Service animals for the disabled:

Should horses, pigs and iguanas be included?

LAST WEEK the New York Times reported a national trend of disabled people replacing service dogs with more exotic animals - such as monkeys, parrots and

And you don't have to go far to find an example. One resident of Pacific Grove uses a miniature horse for stability as she moves around her home. The horse is often seen being walked around a neighborhood not far from the beach.

According to the Guide Horse Foundation, miniature horses make good service animals because "they demonstrate excellent judgment and are not easily distracted by crowds and people."

But there is a growing debate over whether unconventional service animals such as monkeys and pigs should be allowed to cozy up to people in restaurants,

Gang members drawn to quiet P.G.

MORE GANG members are taking up residence in Pacific Grove, according to detective Adam Sepagan, who arrested one of them Jan. 14 for drug offenses and probation violation — specifically, possessing "gang indicia" such as clothing indicating his Sureño affiliation.

"They're moving into town," he said, citing the area of Arkwright Court, where apartments are abundant and cheap. "Unless they do something wrong and we catch them, we can't ask them not to live here. We'd like to."

It's mostly Hispanic gangs, according to Sepagan, and while Norteños were predominant for a while, more Sureños are arriving as of late.

"For the longest time, those people didn't come to P.G.,

because they didn't want to get caught for something like a taillight," and then be found driving a stolen car or having an outstanding warrant, Sepagan said. "But as things are getting worse throughout the county, sometimes they come here because they want to get away from the violence and everything."

And even if they come to Pacific Grove to get away from violence, they commit crimes once they're in town.

"Anytime you've got active gang members, it's all funded by drugs, guns and crime," Sepagan said.

That means Pacific Grove residents need to be more vigilant in protecting themselves, particularly from mail theft, which can lead to identity theft. Gangs have discovered how lucrative it can be to swipe people's personal information from their unlocked mailboxes and then sell it to criminals who use it to steal victims' identities and money.

"There are a lot of unsecured mailboxes," Sepagan said.

Long wait ends in arrest for liquor theft

A 19-YEAR-OLD man staying at a friend's home in Pebble Beach was no doubt surprised to see police approaching his front door Jan. 12 with an arrest warrant for burglary. He had to figure the liquor he's suspected of stealing last summer had long been forgotten. But it hadn't.

According to PGPD detective Adam Sepagan, Patrick James Ayers stole liquor from the Pacific Grove Safeway on June 19, 2008.

'One of the Safeway employees saw him as he was leaving, and we just happened to have an officer who was there in the parking lot," Sepagan said. But when the cop approached the suspected burglar, "the guy took off running, jumped a fence, ditched one of the bottles and got away."

The suspect escaped, but the officer recovered the bottle of hard alcohol the man dropped, and police managed to lift some fingerprints from its surface, according to Sepagan.

"We submitted the prints to the Monterey County crime lab, they were able to find a match, and we were able to get

■ Carmel's new plan already in place

As THE Monterey County Civil Grand Jury weighed in last week on four Peninsula communities' abilities to deal with the raging storms of a year ago, the City of Carmel-bythe-Sea had already taken steps to mitigate many of its concerns. Last month, the city council adopted the new Carmel Emergency Operations Plan outlining how to better care for people during disasters.

Much of it seems to address the issues laid out in the grand jury report that examined emergency preparedness and response during the Jan. 4, 2008, storms when very heavy rains caused flooding, hurricane-force winds toppled trees

Grand jury criticizes government response to 2008 storms

Carmel's emergency operations center responded to more than 60 storm-related calls, Monterey Fire answered an equal number, P.G. Fire fielded 70, and P.B. Fire handled about 60. Amid all that activity, the various EOCs were plagued with moderate equipment failures, according to the report. The grand jury recommended all jurisdictions routinely test their emergency equipment, especially upon receiving notice of an impending major event, and that they hold routine training, including EOC activation drills.

Most of the trouble last winter came after the storm, according to officials who told the grand jury "power outages and poor communication with Pacific Gas and Electric Company frustrated emergency response workers in their efforts to locate and safeguard people who might need help."

Overworked fire crews were stuck baby-sitting live power lines as they waited for PG&E crews with unclear or nonexistent arrival times, and no one working for the utility "seemed to have the authority to prioritize PG&E work or to coordinate efforts with emergency response agencies," according to the grand jury.

Since then, county officials have tried to develop a more effective means of dealing with PG&E, but to little avail. The jury recommended the county board of supervisors appoint an individual or group to help develop a better way for emergency services and the utility company to communicate and coordinate during major incidents.

Jurors also scrutinized the communities' efforts to reach

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Teacher hopes Haiti hero will inspire Carmel High kids

■ First ever school-wide community service effort planned

By MARY BROWNFIELD

AARON JACKSON is a young Floridian who reminds Carmel High School teacher Therese Strutner of some of her own students: He grew up in a well-off family, played golf almost every day and was comfortably unaware of much of the world's poverty and ills.

But during a trip to Central America and the Caribbean in his early 20s, Jackson's eyes were opened to real human suffering, and it changed his life. He left home for Haiti, where he has spent the past several years building orphanages and helping to curb the intestinal parasites that plague millions of impoverished children living in filthy conditions.

In a 2007 "CNN Hero" profile that captivated Strutner, Jackson told viewers it's his goal "to de-worm the entire world." For the price of a pack of cigarettes, he said, a school of 250 kids can be treated for worms, which are spread through contaminated water, undercooked meats and other unsanitary conditions.

Strutner seized on Jackson and his story as a means of inspiring her students, who must do community service in order to graduate.

"At the end of every school year, kids are scrambling to get community service hours," said Strutner. "If I'm a teacher looking for a model of what our students could do, what Jackson is doing is the best."

His orphanages in Haiti have helped free kids from slavery and the sex trade, according to Strutner, and his medical work has saved many, many lives.

"This year, 5 million people are going to be de-wormed by his program," she said. "It's incredible to see what a person can do without a big, cumbersome organization."

She emailed Jackson to see if he could come share his story with Carmel High students, and he said he would. The Padre Parents Club is paying for his flight from Haiti, and Jackson is set to speak at the school Monday morning.

"We've had speakers, and kids responded by wanting to do something, but we didn't have anything organized," she said.

To ensure that's not the case this time around, work is already under way on a school-wide effort that will fea-

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

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
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Worried about mudslides? Weather radios offer warning system

■ Ironically, fire danger returns to Big Sur

WHILE THE California Department of Transportation is working overtime to reduce the threat of erosion in Big Sur, a meteorologist has a piece of advice for residents worried about mudslides and flash floods.

"Get a weather radio," said Tom Evans of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Monterey office.

With its hillsides stripped bare of erosioncontrolling vegetation as a result of recent wildfires, officials are warning Big Sur residents to prepare for mudslides and flash floods in the event of wet weather.

While a simple electronic device can't stop an onrushing wall of mud or water, it can potentially warn residents of an impend-

"It works like a smoke detector," Evans explained. "It makes a loud noise as a warning."

Just last week, NOAA announced the installation of a transmitter at the Post Ranch. From its strategic location, the transmitter will allow the federal agency to communicate emergency bulletins.

"We were very fortunate to get permission," Evans said. "They have a nice hill up there for getting information out."

Because of Big Sur's uneven terrain, some residents will be unable to receive the transmitter's messages. But many, particularly those living atop ridges, will now be able to get an emergency warning.

An optional antenna is available to improve reception. And while the radios are powered by electricity, they can also run for two days on a pair of AA batteries.

For anyone interested in buying a weather radio, Peninsula Communications in Salinas is offering First Alert model WX-200 weather radios at cost, \$45.60. Or email Dick Ravich at bigsursat@sprynet.com to place

While residents are being warned to prepare for mudslides, fire season season returned to Big Sur in the middle of January,

thanks to last week's hot, dry weather. It turns out that the Basin Complex Fire, which ignited seven months ago and was fully contained July 27, is still burning.

The Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade received a report of smoke in the upper reaches of Partington Canyon. The fire was in a location which heavily burned last summer, but a small amount of fuel apparently

Assistant fire chief Martha Karstens said that fire was one of three flare-ups reported in Big Sur last week.

"I don't think anybody anticipated such hot weather," Karstens said. "On Partington Ridge, it was in the 90s."

Firefighters know that embers can survive — deep inside a tree, for example many months after a fire is officially out, and when hot, dry weather returns, the fire can suddenly break out again.

Fire danger is still serious

While there is nothing residents can do to change the weather, there's a lot they can do to make their homes safer from wildfires. Karstens said this is the perfect time to clear brush around residences, especially in neighborhoods west of Highway 1, which last summer's fires didn't reach.

"Clear, clear," she suggested. While it may have felt like fire season outside, technically it wasn't. Much of Los Padres National Forest is closed as a result of fire damage, and a temporary ban on fires exists at Pfeiffer Beach. But visitors can still make campfires or use portable barbecues at several campgrounds and picnic areas, including Plaskett Creek and Kirk Creek campgrounds, and Sand Dollar Beach, Mill Creek and Willow Creek day use areas. And south of Prewitt Ridge, the backcountry is still open to hikers, who are allowed to start campfires where designated fire rings exist.

If not enough rain falls soon, it's quite possible the U.S. Forest Service will tighten fire restrictions. "We've had some internal discussions," said Mike Kremke, division chief of the Monterey ranger district. "It's starting to become a concern for us."

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

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Ryan Ranch moratorium may become permanent

By KELLY NIX

COMMUNITY HOSPITAL of the Monterey Peninsula wants to build more than 100,000 square feet of offices and medical facilities in Ryan Ranch it says would benefit its patients.

But CHOMP's plans and other new development at Ryan Ranch could be stymied indefinitely if the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District imposes a building moratorium it imposed on an interim basis last fall.

In a hearing Wednesday to determine if the moratorium should continue, MPWMD's general manager, Darby Fuerst, said Cal Am doesn't have enough water to meet current demand, much less for new buildings.

In fact, the water district wants Cal Am to supply less water to Ryan Ranch than it has been pumping.

"We are saying the production limits should be set at 72 acre feet a year," he said "which is less than what Cal Am

Officially, Cal Am's supply limit in Ryan Ranch is 175 acre feet to 190 connections. But Fuerst said the limit should be reduced at the business park because the aquifer beneath the office park is being overdrawn.

At the hearing, held at the MPMWD offices, Fuerst said Cal Am delivered 82 acre feet of water last year but used an 'emergency" connection to pump some of the water from the Carmel River.

That, he said, was a violation of Cal Am's agreement with the MPWMD, since Cal Am's Ryan Ranch system is supposed to be independent of other systems. Cal Am annexed the Ryan Ranch system in 1989.

But Cal Am contends the system should be treated as one and that it should be able to use the Carmel River — the Peninsula's main water source — to supplement the Ryan Ranch supply.

"We are under our pumping limits in the Seaside Basin

Development halted

Meanwhile, CHOMP and another hospital will not be able proceed with building plans until the moratorium is lifted.

The hospital bought 21 acres for the planned development five years ago and has already built about 88,000 square feet of offices.

"Completion of the development is integral to our ability to fulfill our mission to meet the healthcare needs of the Peninsula," said CHOMP spokeswoman Brenda Moore. "A moratorium would jeopardize that and also have significant adverse and unforeseen economic consequences for the hos-

"The district and I support the hospital," Fuerst said. "We are doing this to see if we can work out a way so Cal Am increases their production capacity so they have a reliable supply when it is built."

Salinas Valley Memorial Healthcare System also has plans to expand its facilities in Ryan Ranch.

Attorney Sheri Damon, who represents Ryan Court Investors, LLC and another company that have offices being built in Ryan Ranch, said she's concerned the district could put limits on her clients' water use if the moratorium contin-

"This is a business park," Damon said, "and the last thing we want to do now is make it even more difficult for businesses to do business."

But MPWMD directors Dave Potter and Bob Brower were hopeful the matter could be resolved.

We are good at setting rules and regulations," Potter said, "But I'm solution oriented. It seems we could come up with rational, implementable solutions to get us out of this legal

The hearing is set to continue Feb. 18 at 8:30 a.m. at the MPWMD offices at 5 Harris Court, Building G.


Jean Booth Mitchell

stores, churches and other public places.

"Where will it end?" asked Pacific Grove Mayor Dan Cort. "Because camels could be good service animals, too."

The Americans with Disabilities Act protects service animals, without specifying what species are included, and requires they be allowed to go wherever their owners want.

But the national debate prompted the U.S. Department of Justice last summer to propose new regulations that would narrow the definition of acceptable animal species to "dog or other common domestic animal," and eliminate wild animals including reptiles, rabbits, ferrets, rodents, miniature horses, pigs and other farm animals.

If the DOJ proposal goes through, it means the P.G. woman would not have the right to take her horse with her as a service animal and might not be able to keep it at home.

Pacific Grove's laws are a bit vague on the types of animals allowed in the city.

"There is nothing special in our code that says you can't ride horses in the city," said Elizabeth Conti-Yeo, Pacific Grove's animal control officer. "But it says no hoof stock, including horses, may live in the city."

City attorney David Laredo told The Pine Cone Wednesday he believes small horses and other service animals should be considered legal within the city limits.

"Service animals are protected under the law as long as they behave," Laredo said. "Federal and state laws prohibit discrimination against disabled people."

To clarify the city's municipal code, the city council in February will go over the city's rule on service animals, Cort said. It's possible the council could vote to allow animals of all kinds, or just certain types, as service animals.

"I think many people's eyebrows are going to rise, because they are going to hear that some people with psychosis have [service] birds that make them feel better."

Cort, who owns a business restoring historic buildings, is worried that business owners could be forced to pay to modify their businesses to allow for extra accessibility for unusual service animals.

"I would hope that individuals who want a more exotic animal wouldn't impose significant restrictions or costs on small businesses or small Victorian [buildings]," he said. "To pile on more responsibilities for service animals is unjust and unfair, and I think would be an imposition of a Draconian nature."

In November, the council voted to exempt chickens from



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the list of banned farm animals so one resident could keep a few as pets.

Cort said a couple of years ago he was at a P.G. restaurant and had an experience with a bird. It wasn't clear if it was a service animal or just a pet.

"A woman came in with a parrot on her shoulder, and it pooped in my food," he said. "That was the end of my meal."

The owners of the miniature horse, Harvey Brodsky and his wife, whose name he would not disclose, declined to be interviewed because they didn't want to draw attention to the animal. But everyone The Pine Cone spoke to for the article was already aware of the horse.

Miniature horses are not as unusual as some service animals being used. Capuchin monkeys are said to be helpful for people with spinal cord injuries, potbellied pigs can be trained to help the visually impaired, and ferrets and iguanas are used for anxiety.

The Times article even profiled a St. Louis man who uses a parrot to help control his psychotic tendencies.

While Cort, like others, understands the importance of service dogs, he questioned whether other animals might pose a health risk to the public.

"You have a responsibility to provide for health and safety for yourself and your neighbor," Cort said. "If we are going to bring country animals into the city, we have to find out what would allow and disallow those animals. Would they bring diseases?"

In 2005, the American Veterinary Medical Association stated, "The AVMA does not support the use of nonhuman primates as assistance animals because of animal welfare concerns, the potential for serious injury and animal-to-human disease transmission risks."

From all accounts, the owners of the miniature horse in Pacific Grove keep a fairly low profile. Conti-Yeo said she has not received any complaints about the animal.

Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce President Moe Ammar said he hasn't fielded concerns from business owners, either.

"I have not heard a thing," Ammar said. "I work and live downtown and have never seen the creature."

At the meeting, a vote was called to make changes to the group's bylaws to provide greater oversight of the board, including how it imposes and collects assessments and late charges. Ray was chosen by the board to be one of three "inspectors" for the election.

According to Ray's report, when the ballots were turned in, only 23 of 57 met the

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legal requirements for the vote. The rest were disqualified. With so many ballots disqualified, the amendment could not be adopted for lack of a quorum.

At this point, Ray and another inspector insisted they were required by law to keep possession of the ballots. When the 85-yearold Ray tried to leave the meeting room with the sealed ballots, he claimed he was detained by a board member, John Endriz. Moments later, Ray reported he was "threateningly confronted" by another board member, Eric Sand, and was told he was "under citizen's arrest."

Tracy Brown, commander of the sheriff's Monterey Coastal Station, said a deputy was sent to the community center after his office received a report of a disturbance with "heated tempers.'

After the deputy arrived, he determined the dispute was civil in nature, and he decided the ballots should go to the company that manages Los Tulares.

Going to court

The Dec. 2 incident is the latest flare-up in a dispute that led to a lawsuit which was filed Sept. 21, 2007 by several Los Tulares residents against the homeowners association and its board.

The suit alleges the association conducted illegal elections for its board and improperly tried to raise homeowner's annual dues from \$550 to \$1,900.

The suit also contends the board illegally made decisions rgarding the construction, repair, modification and of roads.

Monterey County Superior Court Judge Susan Dauphine ruled Nov. 4, 2008 that the Los Tulares Homeowners Association is subject to the Davis-Stirling Act, a state law governing homeowners associations.

"We consider her ruling to be a major homeowner victory," former board member Frank Koucky said. He is one of the five plaintiffs in the suit.

According to Koucky, the Davis-Stirling Act requires that all elections be "fair and secret." He insisted that voters in previous elections were not granted anonymity; therefore, the voting wasn't "secret."

The lawsuit is also asking that all elections dating from 2007 and 2008 be invalidated and new elections be scheduled.

The residents are divided into three camps, Koucky said.

"One is the 'follow-the-law' group," he explained. "Another is the 'don't follow-thelaw' group. And the third is the 'why-can'twe-get-along?' group."

Koucky said the lawsuit was only filed as a last resort.

"This is an old association, and there are some stubborn people who want to hold onto power while ignoring the law," he added.

Thomas D'Amato, an attorney representing the homeowners association and its board, declined comment.

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on concessions for affordable housing projects wouldn't permit the number of units and restaurant as proposed. He suggested revising the plans to include 10 units, with one of them designated affordable so the commission could approve the restaurant as a concession. The other space in the building could be used as zoning allows, such as for

Agha said he disagreed with Conroy's interpretation of the law. He said the bank was threatening foreclosure, and he and Chaplan were losing \$25,000 per month on the unused property.

"The longer we leave it vacant, the more it will deteriorate and be an eyesore in this town," he told the commission last week. "Work with us, please."

Carmel Residents Association President Barbara Livingston said affordable housing is a laudable goal but difficult for a small city like Carmel to accommodate. She also said the CRA opposes "spot zoning" — such as changing the land use to accommodate a restaurant that would otherwise not be allowed — and Assemblyman Bill Monning's office sent a letter informing the commission it has the responsibility to not grant concessions that would damage the

city's community character.

"If I had known [Barbara Livingston] was going to go to Bill Monning," Agha respond-"I would have given him my side, and you would not have seen that letter."

Planning commissioner Robin Wilson favored "a slight bend in the law" if it provides the practical outcome of more senior housing in Carmel. "It may be spot zoning, but sometimes spot zoning is a pretty good

Conroy then said Agha and Chaplan might be able to get more concessions one for allowing the number of rental rooms in the building and another for the restaurant if they agreed to make at least 20 percent of the units affordable.

Agha consented, and commissioners unanimously voted to approve the use permit for the senior housing and restaurant, as long as they received assurance all the residents would be able to afford to eat there, since their homes will not contain kitchens.

But after the meeting, Conroy read the new 2009 version of the Government Code and discovered the clause, "if permitted by local ordinance" had been added to the section allowing a city to give concessions for density like that bestowed upon the Carmel Inn project. Carmel has no such ordinance, and it would take at least six to nine months to draft and adopt one - if the California Coastal Commission would even approve it.

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Sculptor chosen to honor civil rights hero

A CITY in Florida will honor Martin Luther King Jr. with a bronze statue of the slain civil rights leader created by a Carmel sculptor.

Steven Whyte received the commission after officials from Hollywood, Fla., conducted a nationwide search and interviewed 47 candidates.

Whyte is the owner of a Carmel gallery, Wellington's Legacy Fine Art Sculpture. He is perhaps best known locally as the "Sculptor in the Park" at the annual Carmel Art Festival, where he creates a larger-than-life-sized statue of a noted figure in American history at Devendorf Park while an

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audience looks on.

For Whyte, a native of England, the commission is a great honor. But it's not an easy task.

"This is our third Martin Luther King piece," Whyte explained. "It's always a struggle to reproduce his likeness. He's very close to people's hearts, so you've got to get it right. The statue is going to effect a lot of people's emotions."

If all goes according to plan, Whyte and his staff will complete a clay sculpture of King in the next two weeks. The clay piece will then be sent to Marina, where it will be cast in bronze. "We're hoping to ship it to Florida by the middle of March," Whyte added.

Once the statue arrives in Florida, it will be installed in a downtown Hollywood park. Accompanying the statue will be the complete text of King's "I Have a Dream" speech.

Whyte's studio and gallery are located in Su Vecino Court on Dolores Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

After surviving disco and the British Invasion, doo-wop is here to stay

NEIL YOUNG once sang that it's better to burn out than to fade away. While countless rock 'n' rollers have done both, Joe Terry refuses to do either.

"I'm going to keep singing as long as my body allows it," boasted Terry, a 68-year-old charter member of Danny and the Juniors, who will perform in "The Best of Doo-Wop," Friday, Jan. 23, at Sunset Center. Danny and the Juniors will be joined on stage by The Four Preps, The Olympics and a tribute to The Drifters.

Doo-wop was a vocal-based style of rhythm and blues that was enormously popular in the 1950s and early 1960s. Terry's group etched its place in rock 'n' roll history with the release of "At the Hop" in 1957, which reached the top of the Billboard Charts. While the song is undeniable catchy, Terry attributes much of its success to the marketing genius of early rock 'n' roll's greatest promoter, Dick Clark.

"I was visiting with Dick just yesterday," Terry said Tuesday in a phone interview with The Pine Cone. "We talked about the song. It was originally called 'Do the Bop.' It was Dick's idea to change the title to 'At the Hop.""

The name change did the trick, and the song was suddenly number one in the country, according to Terry, who is still amazed by the its popularity.

While the heyday of doo-wop passed by the time The Beatles took center stage, the genre has endured. In fact, by the mid-1970s — buoyed by the success of the movie, "American Graffiti," and the television show, "Happy Days" — doo-wop enjoyed a revival.

"We were working 250 days a year," Terry recalled about those days, 30 years ago.

Today, Danny and the Juniors play about 70 concerts a year, which suits Terry just fine. He's watched countless rock 'n' roll trends come and go, and he's convinced doo-wop is here to stay.

"Doo-wop is happy music," he added. "People can easily relate to it. We survived the Beatles, we survived disco, and we're still here."

Fab abs make Highlands Inn debut, ladies hit the kitchen

SUPER ABS — not rippling stomach muscles, but well fed red abalone raised by Monterey Abalone Co. in collaboration with scientists from the Moss Landing Marine Labs — debuted at a delightful dinner at Pacific's Edge restaurant in the Highlands Inn Tuesday night.

The event, presided over by executive chef Mark Ayers and wine director Mark Buzan, served as a blind tasting to determine whether people preferred conventionally farmed abalone, which feed off harvested wild kelp, or the newfangled Super Abs that eat kelp and farm-raised red seaweed keeping closer to their natural diet.

The evening grew from an experiment at MLML in which scientists discovered they could cultivate red seaweed and feed it to farmed abalone, which took on the red hue

they are known for in the wild, grew at a faster rate while requiring less work harvesting wild kelp. They went to work with Monterey Abalone Co., which raises abalone in baskets beneath the commercial wharf in Monterey, to see if their Super Abs would tempt people's taste buds and do well on the market. Commercial harvesting of wild red abalone has been illegal since 1997.

"Tonight, all of you are eating my science experiment," exclaimed Thew Suskiewicz. "Two years of my work is on your plates, so I hope you enjoy it."

Ayers devised four courses, with guests sampling identical preparations of the two types of abalone — one served on round plates and the other on squares. Guests listened to the scientists and abalone growers speak as they dined, and at the end of the evening, they indicated which they preferred. (Super Abs won by a landslide.)

But the fun isn't limited to those fortunate folks. During February, the restaurant will offer the four preparations of Super Abs—ceviche-style with endive and citrus "caviar," traditionally pan fried in butter with lemon and parsley, steak-and-eggs style with lacquered bacon and tiny pearl onions, and seared and served with cauliflower puree and lobster butter—for \$15 per plate. Anyone partaking would do well to order a glass (or two) of the wines Buzan selected to accompany the dishes: for the first two, a crisp, citric 2007 Sauvignon Blanc from Voss, and for the second two, a rich, nicely balanced 2006 Alban Vineyards Viognier.

The special abalone dishes will be available in Pacific's Edge and the inn's Sunset Lounge, both of which are located in the main building at 120 Highlands Drive in Carmel. For more information or to make reservations, call (831) 620-1234.

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

residents. The county OES issued major storm warnings on Jan. 3, 2008, via the media, advising people to prepare to shelter in place for up to 72 hours. But during and

after the storm, the Peninsula cities and Pebble Beach had trouble notifying people of outages and where they could go for help. The grand jury concluded each jurisdiction should "set up a system of contacts with the local media, especially newspapers."

To reach residents, P.B. Fire used a reverse-911 system that was deemed largely

ineffective because people's cordless phones don't work without electricity, while P.G.'s was "too antiquated to use." Carmel and Monterey had no systems, though Carmel has since joined the Monterey County Telephone Emergency Notification System.

The grand jury recommended the county work with all jurisdictions and public service agencies on an "aggressive campaign to inform the public about the new emergency telephone system and to register as many people in the system as possible.'

Considering how many elderly people live on the Peninsula, ensuring the disabled and homebound are reached and cared for during disasters presents a significant challenge. P.B. Fire officials had a limited list of those who might need extra help and are reportedly working to update that database and combine it with the reverse-911 system.

Conversely, "Carmel, Monterey and Pacific Grove did not have such databases and relied primarily on the homebound and people with special needs to notify them if help was needed," though Carmel also worked with some local nonprofits.

The grand jury recommended all jurisdictions consult with disabled people when updating their emergency response plans, and it suggested they designate temporary shelter locations.

Carmel officials have already taken several steps against a repeat of the January 2008 storm, including adopting their new disaster response plan last month.

The 280-page Carmel Emergency

Operations Plan, drafted by former Monterey County OES director Harry Robins, meets state and federal standards and covers authority, responsibilities and operations. It replaces two documents drafted in 1981 and 1993.

"Carmel is unique, and presents some unique challenges," Robins said during his Dec. 2, 2008, presentation to the council, citing the city's lack of street addresses as an example. In response, he drafted a comprehensive, easy-to-use plan, so "someone who's not familiar with the city could come in and pick it up and get an understanding." It includes detailed checklists, duties and procedures for preparing for impending disaster, running the EOC, evacuating the city, closing the beach, equipping workers and the EOC, and working with volunteer groups.

The document names the city administrator, rather than the mayor, as the director of emergency services, includes a training plan for city workers, and provides a timeline for implementing the plan and a schedule for updating it every two years.

"The CEOP is a plan both for today and the future that will complement the city's long-standing commitment to effective emergency services management and disaster preparedness," police chief George Rawson told the city council.

He also explained that adopting the new plan would ensure the city is eligible for Federal Emergency Management Agency reimbursement for the costs of disaster management or hazard mitigation.

Not the city or the school district's fault

THE DEATH of Joel Woods in front of Pacific Grove Middle School Sept. 2, 2008, was a terrible tragedy for the man's family, for the school and for the community.

It was not, however, the city's or the school district's fault.

According to police, the accident was caused when a driver under the influence of prescription medication careened down Forest Avenue, colliding with Woods while he tried to enter his vehicle after picking up his son at school. From witness accounts and all the other evidence available at this point, the police account seems to be true.

In which case, the fault for the accident lies with just one person: The intoxicated driver.

However, the family has filed a claim against the City of Pacific Grove, alleging that somehow the city was responsible for the death of Mr. Woods, because the street was too narrow, the drop-off point for the school was in the wrong place, etc., etc. The claim will inevitably lead to a lawsuit, which Pacific Grove taxpayers will have to pay to defend. It could also lead to a sizable award for the Woods family, which will come from taxpayers' wallets.

While we sympathize with the family, we object to any attempt to make the city's taxpayers pay for their loss.

Civil courts are supposed to be places where justice is served. If Party A damages Party B, Party B can ask Party A for restitution. If Party A refuses to make good for the damage he caused, state law (and a long legal tradition dating back to biblical times) allows Party B to ask a judge to compel Party A to pay up.

However, too often in our society, the civil courts have become places where money is redistributed from people who have it to people who don't, regardless of who may be at fault in a particular situation.

So if Party A damages Party B, but Party A has no money, Party B looks for some other convenient individual or group with deep pockets to sue.

This strategy is particularly effective if Party B, the one bringing the lawsuit, also has no money and is in a particularly sympathetic position.

Thus, the jury looking at a case of grievous damage done by A to B looks at the rich party brought into the lawsuit because he is rich, decides he could easily do without some of his money, and awards it to A, regardless of the fact that the rich party did not cause the damage to A. This happens all the time in our civil courts.

In the current circumstances, the intoxicated driver probably has some insurance or assets for the Woods family to gain in a suit against her. But the City of Pacific Grove and the Pacific Grove School District (which will also surely be sued) have, in effect, unlimited assets.

That is why the city and the school district will be sued: Because they have money. They are not at fault in the accident which killed Joel Woods. But they'll have to pay anyway. If you're reading this editorial and you happen to live in Pacific Grove or the PGUSD (which includes parts of Pebble Beach), then you are going to be handed a very large bill for something you had nothing to do with.

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
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

"They just open the door and grab the mail." But that's easily prevented, he pointed out, by getting a post office box or purchasing a locking mailbox.

While police don't learn of some gang members' arrival until the department receives a tip or something goes wrong, officers usually know when a gang member on probation moves into town, since the county keeps track of where they live. In addition, some convicted gang members must register in person at the local police department whenever they

"When they're on probation, we always keep an eye on them, and tips will come in," Sepagan said. If police are suspicious, officers will arrange with the probation department for a sweep of past offenders and will pick up anyone found in viola-

hotel at Junipero and Fifth for a water leak. Crews provided manpower in attempts to shut off a water leak at the meter box. It was determined the leak was on the Cal-Am side of the meter. Cal-Am was notified and sent crews to make repairs.
