

## Shooting at teen party puts brothers in hospital

TWO TEENAGE brothers are recovering after being shot outside their Carmel home last weekend by a partygoer who reportedly was upset after being told to leave the party.

Daniel and Joseph Christensen were shot outside their Handley Drive house about 12:30 a.m. Sunday and underwent surgery at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula this week. They are expected to survive.

"We had a loud party call with possible shots fired from

the area," said Monterey County Sheriff's investigator Archie Warren. "Upon arriving on scene, numerous teenagers were leaving the area on foot and in vehicles."

One of the Christensen brothers was shot in the chest and stomach while the other was shot in the leg and stomach, according to the Monterey County Sheriff's Office.

A friend of the brothers, who did not want to be identified, told The Pine Cone the suspect started shooting after he was told to leave the party because he was "getting out of hand."

After leaving, the suspect "threw rocks at the house and when he was asked to leave again, he fired," the source said. "The other brother intervened and was shot."

One partygoer told deputies that two of his friends had been shot and were being driven to CHOMP.

The hospital wouldn't provide any information about the

Bates, 78, was preparing to open his first art gallery when he had the heart attack. He is unconscious and in intensive care at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula.

"It happened so suddenly," said David Loye, a close friend of Bates. "The latest estimate is he will be in intensive care for another two

to three weeks." Though surgery to repair a blocked artery was

successful, Bates has had complications. He devel-

Loye, who published Bates' 2007 illustrated book, "Bates on Bush," said the artist was working on painting a sign for his new gallery, at Seventh and San Carlos, when he felt lightheaded.

"He went into the bathroom to wash a paintbrush and he felt a little dizzy," Loye said. "Apparently he didn't think too much of it."

But a quick-thinking employee of Perspectacles, the shop where Bates subleases a space for his gallery, noticed the artist was having medical problems. "She has some nurse's training and noticed something serious was happening," Loye said. "She immediately called 911, which undoubtedly saved his life."

Bates, who was nominated by The Pine Cone for a Pulitzer Prize, was rushed to CHOMP, where doctors worked to save his life.

## More than 100 dachshunds to convene at annual beach bash

### BEACH BLANKET Bingo for dachshunds.

That's what will happen Sunday as the Carmel Dachshund Club presents its 5th annual Wienie Roast Sunday at Carmel Beach, creating the head-turning spectacle of more than 100 "wiener dogs" simultaneously frolicking in the sand.

"It's pretty hysterical," said Kim Edmundson, a studio musician and part-time Carmel resident who helped organize the event. "This is our big blow-out of the year."



Edmundson — the proud owner of dachshunds named "Spike" and "Butch" — said the club has grown rapidly since he and fellow dachshund owner Jean Hontalas came up with the idea six years ago.

"We put an ad in The Pine Cone about our first club meeting," Edmundson recalled. "I didn't think anyone would show up. Seventeen dachshunds came to the first meeting, and about 50 turned out for he next meeting. We meet twice a month, and between 20 and 40 dogs come each time."

Sunday's wienie roast offers local dachshunds a great opportunity to both socialize and blow off steam.

"Who needs entertainment when dachshunds are running around?" Edmundson asked. "This event is all about the dogs playing and going nuts on the beach. All the people do is eat. Thanks to the generosity of Ferman and Kerry Sanchez -

the owners of Bruno's Market and two dachshunds - owners of the pooches will feast on the finest hot dogs in town.

"Bruno's supplies all the hot dogs and buns," Edmundson noted.

For visitors to Carmel Beach, the event is certain to turn a few heads. For the local dog owners, the wienie roast serves as a showcase for the many charms of a cute, small and somewhat-elongated breed of canines.


"They're just very loving dogs," Edmundson explained. 'They're a blast to be around. They're such characters."

unique treat, abalone steaks. Until then, abalone was generally considered a junk fish, possibly poisonous, eaten only by the Chinese who chopped the rubbery muscles into chowder. The new chef experimented until he discovered how to slice abalone into strips, pound them until they were tender, dip them in batter and breadcrumbs, and quick fry them. His abalone steaks were such a hit that the modest café on Alvarado Street, near the spot where Rosine's Restaurant sits today, became a social center for the colorful artists and writers of early Carmel, along with the rich and famous staying at the Hotel Del Monte. In 1910, the abalone steak was 75 cents - or 90 with a salad. (Next week: Lucky Lindy visits the Peninsula)

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



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## County wants to reexamine \$\$ deal with proposed C.V. town

A REQUEST by Monterey County to reexamine the terms of a revenue-sharing agreement with a proposed Town of Carmel Valley could add another delay to a lengthy process that has worn out both supporters and opponents of incorporating the scenic valley.

Superior Court Judge Lydia Villareal breathed new life into the drive to create the town when she ruled May 2 that an environmental impact report cannot be required before incorporation is put before voters.

The Monterey County Local Agency Formation Commission decided not to appeal Villareal's decision and announced July 3 that it had reached a settlement with proponents that could pay their attorney Michael Stamp as much as \$240,000 in legal fees

But LAFCO also decided to postpone a critical hearing on incorporation from Oct. 27 to Dec. 1 to allow time to discuss — and possibly renegotiate — an agreement to make sure the county doesn't lose revenue when the new town is created.

"They're still playing games with us," insisted incorporation advocate Glenn Robinson. "It's time to just let people vote."

According to Nick Chiulos, the county's director of Intergovernmental & Legislative Affairs, the original revenue neutrality settlement — based on fiscal data from June 2006

provides the county with an option to reexamine it. He said the poor economy and the amount of time that has elapsed since the agreement was signed were factors that led to the decision to take another look at the document.

Chiulos said he didn't anticipate the discussion over revenue neutrality would add any further delays. But Robinson isn't so sure, going so far as to call the agreement a "Pandora's Box."

"It took 18 months to negotiate the agreement the first time," he observed.

Meanwhile, Carmel Valley Forum president Max Chaplin said the marathon incorporation process has worn down both sup-



Pacific Grove: Violet Baldwin, 102, of Canterbury Woods, Pacific Grove, died on Monday, July 14 at her home.

Violet was born in Bowie, Texas on July 8, 1906 to Alvin R. and Wilhelmina Schaefer. The family later moved to San Antonio where Violet attended Main Avenue High School and graduated at the



age of 16. She graduated from the University of Texas and went on to Cumberland University Law School in Lebanon, Tennessee. After graduation, she passed her law exams and became one of the first three women to be admitted to the State Bar of Texas.

Violet later moved to California where she met and married Carvel Baldwin, a banker with Pasadena Citizen's Trust & Savings. When he retired in 1964, they moved to Carmel and enjoyed being active in community affairs. She was a volunteer at CHOMP from 1978 to 2002 where she racked up a whopping 10,000 hours. She served at the reception desk, the blood center, and both the Short Stay Unit and Intensive Care. She also volunteered at the Monterey Bay Aquarium where she contributed more than 1,700 hours over a span of 15 years. Over the course of the years, Violet has also volunteered at the Red Cross Blood Bank, spent years in Washington as a government aide, read books to the blind, been a member of the Women's Auxiliary at St. John's Episcopal Church and knitted for Navy wives. Vi's excellence at caning chairs is legendary in the Monterey area.

Vi was preceded in death by her parents, a brother and her husband. She is survived by her nephew, Chris Schaefer of Houston, Texas. 

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

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## Planning commissioners ask for help with conflicting state laws

**O**N THE one hand, the California Environmental Quality Act requires Carmel and other cities to protect their historic buildings and "visual resources."

On the other hand, a different state law requires the city to approve affordable housing projects unless they pose a threat to "public health and safety."

Those conflicting mandates left planning commissioners unsure how to proceed Wednesday as they considered the latest iteration of a plan to tear down a former bank building at Dolores Street and Seventh Avenue, designed in a modern style by Walter Burde, and replace it with apartments (including two affordable ones), condos and shops.

The project has been in the city's permit process since 2004. In October 2006, the city council voted the old bank building, now the home of Homescapes Carmel, could be demolished. But the issue continues to arise in the context of what should replace it.

"We've heard the existing building is a great piece of architecture, but there hasn't been any process by which we could say this is a great piece of architecture that should be protected in perpetuity," commissioner Steven Hillyard said, after hearing from a local architect's group that the city should forbid the owner, designer John Mandurrago, to tear the Burde building down.

"I've always had the opinion the building should be demolished," countered commissioner Alan Hewer. "I've always thought it was huge, unattractive and not belonging in this town."

"But we have heard from people with far more credentials than you or I," chairman Bill Strid said, referring to the architects who say the building is very significant, even though it was built only 36 years ago. "And those are the people I am going to listen to."

After their discussion, Mandurrago's attorney, Anthony Lombardo, argued that even if the building is extremely important architecturally, that isn't enough to override state housing law.

"Great architecture is in the eye of the beholder," Lombardo said. "But rightly or wrongly the Legislature has decided we have

THE GOLDEN Bough Theater is 16,000 square feet, but occupies four lots that, under current zoning, qualify for only 4,000 square feet of development.

However, demolishing the ramshackle former cinema to turn it into a modern showplace for live theater won't trigger a requirement that it conform to current size limits, the Carmel Planning Commission decided Wednesday.

"The footprint it has was legal [at the time the building was built] and it should be kept," commissioner Robin Wilson said.

Stephen Moorer, executive director of the building's owner, Pacific Repertory Theatre, asked the commission for guidance so his group could proceed with fundraising and plans for a new theater on the site of what everyone agrees is an inadequate facility now.

"It leaks sound like a sieve," Moorer began. "When the Buddy Holly story is rocking, you can hear it down the block and around the corner."

He also said the current building is very ugly, has inadequate storage, is technically backward, and lacks amenities for actors, technicians and the audience.

"There's a line into the lobby at the ladies room during every intermission," he said.

But he said the current building's size — and especially its height — should be maintained.

'If we go any lower, we won't have room for a two-story set," he said. "In that case, Juliet wouldn't be acting from a balcony, she'd be acting from a porch."

He presented preliminary drawings that showed a theater with the lobby where the stage is now and the stage where the lobby is. Excavation to 31 feet below ground would create space for technical shops below the stage. Double doors, insulating and landscape screening would reduce disruptions to the neighborhood, he said.

Only one neighbor objected to the remodel, asking instead that the theater be removed and replaced with single-family houses.

But the city council has already decided the site should remain a theater, and the rest of the neighbors seemed to welcome improvement to the Golden Bough.

"We're not against PacRep or drama," said Bill Souveroff, who said he represented a group of neighbors. "The theater is a wonderful thing. But we want the remodel done right."

He said parking, theater noise, smoking, drinking, neighborhood ambiance and privacy were all things of concern.

#### 'Work with the neighbors'

Before agreeing that the Golden Bough could stay roughly the same size it is now, and in the same location, commissioners asked Moorer and his architect, Richard McCann, to cooperate with the neighbors.

"I move we express our support for the alliance between the theater and the neighborhood association to work toward agreement on as much of the details as possible," Wilson said.

Without taking a vote, the commission concurred.


"I hope we've provided the guidance you need to come up with a design," commission chair Bill Strid commented.





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

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
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# City: Fire prevention more important than ever

IN LIGHT of the wildfires that have burned in Big Sur and Carmel Valley, the city council in heavily forested Carmel-bythe-Sea is going to urge its residents and visitors to be more aware of fire safety.

And one way homeowners can prevent fires is by having their chimneys swept, according to city hall.

During a special meeting Tuesday, the council voted to educate the public about fire prevention instead of amending municipal code sections related to fire safety.

"We decided to educate the need for spark arrestors and an expert chimney sweep to clean out excessive debris in chimneys," said city administrator Rich Guillen.

In its campaign, the city will also remind people that beach fires can only be set in certain areas and of the need for brush to be cleared around homes and other fire prevention practices.

The council is only recommending residents have their chimneys swept and isn't requiring it. Spark arrestors prevent sparks and other flammable debris from escaping chimneys. "One suggestion was to reimburse a portion for people who [install] spark arrestors," Guillen said.


Instead, he said the city will promote the importance of spark arrestors and other fire safety tips through the media, placing fire prevention tips on doorknob fliers, distributing information at city hall and the library and erecting signs at Carmel Beach promoting beach fire safety.


Beach signs would likely include information letting beachgoers know fires are prohibited between Ocean Avenue and 10th street and the proper way to put out beach fires.

Carmel's municipal code currently includes a litany of fire-prevention-related regulations, including the burning of garbage, beach fires and chimney maintenance. Tuesday's meeting was a followup to a July 1 meeting in which the council discussed fire prevention as an "urgency topic."

The city council could have voted to amend its city code related to fire safety but Guillen said there was no need.

"It became apparent there are already a lot of protections that can be enforced," he said.





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### A Pacific Grove resident's Peace Corps service

"I WONDER what I'm going to do now."

That thought went through my head in March 2004, when I found myself, after a couple of serious life changes, with unexpected free time on my hands. As I pondered my future, my thoughts turned to an idea I'd had for many years. In fact, I had always harbored a desire to join the Peace Corps, but life events had a habit of getting in the way. Suddenly the way was clear and it was time to act.

The Peace Corps has a very convenient way to apply. At their website, www.peacecorps.gov, all I needed to do was fill out an application. After that, I had to talk with one of their recruiters and be nominated. In late 2004, I was told my destination and that I would be leaving on March 1, 2005.

Group 28 bound for Ukraine met on a chilly, rainy day in a hotel in Chicago. There were 45 of us from all over the country. We spent the last weekend in February going through orientation and getting acquainted. Finally, the big day for the flight arrived and we headed to Europe and the beginning of our adventure.

When we arrived at the dormitory that was to be our home for the first week, there was still snow on the ground and the river that ran behind the dorm was frozen over. It wasn't until we got back inside that someone told us we shouldn't have been walking on the ice!

Our introduction

to Ukraine was intense. We started learning Russian or Ukrainian almost from the moment we arrived - and the first word we learned was "piva," which means beer. There was the usual ream of paper that needed to be filled out and signed. We were divided into training groups and we started our transformation into fullfledged volunteers that evening.

After that first intense week, we headed off in our training groups to various cities outside of Kiev for immersion into (in my case) Russian language, Ukrainian culture, and a different way of life.

For the first three months in the country, while I became more familiar with my surroundings, I was placed with a wonderful host-family in the town of Vasilkov, about a twohour bus ride from Kiev. All trainees in Ukraine are required to spend their training time with a local family. I was lucky. Galena was a wonderful cook and gracious hostess who had a comfortable house not too far from town.

Her teenage daughter, Natasha, and son, Sasha, were eager to help in getting me accustomed to my new life. Galena owned a store and I would go there on chilly afternoons (it was a long winter) to study and try to absorb the language. When training was over it was hard to leave. One day I was sitting outside the store and a young girl about 12 or so sat down and started to play her accordion. I'd never heard "Love Me Tender" played so well or sound so sweet.

Not long after that I stepped off the train in Stakhanov, a small city in the Donbas region on the eastern side of the country. It was a coal mining town until the mines were shut because of environmental and safety concerns in the early 1990's. Alexy Stakhanov was a coal miner who, in the days of Stalin, performed some prodigious feat in the mine. Stalin named him a working-class hero. Many years later this city was named for him.

My assignment was to teach English at the Ukraine Pedagogical and Engineering Academy, a small school that offers degrees in electrical engineering, mine engineering



surrounds their houses without worrying about whether they're breaking the law, said Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter.

"There are too many other priorities with greater significance," Potter explained. "We're in a rebuilding mode now. We don't want to come in and create a regulatory presence. We need to create a facilitating presence."

Potter also serves a member of the California Coastal Commission, the agency seeking greater protection for the familiar mix of hardy plants it calls "maritime chaparral."

In a letter to The Pine Cone last week, Charles Lester, senior deputy director of the commission, insisted his agency does not require permits for brush clearance around existing buildings in Big Sur.

Yet he followed that statement by noting that his agency has "worked closely with Monterey County on an emergency approval for clearing dead oaks in Northern Big Sur to reduce the risk of catastrophic fire."

And the coastal commission declared maritime chaparral to be environmentally sensitive habitat in 2006 when it approved a permit for Stephen Foster to construct a new home on the former Rocky Creek ranch, which sits atop a ridge between Palo Colorado and Rocky creeks.

Under the Coastal Act, ESHA is off-limits to almost all development.

While the coastal commission is stepping up protection of maritime chaparral, there is no agreement on what constitutes it.

Coastal commission planner Katie Morange said that the definition "is still being refined." Apparently, the presence of local varieties of manzanita and ceanothus is enough to deem much of Big Sur's vegetation maritime chaparral.

But Lester's letter in The Pine Cone implied there is not much protected maritime chaparral in Big Sur. "Given its limited distribution, we estimate that less than onetenth of one percent of more than 200,000 acres in the Big Sur coast area could potentially involve conflicts between the sensitive habitat and developable residential building sites," Lester wrote.

Big Sur resident Mike Caplin bristled at Lester's words, calling them "misleading."

According to the California Department of Fish and Game's maritime chaparral expert, Caplin noted, "almost all chaparral in California's coastal zone is maritime chaparral, with very few exceptions."

Caplin also takes issue with Lester's insistence that his agency is okay with fire clearance that involves removing maritime chaparral. "Lester's statements lead the reader to think it is not a problem to remove ESHA to provide defensible space for fire protection," Caplin said.

However, in the Foster case, the coastal commission staff "argued that maritime chaparral could not even be trimmed for fire protection purposes," Caplin noted.

According to Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade chief Frank Pinney, state law requires homeowners "living in a wildland interface" to maintain 100-feet of clearance between their homes and a fire threat.

Hillary Lipman, a local property owner, real estate agent and botanist, agrees with Caplin's assessment that maritime chaparral composes much of Big Sur's landscape.

"At least 75 percent of Pfeiffer Ridge is maritime chaparral," observed Lipman, referring to one of Big Sur's most populous neighborhoods.

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
time with family and friends.



lightning June 21 and has burned more than 120,000 acres within the Los Padres National Forest.

Malintha Larsen, who lives on Parrot Ranch Road, at the junction of Tassajara and Cachagua roads, chose to stay on her 11-acre property despite the mandatory evacuation order. "We had to sign a release form and put down our dentist's phone number," Larsen said, "as if they are going to find our burned corpses."

Larsen, who could see smoke from her property, estimated the fire is three to five miles away. "I'm an ex-firefighter and my house is completely defensible," she said. "There is no reason for me to leave. I don't think the fire is ever going to get here."

Although Larsen said the California Highway Patrol has been strict about not letting residents come and go, she said two days this week officers allowed her neighbor's gardener past the barricade.

"As far as the overall picture," Larsen said. "Everybody is frustrated with the police. I don't like being treated like a criminal."

Larsen said she arranged to have a friend

meet her at the firefighters' barricade to give her 100 pounds of food for her chickens.

But when her friend got there, "she called and said 'don't come, they are going to take you [from the property]," Larsen said. "I had a firefighter friend of mine smuggle it in for me."

Larsen said the few neighbors that chose to stay are sharing food. "We are starting to get a little low on supplies," she said. "But I don't think anybody is in dire straits yet."

Unlike Larsen, Kim Berta, who also lives on Parrot Ranch Road, said she, her husband, Ray, and their son opted to evacuate their three-bedroom house.

While she and her husband are staying at a friend's home on Laureles Grade and their son is staying in Carmel, not knowing when they can return home is unsettling.

"We don't know for sure when we are going to go back," she said, "and that is the biggest question in my mind."

Berta said they spent weeks clearing the brush around their nearly 11-acre property and moved all of their firewood away from the house. "Our place is pretty good because it's an open meadow," she said. "We have a good chance of being defensible."

From Linda Jardine's home off Via Cielo in Cachagua, the sound of helicopters, which fly overhead en route to dropping water on the fire, can be heard around the clock.

Jardine, whose area is under voluntary evacuation, said she will stay there even if a mandatory evacuation is imposed.

"Everyone on our road is planning to stay if there is a mandatory evacuation," Jardine said. "But if we were in imminent danger if the fire was across the road — we would leave."

Although Jardine evacuated her horses, her two emus, tortoises and cats and dogs remain on the property. She said she has a plan to get the animals out if it is necessary.

Jardine said she's attended about a half dozen community meetings in the Cachagua area, which she said has provided valuable information to residents about the fire.

And she praised the efforts by firefighters. "When the firefighters brought us cases

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of bottled water, I thought, 'golly, this is remarkable,'" she said.

Meanwhile, hundreds of firefighters who set up base at the Carmel Valley Airport, pulled up stakes and relocated to the fire Tassajara Road Wednesday.

Airport owner Mary Delfino, who lost a

"By the time they got him to CHOMP's emergency room," Loye said, "he was already in such shape they had to put a shock machine on him to bring him around, which is an indicator of how serious it was."



A three-time Academy Award nominee, Glass is a minimalist who is considered one of the most influential composers of the late 20th century. "The fire, at one point, came within 20-feet of our propane tank," Toren reported. "There were also several flare-ups near our back porch."

Just 150 feet from that back porch is charred forest littered with toppled redwoods. "The library was saved thanks to a bold, aggressive and well executed fire suppression effort," Toren added. "Two helicopters dropped water from the air while a ground crew battled the flames.'

In addition to destroying 27 homes — including several on a ridge directly above the library - the fire was particularly hard on local businesses dependent on summer tourism.

"The library took a serious hit," Toren conceded. "It would be wonderful if people took the opportunity to come to Big Sur and offer us their support."


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

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## Versatile Oaxacan chef keeps diners happy at Ody's Tavern

MAURICIO AQUINO, head chef at Carmel-by-the-Sea's Ody's Tavern (formerly The Village Pub), prepares a pub menu that includes starters, salads, gourmet hot dogs, sandwiches and "serious stuff."

It's the serious stuff that chef Aquino likes to prepare best.

The enchiladas are served with long grained rice cooked in housemade chicken stock with tomatoes,

onion and garlic. Cheese is melted over the top of the enchiladas.

Among the serious stuff taverngoers are especially attracted to, according to Aquino, are grilled baby back ribs with Asian sauce, Monterey Bay sand dabs and chicken Alfredo fettuccine.

Aquino came to the Monterey Peninsula in 1996 from his native Oaxaca, Mexico. He worked in a market there where he learned ingredients and produce. When he arrived here, he was successful in obtaining restaurant work and learned on the job.

#### One step at a time

Aquino started as a carver at Sand City's Boston Market restaurant, staying three years, learning English as he went along.

Then he moved higher up the kitchen ladder at Nico restaurant, across San Carlos Avenue from Ody's Tavern. There he worked as a prep cook for a year before moving on to Fisherman's Wharf in Monterey, first as a cook at Abalonetti Seafood Trattoria for five years, then as a cook at



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Paradiso restaurant where he worked for another four years. He moved to Porto Mexico restaurant on the wharf for a year as a cook before coming to work for Ody's Tavern six months ago as head chef.

> The tavern is owned by Raul Arzadon, who was well known in Carmel as the former bartender at Quail Lodge for several decades, where he had quite a following. Before Quail he worked at the renowned Sadie's restaurant on Ocean Avenue in Carmel (now

PortoBello).

Originally from the Philippines, Arzadon always wanted to own a restaurant, and now that he has one, family members help in running it.

Chef Aquino drew our attention to the oil portrait of

Arzadon displayed to the right of the bar, and to an item on the menu, Adam's Burger, named after Arzadon's son, a freshman in college. It features grilled hamburger topped with bacon and a choice of cheeses.

There are three burgers on the menu, all of them with 8 ounces of "the best hamburger available . . . big, fat, juicy patties," Aquino said.

As a tribute to his heritage, Arzadon has Aquino prepare "Kapitan's Lumpia," a Philippine version of egg

roll served with an Asian sauce, and a sweet and sour sauce. Sometime soon, "adobo" will be added to the menu: A Philippine national dish of braised chicken and pork with coconut milk.


But for the most part, Aquino prepares a standard bar menu of chicken wings, fried calamari, quesadillas, and hot dogs. The hot dogs are "gourmet hot dogs made by Sabrett, "New York's #1 hot dog, renowned for its famous snap." The Sabretts are served with mustard, red onion sauce and sauerkraut, "just like in New York," Aquino said.

A variety of salads, sandwiches, fish and chips and the aforementioned "serious stuff" round out the menu.

The restaurant, divided between dining area and bar, boasts two large televisions, a music center, and a Wii interactive game, which children particularly enjoy before and after dinner.

Aquino's favorite pastimes in his off hours are music he serves as DJ at parties with friends — and watching soccer games. But mostly he likes being at home in Seaside with his wife, Margarita, and their three-year-old son, Alexander.

Ody's Tavern is located on San Carlos Avenue between Ocean and Seventh, next to the Gem Restaurant, and is open seven days a week for lunch (except Monday) from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. and dinner nightly from 5 to 9 p.m. The bar remains open until 1:30 a.m. For reservations or information, call (831) 626-6821.

condition of the teens.

The Christensen boys, both Monterey High School students, played on the football team, according to the school's 2007 yearbook, which also lists them as sophomores that year although The Pine Cone was informed they are in different grades.

Handley Drive, outside the Carmel-bythe-Sea city limits, is a cul de sac neighborhood just south of the Carpenter Street exit off Highway 1. Suspect still on the loose

Warren said Monday detectives were working to identify a suspect, who used a .25 caliber handgun in the assault.

'We are pursuing our leads on this," Warren said.

Since no suspect had been identified, it was impossible to determine if the shooter was affiliated with a gang.

Violent incidents involving firearms are almost unheard of in Carmel, so a double shooting obviously alarmed nearby residents.

and information technology. I worked in the IT department assisting students with their language as it pertained to computers. I also taught at a college that prepares Ukrainian students to teach English in grammar school.

For the first three months in Stakhanov, I lived with a host family as I had in Vasilkov. Then I was supposed to move into a flat of my own. Well, I'm the guest who came for three months and ended up staying almost three years. I lived with a wonderful family, a mom and her daughter, in a small house just outside of town. Slava, my host-mother, was a widow whose son, a sergeant in the Soviet army, was killed 24 years ago in Afghanistan. Lena, my host-sister, was a charming and attractive woman who works as a manager in a supermarket.

In addition to teaching, one of the joys I had was helping around the garden. We had very generous grapevines, apple trees and tomato plants. I had to help bring in the harvest. We also had a garden full of vegetables. In late summer, there was a flurry of activity while everything that could be was canned. We also prepared some delicious homemade wine and spirits.

I traveled to many places in the country. One of the good things about Ukraine is the railway system. It may not be the most comfortable or the smoothest ride, but it is inexpensive and you can get to practically every city in the country by rail. A trip from Stakhanov to Kiev, a distance of about 400 miles, cost just \$20 for a berth in a four-person compartment.

The academy where I taught had been around a long time. The equipment and training materials were a old and outdated, but the students were bright and motivated and they made do. And they appreciated having a native English speaker around, which was pretty novel in a city that gets few tourists.

The time I spent in this country was by far more educational for me than it was for my students. Ukraine is a challenge in a lot of ways. It's developing and it needs a lot of work. The people I met were marvelous. The food was great. I was sad to leave.

Service in the Peace Corps is rewarding and demanding. If you have ever considered lending your talents and testing your resourcefulness for a couple of years, you can do no better than to be a volunteer.



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

## Editorial

## 'I'm here, now stop'

IF SOMEONE moves next door to an airport, should they be taken seriously if they start complaining about airplane noise?

The answer is obviously No. When someone buys a home not far from a runway, he gets a discount equal to the reduced value of the home with a noise problem compared to one that's quiet. So when he closes escrow, he benefits from the noise of airplanes near the home. As soon as he moves in, he may start paying the price for the discount he received, but this is a classic quid pro quo in which government (meaning taxpayers) should play no role or have any obligation.

Similarly, anyone living in the neighborhood around the Golden Bough Theater in Carmel must be assumed to have known when they moved in there was a movie and/or live theater nearby, with its concomitant traffic, parking and noise problems. Accordingly, they cannot expect city hall to be on their side if they start asking for the theater to be closed down just because they have arrived.

Nothing stops newcomers from trying to buy the theater — or anything else they don't like operating near their home — and close it themselves. And they always have the option of getting involved in the theater company and trying to bring about modifications that would lessen its impact on their neighborhood.

Or they could just hope and pray that the theater company's leadership would decide to do this on their own.

Fortunately for the people who live and own property near the Golden Bough today, this is exactly what has already happened. The board of directors and management of Pacific Repertory Theatre have launched an ambitious program to turn the Golden Bough from something of an embarrassment — replete with all sorts of in-your-face impacts on surrounding homes — into a modern showplace which promises to be much quieter, more attractive and generally friendlier to nearby residents.

Of course, PacRep should invite the neighbors to be part of the process of fine-tuning the design to make sure it's as beneficial as possible, not only to the theater company and its audiences, but to the people who live on Casanova, Monte Verde and other nearby streets. And when those neighborhood meetings

## New novel previews a world without lies

COULD LYING ever become obsolete? In author Michael Hemp's new novel, "The Nadjik Pheromone," advances in lie-detecting technology make it impossible to avoid telling the truth.





a housing shortage in California, and state law does not allow this city or any city to deny housing based on subjective environmental impacts."

At that point, another commissioner, Robin Wilson, said he was confused.

"If we are told by professional it's visually significant, I think we have to accept that," Wilson said. "But here we have a state law that says, if a project is housing, it overrides everything except health and safety."

Mandurrago said he had tried to incorporate the existing building into the project, which he calls Plaza del Mar, but that just isn't feasible, especially with all the parking he wants to place underground.

# The man who inspired them all

T THE end of his life, the great composer Johannes Brahms was asked to look back on his life and was he had accomplished.

What he cited tells a lot about the importance of the man honored by the Carmel Bach Festival.

"He said he was most proud, not of his own music, but of J.S. Bach's — and not of performing it, but publishing it," said Bruno Weil, Music Director and Conductor for The Carmel Bach Festival. "Before that, Bach's work was scattered all over the place."

The effort Brahms made to assemble what is known as the Bach Edition of 1850 is testament to the importance of Bach's music to the composers who came after him.

"Not only his famous sons, but Mozart, Haydn, Handel and Beethoven," said Bach Fest Education Director David Gordon.

The development of classical music in the 18th and 19th centuries is one of the themes of this year's Bach Festival along with the parallel development of keyboard instruments.

"We want to show the transition from one composer to the next and one composition to the next," Weil offered.

And there are plenty of opportunities to

# Johann Sebastian Bach and why we honor him

HE MAN whose musical genius is celebrated at the Carmel Bach Festival, and who inspired generations of other great composers, has a reputation for having been a dour, serious person who worked hard all the time and didn't laugh much.

While we will never know how much laughter there was in the Bach household for the simple reason that laughter leaves no record of itself, we do know that certain well documented events of his childhood would have made any one of us into a humorless person, if not outright depressed.

Think of it: In 1695, young Johann Sebastian lost his mother, then his father remarried within a few months, only to die soon after. Bach was, at the age of 10, left in the care of a stepmother whom he had only just met.

Even for the 17th century — when serious illness routinely carried people off while their families watched helplessly, waiting for antibiotics to be invented and invoking the Will of God — this was serious stuff.

Perhaps inevitably, the situation with the stepmother didn't work out and the 10-year-old was soon bundled off to live with his brother, Johann Christoph, then 24 and just married.

Johann Christoph, like virtually the whole family, was in the music business, making a living playing, singing and composing in the service of a church, duke, or town.

This big brother became Bach's harpsichord and composition teacher and, surely in an effort to keep his pupil from outgrowing his instruction too quickly, did not allow the youngster to study a manuscript containing pieces by several thenfamous composers. Johann Sebastian tried to get around this rule by copying the forbidden pieces by moonlight over several months. Of course his disobedience was punished and the copy destroyed, which must have been heartbreaking, yet another assault on a normal childhood.

#### Childhood ended

By the time J. S. Bach was 15, whatever childhood he had was over. He moved to Lüneburg in the north of Germany to sing in the Matins Choir, first as a boy soprano, then as a tenor. It must have been clear to him even then that his whole life would be music, whatever form it might take: singing, fiddling, playing keyboards, teaching, arranging and composing.

He was, at 15, a hardworking, professional, underpaid musician, and would remain so for the rest of his life, moving from one North German town to another, fol-

lowing the work. Bach made his music in the service of orthodox Lutheranism, which was rather high-church with elaborate music, as opposed to the thenfashionable Pietism, in which music played a much smaller role.

Pietism, a bit like presentday Charismatic Christianity, with its emphasis on a personal relationship to God, may not have gone as far as altar calls and speaking in tongues, but it was of that general tendency.

Lutheran Orthodoxy — a direct descendant of Martin Luther's break with the Catholic Church in 1521 was Bach's faith, and it went for solemnity and glory in the service of God, and, above all, more music. Did he adhere to the faith because that's where the work was?

On the contrary, Bach evidently was completely sincere, and, lucky man, never seems to have had doubts.

It is well documented that Bach didn't suffer fools gladly. He hated having to teach Latin and music to unruly teenagers, and he regularly refused to do so, to the repeated distress of his employers. He also couldn't bear inferior musicians and, in a story on which all biographers agree, once took off his wig and threw it at an incompetent harpsichordist!


He sometimes showed an indifference to the rules, as when he asked for, and got, a month off from Arnstadt to go to Lübeck and hear the Danish composer and organist Buxtehude, and showed up back at work four months later, not even having written to let his boss know.

We know how important Bach's music

is, but in his day, he was unfavorably compared to Telemann and Kuhnau, and many others who are now completely forgotten.

Despite all of this, Bach was not a revolutionary. He accepted his calling and his station. He set himself the task of making his faith audible, and succeeded to an extent that is still not completely known.

His music speaks strongly to our secular age, meaning even more than it meant to the devout Lutherans of 1750 Leipzig. Who knows what comfort and inspiration people will draw from him in the future.

enjoy the exposition of the music of Bach and his followers.

Gordon said one outstanding example is the chance to hear Bach's masterpiece, the B Minor Mass, in the Saturday evening program, followed by Brahm's German Requiem on Sunday afternoon (July 19-20 and 26-27 and August 2-3). "Hearing them both in one weekend is something you could only do at a festival," he said.

Another wonderful example is the Tuesday night program, "Aha! Concerto."

"The program has several aspects, including the development of the concerto and the transition from the harpsiIt's Music to Our Ears:

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chord to the fortepiano to the modern piano," Weil said. Not only does the Aha! Concerto program feature outstanding musical performances, the audience also has the chance to put the pieces in context.

"We'll be reading from letters and explaining why the composers wrote what they did," Gordon said. "It's not a lecture concert, it's an entertainment. It's the third year we've been doing this format and I love it."

Weil also said the Thursday night program, at which all six Brandenburg Concertos will be performed, is unusual. And Gordon said Friday night's program promises to be memorable.

"We have these fabulous symphonies, by Bach's son and Haydn, along with Beethoven's Egmont Overture and a Mozart piano concerto," Gordon said. "It's the first time we'll be using the Carmel Music Society's Hamburg Steinway in 15 years."

Opening night, July 19, includes a pre-concert reception — which offers a perfect opportunity for patrons to meet the Bach Fest's new Executive Director, Camille Kolles.

"We are certainly lucky to have her," Weil commented.



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
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
