JUDGE ALLOWS EXTENSIVE EVIDENCE IN ARSON CASE

A DEFENSE attorney's efforts to keep damaging evidence against his client out of court failed when Monterey County Superior Court Judge Terrance Duncan ruled in favor of prosecutors Feb. 22.

The evidence, which law enforcement officials say was found in suspected serial arsonist Lance Oliver Scott's home and cars, was illegally obtained, according to attorney Richard Rosen.

Scott, who lives on San Juan Road, is charged with setting

fires on Jacks Peak. He faces 11 arson counts — including use of an incendiary device - and three counts of cultivating, manufacturing and selling marijuana and hashish. He has remained in Monterey County Jail since last summer, when he was arrested following months of investigation into suspicious blazes in the Jacks Peak area in 2006 and 2007. Law enforcement officers identi-

Sparklers, lighters, matches, 13 meth pipes, 14 syringes and **GPS** navigation

fied Scott as a suspect after reportedly catching his cars on video near several of the fires around the times they were set.

In court Feb. 14, Rosen argued investigators illegally installed a GPS surveillance tracker on Scott's car in order to trace his movements, which constituted unlawful search and seizure. He also said the search warrant was invalid and disputed officers' probable cause to search and arrest Scott.

Among the evidence Rosen wanted excluded were:

- all statements Scott made after he was arrested;
- a matchbook seized from his 1986 Toyota pickup truck;
- \$45 in cash, a plastic film canister containing a marijuana cigarette, and a brass pipe taken from Scott;
- items taken from Scott's Oldsmobile, including a Fourth-of-July-type sparkler and its box, a Bic lighter, a silver lighter and a firecracker; and
- items taken from his home, including a model rocket kit, sparkler, Piccolo Pete firework, roll of duct tape, carbon dioxide container, hand-held scanner, paper matchbook, two firecrackers, rental car receipts, a Monterey County Herald

Fire merger, condos, power poles define council race

A FEW lines were drawn in the sand when candidates for mayor and city council of Carmel-by-the-Sea shared their views during a forum hosted by the Carmel Residents Association Feb. 21. Four-term Mayor Sue McCloud is facing nominal challenger Dogman McBill, while council newcomers Ken Talmage and Karen Sharp, both appointed to replace councilmen who left, have some competition from Michael LePage. Voters will choose their leaders April 8.

During the forum held at Sunset Center, candidates answered questions read by moderator Karen Ferlito.

"Thank you for having the courage and conviction to run for public office," she said before inviting them to make three-minute opening statements, during which they outlined their experience, values and views.

Speaking first, McBill pointed out a fifth term for McCloud would have her serving for 10 years — longer than the President of the United States is permitted to stay in

"I wouldn't have run for mayor if someone else had run against Sue this time," said McBill, who was also her sole challenger two years ago. His main theme was getting out the

Talmage tops fundraising in city race

According to campaign disclosure statements filed last week by four of the five candidates for the upcoming Carmel City Council and mayoral election, incumbent councilman Ken Talmage has raised the most funds so far, followed by incumbent Mayor Sue McCloud, councilwoman Karen Sharp and council challenger Michael LePage. Dogman McBill, the only mayoral challenger, did not file a statement.

Talmage, who was appointed to replace Erik Bethel on the

COUNCIL SEES HOPE IN REGIONAL WATER PLAN

THE GREATEST obstacle to securing a viable water supply for the Monterey Peninsula is the failure of cities, the county and various agencies that have a stake in it to work together, Lyndel Melton told the Carmel City Council Tuesday.

At the March 4 meeting, Melton, principal of RMC Water and Environment, said his firm had been hired to develop a sustainable water supply program for the Monterey County Regional Plenary Oversight Group, known as REPOG. Melton and other representatives of the group, which was formed by the California Public Utilities Commission Division of Ratepayer Advocates, have been visiting cities and other agencies to describe their plan and generate support.

Using a combination of several different approaches - some long contemplated, others innovative — the regional plan would be "implementable, sustainable, and publicly and politically acceptable," according to Melton, as well as less expensive than the Moss Landing desal plant proposed by California American Water Co.

"This solves many issues with the same investment," he said. "It's a multi-agency, multi-beneficiary solution."

The goal is to reverse seawater intrusion in the Salinas Valley, reduce to legal levels — if not completely eliminate - pumping from the Carmel River, and provide cities with the water they need for legal lots of record and municipal projects.

Multiple sources

The projects that could provide as much as 29,000 acrefeet of water include increasing conservation, capturing stormwater, storing excess water in the Seaside aquifer, treating recycled water for agricultural use, treating recycled water for urban use, diverting excess flows from the Salinas



San Simeon State Park name changed, activist group upset

CONTRARY TO the wishes of a Big Sur conservation group, California State Parks commissioners voted unanimously last week to change the name of San Simeon State Park to reflect the area's most well known landowner.

Commissioners at a meeting in Chatsworth voted to name the 540-acre park Hearst San Simeon State Park, after newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst.

California State Parks Superintendent Nick Franco said the new name will give the area, best known for its elephant seals, an important name recognizable to park visitors.

"The value to us is that it really unifies the northern coast portion of San Luis Obispo County," Franco said. "It gives us a better ability to communicate with visitors."

But Jack Ellwanger, president of PelicanNetwork, a group based in Big Sur, fiercely opposed the change, contending the park shouldn't be named after a man the group argues was a "bad character."

"It's a disgrace they put that name on that beautiful landscape," Ellwanger told The Pine Cone Wednesday. "Hearst family members are allowed to build private residence ranches, vineyards and graze cattle. The State of California was tricked on this deal. And renaming the park likely was part of

Furthermore, Ellwanger contended, Hearst "squandered his father's fortune on pranks at the public expense, starting wars, creating 'Yellow Journalism,' and railing in his scandalous papers against anything he didn't like but usually was a public good."

Hearst is also recognized for his philanthropic interests. In 1945 he created The Hearst Foundation and in 1948 established the California Charities Foundation, which was changed to the William Randolph Hearst Foundation after his death in 1951.

Did you know...



John Steinbeck is the only Nobel laureate born and raised in Monterey County - to date, anyway. He was born on Feb. 27, 1902, in the gracious Victorian in Salinas that is now a shrine, owned by a nonprofit group that operates a restaurant and

gift shop in the house. That was the Steinbecks' principal residence, with summers and holidays at a Pacific Grove cottage they built when John was an infant. John and his first wife, Carol, took over the cottage as their home during the Depression. They lived there from 1930 to 1936 while John wrote six of his first novels, supported by a \$25-a-month allowance from his father, the county treasurer. John's first critically acclaimed work, "Tortilla Flat," was published in 1935; the subsequent celebrity helped their departure. John and Carol moved to Los Gatos in 1936. (Next week: Steinbeck's homecomings.)

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The foundations provide opportunities to "underserved and underrepresented populations," in the areas of education, health, social service and culture, according to the founda-

Besides Ellwanger, who spoke out against the name change at last week's meeting, several people told commissioners they were in favor of it, Franco said.

Ellwanger said his group, which he said has a membership of 5,000 composed of "networks and people who care about natural and cultural history," will look at other ways to nix the Hearst name from the park.

"I'm going to explore some other paths so we might get this reheard," he said. "We have a lot of attorneys in PelicanNetwork, so I'm going to ask folks for legal remedies for this. We are going to look at ways to get that name off of

Former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood, who is vice chair of the state parks commission, was not in attendance at the Chatsworth meeting. He is busy with post-production on his latest movie, "The Changeling."

The cost of changing the name would be little since state parks only replaces park signs when it's necessary due to age, Franco said. However, some brochures, would be altered to include the Hearst title.

The name change was proposed at an Aug. 24, 2003 commission meeting by a representative from a group called Hearst Ranch Conservation.

The commission also in August voted to reclassify William Randolph Hearst State Beach and include the land in San Simeon State Park, another reason for the change, Franco said. Renaming the park, would make it less confusing to visitors while retaining the Hearst name.

CPR Saturday will include instructions, videos and drills, followed by a written examination which, if passed successfully, certifies the student for one year.

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Too much attention (especially from dogs) means seal must go

TOO MANY dogs romping on sun-drenched Carmel Beach Monday morning showed interest in a young elephant seal relaxing there for it to be left alone, so workers with the Marine Mammal Center found it another place to nap, according to Cindi Mitchell, animal control officer for the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea.

After arriving to check the seal's health, Marine Mammal Center wildlife workers, who were going to just monitor it for 24 hours, saw the number of dogs approaching the small seal and decided to "transport it to Point Lobos," Mitchell

The little elephant seal, which was about 5 feet long and estimated to be just a few months old, was "on the thin side," Mitchell said, but it didn't have any visible injuries or appear

"They thought it would be best to take it so it didn't get stressed," Mitchell said.

A beachgoer called police just before 11 a.m. March 3 to report the seal, which had crawled up from the water to snooze in the sun among the large rocks piled at the foot of the bluff near 11th Avenue. One woman said her dog ran up and dropped his ball nearby, and that's when she noticed the seal and called authorities. Someone also reported it to the Marine Mammal Center, which handles all such cases.

After placing signs on the sand warning people to keep away from the animal and control their dogs, Mitchell stood by for more than an hour, fielding questions from passersby and awaiting the arrival of the marine wildlife workers.

The federal Marine Mammal Protection Act and California Department of Fish & Game code prohibit people from harming or disturbing elephant seals. Their arrival in large numbers has led to beaches being declared off-limits, as was the case when the large seals formed a rookery at Piedras Blancas on the coast just north of Cambria. From just 19 seals in 1990, the population there has grown to an estimated 8,000.

But just a few make rest stops on Carmel Beach each year, according to Mitchell, and they are usually juveniles who spend an hour or two on shore and then retreat to the sea. The last time she saw an adult elephant seal was two years ago, when one came on shore near the rocks at the south end of the beach.

"I've been here since 1983, and I've never seen a group hanging out," she said. "It's usually not more than one at a

Elephant seal pups have also been spotted on beaches in the Pacific Grove area.

Mitchell reminded anyone who encounters any type of marine mammal on the beach to keep away, note its location and call the Marine Mammal Center at (831) 633-6298.

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State tax dollars to smooth Scenic Road, repave parking lots

A TRANSPORTATION bond state voters approved in November 2006 will yield \$400,000 for road work in Carmel-by-the-Sea, the city council learned Tuesday. Allocations from the \$20 billion bond are based on population, and Carmel, with 4,081 residents, qualifies for the minimum distribution, according to administrative services director Joyce Giuffre.

In order to receive the money, the city must indicate what it will be used for, and council members mulled over the items suggested by city engineer Clayton Neill and public works superintendent Stu Ross.

"We ask council to approve this resolution and give staff the authority to move forward, submit the forms to the state and approve the money for these specific projects," Giuffre said. "We could receive money as early as April."

The proposed list included repaving Dolores Street between Fourth and Fifth avenues (\$33,000), repaving Del Mar near Carmel Beach at the foot of Ocean Avenue (\$166,400), repaying a Sunset Center parking lot (\$50,000), grinding and repaving eight crosswalks on Ocean (\$50,000), slurry sealing Scenic Road between Eighth Avenue and Santa Lucia (\$37,000), and slurry sealing the truck route from Carpenter to Junipero (\$26,000). An additional 10 percent, or \$37,600, was designated for design and construction engineering costs.

Giuffre said the council already agreed to fund the first

three projects in the 2008/2009 capital improvements budget, so the bond proceeds would free up that money for other

But council members wondered if it would be wise to repave Dolores Street when the nonprofit Carmel Foundation has plans for major construction on that block. The project, which is languishing while the California Coastal Commission shows no apparent haste in approving the amendment to Carmel's Local Coastal Program that will allow it to proceed, calls for tearing down its old affordable apartments for seniors and building new ones.

"It wouldn't make a lot of sense to repave that street and then have trucks tear it up," councilman Ken Talmage said.

City administrator Rich Guillen said the \$33,000 designated for that particular project could be added to the Scenic Road work, so the slurry seal could be extended from Ocean

With those minor modifications, the council approved the resolution authorizing staff to apply to the California Department of Finance for release of the Proposition 1B bond funds for street and road projects.

The request comes on the heels of the successful acquisition of funds from the Transportation Agency for Monterey County. After the meeting, Mayor Sue McCloud said the city received a check for \$71,812 for repaving Mission Street between Third and Fourth. McCloud credited councilwoman Karen Sharp, who represents the city on the TAMC board, "for pushing that along, because the check was issued within two weeks of the date that we submitted the request for funds. So that offsets the expense of that very expensive one block."

Catalina students raise \$\$ for heart association

SANTA CATALINA students on Feb. 28 jumped rope in a nationwide event to educate students about the benefit of aerobic exercise and heart health, while raising money to support the fight against heart disease and stroke.

The students, 277 of them, took part in Jump Rope for the Heart. Students were given forms and asked to try to raise \$50 each in pledges with the goal of raising \$10,000 for the American Heart Association. Last year, the school raised \$7,000. All grades, pre-kindergarten through 8, in the Santa Catalina Lower School were involved, with older students paired with younger students.

The money raised will go to the American Heart Association to help with heart and stroke research. Every \$15 earns Santa Catalina School a jump rope from the AHA, which Jeff Hrepich, the Lower School Athletic Director, plans to donate to schools without any athletic or physical education equipment.

The Church in the Forest in Pebble Beach could not hold all of the people who came to show their support and to pay their respects to family, including Sutton's parents, Merv and Nancie.


The continuous stream of people presented a challenge to Merv Sutton's two goddaughters who were ushering at the doorway to the church.

Question: Is There a Fee For Taking Out a VA Loan?

Yes, there is, and its purpose is primarily to fund the VA loan program-everything from office space


to employees to paper clips. (Those who have received a VA disability are, however, exempt from paying this fee.)

The amount of the funding fee actually varies, depending on four factors: (1) the amount of the loan, (2) the borrower's military classification, (3) whether the borrower has applied for and obtained a VA loan previously, and (4) the amount of the down payment being made by the borrower (if any). The funding fee generally ranges between 1.5% and 3.3% of the loan

In most cases, rather than paying this fee out-of-pocket, borrowers add it to their overall loan amount. Thus, it is financed, rather than being paid in full at the closing of the

Three things should be kept in mind: First, this is a program whose intention has always been to help returning veterans gain a start in their domestic lives; second, recent hikes to the maximum loan amount have made the program far more relevant to today's real estate market than it was not long ago; and third, like the FHA program, this is a program in transition, and should be watched for relevant and supportive future changes. 

Hearing planned in Monterey over water cutback order

Monterey peninsula water customers will soon be able to voice their opinions of an order proposed by the state compelling California American Water Co. to reduce pumping of the Carmel River by 50 percent within six years.

The agency that issued the draft cease and desist order, the State Water Resources Control Board, has scheduled a meeting April 1 at the Monterey Conference Center to hear the public's concerns.

"This hearing offers the best opportunity for residents and businesses to let the state board know how drastic water cutbacks would affect our community," said Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie.

In January, the SWRCB issued the draft order, 13 years after issuing Order 95-10, which declared most of Cal Am's pumping of the Carmel River aquifer illegal and ordered the private water company to reduce its pumping by 70 percent and find an alternative source.

According to SWRCB spokesman Dave Clegern, public comment in Monterey will be heard following a board meeting, expected to last until early afternoon.

"At least two board members are expected to stay for the hearing," Clegern said. "Members of the public will be allowed five minutes each — at least that's what's scheduled preliminarily. Board members and staff will be available to respond."

The draft cease and desist order calls for Cal Am to reduce river usage from 15 to 50 percent within six years.

Cal Am has a legal right to draw just 3,376 acre-feet of water per year from the river, but it pumped 11,285 acre-feet last year. Overpumping creates low levels in the river, which harms the steelhead fish and red-legged frog populations. Environmental and conservation organizations, such as the Carmel River Steelhead Association, have long called for Cal Am to stop overpumping.

Other meetings planned

On March 19, the SWRCB will hold a preliminary hearing in Sacramento for SWRCB representatives and Cal Am attorneys to work our procedural ground rules for a hearing in June. The public can attend but won't be able to comment, Clegern said.

On June 19, Cal Am and the SWRCB will go head-tohead over the issue in Sacramento, in what will appear much like a court hearing.

"Cal Am and the SWRCB will present their sides of the case, and will hear from others with party status," Clegern said. "All parties will be expected to present evidence and call witnesses. Those witnesses will be cross-examined."

Bowie said Cal Am will argue at the evidentiary hearing that Cal Am has complied with Order 95-10 and is making progress toward a new water supply with its proposed Coastal Water Project, which includes a desalination plant in Moss Landing

"The cutbacks proposed would be devastating to our quality of life on the Monterey Peninsula," she said. "There is a great deal of inter-agency cooperation right now toward finding a new water supply to reduce our pumping of the Carmel River. We hope the state board will recognize and support this progress without setting further limitations that could only be met at a significant cost to our local economy and way of life."

Bowie said Cal Am has hired the Sacramento Diepenbrock Harrison law firm to fight the cease and desist

order. The water company's in-house attorney, Tim Miller, will also be present at the June hearing, she said.

Carmel-by-the-Sea weighs in

The Carmel City Council Tuesday said it plans to testify at the June hearing how the cease and desist order would hurt business in its city.

Mayor Sue McCloud said the order would mean fewer visitors staying in hotel rooms, dining at restaurants and spending less money.

"People will be out of work," McCloud said.

The council also voted to send a letter to the SWRCB opposing the order.

"The impacts of the proposed cease and desist order will have a severe domino effect upon the economic

well-being of this area," the letter states.

The Coastal Water Project, a \$200 million-plus desalination project and aquifer storage and recovery system, would solve the Peninsula's water problem, Cal Am contends.

Since July 2005, the water company has been waiting for the California Public Utilities Commission to approve an environmental review of the project. And a pilot plant for the Coastal Water Project, which the company said would begin operating this month, has been delayed for years.

Should Peninsula residents be forced to cut their water use by half?

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

river and desalinating intruded groundwater.

"They've never been put together like this, but they are all proven methods," Melton said.

Potentially harmful discharges to the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary would be reduced, environmental impacts would be lower due to the need for fewer pipelines, the water would be less expensive, and the carbon footprint would be smaller for the REPOG project than for the desal plant proposed by Cal-Am, according to Melton. Electricity generated by harnessing methane gas at the Marina landfill would power the REPOG desal plant.


At the March 4 Carmel City Council meeting, members said they were impressed with the proposal and asked what the greatest challenges might be.

Getting all the involved entities to cooperate could top the list, but Melton said he believes everyone could strive to work together.

"Do you have the political will needed to push this forward?" councilman Ken Talmage asked.

Melton said support will increase as the project solidifies, which he said will happen as planners prepare to submit it to the California Public Utilities Commission by late 2008 or early 2009. The water supply proposal will be considered as an alternative in the environmental impact report prepared for Cal Am's desal plant.

"Fundamentally, everyone we've talked with is very excited about the project," Melton said.

P.G. sales tax increase to appear on June ballot

ALTHOUGH A half-cent sales tax increase was defeated by Pacific Grove voters in November, the city council Wednesday voted unanimously to place a 1 cent tax increase measure on the June ballot.

If passed by voters, the city's sales tax would increase from 7.25 percent to 8.25 percent and bring the city \$1.3 million a year.

"Taxes are a short-term solution to tied us over as we wrestle with our long-term problem," said councilman Dan Davis. "We have have a serious problem in the city. This is potentially one step forward."

While Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce President Moe Ammar said there was "overwhelming support" in the business community for the tax increase, one store owner spoke against it, saying shoppers might opt to do business in Monterey, which has a lower sales tax.

"This district tax is a budget buster," said Jeanne Graham, owner of The Hand Maden on Lighthouse Avenue. "Where is the plan on how this money is going to be spent?"

Most \$\$ goes to state

Of the current sales tax, just 1 cent of each dollar goes to city coffers (the rest goes to the state). In fiscal year 2006/2007, that amounted to \$1.6 million.

The extra 1 cent, if approved by voters, would bring in only \$1.3 million. Finance director Jim Becklenberg said that's because the sales tax is actually a "district tax," which would apply to all point-of-sale transactions in the city but would not be applied to cer-

tain transactions, such as if an order was placed and delivered outside the city. The loss of those outside sales would result in a \$200,000, per

\$300,000 per year difference.

The council voted against placing another measure on the June ballot that would eliminate the \$3,000 cap on the city's business tax, although coun-

A half-cent increase was defeated last fall, but the council decides to try again

c i l w o m a n Vicki Stilwell suggested that could be added to the November ballot.

Eliminating the business tax cap would affect only a few of the city's businesses and bring in about \$240,000 per year, Becklenberg said.

Voters in November shot down three combined tax measures including one that would have increased the sales tax by a half-cent and another that would have eliminated the business tax cap.

Some council members supported using the extra revenue from the tax increase only to bolster the city's reserves.

But councilman Scott Miller said the revenue generated by the tax increase should go to restoring services and funding city reserves, because that would make it more likely the tax would be adopted.

"We have to sell this," Miller said. "We have to convince voters."

Bringing a major talent like Kidjo to Carmel is a real coup for new executive director Peter Lesnik, who took over the reins of Sunset Center at the first of the year. Lesnik, it turns out, is a fan of the Beninese singer.



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Torched tree spreads to hillside at remote C.V. gun club

A CONTROLLED burn got out of control in a remote area of Carmel Valley Monday, but fire crews doused it before it could spread to any of the 80 cabins at the White

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Rock Gun Club.

"From the mid-valley station, it's about half an hour away," explained Carmel Valley Fire Capt. Eric Ulwelling. "It's way out at the far end of Robinson Canyon Road."

A worker at the gun club was burning a cut-up tree that had fallen during January's storms, according to Cal Fire Battalion Chief Dennis Carreiro, who investigated the blaze since it spread onto land in the state's jurisdiction.

"They had cut the limbs off and decided to try to burn it," he said, and the result was something that easily could have been avoided.

The man set the fire next to a steep embankment covered with brush, according to Carreiro, who said controlled burns require at least 30 feet of clearance.

"He had considerably less than that," he said.

As a result, the fire spread up the embankment and consumed about half an acre.

"It was in steep terrain and our water supply was from a nearby creek," Ulwelling said. Three engines and three chiefs from the valley, as well as a water tender, responded. Cal Fire sent one engine, a dozer, a chief and a crew that cut a break around the area to ensure the fire would not spread.

Once he saw the fire had escaped, the man tried to fight it with a hose, according to Carreiro.

It took about 45 minutes to get the fire extinguished, and the crews left the area after about three hours. Carreiro said the man will not be cited for the fire or billed for the costs of fighting it.

Defensible space

Because of substantial rains in January and February, the ground was wet, and that helped slow the fire's spread.

"Had this been July or August, I think this would have been a very different fire," Ulwelling said. "Because everything was so wet, it progressed very slowly, and we were able to catch it."

It also helps, in general, that the owners of about 75 of the 80 cabins at White Rock have cleared vegetation from around the structures to provide enough "defensible space" that firefighters can safely defend them from wildfires, according to Carreiro.

"Some were pretty hidden in the vegetation, so a concerted effort was made to try to get them to do defensible space," he said.



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
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

The group formed after a chance meeting


between Russell and bass player Bill Laymon in 1982.

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
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

Where a sushi chef got his artistic talent

 R_{YO} CHIBA schooled in the art of silversmithing in Kofu, the Japanese town known for its jewelry trade. In fact, his parents were jewelers. But after four years of intense training at a famous craft school, Tokyo Kogei, Chiba directed his creative talent to cooking.

Although he didn't follow his family's artistic tradition

exactly, he transferred his affection for jewelry making to sushi making, honing skills in creating tempura and sashimi dishes and other Japanese culinary specialties.

Preceded by his sister, Kimiko, Ryo Chiba came to the United States in 1980, settling in Los Angeles. There, he worked in Beverly Hills and North Hollywood Japanese restaurants under the guidance and tuteledge of renowned chefs, picking up English along the way.

Eight years into his American experience, reading a Los Angeles Japanese newspaper one day, he

noticed an ad in the classifieds: A well established Carmelby-the-Sea Japanese restaurant was for sale. His interest whetted, he came to Carmel and looked over Hanagasa Japanese Restaurant on Eighth Avenue between Mission and San Carlos. He liked what he saw, noticing the small restaurant was in proximity to Sunset Center, and a deal was struck. Chef Chiba was the owner of the 30-seat Hanagasa.

That was twenty years ago. Today Hanagasa is still going strong with clientele ranging from Marina-based Koreans, local Japanese, and Anglos, both residents and tourists.

Plenty of help

While Chef Chiba performs sushi magic at the eight-seat bar, Lorenzo Ortiz, who has been with Chiba as chef for 10 years, cooks the other items on the extensive Hanagasa menu, with Chef Chiba joining in when the restaurant is at its busiest.

The waitstaff consists of Masako Ross and Kana Takeushi.

For dinner, Chiba offers a complete Japanese menu of appetizers consisting of vegetables and tofu dishes, seafood, sushi and children's plates.

Special dinners appear on the menu, including bento boxes, charbroiled and grilled vegetables, meats and poultry, seven seafood dinners, hot pot dinners, and sushi — all combined with a green salad, rice and miso soup.

As for lunch, here's where donburi and udon dishes come to the fore. Donburi are boiled rice dishes topped with meat, fish, eggs or vegetables and broth, while udon are thick, fat noodles cooked in a seasoned broth accompanied by vegetables, shrimp, meat, chicken or seafood.

Combination luncheon plates of meat or seafood, and bento boxes are all served with rice, a green salad and a bowl of miso soup. Sushi bar specials include sashimi, nigiri and

Sake, wine, plum wine, beer, as well as soft drinks, mineral water and tea are also

As for the preferences of Hanagasa customers, Chef Chiba said, "Most people ask for the sushi menu, but running close seconds are orders for the teriyaki salmon and hot pot dinners." The hot pot dinners are combinations of chicken or beef with tofu, clear, thin noodles and vegetables with a sukiyaki broth, while yosenabe hot pot dinners combine chicken and assorted seafood cooked in conjunction with tofu, noodles and vegetables.

Desserts are green tea, ginger or vanilla ice cream, banana tempura and ice cream

In case readers have been curious as to the meaning of "Hanagasa," Chiba explained is a summertime festival of dancing. The small restaurant is gay with hanging Japanese lanterns, and the tables, covered in royal blue tablecloths topped with glass, add a bright note.

Outside, flanking a distinctive Hanagasa sign, are two large antique lanterns of glass and metal. One blew down during the January hurricane but has since been repaired and rehung.

Open six days a week, the restaurant keeps Chiba so busy he rarely has time for sports or hobbies.

The stars aligned when Chef Michel Richard (of Washington, D.C., and now Los Angeles culinary fame), teamed up with Chef Anthony Keene of Carmel Valley Ranch. Throw a fancy-schmancy \$12 million renovation into the mix and you know the final product isn't exactly going to suck. Here's the deal folks: I really dig Citronelle. I really want it to be a place that locals love, appreciate, and more importantly, put into their frequent-dining rotation. Ultimately, for selfish reasons (I live dangerously close), I want it to succeed. So, please, do me a favor, do our dining scene a favor and go and check it out.

Swing by the bar for a cocktail. All juices are squeezed to order, the "April in Paris" cocktail is divine and whether John's behind the bar or Simone is working the lounge, you

I know baby steps are the way to indoctrinate some of you readers, and the bar menu is the perfect solution. While, for those of you ready to dine without training wheels, do the big girl (or boy) menu in the main dining room. I promise you you won't be disappointed. It's really that freaking good. God only knows where they pulled their waitstaff from, because for the most part, they are all new faces to me and shockingly deft by Monterey Peninsula standards. I am well aware of the challenges presented in finding skilled staff in such a small, hospitality-oriented community (it was one of my initial concerns with Citronelle coming to the area — could Carmel Valley Ranch find an appropriate echelon of staff to properly complement Chef Richard's cuisine?) and man-o-Manischewitz, the management team at Citronelle nailed it.

Let's run through the reasons I am loving Citronelle: Sexy U-shaped bar? Check. Rock star table with Alice in Wonderland-like super comfy leather chair in front of an always roaring fireplace? Check. Attractive minimalist photography and art adorning the walls? Check. Spacious sofas positioned just right for primo people watching? Check. A private Petit Salon, where parties up to 22 people can dine in privacy overlooking idyllic Carmel Valley? Check. A really beautiful Chef's Table smack dab in front of the floor-to-ceiling glassed-in wine cellar? Check. Paper-thin slices of all your favorite seafood, fish, meats and vegetables splayed artfully across a plate. A moment of silence please while my eyes roll back in my head. Check. The perfectly crisped duck confit and breast, Chateaubriand, Monterey Bay abalone (with a preparation that puts any other I've had to shame), incredible French and California-centric, especially Monterey County, wine list? Killer desserts? Check. (In my opinion, 99 percent of the desserts I try around these parts are far too sweet.) The bottom line is that whether you want to go bar-casual or dine big in the stunning dining room, Citronelle is the most exciting thing to happen dining-wise on the Peninsula in the three years I've lived here.

■ 20th century masters

While Dawson Cole Fine Art is best known as the show-case for local sculptor Richard McDonald's work, the gallery is expanding its creative horizons considerably this week when it hosts a new group exhibit of paintings, "Modern Masters Exhibition," which opens Friday, March 7.

"It's really a fabulous collection," explained Michele Jayson, gallery director. "There's nothing else like it in Carmel."

Included in the exhibit will be works by Wayne Thiebuad, Jim Dine, Vija Celmins, Christo, Robert Motherwell, Frank Stella, Sam Francis, Helen Frankenthaler, David Hockney, Ellsworth Kelly, Roy Lichtenstein and Donald Sultan.

Dine and Thiebaud, like Andy Warhol, were included in

the landmark exhibit, "New Paintings of Common Objects," at the Pasadena Art Museum in 1962 that helped launch the pop art movement.

A native of Latvia, Celmins uses a palette of black and grays to capture seascapes, nightime skies and even spider webs in exquisite detail. Employing oil painting, charcoal, and multiple printmaking processes, she has a reputation for spending months working on a single piece.

Christo has gained international fame for his ambitious and massive art projects. His works include the "gift wrapping" of the Reichstag in Berlin and the Pont Neuf in Paris, the installation of a 24-mile-long curtain called "Running Fence" in Marin and Sonoma counties, and "The Gates" in New York City's Central Park, a two-week exhibit that utilized more than 7,500 saffron banners.

Motherwell was a gifted abstract impressionist, printmaker and writer who came from the same "New York School" (he coined the phrase) as Jackson Pollock. He died in 1991.

Stella, a painter, printmaker and sculptor, started as an abstract impressionist but later created a series of works that were marked by their minimalism and innovation. He is the only living artist to have had two retrospective exhibits at the Museum of Modern Art in New York.

A native of the San Francisco Bay Area, Francis was an abstract impressionist who reportedly created his first painting in Carmel while recuperating from injuries he sustained in a plane crash during World War II. He died in 1994.

Frankenthaler, who was once married to Motherwell, is an abstract artist who developed the "soak stain" technique. Hockney is a British painter, printmaker, photographer and stage designer, while Kelly is a New York-born painter and sculptor with a minimalist approach to his work.

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Lichtenstein, who died in 1997, was a pop artist profoundly influenced by commercial advertising and comic books. Sultan is a North Carolina artist whose large scale still paintings feature bold contrast, abstract composition and unorthodox media.



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

them for more than a decade. Laymon has also played extensively with the Jefferson Starship, Big Brother and the Holding Co. and Al Jardine of the Beach Boys. Curiously, drummer Keith Graves has also played bass for Jefferson

Meanwhile, as the group evolved and showed promise, its members just kept getting sidetracked on bigger, and presumably better, projects. For instance, Jim Lewin, vocalist, guitarist and mandolin player, is about to take a break so he can go on tour with Great American Taxi, a spin-off from Leftover Salmon, an eclectic jam band.

Rounding out the lineup is pedal steel and saxophone player Bruce Wandmayer.

Despite the lack of a record or a consistent touring schedule, the Stanimals have carved out a niche for themselves in the local music scene, starting in Santa Cruz and working their way down to Big Sur. Forsaking traditional bluegrass for a hybrid with an alt-country bent, the band routinely covers rock and pop songs many old school bluegrass players wouldn't touch. "We'll be playing everything from Hank Williams, to Bob Dylan to Steely Dan," Russell said. "I used to play so much Steely Dan, that my friends called me Stanley Dean but in this lineup we're going alt-country bluegrass rock extravaganza."

Perhaps the most remarkable thing about the Stanimals is simply the band's ability to stay together. To put their longevity into perspective, they've been together three times as long as the Beatles. "It's just the love of playing that keeps us together," Russell explained. "I hardly ever play live unless it's with these guys. We have such a long history of being friends and playing together."

Russell, by the way, has a side project as well. When he's not trying to figure out how to play a bluegrass version of "Rikki Don't Lose That Number" or "Reelin' In The Years," he's busy serving as executive director of the Big Sur Chamber of Commerce. Amazingly, he runs the chamber from his home in Santa Cruz. "It's actually easier to run the chamber from Santa Cruz than it is in Big Sur, because here I have a high-speed Internet connection," he added. "Plus, it's easier to find a place to live up here."

The event, now held at Bayonet and Blackhorse golf courses, typically draws about 10,000 people, which the council hopes will increase tourism and revenue to the city. The Concorso owner would also pay the city \$78,750 this year to rent the golf links.

According to a proposed agreement, fairways 10 through 18 as well as the driving range and Asilomar Avenue would be used for the car show. Those fairways would be closed for golf beginning the Monday of the event week to prepare for the event. Fairways 1 through 9 would be closed the day before the show and on the day of the event, which the Concorso Italiano's website lists as August 15.



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






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

newspaper (March 3, 2007), six photos of various fires, newspaper articles on fires and fire department responses, 19 marijuana plants found on the patio and 13 found in the backyard, cell phone records, four large bags of dried marijuana, vaporizer, photos of marijuana cultivation, marijuana magazine, propane bottle and torch, Magellan GPS unit, \$2,000 cash, three shears with trace residue of marijuana, one bag of marijuana, a PVC pipe — possibly a hash leacher; Leica binoculars, one black bag with marijuana and marijuana indicia, one Scooby Doo container with three sandwich bags of marijuana, plates with possible hashish and razor blade, storage tote with scale and package of marijuana, canvas buckets with trace amounts of marijuana, one toolbox with marijuana seeds and roaches, two Western

Union documents, a purple bong, one VHS tape of scale instructions, one air pistol, one butane can, one frozen ball of marijuana, three California Driver Licenses in one woman's name, a red plastic bong, a bong made from a milk jug, a prescription bottle in another person's name, an 8-ounce box of Miracle Grow, a methamphetamine pipe, pipe cleaners, two Uniden portable radios, a night vision scope, a hookah pipe in a case, an FBI ball cap, a shoulder holster and a Yaqui holster, a bag of shotgun shells, two other sandwich bags of marijuana, 13 meth pipes, 14 syringes, one torch lighter, one frisbee with marijuana, one box of marijuana with weigh sheets, and one box of miscellaneous bags of marijuana seeds, marijuana and a booby trap.

Legal surveillance?

In his arguments against the motion, Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Steve Somers said officers can use tools to achieve any surveillance they could do them-

Cal Fire investigator Mark Kendall testified they put the tracker on Scott's car because the defendant's dangerous and erratic driving habits made him difficult and unsafe to follow. Somers also said the warrants were in order, as was Scott's arrest.

Duncan issued his ruling Feb. 22.

"The Court finds that placement of the GPS device on the defendant's vehicle was not a search and that the investigators had valid public safety reasons for the placement," he wrote. Installation of the GPS unit did not require probable cause, but even if it had, investigators had it.

He also ruled the search warrant was validly issued, and police had probable cause to search and arrest Scott. "All searches of the defendant's home and vehicle were proper," he concluded.

A pretrial conference in the case is set for Thursday, April 3, with a jury trial scheduled to begin Monday, April 21.

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
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Cherry Center celebrates birthday with party, art opening

In Carmel's early days, except for the Outdoor Forest Theater, formal performance venues didn't exist, so artists, poets and other creative types gathered in local homes. 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Lost Boy, refugee doctor share heartrending stories of Sudan

AN ORPHANED boy who survived war-torn Sudan and a man who alone cared for tens of thousands of refugees will speak at a reception hosted by the Carmel Red Cross Monday, March 10. Ben Ajak, one of the Lost Boys of Sudan and coauthor of "They Poured Fire on Us From the Sky," and Ashis Brahma, the sole physician at a refugee camp in Darfur, will share their experiences and answer questions, according to Jill Hofmann, international services chair for the Red Cross' Carmel chapter.

"Ben is an example of a young kid who had to escape war and watched both his parents die in front of him, and Ashis was a doctor in Darfur, one of the major places where there's genocide," said Hofmann, an instructor in international humanitarian law who met Brahma when he visited the area and attended several speaking engagements last fall. "So I wanted to bring both those speakers in to bring an awareness to the community of what's happening in other countries and educate people about international humanitarian law."

Ajak was a child when Muslims attacked his village during the civil war in Sudan. Some 20,000 boys fled, walking 1,000 miles to reach a U.N. refugee camp on the Ethiopia-Kenya border. He now lives in San Diego and wrote "They Poured Fire on Us From the Sky: The Story of Three Lost Boys," with two other survivors.

A Dutch physician, Brahma was the only medical doctor at the Oure Cassoni camp in Chad in 2006 and 2007, caring for 27,000 Darfur refugees forced from their homes in Sudan. He will share his experiences and discuss the hardships experienced by refugees and civilians in Chad.

"They both speak from their hearts, and that's why I'm so touched by both of them," Hofmann said.

The reception will be held in the chapter house at Dolores and Eighth in Carmel at 4 p.m., and the men will give short talks and answer questions. Admission is free and all are invited to attend. For more information, call (831) 624-6921.



city council in December 2006 after Bethel left to take a banking job in Shanghai, raised \$5,758 between Jan. 1 and Feb. 25, according to his state-required form. He spent \$1,303.44, owes another \$724.72 and did not take out any loans.

The forms filed by his campaign treasurer, Graeme Robertson, indicated contributions to Talmage ranged from \$100 to \$500, with donors at the top level including himself, Gary and Sarah Chang, Tom and Elece Leverone, Jim and Jane Price, and Bruce Frank. Gary Chang and Tom Leverone are identified as self-employed, and though Price is retired, he is a longtime member of the Sunset Cultural Center Inc. board of directors and is its chairman. Frank is the owner of a small business consultant firm. Other donors include several retirees, among them Jean Draper and Shan Sayles, each of whom contributed \$100. He also took in \$2,158 in contributions of less than \$100

Talmage's expenses included \$1,026.60 to Abrego Printing for stationery and literature, and reimbursement to the Committee to Elect Karen Sharp for mailing labels valued at \$276.84. Bills he had yet to pay as of Feb. 25 included Pine Cone advertising totaling \$474.72 and items from Nielsen Bros. Market amounting to \$250.

McCloud, four-term mayor, raised \$4,939 during the same period and paid out \$716.08.

Treasurer Richard Stewart reported her largest donation — \$1,000 — came from retiree Darnell Whitt II in Carmel Valley, followed by \$500 from Price and \$500 from George Tipton.

Other significant donations included \$350 from Sylvia Breiholz and \$200 from McCloud's sister, Sarah Berling. In addition to a couple more who contributed that amount, several, including Nita Robbins, James Sanders, Sigrid Banks and Dale Hekhuis, gave \$100. She took in \$1,389 in small donations. All of McCloud's donors

are listed as retirees.

Her payments included \$250 to classical guitarist Terrence Farrell for music and \$113.54 in reimbursement to herself for food purchases. Small expenses of less than \$100 each amounted to \$352.54, and she also took no loans.

Karen Sharp, who joined the council last summer after Mike Cunningham resigned, raised \$4,039 between Jan. 1 and Feb. 25, and spent \$2,612, according to forms filed by campaign treasurer Merv Sutton.

She gathered a handful of \$500 contributions, including money from Price, realtor Paul Brocchini, and Fresno residents Paula Capozzi, who is retired, and Anthony Capozzi, an attorney. Interior designer Susan Gardner, and retirees Doris Lawton and Cora Mae Duke, contributed \$100, as did Fresno resident Richard Erganian. Chicago attorney Harry Sangerman donated \$200. Smaller gifts totaled \$1,439.


Among her expenses were \$125 to former city employee Cheryl Panattoni for book-keeping, \$308 for office supplies, \$257 in wine and tips for her kickoff event, \$220 to Citibank Discount Mugs for pens, \$430 for brochure and print ad layout services, \$412.80 for Pine Cone advertising and \$509.20 to the County of Monterey for mailing labels. She also did not borrow any funds.


Finally, LePage, the sole council challenger and a six-year member of the Carmel Design Review Board, raised \$2,586 and spent \$2,817. His campaign borrowed \$2,000 from his wife, Joanne, according to campaign treasurer Barry Kohler.

Among his donors, all of whom made contributions in February, the Democratic Club of the Monterey Peninsula topped the list with \$250. Retirees Stephen Brooks and James Emery each gave \$100, and Kohler, who is also retired, contributed \$150. Attorney Cheryl Moreland donated \$100.


LePage also received \$1,886 in contributions of less than \$100.

His expenses included \$2,700 to Hudson Design Co. in Pacific Grove for campaign materials, and \$100 in petty cash for the Committee to Elect Michael LePage.

vote to preserve democracy.

McCloud spoke of regional issues facing the city and the potential impacts of the state's \$16 billion budget deficit, but she remained optimistic and pledged decision makers will work with residents "to reach our citywide goals and keep our city financially sound."

LePage, a longtime resident and member of the design review board for six years, said

he feels a deep connection to the city and a "responsibility to preserve and protect" it.

"I want our council to be where neighbors serve neighbors," he said, "and find consensus and not conflict."

Talmage, who first came to Carmel on his honeymoon in 1973 and moved here more than a decade ago, said his couple of years on the planning commission and 15 months on the council, including several as vice mayor, have allowed him to demonstrate his decision-making abilities.

"During the past four years, I've been seen as an attentive listener, open minded

and an independent thinker," he said. "I make decisions based on facts, budgets and municipal design guidelines. I try to balance different interests to find common ground and will preserve Carmel's community character."

Sharp, a trained nurse who oversaw a medical center with a large budget before she and her husband moved here, said she "diplomatically worked with people of diverse ages, interests, backgrounds and education," while on the job. In Carmel, she served on the design review board and planning commission before being appointed to the city council last summer.

The issues

When the candidates were asked which three issues are most pressing, they mentioned maintaining financial health, protecting natural resources and tackling regional issues — such as the pending state order to drastically cut water use.

McBill said getting people to vote and instituting a "mayor patrol" that would have the city leader out among the people daily are his priorities. If people wanted to know the third issue, they should come talk to him in front of the post office. For many of the subsequent questions, McBill said he either agreed with McCloud, had no comment or would need to study the matter.

LePage identified Carmel Fire Department's hoped-for consolidation with Monterey and Pacific Grove fire departments as a pressing issue.

"We need to make the health and safety and welfare of our community primary," he said. "We need to adopt the consolidation of the fire department."

Later in the forum, when all candidates were asked for their views on the merger and the department's staffing its engines with two people though federal guidelines recommend four, everyone else said the system works as is and needs no changes. They said the two-person ambulance crew provides the support called for, though Carmel firefighters have said the ambulance is a stopgap measure, not a solution.

"We are staffed the way we should be," McCloud said, and Sharp pointed out the fire department is only outpaced by the police department in spending. Talmage said the study supporting consolidation had serious flaws in its financial analysis.

They all complimented the firefighters on their response times and quality of work.

LePage said Carmel "borrows services" from P.G. and Monterey in the form of chiefs, supervisors and an administrative assistant — for which it pays a total \$110,000 annually — but consolidation could end those contracts. Furthermore, firefighters want the merger.

"We should allow these men who put their lives on the line for us to serve us the way they want to," he said.

He also took a different angle on developer Bob Leidig's proposal to turn the former Carmel Convalescent Hospital into condos. The project is now in the county's hands, since Leidig abandoned plans to annex the land to the city.

When someone asked if the candidates would support the surrounding neighborhood's opposition to the development, most of the candidates said they have not seen the current iteration of the project and will weigh in when appropriate, such as when the environmental impact report is prepared. Talmage pointed out a land use advisory committee for the Carmel area voted 6-0 to recommend the county planning commission deny Leidig's application.

"I would not support this project," LePage said. "It directly affects Carmel, butts up against Carmel, and I think the city council should send a message to the county saying this is not compatible with the general plan and we do not support it."

Money

When asked what the council might do to boost revenues without raising taxes, selling property or cutting the budget, Talmage commented, "I don't know that we need to generate more revenues. We need to be diligent with the revenues we have."

Others pointed out hotel taxes, which already account for a large part of the budget, all go to the city, while sales tax yields just a small share of the 7.25 percent charged. Therefore, they suggested developing more means of attracting visitors and enticing them to stay in town longer.

Most went on the record in opposition to artificial turf, which has been proposed for a small front yard on Scenic Road, though McCloud said the question is really how best to deal with landscaping during a severe

water shortage, considering the looming cuts that could be imposed by the state and Cal-Am's seeking to triple rates for most customers.

Sharp went as far as to say she would rather see dead grass painted green, as Marin did during the drought of the 1970s, than see fake turf.

"I don't care how little water we have, artificial turf is not acceptable," LePage said.

He is also a strong proponent of undergrounding utilities in residential neighborhoods.

"This is a key to having a healthier urban forest," he said. "Indiscriminate trimming of trees for power lines weakens them."

Though it certainly would be more attractive, other candidates pointed out how expensive it is, at \$20,000 to \$30,000 per lot. Taxpayers and residents would have to foot the bill.

"It could be a real hardship on some of our homeowners," Talmage said. "I understand about the forest, but it may be such a financial hardship that we can't afford to do it."

No one mentioned the fate of Flanders Mansion, and all highlighted the restoration of the Forest Theater as a top priority, but they differed over the future of the Scout House, which was closed several years ago because it does not meet handicapped-accessibility requirements. When someone asked if the candidates would commit that night to repairing it and keeping it in city hands, most said no, citing a lack of information and other projects that are more important, though they said options exist to preserve the building.

But LePage said, "This building has been part of this community for a long time," and deserves preservation.

The CRA forum concluded with closing statements from each candidate. Absentee ballots are set to go out next week, according to Monterey County Elections.

The Carmel municipal election will be held April 8, when voters select two city council members who will serve four-year terms, and a mayor for a two-year term. Absentee ballots will be mailed March 10, according to Monterey County Elections.

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Editorial

Getting serious about water

ENDLESS DITHERING would be a good way to describe the way this community has dealt with its water supply crisis.

The crisis was invented to control growth. And its rules — let current users have as much as they want, while cutting off water entirely to anybody with vacant land — was a surefire way to ensure the shortage would drag on for years and years.

As long as a drought didn't hit, with its inevitable and very inconvenient water rationing, there was bound to be little demand from the populace to end the water shortage, for the simple reason that it had no direct effect on 95 percent of them.

We've had plenty of rain since the mid-1990s, and as long as everybody's tap continued to flow with abundant, and inexpensive, H2O, it would certainly be too much to expect the public to rush to pay \$200 million or so for a project that would have very little obvious benefit.

Add to that the endless government regulation of any new development project, especially one as substantial as a new desal plant, and it's easy to see why no new water supply project has been built in the 13 years since the State Water Resources Control Board told us we had to find one.

Now the SWRCB is suddenly getting serious about enforcing its venerable, but little honored, 1995 cutback order. In the next six years, we are told, we'll have to reduce water usage by 50 percent — an obviously impossible thing to achieve.

But while the SWRCB is asked to reconsider, its Sword of Damocles has finally focused attention on the Monterey Peninsula's wholly inadequate water supply. And on the dearth of fresh water for other parts of Monterey County as well.

The best place to see this new spirit of resolve is at a meeting of the clumsily named Regional Plenary Oversight Group, or REPOG. While its name sounds impossibly dull, this group's meetings are actually exciting for anybody who wants to see plentiful fresh water available to the people of Monterey County for decades to come.

Created by the California Public Utilities Commission, REPOG brings together water experts, government officials and concerned citizens from all over the Peninsula and North Monterey County. Chaired by a UC Santa Cruz economist, Steve Kasower, the group has put together a plan for desalination of briny aquifers, reclamation of wastewater and storm runoff, and capturing surplus flows from the Salinas River. Much of the electricity to run the pumps and filters for the ambitious project would be generated by burning methane gas from the Marina landfill.

REPOG has been explaining its plan to local city councils. Soon, the group will begin hosting a series of town hall meetings. In April, the PUC will be presented with the details. An EIR already being prepared for Cal Am's Moss Landing desal plan will be expanded to include the REPOG proposal as an alternative.

And while a consultant's prediction that "dirt could be turned" sometime next year is overly optimistic, we think it was simply wonderful to hear government officials talking about opportunities, rather than just obstacles.
