Bud Allen: Hotelier, publican, benefactor and a man who had a talent for generating grins

■ Asked Clint Eastwood to run for mayor

 $\operatorname{B}_{\operatorname{UD}\operatorname{ALLEN}}$ — a beloved Carmel philanthropist known for his humor, generosity and free spirit, and the man behind Clint Eastwood's decision to run for mayor in 1986 — died at home in Florida on Father's Day. He was 85.

"He was just a wonderful person," recalled Nielsen Bros. Market owner Merv Sutton, who knew Allen for some 50 years as a fellow businessman and Rotarian. "And he lived so high, I don't know how he lived as long as he did."

Sutton called Allen "the most generous philanthropist in the area." As one example, Sutton recalled Allen's decision to donate \$500,000 from the sale of a condo on Junipero Street to the Carmel Rotary Club. The gift was used to establish a scholarship fund that has since grown to about \$1 million and generates \$40,000 annually for scholarships and charities.

"Bud Allen lives on through every scholarship we give," Sutton

"When he saw a person who needed help, he never hesitated," one of his sons, realtor Tim Allen, wrote in an obituary for his father. And though he supported numerous charities, "he will be most remembered for the favors he did for his friends, like the truck he gave to a contractor, the housing he provided to a friend or an employee, a scholarship for a kid to go to school, or the time he gave a woman his hat after she commented that she liked it. Later, she told me that she was relieved that she didn't ask about his pants!"

Peninsula's water supply on the hot seat

SACRAMENTO — AN ATTORNEY for the State Water Resources Control Board accused California American Water Company Thursday of illegally diverting water from the Carmel River for years and doing little to find a replacement water project.

The attorney, Reed Sato, also accused Cal Am of trying to "bootstrap" a 13-year-old water cutback order into a permit to continue illegal pumping.

But during an all-day hearing at the California Environmental Protection Agency's headquarters near the state capitol to determine whether Cal Am should be ordered to drastically reduce pumping from the river, an attorney for the water company mounted a spirited defense, questioning why the SWRCB suddenly decided to crack down and maintaining the state agency had sent them letters for years telling them everything was OK.

The attorney, Jon Rubin, asked dozens of pointed questions of SWRCB employees, many of them referring to the agency's own documents, that seemed to establish that the SWRCB had acquiesced in Cal Am's pumping from the Carmel River as long as it did not pump more than 11,285 acre-feet a year.

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Log Cabin, Tudor house not important to city's history



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THE HISTORIC resources board removed two more homes from Carmel's list of buildings that can't be torn down or drastically altered. On Monday, the HRB decided a twostory log cabin once occupied by the city's first female mayor, and a two-story Tudor Revival-style home designed and built by George Whitcomb are not significant enough to warrant mandatory preservation.

Log cabin lacking

According to a May 2002 report by preservation consultant Kent Seavey, Peter Bartowick's cabin at Santa Rita and Fourth was designed and constructed for Eva DeSabla by noted Carmel builder M.J. Murphy in 1917.

DeSabla "is an enigma, as there is so little biographical information on her," Seavey wrote. He reported she successfully ran for city trustee in the charter election of 1916, when Carmel-by-the-Sea incorporated. She

The city's first female mayor lived in this 91-year-old log cabin, but it's dilapidated and has been changed too much to be considered historically significant.

was appointed mayor in April 1920 but resigned the post five months later. (The next woman to serve as mayor was Charlotte Townsend, who was elected in 1982.)

In addition to its association with DeSabla, the cabin is historically significant "as an unaltered example of early log

Water Flow - Water may be the most limited resource and the hottest political topic on the Monterey Peninsula, but it's hardly a new issue. The Peninsula has been getting most of its water supply from the Carmel River for 125 years, since the Pacific

Improvement Company built the first small dam in the early 1880s to get good water for its posh Hotel Del Monte. By 1920, the population had grown to about 10,000, more hotels had been built, sardine canneries were thriving and the Del Monte Property Company, which had purchased Pacific Improvement, built a larger dam on the river, the San Clemente Dam. The California American Water Co. bought that dam in 1930 and then, after the population tripled, built the Los Padres Dam upriver in 1949. That's the basic system, enhanced and tweaked ever since. Pebble Beach brush fire 'suspicious,' investigators say

AN AGGRESSIVE attack on a fire in Pebble Beach late Tuesday afternoon kept it confined to a quarter acre of

Dennis Carreiro.

After breaking out in the vicinity of Midwood Lane off a brush and trees, according to Cal Fire Battalion Chief fire road — just up the hill from The Lodge and some of Pebble

Beach's most expensive homes — the blaze was reported by someone who noticed the smoke from across the bay at Monastery Beach.

"That was the first report, so it took us a while to find out exactly where it was," Carreiro said.

Two air tankers and a helicopter immediately responded, dumping water and retardant gel on the fire until ground crews, numbering about 45 people from several agencies, could surround it.

Concerned residents of the neighborhood were notified of the fire by the Pebble Beach Fire Department's automatic telephone alert system. But no evacuations were necessary, and a subsequent message gave the all-clear.

Extinguishing the fire took about 30 minutes, followed by two hours of mopping up. Firefighters continued to monitor the area through the night and following day in case it flared again.

Carreiro said the lack of homes, cars or anything else near the site led fire officials to determine the blaze was suspicious. The cause is under investigation.



Homes on the Market

We are often given, in news reports, the number of homes currently on the market expressed in terms of months. For example, there may be "six months of homes on the market"



If there are six months of homes on the market, that means it would take six months to sell all the homes currently on the market, assuming the pace of sales remains exactly as it is and no more homes go up for sale. Six months' worth, it turns out, is a fairly standard number of homes on the market. Ten months' worth is an indication that there are too many sellers relative to buyers: It's a nearly foolproof sign that real estate is experiencing a "buyer's market," and the number of sales has declined sig-

It's important to remember, though, that announcements of how many homes are on the market-or "market inventory"are usually broad generalizations. Frequently, the number expresses how many homes are on the market across the entire nation, an interesting but generally unhelpful bit of data. What we want to know is how the market is faring in the precise area where we are either looking to buy or seeking to sell a property. There, the numbers help us gauge just how hot or chilly a market may be, guiding the way we market or buy a home. 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
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C.V. incorporation on agenda

WHILE THE drive to incorporate Carmel Valley has been bogged down by legal action, the agenda for the Monterey County Local Agency Commission's June 23 meeting hints the process could soon receive a jump start.

LAFCO commissioners are set to discuss the legalities of incorporation during a closed session. But Monday's agenda also offers commissioners the option of taking action on a variety of incorporation-related items, including:

- approving a "work program and schedule" between LAFCO and proponents;
- approving an agreement with a consulting firm, Economic & Planning Systems, for the purpose of updating the Comprehensive Fiscal Analysis, which opponents of incorporation have complained is out of date; and


■ approving a reimbursement schedule for payment by the Carmel Valley Forum.

It is unclear whether the reimbursement schedule pertains to past or future costs incurred by the Carmel Valley Forum, the group pushing the incorporation proposal.

The meeting comes six weeks after a Monterey County judge overturned a LAFCO decision that incorporation had to be examined in an environmental impact report before it could be submitted to voters.

"There are discussions under way between LAFCO and the attorneys for the Carmel Valley Forum," confirmed Kate McKenna, LAFCO executive officer. "The commission will discuss the status of those negotiations in the closed session and may consider taking action."

The county building in Salinas will host the meeting, which starts at 4 p.m.





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FRANCIS H. DAMGAARD

A long time resident of Carmel Valley, Francis (Frank) H. Damgaard passed away in the hospital on June 1, 2008 after a long battle with Alzheimer's disease. He was 83 years old.

Frank was born in Arcata, California on July 15, 1924. He attended Humboldt State before joining the Air Force during World War II and serving for three years in the Pacific. He completed his Master's Degree at UC Berkley, then completed his CPA Exam. Frank worked at an accounting firm in San Francisco for 8 years, moved to Stockton as the Controller of a department store and later became its general manager. When the store sold in the 1960's, Frank joined a large CPA firm in San Francisco, eventually finding his way to Carmel Valley. In 1971, he became the first controller of the Monterey Herald Newspaper. Retiring from the Herald in 1989, Frank found much pleasure in his daily bicycle rides and walks, transforming his hillside property into a lush garden, traveling to countries on botanical trips to see and study ferns and other plant life, learning Spanish, and spending time on woodworking and latch rug projects.

Frank was a volunteer at the UCSC Arboretum, and on many Christmas' eves joined a dear friend in delivering Christmas food and gifts to migrant farm families throughout the Salinas valley. Frank enjoyed volunteering his time and expertise of accounting and knowledge of plants with many organizations. He led members of local botanical groups on trips to parts of Northern California to see native species of ferns in their wild habitats.

Frank was married to the late Evelyn Vawter Damgaard for 46 years. He is survived by his brother, Gene Damagaard of Blue Lake, CA., Beryl Damgaard Nielsen of Loleta, CA. He is also survived by his nieces and nephews, Linda Nielsen Wuelfing of Auburn, CA., Dale Nielsen of Eureka, CA., Lois Nielsen Jeffries of Benecia, CA., Alice Ritchie Sawaya of Anaheim Hills, CA., Lance Richey of Artesia, CA., Brent Richey of Discovery Bay, CA., Judy Richey Carroll of Moreno Valley, CA.

His family and friends will remember Frank as a true gentlemen with his many bowties, his passion for gardening, a green thumb, his compassionate nature, big smile, and a kind and gentle manner.

Mildred Laura Corson Holmes Vuocolo



Chevron's gone, but the gas and tow trucks remain

THE STATION at Junipero and Fourth everyone knows as Carmel Chevron is no longer a Chevron, but that doesn't mean owner Andy Hill won't be selling gas. Rather, he and his longtime fuel supplier have amicably parted ways so he can purchase from a local company in a manner that makes more sense for a small, independent business.

But that deal's not yet inked, leaving him to temporarily carry only diesel, which also powers the towing business that provides two-thirds of Hill's income. No changes are planned for the towing company or the car repair business at the station, Carmel Garage.

Hill said the decision to terminate his contract with Chevron made the most economic sense. According to a long-standing agreement, he had to purchase 9,000 gallons of fuel every 12 days. Skyrocketing oil prices have pushed that payout from roughly \$20,000 to almost double that, and Hill always had to pay the bill in advance.

Turning around and selling it to drivers, he earned 20 cents per gallon, but that total return of \$1,800 per delivery about \$4,500 per month wasn't enough, especially





on top of utilities, maintenance and staff.

"I don't know any businessman who would take that return," he said.

Hill said his relationship with the petroleum company has always been friendly, but the Chevron sign and logos were removed from the station last Thursday morning. It

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

Down the coast, restaurant offers free gas to lure customers

WITH THE gas crunch in full swing, the Big Sur River Inn is willing to put some fuel in your tank in exchange for your business

"If you spend a minimum of \$35 in the restaurant, we'll give you a \$10 Valero gas card," offered general manager Janet Lesniak.

Located on Highway 1 about 24 miles south of Carmel, the River Inn recently placed an advertisement announcing the offer in The Pine Cone. So far, Lesniak is encouraged by the results.

'We've had a great response," she said.



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Curiously, Lesniak has noticed that the customers taking advantage of the offer are actually spending more at the restaurant than they typically would.

"It's an interesting psychological thing," she observed. "It's like they're saying, 'I don't have to pay for gas, so I'll buy another bottle of wine.'

Despite fears that high gas prices could reduce visitation to Big Sur, motorists continue to pour down Highway 1.

"I keep waiting to see a drop in visitors,

but it hasn't come," Lesniak said. "We've actually had a small increase in business this

While Big Sur's geographically isolated business community would seem likely to be adversely affected by rising gas prices, the opposite could actually be true. It is possible Bay Area motorists are shunning trips to more distant locations and actually turning to Big Sur as an inexpensive vacation destination.

"People are not getting on airplanes as

often," Lesniak noted. "Most of our guests are coming from the Monterey Peninsula, the Bay Area and Sacramento."

While even the southernmost tip of Big Sur is just 90 miles from Carmel, it seems a world away — a real bonus for a traveler looking for a change of scenery.

"It's a relatively easy destination to reach," Lesniak said of Big Sur. "You can get away without breaking the bank."

will be another few weeks before the company's legal department finalizes the paperwork ending their relationship.

In the meantime, he's selling diesel, towing vehicles and negotiating with a local fuel supplier who will provide as much gas as Hill wants when he wants it.

"If I have a car-show weekend, I'm going to buy a substantial amount," he said. "If it's a dog-show weekend at the middle school, I don't need to sit on 4,000 gallons of gas on

After a quarter century in town, Hill knows the business well enough to predict such ebb and flow. Raised in Carmel Valley, Hill attended Carmel High and pumped gas part-time for the Carmel Mobil station located at San Carlos and Seventh, where Thinker Toys is now.

There, he got into the towing business by accident — literally. His sister was dating a driver who had suffered a knee injury, and Hill was pressed into taking a truck to a three-car wreck on Highway 1 near Lucia.

"They said. 'You're going to drive the truck to the scene, we're going to hook the wrecked car up for you, and you're going to tow it back to the yard." he said. "That was the beginning."

Hill began working whenever he could, earning close to \$400 weekly.

"It was a huge amount of money for a teenager. I had a new truck at 17 years old," he said. "But it cost me a lot socially, because I worked. I didn't get to do all that fun high-school stuff."

The station moved to Junipero and Fourth, across from the police station, in late 1986 or early 1987. George Giem owns the

land and the buildings, and Hill, who is CEO of the Carmel Garage and Towing corporation, rents from him. The garage operator, in turn, rents from Hill.

With so many years under his belt, he's confident his disassociation with Chevron will not negatively impact the business.

"I think my name in this city is as good as Chevron's. It could be called Jack's Gas in a Can, but as long as I'm on this corner, I'm going to sell the stuff," he said. "You don't stay in business in this city for 25 years by ripping people off and having a poor business attitude.'

He also knows the product he sells is only going to get more expensive.

"In my personal opinion, it will be some time before we figure this out — and that's we,' as in, our government, other governments and OPEC," he said. "This is a poker game, and the ante has become quite expen-

His last order from Chevron gave him a distinct, albeit short-term, advantage in the game. He bought 7,000 gallons of diesel, which should fuel his tow trucks for another month-and-a-half at a rate 35 cents to 40 cents lower than what his competitors are paying at the pump.

He also believes his new fuel supplier will offer prices that will allow him to continue earning a living selling gas to locals and tourists.

"You don't know how much it will cost until you buy it - and tomorrow's going to be different than yesterday," he said. "But I'm under the impression I will be very com-


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

camp at San Lorenzo Regional Park in King City. Unfortunately, the Franciscan Workers were unable to find a bus company this year that could offer a discounted or afford-

Thankfully, LTD SUV Limo Network of Hollister came to the rescue. The company offered up two of its Hummer limos and agreed to underwrite much of the cost. Several private donors made up the difference, and so, for perhaps the first time in the history of humanity, the words "Hummer" and "cheap transportation" can be used in the same sentence.

"It was the cheapest way to get 50 kids to camp," explained Jill Randolph, development director for the Salinas-based nonprofit.

Twenty-six kids piled into one limo, while only 24 could ride in the other, where a flat-screen television took up two of

The idea of a nonprofit group using a luxury vehicle that gets 10 miles a gallon to transport disadvantaged youth might seem shocking, but it is nothing compared with the looks on the kids' faces when the limos showed up at the Jimenez and Camphora farm labor camps near Soledad. "They just screamed," Randolph reported.

The limo drivers had a blast as well.

"The drivers had such a great time," Randolph said. "They were really excited to give the kids an opportunity to ride in a limo. They couldn't wait to see the expressions on the kids' faces."

According to Randolph, the limo shuttle turned out to be a huge success.

"We wanted to do something for the kids," she added. "Socially and economically, they're hemmed into a lifestyle where they're expected to work in the fields and not go to school. The whole idea was to make them feel special and worthy enough to explore the other options they have in life."

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For HomeShare seniors, mi casa es su casa

IT'S AN arrangement that can make everyone happy: Older people living alone get some company and help from a younger adult, who in turn receives a place to live rent free.

The premise of the Alliance on Aging's HomeShare program is simple and effective, but Babs du Pont Hanneman, who helps make the matches, said potential helpers outnumber those looking for company. She hopes more will open their homes and realize what the HomeShare program can offer them.

"Many people are looking into HomeShare as an afford-

able housing option, but I do not have enough homes/seniors to refer them to," she said. "I am speaking about interesting, educated, worthy and wonderful 'young' seniors [in their 50s and 60s] for whom rents on the Peninsula are becoming more and more of a luxury."

But it's not just about low-cost living.

"It's about people helping each other," she said. "It's about an older adult who finds the house is sort of empty, and that, 'It's no fun living by myself or going out by myself, so I can help another person by giving them a room and a bathroom, and in exchange, I get a home-cooked meal, some company and some safety.

The program enables people to remain in their homes and maintain their independence.

"People feel more comfortable in their houses in their 80s and 90s if they know someone's going to come home at night," Hanneman said.

The setup works well for 84-year-old Pebble Beach resident Maudene Kroh, who has lived there for three decades.

Her husband died 11 years ago, and she's since "had trouble getting around," and uses a wheelchair.

A couple of years ago, she called HomeShare. Kroh's first roommate stayed for a while. After she left, Joanne Parker moved in eight months ago.

"She came out here from Michigan to be with her son, who is at DLI," Kroh said. When Parker's son and his wife had a baby, she was without a place to stay.

"I have an extra bedroom, and it just worked out fine," Kroh said.

In exchange for her room and board in Pebble Beach, Parker cooks the evening meals, does the shopping (they split the grocery bill), cares for the yard and "thinks of things before I do," Kroh said. "She could be my daughter."

They are also very compatible, Kroh has discovered.

Parker knits, crochets and makes quilts.

"We sit in the evening and watch television," she said. "We find we like the same

books." Hanneman said such relationships are a hallmark of HomeShare, and she prides herself on her ability to put

people together who will connect. She's been running HomeShare for five years and has more than 30 pairs in the program, including six in Carmel. "I make it my business to

really try to know the people, because for all involved, it's a big deal to think about sharing a house, whether you're moving in or opening your home," she said.

Some potential housemates fear "some big controlling person is going to move in, and that the older people would lose their independence," but Hanneman promised that is not the case. You're not giving up your independence, you're gaining some, because your kids will probably get off your back. And most of the time, it turns into a wonderful relationship.'

The AOA puts the potential housemates through a background check, including Live Scan fingerprinting to check for a criminal record. They must provide references and have lived in California for at least a year.

She also wondered if people are reluctant to participate because the program is free, so perhaps they perceive its value or quality as being low.

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
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New chaparral designation stirs up Big Sur property owners

WHILE MOST Big Sur property owners have little idea what constitutes "maritime chaparral," at least they're not alone.

The topic of what maritime chaparral is - and how it could affect local builders or anyone seeking to clear brush for safe fire clearance — will be raised Friday, June 20, at the Big Sur Multi-Agency Advisory Council meeting.

California Coastal Commission planner Katie Morange, whose agency has determined that maritime chaparral qualifies as an environmentally sensitive habitat (ESHA), said the precise definition of the plant community "is still emerging."

"It's a new thing for us, and we're looking at it on a case by case basis," Morange said. "The definition is still being refined."

The issue of maritime chaparral as ESHA was raised when coastal commissioners appealed a decision by the Monterey County Planning Department in 2006 allowing Stephen Foster to construct a new home on the former Rocky Creek ranch, which sits atop a ridge between Palo Colorado and Rocky creeks. The coastal commission eventually let Foster build, but declared some parts of his lot to be maritime chaparral

"He got to build, but the coastal commission got the precedent they were after," said Mark Blum, a Monterey attorney who repre-

Perhaps even more disconcerting to Big Sur residents is the notion that the thick, dry brush surrounding their homes is an obvious fire threat, but they may not be allowed to

"We don't have a problem if homeowners clear dead brush," said Morange. But live brush might be protected.

Big Sur Fire Chief Frank Pinney said live vegetation also represents a significant fire threat.

"We treat live and dead vegetation equally as fuel," Pinney said. "Live chaparral is loaded with volatile oils. It's designed to

And Pinney said state law requires that homeowners "living in a wildland interface" are required by state law to maintain 100 feet of clearance between their homes and a fire

Some residents are worried that all maritime chaparral will eventually be deemed ESHA. Morange, though, insisted the targeted plant community has a much smaller range than many people assume and requires the presence of certain plants, particularly local variations of manzanita and ceanothus.


Big Sur residents have also accused the coastal commission of creating the designation specifically to limit new construction in coastal areas. One local even suggested the agency is relying on the advice of paid consultants when it should be listening to inde-

Theodore "Ted" Thompson Fehring

April 8, 1914 ~ June 9, 2008



CARMEL - Theodore "Ted" Thompson Fehring, beloved father, grandfather, great-grandfather, uncle, friend and long-time resident, died after a sudden decline. Just as he hoped, he died peacefully in the home he built, in his favorite chair, with loving family by his side. He was 94.

Born in Columbus, Indiana, he ventured to California as a 16-year old, on an epic road trip with two friends. He graduated from Purdue (B.A., M.A. Education) with eight letters in football

and basketball, and began an eight-year stint as teacher and football coach at Wiley High School in Terre Haute, Indiana, in 1937. He met the love of his life, Marie Grote, on the Catalina Island ferry, and they married June 29, 1938. In 1945, they moved with their first three girls, Janet, Jeannie and Joy, to Carmel, where Ted was a teacher and coach at Carmel High School, winning Carmel's first basketball championship that year. Two more girls, Julie and JoAnn followed, and Ted built their home at the corner of Torres and Second in 1952.

After leaving Carmel High, Ted worked as an escrow officer, then became a loan officer and eventually Vice President and Main Branch Manager at Monterey Savings. After retiring in 1977, he became a member of its Board of Directors. He then co-founded Cypress Mortgage. He maintained a lifelong interest in sports, and from 1945 to 1965 worked as a PAC-8 football official, refereeing hundreds of games, including Rose Bowls, East-West Shrine games and the Sun Bowl.

Ted gave energy and time to his community in many ways. He served as a member of the Carmel School Board, Sunset Commission, Carmel Cultural & Planning Commission, was Foreman of the Monterey County Grand Jury, and was active in the Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce and the Carmel Business Association. He enjoyed more than 60 years of perfect attendance with Carmel Host Lions Club, attending his last meeting the week before he died. He and Marie were founding members of Community Church of the Monterey Peninsula and the 20/40 Club. He was an honored Pillar of the Carmel Foundation.

A strong and incredibly generous family man, Ted leaves a legacy of love and memorable times. He created the Fehring-Wawona Fund, ensuring an annual gathering in Yosemite National Park, where his expanding family enjoyed many reunions, golfing, swimming and sharing "choosies." He was a sentimental and funny guy. Ted often got emotional about his love for family and friends, and he especially enjoyed setting up elaborate games or contests that all could play. He and Marie loved to travel too. They explored six continents and the seven seas, by cruise ship, car and tour bus.

He is survived by his five daughters and their husbands: Janet and Peter Schober, Jeannie and Merrill Hall, Joy and Gordon Roberts, Julie and Jeff Almquist and JoAnn and Mark Holbrook; 13 grandchildren and their spouses; 11 great-grandchildren, and many nieces and nephews. He also leaves his Alliance on Aging home-shared friend, Sara Shappee, whose cooking and companionship helped make these last four years wonderful for him. He was preceded in death by his parents, Lynn and Ivy Fehring; his brothers, Raymond and Paul "Dutch" Fehring, and their wives, Rose and Edna; his sister-in-law, Eachren Fuller; and his beautiful wife of 64 years, Marie.

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

Hanneman hopes to dispel those perceptions.

"If you are a person who likes to help out and do for others, then HomeShare is a perfect situation," she said. "Your financial obligations are not as high, because you don't have to give that huge chunk up for rent every month."

And for the older resident, a younger senior living onsite means company, help around the house, fresh food and other essentials.

"I just think it's perfect," echoed Kroh. "The program is the best thing that can happen, because this way, I can stay in my home and enjoy my own things and yet be fairly independent.'

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GILBERT GEORIS

July 4, 1932 - May 30, 2008 CARMEL, CA



Born in the Belgian Ardennes on July 4, 1932, Gilbert was the oldest son and second born in a family of five. As a child he lived through the difficult years of WWII and survived the Battle of the Bulge in the winter of 1944-45. Music was a large part of Gilbert's life, he played the trumpet, drums, and accordion in bands throughout the Belgian countryside.

Gilbert married Marie-Louise Bodson in 1956. In 1966 they moved with their three children to San Clemente, CA. For the next 25 years Gilbert, a self-made man, an entre-

preneur to the core, built a variety of businesses in the hospitality industry. He owned a motel, coffee shop, catering business, bar, and renovated several businesses until he retired at age 55. His wife suffered a debilitating illness in 1974, and Gilbert became mom and dad to his 3 young children. He was widowed in 1987.

With an empty nest, and a new love at his side, Gilbert and Connie moved to Carmel in 1991. They immediately became members of the Carmel Mission, Moose Lodge, Carmel Foundation, and the American Legion. They were a familiar face on many peninsula dance floors and active participants in local area music festivals. He often played the accordion at local German and Swiss restaurants.

Memorial celebrates the life of 'Fantastic Felines' creator



SHE SUFFERED throughout her life from a painful bone disease, yet her artwork brought color and joy to countless

The Crossroads Shopping Village will host a memorial Saturday, June 21, for noted local artist and designer Laurel Burch, who passed away last fall at 61.

"She was like a shining star," remembered Cheryl Harris, a longtime friend whose Crossroads boutique, Exotica, has featured her work for 17 years. "She touched so many people."

Burch's unlikely success story began more than four decades ago when, as a 20year-old single mother of two young chil-



dren, she began turning metal found in junkyards into jewelry. Living in Haight-Asbury during the late 1960s — the epicenter of the hippie

- she sold her wares from a movement tackle box along the sidewalks of the city.

From such humble beginnings, Burch rose to become a gifted artist, an acclaimed designer and a successful businesswoman. Her vivid imagination conjured up eyecatching images of "fantastic felines," mythical animals and colorful blossoms, which she incorporated into jewelry, artwork, T-shirts, scarves, ceramics, tote bags and other creations.

But Burch was afflicted her entire life with osteoporosis, a painful bone disease. She suffered more than 100 bone fractures as a result.

Burch's husband, Rick Sara, as well as her two children, Jay and Aarin Burch, are planning to attend the event at the

Sunset unveils lineup, cuts prices

SUNSET CENTER announced its 2008/2009 season at a launch party Wednesday evening. The event, which began with a well attended, catered reception in the lobby and then moved into the theater, also served as the nonprofit's annual meeting, during which financial figures and goals for next year were shared.

Peter Lesnik, the center's new executive director, unveiled a lineup that features series of performances broken into categories: Broadway, Dance, International, Legends, Family and Children. "And the ticket prices are considerably lower, so we can broaden our reach," Lesnik said.

Patrons can take advantage of lower tick-

et prices and preferential seating if they subscribe to a series rather than seeking admission to individual shows. They can also custom create their subscriptions if they don't want to see all the shows in one category.

After his exuberant summary of the upcoming season and his offer to receive suggestions by email (plesnik@sunsetcenter.org), Lesnik yielded the stage to Sunset Cultural Center Inc. board chairman Jim Price and the other trustees.

Board member Dave Parker, the group's treasurer, summarized the center's revenues and expenses, and said the center hopes to raise more than \$150,000 in grants and donations in 2009, compared with \$10,000 this year. The goal is to turn a small profit even as the amount city taxpayers subsidize the center — \$750,000 this year, and \$713,000 next year — continues to drop.

"Buy tickets!" Lesnik said as the event drew to a close, and attendees were invited to take backstage tours led by Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud.







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Chef Martinez, once a math teacher, chalks up 20 years in Carmel

WHEN HE was teaching math in an elementary school in Oaxaca, Mexico, it never occurred to Tomas Martinez he would some day be an executive chef in a chic Carmel-by-the-Sea restaurant.

But fate stepped in, and after eight years of instructing his young charges in the mysteries of math, Martinez and his wife, Maria, came to live on the Monterey Peninsula in Seaside 20 years ago.

Because he liked to cook as a youngster, beginning at the age of 10, he learned the basics in his mother's kitchen. And he learned about fresh produce on his grandfather's farm where he worked after school all of which served him in good stead later in the United States.

Arriving here without California teaching credentials, it was only natural that he sought work in a restaurant. His first job was at the Italian Restaurant, La Dolce Vita, where

then-proprietor, the late Domenico Vastarella, schooled him in the art of Italian cooking.

June 20, 2008

From there he gravitated to Nico Restaurant, just up San Carlos from La Dolce Vita. There he learned more about Mediterranean cuisine, so by the time he joined Firok Shield's da Giovanni Ristorante Mediterraneo, he was a full-fledged cook.

Shield liked Martinez' cooking and work ethic so much, he made him executive chef at a second restaurant he opened three years ago on San Carlos across from the Hog's Breath Inn: Carmel's Bistro Giovanni.

'Tomas is always happy," Shield said of Martinez, and the atmosphere in the kitchen is always upbeat because of this admirable trait. But Martinez attributed his sunny disposition to Shield: "My boss is the best," he

This symbiotic relationship is an important ingredient in the cuisine at Carmel's Bistro Giovanni. Together, the two men roast

Mediterranean spices and blend them, as exemplified in Pasta Mama Mia. Martinez described the dish as housemade rigatoni combined with ground filet mignon meatballs marinated in 12 Southern Mediterranean spices they "Sardegnia."

And Chef Martinez waxed lyrical when he described his preparation of Bistro Giovanni Ribs. "I marinate the beef short ribs the day before I roast them. My marinade is beer, ginger, garlic and honey; then the next day I slow roast the short ribs for seven hours." He said it's one of the best sellers at the bistro.

But he likes to cook fish best of all. He singled out Pasta Pescatore over linguine as his favorite to prepare, and no wonder: It incorporates clams, mussels, prawns, scallops, salmon and halibut in white wine, garlic, parsley, olive oil and fresh tomatoes.

A diner coming to Bistro Giovanni for the first time could try this combination, suggested Martinez:

"First, as an appetizer, order the Fritto Misto," he said. It has Monterey Bay calamari, prawns, baby artichoke hearts and zucchini seasoned and fried. We serve it with a lemon caper sauce.

"Then our Giovanni Insalatina Greca which is chopped romaine lettuce with cucumbers, red onions, Feta cheese and chopped dates. We toss that with a Mediterranean dressing."


But that's not all. Martinez suggested following these two courses with Osso Bucco, Italian style, if not the traditional Milanese. "We braise a veal shank baked with sweet anise, carrots, onions, celery and tomatoes. Then we serve it over pasta couscous," he

THE FLAVORS of Tuscany, the spices of Chile and Brazil, the creativity of Caribbean cuisine, and the delights of homegrown food and wine can be had on a whim this summer, and without the costs of traveling out of town.

■ Under the Tuscan Moon

At Pèppoli at the Inn at Spanish Bay this Friday, June 20, visiting guest chef Donna Scala of Napa's Bistro Don Giovanni will work up a feast alongside Chef de Cuisine Arturo Moscoso as part of the restaurant's Under the Tuscan Moon Dinner Series.

The chefs will each create a pair of original dishes for the four-course prix fixe dinner, and servers will help diners choose the perfect Antinori wine to complement each course. Open seating will be available between 6 and 10 p.m. Friday, "and the chefs will be in the dining room all evening, sharing their passion for Italian food and wine," according to restaurateur Rich Pèpe. The dinner costs \$75 per person, plus tax and tip. For reservations and information, call (831) 647-7433.

Pèpe, who also owns Little Napoli in Carmel-by-the-Sea, jars his own pasta sauce and makes wine, announced the release of two new vintages: the 2007 Pèpe

Chardonnay and the 2006 Pèpe "Vesuvio" red blend.

His winery produced 225 cases of the Chardonnay, which sells for \$21 a bottle and was aged in a combination of refined French and assertive American oak barrels. Pèpe described the Chardonnay as "rich and slightly creamy," with aromas of pear and apricot, a bit of vanilla and the proper acidity to make it "lively, clean and refreshing," as well as food friendly.

The 2006 Vesuvio, which sells for \$30 and combines Bordeaux and Rhone varietals, is half Cabernet Sauvignon, equal amounts Syrah and Merlot, and a small percentage of Petit Verdot. The winery produced 530 cases of the fruit-forward, medium- to full-bodied wine, which was aged in French and American oak for 15 months and lingers on the palate, according to Pèpe. Chef Martinez has a loyal staff in the kitchen: Fernando Aguillera is the sous chef, and three line cooks and a garde manger cook help him turn out lunch and dinner.

The restaurant seats 78 indoors, and 20 outside in the dog-friendly patio, which locals have come to refer to as Bistro Giovanni courtyard.

When it was time to take the chef's photo, he said he'd like to have the wall mural in the background. The original painting, done by Artur Vasilevich, depicts a European passageway thronging with elegantly attired sophisticates dining al fresco, and others standing about holding wine glasses. It covers the entire northern wall of the restaurant. Shield is painted in, standing in the shadows to the far right.

A culinary career that began 20 years ago in Carmel is going well for Martinez. On his days off, he likes to run to keep fit, and he's a baseball spectator. His youngest son Hector, now 20, is a business major at Monterey Peninsula College. His other four offspring are all in business in Mexico.

house construction in Carmel by master builder Michael J. Murphy," according to Seavey.

June 20, 2008

But attorney Sheri Damon, representing Bartowick, said consultant Sheila McElroy concluded the 91-year-old building can not be considered historic.

She said the city lacks documentation of the cabin's builder and original design, it probably wasn't DeSabla's primary residence, and there is no evidence Murphy handled it.

She also said the house has undergone multiple changes, including a second story addition, removal of a crow's nest, an addition to the west, removal of one chimney and replacement of another, and loss of the front porch.

The city's planning and building services manager, Sean Conroy, noted that Seavey hadn't been able to walk on the property when he conducted his survey, and he agreed Seavey was not correct when he concluded the house was unaltered.

But there is no reason to believe it was not DeSabla's home, and no other buildings on the city's inventory are associated with her, Seavey pointed out.

Nonetheless, he recommended the board grant Bartowick's appeal and remove the cabin from the inventory, which contains 42 buildings designed by Murphy, and 36 other homes built before 1917, including three log cabins.


"It's a charming building to put on the historic inventory; however, because the data are so loose, it would be hard to accept it," commented board member Erling Lagerholm.

"It's unfortunate we have to lose this, because there are not a lot of buildings that date back to 1917, and it would mark her presence in town as the first woman mayor," added board member Julie Wendt. "But I think it does have a lot of integrity issues, and that's a shame."

Chairman Erik Dyar said the cabin would probably still be recognizable to people who lived in town when it was built, but he agreed it has undergone too many changes in the intervening years. "The dilapidation of the residence is pretty severe," he added. "It would be very difficult to restore that in any practical way."

The board unanimously voted to grant Bartowick's appeal.

Too late for Tudor

Bill Karges' two-story Tudor-style house at Camino Real and Seventh was designed and built 68 years ago by George Whitcomb, "one of Carmel-by-the-Sea's premier builders of the 1930s and 1940s," preservation consultant Richard Janick wrote in his December 2001 review of the home. "Mr. Whitcomb prided himself on being a 'precise mechanic' when it came to building techniques."

Because Whitcomb built the stucco and faux timber house, which remains intact, Janick said it should be preserved.

But McElroy said Janick identified Whitcomb as an architect when he wasn't, and she concluded the home is not an excellent example of the Tudor Revival style and can not be considered one of Whitcomb's more significant creations.

Karges "argues that the residence is not a good representative example of the style, as it lacks many of the character-defining features of a Tudor-Revival structure and also is a late example of the style," Conroy wrote in his June 16 report for the board. In addition, though Whitcomb was an important builder, he was not a "master" on par with Murphy or Hugh Comstock.

Conroy recommended the board remove the house from

the list, which contains 47 other Tudor Revival buildings, most built earlier than Karges'. "There are also several earlier examples of Whitcomb's work on the inventory that are more definitely Tudor Revival," he wrote.

Wendt said she was torn, given the home's attractiveness, but she ultimately agreed. "For architectural style, I like buildings constructed in the earlier stages rather than the waning years, and by 1940, Tudor was pretty much over with," she said.

"It's a very nice house, but it doesn't really rise to the higher standard that would qualify it for the inventory," commented Dyar.

Only Lagerholm said it should be protected, as it is "a very attractive home in a very attractive setting," and reflects the Tudor style. The board voted 4-1 to grant Karges' appeal.

The tally

Of the 104 historic designation appeals filed, the city has granted 53, including 10 that were denied by the historic resources board but overturned by the Carmel City Council. Nine others were denied, and 27 appeals have been withdrawn. The remainder are pending.



In 1995, the SWRCB determined Cal Am did not have valid permits for most of the water it was supplying to its customers in the Monterey Peninsula. Although the 1995 order purported to eliminate about 70 percent of the Peninsula's water supply, the state water board delayed enforcement, giving Cal Am the opportunity to develop an alternative water

So when a "cease and desist" order was proposed in January, it caught Cal Am officials by surprise. SWRCB representatives have not said why the water agency issued the

LBAM spraying cancelled over cities

OFFICIALS WITH the California Department of Food and Agriculture announced Thursday the pheromone used to discourage the invasive light brown apple moth from mating will no longer be sprayed over urban areas.

Instead, planes will spray the pheromone over agricultural and undeveloped areas only, and spraying will not begin in those areas until an environmental impact report is finished next year.

Last fall, most of the Monterey Peninsula was sprayed by a low-flying aircraft with the pheromone, leading to protests from residents, some of whom said they became ill.

order when it did, only that it was prompted by Cal Am's violation of the 1995 order.

Representatives from the Sierra Club and the Carmel River Steelhead Association, both of which oppose Cal Am's overpumping of the river, also testified at the hearing, which drew about 50 people.

Without a new water supply for the Monterey Peninsula, the cease and desist order, if finalized, would mean drastic water conservation measures for Peninsula residents.

And Cal Am's community relations manager, Catherine Bowie, said even a 15 percent reduction in pumping of the Carmel River might be a hardship.

"What's at issue at this hearing is the right of our customers to have an adequate water supply for their families, their jobs and their lifestyles," Bowie said during a break in the hearing.

Cal Am for years has been working on developing the Coastal Water Project, which would provide a drought-free water supply to the Monterey Peninsula.

But the project has met tough resistance from environmentalists who oppose the use of open ocean intakes, which kill marine organisms.

The SWRCB board is expected to announce at a later date whether the cease and desist order will be imposed.

Hospitality his forte

Howard E. "Bud" Allen grew up in the Midwest and worked as a salesman for the Armstrong Cork Company before meeting his wife, Char, and moving to the Monterey Peninsula in the late 1950s. In a stable they converted into "a wonderful, warm, Mediterranean home," the couple raised four children: Tim, Tom, Patrice and Laura.

He entered the hotel/restaurant trade as manager at the Mark Thomas Inn (now the Hyatt Regency Monterey), and later bought and renovated La Playa Hotel in downtown

Longtime friend Russ Harris recalled a few distinctly Allen offerings there, such as World War II-era dinner prices and very brief drink specials.

"At 10 minutes to 5 p.m., you could get a cocktail for 10 cents, but you had to have a dime," Harris said. A quarter could not buy a 10-cent drink during those 10 minutes, and once the clock chimed 5, the deal was off.

The hotel also had a cigarette machine, but Allen detested the habit, so he charged \$2 per pack when the going rate was 50 cents, according to Sutton. Harris said he donated the proceeds to cancer research.

Allen went on to open and run a handful of downtown establishments, including It's Bud's Pub on Dolores Street, where Jack London's is now.

"He was a man of many, many talents, and when he walked into a room, it was like turning on the lights," said Cannery Row Co. CEO Ted Balestreri, who knew Allen via the hospitality business. "He was the most colorful person you'd ever want to meet, and he'd think nothing of jumping up on a bar to get everyone's attention."

Allen also bought and sold houses, and became involved in numerous events, causes and foundations. He was past president of the California Hotel and Motel Association and Commodore of the Stillwater Yacht Club, and started the Hookers and Hustlers Ball and the 39 Craftsman show. He also helped found the California Wine Festival.

He was also the man Eastwood credits with launching his political career. "We were sitting around talking one day about the way things were going at city hall, and who we could get to run for mayor," Eastwood told The Pine Cone. "And Bud said, 'Clint, why don't you do it?' And I did."

Sutton remembered the day Allen became president of Carmel Rotary. "His very first meeting, we had everyone meet at Bud's Pub, but we didn't tell him about it," Sutton said. "He went to La Playa [where the club usually met], and there wasn't a soul there.'

Elinor Laiolo described Allen as "a free spirit" and said even his style of dress conveyed his attitude. "He could show up in the most elegant setting in plaid pants that didn't match the plaid jacket he wore, and a tie that didn't match anything, or maybe no tie at all," she said.

Tim Allen said his dad "could do anything," whether it was singing, dancing, throwing a party "like nobody's business," or traveling to exotic places.

Among his favorite sayings was, "Smile and the world smiles with you; frown, and you frown alone."

He lived up to that responsibility and had an infectious grin, according to Balestreri.

"He liked to play a joke on you, constantly," he said. "And you were always excited to see Bud, because you knew he would always put a smile on your face."

"Carmel needs more Bud Allens," said businessman Denny LeVett. "I really loved that guy."

When Harris owned the men's clothing store in the Barnyard that is now Khaki's, Allen would secretly stuff bar napkins in the coat pockets. When trying them on, shoppers would discover them and believe someone had worn the coat out for a night on the town.

"He'd go to St. Vincent de Paul, and they'd have a polyester Seaside High School sweater that he'd buy for \$2, and he'd stuff it in with my \$190 cashmeres," Harris recalled.

Sunset years

More than a dozen years ago, Allen moved to Florida and bought a villa. "He belonged to this country club a mile away, and a mile away in the other direction was his favorite bar," Sutton said. "He called it The Bermuda Triangle."

Tim Allen reported he and his siblings received a card from their father a couple of months ago that contained another of his favorite mottos: "Life should not be a journey to the grave with the intention of arriving safely in an attractive and well preserved body, but rather to skid in sideways, chocolate in one hand, martini in the other, body thoroughly used up, totally worn out and screaming 'WOO HOO what a

He concluded his memorial of his father by saying, "We love you, Pa, and thanks for the ride!"

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

because they are already familiar with the quirks of the library's weathered outdoor table, which has been a big hit with visitors since the library opened nearly two decades ago.


"It's not a state-of-the-art location," Toren explained. "The table is not even on level ground. It's kind of like the Big Sur softball field."


The library also calls its annual literary journal, "Ping-Pong."


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Editorial

We just don't get it

A LOT of inscrutable decisions come from government agencies. But the planning commission's ruling last week that the Carmel Red Cross building would be degraded by the replacement of its cheap, mobile-home-type aluminum windows with vinyl clads really left us scratching our heads.

According to the city's planning staff and several commissioners, the architecture of the Red Cross building requires aluminum windows. But when we stood across the street and looked at the building, our only thought was, "Huh?" The building is not distinctive at all, and has no particular architectural significance that we could see. If its decrepit aluminum windows were replaced with the energy-efficient, attractive and economical ones preferred by Red Cross executive director Sharon Crino, generations of Carmelites could walk by the building without ever noticing the difference. In fact, they would surely regard the new windows as an improvement.

Even if the planning commission is correct, what they are defending has negligible value to the public. And in cases such as this — minimal or no public benefit weighed against a significant gain for a property owner — we think the owner of the building should be given the benefit of the doubt.

In other words, instead of being told, "You can't have vinyl clad windows because we don't think they would be suitable for the architecture of your building," the planning commission should have said, "We may prefer aluminum windows in your building, but simple fairness and good public policy require us to let you do away with them if you want to, because there is no significant public benefit that would result from us telling you, 'No."


That is the way government should work.

Vicious dogs? Dear Editor,

Labeling two service dogs as "vicious" because of tensions between two neighbors was not justified in my opinion, and I would like to comment on your article in the May 29 Carmel Pine Cone.

The fact that my two SAR dogs went over the fence cannot be refuted. However, what transpired after that leaves a great deal of room for conjecture. After putting the dogs in my yard, I, as a medical first responder, examined Casey Conover and observed a scrape on her forehead and wrist. There was no blood. I offered to drive her to emergency or her doctor. She declined. I examined her dog and saw no signs of blood, cuts or punctures. She declined taking the dog to the emergency vet clinic although she did take the dog to a vet four days later and purchased a bottle of prednisone, which has nothing to stated, placed her dog in her SUV. Anyone familiar with vicious dogs knows that when "in drive," even if grabbed by its handler, a dog will turn on him. This did not happen when another neighbor put her hand in Bear's collar to move him. When a dog or person needs no medical attention, they have not been in contact with a vicious dog.

Although the City of Pacific Grove has made its abatement decision — even after reports from dog trainers, animal behaviorists, the veterinarian who treats them and nine people who associate with my dogs on a weekly basis — I believe they made the decision based more on the city's potential liability and CYA than on the facts.

My SAR dogs have appeared in front of more than 17,000 school children and have attended many civic events to present search and rescue information. My dogs always go with me and interact with the membership and public. In 20 years, we have had only this one incident with complaints, and only from this vindictive neighbor who continues to make things difficult despite my five requests that we attend mediation sessions to resolve this issue so, at the very least, civility can return to an otherwise lovely neighborhood. I certainly hope he will accept this, the sixth invitation. It is my intention to consider pursuing all legal venues in resolving

Yet, older women find it more difficult to maintain their muscle mass than their male counterparts because they are less able to utilize protein. Researchers speculate that this key difference in the manner in which women's and men's bodies react to food may be due to menopause-related hormone changes in older women. In any case, this finding may help older women understand why they experience less muscle-building response to weight training than older men. With this in mind, older women may want to eat a protein-rich diet if their goal is to build more muscle.


To emphasize her ties with Carmel, Mom Elizabeth said, "I've lived here as long as anybody."

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



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Tim Allen presents Al Smith's "Garmel Legends"

On the afternoon of February 12, 1935, the great dirigible USS MACON, pride of the U.S. Navy, moved slowly and steadily up the California coast, returning from maneuvers to the great hangar at Moffat Field. She was 784 feet long, 133 feet high, looked like a 50-story building floating through the air, and sounded like the switch yards in Omaha, Nebraska, Her chief officer, Lt. Commander Herbert V. Wiley, commanded a crew of 83. She had eight 12-cylinder, 500 HP engines ranged along her sides, and she paid little attention to the massive thunderheads gathering out at sea. Suddenly, at precisely 5:05 p.m., the storm struck with incredible force. The engines beat violently, the crew worked feverishly, but she was like a bull in a tea shop, plunging, bucking, fighting for survival. In 20 minutes she was driven into the sea 3 miles off Big Sur, where she split like a melon and sank. 81 of the crew of 83 were rescued by Navy vessels in the area and by residents of Big Sur. But the Navy's dream of lighter-than-air dreadnaughts died that afternoon at 1820 hours.





'Finest house on the Peninsula' for sale in P.B.

PON ENTERING the gates at 3177 Del Ciervo Road in Pebble Beach, there is already a sense you are about to experience something extraordinary.

Winding down the cobblestone road that leads to the Mediterranean style home are trees on both sides that frame glimpses of the Pacific Ocean.

It's not until reaching the base of the 10,360 square foot house — perched about 600 feet above sea level — that one realizes the stunning panoramic view of Carmel Beach, Point Lobos and the Pebble Beach Golf Links that the property offers.

"I've been in the business locally for 34 years," said Coldwell Banker real estate agent Greg Kraft, "and this is the finest house I've represented, no question."

No expense was spared during construction, and Kraft and his listing partner, Rick Kennifer, say the \$30 million estate is truly unique, even in an area with many multimillion dollar homes of distinction.

"Just an enormous amount of attention and love went into building this house," Kraft said.

The current owners, a real estate developer and his wife, had the previous home on the property torn down to build the home, a process which took about five years, Kennifer

Offering five bedrooms, six full and two half baths, it was constructed with the highest quality materials, many of which were imported or custom made.

The home has no less than six fireplaces (several of which were imported from France), elevator access to three levels, a library and two separate offices. The lower level of the house features a room perfect for entertaining with a bar, wine

cellar, media area and billiard table.

Finding materials to incorporate into the construction of the home was a passion of the wife, who went on a worldwide trek seeking the best and most unique items.

"She found sources in a variety of places," Kennifer said.

For instance, the flooring on the first floor is antique stone reclaimed from Jerusalem, while the stone flooring on the lower level came from a monastery outside of Paris.

And the stone used to make the interior columns and stairways are from Greece. The

Stumping for sculpture

RICK BACTAD'S paintbrush is a chain saw, and where most people see dead trees and annoying stumps that would be costly to remove, he sees opportunity. His artistic vision and knack with power tools have landed him in numerous Monterey Peninsula yards, transforming the remains of dead trees into lively works of art.

A tree trimmer by trade, Bactad began carving last year as a means of releasing stress and grief. After the loss of an elderly woman he had taken care of — and who had given him his first chain saw eight years earlier — Bactad found himself eyeing large pieces of tree trunk left along Iris Canyon Road in Monterey.

"That's when I started carving angels, because that's when I really needed one," he said. He left his first angel on the roadside where he had carved it, and it disappeared.

"Then I carved another, and that one got stolen," he said. "But don't call it 'stolen,' because if they really need an angel, they can take it."

Since then, Bactad's done more than three dozen pieces, for himself, for passersby and on commission.

"When I start carving, the sound of the chain

saw clears my thoughts," he said. "I can't hear anything — there's no noise to interrupt my vision. It's kind of strange, but it's very therapeutic for me.

"And I can create a nice piece on half a gallon of gas."

An elephant he rendered stayed put on Iris Canyon for a while, but when he carved the same piece into a giraffe, which was lighter and a bit more portable, it also vanished.

"I don't want to create any animosity there," he said. "If they like it that much, they can take it."

Dragon made to order

Then a pilot who had noticed his work tracked Bactad down and hired him to turn a dead Monterey pine behind his Carmel home into a dragon. Layne Lisser, who lives on Mesa Drive and collects dragon sculptures and statues, ended up with a towering, winged specimen, complete with jeweled eyes and a baby tucked under her wing, presiding over his backyard. Lisser was delighted.

Others followed.

"We had to take this huge pine tree down at

Smart gardeners virtually unaffected by water shortage

IGH ABOVE the din of traffic rumbling along Carmel Valley Road — and a world apart from the contentious political debate over the Monterey Peninsula's limited water supply — a drought-tolerant ornamental garden thrives under a sweltering sun.

Designed and maintained over the past seven years by local contractor Susan McDonald, the garden is one of the most impressive local examples of a new innovation in landscaping — the "smart" garden.



home's exterior is Carmel stone.

"The beams in the ceiling were reclaimed from ships that sunk off the coast of Canada," Kennifer said.

And when an item couldn't be found, it was painstakingly recreated.

While in France, the woman found a classic old lighting fixture, but only one. Desiring another, she hired someone to copy the original.

"She commissioned an artisan in Grover Beach to reproduce the design," Kennifer said. "The "old" and the "new" are virtually indistinguishable. It's amazing to me that there are artisans who are capable of creating/reproducing these old

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
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
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

world designs."

The intricate staircase railing was hand made by a blacksmith in Sutter Creek.

And in one of the first-floor bathrooms, the walls of which are covered in silk, sits a 15th-century baptismal font the owners purchased in Europe.

Even the stove hood in the U-shaped kitchen wasn't bought off the shelf. It was carved by an artisan in Italy.

With plenty of space, the cooking area offers tremendous views, as does the rest of the estate.

"Many of the real estate brokers we have had in the home have said this house offers the best view in Pebble Beach," Kennifer said.

Outside the home, the attention to detail is also evident.

The rustic, multicolored roof tiles, the first part of the house one sees when entering the property from the private gate, don't look new. That's because they are not.

"These were imported from the South of France and were reclaimed from an old structure there," Kennifer explained.

Even the meandering stone pathway leading visitors down to the home has a special tale.

"These cobblestones were obtained in the Boston area," Kennifer said. "They are reclaimed from previous use there, and the stones originally reached Boston as ballast in the bottom of trading ships."


Large yet homey

Though spacious, the house offers an intimacy not often found in homes of similar size.


"You don't feel like it's an auditorium you are walking through," Kraft said. "It has a very warm feel as opposed to a grand estate."

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


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

the side of our yard, and it was a double trunk, and I immediately thought it would make a great statue of some sort," recalled Pebble Beach resident Sandra Neeland, who had read a Pine Cone article about Bactad's creating Lisser's dragon. "We had permission from the forestry department to take it down because it was sick and part had fallen on our roof. But it was a big, old pine tree, and we thought it would be nice to have something left of it."

She and her husband, Jim, asked their arborist to cut the tree off at the roof line.

Bactad came to examine the stumps, which Neeland said reminded her of dolphins leaping. He immediately agreed.

"I went online and found a picture of these two dolphins facing each other in the air," she said. "He took the picture, and off he went, and then he came back with his chain saw and worked."

Bactad spent a few days carving the piece, which Neeland said her neighbors and passersby have complimented.

"They are pieces of art," she said. "I was really touched by how he goes about the whole thing.'

On Casanova Street, he transformed a pine stump into a 6-foot sea horse for resident Marlys Powell,

"I had two trees in the backyard, and after a big storm, one of them was leaning funny, and I was worried about it falling on the neighbor's house or my house," she said. The city forester determined it was diseased and dangerous, and gave her permission to cut it down.

After the tree was gone, an arborist told her it would cost \$500 to remove the stump. "So I thought, 'Why not spend the money to do something really creative?" Powell said.

As they walked around her house, he noticed wind chimes adorned with sea horses, and Bactad asked Powell if she had a particular affection for them.

The answer was yes. During a trip to Hawaii, she and her granddaughters had an encounter with the endearing

"That was kind of a mystical piece for me," Bactad recalled, as it inspired him to fire up his chain saw and work for several hours, barely aware of the passage of time.

"Sometimes I don't even know what my saw's going to do," he said. "It just does it."

But the work wasn't uninterrupted.

"There were so many nails in that tree," he said, and every time he hit one, he had to go buy another chain.

Still, the results made Powell very





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

she said. "He made the piece thinking about my 5- and 7-year-old granddaughters, so he made it really cute."

And Powell said she would love to have Bactad carve another tree for her.

"He's an extremely creative, very spiritual guy," she said. "If ever that huge tree on my fence goes, I will have him do something there as well."

The eagle has landed

Alan Cordan, who lives high on the hill in Carmel Views, believes he possesses Bactad's best work: a bald eagle, which he created to be mounted on the top of a Monterey pine Cordan had topped at about 25 feet after the upper half died. The lower portion still has branches with green foliage, but once those give up, Cordan said he'll have the rest of the tree carved into a totem pole.

Being an avid fisherman, he originally envisioned a marlin for the prominent spot but changed his mind.

"They're not natural for this area," he explained. "The eagle — that's our national bird — I thought it was the right thing to do."

"That one took me a week," Bactad recalled. "I had to make four of them to get it right."

He worked on the eagle offsite and, once he was happy with it, brought it to Cordan.

"That one was very, very hard to let go," he

said.

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

dence at 3177 Del Ciervo offers a feeling of seclusion, in part, because it can't be seen from the road and is hidden by trees.

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"There are many vignette-type private, quiet places to go," he said. "There are many areas to experience the landscape and capture different feelings. I think it's a romantic home."



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Oil recycling event aims to keep toxins out of groundwater

WHILE LOCAL residents generally are good about recycling old motor oil, significantly fewer properly dispose of their oil fil-

"We're concerned because we're getting oil, but not an equal amount of filters," said Nancy Treffry, an environmental health specialist for the Monterey County Health Department. "We're guessing people are throwing filters in the trash. There's still about 7 ounces of oil left in each filter. We want to let people know there are other avenues for disposal of filters."

The goal of her agency's efforts is "to keep toxins out of our groundwater," added Treffry, who reminded local residents that "recycling is free."

In an effort to better educate the public about the disposal of motor oil, the health department is hosting a Used Oil and Filter Collection Event Friday, June 27, from 2 to 8 p.m. at Kragen Auto Parts in Seaside.


Residents who turn in a used oil filter will receive a new oil filter free of charge (there's a limit of two per customer). Used oil and filters must be stored and transported properly in a clean, uncontaminated container and the oil must not be mixed with antifreeze, gasoline, diesel fuels, brake fluid, water, power steering fluid, solvents, paints/varnishes, or household chemicals.

The health department offers a network of 43 residential used oil and filter collection centers, a curbside collection program, and agricultural and marine oil collection centers.

sponsored by Medina's nonprofit group, local water agencies and other "smart" gardening-minded companies, aims to recognize beautiful local gardens that save water through plant selection, efficient drip irrigation and other conservation techniques. The contest will present cash, prizes and awards for plant selection, efficient irrigation, California native plants, succulents, Mediterranean plants and creative lawn alternatives.

Medina said she was quite impressed with McDonald's labor of love, which covers a gentle-sloping, south-facing hillside across from Garland Ranch Regional Park.

"It's aesthetically pleasing and it blends in with the natural environment," explained Medina, who lives in Watsonville. "She has created a wonderful habitat [for local fauna]. I saw lots of birds and butterflies and little things scurrying around. They seemed quite happy there."

Despite its visual attributes, the eye-catch-

ing garden requires very little maintenance — and just 20 to 30 minutes of watering every week.

"She has a complete watering system," Medina observed. "Nothing looks overwatered or under-watered. She's only there one day a month for a couple hours. That's everybody's dream."

Master gardeners have come up with a criteria to define a "smart" garden. Its features can include the following elements:

- Plants that thrive with minimal supplementary water for example, California native plants, Mediterranean plants, and succulents without invasive species;
- The use of mulches or ground cover to minimize water loss due to evaporation;
- An irrigation system that uses drip emitters, micro-sprayers, weather based irrigation controllers, and other water efficient irrigation components; Rainwater catchment could be a feature of the irrigation system;
- The use of ground covers and lawn alternatives, rather than conventional turf lawns

that use a lot of water. These could even include synthetic turf or low-water-use grasses;

- Plants that are grouped together according to their water needs; and
- Plants that are appropriate for the microclimate of a garden.

So little water, but so many choices

At the heart of McDonald's garden is a carefully chosen selection of colorful drought-resistant plants. One of her particular favorites is sage — or salvia — an aromatic member of the mint family that is one of California's most popular ornamental plants.

"Salvias are very appropriate for Carmel

Valley," explained McDonald, a longtime Carmel resident. "They don't need much water, and they're very fragrant."

Manzanita, a common native plant noted for its colorful peeling bark, is a perfect addition to a drought-tolerant garden.

"Manzanita is a very long-living and handsome shrub," said McDonald, whose landscaping business, Property Services Garden Maintenance, focuses on renovating and rehabilitating existing gardens. "In the late winter, they are covered with little pink bell-shaped blossoms. Later on, they have berries. They come in a wide variety of forms, including trees, shrubs and ground cover."

Another favorite is rosemary, a Mediterranean herb known for its intoxicating scent and its many culinary uses. "Rosemary is very useful," she observed. "It requires little to

no water, it's fragrant and it has beautiful blue flowers in the winter."

Perhaps the most visually stunning plant in McDonald's garden is the native tree poppy (or Matilija poppy), with its abundant white cupped flowers that tower over other ornamental plants.


"Everyone loves them," she said of the tree poppy. "They're very distinctive and fragrant. They make wonderful cut flowers." Agave is best known as the source for tequila, but McDonald prefers to plant it in gardens for aesthetic reasons.

"It's a piece of sculpture in your landscape," she explained. "It's a beautiful, strong plant. It's very useful as an accent, and no water is necessary."

Cal Am offers help with water savings

 ${\operatorname{To}}$ SAVE water for the Carmel River and money for its customers, California American Water Co. is making house

The water company, with the help of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, is offering free watersaving audits for its Peninsula customers who use more H₂O than the average user.

"An audit will help customers become more educated consumers," said Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie. "It will also help our local water supply and protect the environment."

Last month, Cal Am sent letters to about 200 commercial and residential customers who use from 16 to 31 water units (12,000 to 23,250 gallons) per month, offering the free

"But anyone can take advantage of the service no matter what their water use," Bowie said.

The average customer uses about seven units (5,250 gallons) per month, she said.

An audit involves a Cal Am employee visiting a customer's houses to check indoor and outdoor water usage, and offering water conservation tips. Cal Am later sends customers a report on how to improve water use efficiency.

"It can take from 20 minutes to an hour depending on the size of property, number of fixtures, etc.," Bowie said.

Analyzing a customer's water use is beneficial for everybody, according to the water company.

"The audit staff said they often identify toilet leaks, sprinkler repairs and customers who water more than the optimal amount for their landscaping," Bowie said.

Besides the benefits of saving water and money, The California Urban Water Conservation Council requires Cal Am to audit 20 percent of its customers over a 10-year peri-

The audits will help Cal Am avoid exceeding water use limits and fines for going over those limits. In 1995, the state ordered the water company to drastically reduce pumping from the Carmel River, its main source.

And in January, the state issued a cease and desist order, compelling Cal Am to reduce pumping by 50 percent within six years.

An audit, which can be scheduled by calling Cal Am,

■ Demonstration on how to read the water meter, calculate water use, and to uncover system leaks;

- Evaluation of the landscape irrigation system, including inspection for leaks and malfunctions;
- Inspection of each irrigation station and a check list of improvements;
- A site-specific irrigation schedule based on the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District's two day per week watering rule;
- Education on how and when to adjust irrigation controllers for maximum watering efficiency, and
- Explanation of of rebates for smart controllers, rain or soil sensors, and cistern systems.

Residential customers make up more than 50 percent of Cal Am's total customers, while commercial accounts for 20 percent. The remainder of the water goes to public lands, golf courses and industrial use. Cal Am has 32,000 residential users on the Peninsula.

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BEACHFRONT REMODEL TURNED DOWN FOR THE THIRD TIME

AFTER BRINGING various versions of plans for remodeling their home near Carmel Beach to the Carmel Planning Commission for review — and being sent back to the drawing board each time with requests for modifications - owners Robb and Dale Johnson balked at a planner's recommendations for further changes based on neighbors' concerns about views and the design.

Instead, their attorney requested a vote on their application as submitted. The commission unanimously denied it last month, and the Johnsons have appealed that decision to

During the May 14 meeting, attorney Miriam Schakat told commissioners, "We've tried to do everything we can to accommodate everybody, and here we are again with five more special conditions," requiring design changes.

"Every time we come back to the commission thinking we're addressing concerns that were raised, something else is thrown at us," she said.

The 67-year-old house is part of Sand & Sea, a small group of houses on San Antonio Avenue identified as historically significant in 2002. The city approved remodel plans in 2004 and 2005, and most of that construction is finished, according to the report by planning and building services manager Sean Conroy.

But in 2006, following a successful appeal submitted by owners of the homes within the complex, Sand & Sea was removed from the city's inventory of important properties. Freed from the design constraints imposed on historic homes, the Johnsons sought approval for more work, including a new second story, in 2007.

The planning commission last August denied that request, and the couple returned March 12 with a new one-story

Commissioners delayed voting that day so the city attorney could weigh in on whether the shared driveway, which is also used by people who walk to the beach, should be used in calculating how much building can be done on the lot.

They also worried about view impacts on neighbors across the street and adjacent on the east side, and were concerned the design was not compatible with the other Sand &

Still too big

The May 14 proposal called for expanding the master bedroom on the north side and two other bedrooms on the southeast corner, for an increase of 348 square feet, as well as a new entryway and fireplace, and a slightly pitched roof. The plans included a 1.5-foot reduction in height and made the master bedroom addition smaller to accommodate the

"Staff supports these changes, as they allow the property owner to expand his residence while avoiding significant impacts on neighboring properties," Conroy wrote in his report.

But he also suggested several conditions, including a public access easement along the northern property line and reduction in the square footage of the master bedroom expansion.

Conroy also said 618 square feet of walkways and patios should be removed, and the chimney planned for the south side of the home eliminated, since it would exceed a 15-foot height limit.

Finally, because the city forester determined there is no room for upper-canopy trees on the site, Conroy said the Johnsons should apply for a variance from a requirement that four of the tall trees be included in the remodel plan.

Margaret Kim, the neighbor to the east, generally supported the Johnsons' latest proposal but said she lost some of her view during the first remodel project and did not want to give up much more.

"I would really, really like to see [the Johnsons' home] extended only to the west, and nothing to the north," she said.

Representing Greg Erickson, who lives across the street, attorney Jim Heisinger said, "We continue to believe the design as proposed is not compatible with existing homes on the sand dune. It appears there will have to be a significant redesign."


But when Conroy suggested the commission request another continuance for a redesign, Schakat said her clients

Because "the applicants' representative did not accept the special conditions that were outlined," chairman Bill Strid said, the commission should deny the project. With commissioner Janet Reimers absent, it did so unanimously.

The Johnsons filed their appeal May 20 to have the Carmel City Council examine the commission's vote and determine whether it should be overturned. Meanwhile, the commission adopted its "findings for denial," making its decision final, on June 11.

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Coastal commission sends affordable-housing law back to city

m For}$ MORE than a year, the staff of the California Coastal Commission sat on the City of Carmel's plan to make it easier to build affordable housing in town. And when they finally looked at the plan, the coastal commission's staff decided changes had to be made

June 11, planning and building services manager Sean Conroy presented the Carmel Planning Commission with the changes coastal planners said were necessary for the state agency to approve the amendment to the city's Local Coastal Program.

"They indicated they would not be sup-

portive unless some amendments are made," Conroy said.

As approved by city council in March 2007, the ordinance would allow exceptions to certain development standards — such as setbacks, height, floor area, density and parking — to make it easier for 100 percent affordable projects to be built and to allow "flexibility in design."

But with its mandate to promote visitor access to coast, the coastal commission's staff wanted the allowances permitted only in the multifamily residential and limited residential/commercial districts, not in the central and service commercial areas at the center of town.

"The commission staff was concerned that a potential project could be built in areas more appropriately used for retail and other commercial uses," Conroy explained.

Planners also said the flexibility should only be applied on lots 8,000 square feet or smaller, and the parking allowance should be eliminated, since the zoning code only requires one-third of a parking space per affordable unit and "further exceptions may not be appropriate."

Finally, the coastal planners sought more requirements to ensure "that the granting of zoning exceptions does not have a negative impact on the character of the city," according to Conroy, including determinations the new construction would be an improvement over existing buildings and "the project will not diminish the village character by excessively blocking important public or private views and disturbing natural topography, mature trees or native growth."


Conroy recommended the commission OK the changes and forward the revised ordinance to the city council for adoption, at which point it would return to the coastal commission for final action.

If and when the law goes into effect, the Carmel Foundation will be able to move ahead with its plans to replace nine-units of low-cost senior housing at Trevvett Court with new buildings containing 14.


More than two years ago, the plan for Trevvett Court received a thumbs-up from the city but was delayed pending adoption of the new rules.

Nobody from the public commented on the changes, and the planning commission unanimously voted to recommend the city council adopt the amended ordinance.

For a healthy dose of color in your garden, McDonald recommends purple smoke bush, which is also known as cotinus.

"It has flowers that cover the bush with a sensation of purple smoke," she said. "Like manzanita, it's fire retardant. It's a very nice accent, and it doesn't require much water."

Another favorite is santolina, with its feathery green or silver foliage.

"Santolina is a fragrant drought-resistant shrub," she explained. "It's very, very hardy and long living. It makes a good accent plant."

McDonald said the garden took about two months to plant. "It was attractive from the beginning," she recalled.

Making the tour

Admiring her garden from the cool of a shady bench, McDonald eyes twinkle when she talks about her work.

"I'm very proud of the garden," McDonald added. "It's handsome and it's easy to take care of. It needs very little maintenance. I accomplished what I set out to do."



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
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

Commission shoots down plan for small parking garage

A PROPOSAL for a new parking garage on Fourth Avenue failed to survive its preliminary review before the Carmel Planning Commission last week.

Property owner Denny LeVett proposed constructing the 14-spot, double-decker garage on the corner lot across from the Vagabond House Inn. The lot already serves as a parking lot for the inn. The upper level would be accessed from Dolores Street and uncovered, while motorists would enter the lower level from the Fourth Avenue side. The structure would be cantilevered to avoid impacting several trees.


Planning and building services manager

Sean Conroy recommended the planning commission approve the design concept with a few conditions.

He concluded the garage would help relieve parking congestion and satisfy the hotel's need for off-street parking. The street's slope would help minimize the structure's mass and bulk.

To minimize the impacts on the neighbors, he called for more screening to the south and said LeVett had promised to rebuild the fence to the west. Conroy also suggested he be required to repair the sidewalk alongside the garage and submit landscape and lighting plans for the commis-

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
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



The Carmel garden club may have a staid reputation, but this sexy, award-winning creation by one of its members shows that the group also has quite an imagination.

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

sion's review, along with the final details of the plan.

"The design is supposed to be very low key," said builder Chris Tescher, who represented LeVett at the June 11 meeting. At 17 feet at its highest point, "it has a low profile, the mass is fairly low, and it's open and airy.' The garage would have a concrete floor, stucco walls with openings covered in lattice or trellis, and several trees.

Big and ugly

But a number of people who live near the would-be structure offered very different opinions of the proposal.

"This is, when I look at it, an absolutely ugly structure," said a man who owns a house north of the parking lot and urged the commission to deny it. "There's absolutely nothing aesthetically pleasing about this."

Gene McFarland, who lives down the hill from the proposed project, commented, "We would essentially be inserting a section of L.A. freeway into this wooded [residential] area."

Developer Alan Williams said he felt he was playing the NIMBY role, but said a better option would be keeping the garage at ground level and digging under the property to the south, which LeVett also owns.

"I would encourage some creativity," he said. "I applaud the additional parking, but they're putting it in the wrong place."

Elinor Laiolo, who lives near La Playa Hotel, said that inn once wanted to add a second level to its garage, but was unsuccessful. If the commission OK'd LeVett's application, others might seek similar outcomes, she predicted. "Where would your hands be?" she asked. "Tied."

While providing more parking for the inn is a worthy goal, commissioner Steve Hillyard said the garage would be a poor fit.

"This is a massive structure," he said. "It certainly isn't compatible with those little houses that surround it."

"I feel very much for the residents who live around this place who would have a parking garage stuck into the middle of the [residential] district," added commissioner Robin Wilson, and the commission voted unanimously to deny LeVett's application.

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
