# CFD gadget has already earned its keep

A PIECE of high-tech equipment unlike any other in Monterey County helped save the life of a woman who collapsed at a downtown restaurant last week. The AutoPulse rescue system — purchased for Carmel Fire Department in December with part of an unsolicited \$25,302 grant from Fireman's Fund and Monterey Insurance Agencies — was installed on the engine Jan. 30 and put into action four days later.

The patient, a Peninsula resident in her 80s, was sitting outside the Forge in the Forest on Junipero Street shortly before 3 p.m. Feb. 3 when she lost consciousness, and her breathing and heartbeat stopped. A bystander dialed 911.

Knowing what they were facing, the arriving crews pulled the 35-pound AutoPulse off the engine and carried it to the prone patient, according to Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance paramedic David Jedinak.

A bystander had initiated CPR, and the ambulance crew quickly took over, using a manual defibrillator to shock the woman's heart back into rhythm and establishing an airway to get oxygen to her lungs. Meanwhile, firefighters moved the AutoPulse underneath the unconscious patient, wrapped its strap around her chest and activated its automated compres-

The AutoPulse calculates the depth of the chest wall and size of the person, and compresses the chest

# Flanders debate heats up again

#### ■ EIR renews old controversy: To sell or not to sell?

THE HEARING was supposed to be about the adequacy of the environmental impact report examining the sale of Flanders Mansion, but advocates of keeping the old home turned this week's planning commission hearing into yet another debate about its fate.

"The goal tonight is for the public to discuss the adequacy of the document, not whether the city should sell or lease Flanders Mansion," cautioned planning and building services manager Sean Conroy, adding that people will have ample opportunity to testify when the disposition of the old mansion is considered by the forest, parks and beach commission, the historic resources board, the planning commission and the city council.

The EIR, revised after the nonprofit Flanders Foundation successfully sued the city to stop the sale of the old house, says leasing it out would have less of an impact than selling it, but that selling it is also an option.

"The goal is to create a document that is accurate and useful in making informed decisions about this project," he said.

'We're not here to have a vote whether we're in favor of selling, in favor of leasing or in favor of doing anything else with Flanders Mansion," added commission chairman Bill

Nonetheless, many speakers could not resist the chance to

#### ALVARADO STREET BLAZE: SUIT SEEKS TO PLACE BLAME

A INSURANCE giant filed a lawsuit this week against a sandwich shop destroyed in the massive fire on Alvarado Street in downtown Monterey two years ago, along with the destroyed building's owner and several other firms the suits claims contributed to the devastation wrought by the blaze.

State Farm Insurance Company also sued Star Manufacturing International, the maker of a toaster oven said to have started the fire, which originated in a Ouizno's restaurant.

"Prior to the fire, the toaster oven malfunctioned, causing electricity to overheat and ignite nearby combustible materials," according to the lawsuits filed Feb. 6 in Monterey County Superior Court.

But the suit, which seek more than \$1 million, also targets the owner of the building, several electrical contractors and others who State Farm contends in some capacity had ties to the Alvarado Street building, which was totally destroyed.

The defendants include Saucito Land Company, Julie Work-Beck, Avila Design and Owens Electric.

State Farm's Emeryville attorney, David Demo, said the suits were filed to reclaim the money — \$1,078,000 — the insurance agency gave policy holders Carolyn Harris, Anand Bokde and Joel Knight, whose businesses were damaged by the blaze.

Anand and Bokde were tenants of the building at 467 Alvarado Street, while Knight leased some offices

# CITY FREEZES HIRING, CUTS SPENDING

m To}$  MAKE up for nearly \$600,000 in revenue shortfalls, the Carmel City Council decided during a special meeting last Wednesday to leave vacant jobs unfilled, cut spending and take money from reserves.

"Last year, when you adopted the budget, the economy was in pretty good shape, and we were optimistic," city administrator Rich Guillen told the city council Feb. 4. But now the nation is in a recession economists say may not end until mid-2010, "so based on things we're reading and the data, we thought we should take some immediate action and slow down our spending in anticipation of what will be a difficult year."

Administrative services director Joyce Giuffre presented the numbers, suggesting the council drop the budget's rev-

enue projections by \$583,920, due to declines in tourism and property sales. She recommended lowering the target for transient occupancy tax by \$131,860, to \$4,261,640; property tax by \$82,000, to \$3,892,000; sales tax by \$198,060, to \$2,164,000; and "other" revenue sources by \$172,000, to \$2,690,624. To help make up for the shortfalls, she recommended moving \$187,082 from reserve accounts for hostelry and capital projects into the general fund.

"We struggled with having to do that, but we have managed to build up reserves over last several years for a rainy day," Guillen said. "And I guess it's raining."

Postponing hiring for five vacant positions — public services director, community planning and building director, senior planner, police services officer and finance specialist would save \$134,415 this year, according to Giuffre.

"All the department managers were asked to look at line items and see where they could make adjustments, if possible," Giuffre added. Even the council's discretionary fund was cut by \$10,000.

Spreading out capital projects and purchases over two years would cut \$255,000 from street and road work, and design changes are dropping the Scenic Road bathroom project's costs by \$46,636. Other items set aside, such as the underground water tank at Del Mar and the mist fire protection system in the library, would save \$51,905 this year.


But Giuffre said an unbudgeted \$43,185 for the Sunset Theater movie sound system, \$40,000 for new parking payment machines in the Sunset Center lot and \$34,705 in increased costs for the storm drain at San Antonio and Eighth had to be added to the budget, eating into the cost cutting.

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# \$23 million lawsuit filed against Monterra developers

TWO NEW lawsuits have been filed over the troubled Monterra Ranch development off of Highway 68, including a \$23 million suit by a Southern California bank for unpaid loans.

La Jolla Bank FSB last week filed the multimillion dollar suit in Monterey County Superior Court against Monterra Ranch Properties, owners Roger and Basil Mills, and a host of lien holders and beneficiaries tied to the development.

La Jolla Bank's suit seeks \$23,257,204.68.

"Defendants breached each of the loan agreements by failing to make payments when due," according to the suit, "defaulting under the terms of the loan agreements and failing to pay La Jolla Bank's trustees fees, attorneys fees costs and expenses."

"It's a similar suit to those some other banks have filed," said David Armanasco, the Mills' spokesman. "It's a suit to reserve their rights in the foreclosure process."

Monterra and the Millses have faced numerous lawsuits over the posh housing development, which has failed to attract the number of buyers the brothers expected.

#### Construction company files suit

In a separate claim, Travis Construction Inc. filed a lawsuit last week against Monterey County Bank and Monterra Ranch Properties for unpaid bills for construction of a segment of the subdivision.

The lawsuit claims fraud, unfair business practices, economic duress and other claims and seeks \$264,435.85 in unpaid construction bills.

Monterey County Bank President Charles

T. Chrietzberg, Jr. told The Pine Cone last Thursday the bank is in the process of filing a counterclaim against Travis.

"Travis really misrepresented the cost to complete the project," Chrietzberg said. "The project went over budget by over a million dollars. They fraudulently signed lien waivers in order to obtain funds from the bank, which is a violation of banking regulations."

Chrietzberg also said Travis performed "defective and shoddy workmanship."

David Hollingsworth, Travis' attorney, alleged the bank said it had enough funds to pay for the construction project but short-changed crews who worked double shifts to finish it.


"After they got all the work and materials out of them," Hollingsworth said, "the [bank] said 'Sorry, we've only got so much, and you can have that or nothing.""



# CFD grows by three to ensure speediest possible response

LOVED ONES pinned badges on Carmel's three new firefighters after they took the oath before the city council last Tuesday. Graham Evans, Brian Harrington and David Meurer were hired to fill the positions created by the council to shore up staffing and ensure the speediest possible response to emergencies. They joined the three engineers and three captains who make up the rest of the department's fulltime employees.

"The timing of these changes is difficult due to the declin-

ing economy, but the city administrator and city council remain committed to taking actions that will preserve public safety in Carmel," police chief George Rawson told The Pine Cone after the meeting. "The threat and consequences of a devastating fire demand a strong commitment to ensuring the fire department is properly staffed at all times and all

days of the year."

At the Feb. 3 council meeting, Rawson introduced the three men, all of whom have longtime local ties.

Evans grew up in Carmel, attended Monterey Peninsula schools and began volunteering at CFD while he was still at Carmel High in 1988. After college, he embarked on a different career track but returned to "his true passion," Rawson said, becoming a firefighter and joining CFD part time in 2002. He also went to work for Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance as a paramedic.

Harrington, born and raised on the Peninsula and a resident of Monterey, graduated from Monterey High School in 1998, graduated from the MPC fire academy, and is an emergency medical technician who is working to finish his degree in fire protection. He volunteered as a firefighter at Pacific Grove for three years and Carmel Fire for one-and-a-half years, and also worked part-time for CRFA.

"He has put in many hours in the Carmel Fire Department and has volunteered, and we very much appreciate that," Rawson said.

The son of Monterey City Manager Fred Meurer, Meurer was born in Salinas and has lived in Monterey County his entire life. He became interested in a career in firefighting about two years ago, attended classes and went through the fire academy at Monterey Peninsula College. He volunteered with Salinas Rural Fire Department and worked as a seasonal firefighter for Cal Fire.

"David comes to us with many accolades," Rawson said.

In the two days the department was accepting applications, more than 30 were submitted, "so this was a very difficult decision to make, with many qualified people," Rawson told the council. "But I'm proud to tell you that standing before you are three strong young men who are

ready to protect the community."

To get there, Evans, Meurer and Harrington each had to pass a written test, undergo oral an examination from a group of fire captains and another from the chiefs, submit to a background check, take pre-employment psychological and medical exams, and successfully complete a physical agility test.

"The three candidates ultimately selected were chosen on the basis of their knowledge, skills, abilities and backgrounds," Rawson told The Pine Cone. And they "are familiar with Carmel and the unique challenges associated with findlocations without ing addresses."

Rawson and Monterey Assistant Fire Chief Andrew Miller made the final hiring decision after interviewing a pool of candidates recommended by the fire captains.

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# Long-lost eagle found seriously injured

#### ■ SPCA caring for her at Ryan Ranch

A 16-YEAR-OLD female bald eagle wildlife officials lost track of in 1995 after the bird's radio transmitter failed is recovering after being found entangled in a wire fence at Fort Hunter Liggett last week.

The eagle, known to the Ventana Wildlife Society as "5M," is being treated at the SPCA for Monterey County Wildlife Rescue and Rehabilitation Center at Ryan Ranch for deep wounds on each wing.

The injured eagle was discovered by Fort Hunter Liggett employees, SPCA spokeswoman Beth Brookhouser told The

"They wrapped her in a blanket, removed her from the fence and put her in dog crate and called us," she explained.

Most of the 5M's injuries came from struggling to free herself from the wire fence. "The eagle's left wing is drooping, which is never a good sign," Brookhouser said. "Luckily, X-rays aren't showing any broken bones."

Wildlife center employees are feeding 5M with tongs and giving her intramuscular antibiotics twice a day. The bird is being kept hydrated with subcutaneous fluids.

SPCA workers are also trying to leave the bird alone as much as possible so she doesn't get too comfortable around

"The goal with her, like all the animals we care for here, is to get her back into the wild where she belongs,"

After being found Feb. 1, 5M was treated at Pacific Wildlife Care in Morro Bay before being transferred to the SPCA Wildlife Center.

As an 8-week-old eaglet in July 1993, 5M was collected from a nest in Juneau, Alaska, and banded and fitted with a

A few months later, Ventana Wildlife Society officials released her with 12 others in Big Sur as part of a reintroduction effort.

The Ventana Wildlife Society, which conserves native wildlife and their habitat, released 70 bald eagles to Central California in the 1980s and 1990s and began reintroducing California condors in 1997.

Biologists tracked 5M's movements in the Big Sur, Lake San Antonio and Lake Nacimiento areas but lost track of her in 1995 after her transmitter failed.

VWS executive director Kelly Sorenson helped with the bird's introduction to Big Sur when he worked as a field biol-"It is just an amazing feeling to know that this eagle sur-

vived all these years," he said. "I just hope she can once

The SPCA has received numerous calls from the public asking to see 5M in person, but that type of exposure could add to the animal's duress.

"We completely understand why people want to see such an amazing animal up close," Brookhouser said. "But she is a wild animal, and it is already stressful for a wild animal to

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# Want to party all day at Sunset Center? Movie needs extras

CREWS FILMING a huge scene of revelry at Sunset Center for "Carmel" need hundreds of festively attired extras Friday and Saturday. The hours are long and the pay is nil, but you get to put on your best duds, hang out with friends and meet people, get the insider's view of movie making — and maybe even be "discovered."

'Carmel" features the story of a teenage art prodigy who is abandoned by his drug-addicted mother at a motel and gets caught up in the dark and lucrative world of international art

Part of the film's finale is an upscale and well attended party at Sunset Center, and the scenes will be shot at the venue Feb. 13 and 14 with Alfred Molina, Josh Hutcherson, Lauren Bacall and Billy Boyd. The movie also stars Dina Eastwood, Scott Eastwood and Hayden Panettiere.

The Friday scene will require about 200 people dressed in daytime formal wear — cocktail dresses and suits — while Saturday will call for 600 similarly attired extras.

# Bulldozers away!





In a sight not often seen on the Monterey Peninsula, heavy earthmoving equipment is being used to carve a wide swath through the scrub on the former Fort Ord in Seaside. The grading crews are relocating and widening General Jim Moore Boulevard from two to four lanes, part of an estimated \$20 million project to improve the road, according to Steve Endsley, FORA's director of planning and finance.

The project's current phase, which includes a bicycle path, began last summer and is expected to be completed this year.

The idea is to increase capacity of the road," Endsley said.

The cost of the roadbuilding project is partly being paid with grants of federal and state tax dollars, he added.





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#### **MORE THAN MEETS** THE EYE

When tires wear unevenly, the problem may lie deeper than the treads. While improper tire pressure may be the culprit, the problem may also be loose strut mounts, ball joints, or steering linkage, or weak/fatigued absorbers or coil springs. Excessive wear on both the inside and outside edges of the tire is often due to low tire pressure. A diagonal tread wear pattern on rear tires indicates incorrect wheel alignment of the rear tires. If the toe setting is incorrect, the tire will try to travel in a direction other than the one in which the vehicle wants to go. This happens only momentarily, after which the tire is forced back, causing the diagonal scuff wear pat-

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HINT: If you hit a large pothole or curb, have the suspension components of your vehicle inspected for damage.

#### **AREA OF EXPERTISE**

When choosing an area rug, its shape and size will largely be determined by its location and the room's furniture. In the living room, it is often best to leave a onefoot border of bare floor around the rug. Hardwood floors framing a rug create a more formal look. In the dining room, choose a rug that is about four feet wider and four feet longer than the table that rests upon it so that the chair legs will not catch on the edges of the rug. As far as shape is concerned, a rectangular area rug is the obvious choice for a rectangular room, and a round rug softens the right angles of an otherwise traditional room.

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HINT: To add a touch of whimsy, choose a free-form area rug for children's bedrooms and playrooms.

# Cops issue warning about car burglaries

SOMEONE IS smashing windows and swiping purses throughout Carmel and the Monterey Peninsula, and police are warning

people against leaving anything in their cars. "It has been going on since late December," said Carmel Police Cmdr. Mike Calhoun. "We have had seven, and the county has had a lot more."

In Carmel, the first in this string of auto burglaries occurred on New Year's Eve, and the most recent break-ins happened Feb. 1, when two victims reported their cars were broken into while parked on Scenic Road. In the county area, the Monterey County Sheriff's Office most recently took reports of two vehicle burglaries, one on Carmel Point and the other in the parking lot at Stevenson School in Pebble Beach, on Feb. 9.

"It's mainly in the beach area, but not always," Calhoun said of the Carmel car burglaries, which were perpetrated during day-

The thieves apparently target nicer vehicles and break the window with a tool or a rock when they see a purse inside.

"They also go for anything that's covered," Calhoun said. "You could have a water bottle with a blanket over it, and they will break in to see what's under the blanket."

The burglars are looking for easy money and don't seem interested in items like laptops and stereos, or personal papers.

"They want quick cash or credit cards," he said. "That's really the big thing."

That's exactly what they stole from a New York resident who parked a rental car on Scenic Road last Sunday afternoon to go sit on a bench and enjoy the view with her mother and wheaten terrier.

"About 45 minutes later, we walked back, and the car window was smashed and someone had taken my pocketbook," she said. Records indicate her credit cards were used in large Peninsula stores 20 minutes later.

In response to the incident, school officials called in security personnel. The sheriff's office, meanwhile, increased its patrols of the area surrounding the school.

## Seniors Inn may reopen without restaurant

THE OWNER of the Carmel Inn for Seniors and his business partner have abandoned their plans to open a restaurant in the former care home for the elderly.

Developer Nader Agha delivered the news to the planning commission Wednesday after planning and building services manager Sean Conroy said the city could not allow a commercial restaurant and 24 rental units for seniors in the building on San Carlos Street.

Dr. Ron Chaplan owns the inn, which he has been unable to sell since its closing four years ago. He received permission to tear it down and build nine condos, but vacated that plan after the bottom fell out of the realestate market.

He and Agha subsequently developed a plan to reopen it as a boarding house for seniors, offer five low-rent units, and operate a restaurant to feed the tenants and the public, which would bring in additional revenue. They requested a density bonus in excess of the state code to provide the units, which also allowed them to ask for the restaurant as a concession for providing affordable housing. Restaurants are not allowed in the property's zone.

The commission tentatively approved that setup last month, but Conroy discovered the 2009 Government Code wouldn't allow it unless the city had a specific ordinance permitting the city to grant density bonuses higher than the state limit, which it doesn't.

In his Feb. 11 report to the planning commission, Conroy said Chaplan and Agha could have their commercial restaurant if the inn contained only 11 units, three of which would be affordable, according to density

Alternatively, they could withdraw their application, ditch the request for a commercial restaurant and rent out the units, which don't have kitchens, to elderly tenants. Senior housing is a permitted use in the area and wouldn't even require approval from the planning commission, he said.

"Thank you for the effort," Agha said. "We concur with it and withdraw the application tonight."

## Council readies city for fires and floods

THE CARMEL City Council last week OK'd ordinances limiting construction in the town's 100-year flood zone - which consists solely of the beach and Larson Field and requiring that only fire-safe materials be used when building new homes in certain parts of the city.

#### Water

The Federal Emergency Management Agency required the new "community floodplain ordinance," according to planning and building services manager Sean Conroy, so residents remain eligible for the National Flood Insurance Program and the city can get disaster relief following a bad flood.

"Failure to enact appropriate regulations will result in a suspension of flood insurance for members of the community," Conroy told the council Feb. 3. He said 23 homeowners in the city have flood insurance policies.

The lengthy ordinance was written specifically for California coastal communities to limit development in flood-prone areas, thereby avoiding expensive flood-control projects. Conroy said the feds identified Carmel Beach and Larson Field as the city's only flood zones.

'Very little, if any, future development is foreseen in these two areas," he reported. "Therefore, the primary benefit of the proposed ordinance is to continue to make flood insurance available in the city," and to qualify the city for disaster relief money.

The council unanimously voted to approve the ordinance, which will take effect in April.

#### Fire

Conroy also presented an ordinance to amend the Carmel Municipal Code to adopt the state fire marshal's "high fire hazard severity zone map" for the city. The map highlights a swath of land extending from the northwest corner to the southeast in which only noncombustible materials can be used in new homes, with the intent of slowing the rate of spread and intensity of a wildfire in the forested town. The restrictions don't apply to remodels.

"When this first came to us, our concern was that it might have an effect on community character," Conroy said, because the city favors shingle siding, board and batt, and other traditional wood materials.

But the state keeps a list of treated wood products that meet fire-safe standards, Conroy said. "The noncombustible requirement, therefore, should not have a significant impact on community character, as the traditional range of acceptable siding products will still be available."

Conroy also mentioned the city already requires the use of treated wood shingles on new roofs, regardless of whether the project is new construction or a remodel.

The council unanimously approved the map of the fire severity zone.

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# Courthouse remodel goes over budget by \$45 million

THE COST to renovate the Monterey County courthouse in Salinas has skyrocketed from an anticipated \$15 million seven years ago to more than \$60 million today, according to documents filed in court this week.

The staggering increase was outlined in a lawsuit filed against two construction companies that allegedly released unsafe levels of asbestos into the ventilation system in 2005 while renovating the North Wing of the courthouse.

"The county incurred significant increased remediation costs, additional costs for environmental consulting and testing" because of the asbestos problem, according to the suit.

The suit, filed against the Skanska USA Building company and Nova Partners, alleges negligence, breach of contract and other charges.

Irven Grant, an attorney with the Monterey County Counsel, said most of the \$45 million in extra costs stems from hiring new crews to redo what he said was "inadequate" construction work by Skanska and Nova.

That number also reflects the increased costs of building

materials such as steel and concrete, Grant said.

"At a bare minimum," he said, "[Skanska and Nova] should pay us for the costs incurred for two or three acts of negligence that had to do with cutting and attempting to remove asbestos while people were in the building.

County spokeswoman Maia Carroll said the county also had to monitor and test the air quality of the building 24 hours per day, seven days a week because of the asbestos

"There were some pretty extraordinary measures taken during that time because of the asbestos issues," Carroll

Grant said Skanska and Nova crews agreed to remove asbestos without displacing employees. Ultimately, county workers had to be relocated to portable units just north of the courthouse because of high asbestos levels.

"Nova and Skanska owed a duty to the county to avoid any conduct that would result in the unexpected release of potentially hazardous levels of asbestos," according to the suit.

In 2006, the board of supervisors approved more than \$1 million for asbestos abatement.

Nova Partners and Skanska declined to comment on the suit because they had not yet seen it.

Grant said the suit also seeks to protect the county from liability stemming from suits filed against the county.

'There are a number of employees and other persons who are suing because they were harmed by the practices that went on and the asbestos that was cut loose in the building," Grant said.

Courthouse workers were exposed to asbestos after the two construction companies reportedly drilled into the building's ventilation system, releasing the carcinogen into the building's environment.

In 2006, Skanska and Nova were indicted by a Monterey County Grand Jury for releasing asbestos into the courthouse. The charges included improperly disposing of asbestos and recklessly releasing the hazardous material into the building.

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
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

In their quest to preserve parkland and open space, government agencies have acquired thousands of acres of local real estate in the past decade.

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger has criticized some of the acquisitions, calling for a halt to new parklands until the money becomes available to take care of them.

But Sarah Christie, the legislative director for the California Coastal Commission, believes it's imperative that wildlands be preserved, even if the government agencies buying them can't afford to operate them or open them to the public.

"When properties become available, it's safe to say it's better to buy a critical piece, even if you don't currently have the budget to open it," Christie maintained.

Christie's comments are particularly relevant in the case of Point Lobos Ranch. The 1,312-acre ranch was purchased from the Big Sur Land Trust in two phases. The California Department of Parks and Recreation acquired 494 acres in 1998 and the remaining 818 acres in June 2006. Ultimately, state parks paid about \$12 million for the property. The money came from Proposition 117, also known as the California Wildlife Protection Act, which makes about \$30 million of taxpayer funds available each year for wildlife habitat pro-

But, as a direct result of the faltering California economy, state parks is unable to open the property to the public.

"There's no money to create a general plan, and there's no money to create an initial access plan," said Matt Fuzie, Monterey district superintendent for state parks. "I'd like to see the process of opening the park completed, but from my seat, that isn't a simple thing."

The 1,200-acre Brazil Ranch in Big Sur which was acquired by the U.S. Forest Service in 2002 for \$23 million — has faced far more scrutiny than Point Lobos Ranch regarding its inability to provide public

Until the forest service comes up with a long-term public access plan, the Brazil

Ranch is offering limited access by hosting guided hikes on the property every Saturday, according to the forest service's website.

Fuzie said his agency is open to developing a similar short-term program for Pt. Lobos Ranch, but he said nobody has asked

"We haven't had the pressure to create a [short-term plan]," he said. "But if there was a demand, that might change."

#### Let there be public access

The coastal commission has repeatedly urged the forest service to create more public access. Yet at least publicly, the state watchdog agency has expressed no concern over Point Lobos Ranch and its absence of an access plan.

Coastal commission planner Lee Otter said his agency recently sent the forest service a letter asking it to "get something up and going beyond simply offering guided tours." He confirmed that Point Lobos Ranch hasn't received similar prodding.

"Point Lobos Ranch is kind of taken for granted," Otter suggested. "It's seen as an addition to Point Lobos State Reserve, which already has plenty of public access."

Otter said the public is entitled to access both Brazil Ranch and Point Lobos Ranch.

"We know they're struggling with budget issues," he said. "But a state legislative mandate requires that they provide a maximum of public access and recreational opportuni-

A third recent addition to Monterey County's vast inventory of parkland — the Monterey Peninsula Regional Park District's 4,300-acre Palo Corona Regional Park has not been kept off limits the way Point Lobos Ranch has. The regional park district has yet to implement a long-term access plan for its park, but Otter praised its short-term plan, which allows hikers to access — by reservation only — a well graded 1.5-mile

The path leads to an overlook and picnic spot called Inspiration Point, which offers stunning views of Point Lobos, Carmel and Carmel Valley.

"I am very pleased with what they've done," Otter said of the regional park district. "They're providing public access opportunities and protecting resources. They're taking their charge quite seriously, and they're striking a commendable balance."



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The hills at the upper right overlooking Pt. Lobos were acquired by state parks more than years ago, but they remain closed to the public, and there is no plan to open them anytime soon.

a couple of inches in order to circulate blood to the brain and other vital organs.

"And it doesn't just squeeze where you would normally squeeze the sternum — it's squeezing the whole chest wall — so it's distributing the force around the chest and is much more effective," Jedinak said. "It was a very impressive tool to use in a full arrest sit-

After a few moments, the woman's heart started beating on its own again, and she had a pulse. Emergency workers loaded her into the ambulance and took her to Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula, where she was lodged in intensive care.

Jedinak couldn't say whether the machine made the difference in the return of her vital signs, but it certainly increased the odds of success, giving her body 80 compressions per minute as the ambulance crew worked on getting air to her lungs and administering

"It was the first time an AutoPulse was ever used in Monterey County," said Jedinak, who estimated the fire department responds to a couple of cardiac cases a month and will be putting the machine to good use.

We were very fortunate to be able to secure this from a grant from Fireman's Fund," he said.



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# Gardiner's 'project' includes no development, says planner

JUST FIVE weeks after closing the doors of Gardiner's Resort, the company that owns the property is presenting a "general development plan" for the one time tennis retreat. But according to a county planner, the proposal — which will be considered Tuesday, Feb. 17, by the Carmel Valley Land Use Advisory Committee — does not include any new

According to David Mack of the Monterey County Planning Department, the proposal aims to place 32 lots of record under a single "plan" as a means of preserving its nonconforming uses.

"If the the resort is closed for one year and reopens, they

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would lose their legal nonconforming uses," Mack said. "They would have to comply with existing zoning restric-

Mack said the owners of the resort, Pristine Development, LLC, will be represented by EMC Planning Group. EMC did not return a call asking for comment on the issue.

#### Prime ministrers and presidents

Founded by local tennis legend John Gardiner at 114 Carmel Valley Road, the resort opened in 1957, eventually establishing itself as a world-class tennis getaway.

During its half century of operation, the resort gained fame for its impressive guest list of celebrities, which included four presidents - Richard Nixon, Gerald Ford, Ronald Reagan and George H. W. Bush — and a number of movie stars and athletes.

Pristine Development cited the global financial downturn as the chief reason for closing the resort.

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

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

# Father and son bring a touch of Mexico to Monterey Symphony

Bringing together a reverence for the past and a curiosity about the future, Carlos Prieto is the precise definition of a modernday Renaissance Man.

Prieto, a former Massachusetts Institute of Technology engineering student who went on to become Mexico's most respected contemporary classical musician, will play with the Monterey Symphony when it performs Sunday and Monday, Feb. 15-16, at Sunset Center. Prieto will be joined by his son, Carlos Miguel Prieto, who will conduct the symphony.

The elder Prieto, one of the most acclaimed cellists in the world, has long served as an ambassador for Latin America's many contributions to the legacy of classical music. During the past 30 years, he has performed the world premieres of more than 80 compositions, most of which were written for him by composers from Spanish-speaking countries.

#### Like father, like son

The younger Prieto, meanwhile, is music director of Mexico's most respected orchestra, the Orquesta Sinfonica Nacional de Mexico (National Symphony Orchestra of Mexico). A graduate of Princeton and Harvard universities, he's also an accomplished violinist.

"They come from a long line of musicians," observed Joe Truskot, executive director of the symphony. "They're just an extremely talented family.'

When the symphony performs at Sunset this weekend, it will open each performance with a rendition of Redes Suite by Silvestre Revuelta, an early 20th century Mexican composer.

'Revuelta wrote in all different genres, but he's best known for capturing a Mexican flavor in this particular suite," Truskot said.

The suite comes from the soundtrack of a 1936 Mexican film, "Redes" or "The Wave,"

which marked future Hollywood legend Fred Zinneman's debut as a director.

Following Redes Suite, the symphony will perform a cello concerto by contemporary Mexican composer Federico Ibarra. The elder Prieto commissioned Ibarra to write the piece.

Concluding the program will be a performance of Schumann's Symphony No.4 in D Minor, Op. 120. "It's one of the great 19th century romantic symphonies," Truskot

This weekend's concert marks the symphony's fourth this season, and according to Truskot, the reception it's received so far has been overwhelmingly positive.

#### IN THE fall of 2008, iconic folk singer Joan Baez celebrated her 50th anniversary as a professional performing artist with the release of her first studio album in five years. Produced by Steve Earle and featuring a band that includes bluegrass stalwarts Tim O'Brien and Darryl Scott, "Day

**After Tomorrow**" was nominated for a Grammy in the category of Best Contemporary Folk/Americana Album. Feb. 16, Baez makes a rare local performance at the Golden State Theatre in Monterey. The show, which starts at 8 p.m., is sold out and is in some respects a homecoming for the legendary soprano.

Moving with her family from Palo Alto to Boston in the summer of 1958, a young Joan Baez first made a name for herself performing at the heralded Club 47 in Beantown. A celebrated folk recording artist shortly thereafter, she toured the country with Bob Dylan, and the pair later lived together in the Carmel Highlands. During the 1960s, Baez performed at the Big

Sur Folk Festival, which was held at the Esalen Institute. An accomplished artist with a remarkable body of work, Baez received the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award in 2007.

# Exec Chef Rodriguez: His menu is his palette at Il Fornaio

WATCHING Executive Chef Gabriel Rodriguez at work in the exhibition kitchen at Il Fornaio Italian restaurant is like watching an artist in his studio. He moves swiftly, shaking and stirring pans and pots, adding ingredients, incorporating liquids — all the while intent and smiling to him-

"I love to cook all the time," Rodriguez said. "For me, it's

an art."

The Il Fornaio kitchen allows him to interact with diners who sit at the long counter in front of his range and ovens. "I like it best when it's noisy" — which to him signifies everyone is having a good time.

We watched while he made risotto with fresh fava beans. Carnaroli rice was used in the risotto, instead of the usual arborio rice. He explained carnaroli absorbs more of the cooking broth, has a higher

starch content and keeps its form better. He said vegans can request that vegetable broth be substituted for the usual chicken stock, and he will do so gladly.

He believes food preparation at Il Fornaio restaurants is the most authentic one can find outside of Italy. There are 17 Il Fornaio restaurants and bakeries in California.

Carmel's II Fornaio, located in the Pine Inn, has several dining venues in one large space. There's the coffee bar and bakery that serves light fare in the morning and afternoon; the main dining room — accessible from Ocean Avenue or Monte Verde Street — which offers tables opposite the bar; another area near the host desk, at the far end of Rodriguez' kitchen, features fireside dining; then there's the Ocean Avenue area, and the outdoor terrace from which one can catch glimpses of the ocean and where canines are welcome. All of these areas offer a different ambiance, and the long, elegant bar is a popular gathering place.

Chef Rodriguez is there five days a week for lunch and

dinner. As exec chef, he oversees his eight kitchen prep and line cooks and workers, creates specials, hires new staff, orders, and takes care of myriad other tasks.

"I'm very picky," he said, "so everything is more perfect."


When he's interviewing prospective employees, there are two requirements he considers essential: "I look for good attitude and willingness to work on weekends." He can teach new employees required cooking techniques, but he wants to start out

with an enthusiastic worker.

Before signing on with Il Fornaio, Rodriguez attended San Francisco Culinary School, but dropped out after two months of academics. "For me, I liked to learn on the job," he said. He worked for five years prepping at Café Napoli; two years at PortaBella and two-and-a-half years at the Monterey Plaza Hotel's restaurant as a line cook before signing on with Il Fornaio in 1997.

On the line, he learned a great deal from then-Executive Chef Alessio Giannozi. "He was a master for me. He made me strong [in Italian cuisine]," he said. "I was assistant chef to Alessio, and when he left a year-and-a-half ago, I was made executive chef here."

# The tapas kings, wine fetes, apple lessons and entertaining

EVER SINCE chef Brandon Miller left Stokes Restaurant in Monterey, people have been wondering where he would end up, but no one thought he would be without a kitchen for long.

Turns out he'll be opening Gabe Georis' tapas place, Mundaka, on San Carlos Street next month.

To prepare, Miller has been honing his culinary skills and palate in San Sebastian, Spain. That's where Georis spent his freshman year in college studying, surfing, and learning about food and wine before returning the states, finishing school and going to work for his family's restaurants, Casanova and La Bicyclette.

Miller and Georis became acquainted while collaborating on a holiday dinner. At a table full of people discussing wine and food pairings, Georis said he and Miller "saw eye to eye," and later, he observed the chef's

"I can tell he just gets it," Georis said. "It's a passion for food that comes from the heart, rather than from the mind."

work in the kitchen.

Georis told him about his plans to open a tapas restaurant in the former Gem Restaurant location, and they decided to collaborate. Mundaka — named for the famous surfing town about 30 minutes from San Sebastian — will open next month.

"Working on a new project gets me so jazzed I can't sleep at night! I think I was born to open restaurants," Miller said this week from Spain, where he had just enjoyed a breakfast

of venison, pork belly and red wine in the Barcelona market with chef and tour guide Amanda Laporte. "The learning is one of the reasons I love this business so much."

He and Georis share the vision of a casual, upbeat, lively place that will

become "a local hangout, a place for discussion and laughter, and of course a place to eat and drink well without an exorbitant price tag," as Georis described it.

Miller said he plans to keep the menu "simple, traditional, visual and fresh," letting the ingredients speak for themselves. He's also a strong advocate of using as many local products as possible, including fish, meat, produce, olive oil and other artisanal foods from the Central Coast, but will

Married, he and his wife Maria have a 10-month-old son named after him. He enjoys family gatherings or get togethers with friends, and loves to cook for both.

He learned to cook at his family's home outside of Guadalajara, Mexico. He learned from his mother and aunt while working in his father's butcher shop. His parents now live in Marina.

With II Fornaio for 13 years, Chef Rodriguez enjoys preparing the monthly Festa Regionale menu which features alternately the cuisine of one of Italy's 20 food regions with authentic recipes created by Il Fornaio's Italian chefs.

The everyday "core" menu comes from the company's Corte Madera headquarters, but each executive chef prepares and presents his own specials and signature dishes at the restaurant where he presides.

Chef Rodriguez considers his signature dish to be gnocchi potato dumplings made with Yukon Gold potatoes — and served four different ways. He has been certified for making authentic Italian gnocchi by the company.

"The important thing is to serve only the best quality and to be consistent in preparation," he said. "And to offer hospitality to our customers."

For first-time diners, he suggests a dinner commencing with antipasti misto della casa, followed by an entrée of either a fish soup with jumbo shrimp, prawns, mussels and fresh fish filet, or grilled rack of lamb drizzled with thyme olive oil, served with Yukon Gold potatoes and sautéed vegetables. For dessert, try fried crépes with caramelized warm apples, creme Anglaise, caramel sauce and vanilla ice cream.



'We simply believe the city has not made the case that the sale of the Flanders property is necessary," said Flanders Foundation President Melanie Billig.

The group favors city ownership of the mansion, which is in Mission Trail park, and Billig was skeptical of the EIR's claims that selling or leasing it would facilitate the preservation of the historic property, minimize impacts on the neighborhood and put it to productive use.

"Our contention is the city hasn't really looked at how it can put it to productive use," she said. "There's no concept of what productive use really is."

(She made no mention of extensive but unsuccessful efforts previous city councils have made to identify a public use for Flanders Mansion, including creation of a task force by former Mayor Ken White in the mid-1990s.

After numerous public meetings and in-depth fact-finding, the task force recommended a culinary center be housed at the mansion. But after fierce opposition from the surrounding neighborhood, the council rejected the culinary center concept in August 1997.

"We've been looking for a solution for 25 years and now we're back where we started," said White at the time.)

Billig also said the EIR didn't do a good enough job of outlining the process for sale, including offering the property to local and state government agencies before making it available to a private buyer.

Former planning commissioner Yoko Whitaker said the EIR inaccurately concludes occupancy of the home by a family would have the least impact. Families can be loud, residents can drive through the area at any time of day, and people might want to fence or wall off Flanders from the surrounding public lands.

"Whereas a nonprofit use would have fixed staff and hours," she said, and during events, attendees would park offsite and ride shuttles.

But people who live nearby disagreed. Representing the Hatton Fields neighborhood group, Robert Knight said more than 30 residents submitted letters articulating their opinions. "Flanders Mansion should be sold for the purpose for which it was built — a single-family residence — and no public or quasi-public use should be permitted," he said.

He also doubted a family living at Flanders would generate more noise and traffic than an organization.

Carmel Woods resident Joyce Stevens said the city should not sell the mansion and argued that making it private property would impact the surrounding park habitat and create an inholding.

"I urge you to reject the EIR when it comes before you," she said.

Only one planning commissioner, Steve Hillyard, commented on the report, which he said included "social impacts," when it should have only concentrated on "physical impacts." He also said the "indirect impacts" should not be speculative.

"It ignores the fact that if it keeps it, the city will probably put the mansion to the same use as if it's sold," he added.

Conroy said the city will continue accepting comments on the EIR until Feb. 18.

destroyed by the fire, Demo said.

Danny Fancher, owner of Fancher Monterey, who Demo said was Quizno's franchise operator, is also listed in the State Farm suit. Fancher filed a suit in February 2008 against many of the same parties State Farm did.

Fancher could not be reached for comment.

#### Faulty toaster

Fire investigators determined the blaze was sparked by a toaster oven in the Quizno's restaurant.

"The question is, who is responsible for the fire starting?" Demo asked. "Was it the manufacturer of the toaster oven or was it the Quizno's franchise operator itself?"

And the lawsuit contends others might be responsible for the fire. State Farm also sued several contractors who had performed various electrical work in the building. "There has been work done to the electrical system over

the years, so that's why these other defendants are included," Demo said. The suits also list the company that maintained the toast-

er oven and the previous tenant of the former Quizno's loca-

"As a proximate result of the negligence of all defendants State Farm suffered and continues to suffer losses," according to the suits.

Because all the lawsuits related to the Alvarado Street fire are in the process of being combined, and the statute of limitations to file suit isn't until February 2010, it will be awhile until the suit sees a courtroom, Demo said. "This litigation is not going to go anywhere fast," he said.

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# IN MORE WAY THAN ONE, TWO EGGS ARE BETTER THAN ONE

m FOR}$  ANYONE unfamiliar with the Carmel Valley tradition, being named a Good Egg is a very good thing. But for only the third time in more than half a century, a local resident, Phyllis Crockett, received the lesser known — but ultimately far more prestigious — Double Yolk award.

Crockett was honored at a reception Wednesday evening at the Quail Lodge Resort & Golf Club. Also recognized were this year's Good Egg winners, Mike Thatcher, Cindy Thatcher and Meredith Manhard. The reception was presented by the Carmel Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Carmel Valley Village — which occurred in the decade following World War II — was notable for the spirit of cooperation that existed among residents.

According to Crockett, much of the early construction of

"Everybody worked together like a barn-raising," explained Crockett, who won a Good Egg in 1964.

The community spirit that Crockett describes inspired the creation of the Good Egg award. Since 1953, Carmel Valley residents have annually bestowed Good Eggs on several of their neighbors as recognition for their charitable contributions. "The Good Egg started in 1953, and since then there have been exactly 150 people who have received the award," Crockett observed.

This year's Good Egg winners are all very active members of the Carmel Valley community.

Mike Thatcher works as a licensed painting contractor, while his wife, Cindy, is employed as a substitute teacher at Carmel High School, where she teaches English. Mike has served as the president of Carmel Valley Little

League and president of the Carmel Valley Community Chapel board of directors, and has been a member of the Carmel Valley Kiwanis Club for 20 years. Cindy, meanwhile, has served as president of the

Tularcitos Parent Club and facilitator for Carmel Valley Community Chapel Furniture Thrift Shop, and was once recognized as Volunteer of the Year for Carmel Valley Little League. The couple married in 1972, and they've lived in Carmel Valley since 1976.

Manhard has served as president of the Carmel Valley Community Center, and recently led the fundraising drive for construction of the new 45-meter Carmel High School pool, a \$2.5 million project.

Crockett joins Louis Gardner (1997) and Randy Randazzo (2003) as only the third resident to receive the Double Yolk. "Nobody does anything on their own," said Crockett of the award. "It's a group effort. It's a wonderful community, and I feel blessed to be part of it."

An old bridge that was part of the main entrance to the park was removed last fall. But there is no timeline for

"Until the budget is passed in Sacramento and bond funds are freed up, the contractor will not be able to recommence work," Kirk Gafill, president of the Big Sur Chamber of Commerce said in an email to chamber members Thursday.

In the letter, Gafill said the reopening of the campground and day use areas will likely be "significantly delayed into the summer season."

"In a worst case scenario, it may be well after the summer season before the park reopens," he said.

The lengthy steel vehicle bridge, along with a smaller wood pedestrian bridge within the campground, was removed last fall after studies showed the bridges could be undermined by potential mudslides caused by erosion from last summer's devastating Big Sur fires.

Last spring, a bridge crew performed the initial work to replace both bridges — already called for in a redevelopment plan — with the goal of finishing the work in the spring.

"Our goal was to open around Memorial Day," said C.L. Price, superintendent of the Big Sur sector of the California Department of Parks and Recreation.

Price said park officials and others are exploring options, including reinstalling the old bridges — which are sitting in the park — until they can get new ones. But there could be problems with that.

"They are old bridges, and for safety reasons, they might not pass muster to go back in," Price said. "We have to wait for the winter to pass, and we don't want to put anything in prematurely that is going to be at risk."

Big Sur Chamber of Commerce executive director Stan Russell said the park is a draw for Big Sur businesses. Visitors to the park spend money in hotels, restaurants and

"It could be catastrophic for us," Russell said. "If visitors don't get access to hiking, they are going to rethink their vacation."

The campground has 200 sites, with a combined day use and camper population of approximately 1,000 people per day during the summer season.

In December, the state froze financing for bond-funded infrastructure projects, which affected \$3.8 billion in funding for about 5,600 projects across California. About 5,300 of those projects have been halted or delayed, according to the State Department of Finance.

Gafill said the closure of the park would further hurt businesses affected last summer by last summer's Basin Complex and Chalk Hill fires.

Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park's continued closure would "virtually eliminate one of the most important reasons many travelers have to visit our area," Gafill said.

The Big Sur Softball League season is also in jeopardy, since the field the league plays on lies within the camp-

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

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


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# **Editorial**

# Off with their heads

CALIFORNIA AMERICAN Water made a big mistake when it proposed an elaborate water project that didn't include any new water for the basic needs of this community. The staff of the public utilities commission has just made things a lot worse by recommending a variation on the Cal Am project — again with

Even if the people of the Monterey Peninsula decide they don't want any significant additional development, everybody acknowledges that a few new facilities and housing will be needed sooner or later. And some of them are badly needed right now.

There are plenty of people who don't see the need for a huge new water project that could open the floodgates of development. But nobody is saying, "Don't give us any new water!" It's important that officials in charge of our water supply don't mistake opposition to a huge new water project for opposition to any new water at all.

Right now, everything's at a standstill because of the water shortage. But if this community is going to spend \$150 million to \$200 million for a desal plant and underground storage, it is absolutely essential that it include a small amount of new water for infill housing, granny units, medical facilities, remodels of existing homes, modest business expansions and the like.

A good example of how a small amount of water would benefit the community — and how the moratorium on water permits is hurting everybody — is the American Tin Cannery in Pacific Grove. This grossly underutilized building should have its upper floors converted to condominiums, instantly adding vitality and more of a hometown feel to what is now basically a tourism ghetto. The owners of the complex, and its adjacent parking lot, would surely like to improve it with some badly needed housing. But they can't, because there's no water.

The water project's environmental impact report released two weeks ago didn't even acknowledge the terrible economic and social cost to this community of having a grossly inadequate water supply, and it did nothing to help alleviate it. The view of the people who wrote it — that the only thing a water project need do is replace the water already being taken from the Carmel River — must not prevail.

If it does, the people of the Monterey Peninsula will be subject to a form of governmental repression and denial of basic human rights that call to mind the circumstances that led to some of the important revolutions in human history. The tyrants who try to inflict that on us will have to be deposed.

In fact, does anybody know where we could get a guillotine?

# It's not just a party for fatcats

The economic downturn has led to well deserved recriminations against bankers and other Wall Street fatcats who abused their positions at the helm of this country's — and the world's — financial system. For too long, they have treated the investments of ordinary Americans as their personal cookie jar.


But the new era of parsimony and asceticism must not go too far. For example, if most corporate retreats and conventions are canceled because many of them happen in resort locales and have the appearance of vacations, the people who are going to suffer most are the owners and employees of the businesses that rely on the corporate convention business for their livelihoods.

A good example is the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. At first glance, this event might seem to be an excuse for rich people to play golf and rub elbows

But it's much more than that. The Pro-Am raises millions of dollars for charity. And it brings a ton of badly needed business to the Monterey Peninsula.

Playing golf and having fun may seem frivolous at a time when the President of the United States says we're in a national economic crisis. But backing off from such events will only make the crisis worse.

ination. She was advised to see a doctor if any problems developed as a result of the fall.

# The least-hassle way to get to the Pro-Am? A shuttle, of course

ANT TO avoid parking at Fort Ord, thereby adding an hour to your day of spectating at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am? Increasingly, fans are saying yes, and they're using shuttles to do it.

In fact, recent years have proved many would happily pay a few bucks to hop a shuttle in Carmel, Pacific Grove or Monterey, rather than park at California State University Monterey Bay and ride buses to and from the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. The chambers of commerce in those cities are sponsoring shuttles through Sunday, Feb. 15.

The Carmel Chamber Carmel Commerce and the Innkeepers Association will have buses operating from 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. all weekend, leaving from the Carmel Plaza and delivering riders to the tournament gate in Pebble Beach. To return to town, riders should look for the Carmel shuttle stop at the Pebble Beach Equestrian Center. Daily passes, which allow unlimited rides in and out of the Forest throughout the day, are \$15 per person.

In addition, people can purchase any-day AT&T Pro-Am tournament tickets at the bus stop or in the Carmel Visitor Center, located on San Carlos Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues, for \$55. (Tickets will be \$60 at the gate.)

And the shuttles aren't just for locals hoping for a convenient way to get to the golf tournament. Fanatics from out of town might want to take a break for lunch in Carmel, and those who get their fill of the game after a few hours on the course could opt to spend some time shopping in town instead, the chamber and the innkeepers association hope. Last year, the buses provided 5,000 trips during the five days of the pro-am.

Anyone wondering about the best restaurants in town, or desiring to know anything else about Carmel-by-the-Sea, can stop in at the visitor center located on the west side of San Carlos Street between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

Shuttle tickets and tickets for the pro-am can be purchased ahead of time by calling the chamber at (831) 624-2522 or visiting www.carmelcalifornia.org. During the tournament, shuttle tickets can be purchased at the inns, the Carmel Plaza bus stop or on the bus. Shuttle riders can pay to leave their cars in the north lot at Sunset Center, located at the corner of Eighth and Mission, or in the garage at the Carmel Plaza at Mission and Seventh. Free all-day parking is available in the city lot at Torres and Third, which is about four blocks from the Plaza.

#### **P.G.** offers extras

The Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce's 59-passenger Pacific Monarch buses will depart every 30 minutes from the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History, 165 Forest Ave., beginning at 6:30 a.m. through Sunday, Feb. 15. Pro-Am play begins at 8 a.m. Friday and Saturday, and at 7:30 a.m. for the final round at the Pebble Beach Golf Links on Sunday.

Riders will receive gift bags containing coupons, post cards and brochures.

Chamber president Moe Ammar pointed out that taking the shuttles — as some 2,500 people did last year — will save them about an hour of travel time while offering them more flexibility in their schedules.

With special packages offered by hotels and businesses willing to stay open late, chamber officials said they are "making a concerted effort to provide the maximum in hospitality to the visitors for the golf tournament and to showcase the many charms of Pacific Grove."

Shuttle passes run \$15 per day, or \$40 for a five-day pass, and free parking is available a block away on Ocean View Boulevard. The chamber is also selling daily tournament tickets for \$55. For more information, contact the chamber of commerce at (831) 373-3304 or check the group's website: www.pacificgrove.org.

#### **Monterey hospitality**

The Cannery Row Company, the Old Monterey Business Association and the Fisherman's Wharf Association are collaborating to offer express shuttles to and from Del Monte Forest from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.

The buses will carry golf fans from Cannery Row, Fisherman's Wharf and downtown Monterey, all of which offer plenty of parking, as well as a lot of shopping and dining opportunities before and/or after spectating at the golf tournament.

On Cannery Row, golf fans can catch the shuttle at Wave and Prescott, across from Willy's Smokehouse, and park in the Cannery Row garage off Foam Street. The shuttle from Fisherman's Wharf leaves from Oliver Street off Scott, and parking is available in the waterfront lot off Del Monte Avenue. Downtown, the shuttle leaves from the Monterey Conference Center at the Portola Plaza Hotel, and parking is available in the downtown Monterey garages using the entrances off Tyler or Franklin streets.

# Pebble Beach Pro-Am vital to charities during tough times

URING THE country's current economic state, with job layoffs making headlines and families trying to save as much as possible, charities are also feeling the pinch.

Fortunately, hundreds of nonprofits in Monterey County can rely on proceeds from the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am to help give them muchneeded economic assistance.

The money, distributed through the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, is the lifeblood of many of these local charities. To date, more than \$73 million has been raised. Here are a few organizations that benefit from the golf tournament.

#### ■ Easter Seals

Nobody recognizes the importance of the Pebble Beach Pro-Am more than Tracy Chappell, chief development officer for Easter Seals of Central California.

"Our mission is to change the lives of children and adults with disabilities," said Chappell, who works out of Easter Seals' Monterey office.

The money that Easter Seals receives from the AT&T — about \$82,000 a year — goes toward its P.L.A.Y. Project, a program that shows parents of autistic children how to help their kids at home with about 10 hours per week of intensive play therapy.

"The funding provides for tutors to be in the homes with these parents," she said. "It's quite an undertaking and takes a lot of hours. The AT&T Pro-Am helps us put those tutors in the home."

Autism, which occurs in as many as five out of every 1,000 children, is a developmental disorder characterized by impaired social interaction, problems with communication and unusual, repetitive, or severely limited activities and interests.

But P.L.A.Y. Project is working, Chappell said. She recounted the case of a young son who was scared to be touched by or receive any affection from his mother.

"Because of Easter Seals, her son woke up," she said. "Now he sits in her arms. We have helped him for seven months. The results have been huge. And

the AT&T helps."

Easter Seals also offers services in the areas of education, family, camping and recreation.

The central coast chapter serves about 1,600 people across 10 counties. But Chappell said that number is deceiving because it only reflects the people with disabilities, not their families.

"We really serve the whole family" of disabled people, she said.

# Pros with Peninsula ties savor battles on old stomping

**PROFESSIONAL W**O golfers with local roots — one a well established player with an impressive career and another embarking on his dream of making a

living playing one of the most challenging games on earth — are competing in this week's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. Bobby Clampett, a Monterey boy who became a phenom, and Rob Grube, a Stevenson School graduate seeking his big break in the PGA, are vying with more than 150 other top pros for the lowest scores on the Pebble Beach Golf Links, Spyglass Hill Golf Course and Poppy Hills Golf



Clampett was the youngest player to finish among the top 24 in the Masters (he did it at the age of 18). And then he amassed more than \$1.4 million in winnings during his 14 years as a fulltime pro player. The whole adventure began with a childhood job at Quail Lodge in Carmel Valley.

"I had been bothering my mom for a couple of years because I wanted to



contribution toward our new building. Over the years, AT&T Pebble Beach Charities has donated over \$112,000."

The health center provides primary and preventive medical services, urgent and emergency care, minor surgical procedures, and Spanish language translation assistance.

In order to best serve its Spanishspeaking patients, most of whom are from Guadalajara, Mexico, BSHC developed a Multicultural Health Project, funded in part by Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula.

In 2006, that led Carey to spend nine weeks in Guadalajara to improve her Spanish skills while also spending time in a small medical clinic.

During the 2008 fires in Big Sur, Carey and clinical assistant Danielle Latta, with help from the U.S. Forest Service, set up a medical clinic at the base camp in Molera.

"Not only did the Molera medical clinic avoid time-consuming trips to the emergency room, but it provided immediate onsite evaluation and treatment so that fire personnel could return to their crews to continue their important work," according to the BSHC.

As the fire spread, a second base camp set up near Tassajara Road in Carmel Valley was managed by the health center's staff.

The Forest Service calculated that the medical clinics, which treated more than 1,300 patients, had saved it more than \$2 million.

#### ■ Central Coast YMCA

For just \$30 per year, a child can

join the Central Coast YMCA, which offers a variety of valuable community programs, including after-school childcare, homework assistance, recreation enrichment, spring, summer and winter camps, karate, soccer, basketball, lacrosse and step aerobics for active older adults

"We don't have a full workout facility and pool like you find at a lot of YMCAs," said executive director Tracy Langhorne. "But we provide a wide variety of programs and services."

To help those services, the Monterey Peninsula Foundation gave the Central Coast YMCA \$100,000 last year for its general fund, Langhorne said.

"Those funds support programs like after-school childcare, recreation, sports and camp for children in all five YMCA's of the Central Coast (Monterey Peninsula, Salinas, South County, San Benito and Watsonville),"

The YMCA now even offers soccer and basketball programs for kindergartners.

The Central Coast YMCA last week kicked off its 2009 Strong Communities Campaign, which seeks to raise \$110,000 to support its pro-

And Langhorne said volunteers are an integral part of the YMCA's success and fundraising effort.

"Whether as coaches, tutors, campaigners or policy volunteers, many residents of the Peninsula help us build a stronger community through their work with our YMCA," she said.

Strong Communities The Campaign wraps up March 11.

learn to play golf," he recalled. At first, she ignored his demands. "But I kept badgering her, and she finally took me down to meet [Quail Lodge founder Ed] Haber, and I went into his office when I was 10 and asked for a job."

Haber gave the young boy a job picking balls on the driving range. Clampett got a set of clubs that Christmas, and his mom scraped money together for lessons with teaching pro Lee Martin.

"I had a love of golf right away — it was all I wanted to do," Clampett said. "I enjoyed the challenge of figuring it out and competing."

He played golf in high school at Stevenson, becoming the No. 1 junior player in the state. At Brigham Young University he was a first-team All-American, a rarity for a first-year student, and that summer competed in the U.S. Open when he was 18. He played well and started getting a lot of tournament invitations, including one to play in the hallowed Masters at Augusta, Ga. In 1978, Golf Magazine and Golf Digest both named him the


No. 1 amateur player in the United States, three years after his handicap reached scratch.

He earned his PGA Tour pro player's card by finishing 8th in the Buick Open in 1980 and embarked on a full-time pro career that would last 14 years.

But television also called, and Clampett took a part-time announcing job with CBS in 1991 that became full-time in 1995. He has worked as a course designer and author out of his home in Raleigh, N.C., and been a pilot since 1987, logging his hours in a 1986 Piper Malibu.

Now Clampett is embarking on yet another chapter. He and his wife bought a home in Carmel Valley, and he recently became Quail's "golf ambassador."

"So it's officially my home course, and that kind of brings it all full circle for me," he said. "Part of my involvement with Quail is we're starting to launch

my first golf school with my method of teaching called the Impact Zone — an instruction book that is really changing the way golf is taught and is a unique perspective into what teaching golf is about."

Although he lives with his family in Raleigh, Clampett said he comes to the Peninsula whenever he can and is looking forward to playing well during this year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

"There's nothing like playing golf here on the Monterey Peninsula," he said.

Although he declares his favorite course is "whichever I'm playing at the time," Clampett admitted "a real affection" for Cypress Point and Pebble Beach.

"Cypress, to me, is the ultimate golf experience and the ultimate club," he said. "Pebble Beach really is the ultimate competitive course, and it's a rare combination of really challenging conditions on the coast and rare beauty."

Clampett has been working hard on his game, not only to get ready for the Pro-Am, but to join the Champions Tour full-time as soon as he's old enough.

"I have 15 months to 50 and am focusing on getting my game competitive again to see where I can take it," he said.

#### Fresh on the road

Rob Grube was also an insistent kid who found an unexpected talent and passion for the game of golf.

"I had an overactive Little League coach, to put it mildly, and I told my mom I didn't want to play it anymore, so we tried a bunch of different sports," he recalled. "I've had a love affair with golf since I was 8, and I can't really explain it."

Growing up in Chicago, Grube said no one in his family played the game, though his dad picked it up, and the two go out for rounds together whenever Grube is home for a visit.

Grube found his way to Stevenson via a roundabout way. His older sister attended a prep school in Connecticut, and Grube decided he wanted to go to one, too.

"But I also wanted to play golf, and Stevenson was a perfect fit," Grube said. His mom was familiar with the Pebble Beach high school because a former boyfriend had attended the school years ago, so he applied.

The 14-year-old freshman soon joined the golf team.

"I got to play Spyglass, which is one of the country's greatest courses, every day," he recalled.

He also looked up to his teammates and learned a

lot from their skills and discipline on the golf course. "I wasn't really that good," he said. "I was playing

with these guys every day, and they were beating me. I watched how hard they practiced, and that's what I wanted to do."

Grube played all four years at Stevenson, gradu-

Grube played all four years at Stevenson, graduated in 2004 and headed to Stanford, where he majored in American studies — a combination of history and political science — and played golf.

"It was a similar type of experience to Stevenson in that it was perfect for me: I got a really good education in a great place, and the golf team was fantastic," he said. "It made me a better player, and I loved going to Stanford."

He performed well there as a four-time All-American and Pac 10 Player of the Year. In a tournament against the University of Hawaii, Grube shot a career-low 64 in the final round, tying for the fourth best round in Stanford history. He hit that low again during the 2007 NCAA Championships, netting Stanford the title and third place for himself. Last year, while he was team captain, Stanford missed the title by a one-stroke loss to UCLA.

Grube graduated in June and immediately embarked on his professional golfing career, competing in three Nationwide Tour tournaments and one PGA Tour event, the Reno Tahoe Open, where he finished 14th.

In an attempt to get a regular spot on the PGA Tour, Grube competed in Qualifying School but didn't make it to the final stage.

"No one said it was going to be easy," he commented.

He's eager to return to familiar ground and is excited to be competing in his first AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, in which he, like Clampett, was invited to compete without having to qualify.

"To get to play in a PGA Tour event is a great opportunity, and I'm really excited about it," he said.

While he played Spyglass almost daily during his high-school years, Grube also took his game to Poppy Hills and Pebble Beach Golf Links five times a year.

"Those courses were such a big part of why I became a professional golfer," said Grube, who plans to make time to hook up with his Stevenson coach, see some friends and chat with former teachers while in town.

But "it's business first" when it comes to the reason for his Peninsula reunion, and he's not willing to envision anything other than the best possible finish.

"You have to try to win it," he said.







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

# Your guide to the Pro-Am's musicians, movie stars and athletes

THE ECONOMY may be holding ticket sales down, and rain in the forecast will probably keep some of the usual mob away from this year's AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. But smaller crowds mean better access to the PGA pros and celebrities who make the tournament so popular. With that in mind, here are mini-bios for the stars who will be playing at Pebble Beach, Spyglass and Poppy Hills. For tee times and locations, check the pairings on page 20 ATT. And get your autograph books ready!

#### ■ Rubens Barrichello, Jr.

One of the world's most successful Formula One drivers, Rubens Barrichello was suddenly left without a team when, due to the economic downturn. Honda announced in December it would no longer participate in Formula One racing.

But after such a stellar career, it seems likely Barrichelo will be driving in 2009 for somebody else.

He began his career as a race car driver when he wasn't old enough to have a driver's license, winning five karting titles in Brazil before going to Europe where, in his first year, he won a championship. Barrichello was then invited to join the Jordan Formula One team in 1993, when he was just 21 years old. Before moving to Honda, Barrichelo raced for Ferrari from 2000 to 2005. He has raced on the Formula One circuit 271 times, with nine wins, achieving the seventh-highest lifetime points total.

#### ■ Chris Berman

Perhaps the nation's most colorful sportscaster, Chris Berman was hired by ESPN one month after its inception in 1979. Six times selected National Sportscaster of the Year by the Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association, Berman has also won nine Emmy Awards. This year was his 23rd as host of the ESPN Sunday NFL studio show, and he also took on a studio role for Monday Night Football when it moved to ESPN three years ago, following the acquisition of ESPN by ABC in 1984, which was subsequently purchased by Disney in 1995. Berman is also proud of his role covering the U.S. Open golf



championship, which is has done since 1986. But his greatest fame probably came from his years anchoring Sportscenter (one of his co-anchors was former Carmel resident Craig Kilborn), where his colorful nicknames for famous athletes became part of the national sports lore: Roberto "Remember the" Alomar, Bert "Be Home" Blyleven, Jim "Two Silhouettes On" Deshaies, Fred "Crime Dog" McGriff, Andre "Bad Moon" Rison, Curtis "My Favorite" Martin, Steve "I've Got You Babe" Bono and Chris Fuamatu "Bad" Ma'afala, etc.

#### ■ Michael Bolton

One of the world's top-selling vocalists and song writers, Bolton grew up idolizing such pioneers of R&B as Ray Charles, Otis Redding and Marvin Gaye. Blessed with an incomparable voice, Bolton has sold more than 45 million albums during his career. Bolton has won two Grammys for Best Male Vocalist, six American Music Awards, and had a string of No. 1 hits (including more than 100 songs he has written for other world-renowned artists).

Bolton started his career as a heavy metal singer with the band, Blackjack, which toured with Ozzy Osbourne. Later, he wrote, "How Am I Supposed to Live Without You," which Laura Branigan turned into a hit. His latest CD is "Bolton Sings Sinatra."

#### ■ Brandi Chastain

Her autobiography, "It's Not About the Bra," evokes one of the most famous moments in American sports history, when Brandy Chastain celebrated a winning penalty kick in the 1999 Women's World Cup final by stripping off her shirt during a midfield celebration, later describing it as, "momentary insanity, nothing more, nothing less.'

She was on the U.S. women's national soccer team from 1991 to 2004 and the San Jose CyberRays



#### ■ Carson Daly




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

#### ■ Kenny G





#### ■ Greg Kinnear


You may remember him as the beleaguered father in "Little Miss Sunshine," or as the frustrated inventor of the intermittent windshield wiper in "Flash of Genius." But Greg Kinnear first rose to stardom as the host of E!'s Talk Soup. In 1994, he moved to NBC, where he hosted a late-night talk show. From there, it wasn't far to the silver screen, where Kinnear landed roles in "Sabrina," "As Good as It Gets," and "You've Got Mail." In 2002, Kinnear starred in the movie, "Auto Focus," and later he also appeared in "Fast Food Nation," playing a fast food executive who discovers secrets about his company.

#### ■ Steve Kroft

Now the lead correspondent on the CBS News program, "60 Minutes," Steve Kroft has also

emerged as one of the nation's leading political reporters after scoring several exclusive interviews with President Barack Obama during the 2008 election campaign, including the first interview after the election. His investigative reporting has garnered him much acclaim, including three Peabody Awards and nine Emmy awards, one of which was an Emmy for Lifetime Achievement.

After graduating from Syracuse University, Kroft was drafted into the United States Army and served in the Vietnam War. He was assigned to the 25th Infantry Division in Cu Chi, where he was a reporter for the Armed Forces Network; he covered the Division's participation in the invasion of Cambodia and won several Army journalism awards for his work and a Bronze Star for Meritorious Achievement. Shortly after receiving an honorable discharge from the army in 1971, he began his broadcast journalism career, working as a reporter in Syracuse, N.Y., Jacksonville, Fla., and Miami. Kroft joined CBS News in 1980 as a reporter, assigning him to bureaus in New York, Miami and London. In 1986, CBS News brought Kroft back to the United States to become a principal correspondent on a new magazine show called West 57th. He stayed in that position until the program was canceled in the spring of 1989.



That September, Kroft joined 60 Minutes. After allegations of infidelity surfaced in the 1992 presidential election, then-Governor Bill Clinton and his wife, Hillary, gave an exclusive interview to Kroft. The interview was one of the defining moments in the election.

#### ■ Huev Lewis

A native of New York, Lewis created his breakthrough group, Huey Lewis and the News, in Marin County in 1980. Their first album produced a top-10 hit, "Do You Believe in Love?" and was followed by five other top-20 recordings. Lewis also recorded the theme song, "The Power of Love," for the movie "Back to the Future."

In 2006, the versatile Lewis took on a starring role in the Broadway musical, "Chicago."

#### ■ George Lopez

A Pebble Beach resident and a fan favorite for his friendliness and approachability, the multitalented George Lopez was the star, writer and producer of the ABC sitcom, "George Lopez," which ran from 2002 to 2007 and was a hit with critics and viewers. He also provided the voice for the lead character in


the Disney film, "Beverly Hills Chihuahua." Lopez has enjoyed a long career on stage, film and television.


#### ■ Peyton Manning








#### ■ Dan Marino

He never won a Super Bowl, but Dan Marino is in the NFL Hall of Fame for his illustrious career with the Miami Dolphins and holds or has held almost every major NFL passing record. Remembered particularly for having a quick release and a powerful arm, Marino drove the Dolphins into the playoffs on numerous occasions.

Marino was selected to play in nine Pro Bowls and was named All-Pro eight times. In 1999, Marino was ranked number 27 on The Sporting News' list of the 100 Greatest Football Players.

#### ■ Bill Murray

A favorite at the AT&T Pro-Am, Murray is one of America's unique talents. Born in 1950 in Wilmette, Ill., Murray first moved to the nation's center stage when he joined the cast of Saturday Night Live in 1977. #### ■ Ray Romano

Star of the CBS Monday night comedy, "Everybody Loves Raymond," which ran from 1996 to 2005, Romano was expert at portraying a man who is clueless about relationships. More recently, he provided his acting talents to the Disney movies, "Ice Age," and "Ice Age 3: Dawn of the Dinosaurs." 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




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# HISTORY OF THE PRO-AM

# 63 years of the greatest golfers and the biggest thrills

N 1937, Bing Crosby invited a group of friends to get together for a round of golf and a "clambake" at Rancho Santa Fe in Southern California. That gathering of Hollywood celebrities and golf greats gave birth to the first National Pro-Amateur Golf Championship, sponsored by Bing Crosby, with Sam Snead taking the top prize of \$500.

For five years, the tournament was played at Rancho Santa Fe before being discontinued during the war years. Meanwhile, 1946 was shaping up to be a bleak year for the Monterey Peninsula. Postwar Monterey was frantically scraping for income, the chief source having been packed into sardine tins for just about the last time. Cannery Row was heading into a long decline, Carmel wasn't a worldwide tourist attraction, Pebble Beach had yet to classified the finest course in the world, and nobody had heard of a young, would-be actor named Clint Eastwood.

At this time, a young newspaper reporter, Ted Durein, came up with the idea of attracting more tourists by bringing a major special event to the area. A good sporting event, once a year, perhaps garnished with celebrities, could anchor a drifting economy. Slowly an idea began to take shape, along with a worldwide household name: Crosby.

Durein solicited local merchants to see if they would pool money for a tournament purse — they would. Bravely, Durein wrote to Bing Crosby himself with the idea. That was in January of 1946. February and March passed. Nothing. April, May, still nothing. Then, in June, a letter from Bing's brother, Larry, arrived. Yes, Bing was interested. What's the offer? Durein didn't have one.

#### The deal is struck

He quickly rushed to see if Samuel F.B. Morse (president of Del Monte Properties, now known as Pebble Beach Company) would let the Pebble Beach golf course host the Crosby. Morse agreed. Ted met with Larry Crosby and the deal was struck.

Bing then decided he wanted the tournament spread out over three courses: Pebble Beach, Cypress Point and the Monterey Peninsula Country Club's Dunes Course. The PGA Tour, the controlling body of the professional golfers' tournament, said this was unprecedented. Bing asked, "Why not? It's done in England." The PGA Tour consented and the Crosby Pro-Am broke new ground in American golf and was played for the first time on the Monterey Peninsula in January 1947.

Since then, the annual tournament at Pebble Beach has been a staple of the PGA Tour calendar. The tournament purse has increased from \$500 for first prize in 1937 to a first prize of \$900,000 in 2004. The monies for charity each year have continued to set new records as well, with total contributions hitting \$46 million.

Bing Crosby died in 1977. His wife and children continued to host the Crosby Pro-Am until 1986, when AT&T took over sponsorship of the event. Since 1991, the event has been played at Pebble Beach, Poppy Hills and Spyglass. Over the last 20 years, the event has provided some of the most dramatic moments in golf, including Hale Irwin's fantastically lucky tee shot in 1984, and Tiger Woods' amazing comeback in 2000.

It has also endured some of the worst weather ever for a major sporting event. Twice, after particularly cold and rainy spells, tournament organizers have talked about moving the Pro-Am to a different time of year. And on one occasion, when the hardy golfers refused to surrender to gale force winds and near-freezing temperatures, Crosby reminded everyone that, "We must not forget the players — those dauntless athletes, professionals and amateurs alike - who are willing to pit their skills, and in some instances their survival, against these challenging links in conditions which sometimes defy description."

But most years there have been glorious, only-in-California conditions for the Pebble Beach Pro-Am. And the memories have been golden, too.

#### 1972 Winner: Jack Nicklaus 66-74-71-73 (284)

A 25-foot birdie putt on the first hole of a suddendeath playoff gave Jack Nicklaus the Crosby title and a \$28,000 first-place check. He beat Johnny Miller after both had poor rounds on the final day hitting bad tee shots and missing short putts all over the course. Miller even hit a ball into the ocean on 10. Nicklaus, who three-putted on 17 to set up the playoff, earned his fifth tour victory in six events. Lee Trevino took third place, as well as the Pro-Am title with partner Don Schwab.

According to a newspaper account, Clint Eastwood, then at the height of his "Dirty Harry" fame, playing in his seventh Crosby, missed the cut and spent Sunday watching the Super Bowl (Dallas 24, Miami 3) and playing tennis.

#### **1973 Winner: Jack Nicklaus** 71-69-71-71 (282)

Despite back-to-back bogies on 7 and 8 at Pebble during the final round, Jack Nicklaus won the tournament for the second straight year in a suddendeath playoff — and again with a birdie putt on the first sudden-death hole, 15. Robert Moody appeared to have the tournament won in regulation, but missed an easy two-and-a-half-foot putt on 18 that knocked him back into a tie with Nicklaus and Ray Floyd. "I missed a \$20,000 putt," Moody said. Not only that, he shot 76 on the final round, while Nicklaus and Floyd both shot 71. Instead of the top prize of \$36,000, Moody had to settle for second place money, \$16,650. Lanny Wadkins and Bill Satterfield won the Pro-Am title.

#### 1974 **Winner: Johnny Miller** 68-70-70 (208)

After six straight days of rain, sleet and hail, and with Pebble Beach looking more like ocean than land, the final round of the Crosby had to be canceled after being delayed from Sunday to Monday (Jan. 8). With everyone in a miserable mood, tournament officials threatened not to hold the event again unless it could be moved later in the year. "If we don't get the third or fourth weekend in January next year, I'd say there won't be a tournament," said chairman Don Searle. Originally, the 1974 tournament was scheduled for Feb. 14-17, but Crosby officials and local business people were unhappy with the prospect of playing over Washington's birthday weekend, when tourists would flock to the Monterey Peninsula anyway. So they negotiated a date switch with the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open, but that still left everybody unhappy. After Sunday's round was postponed, defending champion Jack Nicklaus withdrew. He was suffering in the wet weather from back pain and had fallen 10 strokes behind leader Johnny Miller. When Monday's round was canceled. Miller got a reduced winner's check of \$27,500. But he also received a check for \$2,250 for winning the Pro-Am side, with partner Locke de Bretteville.

#### 1975 **Winner: Gene Littler** 68-71-68-73 (280)

A former amateur boxing champ and winner of the 1961 U.S. Open, 44-year-old Gene Littler dented the aura of invincibility that had surrounded youthful Johnny Miller during the first two weeks of the 1975 PGA Tour. A final round of 73 gave him a total of 280, enough for a four-stroke victory over Hubert Green. Miller double-bogeyed 15 on the final round, played in frigid temperatures and gale force winds, and finished with 289, along with Jack Nicklaus. Tom Watson shot 81 on the final day, including two triple bogeys. Littler's winning purse was \$37,000 and it came after 20 years of playing the Crosby, with his previous best finish having been second in 1959. Pro-Am winners were Bruce Devlin and former NFL quarterback Jacky Lee. The tournament was boycotted by Lee Trevino, who said he didn't like playing in the rain on the Monterey Peninsula. Perhaps because of his comment, it didn't rain a bit.

#### 1976 **Winner: Ben Crenshaw** 75-67-70-69 (281)

The 35th Bing Crosby Pro-Am featured a rare meltdown by Jack Nicklaus, who shot 45 in warm sunshine on the back nine at Pebble Beach in the final round, including a double bogey and two triple bogeys, clearing the way for 24-year-old Ben Crenshaw to claim the \$37,000 first prize.

With a record crowd on hand, Nicklaus led the field going into Sunday's play, but ended up tied for 18th place. Already out of the big money and in a hurry to catch a flight to Japan, Nicklaus tried to get to the 18th green in two, but pulled his wood shot into Carmel Bay and finished, in front of a national TV audience, with a triple-bogey eight. Johnny Miller, suffering through two rounds with the flu, tied with Nicklaus at 291. Pro-Am winners were Hale Irwin and Pebble Beach resident Darius Keaton, who was then chairman of Charter Oil Company.

#### 1977 **Winner: Tom Watson** 66-69-67-71 (276)

Tom Watson picked up the first prize of \$40,000 with a dramatic one-stroke victory that included rounds of 66 at Pebble Beach on Thursday, 69 at Cypress Point on Friday, 67 at MPCC's Shore Course on Saturday and a 71 in the final round at Pebble on Sunday, breaking the tournament record, set by Billy Casper in 1958, by four strokes. Saturday's gallery of 28,000 was also a then-record - helped by sunny skies and mild temperatures. Former President Gerald Ford, playing in the Pro-Am for the first time, had a birdie on 14 at Pebble Beach on Friday. Leonard Thompson and Jim Vickers, an oil man from Wichita, won the Pro-Am

#### 1978 **Winner: Tom Watson** 66-74-71-69 (280)

Becoming the fourth man to win back-to-back Crosbys, Tom Watson beat Ben Crenshaw on the second hole of sudden death on the final day of play, which was pushed back to Monday by rain. Shooting a torrid six-under-par 30 on the front nine at Pebble on the final day, Watson finished with a 69, bringing him into an unexpected tie with Crenshaw, who shot a seemingly unbeatable 67. Watson's first-place finish was worth \$45,000. Pro Gibby Gilber and Richard Gelb, chairman of the board of Bristol-Myers, won the Pro-Am team title.

#### 1979 **Winner: Lon Hinkle** 70-68-69-77 (284)

After Andy Bean missed a 20-foot putt on 18, a three-way tie forced a playoff between Bean and fellow PGA youngsters Mark Hayes and Lon Hinkle - a playoff ultimately decided in Hinkle's favor when he sank a 12-foot birdie putt on 17. The winner's purse was \$54,000. Hinkle's dramatic finish wasn't seen by TV viewers, however, when CBS decided to end its coverage after 72 holes in favor of "60 Minutes" and "Rocky." Jack Nicklaus missed the Crosby in 1979 for the first time in his career, and Hale Irwin broke his string of making the cut in 87

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

straight tournaments. Pro-Am winners were Bean and Florida real estate developer Bill Bunting.

#### 1980 **George Burns III** 71-69-71-69 (280)

Under crystal-clear skies, a record gallery of more than 10,000 watched Sunday's final round of the Crosby, when George Burns overcame a big lead by Jack Nicklaus to win. Nicklaus was at one point 10 under (including a 5-under performance on the first six holes Sunday) but faded on the back nine. Burns, meanwhile, was steadily making difficult putts, including a monster 40-footer on 16. "It surprised the hell out of me," said Burns who, at 30, had won almost \$500,000 in five years on the PGA Tour without a victory. He added another \$54,000 with his win at Pebble Beach. Pro-Am winners were George Cadle and Whizzer Farish of Pebble Beach, a pilot for Pan-Am playing in his 22nd Crosby.

#### 1981 **Winner: John Cook** 66-71-72 (209)

A dramatic five-way playoff, the first-ever on the PGA Tour, ended in a stunning victory for unknown pro John Cook over 20-year-old Bobby Clampett, Hale Irwin, Ben Crenshaw and Barney Thompson. Cook won by making par on the third playoff hole after lapses by his opponents (including a bogey by Irwin) left the door wide open. Rain delayed the start of the Crosby to Saturday, and icy winds made things miserable throughout the weekend. Nevertheless, record crowds turned out to watch the tournament, which was shortened to 54 holes and ended on Monday. Clampett, who lived in Carmel Valley, missed the victory when he couldn't sink a three-foot par putt on his final hole at Cypress. Cook's winning purse was \$40,500 (reduced by 25 percent because the tournament was shortened). Pro-Am winners were again George Cadle and Whizzer Farish — the first and only Pro-Am team to repeat. Farish, who grew up on the Peninsula, said of the three Crosby courses, "I've played them a thousand times — each.

#### 1982 **Winner: Jim Simons** 71-66-71-66 (274)

Blowing a five-stroke lead with 10 holes to play — and foreshadowing the 2000 AT&T Pro-Am when Tiger Woods overcame an even bigger deficit - Craig Stadler let Jim Simons win the 1982 Crosby and its first prize of \$54,000. But Simons was no patsy; his

final round of 66 was one of the finest finishes to date in the tournament, and he set a Crosby record with his total of 274, 14 under par. The great Jack Nicklaus might have won, but ended up in a five-way tie for third (with Johnny Miller and three others) after missing several key putts.

#### 1983 Winner: Tom Kite 69-72-62-73 (276)

It rained all day during Sunday's final round, but play continued anyway as Tom Kite took the tournament despite a final round of 73. Saturday, when Kite also played Pebble, he set a course record of 62. The \$58,500 first prize was Kite's fifth PGA crown in 12 years. Despite four birdies on the back nine, Jack Nicklaus finished in sixth place — which earned him \$11,700 and made him the first golf pro to earn more than \$4 million in a career. Cal Peete was in second place, two strokes back. The Pro-Am winners were Gilder and Clark.

#### 1984 Winner: Hale Irwin 69-69-68-72 (278)

With the most improbable shot in Pebble Beach history, Hale Irwin captured the 1984 Crosby title and the \$72,000 check that came with it. Even Tiger Woods couldn't hope to pull off the shot Irwin made on 18 at Pebble during the final round Sunday. Irwin's tee shot was headed out into Stillwater Cove when the ball improbably caromed off a rock and bounced back onto the fairway. "The entire tournament evolved around that tremendous break I had on 18," Irwin said. Mark O'Meara, with two eagles on the front nine, nearly caught Irwin. Even after Irwin birdied 18, Jim Nelford did catch him, forcing a playoff. But on the second playoff hole — 16 — Irwin made a tremendous second shot from a bunker 200 yards onto the green and just nine feet from the cup. When Nelford missed his birdie putt on the hole, Irwin calmly nailed his tournament-winning shot. O'Meara, paired with J.P. Diesel of Houston, won the Pro-Am team crown.

#### 1985 Winner: Mark O'Meara 70-72-68-73 (273)

The final year of the Crosby saw the tournament begin under frosty skies with winds at 35 mph. But in the end, Mark O'Meara warmed up the crowd with clutch putting that, despite a final round of 73, gave him the \$90,000 first place check and a then-record 72-hole low Pebble Beach Pro-Am score of 273. Larry Rinker, Kikou Arai and Curtis Strange were all just one shot behind. Playing in the final group, O'Meara missed a birdie putt on 18, but so did Strange, ending any chance of a playoff. Dean Spanos, who lived in Stockton and was part-owner of the San Diego Chargers, and pro partner Hubert Green captured the Pro-Am grown

#### 1986 Winner: Fuzzy Zoeller 69-66-70 (205)

The first year with its new corporate sponsor was nearly a washout for the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Friday's round was canceled after heavy morning rains drenched the three courses. And so was the rescheduled final round on Monday, leaving Fuzzy Zoeller the winner of the \$108,000 first prize after just 54 holes. Crowds were sparse, but the tournament still generated a hefty sum for charity, with AT&T contributing \$750,000 in its first year backing the tournament. Zoeller, who was on Pebble Monday before play was suspended, called the weather, "The worst conditions I've ever played under." He was also winner of the Pro-Am team title, partnered with Coral de Tierra golfer Mike Evans.

#### 1987 Winner: Johnny Miller 72-72-68-66 (278)

Taking advantage of a bogey on 17 by third-round leader Payne Stewart, Johnny Miller won the Pebble Beach Pro-Am for the second time. On a perfect Sunday at Pebble Beach, he shot a six-under 66, including seven birdies, for the \$108,000 first prize. "I can't believe I won," Miller was overheard to say to his caddy as the day wrapped up. Stewart finished just one stroke back. This was Miller's 19th appearance at the tournament he continued to call The Crosby. In 1968, he launched his career with a victory at the California State Amateur, also at Pebble Beach, which he often referred to as his home course. And Miller wasn't through. He came back and won the Pro-Am again in 1994. The team victory in 1987 went to Fred Couples and baseball great George Brett, who capped the title with a three-inch putt on 18.

#### 1988 Winner: Steve Jones 72-64-70-74 (280)

With an 18-foot birdie putt on the second hole of a sudden-death playoff, Steve Jones capped a dramatic victory at Pebble Beach over a field that included five or six players with a shot at the title. Jones, a relative unknown, triumphed over 1988's top players, including Bob Tway, Greg Norman and Craig Stadler. Jones had a three-stroke lead as Sunday's round began, but bogeys on 15 and 17 opened the door for Tway, who tied the leader with a birdie on 18. But in the playoff, it was Jones who out-putted the veteran for a \$126,000 first-place check. The Pro-Am winners were Dan Pohl and Miami Dolphins quarter-back Dan Marino.

#### 1989 Winner; Mark O'Meara 66-68-73-70 (277)

With a dramatic 10-foot birdie putt on 18, Mark O'Meara edged out Tom Kite — who missed his chance for a tie on 18 when his 15-foot putt for birdie fell short — for the 1989 first prize of \$180,000. "I knew that whoever birdied 18 would win," Kite said. He finished just one stroke back. After the match, O'Meara sharply criticized the slow play during the tournament, saying it took his group three hours to finish the first nine holes during the final round. Pro-Am winners were Steve Jones and Carmel Valley doctor Jim Rheim, who birdied 18 with a 9-foot putt.

#### 1990 Winner: Mark O'Meara 67-73-69-72 (281)

Winning for the second year in a row, Mark O'Meara became the first player to win back-to-back titles since Tom Watson in 1977 and 1978. Nicklaus also won consecutive titles; Cory Middlecoff was the first to do it back in '55 and '56. O'Meara won the \$180,000 first prize with a final round of 72 at a windy Pebble Beach. No one has done it since. Kenny Perry finished in second place, two strokes back. Payne Stewart seemed like the favorite to win until he bogeyed 12, 14, 16 and 18. Four groups had to finish their third round Sunday morning, after high winds at Cypress curtailed play on Saturday. Dean Spanos, co-owner of the San Diego Chargers, teamed with Hubert Green for the Pro-Am team title.

#### 1991 Winner: Paul Azinger 67-67-73-67 (274)

After being frustrated with his play at Pebble Beach year after year, Azinger stormed to a final round score of 67 to take the tournament from gallery favorite Rocco Mediate. "Every year when I leave here, I say I'm not coming back," Azinger joked after taking the \$198,000 first prize. Before the 1991 Pro-Am, Azinger said he'd never shot better than a 70 at Pebble. On his way to the victory, he birdied 13 and 17, while Mediate was blowing his

once-substantial tournament lead with a final round of 74. The Pro-Am team title went to John Cook and soap opera star Jack Wagner.

1991 was also the first year Poppy Hills was part of the Pro-Am play; it replaced Cypress Point golf club after PGA officials raised concerns about the club's exclusive membership policies.

#### 1992 Winner: Mark O'Meara 69-68-68-70 (275)

With a dramatic 35-foot putt on 18 to force a play-off with Jeff Sluman, Mark O'Meara made perhaps his most dramatic shot in a run of three AT&T Pro-Am victories in four years. He captured the \$198,000 first-place prize by sinking another great putt — from 18 feet — on the first playoff hole. The day started poorly for O'Meara, who shot 38 on the front nine. But he came storming back with a 32 on the back nine. Paul Azinger was just one back after regulation play finished, despite shooting 68 for the final round. Pro-Am winners Greg Norman and Kerry Packers set a tournament record with a 42-under total of 246.

#### 1993 Winner: Brett Ogle 68-68-69-71 (276)

Gregarious Australian Brett Ogle captured his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach with a three-shot triumph in the AT&T Pro-Am, despite four bogeys in six holes during the final round. With a steady rain falling through much of the day, Ogle birdied three of the last six holes to fend off challengers Billy Ray Brown and Greg Twigs. Ogle's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Tom Watson had the low round on the final day, with birdies on 10, 11, 18, 6, 7 and 9. Payne Stewart and Jim Morris won the Pro-Am title, after Mark McGwire knocked his team out of contention with a bogey on 18.

#### 1994 Winner: Johnny Miller 68-72-67-74 (281)

Defying the calendar, 46-year-old Johnny Miller captured the AT&T Pro-Am, and even he had trouble believing it. "I play two tournaments a year . . . this is magic," he said. The win was Miller's third title in three different decades at the Pebble Beach charity event — he had previously won in 1974 and 1987. Jeff Maggert, Corey Pavin, Kirk Triplett and Tom Watson all finished just one stroke behind Miller, who sank a one-foot putt for par on 18 to avoid a possible five-way playoff. It rained nearly all day during the final round and, with a gale blowing from the south, Miller got to the green in two on 17 to preserve his lead while Watson was bogeying 14, 16 and 17. Miller's first-place finish was worth \$225,000. Pro-Am winners were Dudley Hart and 18-year-old amateur Robert Floyd.

#### 1995 Winner: Peter Jacobsen 67-73-66-65 (271)

With the best final round by a winner, Peter Jacobsen captured the \$252,000 winner's purse despite starting play at Pebble Beach on Sunday at three under. His total score, 271, was the lowest since Mark O'Meara's 273 in 1985, but with clean-and-place rules in effect because of a wet course, Jacobsen said his record score deserved "an asterisk." With a bit of sun finally showing through the clouds, Jacobsen birdied 18 to seal his victory. David Duval, in his first full year on the PGA Tour, finished in second place, two strokes back. Pro-Am winners were Bruce Vaughn and amateur Masahi Yamada.



some sun, no rain. But heavy rains earlier in the week, including a torrential downpour on Saturday, left the courses - especially Spyglass - in unplayable condition, forcing outright cancellation of the AT&T Pro-Am due to weather for the first, and only, time in its history. (Play was suspended from 1942 to 1946 because of WWII.) In particular, one flooded spot on 16 at Spyglass was cited by PGA officials as requiring cancellation of the event. Jeff Maggert was the leader at 136 after 54 holes; he got \$5,000 in consolation money, just like all the other pros in the field.

#### 1997 Winner: Mark O'Meara 67-67-67 (268)

Fighting off an amazing comeback by Tiger Woods — who was in 67th place on Friday and trailed by seven shots Sunday morning — Mark O'Meara won his fifth AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am by a single shot over Woods and David Duval. Woods, playing in a foursome one hole ahead of O'Meara, had six birdies in the first 12 holes but bogeyed 13. Two shots down on 18, Woods made a dramatic bid for an eagle on 18. His second shot, from 267 yards out, landed on the front of the green. But he missed a 35-foot putt and had to settle for a birdie. O'Meara's all-time low score at the event was worth \$342,000. Pro-Am champs were Paul Stankowski and Andy Garcia.

#### 1998 **Winner: Phil Mickelson** 67-68-67 (202)

A torrential downpour on Sunday brought back memories of 1996, when the AT&T Pro-Am was canceled after 54 holes. But in 1998, with California again experiencing record-breaking rains, PGA officials looked for a way to squeeze in a third round at Pebble Beach sometime later in the year. First, they set the final round for March 2. Later, it was rescheduled again to Aug. 17. The winner's check was \$450,000. The Pro-Am portion of the tournament was canceled.

#### 1999 **Winner: Payne Stewart** 69-64-73 (206)

With weather getting seriously in the way for the fourth time in five vears, the 1999 tournament was shortened to just 54 holes, just like it had been the year before. Saturday leader Payne Stewart was declared the winner of the \$504,000 first prize after heavy rains Saturday night and Sunday forced cancellation of the final round. Stewart's final shot on Saturday, a tap-in birdie on 18 at Spyglass, turned out to be the winner over Frank Lickliter, just one shot back. Pro-Am winners were Lickliter and Robert MacDonnell. Later that year, Stewart won the U.S. Open at Pinehurst, S.C. He died in a plane crash Oct. 25 when carbon monoxide rendered everyone on board his chartered airplane unconscious soon after takeoff from Orlando, Fla. The plane flew on autopilot until it ran out of fuel and crashed in South Dakota, depriving Stewart of the chance to defend his U.S. Open and AT&T Pro-Am titles — both at Pebble Beach — in 2000.

#### 2000 **Winner: Tiger Woods** 68-73-68-64 (273)

Leaving the crowd and the sportswriters practically speechless, Tiger Woods gave the AT&T Pro-Am a finish unlike any other. Down five shots when play began on Sunday, and even further behind — seven shots — with just seven holes to play, Woods took complete control of his game and the tournament, capping his comeback with a 97-foot wedge shot on 15 that hit just to the right of the hole, took two bounces, and landed in the cup. He nearly did the same on 16 and finished two strokes ahead of Vijay Singh and Matt Gogel to take the first prize of \$720,000. The win was Woods' sixth in a row on the PGA Tour. Pro-Am champs were Skip Kendall and King City businessman David Gill. The tournament was the last Pebble Beach Pro-Am event for golf legend Jack Nicklaus.

#### 2001 **Winner: Davis Love III** 71-69-69-63 (272)

Despite a seven-shot deficit when

play started under sparkling, clear skies Sunday morning, Davis Love III put together an amazing round of 63, including five birdies and an eagle on the first six holes. On the front nine, he was an amazing eight under. Another birdie on 15 sealed his victory and the first-place money of \$720,000. Vijay Singh finished just one stroke back; Tiger Woods was eight strokes off the lead. Pro-Am champs were Phil Mickelson and saxophonist Kenny G.

**Winner: Matt Gogel** 66-72-67-69 (274)

With his first PGA Tour victory,

Gogel picked up a check for \$720,000 after shooting two under on the back nine during the final round. Two years earlier, Gogel had watched Tiger Woods stage an incredible comeback to take the tournament from him. This year, third-round leader Pat Perez, who was up by four strokes when play started Sunday, withered on the final day, shooting a triple-bogey on the 18th Hole, opening the door for Gogel who showed none of the nervousness of 2000. Tiger Woods shot 282, eight strokes off the lead (for the second year in a row). Pro-Am winners were Brian Claar and Randall Mays.

#### 2003 Winner: Davis Love III 72-67-67-68 (274)

With nothing but blue skies and mild temperatures throughout the tournament, talk of "Crosby Weather" and of moving the AT&T later in the year - a common topic in the storm-tossed 1990s — was completely forgotten. And with Tiger Woods sitting out the Pro-Am after consecutive years finishing eight strokes off the lead, all the attention was on less well known, but equally formidable, PGA stars. Davis Love III salvaged a victory with a birdie on 18 on the final day — holding off Tom Lehman by a single stroke. Love's win — his second in three years came despite a bogey on 16 on the final round. In the group just ahead, Tom Lehman bogeyed two holes in the front nine but then shot five birdies on the back nine and seemed poised to force a playoff. A missed birdie putt from less than six feet on 18 left him in second place. Love's win, worth \$900,000, came with some extraordinary luck: His tee shot on 12 hit a photographer (not from The Pine Cone) and rolled to within easy putting distance of the pin. The Pro-Am ended in a tie, with pros Phil Tataurangi and Brad Faxon and their amateur partners Chris Heatley and Thomas Ryan ending up with 31-under scores of 257. Both pairings finished with final rounds of 64. Two Pro-Am teams were disqualified during the tournament for signing incorrect scorecards.

#### 2004 Winner: Vijay Singh 67-68-68-69

With four rounds in the 60s, Vijay Singh had little serious competition in the 2004 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. His dominating, three-stroke victory came with 25 birdies and earned him \$954,000. After 54 sun-drenched holes, it appeared that San Jose State graduate Arron Oberholser (who would win the tournament in 2006) had a chance to beat Singh. In the same group for the final round, they were tied at 13 under when play began Sunday. On the first three holes, Singh's tee shots were errant: one going into the rough, one missing the fairway and another missing the green by 60 yards. But Singh managed to turn all three into birdies. Another birdie for Singh on 8, coupled with a double-bogey for Oberholser on the same hole, gave Singh an unbeatable six stroke lead. The winning pro-am team was Jerry Kelly and Robert Halmi, Jr.

#### 2005 Winner: Phil Mickelson 62-67-67-73 (269)

Phil Mickelson started his week on the Monterey Peninsula being inducted into the California Golf Hall of Fame and finished it breaking records on his way to a four-stroke victory in the 2005 Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Fellow lefty Mike Weir was the runner-up.

In the process, Mickelson became the first wire-towire winner since the tournament was lengthened from 54 holes to 72 holes in 1958. He matched the tournament record with a 10-under-par 62 in his opening round at Spyglass Hill Golf Course. The amazing performance also set a record for Spyglass. And then, Mickelson set the tournament 36-hole record at 129 with his second-round 67 at Poppy Hills. And he set the tournament 54-hole record at 196 with his third-round 67 at Pebble Beach.

Although a final-round 73, 1-over-par at Pebble Beach, left him one shot off the tournament record of 268 set by Mark O'Meara in 1997, it nonetheless was a solid finish, given that Weir's 67 was the only sub-70 round posted in a light rain, with some gusty wind. When the final round began, Mickelson held a seven-shot lead through 54 holes, making Sunday's play little more than a formality. His winnings were \$954,000.

Bill Murray and longtime pro partner Scott Simpson were in the running for the pro-am title, but their closing 67 gave them a 258 total, good for fourth. The victory went to Barry McCollam and pro partner Joel Kribel.

#### 2006 Winner: Arron Oberholser 65-68-66-72 (271)

Two years after failing to catch Vijay Singh, Arron Oberholser closed the deal on his first PGA Tour victory to the delight of his family and friends from San Jose.

"Growing up, I always watched guys win the golf tournament and just the walk up 18 at Pebble Beach is unlike anything else," said Oberholser, a former San Jose State standout who played numerous amateur events on the Monterey Peninsula. "Even when you're playing here by yourself or with a foursome, it's still an incredible walk. But to walk up knowing that you are the champion ... I wish everybody could feel that way. It's incredible."

Oberholser shot a final-round 72, even par, on the Pebble Beach Golf Links for a 271, 17-under-par — enough for a tournament record-tying five-shot cushion over runner-up Rory Sabbatini, whose 70 gave him a 276. Mike Weir, who came into Sunday tied with Oberholser at 199, crashed early – with a double-bogey at the second hole and bogey on the third – and shot 78 to tie for third at 277 with Jonathan Byrd.

The victory, which Oberholser locked up with a dramatic birdie out of the trees on the par-4 15th, was a distinctly different sequel to his final round in 2004, when he went into the final round tied for the lead with Vijay Singh, but then seemed to succumb to the pressure of facing one of the top players in the game.

There was a lot of smiling and good times in 2006, as record crowds enjoyed a sixth straight year with no rain problems. Sunshine pushed temperatures into the high 70s as more than 155,000 fans overall attended the four rounds of competition.

Oberholser, whose first place finish was worth \$972,000, became only the fifth player to earn his first PGA Tour victory at Pebble Beach, joining John Cook (1981), Steve Jones (1988), Brett Ogle

(1993) and Matt Gogel (2002).

Oberholser he was also the fifth pro to sweep both the individual and team titles, as he and amateur partner Michael McCallister, the president and CEO of Humana Inc., tied for first in the pro-am, at 255, 33-under-par. They shared the championship with pro Hunter Mahan and Alan Heuer, the COO of Mastercard International, who shot 66 in the final round, while Oberholser and McCallister shot 68.

#### 2007 Winner: Phil Mickelson 65-67-70-66 (268)

Taking the tournament by storm, Phil Mickelson won his third Pebble Beach pro-am (and \$990,000), finishing the tournament ten under par and tying the record for victory margin with a five-stroke win over runner-up Kevin Sutherland. His final round 66 at Pebble Beach Sunday included six birdies.

And speaking of storms, while Bill Murray's group was on the 17th Green at Spyglass on Thursday, a huge Monterey pine toppled on a nearby hillside, barely missing a spectator.

Mickelson and his amateur partner, Harry You, CEO of BearingPoint Consulting, also won the proam tournament, at 39 under par.

#### 2008 Winner: Steve Lowery 69-71-70-68 (278)

Having played 198 PGA tournaments since 2000 without a victory, Steve Lowery probably wasn't expecting to defeat the legendary Vijay Singh in a sudden death playoff at the end of the 2008 Pebble Beach Pro-Am. Still, he neatly dispatched Singh on the very first playoff hole with a seven-foot birdie putt.

Through most of the opening three rounds, Lowery's name wasn't exactly at the top of the leaderboard. But 10 birdies in 15 holes on Saturday and Sunday propelled him to the top. Singh needed a birdie on the final hole of regulation to force the playoff. "Winning on this course against Vijay is something really special," Lowery said, who picked up a first-place check for \$1,080,000.

The pro-am champions were amateur Bill Walters, owner of Walters Golf in Las Vegas, and pro Frederick Jacobsen, who shot 250 (38 under par) to win by a tournament-record 10 strokes.

Clear, sunny weather prevailed on the Monterey Peninsula during the tournament, and there were no delays due to weather.

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
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
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
