Surgeon shares his expertise with Cambodia

THE CARMEL surgeon who performed Cambodia's first total hip replacement and scoliosis surgeries last November will return to the country in March to help train surgeons in the hospital his father founded a dozen years ago.

In a nation with more than 30,000 untreated cases of scoliosis, Gollogly treated a few with severe curvature of the spine — 85 degrees by inserting screws and titanium rods, and fusing the spine in the correct position.

He also undertook the first three complete hip replacements conducted there.

"In Cambodia, if you break your hip by crashing on a motorcycle or falling out of tree as a child, it can be traumatic and painful for the rest of your life," he said.

On his recent trip, he also operated on a partially paralyzed man in his 20s who was bedridden after he broke his back in an accident.

"I was there 10 days, and it was a lot of work. I was wiped out when I got home," said Gollogly, 36. "But it's really fun, really rewarding."

Accustomed to being in the United States and having abundant resources at his fingertips, he was invigorated by the challenges of "limitless pathology and limited resources."

The Children's Surgical Centre — which Gollogly's

> father, an orthopedic surgeon, founded in 1995 and still runs — "aims to improve the quality of life for disabled poor people by providing rehabilitation surgery and general rehabilitation programs." It provides facial reconstruc-

Water cutback order:

SUPE SAYS IT MAY BE IMPOSSIBLE TO COMPLY

A WEEK after California American Water Co. was informed it would be ordered to drastically reduce pumping from the Carmel River — long before a new water project will be brought online — a county supervisor said the order might be impossible to fulfill and he plans to meet with a state assemblyman and others to address the urgent situation.

"It's extremely harsh, and the impact is going to be significant," said 5th District Supervisor Dave Potter. "And I question whether the order is even attainable by this community."

On Jan. 15, the State Water Resources Control Board issued a draft cease and desist order requiring Cal Am to reduce river pumping by 50 percent within six years.

Without a new water supply — which is in the permit process but still has a very long way to go — the order would mean drastic conservation efforts for Peninsula residents, who have already saved more water than most in the state.

Potter, who also called the order "poorly timed," said he planned to meet with Assemblyman John Laird about it.

Insurance company lawsuit seeks \$2 million FOR RLS PRESIDENT'S BURNED HOME

THE INSURANCE company for Robert Louis Stevenson School is suing a lighting manufacturer and two local stores, claiming they're liable for a fire that destroyed the Pebble Beach home of high school's headmaster last spring.

The lawsuit, filed Jan. 16, seeks more than \$2 million for the value of RLS president Joseph Wandke's Forest Lake Road house, which was gutted April 26, 2007.

"The fire," according to the suit, "started as a result of a negligently maintained and/or defective accent light, which was located at the base of a plant."

The suit, filed by Hartford Casualty Insurance Company, targets The Home Lighter in P.G., Design One Environments in Seaside and light manufacturer Cal Lighting in Ontario.

Some homeowners pay \$2,000 a month for H_2O

WITH DRASTIC water cuts looming, the Monterey Peninsula's biggest water users are getting personal phone calls from California American Water Co. reminding them they're using too much water. And a knock on the door might not be too far off.

This week, Cal Am began calling 240 residential customers who used 23 units of water (17,200 gallons) or more in January, said Catherine Bowie, Cal Am's community relations manager.

"When we have an entire community at risk for drastic changes in lifestyle and the potential for significant fines and rate increases," Bowie said, "there is just no excuse for water

Property owner sued over C.V. park access

THE MONTEREY Peninsula Regional Park District and a group of local residents called the Friends of the Carmel River Trail are suing a Carmel Valley property owner who put a gate across a trail that once provided hikers and equestrians access through his land to Garland Ranch Regional Park.

Charities seek \$\$\$ for great golf shots during AT&T Pro-am

How MANY birdies will defending champ Phil Mickelson make during next month's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am? He's not the only one hoping the answer is, "a whole lot."

The Monterey Peninsula Foundation, the nonprofit that

California condors, the big birds seen as buzzards or circling vultures in old movies, were nearly extinct when the last nine were caught 20 years ago and taken to Southern California zoos for captive breeding as part of a recovery program. Now

we have about 300 condors - more than two dozen of them once again soaring over Big Sur, including the first two chicks born there in more than a century. Others are in other parts of California and Arizona – including the Pinnacles east of the Salinas Valley – or still in the zoos, cared for as breeding stock in the recovery program. Thousands existed before the 1849 Gold Rush brought miners, settlers and hunters that gradually eliminated the large scavengers, but some can now be seen from Highway 1, usually near Julia Pfeiffer Burns State Park.

Supporters can choose their charities and commit to giving a certain amount of money per birdie or make flat donations. The MPF will administer the program and provide a 10 percent match to each nonprofit based on how much it raises.

"It is a really good opportunity for us to have something new and get people excited about it, because people are really into golf," Martinez said. "We raise more than \$1.8 million every year, and this money will go toward the operating of our programs." The Carmel Foundation receives no govern-

To provide more motivation, the MPF is awarding prizes to donors via random drawings of completed pledge forms, and each form also offers a chance to correctly guess how many birdies will be made during the tournament and win a Norwegian Cruise Line seven-day trip for two to the Mexican

Martinez said she and other Carmel Foundation staff also hope to generate excitement by wearing golf garb around the time of the tournament and inviting Pebble Beach Golf Links head pro Chuck Dunbar to speak to members about past and future AT&T pro-ams and preparations for the 2010 U.S. Open. Dunbar will speak Wednesday, Jan. 30, from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. in Diment Hall at the Carmel Foundation. Refreshments will follow.

Residents riled up over speed hump on Dolores Street

 $T_{\rm HE}$ SPEED hump installed on Dolores Street last fall to slow drivers taking kids to nearby schools has sparked a battle between neighbors.

Its chief proponent, Jeff White, successfully campaigned for the hump by arguing conditions on the road were unsafe and presenting a petition signed by 23 people backing that claim. But other residents object to it and feel their input should have been sought.

This week, Charlotte and Peter Boyle told The Pine Cone they were upset to find the black and yellow plastic bump, which cost about \$5,000, nailed to the street near their home.

"This hump was installed in front of our house without any notification to us or to most of the households on the affected area of Dolores," she said. "Jeff White did the whole thing while we were out of town and was very selective in who he contacted to sign his petition."

The Boyles inquired about having the hump removed but were told they would have to wait at until a three-month trial was completed.

"We started right away to talk to police, neighbors and the city," she said. "We did everything we were told to do."

They circulated a petition that protested the speed hump as dangerous and unnecessary and said it was installed without due process. Charlotte Boyle reported 15 households on Dolores and four on Franciscan Way signed.

The Boyles gave the petition to the city in December, and White submitted more signatures supporting his.

"I have dueling petitions," observed city administrator Rich Guillen, who plans to hold a meeting with the neighbors to discuss the matter.

They also sent a letter to Mayor Sue McCloud and the city council requesting removal of the hump.

"Our concern is that if this could happen in this manner on Dolores, it could happen anywhere in Carmel, and do we want a city full of speed humps?" Boyle said.

In a letter to Carmel Police Chief George Rawson, Franciscan Way resident John Graney complained the hump "is unsightly and out of character with Carmel," presents a hazard, could increase emergency response times and was poorly placed.

"I am a permanent resident of Carmel, have owned property here for more than 30 years and have not been out of town this year," he wrote. "However, I was not aware of, or asked to sign, any petition requesting that speed humps be implemented on Dolores Street."

Bob Evans, who served on the Carmel City Council in the 1980s and has lived on Dolores for more than 40 years, said the city's decision to install the hump based on White's petition "suggests a curious disregard of normal due process." He called the move "a black mark against a city administra-

tion that enjoys a reputation for fairness and openness in all it does."

But White and his allies said the hump has made the street

"It absolutely has addressed the issues," said White, adding that he can see it from his kitchen window and has watched cars slow to cross over it.

Pulling onto Dolores from Franciscan Way is easier, and walking down the street is safer, he said. He disagreed the hump causes noise and increases pollution.

Council OKs \$50K for urban forest work

AFTER HIRING arborist Barrie Coate last year to make recommendations for maintaining the urban forest in Carmel-by-the-Sea, the mayor and city council approved a \$50,000 plan to implement some of his advice. They perused his report in December and authorized the expenditures Jan. 8.

In a report to the city council, city forester Mike Branson proposed spending \$20,000 to install more pervious concrete and enlarge planters to better accommodate downtown trees and their roots, \$13,000 to improve subsurface soils, \$8,000 to mulch, \$3,000 to conduct a survey to see if replacement trees are being planted and maintained as required, \$2,000 to hold community workshops on proper tree pruning and care, and \$4,000 to contract with a nursery to grow trees resistant to pine pitch canker.

The council first heard the spending plan in December.

"I'm concerned about the public thinking the \$50,000 is for more trees planted, and it's not, really," Mayor Sue McCloud said when the council fielded Coate's study and Branson's suggestions Dec. 4. Branson said the council could override his suggestions and order the purchase of more trees instead, but nobody took him up on that option.

"How can anyone be against any of this stuff?" councilman Gerard Rose asked. "It's like being against puppies."

Also during the December meeting, McCloud worried about gardeners and landscapers doing tree work. While all tree services must obtain business permits and agree to follow city tree-pruning standards, gardeners and landscapers generally work on smaller trees and are not required to follow the city standards. If more than 10 percent of their work involves trimming, they are considered tree services and must get the appropriate license, but that threshold is difficult to calculate and enforce.

"What surprised me most was fact that we have not held landscape and gardening people's feet to the fire," McCloud said. "That was a real shockaroo."

Branson said the city developed a handout in English and Spanish to distribute to landscapers and gardeners explaining the city's rules. McCloud asked him to ensure they receive the information whenever they renew their business licenses at city hall.

At the January meeting, the council approved Branson's request for \$50,000 from the Capital Improvement budget account, but it delayed endorsement of a revised list of recommended trees until the forest and beach commission reviews it and makes suggestions.

School district hires expert to plug holes in computer network

AFTER HACKERS broke into its system last March and accessed the personal information of more than 1,000 employees, the Carmel Unified School District is considering hiring a high-tech computer security firm.

Quest Media and Supplies, Inc., which made a pitch to the board of education last Monday, said it would review the CUSD networks for weaknesses and develop strategies for eliminating them.

"We do expect they'll find flaws — that's what they do," Paul Behan, director of technology and special projects for the district, explained at the Jan. 14 meeting. "They will find and prioritize them for us."

According to the proposed contract, Quest will safeguard the schools' information and systems "from external/internal threats and vulnerabilities including, but not limited to, procedural, software, hardware and/or policy."

"We'll take a look at scanning from two different perspectives: What can someone who is outside your network see? What can someone who is within your network see?" technical consultant Etienne Gadient told the board.

Technicians would scan all internal and external networks, install an "appliance" on the internal network "for scanning and collection of security information," provide a

detailed report of the findings, make recommendations for remediation and "increase CUSD's overall understanding of security threats and potential losses."

The board would not see Quest's reports, which would contain the specifics of what areas are vulnerable and how the systems could be compromised, but would receive progress updates, according to Behan.

Gadient recommended quarterly scanning to ensure the system remains intact.

Behan said he selected Quest, founded in 1982 in Sacramento, rather than a local company because its rates are significantly lower. He contacted some Quest clients, including other education agencies.

"We're not talking about an event, we're talking about a relationship," board member Amy Funt said.

Behan presented a draft contract to the board for review and said he would bring a finalized version back for approval at the next meeting.

Teenage intruders

Last September, the Monterey County Sheriff's Office reported two students had hacked into the district's computer system the previous March.

"After a lengthy investigation of the students' home computers, evidence was found that at least one of the students had illegally gained access to confidential employee information," the MCSO reported at the time.

Investigators gathered sufficient evidence to cite a 17-

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Pine Inn owner proposes underground parking garage

AN UNDERGROUND parking garage next to The Pine Inn is a good idea, the Carmel Planning Commission decided earlier this month. But the garage — proposed by hotel owner Richard Gunner — shouldn't be built at the cost of significant trees and must not come with additional hotel rooms, the commission said.

The garage plans call for excavation of a large area north of the hotel, including the existing Pine Inn parking lot at Monte Verde and Sixth, the southern two lots of First Murphy Park and a section of Sixth Avenue between Monte Verde and Lincoln. There would also be a street-level parking on top of the garage, along with five new hotel rooms on a second story above the parking structure. The garage would provide 100 spaces, 60 of which could be owned and used by the

"This project assumes participation by the city, both in terms of allocating land under First Murphy Park and providing some of the funding for the project," planning services manager Brian Roseth said in his staff

Architect John Thodos said the walls above ground would be covered in plants. Also, mature trees would be planted to replace any cut down during construction.

The net result would be "a continuous park, from Lincoln to Monte Verde, 80 feet wide," with the planted roof of the underground garage disguising the parking area

Gunner came up with the concept "to

serve not only his problem, but a problem in the community," Thodos said.

Code complexities

The plan would require amending the city's codes — and approval by the California Coastal Commission — to allow the removal of significant trees and parking on the First Murphy site, according to

Also, a permit for new hotel rooms above the parking structure would be very difficult to approve, Roseth said, because the site is zoned residential and could only accommodate the units if voters decided to overturn the initiative they passed in 1967 banning hotel/motel uses in the single-family residential districts.

Although Roseth initially suggested not proceeding with the plan since it would require changing the zoning code and general plan, and have to overcome many hurdles he offered an alternative design at the meeting. Instead of using First Murphy Park, the garage could be built under the Pine Inn's parking lot and Sixth Avenue.

The shape would be a little odd, and gas, sewer and water lines would present complications, but Roseth said it might be conceiv-

Thodos indicated he didn't much care for the compromise but conceded it might work.

"Compromise is easy, but if we start with a compromise, I don't think it's much fun,' he commented

A parking problem?

Commissioners differed over whether a shortage of downtown parking exists.

"I think the primary difficulty will be convincing ourselves and others there is a parking problem," commissioner Alan Hewer said.

Chairman Bill Strid countered, "Most definitely there is a great deal of interest in additional parking anywhere in Carmel. It's a matter of our looking at this and seeing if we see a light at the end of the tunnel, because it would be a long and difficult tunnel."

"I do recognize the hurdles — I am not naive," commented commissioner Jan Reimers. "But I think some things are worth the challenge.'

Commissioner Steven Hillyard said the debate seemed to be over whether trees are

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

The light, which was in Joseph and his wife, Marilee's, master bedroom, and had been positioned to illuminate a ficus, had not been tampered with, according to the sevenpage product liability suit filed in Monterey County Superior Court.

"The light was defective in either its design, manufacture, instructions, information, warnings or all of the preceding when it left defendants' control," the lawsuit states, "making it unreasonably dangerous for the purpose for which it was intended to be used."

The Home Lighter's Monterey attorney, Sam Linker, said the P.G. store simply sold the light but played no part in installing the lamp or setting it up at the Wandkes' home.

"I think they sold it five years before the fire happened," Linker said. "It could have been any store that sold the light and they could have been named" in the lawsuit.

Design One Environments specializes in plant interior design and maintenance.

Hartford's suit seeks to reclaim \$2,080,367 the insurance company compensated RLS and the Wandkes for the loss of the 3,700-square-foot house and personal possessions. The Wandkes had lived in the house, built in 1959, for 24 years.

According to the suit, the lighting companies were negligent and careless because they failed to "reasonably supervise, train and hire competent employees and agents to maintain the plant and the light" to prevent a fire from occurring.

The suit, which asks for a jury trial, indicates that "on or about" the day the fire broke out, the defendants "provided or

The lawsuit does not indicate the age of the light, who manufactured it, or who decided to put it next to a flammable house plant. A website lists Cal Lighting as a manufacturer of lighting products.

In their initial probe into the cause, fire investigators didn't know whether an electrical problem sparked the

fire or it was caused by the light's proximity to the plant.

Marilee Wandke was working at home at about 8:40 p.m. April 26, 2007, when she heard the smoke alarm sound at the other end of the house, according to a Pebble Beach Fire report at the time.

She discovered smoke and fire in a corner of the master bedroom, and by the time she had dialed 911 and gotten outside, the fire had spread down the hall.

Minutes later, by the time firefighters arrived from the station a little more than a mile away from the campus, the fire was coming out of the door.

Cypress Fire and Pacific Grove firefighters assisted and worked for about five hours to put out the fire, which caused no injuries.

Craig Ehnisz. In November 2006, Ehnisz installed a gate across the 15-foot-wide trail, which residents often use to reach Garland Park along the north bank of the Carmel River.

"The trail has been used by the public since at least the 1930s," explained Kirk Wagner, an attorney representing the park district and residents' group. "The trail serves as the safest and most convenient access way to the park by foot or horse east of Garland Park. The trail is very well established. Dozens use it daily."

According to Wagner, a previous owner of the property -G&V Properties — agreed in 1974 to allow a trail to cross its land in exchange for a permit to subdivide its land. Unfortunately, a subdivision map that incorrectly placed the easement in the middle of the river was filed with the Monterey County Recorder's Office.

In 1983, after learning the easement was improperly recorded, the Monterey County Planning Department made a development permit sought by the property's new owner conditional on the dedication of an easement for the public use of the trail. The owner agreed to the condition, but the easement was never recorded because he abandoned the project.

By suing Ehnisz — who operates a business, Carmel River Stables, on the site — the plaintiffs are seeking a judgment dedicating the trail to public use.

"It's kind of a sad story and totally unnecessary," Wagner said. "It has really impacted this part of Carmel Valley, where many people own horses. We tried to reach a compromise with the property owner, but we just haven't made any progress. So we're left with no other option than filing a lawsuit."

In response, Ehnisz defended the gate, which he said was installed after after he was attacked by a dog.

"There's a safety issue here," Ehnisz insisted. "What if a dog harms my 11-year-old daughter?"

Ehnisz said he wasn't aware any easement existed when he purchased his property in 2006.

"For an easement to exist, it has to be recorded," he said. "When I bought the property [in the spring], it was raining and nobody was riding on the trail."

The park district offered to pay for liability insurance, Ehnisz reported, but he declined.

"For them, this is a money issue," he said. "But for me, there's more to it than that. I think they're wrong, or I wouldn't be in this mess."

The lawsuit came as a surprise, Ehnisz contended. He said he was under the assumption that a trail was being constructed on the opposite bank of the river.

"I was shocked by the lawsuit," he added. "The last I heard was they were working on the trail.'

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Tax benefit made ranch deal possible

FOR THE owners of Upper Carmel Valley's Violini Ranch, a federal law created just the right incentive to put a conservation easement across 3,200 of their 4,000 acres.

In a \$1 million transaction that was finalized Dec. 21, 2007, the Big Sur Land Trust and the Nature Conservancy acquired the easement from Henry and Johnny Violini.

The law — part of the Pension Protection Act of 2006 — increased the tax benefits for ranchers and farmer who sell conservation easements to land trusts and other groups seeking to preserve open space.

Often, when the easements are sold, the price is below the appraised value of the lost development rights. The difference is treated as a charitable donation by the federal tax code, creating a sizable deduction for the owner.

Before the 2006 law was enacted, landowners were limited in using this deduction to no more than 30 percent of their adjusted gross income for five years. The law now allows them to write off 50 percent of their AGI for up to 15 years.

In the past, a land trust would often purchase a property, then seek a government agency to buy it. More recently, though, the practice of purchasing conservation easements while allowing private ownership of the land has become popular.

"Collaborating with private landowners on conservation easements will become the pathway for preserving land-scapes," said Rachel Saunders, BSLT spokesperson. "It allows property owners to retain ownership, while at the same time, it provides a conservation benefit to the public."

She called the tax law, "a vital tool for an organization like ours."

The tax law that encouraged the Violinis' to sell a conservation easement expired at the end of 2007. Congress is considering legislation that would make the tax benefits permanent

Meanwhile, the transaction represented a milestone for the BSLT, which has negotiated 30 conservation easements in Monterey County.

"It's the largest conservation easement we've been involved with during our 29-year history," Saunders reported.

With government support of land acquisition and management dwindling, it seems only reasonable that nonprofits would team up with the private sector in an effort to preserve open space.

"The Violinis have been terrific stewards of their land," Saunders added. "By working with us, that legacy of stewardship will endure."

The Violinis, meanwhile, praised the BSLT and the Nature Conservancy for facilitating the easement.

"My brother and I love this land and have spent decades exploring every part of it, enjoying the views of the Salinas Valley, Monterey Bay, and seeing bucks and other wildlife," said Henry Violini in a prepared statement. "We want to make sure that this land stays just the way it is, forever."

The ranch is located in the Sierra de Salinas mountain range, southwest of Salinas and about 25 miles southeast of Carmel. Featuring about 2,000 acres of oak woodland and savannas, the ranch is home to numerous animals, including the red-legged frog, California tiger salamander, western pond turtle, songbirds, game birds, waterfowl, raptors (including the golden eagle), mountain lions, badgers, bobcats and a wide variety of reptiles.



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60 years and 24 singers later, Four Freshmen hit the road

HE LIKED the B-52's and the Go-Go's, but a 19-year-old Vince Johnson somehow fell in love with the music of the Four Freshman, a pop vocal quartet whose last big hit came in 1956. Now, two decades after he first heard the group's music on a cassette tape, Johnson is a member of the Four Freshmen and will be performing with the group Jan. 26 at Sunset

Founded in 1948, the greatest impact the Four Freshman had was probably their profound effect on a young Brian Wilson, who would go on to establish himself as one of pop music's greatest visionaries as the leader, producer and chief songwriter of the Beach Boys. Yet during the mid-1950s, the Four Freshman were one of pop music's most popular recording and touring acts, scoring hits with songs like "It's a Blue World," "Mood Indigo," "Day by Day" and "Graduation

A big fan grows up to be a member of an influential vocal group

The current lineup includes Johnson, Brian Eichenberger, Curtis Calderon and Bob Ferreira. In its nearly 60-year history, the quartet has featured 24 different singers.

As a young music student, Johnson discovered jazz and the great pop records of the '40s and '50s that passed for jazz at that time. Not long after being introduced to the Four Freshman, Johnson unearthed a cassette tape of their "Voices in Love" in a bargain bin at Thrifty's. He was hooked.

"I used to listen to it when I drove from San Luis Obispo to Carmel Valley,

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From Carmel Valley to Los Angeles and back again

FOR MANY aspiring musicians, the bright lights of Los Angeles are an irresistible lure.

Cachagua singer Rose Merrill

"The CD is about the journey of my life over the past 10 years," she said.

Doris Day to receive Grammy's Lifetime Achievement Award

THE VELVET-VOICED blonde who imprinted "Que Sera, Sera," and the lyrics from more than 70 other chart-topping songs in people's minds and

who is a longtime resident of Carmel Valley and the animalloving co-owner of the Cypress Inn — will receive a Lifetime Achievement Award at the Grammys next month. According to The Recording Academy, the organization of musicians, producers, engineers and recording professionals that presents the Grammys each year, the Lifetime Achievement Award "honors lifelong artistic contributions to the recording medium."

Born Doris Mary Ann Von Kappelhoff in Cincinnati, Ohio, in April 1924, Day began singing after a car accident interfered with her hoped-for career as a dancer. Academy officials described her as "one of the hottest, sultriest swing band vocalists of the 1940s," who was responsible for "Everybody

Loves A Lover" and "Sentimental Journey."

"Aside from Day's commanding and beautiful voice, her success was also based on her ability to sing a song that projected a unique intimacy with not only a crowd or a mass audience, but also with

each individual listener," according to the academy. She had been twice nominated for Grammys but never won, losing to Ella Fitzgerald both times.

While continuing her singing career, Day also began making movies in 1948 after her agent convinced her to take a screen test for Warner Bros. She appeared in almost 40.

"It thrills me to no end, and if there's anybody who deserves it, it's Doris," said Denny LeVett, who has coowned the Cypress Inn with Day for more than 20 years. "I love that woman with all my heart."

LeVett, who was best

where my girlfriend lived," Johnson recalled.

The relationship didn't last, but Johnson's affection for the Four Freshman did. Three years after graduating from USC with a master's degree in jazz studies, he joined his favorite group.

After joining the Four Freshman, Johnson met Bob Flanigan, the group's lead singer during its heyday. Flanigan, now 81, toured with the Four Freshman for 44 years. "I'm always asking him what it was like then," Johnson said. "It's hard to imagine what it was like before Elvis and the Beach Boys."

While the music of the Four Freshmen

might sound a bit tame today, the group was a big innovator a half century ago.

"They had a really high male voice on top of the chord, and the harmony was all stacked up underneath it," Johnson explained. "They were very influential."

While the group's approach has changed little over the past 50 years, there's a whole generation of music lovers who remember the Four Freshman fondly.

"In 1948, the Four Freshman took standards that were sung by Ella Fitzgerald and Frank Sinatra, and turned them into four-part harmonies," Johnson added. "That's what we're still doing, and we're putting a little twist on it."

"I said, 'Great, I would love to meet her," LeVett recalled this week. "We were out at Quail Lodge, had a wonderful lunch, and I guess we hit it off. I sure liked her. We've been friends for 22 years."

LeVett said he doesn't see Day as often as he would like, though she drops by the inn occasionally.

"She still looks great. If she walked in, you wouldn't hesitate: You would immediately know it was Doris," he said. "She still has that beautiful voice and a wonderful fig-

Movie posters in the inn depict Day in some of her most famous films. LeVett's favorite is "Calamity Jane."

'Who wouldn't love that one?" he asked. "That is a remarkable movie, and she did most of the stunts herself."

LeVett recalled attending the Golden Globes in 1989 with Day and Melcher when both were up for awards, he for Best Original Song for "Kokomo," (he didn't win) and she for "actress of the century, or something like that," (the Cecil B. DeMille Award) presented by fellow actor and former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood.

"That, I will never forget. It was like something you can't ever imagine," he said.

Joining Day to receive the Lifetime Achievement awards will be pop pianist and composer Burt Bacharach, The Band, jazz singer and bandleader Cab Calloway, violin virtuoso Itzhak Perlman, percussionist and composer Max Roach, and bluegrass banjo player Earl Scruggs. The awards will be presented during an invitation-only ceremony Feb. 9 and announced during the 50th Annual Grammy Awards telecast at Staples Center in Los Angeles which will be broadcast live at 8 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 10, on CBS.

"I'm the luckiest guy in the world to have Doris as a partner," LeVett said. "I'm really proud that Doris' name has been so absolutely well known and so admired and so loved."

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


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Carmel reads The Pine Cone

A CELEBRITY chef dropped by Didier Dutertre's Bistro Moulin in Monterey this week to enjoy the French and European cuisine and the camaraderie members of the culinary profession share.

It was Michel Richard and friends who came by for dinner. Dutertre first met Richard in Los Angeles many years ago when Richard, father of French/California cuisine, was running his first restaurant there. At the weekend dinner, Richard and friends shared a tapas plate, went on to gnocchi con spinaci, then Richard settled on an entrée of Steak Bordelaise, a grilled prime hanger steak with a shallot-Cabernet sauce and pommes frites.

The menu at Moulin is short and choice: Only seven entrées appear, plus one or two specials, generally seafood, written on a chalkboard. Six appetizers, an assortment of tapas, three sides and four desserts make up the offerings at Chef Didier's petit bistro, where he is the chef/owner. He changes items about twice a month according to seasonal

availability. But the restaurant that opened June 16 last year is almost always full.

Dutertre opened the Moulin following 26 years with the Georis family's Casanova romantic restaurant in Carmelby-the-Sea. He reigned supreme there

as executive chef for most of that time, overseeing a good-sized staff.

In contrast, at Moulin, Dutertre does most of the cooking aided only by one prep cook, two assistant cooks on the line, and two or three waiters. Colleen Manni takes care of the front of the house, handles reservations

and the well thought out list of California, French and Italian wines, in conjunction with Chef Didier.

The idea of formal cooking training came

to him at an early age in his native L'Aigle, a small Normandy town. Although he was interested becoming a pilot, vision problems

made him change career paths and, at 14 or 15, he decided to attend the culinary institute

"My parents warned me of the long hours and weekend work inherent in the restaurant business and how demanding it is," he said, "but I pursued it anyway. I have an uncle who

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
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owns a bakery and patisserie outside of Paris, and I always enjoyed visiting him."

So with his mind made up, he attended two years of study at the culinary academy in Tours, then two more years at another in Strasbourg, at the same time doing apprenticeships with local restaurants.

Following completion of his formal training, he worked for two years as a sous chef in Montreux, Switzerland, at a gourmet restaurant in conjunction with the casino there.

Then on to Juan-les-Pins on the Côtes d'Azur for the summer, and thence to the French Alps for the winter season in Meribel at a ski resort.

When spring rolled around, he was back at Juan-les-Pins at the seafood and Italian restaurant where he worked for two years. It was during this period of his life he was "discovered" by Gaston Georis of Casanova Restaurant, who was on a recruitment visit, looking for a head chef for the Carmel restaurant. Georis' visit coincided with Dutertre's search for another restaurant in the fall, when the tourist season came to an end on the French coast. Et voila! A deal was struck and Dutertre came to California with a two-year contract that telescoped into 25 years.

During this time he has made it a priority to visit his parents, still in L'Aigle, once a year with his daughter, Jeylan, now 21 and doing an internship in communications in Washington, D.C.

When he retired from Casanova, Dutertre spent time searching out just the right spot for his own restaurant. He eventually found the ideal place on Wave Street near the corner of David Avenue off Cannery Row in Monterey — just a block from the aquarium. The space was too large for what he envisioned, so he shares it with Michael

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Imports, a retail gourmet shop that sells European, Italian, French and Greek foods, wine and ceramics. The Mediterranean store is accessible through a wide archway in a common wall to the restaurant.

Dutertre has had the restaurant decorated with sunny yellow walls, blue and yellow striped cafe curtains, graceful black wrought iron chandeliers, large prints of Parisian scenes on the wall, and a wine rack across the back wall. The kitchen is viewable from the restaurant proper.

Antique pepper mills and ceramic windmills (moulins) are on display. One of the pepper mills is a gift from a favorite aunt in France.

The small bistro tables are placed close together, "very intimate," he said. On weekends. the restaurant turns the tables twice, while in the week it is a little quieter; they do one and a half turns at dinnertime.

Dutertre declined to specify a signature dish because, "They are all my signature dishes," he said. But the current favorite among his clientele is osso buco Milanese braised petite veal shanks with mushrooms and polenta.

As for seafood, Dutertre adheres strictly to the Seafood Watch sustainable seafoods recommended by the aquarium. "My clientele is composed for the most part of sophisticated people who are aware of the seawatch; they're doing their part," he said.

Dutertre likes being his own boss. "It's a good feeling," he said. "I can make all the decisions.'

Bistro Moulin European Cuisine is located at 867 Wave St., Monterey, near the corner of David. It is open Monday through Saturday for lunch from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., and dinner from 5 to 8:30 p.m. The restaurant is closed Sunday. Reservations are seriously recommended by calling (831) 333-

six months, investigators combed through the data and reportedly discovered one of the students had district files on his computer.

A few days after the arrest, the district issued a letter to its staff and posted a notice on its website warning people to closely scrutinize their accounts and run credit checks to ensure their information hadn't been used to commit fraud.


"Approximately 1,100 certificated, classified, management, administrative, substitutes, coaches and former employees who were active in the district during the period of approximately 2000 to March 2007" were affected, according to CUSD, with the hackers accessing names, Social Security numbers, birth dates, addresses and phone numbers of most employees, and email addresses, spouses' first name and driver's license numbers of some.

No bank account information is stored on district computers.

The hackers also accessed documents containing passwords for Carmel Middle and Carmel High parents to see student information, but the district reset them in April 2007 and advised parents to routinely change their passwords.

The district's main student databases were not breached, nor were any medical records compromised. The hackers did not access documents containing Social Security numbers and other personal information of students and parents, according to CUSD.

Sgt. Dennis English reported Wednesday there has been no further progress in the case, with one suspect still facing felony charges and the other under investigation.

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

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

That's one of the reasons Gollogly, who would like to visit the country at least twice a year, wants to help doctors there learn how to do the procedures themselves.

"There's no point in my just going over and doing five cases," he said.

During his November trip, Gollogly worked alongside Dr. Ou Cheng Ngiep, showing him how to use specialized equipment and undertake particular procedures.

"He's talented, skilled, has a lot of aptitude and could easily become a very good functional surgeon for that country," said

Cambodia is learning how to educate and train more doctors via its two medical schools

"France has been supporting Cambodian medical schools since the end of the Khmer Rouge, but they lack a sophisticated postgraduate program," he said. "So people graduate and then don't have the residency programs we have in the United States. And then on top of that, the problems over there are overwhelming."

"And if they're not sure what else to do, we can come to their home to perform a water audit." The audits, to be conducted in the spring, will help customers find ways to use water more efficiently.

In a few cases, a leak has caused a homeowner's water bill to spike. They are not the targets of the phone calls and audits.

"If the whole year their bill has been eight units a month, then in January it's 30 units, that's obviously a leak," Bowie said. "In those cases, we ask our [service] department to issue a service request."

In December, Cal Am used an automated phone message to notify 6,000 customers they were using 10 units or more a month.

Residential customers make up more than 50 percent of Cal Am's total customers, while commercial use accounts for 20 percent. The remainder of the water goes to public lands, golf courses and industrial use. Cal Am has 32,000 residential users on the Peninsula.

Bowie said the personal calls have received positive responses from customers.

"They have all been friendly," Bowie said. "Some claim they had already turned off their irrigation systems. But that means we need to find out where all their water is

"If you take a look at what that order means as far as cutbacks go," Potter said, "in the hotel and restaurant world, there are some pretty devastating impacts."

Potter said he will also bring up the topic Friday at a meeting for the monterey peninsula mayors association, a group composed of 12 mayors.

A spokesman for Laird said Thursday the assemblyman hadn't yet reviewed the cease and desist order but planned on doing so soon.

Potter said he was caught off guard by the state order.

"Here you have Cal Am working forward with a solution, with their desalination facility," he said. "It seems to me the community is more focused than it has ever been on finding a new water solution. And to come in now and act like the community has been ignoring the situation is completely

inaccurate."

Frustration over logjam

Other officials said the situation would be helped if government agencies spoke with one voice.

"Better coordination of the various entities would certainly be helpful to get to the new replacement supply solution in a more expeditious and less impediment-ridden fashion," said Monterey Peninsula Water Management District general manager Dave Berger.

While the SWRCB ordered Cal Am to find an alternative water supply, federal wildlife officials are standing in the way of a new dam on the Carmel River and the staff of the California Coastal Commission tried to prevent a test desal plant from being built in Moss Landing. Meanwhile, the Public Utilities Commission has taken more than two years to review Cal Am's environmental documents for the desal plant it wants to build.

"The more these various agencies realize there is a timeline imposed on us and we need to reach a solution with a sense of urgency, the better," said Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie.

However, Potter, who has been on the coastal commission about a dozen years, said he thought state agencies have

been working well together. "Cal Am just got the permit for the pilot [desalination] plant," he said. "And if you ask me, that's a significant step forward."

Response to SWRCB order

Responding to the urgency of the SWRCB draft order, which could be finalized in a few weeks, Cal Am President Kent Turner sent a letter to the

California Public Utilities Commission this week requesting to discuss the order with commissioners.

Cal Am has a legal right to draw just 3,376 acre-feet of water per year from the river, but it pumped 11,285 last year. Overpumping creates low levels in the river, which harms the steelhead fish and red-legged frog populations.

While Bowie said the company could probably curtail about 15 percent of its pumping within the first couple of years, she said it would have difficulty doing more than that without an augmented water supply.

Four-term Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud will seek her fifth term April 8, and victory would make her the city's longest serving mayor since its incorporation in 1916. Her only challenger is the same man who opposed her last year: Dogman McBill, born William Clement Winfield II.

McBill, who once occupied a purple school bus and staged a traveling show featuring 18 dogs, said he hopes more voters will participate in the election than did in 2006, when McCloud secured 952 votes and he received 335.

"I only got a few hundred, but I didn't know what I was doing," he said.

With a population close to 4,100, the city had 2,778 registered voters as of Jan. 7, according to Monterey County Elections. McBill said he plans to hold court in front of Devendorf Park on Ocean Avenue for the next 90 days to ensure people get his message.

"It's close to where I live and it's perfect, and we'll be able to get my name out there," he said.

Bad news for newspapers

ITEM: Last week, the stock price of the New York Times was the same as it was in 1982.

ITEM: The Monterey Herald has eliminated sections and earlier this month laid off eight employees.

ITEM: The Los Angeles Times fired its top editor Monday for refusing to trim the newsroom budget as much as his bosses wanted.

NOT SO long ago, a man could make his family very rich by owning a newspaper.

William R. Hearst is the most famous example, but there are many others.

The Ochs/Sulzberger family, which controls the New York Times Co., may be falling on hard times now. But for decades, the media empire with the Times at its center reaped tens of millions a year for the lucky descendants of Adolph Ochs, who acquired the paper in 1897 and launched it on a path to greatness.

Likewise the family of Otis Chandler, who owned the Los Angeles Times; the Bancroft family, which owned the Wall Street Journal; the Graham family, which controls the Washington Post, and quite a few others.

Newspaper printing presses printed money along with news and features.

And when a business is doing well, its employees also do well. Handing out generous raises and benefits is much easier when the boss's bank account and stock portfolios are full to the brim. At the big newspaper companies, moneyladen union contracts were the order of the day. And so were top salaries and benefits for senior editors and reporters.

Now that is changing quickly. Advertising dollars are flowing to Internet search engines such as Google and Yahoo and social networking sites like Facebook and MySpace. The newspaper companies are trying to keep up with their own do-everything-and-be-everything websites, but their overall revenue (from print and internet divisions) is declining.


And when revenues and profits start going down, the employees have to watch out, because the boss who gave you a healthy raise every year in the old days may decide it's simpler to lay you off than to suddenly ask you to work for less.

It's a shame to see a venerable industry go through such a traumatic transformation. The exact same thing happened with the railroads, the steel mills and (to a large extent) the airlines. Once money-making machines with fat-cat owners and satisfied employees, they either disappeared or became scaled-down versions of their former selves.

We don't share the pessimism of some observers, who say a declining newspaper industry means a less-informed public. People have access to much more information now than ever before. And they can get it much more quickly. To cite one example: Even if most people in the country didn't learn about Barack Obama's presidential candidacy from a newspaper, they sure as heck found out who he was in a hurry.

And while revenues at small-town papers such as The Pine Cone are also declining, there is a bright light at the end of our particular tunnel. Because for all the explosive growth in information on the Internet, there's still only one place to find out what's going on at Carmel City Hall, the police station or the school board. And that's in the pages of this newspaper.

'Uphold this belief and remove the sign' Dear Editor,

In a town famous for routing streets around trees and not allowing street lights, Carmel High School has erected an electronic billboard. While the decision was made with the best of intentions, it was made, nevertheless, by children — a \$9,000 flashing red sign placed where it can be clearly seen by those least needing the information. The school's plan to turn off parts of the sign and turn it to face the parking lot doesn't begin to correct the error.

The school board of the Carmel Unified School District is now considering a resolution to exempt the school from local zoning rules and the California Environmental Quality Act. The argument is that the red, glowing sign announcing student birthdays and seminars for parents be allowed to remain visible to the community because it is "educational." Passing such a resolution would be educational in that it teaches a modern lesson: If you make a mistake, don't correct it, just look for a legal loophole.

The Carmel Unified School District's "Mission and Beliefs" are listed on the website, carmelunified.org. The sixth in the list is "we have responsibility for the environment." I suggest that members of our community ask the school board to uphold this belief, and remove the sign.

A PURSUIT early Monday morning ended in frustration for Carmel police and other law enforcement officers who chased vehicle burglary suspects out of town but lost them in the Highlands.

While investigating several vehicle burglaries in town early Jan. 21, police noticed a suspicious car in the area, according to officer Rachelle Lightfoot. When the officer tried to pull the driver over, the car took off, fleeing out of the city and down Highway 1.

In the Carmel Highlands, the suspects ditched the car and fled on foot. They failed to pull the emergency brake, and the vehicle rolled into the squad car but didn't cause any damage, according to Lightfoot.

Meanwhile, Carmel P.D. summoned help

from the Monterey County Sheriff's Office and a K-9 officer from Marina to facilitate a lengthy search, but none of them could find the suspects.

"We have the vehicle," Lightfoot said, and police found apparently stolen items inside. "Anyone who is missing property might want to contact us."

Citing the ongoing investigation, Lightfoot did not want to say how many suspects there were or whether the car's owner was involved.

Regarding the possibility of locating and arresting the people responsible, she said, "The prognosis looks good."

KNOW SOMEONE who helped make Carmel-by-the-Sea a better place? The Carmel Residents Association wants to hear from you.





IMPORTANT PUBLIC INFORMATION

On January 28th, 2008, parking enforcement will begin using a Global Positional System (GPS) to read, electronically mark, and enforce time limit zones. A grace period will be in effect for the first two weeks of February after which citations will be issued. Only one of our three scooters is currently equipped with this technology which requires no chalking of the tire.

This new technology uses cameras mounted on the scooter to "electronically mark" a vehicle's time, license plate, and location. As the operator drives the streets, the computer will alert the operator to a violation.

Note: It is important to remember that enforcement will now consist of a mix of "electronic" marking (no chalk marks!) and traditional chalking (chalk on tire) of parked vehicles.

We ask that everyone be aware of the need to comply with posted time limitations. Doing so will help residents and tourists alike enjoy optimal access to the limited and precious resource of parking spaces in Carmel-by-the-Sea.
