Hard-nosed, beloved police officer, 81, was Eastwood ally on city council

BOB FISCHER — who worked for Carmel Police Department for 31 years, served three terms on the city council and hailed from a bygone era in Carmel — died early Monday morning of emphysema. He was 81.

His legion of friends, family and longtime admirers described Fischer, whose real first name was Francis, as larger than life, funny, gruff, congenial and just.

"He was a very likable guy and a regular straight-shooter, and it was a real privilege to serve with him on the council," said former Mayor Clint Eastwood, who swept the 1986 municipal elections with Fischer and another council candidate, Elinor Laiolo. "He was a great asset to the community, and he'll be sadly missed."

Born in San Francisco on Dec. 19, 1926, with twin brother Eddie, Fischer arrived on the Monterey Peninsula when he was 6, following his parents' divorce. With his fisherman father, he grew up working on their purse seiner, the Thelma K. He joined the Merchant Marines and served in the South Pacific, and then signed on with the Army to fight in Europe during World War II. He moved to Carmel in 1949.

"And in 1953 or so, Chief Clyde Klaumann asked him to go to work," said Fischer's daughter, Kathee McFarland, who lives in Monterey. "And he kind of dragged his brother into it." He attended Monterey Peninsula College and, later, the FBI Academy at Quantico, Va.

"He and his brother were the backbone of the P.D. for a long time," said former building official Tim Meroney, who

met Fischer after coming to work for the city 23 years ago.

"This was back in the days when police officers lived in town," Eastwood said. "They knew everybody, and it was a nice time."

On patrol

Retired Carmel Police Chief Don Fuselier, who joined the department in 1972, remembered working with Fischer, then a lieutenant and training officer, during the 7 p.m.-to-3 a.m. shift.

"You would ride with the lieutenant until they would trust you with your own police car," Fuselier said. "Bob was the one who taught me what old Carmel was all about."

Candidates scramble to take Laird's seat

A LONGTIME attorney and activist, and a Carmel chiropractor are the two Monterey Peninsula candidates who will square off against a former Santa Cruz mayor and a San Lorenzo businesswoman in the Democratic primary for the 27th Assembly District seat in June.

The four Democratic Party candidates want to secure the spot held by Assemblyman John Laird, who will leave office this year because of term limits. He could have stayed in Sacramento another six years if Proposition 93 had been approved in February.

Chiropractor Stephen Barkalow and attorney Bill Monning, both Peninsula residents, will be on the June ballot. The Assembly seat is also sought by former Santa Cruz Mayor Emily Reilly and former San Lorenzo School Board member Barbara Sprenger.

Libertarian Mark Hinkle and Republican Robert Murray, candidates from Santa Clara County, will be in their respective parties' primaries.

Among the questions The Pine Cone asked the Democratic candidates was what they would do to help solve

Newts, salamanders to get new C.V. digs

AS FAR as bodies of water go, the future Hastings Pond will probably end up looking like a muddy puddle. But for researchers — and at least two varieties of amphibians — a proposed seasonal pond at Hastings Reserve in Upper Carmel Valley opens up a virtual ocean of possibilities.

Researchers at Hastings Reserve — a biological field station affiliated with the University of California — are fascinated by newts and salamanders. Located along Carmel Valley Road about 26 miles southeast of Carmel, the reserve has long been home to a healthy population of California newts and California tiger salamanders. But the reserve lacks a seasonal pond, which is a necessary component for newts and salamanders to complete their life cycles.

Fair-weather pine smashes through roof

Only the dog was home

IT'S AN unfortunately common occurrence on the Monterey Peninsula during severe winter storms. But despite the lack of rain or wind on crisp and clear Wednesday morning, a huge pine tree crashed onto a home on San Juan Road.

Fortunately, only George and Christine Schmiegs' dog was home at the time, and a neighbor took the scared pup in until the human residents returned, according to Cal Fire Battalion Chief Buddy Bloxham.

Workers in the neighborhood who either heard or saw the tree fall called the fire department a few minutes before noon March 12. The crew on an engine from Cypress Fire Protection District's Carmel Hill station arrived a few minutes later to find the large pine had pulled up at the roots, its thick trunk and large limbs crashing onto much of the house and splintering the roof.

Firefighters searched the premises to ensure no one was trapped, shut off the electricity and gas, taped off the residence to make sure nobody went inside, and awaited the arrival of PG&E and a Monterey County building official.

"There's significant damage," Bloxham reported at the scene.

Inside, insulation and ceiling timbers had rained onto the floor in several rooms.

A short while later, the building inspector got to the house, spoke with the

owners, who had returned in the meantime, and issued a yellow tag, according to Cal Fire Capt. Carlos Aguilera.

"They can go in and out to retrieve things, but they're not allowed to sleep over," he explained.

A representative of the Schmiegs' insurance company was also on the property by the time fire crews left.

"Luckily nobody got hurt, but I imagine it's still a shock to come back home and see that," Aguilera said. "And for us at the fire department, PG&E and the building department to say, 'You can't live here,' just creates more stress."

Car crashes into tree after brakes fail

A 20-YEAR-OLD Castroville woman was hospitalized Wednesday morning after her car's brakes failed and she swerved off the road, smashing into a large Monterey pine.

She was driving down Third Avenue toward Mission Street on her way to work around 7:30 a.m. March 12, according to Carmel Police Cpl. Steve Rana.

"She tried to put on her brakes, and they didn't work," Rana said. "The pedal went all the way to the floor, and she ran it off the road and into a tree."

Someone heard the accident and the woman screaming, and dialed 911.

The driver, who is pregnant, got out of the 1993 Mazda minivan by herself and lay on the ground, according to Rana. She was alert and conscious, but very worried about her unborn child.

Before the ambulance took her to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula, she told Rana she had borrowed the small van from a family member. It was the first time she had driven it, and the brakes had worked without trouble up to the moment she tried to slow down for the turn onto Mission Street.

Checking under the hood of the crashed minivan, Rana said he saw brake fluid in the reservoir and could not immediately determine why the brakes had failed. He verified the pedal would collapse to the floor without resistance.

When the car wouldn't stop, "she didn't know what to do, so she pulled off the side of the road," Rana said. "And the tree stopped her."

In the case of brake failure, Rana advised drivers to apply the emergency brake, which functions mechanically (usually with cables) and will therefore work even if the main (hydraulic) system will not.

Another option: "If you have an automatic, you can put it into 'Park' and let the ratcheting of the transmission slow you down," he said. "Or if you drive a manual, downshift to the lowest gear possible, and that will slow you down."

Did you know...

After John Steinbeck published his masterpiece "Grapes of Wrath" and won a Pulitzer Prize for literature, he and his wife Carol moved back to Pacific Grove in 1941. They separated soon afterwards and John moved to New York City. He married again, separated again, and moved back to the Steinbeck cottage at 147 11th Street in 1948. John met and married his third wife, Elaine, in Carmel in 1949 and they moved to New York. He turned the family cottage over to his sister, Beth Ainsworth, in the 1950s, returning for only brief visits before his death in 1968. A silver box containing his ashes arrived at the cottage on Christmas Eve that year and sat in the garden for two days before the memorial service at Point Lobos, then burial in a family plot in Salinas. After Mrs. Ainsworth died in 1992, the family kept the cottage and still uses it as a private home.

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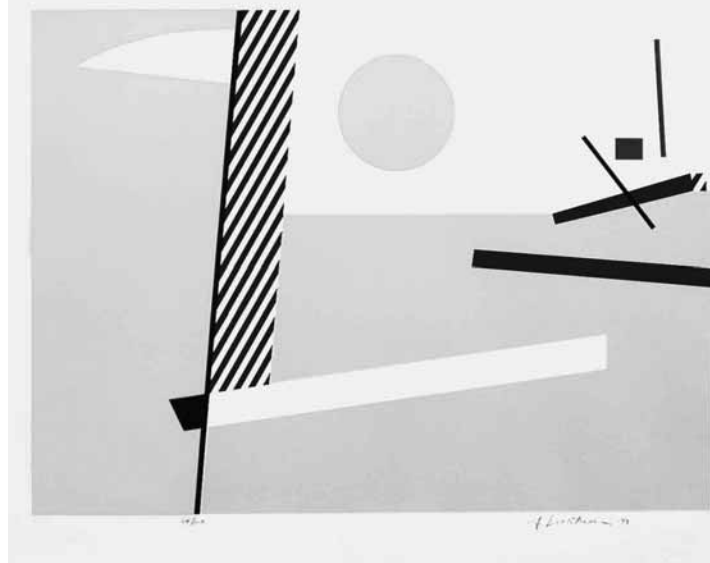
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FCC requires upgrade of police, fire radio system

A FEDERAL mandate that fire, law enforcement and other public agencies begin using "narrowband" radio channels to communicate will cost taxpayers in Monterey County \$20 million over the next three years. The one-square-mile city of Carmel-by-the-Sea will pay an estimated \$302,550 to \$377,559 for new equipment and its share of the upgraded infrastructure, the city council learned last week.

In December 2004, the Federal Communications Commission ordered many public agencies to move from the 25 kHz channels they've used for decades to 12.5 kHz channels, which would facilitate the use of more efficient technology and reduce congestion in radio traffic. The shift must be completed by Jan. 1, 2013.

The infrastructure upgrades and new equipment are vital for agencies to communicate with each other, Carmel Police Sgt. Mike Calhoun told the city council March 4. Carmel P.D. operates its own 911 system, while calls for the fire department and ambulances are handled by dispatchers at Monterey County Emergency

Communications in Salinas. In addition, Carmel has an emergency operations center it activates during disasters and other major incidents.

Right now, a Carmel police officer in another Peninsula city might not be able to reach his station via radio, but the new system should eliminate that problem. In addition, officers will be able to hear each other over a much broader geographical area, according to Calhoun.

To develop and implement the new radio system, Carmel and 11 other cities, several fire protection districts and two volunteer fire departments joined with the County of Monterey in 2006 to conduct a study called the Next Generation Radio Project, or NGEN.

"It is essential that Carmel participates in the NGEN project to ensure across-the-board police, fire and medical communication interoperability with County Communications and allied public safety agencies," Calhoun reported.

The NGEN Task Force hired consultants to develop a strategic plan, system design

School girls throw an on-campus vodka party

HERE'S A look at some of the significant calls logged by the Carmel-by-the-Sea Police Department, the Carmel Fire Department and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office last week. This week's log was compiled by Mary Brownfield.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 26

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 27

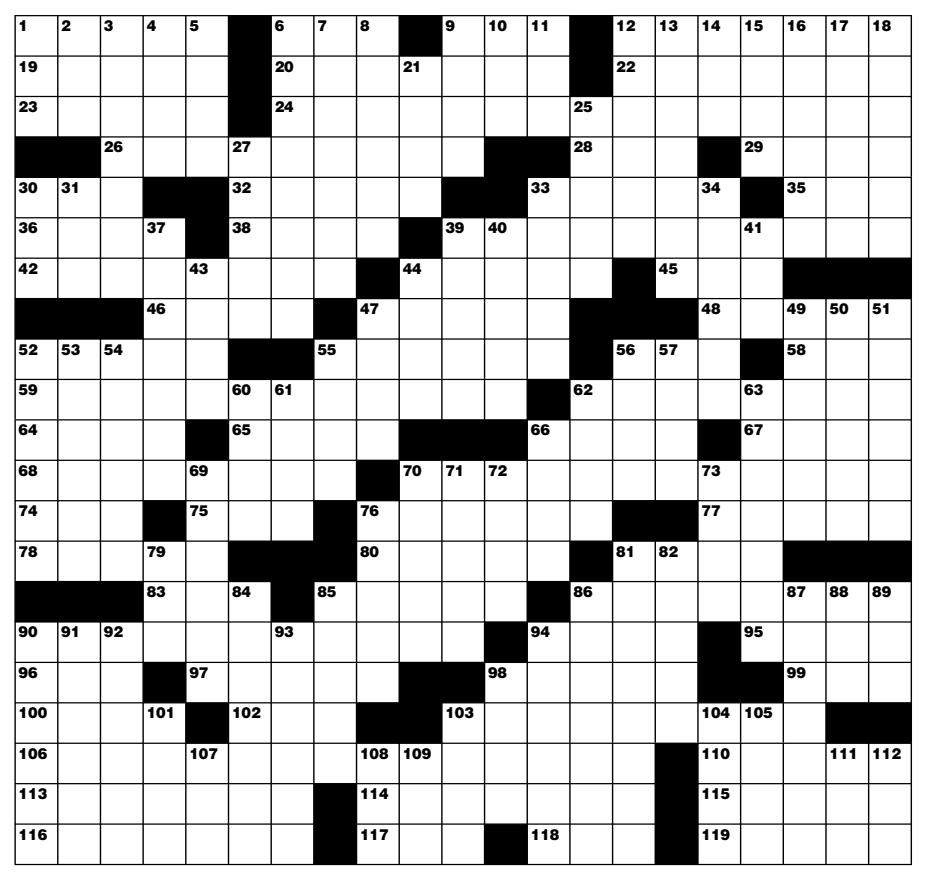
- Carmel-by-the-Sea:** A 24-year-old male subject arrested on Mesa Drive for DUI with a BAC of .21 percent.

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P.G. firefighters may become Monterey employees

WITH CARMEL stepping back from the potential consolidation of its fire department with those in Pacific Grove and Monterey, the remaining two cities are considering a merger. While they still have significant issues to hammer out and need their city councils' approval, officials want the change to take effect July 1.

"When Carmel changed strategy at the last minute, we decided to kick this into gear," P.G. Fire Chief Andrew Miller said.

With the goal of being more efficient and providing better service, the three cities commissioned a study considering the feasibility of their merging. Citygate Associates released the study last summer and recommended first joining management in a single headquarters, then possibly undertaking a full consolidation.

Though all three initially decided to proceed in that direction, Carmel withdrew a few months ago. City administrator Rich Guillen said he wanted to pull back because the merger could be expensive for city taxpayers and he thought it would be better to tackle the issue after the April 8 election for mayor and city council.

And rather than going through a formal merger of government agencies, Miller explained the two cities decided it would be easier for one city to contract with the other to provide firefighting services. Since Monterey has the capacity to bring on 17 new full-time employees, it would be the city that would retain its fire department.

Firefighters in Pacific Grove would continue working in the station there, and the engines and other equipment would remain unchanged, according to Miller.

"The only difference would be their paychecks would be coming from Monterey," he said. They would not have to go through the hiring process in Monterey and would retain their ranks.

Since the two would become one department, it would only need one chief. P.G. city manager Jim Colangelo said existing vacancies mean no one will lose his job, though some titles would change.

"One of the chiefs would become assistant chief, and the assistant chief would become a division chief," he said.

In all likelihood, that means Monterey Fire Chief Sam Mazza would maintain the top position. Miller could become assistant chief, and P.G.'s assistant chief, Dave Brown, might become a division chief.

Hurdles

Substantial labor issues must be settled before the merger can occur, including how to pay out vacation time accrued by P.G. firefighters and how they might retain their seniority when they become Monterey employees. Seniority matters in terms of layoffs — the least senior employees are the first to go — as well as scheduling shifts and vacations.

"That's why we have the labor groups hashing this out," Colangelo said.

The numbers also have to be crunched. Although the Citygate study contained financial data, Carmel's "deciding not to participate for this period of time obviously changes the numbers," he said.

It also doesn't mean Carmel's completely out of the deal. It is already a customer, contracting with P.G. and Monterey for the services of their chief, assistant chief, division chiefs and administrative help. And that relationship may change in the future, although how isn't clear.

"If we change our relationship with Monterey, we would have to go back to Carmel and say, 'If you want to be a customer, here's what we can provide for you, and here's the cost,'" Colangelo said.

"We encouraged Carmel to stay involved," Miller said, adding that a contract with Monterey could also morph into a joint merger with several fire agencies, if they "show interest" in forming a broader Peninsula fire department.

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Program uses play to help autistic children and their parents

A UNIQUE program is giving parents of autistic children on the Monterey Peninsula the tools to help turn play-

time into therapy. Autism, which experts estimate occurs in as many as five of every 1,000 children, is a developmental disorder characterized by impaired social interaction, problems with communication and unusual, repetitive, or severely limited activities and interests.

But Easter Seals P.L.A.Y. Project — Play and Language for Autistic Youngsters — shows parents of autistic children how to help their kids at home with two to three hours per day of intensive play therapy.

“We actually teach the parents what a therapist would typically do with the child,” said Tracy Chappell, chief development officer for Easter Seals Central California. “It teaches the parents to implement therapy.”

P.L.A.Y. Project, which was brought to Monterey County in September, allows trained consultants to teach parents techniques that are fun and useful in daily interactions with their child.

The methods taught are fun, respectful of the child’s indi-

viduality and help parents become their child’s best play partner, according to the program’s website.

Besides improving child/parent relationships, the project’s goals include reducing stress in the home, including siblings in coaching and training, and improving child development so children are ready for school.

Maria Luna, herself the mother of two autistic children ages 6 and 7, believed in the program so much that she gave up a job as a special education teacher in Fresno teaching autistic kids to become a home consultant for P.L.A.Y. Project in Monterey County. She and her kids went through the program last year.

“I saw the difference it made in my children,” Luna said. “I think it’s a wonderful program.”

Luna said she has clients in Carmel, Pacific Grove and Monterey.

The program, which is paid for by First Five of Monterey

For the amphibians who call the 2,000-acre Hastings home, the lack of a pond is simply a minor inconvenience. When nature calls them to breed, newts and salamanders simply migrate to a pond on adjacent private property.

For researchers, though, access to nearby ranches is no longer possible.

“For years we studied vernal pools on private land,” explained Mark Stromberg, resident reserve director. “Unfortunately, we are no longer able to go there.”

To assure themselves an accessible pond, researchers decided to make one of their own. The proposed pond will be installed in an open field that is seasonally flooded by a culvert. The earth will be dredged out to a depth of about 18 inches in an area about 50 feet by 100 feet.

“It won’t be as big as a parking lot,” described Stromberg.

While a thin layer of clay will be applied to the base of the pond after it is dredged to help it hold water, the pond will still be dry for 9 to 10 months a year. Which is exactly what researchers want.

“As the water level in the pond drops, the water gets warmer and the oxygen level goes down,” Stromberg said. “Young salamanders and newts are forced to develop lungs. If the pond doesn’t dry up, they won’t.”

With a new pond in the neighborhood, researchers hope to attract the amphibians, which typically migrate en masse after midwinter rains. So many newts cross Carmel Valley Road that staff at Hastings erected a “newt crossing” sign along the route about 10 years ago.

“Something tells them that it’s time to move,” Stromberg explained. “When it’s dark and raining, you can see 50 of them on the road at a time.”

The salamanders and newts are attracted to seasonal ponds, where they lay massive quantities of eggs in the hope that some young will survive.

“One pond may have 500,000 eggs, but produce only 5,000 ‘walkers,’” Stromberg said. “They have a very high mortality rate.”

The adult newts and salamanders will only stay at the pond for a week or a month before laying their eggs. Then it’s back to whatever rotting log they crawled out from underneath.

“The babies are on their own,” Stromberg observed.

Newts vs. tiger salamanders

Of the two amphibians researchers are seeking to accommodate, the newts are by far the most common.

“They’re about 6 to 7 inches long,” Stromberg said. “They have emerald eyes, brownish orange skin and bright orange bellies. They’re about as big around as your little finger.”

Tiger salamanders exist at Hastings in much smaller numbers than newts.

“The tiger salamander is chunkier, jet black and has yellow spots,” Stromberg explained. “It’s about 10 inches long and as big around as your thumb.”

According to Jeff Miller, a conservation advocate with the Center for Biological Diversity, there are three distinct species of California tiger salamanders. The Sonoma and Santa Barbara species are listed by the federal government as endangered, while the Central Coast species is listed as threatened.

If all goes according to plan, the pond will be ready by the time next winter’s rains come. Not only will it provide a wealth of research opportunities to those who study

Hastings’ rich flora and fauna, but it will also create a fascinating diversion for underprivileged San Francisco Bay Area kids (and perhaps future researchers) who visit the reserve as part of an educational program.

“Besides newts and salamanders, ponds are filled with all sorts of interesting things like tadpoles, algae, aquatic insects and zoo plankton,” Stromberg added. “A pond is the first step to looking at life under a microscope.”

‘Mystery mammal’ identified

In a Feb. 22 article in The Pine Cone about a thermal imaging camera at Hastings, Stromberg reported the device captured the movement of a “mystery mammal.” He guessed it was a ringtail, but only because he and his staff previously ruled out any other animal known to exist at the reserve. The shy, elusive and nocturnal ringtail “cat,” noted for its dramatic black and white ringed tail, is actually not a feline, but a cousin of the raccoon. Unfortunately, Stromberg had no evidence ringtails live in Carmel

Valley other than an unconfirmed 15-year-old report.

But since the article was published, Stromberg has received three phone calls reporting sightings of ringtails in Carmel Valley, one from a park ranger in the vicinity of Palo Corona Regional Park.

“The calls led to verification that ringtails exist in Carmel Valley,” Stromberg reported.

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Landmark Mt. Toro ranch to stay that way after conservation deal

EVEN THOUGH most Monterey Peninsula residents have never heard of the Dorrance Ranch, they've seen it more times than they can count. Located along a flank of 3,560-foot Mt. Toro, the ranch hovers above Salinas and the Peninsula, providing a pastoral backdrop to the hustle and bustle of daily life.

The Nature Conservancy — with the aid of The Big Sur Land Trust and a taxpayers' program designed to protect grasslands —

has purchased a conservation easement across most of the 4,300-acre ranch, preserving views of the landmark property by protecting it from future development.

"There won't be any discussion about development here," said ranch co-owner Steve Dorrance. "We've drawn a line."

It's easy to see why conservation groups were drawn to the ranch. While the upper elevations, along the crest of the Sierra de Salinas range, are bald with grasslands, the lower elevations are studded with impressive groves of a variety of oak trees, creating

what botanists call a Mediterranean woodland habitat.

"Mediterranean woodlands are one of the world's most at-risk habitats," explained Rachel Saunders, director of communications for the BSLT. "They have a remarkably high biological diversity. The Central Coast of California is at the heart of only five Mediterranean habitat regions in the world."

The ranch is also home to an array of animals, including endangered or threatened species like California red-legged frogs, California tiger salamanders, burrowing owls and California condors. Also found on the property are mountain lions, bobcats,

deer, red-tailed hawks, golden eagles, ground squirrels, pocket gophers, brush rabbits, badgers and numerous game birds, songbirds and reptiles.

The Nature Conservancy purchased the easement for \$6 million. Half the funding came from the Wildlife Conservation Board, which distributes tax money that supports its Rangeland, Grazing Land and Grassland Program. The board falls under the jurisdiction of the California Department of Fish and Game.

The balance of the funding was provided by the Nature Conservancy (\$750,000 from private donations), the David and Lucille Packard Foundation (\$1.75 million) and The Big Sur Land Trust (\$500,000 from private donations, including the Barnet Segal Charitable Trust).

By reducing the sale price from the easement's appraised \$7 million value to \$6 million, the Dorrance family gets a tax deduction of \$1 million.

After purchasing the ranch six decades ago, the the family established a rich equestrian legacy on the property. The late Bill Dorrance was considered a founder of the modern horsemanship movement. He promoted methods that could be best described as a more 'humanistic' approach to working with horses. Bill's brother, Tom, was one of the inspirations behind Nicholas Evan's best-selling book, "The Horse Whisperer."

The ranch has been in the family since the 1940s and is currently co-owned by Steve, Dave and Billy Dorrance. Dave Dorrance began laying the groundwork for this week's preservation deal back in

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Slick new city website set for unveiling

CARMEL'S REVAMPED website should go live this month, according to Monterey ad man Jeff Burghardt, who was tasked with overhauling the clunky, outdated "ci.carmel.ca.us" site the city has used for eight years. First hired to handle the city's advertising and public relations, Burghardt landed additional contracts last summer to become its economic development and marketing director, and to redesign the outdated website city administrator Rich Guillen once likened to as a Model T Ford.

"You're not going to upgrade a Model T," he said at the time.

Last week, Burghardt demonstrated the

Model T's replacement for the Carmel City Council, highlighting the revamped website's useful information for residents, visitors, business owners and newcomers who might partake in any number of online services, from downloading permit applications, to checking out the municipal code or finding out when the planning commission meets.

Anyone seeking to start a business in town can find answers to a host of questions and get the proper forms in order, while someone interested in noteworthy facts and figures about Carmel can find them online as well.

The site also offers a calendar of events, volunteer opportunities and emergency

information, all while streaming live jazz from downtown radio station KRML, if the web surfer at the computer is so inclined to listen.

In addition, following the council's vote in January to hire Internet company Granicus to stream its meetings live on the web, Burghardt designed the website to include links to the meetings and their agendas, so people can search for specific topics using key words and then watch that part of the hearing.

Burghardt told the council he pulled a lot of the content over from the old website, "but added a lot and cleaned up a lot." He also

visited other city sites to see what aspects were most effective, and "put a lot of effort into the site map itself." According to the contract approved last year, Burghardt is receiving \$30,000 for the website revamp.

the Peninsula's water supply problem. A cease and desist order being considered by the State Water Resources Control Board could compel California American Water Co. to reduce pumping of the Carmel River by 50 percent within six years. They had few specific answers.

Unsurprisingly, protecting the environment, providing affordable housing and improving education were important to the candidates.

■ Stephen Barkalow

Carmel chiropractor Stephen Barkalow is one of two candidates who live on the Monterey Peninsula. Near and dear to Barkalow is the price of healthcare, which he said is one of the reasons for the high cost of living for employees and employers within the 27th Assembly District.

"I have witnessed how the lack or loss of healthcare coverage has affected so many different aspects of my patients' lives - from personal finances to housing," he said. "It is time for the people of the 27th Assembly District to have a legislator who is an expert in a field that is in critical need of repair."

Increasing funding for education, providing affordable housing and protecting the environment are also on Barkalow's priority list of issues he would tackle if elected assemblyman.

He's also committed to seeing more "smart growth," which he said is best directed toward revitalization of villages, towns and city centers rather than building new subdivisions.

"This kind of growth will allow cities to attract families and stimulate local business, while reducing the need to commute," he said. "It will also increase the tax base and stimulate the local economy. This can be done instead of raising city taxes and will allow us to address our environmental and transportation concerns simultaneously."

In establishing a water supply for the Peninsula, Barkalow is the only candidate who acknowledged the ambitious work by the Regional Plenary Oversight Group, which was created by the California Public Utilities Commission to come up with an alternative water supply for the Peninsula.

"This is a good example of thinking outside the box to find a solution which is reasonable, ecologically sound and diverse," he said.

The group, headed by UC Santa Cruz professor Steve Kasower, has proposed using desalination of brackish water, recycled water, stormwater runoff and other sources

to supply as much as 29,000 acre-feet of water from the Peninsula to Pajaro.

Barkalow's endorsements include the California Chiropractic Association, psychologist Carl Alasko and photographer Doug Steakley.

■ Bill Monning

Monterey Peninsula attorney, law professor and activist Bill Monning, whose family first settled in Carmel in the 1920s, said he can offer Peninsula residents "knowledge, familiarity, and experience" as assemblyman.

"I am strongly committed to protecting our communities' environment and maintaining a high quality of life," Monning said, "including support for quality education, healthcare services, and sustainable (smart) economic growth."

If elected, Monning said, he would work to ensure the preservation of the coastal environment.

"We need to be vigilant about water and sewage runoff into the bay," he said, "as the addition of toxic chemicals and other pollutants may damage the ecological balance of the Monterey Bay and Pacific Ocean habitats."

Monning said he believes there is no single state or regional solution to the Peninsula's water issue, but said the Peninsula must explore other available water resources such as green construction, "sustainable and environmentally appropriate desalination options," and education and incentives that promote water conservation.

"I favor exploration of regional solutions and believe that the current overdraft of the Carmel River is not only in violation of state law, but also is unsustainable," he said.

When it comes to California America Water Co.'s proposed Coastal Water Project, which includes a desalination plant in Moss Landing, Monning said he would withhold judgment of the project until the California Public Utilities Commission completes its final environmental impact report on the project.

"I believe that Cal Am's Coastal Water

Project provides a basis for promoting constructive dialogue on the issue of achieving a drought-proof water supply to the Monterey Peninsula," he said.

Monning's endorsements include 5th District Supervisor Dave Potter, Monterey County Sheriff Mike Kanalakis and former Monterey Mayor Dan Albert.

■ Emily Reilly

Former Santa Cruz Mayor and City Councilwoman Emily Reilly grew up in a working-class Pennsylvania town without any of the environmental concerns of today.

"That ingrained in me a deep sense of appreciation for preserving the environment," Reilly said.

Reilly said there are a number of environmental issues important to the Monterey Peninsula and the Central Coast, including coastal protection, fighting global warming and coming up with a more sustainable solution to the transportation needs of the area.

"It is important to ensure that these protections are compatible with preserving jobs and expanding affordable housing," she said. "My experience on the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary Advisory Council and as a mayor and city council member of Santa Cruz have taught me this."

While mayor, Reilly participated in a commitment by the City of Santa Cruz to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and establish mandatory green building regulations for construction.

Reilly does not support legislation to provide a water supply to the Peninsula but would "find a solution that protects the environment and takes a fair look at all the issues."

Reilly said she won't commit to a desalination plant to provide a drought-free water supply, but said it is important to include the community in the process.

"I support finding a solution to the potential water shortage on the Peninsula," she

said. "A desalination plant is obviously one way of achieving this, and it is a solution we are pursuing in Santa Cruz through our integrated water plan."

Reilly's endorsements include Lt. Gov. John Garamendi, California State Board of Equalization Chairwoman Betty Yee and former Santa Cruz Mayor Katherine Beiers.

■ **Barbara Sprenger**

Businesswoman and former San Lorenzo Valley School Board member Barbara Sprenger lists the environment as her "highest priority," but includes healthcare reform, education and job security as other important issues.

"The people of the Monterey Peninsula primarily care about the same things as the rest of the district," Sprenger said, "protecting our watersheds and forests, finding a reasonable balance between producing the affordable housing our working communities need and protecting the environment and open space, and providing the education and healthcare we all need."

Sprenger helped organize Friends of Locally Owned Water, or FLOW, which has tried to turn California American

Water Co.'s facilities in the Santa Cruz mountains into a publicly owned utility.

If elected, Sprenger said she would make water a primary focus of her work in the Assembly. She favors a regional solution instead of intervention from the state Legislature in securing a water supply for the Peninsula. "There are many potential solutions on the table," she said, "and we must be sure we're maximizing the lowest cost — both environmen-

tally and financially."

That could include conservation, recycling and desalination, Sprenger said.

"I will certainly work with all the players to craft solutions," she said.

Sprenger's endorsements include 24th District Assemblyman Jim Beall, former San Jose Mayor Susan Hammer and 22nd District Assemblywoman Sally Lieber.

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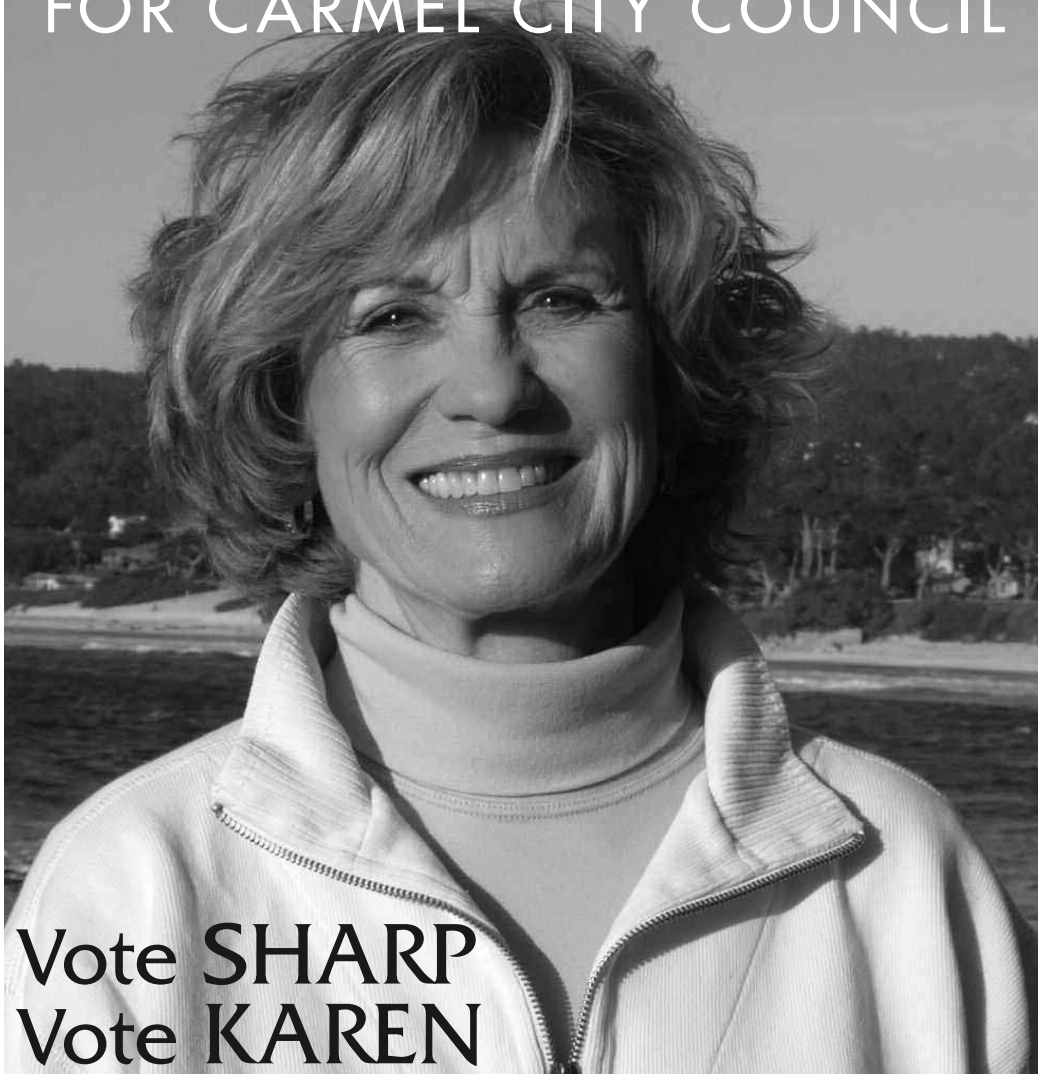

Fischer also stressed the importance of getting out of the car to patrol on foot, checking on residents who might need help and meeting the characters who made the town what it was. “Bob was way ahead of his time in what we call today ‘community policing,’” Fuselier said.

He lent a sympathetic ear to younger officers and could be found at the coffee counter in the former Golden West — now occupied by Cantinetta Luca — next to what was then Piccadilly Nursery and is now Piccadilly Park.

“Bob would get off at 3 a.m., but at 7:30 or quarter to 8, he would still be at the counter at Golden West with his cup of coffee, and if you had something on your mind, you could find him there,” Fuselier said. When Fischer and his wife, Marian, lived on Junipero, the door was always open.

“You could drive by, and if you had a problem, he would sit and listen,” Fuselier said. “He fathered us in a lot of ways. But if you screwed up, he would let you know. He wasn’t a softy.”

And people listened to him and did what he said. “That was one of the great joys of working with someone who knew everyone,” Fuselier said.

He also recalled his superior “grinning like a kid,” while driving the department’s all-terrain vehicle, which had tracks like a small tank, on beach patrol.

At one point, Fischer and his family moved into Flanders Mansion.

“He was kind of a caretaker there. There was some vandalism, because nobody lived in it after the city bought it,”

Fuselier said. “With three social girls, Bob was running up quite a phone bill, so he had a pay phone installed in Flanders Mansion. If his daughters wanted to make a phone call, they had to pony up a dime.”

At the counter

Greg Cellitti, who owns Friar Tuck restaurant at the corner of Dolores and Fifth with his wife, Cynthia, said Fischer rarely missed his daily cup of coffee.

“In the 30 years I’ve been there, the guy only once ate anything,” Cellitti said. “He had a hamburger, and don’t ask me why — I’ll never know.”

He would visit with his friends and everyone else in the restaurant, and Cellitti said the former cop, who rose to the rank of assistant chief and also served as acting chief before retiring in January 1985, liked to recount some noteworthy tales.


While on duty with his brother one night in the early 1960s, according to Cellitti, they were chasing some kids and caught one near San Antonio Avenue.

“He had to back up his brother, so he handcuffed one of the kids to a tree, and then they apprehended the other one and took him to the station and booked him,” Cellitti said. A couple of hours had passed before he remembered the other was still tied to the tree. And it was raining.

Another occurred years later when a body was found buried on the beach, the man a victim of a deadly encounter.

“They had to call the forensic team from Fresno. They found all these cigarette butts around the body, so they figured the person who buried the body was a chain smoker,” Cellitti said. “And it ended up they were Bob’s cigarettes — he was chain smoking [at the crime scene], because they’d never had a murder in Carmel.”

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Symphony concert highlights compositions from the 1940s

THE MONTEREY Symphony presents its fifth concert of the season Sunday and Monday, March 16-17, at Sunset Center, offering a trio of classical compositions written in the 1940s.

The symphony will open the concert with a rendition of "Appalachian Spring," a ballet score penned by Aaron Copeland in 1944. Inspired by modern dance pioneer Martha Graham, the ballet tells the story of a spring celebration that follows the construction of a farmhouse by a young Pennsylvania couple in the 19th century. "Appalachian Spring" is notable for its inclusion of the Shaker melody, "Simple Gifts."

"The ballet was commissioned by Elizabeth Sprague Coolidge, who was a great lover of chamber music," explained Joe Truskot, executive director of the symphony. "Martha Graham came up with the title. It's a wonderful piece of music."

Following "Appalachian Spring" will be "Concierto de Aranjuez," which was written by Spanish composer Joaquin Rodrigo in 1940. Rodrigo and his fellow countryman and contemporary Andrés Segovia are credited with popularizing the use of guitar in classical music. Rodrigo's work also had a great effect on jazz great Miles Davis, particularly evident in his landmark 1960 recording, "Sketches of Spain," which features an extended version of the second movement of "Concierto de Aranjuez." Photographer 'maps' the human body with camera and collage

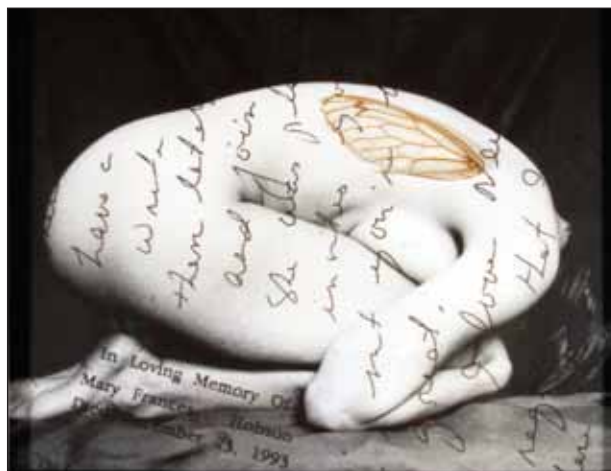

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Psychologist to praise creativity in young people

AN EXPERT on the development of creativity in young people will tell a Carmel

audience Monday that allowing children to explore the arts has an invaluable and direct correlation to success in adult life.

Victoria Stevens will present "Creative Thinking, The Brain, and Cognitive Processes, the Importance of Arts for The Development of Creativity in Children & Adults" at Il Fornaio restaurant. The event is free.

Over the years, because of budget con-

straints, California school systems have steadily cut art and music programs, a move some say will have lasting effects on child development.

"If we deny our children exposure to the arts," said Jane De Lay, executive director of the Forest Theater Guild, which is hosting Stevens' speech, "we are creating humans that don't have the capacity to feel empathy for each other."

Stevens, a clinical psychologist, will discuss the importance of providing every student with a comprehensive, balanced and rigorous arts education, taught during the regular school day.

Experts contend the importance of education in the arts for lifelong success cannot be overestimated and say the benefits of arts in education include cultural understanding, readiness for learning and creativity, cognitive outcomes, emotional intelligence, social interaction and preparation for the work force.

"When you think about our overall soci-

ety and the job market and what our young will be facing as adults," De Lay said, "they must have the creativity and imagination and confidence and the problem-solving skills."

Stevens will also share strategies outlined in a report prepared by the California Alliance for Arts Education on the importance of arts in public schools. The report, which she contributed to, highlights the lack of arts education throughout the state, despite political and educator support for such programs.

The event is open to anyone, but De Lay encouraged teachers, principals, policy-makers and others to attend Stevens' presentation, "so they understand why they have to support the arts education programs in our schools."

Stevens' presentation is set for March 17 from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at Il Fornaio at Ocean and Monte Verde, Carmel. For more information about the event or to learn more about the Forest Theater Guild, contact Jane De Lay at (831) 383-9681.

raphy as a medium of self expression.

Hobson later attended the University of New Mexico, where she graduated with a master's degree in the history of photography. In New Mexico, Hobson studied surrealism, leading her to experiment with mixed media compositions. After graduating 12 years ago, she created the first of a collection of collages in her "Mapping the Body" series.

"As early mapmakers used pen and ink to chart the surface of the world, I use collage to navigate the inner world," writes Hobson, who lives in Stinson Beach. "I print images of the body on Kodalith [a very high contrast film that renders subjects in pure black and pure white], because black and white transparencies render the surface invisible. I collage in layers using real objects. I delight in insect wings, needles, fishhooks, matches, train tracks and door hinges because they are so very tactile and convey multiple meanings."

While much of her work is inspired by her personal experiences, her themes are universal.

"Many of the pieces in this series were inspired by personal history," she recounted. "However, my hope has always been that the work transcends its origins and speaks to something larger than myself ... For this reason, I encourage viewers to discover their own unique reading of each piece."

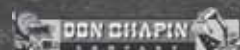
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Bicyclette bounty, plentiful Pinot and lifeafter the BSOD

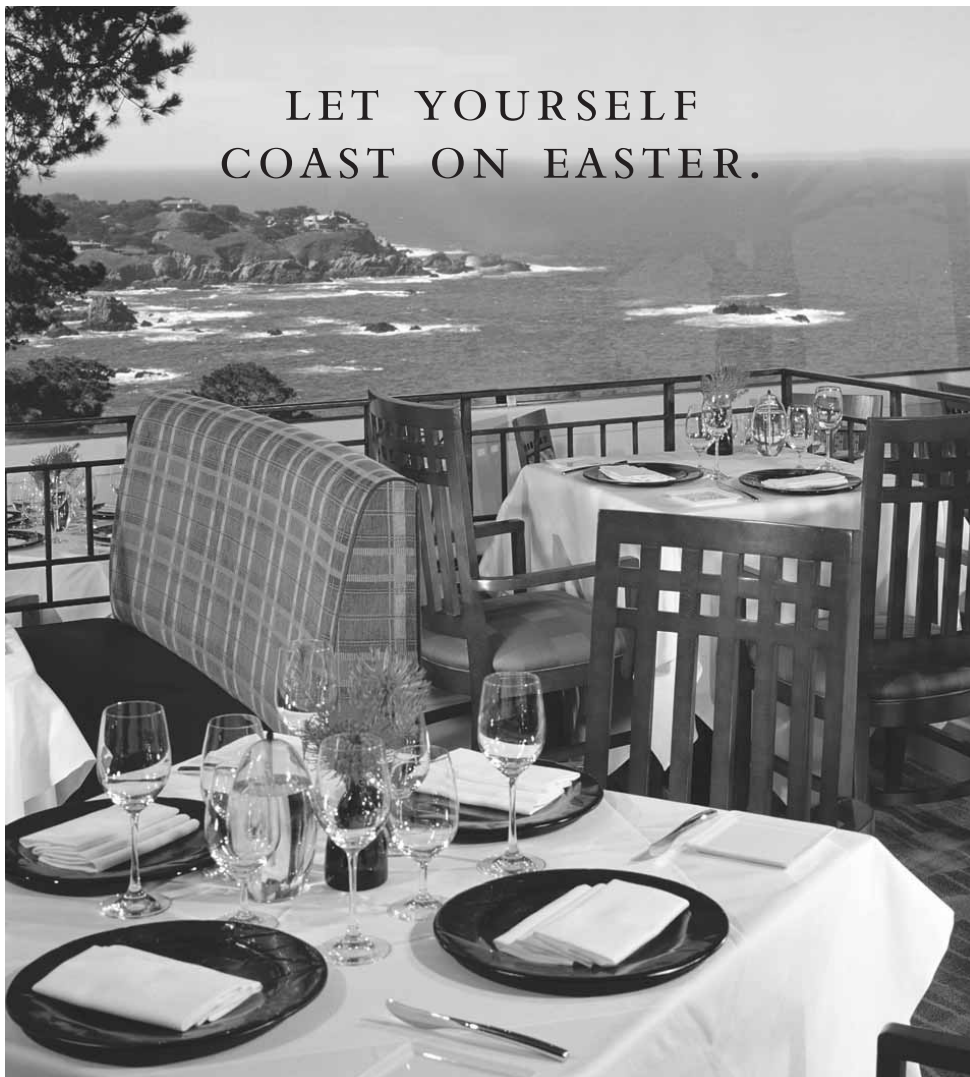
■ Red Wine weekend

1990, when he attended a workshop in Austin, Texas offered by Holistic Management International. HMI provides training, education and consulting services to the stewards of large properties, advocating progressive strategies that seek to find common ground between traditional ranch-

ing and ecology. "We had some real concerns about how, as a family business, we could continue to run cattle here," he conceded. The workshop, with an emphasis on improving communication among family members, was a real eye-opener for Dave Dorrance. "I thought we needed more fences and more water, but what really mattered was family dynamics," he recalled. "Once we found out what each family member wanted,

it was easier to figure out what we wanted to do with the ranch." In exchange for \$6 million, the Dorrance family gives up its right to develop most of the property, but they're still able to live on the ranch and maintain its cattle operation. When Christina Fischer of the Nature Conservancy first visited the ranch, she was pleasantly surprised at how well the Dorrance family had cared for the property. "They have been extremely thoughtful land stewards," explained Fischer. "They have thought carefully about everything they have done on the ranch, not only regarding cattle production, but also the environment." Without the money generated for the Dorrances by creating the conservation ease-

ment, the temptation of selling the ranch might be too great for the family, explained Bill Leahy, executive director of the BSLT. "Corral de Tierra is an area that is most likely going to receive a lot of attention from developers," he said. The \$6 million "will take the pressure off future generations to sell the ranch by creating a reliable source of funding so they can stay in business." For the Dorrance family, the sale of the conservation easement not only converts part of their property into a lot of cash, it ensures the future of the property they love. "Cattle ranching will be here long after we're gone," Steve Dorrance added. "Hopefully the red-tailed hawks and red-legged hawks will be, too."

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An Open Letter from the City Administrator Regarding Fire Department Staffing

The City of Carmel-by-the Sea values all of its employees and recognizes the important role they play in providing effective, efficient service. Whenever a critical, life-saving emergency arises, our staff at the Carmel Fire Department consistently provides the highest level of service to the citizens of our community, and the vital role they play can not be overemphasized. Nevertheless, there are some facts below that I hope will clarify statements by representatives of the International Association of Fire Fighters (IAFF) Local 4579.

1. Minimum staffing levels: The Fire Department is staffed to initially respond to an emergency with four fire fighters and a Duty Chief. This staffing level complies with what is commonly referred to as the "2-in/2-out" OSHA regulation which requires fire fighters to work in teams of two. One team enters a building while the second team remains outside and ready to immediately rescue the inside team. Two of four firefighters are Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance (CRFA) employees who are also certified for medical aid. One is a fire fighter/paramedic and the other is a fire fighter/EMT (emergency medical technician). This staffing ensures that advanced life saving capabilities are included as part of the fire department's initial response.

2. Consolidating fire service with Monterey and Pacific Grove: The cities of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Monterey and Pacific Grove continue to discuss "headquarters" consolidation – not full departmental integration. Headquarters consolidation means that "only" fire administration is consolidated, i.e. fire chief, assistant fire chief, clerical support, etc. The city successfully implemented headquarters consolidation in 2001 and now has a contract for \$110,000 with Pacific Grove Fire Department to provide this service.

3. Staffing during critical emergencies: If an emergency requires more resources, the fire department has systems in place to respond with extra staffing and equipment. These systems include any one or all of the following:

- 13 paid volunteers, including intermittent engineers, paid call fire fighters, and a paid call battalion chief
- Call-back of full time fire department personnel
- Automatic and Mutual Aid from nearby allied fire departments; in such cases, additional fire trucks and personnel will respond as needed. In past incidents, as many as five additional fire trucks arrived in Carmel within a very short period of time.

Rest assured that your safety will never be compromised nor will the city ever place our fire fighters at risk. Having made this statement, it does not exclude the city from acting in a financially responsible manner. It is always our goal to provide you with exceptional public safety service.

With kids

Fuselier said Fischer had a particular skill with kids, and often closed off the Sunset Center parking lot for ball games.

He knew how to deal with the troublesome teenagers who hung out in the park, too.

“They would give us a lot of lip, but when Bob told them to do something, it was, ‘Yes, Mr. Fischer,’” he said. “They had great respect for Bob, not just as a peace officer, but as a human being.”

When Fischer planned to retire, the Carmel City Council adopted a resolution of commendation. In addition to listing his accomplishments, the resolution reads, “Assistant Chief of Police Fischer is not only appreciated for his many years of service dedicated to protecting the lives and properties of all the citizens of Carmel, but especially for his dedication to the young people of Carmel in keeping them off of the police rolls and guiding them toward the honor rolls.”

In another document placed in his personnel file in December 1983, someone wrote, “When working with Carmel’s youth, Bob is well known for his warmth, patience, good judgment and firmness. It has been said of Bob Fischer, ‘whatever the situation, he always seems to have the know-how and expertise to be a human being first and police officer second.’”

At the dais

After retiring from the police force, Fischer embarked on his political career in 1986, running alongside Eastwood and Laiolo. They won by a landslide.

He would go on to serve 12 years. When he ran for reelection in 1990, Fischer said in his campaign brochure, “It is my

sincere belief that the actions of the city council over these past four years have greatly contributed to the mending of the aggravation that existed between the business community and the residents of our unique community.”

Among the ideas he supported: a parking structure at Mission and Eighth, residential parking permits, a reduction in new houses being built, a 50 percent open space requirement in the residential area, a strong design review committee, and “full cultural and recreation enhancement and expansion.”

He also asked if the city should “consider a squirrel kidnap squad to bring the little rascals back to Carmel — I miss them.”

Fuselier, who became police chief in 1994, “sat through more council meetings than I care to think of,” and recalled Fischer’s frequently providing “the voice of reason.”

“He didn’t go off on tangents or do quirky things. He was always just and solid, and did great job,” he said. “Someone who got turned down at least knew he had been heard justly.”

Cellitti said Fischer was also a man of his word. “If he told you he was going to do something, he did it,” he said.

Sandy Farrell, executive assistant in city hall, said, “He was just amazing — he had a lot of good humor and really was a champion for the little guys — and he was a wonderful man to work with.”

Finance specialist Karen Love, the city’s longest serving employee with 39 years on the payroll, said Fischer’s dry humor was most evident to those who got to know him well enough to crack his tough exterior. A request for a postcard from a vacation trip to South Dakota resulted in Fischer sending a series of cards for years.

“Marian told me she would get so mad, because he would spend hours looking for the worst post card,” Love recalled.

Meroney, who was the city’s building official during Fischer’s time on the council, said, “He was always conge-

nial, always went out of his way to say, ‘Hi,’ to people, always open to suggestions and different things.”

“I miss him,” Meroney continued. “He was a longtime figure in the community and dedicated a lot of himself to the community.”

On weddings

Fischer also owned a small businesses called Carmel Weddings with his wife. Today, McFarland runs it.

A talented photographer, retired detective Pete Poitras has shot images for Carmel Weddings for years and said the Fischer he knew in the private sector was far different from the man who had been his boss at the police department.

“I didn’t realize he had a sense of humor until after he retired,” Poitras said. “And then I said, ‘Wait a minute, you were the same guy I used to work for who was a captain in the police department?’ And his reaction was, ‘You didn’t need to know I had a sense of humor.’”

He was diagnosed with emphysema, and his wife died a few years ago. Fischer moved in with his daughter about six months ago, but he was still seen around town.

“He would always come by for his one cup of coffee, go to the post office and drive by the ocean,” Cynthia Cellitti said. “I told him, ‘Bob, I want to see your face every day.’”

McFarland described her father as “larger than life,” especially in his prime.

“I used to love show and tell in elementary school, because I always got to bring my dad,” she said.

Fischer is survived by his three daughter, — Kathee McFarland of Monterey, Diana Tucksen of Nevada and Gael Johnson of South Dakota — and his grandchildren.

A celebration of his life is planned for 10:45 a.m. Saturday, March 29, in the American Legion hall on Dolores south of Eighth in downtown Carmel. Donations may be made in his name to American Legion Post 512, P.O. Box 512, Carmel, CA 93921-0512.

County, is offered to parents of young autistic children.

By giving parents the skills to help their child at home, the program can save time and money, since it costs \$8,000 to \$60,000 per year to treat autistic children in hospitals and other institutions. Apart from those benefits, the program allows parents to bond with their children, Chappell said.

"A lot of times, children with autism are withdrawn, and even the parents experience it," she said. "They are excluded from having a connection with their child. It's very painful to watch."

Chappell said the methods taught to parents assist in helping them knock down certain repetitive habits their autistic child may have. "A child with autism has what I would call an extreme comfort zone," she said. "It could be focused on the washing machine going round and round. It could be banging something, and it could be their head."

The P.L.A.Y. Project was created by Richard Solomon, a doctor who diagnosed and treated children with autism for more than 15 years. Solomon's study of 70 autistic children showed that 65 percent of them involved in the program made "good to excellent progress," according to the project's website.

A little known fact, Chappell said, is that Easter Seals, which provides services to children and adults with disabilities and other special needs, and support to their families, has been serving people with autism of all ages since 1947, Chappell said. "It's just that autism is more known today since there is more publicity about it," she said.

The program, which is free for parents, is funded by First Five Monterey County for another year. Easter Seals is seeking funding from the state and other options — including

offering the program at schools — to help keep it going.

and preliminary costs. According to estimates based on the number of radios its police officers, firefighters and public works employees use, the city's share of the countywide upgrade — which will include a network of shared base stations and transmitters — will be \$136,151 to \$211,160.

Another \$166,399 will be needed to replace 27 mobile radios installed in vehicles operated by the police and public works departments, 25 portable radios carried by personnel in those agencies, and the antenna at the police department. Calhoun said a grant is covering the fire department's radios.

"At this point, we want to see if you want to continue being part of the process," Calhoun told the council.

"And actually, we don't have a choice," city administrator Rich Guillen added.

"When you look at cost that's going to be borne by some of our sister cities, it's horrendous," councilman Gerard Rose commented before agreeing with the mayor and other council members the city should continue its role in NGEN.

The total estimated infrastructure cost is \$7.75 million to

\$12.02 million. With 1,128 radios in use, Monterey County's tab would be the largest and could reach \$4.8 million. The City of Salinas, with 510 radios, would pay up to \$2.2 million. On the Peninsula, Monterey's share, based on 188 radios, would be up to \$790,000. Pacific Grove — 130 radios — would pay as much as \$550,000. With 84 radios, Carmel Valley Fire Protection District's cost would reach \$350,000.

While two volunteer fire departments represented on the task force — Big Sur and Spreckels — were also facing very big bills, Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade Assistant Chief Martha Karstens said Monday the total was reduced following discussions at a recent task force meeting.

"I looked at that and went, 'Oh my gosh! That's more than our budget!'" she said. The agency's projected outlay of almost \$200,000 was based on 46 radios. But Karstens said the NGEN group decided volunteer agencies, which survive almost entirely on donations, should only be charged based on the number of radios in their vehicles.

"We only have 11 of those, so that substantially dropped the amount," she said.

She said the group also talked about options for financing, though Karstens believes Big Sur VFB will not have to borrow money to cover its share of the NGEN project and equipment replacement costs. Though the brigade receives some state tax dollars, it largely relies on three major fundraisers — the Big Sur International Marathon, the Big Sur River Run and a Halloween event — as well as donations from residents and community members.

"We get really good support down here," she said.

family,” Truskot noted. “Angel, his father and his two brothers played with the Monterey Symphony in the 1970s and early 1980s. Angel was born in Spain and is a close personal friend of our conductor, Max Bragado-Darman. Both Max and Angel knew the composer well. According to Max, ‘Angel owns the piece [by Rodrigo]. Nobody does it better.’”

Concluding the concert will be “Sinfonietta,” or “Little Symphony,” which was completed by French composer Francis Poulenc in 1948.

“It’s a four-movement tribute to the symphonies of Mozart,” added Truskot. “It’s written in a similar style, but on a smaller scale. It’s very melodic, very enjoyable and very clever. The audience is in for a treat.”

another wrote, “Wayne is active and energetic — always willing to help out wherever he is needed. His response is always positive, and it is a pleasure to work with him.”

A 37-year resident, Kelley served seven years on the city’s forest and beach commission and is an active volunteer with the Friends of Carmel Forest. He participated in the first docent class at Point Lobos State Reserve, going on to conduct tours and give school presentations for 27 years.

For the CRA, Kelley is a past board member and has participated in monthly cleanups at Carmel Beach for 16 years. “He designed and made most of the unique tools used by the volunteers to pick up trash and sift out the sand,” Anderson said.

Kelley and his wife, Phyllis, joined Carmel Fire Department’s Neighborhood Emergency Response Program to learn how to help other residents during disasters, when emergency services are stretched thin. He was a hospice volunteer for a decade and continues to visits homebound residents on behalf of his church.

As if that weren’t enough, he has also been an active member of the Big Sur Land Trust, the Cetacean Society and the Sierra Club, frequently walks on Carmel Beach with rat terrier Jasmine and does wood carving at the Carmel Foundation.

At the Carmel Woman’s Club — decorated to the hilt in green — some 140 people gathered for the 19th annual CRA Citizen of the Year award ceremony.

“The entire program was a love fest for the Irish,” Anderson reported. Patisserie Boissiere even donated a cake decorated green.

Irishman and Fifth District Monterey County Supervisor Dave Potter, who was master of ceremonies, listed clues to Kelley’s identity before asking Mary Condry, who is also Irish, for the green envelope.

“Potter even sang an Irish ditty, ‘Has Anyone Here Seen Kelly?’ before announcing Wayne’s name,” Anderson said.

Miller told The Pine Cone her husband, Monte, “happened to be standing up in the back of the room, and all of a sudden, he saw Wayne’s hands go up, one on each ear, like he didn’t believe it.”

After Kelley came forward, Mayor Sue McCloud presented him a certificate on behalf of the city council, and Potter proffered one from the supervisors. Congressman Sam Farr and Assemblyman John Laird also sent certificates.

When it was her turn, Miller handed Kelley the award and a small watercolor painting of Carmel Beach by CRA and Carmel Art Association member Frankie Laney, saying, “Please accept this gift as a small token of our admiration and appreciation for your many years of community service, not only in Carmel-by-the-Sea, but on the entire Monterey Peninsula.”

She concluded the ceremony with an appropriate toast: “May the lilt of Irish laughter lighten every load. May the mist of Irish magic shorten every road ... And may all your friends remember all the favors you are owed.”

Where the energy goes

WITH PETROLEUM prices well over \$100 per gallon, and gasoline approaching \$4 per gallon, a lot of people are trying to figure out how to reduce their driving. One Pine Cone employee has even managed to keep his gasoline consumption to about 10 gallons a month.

It's surprising how much less driving you can do without much inconvenience — by combining multiple errands into a single trip, for example. (Nationwide, for the first time since World War II, gasoline consumption has actually declined.)

Likewise, it's not that difficult to reduce consumption of electricity and natural gas at home — by switching to fluorescent bulbs, installing automatic thermostats and teaching the kids to turn off the lights when they leave a room.

So while Americans are becoming more energy wise in ways that are at their fingertips, a Cornell University professor has studied the hidden energy use that goes into producing our food. And his figures are shocking, to say the least.

According to Prof. David Pimental, we invest 10 calories of fossil fuel energy for every calorie of food we consume. Thus, one pound of hamburger is produced at the cost of a gallon-and-a-half of gasoline equivalents. And almost everything else for sale in local supermarkets comes at a similarly disproportionate energy expense.

The most ridiculous example of all is bottled water. Visit a deli on pretty much any street corner in New York and you'll see bottled water from Fiji for sale. Water is heavy — more than 8 pounds per gallon. Yet, the Fijians have found a way to make a profit by packing ships full of bottled water and sending them half way around the world. Bottled water contains zero calories and has zero benefits over tap water. Yet a great deal of energy is devoted to moving Fiji water, and many other brands, all over the place.

Similarly, the next time you are in a supermarket and see bell peppers from Israel or melons from Argentina for sale, you might ask yourself how much petroleum it took to bring them to your town.

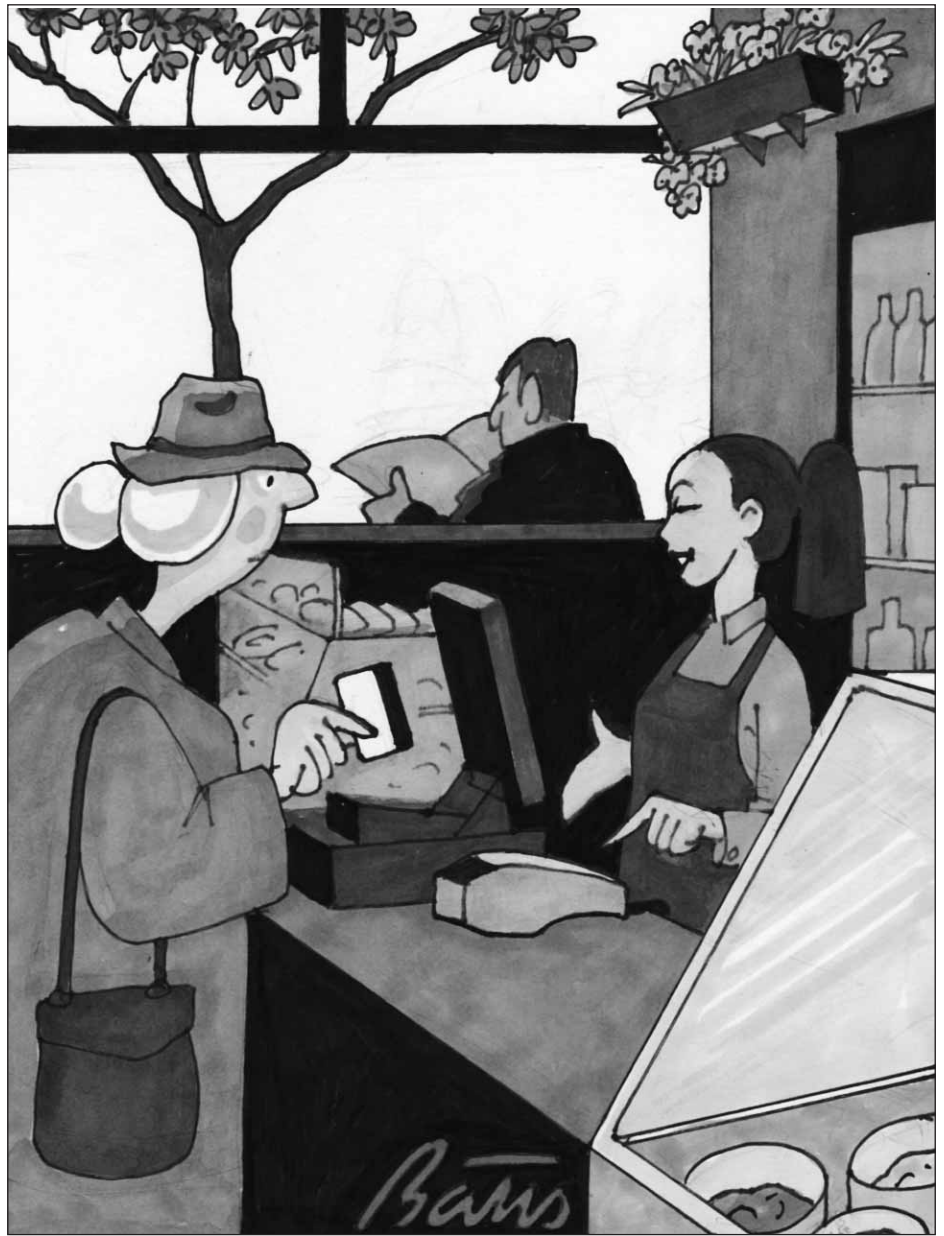
The strangest part of this equation is the fact that goods imported from great distances are sold for very low prices.

And what does that tell us? That the petroleum lavished on our food supply is produced at a very low cost. During the 20th century, oil was plentiful and cheap. Our entire culture — transportation, food, entertainment, etc., etc. — was built around this fact. The tremendous plenty in our country, where obesity is an epidemic among the poor, owes its existence to cheap oil.

But as Pimental also points out, the amount of petroleum on the planet is finite. And when it runs out, so will our food supply.

The answer to this dilemma is not to have everybody start farming their backyard. It is to develop new sources of energy — renewable, clean and inexpensive. Your next meal depends on it.

If ever someone attempts to select the 10 citizens who have done the most to create the international reputation Carmel enjoys, two of the names at or near the top will be: DENE DENNY and HAZEL WATROUS. Fast friends for many years, they came to Carmel almost by accident, but not without preparation. DENE had been an accomplished English teacher, a concert pianist, and a strong promoter of "modern music." HAZEL had been an art teacher, a designer, and an advocate of "modern art." In the late 20's they left their penthouse in San Francisco for a year's study in New York. Fortunately for us they went via Carmel and never left. Their partnership produced several results which live on today: (1) they restored the First Theater in Monterey, (2) they produced concerts and plays in the Golden Bough Theater; (3) they opened what later became the Studio Theater; (4) they started the Carmel Bach Festival which will begin its 50th season on July 13. It's curious that two ladies, so dedicated to modernism, should have adopted J. Sebastian as their patron saint. Anyway, it has grown from 3 days in 1935 to 3 weeks in 1987, and it is loved and respected everywhere."
