Puppy recovering after ears crudely cut off

DESPITE THE painful wounds he received after his owner cruelly cut off his ears, 4-month-old Oliver is still a lovable dog.

The brown and white mutt is healing after being left at the Hollister Animal Shelter April 8 with severed ears.

"The poor little guy just wants to lick you, and his tail won't stop wagging," said Beth Brookhouser, spokeswoman for the SPCA for Monterey County, which is caring for the dog.

Oliver's ears were cut off and cauterized in what the SPCA believes was a crude attempt to crop them. Cropping should always be performed by a veterinarian.

"Most likely the people that did this thought he was a pit bull," Brookhouser said. "He could have some pit in him, but that's not his main breed. It's hard to tell without the ears."

Cruel perpetrator sought


As Oliver heals from the jagged wounds, the SPCA has gotten a flood of calls about him.

"He's not available for adoption yet," Brookhouser said. "He needs to heal, and we hope to catch whoever did this, first."

The dog could be used as evidence if the people who cut his ears are found, she said.

"We have a pretty long list of people who are interested in the little guy, though," Brookhouser said. "And we've had calls from all over the country asking about him."

After he was the subject of KGO and KTVU news stories, other news media as far as Hawaii reported the story.

"We have gotten calls from Maine," Brookhouser said.

On Monday, the stitches in Oliver's ears were removed.

SPCA Veterinarian Dr. Carol Iida has been treating Oliver and did a lot of work to clean up the puppy's wounds when he arrived, Brookhouser said.

"She cleaned and sutured the wounds," she explained. "And Oliver is now on pain medication and antibiotics. He seems a lot better."

Judge: Oil spill suit may be too big for Monterey courts

MONTEREY COUNTY'S presiding judge is mulling whether the county is equipped to handle a complex trial over a 2007 oil spill in San Francisco Bay. In heavy fog, the container ship Cosco Busan collided with the San Francisco Bay Bridge, spilling 58,000 gallons of diesel fuel.

Several cities sued the company that owned the ship, but because extensive news coverage might prejudice potential jury members, a judge ordered the trial moved to a Monterey courtroom.

Superior Court Judge Adrienne Grover is reviewing the case to decide if the county can accommodate court proceedings and the trial, which could last months because of the "enormous quantity" of witnesses expected to testify.

News to them

"Because the case was received in an unusual way, without prior notice," said court spokeswoman Nona Medina, "Grover is looking into the issues that surround acceptance of the change of venue."

The trial could tie up a Monterey courtroom for several months.

In December 2008, the City and County of San Francisco filed suit against Regal Stone Ltd., the owner of the Cosco Busan, a 65,000-ton cargo ship that damaged its fuel tanks

'Suicidal' driver rams cop cars after canyon chase

A 37-YEAR-OLD Palo Colorado Canyon resident reported as suicidal was hit with a Taser, arrested and jailed Easter Sunday after he led cops on a high-speed chase up the canyon's narrow road, rammed two squad cars and injured a deputy, according to authorities.

A Monterey County Sheriff's deputy first approached Coy Gonzales near Point Lobos, where he found him sitting

Lots of learning (and eating and drinking) at PBF&W

THE PEBBLE Beach Food & Wine is so huge, and the experiences it yields so varied, it would be impossible to summarize concisely. Instead, consider these top lessons learned during the four-day festival of parties, lunches, dinners, tastings and cooking demonstrations held in Del Monte Forest April 16-19. Then, mark your calendar for next year's event — April 8-11, 2010 — and start preparing for a blowout.

No. 1: Pacing is everything. Following a golf tournament on the Pebble Beach Golf Links for chefs, winemakers, sommeliers and VIPs, the PBF&W kicked off in festive fashion Thursday night with dozens of wineries and renowned chefs cooking and pouring throughout Spanish Bay. Friday featured wine tastings, several options for lunch, cooking demonstrations and lavish dinners; Saturday was the same, except that lunch was replaced by the Grand Tasting showcasing 200 wineries and 25 chefs in a

60,000-square-foot tent at the Equestrian Center, and Sunday culminated with morning tastings and cooking demonstrations, followed by another Grand Tasting. Many guests signed up for packages that had them going morning, noon and night for more than three days, and

Shortly after mudslide closes highway, fire returns to Big Sur

JUST 11 days after heavy rains sent mud across Highway 1, a Big Sur brush fire this week reminded residents the dry summer season is quickly approaching.

The April 19 fire, which was started by a downed power line at about 5 p.m., was located in a residential neighborhood west of Highway 1 and south of Sycamore Canyon Road. The 2.5-acre blaze threatened three homes.

"We had just returned from training on Gorda Mountain on the South Coast when we received the call," reported

Martha Karstens, assistant chief of the Big Sur Volunteer Fire Brigade. "Everybody was tired, and we hadn't eaten."

Thankfully, residents helped firefighters get an early start on putting out the blaze. "The locals were already on the fire when we got there," Karstens said.

Assisting residents and the fire brigade were Cal Fire, the U.S. Forest Service, the Monterey County Sheriff's Office and the California Highway Patrol, which supplied a helicopter so firefighters would have "an eye in the sky," Karstens explained.

With only a light breeze blowing, firefighters quickly extinguished the flames. "We were lucky once again," Karstens said.

Service, put out the blaze, which caused little structure damage.

The fire was the third to hit Ventana in less than a year. The resort barely escaped disaster in June 2008 when a devastating wildfire came with a few feet of its buildings. Then, an Aug. 10, 2008, electrical fire heavily damaged the resort's Cielo restaurant.

"It has been just one thing after another," Karstens sighed.

Firefighters urge brush clearing

THIS WEEK'S brief heat wave and Big Sur's recent fires point to the importance of preventing or fending off summer wildfires. Cal Fire officials are asking residents of rural areas to create defensible space around their homes, including clearing all brush, dead grass and other combustibles within 100 feet of their houses.

"Last year's devastating fires in Monterey County are a sharp reminder of our vulnerability to fire," according to Cal Fire information officer Curt Itson.

Cal Fire offered advice for protecting houses from conflagration, including:

- removing all flammable vegetation within 30 feet of all structures;
- spacing trees and plants well apart within the next 70 feet;
- clearing all needles and leaves from roofs, eaves and gutters;
- trimming branches up to 6 feet from the ground;
- removing branches within 10 feet of any chimney;
- operating trimmers, mowers and other power equipment before 10 a.m. and after 6 p.m.; and
- landscaping with fire resistant plants.

Carmel's bell tower – The stone bell tower on the center median of Carmel's Ocean Avenue at San Carlos Street was designed and built in 1922 by Charles Greene, one of the legendary architects of the Arts & Crafts Movement in the early 20th century. He broke away from the celebrated Greene & Greene firm, which designed many of the homes still treasured in Pasadena, and moved to Carmel in 1916 in order to devote more time to his personal painting and writing. Greene did only a few structures here, most notably his brick studio near Lincoln and 13th; the castle-like "Seaward" mansion that seems to sprout from the ocean cliff across Highway 1 from the Highlands Inn; and the downtown bell tower, which is actually the Carmel War Memorial, a monument to Carmel's World War I veterans. Greene also designed and built his family home in Carmel, a U-shaped redwood bungalow on Lincoln that has since been demolished. Personal note: I am not related to any of these people. 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

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C.V. firefighters: more tax dollars will help protect people

THE PRESIDENT of the union representing Carmel Valley firefighters said doubling the fire district's tax on property owners is the best way to ensure continued fire protection and emergency services. Voters may be asked to approve the tax increase in August.

"The additional \$75 we are proposing would help us return to our previous level of staffing and continue the high level of service our community has come to expect," firefighter Scott Fenton said. "This assessment subsidizes a free ambulance ride for Carmel Valley residents."

The district recently announced pay cuts, one layoff and other measures to carve \$623,000 to meet its \$4,023,000 budget, but the union discovered the severity of the district's financial woes earlier, when the International Association of Firefighters audited financial statements for 2006 and 2007, according to Fenton.

"Their findings were our first red flags," he said. "The proposed preliminary budget submitted last June had an initial deficit of \$213,000, so our concern as employees was to make sure we were solvent in a time of increasing financial hardship at the federal, state and local levels."

With income from state tax dollars and ambulance trips decreasing, the union formed a budget task force and submitted a report to the board of directors in September 2008 recommending upping fees for fire and ambulance services, and raising the tax on property owners that was imposed in 2001.

"On the expense side, we recommended a drastic reduction in legal expenses and trimming of the operational budgets to the bone," he said.

As with almost all government agencies, salaries and benefits account for most of the

spending, and Fenton said the union "looked first at how we could reduce our own cost to the district by down-staffing through retirement attrition and overtime reduction."

Firefighters also considered the costs of hiring a new chief to replace Sidney Reade, who retired, and ultimately recommended signing on with Salinas Rural Fire Chief Michael Urquides to run the district.

Fenton reported that when Urquides arrived, he discovered more financial bad news after conducting an audit that revealed reserves had dropped from \$867,000 to zero between 2004 and 2008.

"When our new chief started on Feb. 1, we had a \$179,000 fund balance deficit to overcome in the five remaining months of this fiscal year," Fenton said. The dire financial situation "put us into a position where layoffs and pay reductions were the only option."

Fenton said arriving at that conclusion was "painful," as were the resulting layoff of one firefighter, the reassignment of another, and the 10 percent across-the-board pay cut. The salary for an entry-level firefighter was \$50,844, and a captain started at \$75,132, according to Fenton. Now they are \$45,760 and \$67,619, respectively. Combined with the drop in overtime pay, the changes mean a 20 percent to 25 percent decrease in income for C.V. Fire employees.

"It should also be noted that we have not received a raise for cost of living or any other reason for nearly three years, so when you add the recent salary reduction into the mix, we are well behind many of our fellow firefighters in Monterey County," he said.

Increasing the tax on homeowners is vital, according to Fenton, who said it will be up to the board to determine if and when voters will be asked to assess themselves further in the name of fire protection and medical care.

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
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Money from reserves to pay contractor

JAMES SOMMERVILLE, Inc., is receiving \$33,516 to replace three storm drains in Carmel, and the city council moved the money from capital reserves to the general fund this month to pay for it. The construction company bid on projects on Mission Street between Eighth and Ninth, Santa Rita

between Fifth and Sixth, and at San Antonio and Ninth. But the work was not included in the 2008/2009 budget, so the council had to adjust by transferring the money from the capital project reserve to the public works account for outside labor. Council members approved the transfer April 7.



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



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Peninsula women dubbed 'outstanding'

MONTEREY PENINSULA residents Carole Erickson and Bruna Odello were named among this year's Outstanding Women of Monterey County at a March 29 celebration hosted by the Monterey County Commission on the Status of Women. Carmel Mayor Sue McCloud presented the honors to Erickson and Odello, along with six women from the four other supervisorial districts, during the event at Hartnell College in Salinas.

Nominated by county residents, the honorees were selected by a committee of commissioners, representatives of women's organizations and community members.

A lifelong county resident, Erickson was recognized for her life's work on many social justice issues, focusing on gender, race and social equality. She was active in single-

payer healthcare and has received awards from public-health agencies and state officials.

Odello, whose family has long been part of the fabric of the Monterey Peninsula, was praised for her devoted volunteering, from 15 years with the Crosby (now the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am), to time as a Girl Scout leader and a board member of the Gateway Center. Odello is active at the Carmel Mission, reporting that "teaching catechism classes to second graders since 1957 is her favorite activity," and organized the successful Bill Bates fundraiser last fall.

"She has worked to improve the status of all women, including women migrant workers, the homeless, the low-income, the elderly and the disabled through her church outreach," according to the committee.

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Tourists find body off Highway 1 in Big Sur; murder suspected

A DEAD man discovered near Point Sur this week was likely murdered somewhere else and was dumped in the brush alongside Highway 1, Cmdr. Alan Wheelus of the Monterey County Sheriff's Office reported.

Hans Hugo Heath, 58, died of trauma to his head, an autopsy confirmed Wednesday. Investigators believe he died late Monday or early Tuesday.

Two motorists who were visiting from New Hampshire were taking photos near Point Sur when they discovered Heath. The body was found about 40 feet below the road. According to investigators, there were no signs of a struggle.

They also ruled out the possibility that he

sustained his injury from an accidental fall down the cliff.


Heath once served time in state prison on a domestic abuse charge, Wheelus confirmed.

It is unknown if Heath had any drugs in his system when he died. The results of a toxicology test won't be available for several weeks.

"We have a lot of questions and not a lot of answers," Wheelus conceded.

notifying him. "All of a sudden our project is set for a public hearing on May 7, without giving us time to prepare," Ghandour said.

While occupying a valuable beachfront site, the proposed 161-room resort would incorporate state-of-the-art eco-friendly features, including habitat restoration and use of wind power and solar energy.

The motion to halt the coastal commission's hearing is the second legal action Ghandour has taken in less than a month.

On April 3, his company, Security National Guaranty, filed a request in Monterey County Superior Court to invalidate the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District board's March denial of a water distribution permit for the resort.

The motion, which contested the MPWMD's jurisdiction, should have automatically delayed the coastal commission's review of the project for 90 days, Ghandour said. Instead, the coastal commission decided to hear the matter at its May meeting in San Francisco.

Ghandour said he believes the public hearing was placed on the agenda maliciously so he and his attorneys would not be prepared.

"Somebody locally or on the coastal commission's staff decided to screw us," Ghandour said.

The manager of the coastal commission's Santa Cruz division did not return a phone message left by The Pine Cone.

Court hearing next week

On April 29, Monterey County Superior Court Judge Roger Randall will consider the motion Ghandour filed over the MPWMD board's denial of a water permit, which would allow California America water Co. to deliver 90 acre-feet of water per year to the hotel.

"We believe the water district overstepped their jurisdictional bounds" in denying the permit, Ghandour said.


Ghandour has said he believes four members of the MPWMD board voted against the water permit because of their antigrowth ambitions.

Ghandour has faced numerous other legal snags in his decade-long quest to build the resort.

After repeatedly approving the Ghandour property as a site for a "visitor-serving use," in December 2000, the coastal commission rejected a permit for the hotel, contending it would violate the California Coastal Act by harming environmentally sensitive habitat, creating erosion and impeding public views of the coast.

In response, Ghandour's company filed suit against the commission, claiming a right to develop the property.

In 2008, a California appeals court sided with Ghandour, ruling the commission exceeded its authority when it denied his permit.



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'Annie' cancelled

AFTER MAKING a public plea last week for funds to help save its production of "Annie," the Forest Theater Guild announced it is putting the musical off until next year. Citing financial troubles that include \$110,000 owed from last year's season, board vice president Safwat Malek said the guild is putting off "Annie" but will still show movies and produce "Bandido!" In addition, it hopes to hold fundraising performances.

Malek said he spoke with Mayor Sue McCloud, who pledged the city would help however it can. The guild pays rent for the city-owned theater, which is also used by Pacific Repertory Theatre and Children's Experimental Theater. Their seasons are not affected.

SINGER-SONGWRITER SEVERIN Browne will perform Saturday, April 11, at Plaza Linda restaurant in Carmel Valley.

The brother of pop star Jackson Browne, Severin is a gifted vocalist and tunesmith who signed his first recording contract with Motown Records nearly 40 years ago.



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
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Sandy Claws

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
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

overindulgence to the point of having to miss other events was not unheard of. It's easy to forget not to finish every last drop in every wine glass or eat every morsel offered. In fact, it's hard not to finish it all, especially when they are once-in-a-lifetime tastes.

No. 2: Learning you really like the 1959 Chateau La Mission Haut-Brion is good and bad. Good, because if you're like most mortals, the opportunity to taste it had never before arisen, and even when it did on Friday afternoon, the \$1,000-per-person price of admission to the tasting of eight 1959 Bordeaux kept most people away. Bad, because it costs as much as \$4,150 per bottle — if you can find it. The wines offered during some of the PBF&W tastings were phenomenal and rare, and the people selected to speak about them well versed and entertaining, the top experts in their fields. Consider Sunday morning's tasting of eight vintages of Cristal Champagne, all of which were from the family's private cellar and disgorged just a few years ago. It provided an unusual opportunity to sample, scrutinize, compare and savor some of the world's finest bubbly across two decades as the charming Frédéric Rouzaud, managing director of the company, shared stories and facts about each precious bottle. And you can't even find most of those on the open market.

No. 3: Patience is a virtue. The PBF&W is a massive undertaking that requires coordinating dozens and dozens of volunteers, Pebble Beach Co. employees, chefs, sommeliers, winemakers, support staff, logistics, preparation, cooking, serving and everything else. Only in its second year, the PBF&W still has bugs to work out — including getting its events to start on time. Seating for the Chef's Table Truffle Lunch — a cleverly conceived feast in the kitchen area of the Grand Tasting tent devised so guests could watch star chefs Michel Richard (Citronelle) and Jean Joho (Everest) and their assistants at work — happened almost an hour after the noon start time, leaving guests to wander parts of the under-construction tent while sipping fabulous 2002 Roederer Estate L'Ermitage Brut but certainly desiring something to nibble along with it.

But the hors d'oeuvres came eventually, the live music was great, and the meal was memorable — including black truffle risotto (Joho) paired with a lovely 2007 Schloss Johannisberg Riesling Kabinett, Khalafi prawn and truffle sauce (Richard) with Chalone Chardonnay, cabbage-wrapped Squab stuffed with truffles (Joho) served with 2005 Hewitt Vineyard Cabernet Sauvignon from Napa Valley, and Richard's creative riff on blueberry cheesecake served with Penfolds Grandfather Old Liqueur Tawny (which the Aussies can no longer call Port). And it finished just 15 minutes late. A few wine tastings and cooking demos also got under way after the scheduled time, with some taking a full hour anyway — as with the informative tasting of Pinot Noir from all over the world — and others, such as Richard's demonstration of dishes to cook and serve with Penfolds wines, rushing to finish within the appointed time. That demo was fun and tasty, but it would have been all the better had the chef taken the full hour to charm his audience and show off his talent.

No. 4: It's pretty much impossible to go wrong. The country's top chefs are the best in their field for a reason, and their creativity shone through in Pebble Beach. The Grand Tastings, held Saturday and Sunday, featured 200 wineries and 25 chefs each day. With all sorts of ingredients, many sourced locally, at their disposal, they had a field day. Mark Estee of Moody's Bar & Lounge in Truckee created a lighthearted BLT on a tiny bun with sweet tomato jelly, Becker Lane organic pork and avocado ice cream, and Carmel Valley's own Cal Stamenov of Bernardus offered Dungeness crab leg with fresh chickpeas, cured Meyer lemon and carrot sauce. Mario Perez, also not far from home as banquet chef for the Pebble Beach resorts, wowed with a bite of lamb *sous vide* (sealed in plastic and cooked at very low temperatures, making for tender, juicy meat) topped with Castroville artichokes, and crostini with four types of local mushrooms, Gorgonzola cheese and truffle oil. And the wines, ranging from highly regarded French chateaux, Champagne houses and Australian, German and Italian vintners, to numerous American wineries and many locals, offered the pleasurable challenge of searching out and tasting those whose wines you have

always wondered about or recall fondly.

No. 5: Take notes — but don't make it too much work. One of the goals of the Grand Tastings, as well as of Opening Night, is to expose attendees to a lot of different restaurants and wineries, some whose names they might never have heard before.

With so much gustatory overload, not to mention having to at least partially concentrate on avoiding collisions with other glass-toting guests, the chefs, restaurants and wines of whom you want to take note flit out of memory within moments. Better to jot down a few words to trigger a memory — and a dinner reservation or winery visit — later. It can be an immense relief to recall that Club XIX chef Ressel Rassallat's perfectly scrambled eggs topped with caviar and served in an eggshell can be had just down the road at the Lodge, that Pelerin's Mesa Del Sol Syrah should not be missed, and that Elizabeth Spencer's delicate Rosé is perfect for hot weather.

No. 6: Take friends who love to eat and drink as much as you do. While flying solo during a multi-day food and wine fest would hardly be horrible, it's that much more fun to compare notes, pass the time while waiting in line, take revivifying walks and people-watch with like-minded companions. The Pebble Beach Food & Wine offered a lot of options: three different packages that included a variety of events, as well as the a-la-carte ticket ordering that opened a few weeks

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before it began, enabling couples and friends to plan accordingly. Whispering about the aromas of an unusual Pinot Noir from Tuscany and comparing notes during a multi-course meal made the weekend that much more enjoyable.

No. 7: When you go for it, go for it. Sure, some of the events had four-digit ticket prices, but when and where else will you have the opportunity to taste wines made 50 years ago in what has been hailed as the best vintage of the century, or sit down to a dinner incorporating truffles, caviar and foie gras? That's a large part of what the event, introduced by cofounders Rob Weakley and Dave Bernahl last year, is all about. It's also why it gets so much attention and support from sponsors and the public, and can raise money for charities in spite of what must be colossal costs. In their letter to this year's attendees, Weakley and Bernahl wrote, "Each of you that have gathered from around the world on this great weekend have something very special and binding in common, your love of food and wine. This love is perhaps one of the most transcendent forms of sharing and communication in our culture. Great food and wine can instantly create commonality among people from any corner of the globe."

Can P/E Ratio Help You Make Smart Investment Choices?

How can you tell if a stock is selling at an attractive price? Take a look at its price/earnings ratio, or P/E.

A stock's P/E reveals how much investors are willing to pay per share of earnings. For example, a stock with a P/E of 20 implies that investors are willing to pay \$20 for every \$1 of earnings that the company generates.

Generally speaking, the higher the P/E, the more "expensive" a stock is perceived as being. To illustrate: A \$20 stock with a P/E of 70 may be considered more costly than a \$100 stock with a P/E of 20.

With the market still down so much, you might be able to use P/E to get a clearer sense of which stocks are really priced attractively and which ones are expensive, despite their low price.

P/E can be a useful tool. Put it to work soon.

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Your Gardener's Checklist for April 24 - May 7, 2009

- Add a generous layer of mulch on flowerbeds and the garden to conserve moisture in the soil and reduce the number of weeds.
- Pick up and destroy camellia flowers that fall to the ground so that they don't become a home for diseases.
- Check ties and stakes on young trees and rose trees. Replace or remove them if needed.
- Feed your hanging basket fuchsias, bougainvillea, lantanas and others with a good general purpose fertilizer or fish emulsion once a month or half strength every two weeks.
- Aerate lawns this month if you can't push a screwdriver up to its handle into the lawn.
- If you don't have the space to grow vegetables in the ground then plant them up in containers. Choose a container at least 18 inches deep and wide and use a fresh potting mix. Place them in at least 6 hours of sun. Fertilize and water routinely.
- Thin fruit on fruit trees, especially apples, peaches and plums. Leave about 3- 5 inches between fruit and get ready for pie.

in his parked car, around 7 p.m. April 12, according to Cmdr. Tracy Brown. Someone had reported he was suicidal, and officers were alerted to look for him.

But when the deputy asked Gonzales to take his keys out of the ignition, the man refused, fired up his truck and drove away.

"The deputy then pursued him south on Highway 1, as Gonzales was driving southbound in the northbound lane and causing cars to swerve out of the way," Brown said.

When Gonzales stopped, the deputy attempted to fire his Taser at the suspect while he was still in the truck, but the darts didn't catch, and Gonzales drove away again, according to Brown.

A California Highway Patrol officer joined in the chase, following Gonzales as he headed up Palo Colorado Canyon Road.

When Gonzales suddenly made a U-turn, "between the CHP vehicle and our vehicle,

we tried to block the guy in," Brown said. But Gonzales accelerated, ramming his truck head-on into the deputy's vehicle and grazing the CHP car.

The impact caved in the front end of the sheriff's deputy's vehicle but only caused minor damage to the CHP car.

Gonzales was reportedly uninjured, but deputy Sean White was sent to the hospital for treatment and later released. Brown would not elaborate on his injuries but said White has since returned to work.

Following the collision, Gonzales got out of his truck but ignored officers' commands to submit, CHP Sgt. Carl Churchfield said.

"He failed to comply with what the deputies were telling him to do," Churchfield said, so one of them fired a Taser at Gonzales, temporarily disabling him so they could take him into custody.

Gonzales was taken to Monterey County Jail and placed under a 72-hour hold for evaluation. He faces charges of felony DUI, since he allegedly injured a peace officer, and felony evading arrest.

But Oliver, described by Brookhouser as "a very smart, sweet boy," is still reeling from the traumatic procedure.

"He was very shy around his ears, which is totally understandable," she said. "If you came near his ears he would flinch, but his tail would never stop wagging."

SPCA executive director Gary Tiscornia taught Oliver how to sit, Brookhouser said.

The dog, when he's available for adoption, will likely make a good pet.

"He seems he would be great for any family," she said, "as long as they are ready for puppy antics and can teach him to be a good dog."

The SPCA for Monterey County is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those who cut off Oliver's ears.

The SPCA is asking anybody with information about Oliver to call (831) 373-2631 or (831) 422-4721 ext. 213. Callers' identities will be kept confidential.

when it crashed into the Bay Bridge.

The suit, also filed against the ship's pilot, John Cota, seeks to recover all the costs of investigating and responding to the spill, and the loss of recreational opportunities by S.F. Bay Area residents.

On April 9, documents signed by San Francisco Superior Court Judge Charlotte Walter Woolard were filed in Monterey County to move all future court proceedings here.

In addition to concerns about prejudice of potential jury members, the trial was relocated because of the possible "home-court advantage" San Francisco might have.

No date set

Because of the length and complexity of the proceedings, Medina said it's possible Grover could find the county is not capable of handling them. "She is currently in communications with the administrative office of the courts in conjunction with our court executive officer on all issues that surround acceptance of the case," Medina said.

There is no deadline for Monterey County to make a decision about whether or not it can host the trial, she said. "Once an internal review has been completed," Medina explained, "we can better assess when a final decision will be made."

No date has been set for the trial, and the first pretrial conference for the case isn't until October, Lakritz said.

Some questions — such as whether Monterey County would be reimbursed for the costs of the trial — can not be answered until Grover makes her decision, Medina said.

paint in the alcove. Members OK'd the yellow paint and motif but said all of the purple paint and the fake timbers had to go.

Because she didn't attend the meeting and wasn't able to defend the door, King asked the board to open the matter again. After the board agreed, King's daughter and store co-owner, Jennifer Kadosh, stood up and testified that the door had been purple for years.

"We really appreciate your approving the wall to remain yellow and the pictures we had painted, and we apologize for not applying for a permit," she began. "We didn't realize we had to do that."

They made some of the changes ordered by the board but did not repaint the door or a nearby purple post.

"This was the color of the door when we first opened our

business, and according to [building owner and Kadosh's father] Jack Hakim, the door was purple, and has been for many years."

The door was simply repainted, she said. And a 2004 photo provided by the planning department showed the door was purple.

While design guidelines for downtown argue against bright, primary colors and favor neutral tones that blend in, assistant planner Marc Wiener said they are open to interpretation. "The key is protecting downtown," he said.

Board member Jonathan Sapp favored allowing King to keep the purple door, since it is upstairs in an alcove, not down at street level. "Given the fact it's quite off the beaten path and not visible from the street, I think it's OK," added board member Mary Bell.

"I was not anti-the-purple-door to start with," DRB member Keith Paterson commented, and the board unanimously decided the purple door could stay, but the purple column could not. It must be repainted to match the rest of the building.

"Watching three artists gliding and floating through the air and framed by the theater's gothic arch will make this one of the most beautiful events we have ever had here," he predicted.







had ordered. She would then duplicate the order, hoping the guest would overlook the extra charge and pay it.

Wednesday night, she had a cocktail, and Thursday, she reportedly went for a full meal of sand dabs, two glasses of red wine and a cappuccino, charging the bill to the room of a man who had dined on an identical menu earlier that evening.

Officers found Grimes downtown Friday morning, and inn employees identified her, according to Lightfoot. She initially said her name was Amanda Lee George and that she was from Hawaii, but police eventually discovered her true name, along with three outstanding arrest warrants for fraud in Texas and Washington State.

Police also discovered Grimes had spent the previous two nights in a Carmel rental for which she had taken the key during a stay

two years ago.

Grimes was arrested for trespassing, possession of burglary tools, possession of stolen property, defrauding an innkeeper, theft by credit card and providing false information to a police officer. With multiple aliases and no home address, she is considered a flight risk, so the court granted a bail enhancement in the amount of \$200,000.

"She's still in custody," Lightfoot said. "I'm working on getting no bail. She has no good address, and that's why she was down here scamming. She was very believable and friendly."

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

Understanding insurance

IN THEIR haste to push the United States toward a single-payer (translation: government-run) healthcare system, national media outlets love to feature woe-ful tales of families which, after a layoff or other loss of employment, are left facing substantial medical bills without private insurance to help pay them.

Of course, our country already provides unlimited, free or very-low-cost medical care to the elderly and the poor. So one essential element in these sad stories is that the families stuck in the no-medical-insurance-and-big-medical-bills dilemma are not elderly or destitute. Usually, they also have a substantial asset (a home, for example) which they do not want to liquidate or borrow against for the sake of paying hospitals and doctors.

One recent story in a national newspaper told of a family with a son whose cancer is in remission. His mother had a job with a national shipping company, and the company's health insurance paid more than \$2 million for the young man's successful treatment. But then she lost her job and the generous health insurance that came with it. Now, she's facing the necessity of borrowing against her home to pay for her son's costly followup care. She could afford small premiums for new health insurance, but not the substantial premiums that would be required to cover the sizable bills that her son's treatment will surely generate.

There's just one problem with this story: It is not "insurance" to pay a small premium to obtain coverage for a large and entirely predictable expense. The point seems obvious, yet most media coverage of the nation's health-insurance "crisis" ignores it.

When someone buys an insurance policy, he is joining a group of people who have agreed to pool their mutual resources (premiums) to cover each other in the event something really bad happens to one or several of them (benefits).

Imagine you had such an agreement with 100 of your friends, with each of you agreeing to pay \$1,000 per year into a joint account. This \$100,000 per year accumulates for the group's benefit, with portions of it paid out to members who encounter the unforeseen circumstances the group has agreed to protect its members against.

Now, suppose someone asks to join the group who knows he will have losses of \$50,000 per year, and who wants those losses covered for the \$1,000-per-year premium. Would you agree to let him join under these circumstances? Of course not. What that person is looking for isn't insurance. It's a gift.

He's not saying, "I need medical insurance." What he's saying is, "I need someone to pay my medical bills so I don't have to."

And how would you feel if the government required you to admit that person to your group? Cheated, obviously.

Another question: Suppose that person had been given an opportunity to join your group before he became aware of his future, \$50,000-per-year costs, but he declined. Should you be required to admit him after the losses suddenly began?

In the news media's fantasy world, these questions do not exist. Instead, there are just faceless, cruel corporations being mean to helpless, misfortunate individuals.

But the nation's healthcare problems won't be solved by fantasies. They'll only be solved by careful consideration of the complex world of healthcare winners and losers, and of revenues and expenses.

We can start by educating ourselves about what insurance is and how it is actually supposed to function.

Paying for incorporation

Dear Editor,

A few weeks ago I wrote the Pine Cone suggesting that those who vote for the incorporation of Carmel Valley should be held directly accountable for any budget shortfalls if the rosy financial forecasts that are being used to justify the new town turn out to be wrong. A week later, one of your readers suggested the financial forecasts must be correct, saying: "In the current down economic circumstances, when Carmel Valley property taxes are holding pretty steady, the county is slashing services."

What I want to know is where she gets her information that Carmel Valley's property taxes are "holding pretty steady," and how she figures that in an extended recession the financial forecasts on which the incorporation rests won't go right out the window. One only has to look at the April 20 Pine Cone to see that the median home price of a house in Carmel Valley has gone down 40 percent between the first quarter of 2008 compared with the first quarter of 2009. It is only a matter of time before housing sales at these depressed prices send property taxes, along with other tax revenue, down. Opponents of incorporation have every right to demand that the financial forecasts be redone to see if incorporation is still economically feasible. Either that, or go back to my original idea where everyone who votes in favor of the incorporation will be held responsible for any revenue shortfall.

Good as new

When doctors informed Big Sur resident Bob Cosgrove that he would need two new lungs if he wanted to live, he knew he was facing a tough battle to regain his health. Yet even in the dark days that followed his prognosis, he managed to stay upbeat. "I just wanted to see my kids grow up," said Cosgrove of his determination to survive.

The Henry Miller Library will host a benefit concert Sunday, April 26, for Cosgrove, who received a double lung transplant Nov. 24 after he was diagnosed with pulmonary fibrosis.

Luckily, Cosgrove received his transplant after waiting just four days. He's more than 6 feet tall, and everybody ahead of him on the waiting list wasn't big enough for a pair of lungs which suddenly became available. He doesn't know where his new lungs came from.

While Cosgrove thankfully had most of his medical expenses — which total more than \$500,000 — paid by health insurance from his job at Deetjen's Big Sur Inn, he is still facing a mountain of bills. The proceeds from the fundraiser will help pay those bills and provide him with a cushion of support until he is able to go back to work.

"I've put a lot of energy into recovering — brain power, prayer, anything I can muster," said Cosgrove, who now lives in Monterey after losing his Partington Ridge housing during last summer's wildfires. "My health is pretty good, and I'm moving forward."

Cosgrove was the cofounder of the Big Sur Jazz Festival. The fundraiser will also serve as a showcase for a new local band, the Shiny Unicorns. "We're a raunchy three-piece rock band," Jeremiah Slate explained.

Slate and Tod Williamson will trade off playing guitar and bass, while Heidi Varbel plays drums.

IDYLLIC QUAIL Lodge & Resort, known for its beautiful golf course and recently renovated lodge and clubhouse, may be an ideal place for all aspects of a wedding. 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

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Designer makes wedding dress dreams come true

WHETHER IT'S choosing what kind of flowers to use to what song is most appropriate for the "first dance," brides-to-be nowadays have endless possibilities to make their wedding days unique.

But deciding what wedding dress to wear is among a bride's biggest concerns.

And nobody knows that better than the team at Ericka Engelman Couture, a local designer specializing in custom-made wedding dresses.

"We love working with brides and making something they dream about really happen," said owner Ericka Engelman.

Ericka Engelman Couture makes as many as 24 cus-

tom bridal gowns and alters up to 100 gowns every year. Each gown is painstakingly crafted to each bride's personal taste.

"We have done so many different kinds of things," she said. "Every bride who walks in the door has something different she's looking for."

More than ever, brides are requesting less traditional gowns in favor of those that better reflect their personalities, Engelman said. Gowns of pale blues and greens, and those embroidered with the bride's name, for instance, are regular requests.

"They don't want it to look like a wedding dress," she said. "It's really kind of a fun time for us. We don't get the off-the-rack bride, we get the very special person."

In order to convey their ideas of the perfect wedding

dress, Engelman said she tells brides-to-be to bring into her shop all their ideas and photos.

"The average age of brides is 26," she said. "They know a bit more about themselves, and they are not finding what they want on a rack. They want a dress that says something about them."

Most of the gowns Ericka Engelman Couture creates are made of fine silk.

"We find that a bride's complexion and everything responds to silks more than polyesters," she said. "Silk gowns tend to be lighter ... and they just kind of float."

Engelman's custom wedding dresses cost \$2,000 to \$8,000, with most gowns in the \$3,500 range. Gowns are

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

first mocked up in less expensive muslin — a type of finely woven cotton — so

the customer can get an idea of what the gown will look like when it's completed in silk.

"We like to have at least three months to do a gown," Engelman said.

And regardless of how a gown may change from its original concept,

Engelman said there is complete transparency between her staff and customers.

"There are no surprises," she said. "If we change something, we tell them right then that this is going to cost more and let them decide if they want to do that."

But sometimes things don't go as planned. She once was asked to make a wedding gown in a weekend. Fortunately, she and her staff work well under pressure.

"A dry cleaner ruined a dress and we had to recreate it," she said. "It wasn't one of our dresses originally, but we saved the day."

Though Engelman started the business 26 years ago after having graduated from the Fashion Institute of Design & Merchandising in Los Angeles, she said she confidently relies on the expertise of

her employees, including assistant Meghan Ryan, to help pull it all together.

"Meghan and I do the fittings and the consultations with the brides, and come up with ideas," Engelman said. "And the rest of the staff, through a collaborative effort, make it happen."

And when an anxious bride steps into Ericka Engelman Couture, she can leave the worries of all the rest of her wedding planning at the door, Engelman said.

"A lot of chaos can be happening, but this is a quiet place," she said. "You have time to try on your dress and be beautiful. It's a happy place and we love it."





Sea, you should realize there can still be competition not only for Saturday afternoons, but for caterers, florists and entertainment as well. Planning ahead — way ahead — will prevent your dream wedding from being

snapped up by some other couple.

At least six, and preferably 12, months before the wedding, the following should be considered:

- ♥ The budget. A realistic assessment of what you can spend will help steer the course of the wedding away from beginning your married life buried in debt.
- ♥ Hone the guest list, the length of which will determine possible locations for the wedding and reception.
- ♥ Reserve not only the wedding venue, but the reception location, and airline tickets and hotel for the

honeymoon. (You can't use frequent-flyer miles to the most sought-after locations without booking far, far in advance.)

- ♥ Reserve the services of the pastor or other person who will perform the ceremony.
- ♥ Select attendants for bride and groom and make sure they're available.

- ♥ Book local hotel rooms for out-of-town guests, family and attendants.
- ♥ Check catering facilities at the reception location. Contact an outside caterer, if necessary.
- ♥ Book a photographer and videogra-

pher.

- ♥ Discuss any written prenuptial agreements.
- ♥ Select wedding and bridesmaids' dresses or the design you wish a seamstress to use.
- ♥ Discuss and plan living arrangements after the wedding (these days, many couples already have that taken

care of).

♥ Request announcement of the engagement in your hometown newspaper.

♥ Select your wedding rings.

About four months before the wedding date, most final arrangements should be completed:

♥ Pay deposits and sign contracts for the ceremony. Writing at least an informal "letter of understanding" detailing what you expect from caterers, florists, entertainers and photographers can help prevent disastrous misunderstandings on the big day. Agreements or changes made in person or over the telephone should be noted with a simple letter while the details are still fresh in both minds.

♥ All attire should be ordered, with color schemes communicated to the parents of bride and groom.

♥ Sign up with a bridal registry. Many small, local stores can make a gift registry available worldwide on the Internet, and the large national chains such as Macy's or Saks Fifth Avenue will obviously be able to make a registry available to guests who will choose gifts in other cities.

♥ Order invitations.

♥ Check civil requirements for marriage licenses.

♥ Purchase wedding rings.

♥ Reserve limousines.

♥ Finalize guest list and check correct mailing addresses.

♥ Shop for trousseau.

Sixty days before the ceremony is the time to:

♥ Address all invitations and send those to anyone who will have to make travel plans. Other invitations can be sent

six weeks before the ceremony.

♥ Review all agreements, including memos outlining changes or additions, with the person officiating, and all suppliers.

♥ Plan rehearsal schedule and dinner, and bridesmaid's luncheon.

♥ Decide on accessories, such as goblets for toasting, pillow for rings, garter, guest book, something borrowed, something blue.

♥ Book hairdresser and makeup artist for the morning of the ceremony.

♥ Finalize all accommodations for out-of-town guests and for the honeymoon.

♥ Order wedding cake.

♥ Have final fitting for wedding dress.

♥ Sit for bridal portrait.

♥ Get marriage license from the county recorder's office.

♥ Choose gifts for bridesmaids and groomsmen.

♥ Purchase book to record gifts, and start writing thank-yous immediately.

♥ Take care of legal details regarding change-of-name on driver's license, Social Security card, insurance, bank accounts, charge accounts, wills.

Three weeks before the ceremony, you should:

♥ Reconfirm all accommodations; canceling any surplus.

♥ Send wedding announcement to the newspaper in the bride's hometown, the

groom's hometown and the location of the wedding.

♥ Select someone to be in charge of placing the guest book at the reception and of moving gifts.

♥ Get hair trimmed.

♥ Remind each other why you embarked on this journey in the first place.

During the final week before the big day, it's a good idea to:

♥ Give the photographer a list of guests to immortalize. Discuss logistics with videographer.

♥ Contact guests who have not responded, to try to get an accurate count for the caterer.

♥ Plan seating arrangements.

♥ Pack for the honeymoon. Make sure luggage is picked up by the limousine or is in the car taking you from the reception.

♥ Try to get plenty of sleep.

♥ Have a rehearsal and enjoy the dinner afterward.

♥ Pick up all wedding attire.

♥ Make a list of no more than seven things to remember on the Wedding Day.

In addition to the copy you think you'll be able to find that morning, give another to the maid of honor and best man and pin one to your wedding underwear.

Make sure the first thing and the last thing on the list is: Enjoy!
