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S.F. Chronicle exposes 'secret' Boy Scout deal ... that was in *The Pine Cone* four years ago

AN ARTICLE in the San Francisco Chronicle last week, "Political pull helped fix Scouts' dam problem," accuses U.S. Rep. Sam Farr and former state Senator Bruce McPherson of trading favors for campaign contributions, and a local Boy Scout council of cutting a secret deal to hide its role in the illegal construction of a dam on the North Fork of the Little Sur River.

The story reported that Farr and McPherson received donations from two Granite Construction Co. officials with ties to the Pico Blanco Boy Scout Camp in Big Sur, and suggested the two politicians helped the camp evade prosecution by the National Marine Fisheries Service. The federal watchdog agency believed a temporary dam on the Little Sur River — which creates a summertime swimming hole for Boy Scouts — might have been responsible for killing at least 30 steelhead trout in 2002.

Public a long time

The Chronicle story implied that, because of the campaign contributions, the Scout council "avoided fines and quietly secured a favorable settlement agreement" in June 2003. The agreement, according to the Chronicle, was never made public. But the details of that agreement were

reported in *The Carmel Pine Cone* Aug. 12, 2005, based on interviews with an attorney representing the Boy Scouts who made no effort to conceal them.

"Instead of a fine," Chronicle reporter Seth Rosenfeld

Businesses lament Pro-Am timing

■ Golf tournament arrives on Valentine's and Presidents Day weekend

THE MONTH of February usually provides a much-needed boost to Peninsula businesses during what otherwise would be a very slow season.

But this year, the three big February draws — the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, Valentine's Day and the Presidents Day holiday — are all happening on the same weekend, leaving a lot of business owners and their employees disappointed.

The scheduling snafu happened because New Year's Day fell on a Thursday, according to Ollie Nutt, president of the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, which hosts the AT&T Pro-Am. PGA officials didn't want the golf pros traveling during the holidays, so they pushed the first event back a week. The AT&T Pro-Am is the sixth tournament on the PGA calendar, which moved it to the second week after the Super Bowl and the week after the Pro Bowl.

(With New Year's falling on a Friday in 2010, the shift will happen again next year, with the pro-am scheduled for Feb. 8-14, 2010.)

No football clash

Nutt said tournament organizers don't mind the additional week, which means more potential pro football players in the field of celebrity golfers, and less competition for fans who might normally have to choose between golf and foot-

EIR favors Marina desalination plant

AN ENVIRONMENTAL study five years in the making was released last week by the California Public Utilities Commission, and it concludes that a desal plant in Marina is the best long-term solution to the Monterey Peninsula's perennial water shortage.

Five fewer miles of pipeline and no open-water intakes

The plant, which would cost at least \$100 million, would not provide any new water for infill housing, remodels or building on lots of record, the EIR says.

"While any water supply project in Monterey County is controversial, a project that includes water for growth may be very controversial," according to the EIR.

If finalized by the CPUC, the document would put an end to California American Water Co.'s plan for a desal plant in Moss Landing.

"From an environmental perspective," said Eric Zigas, project manager for the EIR, "there is a better alternative to the Moss Landing project."

The EIR, released Jan. 30, says the 11 million-gallon-per-day desal plant proposed for North Marina would be better for the environment than Cal Am's Moss Landing project because of several factors.

"You have five miles less pipeline; you don't have open water intakes or rely on once-through cooling," Zigas told *The Pine Cone*.

A desal operation in North Marina would draw seawater and brackish groundwater from coastal wells instead of tak-

ing water from the Moss Landing harbor and pumping it through the power plant's once-through cooling system, a system disliked by environmentalists because it kills fish and other marine organisms.

Two scenarios in Marina

A regional water supply project, proposed by Water for Monterey County, is also analyzed in the EIR. That project would also utilize a desal plant in Marina, and would draw

Pasadera to file for bankruptcy

PASADERA COUNTRY Club LLC will file for bankruptcy protection in the next few days, but its members won't notice a difference in the management of the club, according to spokesman David Armanasco.

"There will be no change in playing golf yesterday or tomorrow," he said. The filing also affects only the club and its facilities, not people who own homes in the development.

The three partners in the LLC — Tom deRegt, Lee Newell and Fred Bates — have poured almost \$40 million into Pasadera, but the club has operated at annual deficit ranging from \$1.9 million to \$2.4 million "over quite a few years," Armanasco said.

Foundation starts checking backgrounds of its volunteers

WITH INCREASING frequency, organizations that rely on free help are looking into the personal histories of people who volunteer, and The Carmel Foundation is among the latest to undertake the security measure. While the move has offended some, CEO Jill Sheffield defended the practice and said it's becoming "the gold standard" for nonprofits.

"The good news is nothing bad happened to generate this," she said this week. "We did it to be proactive and protect our seniors."

No hits

The foundation initiated the checks late last year, beginning with its own board members in November and its paid staff in December. In late January, Sheffield sent a letter to each volunteer asking the person to enter his or her name and Social Security Number at mybackgroundcheck.com.

The system searches for criminal history and verifies the SSN is legitimate, and Sheffield logs on each morning to obtain a report showing the names of volunteers who have initiated the search and whether they are clear or have "hits." If someone does, Sheffield contacts mybackgroundcheck.com to determine the nature of the issue.

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CPD NAMES DETECTIVE, COMMANDER

A NEW detective is on the job at Carmel P.D. Patrol officer Rachel Lightfoot — known for her skills nabbing criminals on the job and for her talents as an equestrienne off the job — took on the new role Jan. 1. She replaced officer Jesse Juarez, who worked the plainclothes job for four years before heading back out on patrol.

The job shift is department policy, designed to give police officers a wide range of experiences, and Lightfoot is ready for her turn at the detective's desk.

"A couple of years ago, I investigated the case of a con man who was using a dead person's I.D.," she said. "It was really satisfying to start with a lead and put the puzzle pieces together, and follow through to get a conviction."

Since then, Juarez has spent some time mentoring Lightfoot, teaching her techniques of detection, and she worked a cases involving elder abuse, financial crimes, fraud and other matters. She attended state-certified classes on basic detective work that covered how to handle a crime scene, write a search warrant and investigate a death. She's also taking classes on fighting computer crimes.

The new assignment has her working with a lot of other law enforcement agencies, comparing notes and details to help each other make arrests and solve problems.

"We network with each other," she explained. "We've solved a lot of stuff that way — especially with the sheriff's office and sharing information, because usually the suspects are doing it in multiple jurisdictions."

So far, the toughest aspect of the new job is "juggling the case load and trying to get things done in a timely manner, because new things come in daily," she said.

But that doesn't mean Lightfoot doesn't want the opportunity to tackle all that work. "I'm just really excited to be accepted for this position and have a lot of opportunities to work with the community," she said, adding that she hopes to host seminars on preventing elder abuse and other salient points for Carmel residents and community members.

"And I have an open-door policy if anyone wants to come talk to me about anything," said Lightfoot, who is in the Junipero Street station Sunday through Thursday.

In another change, Sgt. Mike Calhoun was promoted to the new commander position approved by the Carmel City Council, and he was presented to the council in December.

"I wanted you to see someone who I'm very, very proud of this evening," Chief George Rawson said in his introduction of Calhoun, the 25-year CPD veteran who is now second in command at the department.

Rawson praised Calhoun's leadership, service and dedication to community policing before Calhoun took the oath at the Dec. 2, 2008, council meeting, which was also well attended by Calhoun's family and fellow officers.

"I expect great things from you," Rawson told Calhoun, adding that he knows his new commander will take the department "to an even higher level of community policing than it is today."

Calhoun thanked the mayor and council for approving the job, which carries with it more duties and a raise, and offers opportunities not just for him, but for others in the agency.

"We're working together to make this organization the best we can," he said.



Did you know...

Ike Liked the Monterey Peninsula - Locals liked President Dwight Eisenhower as much as he liked the Monterey Peninsula when he and his wife, Mamie, visited in the summer of 1956. He arrived after a 120 mile train trip from San Francisco to Monterey during which he spent an hour waving to well-wishers from the open back platform of the train. Ike was met with a cheering reception on a late August evening in Monterey. His caravan then made the short drive to the Cypress Point Club. Ike came for three days of golf, caught "vacation fever" and stayed for two more. It was a happy break after he was nominated for a second term by a Republican convention in San Francisco. Ike and Mamie spent most of their time at the Cypress Club which only had 130 members (versus 250 today). His suite is still referred to as the Eisenhower room. While at Pebble Beach, the problems of the world would not go away. Ike would need to respond to a recent nuclear test by the USSR and monitor the growing Suez crisis. 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No re-do for restaurant, no new windows for hotel

THE OWNERS of the Village Corner restaurant have to figure out a better way to shield their patio from the elements, and the owners of the San Antonio Inn must remove their illegally installed aluminum windows and put the old wood ones back in, according to votes by the Carmel Design Review Board Jan. 28.

Designer Claudio Ortiz, hired by Bob Leidig and Mike Draper to help make the patio in their restaurant at Mission and Sixth a more pleasant place to dine, said the flower-lined spot is too hot when it's sunny and too cold when it's windy, foggy or rainy. He proposed building a trellis to support canvas canopies over the outdoor eating area, and hanging five heaters on the walls. Ortiz also sought permission to paint the north wall raw sienna and the east wall an adobe color, hang three pendants from the canopies, install five light fixtures and put mosaic tiles on the fire pit in the center of the patio.

Assistant planner Marc Wiener took issue with several aspects of the design, describing the trellis as too large and out of character for the building, and the proposed yellow canopy too bright. Wiener also objected to the paint colors and pointed out that the proposed use of a "faux finish" contradicts downtown design guidelines. He recommended leaving the walls alone or proposing a different color.

Ortiz defended his design, saying the beamed trellis would "provide a unique ambiance," and the canopies could be retracted according to the weather. He said he lowered the height in response to Wiener's comments and argued the design fits well while making eating lunch and dinner in the courtyard more comfortable.

Board member Jonathan Sapp said he liked the concept but found the structure too massive and recommended Ortiz "go lighter." He also wanted a single canopy color and said

painting the courtyard one color, instead of two, would "punch it up nicely without it being un-Carmel."

Member Mary Bell disagreed. "I like the way the beams blend in with the building, and I think Claudio's eye for scale is pretty good," she said. "Generally, he doesn't present us something that's going to be overwhelming."

DRB member Keith Paterson could find no reason to object to two colors for the canopies or the proposed wall paint. "I think the color chosen is a little strong, but I wouldn't necessarily go against it," he said.

But board member Michael Lynch felt the trellis was too large, and chairman Michael LePage entirely agreed with Wiener's report. "You have a lot of creative stuff going on here, but some of it is in conflict with the design guidelines," he said. "I think staff's recommendation to come back with a redesign is appropriate."

Paterson moved to delay voting on the application so Ortiz could return with new drawings, and the motion passed 4-1, with Bell dissenting.

Hard time for new windows

Ross and Lynette Farley, owners of the San Antonio Inn on San Antonio between Ocean and Seventh avenues, were ordered to stop installing new aluminum windows in the shingle-sided hotel after the work "came to the city's attention," according to Wiener's report.

The couple sought after-the-fact permission from the DRB to put in the new double-paned aluminum windows.

The design guidelines, however, indicate "materials other than authentic, unclad wood are appropriate only when it can be demonstrated that the proposed material is more appropriate to the architecture," Wiener reported.

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

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KIDS BENEFIT FROM THIEF WITH A HEART

■ Or maybe he just wasn't interested in what he stole

THE MACY'S bags sitting on a downtown Carmel corner last Thursday afternoon seemed to promise bounty for the person who swiped them while their owner, Dianne Terrell, was in her house gathering belongings to take with her to the hospital.

In fact, the enticing-looking bags contained coloring books and stickers destined for 732 kindergartners. Terrell, chairman of the Hospital on the Hill program at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula, was devastated to think of all those disappointed kids. The coloring books are part of Terrell's outreach effort to help children learn the hospital is not a bad or frightening place, so they might have less anxiety when they or their parents have to go there. Hospital on a Hill representatives speak with 1,600 kids at 22 schools each year.

"I just carried the two bags out, because I couldn't carry them all at one time," she said of the sacks filled with the kids' goodies that she left on the corner of Monte Verde and Seventh in front of her house. Then she went back inside to fetch personal items she'd need for her own hospitalization for back surgery.

"When I came back out, someone had stolen them, and I was totally hysterical," she said.

Nobody at city hall or L'Auberge Carmel across the street

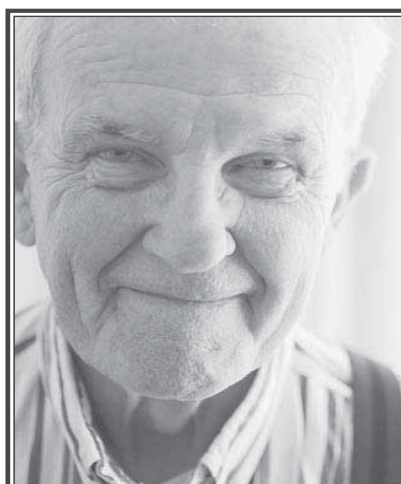
saw the thief, and Terrell believes someone driving by simply stopped and grabbed the bags. She hoped that when the thief realized they contained nothing of monetary value, the person would return them.

Recovered from a bench

A Carmel Foundation volunteer drove Terrell to the hospital and said she would check by the house to see if the bags were back. Terrell also planned to notify the Carmel Police Department, but the foundation volunteer called her before she could dial CPD.

"She phoned me at about 10:30 Friday morning. She had gotten a call from the concierge at Carmel Plaza, and they had the coloring books," Terrell said. A maintenance man had found the bags on a bench in front of the shopping center and brought them to the office, where a worker dug through, found an envelope with the foundation volunteer's name on it, and called her to come pick them up.

"The children will have their books and our program will go as planned, and I'm so relieved I can sleep and get well," she said. "I prayed and prayed that someone would return them and not put them in the trash. It's a blessing that the person who stole them had enough decency to return them."



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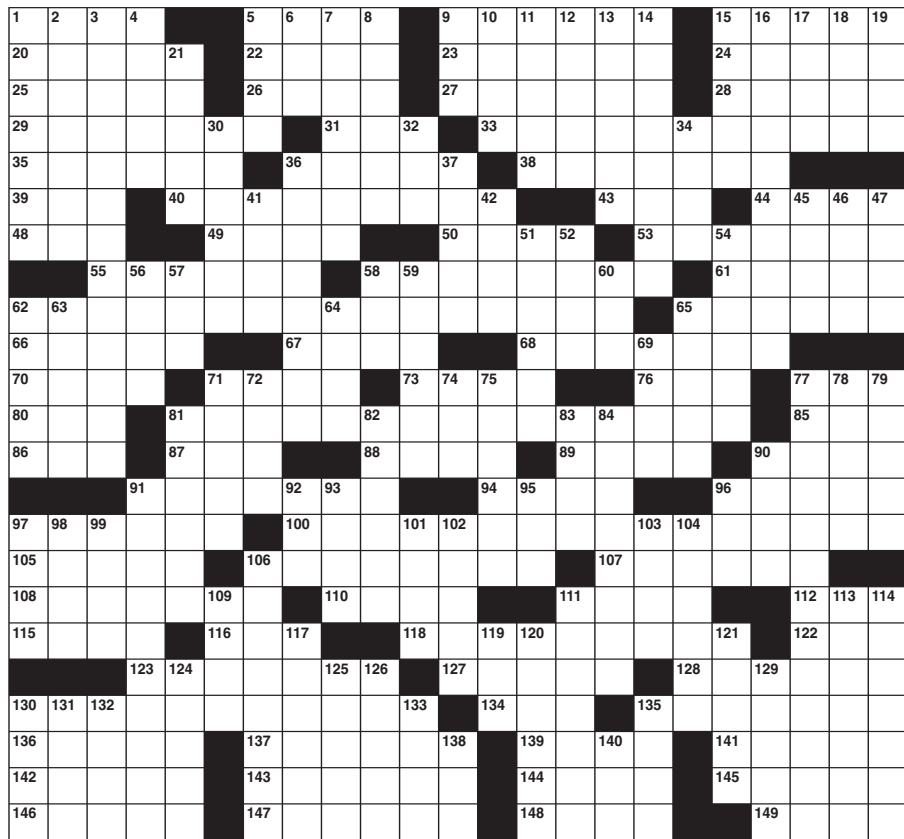

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Council rejects appeal of two-story house

HOMEOWNERS WHO tried to stop two neighbors from building a two-story home in front of them lost an appeal to the Carmel City Council Tuesday, though they could still take their fight to the California Coastal Commission. Carol Bergere and Ron and Marian Wormser own two-story homes on Lopez Avenue and argued that Jeff Baron and Kevin D'Angelo's proposed remodel of their Camino Real home would be too large, ruin their views and invade their privacy.

The plans for the 2,999-square foot house, drawn by architect Peter Davis, underwent numerous changes during hearings at the Carmel Design Review Board before receiving approval last month. In response to requests from planners and board members, Baron and D'Angelo reoriented the second story and reduced its size, dropped the height twice (from 22.5 feet to 21.5 feet, and then to 20.25 feet), removed the roof eaves from the second story, decided not to plant two tall trees, moved a studio and frosted an upstairs window.

Assistant planner Marc Wiener said those modifications "achieve a fair balance of view opportunities and maintain reasonable privacy for all of the properties affected by the project, as encouraged in the design guidelines." He concluded the home would fit well in a neighborhood filled with two-story houses, pointed out the height is almost four feet below the maximum, and recommended the council deny the appeal and uphold the DRB's approval.

Representing Bergere, Salinas attorney Brian Finegan said the proposed house would box his client in and rob her of the view from the ground floor of her house, the area most used for entertaining. Upstairs, he said, consists only of a small master bedroom.

"Is your 110-square-foot second-story bedroom where you take your guests who come to your home to enjoy a glass of wine and watch the

sunset on the beautiful Monterey Bay?" Finegan asked.

He pointed out the people living next to Baron and D'Angelo could also add a second story to their house, which would further block Bergere's view.

"A better alternative is the original project application," he said, which put the second story lower on the sloped lot and farther from his client's home. "Ideally, there would be no second story. If there is a second story, clearly another location would be better."

But that alternative would be the Wormsers' "worst nightmare," according to their architect, Terry Latasa, because it would completely block their view.

Ron Wormser also objected to the orientation of the second floor and its position higher on the lot. "It presents a massive presence adjacent to our main living level and is out of compliance with the design guidelines," he said.

In defense of their design, D'Angelo said he and Baron had spent nine months trying to come up with plans that would be acceptable to the neighbors while allowing them to enjoy a view similar to their opponents'.

"We are not asking for a second story that would partially obscure the ocean views of a one-story rear neighbor," he said. "We are not asking for a second story that is at the same level as our neighbors' second stories; in fact, both of our neighbors are so much higher on the slope that our second story is lower than their ground-floor levels."

They provided 15 letters from supportive residents, and a few people spoke in their favor at the Feb. 3 meeting.

Only way to save a view

D'Angelo and Baron's defense resonated with the majority of the council. "There is a view held by some Carmelites that a view is always protected under our code, and that's not the case," councilman Gerard Rose said. Instead, people have to share.

"The only way you can protect a view if you live uphill from someone is to buy the property below you," he said.

"They made a good-faith effort to come up with what works on a very difficult site," commented council member Ken Talmage. "It's fair and equitable. I think there are some problems with the views, but those problems are shared."

Only Mayor Sue McCloud took issue with the design, suggesting it be lowered another three feet and asking Baron and D'Angelo to reconsider the location of their hot tub.

McCloud said she was only suggesting the council work with the applicants on the design, which she said "flies in the face of our mass and bulk design guidelines the way it is now," due to an appearance of three stories.

The council voted 4-1 to deny the appeals and uphold approval of the design.

Rosie's concert moved

SINGER-SONGWRITER REBECCA Sayre was planning to play at Rosie's Cracker Barrel Saturday, Feb. 7, but the concert will be moved to the Village Fish House. A week ago, Rosie's management was warned by the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control that a 1999 lawsuit settlement, which was negotiated by a previous owner of Rosie's, prohibits the business from offering live music.

Sayre, who lives in Nashville, Tenn., has been working full-time as a musician since 2004 but only recently decided to go on the road as a solo act.

"This is the first time I've been able to go out and be a solo act," she said. "I'm more portable now."

Unlike many other solo acoustic performers, Sayre side-steps melancholy, introspective music. Playing a mix of jazz, pop, blues and folk, she prefers to keep things upbeat.

"I don't do a lot of victim songs," she said. "There are enough of those out there. I try to keep it light, funny and honest."

Sayre's concert starts at 4 p.m. Admission is \$10. The Fish House is located at 19 E. Carmel Valley Road. If you're interested in attending, you'll need to RSVP by calling (831) 659-2629.

New information about Moss Landing LBAM rearing lab

DETAILS HAVE emerged about a facility in Moss Landing that will be used to raise millions of invasive light brown apple moths in an effort to eliminate the insect.

In what will be ground zero in the state for apple-moth rearing, about a dozen entomologists and researchers will soon set up shop in Moss Landing to raise and study apple moths so they can be sterilized and released.

"They will get moved in sometime over the next few weeks," said U.S. Department of Agriculture spokesman Larry Hawkins.

The idea behind the sterilization program is to inundate the fertile population with sterile moths to cause a "population collapse" of the destructive insect.

The LBAM rearing operation will be housed in specially outfitted modular trailers. Apple-moth colonies that exist in labs in Albany, will be moved to the new facility to begin rearing.

Once the insects are adults, they will be transferred to a San Francisco Bay Area facility to be sterilized, then be brought back to Moss Landing for more testing until they are released.

Hawkins said radiation will be used to sterilize the scores of moths raised at the new facility. "The same type of radiation is used to irradiate food to clear it of germs," Hawkins said.

Though other insects such as Mediterranean fruit flies are sterilized in the pupae stage, Hawkins said apple moths will be sterilized in the adult stage.

The California Department of Food and Agriculture believes the light brown apple moth, which has had devastating effects in Australia, could cause tens of millions of dollars in damage to state crops if not eradicated.

In the early stages, researchers at Moss Landing will determine how much radiation will be required for sterilization, while making sure the insects have proper flight characteristics and are healthy.

"We want a competitive insect, we just want one that is sterile," Hawkins said. "It will take some research to fine tune that process."

Releasing millions of LBAMs into the environment won't be a problem, since apple moths are only a threat to agriculture and horticulture in the pupae stage, not in the adult stage.

Through testing, researchers will also determine how many sterilized moths will be required to "overflow" the fertile population.

"You need 100 sterile fruit flies for every fertile fruit fly to ensure success," Hawkins said, citing an example.

The first of the sterilized apple moths will be released sometime this year, he said.

The moth-rearing program, a collaboration between the CDFA and the USDA, will be located on property across the street from the Moss Landing power plant. The land, at Highway 1 and Dolan Road, is the site of a former magnesium brick plant and is now

owned by Nader Agha.

The Moss Landing facility will also be the new home to another 250 or so employees researching other aspects of light brown apple moths. Those workers are currently at the LBAM headquarters in Watsonville.

If the program is successful, the operation in Moss Landing could be expanded and more employees hired, Hawkins said.

The facility is leased under a USDA contract, with costs to be shared by both agencies. Hawkins said he wasn't sure of the estimated annual cost to taxpayers to run the rearing facility but said that would be released in the coming months.

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Virginia Buby

May 1, 1925 ~ January 20, 2009

Mrs. Buby died on Tuesday, January 20th, 2009 at 9:15 pm. She died in her Monterey home, in her sleep, in her own bed, with her daughter Carol by her side. The morning of the 20th, Virginia was able to sit in her favorite Queen Anne arm chair and watch the Inauguration of our 44th President, a man for whom she had voted.

Virginia was born on May 1, 1925 in Brown City, Michigan at the home of her maternal grandparents, Frank and Mattie MacDougall. She graduated from Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan in June of 1947 and two weeks later married Don Buby. Three daughters and a son were born of this union. She reluctantly left her Michigan friends and family to comply with her husband's decision to move from Royal Oak, Michigan to Monterey, California in August of 1963.

Although their station wagon was crowded for the cross country trip, their nine year old collie Lady was more relaxed and happy than usual in the joy of having the entire family together in one small space. She had always thought it her job to keep everyone herded together. A letter of recommendation from her Michigan school principal in which the last sentence read "We were very sorry to lose Mrs. Buby as a teacher; our loss is California's gain" influenced the Monterey Peninsula Unified School District head of personnel to hire Mrs. Buby as a kindergarten teacher two days after their arrival in Monterey. She retired in June of 1991, to care for her mother, Frances MacDougall Williamson, who lived with Virginia for several years until her death.

More recently, Virginia enjoyed her memberships in Community Church of the Monterey Peninsula, Carmel Foundation, Wayne State University Alumni Association and California Retired Teachers' Association.

She is survived by her daughter Diane Hulphers living in Burlington, Vermont, her son Gordon Russell residing in Pacific Grove, her daughter Carol Surtees residing in Monterey, her granddaughter Kristin Hodges of Santa Cruz, her grandson Django Hulphers of Santa Cruz, and her great-granddaughter Anthea Hulphers of Santa Cruz.

Mrs. Buby was preceded in death by her husband Donald in June of 1988 and their daughter Linda Jean in May of 1952. At Mrs. Buby's request, **no memorial services will be held.** It was also Mrs. Buby's wish that any memorial contributions be sent to the donor's favorite charity.



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New charge added to permits

PEOPLE PULLING building permits for residential and commercial projects will have to pay a little bit more, according to a Carmel City Council decision Tuesday to add a state-mandated surcharge to all building permits.

The fee — required by a Senate Bill aimed at raising money for innovation in green construction — will be \$4 per \$100,000 of project value, with a minimum surcharge of \$1.

According to a Feb. 3 report prepared by building official John Hanson, SB 1473 took effect Jan. 1 and requires jurisdictions

to assess a surcharge on all building permits for the newly created Building Standards Administration Special Revolving Fund.

"This fund will emphasize the development, adoption, publication, updating and educational efforts associated with green building standards," he said.

The city will send the money to the state quarterly and can keep 10 percent for "administrative costs and code enforcement education." The council approved the surcharge as part of its consent agenda Tuesday.

Lucy the horse and other service animals OK in P.G.

SERVICE ANIMALS of all types — including a miniature horse named Lucy used by a disabled woman in Pacific Grove — are automatically protected by law, and the P.G. Municipal Code does not need to be revised to reflect that, the city council decided Wednesday.

In clarifying the city code on service animals, which only specifically mentions dogs, city attorney David Laredo said service animals such as monkeys, cats and others are permitted to accompany their disabled owners anywhere in town, because state and federal laws require it.

Mike and Cathy Early wrote a letter to the council in support of their Weldon Grove Place neighbor Rona Halpern, who uses her small horse, Lucy, to get around. Halpern wasn't mentioned in the city council agenda.

"We have experienced no problems as a result of Lucy's presence in the neighborhood," according to the letter. The miniature horse is "clean, quiet, very friendly."

In a Pine Cone story Jan. 23 about service animals and Lucy, Mayor Dan Cort said he was concerned business owners might be forced to modify their businesses to allow for extra accessibility for unusual service animals.

"Lucy the horse is welcome in Pacific Grove," Cort said during the council meeting.

Guidelines in the Americans with Disabilities Act define "service animals" to mean any guide dog, signal dog or other animal individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability," according to Laredo's memorandum presented to council.

"If you exclude a service animal," Laredo said, "then you expose yourself to liability."

Laredo said business owners must allow service animals into their establishments, regardless of the type of animal.

"That doesn't mean that people with service animals have carte blanche," he said. "The animals have to behave appropriately."

Laredo wrote the memorandum, which examines federal and state disability laws, in response to an inquiry by a council member as to whether the municipal code should be revised to include service animals other than dogs.

Though the law indicates service animals must be "trained," there is no regulation on who should train them, or how, Laredo said.

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Council supports water projects

IN A particularly timely move, considering the state's release Friday of an environmental impact report analyzing potential solutions to the Monterey Peninsula's perpetual water shortage, the Carmel City Council voted Tuesday to adopt a resolution in support of the projects proposed by Water for Monterey County.

WMC — formerly known as the Regional Plenary Oversight Group — developed a group of projects to provide up to 26,500 acre-feet of water per year. Among them are diverting excess water from the Salinas River, recycling water, desalinating brackish groundwater, injecting water into the Seaside Basin, capturing stormwater and improving conservation in various ways.

"The regional projects and water management programs appear to be cost effective for ratepayers and have a significant regional benefit," and "a collaboration of political and quasi-political entities in Monterey County is beneficial and necessary to develop and implement a comprehensive strategy to achieve sustainable and cost-effective water supply solutions," according to the resolution adopted by the council Feb. 3 as part of its consent agenda.

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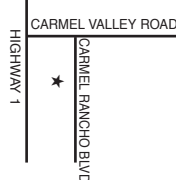

reported, "The deal required the council to install a fish ladder; modify the dam's spillway to allow steelhead to migrate upstream; and enhance the stream bed habitat for fish. The project cost more than \$1 million, a council official said."

The Chronicle claimed the settlement agreement was never made public, but attorney Eric Robinson, representing the Boy Scouts, discussed its details with The Pine Cone in 2005.

Also not mentioned in the Chronicle article is the irony of the controversy. The Chronicle is owned by Hearst

ball.

But it's not good for Peninsula businesses, especially this year, that had hoped for two strong weekends in February.

"I can't think of a positive spin on it," commented Monta Potter, CEO of the Carmel Chamber of Commerce. "People have been talking about it for months, and they're disappointed. There have been years when all three were on different weekends." With the sad state of the economy, she added, the timing is especially unfortunate.

A wedding shortage

Valentine's Day is huge for the bridal industry, and its falling on a Saturday usually means major money. Not this year, according to the Rev. Patt O'Brien of the Monterey Stone Wedding Chapel next to Tarpy's Roadhouse in Monterey.

"Usually Valentine's Day is very busy for us," she said. "But I have just two weddings, and I should have eight, nine or 10."

O'Brien speculated people are worried about finding hotel rooms for themselves and their guests, and restaurants able to accommodate their rehearsal dinners and receptions. She said many vendors at a recent bridal fair in Monterey were complaining about the unfortunate timing.

"It's not just people like me," she added. "It's the restaurants and hotels that could have had two busy weekends instead of just one."

Kathee McFarland, who has owned and run Weddings by the Sea consulting since 1986, said the holiday is netting her zero business this year.

"I can remember one time on a Valentine's Day on a Saturday, we had 27 weddings," she said. "So this year is really bad."

In addition, restaurants, particularly those that cater to romance on Feb. 14 and groups of golf fans during the AT&T, are reportedly struggling to accommodate the two.

Potter said innkeepers, restaurateurs and others need to pitch alternatives to potential customers. "They need to keep marketing for the weekend before and the weekend after," she said.

Economy affects everyone

Nutt said the national recession is affecting everyone's business, and the tournament has seen drops in sponsorships and ticket sales this year.

"I'm not surprised to hear you say others' sales are off," he said. "It's more the state of the economy. If the economy were stronger, we would probably be more of an overlap than we are now."

Sponsorships have declined nearly 10 percent, Nutt said, and ticket sales are off 19 percent from last year's high, when the pro-am raised \$6.74 million for charities. The drops mean about \$600,000 less in sponsorship money and \$150,000 less in ticket sales.

Organizers are cutting their expenses as much as possible, according to Nutt. Some are automatic: If a sponsor decides not to set up a tent on the 18th Hole, no one has to be paid to do it. But others are deliberate, and Nutt said cuts are being made in equipment and materials purchases, social events, uniforms, gifts, transportation and other areas. The tournament's annual budget is about \$9 million, most of which goes to prize money for the PGA pros.

Nutt said the tournament "will be hard pressed" to raise \$6.74 million for nonprofits this year. "But I sure as heck hope we're not below \$6 million."

How Will 403(b) Changes Affect You?

If you work for a hospital, school, college or other nonprofit organization, you may be contributing to a 403(b) retirement plan. If so, be aware that some key rules are changing.

Previously, your 403(b) may have allowed you to invest with several different providers, or vendors. Under new IRS regulations, however, you can now only move assets from one vendor to another if both vendors are on your employer's "approved" list. If your current vendor isn't on this list, you may need to switch vendors.

Here's another change: To withdraw money from your plan before you retire, you must now qualify for "hardship" withdrawals, such as those needed to pay for medical expenses or post-secondary tuition for yourself, your spouse or your dependents.

While these new regulations are somewhat more restrictive, your 403(b) plan is still a great way to save for retirement — so take full advantage of it.

McPherson did nothing inappropriate.

"In dealing with several environmental agencies, the Scouts did what any organization might do — they turned to their elected representatives for direction," the statement reads. "Two highly respected legislators, Democrat

Congressman Sam Farr and former Republican State Senator Bruce McPherson, helped arrange informational meetings between experts hired by the Scouts and appropriate government officials. These meetings assured the council operated its facility within all state and federal regulations and thanks, in part, to Mr. Farr's and Mr. McPherson's assistance, the Scouts were able to preserve their waterfront program by making significant improvements to their existing dam,

which now serves as a model for good stream management in the western United States." Nearly 2,000 Scouts from the Southwest U.S. visit the camp every summer.

The Boy Scout camp is currently closed and undergoing an extensive rehabilitation effort after barely surviving last summer's wildfires, which burned down several outbuildings. Gallegos said the facility is on target to begin welcoming boy scouts back to Big Sur as early as Memorial Day.

excess winter flows from the Salinas River.

Though the EIR says the North Marina project would be "slightly environmentally superior" to the regional project, the CPUC could reverse the priority in favor of the regional project, or it could decide to combine components from those projects.

"The commission can mix and match," Zigas said.

Steve Kasower, coordinator for the regional project, said he believed the EIR was fair. But he said the document didn't examine important aspects of the regional plan.

"Our project has some unique values not reflected in the EIR," he said. "For example, we are proposing to use green power for the entire project. The EIR doesn't explore the green power issue because it's a water EIR."

Cease and desist order possible

The release of the EIR comes just a few weeks before the State Water Resources Control Board is expected to issue a decision on whether to impose a cease and desist order on Cal Am, compelling the water company to drastically curtail

pumping from the Carmel River.

Cal Am has a right to draw 3,376 acre-feet of water each year from the Carmel River but has been allowed to withdraw 11,285 while trying to come up with another project.

All projects flawed

The EIR indicates all the projects have "significant and unavoidable impacts" on the environment, because of greenhouse gas emissions, noise, air quality and erosion.

The document also outlines unresolved issues, including relationships and agreements among water agencies, and the future of once-through cooling at Moss Landing.

Cal Am officials declined to discuss the EIR in detail because they hadn't gone through the entire lengthy document, but they made a general statement.

"We are so glad the document is out," said Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie. "This is a huge milestone in terms of getting a new water project."

The public will have a chance to weigh in on the EIR during a 60-day public comment period. In March, there will also be four public meetings. Zigas said the CPUC mailed 47,000 public-hearing notices to Peninsula water customers and any property owner within 300 feet of any proposed facility.

After the EIR process, the analysis will be presented to the CPUC, which will incorporate the final EIR into the review process for Cal Am's application to build a water project. The CPUC will then make a decision about which, if any, project or alternative Cal Am should pursue.

The final EIR is expected to be released sometime in the summer, said Andrew Barnsdale, staff member with the CPUC.

"We encourage everybody's comments," Barnsdale told a group at a Water for Monterey County meeting in Marina Wednesday. "Let us know how you feel about it."


The three phone book-size volumes of the EIR took a staff of 17 people to write and cost at least \$2 million to prepare, Zigas said.

The public meetings for the EIR will be Monday, March 2, at 1:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. at Embassy Suites, 1441 Canyon Del Rey Blvd., Seaside; Tuesday, March 3, at 6:30 p.m. at North County Recreation Center, 11261 Crane St., Castroville, and Wednesday, March 4, at 6:30 p.m. at Rancho Cañada Golf Course, 4860 Carmel Valley Road.

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Clarinet virtuoso transforms chamber music quartet

LIKE AN ensemble of chefs tinkering with a recipe, a members of the chamber music quartet, TAGI, have stumbled upon a delicious new sound.

TAGI performs at Sunset Center Friday, Feb. 6, showcasing a musical approach that's anything but traditional.

"The thing that distinguishes this group is that they've added a clarinetist," observed John Newkirk, managing director of Chamber Music Monterey Bay, the non-profit presenting the concert. "It's not your typical four-person ensemble. This gives them the opportunity play music that a traditional four-piece ensemble can't."

Formerly known as the New York Lyric Chamber Players, the quartet features Tatiana Goncharova on piano, Igor

Begelman on clarinet, Grigory Kalinovsky on violin and Sophie Shao on cello. The first three musicians were born in Russia, while Shao comes from Houston, Texas. The group takes its name from the initials of its Russian members' first names.

When it performs at Sunset Center, the New York City-based TAGI will play four pieces of music, including Brahms' Clarinet Trio in A Minor, Op. 114, Tchaikovsky's Trio in A Minor, Op. 50, Stravinsky's L'histoire du Soldat and Shostakovich's Prelude No.24, Violin and Piano.

The concert also offers a rare local opportunity to see a rising star perform.

"Begelman will be showcased in the Stravinsky piece," Newkirk noted. "He'll

Once an architect, nonagenarian unveils the art of the ghost town

AFTER SPENDING much of his career drawing buildings that were about to be constructed, architect Olof Dahlstrand became fascinated with drawing buildings that were about to fall down.

An exhibit of Dahlstrand's drawings, "Lithograph Sketches of the Old American West," will open at the Carmel Art Association Saturday, Feb. 7.

During the 1960s, Dahlstrand created images of ghost towns throughout the American West using traditional lithographic pencils on plastic plates. In the process, he created a historical record of many scenes that no longer exist.

"They were ghost towns back in the 1960s," explained the 92-year-old Dahlstrand, a former Carmel City Council member and planning commissioner. "But because the land was cheap, a lot of retirees built houses, and now, some of these areas are really loaded

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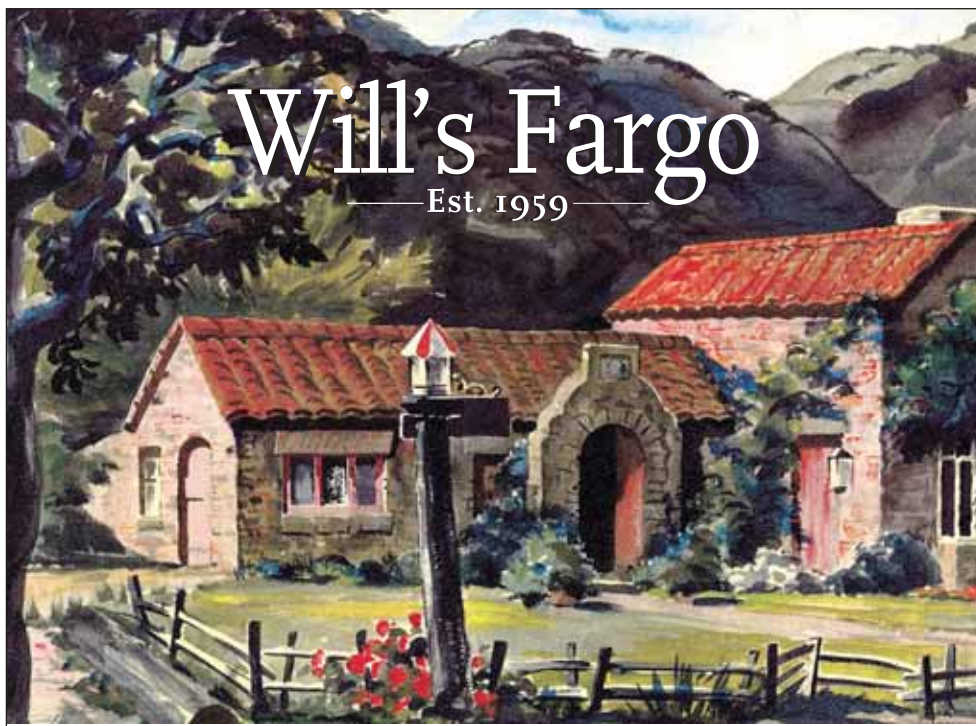

Doing so will help hardworking people keep their jobs, help companies support non-profits that care for people who can't take care of themselves, help public agencies function, and make everyone a little happier during such depressing times full of bad economic news.

In Carmel, why not stroll to a few of the idyllic town's tasting rooms, such as:

■ Cima Collina (tasty — and affordable — limited production wines, west side San Carlos between Ocean and Seventh, open Thursday through Monday from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m.);

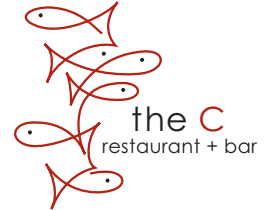

Salyer American, a produce grower operating in California and Arizona, is bringing purple, orange and green heirloom varieties to supermarket aisles, according to the inimitable Marci Bracco, who handled marketing for Scheid Vineyards before making the move to Salyer last month. The colorful varieties are reportedly even more nutritious than their pale sibling.

Their flavors subtly vary as well, and creative chef Brandon Miller has embarked on several successful culinary experiments. He suggested preparing the orange variety au gratin in the classic French style with a béchamel of shallots, cauliflower stems, butter, flour, nutmeg and milk, pureed with horseradish and tossed with blanched cauliflower florettes, mixed with grated Gruyere, and baked "until bubbly and lovely."

"My thing with vegetables is trying to coax the sugars out and caramelize them," he said. For the purple, he suggested blanching it, browning it in olive oil over high heat, adding garlic and tossing it with white beans.

"It's cool that it keeps its purple color," he observed.

■ **Breakfast on the trail**

It's a bit pricey, but considering the importance of the first meal of the day, the Trailside Cafe can't be beat for breakfast.

Consider the three options for Eggs Benedict — classic, smoked salmon, and Santa Barbara (smoked turkey and avocado) — or the several tasty omelets, not to mention the genuinely sinful French beignets. The expansive menu also lists a few healthier options that are quite good, and offerings from the griddle. Beverages run the gamut, from espresso drinks and good serve-yourself coffee, to fresh fruit juices, teas and mimosas.

Restaurant hours are 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. The Trailside fronts on the recreation trail on Cannery Row, with views of the sea and athletic passersby, but it can be accessed by car at 550 Wave St. For more information, call (831) 649-8600.

up with people. Or they simply vanished."

Drawing is something that always came easily to Dahlstrand. By the age of 8, the Wisconsin native discovered he possessed an uncommon talent.

"I once thought everybody could draw," he recalled. "But then it suddenly dawned on me that I was the only one who could. The other kids started to ask me to draw football players in their text books. From then on, I became interested in art."

While Dahlstrand was following his creative impulses and exploring art, his family decided to try to redirect his talents toward something a little bit more practical.

"My father was concerned about my ability to one day buy food," he laughed. "He suggested that I become an architect, and it turned out to be the best of all worlds."

Dahlstrand graduated from Cornell University in 1939 with a bachelor's degree in architecture. With the onset of World War II, he took a job for a defense contractor designing buildings for the allied war effort. After the fighting ended, his career as an architect took off, and soon he was designing what would eventually become an impressive collection of buildings in Berkeley, Orinda, Lafayette and Walnut Creek.

Fifty years ago, Dahlstrand moved to Carmel, and he soon left his imprint on the town. Among the many local buildings he designed are the bank in mid-valley, the original Carmel Plaza complex and the former Crocker Bank next to Devendorf Park, now the Harrison Memorial Library Park Branch. In 2005, the Carmel Residents Association named Dahlstrand its Citizen of the Year.

With such an impressive professional — and creative — legacy in Carmel, it's safe to say Dahlstrand is a local institution.

"The natives are finally ready to call me an old-timer," he joked.

Also opening at the art association will be exhibits by Heidi Hybl, Helene Goldstein and Michie Long. Hybl explores plant forms in a series of oils on paper and canvas. Goldstein uses oils and pastels to create lush

imaginary flowers. Long, meanwhile, focuses on depicting solitary figures against sparse backdrops.

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City hires event planner

A FORMER facilities manager of Monterey Peninsula Country Club and manager of the county-owned Laguna Seca Recreation Area will receive \$18 per hour to oversee activities for Carmel-by-the-Sea.

On Tuesday, the city council approved an hourly at-will contract not to exceed \$20,000 per year with Robert Clovis to "plan, manage, promote and regulate city- and non-city-sponsored events and special promotions on public property" — such as the installation of holiday lights, the Independence Day celebration, the city's birthday and Halloween parade, and Homecrafters' Marketplace — as well as serve as a community liaison and goodwill ambassador who will recruit and train volunteers. Since former community services director Christie Miller left last year, no one has held such a role in the city.

According to the job description for the contract community event planning coordinator, city officials wanted someone with "strong interpersonal skills and the ability to work with a number of agencies and people,"

and who is knowledgeable in PR, budgeting, contracts, risk management, permitting and other administrative tasks.

According to a report from city clerk Heidi Burch, Clovis is that person. In his bio, Clovis said he worked 11 years at MPCC and also handled a variety of tasks for Monterey County Parks, including serving seven years as manager of Laguna Seca, where he "worked with a variety of event promoters and governmental agencies to ensure compliance for events up to 30,000 people," according to the bio. "Planning issues included parking, traffic, sound, communications, security, medical and emergency response."

While there, Clovis coordinated with the Army, California Highway Patrol, Caltrans, Salinas Rural Fire District, Sports Car Racing Association of the Monterey Peninsula, Monterey County Communications and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office.

As part of its consent agenda, the council authorized city administrator Rich Guillen to enter into a contract with Clovis.

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


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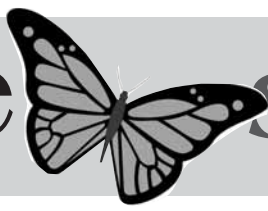


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Suit filed by son of slain C.V. couple

THE MAN who shot and killed Mel and Elizabeth Grimes in 2007 over a petty property dispute is now the target of a wrongful death lawsuit filed last week by the couple's son.

On Jan. 28, Thomas Rey Ellington, the son of Elizabeth Grimes and stepson of Mel Grimes, filed the lawsuit against the couple's killer, John Kenney. The suit seeks damages for personal injuries and wrongful death.

"Thomas Rey Ellington has sustained a loss of the love, affection, companionship, guidance, society, comfort and support" as a result of the deaths of his mother and stepfather, the suit alleges.

In September, Kenney was convicted of gunning down the Grimeses over a property dispute outside their Carmel Valley home on January 29, 2007.

Mel Grimes, a criminal defense attorney, received multiple bullet wounds and died at the scene while Elizabeth, a nurse, was shot in the back and died in a helicopter en route to a hospital.

"Melvin Grimes, Jr. and Elizabeth Grimes, while peacefully and lawfully occupying their property," according to the suit, "were deliberately and maliciously shot to death."

The suit contends Ellington is entitled to damages for his mom and stepdad's deaths. Those damages include medical expenses, property costs, and funeral and burial expenses, according to the suit.

Richard Hoffman, Ellington's attorney, did not return a phone message left by The Pine Cone.

The suit also doesn't mention whether Ellington believes Kenney has any money or other assets. In October 2008, Kenney gave his attorney the home where the killings happened as payment for his legal services.

The shooting came after a long-standing dispute between Kenney and the Grimeses.

The day of the shooting, Kenney had a boulder delivered and placed on the disputed property to prevent the Grimeses from creating an easement over his property by driving across it.

After the Grimeses confronted Kenney about the boulder, he shot the couple.

While prosecutors during Kenney's trial argued he killed the couple in cold blood, Kenney said he was in "in a high state of fear;" and claimed Elizabeth Grimes struck him in the head and that Mel Grimes came at him with a sledgehammer.

The jury found Kenney guilty of first degree murder of Elizabeth Grimes and second degree murder of her husband. He was sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

The Grimeses' death certificates, attached to the lawsuit, indicate the couple's ashes were scattered off the Monterey County coast.

All tickets are \$5 and proceeds benefit the guild's youth outreach programs.

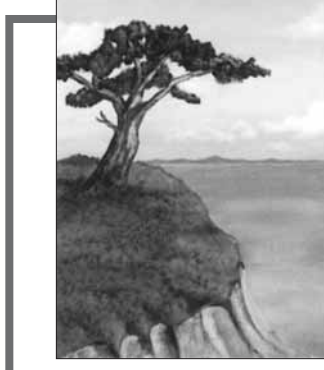

"This program allows the foundation to protect its members and donors, as well as strengthening our organizational reputation," she wrote in the letter. "By implementing this background screening program, The Carmel Foundation can prevent undesirable individuals from working or volunteering here and reduce organizational liability risks."

Sheffield admitted the decision is unpopular with some volunteers. Anyone who elects not to undergo the background check will no longer be permitted to help out at the foundation.

"There have been some hurt feelings — 'Why us?' and, 'Don't you trust us?', and it's not about that at all," she said. "Scams on seniors are running rampant. You see articles online and in the paper every day, and seniors are a very vulnerable population. You need to know who's in your house."

Background checks and fingerprinting are required for people who work with children, but no such provisions exist for those serving seniors, Sheffield pointed out. And while many of the volunteer roles at the foundation, like teaching computer classes and serving lunches, are low-risk, she didn't want to single out certain groups — such as those who deliver meals to homebound seniors or help them track their finances — to undergo the checks.

"We feel very good about it and think it's a good move to make," she said. "We would like to think we don't have to do that here, but then you think, 'Let's not be naive.'"

What others do

Sharon Crino, executive director of the Carmel chapter of the American Red Cross, said her organization has conducted background checks on all volunteers nationwide since 2005. Since the Red Cross is a humanitarian organization and volunteers frequently handle sensitive issues and cases, Crino said it's important to know who's doing the helping.

"Once you become a volunteer, you have an awful lot of access to Red Cross data, and we feel strongly we should have clear knowledge of anything that's going on in your life," she said. "And we have found some pretty significant things in those background checks that have led to volunteers' being pulled or not accepted."

Crino said the Red Cross uses the same system as the foundation, and all the infor-

mation is available to the candidate.

The Monterey Bay Aquarium subjects its unpaid workers to the same human-resources procedures as its paid employees, according to communications director Ken Peterson, including background checks. "We do whatever we need to do to assure we have the right folks working for us," he said.

The SPCA for Monterey County runs background checks on prospective employees and volunteers, according to executive director Gary Tiscornia.

"It's a matter of risk control," he said. Checking criminal histories helps protect everyone working at the animal shelter, where volunteers have access to animals, veterinary drugs and children.

The City of Carmel requires its volunteers, most of whom work in the library, to undergo background checks and fingerprinting, but library director Janet Cubbage said that's primarily because they may be working with children.

People who donate their time at Sunset Center are not subject to official examination, but they have to apply and are interviewed, and their references are checked, general manager Michelle Edmundson said.

"But our volunteers perform a very different service," such as handing out programs, ushering, distributing surveys and generally providing hospitality during events, she said. "I can see why The Carmel Foundation would do background checks, because they're working with a different population."

The Carmel Chamber of Commerce also uses volunteer help in its visitor center on San Carlos Street and does not run background checks, according to CEO Monta Potter. "I suppose we could do it, in terms of the money handling," she said. "We don't at this point, but it's something I've always known about from other organizations I've worked with."

JUST A month ago, Gardiner's Resort in Carmel Valley announced it was closing its doors. Now, the Carmel Valley Land Use Advisory Committee is about to consider a proposal to develop at least 16 lots on its 25-acre property.

The LUAC will meet Tuesday, Feb. 17, at St. Phillips Church in Carmel Valley. The church is located at 8065 Carmel Valley Road. The meeting is preceded by a visit by LUAC members to the property at 4:30 p.m.

Founded by local tennis legend John Gardiner in 1957 at 114 Carmel Valley Road, the resort offered first-rate tennis instruction in a world-class resort setting. Its owner, Pristine Development, LLC, cited the global financial downturn as the chief reason for closing the resort. During its half century of operations, the resort gained fame for its impressive guest list of celebrities, which included four presidents — Richard Nixon, Gerald Ford, Ronald Reagan and George H. Bush — and a wide assortment of movie stars and athletes.

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Editorial

Capping salaries

ALMOST ALL the media commentators completely missed the point this week as they analyzed President Barack Obama's decision to limit the pay of executives whose companies get federal bailout money.

Pundits on the left and the right were debating whether it was "fair" to limit Wall Street executives' compensation to \$500,000, and whether doing so would help or hurt Obama's strategy for reviving the economy.

Discussing the first point is just a waste of time. Only a few far-left nutcases think the government has any business deciding how much a bank executive, baseball star or heart surgeon is paid.

And even Obama obviously doesn't think there's anything inherently unfair about somebody making more than \$500,000 a year. He and his wife earned \$2.7 million in 2006-2007. Former President Bill Clinton and his wife, Hilary, whom Obama picked for Secretary of State, earned more than \$109 million since moving out of the White House eight years ago.

Indeed, it's a forgone conclusion that some people are worth multi-million-dollar salaries, appearance fees and returns on investments, and that the government shouldn't be in the business of determining who these people are and how much they should receive. The only people making those decisions should be the people who are providing the money the millionaires get.

And that's where the commentators missed the boat. Since the government is providing huge loans and other financing to the firms in question, it is obviously legit for the government to condition those loans in any way that suits the public interest. Since the U.S. government is now, in effect, a stockholder in all the companies that have taken bailout money, President Obama has a responsibility to make sure they use the public's money wisely. And that includes having a say in what company executives are paid.

The Chronicle strikes again

WITH THEIR sorry record of making big mistakes when they report from the Monterey Peninsula (we have pointed out two especially egregious ones in recent weeks), you'd think journalists from the San Francisco Chronicle would be extra careful anytime they set foot in these parts. But this week, they screwed up again:

In his haste to discredit the Boy Scouts of America, a reporter from the Chronicle revealed that a supposedly secret agreement, abetted by corrupt local politicians, allowed the Scouts to block a small river in Big Sur to the detriment of a threatened species.

The agreement was never made public, Seth Rosenthal reported.

However, as Chris Counts reports on our front page this week, details of the agreement that allowed the Scouts to dam the Little Sur River during the summer camping season were reported in this newspaper in 2005. The Boys Scouts fully cooperated in the reporting of this story and were obviously not trying to hide anything. A Monterey County planning department report outlining the entire agreement is also readily available online.

And, despite the Scouts' opposition to being forced to accept gay Scoutmasters, the organization still does a world of good for youngsters of all races and income groups. The Chronicle should not forget this.

And while we're on the subject: Every time a newspaper crusades to protect forest resources, we think it should be required to remind its readers of every newspaper's role in cutting down hundred of millions of trees around the world each year so they can be turned into paper.

If newspapers are allowed to cut all those trees, with barely a whimper from the Sierra Club or anybody else, surely the Boy Scouts can have a little swimming hole.

He recommended the board deny the Farleys' application and require they reinstall the old windows or replace them with new, unclad wood windows.

Ross Farley, who bought the inn with his wife 11 years ago and also owns the Carmel Garden Court Inn, said he did not realize he needed a permit for the work. "If I had known then what I know now, we wouldn't be here going through this process," he said.

"We have had nothing but compliments from guests and from passersby on these windows, but I understand it's something that's not acceptable," he said.

Nonetheless, installing new custom-made wood windows would be cost prohibitive, especially in a year when business at the inn is down 60 percent, Farley argued.

"All the windows need to be replaced," he said. "Customers complain about the drafts."

He asked the board to considering allowing aluminum windows in the walls less visible to the public and wood windows in the front.

All the board members sympathized with the sad economic situation affecting the hoteliers but said design standards must be upheld.

Paterson acknowledged the DRB has occasionally OK'd non-wood windows. "I don't think these windows are of a standard where we could make an exception," he said.

The DRB unanimously and "regretfully" voted to deny the Farleys' application.

"They have had some successful membership growth, but the costs were much higher than they originally anticipated when they opened the club," he said.

Pasadera Country Club includes a large clubhouse with a formal restaurant, grill and bar, swimming pools, tennis courts, workout facilities and a Jack Nicklaus-designed golf course, which opened in 2000.

Chapter 11 bankruptcy will provide the partners time to reorganize the business, protect the deposits of the club's 276 members



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and shield the property from foreclosure by its main creditor, Rabobank, according to Armanasco. It does not eliminate the club's debts.

"This is primarily in the interest of the members," said Armanasco, who would not reveal the total amount of the members' deposits that could be seized by creditors if the bankruptcy filing were not undertaken.

The filing will also facilitate the search for investors who might want to take over,

according to Armanasco.

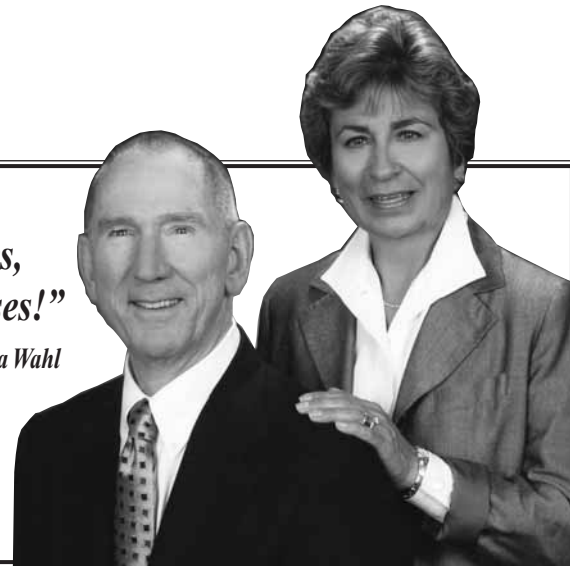
He said Donald Trump was interested but pulled out in part because a small group of opponents threatened to sue to stop his purchasing the country club and golf course.

"Under the Bankruptcy Code protection, they will be allowed to deal with potential investors and/or buyers without that threat," he said, adding that he does not know whether Trump would return to the negotiating table.

■ 12 and under admitted free if accompanied by an adult.

Daily tickets will also be sold at the Carmel shuttle stop in front of Carmel Plaza shopping center, at the Carmel Chamber of Commerce visitors center on San Carlos Street, at the Pacific Grove admission trailer (17 Mile Drive at the P.G. Gate) and at the CSUMB parking area (follow signs from Highway 1 exit to CSUMB, approximately 10 miles north of Pebble Beach).

Parking: During early practice rounds (Mon.-Tues.), parking is available inside Pebble Beach. Wednesday and during tournament rounds, complimentary spectator parking is available on the CSUMB campus at the former Fort Ord, about 10 miles north of Pebble Beach on Highway 1, with frequent shuttle buses to deliver spectators to the competition courses, where other shuttle buses will also take them between courses. Handicapped parking is available throughout the practice and tournament rounds inside Pebble Beach.

There are also convenient shuttle buses available from Carmel, Pacific Grove and Monterey to the pro-am tournament. For details about these shuttles, please see page 5ATT.

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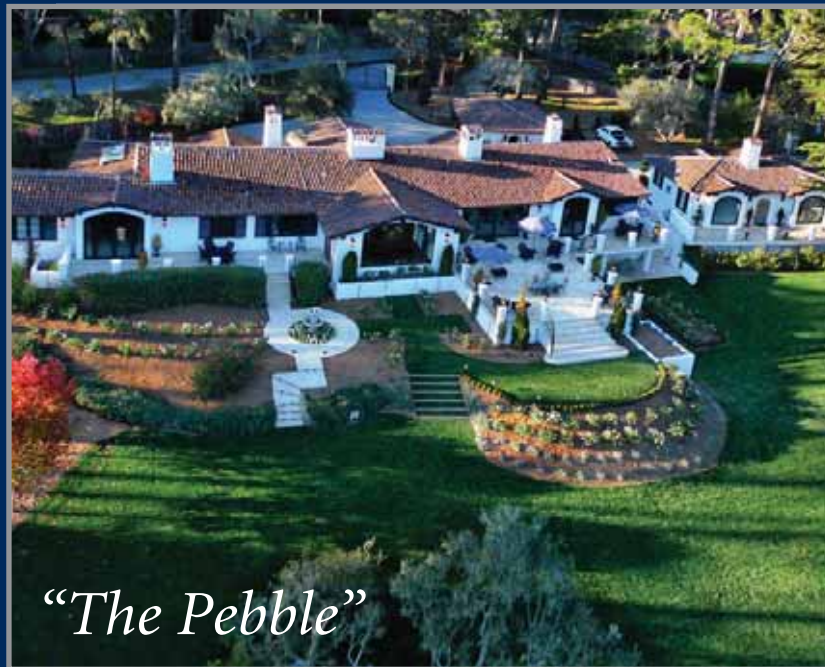

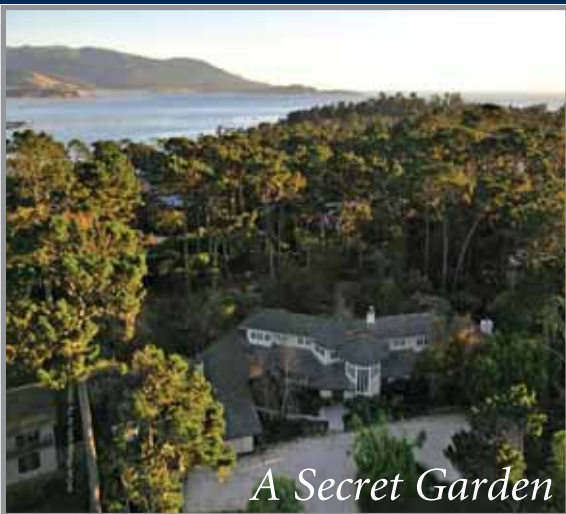

Savvy fans know to hop a shuttle for more fun on and off the course

WANT TO avoid parking at Fort Ord and add an hour to your day of spectating at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am? Increasingly, fans are saying yes, and they're using shuttles to do it.

In fact, recent years have proved many would happily pay a few bucks to hop a shuttle in Carmel, Pacific Grove or Monterey, rather than park at California State University Monterey Bay and ride buses to and from the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. The chambers of commerce in those cities are sponsoring shuttles Wednesday, Feb. 11 — so people can get to the Celebrity Challenge to see and photograph their favorite stars on the course — through Sunday, Feb. 15.

The Carmel Chamber of Commerce and the Carmel Innkeepers Association will have buses operating from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Wednesday, and 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Thursday through Sunday, leaving from the Carmel Plaza and delivering riders to the tournament gate in Pebble Beach. To return to town, riders should look for the Carmel shuttle stop at the Pebble Beach Equestrian Center. Daily passes, which allow unlimited rides in and out of the Forest throughout the day, are \$15 per per-

son.

In addition, people can purchase any-day AT&T Pro-Am tournament tickets at the bus stop or in the Carmel Visitor Center, located on San Carlos Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues, for \$55. (Tickets will be \$60 at the gate.)

And the shuttles aren't just for locals hoping for a convenient way to get to the golf tournament. Fanatics from out of town might want to take a break for lunch in Carmel, and those who get their fill of the game after a few hours on the course could opt to spend some time shopping in town instead, the chamber and the innkeepers association hope. Last year, the buses provided 5,000 trips during the five days of the pro-am.

Anyone wondering about the best restaurants in town, or desiring to know anything else about Carmel-by-the-Sea, can stop in at the visitor center located on the west side of San Carlos Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

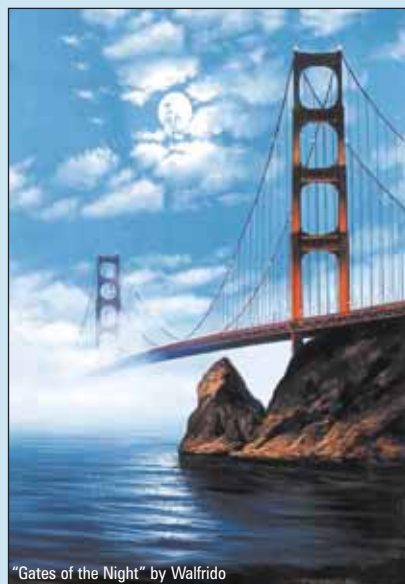

Innovative program uses golf to teach youngsters about life

FOR MILLIONS of golf fans around the globe, the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am is a world-class sporting event that takes place in a stunning natural setting.

But for thousands of Monterey County residents, the tournament provides funding for a literal lifeline of health and social services.

Each year, the Monterey Peninsula Foundation—the charitable organization that hosts the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and its sister tournament, the WalMart First Tee Open at Pebble Beach—awards about 160 grants to local charities. The grants average about \$25,000. (For a complete list of grantees last year, please see page 11 ATT.)

Of all the local nonprofit groups that receive funding from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation it is doubtful that any have discovered a more creative—and effective—way to bring charity and golf together than the Salinas-based First Tee of Monterey County.

The aim of the First Tee program is to provide—through the game of golf—education and experiences for young people that promote character development and life-enhancing values. Thanks to an innovative new program, the organization is wildly succeeding in its ambitions.

One of 206 chapters nationwide, Monterey County's First Tee program is based at the 9-hole, par-31 Twin Creeks Golf Course in Salinas. There, during a two-week period, an estimated 3,200 children pass through its doors, up from about 1,000 just one year ago. The program hosts about 150 90-minute classes during each two-week span.

What is perhaps most remarkable about the children participating in the program is the fact that most

live in the Alisal Union School District, an area that is dominated by working-class Spanish-speaking households. In the vast majority of cases, the young golfers come from families with no experience play-

ing golf.

Through its Life Skills Experience program, kids

fornia.org. During the tournament, shuttle tickets can be purchased at the inns, the Carmel Plaza bus stop or on the bus. Shuttle riders can pay to leave their cars in the north lot at Sunset Center, located at the corner of Eighth and Mission, or in the garage at the Carmel Plaza at Mission and Seventh. Free all-day parking is available in the city lot at Torres and Third, which is about four blocks from the Plaza.

P.G. offers extras

The Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce's 59-passenger Pacific Monarch buses will depart every 30 minutes from the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History, 165 Forest Ave., beginning at 6:30 a.m. Wednesday through Sunday, Feb. 11-15. Pro-Am play begins at 8 a.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, and at 7:30 a.m. for the final round at the Pebble Beach Golf Links on Sunday.

Riders will receive gift bags containing coupons, post cards and brochures. Chamber president Moe Ammar pointed out that taking the shuttles—as some 2,500 people did last year—will save them about an hour of travel time while offering them more flexibility in their schedules.

With special packages offered by hotels and businesses willing to stay open late, chamber officials said they are “making a concerted effort to provide the maximum in hospitality to the visitors for the golf tournament and to showcase the many charms of Pacific Grove.”

Shuttle passes run \$15 per day, or \$40 for a five-day pass, and free parking is available a block away on Ocean View Boulevard. The chamber is also selling daily tournament tickets for \$55. For more information, contact the chamber of commerce at (831) 373-3304 or check the group's website: www.pacificgrove.org.

learn the value of maintaining a positive attitude, how to make decisions by thinking about possible consequences, and how to set goals and achieve them. The program uses golf as a metaphor for life, and the youngsters are always encouraged to have fun while they're playing the game.

"Life skills come first," explained Barry Phillips, executive director of the local First Tee chapter. "That's what it's all about. It's a fantastic experience for everybody. I'm just so excited about the program."

According to Phillips, the benefits the children receive from the program are easy to measure.

"The rewards are tangible," he observed. "When a child hits his or her first golf shot, he or she stands up just a little bit straighter."

■ Ambitious event to benefit 79 charities

Like the First Tee's Life Skills Experience program, the Birdies for Charity event creatively brings togeth-

er golf and philanthropy. And like the First Tee, its positive results are quickly outdistancing its organizers' modest goals.

This year's Birdies For Charity fundraiser, only the second ever, aims to raise money for 79 mostly local charities, up from just 31 in its inaugural year.

"It's like a walk-a-thon," explained Nettie Porter, a marketing associate for the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, which hosts the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and distributes its proceeds to nonprofit groups.

It's up to each donor to guess the number of birdies that will be scored at the Feb. 12-15 tournament. Last year, there were 1,852 birdies. So if a donor last year chose to pledge a penny for each birdie and designated the SPCA for Monterey County as the recipient, the charity would have received \$18.52.

"Charities love the program," Porter said. "All the proceeds go back into the community. It's a no-brainer."

To create more incentive for nonprofit groups to get involved, the Monterey Peninsula Foundation adds a 10 percent match to each donation.

Not only do the charities raise money for their own coffers, but donors can compete for a wide range of prizes. This year's Grand Prize, which will go to the donor who comes closest to guessing exact number of birdies, will be two Continental Airlines tickets valued up to \$500

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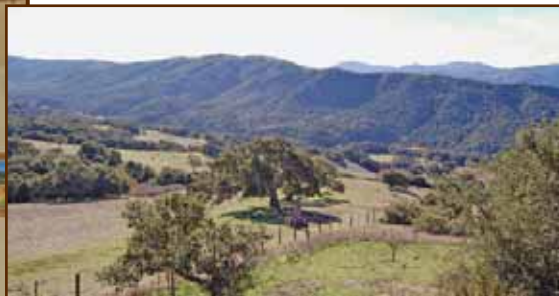

Champion takes on challenge of hitting a little ball with a stick

A MAN accustomed to risking his life in order to win will bring his competitive drive to a new venue — a golf course — during the Feb. 9-15 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

Kenny Roberts Sr., a multi-time world champion motorcycle racer who had spent more time on the track at Laguna Seca than on the fairways of Pebble Beach before deciding to take on this particular challenge, said he's been training hard and is ready to play.

Fellow world champion Wayne Rainey, who lives locally, and Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca GM Gill Campbell encouraged Roberts to enter the tournament, which has PGA pros and amateurs competing on the Pebble Beach Golf Links, Spyglass Hill Golf Course and Poppy Hills Golf Course Feb. 12-14. After play ends Saturday, the top scorers will move on to the final round at Pebble Beach on Sunday.

Roberts first encountered the allure and frustration of golf early in his racing career.

"When I was racing in America, I used to stay at a guy's house in Chattanooga, Tenn.," Roberts recalled, and his host made him give the game a try. "I had never played golf, and all the squirrels in Chattanooga will never forget it. They had some bullets flying at them that day. I think I hit every tree on the course."

But he was hooked, if for no other reason than he wanted to best his friend at his own game. "And by the time he retired, I was able to beat him," Roberts said.

Despite a busy schedule as a racer and later as a team owner that had him circumnavigating the globe, Roberts kept playing. He hoped his sons would take up the game as well, but they opted for racing motorcycles instead, and Kenny Roberts Jr. also

holds a world title.

"It's one of those things you can do your whole life," he said of golf. "And it takes four or five hours to play and get the old competitive juices flowing."

Roberts' home course is at the Turlock Golf & Country Club, but he's spending the winter on the Peninsula with Rainey "in training" — which means playing golf every day.

"I used to tell him, 'Get out there on the bike!'" he said, as Rainey used to stay with Roberts in the winter. "And now, he's saying, 'Get out there and practice!'"

The consequences of failure

And just as he put everything he could into winning motorcycle races, Roberts has dived headlong into golf. In doing so, he's discovered the similarities and differences in the two endeavors.

"With motorcycles, you perfect and perfect and perfect, and then you add aggression," he observed. "I find when I'm on the golf course and I add aggression, it just makes it worse."

The consequences of failure differ greatly, of course: "Screw up really bad on a motorcycle, you end up picking a hay bale out of your butt. Screw up on a golf course, and you lose a hole."

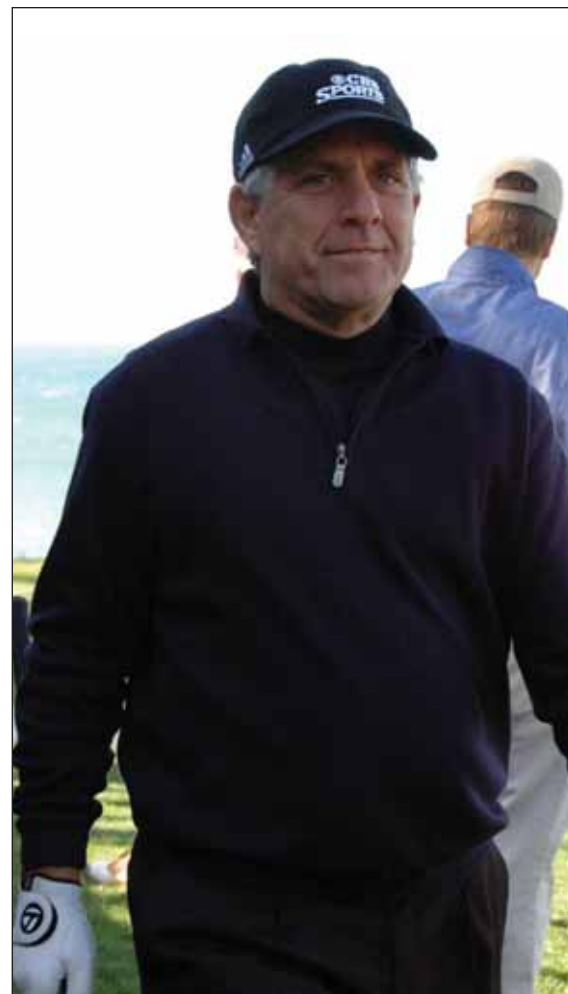
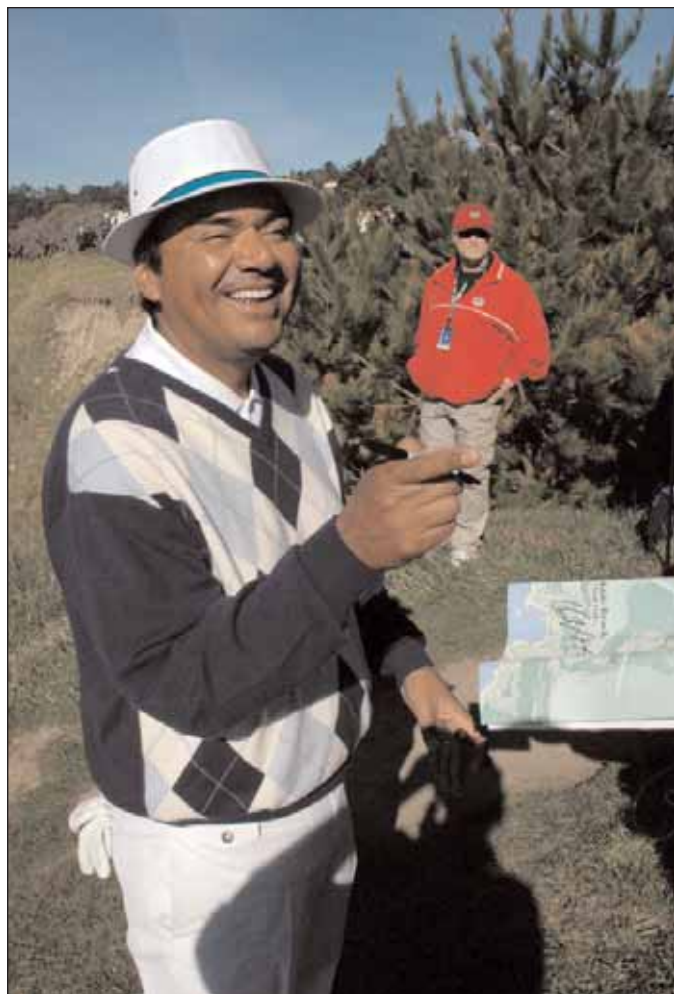
But in some ways, "golf is a lot like motorcycle racing," Roberts said. It's easy to try too hard and over think things.

"Then you have to back yourself up and say, 'Dude, you know how to hit the ball. Just hit the ball.'"

And yet, Roberts said he doesn't really know what he's doing, especially when it comes to reading greens, so he wants an expert by his side during the tournament. One of his sons offered to caddy for him, "and I said, 'You don't know any more about it than I do.'"

Instead, Rainey connected him with Riley Ramones, an assistant in the golf shop at Cypress Point Club (and motorcycle race fan) who "said he's played about 100 times at Pebble Beach," Roberts

said. "So hopefully he'll know where to putt."

Roberts put his handicap at 4 or 5 strokes over par but said he hopes AT&T officials will look at his record and give him 10.

The multi-time champion, who is also a Legend of Laguna Seca and a Grand Prix Legend, and whose name is in the Motorsports Hall of Fame of America, the International Motorsports Hall of Fame and the AMA Motorcycle Hall of Fame, admitted he's a little nervous about playing in the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

"I'm a little nervous, because I usually perform with my helmet on," he clarified. "I tried it out to see if I could play with it on, and funny enough, I did just as well with it as without it."

While racing, Roberts swore he would win the world championship, so it makes perfect sense that he plans to play on Sunday.

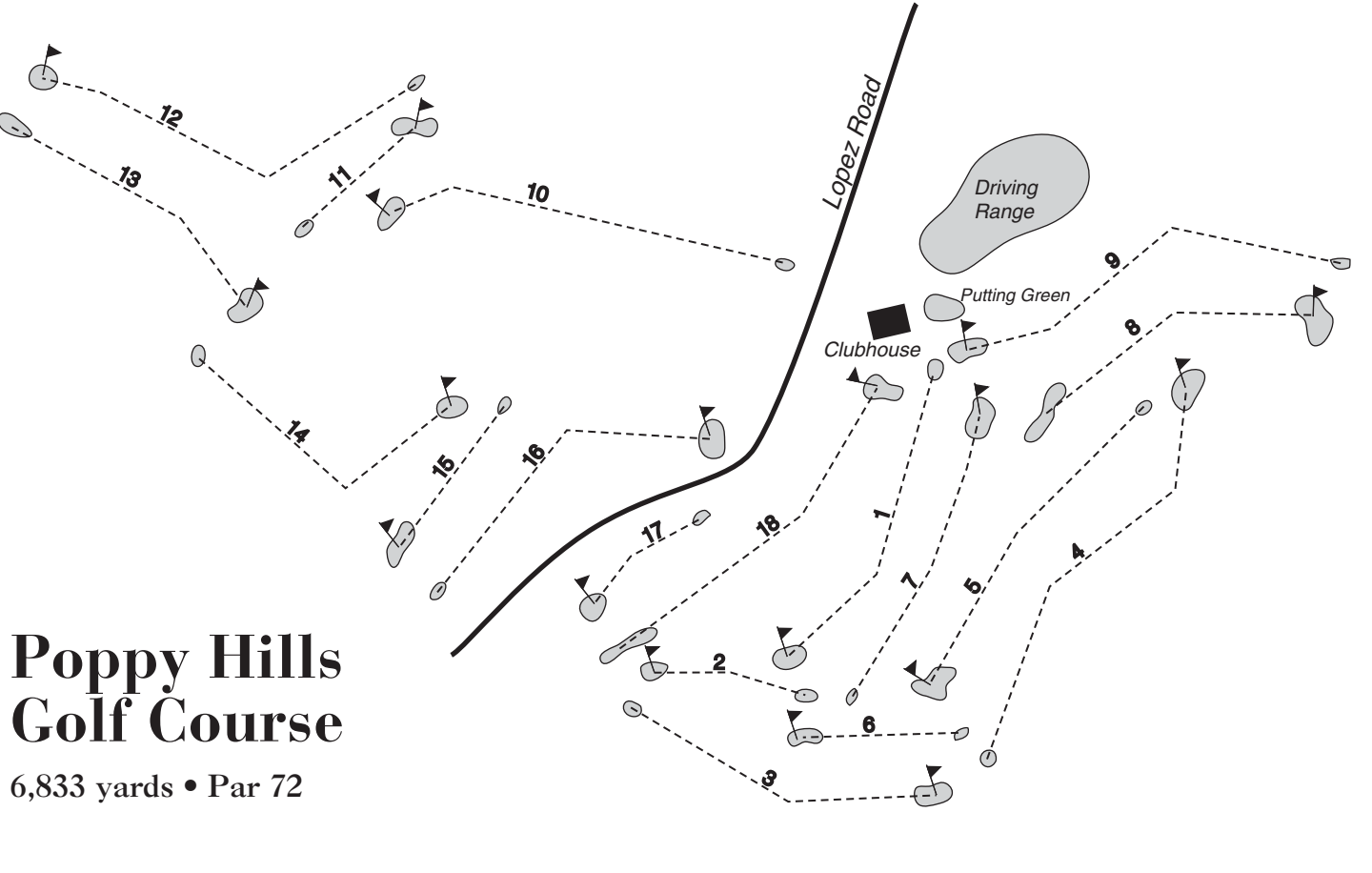
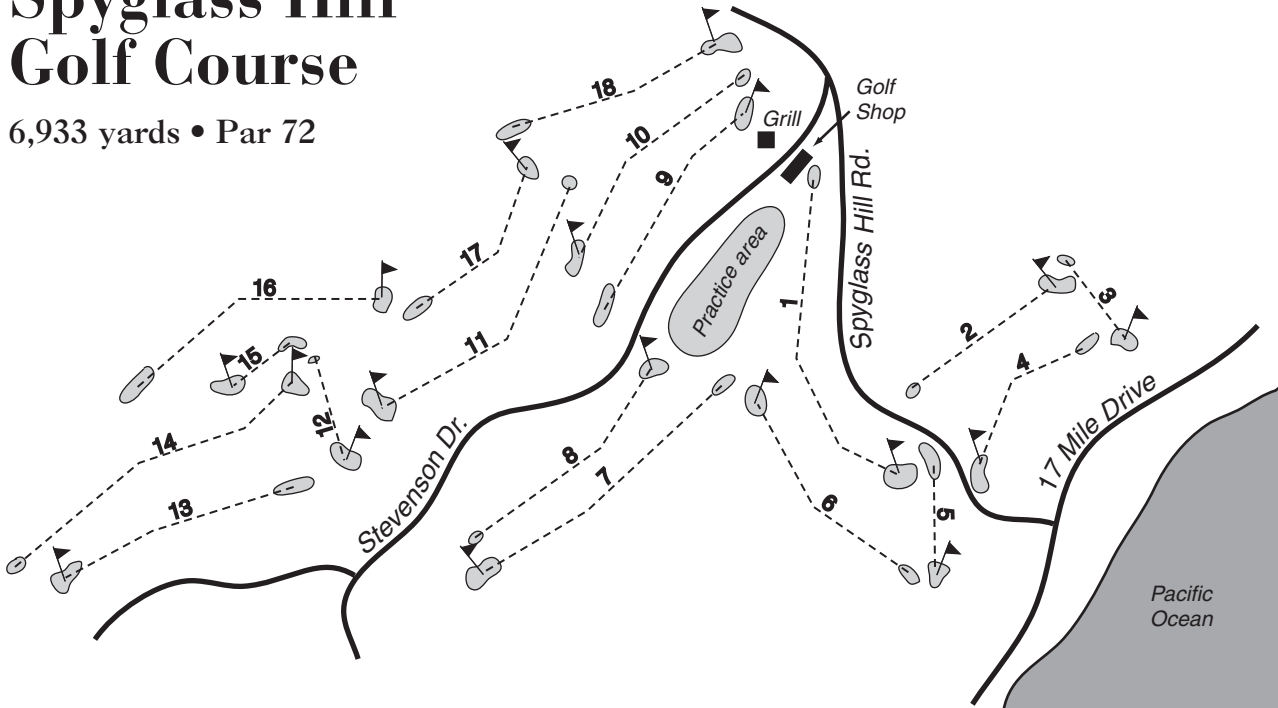
"I want to make the cut. I don't want to embarrass myself and get booed off the fairway," he said, before admitting, "I'm kind of competitive, so of course I want to win."

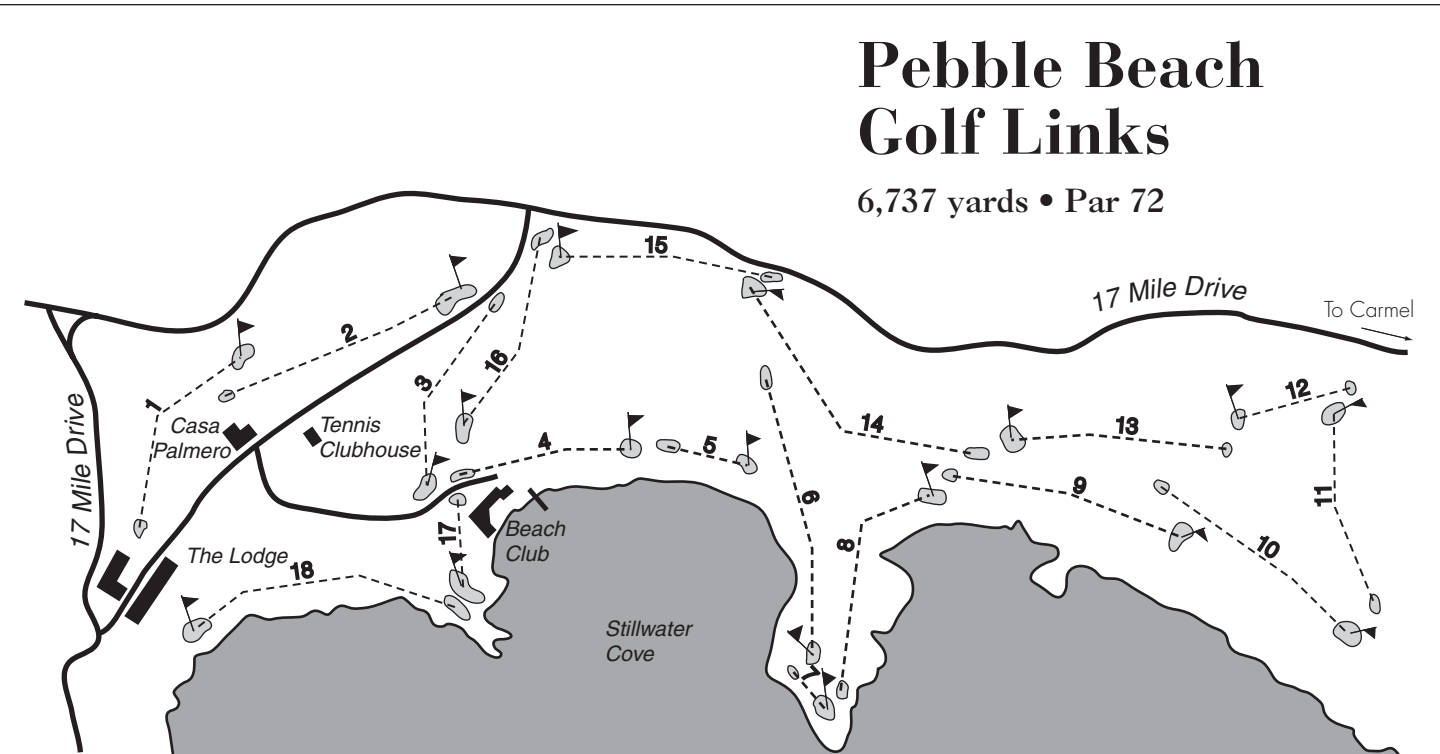

Bayonet Black Horse golf courses reopen after \$13M upgrade

A \$13 million, multiyear renovation was completed in December at the scenic and challenging Bayonet and Black Horse golf courses, originally designed by military brass in 1954 and 1964 when Fort Ord was a bustling Army base.

Noted designer Gene Bates, who also oversaw the recent revamp of the course at Carmel Valley Ranch, capitalized on the dramatic seaside and undulating terrain in his work on Bayonet and Black Horse's 36 holes.

Despite their makeovers, both courses maintain their distinctive characteristics. The longer Bayonet, par 72 at 7,104 yards, features narrow fairways, steep bunkers that penalize poor shots, and has "retained its famous bite," according to course officials. Meanwhile, the 7,024-yard, par-72 Black Horse showcases sweeping bay views, fringe-edged bunkers and tricky greens.

The first phase of the redesign, Bayonet's front nine, debuted in May 2007 with eight renovated holes and a completely new 9th Hole, formerly the 5th. Bayonet's back nine, including its signature Combat Corner on holes 11 through 13, were the last to reopen, on Dec. 20, 2008.

Bates "kept the integrity of the challeng-

ON THE Monterey Peninsula, there's a golf course for everyone. Are you looking for a pitch-and-putt to play during lunch? No problem. Care to splurge on a full day of pristine fairways and greens, accompanied by a fabulous lunch in a fancy restaurant? Sure thing. In fact, in addition to the world famous Pebble Beach Golf Links, which

will host pros and amateurs all week long during the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, the Peninsula is home to almost two dozen courses, many open for public play.

■ Bayonet and Black Horse, Seaside

Located at 1 McClure Way in Seaside on the former Fort Ord, green fees at Bayonet and Black Horse run \$75 (weekday twilight) to \$160 (weekend mornings, including cart). Discount rates available to juniors (17 and under) and seniors (60 and older). Carts available for \$40 to \$50, and range balls cost \$10 per bag. Club rentals and professional help also available. Call (831) 899-7271 (PAR-1) or visit www.bayonetblackhorse.com.

**World-class
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■ Carmel Valley Ranch, Carmel Valley

Closed in 2007 while undergoing a multimillion-dollar makeover overseen by Gene Bates, the golf course created by Pete Dye and built in 1981 reopened last year to great fanfare and much anticipation on the part of its members and guests. The stunning 400-acre Carmel Valley Ranch sits just east of mid-valley, with the course running along the Carmel River and up the base of nearby hills. C.V. Ranch, a Luxury Resorts & Hotels property, seeks to offer the quintessential private country club experience to players, and the course was named among the best in the country by readers of Conde Nast's Travel + Leisure magazine. Pro Bobby Clampett held the record of 63 with player Mark Brooks on the 6,201-yard par 70 course for several years but was unseated by Kevin Streelman, who shot a 60 there in 2006. Green fees run \$80 to \$165 this time of year, depending on what time you're playing and whether you're a member, a resort guest or an outside guest.

ing series of dogleg left holes intact, with some slight, uncompromising modifications," according to course officials.

The back nine at Black Horse, completed on May 1, 2008, underwent the most dramatic change, including the new par-3 15th Hole that replaced the previous 13th Hole. The course's new front nine reopened last December.

In addition to broadening the already breathtaking views of Monterey Bay, the renovation included several significant, though less dramatic, improvements, among them the installation of a state-of-the-art irrigation system, additional and reshaped bunkers, redesign and rebuilding of greens to USGA specifications, and removal of kikuyu grass and po annua, which were replaced with T1 bent grass on all 36 holes. Bent grass is particularly known for producing smooth lies on golf courses but is notoriously difficult to cultivate and maintain.

Stay and play

Home sites and a luxury hotel are part of the long-term improvement plans at Bayonet Black Horse, but with lodging on the grounds far off due to permit, water and environmental constraints, the course operator, Seaside Resort Development, announced new "stay-and-play" packages with three local hotels: Sanctuary Beach Resort, Casa Munras Hotel and Embassy Suites.

Through May 1, except on certain blackout dates, Sanctuary Beach Resort in Marina offers special room rates that include one 18-hole greens fee, cart and range balls. Monterey's Casa Munras, which also underwent major renovation, features special rates and the same golf package through May 6

(except during the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, Easter weekend and the Pebble Beach Food & Wine event).

Embassy Suites in Seaside is offering its golf package until June 25 and is including a few bonus

services as well. Blackout dates at Embassy Suites include Feb. 12-15, April 16-19 and May 14-17.

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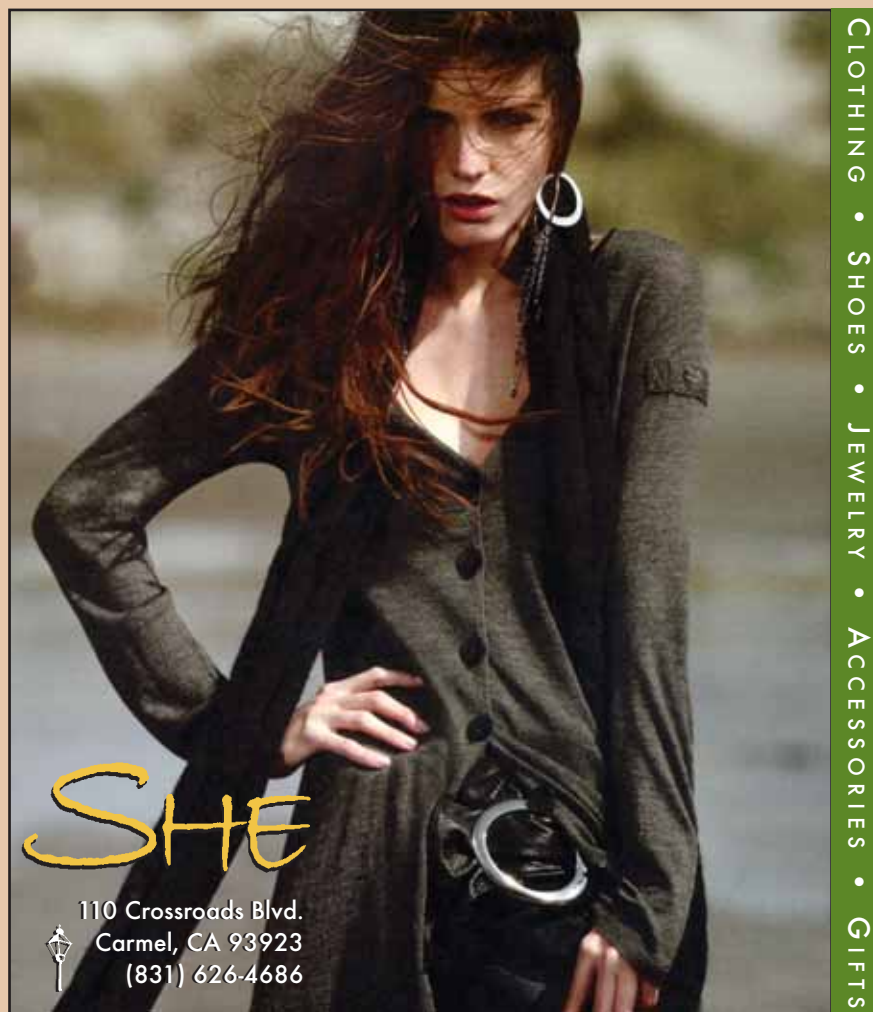
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

Carmel Valley Ranch is located at One Old Ranch Road, off of Carmel Valley Road just east of Mid Valley Shopping Center. For more information, call (831) 626-2510 or visit www.carmelvalleyranch.com. (As an aside, the resort also features Citronelle, noted chef Michel Richard's new restaurant that opened a year ago.)

■ Corral de Tierra Country Club, Salinas

The club's website promises that after walking its 18 holes — "and, yes, the members believe that walking is the best way to experience Corral de Tierra" — unwinding on its scenic patio will give you time to replay your round and refine your excuses. "The wonderful views of the hills while you do so will reaffirm the wisdom of your decision to invest time in yourself at Corral de Tierra Country Club," the website continues.

The private 6,683-yard par 72 course, situated off the Monterey-Salinas Highway and graced with some of the best weather on the Peninsula, was designed by Bob Baldock in 1960. It was redesigned in 1999 and 2000 by J. Michael Poellot, and now offers the added challenges of a multitude of bunkers. Its gentle elevation changes and tree-lined fairways also make it a great walking course. It has served as a site for U.S. Open qualifying rounds. The course record is 63, shot "by several players," according to the Northern California Golf Association. Corral de Tierra is located a few miles east of Los Laureles Grade on Highway 68

(Monterey-Salinas Highway), and is open only to members and guests. Inquire about reciprocal agreements with other private clubs. Guest fees, \$75-\$125; cart fee, \$36. For information, call (831) 484-1112 or visit www.corraldetierracc.com.

■ Cypress Point Club, Pebble Beach

Designed in 1928 by renowned course architect Alister MacKenzie, the 6,509-yard, par 72 Cypress Point course is known all over the world, in part for its breathtaking par 3 16th Hole that entices braver players to fire their tee-shots over the frothing sea. Golfer Marion Hollins first conceived of the idea in 1924 and pursued the development of a first-class golf course and a clubhouse containing a handful of sleeping rooms. Membership would be limited to 200 people who would pay about \$2,500 (in 1924 dollars) to subscribe. The club, which in the past hosted the Walker Cup, is open only to members and their guests. Longtime PGA Class A golf pro Jim Langley retired a few years ago after heading the program there for years and still holds the course record 63, which he shares with Casey Reamer — the course's current PGA Class A Pro — and Ben Hogan. Cypress Point Club is located at 3150 17 Mile Drive in Pebble Beach. For information, contact the pro shop at (831) 624-2223.

■ Del Monte Golf Course

Nicknamed "Old Del Monte," and sometimes merely called "Old D" by locals, the Del Monte Golf Course was designed by golf and polo enthusiast Charles Maud and built in 1897, making it the oldest continuously operated course west of the Mississippi River. (The course at the Presidio in San Francisco was built a year earlier but was temporarily converted to a drill field during the Spanish-American War.) Owned and operated by the Pebble Beach Company, Old Del Monte — 6,365 yards from the blue tees, par

72 — is open to the public and is home to the Monterey Bay Golf Club, founded in 1932. In 2006, Nick Watney unseated longtime record holders Ken Venturi and Todd Gjesvold by one stroke to set the new record low score of 61, and he was joined last year by Eric Lippert. Del Monte was the original host of the California State Amateur and still hosts the annual Callaway Golf Pebble Beach Invitational and The First Tee Open each fall. Green fees are \$110, regardless of whether you're staying at a resort, with discounts available online and as part of the annual Duke's Membership. Cart fees, \$20-25, though pull carts are also available, as are sets of Callaway rental clubs. Old D is located at 1300 Sylvan Road, adjacent to the recently remodeled Hyatt Regency Monterey, with its new fine-dining restaurant, TusCA, and a lounge, for post-round revivification. For more information, call (831) 373-2700 or visit www.pebblebeach.com.

■ Laguna Seca Golf Ranch, Monterey

Robert Trent Jones Sr. and Robert Trent Jones Jr. designed this public course together in 1970 in their first joint venture, which yielded "18 beautiful holes that follow the natural terrain of the oak-studded coastal hills along the Monterey-Salinas corridor." Johnny Miller once held the record 64 on its 6,161 yards but relinquished that distinction to Mark Darby, who beat him by one shot for a total 8-under-par score of 63 a few years ago. The course is located off of Highway 68 east of the Monterey Airport and can be reached by turning north on York Road and following it to the end. Rates range from \$35 to \$65, depending on the time of day, and golf carts cost \$38. Thirteen-acre natural grass practice facility and Cobra golf club rentals also available. For information, call (831) 373-3701 or visit www.lagunasecagolf.com, which also features online specials.

■ Monterey Peninsula Country Club, Pebble Beach

The idea of Monterey Peninsula Country Club first arose in 1925 when

Sam Morse, James Habbord and Thorwell Mullally decided to combine a golf club with housing. Two courses make up MPCC. The Dunes Course was designed by Seth Raynor in 1926 and redesigned by Rees Jones, and the Shore Course, designed by Bob Baldock in 1961, was recently remodeled by architect Michael Strantz. 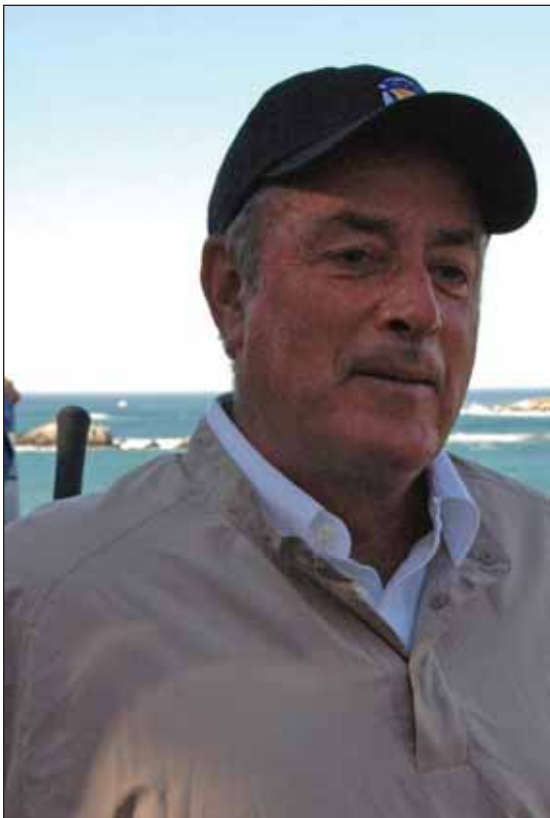

grounds in Monterey — is also open to the public for ridiculously low rates. But the course is not without its darker stories, including the crash-landing of a Cessna on the 6th Fairway in September 2003 (no golfers were involved), and the crash of a Carmel Valley attorney's small plane in the driveway several weeks ago. Robert Muir Graves designed the course in 1963, and it has been redesigned by Marc Messier, with a scheduled reopening of June 1. The facility includes two practice greens and a driving range, snack bar and pro shop. The course is located at Garden and Fairgrounds Road in Monterey, near the Monterey Airport. For more information, call the golf shop at (831) 656-2167 or visit www.nps.edu/adminsrv/mwr/golf/index.htm. While Monterey Pines is closed, several other area courses are offering discount rates for members of the military. Check the website for a list.

■ Pacific Grove Golf Links, Pacific Grove

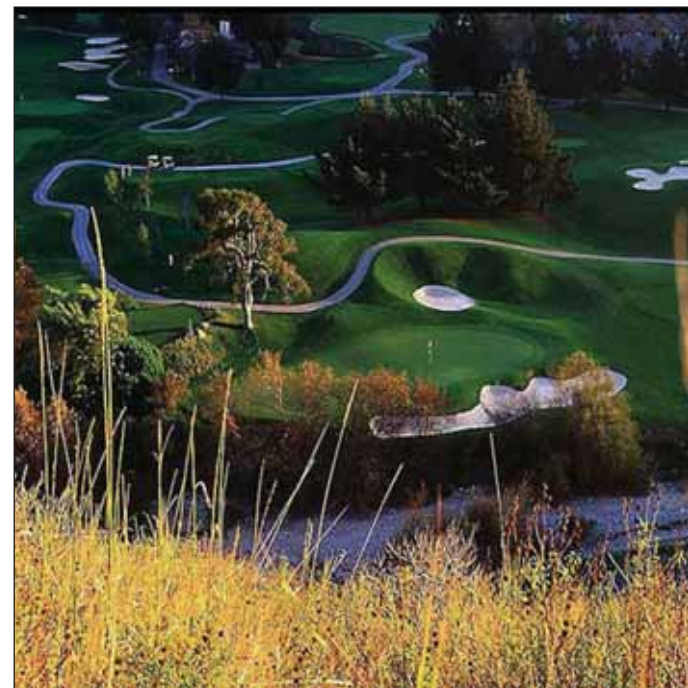
Affectionately known as the "Poor Man's Pebble Beach," and ranked among Golf Magazine's Top 50 Golf Courses Under \$50, P.G. features a truly links-style back nine. ("Links" is

an old Scottish word for "wasteland.") Designed by Jack Neville — who also designed Pebble Beach Golf Links — and H. Chandler Egan in 1932 on land the city bought from Pebble Beach Company founder Sam Morse (front nine), and leased from the military (back nine), this 5,732-yard par 70 public course is situated on prime real estate near Asilomar State Beach and surrounds the historic Point Pinos Lighthouse. The ocean scenery is unsurpassed, and the highly regarded Zagat Survey selected it as one of the best courses in the country in 2003. To illustrate the increasing popularity of the game and the city's course, which was originally 9 holes, P.G. officials cite financial reports from the 1947/1948 fiscal year that indicated 49,986 individual 9-hole rounds were played and revenues were \$21,618, and the 2002/2003 fiscal year, which saw 82,330 rounds played and \$1,528,841 in fees. The new clubhouse, located at 77 Asilomar Blvd. in Pacific Grove, was completed in February 2006, and its restaurant is run by the owners of the beloved Red House Cafe downtown. The course record, 60, is shared by Casey Boyns, Rich Hunter and Eric Eldridge. Green fees are \$40-\$45 for nonresidents and \$20-\$25 for residents, with discounts for 9-hole play, twilight rounds and junior players 17 and under; cart fee, \$34. Club rentals and lessons also

■ Pasadera Country Club, Monterey

Designed by Jack Nicklaus, Pasadera opened in spring 2000, just a few months before the U.S. Open was played at the Pebble Beach Golf Links. The course was launched under the leadership of partners Fred Bates, Lee Newell and Tom deRegt, with Paul Spengler, executive vice president of the Pebble Beach Company, coming on board as a managing partner later. "The original landscape at Pasadera provided a unique opportunity to create a dramatic layout that incorporates selected design features reminiscent of the world's most revered layouts. The course evokes similarities to The Old Course at Saint Andrews, Augusta National, Pine Valley and Pebble Beach, which are arguably four of my favorite courses in the world. It is my hope that golfers will enjoy the subtleties that Pasadera has to offer, from the opening tee shot, to the final putt," says Nicklaus, who designed the 6,743-yard par 71 course open only to members and their guests. Capitalizing on the existing hills, canyons and old oak groves, Nicklaus used natural-style bunkering and took advantage of splendid hazards, such as the awe-inspiring par 3 over a deep chasm. Fred Shoemaker held the course record 67 until last year, when Rick Leibovich shot a 65. Located at 100 Pasadera Drive off Highway 68, Pasadera lies just east of Laguna Seca Golf Ranch and west of the world-famous race track by the same name. The pro shop can be reached by calling (831) 647-2421.

■ Pebble Beach Golf Links, Pebble Beach

Situated on scenic coastal land originally slated for housing developments, Pebble Beach opened to the public in 1919 and is considered one of the greatest courses in the world. Its oceanfront holes, including the dramatic par-3 7th and the spectacular 18th, are particularly captivating. The 6,726-yard, par-72 course was designed by Jack Neville and Douglas Grant, but Jack Nicklaus designed the par-3 5th Hole dedicated in November 1998. Pebble Beach has been the site of four U.S. Open Championships — and will be again next year — and was ranked the No. 1 Public Course in America by Golf Digest in 2005, 2007 and again in 2008/2009. "Since 1919, the exquisite beauty and unique challenge of Pebble Beach Golf Links have thrilled golfers and spectators alike," according to the resort. The course record 62 is shared by Tom Kite, David Frost and David Duval. The course is open to the public, with priority given to resort guests. Green fees are \$495, which includes a cart for resort guests. Carts for non-resort guests are extra, and caddies are also available for a fee. For more information, call golf reservations at (800) 645-9300 or visit www.pebblebeach.com.

■ Peter Hay, Pebble Beach

The only executive-length course on the Peninsula — called so because it's made up entirely of par-3 holes and thus can (presumably) be played during a lunch hour — Peter Hay opened in 1957 and features a compact 9 holes spanning from 58 to 104 yards in length. The charming course is perfect, "whether you are working on your short game or teaching your children the game of golf." The short course near the Lodge at Pebble Beach was designed by longtime P.B. golf pro Peter Hay — who was born in Aberdeen on Feb. 4, 1885, and arrived at Del Monte in 1916 — in collaboration with P.B. Golf Links designer Jack Neville and Gen. Robert McClure, who created Bayonet Golf Course. It's also home to the 30,000-pound sculpture, "Encircling Centuries of Excellence," created by Richard MacDonald for the 2000 U.S. Open. The course is open to adults for \$25 (unlimited play all day), \$5 for kids 17-13 and free for those 12 and under. To make it an even sweeter deal, the Pebble Beach gate fee will be reimbursed with the purchase of one green fee. For more information, call (831) 622-8723.

■ Poppy Hills Golf Course, Pebble Beach

Commissioned by the Northern California Golf Association, the 6,857-yard par-72 Poppy Hills was designed by Robert Trent Jones Jr. in 1986 and is open to the public. In 1991, Poppy Hills became one of the three courses hosting each year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. PGA Tour statistics in 2006 affirmed its 5th Hole as "the toughest on tour," and Poppy is known for its undulating fairways, challenging elevation changes and other characteristics designed to force golfers to carefully calculate their shots. Players enjoy Poppy Hills so much they named it No. 12 among the most popular golf courses in the United States, according to the 2007 Zagat Survey. Pro Mat Gogel holds the course record of 62. Green fees are \$200, but joining the NCGA can get you nearly 75 percent off, and twilight rates are available. The fee for carts — which include GPS — is \$36. The course, the first in the United States to be owned and operated by an amateur golf association, is located at 3200 Lopez Road in Pebble Beach. For reservations, call (831) 625-2035 or visit www.poppyhillsgolf.com.

■ Quail Lodge Resort and Golf Club, Carmel Valley

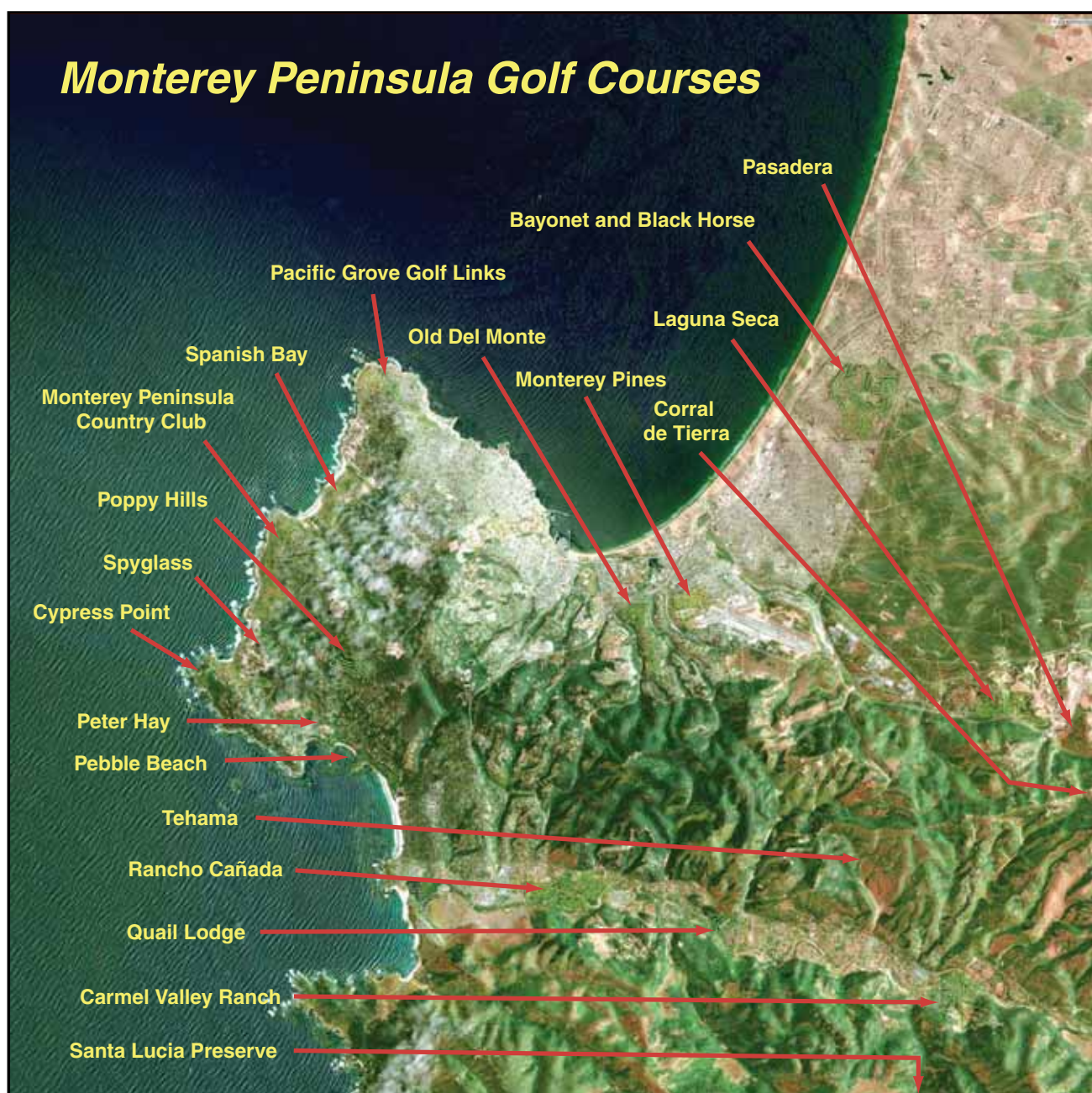
"A round of golf on our scenic Carmel Valley golf course is so relaxing, the wildlife may ask to play through. Go ahead and let them — when you're surrounded by hills and lakes this beautiful, it seems a shame to rush," crow the people at Quail. The 6,449-yard par 71 Quail Lodge course — abundant with 10 lakes and lush, colorful landscaping — was designed in 1963 by Robert Muir Graves. It was honored by "Golf for Women" as one of America's most friendly facilities. Pro Bobby Clampett shares the course record 62 with Lennie Clements. The course is open to members and their guests. Green fees, including carts and range balls, run \$140-\$185, depending on day of week and time of year. Reduced rates available for 9 holes and twilight play, as well as for juniors (17 and under). Practice facilities include a seven-acre driving range, a bunker, chipping areas and a 6,500-square-foot bent grass putting green. Resort guests also have access to the 9-hole executive putting course near the Quail Lodge guest

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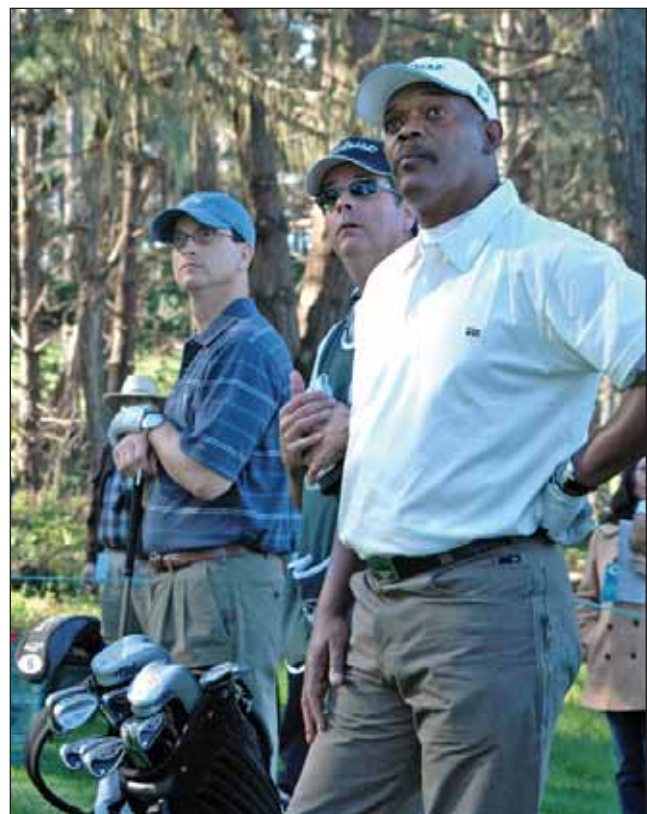

■ Rancho Cañada Golf Club, Carmel Valley

Situated along the Carmel River and on surrounding lands, Rancho Cañada features two 18-hole courses: the 6,357-yard par 71 West course, with fairways described as "deceptively broad to needle narrow," and the 6,125-yard par 71 East course, where the Carmel River comes into play on the front 9. Pro golfer Sam Snead once said the 15th Hole on Rancho Cañada's West course was the narrowest hole he had ever played. Both designed by Robert Dean Putnam in 1970, the East and West courses are open to the public and are located at 4860 Carmel Valley Road in Carmel Valley, just a few miles from the coast. Course records include a 63 on the East course by Doug Sanders, and a 64 by John Kenneday on the West course. Green fees, \$35-\$70; cart fees, \$38. 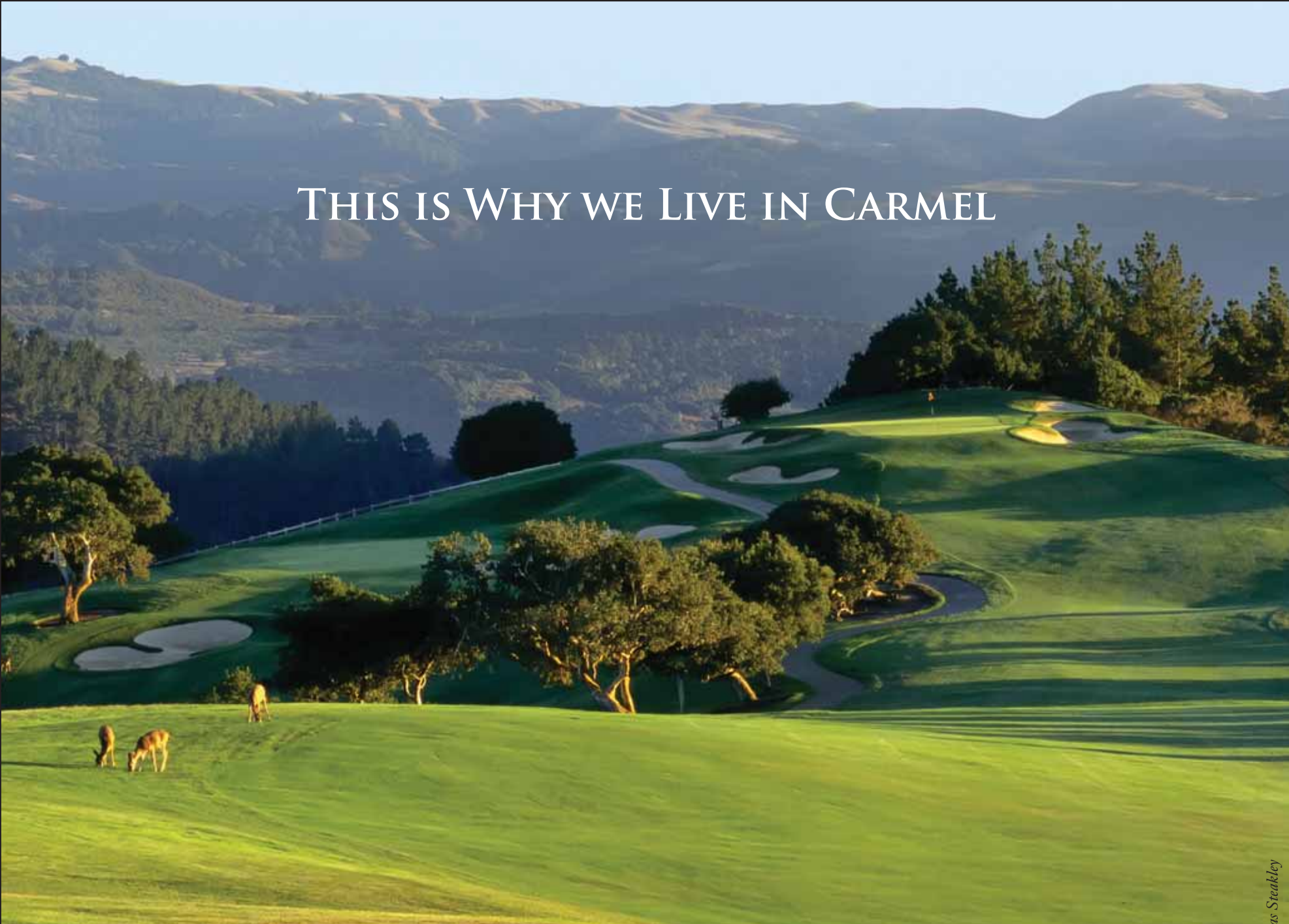

■ Spyglass Hill Golf Course, Pebble Beach

Designed by Robert Trent Jones Sr. in 1966 as part of the master plan for the Pebble Beach ocean front, this resort/semiprivate course measures 6,953 yards at par 72 and takes its name from Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island." Local legend has it he spent time walking in the area while brainstorming, and many of its holes bear notable names, such as Black Dog and Billy Bones. The year after the course was completed, Spyglass replaced Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course in the Bing Crosby Golf Tournament in 1967 and has been part of the tournament — now the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am — ever since. In 2007/2008, Golf Digest ranked it No. 11 on its list of America's 100 Greatest Public Courses. It is also one of the toughest, but the record 64 held by Dan Forsman and David Berganio fell in 2006 with Phil Mickelson's blistering 62, a feat mirrored by Luke Donald. According to the resort, "the first five holes roll through sandy seaside dunes challenging the golfer to carefully pick the safest path. The following 13 holes are cut through majestic pines with elevated greens and strategically placed bunkers and lakes to grab the errant shot." Green fees are \$330 (including cart, for resort for guests). Carts and/or caddies available. The course is located at Stevenson

Drive and Spyglass Hill Road in Pebble Beach. For reservations, call (800) 654-9300 or visit www.pebblebeach.com

■ Tehama Golf Club, Carmel Valley

Jay Moorish, who also designed Shadow Glen in Kansas City, Troon and Troon North in Scottsdale, and Loch Lomond in Scotland, created this 6,520-yard par-71 course high in the hills above Carmel Valley. According to Tehama, "the tranquility and natural beauty of the land, combined with this time-honored game, provides the golfer a surreal hide-away." Owned by former Carmel Mayor Clint Eastwood, the course opened for private play in 1999 and climbs 200 feet in elevation during its 18 holes, six of which are uphill. Rick Leibovich holds the course record 62. Members and guests only. For more information about Tehama, which is located at 25000 Via Malpaso off Carmel Valley Road, contact the golf shop at (831) 622-2250 or visit www.tehamagolfclub.com.

■ The Links at Spanish Bay, Pebble Beach

"Spanish Bay recalls the original Scottish concept of the game golf established over five hundred years ago ... Here, the golf course provides you with the choice of using your regular shot or a low, running shot to play the firm turf while keeping the ball under the steady ocean breezes," according to P.B. Resorts. Open for public play, the 6,821-yard par 72 Spanish Bay links were jointly designed by Robert Trent Jones, Jr., former USGA president Sandy Tatum

and Tom Watson, who once remarked, "Spanish Bay is so much like Scotland, you can almost hear the bagpipes." (Watson, incidentally, also holds the course record, 62.) "Links" refers to the old Scottish term for a sandy seaside wasteland with bristly grasses and stiff prevailing winds, and the Monterey coastline is reminiscent of the rugged beauty of that country. The course overlays land once occupied by a sand mine and included extensive rehabilitation of the dunes and native plants in the area. Guest fees are \$260 (for resort guests, this rate includes a cart). Carts and caddies available. The course is located at 2700 17 Mile Drive in Pebble Beach. For reservations, call (800) 654-9300 or visit www.pebblebeach.com, and remember to listen for the bagpiper who notifies golfers that the day's play is coming to an end.

■ The Preserve Golf Club, Carmel Valley

Tom Fazio designed this private, 6,974-yard par 72 course located among the "stands of massive ancient oaks, beautiful rolling meadows, ponds and streams" deep within the Santa Lucia Preserve and highlighted by the spectacular Santa Lucia Mountains. Fazio commented, "It's as if you are going on a grand hike and happen to have a golf club in your hand," and said the course has no signature hole, as the entire place is a signature property. The course opened in 1999, with membership limited to 300 owners of property within the preserve's gates.
