning, and where.

"The fire was in some void areas, so it took some extensive overhaul operations to dig it all out - cutting into walls and finding all the hidden fire," Brown said. He esti-mated it caused about \$70,000 in damage to the home and another \$5,000 to its contents.

In addition to replacing the broken sheetrock and repairing the walls, the resident will have to deal with the extensive smoke damage and replace any possessions ruined by the water used to extinguish the flames.

Brown said it's unknown what caused the fire, but the investigation should be completed soon

Looking forward and looking back

This year marks the 40th anniversary of the Turtles' unlikely rise to the top of the charts. Unlike many of its contemporaries, the band's well crafted, upbeat and unpretentious pop songs have aged surprising well. Their graying fan base apparently agrees with that assessment — the demand for live appearances has been steady since the Turtles went back on the road in 1984.

Perhaps the greatest testament to the Turtles enduring popularity came last month when the Grammy Hall of Fame added "Happy Together" to its list of the greatest pop songs ever.

Looking back on it all, Volman is proud of the Turtles' accomplishments.


