

Oak disease draws international researchers

LIKE PINE pitch canker, sudden oak death is a disease that has destroyed thousands of trees in Monterey County. But unlike pine pitch canker - which stirred widespread controversy a decade ago amid fears it would wipe out entire forests - sudden oak death has gone largely unnoticed by most local residents.

But the devastation of Monterey County's tanbark oaks has not escaped researchers. This week, international experts who study Phytophthora — a genus that includes the pathogen that causes sudden oak death --- met at the Asilomar Conference Center in Pacific Grove. Representing 17 different countries, the researchers traveled to Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park and Carmel Valley's Mitteldorf Preserve to observe firsthand the effects of the disease.

"Sudden Oak Death went through Pfeiffer

Big Sur State Park three or four years ago," explained David Rizzo, a forest pathologist and a professor at UC Davis. "If you walk to Pfeiffer Falls, you can see giant holes in the forest where trees have died."

But on 1,100 acres of Carmel Valley's most precious tanbark oak forest, the effects of the disease are just beginning to emerge.

"Sudden oak death just reached the Mitteldorf Preserve," Rizzo said. "You can see thousands of bright red trees that just died."

With most local residents living beneath or near a canopy of Monterey pines, the effects of pine pitch canker were difficult to ignore. Tanbark oaks, however, unlike the

> California coast live oak, are not often found in residential neighborhoods. And while the live oak can be affected by sudden oak death, it is the tanbark oak, a tree that is common along the watersheds that spill out the local Santa Lucia mountains, that has suffered the most.

Just one of many related pathogens

Many of the researchers attending this week's conference on Phytophthoras come from places where there are no tanbark oaks. But the experts are interested in studying sudden oak death because related Phytophthoras are

WATER BOARD CANDIDATES AGREE: NEW SUPPLY BADLY NEEDED

THE FOUR candidates running for two seats on the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District's board of directors have varying backgrounds but all say they are committed to one objective - finding a drought-free water supply.

On Nov. 6, Peninsula residents will decide whether to vote for Regina Doyle or Lee Yarborough for District 4, which includes Pacific Grove and Del Monte Forest, and Bob Brower and Lance Monosoff for District 5, an area covering Carmel and Carmel Valley.

Clearly, the biggest issue facing prospective water board members is finding an alternative source to the Carmel River, which is being overpumped by water provider California American Water Co. For a dozen years, the company has been under a state order to find an alternative water project to supply its customers.

Division 5 director Larry Foy, who will be replaced by either Brower or Monosoff, said the new directors will have the challenging task of deciding which alternative water project and supplemental projects are best suited for the Peninsula — not an easy task.

"We have several projects in the mix right now," said Foy, who believes a desalination plant is the solution to overpumping of the Carmel River.

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Security cameras to be installed at sewage treatment plant

IN AN effort to prevent sabotage from terrorists or mischief from teenagers, security cameras that can be monitored remotely from laptop computers will be installed at the Carmel Area Wastewater District treatment plant.

Multiple cameras will be placed at various locations throughout the plant, including the lab, chlorine storage facility, front gates and parking lot.

"It allows us to look at areas of the treatment plant at any



time when we get an alarm," said CAWD general manager Ray von Dohren. "Our operators will be able to turn on their laptop and call up the camera and look at the treatment plant in real time to see what the intrusion might be."

The \$35,000 camera system, to be installed within a few months, was unanimously approved July 26 by CAWD's board of directors. The cameras will help detect intruders animal or human — at the sewage treatment plant, located on the north bank of the Carmel River between Highway 1 and the Pacific Ocean.

"We had planned on putting in a security system for quite a while," von Dohren said.

Although the CAWD plant seems an unlikely target for terrorists, the security upgrade is just one of many being performed at power plants and water treatment plants across the nation.





Did you know...

The Department of Homeland Security this year warned U.S. chemical plants and bomb squads to guard against terrorist-manufactured chlorine truck bombs, which have recently been used in Iraq.

And the Chlorine Institute, according to Homeland Security, reported to the FBI several thefts or attempted thefts of 150-pound chlorine tanks from water treatment plants in California.

Although CAWD's chlorine, used to kill bacteria in treated sewage, is stored in 1 ton tanks, making theft unlikely, the cameras could prevent possible sabotage.

"We do have to worry about this stuff," von Dohren said.

The cameras, which will be mounted on poles or buildings, will also prevent any sort of mischief that might occur at the plant.

"We have had indications of people coming here — kids playing around and leaving stuff around," he said.

The security system will be integrated into CAWD's computer system. The plant's workers will be able to monitor the plant from home even if they get a call at 3 a.m.

"We have teams of two people each on standby for 10 days," he said. "If they get a call in the middle of the night, they are responsible for taking care of it."

And if it's just an animal that happens to trip the alarm, the employee on standby will be able to reset the alarm from home via laptop. If it's a human intruder, a CAWD employee will call the Monterey County Sheriff's Office and request a deputy respond to the incident.

"It keeps our operator from running down there in the middle of the night, and that saves money," von Dohren said.


The new system will require extensive modification of software and hardware, he said.

The camera system is part of CAWD's capital improvement plan. CAWD's insurance company, in an effort to keep premiums low, suggested installing the system, von Dohren said.











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Canine calendar contenders invited to strut stuff at casting

SPURRED ON by its "howlingly successful" inaugural 2007 calendar, the city will hold a 2008 Dog Calendar Casting Call at Carmel Beach next Saturday afternoon. Last year, more than 300 local canines competed to charm the judges into granting them immortality — or at least a little fame and some good press for their town while raising money for the SPCA of Monterey County — by appearing in the calendar.

During the Sept. 8 event, the dogs will come under the tough scrutiny of writer, producer and director Walt deFaria, Cypress Inn and poodle owner Denny LeVett, and Sherrie McCullough, the judges who "will evaluate contestants on personality, charm, face and first impression," according to ad man Jeff Burghardt, who holds the city's

marketing/economic development contracts and conceived the calendar concept.

KSBW-TV news anchor Erin Clark will again preside over the competition, which is being sponsored by BARk, "the dog culture magazine." The casting call will be open to all dogs living in the 93921, 93922, 93923 and 93924 zip codes.

"What the judges are looking for is anyone's guess," Burghardt counseled contenders. "So put your best paw forward and just be yourself."

Carmel has long been considered one of

the nation's top dog-friendly towns. Retailers cater to canines almost as much as they do humans. Restaurants offer outdoor seating for pups alongside people, the Cypress Inn is famous for its afternoon tea featuring decadent drinks and treats for four-legged as well as two-legged customers, and every other Ocean Avenue shop seemingly has a water bowl outside and biscuits inside. Robbie, the mayoral pooch, recently enjoyed his film debut when a 15-minute documentary about his daily life was shown in city hall and turned into a five-minute podcast for the city's www.carmelcalifornia.com website.

And The Pine Cone has profiled personable dogs in its Sandy Claws column, penned by Margot Petit Nichols, almost weekly for more than a decade.


School and 1982 graduate of Cal State Long Beach. He was a member of Sons of the American Legion in Carmel.

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Firefighters rescue trapped cop



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

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Half of Sunset board set to resign

THEY INSIST it's not a mass exodus and that they're leaving because things are going so well — not so badly — but with the Aug. 21 resignation of the Sunset Cultural Center board's chairman, and three other trustees expected to retire when their terms end in October, more change is in store for Carmel's crown jewel. The center is also preparing for the arrival of a new general manager to replace Jack Globenfelt, who came on board in January 2005 and announced in May he would be leaving in September.

"I'm concerned that we not give people the idea there's an implosion," said Jim Price, who helped form the nonprofit contracted in 2004 to run Sunset, was the board's first chairman and assumed that role again

after Perry Walker's departure. "In each case, my understanding was this has been contemplated for some time, and they felt we had brought the organization to a good place, with strong finances."

Price said serving on the board "takes an enormous amount of time," and with a year's worth of programming in place and more in the works, "we're in a position where people feel comfortable leaving without jeopardizing the business."

Walker, who tendered his resignation at last week's board meeting, said it was simply due

"It's kind of like being invited to a dinner party — there's a proper time to arrive and a proper time to leave," said Walker, a founding member and the board's chairman for more than two years. "When the dessert is finished and the coffee's cold, it's time to go." He said he felt comfortable moving on, considering the center's stable finances most recently illustrated by the fourth-quarter report showing a budget surplus of \$93,321 — a "solid staff," and performers scheduled for the coming year.

Walker also said the executive search committee, of which he was a member, is close to selecting Globenfelt's replacement. A consultant narrowed the field from 25 applicants to six candidates. Headed by Price, the committee also includes Sarah Brown, Dave Parker, and community members Roger Parkes and Graeme Robertson. The group interviewed the last of the prospective general managers this week and hopes to make an offer soon.

"Having those two responsibilities in one person gives continuity to things," Walker said of Price.

Back in black Brown, another founding board member who served as treasurer until trustee Michael McMahan took over about a year go, said she plans to retire when her first term ends in October. According to SCC bylaws, trustees may serve a maximum of two three-year terms.

"One thing I'm most pleased about is we've completed our first three-year contract with the city, and every year, we've been in the black," she said. This summer, the city and SCC opted to extend the contract another three years.

Brown said her decision to leave was not recent and, like Walker, she felt it was just the right time.

"I've done what I set out to do, and I do feel like SCC is stable and the center is moving along nicely," Brown said. "This has been a significant time commitment, and a very rewarding one, and it's been fun to tackle this."

When they began researching the the-

ater's operations in advance of proposing their contract, SCC members discovered several different city departments helped run it. Budget numbers were difficult to calculate, as each department reported its own Sunset-related expenses, and other costs were unknown.

"We have tried to use some business practices, and I think we've organized the Sunset administration in a little different way than when the city managed it," Brown said. "I'm actually quite proud of what we've done. There were a lot of unknowns, and we jumped in without knowing exactly what was coming."

Walker and Brown said they have enjoyed being part of SCC.

"It was a real privilege to do it. It's a great board, good people to work with, a great staff, and we did what we wanted to do," Walker said. "We brought in some very creative programming — a wide variety of quality cultural events. We

laid a good foundation, and that was a lot of fun. It's something I was glad to do for Carmel and for Sunset."

Brown and Price said they are aware of other board members who intend to resign at the annual meeting in October.

"There are different reasons for each, and I certainly don't want it to seem like there's a mass exodus, because it's not the case," Brown said.

Karen Kadushin, an original board member and SCC's first secretary, reportedly intends to leave, as does Katherine Bucquet. Neither could be reached for comment.

Other founding trustees who have already left and were replaced are Fred O'Such, Gary Luce and Demi Briscoe. According to the nonprofit's bylaws, one-third of the nine people must live in Carmel-by-the-Sea, and another third must reside in Monterey County. The departing members' replacements will be selected by the board, which also includes Steven Hillyard and Deanna Adolph.

Although their seats will be occupied by others, Brown and Walker said they plan to remain involved as part of Sunset Center's Producers' Guild, which was "created to act in concert with SCC to share the joys and risks of live-entertainment programming."

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"Sunset is Sunset — you can't divorce yourself from the place," explained Walker, who is also president of the Carmel Rotary club.

"I would love to continue to support Sunset Center and its programs," said Brown, who is also active in the Carmel-bythe-Sea Garden Club. "And I will continue to attend events and support SCC in any way I can."

Man sues over neighborhood 'eyesore'

m A}$ PACIFIC Grove man is suing the City of Pacific Grove because he says officials have refused to enforce a public nuisance ordinance over his neighbor's unsightly property.

In the lawsuit filed July 27 in Monterey County Superior Court, James Willoughby wants the city to order his neighbor on the 1200 block of Shell Avenue to clean up his property.

The city has "totally destroyed the ambiance of the neighborhood and interfered with the enjoyment of my property," Willoughby told The Pine Cone.

He contends his neighbor didn't have permits when he bulldozed the property in 2006 to make a parking space for a boat and a motorhome. The property is directly across from Willoughby's dining room window.

"The car has not been registered for seven years," he noted in the small claims suit. "The unauthorized grading is an eyesore in the neighborhood."

The complaint seeks to "remove the illegal storage of vehicles and restore the land to what it was before the excavation, and to meet all city codes."


But city attorney Dave Laredo said Willoughby should sue his neighbor over the blight, not the city.

"The bottom line is he would like the city to undertake an effort hat he is able and legally entitled to do himself," Laredo said. "He could sue the neighbor for the same theories he is suing us for."

But Willoughby said his dispute isn't so much with his neighbor as it is with the city for not upholding the law.

"The city manager is responsible for enforcing all ordinances," he said. "He doesn't have the right to choose which ones he is going to enforce and which ones he is not."

Besides weighing several desalination plant proposals, an aquifer storage and recovery project, and increased water conservation methods, Foy said, the new directors will also have to look at the possibility of using reprocessed water for irrigation purposes, a project proposed by the Monterey Regional Water Pollution Control Agency.

District 5

Lance Monosoff, a 52-year-old Carmel resident and Sierra Club activist who has lived next to the Carmel River for the past 17 years, said he would like a desalination plant to help solve the Peninsula's water problems.

"Due to overpumping," said Monosoff, a real estate broker, "each summer the river changes from a living river into a dry riverbed. It is way past the time for a new water supply that does not rely on the Carmel River."

Aware of the possible fines that could be passed to ratepayers if Cal Am doesn't find a water supply alternative, Monosoff said at this point he's not sure of the best solution but, if elected, said he would find out.

"As both a resident and business owner, I am concerned about the costs to the residents of any water projects," he said. "At this time, it is unclear what the most economic desal plant would be to the consumer."

If elected, Monosoff, who currently serves on the Sierra Club's State of California Political Committee, said his priorities would be to implement a desal plant and establish a drought reserve.


Cal Am and Pajaro Sunny/Mesa Community Services District have proposed desalination plants in Moss Landing, while Cal Am has also agreed to consider a subsurface desal plant in Marina. Another company has proposed a shipboard desal operation.

Some of Monosoff's colleagues in the Sierra Club oppose certain types of desal operations because of their effect on the coastal environment. Others don't want a desal plant at all because it could promote growth.

"As an environmental activist," Monosoff said, "I have experience in environmental protection. I won't just talk about protecting the environment, I'll do something about it."

Monosoff said his supporters include former Assembly man Fred Keeley, Bill Monning, and current water board directors Kristi Markey and Judi Lehman.

Bob Brower, owner of Chateau Julien Wine Estate, who



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oversees 30 employees, said he hopes to bring a "fresh approach" to the water board.

"I think the biggest thing I bring is leadership," Brower said. "I believe I have some great managerial and leadership skills. I have not only been on the Hospice board 11 years, I created a whole new Hospice and got on a financial footing."

Brower, 58, said he'll carry to the water board the skills he's learned in business.

"You charge us to basically get a reliable and replaceable water supply that reduces the amount of groundwater we are currently using," he said. "We can't hurt our environment, but at the same time we need water. I think I can bring some leadership skills to resolve some of these issues."

Brower, who moved to the Peninsula 27 years ago, said the Carmel River is in "terrible shape" but said he's not sure whether a desalination plant is the answer to offset the damage being done to the steelhead fish and red-legged frog in the Carmel River.

"I firmly believe that desal is part of the solution, but I don't believe it's all of the solution," Brower said. "I haven't looked at all of the proposals as they have been presented to the water management district."

Brower, who is being endorsed by Foy, said he believes there can be more conservation.

"We have nothing in the hopper that is going to add one

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drop of water," he said. "And if we have another dry year, this is going to be one barrel of worms. I don't think we are moving fast enough. I think we need to pick up the pace."

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



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

SLEEPLESSNESS AND SMOKING HURT GUMS

When researchers recently undertook a study to identify the biggest risks for poor oral health, they found that smoking was the leading factor to be associated with the progression of periodontal (gum) disease. More than 41 percent of the study's subjects with progressive gum disease were smokers. After that, a lack of sleep was found to be the second highest risk factor. Study subjects who got seven to eight hours of sleep nightly had less gum disease than those who slept six hours or less per night. The study, which also took factors such as nutrition, stress, hours worked, and eating breakfast into account, found that high stress levels and daily alcohol consumption also significantly impacted periodontal disease progression.

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P.S. A shortage of sleep may impair the body's immune response, which may lead to higher levels of gum disease.





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
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First Tee Open promises hot competition for pros, juniors

D NTERING ITS fourth year raising money and international awareness of a nonprofit that teaches children and teenagers life skills through the challenging game of golf, the Wal-Mart First Tee Open at Pebble Beach kicked off this week with a field full of fierce competitors.

First Tee Open practice rounds were held

Wednesday and Thursday, and a sold-out fundraiser set for Thursday night featured Hootie & the Blowfish lead singer Darius Rucker performing Frank Sinatra songs at a Monterey dinner presided over by Clint Eastwood, the tournament's chairman.

"The benefit concert — that's new for us," said Ollie Nutt, president and CEO of the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, which organizes the First Tee Open and the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

Another First Tee Open first occurred behind the scenes this year, Nutt reported: a sizable waiting list of amateur players.

"I remember the first year, talking to everyone I could," he said. "It speaks well for it that people want to come back."

Pebble's only female caddie: A First Tee grad and volunteer

AT AGE 20, Ashley Dickman is a standout in many ways. As Pebble Beach's only female caddie, she modestly says, "I think the only thing different is that my players may underestimate me when first meeting me on the tee box. I might have to work a little harder to gain their confidence."

Clad in the standard caddie-issue white shirt, khaki pants and signature Pebble Beach cap, she appears to be much like

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
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her fellow male caddies, except for her thick, blond pony tail extending out the back of her hat. At a closer glance, her Christian cross earrings are visible, and her athletic, slender build is apparent.

Aside from her attractive physical appearance, she's a standout in character and accomplishments, as she juggles her responsibilities on the California State University Monterey Bay women's golf team, her classes as a business major at CSUMB, and her

caddie job at Pebble Beach.

But it's The First Tee that has opened doors for Dickman. She grew up playing in the program and later was a First Tee volunteer, teaching and coaching in her hometown of Rocklin, just north of Sacramento.

"It was so rewarding teaching the juniors the real meaning of golf and how it relates to life," she says. "I

taught them how to play golf and, more importantly, the nine core values. Integrity is the value that stands out the most for me, because everything else builds on it."

The only golfer

"My dad inspired me to get into golf around the age 9," says Dickman, one of five children, but the only golfer. "I played a lot of sports, and golf was the one that stuck."

She played on her high school team, winning many competitions through the years, and was named Most Valuable Player her freshman and senior years.

As a result, she landed a partial golf scholarship from CSUMB and a \$1,000 scholarship from The First Tee. But moving to the Monterey Peninsula was a bit of a shock.

"I had only seen the ocean twice before," Dickman recalls. "I was pretty excited to be able to come down here,

and now I see the beach every day."

As a member of the CSUMB women's golf team, she manages a demanding tournament schedule and maintains her class schedule, along with her caddie job. She currently is not keeping a handicap, but says she shoots in the low 80s and sometimes breaks into the 70s with her bag of mix-brand clubs. "We play all over the United States, but the funny thing is, the best courses are right here!" she says with a bright, beaming smile.

Not just carrying bags

"I was not apprehensive or afraid at all," she says about her first day on the job at Pebble Beach. "I am used to sticking out like a sore thumb. I feel like I am one of the guys just in that I enjoy sports more than most women, especially golf. But then, I am quickly reminded how I want to go shop, tan and put on a little make-up," she says.

And she appreciates the complexities of her job.

"Being a caddie is not just about carrying bags. There's a lot to it," she says.

Along with all other caddies, she attended a rigorous training course before ever stepping out on the course — a training that added to her natural abilities.

"I have the physical strength to carry two bags, get to the player's ball before they do, provide course knowledge, give accurate yardage according to the conditions, recite rulings and read the greens well," she says.

project, Jim and Cindy McGillen, who have resided in Pebble Beach and Carmel for the past 30 years, were so impressed by the Sun Valley Writers Conference they haven't missed one session in the 15 years the event has been running.

"We have a second home in Sun Valley," McGillen said, "and I thought Carmel, with its literary history, would be just the venue for a similar festival. We've modeled our event on the fantastically popular annual Sun Valley Writers Conference. They have 1,000 tickets to sell, and they always sell out."

McGillen said tickets to the Carmel festival are limited to 705, and each ticket costs \$500, plus a small handling fee. "I'm so sure anyone attending the sessions will enjoy them, I'm guaranteeing it. If someone buys two tickets and that person sells two more tickets, I'll refund the price of the tickets if the festival isn't as compelling, inviting and entertaining as we've said it will be."

McGillen continued, "This is a challenge to the community. We want to have a full house at Sunset Center. We've put up over \$320,000 of our own capital to finance the festival — to rent the entire Sunset Center, to pay for speaking and travel fees for the major authors, accommodations for most and a luncheon for all attendees on Saturday."

Acknowledging the ticket price is steep, McGillen pointed out that a couple may split a ticket, with one person attending at a time. A concierge desk in Sunset lobby will be set up for this purpose.

"Further, those who can are encouraged to buy one more ticket than expected and donate it so that local educators and school children can attend," he said.

"The response to date has been overwhelming," McGillen continued. "Some people have called to order 10 tickets at a time and have even offered to host a dinner party." For the really enthusiastic, various donor categories have been set up, ranging from \$1,000 to \$20,000. McGillen, who is semi-retired, said, "Cindy and I consider this an investment in our community. If the festival is as successful as we anticipate, we want to schedule it every year, possibly for a full week of speakers. I want people to plan their vacations around this."

The McGillens have been involved in television. Cindy McGillen was president of the local NBC affiliate, KSBW-TV, for six years but retired 10 years ago. McGillen has produced movies and movies for television for years and still does projects now and then.

"If there is one thing I want to leave with your readers," McGillen said, "it's that those who attend will have an extremely enjoyable weekend. Frank McCourt will be the featured speaker the first night of the festival. He's a wonderful writer, but an even better speaker. He's funny and insightful. I think of him as a Mark Twain and Will Rogers rolled into one."

McGillen said they first met McCourt in Sun Valley and subsequently in Donegal, Ireland, where they own a farm.





presently wreaking havoc in many parts of the world. The devastation caused by *Phytophthoras* is also nothing new. The Irish potato famine of the mid-19th century was caused by a *Phytophthora*, and pathogens from the genus are suspected in the current die-off of European deciduous forests.

"There is a *Phytophthora* in West Australia," Rizzo explained. "It reduces forests to grasslands. It's really scary."

Locally, the deadly effects of sudden oak death can best be seen along the many creeks that pass beneath Highway 1 as it winds its way down the Big Sur Coast. Dense groves of redwoods, tanbark oaks and laurels typically shade the waterways, and anyone who hikes Big Sur's coastal canyons can't escape the presence of countless dead trees.

Curiously, it is the laurels that often pass the disease on to tanbark oaks. "Sudden oak death infects just about

everything, it just doesn't kill it," Rizzo said. "The laurels are one of the most important players in this whole thing. They get infected, but they don't die. And they're the ones that spread the disease."

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Mysterious music class among CUSD Adult School offerings

^cSENSE OF humor is the only prerequisite," for a music history/appreciation class to be offered Saturdays beginning Sept. 8 at the Carmel Foundation, according to instructor Scott MacClelland.

And since the course is offered through the Carmel Unified School District Adult School, students need not be members of the foundation to enroll.

"The tuition is \$25 per semester — a bargain for enjoying a 'concert' each week from his vast collection of CDs," reported Carol Stratton, who said MacClelland began teaching the course at the foundation 30 years ago but only recently passed his 55th birthday — the age required to join the nonprofit.

The teacher is well schooled in music, according to Stratton. A classical radio programmer and presenter for three decades, MacClelland also wrote a music column for The Pine Cone and "has written features and music criticism for all daily and weekly newspapers in the greater Monterey Bay area, and in the San Francisco Bay area." He also contributes to Strings Magazine and is program annotator for the Carmel Bach Festival.

Repeating the class

Over the years, his course topics have varied widely, focusing on opera, classical music and musicians, music history, composers and performers, jazz, world music and dance. Many students attend semester after semester, year after year, because of that variety, according to Stratton.

"Each semester begins with a general discussion among students that leads to the specific topics for that semester," she said. Past courses have included a video of the opera "Turandot," which was filmed at The Forbidden City in Beijing; demonstrations by a clarinetist, a French horn player and a cello player; a video series by Leonard Bernstein from his lectures at Harvard on the basics of music; a video of the Ambrose Thomas opera, "Hamlet;" sacred chant; an audio documentary on the life of Mozart, and South American composers.

"This gleaning is just to give you a flavor of the wide



diversity of subjects that we cover during the semester," said Stratton, who has attended the class for eight years.

Students and MacClelland meet Saturday mornings from 10 a.m. to noon in the Ruth Blanchard House on the southwest corner of Dolores and Eighth in downtown Carmel. People interested in attending must enroll through the CUSD Adult School, and MacClelland recommends they also purchase a copy of Michael Kennedy's Oxford Concise



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

Big Sur garage band cranks up the rock 'n' roll volume

ON ANY given summer day, it's easy to find a musician in Big Sur. Whether it's a conga drummer laying down a beat in a pullout along Highway 1, a gray-bearded flutist playing a riff in the Esalen hot tubs or an idealistic young folkie sitting on a redwood stump tuning his guitar, the sparsely populated coastal community is a mecca for wayward musicians. But one thing you almost never see in Big Sur is a homegrown rock 'n' roll band.

With dueling electric guitars and a charismatic lead singer whose stage antics make Mick Jagger look subdued, Olde Panther definitely qualifies as a rock 'n' roll band. And with five longtime local residents in tow, they're certainly homegrown.

Olde Panther's affinity for high energy and loud volume will be on full display when they play at Big Sur's Maiden Pub Sunday, Sept. 2, just two days after opening for Lovers and Strangers at Monterey Live.

The fact that no homegrown rock 'n' roll band has thrived in Big Sur in recent memory should come as no surprise. Big Sur has long been a place with two distinct populations. The first — long-term residents — is known for its independent, and at times, stubborn nature. The second — made up pri-

marily of newcomers searching for summer jobs or simply a place in the sun for the summer — travels light and flies off like migratory birds at the first sign of winter's chill. For better or worse, neither group has had much luck at creating enduring rock 'n' roll bands.

"You go to an open mike at the Henry Miller Library and you'll see 30 people playing, but you won't see them hanging out together," observed Todd Morton, Olde Panther's lead guitarist.

Yet despite the challenges of keeping a band together in Big Sur's everchanging and far-flung community, Olde Panther has survived — and started to thrive. Founded by vocalist Morton. Tod Williamson, guitarist Phil Wojtowicz and drummer Jud Wiesjahn, the group took its name from the brand of beer favored by the Three Stooges. The quartet started jamming together on Sunday evenings about two years ago.

"The first time we played together, it felt really good," recalled Morton.

Williamson, executive chef at Nepenthe Restaurant, agreed.

"I've played with 10 bands, but I've never played with a group like this," explained Williamson, who has been featured in The Pine Cone as a two-time Grand Masters winner at the Carmel Surfabout. "Sunday is now my favorite day of the week."

After jamming together for about a year, bassist Donnie Dickman joined Olde Panther.

"Donnie is actually a musician," said Williamson, showing off the band's trademark self-deprecating humor. "We're just hobbyists. I figured if he wanted to play with us, we must be all right."

The musical evolution of Wojtowicz — chef and part owner of the Big Sur Bakery — as a rhythm guitarist has also helped bolster the group's confidence.

"Phil's our anchor," Williamson explained. "When things go wrong, we turn to him."

Then there's Williamson, the band's irrepressible vocalist. A force of nature, Williamson uses his extensive martial arts training to enhance his well honed repertoire of rock-star moves. With his band mates perpetually edging away from the center of the stage, Williamson has plenty of room to move, which he does to impressive theatrical effect.

Keeping things simple, the band favors an upbeat contemporary sound that's low on frills but high in decibels.

"This is a garage band," declared Williamson, matter-offactly. "There's no drum machine here. It's just straight-ahead rock 'n' roll."

The concert at the Maiden Pub starts at 9 p.m. The pub is located in the Village Center Shops, about 24 miles south of

"Without Why" opens Friday, Aug. 31, at the Cherry Center for the Arts, providing a showcase for a talented group of local actors and actresses studying theater production.

"People who are coming to see the play can expect to see something a little different," explained Conrad Selvig, an MPC drama instructor who directs "Without Why."


Selvig, who supervised the remodeling of the Cherry Center's theater, believes the intimate venue is just the right setting for the play.







British folk-rocker Richard Thompson best known for his guitar work and songwriting with Fairport Convention in the late 1960s and early 1970s - will play at Sunset Center Thursday, Sept. 6.

Thompson and singer Sandy Denny teamed up to create a sound that was equal parts traditional British folk and contemporary American rock. On albums such as "Unhalfbricking" and "Leif and Leige," Fairport Convention achieved its greatest commercial and critical success.

The tour tells it all

LAST WEEKEND, a group of enterprising local real estate agents put together an afternoon of open houses featuring homes in Carmel-by-the-Sea for sale at prices under \$1 million. No fewer than 11 homes were included — a surprisingly large number, considering the super-escalation of prices that has gone on almost continuously since the town was born. The fact that such a tour was seen as a worthwhile selling device evokes some basic lessons in economics:

Buyers determine real estate values as much as sellers

When local real estate is under discussion, local know-it-alls can often be heard blaming "greedy sellers" for driving prices up.

But the price that a home sells for is not determined solely by the person trying to sell. He can set his asking price wherever he wants, but that price is just a number on a piece of paper until somebody decides to pay it.


In a free marketplace, such as local real estate, sellers compete with each other trying to get the highest prices for their goods, while buyers simultaneously compete with each other to get those goods for the lowest possible prices. Therefore, if home prices are rising more quickly than you'd like them to, it's because a lot of other people disagree with you and are willing to pay higher prices for homes in this highly desirable area. In Carmel and neighboring communities, prices have been propelled into the stratosphere because lots of buyers have been only too happy to pay top dollar.

The same principle can be seen in its purest form in the stock market, where prices move up and down rapidly, reflecting the changing, and offsetting, desires of buyers and sellers. Practically every news report about the stock market misses this fundamental fact. When the market goes up, they attribute it to optimism, ignoring the obvious logic that every time a stock changes hands, the person buying thereby proves his belief the stock's value will rise, while the seller's decision to sell demonstrates his belief that it won't. Likewise, when the market goes down, reporters invariably say, "sellers outnumbered buyers," or something equally fundamentally wrong.

When demand exceeds supply, prices will rise

Local real estate prices may be declining in Carmel and neighboring communities. But if they are, the downturn is very likely only temporary, for the simple reason that more people want to own homes here than there are homes available to buy. Our great weather and beautiful scenery are two important reasons. But more important is the fact that almost no new homes are being built (except in place of old ones). The local water shortage is one principal reason. So are the Gordian-knot-like building regulations imposed by the California Coastal Commission and other government agencies.

So if you've owned a home in the Monterey Peninsula for more than five or 10 years, the next time you feel like cursing the coastal commission for making

Reward upped in hope of more bites

A FEW possible tipsters nibbled at the \$1,000 reward offered for information leading to the arrest of the Banksyinspired copycat who left stenciled images of camera-toting tourists throughout Carmel - including one on the side of city hall — last month. But with no suspect in the bag, the police department has doubled the ante in hope of gathering more helpful information.

'We've upped it to \$2,000 and are stressing that you can remain anonymous," detective Jesse Juarez said. "We're hoping someone can come forward and provide us with the identity of the person or persons responsible for the graffiti, no questions asked. But Laredo said "the question is at what point [and] to what extent should the city be enforcing all of its rules. Jaywalking occurs all the time, and it's discretionary when to enforce.'

Willoughby contends he has sent four letters to the city manager and one letter to the community development department, but he said they have not responded.

"During our working years," he notes in the suit, "my wife

Pacific Grove-based health education consultant Regina Doyle said she wants to join the water board to be more involved in the community.

"Since returning to Pacific Grove in 2000 with my husband, Brendan Doyle, an international water engineer, I have been deeply interested in the ongoing water supply and conservation issues facing our area," Doyle said.

Doyle, 52, believes Cal Am's proposed desalination plant is just one possible solution. She said pending reports from the MPWMD and a citizens advisory committee report on the feasibility of various water projects for the Peninsula could provide answers. Doyle also believes there are other non-desal plant options, such as increased water conservation.

She said more conservation is possible, if the community is informed what its options are to achieve it.

"I believe new technologies will present such opportunities. If elected, I will use my skills in public health education to further increase community involvement and awareness," Doyle said.

She said her career experience, including work with government institutions through UNICEF, the World Health Organization, World Bank and others, will help in her role as water board director.

"I believe that the processes and principles of encouraging participation and representing the interests of the local people are common to all societies, including ours," Doyle said.

Retired civil engineer and current publisher of the Pacific Grove Bulletin, Lee Yarborough has some heavy-duty and perhaps the strongest credentials for the water board because of his longtime role in public administration.

Yarborough, 76, was public works director of Daly City, city manager for King City and Placerville and executive director of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County.

"I've had a lot of involvement in water management," he said. "I have done stormwater management, and I handled management of the entire San Mateo County non-point source [system].'

Yarborough said he understands all too well the importance of finding an alternative water supply for the Peninsula.

'You are talking about the economy of the county," he said. "The consequences of a drought are a disaster. Do we want to be in that position, or do we want to try to manage the water? And that's what I really hope to contribute to."

Yarborough said he is not set on one water supply solution and will look at all of the options if elected.

"One of them is bound to pay off," he said.

Foy, who is endorsing Yarborough, said the publisher's experience with TAMC and as city manager would be beneficial to the board.


