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### IT TAKES A DECADE TO SET A FIRE

W HILE THE last thing most residents want to see in their backyard is a wildfire, Mark Stromberg was thrilled to see 300 acres of Carmel Valley's Hastings Natural History Reservation go up in flames last week.

Stromberg, the reserve's director, and his staff have been trying for 10 years to get permission from a myriad of government agencies to conduct a controlled burn on the 2,500-acre Upper Carmel Valley property, which serves as a biological field station for University of

California students.

About 100 firefighting personnel from the California Department of Forestry, the Cachagua Fire Protection District and the Gabilan Conservation Crew set fire Wednesday, Dec. 12, to the reserve's School Hill area in an effort to reduce a buildup of dry grass and shrubs while enhancing wildlife habitat.

The way Stromberg sees it, fire can be a good thing, especially for the native vegetation that covers the hills and valleys.

"Fire is part of the natural landscape in California," Stromberg explained. "Many plants in our shrub community need fire to germinate. If you expose some seeds to smoke, they germinate immediately. Many plants tolerate fire very well and have come to depend on it."

And while the fire killed some animals in the burned area, it will also benefit many species, Stromberg explained.

"When fire-adapted plants are burned, old woody dead stuff is cleared out and green tender shoots emerge," he said. "They're high in protein and full of easily digestible carbs. Deer, wood rats, mice and quail — anything that can bite off green leaves — is in great shape after a fire."

Hawks are attracted to fire as they seek animals fleeing the flames. "They see a fire and they say, 'Let's go eat." Stromberg said.

Prior to the arrival of Europeans, the Carmel Valley landscape burned frequently. Native Americans commonly set fires, according to Stromberg, to make hunting and gathering easier. He said as many as 20,000 Native Americans lived along the Central California Coast when Europeans first arrived.

# C.V. man: 30 gallons of blood and counting

IMAGINE almost three dozen paint cans lined up next to each other. Now imagine those containers filled with blood.

That's the amount Carmel Valley resident Gary Nelson figures he's donated over the past 45 years.

"It's become a source of pride to me to see how much I can give," Nelson said Monday.

At 70, he believes he's donated about 30 gallons of whole blood and platelets. The amount includes blood he's donated to the Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula Blood Center and in the 1960s while working in Livermore.

Nelson and a Marina man who has donated 26 gallons, according to CHOMP records, are the Peninsula's top donors, according to the hospital.

An average adult male has about 1.5 gallons of blood in his body.

Nelson primarily donates

platelets, which are cells in the blood that help with clotting.

"I've been averaging about a unit a week," he said. "It's kind of a long procedure. You can watch a movie and that sort of thing."

While donating a pint of whole blood can take as little as five to seven minutes, donating a unit of platelets, an amount less than a pint, can take an hour and a half.

A separating machine attached to a donor's arm removes the platelets and a small amount of plasma, then returns red blood cells to the body.

"When you donate whole blood," said Sharon Paddock, supervisor of the CHOMP Blood Center, "you can't donate again for eight weeks. For platelet donations, we have some donors who come in once a month."

That's because the body replenishes platelets very quickly. Donors can give 24 times a year.

# Harbor seals moving in to new territory

■ Pacific Grove to deter them from Lovers Point

HARBOR SEALS have taken up residence at two additional beaches in Pacific Grove, and the city is getting ready to keep them from taking over Lovers Point.

In fact, the P.G. City Council this week passed a resolution that would allow the cute, slippery creatures to be scared off if they set up housekeeping on the city's main beach for swimming and sunbathing.

Lovers Point would have to be temporarily closed to humans if seals begin giving birth there, one city official said

"The pups are pretty helpless little critters for about a month and rely solely on Mom to survive," said Thom Akeman, who is on the city's beautification and natural resources committee.

With the population of harbor seals "as high as it's ever been," according to Akeman, there's concern they'll

# County cleanup could leave some homeless

A SURGE of code enforcement activity, which one resident called "a reign of terror," has the people living in Upper Carmel Valley's Jensen Camp worried they'll be evicted from their homes.

Located about 25 miles southeast of Carmel and just across a creek from the Cachagua Store, Jensen Camp is a small community of about 75 residents who rent trailers or trailer space from a single property owner, Javier Guzman.

In his blog, resident Michael Jones described the recent attention the camp has received from code enforcement officer Phil Hickenbottom, who works for

m A}$ N UNUSUALLY early awakening and a slight change in routine may have helped thwart serious injury or death at the scene of an overturned big rig on Highway 1 early last Wednesday. San Jose resident Saul Flores, a builder/developer who commutes to the Monterey Peninsula almost daily to oversee construction projects in Carmel, Pebble Beach and Monterey, said he happened to be in the right place at the right time to get the driver and a female passerby out of

harm's way before a car crashed into the overturned truck.

Commuter in right place at right time during truck wreck

"It was strange from the very beginning," he recalled. "I've been going down there for approximately two-and-ahalf years, and this was the first time I came that early."

Flores usually leaves home in time to arrive in Monterey around 6 a.m. for breakfast at the Black Bear Diner on Fremont Street before visiting his first job site in Monterey at 7. But on Dec. 12, he awakened at 3:30 a.m. and decided to get up and on the road earlier than usual. Nearing Monterey, he made an impromptu decision to eschew his regular stop and eat at the Black Bear in the Crossroads instead.

But it wasn't open yet, so he headed for Starbucks at Del Monte Center. On Highway 1 just north of Ocean Avenue, he discovered a Safeway tractor-trailer lying on its side blocking the southbound lanes and a frantic woman nearby.

"I asked her if she called 911, and she said, 'Yes,'" said Flores, who admitted he's usually too squeamish to stop at the scene of a wreck. This time, he pulled over and got out of

Peering up at the truck's cab, he noticed the driver's door starting to move and caught a glimpse of the man's hands. Flores said he suddenly realized just how dangerous the situation was, with the overturned truck's undercarriage facing traffic in the middle of a corner on a very dark stretch of roadway. It was just after 5:30 a.m., and Flores worried a driver would fail to see the truck's matte gray underside and slam right into it.

He pulled himself up to the driver's door and helped get the driver, 53-year-old Francisco Parrilla of Stockton, out of

"He was a little dazed, and I was trying to impress on him to hurry," Flores said. "I had him just kind of fall on me and come down to the street, and I was starting to panic, because we were in middle of the southbound lane."

Suddenly, Flores said, he saw a car speeding toward them on Highway 1.


"I was screaming at the car to stop," he said," but there was nothing I could do to make them

He and Parrilla rushed out of the road, and the 1991 Camry hit the big rig very near where they had been standing, according to Flores. It then "veered like a pinball and landed within inches of us and my parked car," he said. "There was no screech of tires.

They didn't even know it was there."

He later learned the people in the Camry were taken to the hospital but had sustained no injuries. California Highway Patrol public information officer Jim Covello said the gold 1991 Toyota Camry had been traveling northbound on the highway when it hit the truck, and no one was hurt, but Flores said the CHP had the direction of travel wrong.

The driver of the truck, who had reportedly crashed into a pole and overturned after swerving to avoid two deer, was also unharmed. The freeway was completely closed for a few hours, and then intermittently open for a few more until reopening completely around 11:30 a.m. The CHP investigated the accident and concluded that, because no one witnessed the deer crossing the highway, the driver was at fault for making an unsafe turning movement, according to Covello. But he will not be cited.






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# P.G. council reduces solar fees, rejects other permit hikes

THE PACIFIC Grove City Council Wednesday rejected a bid to increase development permit fees by 15 percent and voted unanimously to cut drastically the fees homeowners pay for going solar.

City manager Jim Colangelo recommended tacking on a 15 percent long-range planning fee on all development permits, something the council said needed more public

"That is one of the things that should be looked at in a community workshop," said councilman Dan Davis.

In his report to the council, Colangelo said the increased fees would help fund the update of the city's general plan, Local Coastal Program and zoning ordinances.

But the council gave the go-ahead to reduce permit fees for residents installing solar photovoltaic systems in their homes. The reduction is an incentive for those considering such systems.

Only a "handful" of P.G. residents each year apply for a solar permits, Colangelo said. Mayor Dan Cort said he's going to install a solar system in his home.

"It doesn't make sense for us to charge excessively for people who want to build sustainability into their lifestyle," Cort told The Pine Cone before the meeting.

The city will now charge solar-seeking residents one hour for a plan check and two hours for an inspection, at \$82.50 per hour.

For example, for a \$25,000 solar photovoltaic cell system, the city previously charged \$775.42 for the permit fee and \$581.57 for a plan check. Now, the cost will only be \$247.50, a savings of \$1,109.49.

Tony Tersol, who owns a solar energy

installation business, told the city he thought it was asking too much in solar processing

And while he was requesting special treatment for solar projects compared to

other development and building permits in the City Pacific Grove, Tersol said it would make the city's more in line

'I'm not asking for special consideration for solar'

with what other agencies charge for solar projects. "I want to point out I'm not asking for special consideration for solar," Tersol told the council. "I'm asking that solar be treated fairly."

Even after the reduction, other cities still charge less in solar permit fees. Santa Cruz charges \$125 for up to a \$25,000 solar system, while Marina is the lowest at \$84.45. The new P.G. fee will be on par with what the City of Monterey charges.

The amount the city will lose in revenue because of the reduced permit fees is outweighed by the benefits of increased used of solar energy, Colangelo noted in his report.

"It is crucial to encourage citizens to use alternative energy by installing solar photovoltaics in their homes," the report indicated, "and thus the loss of revenue is deemed acceptable in order to accelerate the shift to environmentally sustainable practices."

The reduction in permit fees garnered the support of Sustainable Pacific Grove, an environmental group headed by Colangelo's sister, Joy Colangelo.



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# New CHS library to get fire sprinklers after all

AFTER HEARING concerns raised by Carmel High School student body president Kyle Macdonald and echoed by fire officials, Carmel Unified School District board members unanimously voted last month to put fire sprinklers in the new CHS library. The sprinkler system, which is not required under state code, had been removed from earlier plans in order to save money.

Macdonald, who represents students on the school board, had inquired at an earlier meeting about the decision to exclude fire sprinklers. He worried it could cost lives and result in unnecessary damage if a fire broke out in the new library, which will cost about \$3 million and is funded by the \$21.5 million bond voters approved two years ago.

Cypress Fire Battalion Chief Dennis Carreiro, whose fire district includes the high school, told the board of education Nov. 19 his district requires fire sprinklers in new homes to help save lives, and in new commercial buildings to help protect property. A bookstore, he pointed out, would have them, but the state architect's office governs school projects and requires sprinklers in buildings over a certain size. The library, at 6,600 square feet, doesn't qualify.

He encouraged the board to exceed the state requirements and sprinkler the library anyway. If a fire erupted there, Cypress would send at least two engines, and other departments would respond as well, but it could take as long as 12 minutes to get water inside the building. In a structure full of books, the damage could already be extensive by then.

"But with a sprinkler system, as soon as the ceiling hits just under 200 degrees, it activates," he said. "As a fire marshall representing our board of directors and a 27-year firefighter, I encourage you to take action, research to get a price and spend a few extra dollars now to keep your library as safe

School officials estimated the cost at \$60,000 to \$70,000, though Carreiro said a system might be installed for as little as \$20,000. He also noted that, while students and teachers might not be in the building when a fire broke out, firefighters would have to enter it to put out the blaze, so their safety also argues for a sprinkler system.

#### Dollars vs. lives

District superintendent Marvin Biasotti wondered if a decision to put fire sprinklers in the library at the high school would require their installation in the libraries at River School, Tularcitos and the middle school.

"Whatever part of the argument is resonating with you, the exact same condition exists at other three libraries," he

Board president Amy Funt asked what the community would want, considering its money is paying for the library. She also observed that while the state does not require sprinklers in buildings paid for with private dollars or local bonds, it does require them in structures built with state tax dollars.

In addition to offering low-cost lunches in its dining hall and providing meals for homebound seniors and their caregivers, the foundation gives rides to appointments and shopping, and holds numerous classes and special events.

Further making the Christmas meal special, the Carmelby-the-Sea Garden Club has donated topiaries as centerpieces and for delivery to those who must remain at home, and Lula's Chocolates has contributed 125 boxes of handmade chocolates for a sweet finish.

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# Aquarium employees to fill vacancies at P.G. museum

To HELP the city with its budget shortfall, workers from the Monterey Bay Aquarium will help staff the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History until the city can develop a long-term plan to hire employees and become profitable.

The staffing is necessary because the city, as part of a reorganization to save money, laid off the museum's assistant curator and eliminated the museum director job, effective with the retirement of Paul Finnegan, who is leaving his post in January.

"Some of the aquarium's guest services people will be working the main floor of the museum," city manager Jim Colangelo told The Pine Cone.

They are scheduled to begin working Jan. 14.

The museum was on the chopping block until the city council voted last week to keep it open. The city is facing financial shortfall of about \$2.6 million. Taxpayers rejected

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tax increases that were on the Nov. 6 ballot.

On Wednesday, the Pacific Grove City Council unanimously agreed to continue charging the aquarium just \$1 annual rent for city land it occupies. The aquarium fought a bid by the city to get more money after its lease expired in 2005. The idea of staffing the museum came about the time the city and aquarium negotiated the lease, Colangelo said.

"In our course of meeting with them," he said, "one of the things that came up was, is there a way the aquarium could help with the museum?"

Colangelo said other partnerships will be considered as the city struggles to make income cover expenses.

"I just think it's really a help to the city at this point," he said. "And it is what we are going to need to do in a lot of other areas."

Colangelo said probably one aquarium employee will be at the museum during business hours. The city might hire part-time employees to help out with the aquarium staff.

This week, it was announced the aquarium's chief financial backer, the David and Lucile Packard Foundation, committed \$50,000 to the museum, which "the city could use to hire a museum manager," Colangelo said.

The aquarium's marketing department will also work with the city to develop ways for the museum to make money, which could include various endowments and enlisting other museums to pay for the exhibits, Colangelo said.

It's also possible the museum could be a stand-alone non-profit entity, he said.

"Anything is possible for this museum," he said. "At this point, our goal is to make it as successful as possible."

Because platelets are only useable for five days, CHOMP's Blood Center is constantly seeking donors. And this time of year, the Blood Center is especially in need, since donors often cancel because of illness, Paddock said.

"We continue to need through the holidays," she said. "We need to keep the donations coming in."

Cancer and open-heart surgery patients are the biggest recipients of platelet transfusions.

Nelson said about 20 years ago, much of the platelet donations he made went to a Peninsula man with cancer, whom he eventually met.

The man has since died, but the platelets extended his life.

"It was years I donated" to him, said Nelson. "He was very appreciative."

Nelson said he started donating blood while working at

Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in the 1960s after someone told him he would be a good candidate because of his clean lifestyle and good veins.

"One time, a gal took a look at me and said, 'You were born to give blood,'" Nelson recalled.

From that time on, he's been hooked on the satisfaction of helping people through donating.

"You really feel good about yourself afterward," Nelson said.

There haven't been any serious mishaps while donating blood through the years, but Nelson said his arms are proof he is a serial donator. "You get a lot of scar tissue from being

stuck with a needle so much," he said.

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## Board wants greater scrutiny of bishop's house at Mission

APPROVAL OF the proposed remodel of a house on the grounds at Carmel Mission was delayed by the Carmel Historic Resources Board Monday because the city's consultant failed to thoroughly evaluate the building's significance. The review submitted by Kathryn Gualtieri did not elaborate on why the bishop's residence, constructed in 1952 as a convent, should not be considered historic, and board members put off evaluating the Diocese of Monterey's application until more information is forthcoming.

"I am glad the city requested the consultant to provide analysis of the historicity of the bishop's residence," chairman Erik Dyar said Dec. 17. "Looking at this one-page submittal, I find it wholly inadequate.'

The Mission San Carlos de Borromeo del Rio Carmelo was constructed in 1771 and is a National Historical Landmark, but many other structures were built on the six-acre grounds in the 1900s and have not been evaluated for individual significance or as a group in a potential historic district. Gualtieri pointed out that fact but did not undertake such an analysis.

"Although it is adjacent to the Carmel Mission, the convent building was constructed at a later date and would not be considered a primary Mission Period historic resource," she wrote. But since it is part of the site, the work, which includes adding a

new two-car garage, entry foyer and covered porch, should "be compatible with the original design of the Mission and the complex as

At the meeting, Pacific Grove architect James Smith said he planned to make the former convent "a proper bishop's residence," since it's "a little ill-suited for its current purposes." In addition to remodeling the interior and making exterior changes, the plans call for repairing cracks, replacing timbers that "are a little bit eaten," and adding landscaping along the adobe wall so people don't hit it with their cars.

Gualtieri had recommended the proposed elaborate design for the entry be scaled down, and Smith had complied. In a report to the board, senior planner Sean Conroy advised it to find the project consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's standards for the renovation of historic properties.

"Since the bishop's residence is not individually historic, new additions and alterations do not have to be differentiated from the existing building," he wrote. "The additions are simple in design and compatible with the existing building and the Mission property. The applicant has done a good job of addressing the consultant's concerns."

But the board did not want to consider the proposed changes without a thorough evaluation of the house, including data backing up

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
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
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#### Construction-induced Christmas blues

# Big Sur trails to stay open this winter

DESPITE A report published in the Monterey County Herald, the U.S. Forest Service is not planning to close any Big Sur roads or trails this winter.

According to a press release sent out last week, the federal agency "has begun closing some roads and trails in Los Padres National Forest for the winter season. Additional forest roads may be closed intermittently during wet weather."

Joe Pasinato, a public affairs assistant for the forest service, confirmed his office has fielded calls this week from residents concerned about the possible closures in Monterey County. The Herald apparently overlooked the fact that much of Los Padres National Forest is not in Monterey County. Pasinato said local hikers have nothing to worry about.

"The closures do not affect your end of the forest," Pasinato said.

Pasinato said most of the possible road and trail closures are in the Mount Pinos Ranger District, which is located between Santa Barbara and Bakersfield. A few possible closures are in the Ojai Ranger District, which is located southeast of Santa Barbara.

According to Pasinato, the forest service is required by law to give advance notice of the possible closure of a road or trail. He said most closures come in response to excessive rain, and particularly, snowfall. Gates are installed at strategic locations in the forest to prevent access by motorized vehicles.

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

## Helpers, runners, walkers and New Year's resolvers sought

THE RIO Resolution Run has a new beneficiary and is looking for people to volunteer or take part in it.

A tradition for folks who like to feel good about starting the new year off right by burning calories for a cause, the Rio Run will offer a three-mile fun walk/run and 6.5-mile race through Mission Trail park and Carmel Jan. 1. The festivities wrap up with a pancake breakfast and random drawings for fabulous prizes.

After a decade raising money for the Suicide Prevention Service of the Central Coast, the race's founder, restaurateur Tony Tollner, decided last year it was time to select a new underfunded and underprivileged nonprofit to benefit from the run, which attracts hundreds of walkers and runners of all ages.

Although the national organization has name recognition, the local chapter of Big Brothers Big Sisters needs assistance with fundraising and finding adult mentors, particularly men, to pair with kids. Big Brothers Big Sisters mentors have reportedly "influenced the lives of more than 1 million children in thousands of communities across the nation."

It helps that the organization "brings a young, fresh volunteer base to the table," Tollner said after last summer's announcement, but race organizer Julie Ann Lozano said more people are needed to ensure race day runs smoothly.

A number of assignments are available, though the Carmel High School track team is already set to map out the two courses New Year's Eve and get out at 5:30 a.m. the next day to erect the barriers. "We make a donation to them in exchange," Lozano said.

The Resolution Run is known for its lovely routes through Mission Trail park and Carmel. While the shorter walk/run usually turns back toward the finish line before reaching the shoreline, the long run takes athletes along Scenic Road and around Carmel Point, providing scenic visual distractions for anyone feeling fatigued.

Both races will begin at 9 a.m. sharp at the Crossroads shopping center in front of the Rio Grill and end at Larson Field behind Carmel Mission, with a walk back to Highway 1 and Rio Road for pancakes and prizes. Registration is \$30 (\$35 on race day) and \$20 for kids 12 and under, and includes a long-sleeve T-shirt. 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








section to feature selected vintages for a few hours on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, according to an Oct. 12 letter to the city. The tastings would attract more customers on slower days and help build relationships with vendors so he could offer a better selection of wines for sale.

"A wine tasting bar would be a great benefit to our customers, vendors and daily business," Sanchez wrote.

Surf N Sand, located on the edge of the business district at Torres and Sixth, sells cards, books and magazines, snack foods, liquor, beer, wine and miscellaneous other items. It does not conform with Carmel Municipal Code requirements for the residential-commercial district, according to planning services manager Brian Roseth, who said wine and beer can only be sold in a full-line market like Bruno's, snacks belong in a convenience store, and the other items are prohibited.

Roseth said Surf N Sand only exists in its present state because it predates the rules, which were adopted in 1984.

Since a tasting bar would add to the store's wine business, it would go against the city's practice of reducing and eliminating uses that don't comply with the current code, Roseth

Commissioner Alan Hewer was tempted to go against Roseth's advice.

"It's unfortunate they are where they are and that the line wasn't drawn around them," he said, adding that approving the permit would put Surf N Sand on equal footing with other similar businesses in town.

Chairman Bill Strid asked if combining Bruno's and Surf N Sand's finances so they could hold a single business

license instead of two would enable the city to approve the wine tasting. Roseth said he believed it would, since the tasting could be associated with Bruno's, a full-line market.

"That seems very effective, because it would be very difficult for me to come up with justification to go against the general plan to allow you to have wine tasting as established now," Strid told the Sanchezes.

Several commissioners also suggested physically connecting the two stores, which were constructed more than a half century ago.

The commission voted to give the pair a month to determine whether they could and would want to make such a change to facilitate wine tasting.

After the meeting, Fermin and Ryan Sanchez expressed doubt about the possibility and wondered if it would be worth the trouble, considering offering wine tasting is no guarantee business will boom. They also said the buildings could not be connected.

"At least we didn't get denied," Fermin Sanchez observed.

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

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that would be approximately \$24,000 annually saved by the city just through energy efficiency," AMBAG assistant special projects manager Elisabeth Russell told the Carmel City Council Dec. 4. "Not to mention the good things you've done for the climate."

City taxpayers reap benefits of 'vending misers' and other gadgets

This week, Russell told The Pine Cone the Energy Watch program, which is open to people in Monterey, San Benito and Santa Cruz counties, has facilitated the installation of almost \$300,000 in energy-efficient devices in public buildings, hotels, motels, restaurants and homes in 2007. On Thursday, an auditor was busy reviewing Monterey buildings for potential power savings, according Russell.

An auditor already thoroughly vetted seven cityowned buildings in Carmel, and contractors paid by Energy Watch installed the new bulbs and equipment.

"We were essentially changing out lighting," she explained, with new bulbs replacing higher-wattage lights, and LED exit signs taking the place of conventional ones.

Workers also added motion sensors to ensure no lights are left blazing in

empty closets and other small spaces.

We won't install them in large stall bathrooms, because we don't want anyone to be stuck in the dark," she said.

Finally, city soda machines were equipped with "vending misers" that keep the right number of drinks cold.

> "It reduces how much time the compressor's on," she said. It also senses when soda sales are brisk and will keep the chilling ramped up when needed. Conversely, "at night, when no one's using it, it will almost put the soda machine to sleep.'

> According to Russell's Dec. 4 report to the council, Harrison Memorial Library's main and Park branches benefited the most, with a combined \$13,052.50 worth of equipment installed, followed by Carmel Police Department, which received \$7,276.30 in new bulbs and gadgets. Carmel City Hall, the firehouse and Vista Lobos also received upgrades, as did some of Sunset Center's buildings — though not the theater's spotlights, of course.

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# Despite rain, water savings urged to avoid conservation rules

A STRONG storm swept through the Monterey Peninsula this week, but despite rainfall, local water users may nevertheless have to go into an advanced state of water conservation in January.

And to encourage savings by the community's biggest users, California American Water Co. wants to raise their rates signifi-

"Water use has exceeded daily targets almost every day since November 18," said the water users into Stage 2 in January."

The conservation mode, one of seven levels established by the water district, means required landscape water budgets for large irrigators of three acres or more, large residential water users and water users with dedicated landscape water meters.

The Peninsula is currently in the midst of Stage 1, which "increases conservation activities and prepares for further stages of conservation and rationing."

If the Peninsula moves into Stage 2, it will be the first time in recent memory.





complicated recipes are making a believer out of me.

#### What you need:

- 4 oz. bittersweet chocolate (finely chopped)
- 3 Tbs. butter, softened and cut into small pieces
- 1/2 tsp. peppermint extract
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 c. confectioners' sugar



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#### How to make:

Melt the chocolate in the top of a double boiler over barely simmering water. Add the butter and cook, stirring, until the butter has melted and is incorporated into the chocolate.

Separate 1 egg, putting the white in a large bowl and the yolk into the chocolate. Whisk the yolk into the chocolate, fully incorporating it. Repeat this process with the remaining 2 eggs. Stir the peppermint extract into the chocolate mix-

Remove the chocolate mixture from the heat and let cool to lukewarm. Add the salt to the egg whites and, using an electric mixer, beat them on medium-high until they form stiff, glossy peaks. Beat in the confectioners' sugar.

Fold the egg whites into the chocolate, being careful not to deflate the egg whites. Spoon the mousse into a bowl or individual serving bowls and refrigerate for at least 6 hours before serving, or until the mousse is very firm.

Serves 4.

Powers, who was married to Carmel cofounder Frank Powers and lived in the town for nearly two decades, moved abroad after her husband died in 1920. When Powers left for Europe — where she later established herself as a painter in Paris, Capri and Rome — the recently married Madeleine stayed in San Francisco with her husband.

"It's very ironic that everybody in this show is a descendant of the daughter she left behind," Gafill observed.

Madeleine's daughter, Lolly, married Bill Fassett, and the couple moved to Big Sur in 1946 and founded Nepenthe. As Nepenthe evolved into a gathering place for an interesting cast of creative types, Lolly emerged as the grand matriarch of more than just her own family. And while she never embraced a particular artistic medium, she profoundly influenced the would-be artists in her own family and her community.

"When I look at all this work [in the Phoenix Shop exhibit], I see the stamp of my grandmother, Lolly," Gafill said. "She wasn't an artist per se, but she created an environment that was so rich and colorful."

Lolly Fassett encouraged her children and grandchildren to be creative and resourceful.

"Lolly encouraged people to deal with their limitations by using creativity," Gafill said. "If we didn't have candles, we dipped them. If we didn't have clothes, we made them. Half the building at Nepenthe was made from reclaimed wood. After the kids got out of school, they would pull nails out of old wood, and if the nails were straight enough, they'd use them again."

According to Gafill, most family members never considered themselves "artists." That was a title they reserved for her uncle, Kaffe Fassett.

"Kaffe was the artist," she recalled. "Everyone else was making amazing things, but we never thought of ourselves as artists."

The author of more than a dozen books and the creator of a vast body of colorful works, Kaffe Fassett is one of the world's most acclaimed textile artists. In 1988, he became the first textile artist ever displayed in London's prestigious Victoria and Albert Museum. Kaffe Fassett, by the way, is planning to be at Friday's reception, Gafill confirmed, where he will sign copies of his books and talk about his work.

In addition to showcasing Fassett's artistic accomplishments, Friday's reception highlights the family's diverse artistic talents.

"I've always known that everybody in my family had a creative impulse," said Erin Gafill. "But this is the first time I've seen everybody's work in the same place."

The event has also brought the family closer together.

"There can be a lot of tension in any family," Gafill said. "Many things can divide us, but creativity brings people together. This exhibit is creating a sense of excitement and a sense of connection. It's really healing."

The exhibit is also evidence that a liberal use of bright colors is a family trait.

"Many artists are tentative with their use of color," she said. "But not in this family."



the Monterey County Sheriff's Office.

"[Hickenbottom] has toured and photographed the camp, has detailed each and every deviation from the current county code and is handing out citations for one and all,"

wrote Jones, who owns A Moveable Feast, a catering business located at the Cachagua Store. "He is confiscating vehicles and condemning homes wholesale ...'

Robin Knowles-Falkenberg, a 15-year Jensen Camp resident who is in the process of moving to Marina, returned to the camp last week to discover her trailer had been declared a public nuisance and a car she owned had been towed. Knowles-Falkenberg said she previously notified the sheriff's

office of her impending move and said the car — a 1997 Mitsubishi — is registered as a non-operative vehicle.

"It's just not fair," Knowles-Falkenberg said of the citations. "Especially at this time of year. It's too close to Christmas."

Knowles-Falkenberg said the sheriff's office is unable to tell her exactly where her car was towed because Hickenbottom is on vacation until early January. She is also worried she won't be able to sell her trailer now.

"I'm a single parent and I work my tail off," she said. "I used my inheritance to pay for this trailer. It's my nest egg."

Knowles-Falkenberg has 30 days to clear the violations.

According to Jones, residents are being cited for violations that exist all over Monterey County, even in upscale neighbor-

"It's selective enforcement," he suggested.

Jones is concerned residents don't have the resources to fight the county.

"These people have no one standing up for them," he said.

While it is not known what caused the recent surge in code enforcement, the action follows a 6th District Court of Appeals ruling in September that decided the county can be sued by Jensen Camp residents after it was determined their drinking water was tainted with dangerous levels of naturallyoccurring fluoride. The appeals court ruling reversed a 2006 decision that released the county from liability in the case.

#### 'No need to be heavy-handed'

Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter said his office was not informed in advance of the escalation in code enforcement.

"My office is extremely concerned about the way this has happened," Potter insisted. "It was a complete surprise to us. I'm concerned there was not a whole lot of warning, respect, courtesy or even normal process given over what is essentially a vehicle abatement issue."

Potter offered his assurances to Jensen Camp residents.

"I've contacted every level of authority in the county," he said. "Let's be kinder and gentler. Let's work together on the issues. We don't need to be heavy-handed. There are better ways of enforcing [county code regulations] than coming in and scaring the community."

The Monterey County Sheriff's Office confirmed its recent focus on code violations at Jensen Camp.

"We do have an active investigation going on for various code violations," confirmed Sgt. Scott Ragan of the MCSO's coastal station. Ragan declined to comment on the specifics of the investigation because Hickenbottom is on vacation.

Despite Hickenbottom's absence, the code enforcement continues.

"They took six cars out of here yesterday," Jones reported Thursday. "Somebody is still working."

Ultimately, though, Jones is more worried about residents losing their homes.

"Where is everybody going to go?" he asked.

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

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

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
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#### Police seek help in nabbing criminals

BURGLARS BROKE into several Pacific Grove homes during the past month, including one incident when the perpetrator fled after a woman heard him rummaging in her family room Monday night. Police hope eagle-eyed residents will help them catch the culprits.

Seven residential burglaries were reported between Nov. 24 and Dec. 18, according to PGPD Cmdr. John Nyunt. While alarms apparently scared thieves away in a few instances, burglars made off with cash and electronics in others, and ransacked one home. They usually kicked in doors or broke windows to gain entry.

During the evening of Dec. 17, a woman who lives alone on Hillcrest was in her upstairs bedroom when she heard noises downstairs and saw a light on in the family room, according to Nyunt. 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



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"The early explorers reported seeing lots of smoke along the coast," he said. "It wasn't all from lightning strikes. It certainly was the result of Native Americans using fire as a tool."

Stromberg listed just a few of the many reasons Native Americans embraced the practice of controlled burns.

"Many plants were burned for cordage and weaving," he explained. "Many plants were burned for food production. And [after burning], it was a lot easier to see grizzly bears."

Stromberg said sediment in local ponds indicates prehistoric fires occurred in Carmel Valley every two to five years.

#### Reduced risk

Perhaps most important, controlled burns reduce the risk of catastrophic fires, which usually occur during hot windy weather and are extremely difficult to suppress.

"It's not a matter of 'if,' but 'when," said Stromberg, on the chances a major wildfire could strike Upper Carmel Valley.

Although a planned burn at Fort Ord in October 2003 got out of hand, Stromberg said the beneficial use of fire as a land management tool is quite safe.

"The California Department of Forestry sets guidelines in place to make sure controlled burns are done under safe conditions," he said. "Very few people ever get hurt from a controlled burn. Their safety record is nearly 100 percent."

But just because it's safe doesn't mean it's easy. To get permission to burn a specific piece of land, a landowner must make sure a wide range of conditions are met, including recent precipitation, low temperatures and a virtual absence of wind. Those criteria, combined with staffing and equipment requirements, make it very difficult to plan for a controlled burn.

"To do it safely, the conditions have to be just right," he explained.

Stromberg said the reserve's steward, Jaime del Valle, spent three years working on the controlled burn plan CDF recently approved. Del Valle, by the way, is a battalion chief for the Cachagua Fire Protection District. Stromberg said the



reserve started planning the effort a decade ago.

"It was a happy coincidence that the conditions were right," Stromberg conceded.

According to Stromberg, the controlled burn cost the reserve about \$3,000, most of which was spent on gasoline. Firefighters who were on hand to monitor the blaze made use of a helicopter, three bulldozers and six fire engines — all at no charge to the reserve. In addition to the firefighters and equipment, Gary Paddock Contractors contributed personnel and A Moveable Feast, a catering business located in Cachagua, helped feed everybody.

"The fire really cleaned up the landscape," Stromberg said after surveying the firefighters handiwork. "We removed a

# Alleged drunken driver spits on police officer

A 53-YEAR-OLD Pacific Grove man was "very intoxicated," acted belligerent and spat on a police officer after getting pulled over on Ocean Avenue for "driving recklessly and hazardously" at 10:20 p.m. Dec. 14, according to the Carmel Police Department.

The altercation occurred after police took Soney Bae into custody for suspected drunken driving and drove him to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula for a blood test because he refused to submit to a breath test, according to Cpl. Steve Rana.

"He kept on getting more and more aggressive and refused to walk with the officers back to the car," Rana said of Bae, who had also refused to identify where he lived and began yelling and swearing loudly in Japanese and English. 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

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take over even more beaches, which could lead to more contact with humans.

"If people get too close to them or bother them, the moms take off," said Akeman, also a docent with the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary. "An abandoned pup is almost always a fatality. Without mom's milk, they don't survive."

Harbor-seal pupping season peaks in

Although experts believe human activity and scent will be enough to deter harbor seals from setting up shop at Lovers Point, there is some concern the animals could move to the beach because of their increasing population.

April and May, Akeman said. The local har-

bor seal colony is about 600.

Currently, most of the harbor seals, which are nocturnal, spend their days on a beach next to Hopkins Marine Station. Recently, they moved to a beach right next to the chain-link fence that separates Hopkins Marine Station from the nearby recreation

And Akeman said in 2006, during the birthing season, a few seals ventured from Hopkins and went to a small beach at Fifth Street which was fenced off by the city. This year, the seals returned to the Fifth Street beach.

"If they are expanding west of Hopkins," Akeman said, "that brought up the question: Are they likely to have pups at Lovers Point? And that brought the next question: Are they likely to establish a colony there?"

#### A bad mix

About 20 years ago, harbor seals took over a popular beach in La Jolla called Children's Pool, sparking feuds between those wanting to protect the animals and others who believed they should be driven from

Akeman said the resolution is designed to prevent a similar situation from happening in

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Pacific Grove.

"Seals and people don't mix," he said.

Some of the tactics proposed by the city to deter seals from moving onto Lovers Point may seem comical, but they'll be necessary, according to the city.

"If yelling and waving don't work, we'll take pots and pans down there and bang them," Akeman said.

Scarecrows, sonic repellers, digital noisemakers and "excessive or continuous noises" are also being considered to fend them off.

"We decided we don't want any instruments — no prods, no pokes, no touching at all," Akeman said.

The city could use its own employees trained to repel the harbor seals and enlist volunteers for the activity.

And if pups are delivered on a city beach, the city will fence off and close the beach, and post "No Trespassing" signs.

The city might use docents to explain the

pupping viewing sites and the nature of the mothers and their pups. This is currently done at the other harbor-seal areas. Akeman, Bill Kampe and Roger Phillips

were part of a subcommittee to discuss how best to deal with the harbor seals, which are protected by federal law.

All of the proposed techniques were approved by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Harbor seals, which are speckled and don't bark, are half the size of their sea-lion relatives, which are more aggressive in

#### Board: House too common to protect

 $\Gamma$ HEY DIDN'T even show up to plead their case, but the Carmel Historic Resources Board unanimously agreed with them anyway.

Robert and Susan Neal's two-story, wood and brick house at Forest and Seventh is not historically significant and should be removed from the city's inventory of buildings that must be preserved.

Historian Kent Seavey concluded in a June 2005 evaluation that the California Ranch-style home, designed and constructed by Ernest Bixler in 1954, is significant. He argued for its preservation because Bixler, a former postmaster who designed and built homes in Carmel from 1930 to 1966, lived there, and because it is "a good representative example of Bixler's residential building design in the California Ranch

In their appeal letter, the Neals said their house should be removed from the inventory because it "does not embody any distinctive characteristics of the California Ranch style and does not possess high artistic value," is not related to any of the city's historic themes and was built after 1940.

Furthermore, California Ranch-style homes in general are not important in Carmel history, and other homes Bixler built are better examples of his work.

Senior planner Sean Conroy agreed. In his staff report to the board, he pointed out California Ranch style, particularly the hipped-roof version like the Neals', is hardly unusual.

"Therefore, it appears the subject residence is an example of the most common style of residential design in the coun-

try from the 1950s," he wrote. Conroy compared the house with several other homes Bixler built in the 1930s in various European revival styles. "The five other examples of Bixler's work on the invento-

ry stand out as contributing to the unique character of the city, while the subject property does not," he concluded. Neither the Neals, nor anyone else, was present to com-

ment on the appeal. Because the style was so common and prolific, board

member Julie Wendt said, a California Ranch-style house in Carmel "should be an exceptional example ... rather than just a good example," to warrant mandatory preservation.

The house is "quite plain" and has "no interesting features

about it," board chairman Erik Dyar added.

The board voted 4-0 to grant the Neals' appeal and remove the home from the inventory. Member Nicole Schroeder was absent.

whatever conclusion Gualtieri makes about the building's historical significance.

"I have no problem with what you're doing and suspect the building is probably not historic," board member Julie Wendt told Smith. "But we should have proper documentation in the file."

While she and Dyar said they wanted an evaluation of the entire Mission complex, Conroy pointed out that the relatively minor alterations sought for the single building would not justify requiring the Mission to pay for an expensive and time-consuming analysis.

"If the Mission sought more extensive changes, that would be the time for more evaluation," he said.

Dyar said he would be content with further study of the residence for historical significance and how it relates with the other structures on the property. With that, the board voted 3-0 to put off voting on the remodel plans. (Member Elinor Laiolo had to step down because she is a parishioner, and Nicole Schroeder was absent.)

## What emergency?

THERE WAS a very odd commentary in the New York Times over the weekend — one which had some interesting relevance right here on the Monterey Peninsula.

Clark Hoyt, the Times' ombudsman (which is to say, the man who analyzes the paper's voluminous mistakes for its readers), offered a column Sunday that objected to the content of a fashion supplement the Times recently started publishing 15 times a year. The supplement, T, is "a glossy, unabashed tribute to the good life," Hoyt noted, and carries enough glitzy advertising to be a "spectacular success" in the otherwise "depressed newspaper world, where revenues are stagnant and layoffs and buyouts are frequent."

The magazine's success helps support the Times' vast, if often misguided, newsgathering operation. But that success also comes at a price to the paper's reputation, according to Hoyt. A photo spread in the Dec. 2 edition contained semi-nude shots of a 17-year-old model from Texas. The photos of the young lady had a "certain Lolita quality," and the Times "made a mistake in publishing them," Hoyt concluded, because T is "delivered with the Sunday Times to more than a million homes" where the newspaper's readers have "no choice about receiving it" and where some people presumably don't want their children to see high-fashion photos of a barely clothed teenager.

But having closely followed the New York Times' alarmist coverage of global warming — wholeheartedly imbued with an Al Gore-style doomsday point of view — the first thing that crossed our minds wasn't whether anyone cared if a young lady took most of her clothes off to be photographed by the Times. Instead, we wondered how the Times can square its concern over the looming crisis of a warming planet with its decision to initiate yet another paper-hogging section of an already massive Sunday edition. No matter how you slice it or spin it, the New York Times is a colossal consumer of dead trees — trees which, if left standing instead of being turned into a medium for profit-making photos of a Texas teenager, would still be in a forest somewhere soaking up CO2.

Which brings us to the local angle: The Carmel Pine Cone may be the only newspaper in the United States which urges its readers not to read it in print. Instead, we offer the exact same content in a special electronic edition which is available by email or via a download from our website. The electronic edition of The Pine Cone is identical to the printed version, but without (as we have pointed out numerous times since we debuted the electronic edition last spring) the dead trees, energy-hogging printing press or delivery trucks burning gasoline as they ply the streets every Friday morning. If you care about global warming, please subscribe to our electronic edition by entering your email address at www.carmelpinecone.com.

The New York Times has an elaborate website. But does the paper urge its readers not to buy the printed version? Hardly. Global warming may be an emergency, but the Times doesn't want it to get in the way of making money. Not their money, anyway.

#### Hearing both sides Dear Editor,

I was present at the Carmel City Council's Dec. 4 hearing of an appeal by a commercial property owner asking that the city remove his property from the list of historic resources.

What struck me as unfair to the city was that its certified historic preservation consultant was not there to present his expert opinion that the property is historic. If this were a judicial hearing, no information-seeking judge and jury (in this instance mayor and council) would hear a case without both sides represented.

But on Dec. 4 only the prosecuting attorney (the consultant, representing the self interests of the property owner who hired her), was present. When the council hears

appeals relating to historic resources, the city's historic consultant (the person under contract to defend the city's values) must give testimony so that there can be a fair and balanced hearing.

Fortunately, the judge (Mayor McCloud) and two members of the jury (council members Hazdovac and Sharp) agreed, and Carmel's historic preservation consultant will be at city hall Jan. 8 when the council meets again to hear this agenda item.

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

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



#### "Garmel Legends"

We keep a little file of legends which we wish had happened. But didn't. Among them is the non-visit to Carmel of SIR ARTHUR SULLIVAN on July 24, 1885. He had come from London to New York to conduct The Mikado, to fight against piracy of Gilbert and Sullivan operas in the States, and principally to visit the children of his deceased brother in Los Angeles! His train journey from New York to San Francisco took 9 days, including stops in Chicago, Iowa, Denver, Salt Lake City and Sacramento. Of Iowa he wrote: "No liquors to be sold in this state. Shall not dine in Iowa." He hated the food in Lincoln, Nebraska; he played the organ in Denver's opera house; repeated that impromptu recital at the Mormon Tabernacle; visited China town and Alcatraz in San Francisco; and took the overnight train 428 miles to L.A. Presumably he by-passed Carmel in the night, probably a few miles inland. We are distressed that he lacked a better guide, especially because he did visit Madera, Fresno and Yosemite during his time in California. But, maybe he was right: we had no opera, no Golden Bough, no Sunset Center, no Forest Theater in 1885. But what a difference he might have made in Carmel history! His "Pirates" might have operated from Carmel Bay instead of Penzance!



Carmel-by-the-Sea: A citizen found a dog near her residence on Santa Rita Street and



"If the state wants to protect its investment for things built with state money, what does our community want us to do with their investment?" board president Amy Funt

Colin Macdonald, Kyle's father and a fire captain, speculated voters would support the board if it decided to sprinkler the library, though board member Howard Given suspected if the question were an either/or, such as, either the fire sprinklers or a new playing field at the high school, many would choose the latter.

"The bond holders are expecting us to deliver in a lot of different areas, and that's what got us into this jam in the first place," he said, as efforts to save money led to the decision to remove the sprin-

klers from the plans.

"The argument \$50,000 could save a firefighter's life is very powerful for me," Funt said, as was the argument that sprinklers could limit fire damage.

"I had not considered the firefighter safety issue; that didn't come to my mind, and that is a really important thing to consider," trustee Annette Yee Steck commented. "On the other hand, we are trying to spend our money in such a way that we can build everything that we need to build for our district and that we promised we would build.'

She wondered how to weigh the cost against potential loss of life and said she did not have enough knowledge of firefighting to judge how much of a difference the sprinklers would make.

"I would hate to see us put all that money into the building and then, through the fluke of a fire starting, lose that entire effort," added trustee Marcy Rustad.

The board unanimously supported installing fire sprinklers in the new library, which is already under construction.

Afterward, Funt praised Macdonald, who had also spoken to the Cypress Fire Protection District board and received its support, for raising the matter.

"You did an extraordinary thing. You brought an issue to us that had very real meaning for you," she said. "That brought about important discussion and a change for our district that no one envisioned."
