

■ Election recommended for November 2009

AFTER ALMOST a decade of trying, proponents of a Town of Carmel Valley got what they wanted Monday when the Local Agency Formation Commission voted 6-1 to recommend the town be created.

It is now up to the Monterey County Board of Supervisors to set a date for an election for residents of the proposed town to decide if they want to incorporate. They will also be asked to elect a five-member town

LAFCO recommended the election take place Nov. 3, 2009, with the town officially open for business on July 1, 2010.

There was some last-minute drama Monday, as 3rd District Supervisor Lou Calcagno helped remove Tehama — a 2,000acre golf club and subdivision co-owned by Clint Eastwood — from the boundaries of the would-be town. More than 25 other neighborhoods and business areas, including the Crossroads, Barnyard and Carmel Rancho shopping centers and several nearby residential communities, also asked to be excluded from the proposed town, but LAFCO turned down those requests.

In contrast to a Nov. 24 public hearing on incorporation — which featured testimony by more than 50 residents — the Dec. 1 hearing offered commissioners a lengthy opportunity to sound off on the issue. Calcagno started things off with a bang by rattling off 20 pages of arguments, which read like a "Greatest Hits" collection of incorporation criticisms. He recited the long list of complaints with a minimum of pauses and often without attribution.

"I'm not comfortable moving this thing forward," Calcagno said, although he later conceded he was willing to do so, if only to avoid another expensive court battle like the one last summer, which cost taxpavers \$240,000 to reimburse attorney Michael Stamp for representing incorporation propo-

NTSB: Henson's plane had just 32 ounces of fuel

AN AIRPLANE piloted by a Carmel Valley attorney was almost out of fuel when it crashed last week into a golf course just short of the runway at Monterey Peninsula Airport, according to a preliminary report released this week by the National Transportation Safety Board.

On Nov. 25, Zan Henson was piloting a 1970 Piper

Cherokee home from a trip to Mexico when the plane struck an oak tree and crash landed in the parking lot of the Monterey Pines Golf Course.

Henson received two cracked vertebrae and a broken rib in the crash, while his friend, Jim Rummonds, an Aptos attorney, had more serious injuries, including three broken vertebrae, four

racked ribs, a collapsed lung and a concussion.

A preliminary investigation released this week by the NTSB shows that the plane Henson was flying had only 32 ounces of fuel in it when it went down.

"During removal of the airplane," NTSB aviation accident investigator Josh Cawthra wrote in the report, "recovery crews reported they drained 24 ounces of fuel from the left wing fuel tank and 8 ounces of fuel from the right wing fuel

In an interview at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula the day after the accident, Henson maintained he had an hour's worth of fuel when the plane crashed. But according to the NTSB, what remained on board was equivalent to less than three cans of soda.

'The pilot stated he realized that he 'ran the right fuel tank out of fuel,' and immediately switched to the left fuel tank and turned on the electric fuel boost pump," the report indicates. "Despite his efforts, the engine did not restart and the airplane descended into trees and subsequently impacted the

Deer with stake in antlers appears to be losing weight

A BUCK in Pacific Grove who has had a three-foot wooden stake caught in his antlers since July appears to have lost weight.

The buck acquired the appendage five months ago while scratching or sharpening his antlers at a construction site outside a Sunset Drive home. A piece of rope became wrapped around the animal's antlers, fixing the stake.

"He looks thinner," said Elizabeth Conti-Yeo, Pacific

Grove's animal control officer who observes the buck regularly. But the weight loss might not be from the buck having trouble eating.

"It also could be from the rut," Conti-Yeo said.

The SPCA for Monterey County has been hesitant to remove the stake by tranquilizing the buck because of the dangers in the procedure.

"The tranquilizer itself easily could kill the deer, as could the drug used to counteract the tranquilizer," said SPCA spokeswoman Beth Brookhouser.

Unless the buck can't eat or is in distress, the SPCA will wait until the animal sheds its horns, which usually happens in winter or early spring.

"We will intervene as a last resort," Brookhouser said.

Conti-Yeo said she's concerned the buck could break its neck if it gets the stake caught in a fence and tries to free

In photos Conti-Yeo took of the buck Nov. 8, it's apparent the stake has rubbed against the deer's neck and back.

"Where that stake rubs on his fur," she said, "he is losing that hair, and it looks like it could become an open wound."

The buck usually travels with a group of other bucks in the golf course and beach areas of Pacific Grove. Whenever she encounters the buck, Conti-Yeo takes pic-

tures of the animal to document its health. "I have pictures from [the beginning]," she said, "And now

he is definitely not as full."

Brookhouser said it's not uncommon for deer to have items attached to their antlers, such as plastic soda holders and construction mesh.

"We have even seen barbed wire," she said.

Though the SPCA and the City of Pacific Grove had been flooded with calls about the deer from surprised residents, Brookhouser said her agency has not received any recent reports about the buck's condition.

"We just encourage everybody to keep us updated on the guy," she said.

Young children watched C.V. cockfight, gambling

CHILDREN AS young as 5 years old were in attendance for a bloody cockfight last weekend east of Carmel Valley Village that resulted in the arrest of three people and the seizure of dozens of fighting birds.

Following a tip, Monterey County Sheriff's deputies Saturday, Nov. 29, raided a home off Carmel Valley Road where a cockfight was in progress. The arrival of law enforcement officers and K-9's sent men, women and several young children scrambling.

"There were children there ranging from 5 to 11 years old," said sheriff's Cmdr. Fred Garcia. "I would make an assumption they were probably watching" the cockfight.

While most of the people in attendance got away, deputies arrested Matthew Cervelli, 58, of Carmel Valley, and Ramon Lopez, 46, and Amado Aguirre, 48, both of Salinas.

"It appears [Cervelli] was hosting it," Garcia said. "He had a van with a table and an ice chest, like he was selling beverages.'

Aguirre was charged with possessing fighting birds and resisting and delaying a peace officer, while Lopez was also arrested for possessing fighting birds and a probation violation, Garcia said.

Cervelli was arrested for conspiracy, a felony, for setting up the operation, according to Garcia.

Eight other people at the cockfight, including women who had children with them, were questioned about being participants, Garcia said. The sheriff's office will forward their names to the district attorney's office, which could charge them







Companies vie for Tularcitos classroom project

Public Agencies are learning the world's woeful economic state has a substantial silver lining: lots of competition from contractors wanting construction jobs, and lower than expected bids. Such is the case for the new five-classroom building planned for Tularcitos Elementary School in Carmel Valley Village.

"We had budgeted \$1.6 million in construction costs," Rick Blanckmeister, chief business official for Carmel Unified School District, said last month. But on Nov. 4, the district's board of education approved a contract with Kent Construction of Gilroy for \$984,799.

"There could be additional costs or unforeseen circumstances, but it's still significantly lower than what we had anticipated," Blanckmeister said. "It's definitely a reflection of the market. And we had nine bidders on the job."

Most of their bids fell in the \$1 million-to-\$1.1 million range, according to Blanckmeister, with the highest coming in at \$1,233,000. The new building is the only project at Tularcitos being funded by taxpayers via the \$21.5 million bond they approved in 2005.

The five-classroom wing will replace some portable units, though a few will be used for special programs like music, and the new building will provide more space than currently exists on campus.

The new classrooms will also set the standard for technology, according to Blanckmeister, including interactive white boards, Internet, computers, audio and visual equipment, and necessary infrastructure.

"Part of the concept there is those classrooms will be seen as setting expectations for technology," Blanckmeister said. "A lot of research went into what standards for elementaryschool classrooms should be."

According to the contract, the company has 240 days to complete the work, so the new wing should be finished in

"It will be up and running for the following school year," he said.

City inches closer to joining Monterey Fire

WHEN PACIFIC Grove firefighters don Monterey Fire Department badges and start getting City of Monterey paychecks in mid-December, Carmel's contract with Pacific Grove for fire chief services will end. But no leadership gap will follow, according to a short-term contract approved by the Carmel City Council Tuesday that will have Monterey staff taking on those responsibilities.

And by the time that new agreement expires at the end of February 2009, Carmel firefighters might be gearing up to become Monterey employees as well, council members said.

The consolidation of Monterey and P.G. forced the issue of CFD's long-term options, and police chief George Rawson outlined three: hiring a new chief and becoming a standalone department, contracting with another city or fire district to run Carmel's fire station, or forming a completely new government agency to run fire departments in the area.

"Important decisions must be made within the next 60 days regarding management of the fire department," Rawson said in his Dec. 2 report.

In his analysis of the options, Rawson concluded operating independently would preserve local control and ensure that Carmel's firefighters would have in-depth knowledge of its confusing streets. But a stand-alone department would be

"This option is very expensive and is not recommended," Rawson wrote in his report. "Establishing a stand-alone fire department would be an arduous process that would necessitate an immediate recruitment effort to hire additional personnel to include a fire chief, division chiefs, and other personnel to oversee fire prevention and training.

Getting the City of Monterey, Carmel Valley Fire Protection District or Cal Fire to take over Carmel's fire department would allow shared administrative costs, better staffing and infrastructure, and abundant resources, but would deprive the city of control over personnel costs.

"This option is the most logical and will probably be the most economical," he said. If implemented correctly with the right partner, contracting would improve "firefighting capabilities in all contexts." Since all departments would be under one agency, they would work well together and be able to send multiple engines to a large fire quickly.

Forming a new government agency — called a joint powers authority — would offer better control over salaries and operational costs but would provide only a "marginal return on investment," require more staff and cause liability issues, according to Rawson.

"The process of establishing a JPA also can be arduous and very time consuming," he said. "Based on the narrow window of time Carmel has to execute a new contract, it would be prudent to focus on contracting."

'An extraordinary fire department'

City administrator Rich Guillen has discussed fire consolidation with his counterparts in Monterey and Pacific Grove for more than three years.

"Our cities work really well together," commented Monterey city manager Fred Meurer, who attended the council meeting to encourage Carmel to join Monterey and Pacific Grove in a department run by the City of Monterey. "The next step is to turn our three fire departments into an extraordinary fire department with one chief, one deputy chief and a full complement of officers."

At this week's meeting, after Mayor Sue McCloud said the council would not make any quick decisions about the fire department's long-term future, she opened the discussion to members of the public, but no one responded.

"Certainly if we don't work with our sister cities, we're jeopardizing not only the safety of our fire responders, but putting the safety of our citizens at risk as well," commented councilman Gerard Rose. But he also said it's "absolutely critical we maintain a staff" of Carmel-savvy firefighters who know their way around a town with dimly lit streets and few numbered addresses.

Rose recommended the city look into contracting with Monterey or another neighboring agency.

"I think this is an important and significant step in the



Foundation fires up new generator

THE CARMEL Foundation, which was powerless along with the rest of town for days during last January's big storms, wanted to prevent a repeat, considering how many seniors rely on the nonprofit for hot lunch, shelter and companionship almost daily.

After the power came back on, the foundation launched a fundraising effort to purchase a generator that will keep its kitchen and buildings open, warm and productive no matter what's happening with PG&E's lines and poles.

Foundation members and community groups like Yes for Carmel, Monterey Peninsula Volunteer Services, Yellow Brick Road Benefit Shop and The Harden Foundation contributed \$44,000 toward the \$48,000 project. They were honored for their generosity Nov. 17 at a Generator Installation Celebration, during which they munched cake donated by Safeway and received emergency preparedness kits.

The Carmel Foundation, which relies entirely on donations to operate, provides most of the low-cost housing for seniors in town, offers some 50 classes and events each week, provides hot lunches and food for shut-ins four days per week, and helps members get to medical appointments, go shopping and take field trips.

The foundation is open to anyone age 55 or older and has about 4,000 members.

Groups give smoke detectors to Carmel Valley residents

THREE LOCAL civic groups want to help Carmel Valley residents protect themselves from home fires.

The three organizations — the Carmel Valley Rotary Club, the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 234 and the National Electrical Contractors Association — are sponsoring a smoke-detector giveaway Sunday, Dec. 7, at the Mid Carmel Valley Fire Station at 8455 Carmel Valley Road and the Carmel Valley Fire Station at 26

According to Carmel Valley Fire Chief Sidney Reade, home fires pose a greater risk during the holidays.

"Smoke detectors really do save lives," Reade explained. "There are more than 400,000 home fires in the United States every year. And they result in over 3,500 deaths. Everybody assumes they have fire detectors, but often they don't. And there is an increase in fire during the holidays as a result of fireplaces, heaters, Christmas lights and candles. This is a very good time of year to be doing this campaign."

The free smoke detectors will be available at both fire stations from 9 a.m. to noon. Recipients must be at least 18 years old and show identification. For more information, call (831) 624-5907.

right direction," and a shift from a parochial view to a more Peninsula-wide perspective, he said.

"A stand-alone department for a city of 4,000 doesn't work," councilman Ken Talmage said.

But he also agreed local knowledge is important, and Meurer said that, even if consolidation occurs, the Sixth Avenue station would retain its Carmel staff.

"I would argue that what we are proposing would increase your comfort level," he said.

While a Monterey Fire ladder truck now only comes into Carmel if it's needed for a

structure fire, in a contract situation, he said, "Every one of our engine companies will be as familiar with runs in Carmel as they are with runs in Pacific Grove and in Monterey."

Guillen thanked the council for its input and said biweekly meetings are already planned for the city managers and fire chiefs.

"We pretty much know the template, so it's pretty much just getting Carmel to fit into that template," he said.







Henson said he believes a fuel leak was responsible for the discrepancy in fuel. The plane was equipped with two 25-gallon tanks.

"I left Mexicali with 4.5 hours of fuel, and I flew approximately 3.5 hours" to Monterey, Henson said. "So somewhere or other, some fuel leaked out of that left wing."

After departing Calexico International Airport for Monterey following a 10-day vacation, Henson said he refueled in Mexico twice, once in Loreto and again in Mexicali. He said he visually checked the tanks in Mexicali to make sure they were full.

Monterey Deputy City Manager Fred Cohn last week said there was no fuel spill at the crash site.

According to NTSB records, the aircraft

is registered to Carmel resident Joanna Pfeister.

Investigation continues

A Federal Aviation Administration representative investigated the wreckage last week, forwarding his findings to Cawthra. The final investigation report should be completed within six months, Cawthra said.

The plane is at an aviation retrieval yard in Sacramento and will be moved to another location, where it will be inspected.

"I plan on taking another look at the airplane in the next month," Cawthra told The Pine Cone.

The NTSB is an independent federal agency that investigates every civil aviation accident in the United States and other significant transportation accidents.

"We try to learn from these accidents to see if there are any safety issue to be fixed to prevent them from occurring again," he said.

"Some people tried to grab their roosters and leave," Garcia said. "One of the gentlemen who was caught had a rooster under his arm."

Deputies also confiscated scales to weigh the birds and 135 cockfighting spurs — expensive blades that are attached to roosters' feet in an effort to do the most damage during a

"There were some birds that had visible injuries," Garcia said. Also, 12 dead roosters were recovered.

Deputies and four workers from the SPCA for Monterey County found dozens of birds on scene. A grave for birds was

"We have 51 live birds right now," said SPCA executive director Gary Tiscornia. "We did take in a total of 61, but 10 of them had to be euthanized" because of injuries.

Tiscornia said the birds, which are being held for evidence until the criminal cases against the defendants are resolved, will also be euthanized.

"The sad fact is that these birds are bred to fight and kill other birds," Tiscornia said. "So there is very little ability to place them anywhere.'

The roosters are being held at SPCA off of Highway 68. Because of their aggressive nature, the birds have to be kept in separate enclosures.

There is also the risk the birds carry highly contagious diseases, such as avian flu and Newcastle disease. "It's a threat to agriculture and other animals," Tiscornia

Deputies found evidence attendants were waging money, a common practice during cockfights.

"It's all about gambling," Garcia said. "Several of the peo-

ple who were arrested had hundreds of dollars on them.'

Cervelli was found at the scene carrying \$710 in cash, Garcia said.

"When they got him in jail, he had another \$251 on him," he said.

Garcia said the sheriff's office was notified about six months ago that there was cockfighting at the same home, but when deputies got there, they didn't find anything.

Garcia said those involved in cockfighting are a close-knit group of people who watch the blood sport.

"It's word of mouth, and they pass it on," Garcia said.

precinct. And there are a couple of surprises.

For instance, even though they live right next door, voters in Carmel and Pacific Grove didn't see things quite the same way as their neighbors in Pebble Beach.

While Pacific Grove voters overwhelmingly chose presidential candidate Barack Obama over rival John McCain, 76 percent to 24 percent, and Carmel-by-the-Sea went for Obama by 67 percent to 33 percent, the Pebble Beach tally was close: just 52 percent for Obama and 48 percent for

Precincts in Big Sur reported the largest gap, with 80 percent of the vote going to Obama, while only 20 percent went to McCain.

Gay marriage

With a less than 5 percent spread, state voters in November passed Proposition 8, which changed the California Constitution to limit marriage to traditional, malefemale couples

As with the presidential election, there were varying results among Monterey Peninsula voters over Prop. 8

Pacific Grove residents voted 69 percent to 31 percent against Prop. 8, while Pebble Beach residents also voted against it but with a closer margin of 53 percent to 47 per-

In Carmel, the vote was 64 percent against Prop. 8, while Big Sur overwhelmingly voted against it, at 77 percent to 23

Seaside rejected Prop. 8 by a margin identical to the vote in Pebble Beach, with 53 percent voting against it and 47 percent supporting it.

"The cat specifically had paint on its side and ears and face," said Richards, who had no dollar estimate of the damage and no updated information on the cat's condition.

"Sadly, we have experience with all kinds of cases of cruelty to animals, whether it's putting rubber bands on them or tight collars that dig into their skin, painting them or dousing them with kerosene and setting them on fire," said Gary Tiscornia, executive

"Removing the paint from the fur can be a torment of its own," he added. "It's a painful process, depending on the kind of paint and how long it has been on the animal."


He said animal-cruelty cases are particularly tough to solve for one obvious reason: "The animals can't tell us who did it."

He advised anyone who has a pet abused by vandals or who witnesses an act of animal cruelty to get the victim to the vet immediately and report the incident to local law enforcement or directly to the SPCA.

"Certainly we're primarily interested in crimes against animals — that's what we do," he said. "We're really dependent upon the public to help us solve these crimes and refer them to the district attorney for prosecution."

Tiscornia said people can also report crimes anonymously by telephone or online at the SPCA for Monterey County website.

As for the Hatton Road case, Richards said the sheriff's office has leads and is working on catching the culprits, who face charges of vandalism and animal cruelty.

DiMaggio argued that residents should be allowed to vote on

"If I lived in the valley, I would vote no, but I wouldn't argue against the right to vote," DiMaggio said.

DiMaggio also took issue with the idea of a business or neighborhood opting out of the incorporation boundaries.

"There simply doesn't exist the right to opt out of the incorporation process," he observed.

Can it afford to be a town?

Several commissioners questioned the viability of creating a new town in the midst of a nationwide economic downturn, often referring to a fiscal analysis funded by opponents. Commissioner Don Champion, though, had harsh words for the study, calling its data "questionable at best" and finding "little substance" in its 600 pages.

Commission chair and Salinas Mayor Dennis Donohue, meanwhile, cautioned his colleagues to not place too much emphasis on any one fiscal study.

"Nobody's numbers are right," he suggested. "They're all speculative. But folks can come together and be undercapitalized. We do it in Salinas all the time."

Opponents claim the new town would not be able pay its expenses, but LAFCO executive officer Kate McKenna insisted it can be solvent. She also said her agency simply followed state incorporation law when evaluating the town's

'Our responsibility is to determine that the new town has the adequate revenues to ensure financial viability in the three fiscal years followincorporation," McKenna explained.

Contrary to claims by opponents, McKenna said the exclusion of Tehama from the proposal will have little effect on the town's revenues because few homes will be constructed during the next three years. Meanwhile, proponent Glenn Robinson was critical of the decision to remove Tehama from the proposed town's boundaries.

"The Carmel Valley Forum will need to decide if it will fight this nonsensical exclusion," Robinson said. 'Eliminating Tehama nearly cuts the town in half. All of the traffic, flooding and other impacts from Tehama will affect Carmel Valley, so it should have remained inside the bound-

What's next?

Now that LAFCO has approved incorporation, several steps need to occur before residents can vote on it. First, the proposal needs to be reviewed by the U.S. Department of Justice and the California State Lands Commission. Then the board of supervisors is required to set an election before voters can ratify it.

According to McKenna, the timeline doesn't allow for a special election in the spring, so the next opportunity for voters to weigh in on the issue will be in November.

In the meantime, opponents are gearing up for what promises to be a contentious political and legal battle.

"Let the war begin," announced opponent Bob Sinotte. "I think we should rename the proposed town of Carmel Valley 'Stampville' in recognition of the lawyers who tied the hands of the commissioners, most of whom think the proposal is fatally flawed. There are a litany of concerns that suggest the fate of incorporation will be decided in the courts."

Robinson admitted incorporation supporters face a tough fight ahead.

"Developers will pour lots of money into the campaign to defeat incorporation," he predicted. "We will be badly outspent — that is for certain. But we have facts and logic on our side, and we will meet in living rooms and patios on every street in Carmel Valley to discuss incorporation. Facts empower people, so I expect incorporation will win.'

For now, though, Robinson can pause for a moment and savor this week's win.

"This is a historic moment for Carmel Valley," said Robinson of the LAFCO vote to okay incorporation. "People here have been discussing it for 40 years but it has never gotten to a vote. Finally, our community will get the opportunity to decide for itself the shape of its future.'

Your Gardener's Checklist for December 5-11, 2008

- ☐ If you turned your irrigation controller off with the last rain, plants will need water every 2-3 weeks without rain. Don't forget those under the eves even when it does rain.
- ☐ Expand or start your rose garden with a wish list for the 2009 All American Rose winners. See your local full service garden center for a list.
- ☐ Do not begin pruning deciduous trees until most of the leaves have fallen. This will give you a better view of the
- ☐ Early spring blooming shrubs and trees can wait to be pruned until they have bloomed. If you prune them now-you will lose out on the flowering glory this spring.
- ☐ Apply a thick layer of mulch (about 3" deep) in all of your garden beds. It will enrich the soil and keep it from compacting in the winter rain. However, not directly on trunk and root crown of tree, especially native oaks.
- Plant colorful iceland poppies to fill flowerbeds with color through winter. They'll bloom in cups of orange, white, yellow, pink, red or cream flowers.

Council OKs \$\$\$ for numerous changes to new fire engine

THE \$427,645.44 taxpayer-funded Pierce Saber PUC Pumper fire engine ordered by the City of Carmel in August is under assembly and slated for delivery in March 2009, but the city council learned Tuesday the price will increase by more than \$11,000.

According to a three-firefighter committee sent to check on the engine's progress, more than three dozen changes are needed to ensure the new rig meets federal safety standards, administrative services director Joyce Giuffre wrote in a report for the council Dec. 2.

Last August, the council approved a contract with Pierce Manufacturing to design and build the engine, and a "new apparatus committee" of CFD Capt. Ian Watts, engineer Ken Hutchinson and part-time Battalion Chief John Trenner recently met with the company to check on its construction and ensure its specifications meet National Fire Protection Association standards.


The group returned with more than 40 contract change orders totaling \$9,323 to make the engine "properly equipped for the needs of Carmel-by-the-Sea" and aligned with federal safety guidelines, according to Giuffre. Based on \$2,017 in finance charges over seven years, the total cost will be \$11,340.

While several of the changes call for deleting high-dollar items, such as the \$1,166 driver-controlled locking rear differential, the three rear-facing SCBA seats for \$1,049 and several pieces of equipment for \$2,247, many more additions were ordered, such as the two vinyl map pockets for the front cab doors (\$463), 2-inch-tall lettering on the doors reading "Proudly serving Carmel By-The-Sea since 1915" (\$520),

Carmel-by-the-Sea door emblems based on the department patch (\$495), equipment storage rack for a Stokes basket [for rescuing people from steep hillsides] and two backboards (\$874), eleven adjustable shelves (\$1,804), a two-tone paint break to the upper rear body to match the cab paint break (\$945), gray spatter finish in the body compartment interior (\$473), a "Z" jog in the side reflective striping (\$284), \$1,597 in other lettering on various exterior aspects of the engine, and \$3,478 in lighting equipment.

The city council Tuesday OK'd the changes without discussion, as the item was part of its consent agenda. According to the agreement, the additional bill will be due upon receipt of the new engine in March 2009.

The city is financing the entire cost of the engine — now up to \$506,984.44 — over seven years. Included in that overall cost is about \$70,000 in interest.







Big Sur residents ready to rescue neighbors from mudslides

Rushing to beat the rainy season — but not hasty when it came to teaching and learning vital lifesaving skills - six Cal Fire instructors and a Monterey Fire captain collaborated to lead more than four dozen people through a Citizens Emergency Response Training class in Big Sur to help ready them for winter's inevitable post-wildfire mudslides.

Want a new house for Christmas?

"The intent of the class is to teach them how to take care

of themselves and their neighbors when disaster strikes," explained Cal Fire Battalion Chief Robin Hamelin. "In any major event, be it fire, earthquake or whatever, the emergency resources may be sorely taxed until assistance arrives, which could be several days. CERTs are extremely helpful in

The curriculum is standardized based on a federal program, and it covers CERT organization, disaster preparedness, fire safety, disaster medicine, urban search and rescue, disaster psychology and terrorism.

"And then the instructors take it and modify it to meet the local issues," such as sandbagging to confine storm flows, Hamelin said. During 20 hours of class time at the Pfeiffer Big Sur State

Park conference center, residents learned how to use fire extinguishers, conduct basic first aid, extricate friends and family from collapsed buildings after an earthquake and shut off gas meters, among other valuable skills. They also learned what to watch for and what to do when fire is approaching.

The training culminated with a final exam at the main fire station in Pebble Beach Nov. 22, when a couple dozen "victims" with serious injuries had to be rescued by trainees.

'We put them under piles of lumber and so on, and they had to pull them out, move them correctly, do first aid and work under basic incident-command rules," Hamelin

They will also be called upon to help with tasks like delivering food to elderly residents during big storms. The Big Sur group will be guided and trained by the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade.

Cal Fire Capt. Jennifer Valdez, who is in charge of disaster planning, congratulated the graduates and said CERTs "help make our communities safer and stronger."







After eight-week Big Sur retreat, urban artist unveils work

More than 100 local children will perform at Sunset Center this week-

end when Dance Kids of Monterey County presents the timeless holiday

As the latest beneficiary of a program that offers artists an opportunity to live and work in Big Sur, Laura Diamondstone spent the past eight weeks pursuing her creative impulses at the Glen Devin Ranch. Now she's ready to unveil the fruits of her labor.

The Big Sur Arts Initiative and the Big Sur Land Trust present a one-day exhibit of Diamondstone's work Sunday, Dec. 7, from 2 to 5 p.m. at Soul River Studios in Big Sur.

Diamondstone, who lives in the San Francisco Bay Area, spent nearly two months in a studio that sits atop the narrow spine of Garrapata Ridge on the north Big Sur coast, just north of Palo Colorado Road. The ridge is blessed with an extraordinary 360-degree panoramic view of the surrounding mountains, canyons and ocean.

By all accounts, Diamondstone made the most of her stay in Big Sur.

"Laura is going to display everything she created," explained Lisa Goettel, who heads the BSAI's Arts Bridge program. "She was incredibly prolific."

Among the highlights of her exhibit are a large triptych, dozens of 4-inch-by-4-inch paintings, and a collection of drawings and watercolors.

"It's a pretty good mix of mediums," Goettel observed. Diamondstone's stay in Big Sur had a profound effect on her, Goettel said.

"She was so inspired by Big Sur that she's actually making a life change and moving out of the city," she explained.

and asked what he could do to get the production back to Sunset," Richmond recalled. "He's a big fan of dance."



AT THE tender age of 13, Mike Beck went to the Monterey Pop Festival. There, on the main stage at the Monterey Fairgrounds, among the blazing guitar solos of Jimi Hendrix, Pete Townsend and Stephen Stills, he saw his future.

Forty-one years later, Beck's musical journey is coming full circle. While he's never achieved the commercial success of his childhood heroes, he's a widely respected guitarist and songwriter whose music brings

together the best qualities of 1960s rock 'n' roll. And when he performs at the Pelican Tavern in Pacific Grove Friday and Saturday, Dec. 5-6, he'll be backed by the Bohemian Saints, a band Beck is convinced is one of the Monterey Peninsula's finest ever.

"My heart and soul are with the Bohemian Saints," said Beck this week from his home in Montana, where he works as professional cowboy when he's not touring. "We have something really special. When

Editorial

An undemocratic decision

SEVEN YEARS ago, we used this space to urge that external barriers to incorporation of Carmel Valley be lifted. If the people of the scenic valley want to take charge of their own zoning, road maintenance, police protection and the like, they should be able to without the state, the county or the Local Agency Formation Commission's interference, we said in July 2001 editorial.

"If the people want it and they're willing to undertake the financial obligations of self-government, nothing should stand in their way," we summed up.


This week, one of the most formidable barriers to letting the people of Carmel Valley decide their own fate was lifted, when LAFCO voted to approve the creation of a Town of Carmel Valley. The issue will probably be submitted to the valley's voters next year. While we take no position on whether they should vote yes or no, we certainly applaud the fact that they'll be able to make up their own minds.

But underlying the triumph of democracy that LAFCO's decision represents, there is a rather shocking undemocratic undercurrent. According to LAFCO's analysis, no fewer than 27 neighborhoods, business areas and property owners asked to be excluded from the proposed town — including The Crossroads, Barnyard and Carmel Rancho shopping centers and most of the adjacent residential neighborhoods, plus the Clock Tower business district and several other important properties on Via None Marie, not to mention Rancho Cañada, Quail Lodge, Hacienda Carmel, September Ranch and Tehama. Since incorporation was proposed, it has been obvious that anti-incorporation sentiment runs high at the mouth of the valley. But at this week's meeting, except for Tehama and Coast Ranch, all these people were told, "Too bad — you're in."

It seems the Town of Carmel Valley wouldn't have enough money to operate without the substantial sales, hotel and property tax revenues all these shopping centers, expensive homes, offices and hotels generate. Which raises the very ugly possibility that an entire, geograpically isolated part of the proposed Town of Carmel Valley may be hauled unwillingly into the city, simply because the residents (businesses don't get to vote) in the Shanghaied area are outvoted by the more populous neighborhoods to the east. This would be wrong. While it might be acceptable for a small pocket of opposition to be included in a town which is voted for by a majority of residents throughout the proposed town, doing the same thing to such a wide area as the entire mouth of Carmel Valley smacks of totalitarianism.

Unfortunately for incorporation proponents, the idea that all those people would be forced to join a town they don't like is also likely to drag the incorporation proposal to defeat. Because even residents of mid-valley and Carmel Valley Village who favor incorporation are going to find something unsavory about dragging the mouth of the valley with them.

DEC. 5 marks the official city tree-lighting ceremony and kicks off the start of the downtown holiday shopping season.
