D.A. warns of widespread elder abuse

Calls for regulation of caregivers

THE PEOPLE who are supposed to be caring for the county's seniors are actually the ones who commit most of the financial crimes against them, according to Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Lisa Poll, who heads the DA's Elder Abuse Prosecution Unit.

Those paid to take care of elderly residents account for two-thirds of financial elder abuse, which includes embezzlement and theft, she

But prosecuting offenders is a difficult task since the home caregiver industry isn't regulated. "There needs to be some sort of oversight put in place," said Poll. "The lack of regulation makes the home care industry rife with abuse."

While nurses who care for the elderly are regulated, caregivers are not. No training or cer-

tification are necessary under the law, and anyone can care for a senior and get paid for it.

Tough to prosecute offenders

Because there are no specific laws for caregivers to follow, it places the burden on prosecutors to prove a caregiver intentionally took advantage of a senior.

And elder abuse cases are loaded with hurdles not present in other crimes. Elderly victims often won't report caregivers for fear of jeopardizing their own care.

"They think, 'If this person is arrested, who will take care of me?" Poll said.

As a result, many cases go unreported to police, Poll said. And when cases are reported, law enforcement often misper-

ceives a criminal offense as a civil matter.

"[Police] may not take the case," she said, "because they are not trained in the academy to deal with financial abuse cases."

Unscrupulous caregivers often play on the emotions of their senior victims. Some will steal money or ask for loans, and later, when caught, contend the money was simply a gift something difficult for prosecutors to disprove.

"If there was any regulation of the industry and laws that prohibited gifts and loans, some of those defenses could be shut down," Poll said.

A 28-year-old caregiver employed by a local agency

Split council wants Maserati's garage redesigned

SAN CARLOS Street residents Tor and Katherine McPartland may have a really nice car, but they can't build a garage to keep it in, a divided Carmel City Council decided Tuesday. At least, not yet.



Objections to the idea of a garage on the front property line of this San Carlos Street house were enough to convince a slim majority of the city council to overturn the project Tuesday.

On a vote of 3-2, the council granted a neighbor's appeal, overturned the design review board's unanimous approval of the detached single-car garage in the front setback of the McPartlands' home and asked the board to look at the project

Alleging a garage built at the front property line would violate residential design guidelines, neighbor Patricia Troxell asked the council to require it be redesigned and built elsewhere on the lot. Otherwise, she said, it would wreck her view of the street and Sunset Center, limit her enjoyment of her front yard, reduce the value of her property and be dangerous because the street is busy.

"To have an overwhelming structure like this takes away from the character of our village," she said.

The only option?

Planner Nathan Schmidt recommended the council deny the appeal, since the proposed garage would meet city codes, be lower and smaller than the limits in the ordinance, and "add diversity to the street."

Residents Monte Miller and Barbara Livingston also said planners should consider placing the garage in another location on the property, and a couple of other neighbors sent letters expressing concerns similar to Troxell's.

But designer Ben Wise said the front of the lot is the only

"I have carefully studied the site, and this seems to be the only logical location," he said. "I worked with staff and think staff has made their support of this garage clear."

Recovering from cancer surgery, Smith says he's 'very much better'

Plans to return to board of supervisors soon

AFTER SEVERAL weeks of recovery following surgery to remove an abdominal tumor, Monterey County

Supervisor Jerry Smith said Wednesday he hopes to return to work by the end of the month.

The 4th District supervisor, who has been on medical leave since March, is undergoing che-motherapy.

"I'm doing very much better," Smith said in a phone interview from his home Wednesday. "It was just one of those situations where I was diagnosed with cancer, but it was operable."

Smith, 61, said he's eager to resume his duties after being away for several weeks.

"The diagnosis is for a full recovery," he told The Pine Cone. "I feel really strong and I'm basically going through

Smith was admitted to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula in March where doctors removed the tumor. Before his interview with The Pine Cone, the nature of Smith's illness hadn't been publicly disclosed and he wasn't in a condition to talk to news media.

"In all honesty," he said, "from March 19 until two weeks ago, I was sedated pretty heavily."

Smith said he's received an outpouring of support from

P.B. FIRE DESTROYS HOME OF RLS HEADMASTER

A DECORATIVE lamp apparently set a ficus on fire in Joe and Marilee Wandke's home at Stevenson School, gutting it last Thursday night, but investigators don't know whether an electrical problem or the light's proximity to the plant caused the blaze.

While working at home alone at about 8:40 p.m. April 26, Marilee Wandke, whose husband is headmaster of the school, heard the smoke alarm sounding at the other end of the house, according to Pebble Beach Fire Battalion Chief Dennis Carreiro. She discovered smoke and fire in a corner of the master bedroom, and by the time she had dialed 911 and fled outside, the fire had spread down the hall.


Four minutes later, fire engines arrived from the station a little more than a mile away from the campus on Forest Lake

"We got there and had fire rolling out the door already," Carreiro said.

A total of 25 personnel from PBFD, neighboring Cypress

Woman who stole coins back in jail for threatening her aunt

m T}$ HE WOMAN who recently got out of jail after serving time for stealing a wealth of gold coins and other valuables from her 99-year-old great aunt has been arrested for allegedly threatening the elderly woman and her associates.

Cynthia Hurley was arrested last week after making threats against her great aunt, Lillian King, King's attorney, Robert Rosenthal, and Nader Agha, co-conservator of King's estate, said Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Lisa

"One [threat] was verbalized to [Hurley's] counselor and involved all three of those individuals," Poll said. "And the second incident just involved Nader Agha on April 23."

Poll said details of the threats aren't public now but could be revealed at a May 10 court hearing in Salinas. Hurley was in a courtroom Tuesday for appointment of a public defender and remains in custody at Monterey County

"One of the terms of [Hurley's] probation is not to harass, threaten or harm the victim or co-conservators in the case," Poll said.

Hurley made the first alleged threat to a drug counselor, who told authorities, Poll said.

Rosenthal declined Wednesday to comment on the the case because it is still pending.

Hurley's arrest for violating the terms of her probation is the latest in a seemingly unending saga involving her and

In a plea bargain in October, Hurley pleaded no contest to stealing valuables from King while both lived at King's oceanfront estate in Pacific Grove.

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Study of consolidated Peninsula fire departments to be released

■ Monterey, Carmel, P.G. already share some services

Monterey firefighters are now available to respond to major incidents in Carmel-by-the-Sea, according to the agreement that took effect April 16. For \$20,000 per year, fire supervisors from Monterey are dispatched, along with Carmel firefighters, to fires, ocean rescues, technical rescues, certain alarm activations, serious hazardous materials incidents and mass casualty situations in Carmel.

Earlier this year, Pacific Grove signed a contract with Monterey for the same service, and Carmel joined in when the city council approved it April 3. The city already contracts with P.G. to have its fire chief, Andrew Miller, and his assistant chief oversee Carmel's fire department.

With only six full-time firefighters on staff at the station on Sixth Avenue, city councilman Gerard Rose said at the April hearing, "The new agreement will enhance and further ensure there will be a complete response [to any emergency]. Carmel does a good job of keeping things quaint, but police and fire is not something we want to be quaint at."

Afterward, Miller said the new agreement would ensure a supervisor is available to respond to emergencies at any time of day and would save the city about \$40,000 a year.

Carmel's three former supervisors still work for the department but have different duties, including manning the fire station, responding to emergencies and training other employees.

"The big expense was paying for a 24/7 duty chief, which was something like \$60,000 per year," Miller said.

Monterey Fire officials have toured the city, met with the full-time staff and been informed of particular hazards, inoperable hydrants, emergency response plans and other logistics of tending to emergencies in town.

Consolidation study due

The agreement also gives the three cities the chance to see how they work together — something they may be doing to a greater degree in the future. The prospects of sharing emergency services are contemplated in a study which may be released this month.

City councils in Monterey, Pacific Grove and Carmel agreed last summer to pay Citygate Associates \$50,000 for the feasibility analysis, and Miller said the mayors, city administrators and fire chiefs met last week to discuss its conclusions.

They shared ideas and asked that more information be included to "make it more comprehensive," Miller said.

He did not want to reveal the study's conclusions prior to its public release, but it was also unveiled last Monday for about 50 workers from the three departments, including union presidents from Monterey and Pacific Grove, and Capt. Mitch Kastros from Carmel.

"The goal of these meetings is to make sure all the information is there that we need in order to take the issue to the rest of the councils and the public," Miller continued.

The mayors, city administrators, fire chiefs and possibly the vice mayors are set to discuss it again May 7, after which the consultants will prepare the report for public review.

Miller said he expects a meeting will be set soon to release the study and solicit comments from residents and the cities' elected officials.

Following the dedication, the Carmel High teams competed in their final meet of the season against Pacific Grove. Potter reported they were victorious.

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

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

FAILED BANK ROBBER PLEADS NO CONTEST, FACES LIFE IN PRISON

THE MAN whose clip fell out of his gun as he tried to rob a Crossroads bank last summer pleaded no contest to felony bank robbery charges, Monterey County District Attorney Dean Flippo announced April 26..

Tyrone Foisy, the 46-year-old Carmel Valley resident who

was wrestled to the ground by the bank manager after the clip incident, is set to be sentenced next month and could receive 45 years to life under the state's Three Strikes law because of previous felonies.

The attempted robbery occurred at Wells Fargo Bank July 31, 2006, when Foisy walked in wearing a hooded sweatshirt, sunglasses and bandanna, and carrying a loaded handgun.

"Foisy threatened to kill bank employees if they didn't give him money," Steve Somers of the DA's office

reported. "The robbery was thwarted by the bank manager who, not realizing that Foisy was robbing the bank, approached him from behind to try and determine why he was shouting."

When Foisy turned to face the manager, the ammunition clip fell from his gun. A few bullets escaped and rolled along the floor, and the manager grabbed for the weapon, even though a round could still have been in the chamber.


The pair fell to the ground, and Foisy used a can of pepper spray to temporarily blind the manager, who was nonetheless undeterred. Another bank employee helped pin the robber to the floor.

Sheriff's deputies took Foisy into custody and investigated the crime scene that included cash spilled on the floor during the attempted armed robbery. Emergency medical tech-

Tyrone Foisy, as he was being taken into custody last




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Activists offer riverside hikes, lobby Congress for protection

IN AN effort to raise the public's awareness about the importance of local waterways - and to enlist help in lobbying Congress to protect more local rivers — a consortium of environmental groups is offering guided group hikes this weekend along Big Creek and the Arroyo Seco River.

Friends of the River, a statewide river conservation organization, has teamed up with the Ventana Wilderness Alliance, the Ventana chapter of the Sierra Club, and other conservationists, community leaders and activists to form the Ventana Wild Rivers Campaign. The goal of the campaign is to convince Congress to bestow Wild and Scenic River status on nine local rivers and creeks. The designation would require they be "preserved in a free-flowing condition."

The public will have a rare opportunity to visit the Big Creek watershed in Big Sur Saturday, May 5, when guide Julie Anne Hopkins leads a hike through the Landels-Hill Big Creek Reserve, a rugged 4,200-acre property that serves as a biological field station for students attending the University of California at Santa Cruz and is usually closed to the public. For reservations, directions and other details, call (831) 566-6012.

On Sunday, May 6, guides Stan Mellin, Catherine Sheen and Dennis Palm will lead hikers into the Arroyo Seco watershed. The river, which flows east from the crest of the Santa Lucia Mountains, is the last of three major tributaries of the Salinas River that remains undammed. About 19 miles of the river are located within the boundaries of Los Padres National Forest. For more information about the May 6 hike,

call (831) 375-7430.

The Arroyo Seco River supports steelhead that spawn in the Salinas River watershed. Its riparian habitat home to the California spotted owl and the Southwestern pond turtle, two species environmentalists want the federal government to


"The Arroyo Seco River is also one of the most popular recreation destinations in the Santa Lucia Range," explained Hannah Schoenthal-Muse, Central Coast Rivers coordinator for Friends of the River. "The river flows through a series of deep rocky gorges that provide a rugged setting for camping, hiking, swimming and white-water kayaking. And most of the people who visit the river every year are locals."

In 1992, Congress granted Wild and Scenic status to the Big Sur River. In 2005, the U.S. Forest Service concluded the Arroyo Seco River was the only other waterway in Monterey County eligible for federal protection.

"We were very disappointed the study only recommended protection for the Arroyo Seco River," Schoenthal-Muse said.


The VWRC is also seeking Wild and Scenic protection for Tassajara Creek, Church Creek, Big Creek, Carmel River, the North and South Forks of the Little Sur River, Nacimiento River, San Antonio River, San Carpoforo Creek and Willow

"We want to make sure the pristine areas at the headwaters of these watersheds are protected in perpetuity," Schoenthal-Muse explained. "We're convinced that all nine of these rivers and streams are eligible for federal protection. These are amazing, pristine rivers. They are ecologically diverse. They have so much to offer."

Good Old Days Parade participant dies in scooter accident

THE LOCAL motor scooter community was shocked this week to learn about the fatal accident of one of their own, a 78-year-old Cachagua man who just a week before his crash rode in the Good Old Days parade in Pacific Grove.

Paul Sparks was riding his 2006 Suzuki Burgman westbound on Carmel Valley Road April 28 when he struck the Honda Accord driven by 18-year-old Salinas resident Chelsea Bachman, according to the California Highway Patrol. She reportedly began to turn and suddenly stopped directly in Sparks' path.

Sparks was one of a group of riders, mostly members of the Vespa Club of Monterey, who rode in the Good Old Days Parade April 21. Sparks was unknown to club members until the day of the parade.

"He was real soft spoken," Roger Vandevert, president of the Vespa Club of Monterey, said of his first impression of Sparks. "He just wanted to go riding."

Wei Chang, a club member who had posted an advertisement about the parade on Craig's List, said he had a brief

"He said he would like to participate in the parade with the group," Chang said. "And I said, 'Great."

Ken Jones, the club's secretary/treasurer, said he was playing golf Monday when he heard from a golf buddy a scooterist had been involved in a fatal accident.

"One of the guys said, 'You better stay off Carmel Valley Road," Jones recalled. "He said a scooter rider got killed there, but he didn't have any details at all."

On Monday, Jones read a news report about Sparks'

"It's a reality we live in, but it's sad," Jones said. "And it helps us all be a little more careful and understand the risks we have on a scooter."

Sparks wasn't a member of the Vespa club but had taken steps to become one, including attending a club meeting the Tuesday after the Good Old Days parade. He would have been the club's oldest member.

Sparks worked was a business machines associate at Staples in Seaside, where he had been employed for about six months, according to a store employee. He had family back East and visited them once in awhile.

Michael Jones, owner of the Cachagua Store and A Moveable Feast Catering, said Sparks would come in every Sunday for brunch and bring George, his toy poodle. Jones usually made George an egg-white omelet because the dog had kidney problems.

"He was a sweet dog," Michael Jones said. "We served George at a table. He sat in a high chair."

Coincidentally, George died just a week before Sparks was killed, Michael Jones said.

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



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Ticket sales, fewer jobs put Sunset in the black during third quarter

SUNSET CENTER is in the black for the quarter but in the red for the year, executive director Jack Globenfelt reported to the Carmel City Council Tuesday. But he characterized the third quarter — which included some lackluster performances and decreased attendance in January, February and March as "spring training" and said the center already hit some "home runs" during the current quarter, which ends at the close of the fiscal year June 30.

Total performance revenues were \$55,220 ahead of budget, at \$244,160, from Jan. 1 through March 31, but Globenfelt said rental income from the center's historic presenters, such as the Carmel Music Society and the Monterey Symphony, was \$33,328 below budget, at \$73,567.

"This drop is due to a decline in attendance from the previous fiscal year by the Historical Presenting Partners and fewer performances by outside promoters," Globenfelt reported. The shows arranged by Sunset Center staff were mixed, with Paula Poundstone's well attended while others broke even or lost money. The separate Performance Carmel series, which offered one event in January and two in March, also yielded disappointing results.

Due to the decline in attendance, "fees and other income" totaled \$56,065, rather than the target \$83,022. The center closed the quarter with revenue from all sources \$5,065 below the anticipated \$378,857. That figure does not include the city's \$178,250 subsidy for those three months.

Globenfelt also reported mixed results on

the expenditure side, though the quarter ended with a favorable balance.

The costs of presenting performances were greater than anticipated, coming in \$96,352 in the red at \$261,955, and ticketing services cost \$2,909 more than expected, for a total of \$52,317.

That overspending was more than offset by savings in salaries, benefits, payroll taxes and other direct expenses, which were budgeted at \$245,283 but were actually \$141,155, "as a result of personnel changes, better staffing utilization and less overtime by casual laborers," according to Globenfelt.

He said conservation efforts developed by Sunset staff helped keep utility bills and other maintenance and insurance expenses \$4,531 under budget, at \$65,168.

Overall, expenses were \$9,399 lower than anticipated, which put Sunset \$4,334 in the black for the third quarter. The fiscal year to date, however, shows a \$8,201 deficit as cost savings of \$33,037 have failed to make up for the \$41,237 gap in revenues.

But with two months left, Globenfelt predicted Sunset will finish the year on track.

We expect the remainder of the year to be close to our projections. While we have pushed to lower costs and raise income, it cannot be anticipated that these results can be sustainable in the future," Globenfelt's report concluded. "Costs for services, materials and artists' fees continue to rise, and we are expecting substantial competition for performers and entertainment in the market."

Nonetheless, he told the council the fourth quarter is showing well, with several well attended performances already past.

"We had a lot of home runs in April."



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

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

recently pleaded guilty to taking more than \$100,000 from a 78-year-old quadriplegic Monterey woman.

"He said 'if you give me \$110,000 for a down payment on a house," Poll said, "'I will take care of you for the rest of your life. You will have a free place to live and you won't have to worry about anything anymore."

The man, who will be sentenced in August, didn't buy a home and instead spent most of the money on personal items.

'Some of these victims don't have family to care for them," Poll said. "And they will do just about anything for those who take care of them."

Margarite Alvarez, CEO of Community Care and Choice

Home Health Care, a locally owned, state licensed, Medicare certified agency that offers in-home skilled nursing and rehabilitation services, said for every elder abuse case that is reported, there are many more that are not. "I think the statistic is for every one case that's reported,

four go unreported," Alvarez said. "I can say that is a low figure.'

Embarrassment, shame and diminished mental capacity are other reasons elderly victims don't report abuse, Poll

"It's all the same issues that are in domestic violence," she said. "But on top of that, there is the extra layer of the mental and physical health issues."

When a caregiver is charged with a crime, Poll said judges often impose lenient sentences against offenders that don't match the severity of the offenses.

"The law hasn't caught up," she explained. "It's a matter of educating the courts and raising awareness of the issues so there isn't such a disparity in sentences."

There is also the issue of resources. On any given day, Poll has from 30 to 50 elder abuse cases on her desk. The county simply doesn't have the funds to augment the elder abuse

Family members cheat too

It's not only paid caregivers who are the problem. Family members who care for their relatives compose nearly onethird of those who cheat seniors, Poll said.

For example, Lisa Karne MacAdams and her daughter, Christi Schoenbacher, bilked a total of \$230,000 from MacAdams' 75-year-old mother, according to Poll.

"Once that ran out, they put her in a home and sold off all her jewelry and furniture.' Schoenbacher and MacAdams also maxed-out the elderly

"They convinced her to cash in an annuity," Poll said.

woman's credit cards and left town after dropping her off at a senior care facility, she said.

'They abandoned her," Poll said. "She was of sound mind and didn't need to be there."

While most caregivers are honest, Alvarez said it's too easy for dishonest people to avoid detection.

"If you are a hairdresser, you have to be licensed," Alvarez said. "If you are tattoo [artist], you have to be licensed. Why would someone who puts their hands on elderly people and has access to their money and funds not be licensed? Does that make any sense whatsoever?"

'A step in the right direction'

Alvarez has led the local charge for regulating in-home caregivers and has held two conferences in Monterey to provide family caregivers with the tools to be successful. Both conferences were well attended.

And there is a move toward regulation. Assembly Bill 853, the Home Care Services Act of 2007, introduced in February by 9th District Assemblyman Dave Jones, seeks to license caregivers.

While Alvarez said she believes the bill doesn't go far enough in regulating independent caregivers, she said it's a step in the right direction given the rising popularity of home care.

"The area for abuse is going to get bigger and bigger," Alvarez said, "because there will be a shift from hospitals and nursing facilities to home care because it's less expensive."

On April 30, the bill was referred to the California State Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

Asking the right questions

Before hiring a caregiver, Poll said there are some simple questions people should ask

"What are their qualifications for hiring?" Poll said. "Do they do a criminal background check? What kind of training do they provide and what is their financial policy for

gifts?"

But Alvarez said those intent on cheating the elderly — most of whom are independent caregivers and don't work for an agency — will come up with acceptable answers.

"There's no way you can tell by asking questions," she said. "Some of the biggest [offenders] are also the best caregivers."

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


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Mission uses iPods to interest 4th graders

ALL CALIFORNIA fourth graders study the history of the Catholic missions built throughout the state in the late 1700s and early 1800s. And when students pick a particular mission for their special projects, the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea hopes they'll choose the Mission San Carlos Borromeo del Río Carmelo.

In hope of establishing a competitive edge, the Carmel Mission, founded in 1771 by Father Junipero Serra and widely considered the crown jewel of the 21-mission system, last month became the first to offer a video podcast. The narrated, eight-minute program can be downloaded from the city's website, www.carmelcalifornia.com, and then transferred to any video player, such as Apple's video iPod. Computer, will play the podcast on most desktop computers, as will YouTube. It can also be viewed on the city's website.)

"This program is a very significant step forward for the mission in its approach to continuing the teaching that really is the basis of the missions in California," said director of operations Lou Sanna. Missionaries aimed to colonize the land for Spain, teach residents about Christianity and expose them to what they "believed was a better way of life."

Mission video podcast will help fourth graders, their families and other visitors learn about this important aspect of the



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




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




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Visit of WWII aircraft offers bomber's eye view of the Peninsula

EVER WONDERED what the world looks like from the gunner's seat in the nose of a B-25 Mitchell World War II bomber? Or wanted to pretend to be the bombardier in a B-17 Flying Fortress, or peer out from behind the .50-caliber machine guns of a Consolidated B-24 Liberator?

All three of those historic aircraft will be in Monterey and available for 30-minute flights next week, when the nonprofit Collings Foundation brings its annual Wings of Freedom tour to town. With the goal of honoring veterans and educating Americans about national history and heritage, the bombers will be open for tours on the ground and available for flights at the Monterey Jet Center May 11-14.

Carmel Highlands resident and Cypress Fire Capt. Chris Hartzell, an airplane buff, has twice opted to "fly a mission," as the

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foundation bills it.

"In the B-17, you get to feel what it was like to be the bombardier," he said. "But the B-24 has the most panoramic view. It was really tough to pick between the two."

According to the Collings Foundation, B-17s and B-24s "were the backbone of the daylight strategic bombing campaign of World War II." The nonprofit owns the only B-24 is the world that still flies, and the B-17 is one of nine across the United States that can take to the air. The B-25 is similarly rare.

"I have always been into World War II bombers. I used to make models of them back when I was 8 years old or so," Hartzell said. "And the B-17 — I don't know what the attraction is, but it's always been my favorite

After years of checking out the historic aircraft whenever it came to town, Hartzell finally took one of the 30-minute flights.

"It was the most awesome thing," he said.

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"There's easy access to get into the nose. It's a great view — fantastic — and in the B-17 you can actually stick your head out the tail as the thing is flying. It's really cool."

Hartzell and his then-girlfriend (now wife) Ame Wells rode in the B-24 a few years later in celebration of his birthday.

That aircraft has tight spaces and is harder to explore during flight, but it affords great views at the waist gunner's vantage point, where the side panels are removed.

"You can stand in the window with a .50caliber gun and look out," he said. There's usually a bottleneck at the prime viewing spot in the front of the plane, so Hartzell advised waiting for the initial rush to subside so as not to spend too much time in line and consequently miss the stunning aerial views available from other areas of the plane.

And take ear plugs.

The details

While the half-hour flights costs \$425 in the B-17 or the B-24, and \$325 for the waist gun or \$400 for the front fuselage in the B-25, people may pay much less to take tours of the aircraft while they are parked on the tarmac at the Monterey Jet Center. Adults pay \$10, while children 12 and under are \$5. The organization says the fees are considered donations and are tax deductible.

With the caveat that flight schedules are always subject to weather, the aircraft are set to arrive in Monterey the afternoon of Friday, May 11, and be open to the public from 3 to 5 p.m. On Saturday and Sunday, May 12-13, the hours will be 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and the planes will also be available Monday morning, May 14, from 9 a.m. to noon. Whenever possible, flight times are scheduled to occur before or after those hours.

Fire Protection District and Pacific Grove Fire Department responded and contained the blaze to the house, but almost everything inside was destroyed, and the building itself will have to be torn down.

Crews worked at the scene for about five hours. After dousing the blaze, they spent considerable time pulling whatever they could salvage out of the wreckage, including a large number of family photographs.

"It's amazing, the pictures that were saved," Carreiro said. "The Wandkes were very appreciative, to say the least."

Julie Pitts, who works in the school's office of advancement, said the couple is staying with friends while figuring out what to do next.

"The house will need to be leveled, because there's nothing that can be saved," she said. Constructed in 1958, the 3,700-square-foot home was first occupied by the school's founders in 1959. Stevenson, then a boys' school, had been operating for seven years.

The hallway contained black slate salvaged from the roof of Carmel's old Sunset School, and ivy growing on a fence outside was clipped at George Washington's Mt. Vernon, N.Y., home, according to Pitts. She said the house was built large enough to accommodate gatherings of faculty, parents, students and alumni.

"The Wandkes have lived there for almost 24 years, and even though the school owns the house, that was really their home," she said. "They are probably just taking care of getting their basic lives back in order. When something happens like that, you suddenly realize you don't have your vitamins or your glasses or your cell phone — stuff you take for granted."

She said they are grateful for the support from the community and the school.

Plenty of water

Carreiro said the Pebble Beach Community Services District's ongoing multi-million-dollar work replacing old water mains with 8-inch lines and installing new hydrants helped ensure they had plenty of water to use on the fire. He praised PBCSD for investing in the effort to upgrade the

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"You don't have a fire department doing much good if you don't have water," he said.

(Twenty-nine hydrants in the City of Carmel were put out of service last fall, and much of the old 4-inch water lines are corroded. Since then, more than a third of the fireplugs have been replaced or repaired and connected to other lines. Plans are in place to ensure fire protection until the work is completed.)

In addition, fire officials said the smoke alarm may have saved Wandke's life and helped keep the fire from spreading beyond the house since the fire department arrived moments after her 911 call.

Whether the home will be rebuilt is unknown, according to Pitts. "There hasn't been any discussion of that, yet," she said. "It's too soon to say."

Plans have long been under way for a new president's house off campus on Silver Court, but Pitts did not know the status of that project. She also could not say if the school's insurance company had assessed the amount of the loss. Carreiro estimated it at \$2 million, based on the resale value, including the land. The cost of replacing the structure would be much lower.

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PacRep Theatre's acting school offers kids cure for stage fright


FOR MANY children, there is nothing scarier than getting up in front an audience and speaking.

A handful of local youngsters, though, luckily have no such apprehension. 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Octogenarian painter: It takes a lifetime to make an artist

IN A world of ATMs and high-speed Internet connections, where impatience has almost become a virtue, the creative process remains indifferent to urgency and deadlines. In fact, as Rip Matteson has discovered, art reveals its greatest gifts only after a lengthy passage of time.

"It's a lifetime job," explained Matteson, 89, of his evolution as an artist.

Matteson will be joined by local artists Christine Crozier, Mary Fitzgerald Beach and Mark Farina in new exhibits opening Saturday, May 6, at the Carmel Art Association. The gallery will host a reception from 6 to 8 p.m.

A resident of the small San Francisco Bay Area unincorpocommunity Kensington, Matteson joined the art association in 1950

shortly after establishing the art program at Monterey Peninsula College. A resident of the Monterey Peninsula for 15 years, he once served as dean of instruction at MPC.

Matteson is best known, though, for his work as a cartoonist. His cartoons have appeared in the Saturday Evening Post, Playboy, Punch and many other national publications.

An accomplished figurative painter, Matteson has long made a study of the beauty of the feminine form.

"In my view, painting, like music and dance, should be about beauty, pleasure and feeling good," he said.

But for a painter to be successful, he must also contend with failure.

"You have to realize you are on a road worth following," he said. "I'm glad I hung in there."

For Matteson, one of the biggest hurdles he faced was his habit of comparing his work with that of his favorite artists.

'I'm not Matisse," he insisted. "I'm not Gauguin. It took me a long time to get past these giants. I'm Matteson. And I like who I

Despite working as an artist for more than half a century, Matteson has no plans to retire anytime soon.

"I figure I've got about 15 years left as a painter," he said. "I'll slow down then, but in the meantime, I'll just make the most of each day."


Old buildings and bright flowers

"While my paintings are kind of based on plein aire, most of them are too big to have been painted on site," she said. "I try to maintain a loose and spontaneous feel about them. I think it shows in the work. They're almost abstract. I'll look more for the emotional feeling of a crabapple tree than its rep-

"Earthsapoppin" also comments on the state of the Earth's environment. "We didn't want to preach, but the play does convey a subtle message that it's good to be green."

Despite the message, deFaria said the play is filled with lighthearted fun. "There will be lots of singing, dancing and gags," he said.

The play was written to provide ageappropriate roles for the kids, deFaria explained. "Our actors play characters their own age," he said. "I'm always looking for material for young people."

"Earthsapoppin" also offers deFaria a chance to team up with his longtime creative collaborator, composer Stephen Tosh.

"In my mind, Stephen is a genius," deFaria said. "He is a serious composer."

Managing a cast of energetic youngsters no doubt has its challenges. But deFaria received more than just a few helping hands along the way.

"The thing that makes it all work is the support of the kids' parents," he explained. "They are our stage hands."

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
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
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Seaside noodles, hanging meat and Big Sur in the Big Apple

The board first considered the plans in February but delayed voting until March in order to address the neighbors' concerns. Upon approving the application, board members required the McPartlands to lower the garage to 7.5 feet in height. "I believe the design review board carefully studied our application and considered all these comments that have been made by the neighbors," Wise said.

Mayor Sue McCloud asked if the couple had considered a carport, but Wise said they own an expensive car (a Maserati) that's already been keyed once and needs to be protected.

"When you're backing out of my driveway now, you don't really see the road until you're in it, so the garage won't have anything to do with the visibility," added Tor McPartland. "San Carlos is a busy street you just have to take care."

"I think it's fine the way it is - it conforms to all of our codes," councilwoman Paula Hazdovac said as she made the motion to deny Troxell's appeal.

Councilman Gerard Rose agreed and said he respected the DRB's deliberations. "They're not potted plants. Their opinion is to be considered," Rose said. "Unless we change the code to say we're not going to allow zero-lot-line garages because they will affect someone's view, we have to allow it."

Council members Ken Talmage and Mike Cunningham proposed moving the garage. "To me, it isn't whether the project lives up to the guidelines," Cunningham said. "I think it does." But he said it could do a better job.

McCloud said she could only approve if the garage were shifted to the west and its roof pitch lowered. She also said the site could be graded to drop it further and possibly eliminate the need for stairs at the rear of the building.

Talmage asked if Hazdovac would amend her motion to include the changes, but she declined. "No. I do not want to become a planning commissioner or a design review board member," she said.

City administrator Rich Guillen suggested the council send it back to the board "We don't even know if your recommendations can work," he said.

City attorney Don Freeman agreed, and McCloud moved to grant Troxell's appeal and remand the McPartlands' garage application to the design review board. The motion passed 3-2, with Rose and Hazdovac

nicians, paramedics and firefighters treated the manager and other people in the bank for exposure to pepper spray.

At the time, a sheriff's sergeant said Foisy was a member of the Aryan Brotherhood, and upon his arrest, investigators learned he was on parole after serving time in prison for a previous robbery, according to Somers. Foisy also reportedly told the Federal Bureau of Investigations he committed two other bank robberies in Monterey County while on parole.

Foisy is set to appear before Monterey County Superior Court Judge Lydia Villarreal for sentencing June 7 and is anticipated to request dismissal of six prior violent felony allegations so he might avoid a life sentence.

"The district attorney's will vigorously oppose his request," according to Somers.

CMS music gets high marks

THE CARMEL Middle School orchestra and concert band each received the highest ratings possible at a music educators association in Salinas April 20.

The music, under the direction of CMS music teacher Nancy Fowler, received "unanimous superior" status, at the CCS California Music Educators Associations' Large Group Festival at Hartnell College, Fowler said.

There are 20 students in the string orchestra and 53 students in the concert band, Fowler said.

In February, Rosenthal, on behalf of co-conservators Agha and Richard Bollenbach, sued Hurley for abuse of an elderly person, fraud and deceit, oppression and malice. The amount of money in valuables and cash Poll could prove King had stolen was about \$900,000, though Rosenthal has said he believes King is missing much more than that.

Hurley had moved to Pacific Grove from Texas to take care of her aunt, who in turn allowed Hurley to live on the scenic property.

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
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Editorial

When nature comes to call

As P.J. O'Rourke once wrote, "I have two words for anybody who longs for the good old days: Modern Dentistry."

Primitive humans lived close to nature. Too close. To them, the natural world was a dangerous place where starvation, sudden fatal illnesses and attacks by hungry animals were common threats — not to mention the dangers from the next village. Even a bad toothache wasn't much of a worry when you were dying of yellow fever, hadn't eaten in a week or had a spear in your gut. But nowadays, thanks to the accomplishments of civilization, the slightest disruption in the food supply or outbreak of a contagious disease produces demands for a congressional investigation.

As he conquered terrible illnesses, learned how to provide plentiful food, eliminated the danger from animals that were bigger than he was and started enforcing laws, modern man invented his own dangers, of course. The mass slaughters of the 20th century came about when the instruments of civilization were employed without its mercies. Just 65 years ago, European peoples were senselessly killing each other as quickly as they could.


But all the deaths in all the wars in all the centuries pale in comparison to the destruction wrought by man's natural enemies. Indeed, if just one of mankind's discoveries — antibiotics — had never been made, hundreds of millions of people who are alive today would not be. Peninsula and will be sending all three of my children to college next year. Every home built (from one to 19 units) will have to pay an in-lieu fee for not providing affordable housing on site (the county exempts fees on building one to two units). Property owners wanting to subdivide land for their children would need to pay for a countywide campaign (costing hundreds of thousands of dollars), in addition to paying in-lieu fees. Large developers will be the only ones able to afford a countywide vote and local residents will have to give up their dream. With more stringent requirements (Measure A requiring 30-40 percent below-market-rate housing), there is no question that many developers will simply not build the homes because of profitability, which is exactly what many supporters of the plan want: No building.
