■ 'Spirit nests' turn heads

EVEN IN Big Sur, where the abundance and variety of nature creates a constant visual spectacle, Jayson Fann's eye-catching "spirit nests" stand out.

Constructed almost entirely from the branches left over from local tree-trimming projects, Fann creates small structures that are easy to appreciate but difficult to categorize. Are they Stone Age dwellings, or are they fine-art installations? Fann, who owns the Big Sur Spirit Garden, leaves their definition open to interpretation. But one thing he does know is that they're turning heads.

"It seems like every day here at the Spirit Garden, somebody walks in, looks up and says, 'Oh my God, that's the coolest thing I've ever seen," Fann said.

The longtime Big Sur resident uses two primary tools to construct each nest: a chainsaw and a small, portable screw gun. He acquires his building materials from Big Sur tree trimmers, who are more than happy to lighten the loads of debris they routinely haul off to the county landfill.

"What I use is what people would otherwise run through chippers," Fann explained. "Those branches are

ideal for what I'm doing."

Inspired by simple, symmetrical designs, Fann bends the branches to create dome-like structures that resemble oversized cocoons. A single structure can utilize a thousand branches and can weigh up to two tons. Screws sink easily into the green wood and are difficult to even notice. Afterwards, he sprays linseed oil on the each struc-

Caltrans: Motorcyclist was intoxicated when he hit the pig

AN EMERGENCY-ROOM doctor who treated an injured motorcyclist at CHOMP in September 2003 testified Wednesday that the rider was intoxicated when he was brought to the hospital.

The motorcyclist, Adam Rogers, who remains disabled after colliding with a wild pig on Highway 1 in September 2003, is suing the State of California for \$8 million, claiming But attorneys for Caltrans brought Dr. David Dansky and other experts to a Monterey courtroom this week in an

attempt to show that Rogers was responsible for his accident. According to Dansky, when he was brought to CHOMP, Rogers had what is considered a "high" level of alcohol in his bloodstream.

"The lab report indicates he was intoxicated," Dansky said.

Maldonado calls for limit on sex offenders' access to IDs

STATE SEN. Abel Maldonado said he'll consider proposing a bill that would prevent registered sex offenders from working in liquor stores and other businesses where they can check IDs and have access to customers' personal information.

"Allowing registered sex offenders to view a person's driver's license, thereby allowing them to obtain important contact information like the person's address, is extremely dangerous," Maldonado said.

Maldonado made the comments to The Pine Cone after learning that registered sex offender and liquor store worker Thomas Pollacci, 49, was charged with three felony counts of rape stemming from an April 2008 incident. Pollacci's family

Distribution racks cleaned out

I HE CARMEL Pine Cone is encouraging readers to download last week's edition from from the paper's website after more than 8,000 printed copies were stolen from racks all over the Monterey Peninsula.

Someone driving a blue pickup truck was spotted at numerous locations around Carmel taking large stacks of Pine Cones. Under California law, it is a misdemeanor to take multiple copies of a free newspaper for the purpose of stopping someone from reading it.

One employee, who didn't want to be identified, said she confronted a man who appeared to be in his 30s, who took a bundle at a Carmel Rancho business.

Sacramento lobbying pays off for Big Sur bridge activists

A STATE board with billions of tax dollars to hand out agreed this week to free up \$500 million that would allow a crucial bridge to be installed at Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park.

The park is losing thousands of dollars a day because there is no vehicle access to the popular hiking and camping spot.

Big Sur businesses are also being severely impacted.

In December, because of the budget crisis, the state froze funds for thousands of infrastructure projects throughout California, including a bridge which is necessary for access to Pfeiffer park's popular campground.

Big Sur resident Jack Ellwanger, who has lobbied local politicians to free up funds to have the bridge installed, addressed the state's Pooled Money

River School class size up for discussion amid registration crackdown

OVERCROWDING AT River School — and how best to deal with it — is set for debate during a meeting of the Carmel Unified School District board of education Tuesday night.

Administrators are trying to determine the best way to address the issue of enrollment exceeding class-size limits at the popular elementary school, which consistently receives superlative accolades and demonstrates high test scores.

Last month, they quickly dismissed the prospect of shifting boundaries following an outcry from parents, and pledged to develop other ways to deal with the problem of having too many students.

"When we left the last meeting and the discussion on this topic, we said we would start several wheels in motion," district superintendent Marvin Biasotti said this week.

Those tasks include determining to what extent class-size standards can be relaxed and how to treat students who legally attend River but don't live within its boundaries, as well as commissioning a demographic study and verifying parents' residency information by getting them to re-register their children at the school.

Biasotti is ready to talk about class-size limits and will reveal the details at the March 24 meeting. Schools receive state money if they restrict students-to-teacher ratios to certain numbers.

He is also prepared to make recommendations on "what our priorities would be for removing students who are there on interdistrict transfer, rather than just saying, 'Everyone is excluded if you don't have residency.'

Some students attend River even though they don't live within its boundaries because a parent works for the district or they were transferred from Tularcitos due to issues there, according to Biasotti.

Occasionally, a student will be transferred from another district for compelling safety reasons, but Biasotti said that did not apply to any kids at River School.

"It's a sensitive topic, and I think the board needs to hear my recommendations, but also hear from the affected people," he said. According to the district, 31 students at River don't live within its boundaries.

He will update the board on the demographic study, which examines statistics such as live births, computer records and past enrollment to predict future enrollment.

The residency audit, in which parents must go to River School to re-register their children, was about 40 percent complete by the end of last week, according to Biasotti. Trustees will discuss how best to get the process completed.

"That's phase one," he said. Phase two will involve spotchecking residency based on the information provided by parents, and following up with those whose paperwork is incorrect or incomplete.

The study and investigative home checks are estimated to cost about \$5,000.

"We've had a temporary employee here collecting residency information as parents come in, so we have that piece of it, but then we will be paying a company to do the checking," Biasotti said. "It's hard for us to predict, having not done this before, how much time it will take."

The CUSD board meeting is set to begin at 6 p.m. Tuesday, March 24, in the multipurpose room at Carmel River School. For a detailed agenda, visit www.carmelunified.org.

Big Sur welcomes spring with music, dance, poetry



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Salesman eludes jewel thieves

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

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CPD's new squad car is a stealthy beast

POLICE OFFICERS might hesitate to admit it, but it can't be denied: One of the coolest aspects of their new squad car is that it's sneaky.

"It's low profile, so we can blend in a little better," Carmel Police officer Chris Johnson, who was in charge of designing and ordering the car, admitted.

Outfitted by West Coast Police and Fire, the new sedan is quieter, roomier for officers and prisoners, and more energy efficient.

Most noticeable — or perhaps least noticeable — is the lack of a light bar on the roof. Instead, the car's bar of white, blue and red emergency flashers runs along the top inside of the windshield, and are low-energy LEDs rather than conventional rotating bulbs. The lights are brighter, and "the

maintenance is nothing," according to Johnson.

"The big ones are noisy when they rotate, and they draw a lot of power," he said, which is one reason police cars are left idling when they are parked beside the road with emergency lights flashing. Johnson said a conventional light bar can kill a battery in 20 minutes. The old bar also produced a lot of wind drag.

As the manager of Carmel P.D.'s fleet, Johnson researched every detail in designing its newest addition, which was funded by the city in the 2008/2009 budget.

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
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Coastal commission finally makes way for senior housing

AFTER YEARS of planning, fundraising and permit delays, the Carmel Foundation is on the verge of breaking ground on new affordable apartments for seniors. A major step forward quietly occurred in Monterey March 12, when the California Coastal Commission approved the city's new zoning and design rules for the 8,000-square-foot Dolores Street lot known as Trevvett Court.

"We were in and out of there in five minutes," commented foundation CEO Jill Sheffield.

The brief discussion and quick approval were based on the recommendation of coastal planner Mike Watson, who determined the "specific plan" proposed for the property would not violate the city's Local Coastal Program or ruin the town's character.

Designed by architect Eric Miller, the project calls for two-story buildings containing 14 affordable apartments to replace nine units in one- and two-story buildings at Trevvett Court. It will also have some underground parking and common areas.

Watson concluded the plan would "facilitate a project that would be sited and designed to limit its perceived scale," and he described its allowances — increasing maximum floor area from 80 percent to 109 percent, coverage from 68 percent to 70 percent, and height from 26 feet to 30 feet — as "slightly" more than permitted under citywide rules. The plan would restrict the apartments to rental by older residents

with low and very low incomes, and would also govern water quality and limit landscaping to noninvasive and native plants.

"The plan requires the use of traditional Carmel design elements and should enhance and foster the special community character of Carmel," he concluded.

Sigh of relief

His support marked a striking contrast to the tortured path of a citywide ordinance approved by the Carmel City Council in February 2007 to facilitate 100 percent low-cost housing projects in town. That law, designed to accommodate the Trevvett Court plan and others like it, sought to provide more flexibility in height, setbacks, density, floor area and parking for affordable-housing projects.

After months of apparently ignoring the proposed law, the commission requested multiple changes last summer, and the city agreed. In December, having concluded the zoning flexibility in the law would irreparably harm the town, Watson recommended approval only if all provisions except the density increase were removed, and the coastal commission OK'd the gutted ordinance.

Carmel planners then had little choice but to write a specific plan stating heights, setbacks and other standards only applicable to the Dolores street property, so the nonprofit could proceed with its project. The city council approved the plan, but since it was an amendment to the Local Coastal Program, the coastal commission had to approve it as well.

Last Thursday, it did, to Sheffield's immense relief.

"We were quite far down on the agenda, and I had planned to be there all day," she recalled. "I had some board members who were going to come down later, and they missed the whole thing!"

The state's OK paves the way for the city permits, which should go smoothly, considering planners already vetted the project and stated their support months ago.

"And then it's just a matter of getting enough money to build," Sheffield said.

The foundation wants to raise \$2.4 million before breaking ground and is about \$400,000 below that target. Sheffield said donations have been very generous — including the \$50,000 the California Association of Realtors gave the foundation on Jan. 21.

"We're completely finished with the coastal commission," she said. "And we're ready."



As soon as it raises another \$400,000 and gets its city permits, The Carmel Foundation will finally be able to break ground on 14 new apartments at Trevvett Court.

Elderly renters need new lift

THE ELEVATOR in the largest affordable-housing complex for seniors in the City of Carmel keeps getting stuck, sometimes with people in it. And for the past several years, the nonprofit that owns the building has hired someone to fix it.

"It sits outside, so it's exposed to the elements and is difficult to maintain," said Carmel Foundation CEO Jill Sheffield, adding that the elevator is outdoors because it was installed 1994, several years after the complex was built.

And right now, it doesn't work at all. In a complex where the 25 residents average 80 years in age and the oldest is 101, the ability to get between floors without tromping up and down flights of stairs is more than a slight convenience.

Everyone who lives upstairs is ambulatory and can use the building's dumbwaiter to carry groceries upstairs, according to Sheffield, but she hopes community members will pitch in for a new — and reliable — elevator sooner rather than later.

"A year or two ago, somebody got stuck in it," she said. "So that's not great."

Firefighters have had to rescue people from the broken elevator four times in the past four years, according to Carmel Fire Department records.

"I personally have gone there three or four times," said Carmel Fire Capt. Mitch Kastros. "It's always significant," because the victims, who are understandably stressed by being trapped, are usually older and more likely to have health issues.

The Acme Home Elevator company estimated several months ago that replacement would cost about \$30,000, and Sheffield said she also plans to ask Otis Elevator Company for a quote.

"We're looking to do it as fast as possible," she said. "For

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Taxi commission may take control of Peninsula's cabs

DRIVING A taxi on the Monterey Peninsula means getting different permits from different cities with different rules and requirements. In the name of saving money and time, and improving service, the Transportation Agency for Monterey County conducted a regional taxi study and presented the resulting proposals to the Carmel City Council this month.

TAMC executive director Debbie Hale said the study sought to reduce costs for all the jurisdictions that certify taxi operators and vehicles, conduct background checks and undertake other legwork involved in licensing cabs and their drivers. The study's 13 partners included Peninsula cities, the county, Monterey-Salinas Transit, California State University Monterey Bay, the Monterey County Hospitality Association, the Monterey Airport — which generates a lot of taxi traffic. Cab drivers also weighed in, and Hale said the project manager worked closely with police chiefs to compile information and ideas.

"In these tight budget times, everyone's all about, 'How can you consolidate services and save money?" Hale said. "So we're a little bit ahead of the curve on this project, and it's designed to save all the cities money and reduce the staff time."

The study also examined ways to improve service for people who ride taxis, especially the elderly and disabled, and tourists.

'We want the taxis to be a more pleasant

experience," Hale said.

Researchers concluded a "taxi authority" centralizing permitting, fees, inspections and other aspects of the cab business would work best, and they determined Monterey-Salinas Transit should administer it, since its employees already inspect vehicles and certify drivers. Hale described the plan as a "one-stop shop."

The authority would also set fares, ensure some of the Peninsula's 120 cabs are handicap-accessible, require drivers to accept discount "scrip" from elderly riders, and establish a system for reporting complaints and violations.

City police departments would remain responsible for enforcing the rules governing cabs, which would have a medallion decal and be subjected to a standard system of penalties. Fares would be posted, and a tollfree number established for anyone wishing to make a complaint.

Hale said a taxi steering committee with representatives of each member of the group would deal with fares and other issues, and the City of Monterey's taxi ordinance would serve as the foundation for the authority's regulations. Cities would have to amend their ordinances to recognize the regional taxi authority. People might have to be hired, or existing employees trained, to run the program.

The regional permitting process would cost cab drivers \$397 — an amount similar to what they currently pay, according to Hale which would include \$80 for the driver

permit, \$210 for the vehicle permit, \$15 for LiveScan fingerprinting, \$60 for drug and alcohol testing and \$32 for the Department of Justice background check. MST would keep the first three fees, while the rest would be passed through.

"If you're a taxi in multiple jurisdictions, you would have considerable savings," Hale said.

Assuming annual driver applications totaling 200 and annual vehicle permits totaling 133, Hale said the fees would cover the annual operating cost of \$47,000. The jurisdictions would share the startup costs estimated at \$23,000.

"It would be cost neutral," she said. "You wouldn't have to do the administration anymore, and the fees would take care of it. It's quite beneficial for all the participants."

The standardized procedure would also offer "open entry to the taxi market," with all taxis serving all cities, instead of cab fares limited to drivers who have obtained permits for particular towns - which occasionally sparks conflict between permitted and unpermitted drivers operating in a city.

The airport has also been a source of concern, with some cabs able to drop people off but not pick up riders, according to Hale.

"The airport wouldn't be restricting like they are now," she said, though it would still levy a surcharge. "There's a general feeling there aren't enough taxis at the airport."

Hale said she hopes to have the agreements approved in May and June, and the authority formed in July. Its boundaries would cover a large chunk of the Peninsula, but not Salinas, which she said maintains its own taxi regulations and is satisfied.

"This is long overdue," commented city attorney Don Freeman. "This would be really beneficial, due to the time and controversy that surrounds each application that comes forward."

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Highlands, surrounding areas get Reverse-911 service

RESIDENTS IN the Carmel Highlands and areas surrounding the City of Carmel can now rely on the fire department's Reverse-911 Telephone Emergency Notification System to alert them about an impending emergency or what to do after a major incident has struck, according to disaster preparedness coordinator Richard Lopez, who works in the Cypress and Carmel Highlands fire protection districts.

Firefighters record pertinent messages such as evacuation routes, instructions and areas to avoid — that are disseminated quickly via residential phone lines, but Lopez said alternate numbers, and even email addresses, can be input as well.

He also asked that residents who receive their monthly telephone bills at the post office contact AT&T to ask that their physical addresses be noted in their accounts.

"This will ensure that you receive all vital information in a timely manner," he said. The phone company's toll-free numbers are (800) 288-2020 for residential customers and (800) 750-2355 for business customers.

One of the team's coaches, social studies teacher Bill Schrier, said the students worked hard to get where they are.

Donald McNeely July 10, 1914 - March 9, 2009



Donald McNeely ventured forth from this life on March 9 in Pebble Beach, California, a place he had been drawn to while exploring the most exclusive and exquisite golf courses of the West Coast with a friend before shipping off to the Pacific Theater of WWII. He was 94 years old and his long life was filled with adventures and successes, unflagging faith and courage, and boundless acts of kindness.

Up to the end, he was as sharp as the day he graduated from Yale in 1937. A student of history, keen on current events, he clipped out articles voraciously

for family and friends as a devotee of the NYTimes. Always eager to know more about the world, his enthusiasm for life was evident in his booming voice and ready cheerfulness. His nimble mind, unique wit and impressive vocabulary made him a captivating communicator and wordsmith. His adventures took him from the playing fields of Yale to the wartime battle of Guadalcanal while in the Navy's special intelligence department to the ranks of handpicked advisors serving on Ronald Reagan's 'Grace Commission'.

Don was born on July 10, 1914, in St. Paul, MN and went to St. Paul Academy where sports became one of his grand delights. He won the state squash championship in 1955 - 57, threw the ball around with his friend, Hank Greenberg, in wartime baseball games, and played tennis until he was 90. In 1962, he became co-owner of the Minnesota Vikings and helped bring the Washington Senators to Minnesota as the Minnesota Twins.

He enjoyed the company of others and that translated into club memberships around the country, many involving golf and tennis, like the Cypress Point Club in Pebble Beach, the White Bear Lake Yacht Club, the Yale Club and River Club of New York City; the Minneapolis Club; the Los Angeles Country Club; and the Old Capital Club in Monterey, CA.

Sportsmanship influenced how he lived his life. Fair and honorable (his son Kevin said he never made a joke at someone else's expense), he supported causes important to him and paid tribute to those who helped him along the way.

He memorialized his beloved aunt and uncle with the Lee and Rose Warner Coliseum at the Minnesota State Fair and the Warner Palestra sports center at St. John's University in Collegeville, MN (where he also funded the Donald McNeely Spectrum, the campus field house), and helped establish the Rose Warner Writing Center and the soon-to-be Rose Warner Science Lab at the College of St. Scholastica in Duluth, MN. He was dedicated to environmental education which resulted over forty years ago in the creation of The Lee and Rose Warner Nature Center, which partners with the Science Museum of Minnesota.

He raised five children with his wife and great love, Marjorie, and founded in her name the Marjorie McNeely Conservatory at Como Park, the Marjorie McNeely Gallery at the Minneapolis Institute of Arts, and the Marjorie McNeely Fund for the Blind or Illiterate in Monterey County, CA.

A savvy entrepreneur and a innovative thinker, he joined his father's business -The St. Paul Terminal Warehouse Company - after the war and turned it into a national company called Space Center, Inc. He was co-founder of Control Data Corporation and his past directorships include Buckbee-Mears; Conwed Corporation; North Star Research & Development Institute; North Star Steel; Northwest Airlines; Wells Fargo (Norwest Bank); and Red Owl Stores. To give young men and women the skills to succeed in business, he established the Donald McNeely Center for Entrepreneurship at St. John's University in Collegeville, MN. From his cherished home on Manitou Island in White Bear Lake, MN, Don reached out into the community and beyond to help guide religious, civic, arts, and educational organizations like the Catholic Charities, Como Friends, Guthrie Theater, The McNeely Foundation, YMCA, and Yale University where he founded scholarships. He was a generous man, not only with his resources and his time, but also with his heart. Wary of inherited wealth he had optimum respect for those who generated their own good fortune and success. He encouraged his children in their passions believing that he himself "did not work a day in his life" as he remained active in business until his passing day. His daughter Nora wrote of her father last year that his rich and meaningful life had exuded character that was "deep, genuine, complicated, and beautiful." Those who knew him found him to be a true gentlemen and an original and are fortunate souls indeed. His wife Marjorie (née Reeds) died in 1998. His children, Nora McNeely (Michael) Hurley, Robin Brooks Tost, Greg McNeely, Kevin (Rosemary) McNeely, and Peter (Incy) Brooks, survive him, as do his grandchildren Jamie, Jen, Peter Jr., Holly, and Hannah Rose and great-grandchildren Piper, Pen, and Miles, brother Harry G. McNeely, Jr., and eleven nieces and nephews. A memorial Mass and reception to celebrate his life will be held in the spring. In lieu of flowers, memorial donations may be made to The Marjorie McNeely Conservatory at Como Park, 1225 Estabrook Drive, St. Paul, MN 55103.

"The students are nervous, but really excited about making it to the state finals," Schrier said. "It's something we've set our sights on since we began the program four years ago."

The mock trial program offers students a great opportunity to gain important life skills.

"The program prepares students for life in so many ways," Schrier explained. "The program emphasizes ethical behavior and civility, and they are expected to live up to those ideals at all times. Each student signs an oath to that effect. The one thing I've heard repeatedly from adults who see a trial for the first time is how impressed they are with the students' professionalism and demeanor."

His pupils have also learned about the value of hard work and preparation.


"Mock trials are not won because a student has good public-speaking ability," Schrier observed. "They are won by teams that put in the long hours to sift through complex facts, learn the rules of evidence and procedure, and practice their presentation. As I tell my students, the three most important words in trial work are 'preparation, preparation, preparation.""

Through public speaking, students have gained confidence and learned important lessons about communication.

"Students learn how to disagree respectfully with authority figures. How many adults do you know — other than lawyers who are comfortable going to court and engaging a judge? I've got 15-year-olds


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
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TCHAIKOVSKY'S DRAMATIC SIXTH SYMPHONY HIGHLIGHTS SYMPHONY CONCERT

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

AN ICON among fine-art photographers, Ansel Adams is best known for his striking black and white images of dramatic natural landscapes in the American West. But Adams, who lived in the Carmel Highlands for more than two decades, also loved photographing people.

1964 turns back the clock as Beatlemania comes to Sunset

As A member of a popular Beatles tribute band, Mark Benson knew he was playing a character — John Lennon — who made history. But one day in Berlin, Germany, Benson discovered that he, too, was making history.

"We were one of the first groups to play in East Germany after the Berlin Wall came down," recalled Benson, who will perform with the Beatles tribute band, 1964, at Sunset Center

Friday and Saturday, March 20-21. "Since the Beatles' records were never released in communist East Germany, we figured they wouldn't know more than a few songs. But they knew the all the words to every song we played — in English."

Benson's group — which pays tribute to the music of the Beatles from 1964 to 1966 was the first of many that performed that day, but likely the only one the audience remembered.

"They made the mistake of putting us on first," Benson continued. "Every group that followed us had to listen to the crowd chant, 'We want the Beatles!'"

The 1990 performance in Berlin went over so well that 1964 was invited to perform at a ceremony to celebrate the reunification of Germany. As Benson watched the leaders of West Germany and East Germany sign the documents that reunified their country, he realized he was wit-

Pèpe's wines, mountaintop Pinot, hotcakes and the Cotton Club

LITTLE NAPOLI'S Rich Pèpe plans to open a wine shop and tasting room next to his Dolores Street restaurant, and the Carmel Planning Commission gave him the go-ahead last week.

Called VinoNapoli (what else?), the corner store that was formerly Carrigg's of Carmel will carry vintages from Pèpe Winery, Ventana Vineyards and Antinori.

"In general, only wines that we have a special relationship with will be featured," he told the commission. "All of these brands are also featured in our restaurant next door at Little Napoli."

The room will have a bar and four tables with 16 seats, and tasters will be able to nibble on light snacks prepared on site while sampling the wines, according to the application. Shelves and racks of bottles for sale will fill the rest of the shop

Since Carmel caps the number of bars in town at three, VinoNapoli must not be considered a "drinking place," so Pèpe had to agree not to allow bottles of wine to be consumed in the store, to pour no more than 2 oz. per taste, and



to sell only wine. In addition, transferring food and wine between the shop and Little Napoli is prohibited.

Commissioners admonished Pèpe not to let his tasting room become a hangout.

"The fireplace will draw people in, especially on cold days, and it's important you police the area," chairman Bill Strid said, lest too many people taste and take up more than the allowed 30 percent of the shop.

Commissioner Steve Hillyard didn't want the store and tasting room, which will be open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily, to be "a place to wait for a restaurant table and drink while you're doing that."

After agreeing the permit should define VinoNapoli as a "wine shop and tasting room limited to wine," commissioners unanimously agreed to approve the permit.







Laguna Seca Golf Ranch to host 2009 Concorso Italiano

CONCORSO ITALIANO — the upscale Italian car show held the Friday of Concours Week for nearly a quartercentury - has new owners and a new home.

Tom McDowell, the head of a group that purchased Concorso from Jack and Leslie Wadsworth, announced this week the 2009 event will be held Aug. 14 at Laguna Seca Golf Ranch.

Last year, the Wadsworths, who bought Concorso from founders Janet and Frank Mandarano several years ago, staged the show at the Marina Airport. For a few years prior, it was held at the Bayonet Black Horse golf courses in Seaside.

McDowell characterized the move to the airport, located a dozen miles north of the Monterey Peninsula car action and covered, of course, in concrete, as a mistake.

"We, the new Concorso owners, believe that holding the 2008 event at the Marina airport was an unfortunate decision," he said in a letter to CI fans in which he introduced himself and his goals for the future. "It will not happen again."

He pledged to return the show "to its core beginning — to a place we all enjoyed for the right reasons.'

McDowell described it as it once was and should be again. "For many years, the Concorso has been a trendsetting show with many traditional aspects that all have anticipated and enjoyed each year. From humble beginnings evolved a special camaraderie that most of you have shared," he wrote. "The founders, Frank and Janet Mandarano, brought in legendary Italian personalities who were honored to be part of the experience of being with you, their fans, in a one-on-one basis on a lush green lawn surrounded by the cars they had designed, raced or engineered."

A major consideration in reinventing Concorso Italiano is holding it at a suitably luxurious Monterey Peninsula golf course.

"A classic car should always be displayed on a green lawn," he said.

Pacific Grove was a possibility to start hosting the Concorso, but the city initially declined and later concluded a costly environmental impact report would be required.

The new owners finally found the right green at Laguna Seca Golf Ranch, the course near York School on Highway 68 designed by Robert Trent Jones (junior and senior) under the same ownership as Rancho Cañada. The grounds are ample, access is easy, and exhibitors and vendors will have their own way in, protecting them from spectator-caused traffic jams, according to McDowell.


He said this year's Concorso would also feature better food at reasonable prices, good wine, music, commentary from special Italian guests, fashion and other entertainment.

"As you might guess, a venue of this caliber is considerably more expensive than in prior years, but we are holding the line on ticket prices," McDowell announced. "This is sensational news."



ture to help preserve the wood.

At first glance, the nests look somewhat brittle, but Fann insisted they're quite tough. "I build them to be practical," he said. "They are really solid. They're not falling over."

Fann's introduction to his unconventional craft was not unusual. Like countless youngsters, he built imaginary forts in the woods. But when he was 13, he visited the Pine Ridge Sioux reservation in South Dakota, where he helped construct a sweat lodge. The experience fired his fascination for traditional building methods. Later, he traveled extensively in Africa and South America, where he actually stayed in dwellings not unlike those he creates in Big Sur.

In 2004, while Fann was managing Esalen Institute's Art Barn, he proposed staging a summer arts festival. Esalen's board of directors gave the event their blessing, but they were unable to offer much financial support. Fann decided the event needed a couple dazzling art installations, and a recent

tree-trimming project gave him all the materials he needed to create his first nest. The installation proved to be a big hit, and soon Fann was hard at work creating his second nest.

Today, Fann's nests can be seen at three Big Sur businesses: Esalen Institute, the Big Sur Spirit Garden and Treebones Resort. John Handy, the owner of Treebones, commissioned Fann to install a nest in his campground.

"We love our nest," Handy said. "Our motto is "we're perched lightly on the edge,' and Jayson's nest is as close to nature as you can get."

The nest has become more than just an interesting piece of sculpture at Treebones, which offers lodging in 16 yurts and features six campsites. "One couple put a tent insid on a windy and rainy night," Handy recalled. "They loved it."

At Treebones, guests routinely find themselves drawn to the nest. Most are content to simply admire the unusual structure, while others are tempted to take naps, meditate or read books in it. Handy simply marvels at the response guests have when they encounter Fann's handiwork.

"What Jason created is way beyond what we ever expected," Handy added. "At one point, we thought he was finished,

Investment Board in Sacramento Wednesday, making the case the missing bridge is vital to the Big Sur economy.

'Our community has been traumatized by [last summer's] fires," Jack Ellwanger told The Pine Cone. "And now what we have staring at us is a bridge that not only goes nowhere, it's an open wound."

Though the funds are dependent on the state selling \$4 billion in bonds to bolster the Pooled Money Investment Account, Ellwanger said he's optimistic legislators will allocate money for the bridges. "My feeling from the attention they gave us is that we are in a favored position," he said.

Ellwanger wrote a letter, which was handed to California State Treasurer Bill Lockyer, who is also chairman of the PMIB, reiterating the importance of the park's bridge.

The bridge could cost \$2 million to \$3 million to replace, a small fraction of the estimated \$18 billion in various state infrastructure projects affected by the freeze.

The bridge was removed last fall after studies showed it could be undermined by mudslides caused by erosion from three separate wildfires last summer which burned about a quarter-million acres and closed off much of the coastal area to visitors

The goal is to have the bridge replaced by Memorial Day, the official kickoff to the summer season, which draws the most visitors to the park.

Others in the Big Sur community have also put in a lot of

information," Maldonado said. "While the deadline to introduce new legislation for this year has passed, I will certainly consider introducing a bill next year to end this dangerous practice.'

effort toward getting the bridges back in place. Stan Russell, executive director of the Big Sur Chamber of Commerce, said he's been in contact with U.S. Rep. Sam Farr. Kirk Gafill, president of the Big Sur Chamber, and the group's vice president, Dan Priano, have been in constant contact with Sen. Abel Maldonado to help resolve the issue.

Russell said he's been told the Big Sur bridge is among the two priority infrastructure projects in the state to be funded. "It looks very optimistic the funds will be released," Russell said.

If the park can't get funding soon enough, Russell said it's possible temporary bridges could be installed by the Army Corps of Engineers. "That's a possibility if the state doesn't move fast enough," Russell said.

Russell said the issue will be brought up before the Big Sur Multi-Agency Advisory Council, which meets March 20. The meeting is co-chaired by 5th District Supervisor Dave Potter and Farr.

Ellwanger said the park is a cash cow not only for the Big Sur community, but for the state too. "More than anything else, it's silly to deprive the community of that economic engine," he said.

Besides campers, players in the Big Sur Softball League can't practice — normally something they would be doing this time of year - because its field is being used as a storage area for construction equipment and materials. Players have been practicing wherever they can find an open field.

The Big Sur Multi-Agency Advisory Council meeting is at 10 a.m. at the Big Sur Lodge, located within Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park. Parking is available at the lodge.

This year, Maldonado introduced SB 496, a bill that would prohibit registered sex offenders from obtaining a real estate license.

Under current law, registered sex offenders who are real estate agents are granted full access to a family's home, including keys that could allow a predator to access a home at night or when adults are not around, a loophole Maldonado said needs to be closed.

And allowing those convicted of sex crimes to work in jobs where they have access to personal details also puts the public at risk, he said.

"Keep an open mind"

Pollacci was charged by the Monterey County District Attorney's Office with forcible rape of a woman too mentally and developmentally disabled to give legal consent and who was unconscious at the time.

But on Tuesday, the Salinas law firm representing Pollacci issued a press release stating Pollacci and his accuser knew each other.

"The complaining witness and Tom Pollacci have known each other for many years and had a relationship," according to attorney Tom Worthington. "And based on our investigation, there is no reason to believe that she was in any way developmentally disabled."

Worthington wrote that Pollacci voluntarily provided police a sample of his DNA in July 2008. He said Pollacci, who is being represented by Worthington's legal partner, Andrew Liu, will plead not guilty to the charges when he is arraigned March 24.

Meanwhile, a woman who has not revealed her name launched an Internet campaign to boycott Ron's Liquors, the Pacific Grove store Pollacci's family owns and he has managed. The woman was interviewed by KSBW this week.

"We demand that the Pollacci family sell the business," according to the email. "And we also demand that Tom Pollacci stay out of Pacific Grove."

Another Pacific Grove resident defended the owners of Ron's Liquors. Jeanie Anton, who said she has known the Pollaccis for decades, told The Pine Cone she would not sup-

port a boycott of the store.

"I have known the Pollacci family for as long as I have been in Pacific Grove, around 40 years, and the whole family should not be punished for the misdeeds of one family member," Anton said. "Yes, Tom Pollacci should stay out of P.G., but please don't chastise the whole family. His parents and siblings are very nice people."

Another resident, who also wanted to remain anonymous, sent out a mass email message expressing her concerns that Pollacci has access to customers' personal information while working at the store.

"Women are showing their IDs to him when they go into Ron's Liquor to buy alcohol and such," according to the email message "And that is very dangerous.'

Worthington said Pollacci doesn't currently work at the Lighthouse Avenue liquor store. The attorney also urged the public to keep an open mind "until they have heard evidence instead of



basing their opinions on vicious rumors.'

"Our client has cooperated fully with the investigation," he said. "[Pollacci] surrendered as soon as he learned of the warrant."

Pacific Grove police told The Pine Cone Pollacci is a registered sex offender but did not say what he had done to require him to register. For more than 50 years, California has required sex offenders to register with their local law enforcement agencies.

Highlands man admits to fatal hit-and-run

The admission came more than two years after the collision.

him near the entrance to Pt. Lobos and kept driving to his own home in the Yankee Point area. California Highway Patrol officers did not respond to investigate until passing motorists reported seeing the victim's body around 7 a.m.

Investigators later determined Seaborn had been drunk at the time of the crash.

Seaborn, who has been out on bail since his arrest, is set to be sentenced May 15 to five years in prison. Seaborn had no prior DUI convictions.

Reappoint Potter

The first thing for Bass to keep in mind is the unique importance of the coastline in this part of the state. Unlike Southern California, where Bass lives, the stretch of coast from Big Sur to Santa Cruz is mostly undeveloped, and contains scenic and other natural resources unsurpassed anywhere in the world. Potter's long history on the coastal commission, together with his service as a Monterey County supervisor, give him a special appreciation for these precious qualities and their importance to the people of the Central Coast and the entire state.

But Bass should also be assured by the fact that Potter is by no means an environmental zealot. His voting record on the commission demonstrates that, while he places a very strong emphasis on preserving the natural environment, he also values important human goals, such as encouraging responsible economic development, providing affordable visitor access to the coast, protecting vibrant and historic residential communities, and respecting basic property rights.

For example, Monterey County residents remember very well the proposal several years ago by the coastal commission's doctrinaire staff that new development along the Big Sur coast be sited so as not to disrupt the view of the coast from boats.

The ridiculous proposal was greeted with the well deserved outrage of residents of Big Sur, who saw it as yet another step toward the destruction of the area as a viable residential community. Needless to say, they were reassured when Potter helped stop the viewshed-from-boats plan in its tracks, saying it "didn't even pass the laugh test."

Perhaps Bass is wondering: Just how much do the people of Monterey County value Potter's public service? His supervisorial district includes most of the county's spectacular scenery, and he was reelected in 2008 with 74 percent of the vote.


The issues the coastal commission deals with are vast and complex. It is not an agency where newcomers can do a lot of good. Now more than ever, Potter's experience is needed, and he should get another term.

The courthouse cash machine

THE SUBSTANCE of the Motorcycle vs. Pig trial under way at the Monterey courthouse notwithstanding, there has been quite a bit of troubling information revealed by testimony about the fees commonly paid to "expert witnesses" in civil and criminal cases.

One doctor, testifying for the injured motorcyclist, said she charged \$550 per hour for her work outside the courtroom. Based on 40-hour weeks, that comes to a yearly income of almost \$1.2 million.

Another physician and professor of medicine, this one testifying for Caltrans, was asked what he had been paid for a day of giving depositions in the case. His shocking answer: \$8,000 by the taxpayers of the State of California, plus \$1,000 by the motorcyclist's attorneys (who hope to recover the amount, and everything else they've spent on their case, from taxpayers). At \$9,000 for a single day of work, that means the professor believes he's worth \$2.3 million per year. How on earth did these fees get so high?

I'd like to build on Geoff Johnston's idea of accountability (letters, March 6). Residents of Carmel Valley pay millions of dollars more in local taxes to Monterey County every year than they get back in services. This is even more true in the current down economic circumstances, when Carmel Valley property taxes are holding pretty steady but the county is slashing services. With incorporation, all those local tax dollars will stay right here in Carmel Valley, providing us with a much higher level of service. Police protection will be much better (projected to be about 50 percent higher level of service) and our roads will get the attention they need.

But instead of putting all that extra revenue toward better services, perhaps we should pay a bonus to all those people who supported the town of Carmel Valley. That's probably not legal, so we'll just have to settle on a big "Thank you!" possible consolidation of the Carmel and Monterey fire departments interesting. Consolidation of services can be a good thing and should be looked into by cities and special districts on a regular basis, not just when times are tough.

A few of the many questions to be asked during the consolidation process are: How will the consolidation affect service levels, will they stay the same, increase, decrease? Is there a real savings or have the costs increased with no increase in service level? Are employees treated fairly, will they be able to carry longevity credits, medical benefits, pay, or retirement benefits into the new consolidated department, etc.?

The Monterey and Pacific Grove fire department consolidation is not new to the Peninsula. Cal Fire has provided contractual fire and medical services to the Cypress Fire Protection District and the Pebble Beach Community Services District for over 40 years. Each agency shares fire department management and operational staff, yet has its own governing body and revenue sources. In 2000 the Carmel Highlands Fire Protection District contracted with Cal Fire and also shares management and operations staff. The fire protection contracts with Cal Fire have

Though Dansky testified he didn't smell alcohol on Rogers, he said doctors "frequently don't" smell alcohol on patients who have been drinking.

When Rogers arrived at CHOMP via ambulance in the early morning hours of Sept. 23, 2003, Dansky said he also showed signs of a serious brain injury.

He was "dazed, moaning and showing signs of brain damage, which includes things like arching against the bed and occasional combative behavior and certain types of posturing," Dansky testified.

Rogers also had a broken collarbone, abrasions, and his left lung was popped, Dansky said.

A professor of medicine at the University of Southern California, Nachman Brautbar, testified that he agreed with Dansky's analysis.

"Adam Rogers was intoxicated based on the medical records I reviewed," Brautbar said from the witness stand. He estimated that Rogers had four or five drinks in the hour before the accident to achieve his measured blood alcohol level, which Brautbar said was .107 percent.

Rogers' attorneys, Larry Biegel and Chuck Keller, tried to convince the jury that an alcohol swab used to clean the site where blood was drawn could have caused the elevated alcohol level.

But Brautbar dismissed the idea. "If there was contamination from the swab, the most you could get would be four or five points, which is minuscule compared to 107," Brautbar said.

Another witness for Rogers also tried to rebut the idea that he had been drinking before he crashed.

Cal Fire Capt. Chris Hartzell testified he was one of the first emergency workers on the scene of Rogers' crash, which left the motorcyclist lying on his face in the middle of Highway 1.

While working to save Rogers' life, Hartzell testified he was close to Rogers' face, but said there was no smell of alcohol.

But under cross-examination, Hartzell rated his own sense of smell as "poor to moderate," and admitted that, among all the motor vehicle accidents he'd worked during his career with the fire service, "Every time I've been able to smell alcohol, the patient was conscious. I need somebody to be conscious and breathing to be able to smell alcohol."

When Rogers was treated on the highway, he was uncon-

Biegel asked Finn how her family life has changed since the accident.

"I feel sad," said an emotional Finn. "There have been happy times, but they're nowhere near the same. It's more like I'm his mother ... it gets really lonely."

The trial is expected to go to the jury next week.

Though he's eating well and settling in quite nicely, Monkey still has room to learn some manners.


"He's not liking my son so much," she said. "He keeps biting his forearm."

"I felt really lucky to have adopted him," she said.



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
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
