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# Esalen's 'hot tub diplomacy' changed Yeltsin's mind and the world's map

FOR MOST Americans, the enduring image of the late Soviet President Boris Yeltsin is him atop a tank in 1991, rallying opposition to a Communist Party coun

But the free-market ideas of the man who dismantled the Soviet Union were cemented on a trip to the United States two years before — a trip organized by officials from Big Sur's Esalen Institute.

It may be better known for its hot tubs and New Age seminars, but Esalen's founders had long been interested in the cause of international cooperation and world peace. It was Esalen's Soviet-American exchange program that arranged the historic 1989 meetings between Yeltsin and President George H.W. Bush and former President Ronald Reagan.

But as impressive as those summits were, for Yeltsin, they paled in comparison to his visit to a Houston, Texas, supermarket.

Amazed at the store's dazzling display of produce, Yeltsin wept. Like most Russians, he had been indoctrinated to believe American prosperity was a myth. He reportedly embraced capitalism on the spot.

#### Surviving on lies

"Seeing all that abundance just overwhelmed him," recalled Joseph Montville, who once directed an Esalen seminar on the psychology of the U.S./Soviet relationship. "He realized he had been lied to by the Communist Party. He realized the whole system was dishonest, and the state was surviving on a whole structure of lies."

Now known as "Track Two: An Institute for Citizen Diplomacy," the exchange program was established in

1979 to "create alternatives to adversarial relationships between nations by encouraging a broader understanding of human relations and human potential." The media called the effort, "hot tub diplomacy."

Once a part of Esalen, the San Francisco-based institute is now a stand-alone nonprofit group. Its current director, Dulce Murphy, remembers those heady days when Yeltsin first came to the United States.

"I was with him when he visited the New York Stock Exchange," said Murphy, the wife of Esalen co-founder Michael Murphy. "I'd never been on the floor of the

# Judge declines to block desal plant

CALIFORNIA AMERICAN Water Co. can proceed with its construction of a pilot desalination plant in Moss Landing, a Monterey County judge ruled Thursday, thwarting an effort by activists to stop it.

In a 50-minute hearing, Superior Court Judge Robert O'Farrell declined to issue an injunction requested by two water activists seeking to prevent Cal Am from building the test facility. They claimed permits for the pilot plant from the Monterey County Board of Supervisors, the county health department and the California Coastal Commission violated

The group takes credit for helping retain a downtown post office and thwarting efforts to turn Hatton Canyon into a freeway. In 1994, its members hosted a fundraiser featuring Charles Schulz that garnered \$26,000 for Harrison Memorial

"And whenever anyone needs a volunteer to do anything, they always call the CRA," said former president Linda Anderson, who was also at the initial meeting in Mayer's home. She and her husband, Clayton, spearheaded the monthly CRA beach cleanup that's been going for 15 years.

condos. Following prolific protests and a unanimous vote against the annexation by the planning commission April 11, attorney Derinda Messenger said Leidig and his son, Curtis, wanted more time to address the neighbors' concerns before presenting their plans to the council.

"Asking the city council to take up this project so soon after the planning commission's decision is a mistake for everybody," she said this week. Considering the volume of comments the city received and the time it will take to absorb them, "I think rushing it to May 1 would be a disservice to all the parties — the neighbors, the city and my clients."

Leidig first presented his idea to the city last fall, and council members asked planners to proceed with the annexation application, which would occur prior to the design and approval of specific development plans for the 3.7-acre property

After conducting environmental study on the annexation, planning services manager Brian Roseth suggested adding the property to the city with zoning that would set the maximum number of condos at 30. Leidig, who initially said he hoped to build 60 to 75 units, agreed to the lower number.

But the move did nothing to assuage opponents, who said even 30 units would destroy the surrounding neighborhood's character. Some said they would rather the county retain jurisdiction than the City of Carmel. "We hope to work with the community a little more closely and try to address some of the issues they've brought up," Messenger said. "We've reduced the density considerably from what we started with in response to the community's concerns. If we need to move it a little more in response to that, of course we would like to not be faulted for that."

#### **Traffic committee formed**

Residents in the area also predicted disastrous traffic situations on narrow residential streets in the area of Highway 1 and Valley Way, but Messenger said the one- or two-month delay in bringing the proposal to the council would provide the necessary time to address those worries.

She said the Leidigs established a subcommittee that includes residents and representatives of county and city public works departments.

"We'll look at existing issues that have been identified out there and see what we can do to take care of those things, even without our project," Messenger pledged. "And if our project has impacts on intersections or exacerbates certain problems, we need the input on what we can do to correct those problems. We can't do it in a vacuum."

Although the environmental study concluded annexation

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

# SPCA wants more responsible tenants and pet-friendly landlords

Those two words have long been the bane of renters with animals trying to find a place to call home on the Monterey

Now, in an effort to reduce the number of pets given up for adoption because their owners couldn't find places to rent, the SPCA of Monterey County is reaching out to pet owners

"There are a lot of good renters with great pets that would make wonderful tenants if the landlords could sort the good pet owners with well behaved pets from those who don't care so much," said SPCA executive director Gary Tiscornia.

In a new program, the SPCA seeks to show landlords how to better screen pet owners and show animal owners how to be more responsible, he said.

For instance, "if a pet owner has two cats and they provide one litter box, and they don't understand why their cats go out of the litter box," Tiscornia said, "we will tell them why [more] litter boxes could help stop that."

Tiscornia said he wants landlords who currently prohibit pets to work with the SPCA in developing solutions that will "protect their property while expanding their market to include responsible pet owners."

The goal of the new program is to double the SPCA's petfriendly rental listings within the next six months, Tiscornia said. The list, posted on the SPCA's website, shows rentals in the county that allow pets.

Dianne Mahroom, property manager with the Vistas at High Meadows, which rents to pet owners, said she regularly gets calls from people who have had a difficult time finding a place to live with animals.

The Vistas, which has been listed on the SPCA's pet friendly list for several years, charges a \$50 per pet, per month over the standard rate.

"As long as the pets don't disturb other tenants it's OK," Mahroom said.

The SPCA also offers certification programs for pet owners that show the owner and pet have undergone a specific training course with an animal expert, he said.

"We provide certification that would help a pet with behavioral issues that could be a problem for a landlord,"

Last week. Tiscornia sent letters to the editor about the idea to several newspapers but so far has received little


"We don't have a problem connecting with pet owners who are looking for rentals," he said. "But we're having a difficult time connecting with landlords."

Every pet owner denied housing because of an animal

"represents a lost home to an SPCA pet" Tiscornia said. At the same time, by considering responsible pet owners, he said, landlords would expand their pool of renters.

Although the SPCA doesn't have statistics, Tiscornia said

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# New garden reveals Harrison library's long-hidden facade

\*WALTER TOOK very good care of this historic building," Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club member Carol Stratton told those gathered outside Harrison Memorial Library Wednesday for the dedication of its new garden, designed by landscape architect Walter Guthrie. "The garden was so overgrown that it was like Sleeping Beauty's castle, and Walter was the prince who liberated it.'

The brief ceremony, which included Mayor Sue McCloud, council members, garden club representatives, patrons,

library staff and Guthrie's widow, marked the official reopen-CHURCH SERVICES



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ing of the garden, which closed early this year to undergo a long-planned and comprehensive makeover.

After deciding to take on the task of redoing the garden, club members spent several years working to raise \$160,000 and obtain city approval of the plans, which Guthrie donated. This winter, Craven Landscaping was hired to remove the old brick pathways and planters, pull the vegetation — save for the towering pines — and construct new stone paths and planters containing low-growing, drought-tolerant plants and shrubs. Patrons in wheelchairs can now access the front of the library more easily, and added benches provide ample spots for web-surfing laptop carriers to partake of the library's free wireless service outdoors.

The aim of the garden redesign, which Guthrie developed through examining historic photos and listening to the concerns of library users, was to showcase and complement the building designed by renowned California architect Bernard Maybeck in 1927, according to the garden club. The infant plants it currently contains should grow no more than a few feet tall, enabling passers by to see the historic edifice from the street.

While Guthrie, who died in a mudslide outside his Mid-Valley home a year ago, was earlier named the Carmel-bythe-Sea Garden Club's "first honorary gentleman member," he was additionally honored Wednesday with a new plaque placed on a bench to recognize his contributions to the city.

# Flanders judge gives city a chance to change his mind

THE MONTEREY County Superior Court judge who overturned the city's decision to sell the historic Flanders Mansion has temporarily rescinded the ruling.

Judge Robert O'Farrell has scheduled a May hearing to give the city's lawyer, Bill Conners, a chance to try to convince him to reverse the judgment.

After O'Farrell decided in February the city council broke its own law against demolition by neglect by allowing the 1920s-era mansion to fall into disrepair, and violated California environmental laws and state provisions governing the sale public property, Conners filed court papers alleging the points made in the 22-page ruling were not backed by the facts in the record.

He also said the judge should have deferred to the council's decision because its members were elected officials who considered all the available information before casting their



Here are just a few of my thoughts about our unforgettable week in China; a land of extreme contrasts.

- · One had to continually remind oneself that this is a communist country when one was surrounded by what appeared to be rampant
- · Instead of ten thousand bicycles, one saw ten thousand Audis and Buicks.
- One couldn't help comparing the luxurious hotel bathrooms to the public toilets whose use requires the agility of someone pro-

ficient in yoga.

- At one o'clock in the morning one could see welding torches being used at the top of the many high-rise buildings under construction. And we saw young girls working in government factories who have to sleep and eat in the same building where they work long hours. There are no trade unions in China!
- To my taste the food was bland and I suspect some Chinese feel the same. This could account for the lines outside some of the Kentucky Fried Chicken, MacDonald's and Pizza Hut establishments that one saw on almost every corner in Shanghai, Suzhou and Hangzhou.
- The hotels were outstanding but one had only to walk a few yards to see the real China - small shacks crowded together with many families having to share one toilet and with no running
- One of our tour guides told me that the Chinese refer to us as the 'Big Noses.' She added that they have another term for some of us - the 'Buddha Bellies'!
- My overall impression was one of deep concern at the rapidly widening gap between the haves and have-nots. History tells you what happens when this gap reaches a certain point and China has a long and sad history of social unrest.
- · Would I return to China? Most certainly 'yes'. We just scratched the surface of this immense country so I can hardly wait to return and spend more time exploring the historic sites. Ninety minutes was hardly enough time to explore the Forbidden City in Beijing with its 9,999 rooms (Next time I will avoid room number one which is Starbucks!).
- And, surprise, my \$25 "Rolex", purchased from a street vendor at the Great Wall, is still working!
- Finally, I must take this opportunity to thank the Chinese government for making this visit possible. One reason for being offered this trip was to give Chinese business people the chance to introduce themselves to those from California. To this end the Beijing Chamber of Commerce put on a splendid reception for us but, apart from Monta Potter, my wife and myself and a realtor from Walnut Creek, no one showed up. Very embarrassing.

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# P.G. tells shoreline residents where to go in case of a tsunami

THE CHANCES are very small that a devastating tsunami will strike Pacific Grove anytime soon. But if it does, the city will be more prepared.

A townhall meeting was planned for Thursday night to give the town's citizens a chance to learn what they should do if a tsunami is on its way.

"We are just trying to make an effort to be proactive and to properly plan in the event that we do have a tsunami," said Pacific Grove Fire Chief Andrew Miller.

In December, the Pacific Grove City Council adopted a tsunami incident response plan, which calls for a protocol to evacuate residents who live close to the ocean. The city's plan follows a model that other state cities and counties use, Miller said.

A tsunami is a series of large waves created by an underwater disturbance or earthquake. Tsunamis can move hundreds of miles per hour in the open ocean and smash into land with waves more than 100 feet

In a worst-case scenario, experts estimate a tsunami in P.G. could damage the city's low-lying coastline, also called the "tidal surge area," Miller said.

Because a tsunami aimed at California would probably be generated in Alaska or Asia — where the Pacific tectonic plate is in constant conflict with the Asian plate there would probably be plenty of warning before Pacific Grove was hit.


We could have an hour or longer to prepare for a tsunami," Miller said. "Our goal would be to contact all the people in the evacuation zone and move them to higher ground."

The evacuation area includes every house and apartment building along Ocean View Boulevard, homes on Sunset Drive to the Asilomar Conference Grounds, the areas bounded by Asilomar Avenue to the west, Esplanade Street to the east, Del Monte Avenue to the south and the Pacific Ocean to

About 700 people live in the roughly 300 homes located within the evacuation zone,

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# Steady revenue growth anticipated in next year's city budget

JOB CHANGES, higher parking fines and increased funding for Sunset Center figure in the proposed 2007/2008 budget received by the Carmel City Council Tuesday. Members made no comments and took no action on the \$12,875,794 spending plan after hearing city administrator Rich Guillen's predictions for the coming fiscal year but are set to discuss it in detail at a special meeting May 22.

Guillen, administrative director services Joyce Giuffre and city treasurer Dewey Evans drafted the budget based on growth of 3 to 5 percent in the "big three" revenue sources of hotel, sales and property taxes. At \$4,220,000, \$2,217,000 and \$3,656,700, respectively, they will combine to account for 79 percent of the city's income. Other revenue streams, such as business license tax and permit fees,

Hotel, sales and property taxes will probably be higher — but not by much

are expected to grow 2 to 4 percent.

No reserve funds will be needed to balance the budget, Guillen said. In fact, it calls for a \$50,000 transfer into the city's savings accounts.

Fees will remain stable, with the exception of parking citations. While the fine for overtime violations increased from \$20 to \$30 in the 2006/2007 budget, others remained unchanged last year. Guillen recommended boosting penalties for faulty parking from \$20 to \$30, and increasing the \$20 fine to \$25 for leaving an unauthorized vehicle in a commercial loading zone, no parking zone, red zone or passenger loading zone, as well as for oversize vehicles and other illegal parking.

"We would be bringing our city in line with other cities,"

#### A TALL ORDER

It is no secret that we become shorter as we grow older. In fact, a recent study the ages of 30 and 70 shows that men lose an average of 1.25 inches in height while women lose nearly 2 inches in stature. Why does this happen? The bone-thinning disease known as osteoporosis is the biggest cause of height loss. To begin with, aging bones become thinner, less dense, and more porous. As a result, the spine becomes more susceptible to microfractures in the vertebrae, which shortens the spine. To counter these effects, engage in some form of weight-bearing exercise, adopt a healthy diet rich in calcium and vitamin D, and consult with your doctor.

The increases would probably garner an additional \$5,000 to \$10,000 for the general fund.

Expenditures are projected to be \$7,524,344 in salaries and benefits, and \$5,351,450 in materials and services.

#### **More Sunset spending**

Public safety typically consumes the most dollars. Police spending would increase from \$2,495,500 this year, to \$2,673,132 in the coming fiscal year, while the fire department's current \$1,738,046 would drop to \$1,678,154. The cut stems from a decline of \$87,801 in salaries and benefits, mostly by using less part-time labor, offset by a \$27,909 increase in materials and contractual services.

There will also be a decline in building maintenance, which Guillen recommended be placed under the leadership of community services manager Christie Miller after building official Tim Meroney retires Aug. 1. Harrison Memorial Library will also spend less after losing its longtime director

Increases are set for the administration and administrative services departments, information services/network management, community planning and building, public works, forest and beach, and community services.

The private nonprofit Sunset Cultural Center, Inc., contracted to run the center on behalf of the city, requested a greater subsidy in 2007/2008. The group received \$772,000 in 2005/2006 and \$713,000 in the current fiscal year, but Guillen bumped the total to \$750,000 in the proposed bud-

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# River School kids will Run for Matt

WHILE SOME of the fleetest long-distance runners are battling over 26.2 mostly grueling miles of Highway 1 during this Sunday's Big Sur International Marathon, a couple hundred Carmel River School students and family members will be running their hearts out in the accompanying 5K in honor of their friend and classmate, Matt Haines, who died suddenly from a brain hemorrhage last month.

"We had a six-week run-a-thon, and of course it culminates with the Big Sur 5K," said principal Jay Marden. "And the purpose was to raise money for the Matt Haines Memorial Fund."

Students solicited donations from their friends and families, who pledged flat or per-lap payments.

"It's a much different community service endeavor than we have engaged in previously," said Marden, whose school is known for its avid runners. "It's something the kids feel

Some students have already exceeded the 200-lap mark (one lap is about an eighth of a mile) and all will turn in their running logs Sunday. They will have another week to collect the funds, which the parent-teacher association will deposit and then turn over in check form to the memorial fund to help the family, which has had to contend with expenses along with the excruciating grief.

A sponsor created Carmel River School 5K Run for Matt Team T-shirts, which the students have been buying for \$15 each, also to benefit the family, and plan on wearing during Sunday's run.

"We had our largest registered group, ever," Marden said of the crew participating in the Big Sur 5K. "In the neighborhood of 220 kids and their family members signed up."

#### Record numbers all around

According to the Big Sur Marathon office, registration sold out with a record 12,000 athletes set to compete in the April 29 events, including the marathon, the relay, the 21mile PowerWalk and 10.6-mile walk, as well as the 5K.

Entering its 22nd year, the marathon is world renowned for the toughness of its course — which includes climbing the aptly named Hurricane Point — its musical entertainment along the route, its stunning scenery and its dedicated volunteers. The event raises money for local charities.

"Hard, grueling, mountainous, windy, spectacular, unforgiving, rewarding, spiritual, mystical and unforgettable are some of the adjectives that have been used to describe our Marathon," the event's website reads. "Please join us on April 29, 2007! You can add your own praises or curses from your experience of running or walking Big Sur."

"This is our recommendation," he said, and the goal is to arrive at a sum "they can live with and we can live with."

The proposed budget calls for \$773,705 in capital improvements, based on the council's input at a March 27 meeting. In addition to acquiring new equipment, the project list includes street and parking lot repaving, carpeting city hall and remodeling the Del Mar restrooms.

#### Job shifts

Guillen also recommended the council add "deputy city administrator" to city clerk Heidi Burch's job title.

"It will give Heidi another hat I'm sure she would be happy to inherit," Guillen said. The new job would allow her to handle Guillen's day-to-day tasks so he can focus on larger projects, including the economic revitalization plan, stormwater runoff, the general plan update and plans for the Forest Theater and Del Mar.

He proposed hiring building maintenance specialist John Hanson as the building inspector to replace Meroney and contracting with an outside firm for the work Hanson is not yet certified to handle, such as checking blueprints.

Guillen told the council he also plans to request funds for a planning director in the near future.

In the housekeeping category, Guillen said the council should consider consolidating some old reserve funds to shift dollars to other categories and will likely be asked what to do with small deposit accounts that have gone unused for some time, such as the \$5,122.88 set aside for the summer concerts the city no longer hosts and the \$540 for maintenance of a baby grand piano at Sunset Center.

"General accounting practice does allow you to collapse them and use them for other purposes, but that has to be at a public meeting, and the council has to make that decision."

According to the budget schedule, council members and the public can submit questions to city hall until 5 p.m. May 2. Staff will draft the answers for distribution to the council by May 16, and the next budget hearing will be held May 22. Another meeting will be held May 31, if needed. The new budget must be in place by the time the 2007/2008 fiscal year begins July 1.

"Going up was steep," Hartzell said.

"Coming down was even steeper."

Hartzell's sister, Aurora, won the hat contest, and Josh Leys solved the riddle after Hartzell dropped numerous hints to the


"I guess it was harder than I thought," he said. (The puzzle involved the name of the only cartoon episode in which Wile E. Coyote actually catches the Road Runner.)

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

a 1989 county ordinance requiring desalination plants be publicly owned.

But O'Farrell refused to issue the injunction, saying the activists probably wouldn't be able to win their case when it goes to a full trial. According to the judge, they also hadn't proved any "evidence of harm" that might be caused by the small pilot plant, which would use water from the Moss Landing testbed and treat it to potable water standards only for testing purposes.

"There is no evidence any kind of technical or harmful effects that are going to happen," Cal Am's attorney Patrick Breen argued. "Cal Am [will be] taking water that has already been drawn from the ocean by the Moss Landing power plant. This is the ideal situation to test this facility."

But Barbara May, an attorney for George Riley and Manuel Fierro, who filed the lawsuit, focused on the language of the 1989 ordinance, arguing even a pilot plant is subject to the county rule, not just those that produce water

"The respondents argue that the ordinance doesn't apply because [Cal Am] is not producing water for human consumption," May said. "That's not what the ordinance says. This ordinance does apply to this temporary facility."

Robert Rosenthal, who filed the lawsuit for the plaintiffs, said he would meet with them to discuss whether or not they wanted to appeal Thursday's ruling. They could ask a higher court to issue an injunction.

Meanwhile, a trial on the full merits of Riley and Fierro's suit could be held as early as next month.

Cal Am needs to come up with a water supply to comply with a 1995 state order directing it to drastically reduce pumping from the Carmel River — the Peninsula's primary water source — because the company does not have rights to most of the water it has been taking for years.

nent desal plant may have to be publicly owned, the test plant does not have to be.

#### More waves for Cal Am

With one legal obstacle out of the way, Cal Am must wait for the owners of the Moss Landing power plant to receive an amended permit from the California Energy Commission so the pilot plant can be operated on its property.

The application for the permit was submitted to the energy commission this week, and it will likely be weeks before the state agency approves it, according to energy officials.

Madeleine Clark, director of the Elkhorn Slough Coalition, said she plans to object to the permit. She said the pilot plant will harm animal life since it would discharge large amounts of bleach, ammonia and other chemicals into the slough.

"There is a chemical cocktail that is going to be dumped into the near shore jetty," she said. "That's like a nursery for many of the species that inhabit the sanctuary. It's a very profound ecosystem."


The water company's 6,500-square-foot plant, which has been sitting unassembled at the Moss Landing power plant for months, will use only about 280,000 gallons of the 180 million gallons of water per day that flow through the power plant, currently operated by Dynegy, Inc. The pilot desal plant will operate for 12 months, according to Cal Am.

The 1989 county ordinance requiring that all desal plants be publicly owned was enacted during a severe drought to prevent landowners from creating a profusion of small desal plants. It was not intended to apply to regulated utilities such as Cal Am, the company said.

Riley and Fierro's lawsuit contends that by bypassing the ordinance, county supervisors violated Local Coastal Program requirements and "abused their discretion and proceeded in a capricious manner that is contrary to law and factually deficient." It also states the permit was granted without complying the California Environmental Quality Act.

The judge's ruling, while not final on those claims, indicates they will not suc-

Last Dec. 14, coastal commissioners voted to issue Cal Am a permit for its pilot desal plant facility. The commission's decision was preceded by approvals from the board of supervisors and the county health department. All those agencies decided that, while a perma-

THE PIZZA-MAKING learning curve

To help its staff scale it, Cantinetta Luca brought over a young pizzaiola, Giovanni Grassi, from Fratelli la Bufala in Naples, Italy, last week.

The Carmel hot spot's pizzas were good to begin with, but after five nights with Grassi at the helm, they are killer.

The handsome young Italian started making pizzas when he was 12 years old. Giuseppe Panzuto, general manager of Cantinetta Luca, had worked with Grassi in Naples during his pre-teen years and was thrilled to host the now 21-year-old pizza master for his debut in America.

"In Napoli, you end up doing one of three things," said Panzuto. "You work, go to school or end up in jail."

Grassi went to work, honed his art and has been nominated three times for the Best Pizza in Italy award.

After saddling up to the five-seat bar in front of Cantinetta Luca's pizza oven, my boyfriend and I intently studied Grassi as he crafted pizzas three at a time.

His technique was unlike anything I'd seen. Despite a never-ending stream of orders, Grassi's every movement was calm, gentle and fluid, while clearly precise and exacting. The crust was made with a live yeast that Grassi brought from Italy.

After flattening each portioned round of dough delicately with a slight tapping of his fingertips, Grassi draped the dough over the side of his hand and rocked it back and forth a few times to stretch it to the desired diameter. The result was an imperfectly shaped crust that forewent the usual pushing, pulling, and in-the-air manipulation that most American pies endure.

The crust was then dressed conservatively with whatever toppings it required, including a marinara sauce that consisted of a mixture of San Marzano tomatoes and salt only (no sugar). A single spoonful or so veiled the pie perfectly.

Each pizza was then placed into the wood-fired oven — no more than three at a time. After a few slight adjustments, each pizza emerged slightly charred around the edges and bubbly where it mattered most in about two minutes flat — with meat, shaved cheese and greens toppings added postcooking.

Falling in love with pizza cooked by an imported pizzaiola

Cantinetta Luca's wood-burning oven is made from cotto refractario (refractory clay) quarried from the hills of Tuscany.

Panzuto told me that Cantinetta Luca typically sells 50 pizzas daily. During Grassi's first night behind the line, the restaurant sold 120 pizzas to 134 guests! My friend and I managed to scarf down three of them without much problem — the texture was that light and delicious. Which just goes to show that, in the case of perfecting pizza, less really may be more.

exchange, and we were both amazed."

Yeltsin was an unforgettable personality, Murphy recalled.

"He had extraordinary charisma," she remembered. "He was such a people person. His ability to work a crowd was just amazing, and Americans would cross the street just to shake his hand. Here was a man, I realized, who was going to make a difference in the world."

Despite the institute's sponsorship of his trip, Yeltsin never made it to Esalen's famed cliffside hot tubs. In fact, according to Murphy, he never even reached the West Coast on that first visit to the United States.

Nevertheless, the trip proved to be a defining event for Yeltsin — whose personal disavowal of Soviet Communism led to the remaking of the map of the world — and Esalen's exchange program, which received notoriety for breaking down cultural and political barriers.

"In our quiet, unobtrusive way, we helped grease the skids of the Soviet collapse," commented Montville, who worked for two decades as a diplomat for the U.S.

Department of State.

Murphy is also proud of Esalen's role in Yeltsin's historic visit, which included stops in New York, Baltimore, Phildelphia, Miami, Indianapolis, Houston, Dallas, Minneapolis, Washington D.C., Chicago and Rochester,

Among the people Yeltsin met were Reagan, Bush, Joseph Lieberman, Bill Bradley, James Baker, Cyrus Vance, David Rockefeller, Dan Rather, Jane Pauley and

The first popularly elected leader in Russian history, Yeltsin was president of the Russian Federation from 1991 to 1999



In 1999, after Russia suffered a severe economic crisis, Yeltsin resigned. He was replaced by the man he endorsed, Russian President Vladimir Putin, who has undone some of Yeltsin's reforms.

# Big Sur man gets three years for killing his daughter

# Three years after 'leap of faith,' local gallery is thriving

AFTER LISTENING to her friends talking all the time about how great it would be to open an art gallery in Carmel, Barbara Kreitman decided to see if they were right.

"It was a gutsy move," recalled Kreitman, whose Gallery North celebrates its third birthday Saturday, April 28, with the opening of a new exhibit, "Take Three." "It was a leap of faith. I consulted many of my artist friends. They all wanted to do it, but nobody wanted to sign a lease."

Kreitman signed on the dotted line, and Gallery North was born.

"I figured, if I build it, they will come," she recounted.

While Kreitman had high hopes, she knew opening a gallery representing only local artists was a gamble.

"Some people said to me, 'Locals will never buy artwork from you," she remembered.

# Voice of disaster flicks turns to jazz and show tunes

was voice of the big budget disaster film.

In 1972, McGovernwas working as a secretary to support her fledgling musical career. She sent a demo tape to Russ Regan, who at the time was head of 2 0 t h Century

Records. He

decided her voice would be perfect for the theme song to a new movie, "The Poseidon Adventure," and he hired her, sight unseen.

The film, which tells a fictional Titaniclike tale of a capsized luxury ocean liner, became a huge box office success, ushering in an era of expensive disaster movies with all-star casts.

McGovern recorded the film's theme song, "The Morning After." Its upbeat message of hope served as a perfect counterpoint for the action on the screen, which featured Gene Hackman, Ernest Borgnine, Shelley Winters and others fighting for their oceandrenched lives as the capsized Poseidon slowly sank. The song eventually climbed to No. 1 on the Billboard pop music charts and later earned an Oscar for Best Song.

#### Disasters on sea, land

After the success of "The Poseidon Adventure," producer Irwin Allen came back two years later with "The Towering Inferno," which tells the story of the world's largest building burning down. Like "Poseidon," it boasted an all-star cast, featuring Steve McQueen, Paul Newman and Faye Dunaway. And like "Poseidon," the film showcased McGovern singing its theme song, "We May Never Love Like This Again," which won an Academy Award for Best Song.

In 1980, McGovern made a cameo appearance in the hit comedy, "Airplane," playing a singing nun who mindlessly knocks the IV line from the arm of a sick

"The Morning After" continues to make its mark on pop culture. In a 1999 "South Park" episode, the Cartman and the gang are required to sing the song backward to break a spell. A "Simpsons" episode parodied "The Poseidon Adventure," and the song's lyrics were changed to reflect the passengers' impending doom.

McGovern temporarily abandoned pop music in the early 1980s to pursue a career on Broadway. By the late 1980s, she was back in the recording studio. More recently, she has performed jazz standards in nightclubs.

# 15 years in the same kitchen — but for different restaurants

By MARGOT PETIT NICHOLS

 $\Gamma$ HE TINY, fully equipped kitchen at La Bicyclette restaurant in Carmel-by-the-Sea is designed to save the chef steps and time and it does so admirably. A small alcove is reserved for salad making, the dishwasher is

relegated to a corner, and a shelf inside the kitchen door holds orders ready for pickup by the waitstaff without imposing on the chef's domain.

Copper saucepans are stacked on a low shelf ready for instant use, and at least 15 ladles of all sizes hang by the formidable

Chef Fidel Perez has worked in the Lilliputian setting for 15 years: The first 14

with Alan and Katie Lewis' La Boheme French restaurant, then another year since it morphed into the Georis family's La

Bicyclette Restaurant and Cafe at the same location on Dolores Street near the corner of Seventh Avenue.

Having mastered French cooking as relief chef with Alan Lewis, Perez quickly picked up preparation of Italian cuisine in keeping with the rustic European family-style menu of La Bicyclette. He works under two bosses: Executive Chef Didier Dutertre, who presides over the kitchen at the Georis' Casanova Restaurant and who plans menus with La Bicyclette's head chef, Robin Sachs.

> Sachs moved over from the kitchen at Casanova and now cooks five nights a week at Bicyclette.

But Perez works alone Mondays and Tuesday, doing all the vegetable prep work, roasting chickens, preparing soups (lentil, carrot, fennel) and desserts, and cooking dinners. He does prep work for Sachs on Wednesdays and salads on

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
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

wine tasting from 1 to 4 p.m. Although full luncheons are not served at La Bicyclette as yet (but probably will be, starting in May), a small menu of assiette campagnarde — assorted cheeses, dry salami and country paté served with crostini - a terrine of soup, three desserts and espresso drinks are offered. Georis wines may be sampled in tasting flights of five wines, 2 ounces each, during the afternoon.

When Perez comes to the restaurant daily, he begins with garde manger duties of sauce and soup making, then goes on to dessert preparation — which this week included a gâteau Grandmère (an elaborate bread pudding), profiterolles au chocolat (cream puffs with vanilla ice cream, slivered almonds and chocolate sauce), apple crisp, strawberry-rhubarb pie and mousse au chocolat en pot. Since Perez was the pastry chef for La Boheme for many years he particularly likes this task. Then he begins prep work on the entrées.

When the Lewises had La Boheme, only one entrée a night was offered. In contrast, La Bicyclette offers five. This week the dinner menu listed roasted freerange chicken with rosemary and thyme, fettuccine with oyster mushrooms, braised kurobuta pork short





ribs with cumin and rosemary, pan roasted Pacific rock cod with citrus-sorrel beurre blanc, and filet mignon with gorgonzola sauce. Dinners also include antipasto salad and a copper tureen of soup.



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The small restaurant holds only 32 patrons at double or four-top tables, with a larger table for five or six in the small "house," a replica of a cottage with windows and flowered window boxes which is part of the dining room.

Copper pans hang in profusion from wainscoting along the dining room walls, while blackboards with the daily entrées and wine suggestions written in chalk lend a casual air to the restaurant.

The vintage bicycle parked on the sidewalk in front of the restaurant is functional as well as ornamental. It's used by a server or greeter when a patron orders a wine from the impressively large wine list shared with the mothership Casanova Restaurant. Although La Bicyclette has a lesser list of reasonably priced wines which are stored at the restaurant, it is Casanova's extensive wine cellar of more costly wines that are sometimes ordered at La Bicyclette, necessitating a swift bike ride to the Fifth Avenue-at-Mission restaurant. A padded wine cozy in the old-fashioned bike basket protects the wine in transport.

Perez is not from a family of chefs, but he does hale from Oaxaca, Mexico, well known for its excellent cooks. He came to California in 1983 with very little English. But his sister lived in Salinas and two cousins lived here, too, and provided him with an entrance to the Monterey Peninsula.

Unmarried, Perez said he doesn't participate in any sports on his day off but prefers to watch them on television and

enjoys walking around Monterey, where he lives.

He visits Oaxaca whenever he can where he has two sisters and a brother in Chiapas.

All in all, Chef Perez is proving to be a valuable legacy from La Boheme to La Bicyclette and has made a fluid transition.

La Bicyclette restaurant is open for an afternoon menu and wine tasting from 1 to 4 p.m. daily, and for dinner from 5 to closing nightly. Call (831) 622-9899 for reservations.

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

according to P.G. Fire disaster coordinator Jim Gunter. The basic message to these people: Go uphill.

If there was a tsunami threat, the federal government's Tsunami Warning Center would notify the Monterey County Office of Emergency Services, located in Salinas.

The city would use a phone system that automatically dials all Pacific Grove residents within the evacuation zone, warning them of the possible tsunami and telling them to move to higher ground.

"We would would send our emergency resources into the affected areas and would provide search and rescue if needed," Miller said. "And after the county notified us, we would establish a temporary emergency activation center at Pacific Grove High School's football field."

More than a mile inland and about 150 feet above sea level, the field would presumably be safe, and the emergency center

would be where residents could take temporary shelter and find information.

While a distant quake would provide ample time to notify residents of the danger, a nearby quake could also generate a tsunami

"If we had a significant earthquake in Monterey Bay where a shelf dropped," Miller said, "there would really be no notification. People would need to move to higher ground quickly." That's why it's important for those in coastal zones to immediately move away from the ocean if they feel an earthquake, he added.

Residents in P.G.'s evacuation zones were sent fliers informing them about Thursday's tsunami meeting at the city's Museum of Natural History. The flier urges disabled residents to contact the fire department before a tsunami warning so arrangements can be made to help them from their homes.

If a tsunami were to strike and homes were damaged, the fire department would coordinate with the American Red Cross to make sure people had places to stay, Gunter said. "We would start a full-blown sheltering program."


Better safe than sorry is the attitude emergency officials take when preparing for something as seldom as a tsunami.

"It's one of those things that if we don't prepare for it, it will happen," Gunter said.

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

a significant number of animals at the SPCA are pets that were given up because their owners couldn't find places to rent. "It's been a high enough number to raise our concern," he said. "And we certainly don't want pets to be homeless, particularly if they have great homes."



Most of us pay far too little attention to what will happen to the assets we own after we leave this life. So let's jump right to the bottom line here: Spend some time—and do so



Here's a simple example. Let's say you and your spouse move to Colorado early on, but you continued to assume that your assets were all protected by community-property rules. But they aren't. Colorado isn't a community-property state—only nine states are.

Add to the confusion the fact that ownership laws (ways of taking title) are constantly under revision, and you will surely agree that you should be talking to your estate tax attorney every time you take title to a new piece of real estate, among other assets. 

# The most confusing ballot

WHEN VOTERS take a look at their ballots in the June election, they'll be confronted with three separate measures about the county general plan. Last week, we ran a story on the front page explaining what each of the measures would do. But even people who read the story carefully, and who pay close attention to the campaign, might not be sure which measures to support, or be able to keep their preferences straight as voting day approaches. Even the most educated and interested citizens can be expected to become a bit frustrated over the confusing choices. And then there are the people who don't pay much attention to local political issues ... they'll really be unsure which measures to support.

History has shown that when voters become frustrated or confused, they tend to vote No on everything.

If that happens this June, the LandWatch general plan initiative (Measure A) will fail. But so will both the measures dealing with the supervisors' plan (B and C). Since a No vote on one of these measures would leave the supervisors' plan in place, while a No vote on the other would reject the very same plan, voting No on both of them would be self-contradictory. Yet that is what many voters can be expected to do.

According to the county counsel's office, if A, B and C all fail, but more people vote No on B than on C, the supervisors' general plan will remain in effect. But if more people vote No on C than on B, it will be negated.

We think there's a lesson to be learned from this hopeless situation: Land use issues should not be the subject of ballot measures.

But there's another lesson: As initiatives proliferate, and voters are confronted with ever-longer ballots, if there's going to be a ballot measure on an issue near and dear to your heart, try to arrange things so that a No vote will work in your favor.

THE CARPENTERS union is once again picketing DMC Construction. This time, their banners claim DMC is somehow making "war on the middle class" by paying carpenters less than the union thinks it should. This ridiculous, overblown accusation is an embarrassment. Picketing is supposed to help a cause, not sink it. This time, the union has sunk so low, it may not be able to get back up.

# **MEASURE A**

"It's clear that the developers have been in the driver's seat," said LandWatch Monterey County member Jane Parker at a Monday press conference in Salinas. "We can change that by passing Measure A."

According to the LandWatch report, from 1998 to December 2006, "development interests" — which the group says include agriculture, construction, tourism and real estate gave 68 percent of all contributions to supervisors.

Measure A would implement the LandWatch-backed Community General Plan Initiative, an alternative to the supervisors' own general plan, known as GPU4. Both plans would amend the county's 1982 general plan.

The initiative, which would require a vote of the people for any general plan amendment in the future, directs growth to five unincorporated areas in the county and allows for about 10,000 residential housing units. The supervisors' general plan allows about 21,000 units, but more of them would be affordable.

those [original] values," said president Roberta Miller, who joined the CRA in 1998 with her husband, Monte, soon after moving into town. "They're just as popular and significant today as they were in the past."

She said the residents association has several goals for the coming years.

"We want to find a way to be able to work with the business community and really find out what our commonalities and goals are, because we do have a lot of things in common," she said, adding that the group encourages its members to shop locally as much as possible. "We have to come up with some ways we can talk to each other and work on things in the city that we have a common interest in."

"What's good for business should be good for residents," Anderson said.

Members plan to focus on Carmel's forestry practices, such as replacing Monterey pines with Canary Island

They intend to remain on top of the condo project, which would entail annexing the property to the city and would violate the tradition of placing multifamily residences near the business district at the center of town, according to Miller. "It will change the character of Carmel, the ambiance, in a multitude of ways," she said.

The ongoing proliferation of art galleries downtown is also cause for concern, she said.

"There's a large loophole," in the ordinance passed a few years ago to stem their flow, she said. "I don't know what they're going to do about it."

But whatever it is, the CRA will be there to partici-

"Measure A gives the people, not the politicians and their crony friends, the power to choose," said Alex Urciuoli from the Citizens for Responsible Growth, a group supporting the LandWatch initiative.

The battle for the county's 20-year growth plan is heating up. LandWatch's press conference came less than two weeks after Plan for the People, a group supporting supervisors' general plan, held its own rally, saying the initiative would reduce affordable housing and aggravate gang and crime

LandWatch countered by implying that supervisors were corrupt and voted for GPU4 because their campaign contributors wanted them to, even though they knew it would be bad for the county.

"It's a strategy you would expect from LandWatch," said Plan for the People spokesman Andre Charles, who attended LandWatch's press conference. "What they are attempting to do is distract voters. They know they are losing the debate."

The LandWatch report provides the total amount of donations each supervisor received and the percentage from "developer interests."

The report indicates Lou Calcagno received 77 percent or about \$328,000 of his donations from developer interests, Jerry Smith got 76 percent or about \$404,000, Fernando Armenta got 74 percent or about \$158,000 and Simon Salinas received 55 percent or about \$65,000 from the interests, according to LandWatch.

Even Dave Potter, the 5th District supervisor who supports Measure A, received 42 percent of his contributions from developers and their allies, which ranked him lowest percentage-wise, but put him third-highest in total money received from the group, with about \$171,000.

Of a total of \$1,868,000 given to supervisors, \$1,259,000 came from "development interests," the LandWatch report indicates.

votes to sell the mansion, which the city purchased in 1972 and has tried but failed to put to use ever since. The council intended to use the proceeds for capital projects.

"Quite frankly, I strongly believe the judgment contains conclusions of law without any facts," Conners said. "If he's going to overrule the strong assumption the city is correct, we would like to know the facts on which the decisions are based."

But the attorney admitted it "would be a stretch" to believe O'Farrell will change his mind about ruling in favor of the nonprofit Flanders Foundation, which sued the city in November 2005 to halt the sale of the historic home situated on land within Mission Trail park.


'It would be nice if the judge changed portions of the judgment that we feel are factually not supported," Conners said. "But whether he does or not, at least the record will contain our objections made before the judgment was entered."

That distinction is important, he said, because the appeals court takes the facts decided at the trial court level as settled and only considers what Conners called "errors of law."

In response to Conners' request, O'Farrell scheduled the May 10 hearing. Conners subsequently asked for a week's delay. The court's website indicates there will court sessions May 10 and 18.

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



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

Everybody knows that Del Monte is the oldest golf course west of the Mississippi, actually dating from 1897. But can you guess the second oldest in this area? Pebble Beach? Cypress Point? No, that honor belongs to the CARMEL GOLF CLUB, a nine hole links measuring 2112 yards, spread over the dunes of Carmel Point. Its club house stood on a rise at what is now 14th Ave, and San Antonio, and it is still there! It's a small, shingled building, now used as a guest house by descendants of the founders, Philip and Laura Wilson. The course was opened a hole at a time in 1912, and the first official meeting was held Nov. 20 of that year at the Pine Inn. Memberships were \$20 a year, green fees 50¢ a day. The land was owned by the Carmel Development Company, which assured the Club by written contract that it "would not be sold in lots or otherwise till after the year 1915." Among the members was Dr. Clampett, which brings us up to date. The Club expired around 1920, and today nearly 300 houses stand on its abandoned fairways. Think what might have been!
