John Kenney gives his house to his lawyer

Attorney asking \$625,000 for home with 'inspiring views'

THE ONE-ACRE property and threebedroom home at 80 Southbank Road in Carmel Valley were the scene of an infamous double murder.

Last week, the man convicted of shooting his neighbors gave the house to the attorney who unsuccessfully defended him. And the attorney immediately put it up for sale.

At the Monterey County Jail, where he is at the beginning of what promises to be a life sentence without the possibility of parole, John Kenney signed a deed last Thursday giving his former home to Thomas J. Nolan of the

Palo Alto law firm, Nolan, Armstrong & Barton LLP. And the attorney promptly listed it with Sotheby's International Realty for \$625,000.

Kenney was convicted Sept. 17 of murdering Mel and Elizabeth Grimes after a long-running dispute over a shared driveway. He is to be sentenced Nov. 3.

According to a Sotheby's website, the listing of the Kenney home is "new this week." It describes the threebedroom, two-bath house as a "mountain side retreat" with "inspiring views" and a "spacious master bedroom with sunroom addition and office."

According to testimony at the trial — which ended with Kenney convicted of second-degree murder for shooting

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Internet advertising for the former home of convicted murderer John Kenney was launched this week after Kenney gave the home to his defense attorney.

Mel Grimes, and first-degree murder for gunning down Elizabeth Grimes as she tried to help her mortally wounded husband - it was also where Kenney waited in January 2007 for his neighbors to come home after he placed a boulder on part of the driveway he claimed was his, but which the Grimeses routinely used to access their carport.

According to the prosecutor in the case, Berkley Brannon, a title search showed the Grimeses had an easement to use the disputed part of the driveway.

Kenney, 73, testified he asked Monterey County Sheriff's deputies, along with several personal advisers, to

TAMC concedes Hatton Canyon trail needs EIR

THE COST of a hiking and bike path through Hatton Canyon, which opponents have dubbed "The Trail to Nowhere," just went up.

The Transportation Agency for Monterey County agreed this week to pay for a full environmental impact report before it tries to construct a 1.7-mile bicycle and walking path between Canyon Drive and the Carmel River. Before agreeing to fund the EIR, the agency estimated the project would cost \$3.8 million.

A group of neighbors living near the proposed trail calling itself "Save Hatton Canyon" — insists the project brings too much development into what the neighbors believe is an environmentally sensitive area. Activists successfully stopped the Hatton Canyon Freeway project with the same argument.

"It's a massive road, not a bicycle trail," said Joe Krings, who lives near the canyon. "You can't just mow down wet-

State official: P.B. revised plan won't have golf course

A REVISED version of a plan by the Pebble Beach Co. that called for a new equestrian center, hotel rooms and employee housing could be unveiled by the end of the year, but without its most contentious component — an 18-hole golf course — according to a senior staff member with the California Coastal Commission.

The project, called the "The Del Monte Forest Plan:

Forest Preservation and Development Limitations," was unveiled eight years ago. It included a cap on building in the forest and would have created large open-space preserves.

The plan was embraced by residents and county officials as it made its way through a lengthy permit process, but was rejected by the coastal commission last year after the agency decided the golf course would do too much damage to "environmentally

county officials liked the original plan, but the coastal commission vetoed it

sensitive habitat" — especially Monterey pine forest. To appease the commission, while still getting some use of its land, the Pebble Beach Co. will likely abandon the golf course proposed for the site of the equestrian center, a coastal commission planner told The Pine Cone this week

"We have been discussing an option that wouldn't have a golf course," said Dan Carl, manager of the commission's central coast district office in Santa Cruz.

The golf course the company wanted to build would have involved cutting thousands of Monterey pines — one of the world's most plentiful tree species, but which the commission decided needs special protection in its native range.

"We said that, from our perspective, a golf course wouldn't be part of the package, at least of that scale," Carl said. "And they said they're not interested in a smaller scale."

Though nothing has been formally submitted, in addition to eliminating the golf course, the revised plan will probably also be scaled down in other respects.

"It may not be as big an expansion as they had pro-

DUI driver wants mental exam by third doctor

ONE DOCTOR believes Deborah King is fit to be tried for murder and vehicular manslaughter in the Sept. 2 death of 35-year-old Joel Woods, but another said she is not. On Wednesday, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Adrienne Grover said she wants the differences in opinion settled and put the matter off until Nov. 7 so the defendant could undergo further analysis.

Police arrested and jailed the 51-year-old Monterey resident after she allegedly ran down Woods with her BMW SUV as he picked up his son from Pacific Grove Middle School. Officers determined she was under the influence of prescription drugs at the time. Because King had accumulated five DUI charges in another county a decade ago, the district attorney's office filed murder and gross vehicular manslaughter charges based

m THREE MONTHS after it began operating, a high-tech filtration system built specifically to irrigate Pebble Beach golf courses and other open space with reclaimed sewage is running smoothly, according to its operators.

The reverse osmosis system — which forces treated wastewater through microfilters, removing virtually all contaminants — pumps more than one million gallons of water daily from the Carmel Area Wastewater District plant to a reservoir in Pebble Beach where it is used for irrigation.

Some of the treated water is also flowing to the Carmel River Lagoon to improve the habitat for native plants and animals.

"The plant is running peachy keen," said Mark Scheiter, CAWD plant superintendent.

The reverse osmosis system, which began oper-

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Father Serra - Sainthood was proposed for Father Junipero Serra 60 years ago by the Catholic Diocese of Monterey-Fresno. The laborious process has moved slowly since. In 1985, the Vatican recognized Serra as worthy for establishing the Spanish missions in California during the 18th

century. In 1986, Pope John Paul II declared the priest venerable, and was expected to beatify him in September 1987 while visiting Serra's grave at the Carmel Mission. But Indian protests erupted. Some historians and Catholics see Serra as a hero who brought Christianity to save the souls of thousands of California Indians, while other historians and Indian descendants see him as a brutal force of cultural genocide. Most Indians died young from various diseases brought by the Spanish, and some were treated as captives and slaves. A year after his Carmel visit, the pope did beatify Serra and move him one step from sainthood, but the controversy simmers on. (Next week: Asilomar)

Commission wants control of demolition permits, nixes clad windows

CARMEL PLANNING commissioners believe they, not members of the design review board, should be in charge of approving demolitions in the city. They voted Oct. 8 to recommend the city council make that change.

At issue was the workload, according to planning and building services manager Sean Conroy. The commission handles general plan updates, the creation and revision of policies and ordinances, and other broad issues, while the DRB handles most design applications.

"Right now, the design review board reviews applications that don't require a use permit," Conroy said. "A lot of the land use projects don't require use permits, so the DRB agendas tend to be longer."

In September, the city council discussed that imbalance, and instead of recommending merging the two bodies into one, it suggested requiring use permits for all demolitions, Conroy told the commission Oct. 8.

"That would kick all demolitions and rebuilds into planning commission review," he explained, while the DRB would continue considering substantial alterations and other

But at the meeting, Conroy proposed another solution: simply revising the code to state that only the planning commission can vote on demolitions.

"Use permits have a fee associated with them, and more paperwork and staff time are involved," he said. In addition, use permits require a four-fifths affirmative vote in order to

The commission unanimously agreed with Conroy's recommendation to amend the municipal code, which must be done by the city council.

Meanwhile, in the ongoing debate about the acceptability

"The windows have come a long way," planning and building services manager Sean Conroy said of the aluminum-clad versions, which can be difficult to distinguish from painted wood windows.

'Clad windows are easier to maintain, and when properly detailed, have an appearance very similar to wood," Conroy

They also need painting much less frequently than wood windows, especially in oceanfront areas.

'A long, long way'

Nevertheless, Conroy advised the planning commission to deny Dunbar's request, because unclad wood windows would better match the architectural style of his home and are preferred by the city's design guidelines, which call for natural materials unless style dictates another material is more appropriate.

"I have for a long time thought aluminum-clad wood windows were a good idea, and I think technology has come a long, long way," commented commissioner Robin Wilson.

He wanted to approve the application but got no support from his fellow commissioners, so it was denied.

Commissioner Steve Hillyard suggested revamping the code to allow clad windows, if that's what city officials want, to "put everyone on an even playing field."

Peace Corps in Tanzania has school and students — but no books

Dave and Wendy Banks, Carmel residents who put their lives on hold to serve as Peace Corps volunteers in East Africa, have a message for their friends, family and supporters back home: Send books.

"They are teaching high school over there and have absolutely no materials," explained longtime friend Judy Kirk, who lives at Del Mesa Carmel.

The Bankses — she a retired public school teacher, he a retired pharmacist — left the Peninsula in June to work in Tanzania. When the four dozen Peace Corps volunteers bound for Africa assembled in Washington, D.C., to make the trip, the Bankses found they were the only couple, and two of only four older folks amidst many college students and other young workers. "We said we could be mom and dad to anyone who needs some TLC," they wrote in a June 10 blog entry.

After arriving in Africa, and undergoing training and learning the ins and outs of their host country, including its cultural mores and language, the Bankses and the other volunteers were officially sworn in as Peace Corps workers during a ceremo-

ny Aug. 20.

A week later, they arrived in their new home village of Malindi. The village is about 1.5 hours "via dala dala and foot," from Lushoto, where they can go online when the power is on, do their banking and pick up supplies. (A dala dala is an African minibus or shared taxi.)

"This is a cooler, mountain area which stays green yearround and has an abundant supply of fresh fruits and veggies. We are nestled in one of many valleys where everyone farms," they wrote, describing their home as comfortable and new, with an outdoor area for cooking and showering. "We do not have electricity but can read and play cards by lantern light at night. The southern sky is beautiful at night, as it is so

And the people are warm and welcoming: "All the walking up and down valleys is delightful, and the villagers are extremely friendly: Greet, re-greet and then greet some more."

During the next several weeks, they got situated, and one blog entry recounted observations of the potato harvest as women dug up the plants, bagged the little spuds, sewed the sacks shut and carried them on their heads to the side of the road to wait for a market-bound lorry. They attended a workshop, participated in health clinics and worked on a health education program to be implemented in a primary school.

On Sept. 27, the Bankses described embarking on their first adventures as teachers in the local school, where he is handling biology and she is covering English.

"Picture a classroom with only wooden desks, blackboard and chalk ... that's it. Oh, and 80 eager-to-learn students jammed into benches, four per bench," they wrote. The students are 14 to 18 years old and learn in English. More than 325 attend the school, with another 180 kids set to join them in January.

But they have no books at all, and the Bankses urged their blog readers and others to collect and send classroom reference books in all subjects, as well as fiction and nonfiction, magazines like Scientific American and National Geographic, sports books, dictionaries, "anything." They also suggested sending some simpler books that

Big Sur stockpiles sand

THE SUN is shining and there is hardly a cloud on the horizon, but that isn't stopping residents from worrying about will happen when winter rains come to Big Sur.

With entire hillsides stripped bare of vegetation as a result of the devastating summer wildfires, officials now worry mudslides could devastate the Big Sur community. In response, many locals are stockpiling one of the oldest deterrents against flooding — sandbags.

With little fanfare, the Monterey County Public Works Department recently delivered 35 tons of sand to a large Highway 1 turnout located just south of Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park. "The sand just showed up on our doorstep," explained Martha Karstens, assistant chief of the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade. "We didn't know it was coming."

According to interim maintenance manager Shawn Atkins, public works has increased the amount of sand it typically delivers to Big Sur residents at the request of Cal Fire, the state fire protection agency.

The free sand is available to any resident. "Just go get it," Karstens suggested.

The fire brigade is also offering free bags. For more information, call (831) 667-2113.

While stuffing sand into bags might sound like drudgery, one resident is turning the task into a festive event. At Riverside Campground and Cabins, manager Amanda Rideout is hosting a sandbagging barbecue this weekend for her family and friends. Four of Riverside's cabins, it turns out, lie in the flood plain of the Big Sur River, which will likely be inundated by mud and debris this winter.

"We have 3,000 bags and a huge pile of sand," Rideout added. "We're building a flood wall."

Emergency team volunteers honored by President

FIFTY-SEVEN MEMBERS of the Pebble Beach Community Emergency Response Team who helped residents cope during winter storms and put in more than 2,400 combined hours of work this year will be applauded at the Oct. 31 meeting of the Pebble Beach Community Services District board. Each member will receive the national President's Volunteer Service Gold Award, according to Cal Fire Capt. Jennifer Valdez.

Established in 2003, the award is given annually to people, groups and families who "have demonstrated exemplary citizenship through volunteering." At the PBCSD meeting, each person will receive a gold lapel pin, certificate and congratulatory letters from President George W. Bush and the President's Council on Service & Civic Participation.

"For a newly formed organization, the Pebble Beach Community Emergency Response Team has a remarkable history of volunteer service," Valdez said. "It shows how many hours they've given back to the community, and I think it's a great way to be recognized."

The volunteers, who underwent CERT


training provided by the fire department, help in their neighborhoods and the community by doing public outreach, patrolling fire roads, assisting firefighters and other emergency workers during local disasters, standing by in case their skills are needed at special events, and undertaking ongoing monthly training. "I want to stress what a major accomplishment this is," Valdez said.

The latest CERT course began this week, it's not too late to sign up, and everyone is welcome to participate in the free training, according to Valdez.

Topics include hands-on use of fire extinguishers, disaster preparedness, disaster medical operations such as how to treat life-threatening conditions and do triage, light search-and-rescue operations, how CERT fits in with professional emergency responders and its members' roles during major incidents, how to tell if someone is coping during an emergency, how "to deal with all the horrible things you see in disasters," and facts about terrorism. The course culminates with a day of demonstrating skills as a team.

"We turn the station and engine bays into a disaster site," Valdez said, and people pretend to be victims.

With little vegetation left to burn, Chalk Fire's days are numbered

HIGHWAY 1 was closed at Limekiln State Park Thursday as the Chalk Fire burned close to the scenic route, dropping rocks and debris on the pavement.

Thankfully, despite road delays and thick smoke, the fire appeared to pose little risk to the nearby New Camaldoli Hermitage, which is located just north of the state park.

"The only issue we have right now is that the fire is kicking rocks," explained Martha Karstens, assistant chief of the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade. "The hermitage is looking good, the east side is looking good, and there's nothing left to burn to the south."

The fire started Sept. 27 near Chalk Peak, which is located south of Nacimiento-Fergusson Road, but quickly jumped the narrow and winding route through the moun-

Although a few spot fires have been reported south of the road, nearly all the present fire activity is located north of it. The road remains closed to make way for firefighting operations.

"We're very happy with the way the fire is going," Karstens added. "It will eventually

burn itself out."

The fire has consumed more than 15,000 acres. The cost to date for fighting the fire is more than \$21 million. A total of 32 fire engines, 11 helicopters, 10 air tankers and five bulldozers have been involved in the firefighting effort.

More than 700 firefighters, including 20 local volunteers, have battled the blaze, with 17 injuries reported. Other agencies participating in the effort include Cal Fire, the U.S. Forest Service, the Monterey County Sheriff's Office and the California Highway

The cause of the fire is still under investigation. The Pine Cone received an unconfirmed report that it was accidentally caused by hunters.

City announces street closures

PUBLIC WORKS superintendent Stu Ross announced the dates of road construction that will disrupt drivers, walkers and cyclists in downtown Carmel in late October and early November.

Sunset Center's south parking lot, which is in dire need of repaving, will be resurfaced

On Nov. 3 and 4, Scenic Road along the beach will undergo slurry sealing, making it off-limits to walkers, motorists, cyclists and anyone other than the people doing the work. On Monday, Scenic will be closed from Ocean to Eighth Avenue, as well as from 13th Avenue to the southern city limit. On Tuesday — Election Day — the beach-front road will be closed between Eighth and 13th avenues. Work hours both days will run from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

And on Nov. 4 and 5, crews will work throughout the night — between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. — to remove and replace crosswalks on Ocean Avenue. Detours will be available, and will change as work progresses.

Don Chapin Company will handle the projects, according to an agreement approved by the Carmel City Council this

The company estimated it will cost \$46,240 to slurry seal Scenic Road, \$25,993 to redo the crosswalks and \$55,052 to repave the south lot at Sunset Center.

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
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
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Smoldering butt sets P.B. garage ablaze

A CARELESSLY discarded cigarette set a garage on fire in Pebble Beach Wednesday morning, but the fortuitous location of a fire engine parked just around the corner led to the quick dousing of the flames.

Cal Fire Battalion Chief Dennis Carreiro said a crew from the Pebble Beach fire station was working on equipment on nearby Huckleberry Hill when a neighbor called 911 at 9:30 a.m. Oct. 22 to report smoke and flames coming from the garage of a home on Costado Road. Carreiro estimated the smoldering began around 8:45 a.m. when the man who lives there apparently discarded a cigarette before he got into his car and left - not realizing the butt landed on a stack of folded shop towels. "It appears he missed the trash can," Carreiro said.

Responding to the 911 call, three firefighters could see smoke coming from the garage — but firefighting rules prohibited them from entering the garage until another engine arrived. So they hooked up to a nearby hydrant, ensured the flames had not reached into the home itself and made sure nobody was home. Once a second engine arrived, they were able to break into the garage and fight the fire — using the least amount of water needed, so as not to cause unnecessary damage.

"Two of our sharpest guys were on the nozzle," Carreiro said. "They let steam do the work." (When water comes in contact with high heat, it turns into steam, which interrupts combustion without drenching everything.)

The fire was confined to the empty side of the garage where the resident's car had been. Damage from the flames, smoke, heat and water was limited to the walls, ceiling, work bench, lights and tools, and totalled an estimated \$25,000.

Carreiro said the Mercedes parked in the garage's other space would probably be fine following a thorough detailing.


A total of 20 firefighters from Pebble Beach Fire Department, Cypress Fire Protection District, Monterey Fire Department and Cal Fire responded to the incident.

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Sculptor allowed to keep his extra-wide gallery doors

WHO KNEW an argument over a door would have such a galvanizing effect?

More than a dozen people attended a design review board meeting in Carmel City Hall Wednesday evening for the debate over the doors in sculptor Steven Whyte's Dolores Street gallery and art studio. Some said the doorway's 8-foot width violates the rules for downtown and looks like it belongs in a shopping mall, while others argued the doors are nice looking and enable people to see an artist at work.

Assistant planner Marc Wiener said planners believed Whyte's plans for remodeling his Su Vecino Court storefront called for a

single door and side lights, not a double

"It was not indicated how the door would open; however, staff assumed that the door would open in a traditional pivoting manner," he wrote in his Oct. 22 report for the board. According to commercial design guidelines, "Entrances to stores should not be excessively wide, and single doors are strongly encouraged."

Wiener suggested Whyte be allowed to keep the door, but "the side light panels shall remain closed at all times."

The sculptor said he was surprised to learn the doors were an issue and that he

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





According to the deed signed last week, the gift of

the home was to satisfy the \$400,000 debt, plus 6 percent interest per year. Presumably, after selling the home, Nolan will pay off the \$250,000 mortgage and keep whatever is left as his fee for defending Kenney.

It's also safe to assume the new owner will be aware that the neighboring house, where Mel and Elizabeth Grimes lived, has a driveway easement over part of Kenney's land.



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

ating in mid-July, eliminates the need for about 42 million gallons of drinking water per year that had been used to irrigate the greens — and that's on top of saving hundreds of millions of gallons of drinking water that the first phase of water treatment had replaced.

Treated water from the first phase, which went online in 1994, proved to be too salty for the sensitive greens of Pebble Beach and other golf courses, which had to be periodically flushed with drinking water.

The newest plant, which uses the same technology as a desalination plant deploys to turn saltwater into potable water, is probably the first of its kind built for golf-course irrigation. "Honestly, I don't know if there is anything like this anywhere in the world," said CAWD general manager Ray von Dohren.

While most reverse osmosis systems are designed to handle constant flows of water, the CAWD plant was designed to handle a variable flow, which called for some special design

'Our reverse osmosis unit has to go fast and slow, fast and slow, and they aren't designed to do that," Scheiter said.

The treated water from the reverse osmosis plant, which produces about 750 gallons per minute, is pumped directly to golf courses and athletic fields in Del Monte Forest, or to the 100 million-gallon Forest Lake Reservoir, where it can be

In the summer, Pebble Beach golf courses require up to

4.5 million gallons of water per day.

Though the new system has had few snags in light of its unique design, Scheiter said it hasn't been completely fool-

"We had to make a few minor changes here and there," he said. "Fifteen to 20 percent of what you build is going to be problematic. We have had about 5 percent."

When water comes out of the facility, it is so pure it has a lower salt content and fewer minerals than drinking water.

"We actually have to add salinity and hardness back to the water so it doesn't damage the greens," Scheiter said.

For golfers and for fish


Water that goes through the plant not only irrigates the greens, but about 160,000 gallons per day are pumped into the Carmel River lagoon to boost the water level for the threatened steelhead trout habitat.

"We discharge it into the lagoon about two hours a day," von Dohren said. "Then we turn it off, and we discharge into Pebble Beach" for the remaining 22 hours.

The system allows water at the reservoir to be stored during the winter months, when the demand is lowest, so it can be used for the golf courses and athletic fields in summer, when the demand for water is at its peak.

Scheiter said it's expected a few hundred thousand gallons more water per day will be pumped to the reservoir within the next few months.

'We are only running the reverse osmosis facility at twothirds of capacity," he said. "Once the flows pick up due to the rainy cycle, we will probably will kicking it up to 1.4 million to 1.5 million gallons per day.'





than 150 letters opposing the project to TAMC in the last sev-

Plans call for the paved portion of the trail to be 12 feet wide, with a 4-foot shoulder of decomposed granite for walkers. The project would also feature a lighted Carmel Valley Road underpass.

TAMC planned to approve permits for the path with a mitigated negative declaration — a much less thorough, and cheaper, type of environmental review based on the conclusion that a project would not have any serious consequences for the environment. But the concerns of residents convinced the county to pay for the EIR.

"It was decided to do the study, because there were enough comments," project manager Todd Muck explained. "We decided it was prudent to do an EIR."

Muck declined to guess how much the EIR would cost, but he said he was confident it wouldn't delay the project, which is scheduled to begin in late 2009.

The trail aims to provide a bicycle and walking route between the Crossroads, Carmel Rancho and Barnyard shopping centers, Carmel High School, and adjacent residential and recreational areas.

The project is a partnership between California State Parks, the Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District, the Big Sur Land Trust, Caltrans and TAMC.





Robert Edward Tierney died Friday night in his home in Carmel, CA of prostate cancer. Bob is survived by Sally Masterson Tierney, his bride of fifty years, their four married children, eleven grandchildren and countless friends, whom he loved dearly. Bob led an exciting and exemplary life, dedicated to service for his country, family and

An only child, raised in the Midwest, Bob's aspiration as a young boy was to become a soldier statesman. In 1958 he graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point and began flight training. He was a pilot in Strategic Air Command during the Cuban Missile Crisis and in 1965 he joined the Central Intelligence Agency where he was awarded the Certificate of Distinction. Bob led a distinguished career in the CIA serving his country in Laos, Singapore, Japan and ultimately in the U.S. Mission to the United Nations under Ambassador Jeanne Kirkpatrick. Throughout, he earned a strong reputation for integrity, independent thinking, and disciplined intelligence. As one senior diplomat recalls with a smile "Bob was always the one to ask the question that none of us wanted to answer..." Bob was equally engaged and inquisitive with his family; at home his favorite seat was at the family dinner table, where his probing inquiry was balanced with wit, patience and love.

During his career, Bob and Sally moved over fifteen times and engaged in each community as if it were their hometown, setting roots and "giving back." After retiring from government in 1983, Bob and Sally moved from New York City to Camden, ME, where they opened a family business, "The Maine Stay" Bed & Breakfast. Gregarious by nature, a gifted conversationalist, and quick with a (long) joke, Bob became a popular innkeeper and civic leader. He led the Camden Economic Council and he created The Camden Conference, a nationally renowned education and policy program focused on foreign affairs, now in its twenty-second year. Bob was instrumental in the development of the Institute for Global Ethics and, following the suicide of a close friend, he co-founded the Depression Awareness Program. Bob's ability to create institutions that continue to thrive today derived from a unique balance of imagination and leadership, optimism and discipline.

In 2000, Bob and Sally officially retired to Carmel, CA, to settle in the home they had purchased in 1975, next door to Sally's parents. The following year, Bob was diagnosed with advanced prostate cancer. Bob's enthusiasm for life and devotion to his Faith, together with the support of his outstanding doctors, sustained him and those surrounding him for seven wonderful years.

With daily intent, Bob lived an authentic and prosperous life. He served his country with honor abroad and at home. He helped to build stronger communities. He delighted himself and others with his recreational pursuits, as an adventurous sailor exploring Midcoast Maine, an outdoorsman on weekly treks with his hiking club, and as an enthusiastic bass singer in the Carmel Mission Choir.

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


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Coming soon to Sunset Center: Lions and tigers and bears



Bates, whose cartoons have been featured in The Pine Cone since 1972, suffered a heart attack in July. While recovering at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula, he contracted a staph infection and has been hospitalized ever since.

Doctors repaired Bates' heart, but the infection has kept him in CHOMP's intensive care unit for nearly four months.

According to Bates' friend, David Loye, the cartoonist's wife, Lei Lei and his daughter, Chelsea need help with basic living expenses.

Although Bates has shown signs of improvement, he still has a long road to recovery, Loye said.

Gallery features political wisdom of Dr. Seuss

WITH FILM and pop stars — and even plumbers and hockey moms — weighing in on next month's hotly contested presidential contest, it seems only reasonable that the Cat in the Hat is dispensing political advice.

The Hanson Gallery hosts an opening reception, Saturday, Oct. 25, for a new exhibit, "Dr. Seuss for President," which pays tribute to the political cartoons, views and activism of Ted Geisel. Under the name of Dr. Seuss, he penned and illustrated popular children's books like "The Cat in the Hat," "Green, Eggs and Ham" and "Horton Hears a Who." Geisel, who died in 1991, was also the creator of the timeless Christmas classic, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas!"


Before he achieved fame as Dr. Seuss, Geisel was a successful political cartoonist during World War II. Not shy about his liberal views and an outspoken opponent of fascism, he enthusiastically supported the war effort, praising the leadership of President Franklin D. Roosevelt at every opportunity. His primary targets included Hitler, Mussolini and anyone critical of Roosevelt, which included Congress, the Republican Party and several influential U.S. newspapers.

Geisel's passion for activism had a profound influence on his most popular work, "The Cat in the Hat." In 1954, Life magazine featured a report on illiteracy, concluding that children were have difficulty with reading because the books they were reading were boring. Geisel's publisher challenged him to write a book with only the most important 348 words, and by the time "Cat in the Hat was finished, the author had whit-

Dessert is not included, but considering how much money you save, you might as well commit to the sinfully good Mississippi Black & Tan Mud Pie, a tower of chocolate and coffee ice creams atop a cookie crust and doused in chocolate and caramel sauces. Not for the faint of heart.

And if sitting through a movie after all that might spark spontaneous narcolepsy — or you'd rather see a matinee, since only "The Dark Knight" is showing in the evening the movie tickets need not be used the same night you dine. Just keep them and show up at the theater whenever the time is right — as long as it's not a Friday or Saturday, the deal's blackout nights.

BBQ and a Movie makes a great gift, too, pointed out Neikirk, whose wife came up with the Dinner and a Movie concept so popular with Tollner's Montrio restaurant customers. Not only are they fun and convenient, but they don't weigh much, don't take up any space and will not go bad when purchased well in advance.



would have to ask the DRB for permission to use them.

"Nobody questioned us how the doors were going to work. The building inspector signed off on them as doors, not as doors and side lights," he said. "I knew they were larger than normal doors. That's why we applied for the design, and had there been any questions, we would have modified the design accordingly.

Whyte said he designed the doors so they could be opened wide to allow passersby to see him working in his sculpture studio toward the back of the gallery, as well as for moving large pieces in and out. He said they're placed at their full width two days a week for four or five hours.

Love the doors, hate the doors

Several speakers defended Whyte's gallery and said the work he did on the building adds to the ambiance and character of Carmel. They also pointed out the city benefits when artists work in their stores.

"This is exactly what Carmel wants and needs," commented longtime resident Wies Norberg. "We always wanted working artists and their galleries."

She contrasted Whyte with sculptor Richard MacDonald, who recently opened a large gallery — which she likened to a palace — and has sold his pieces at several places in town for years but does not sculpt here.

Ted Balestreri, son of the prolific landowner, said Carmel should be grateful to have Whyte, whom he wished had remained on Cannery Row.

Another tenant in the complex that includes the gallery complimented the improvements Whyte made to the "ugly building," and he accused the door opponents of picking on him. Ocean Avenue, he added, is more mall-like than the Dolores Street art gallery.

Susan Lukowski argued it would be unfair to restrict the door.

because of a mistake made by the city," she said.

But several residents said the large opening on Dolores reminds them of stores in shopping malls.

"When we were walking through town, I saw that and thought, 'What happened to that building?'" Carmel Residents Association member Linda Anderson said. When the doors are open, "the front of that building is gone."

but permanently fixing them so they could never be opened

CRA member Monte Miller said the design guidelines should be followed, and if city officials decide they want larger doors, they should change the rules to match.

"Of course all business owners would like the front of their businesses to be wide open," commented former city councilwoman Barbara Livingston. "I call those doors

'bazaar doors.' They're very inappropriate." Businesses should only have single doors, preferably Dutch doors, she said, to match the traditional look of Carmel.

Majority favors flexibility

"It's very rare I disagree with Barbara Livingston, who has done so much for our city over the years," said board member Michael Lynch.

But it's not as if the gallery's entire front is open, and then sealed with a Bronx shield at night, he pointed out. "The design of the doors themselves is very nice."

If the city required all downtown doors to be 36 inches wide and Dutch in style, "that's even worse," than allowing some flexibility in design, board member Jonathan Sapp

Chairman Keith Paterson also sided with Whyte (and his famous English bulldog, Lord Wellington), but DRB member Michael LePage did not.

"I'm really surprised how much response there was to this," he said. "And I appreciate everyone's points of view, but we are the design review board, and we enforce the design guidelines, which are very specific about the size of the door. This door wouldn't have been approved."

He made a motion to forbid Whyte from using the full width of the doors, but the motion died for lack of a second. The board then voted 4-1 to allow Whyte's use of the doors as he designed them — a vote that drew applause from many in the audience.

on the premise she knew driving under the influence was dangerous but did it anyway.

During court proceedings, questions arose regarding her mental competency, and Monterey psychiatrist Taylor Fithian was asked to evaluate her. He found she was unable to stand trial but may be able to in the future with proper medication. At an Oct. 1 hearing during which his report was discussed, Grover decided another court-selected expert should examine King

On Oct. 22, she received a report from psychologist Elaine Finnberg, who determined King is taking proper medication and able to understand the criminal proceedings against her.

"Rather than having a split decision and having a trial on the subject, perhaps Dr. Fithian could take a further look," suggested Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Steve Somers. "His followup report is dated Oct. 3, and I

think a lot has happened in the last three weeks."

But King's attorney, Joy McMurtry, said her client preferred a third evaluation by a new doctor.

"My client would like an independent evaluator," she said. "She sees Dr. Fithian and Dr. Finnberg fairly often, and with a split decision, I'm uncomfortable with Dr. Fithian going back again." (When ordered by the court, the \$325 to \$500 experts receive for the evaluations is provided by taxpayers.)

Grover opted for trying to resolve the differences in opinion between the two before calling for a third expert. She added, "My opinion is Ms. King does appear to be more engaged in our proceedings," than she was during past court appearances.

If Fithian still disagrees after completing his investigation, Grover said she would consider McMurtry's request.

"Criminal proceedings remain suspended," she said. "I would like to come back on Nov. 7 at 8:30 a.m. for receipt of Dr. Fithian's updated report and further proceedings under 1368."

The "1368" to which she referred is the California Penal Code section ensuring no mentally incompetent defendant is forced to stand trial.

posed," Carl said.

In addition to the golf course, the original plan included 33 luxury homes, 160 new hotel rooms, expansion of the Inn at Spanish Bay, 60 new employee housing units and the relocation of the equestrian center to the Sawmill Gulch area.

Ever since coastal commissioners rejected the plan at a meeting in Santa Rosa in June 2007, representatives from the Pebble Beach Co. and Monterey County have been meeting infrequently with coastal commission staff to try to agree on a plan.

Carl said the discussions have included "pursuing all sorts of options, including avoiding the areas that are biologically sensitive."

"I think it's been a good back and forth about what their needs are ... their bottom line, money kinds of needs, and the areas that are sensitive and they need to avoid," he said.

The parties last met six weeks ago and are expected to meet again in mid-November. Besides Carl, coastal commission deputy director Charles Lester has been present at the meetings.

The plan, as first drawn up, would have provided long-term protection for the most vital parts of the native Monterey pine forest by limiting future development far beyond what the coastal commission envisioned in the 1980s.

But environmental groups, including the Sierra Club, contended the development would impact dozens of sensitive plant and animal species.

The Pebble Beach Co. and others have long argued that Monterey pines, which number in the millions in Monterey County, are not environmentally sensitive habitat.

The broad outlines of the original plan were approved by voters in 2000, when they agreed to amendments to the county's general plan.

But the coastal commission also rejected those plan amendments.

Whatever plan is finally agreed upon, the Pebble Beach Co. may still need to amend the general plan to allow the development.

"At a very basic level," Carl said, "that has to be changed for them to pursue anything they want to pursue."

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Yes on Z

WITH the trillion-dollar federal budget, the \$160 billion state budget, plus county and local budgets of tens of millions more, does the government have enough money to keep our roads in tip-top shape? The answer is a big fat yes, but somehow the public servants in Washington, Sacramento and Salinas manage to find other things to spend the colossal treasure on. That's why voters sometimes have to take matters in their own hands by specifying where they want their hard-earned tax dollars to go.

Measure Z will increase local sales taxes by one-half percent for 25 years, with the money going to some badly needed Monterey County road projects. If you've ever tried to drive to Santa Cruz or Prunedale on a busy weekend, or use Lighthouse Avenue in New Monterey at 4:30 on a weekday afternoon, you know what we're talking about.

Any new tax needs to be considered very carefully. We think Measure Z passes the test — especially because, unlike most other taxes, when you pay it, you'll know what it's being used for.

Yes on 1A

While we're on the subject of transportation, we'd also like to ask our readers to support a state ballot measure that would authorize (and pay for) a high-speed rail line connecting Sacramento and San Francisco to Southern California. The closest station to the Monterey Peninsula would be Gilroy, so it's not something that would be an everyday solution to traffic congestion in Monterey County or that would make it easier for tourists to pay us a visit. But the benefit to the entire state would be enormous. Many other countries have reaped the benefits of high-speed, intercity rail service. It's time for California to join the list.


Yes on 11

For more than a decade, the duo performed regularly on the Monterey Peninsula, carving out a niche in the local music scene. Eventually, though, music took a backseat to


The swing era comes alive again in C.V.

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



Everybody knows that Del Monte is the oldest golf course west of the Mississippi, actually dating from 1897. But can you guess the second oldest in this area? Pebble Beach? Cypress Point? No, that honor belongs to the CARMEL GOLF CLUB, a nine hole links measuring 2112 yards, spread over the dunes of Carmel Point. Its club house stood on a rise at what is now 14th Ave, and San Antonio, and it is still there! It's a small, shingled building, now used as a guest house by descendants of the founders, Philip and Laura Wilson. The course was opened a hole at a time in 1912, and the first official meeting was held Nov. 20 of that year at the Pine Inn. Memberships were \$20 a year, green fees 50¢ a day. The land was owned by the Carmel Development Company, which assured the Club by written contract that it "would not be sold in lots or otherwise till after the year 1915." Among the members was Dr. Clampett, which brings us up to date. The Club expired around 1920, and today nearly 300 houses stand on its abandoned fairways. Think what might have been!
