Man fails suicide, becomes disabled, sues CHOMP

A SUICIDAL man who fell from a second-floor balcony at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula — during an escape attempt using a rope crafted from tied-together hospital gowns — has filed a lawsuit against the hospital and two doctors, claiming negligence.

Micheal J. Murphy, 56, who had been admitted to CHOMP for shooting himself in the leg in a suicide attempt, was permanently disabled from the June 16, 2006, fall, according to the suit filed Aug. 13. His disability is the hospital's fault, the lawsuit alleges.

"Despite knowing that [Murphy] was suicidal," the suit indicates, "the [doctors] did not order any special precautions

Council debate: Who owns an ocean view?

IN A town where a peek of the ocean from a living room or a bedroom is something to be prized — and staunchly defended — the Carmel City Council grappled with two disputes between neighbors and would-be builders last week. The council also considered a third homeowner's plan for a metal roof.

In the process, the council overturned three earlier decisions of the design review board.

"Utilizing physical activity, Jay found a positive way for the children to deal with their grief," Love wrote, by organizing a run-a-thon that generated more than \$13,000 for the family.

"It has been determined that physical activity is conducive to learning," she wrote, tying Marden's commitment to student fitness with River's top academic ranking among similar schools in the State of California.

The selection committee was suitably impressed, and last

"While I'm honored with being chosen to be one of the three finalists, my initial reaction was, 'Great! But I could do so much more," Marden said this week. "I feel principals can always do a better job."

In the push to have students master academic skills and perform well on standardized tests, emphasis on physical activity has dwindled, according to Marden.

"Our state and our nation have such a hardcore push toward academic rigor, but our kids' physical health is something that we should all be concerned about," he said.

The ideal principal


According to the awards committee tasked with selecting the Principal of the Year, the winner must have exceeded his normal responsibilities to inspire increased physical activity in his students, and pledged ongoing support of athletics and fitness in a manner that "indicates an understanding of the correlation between that support and students' academic success."

During his years with the school district, Marden emphasized fitness while principal of Captain Cooper School in Big Sur, assistant principal at Carmel Middle School and head of River School, which he joined in mid-2003. He is also the key organizer of the annual Kids of Carmel Track Meet that brings students together from public and private schools throughout the Peninsula to compete in various events.

With an eye toward improving children's health in his school, Marden said he hopes to tactfully and sensitively identify out-of-shape students and "create individual plans to help those kids meet physical fitness goals."

tion, but the school is independent and has never been diocesan. For a time in the 1960s the school housed boarding students. In 1970 the school went co-ed.York is especially proud of its commitment to diversity; it gives need-based financial aid to nearly 40 percent of its 200-plus students. 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Council places emergency prohibition on 'condo-hotels'

 A_{RE} CONDO-HOTELS — in which an owner lives in a condo a few weeks out of the year and has it rented out as a hotel room the rest of the time - a grave threat to community character and the economy? Or nothing to worry about?

Uncertain of the answer, the Carmel City Council voted 4-1 last Tuesday to pass a 45day "urgency ordinance" - which went into effect right away - forbidding the conversion of condos and hotels into condo-hotels.

City administrator Rich Guillen and city attorney Don Freeman pushed for the emergency prohibition because people have expressed interest in turning three properties the Carmel Sands Inn, the Carmel Resort Inn and the Sunset House - into condohotels.

Also, California Coastal Commission executive director Peter Douglas told cities they could not approve such developments without amending their Local Coastal Programs to allow them.

And a pending Assembly Bill, AB 1459, would "prohibit the sale or transfer of a unit in an overnight visitor-serving commercial facility located in the coastal zone for individual ownership, or the conversion of such to a private residential facility."

'We'll take 45 days to have meetings with the people who are proposing these conversions," said Guillen. Also, city officials will meet with coastal commission planners, "to see where the coastal commission is going on this."

Councilman Gerard Rose said the inquiries into condo-hotels did not constitute the "extraordinarily threatening situation" that would warrant an urgency ordinance, and he disagreed "legally and philosophically" with Douglas' assertion they could not be approved by cities if their LCPs are silent on the topic.

Aspen or Honolulu

Mayor Sue McCloud said the potential loss in hotel taxes justified a hasty response. "TOT is our No. 1 source of revenue, and

anything that could impact that, particularly negatively, should concern us," she said.

Guillen said he didn't think the council would want Carmel-by-the-Sea to become like Aspen or Waikiki. "That's why I recommend you go forward with this until we really understand what the impacts of hotelcondo conversions are."

Several members of the public, including former councilwoman Barbara Livingston, Carmel Residents Association President Roberta Miller and Flanders Foundation President Melanie Billig, asked the council to adopt the urgency ordinance.

The council voted 4-1, with Rose dissenting, to impose the emergency prohibition. At the end of 45 days, it could hold a hearing and extend the ban another 10 months and 15 days, and then for another year.

"I wouldn't anticipate this taking that long in Carmel," Freeman said. "But then again, anything is possible."



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

Man stopped for suspected theft arrested for C.V. pot plot

T TURNED out he didn't steal the mountain bikes in the back of his pickup truck, as originally suspected. But when 39-year-old Carmel resident Robert Karges was stopped on

Carmel Valley Road Aug. 4 Monterey County bv Sheriff's deputies wanting to question him, they reportedly found another reason to arrest him: five live pot plants and the tools for putting them in the ground.

Deputies were in the area at the behest of a Rio Vista resident who heard a noise and saw a man putting what she thought was her husband's mountain bike in the back of his truck, according to Sgt. Scott Ragan. She yelled at him the stop, and when he didn't, she called the sheriff.

Moments later, as she

conferred with deputies at the intersection of Carmel Valley



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Road and Rio Vista, the suspicious bike-toting truck drove past. Deputies stopped Karges and his passenger and inquired about the mountain bikes. They explained they were going for a ride. "Then the deputies noticed the marijuana plants in back," of the four-door Chevrolet Silverado, Ragan said. "The driver admitted they were his and that he was going to take them out to Carmel Valley to plant, and that's what he was arrested for." Karges also had a water jug, potting soil, chicken wire and shovels in his truck, according to Ragan.

Meanwhile, the Rio Vista resident returned home to find her shed still locked, with the mountain bike safe inside.



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Baby raccoon misadventure warms hearts of Big Sur diners

FOR THE many local residents who consider raccoons a nuisance, it's hard to imagine the masked trash bandits as the subject of a heartwarming story. But even the most ardent raccoon hater couldn't help get the warm-and-fuzzies after an incident at Fernwood Resort in Big Sur this week.

As a group of diners - mostly softball players from the Esalen Institute celebrating an Aug. 14 victory over the rival State Park team — sat on a deck overlooking the Big Sur River and enjoyed a postgame snack, two adolescent raccoons climbed into the upper branches of a maple tree. When the raccoons scampered onto branches that could barely sustain their weight, the diners gasped.

Like treed cats, the pair had climbed up but didn't know how to get down. And with the tree leaning more over a steep embankment and the river, they were in a precarious spot. Close at hand, a third and much larger raccoon - presumably the mother - scurried up the tree and gave the tikes a lesson in scurrying down, which evidently isn't nearly as easy as scurrying up. The kids, clearly paralyzed by fear, clung to narrow branches as mom demonstrated some moves. But the youngsters wouldn't budge.

"We were thinking of calling the fire brigade," said one onlooker, Kinga Pfeifer.

Three times the mother climbed up and down the tree, displaying an awkward waddling motion that could never be described as graceful. But it was clearly an effective technique, and eventually the young raccoons got up enough nerve to try it themselves.

One after the other, they, too, scurried down the tree, employing the same waddling technique that their mother had demonstrated. As each young raccoon finally touched terra firma, the crowd let out a big cheer not unlike the ones that could be heard on the softball field earlier that evening.

After the ordeal, onlookers shook their heads in disbelief. One Big Sur resident, Laura Doherty, wondered if the "mother" raccoon was actually the kids' dad.

"That had to be the father," reasoned Doherty, who works in the programs department at Esalen. "No mother would put her children through so much risk."

GARLAND RANCH Regional Park will host its first-ever group hike for dogs Saturday, Aug. 18, and their owners are invited to come along.



CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA CITY COUNCIL

ORDINANCE NO. 2007-9

SPENDING PRIORITIES RELATING TO ZONING AND MAINTENANCE OF CITY-OWNED PROPERTY

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

A. The purpose of this Ordinance is to add Section 3.04.120 to the Carmel-by-the-Sea Municipal Code.

B. The City finds and declares that the City Council should be the final arbiter of spending priorities relating to zoning and maintenance of City-owned property.

Section 2. ADDITION OF SECTION 3.04.120 TO DIVISION 3.04 OF THE CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA MUNICIPAL CODE.

A section 3.04.120 entitled "SPENDING PRIORITIES" is added to Division 3.04 of the Carmel-by-the-Sea Municipal Code which reads as follows:

3.04.120 SPENDING PRIORITIES

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Code, the City Council shall be the final arbiter of spending priorities relating to zoning and maintenance of Cityowned property.

Section 3. SEVERABILITY.

A. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected thereby and shall continue in full force and effect. To this end, provisions of this Ordinance are severable.

B. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases be held unconstitutional, invalid or unenforceable.

Section 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after its final passage and adoption.

m A}$ NEW tradition for all members of the community to celebrate life and support the programs of Suicide Prevention Service of the Central Coast" will commence Sept. 15 with the inaugural Coastal Trail Walk. The walk - from Window on the Bay park in Monterey to Pacific Grove and back will occur five days after World Suicide Prevention Day and raise funds for the local nonprofit.

The announcement followed a recent spate of suicides on the Monterey Peninsula, including men who shot themselves in Pebble Beach and Monterey, and attempted suicides, such as the twin sisters in Carmel who reportedly tried to cut each other's throats after they became destitute and learned they were being evicted.

"The need is great in our community, but no one wants to talk about it," said walk coordinator Julie Ann Lozano. "Fundraising is also very difficult for this organization, as [we don't have] warm and fuzzy pictures of seniors, children or animals."

During the past four years in Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito counties, 360 people of varying socioeconomic status, age and ethnicity killed themselves, according to Lozano. There are more than 30,500 suicides and as many as 1 million attempts in the United States annually.

But many of those tragedies might have been prevented if the people sought help and the support of families, schools, workplaces and communities.

Suicide Prevention Service of the Central Coast provides help via its free, 24-hour, confidential, bilingual hotline, as well as educational materials, youth presentations, community training, and support for at-risk adults and those grieving the loss of a loved one from suicide.

Lozano said people can support Suicide Prevention and the inaugural Coastal Trail Walk by taking part themselves, sponsoring a walker, spreading the word through email and the website, volunteering to help or sponsoring the event, as Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula and

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


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The state giveth your money, and the state taketh it away

Council returns some tax dollars, asks for others

THE CARMEL City Council voted last week to return some taxpayer dollars to the state, request some funding from a local park district, and dole out funds provided by trash-collection customers. The three separate items appeared on the council's consent agenda Aug. 7 and were approved without discussion.

Because it did not spend enough money on road work in fiscal year 2005/2006, Carmel must return \$19,628.86 in Traffic Relief Congestion Fund money to the state, according to administrative services director Joyce Giuffre.

In order to keep it, the city would have had to spend \$1.1 million but came up \$140,285 short. It did not meet the minimum in an alternative formula based on last year's spending, either.

While the city must return the money from the fund's 2005/2006 allocation, Giuffre anticipated it will not have to do the same with the \$29,230.57 received last year, "because there are significant road projects scheduled for 2007/2008 that will allow the city to comply."

Park payout

Forest Hill Park on the north side of town, Piccadilly Park on Dolores Street, and Devendorf Park on Ocean Avenue "need improvement to provide a higher quality use and experience for park visitors," and the city hopes the Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District will help pay for the work. The council voted to request \$10,000 from the agency, which is accepting applications for grants for parks, open space and coastal preservation projects.

According to MPRPD guidelines, projects will receive priority consideration for funding if they:

■ increase park safety, especially for children;

■ improve ADA accessibility;

"enhance public awareness and appreciation of parks, recreation and open space;"

convert more property into public parks or open space,

■ further protect the coast.

While jurisdictions are asked to allocate matching funds for the work, it's not required. The grant application is due Sept. 7, with the park district set to announce its decisions in November.

Kids' garden, snack bar

Each year, Carmel Marina Corporation gives \$18,000 in

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fees paid by its garbage-collection customers to the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea for allocation to youth groups working on recycling and other environmental projects. With \$59,592 in its Youth Recycling deposit account, the council voted to distribute a total \$26,450 to Carmel Middle School, River School and the youth center.

The winners:

■ Working under CMS' Hilton Bialek Biological Sciences Habitat, students will create a landscape design and maintenance plan for Forest Hill Park, replace dead and dying plants with native species grown at the habitat, and install an irrigation line. They received \$14,450.

Habitat students will also propagate and plant 2,500 native seedlings to restore the beach bluff pathway along Scenic Road, just as they did last year. That grant was \$6,000.

The nonprofit Carmel Youth Center will update its snack bar by purchasing recycling bins at a cost of \$2,500.

■ River School students received \$2,000 to help buy materials for their "self-sustaining, small-scale, gardenbased business to provide the local community with organic goods and student-made, garden-based products," cultivated in their children's garden, as well as \$1,500 to build an improved composting system.

Mauled pet cat found near home on Guadalupe

POLICE FOUND a dead pet cat in the area of Guadalupe Street and Fourth Avenue last week that appeared to have been killed and partially eaten by an unknown predator.

The grisly discovery prompted the department to warn residents in the area to keep their pets indoors at night, though they are unsure what animal attacked and killed the feline.

The incident followed reports in late July of two dead cats and a possible mountain-lion sighting at the other end of town near the Carmel River School.

Mountain lions also reportedly preyed on pets in Carmel Valley and Monterey, and a lion suspected of killing a dozen dogs in Big Sur was killed earlier this summer.

"It was a neighbor's pet that was dragged across the street into another yard and basically eaten," Carmel Police Sgt. Mike Calhoun said last Thursday.

Biologists from the California Department of Fish and Game "can't determine what kind of predator it might be, but we're distributing notices in the area to tell people to keep their pets inside," he said.

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

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Sunset Center reports strong fourth quarter

■ Nonprofit signs on to manage theater for another three years

SUNSET CENTER finished the fourth quarter of the 2006/2007 fiscal year \$93,321 in the black, the nonprofit's board chairman told the Carmel City Council last week. The budget surplus resulted from operating income \$27,086 above target at \$380,159, and expenses \$66,235 under budget at \$534,759. In the form of an "enabling grant," the city contributed \$178,250 to the center's quarterly budget.

Theater rental income was down by \$7,329, due to fewer shows produced by outside presenters, according to chairman Perry Walker, but income from performances organized by Sunset Center staff was \$36,950 higher than anticipated.

"When we took over Sunset Center, we thought we would

be doing 10 Performance Carmel series shows," he said, referring to the series that's been produced in-house at Sunset Center for 15 years.

But after the center's extensive \$21.65 million remodel, and subsequent increases in rental rates during the following few years, many of the groups that had been presenting shows there did not return. As a result, the center's management, hired in 2004, increasingly assumed the responsibility of finding, hiring and scheduling various artists.


"We are now the major presenter at Sunset," Walker said. "We are taking on that risk, and that is a huge change in what our mission was."

Between July 1, 2006, and June 30 this year, Performance Carmel featured 11 shows, and Sunset Center Presents — the other in-house series — hosted 28. The Historic Presenting Partners, such as the Monterey Symphony, organized 57 performances, and "other events" accounted for 22.

For the fourth quarter, performance expenses were \$3,485

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more than the budgeted \$223,896, but that and the \$4,007 overage for utilities, maintenance and insurance were offset by savings of \$44,779 in salaries and \$28,948 in ticketing services.

"We finished net \$93,000, which is really quite remarkable for the fourth quarter," Walker said, though he added a sobering comment. "There's no promise we can continue this stellar performance. All costs are going up."

Walker said audited figures for the 2006/2007 fiscal year, which ended June 30, will likely be presented to the council in November.

Contract extended

On June 29, executive director Jack Globenfelt sent a letter and \$120,000 to city administrator Rich Guillen on behalf of Sunset Cultural Center Inc., the nonprofit that runs the center for the city.

The money was the advance of working capital city taxpayers provided to SCC when its contract was signed in 2004. According to that agreement, SCC was to pay the money back by June 30.

At the council meeting, Guillen thanked Walker for the check and said the city had already cashed it.

Globenfelt's letter also said the SCC board of directors voted to extend its contract with the city "to manage Sunset Center for an additional three-year period with the enabling grants approved by the council of \$750,000, \$700,000 and \$680,000 for the next three fiscal years."

The subsidies provided by city taxpayers help cover the costs of running Sunset.

"We look forward to continuing the cordial working relationship between the city and the board of trustees," his letter concluded.

View fight No. 1

After redesigning his plans once, San Antonio Avenue property owner Richard Kashfi received DRB approval in June for his proposal to tear down an old home and construct a three-bedroom, three-bathroom, two-story residence in its place.

But neighbors objected, citing city design guidelines that stipulate, "The desire to maximize view opportunities from one's own property must be balanced with consideration of respecting views of others." Several nearby residents particularly took issue with Kashfi's second story comprising the master bedroom and bathroom and two balconies.

But after asking for a 12-inch drop in height and a reduction in size of the second story in May, the DRB OK'd the design when Kashfi returned in June, finding it met the city's codes.

"They decided no options would appease the neighbors, other than one floor," assistant planner Nathan Schmidt told the council Aug. 7, so board members requested no further modifications.

Paul McKnight, who lives on the southeast corner of Carmelo and 10th directly east of Kashfi's property, said the new 2,460-square-foot home, to be built on an 6,000 squarefoot lot, would be be "oppressive" and block most of his view of the sea.

"We would like to see that second story eliminated and think Mr. Kashfi can work out some design where he can still get his views and we can retain ours," he said.

Peter Boutin, whose home is catty-corner from McKnight's, said, "If you don't grant the appeal, it just goes forward and we've lost forever the views that are sacred. It's a death blow to us if you don't grant it. If you do, maybe we can work with the neighbors."

Schmidt agreed with the appellants and recommended the council overturn the board's approval of the plans.

But Kashfi said he made changes to the home's design based on input from city planners and direction from the DRB. He promised the home would be attractive.

Representing Kashfi, attorney David Sweigert of Fenton & Keller said the appellants were asking the council to grant them a view easement over his client's property, placing their rights to ocean views above his.

Another attorney representing Kashfi, John Bridges, wrote, "Appellants' all-or-nothing approach (i.e., demanding complete elimination of the approved second floor) is unreasonable, inequitable and does not even attempt to strike a balance with Mr. Kashfi's rights."

The council did not want to deny the second story outright but asked Kashfi and his designer, Darren Davis, to redraw the plans to have less impact on the neighbors. They suggested a reconfigured second story, more excavation and a lower roof pitch.

"If those considerations are taken into account in the proposed design, it could end up irritating everybody equally," councilman Ken Talmage said. "We're not here to pick winners and losers."

With a unanimous vote, including that of newly appointed Karen Sharp, the council upheld the neighbors' appeal and sent Kashfi back to the design review board.

View fight No. 2

When it denied San Antonio Avenue resident Shan Sayles' plans for a 478-square-foot, two-story addition to his home, the board said his proposed remodel would significantly affect the views from his neighbors' homes.

In his appeal to the council, Sayles alleged the board incorrectly interpreted the guidelines regarding individual rights to scenic vistas.

"The DRB decision was not a balance of views," commented his architect, Brian Congleton. "It was the protection of one person's view over another."

Senior planner Sean Conroy agreed and recommended the council grant Sayles' appeal and approve the design.

'The proposed addition will block a significant portion of the ocean views from the neighbor's living room on the lower level of the residence," Conroy wrote in his staff report. "However, views of the ocean would still be available from other portions of the lower level, and the views from the second story will not be affected." He also asked that the addition be shifted two feet to the north to lessen the impact on the neighbor to the east. "His will improve, and ours will be gone," resident Jim Finnegan said of Sayles' ocean views. "I just want you to be consistent."

a view."

But Mayor Sue McCloud said the differences between the two applications weren't all that vast. The board described the loss of views as "significant," she said, and she worried the council would be unfair in approving Sayles' application while denying Kashfi's.

Ultimately, the council, minus Sharp, who recused herself because she owns property nearby, voted 3-1 in favor of Sayles' appeal.

And one metal roof

Santa Fe homeowner Nancy Ripken was concerned not about views, but about the safety of her roof, when she asked the council to overrule the board's denial of the the ridged metal sheeting she hoped to install on her cottage.

"Metal, plastic and glass roofs are inappropriate in all neighborhoods," according to the city's residential design guidelines, and Schmidt recommended upholding the board's denial of Ripken's proposed metal roof.

But she argued the metal covering would be fireproof, clean and low-profile, since the roof of her 1940s home is barely visible from street level. She proposed using an "antique copper" color similar to that of weathered wood shingles.

She also said the DRB was unfair in denying her application, considering it approved a metal roof on another home at the same meeting.

Ripken told the council wood shakes are a fire risk and will eventually be prohibited as more insurance companies refuse to cover homes with wood roofs. She said the devastating Lake Tahoe fire was so destructive in part because many of the homes were combustible.

Tree debris would slide off a metal roof, and it would be "environmentally green," she said. "It's the only roofing material where you can drink the water that runs off.

Hazdovac pointed out the guidelines are not mandates. "I would grant the appeal based on fact that the design guidelines say metal roofs are inappropriate, not that they're

not allowed," she said. "I think it would complement the house very nicely, and you can barely see it." Rose agreed, commenting he had trouble even seeing the roof during a site visit the previous day, and the council unan-

imously voted to grant the appeal and approve the metal roof in "antique copper."

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Other neighbors also objected in writing and at the hearıng.

"The two of us affected most severely are here, but there are others," Finnegan said. "If this is approved, we'll have three two-story houses around us. Eventually, we'll be in a hole."

Council members were not convinced.

"I was shocked, really, to see how minimal the visual impact of the addition was," councilman Gerard Rose said. "I think it's pretty clear that Mr. Congleton went to extraordinary lengths to minimize the visual impact on the neighbors.'

Talmage said the proposal was not nearly as large as Kashfi's, and councilwoman Paula Hazdovac said, "I don't think this addition impacts the views that greatly compared to the last one, where it completely obliterated any hope of

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

to prevent suicide attempts or other self-destructive behavior."

The suit contends the two physicians who treated Murphy in June 2006, Lee M. Goldman and Sohrab Gollogly, allowed him to be placed in a second-floor hospital room at CHOMP with no restraints or guard to make sure he didn't harm himself. "They should have done something," Richard Damon, Murphy's Santa Cruz-based attorney, told The Pine Cone. "There are various options. One, they should have put him on the ground floor; two, put him on suicide watch; three, put him in restraints. You don't give him the opportunity knowing he is suicidal — to do it."

In a phone interview Thursday, Goldman said he hadn't yet been served and therefore was unable to comment. Gollogly couldn't be reached for comment Thursday.

Nine days after Murphy was admitted to CHOMP for the gunshot wound, Damon said his client "tried to escape by tying together some hospital gowns," then fell to the ground from the second floor, "and ended up severely disabled."

Murphy, who received "serious fractures to his back and foot," has crippling back pain and lives off disability checks.

On June 7, the day Murphy was admitted to CHOMP, Goldman observed and noted Murphy was "on a selfdestructive course," according to the suit. The next day, the suit claims, Gollogly noted Murphy had "multiple psychosocial problems, including suicidal tendencies" and that "he attempted to commit suicide by shooting himself in the calf with a .38-caliber pistol ... he became despondent and overdosed on heroin."

Because of the gunshot wound, doctors "were well aware that [Murphy] was bipolar, depressed and suicidal," the suit indicates. "That's a pretty serious sign of suicidal tendencies," Damon said Wednesday.

CHOMP spokeswoman Lauren Elsensohn said the hospital couldn't comment on the lawsuit because of patient privacy laws. "I want to ensure you and your readers that patient safety and patient privacy take high priority at Community Hospital," Elsensohn said. "We provide that every day."

Murphy, who now lives in Santa Cruz, is taking prescription medicine and doesn't have any more mental health issues, Damon said.

"He just needed to be on medication," he said.



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
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Post-punk folkies share Big Sur stage, Hollywood past

A QUARTER century after he carved out a legacy as leader of the critically acclaimed Los Angeles punk band, X, John Doe comes to the Henry Miller Library in Big Sur Sunday, Aug. 19, as a singer-songwriter whose music now has more in common with John Cougar Mellencamp than it does with the Sex Pistols.

Which isn't such a bad thing. Punk rock, like so many genres that have taken pop music by storm, hasn't aged very gracefully. Its shock value had a great impact in the late '70s

So during the past two decades, Doe has turned — like his longtime friend, singer-songwriter Dave Alvin — to the rich legacy of folk music for inspiration. And like Alvin, he tosses in healthy doses of country, rock and blues, creating a stripped down sound that conjures up Mellencamp or the acoustic side of Bruce Springsteen.

Even during X's heyday, Doe was expanding musically beyond the narrow constraints of punk rock.

"X was always a hybrid," he said in an interview this week. "By our second or third album, we were including elements of Americana in our music."

While Doe admits to many influences — he cited the Rolling Stones and Johnny Cash as examples — he has long strived to carve out his own musical identity.

"I'm not trying to be anybody I'm not," he insisted. "I've always been pretty good at being myself."

Return to Big Sur

Doe's concert Sunday marks his return to a library he played four years ago.

"It's pretty mind-blowing singing into the redwoods," he

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
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

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

euthanized.

A hearing officer appointed by the City of Pacific Grove also listened to testimony Thursday afternoon from Donald Armstrong, co-owner of the Lab and a resident of Rancho Palos Verdes, as well as local TV news anchor Olga Ospina, whose Maltese died several days after the July 25 attack in front of the Pacific Grove

post office.

"From what I saw, I would have no problem returning this dog to its owner," said dog expert Barbara De Groodt, owner of Salinasbased From the Heart Animal Behavior Counseling and Dog Training.

After listening to witnesses, a police officer and the

dogs' owners, hearing officer Carmelita Garcia said she would make her decision later whether the dog should be euthanized.

De Groodt, who met with the Lab, Samson, after the attack to determine if it was vicious, said she introduced her "Maltese-like" dog Barney, a terrier-poodle mix, to Samson.

"Barney barked and rolled over and ran," De Groodt said. "But Samson didn't pay a whole lot of attention to him."

An emotional Ospina pleaded for Garcia not to return Samson to his owners.

"I just don't want this happening anywhere in the world where this dog is," said Ospina, who teared up several times during the hearing. "Please help me, please help me put this dog down. I have been through so much and this has been very difficult."

Ospina was walking her dog, Lulu, in front of the post office when Samson leapt through an open window of the car and attacked the Maltese.

A woman who witnessed the attack from a building across the street testified she heard Ospina's screams. "I heard her screaming, 'Help me! Help me! Somebody help me," the witness said.

Lulu underwent emergency surgery and survived for three days at Santa Cruz Veterinary Hospital before she died.

Ospina told The Pine Cone last week she's received an outpouring of support from the community over the death of her dog.

Garcia said she would send a certified letter containing her decision to the parties involved but didn't place a timeline on it.


Therapy

picked up physical evidence in about half of the fires."

Williams also said Scott's movements while under surveillance tied him to the crimes, though he declined to describe the actions that led to that conclusion.

"He came to our attention in about October of last year," Williams said. In Pebble Beach, arson was suspected in two September 2006 fires. After that, two or three apparent arson fires were ignited during the winter, with the number escalating in the summer, including some suspicious blazes in Pebble Beach in June.

"We're still looking at fires, previous and current," for possible links with their suspect, said Cal Fire information officer David Jones.

The most recent case of arson involved a half-acre that burned near Barnet Segal Lane and Iris Canyon Road the afternoon of July 21. That was fought by Cal Fire, Monterey Fire and other crews, and Jones said Monterey P.D. also participated in the investigation.

"I'm glad these never took off," Jones said of the small blazes set on the Monterey Peninsula. "They could have really become something."

Especially now, following months of little to no rainfall. Jones said even green trees contain far less moisture than usual, making them particularly flammable.

Drugs, too

Because Scott was suspected of non-fire-related crimes as well, the Monterey County Sheriff's Office was also involved in the investigation.

"While they were searching his home, they found a whole bunch of marijuana - 30-plus plants and a bunch of packages of it dried," reported Sgt. Scott Ragan.

On Sunday morning, in marked and unmarked vehicles, Cal Fire investigators, sheriff's deputies and Carmel police officers followed Scott as he drove through town. Jones said they wanted to arrest him away from home.

"There were a woman and two children at the house, so my understanding is it was deliberately away from the house," Jones said. "Kids get traumatized enough today."

And while neither Jones nor Williams would characterize Scott's driving as evasive, Williams commented, "He was making some rather unusual traffic maneuvers."

With the erratically driving suspect on the outskirts of Carmel-by-the-Sea, police pulled him over near the Carmel River Lagoon.

"Downtown is not the place to be chasing someone,"

Williams said, especially on a Sunday in August.

Scott was taken to Monterey County Jail and held on \$2 million bail. He was still in custody Thursday.

And on Wednesday, Williams submitted the case file in a 3-inch binder to the Monterey County District Attorney's Office, which will determine how many charges Scott will face.

Crime victims seek help

VOLUNTEERS ARE needed to help crime victims negotiate the criminal justice system, obtain the latest information on their cases and learn their way around the courts. The Crime Victims Unit in the Monterey County District Attorney's Office is based in Salinas but serves the entire county with only five advocates, according to Pam Patterson, victim/witness program coordinator.

Those advocates provide a host of "mandatory services" for crime victims and people who have lost family members to homicide, including crisis intervention, emergency assistance, resource and referral counseling, property return assistance, orientation to the criminal justice system, court escort/support, case status/disposition information, notifica-

> tion of family and friends, employer notification and victim-of-crime claims assistance.

> They also provide a host of optional services: creditor intervention, child-care assistance, restitution information, witness notification, funeral arrangement assistance, transportation assistance, employer intervention, and information on crime prevention, witness protection and temporary restraining orders.

> During training, volunteers initially shadow advocates.

> "And then, if appropriate, they begin assisting people on their own," Patterson said. "It helps if they have a helping background in some way," such as studying social work or volunteering at a crisis center.

> While Patterson tries to be flexible to accommodate volunteers' schedules, she seeks commitments of about four hours per day a few times a week, "because clients and calls come in all the time."

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

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



PODS containers — as large as 16 feet long and 8 feet high — are an eyesore, impede the city's narrow streets and are left in one place too long.

"All of a sudden," police chief Darius Engles said Tuesday, "we started getting complaints that these storage containers have been parked on a street for two or three months."

That led the P.G. City Council Wednesday to approve an ordinance that will charge residents a fee for using PODS containers, as well as large dumpsters, and limit the time they could be placed on city streets.

"Cities throughout the United States have suddenly found themselves dealing with this very popular storage concept and the issue of storage containers parked on city streets and in residential neighborhoods," Engles wrote in a report to the council.

The ordinance would require P.G. residents to pay a \$30 city fee to use the containers and would limit their use on city streets to seven days.

Residents could opt to pay another \$30 to extend the use for another seven days. After that, the city would require the trash and storage units to be removed from city streets. Once the ordinance is implemented, the \$30 permit fee will help the city pay for a police officer to check out streets where residents request PODS and other dumpsters to make sure the location is suitable, Engles said.

At Wednesday's council meeting, councilman Scott Miller proposed charging a daily fee for the containers.

"If there is a fee for every day you park on the street," he said, "that's the motivation to get the project done."

City manager Jim Colangelo said that would be too difficult to regulate since it would require the city to constantly monitor PODS and dumpsters, and determine how long each one is parked.

One Pacific Grove resident said a PODS storage container was parked on Carmel Avenue near his home for two months until he finally called police. The container disappeared shortly after his call.

"Do you want to live in a place where a bunch of square boxes are blocking people's view of the neighborhood?" said the man, who did not want to be identified. "It's just one more blight on the landscape."

Different rules for construction

The ordinance would be less restrictive on those using refuse or storage containers in conjunction with a building project, Engles said. In those cases, long-term use permits could be issued as long as an applicant obtains a valid building permit from the city.

Construction applicants who park the containers on the street would be subject to a onetime \$30 fee while those who set them on their own property will not.

"We will not charge a fee for construction [uses] when a container is placed on the property," Engles said.

In his report, Engles notes PODS' booming franchise business, founded in 1998, grossed more than \$200 million last year. On its website, PODS boasts it offers its service to more than "200 million people in more than 20,000 cities in 46 states, provinces and territories throughout the United States, Canada and Australia."

First ordinance of its kind?

Engles, who is a member of an organization composed of California police chiefs, said when he sent an email message to members asking if they knew of similar ordinances to regulate PODS and other containers, nobody was aware of any.

"They asked me to send it [the ordinance] along," Engles said. "It's kind of an emerging problem."

Engles said he discussed the proposed ordinance with PODS company officials.


"They think what we have proposed is very fair," he said. "They have no problem with this at all."

The city council will come back at a later meeting for second reading of the ordinance.





our dogs," Nelson said. "As a docent, Kathryn was looking for a project that allowed her to share her passion for hiking while spending time with her new best friend, Marleybear [an Australian shepherd and Lab mix]. Docent-led dog hikes were just the answer. The hikes give dog owners a chance to enjoy Garland Park, train their dogs, socialize with other dog owners and learn dog etiquette in a safe environment."

Dogs are not required to be leashed at Garland Park. But, according to Nelson, walking a dog on-leash is an important step in learning how to responsibly walk a dog off-leash.

"These on-leash dog hikes highlight the need to understand that the off-leash policy is conditioned on the premise that a dog let off-leash is immediately obedient, under voice control, within visual contact and not running rampant," he said. "If dog-owner responsibility starts to slip, the privilege could be lost to all dog owners."

With midday temperatures in sunny Carmel Valley soaring, Hannay and Marleybear mapped out a relatively cool route along the lower elevation trails of the park. "We scouted the walk," said Hannay. "Much of it is in the shade, and we pass a couple ponds along the way. We want to keep the dogs happy and not get them overheated."

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



Immigration nonsense

ARE THE people who cover immigration issues for the major newspapers living on a different planet than the rest of us? Sometimes it seems that way. Surely these reporters, whose profession has impartiality as one of its core principles, aren't campaigning for a certain political outcome. Neither could so many people be blatantly dishonest. They must simply have a completely different concept of the truth:

■ An Associated Press story printed in many newspapers across the country over the weekend was loaded with hyperbole, unsubstantiated allegations and what could only be described as propaganda. The story was headlined, "Fewer Mexicans trying to enter U.S.," and contained these gems:

"Mexicans are increasingly giving up on the American dream and staying home ... as the United States purges itself of its illegal immigrant population."

But, as far as we can tell, nothing that could even remotely be called a purge is going on.

"Migrants say they feel Americans are increasingly hostile toward immigrants. 'It's the discrimination,' said 28-year-old George Guevara, who was deported to Tijuana last month after living in the U.S. for 18 years."

Trouble is, the reporter didn't cite any examples of discrimination against Guevara, or any other immigrants, for that matter. He also left out the fact that the United States admits about 750,000 legal immigrants each year, and there is no effort in Congress or anywhere else to reduce this figure.

■ A front-page story in the Monterey County Herald Aug. 14 told of an assault against a Mexican day laborer who, police said, was picked up in Seaside by a man who pretended to want to hire him, but then took him to a remote part of Marina and beat him. This incident, the Herald reported, was being investigated as a possible hate crime. The story — about 750 words long — contained the phrase "hate crime" 15 times. Two days later, a profile of the victim contained three more references to a possible "hate crime." But neither story contained a single instance of the words, "illegal immigrant," or any reference to whether the victim was in the United States legally. He is a "native of Oaxaca" and "came to this country seven years ago," the newspaper reported. But whether he is a legal resident of the United States was left to the reader to guess.

These stories have a single purpose: to generate sympathy for illegal immigrants from Mexico and other countries in Central and South America. They are based on the reporters' obvious belief that anyone who is in favor of curtailing illegal immigration is heartless, cruel and prejudiced.

But that is not the country we see. The United States has long welcomed immigrants from all parts of the globe and continues to do so. The actions of a single, possibly deranged, individual do not change that fact one iota. The controversy over the millions of Mexicans who have crossed the border illegally isn't about discrimination against immigrants or Mexicans. Even the most strident opponents of illegal immigration have not called for an end to all immigration from Mexico. They just want the mass lawbreaking to end. Surely even reporters can understand that sentiment.

Rebuilding and racing Sir Jack's quick and slippery Formula Jr.

T CAME into his life in bags and boxes and took one-and-ahalf years to rebuild, but this weekend at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca, Carmel Valley resident Dave Zurlinden will again drive one of the most historic racing cars in the world.

Last year, he drove the 1962 Brabham BT2 Formula Jr. to second place in the Rolex Monterey Historic Automobile Races.

The car's creator, Australian Jack Brabham, was the first race car driver to be knighted and the only Formula 1 driver to win a world title in a car of his own construction.

Zurlinden's racer is one of 11 built by Brabham (the "B" in the car's name) and Australian engineer Ron Tauranac (the "T").

"The reason I get to participate in the historic races at Laguna Seca has nothing to do with me and everything to do with my car," Zurlinden said.

The Brabham BT2 may be well known today for its distinguished creators. But among racers, it had a more practical reputation.

"Tauranac always had the customer in mind as he was building racecars," Zurlinden said. "So they were very well known to be easy to set up, easy to maintain, easy to drive, and fast."

The Brabham-Tauranac team's eighth car — the one Zurlinden would come to own — was driven by Frank Gardner for in the British F-Jr. championship and then shipped back to Australia after the 1962 racing season drew to a close.

There it stayed, regularly appearing at race tracks as it changed hands nine times before it was brought to the United States vintage car collector John Streets in 2001.

"And then he sat on it for a couple of years," Zurlinden said. "He was going to restore it for his son to drive."

But Zurlinden had a different idea for the boxes, crates and even a gunny sack of original parts he spotted on a shelf in Streets' Palo Alto mechanic's shop. He asked Streets what he had in mind for the dismantled racer.

"He said, 'I don't know; I should sell it," Zurlinden recalled. "And I said, 'Why don't you sell it to me?"

Soon the deal was set, and Zurlinden began the extensive restoration of the famous car. In 2005, he was able to drive the 1962 Brabham in the Wine Country Classic at Sonoma's Infineon Raceway.

"That was its first race on American soil," Zurlinden said.

Undaunted by broken feet

That race also marked the beginning of a new era for the car's Carmel Valley owner. Zurlinden's history with cars was already long and varied, but the BT represented his foray into the world of vintage racing.

"When I was about 4 years old, I started noticing cars, and it's been a lifelong addiction, weakness and problem," said Zurlinden, who hitch-hiked to Laguna Seca to watch races while he was at UC Berkeley.

Later, he spent a couple of years as a mechanic on sailboats and ended up in Costa Rica.


Returning to California in 1971, he realized he needed a real job and went to work as a car mechanic. Burned out and bored with repairing cars three years later, he went into the packaging machinery business. Today, his Salinas company employs a dozen people, including his two sons, Marc and Paul, and Zurlinden

Shreve Archer III — Vintage racing loses a great gentleman

HEN THE green flag waves at the start of this weekend's Rolex Monterey Historic Automobile Races, a man known for great ontrack battles and off-track achievements will be missing from the grid.

Shreve "Mac" Archer III, who raced his bright red Cobra 427, "Old Bertha," at the Historics for more than two decades, competed in his final race last year. Archer died at Stanford Medical Center in June following a long battle with leukemia. He was 58.

A Carmel pediatrician who specialized in learning disabilities, attention deficit disorder and behavioral problems, and whose great-grandfather was a founder of Archer Daniels Midland Co., Archer was a longtime speed-sport fanatic. But Steve Earle, who founded the Monterey Historics 34 years ago, said he didn't look the part.

"He was an exceptional guy, and the last thing you would think of him was as a racing driver," said Earle, because he was so "clean cut."

But his skills, which he honed as a professional motorcycle racer and kept sharp through more than 20 years of vintage racing, were undeniable.

"Most of the guys who run in vintage racing don't have the experience that Mac had, and certainly don't have that very, very high skill level," Earle continued. "Not to belittle any of them — it's just that Mac was extraordinary. And as a person, he was so calm, confident and nice."

Archer could always be counted on to wage a good battle. He always drove as competitively as possible, but without losing his manners.

"Even when we put him with much faster cars, he

didn't care," said Earle. "He always wanted to do it in a fun, interesting way, and for him to be

> able to run through the field, and have a good time, that was it. It wasn't about the winning — he just wanted to drive."

> In 2001, starting from 14th position in a field of 30 historics cars, Archer had a slow start but proceeded to slice through the field, passing almost everyone before entering the final turn of the last lap neck-andneck with a Ferrari driven by Rob Walton. Crossing the finish line, Archer beat Walton by a nose. Afterward, he apologized for a lastminute swerve that could have caused a collision.

"He was a gentleman and a great guy, and everyone admired his driving," Earle said.

In addition to winning races, Archer won several honors at the Historics, including Postwar Awards for his Cobra and his McLaren. He was also recognized for best presentation and performance within his race group.

"He probably should have gotten more, but you have to share," Earle said.

Fellow vintage racer Jimmy Castle Jr., who as a kid played with Archer in Pebble Beach in the early 1960s, lost touch with his childhood friend for 30 years following a move to Hawaii and military service. They reconnected at the Historics.

"I got to know him pretty well these past few years, racing and designing," Castle said.

"I never heard him complain — he was a gentleman," he continued. "And everybody that knew him well is deeply saddened by his loss."

Finding Bertha

Eric Bernhard, who befriended the motorcycle-riding Archer in the 1960s, went to work for him in the mid 1980s when he was heading a professional motorcycle racing team.

"After a year or so, he disbanded the motorcycle team and decided he was going to spend the money on himself instead of somebody else

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After Shreve "Mac" Archer III finished first in a particularly exciting race at the Historics in 2001, he posed for a photo with his youngest son, Shreve Archer IV. The younger Shreve, now 13, is taking after his dad not in name only — he likes to race as well.

who always complained about the equipment," he said.

Archer opted for vintage racing, and Bernhard went car hunting on his behalf. After a fruitless stop in Texas, he found the Cobra in Vineland, N.J., and drove it back to California.

"He bought 'Bertha' by wire transfer, relying on my description of the car," Bernhard recalled. "It was basically an average condition street car. It never had a real racing history."

Many years after buying the Cobra, a fender bender at Laguna Seca revealed some of the truth of the car's history, according to Bernhard. "It had been wrecked in almost every way," he said. Even its frame showed damage.

But they rebuilt the car, and it continued to be competitive for Archer. Up through last year, Archer raced Old Bertha in every year's Historics, except the one time he decided to bring his McLaren instead. president, while Bernhard "was the practical guy." Tapping into Archer's medical knowledge, racing experience and desire to make a difference, the duo worked on safety products for cars, motorcycles and jets.

"We would talk about what would work and what wouldn't, and I would try to turn the idea into something we could construct," Bernhard said.

For the U.S. Air Force, they created helmets that would lessen the impact generated by ejection from jets.

Prior to that, Archer created a back protector for motorcycle racers, who often suffer spinal damage during crashes.

"He patented the idea of flexible armor that protected the spinal cord," Bernhard said. The back protector — now standard gear for any racer and many street riders deflects the force of an impact to the soft tissue on each side of the spine. into safety for historic racing," Earle said. "You really got straight, honest and experienced answers."


Born in St. Paul, Minn., in September 1948, Archer was also a descendent of the Doud family and attended the University of California at Santa Cruz and Claremont Men's College before obtaining his medical degree from the University of Miami in 1979. As a physician, he distinguished himself in the treatment, study and funding of programs deal-

In 2006, Mac Archer piloted his Cobra, nicknamed Old Bertha, around Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca in what would end up being his final Monterey Historic Automobile Races. His death in June leaves a gap not only on the grid, but in the sport.

Archer also designed an air bag for a motorcycle helmet and that would stabilize the neck in a crash. And he was instrumental in the development of the extractable seat used in all contemporary Formula 1 racecars.

Finally, Archer and Bernhard collaborated on a high-end child safety seat that moves on tracks to reduce g-load and also protects the head.

"That was the biggest thing he worked on recently," Bernhard said.

Earle said he had been anticipating collaborating with Archer on safety improvements in his sport.

"He was one I was looking forward to turning to as we get deeper ing with shaken baby syndrome, as well as traumatic brain and spinal injury.

As a pediatrician, "parents just loved him, and children, too," Bernhard said. "He was born as a wealthy child — he could have been a trust fund kid the rest of his life but he had a tremendous amount of drive to make a contribution."

Bernhard also said his friend made a strong impression toward the end of his life — as he fought to survive.

Archer is survived by his wife, Kim, and two sons, Damon and Shreve IV — who reportedly "wants to be a racing driver, like his dad."







is back to his first love.

"I had been around racing since I was in my early 20s," he said. "But I didn't get to start racing until I was 40 years old (in 1989), because by then the kids were old enough and I had a little free time and a few extra bucks, and my wife, Judy, said, 'Go ahead.""

Finally behind the wheel, Zurlinden competed in various Sports Car Club of America classes for 12 years.

"Then I had a really bad accident in March '01 in a Formula Ford at SPEED World Challenge Touring Car Series.

"I went to just about all the races with him: Sebring, Mosport, Mid-Ohio, Road America at Elkhart Lake, Lime Rock," he said. "It was cool. They paid all my expenses, but they didn't pay me. It was a very tight budget, but at least they had a budget.'

Back home, Zurlinden began helping his friend, Peninsula resident Rob Manson, with his cars.

"I still had my tools and trailer, and was bored sitting around," Zurlinden recalled.

Now he has two Brabhams and is driving again — but in the not-quiteso-competitive world of vintage racıng.

collectibles and technology."

The 40 exhibitors dealing in rare automotive collectibles and memorabilia will offer for a variety of items for sale including auto parts, original poster art, books and literature, fine art, photography, posters and luxury items.


"We have a man coming from Germany who creates sculptures of unrestored automobiles," Leach said. "They are miniature scale."

Sears Point," he said.

"Because of the respect for cars, you dial it back a couple of clicks,' he said.

It's not unusual for a faster driver to wait behind a slower one until it's less risky to pass.

"Having done many years of the real competitive stuff, I enjoy this much, much more, and I enjoy it more than I ever thought I would," he said. "Club racers think vintage guys are just driving around, but there are a lot of guys out there who are going hard, and that's what makes it fun. You just don't want to have contact."

memorating a Ferrari GTO using metal discarded from the car during restoration."

Bennett's sculptures of a Jaguar D-type list for nearly \$10,000.

Also on hand will be Michael Mendocino from Cheyenne, Wyo., who sells vintage items that car collectors and enthusiasts often use to decorate their garages to create a certain ambiance.

"He represents a category called petromobilia, which is vintage gas station items," Leach said. "He has glass globe pumps as well as gas cans and other collectibles related to early gas stations."

"We also have some categories that are of interest to collectors that go beyond cars," she said.

And for the first time, RetroAuto will also feature an exhibit of Vespas brought in from Il Motorino in Santa Cruz. It's the first time a scooter dealer has exhibited there, Leach said.

RetroAuto is located immediately adjacent to the main pedestrian entrance to the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance. On Aug. 17 the event runs from 10 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.; Aug. 18, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Aug. 19 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The event, which Ockert said is similar to a private party, although it's open to the public, is growing every year.





EBBLE BEACH might be golf's most fabled destination, but to an ever-growing group of painters, sculptors and collectors, the upscale community is also home to the biggest event in automotive fine art.

This week, the 18th Fairway at Pebble Beach will host the 22nd annual exhibit of the Automotive Fine Arts Society. The event is part of the 57th annual Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

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
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


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

Bruce Wheeler and Nicola Wood.

At Pebble Beach, these artists present new works in a variety of mediums, including watercolors, acrylics, oils, gouache, pen & ink, clay, wood and metals.

"The entire show is brand new every year," explained Ken Eberts of Temecula, president of the AFAS.

Founded in 1984, the AFAS has just 32 members, but they are some of the world's finest automotive artists. Their first exhibit as a group was hosted by the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance in 1986.

The artists — who come from England, Germany, France and Canada, as well as the U.S. — will be on hand to celebrate their favorite subject, the art of automotive design.

"Cars are designed by artists," Eberts offered. "Their bodies are essentially functional sculpture."

For most of the participating artists, a love of cars has been a lifetime journey.

"As a kid, I grew up in the Bronx," Eberts recalled. "Living among concrete, bricks and asphalt, the only thing that would catch my eye were the cars."

Many of the participating artists were able to parlay their creative skills and their affection for cars into careers as automotive designers. Both Mayer and Eberts worked for Ford in that capacity.


But, like many of his contemporaries, Eberts wasn't ready to give up his love of cars when he retired.

"I missed cars," he conceded. "So I started doing paintings of them. Then I found someone who was interested in selling them. That's how I got started."

Bill Neale, a resident of Dallas, Tx., and a founding member of the AFAS, turned to painting cars after a career as a commercial artist in the advertising industry.

"I've always painted cars and airplanes," Neale explained. "That's what got me into the advertising business as an illustrator. Now I'm retired and I paint full-time."

It's not surprising that the artists — many of whom are retired or seniors - would turn to an ear-

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lier era for creative inspiration.

"Some of us are like historians," Maher said. "We're creating snapshots in time."

Plus, it's easy to get nostalgic about antique car designs, which placed a greater emphasis of creativity and refinement than is usually seen today.

"I'm probably dating myself, but there just aren't as many drop-dead beautiful cars as there used to be," Maher added.

He said automotive design reached its artistic peak decades ago.

"1932 was a great year for car design," he recounted. "1955 was a fabulous year for American cars. The mid-60s weren't too bad either. They spawned the muscle cars."

The diversity of contemporary and vintage car designs provide artists with a seemingly endless source of subject matter. Throw in a variety of mediums and styles, and you have the recipe for a fascinating and dynamic fine art exhibit. "Everybody has their own way of looking at something," Maher offered. "To see the same car depicted by different artists is really interesting." While automotive art is the subject of the ASAF gathering, most members are simply thrilled to be coming to Pebble Beach. "We've been traveling to Pebble Beach for many years," Neale said. "It's the single most important show for ASAF members, and we've made a lot of friends there."

Eberts has been attending the Pebble Beach show since its inception.

"It's the top automotive art show in the world," he said. "It's really an honor to be there."

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


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CONCOURS WEEK

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November 5, 1950: The first Pebble Beach Road Race and Concours d'Elegance were held. Phil Hill won the Road Race through Del Monte Forest, driving a Jaguar XK120. Best of Show at the Concours went to Sterling Edwards' 1950 Edwards R-26 Special Sport Roadster. Fewer than forty cars were exhibited: prewar cars, postwar cars, and MGs. Local resident Alton Walker served as Concours Chairman.

1951: In its second year, the Concours' Best of Show winner was Mrs. Charles H. Hornberg's 1951 Jaguar Mark VII Saloon.

1952: The Concours moved from the Beach Club to the lawn of Del Monte Lodge. Classes increased, and cars were distinguished based on cost and type. Again this year, the Best of Show winner was a new car: Glen Sorey's 1952 Jaguar XK120 Fixed Head Coupé.

1953: Concours entries exceeded 100 for the first time. The Concours also hosted its first special exhibition — two winners of the Carrera Panamericana (the Mexican Road Race). Best of Show was Peter Clowes' 1953 Austin Healey 100.

1954: Lucius Beebe joins the team of Concours judges. Best of Show was again a 1952 Jaguar XK120 Fixed Head Coupé, this time owned by Barclay Cotter.

1955: For the first time, Best of Show was a classic: Phil Hill's 1931 Pierce-Arrow 41 LeBaron Convertible Town Cabriolet.

1956: The Road Races and the Concours were held together at in Del Monte Forest for the last time. Ernie McAfee lost control of a 1955 Ferrari 121LM Scaglietti Spyder during the races, hit a tree, and died. Dr. Milton R. Roth won Best of Show for his 1930 Bugatti Type 37 Grand Prix.

1957: The races moved to Laguna Seca. On its own, the Concours still attracted 10,000 spectators. Best of Show was Frank B. Cox's 1937 Rolls-Royce Phantom III Mulliner Sedanca de Ville.

1958: The first poster to advertise the Concours appeared, an awards ramp was built, and class categories distinguished classics from antique and vintage cars for the first time. Rolls-Royce also became the first marque to get its own ongoing class. J. B. Nethercutt's 1930 duPont Model G Merrimac Town Car won Best of Show, setting a new standard for excellence in automotive restorations.

1959: J. B. Nethercutt's 1939 Bugatti Type 57C Atalante was Best of Show.

1960: The Concours was canceled due to

1965: Bad weather again forced the Concours to be held near the stables. The winner of Best in Show was Christopher F. Coburn with his 1927 Bentley 4-1/2 Litre Vanden Plas Tourer.

1966: Judge Lucius Beebe died prior to the Concours and a new trophy established in his name was first awarded to Robert A. Davies' 1934 Rolls-Royce Phantom II. Eldon Dedini created two posters for the Concours. His original art was offered as a gate prize, while posters were sold to the public for charity. William Harrah won his third Best in Show with a 1931 Bugatti Type 41 Coupé de Ville

1967: Bob Hope took to the stage for a full 45 minutes to entertain the Concours crowd. A 1937 Rolls-Royce Phantom III H. J. Mulliner Sports Saloon, owned by Ralph C. Shermund, was Best in Show.

1968: Gwenn Graham, who oversaw the Concours throughout its early years, died, and Carol Rissel took over. For the ensuing three years, the Concours bears Graham's name. Best in Show was Stanley W. Good's 1964 Maserati Mistral Coupé.

1970: A class devoted to MGs and became a regular offering. Best in Show: J. B. Nethercutt's 1931 Daimler Royal Double 6 Limousine.

1971: A 1927 Mercedes-Benz S Three Door Tourer, owned by Owen Ownes, was Best in Show.

1972: Lorin Tryon and Jules "J." Heumann (who also won Best in Show with his 1922 Hispano-Suiza H6B Labourdette Skiff/Torpedo) agreed to serve as Co-Chairmen of the Concours. Separate groups of Class and Honorary Judges were established, with Strother MacMinn named Chief Honorary Judge. The first "Elegance" award was established in Gwenn Graham's name, and it was initially awarded to Ken Vaughn's 1934 Packard Twelve Derham Sedan. Donations go to Guide Dogs for the Blind.

1973: For the first time, there were special classes for Duesenbergs and postwar Ferraris. Both became fairly regular offerings. Best in Show was won by Mrs. Marilyn Chandler, whose family owned the Los Angeles Times, with her 1939 Mercedes-Benz 540K Special Cabriolet.

1974: The first Monterey Historic Automobile Races were held at Laguna Seca in tandem with the Concours, and the Concours honored some cars from the races. The Pebble Beach Cup was first presented to Robert Ames' 1951 HRG. The first Hans Tanner Trophy for best Ferrari went to Stephen Griswold's 1952 Ferrari 212 Touring Roadster. United Way of Monterey County becomes the principal recipient of Concours proceeds. Best in Show was M. L. Post's 1929 Rolls-Royce Phantom I Brewster Regent. After the Concours concluded, a mishap occurred: a fire engine filled with water pulled onto the Concours ramp, and it collapsed. awarded to Mr. & Mrs. C. Gooding's 1932 Packard 903 Dual Cowl Phaeton, and the first Charles A. Chayne Trophy for most significant engineering was awarded to Kent Wakeford's 1925 Lancia Lambda Casaro Roadster. Best in Show went to Mr. & Mrs. Phil Hill for their 1927 Packard 343 Murphy Convertible Sedan.

1980: The first class of 16-cylinder cars was offered. Two Gwenn Graham awards were presented: Matt Browning's 1931 Pierce-Arrow 41 LeBaron Sport Sedan was named Most Elegant Closed Car, and Bill Hinds' 1937 Delahaye 135M Figoni et Falaschi Cabriolet was named Most Elegant Convertible. J. B. Nethercutt won another Best in Show with his 1933 Duesenberg SJ Rollston Arlington Torpedo Sedan.

1981: Briggs Cunningham and his creations were honored. Hispano-Suiza was featured, with J12s taking to the field in numbers. Best in Show was Terry Radey's 1929 Duesenberg J Murphy Convertible Coupé.

1982: Delahaye and Delage were featured. There was also a class for Porsche. The first Montagu of Beaulieu Trophy was presented to Neil Breton's 1939 Alvis Speed 25 Charlesworth Tourer. Best in Show: Tom & Gerd Perkins' 1935 Mercedes-Benz 500K Special Roadster.

1983: Isotta Fraschini was featured, with early Fords also filling a special class, while a class for Packard became a regular offering. The Co-Chairmen's Trophy was first awarded to George Wingard's 1913 Isotta Fraschini Tipo KM4 Roadster. Best in Show went to Irwin Ginsberg for his 1930 Isotta Fraschini Tipo 8A SS Castagna Dual Cowl Phaeton.

1984: Talbot-Lago was featured. The first Ansel Adams Trophy for most desirable touring car went to Orland Wiseman's 1911 Pierce-Arrow 6-48 Tourer. The first French Cup was awarded to Pat Hart's 1938 Talbot-Lago T150-SS Figoni et Falaschi Coupé. Mr. & Mrs. Kenneth Vaughn took Best in Show with their 1929 Cunningham V5410 All Weather Cabriolet.

1985: All six Bugatti Royales were united for the first time at Pebble Beach — an amazing feat that underscored the Concours' status as the top event of its kind. There were also classes for Lincoln and Alfa Romeo. Jack Becronis' 1939 Bugatti Type 57 Saoutchik Cabriolet won Best in Show.

1986: The centennial of Mercedes-Benz was honored. The American Underslung was also featured and Duesenbergs were on the field in substantial numbers. The first Alec Ulmann Trophy for most significant Hispano-Suiza was awarded to the Blackhawk Collection's 1924 Hispano-Suiza H6C Nieuport Boattail Skiff. The Concours hosted the first annual AFAS exhibition, and an automobile auction also took place in nearby Monterey. During the Concours, when Juan Manuel Fangio and Stirling Moss drove up the ramp in a replica of Carl Benz's Patent Motor Wagon, they very nearly tipped over. Arturo Keller's 1936 Mercedes-Benz 500K Special Roadster won Best in Show.

1961: For the first time, the Concours requested a one-dollar donation from those in attendance to benefit the Monterey Peninsula Hospital Auxiliary. Scott Newhall's 1930 Packard 740 Roadster was Best in Show.

1962: Best in Show: Alton H. Walker's 1913 Rolls-Royce Silver Ghost Tourer.

1963: Bad weather forced the Concours to be held near the stables. A special class of Aston Martins were exhibited. Best in Show went to William Harrah 1931 Pierce-Arrow 41 LeBaron Sport Sedan.

1964: Bentley gained ongoing recognition. For much of the remainder of the decade, three classes were devoted to Rolls-Royce and two to Bentley. William Harrah again won Best in Show, this time with a 1935 Bugatti Type 50 Coupé Profilé. 1975: The Concours celebrated its 25th anniversary. Merv Griffin auctioned off the year's poster. Best in Show was Robert Milhous' 1934 Packard 1101 Convertible Victoria.

1976: Bugatti was featured. Appropriately, Best in Show was a 1937 Bugatti Type 57SC Atalante owned by William Harrah.

1978: Mercedes-Benz was featured. Mr. & Mrs. Phil Hill won Best in Show with their 1927 Packard 343 Murphy Convertible Sedan


1979: Rolls-Royce and Bentley were featured, and Mrs. W. O. (Margaret) Bentley was on hand to present special awards to those cars. The first Briggs Cunningham Trophy for most exciting car was 1987: Bentley 8 Litres and Cord L-29s were featured. The first Mercedes-Benz Trophy was awarded to Frank Cherry's 1935 Mercedes-Benz 500K Roadster. Carol Rissel retired after overseeing the Concours for nearly two decades. Thomas Lester's 1928 Minerva AF Ostruk Berline Transformable was Best in Show.

1988: Hispano-Suiza J12s were on special display,

Meeting his hero

Last year, the Monterey Historics honored Sir Jack Brabham, the champion racer who built Zurlinden's car.

"In 1960, I got to go to the Times Grand Prix at Riverside and saw Jack Brabham win — before he was a Sir," said Zurlinden. "To own two of his cars - he was one of my heroes when I was a kid."

He calls his other Brabham, a 1969 BT29 Formula B car, his "E-ticket ride." It has a larger motor and turns almost 200 horsepower, compared with the smaller car's 120.

Both are fun to drive. While the BT29 has more power, the Formula Jr. is "quick and slides around on those skinny tires."


At Laguna Seca, Zurlinden's favorite stretch runs from the flat and fast Turn 4 to the top of the

American Dream cars were also on display. Sandra Kasky, who had worked with the Concours since joining Pebble Beach Company in 1985, was named Director of Special Events for Pebble Beach Company. Best in Show went to a 1922 Hispano-Suiza H6B Labourdette Skiff owned by Robert L. Meyer.

1990: Giotto Bizzarrini was honored, veterans of the Brighton Run were on display, and more dream cars were exhibited. The Christie's auction and the Blackhawk Exposition joined the roster of Pebble Beach Weekend events. The Strother MacMinn Student Endowment Fund was also established. Fashion guru Ralph Lauren won Best in Show for his 1938 Bugatti Type 57SC Atlantic.

1991: Rolls-Royce, Pierce-Arrow, and Siata were featured. Sam & Emily Mann of Englewood, New Jersey, who would also take top honors at the 1996, 2002 and 2005 Concours, won Best in Show in 1991 with their 1932 Chrysler CH LeBaron Speedster.

1992: Sandra Kasky agreed to serve as the Concours' first full-time Executive Director. Delahaye and Talbot-Lago were featured, and there were special classes for Facel Vega and Jaguar. J. B. Nethercutt earned a record sixth Best of Show award, this time with a 1929 Rolls-Royce Phantom II Brewster Town Brougham. (Nethercutt's outstanding collection, including several Pebble Beach Concours Best of Show winners, is now housed in a museum in Sylmar.)

1993: Pininfarina coachwork was onored, Lamborghini was featured, and there was a class for early Station Wagons. The first Tony Hulman Trophy for most significant open wheel race car went to Vic Yerardi's 1959 Ewing-Watson Dean Van Lines Special. Manufacturers were invited to display current concept cars, and this became a part of the Concours. Ralph Lauren won Best of Show again with his Ralph 1930 Mercedes-Benz SSK Count Trossi Sports 2-Seater.

1996: Lincoln was featured, Zagato coachwork was on display, and there was a class for American Sports Cars. The Hans Tanner Trophy was renamed in honor of Luigi Chinetti. Sam & Emily Mann were back on the Best in Show podium with their 1938 Delage D8-120 De Villars Cabriolet.

1997: The centennial of Oldsmobile and the golden

anniversary of Ferrari were celebrated, steam cars and Aston Martin were featured, and designer Tom Tjaarda was honored. Hot Rods take to the field for the first time, and the first Dean Batchelor Trophy for most significant hot rod went to Bruce Meyer's 1932 Doane Spence Ford Roadster. There was even a class for Micro Cars. Businessman William E. Connor II of Hong Kong won Best in Show with a 1937 Talbot-Lago T150C Figoni et Falaschi Coupé.

1998: The first Tour d'Elegance was held just prior to the Concours and was an immediate success. The first Elegance in Motion Trophy was subsequently presented to Bruce Meyer's 1937 Bugatti Type 57C Ventoux. Minerva. Derby Bentley was featured, designer Sergio Scaglietti was honored, and Porsche celebrated its golden anniversary. Best in Show went to John Mozart of Palo Alto and his 1938 Bugatti Type 57SC Corsica Roadster

1999: Lorin Tryon died prior to the Concours, and J. Heumann served as sole Chairman. Glenn Mounger and Ed Gilbertson join the Executive Committee. The Lorin Tryon Trophy was established to recognize longtime contributors to the Concours, and it was first presented to Don Williams of Blackhawk. Packard, Auto Union, Lagonda, Morgan, and the Maserati 5000GT were featured.

The first FIVA Trophy for best preserved car went to Jay M. Eitel's 1933 Marmon V16 LeBaron Victoria. G. Lingenbrink and Charles Bronson took Best in Show with a 1932 Daimler Double Six Martin Walter Sport Saloon.

Walnut Creek won Best in Show with their 1937 Delahaye 135 M Figoni et Falaschi Cabriolet

2001: The centennials of the first Mercedes and of Ford Racing were celebrated. The likely real Blue Train was unveiled among the many vintage Bentleys on the field. Chrysler Town

2004: The 100th anniversary of Rolls-Royce was celebrated as well as the centennial of Hispano-Suiza, the French-built luxury vehicle. The event also showcased the finest collection of Ferraris ever assembled. Best of Show went to Joseph C. Cassini III's 1938 Horch 853A Erdmann & Rossi Sport Cabriolet.

2005: The Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance honored Alfa Romeo and the 75th anniversary of Carrozzeria Pinin Farina. Sam and Emily Mann won Best in Show again (fourth time) with their 1937 Delage D8-120 S Pourtout Aero Coupé.

2006: After 175 cars competed in the 56th Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, a 1931 Daimler Double-Six 50 Corsica Drophead Coupe, one of only four such vehicles ever produced, was named Best in Show. The owner was Robert Lee of Reno, Nevada.



1994: Ferraris took to the field in numbers, Pegaso was featured, and the coachwork of Touring was also on display. Terence & Mary Beth Adderley's 1933 Duesenberg J Rollston Torpedo Convertible Victoria was Best in Show.

1995: Rolls-Royce and Iso Rivolta

2000: The Concours celebrated its golden anniversary. J. Heumann stepped became Chairman Emeritus, Glenn Mounger agreed to serve as Chairman. Concours and Ed Gilbertson was named to the new position of Chief Judge.

A selection of past Best of Show winners and Road Race standouts were positioned at water's edge. Teardrops and Boattails and Maseratis were all featured.

The first Classic Car Club of America Trophy went to Otis Chandler's 1934 Packard 1108 Bohman & Schwartz Town Car. Jacques and Betty Harguindeguy of

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
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
