# Eastwood's next projects: Affordable housing and Angelina Jolie

HE TOOK the summer off after finishing two complicated movies in one year, but former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood is about to resume his role as of one of Hollywood's hottest directors. And this time, he's making a thriller with perhaps the world's most controversial movie star.

Filming of "The Changeling," starring Angelina Jolie, begins in two weeks.

"I've never worked with her, but she's a very good actress and I think she's a very good choice for this role," Eastwood told The Pine Cone. "A lot of actresses were trying to get it."

The movie tells the story of a woman whose son disappears. When police find him and return him to his mother, the woman claims it's not the right boy.

Filming will be at various locations around Los Angeles and at Universal Studios. The producers are Ron Howard, Brian Grazer and Rob Lorenz. A release date has not been set.

"It's a dark story but a very interesting story with a lot of intrigue," Eastwood said, "and it's a little different from what I've done before."


Eastwood, 77, has two Best Director Oscars — for "Unforgiven" (1992), a grim western, and "Million Dollar Baby" (2004), a love story set in the world of semi-professional boxing. His biggest fame as an actor came from action movies, such as "Dirty Harry," which was released in 1971.

That was also the year Eastwood launched his career as a director, with "Play Misty For Me" — a thriller filmed entirely on the Monterey Peninsula and featuring numerous local landmarks. It's currently being offered, along with several other Eastwood films, by Comcast's On Demand service. "I saw it again not too long ago and it's held up pretty well," Eastwood said.

Before heading to Los Angeles this week, Eastwood also confirmed he will be a principal in the Rancho Cañada Village housing project in Carmel Valley, which was launched by Nick Lombardo before his death in May 2005.

"There's always the dilemma of where to provide work-

force housing," Eastwood said. "I was very conscious of it when I was mayor, and it's even worse now, with a lot of people who work on the Monterey Peninsula driving from places like Soledad."

He said the Rancho Cañada project might result in less traffic on local roads as people who live there are relieved of their long commutes. Water for the 280-unit project will come from a reduction of water use on the Rancho Cañada golf course.

The latest general plan being considered by the county might make it difficult to build the Rancho Cañada project, Eastwood acknowledged. Two weeks ago, his business associate, Alan Williams, asked the board of supervisors to leave the door open for the project as the county works on GPU5.

Affordable units in the Rancho Cañada project, including 140 apartments and townhouses, would be subsidized by market-rate homes.

"It's something I will be proud to invest in," Eastwood

# RATEPAYER ADVOCATES PROPOSE CHEAPER WATER PLAN

■ Treated sewage could become part of Peninsula's supply

A GROUP that advises the California Public Utilities Commission has proposed a water supply for the Monterey Peninsula it says will cost \$100 million less than California American Water Company's desal plant.

"The thought was, are there any other local alternatives that could be implemented faster, cost less and have fewer environmental concerns?" said Keith Israel, director of the Monterey Regional Water Pollution Control Agency and a member of the Regional Project Technical Work Group appointed by the PUC Division of Ratepayer Advocates. "That is how this process started."

The new plan — called the "regional urban water supply evaluation" — was drawn up to identify the best and cheapest water solution for the Monterey Peninsula as an alternative to Cal Am's proposed Coastal Water Project, which will cost about \$230 million.

The new plan would provide from 12,500 to 28,400 acre-feet of water per year, according to its creators.

"We took every project that agencies in Monterey have looked at at some point in the past," said Steve Kasower, senior research economist with University of California Santa Cruz Center for Integrated Water Research, and a consultant to the DRA, "and we stuck some of them together."

Although the plan calls for a bulk of the Peninsula's water to come from a desalination plant, the plant would be smaller than the one proposed by Cal Am. Combining a small desal plant and several other projects would be less expensive to local ratepayers and be less controversial, Kasower said. Although not any one of the components on its own would be able to supply the Peninsula

# Second story removed, but neighbor says house is still too big

EVEN THOUGH Rick Kashfi decided to lop off the second story of the home he plans to build at the southeast corner of San Antonio and 10th, neighbors still objected at last week's Carmel Design Review Board meeting. But the board, which had approved the original two-story proposal that was overturned by the city council in August, decided he had conceded enough and again voted in his favor.

After the council sent him back to the drawing board with a request to minimize the impacts on neighbors by reconfiguring the second story, changing the roof pitch and height, and excavating to lower the entire home's position on the property, designer Darren Davis drafted plans for a new 2,460-square-foot, one-story, U-shaped home. Stucco-sided with a cedar-shake roof, it would contain four bedrooms, three bathrooms, an attached

# Renegade Shakespeare scholars convene

THE BIGGEST controversy in the history of literature is coming to town this weekend.

For the third time in the event's 32-year history, Carmel will host the Shakespeare Authorship Conference, a gathering of scholars, history buffs and literary detectives dedicated to debunking the idea that William Shakespeare actually penned the works attributed to him.


"There is definitely reason to doubt that Shakespeare wrote the plays," explained Stephen Moorer, PacRep Theatre's creative director and a leading debunker who played a big role in bringing the event to Carmel. "And there is so little that is known about the man, it just fuels the debate."

In the world of Shakespeare scholarship, those who question the traditional view of the author are often called anti-Stratfordians, a reference to Stratford-upon-Avon, the writer's alleged hometown. They believe the true author of Shakespeare's works was an aristocrat or, perhaps, a group of aristocrats. Moorer believes it would be impossible for a man from Shakespeare's humble origins to have such uncanny insight into the world of the privileged and the titled.

"In Shakespeare's work, there is such realism and depth in the aristocratic characters," Moorer said. "The peasants often come across as fools. They have funny names and they're the subject of ridicule. When they're portrayed as a mob, they're a threat. That's a very aristocratic estimate."

Anti-Stratfordians offer several leading candidates as the true author or authors of Shakespeare's work —
Francis Bacon, Christopher Marlowe and Edward de Vere, the 17th Earl of Oxford. DeVere is considered such a popular candidate that he has inspired his own sub-

genre of anti-Stratfordians known as Oxfordians.

"His life's story reads just like Hamlet's," Moorer insisted.

# COUNCIL GRANTS SHOPPERS, DINERS MORE TICKET-FREE TIME DOWNTOWN

PEOPLE OFTEN complain about parking in Carmel. Ninety minutes is not enough time ... \$30 overtime tickets are a drag ... sometimes it takes 15 minutes just to find a spot.

At the recommendation of police chief George Rawson, the city council decided Tuesday night at least one of those annoyances should change. The 90-minute limit imposed downtown will grow by 30 minutes, and some of the halfhour green zones will also become two-hour spots. The extended limits could be in place in time for holiday shop-

"In my six years here, I can't tell you how many complaints I've gotten regarding the time limits," Rawson told the council Oct. 2. "Ninety minutes is just not time to properly patronize downtown Carmel."

A survey revealed the business district contains about 1,790 marked parking spaces, 1,284 subjected to time limits. Of those, 773 are 90-minute zones, and 113 are 30-minute green zones. The change would affect all the 90-minute spots and a handful of half-hour spaces, and Rawson estimated the cost of replacing the signs at \$15,450.

Councilwoman Paula Hazdovac, who sits on the city's traffic/parking committee with resident Carl Iverson and design review board member Michael Lynch, said merchants complained the 90-minute time restrictions scaring "all the visitors and residents away from the downtown area."

"That's where the idea [of extending the parking limits] came from," Hazdovac said. In addition, green zones often go unused, possibly "because we don't have as many resi-

dent-serving businesses as we used to, so there's not as much need to run in for a quick 15minute errand."

Chamber of Carmel Commerce CEO Monta Potter said she told member businesses about the possible change and reported no objections.

"People vote with their feet, and there are not many people here to protest this,"

The downside could be reduced turnover, according to Potter, who said the need remains for a garage, a shuttle service or some other means of providing more parking.

she pointed out.

#### Will GPS help?

The increase would also allow people who work downtown to occupy valuable spots for longer, complained Meredith Crowell, who owns Linens & Such at San Carlos and Eighth. Mayor Sue McCloud said a study several years ago revealed business owners and workers took up 700 spaces in the business district that could have been used by

"People need to be hammered over the head to get their employees to stop parking in the downtown area," commented Alex Heid, who handles advertising for Pebble Beach Magazine and GuestLife-Monterey Bay.

Michael Adamson, businessman and chairman of the chamber board, said he required his new employees at Monterey County Bank to sign an agreement pledging they would not use timed spots.

"There's plenty of parking in this town. It's the responsibility of the merchants to find parking so they can free up parking for paying customers," added Hazdovac, who owns a store on Dolores Street with her sister. "People feel they are entitled to park in front of their businesses, and then they are the first to complain they don't have any business."

McCloud and Rawson speculated the problem might dissipate with the introduction of new enforcement technology. In June, the council voted to spend more than \$70,000 on a parking-patrol unit that uses cameras and a GPS system to determine whether a car has been parked overtime.

They wouldn't say exactly when the high-tech cart will hit

California farmers and ranchers are famous for their willingness to innovate as in, for instance, their recent advances in organic farming. Some of the roots of this taste for experiment can be found in Carmel Valley, in the 19th century, in the person of Edward

Berwick, one of the key agriculturalists in the history of the state. London-born, Berwick arrived in the valley in the late 1860s, at a time when wildcats still prowled and the occasional grizzly bear passed through. He bought a 120-acre tract for \$500 and launched experimental farming endeavors, including the resurrection of the Winter Nelis pear, a forgotten varietal from the mission era. The Berwick Orchard became "world famous," writes historian Augusta Fink, and Berwick's pears were coveted by the crowned heads of Europe. His success attracted other innovative growers to the valley, as well as the state. (Next week: The Great Julia Platt.)



# Tipsy man gets police ride to work

HERE'S A look at some of the significant calls logged by the Carmel-by-the-Sea Police Department, the Carmel Fire Department and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office last week. This week's log was compiled by Mary

Carmel-by-the-Sea: Ambulance dispatched to Highway 1 and Ocean Avenue for an unknown medical. Cal Fire with patient refusing medical care. Ambulance canceled. **SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 23**

# Too many Mission Ranch cocktails land man in jail for allegedly kicking cop

A 29-YEAR-OLD Carmel resident who was fallingdown drunk lost his cool and assaulted a Mission Ranch employee and two sheriff's deputies after being told to get a ride home, according to Monterey County Sheriff's Sgt. Scott Ragan. Nicholas Vorobiov was arrested Sept. 26 and taken to Monterey County Jail on charges of public intoxication and battery on a peace officer.

In the bar, Vorobiov was reportedly no trouble when someone suggested he had had enough. Shortly after 8 p.m., an employee called a cab, and the man walked outside and collapsed in some bushes, according to Ragan. But after regaining his feet and waiting a little while for the taxi, Vorobiov decided he would drive himself home.

"The employee tried to stop him," Ragan said, and the sus-

pect "punched him in the face." When the worker shoved back, Vorobiov rolled off the hood of his car and fell to the ground, where arriving deputy Kathy Palazzolo found him

She arrested Vorobiov and arranged to rendezvous with another deputy, Fernando White, who was transporting a suspect from Big Sur to Monterey County Jail in the department's Ford truck, so the two could be taken together.

They met at Carmel High School to put Vorobiov in White's vehicle, according to Ragan. During the transfer, he spat at Palazzolo, who decided to place a hood over his head to prevent his spitting on her again. As the two deputies attempted to further restrain him, Vorobiov allegedly kicked the other deputy in the groin.

He is facing a charge of public intoxication and two counts of battery on a peace officer.

# Six-foot, 650-pound 'Trumpeter' to greet Carmel Plaza visitors

AFTER DESCRIBING themselves as ill-equipped to define "art" and decide what can be displayed in public view on private property, planning commissioners nonetheless unanimously voted last month to allow Richard MacDonald's "Trumpeter" to be installed in a planter near the entrance to Carmel Plaza.

The commission had earlier approved the same bronze piece for installation outside the Dawson Cole Fine Art Gallery on San Carlos Street, but assistant planner Nathan Schmidt recommended granting the Plaza's request to have the 6-foot-tall, 250-pound sculpture moved to a planter outside Louis Vuitton. With the dissolution of the Carmel Art Board last year, Schmidt said the planning commission is henceforth responsible for deciding "the quality and placement of

all outdoor art visible from the public right of way."

CarrieAnn of Dawson Cole said the Plaza approached her gallery with the idea of placing the "Trumpeter" near its Ocean Avenue gate. MacDonald is a widely collected sculptor who uses traditional methods for working in bronze. (He also designed the golfer sculpture erected at Peter Hay golf course for the 2000 U.S. Open and did the bust of Del Monte Forest founder S.F.B Morse installed near the 1st Tee of the Pebble Beach Golf Links.) CarrieAnn said the "Trumpeter" would remain for sale at \$188,000, and the gallery would pay rent for the planter spot.

Though he could not attend the Sept. 12 hearing, marketing manager Ryan Williams wrote in a letter to the commission, "Carmel Plaza feels that adding this feature to its common area will enhance not only the customer's experience, but also add to the City of Carmel's flavor of a true art colony and represent a local artist and all of his creativ-


Carmel Art Association sculptor and former CAB member Eleen Auvil objected to the commercialism, and resident Monte Miller suggested the planning commission defer from making decisions regarding mat-

#### The enrichment question

According to city policy, the planning commission should base art-related decisions on whether the request would meet several goals, including:

- "to enrich the public environment" for residents and visitors through incorporation of the visual arts;
- "to nurture, enhance and encourage" the artistic community;
  - to enable the city to "sustain and



# Successful inaugural festival exercises brains overtime

HAILED BY Carmel Authors and Ideas Festival organizers as "the greatest storyteller of our time," Frank McCourt, whose three autobiographies chronicle an impoverished upbringing in Ireland, his trek to the United States and a 30-year teaching career, opened the inaugural festival at Sunset Center Friday night.

The three-day gathering, which featured the opening-night reception Sept. 28, followed by talks, autograph sessions and small group meetings with more than two dozen authors Sept. 29-30, was organized by Carmel residents Jim and Cindy McGillen. They modeled it after the celebrated Sun Valley book festival, which they have attended for years.

Following welcome comments by Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud and an appearance by a convincing John Steinbeck, Shannon Miller sang "Danny Boy" — reportedly McCourt's favorite song. A Santa Catalina School seventh grader introduced the celebrated speaker.

"Don't you have anything better to do tonight?" McCourt asked the audience — his dourness offset by a wry sense of humor, the whole package tempered by his clear Irish brogue and small stature. "Does anybody work in Carmel?"

He told the audience of several hundred people he met Jim McGillen in Sun Valley and agreed to come speak in the city he described as "one of the prettiest places on the face of the earth."

The only thing missing in Carmel, he pointed out later, is a bookstore. "Maybe I should come back and open one myself," he said, adding that he has the money to lose.

McCourt spent most of his roughly 45 minutes on the Sunset Center stage talking about teaching, the vocation he stumbled

into after leaving Ireland for New York at 19. Newly arrived, he worked odd jobs, was drafted during the Korean War and spent two years stationed in Bavaria, "drinking beer and chasing frauleins at taxpayers' expense," read voraciously and talked his way into New York University — despite having never graduated from high school — by telling the admissions department he'd read Dostoevsky and Joyce.

"Nobody reads Joyce," he confided to the audience.

In search of a career, he considered journalism but decided he lacked the proper personality, and given his love of books and enjoyment of kids, he settled on teaching.

"I didn't realize what I was getting myself into," he said. "It's the hardest job in the world" — especially at a vocational high school in New York, an experience McCourt chronicles in his third autobiography, "Teacher Man." (First was the Pulitzer-winning "Angela's Ashes," about his "miserable childhood," followed by "'Tis.")

He read an excerpt about his first day at a school where the teenagers managed to detect his weaknesses "like heat-seeking missiles."

Within hours, he found himself in the principal's office trying to explain why he ate a balogna sandwich thrown by one of his students, and the following day he was back to talk his way out of an inappropriate remark: One of the boys asked if he went out with girls in Ireland, and in exasperation, he had replied, "No, we went out with sheep!"

But he got them to work. As a writing exercise, he had them practice a skill many had tried already: the excuse note. Write an excuse note from Adam or Eve to God, he told them. He also asked them to write obituaries of teachers.

# Tattoos, piercings on display at Monterey Museum of Art

SO MANY times, people see somebody with a tattoo and are afraid to look at them, but now they can."

That's one of the reasons Margi Perotti, an administrative coordinator for the City of Carmel and the owner of Monterey tattoo and piercing shop Creative Visions, happily obliged when the Monterey Museum of Art asked her to organize an exhibit for its Arts Lounge@La Mirada quarterly series. "Monterey Ink: A Night of Living Art," will run from 7 to 9 p.m. Friday, Oct. 5, and feature two dozen live models showing off tattoos and piercings by Perotti, who started tattooing 18 years ago, and the other artists in her shop.

"They'll be set up like paintings and statues on little pedestals," she said of the men and women who agreed to be part of the art for the evening. They will be spread throughout La Mirada, the Monterey Museum of Art's historic property off Fremont Street near Monterey Peninsula College.

"We chose a wide variety of people who have large enough work to be able to be seen from a couple of feet away, with details," she said, "and who would make a good impression and be able to sit there and answer questions."

All are clients of her shop, and almost everyone was game, though Perotti said one person backed out because he felt uncomfortable with the idea of people scrutinizing his half-naked body for two hours.


Attendees — who are encouraged to sport their own tattoos during the event if they have any — will see a wide variety of work, including traditional biker tattoos, Asian fusion art, intricate flowers and dragons. They will also have the opportunity to examine tattoos in various stages of completion

Several will exhibit body piercings, including "corsetry," which involves patterns of rings down the back with ribbon laced through.

"The body piercings will be a little bit shocking for a lot of people," Perotti said.

And how did such an exhibit end up within the halls of the MMA, which has a permanent collection of 15,000 paintings, photographs, works on paper, and Asian ceramics, including many pieces by notable and collected California artists from the last century?

"They approached me and asked if I would be willing to do something like this," Perotti said. Of course, she enthusiastically answered in the affirmative, having already contemplated a similar show and pitched it to Sunset Center several



years back but was told Carmel probably "wasn't ready for that"

"So when they approached me, I knew exactly what I wanted to do," she said. "It will be a time for people to be able to come and expand their minds toward tattooing and the art of it. They can stare and look

and not feel bad about it."

Arts Lounge@La Mirada is a quarterly evening gathering for Monterey Contemporaries, a group of MMA members between the ages of 21 and 45, "who appreciate art and music, good food and beverage, culture and conversation, and enjoy meeting others who share similar interests," according to the museum.

The Oct. 5 Arts Lounge is sponsored by Creative Visions Tattoo and Body Piercing on Lighthouse Avenue, and by The Ol' Factory Café in Sand City, which will host an after-party. Music and "lounge concepts" will be provided DJ Todd Prophet and Brian Bode. Mendocino Brewing Company will pour the suds, and Ventana

Vineyards will offer the fruit of the vine.

La Mirada is located at 720 Via Mirada next to Monterey Peninsula College. Admission to the Arts Lounge is \$5, and no one under 21 will be admitted. For more information, visit www.montereyart.org or call (831) 372-5477.

THE PACIFIC Grove City Council Wednesday unanimously approved a reorganization of the city government that would eliminate 24 city employee job positions and save the city about \$570,000 a year.

The council made its decision after a packed, three-hour discussion at city hall, which drew passionate public comment from those critical of the reorganization.

'There is a whole gamut of things that are revenue producing that I don't think have been looked at," said former P.G. mayor Jeanne Byrne.

But council members said they didn't think there was any other option but to approve the plan.

"I know the impact this kind of move has on people," said councilman Dan Davis. "Unfortunately, my responsibility is to ensure the financial well-being of the city. I just don't see

The reorganization, which means 16 employees will be laid off in January, was recommended by city manager Jim Colangelo, who contends the cuts would not mean a reduction of services and would make the city run more efficient-

"The status quo is not an option," Colangelo told the council. "On the current path, we run out of money about this time next year. Eighty percent of our costs are salary. We aren't going to make a big dent in reducing costs unless we reduce salaries."

City budget director Jim Becklenberg outlined the P.G.'s financial straits in a detailed report to council, which outlined a potential \$2 million shortfall next year.

"We have a \$2 million problem to solve in order to have a sustainable community and have the services we think the community expects," Becklenberg said.

Despite the figures presented by Becklenberg and Colangelo, many members of the public asked the council to postpone its decision until there is more public review of the reorganization. One citizen, Richard Ahart, suggested the council scrutinize Colangelo. "I don't see him coming to the table and offering his

salary up," Ahart said of the city manager, who makes about \$158,000 per year. "I strongly suggest they look at his performance ... and ask for a resignation." Tim McCormick, representative for Laborers Union of

North America, Local 270, which represents city workers, threatened a lawsuit.

"The city manager has not gone through the process under our constitution," McCormick said. "These jobs are a property right and require due process. You cannot replace jobs for jobs at a lower wage."

The layoffs affect nearly every city department, and include positions from secretaries to directors. Jon Biggs, the city's community development director, recreation director John Miller and golf director Mike Leach are among the highest paid employees to be laid off. Factoring in employee benefits, each position costs the city more than \$160,000

They're generally very quiet, except for the "crazies" that afflict them during the first five minutes out the door, at which time they cavort and spin in circles to show their elation at being free of walls.





The new design "substantially limited the mass and scale," senior planner Sean Conroy told the DRB Sept. 26. He commended Davis for respecting the neighbors' privacy and recommended approval of the proposed demolition and new construction.

The new plans were included on the board's consent agenda for approval without discussion, but member Mary Bell wanted to talk about the proposal. She wondered if a skylight at the rear of the house would bother the neighbors.

Davis argued it was crucial in a room that would otherwise be quite dark due to surrounding homes and trees.

"Mr. Kashfi has really gone the extra mile on this house to reach a compromise," he said.

When it was his turn to speak, Kashfi asked the board to approve his scaled-down design.

Resident Robert Cook, who owns property to the east, asked the board to prevent Kashfi from planting trees that could grow as tall as 20 feet and interfere with his view. The board decided to grant the request by limiting the plants to varieties that will max out at 10 feet.

Peter Boutin, who also owns a home nearby and who

appealed the originally approved design to the council, did not state any objections to the new plans.

But co-appellant Paul McKnight, who lives east of Kashfi's property and requested the council demand a onestory design, wrote a letter objecting to the revised proposal. He said the new home would "substantially block" the only ocean view available from the deck of his house. "We request that Mr. Kashfi consider lowering the elevation of this southern roof line," he wrote. "We hope that he will be open to this suggestion in the spirit of being a good neighbor.'

Board members decided Kashfi had already been a good enough neighbor after removing the second floor from his plans even though the city council had only asked for a redesign. "Considering where they would have been had the first concept been built, although I can see there is going to be some loss of view, under the circumstances, it's really kind of minimal," board member Michael Lynch said.

Bell complimented Davis on his revised design. "You have a big lot and used it effectively," she said. "I am concerned and feel badly the McKnights next door are going to lose a little bit of their view, but considering Mr. Kashfi has completely taken off his second story, I don't have any objections to the project."

'Mr. Kashfi has gone to great lengths to make this acceptable to the board," commented DRB member Janet Reimers, who was the lone dissenter on the original design when the board approved it in June. "He's gone through the full process and is certainly more educated than when he started."

The board unanimously approved Kashfi's revised appli-

# AFRICAN SAFARI, CONCERT TO BENEFIT LOCAL ELEPHANTS

EVERY YEAR it costs more than \$100,000 to take care of Buffy, Butch, Kristi and Paula — four "retired" African elephants who call a portion of the 51-acre Vision Quest Ranch in Salinas their home.

Facing rising costs to take care of the animals, a safari in South Africa and a concert at the ranch are being offered to help pay for the extensive care they require.

"Our lives revolve around the elephants," said Charlie Sammut, director of Elephants of Africa Rescue Society, the nonprofit dedicated to providing a habitat for wild African animals with a focus on elephants. "It costs about \$85 a day per elephant just for food and vet care. Factoring in staffing and everything, it's not cheap.'

Sammut is also founder of Wild Things A.R. Inc., a company that provides trained wild exotic and domestic birds and animals for film, TV, live productions and educational purposes.

"We are constantly working with the elephants" — which range in age from 26 to 40 and were circus performers — "bathing them, trimming feet, removing dead skin, whatever they need."

To help out EARS, Dan Presser, owner of Four Winds Travel in Carmel, is donating some of the profits from a \$8,449 trip to South Africa he's offering from Jan. 15 to Jan. 27.

"I'm giving 50 percent of the proceeds of the trip to EARS," Presser said.

There's only space for 10 couples and it's filling up quickly, Presser said.

The trip's itinerary includes a visit to Robben Island, where former South African president and anti-Apartheid activist Nelson Mandela was imprisoned for more than two





# Point Lobos Community Day

m WITH JUST 1,200 acres — and only 550 above water — Point Lobos State Reserve is not a particularly large park. It features no dramatic mountain peak or jawdropping waterfall. Yet the park, with its windswept cypress trees, dramatic rock formations and pristine coves, is perhaps the popular natural scenic wonder on the California Coast.

In recognition of its status, the park will host its first Community Day Saturday, Oct.

The event, which pays tribute to Point Lobos' remarkable natural and cultural history, offers locals an opportunity to enjoy one of the Monterey Peninsula's greatest trea-

"For such a small piece of property, Point Lobos has such incredible diversity," said Chuck Bancroft, a California Department of Parks and Recreation ranger who has worked at Point Lobos for nearly 27 years. "Ansel Adams once said, 'You can point your camera in any direction and get a great photo."

Located just three miles south of Carmel, the park was founded in 1933. Its first residents - indigenous people now known collectively as the Ohlone — first occupied Point Lobos between 2,500 and 3,000 years ago. After the Carmel Mission was established in 1771, Spanish vaqueros grazed cattle there. By the middle of the 19th century, Chinese fishermen were commercially harvesting abalone at Point Lobos. In 1862, Portuguese fishermen set up an extensive whaling operation that thrived for more than two decades. Just before the turn of the 20th century, Japanese divers began harvesting abalone, a venture that was so successful it once accounted for 75 percent of the abalone sold in California. Later, a town was planned

for the north shore.

Today, Point Lobos is wholly owned by the State of California, and few remnants of the fishing industries remain. Though it is heavily used by tourists and has been the setting for several Hollywood film (including Alfred Hitchcock's 1939 Oscar-winning Best film, "Rebecca"), the land has reverted back to a somewhat natural state. And with a network of trails traversing its pine forests, it has emerged as a hikers' paradise. Its trails are relatively short (the longest is 1.4 miles) and the topography isn't too dramatic so, it provides easy accessibility for even the mobility-challenged. A wheelchair-accessible loop trail leads from the park's main parking lot to dramatic Sea Lion Point.

While Point Lobos is a user-friendly place, Saturday's event makes it particularly easy to learn about the park's history and natural resources.

"The event is a nice way of saying, "Thank you, to the community," Bancroft said. "On a typical day, we offer one or two guided nature walks. On Saturday we'll offer 16. We're also going to have three volunteers with spotting scopes posted at different locations.'

Bancroft will serve as one of two wandering "poets" as he recites the work of Robinson Jeffers, Jeanne D'Orge, Elliot Ruchowitz-Roberts and others.

Parking at the reserve is very limited, but free parking will be available at the Crossroads shopping center, and buses will shuttle guests to and from the park all day. The first shuttle will leave the Crossroads at 9 a.m. Food will not be available at the park, so pack a picnic lunch, wear sturdy walking shoes and don't forget your camera or binoc-

# C.V. road work postponed until January

CALIFORNIA AMERICAN Water Co. has agreed to postpone its water main work in Carmel Valley Village until January but will continue road work east of the Village later this month.

For four years, Cal Am has been in the process of upgrading the valley's water pipes, which serve as the Monterey Peninsula's principal water artery. But residents have complained about traffic tieups on Carmel Valley Road, while business owners said traffic delays are detrimental to sales.

"October is still one of the most popular months for visitors," said Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie. "So the businesses asked us to delay the work until January, which is a slower time for them."

This month, Cal Am will resume night work on Carmel Valley Road past the village in the one-lane area known as "the bucket."

Jeffrey Andrews, owner of Avant Garden and Home in Carmel Valley Village, collected hundreds of signatures and met with Cal Am seeking to have the work done at night and postponed until January, when business is slower for shops and restaurants.

"Everybody is pretty happy about it," said Andrews, who also met with Cal Am and Monterey Peninsula Engineering, the construction company performing the work, in hopes of modifying the schedule.

The January construction will be from Village Drive to Holman Road, and east of the Village on the one-lane section of Carmel Valley Road past Klondike Canyon Road. All the work beginning in January will be done during the day.

Although Andrews sought to have the work performed at night, he said the he's generally satisfied with the agreement. "Hats off to Cal Am and Monterey Peninsula Engineering for listening and working with us," he said.

Cal Am said night work in the Village would be more disruptive to residents than day work because of the bright lights and noise from trucks' back-up alarms.



enhance" its recognition as an artistic center;

■ to increase public access to artwork, and to promote understanding and awareness of art in public; and

■ to promote diversity in medium, style and design

Schmidt said the sculpture would meet those criteria, but planning commissioner Steven Hillyard was uncertain of his ability to agree or disagree.

"I have no expertise to say whether this would enrich us or not," he said.

When they approved the same sculpture for placement outside Dawson Cole a few months ago, commissioners expressed similar discomfort, and Strid said nothing much has changed.

"I personally don't feel qualified to make that decision, either," he said.

Commissioner Robin Wilson said organizations and artists should decide what to display, not just the Plaza or a single gallery, but commissioner Alan Hewer disagreed.

That location belongs to the Plaza they should be allowed to select what they put on their property," he said, adding that the commission's previous yes-vote on Dawson Cole's application indicated they should vote similarly on the Plaza's request.

"Last time, we went through the same exact discussion and ended up accepting it," he said. "This is still private property."

Wilson suggested the Plaza hold contests regularly to rotate local artwork through the highly visible spot.

'I would find that a whole lot more palatable than getting one of seven copies at \$250,000 and sticking it out there," he said.



#### No more time for residents

Councilman Ken Talmage, who lives near Harrison Memorial Library, asked about Rawson's proposal not to change the extended time already allowed people with residential parking permits. The annual stickers, available only to people who live in town, provide for 60 minutes in half-hour spots and 180 minutes in 90-minute spots. Most people believe the permits simply mean double-time parking, but the ordinance specifically states time limits that would remain unchanged, according to Rawson.



Anti-Stratfordians believe Shakespeare was simply a front for an aristocrat — or a group of aristocrats. By creating a fictitious author of the plays, the real writer could anonymously comment on — with impunity and often great satire the contemporary politics, affairs and gossip of Elizabethan England.

"If it was known that the plays were written by a circle of nobility, the queen would have known that they were writing about her," Moorer suggested.

#### A student's insight

The Golden Bough Playhouse will present a series of lectures Friday, Saturday and Sunday featuring some of the leading voices in anti-Stratfordian research. Perhaps most interesting about the lineup of speakers is the inclusion of Allegra Krasznekewicz, a junior at Santa Catalina School in Monterey. Krasznekewicz recently took home top honors in countywide and statewide History Day competitions for her paper, "William Shakespeare and Authorship Controversy: A Study in Literary Triumph and Historical Tragedy." Despite her youth, Krasznekewicz offers impressive credentials as a Shakespeare scholar. She started reading and performing Shakespeare in junior high school, and after spending a month in London and Oxford during her freshman year, she began researching the Shakespeare authorship



"The paintings focus on the land, the light and shadows," Smith said. "The look of the land is the one aspect that defines the California landscape."


#### ■ In memoriam: Mezzotint master

G.H. Roth, a gifted artist and onetime Carmel resident who was acclaimed for her work engraving mezzotints, died recently in Geneva, Switzerland. She was 72.

Born in Poland in 1935, Roth was forbidden to become an artist, so she trained as a goldsmith instead, the family said. Her talent for crafting precious metals complemented her

engraving work. She produced more than 380 copper plates, many as large as 24 inches by 36 inches. Each plate required at least 500 hours of labor to complete. Ultimately, she produced about 70,000 mezzotints, which are considered one of the most difficult art forms to create.

In 1968, Roth was awarded the Villa Romana Fellowship, the oldest art prize in Germany. She owned a house in Carmel from 1978 to 1999 and operated the G.H. Roth Gallery.


# Bates to receive Yellow Brick Road honor

# They cook with amore and want you to linger at Nico Ristorante

By MARGOT PETIT NICHOLS

HE PRACTICED law on the Monterey Peninsula for a year before an irresistible opportunity presented itself: In 1994, Nico Mavris bought La Dolce Vita restaurant in Carmel-by-the-Sea from Domenico Vastarella and Alan Baylor and became a chef/restaurateur in the very dining establishment where he had waited tables while attending law school in Monterey.

Mavris met Enzo Pagano and Isiais Alonso at La Dolce Vita as colleagues and became fast friends there. Then, ten years ago, Mavris and Pagano became partners when they created Nico Ristorante Mediterraneo (in Le Bistro's old spot) just up San Carlos from La Dolce Vita — but much closer to Ocean Avenue. Alonso joined them as head chef. They ran the two restaurants simultaneously until selling La Dolce Vita in 1999.

"We don't really have titles for each other," Mavris said. "The three of us are always in the kitchen. We all cook.

"Enzo is from Calabria and I'm from Athens. We create the menu, which is Greek and Italian; together it becomes Mediterranean."

Isiais is from Oaxaca, Mexico, and is the "day-to-day chef de cuisine," Mavris said. "We're really like a family here; we've been together 15 years, counting the time at Dolce Vita."

What they have in common is a passion for food and what it represents. "Food is not just a substance,"

Mavris said, indicating it is the unifier that brings friends and family together — the sustenance that binds.

"We get Nicol try to gently educate people about food.—

"We [at Nico] try to gently educate people about food—to take time over food. We have no idea how long we will be together in this life," he said, suggesting that moments around the table are precious.

The recent accidental death of Vastarella — who apparently drowned in a neighbor's Carmel Valley swimming pool

— shocked the food community here. "He was my mentor, a soulful person, part of my family," Mavris said. "He use to come over and we'd talk about recipes together. We miss him."

Mavris said he met his wife, Lejla, at the restaurant when she was a student at the Monterey Institute of International Studies. They married during the millennial year of 2000. "We were the first of four couples to get married after

meeting here at the restaurant," he said.

Mavris associates food with family and family gatherings because as a child he watched his mother making moussaka or spanikopita in their kitchen. It was his mother who taught him how to make galaktoboureko, a milk custard dessert baked in filo dough with warm honey spooned over it.

More recently, his mother sent a wheel of kefalograviera cheese to make an unusual dish called saganaki. Mavris interrupted this interview in the restaurant's back patio by leaping up for a trip to the kitchen. He returned with a sizzling hot pan in which he had browned a triangle of the cheese lightly coated in flour. He quickly poured in a small glass of Metaxa brandy, ignited it into a flaming spectacle, and by squeezing a lemon half over it, extinguished the flames.

Not only was it a dramatic show, but served with toasted pita points, the cheese proved to be delicious. Mavris said kasseri

cheese can also be used for this dish.

While the Nico menu is composed primarily of Greek and Italian dishes, there are a number of Mediterranean specialties as well, such as a rosemary roasted Moroccan chicken in a tangerine reduction served with

Pagano's Italian heritage is seen in La Caprese salad of tomato, mozzarella and basil, spaghetti al carbonara, and crab ravioli in a Champagne cream sauce.


Mavris' Greek influence is evident in a moussaka with eggplant, potato, vegetables, goat cheese, Parmigiano and béchamel sauce, and also in Aegean grape leaves stuffed with herbed brown rice.

Alonso's heritage is brought out in a paella of seafood, chicken and seasonal vegetables in saffron.

Asked to suggest a complete meal for a patron dining at Nico for the first time to exemplify the style and breadth of their talents, he recommended these signature dish-

To begin, a starter of grilled portobella mushrooms with rosemary and roasted pine nuts. An entrée of Monterey Bay herb-grilled salmon on a bed of saffron risotto, or a pasta of whole wheat linguine with fresh clams, sun-dried tomatoes and roasted garlic - or perhaps bistecca alla Fiorentina, a grilled rib eye with Tuscan flavors and green olive oil. And for dessert, baklava or real Italian gelato from Gelatomania in Watsonville.

# Aruba, Hawaii, Chez Christine and the Carmel Valley Chevron

THIS WEEK'S column is coming to you by way of Aruba. My mission to explore all of the ABC Islands is officially two-thirds complete. Curação was tackled earlier in the year and Bonaire is on my early-2008 "to visit" list. More on the "A" island of Aruba's eats and drinks when I return. So far, the local Balashi beer is treating me right.

In other travels, my beau and I had the pleasure of a fiveday stay at The Four Seasons Resort Maui at Wailea (www.fourseasons.com/maui/) last week. The resort just underwent a \$50 million makeover, and as a food, wine and travel writer with destination wedding and honeymoon clients, I try to (ahem) do my homework and stay on top of these developments. Hands down, it was the finest, most amenity-filled and flawless hotel service experience I've ever had. The highlights reel includes: Japanese Kobe beef at DUO, the property's newest restaurant. DUO is the only establishment on Maui serving the melt-in-your-mouth marbled delicacy, which is being flown in direct from Japan every third day. At \$176 for a 6 oz. piece, it's a major splurge, but I can say with 100 percent certainty that this meat delivered a carnivorous experience I didn't know steer was capable of. The tasting menu at Wolfgang Puck's Spago also delivered above and beyond my expectations. The first suggested wine pairing? A Talbott Chardonnay. We hit the bar at Spago another evening for a light bite and talked a honeymooning twosome from Tampa into trying a bottle of Morgan Sauvignon Blanc. They loved it. Less extravagant, yet equally delicious were the creative sushi rolls at Sansei in Kihei — especially the panko-crusted ahi sashimi sushi roll with fresh island Yellowfin tuna.

#### ■ Chez Christine needs our support

This bit of news came via my favorite gourmand on-thego and all around Good Samaritan, Mary Chamberlin: Chez Christine (name after owner Michel Christine Richard) opened in Carmel a few months ago to rave reviews by local





foodies (I admit, I have yet to go). Homemade bread, lightly battered artichoke hearts with handmade French garlic aioli, escargot (David Babcock of Clementine's Kitchen swears they are the best snails west of Paris), pureed chicken and mushroom soup with a touch of curry, and filet mignon au poivre with gratin of potato and gruyere are among the très Français menu items.

Christine gets up at 4 a.m. to bake the restaurant's bread and runs the front of the house. Her husband is the chef and her sons multitask as waiters and bus boys; their daughter-in-law kicks in wherever needed. The bad news is Christine's husband has fallen quite ill with leukemia and has no health insurance. Mounting medical bills, several surgeries on the horizon, sky-high restaurant and apartment rent, coupled with being a Carmel newcomer, are causing major financial stress on the family. Despite this, numerous sources have told me that the food and service hasn't skipped a beat. In the spirit of supporting family-owned establishments and spreading some kindness, I encourage you to go support Chez Christine. I'm making a reservation this week.

#### ■ If you grill it, they will come

Not one to shun the occasional gas station meal, al fresco




Friday lunch in the parking lot at the Chevron in Carmel Valley is a grilled frenzy not to be missed. Here's the deal: Every Friday, Joe Solis' Good Time Catering crew sets up its sprawling grilling spread in the Chevron parking lot. Pick your sandwich or plate and pay at the register inside the gas station, hand your ticket to someone manning the grill and walk away with a hefty portion of freshly grilled goodness.


Some of sandwich highlights include Kahlua Pulled Pork (\$6.75), Tri-Tip (\$7.75) or Joe's Big Boy Hamburger (\$6.50). Heartier appetites may opt for the meal deals, which include potato salad, chili beans and garlic bread. The pork rib plate is a steal at \$8.50.

The island is divided between the National Park Service, which owns approximately 20 percent at the west, and The Nature Conservancy, which owns the rest. The property line is at Prisoner's. I had purchased a landing permit from The Nature

Conservancy but the group's land was posted with "keep out"

signs due to their pig eradication program. So we hiked on the national park side, climbing to a summit where we could look out over at the Pacific rolling away to the south. We met an exceedingly entertaining skipper and his daughter near the top. They had sailed over from Santa Barbara and regaled us with funny stories about their anchoring experiences at Santa Cruz Island.

In our two-and-a-half days on the islands, we encountered about 10 people. The remoteness and solitude of the Channel Islands — only about 20 miles from California — are astounding. If you have not been to the Channel Islands, find a way to get there. Trips can be found in Ventura.

Although I enjoyed the weekend with Matt, I discovered that the deep joy I normally have when I sail was absent. Grieving and good times, for me at least, could not co-exist. I needed to get Athena home and end the Mexico/California voyage.

#### Seasickness and too much kelp

The return trip was set to begin the weekend of July 20. While the weather between Point Conception and Monterey can be challenging, the forecast seemed doable, though not ideal. Small craft advisories were up, with winds from 15 to 25 knots. I would have preferred less, but the boat was well prepared to handle those conditions.

Richard Henry Dana, in "Two Years Before the Mast," gives an idea of how tough this stretch can be. On board Alert in December of 1835, his ship took 20 days to sail from Santa Barbara to San Francisco, getting hammered continually from Point Conception north. I figured we could make the 280-mile passage in about two days, employing our up-the-Baja strategy of a double-reefed mainsail and a hardworking engine. We would leave Ventura in the morning, get around Point Conception at night after the afternoon winds had subsided a bit, and keep right on going.

This approach would put us at notorious Point Sur early in the morning, the best time to pass that potentially furious promontory.

We were a crew of three: myself; my sailing buddy from Pacific Grove, Bob McCormick; and Bob's friend, Richard Carr, of Monterey. Both are experienced sailors, though this was to be their first West Coast, uphill off shore experience. Richard has owned sailboats for years and keeps his current sloop on Chesapeake Bay.

Initially, everything went as planned. We left Ventura at 10:30 a.m. on July 21, with a full tank of diesel and 25 gallons of additional fuel in jerry cans on deck. The first time I brought Athena up from Ventura in 2003, we sailed all the way to the Cojo anchorage near Point Conception. On that trip we made two stops, first at Cojo and then at San Simeon.

This time there was not enough wind to sail, so we motor

sailed to Point Conception. We were barely underway when Richard got seasick. His past experiences with seasickness had been transitory: He got sick and then recovered and was fine. His luck ran out on this trip.

He valiantly stood his three-hour watch the first night, a mildly rough ride up from Point Conception and past Point Arguello, Point San Martin and Point Buchon. On Sunday he was pretty much comatose all day and was unable to hold down either food or water. Richard is a trooper and never complained. Late in the afternoon, after we had passed Point Piedras Blancas and were beginning our ride up the Big Sur Coast, we realized that Richard was in much worse shape



than we had realized.

We decided his safety trumped our schedule, so we turned the boat around, sailed south past Point Piedras Blancas and headed east to the gorgeous San Simeon anchorage. We anchored there about 5 p.m., deployed our dinghy, and dinked Richard into the beach.

I was a bit nervous about the beach landing as the only other time I had landed there, in July of 2003 with Nellie, we got swamped, flipped the dinghy in the surf and drowned the outboard motor. This time Bob and I engineered a perfect landing and left a very happy Richard on the beach waiting for his wife to drive from Monterey to pick him up.

We returned to the boat, prepared dinner and took an hour nap before departing in the pitch black at 10:30. We motored out to the green entrance buoy, raised the main, turned right and began to motor sail back out to Point Piedras Blancas

We had one more adventure in store for us. We had noted immense beds of kelp near shore when we came in during the afternoon. We had totally forgotten about them and in the pitch black innocently motored into a vast forest of kelp. The boat came to a dead

There are a couple of ways to rid your rudder, prop and keel of kelp. One is merely to stop, and sometimes the kelp will drop off. Another is to run the prop alternately in forward and reverse to cut if off the prop. A third way is to use the boat pole to pull the kelp out from under the boat.

We tried all of these and nothing worked.

By now it was 11:30 p.m., and we were not going anywhere. I decided to get into the water in back of the boat, going down the swim ladder with a very sharp fishing knife to try to cut the kelp away.

By the time I got undressed and into the water, the kelp had miraculously fallen away. My chance for mini-heroism having vanished, I hopped back into the boat, dried off, got dressed and got the boat underway.


We got stuck in the kelp a few more times but were able to free ourselves rapidly until we finally cleared the spindly traps. It was midnight, and Bob and I were at last on the last leg.

It was a windy, bashy, cold and miserable night and morning with intermittent fog that reduced our visibility to almost zero

With the help of our radar and sturdy autopilot, we chugged away, clearing Point Sur around noon, passed Point Lobos and crossed Carmel Bay between 4 and 5 p.m., rounded Point Pinos at 6, and backed to our slip, A77 at Monterey Harbor, at 7 p.m. on July 23.

My friend Jean Du Preez and his 2 yearold son, Luc, were on hand to greet us.

After nine months 15 days, the momentous and tragic Athena had voyage ended.



Express into the valley, also pitched in.

"People tend to know about Cima Collina, Galante and Southern Latitudes, but the others — it's fun to introduce people to them," Potter said, including The Cheese Shop in Carmel Plaza, Nielsen Bros. decades, the Cape of Good Hope to see jackass penguins, Zambia to see Victoria Falls and, of course, safari adventures.

annually, according to city figures.

But another figure provided to The Pine Cone shows the cumulative employee experience lost to the job cuts amounts to about 265 years.

"I have a concern about losing the knowledge and experience that a lot of these employees have," said city councilman Alan Cohen. "I see the tradeoff as a hard thing to swallow."

Colangelo said most of the 16 employees would be able to retain their jobs but would have to settle for a pay cut. He said in some cases, the newly drawn positions would require less responsibility, which he said could merit the adjustment in salary.

The reorganization also calls for the city's youth center to be run by the Boys and Girls Club and the YMCA to operate the city's youth soccer and basketball recreation leagues. Colangelo said the contracts would provide the same service at a lower cost.

But a woman who worked as a former recreation coordinator with the city until a few months ago said seeking outside help to run the city's recreation department would mean a lower quality of service.

"There is a severe disconnect with outsourcing," she said, "and that's what you will bring to the City of Pacific Grove..."

Colangelo said the consolidation of city services would mean better overall customer service and an improvement in the city's building inspection services. He also said the city would explore the possibility of privatizing some services.

Longtime resident Ted Hollister told council members the layoffs would be a further blow to the spirit of city employees.

"In 48 years," he said, "I have have never seen employee morale as low as it is now."

Councilwoman Vicki Stilwell said the council was aware of the problem and said it had to change.

"Morale sucks in this town," she said.

Surprisingly, no employees affected by the layoffs addressed the city council. One employee, who wanted to remain anonymous, suggested a possible reason for the silence.

"Public comment is discouraged," according to the employee. "And the word 'insubordination' has come up more than once."


The event — which raises money for the P.V. School PTO and the P.V. Community Center — provides a marketplace for rock hounds and a stage for an eclectic collection of musicians.

Students often attempted to distract McCourt from the normal parts of the curriculum by asking about his former life in Ireland. Fortunately, it was recounting those tales that would lead him to write his first memoir three decades later, when he retired from teaching.

The kids told him he should write a book, according to McCourt. "And I do what I'm told." He described the desire to draft the memoir as "an itch," and he finished the work in 13 months. It became a best seller.

#### Just for starters

McCourt's Friday-night appearance was preceded by offerings of select Monterey County wines, hors d'oeuvres from A Moveable Feast, nibbles offered by The Carmel Cheese Shop, and every author's book offered for sale in the Sunset Center lobby by Borders.

Throughout the evening, many attendees remarked that the festival seemed a perfect new match for the city's beautifully renovated cultural center. But the Friday was just the beginning ....

Saturday and Sunday, authors took turns lecturing from the Sunset Center main stage, signing books and conferring in small

"breakout sessions."

Elizabeth Edwards, breast-cancer survivor and wife of presidential candidate John Edwards, was Saturday morning's headliner and was invited to talk about her book, "Saving Graces," and her experiences fighting cancer.

Margot Petit Nichols, a lifelong bibliophile and former book reviewer for The Pine Cone, described the festival as "a smashing success."

"Every detail had been attended to," she said. "Everybody was happy and said how wonderful it was."

Nichols spent the weekend listening to the authors who made their presentations in the main auditorium, rather than attending the breakout sessions. Students of various ages from public and private schools around the Peninsula introduced the speakers.

Nichols particularly enjoyed Irshad Manji, described by the New York Times as "Osama bin Laden's worst nightmare" and recipient of Oprah Winfrey's inaugural Chutzpah Award for "audacity, nerve, boldness and conviction," according to festival organizers.

"She does have chutzpah," Nichols confirmed, adding that Manji talked about her upbringing in a Muslim neighborhood in America.

Investigative reporter, New Yorker magazine contributor and author Seymour Hersh

discussed the possibility of war in Iran and the conditions in Iraq. While he sees war with Iran as highly likely, he urged his listeners not to despair.

"He left on an optimistic note," she said, marveling that "he spoke absolutely without notes and is just on fire about his subject."

Afghani-born, American-educated Tamin Ansary, who wrote "West of Kabul, East of New York," discussed hopping on a plane from Cairo to Kabul for his first visit and landing without any idea of what to do or where to go.

He ultimately found his home village and former family compound — since bombed to destruction in wartime — and the grave of his father.

Jason Roberts chronicled the life of a blind man who traveled the world and managed to "see" more during his journeys because he was not distracted by the physical sights in his book, "A Sense of the World, How a Blind Man Became History's Greatest Traveler."

"He spoke the way I imagine he writes it was just beautiful," Nichols recalled.

Presidential historian and Pulitzer Prize winner Doris Kearns Goodwin closed the festival Sunday afternoon with an hour-long lecture on "The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln," the subject of her latest book.

"She really made him come alive," Nichols said. "She is quite a dry person but

really warms to her subject."

Goodwin also reportedly diverged onto the topic of another of her passions: baseball.

Nichols remarked that every detail, even the tasty box lunches and the colorful flags outside Sunset Center, combined to provide a memorable festival complemented by superlative weather and the pleasure of seeing many familiar faces.

"It fulfilled all my expectations, and I was just so impressed," she said. "There were no hitches or glitches, as far as I could tell. Everything was on time, the audience was receptive, and the longer speakers had many questions from the audience."

She was by no means alone in her praise. At Tuesday's Carmel City Council meeting, attorney and resident Skip Lloyd said the festival and Sunset Center are a perfect match.

Mayor Sue McCloud, who attended all three days, proclaimed it a great success and said the McGillens have already secured next year's dates.

Considering Carmel's founding fathers advertised more than 100 years ago for "brain workers," McCloud said, "your brains worked overtime" at the inaugural Carmel Authors and Ideas Festival.

"We are indebted to Jim and Cindy McGillen, and I hope we will have them at the next council meeting to thank them personally," McCloud said.

# Bottle-stealing suspect picked up







with all the water it needs, collectively they could, he said.

#### A combination of solutions

To provide the Peninsula with 12,500 acre-feet of water per year, the plan calls for 8,330 AFY of desalination, 300 acre-feet of stormwater reuse, 150 acre-feet from conservation, 920 acre-feet of aquifer storage and recovery, 2,500 acre-feet of groundwater replenishment and 300 AFY of recycled water. A larger regional plan, which could be expanded in another phase, could provide as much as 28,400 acre-feet of water.

One acre-foot of water is 325,851 gallons, which is enough to provide for three families for about one year.

The group has identified about 1,700 acre-feet of water it could "implement immediately," including conservation, stormwater reuse, aquifer storage and recovery, and desalination from Sand City's plant, which alone would provide 300 acre-feet per year.

"We are calling some of these projects the low-hanging fruit," Kasower said. "These are projects that could get going easily.'

Although Kasower said a component such as stormwater reuse isn't a "big-ticket item," and on its own won't provide the Peninsula with a large amount of water, he argued it's one piece of the puzzle.

"Why not do it even if it's two acre-feet?" he asked.

The stormwater would be captured in parking lots and directed to aquifers. Oils and pathogens would be removed as the water percolated through layered berms.

#### Big dollars saved

Besides being a more environmentally friendly solution to solving the Peninsula's water supply problems, Kasower said a multi-component project would cost much less than Cal Am's Coastal Water Project.

"We are looking at a magnitude of perhaps \$100 million or so savings," Kasower said.

But it's unknown exactly how much each component would cost. Kasower said the group is still seeking more studies to determine that. It's also unknown how long it would take to implement the components.

But Kasower said the community probably can't wait.

"We don't know when the state water board will put the hammer down" and start imposing fines for overpumping from the Carmel River, Kasower said.

One of the more ambitious projects includes using treated sewage to recharge aquifers from which drinking-water is drawn. Although off-putting, the method is being used in Los Angeles and Orange counties, Israel said. "The water would go through microfiltration, reverse

osmosis, ultraviolet disinfection and hydrogen peroxide treatment and be brought up to beyond drinking water quality," he said. After being treated, the water would be injected into the

Seaside aquifer, where it would remain for about a year before being distributed to Cal Am customers.

The project, which would provide at least 2,500 acre-feet

per year, would be the first of its kind in Northern California, Israel said.

Admittedly, however, there is a public relations challenge in convincing customers that drinking treated wastewater is palatable and safe.

"It's very hard to get people to understand that this technology is not rocket science, it's not new," Kasower said. "The community is going to have to become comfortable

## Making yourself too expensive

IT HAPPENED with the steel mills, the newspapers, the TV networks and the airlines, and now it's happening with public employees: Their salaries and benefits have gotten to be so generous, the only way to control costs is to eliminate jobs, if not whole departments.

Consider the airlines. They began as high-end purveyors of luxury services to wealthy customers. There was so much profit to be made delivering business executives and socialites from New York to Chicago or Los Angeles, airline owners became very rich and pilots were rewarded with sky-high salaries. But with the advent of larger airplanes, airfares began to fall and flying became a mass phenomenon. As demand for air travel increased, discount airlines such as Laker and Southwest began to appear — airlines that paid their pilots \$100,000 instead of \$300,000 per year, and flight attendants less than half of what they were making at Pan Am and TWA. Unable to compete with the discount carriers on fares, these legacy carriers asked their employees to take substantial pay cuts. In some cases, they refused. The result was that several airlines were forced to stop flying altogether.

Likewise, in the early 1960s, a newspaper strike in New York resulted in higher wages — but many of the union members who collected those wages lost their jobs altogether when four dailies went out of business in the next few years.

It was a result foretold by President John F. Kennedy, who was quoted by the Associated Press during the strike as criticizing union leaders for "attempting to impose a settlement that could shut down several newspapers in New York and throw thousands out of work."

In more recent years, television networks such as NBC and CBS responded to sharply escalating costs at their overseas bureaus by closing most of them.

With mid-level municipal employees earning salaries and benefits well over \$100,000 per year, and with ridiculously generous retirement packages being negotiated year after year, the same thing is happening with public employees. Even firehouses are being consolidated or shut down, because firefighters cost so much to keep on the payroll.

Every working person deserves to be paid a fair wage. Collective bargaining is an important tool toward this end. But if wages and benefits get to be too high, the result — even for valued employees — may not be a pay cut, but a pink slip.

#### What emergency? Dear Editor,

Though I have attended all of the meetings and read all of the information concerning the United States Department of Agriculture and California Department of Food and Agriculture plan to once again spray our town, I still don't understand why the light brown apple moth is considered an emergency.

The only losses claimed to justify this LBAM emergency are financial losses to the already subsidized ag industry, and the potential loss of a \$15 million contract to

The LBAM is not a serious public health threat, so why does the state have the right to blanket our town with an untested and undisclosed chemical spray?

The scientists and staff at CDFA, etc., wish for us all to believe we are being sprayed with a natural pheromone and guarantee it is harmless. But these are not benevolent moth scents drifting down upon us. CheckMate is not a natural pheromone. It is a synthetic chemical compound mixed with a synthetic encapsulating agent, and neither has been used in residential areas before. It is designed to adhere to surfaces for 30 days and is not water soluble.

I understand that the CheckMate spray

will be diluted, however, I find it totally unacceptable that it is being sprayed over our town no matter how benign the scientists claim it to be. There are other options for controlling LBAM.

The local papers are advising us to put our "faith in the scientists" because the scientists can be trusted to protect the public. The scientists have promised us that DDT (oops) CheckMate is safe to spray over residential areas.

I live on the Monterey Peninsula because we have clean air and water and a coastline protected from pollution by the National Marine Sanctuary.

I am outraged that my family is being forced to breathe these chemicals to protect the financial interests of big business and protect consumers in China from buying fruit with blemishes.

I have never seen so many members of our community from all walks of life unite in opposition to any issue. Our city councils are nearly unanimous in their opposition — this is unprecedented.

I urge all other concerned citizens to call all local, state and federal representatives and ask what is the emergency that enables our government to subject our families to an experiment against our wishes. We should also be asking why this spraying has been forced upon us without sufficient time to respond to this attack on our civil rights.

It is not too late to stop the spraying – the CDFA has an emergency order that allows them to spray us every 30 to 60 days until 2010.

The Big Sur Lodge Conference Center will host a meeting Tuesday, Oct. 9, to discuss creating a steering committee of local residents who could help guide the planning process for the Big Sur section of the California Coastal Trail. But it is unclear how much input the hikers' group — the

"We have been asked by the coastal conservancy to propose a community-based steering committee," explained Big Sur resident Jack Ellwanger.

Getting to this point hasn't been easy, though. "It's been a royal battle," Ellwanger said. "We've gone eye-to-eye and toe-to-toe with them, and it's a great victory for the community to get the ability to develop a proposal that could drive the whole process."

The coastal conservancy has awarded \$175,000 to a consulting firm to prepare a plan for the Big Sur section of the trail. If the agency decides to work with the local steering committee, Ellwanger hopes the group's role is more than just ceremonial.

"If we're going to have a trail, let's see what the community wants to do," he sug-

Ellwanger said the local community has a great track record of taking care of the coast, and the coastal trail's organization should

"Big Sur residents developed the state's first land use plan," Ellwanger noted. "That's why we don't have billboards here. The people who live here love this place and want to protect it."

While the coastal trail doesn't yet exist, a website dedicated to the trail - www.californiacoastaltrail.info — presents a route that would mostly be adjacent to existing roads as they pass through vast stretches of

"The trail, by necessity, follows State

Highway 1 or secondary roads — the Old Coast Road from Bixby Bridge to Andrew Molera State Park and the Coast Ridge Road from the Ventana Inn area to Kirk Creek Campground," the website says.

But when the trail reaches Big Sur's south coast, hikers would be able to get away from traffic and into more remote territory via the existing Cruikshank and Buckeye trails, which are located in Los Padres National

The web-site also offers a disclaimer, reminding readers nothing is set in stone.

'The coastal trail alignment shown on these maps has not been sanctioned by any agency of the State of California ...'

On the website, the coastal trail's organizers imply they are interested in working with local communities.

'Where the trail does not yet exist, local

volunteers are working with local and regional organizations and state and federal agencies to suggest and to evaluate possible routes," the site says.

Ellwanger hopes the coastal trail's organizers are sincere. In the meantime, he's encouraging residents to get involved in the process, even if they oppose the trail.

"It is up to us to propose how that committee should be composed, how it should comport itself, and what its purpose and scope are," he added. "Everyone's ideas and opinions are welcome."

The meeting starts at 5 p.m. The conference center is located inside Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park, about 26 miles south of Carmel.



## Supervisors: Not all is well in Carmel Highlands

THE MONTEREY County Board of Supervisors Wednesday imposed a 45-day ban on new development and new wells in Carmel Highlands, citing state concerns over health and safety issues.

The ban, unanimously approved by supervisors, is intended to allow the county to come up with a better plan to manage the area's sewage, directed by the Regional Water Quality Control Board.

Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter said the supervisors couldn't ignore the directive from the regional water board to stop development until a plan is formulated.

"If we don't proceed as directed, the water board is going to take over permanent authority," Potter said. "I think it's not very responsible for us to say, 'OK, let's see what happens."

The management plan, which the county has until Dec. 1 to complete, will identify criteria for making sure sewage from septic systems isn't posing a health hazard.

The state is concerned the fractured granite geology of the Highlands could allow effluent from wastewater disposal systems to seep into groundwater, which is then tapped by pri-

Mike Grachek, owner of Granite Drilling Co., told supervisors his company has drilled many wells in the Carmel Highlands and never encountered a problem.

"I know for a fact there has never been septic intrusion in any well we have drilled in the Carmel Highlands," Grachek

John Bridges, attorney for Rick Kashfi, who wants to build a 5,200-square-foot home in the Highlands with a well and septic system, urged the board to resist the temporary

"There is no health threat," Bridges said. "There is no apocalypse. There is no record whatsoever of any water problems in the Highlands."

Richard LeWarne, the county's assistant director for environmental health, said over the years there have been two cases of septic contamination in the Highlands.

Besides wells, the 45-day building moratorium applies to subdivisions, bedroom additions, new dwellings or guest houses, and new or expanded commercial activities.

County environmental health director Allen Stroh said the purpose of the study is to prevent any problems, and the county will try to have the study completed as quickly as possible to create the least amount of burden to property owners.

'I keep hearing over and over again, 'Show me the bodies,' so to speak," Stroh said. "The regional board in essence is saying, 'We don't want the bodies."
