Bill Bates succumbs after long illness

BILL BATES, Carmel-by-the-Sea's unofficial artist in residence, died Thursday morning after a lengthy stay in the hospital following a heart attack last summer. He was 79

Bates' wife, Lei Lei, was with him when he passed away at Kindred Hospital in San Leandro about 5:45 a.m.

"To the last day, he was still fighting," Lei Lei Bates told The Pine Cone.

Bates, whose cartoons, books, and ubiquitously sunny outlook made him a beloved character in Carmel for more than three decades, had a heart attack July 1, 2008, while preparing to open his first art gallery.

While recovering from the heart attack at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula, he developed a debilitating staphylococcus infection in his chest which kept him bedridden and frequently comatose, and launched him on a touch-and-go, 10-month-long odyssey to five different hospitals.

At times, Bates' health showed signs of improvement, but they were always followed by setbacks.

Ultimately, Lei Lei said it was complications from the staph infection that caught up with him.

"His organs failed because of the long time he was in the hospital," she said. "He had heart failure and his kidneys weren't functioning too well. And his lungs were not working too well."

"We've known for weeks this was coming, but it's still a jolt," said a friend, David Loye, who helped raise money to support Bates' family

Despite his lengthy healthcare ordeal, his wife said Bates was the same man until the end, using his eyes to communicate when he wasn't able to speak.

"He was still as humorous as before," she said. "All the nurses and doctors loved him. He was just a very fun person."



ARTISTS DONATE TO HELP KEEP BACH FEST AFLOAT

To HELP bring world-class musicians to town, Bach Festival organizers are turning to one of the Monterey Peninsula's greatest homegrown resource—its artists.

More than 130 mostly local artists are creating miniature works of art to help raise money for the iconic festival, which for 72 years has paid tribute to the music of Johann Sebastian Bach and the Baroque period. Sierra Club asks state to restrict Peninsula's water

■ Rationing possible to protect fish

CITING RECORD-LOW steelhead trout populations in the Carmel River, the Sierra Club is asking the State Water Resources Control Board to order an immediate 25 percent reduction in water use by residents of the Monterey Peninsula.

Larry Silver, the Sierra Club's Mill Valley-based attorney who filed the requested cease and desist order with the state water board, said Monterey Peninsula residents will probably need to ration water to comply.

"Basically, there are going to have to be some sacrifices made in light of the status of the steelhead," Silver told The Pine Cone.

Green building rules may be added to permits

I HE CITY of Carmel will no longer count on people to voluntarily use environmentally friendly materials and practices when building in town. It will require them if a proposed ordinance for green building requirements is adopted by the city council, as unanimously recommended by the planning commission Wednesday. The standards would become mandatory in January.

"The purpose of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea's green

A 43-YEAR-OLD Salinas man wanted on a \$30,000 warrant made the mistake of driving drunk through Carmel just after 2 a.m. May 18, according to police.

Sgt. Ken Shen reported officers Chris Johnson and Josh Plosser were on patrol when they saw a driver run a stop sign and continue up the road erratically after the officers gave chase. Miguel Briseno stopped the car in the area of Junipero and First and fled on foot but was hit with a Taser, cuffed and arrested after getting only half a block, according to Shen, who said the man was intoxicated. The officers also reported Briseno had multiple prior DUI convictions and was wanted on a \$30,000 warrant for violating the terms of his probation. He was also driving on a suspended license.

Did you know...

Commercialism-by-the-Sea - The Carmel Pine Cone began warning against the danger of a chamber as early as 1928. A chamber of horrors? A torture chamber? No, a Chamber of Commerce! The Pine Cone called it the "trademark of


Babbitry." Then in November of 1931, in the depths of the depression, the paper reported that 40 business people had the temerity to consider the formation of "an organization to expound the charms of the village to the world." The paper noted that "despite the fact that at least half of Carmel's stores are owned by women, only one, a writer at that, braved the dangers of attending the session." Mayor Herbert Herron called the chamber idea ridiculous and said that "the merchants are cutting their own throats." One resident warned that if the chamber were established, people would call the town "Commercialism-by-the-Sea". A week later the Los Angeles Times reported that it was not surprising that Sinclair Lewis was about to take residence in Carmel now that the "charming little city has voted down a proposal for the establishment there of a chamber of commerce." The paper noted that "artists and authors...poohpoohed the idea of commercial exploitation and would have none of it." A Carmel Business Association had been formed three years earlier in 1928 but it was organized to improve the city, not to be a booster organization. In 2003 the Carmel Business Association was renamed the Carmel Chamber of Commerce, 75 years after the controversy started. (Next: Morse Take Over)

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Burglar breaks Flanders window


SOMEONE BROKE into the vacant Flanders Mansion by smashing a rear window the evening of May 11, according to Carmel Police Sgt. Ken Shen, but the culprit probably fled when his actions triggered the burglar alarm.

Just after 6 p.m., the motion sensor in the city-owned house sounded, and Shen and officer Chris Johnson arrived to find a broken window.

Suspecting someone might still be inside, they summoned Monterey County Sheriff's deputies and a K-9 officer from Marina to help search the sprawling building and its grounds, which border on the Mission Trail Nature Preserve.

"There was no one inside," said Shen. Since the mansion is vacant, it contains nothing to steal, so he suspected the person planned to vandalize it, squat or do drugs there.

"He probably jumped in, and the alarm beeped, so he jumped back out," he said. "We boarded it up. There were no other issues."



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Pollacci hearing delayed until July

THE PRELIMINARY hearing of Tom Pollacci, in which a judge will decide whether sufficient evidence exists for the rape case against him to proceed, has been put off until July 10, attorneys and the judge decided in a May 20 meeting.

The preliminary hearing was originally scheduled for May 8 but delayed so attorneys could gather more information for the case and vacations could be accommodated, Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Cristina Johnson said this week.

Pollacci, free on a \$300,000 bond but under home confinement at his parents' Pebble Beach residence, is accused of raping a woman who was unconscious and unable to consent to sex in April 2008.

He reportedly left her at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula with a head injury, but police tracked him down, questioned him and searched the family business, Ron's Liquors on Lighthouse Avenue, where he had been working.

An arrest warrant was issued for him more than 10 months after the alleged attack, and he turned himself in to Seaside P.D., where he was booked and released on bail.

Man admits killing pedestrian in Ocean Avenue crosswalk

THE SALINAS resident who accidentally struck and killed a pedestrian in downtown Carmel in October 2007 pleaded no contest to a misdemeanor charge of vehicular manslaughter last week. According to Monterey County Managing Deputy District Attorney Ed Hazel, Salinas resident George Gamboa entered the plea in Superior Court May 14 and is set to be sentenced June 25. He faces up to 30 days in Monterey County Jail and up to a year if he violates any of the terms of his probation. A restitution hearing to determine how much he owes the woman's family is also pending.

Rebecca Tarumoto, 62, was in the crosswalk when Gamboa hit her with his Dodge Ram as he turned south onto Junipero Street from westbound Ocean Avenue. She was airlifted by helicopter to a trauma center and died 12 days later. Following an investigation, with which Gamboa cooperated, according to Carmel police, charges were filed in March 2008, and he pleaded not guilty in April.

In June, widower David Tarumoto and his family requested a hearing, "for the purpose of determining appropriate restitution."

Earlier that month, their Mountain Viewbase attorney, Michael Capitina, sent a letter to Monterey County Superior Court Judge Efren Iglesia asking him to prohibit Gamboa from pleading no contest to the charge.

"The force of the collision caused traumatic brain injuries to Ms. Tarumoto which led to her horrific, lingering death, some 12 days later," he wrote, and her family members "were never again able to speak with

their wife and mother. Their last memories are that of M Tarumoto lying unconscious on a ventilator machine."

The letter lamented the lack of correspondence or apology f r o m Gamboa. "The defendant has not accepted responsibili-

ty for the consequences of his criminal neglect," the lawyer concluded in the June letter. "Therefore, it is respectfully requested that the honorable court refuse entry of a plea of no contest by the defendant if attempted."

But Gamboa entered, and the judge accepted, the no-contest plea. Although it is essentially an admission of guilt, it can not be construed as acceptance of liability in civil court the way a guilty plea can, Hazel explained.

The restitution hearing could be held in

conjunction with the sentencing, according to Hazel, if the victim's family can gather the appropriate records in time. He said the Tarumotos could demand restitution for hospital and medical bills, counseling, attorney's fees, funeral costs and other expenses associated with the fatal accident and the adjudication of the case.

"There was a new law passed last year

that gives victims a huge range of rights in terms of restitution," Hazel said. "So they have a really big voice." In addition, criminal restitution payments can not be avoided by the defendant's filing for bankruptcy the way a civil judgment can.

Gamboa is set to appear for sentencing June 25 at 2 p.m. in Iglesia's courtroom in Salinas.



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

CHOMP TO BE CERTIFIED AS 'PRIMARY STROKE FACILITY'

COMMUNITY HOSPITAL of the Monterey Peninsula will soon be the county's foremost facility to treat patients who have had a stroke, because the hospital's emergency room will be staffed 24/7 with specialists in diagnosing and treating stroke victims.

"Having a [stroke] center here at Community Hospital will be a significant benefit to residents of the Monterey Bay Area, resulting in better outcomes for those who have strokes," said Dr. Anthony Chavis, CHOMP vice president of medical affairs.

"There are a list of guidelines that CHOMP will follow," said Sherry Houston, executive director of the Santa Clara County-based Stroke Awareness Foundation, which urged the hospital to become certified as a primary stroke facility.

For instance, CHOMP must have a special team of doctors, nurses and other technicians on call 24 hours a day who

have been trained to properly diagnose and treat a stroke patient.

"In the emergency department, they need to be able to quickly recognize the symptoms of a stroke, which aren't always obvious," said Christine Short, a clinical quality and risk management analyst at CHOMP.

Also as part of the designation, CHOMP employees are being trained to identify candidates eligible for tPA (tissue plasminogen activator) to dissolve blood clots in the brain.

The drug, most effective when given within several hours of the onset of a stroke, can greatly improve the possibility for recovery.

Determining who is eligible for the tPA requires a CT scan and other tests, which CHOMP must have available at all times for the certification.

While tPA can be effective for someone who has had an ischemic stroke, an obstruction within a blood vessel, it can be dangerous if it's given to someone who has had a hemor-

rhagic stroke, when a weakened vessel ruptures and bleeds into the brain. About 80 percent of strokes are ischemic.

CHOMP treats an estimated 300 stroke victims per year, making the certification an important asset to the hospital. It is expected to receive certification sometime during the summer.

"Time is of the essence when it comes to treating stroke victims," Chavis said. "And the closest certified primary stroke center right now is in San Jose."

Short said the staff at CHOMP is undergoing stroke training and education as part of the certification, which should be given in the next few months.

"We have an elderly population, and it made a let of same

"We have an elderly population, and it made a lot of sense to the hospital" to become certified as a primary stroke center, Short said.

Houston said her organization is also working with the Monterey County Board of Supervisors and county ambulance companies, so if a firefighter or paramedic recognizes a person has had a stroke, he will rush the patient to CHOMP instead of another hospital

"From what I can tell, CHOMP is not only going to be a good stroke center," Houston said, "it is going to be an excellent one."

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

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

Popular Big Sur hiking route finally reopens

HIKERS WILL again be able to enjoy some of Big Sur's most dramatic views after the California Department of Parks and Recreation this week opened several trails closed since last summer's wildfires.

"Thanks to some great assistance from Cal Fire and their work crews, the trails on the east side of Highway 1 at Andrew Molera State Park are open to the public," announced C.L. Price, Big Sur sector superintendent for state

For hiking enthusiasts, the opening of the park's East Molera Trail is cause for celebration. Known to locals as "The Golden Staircase," the steep route starts at Highway 1 and zigzags its way for four miles up steep hillsides of golden grass as it winds its way toward Post Summit, 3,400 feet above sea level. Along the way, hikers are blessed with distant views of Point Sur to the northwest, Big Sur Valley to the southwest and Pico Blanco to the east.

No trail offers better views of Pico Blanco, a 3,700-foot peak notable for its distinctive limestone. The mountain is also noteworthy for its fascinating cultural history: Big Sur's indigenous people, the Esselen and the Rumsen, considered it the birthplace of the world, while 19th century gold miners claimed to be scared away by a protective Native American goddess. Today, it is owned by Graniterock Co. of Watsonville, and much of the mountain is off limits to hikers.

While the peak of this year's extraordinary wildflower bloom has passed, the East Molera Trail still features a dazzling display of color, partly as a result of the fire. In particular, several variety of clarkias, which look like magenta-colored poppies, are proliferating at the higher elevations. Clarkias are known as late bloomers — in fact, they're commonly known by another name, Farewell to Spring.

The East Molera trailhead is distinguished by a ramshackle wooden cattle guard located just south of the park's main entrance on the east side of Highway 1. Molera park is located on Highway 1 about 20 miles south of Carmel. Parking is available for a fee in a lot located west of Highway 1. For more information, call (831) 667-2315.

building ordinance is to guide development in a sustainable manner, promote energy efficiency, improve air quality, preserve natural resources and encourage architectural design that is consistent with the city's diverse design traditions," the draft ordinance reads.

Modeled after the City of Monterey's program, the ordinance would rely on a checklist of green-building practices, with residential and commercial projects required to achieve a certain number of points before they could be approved.

Using the 310-point Build it Green checklist for residential projects and the 100-point LEED Commercial checklist for nonresidential construction, the requirements would range from four points for a residential bathroom or kitchen remodel to 60 points for a new home, while commercial buildings would need 16 points for additions/remodels smaller than 1,000 square feet, up to 24 points for new structures.

For housing, points are given for measures taken on the site, such as reusing construction debris (two to four points, depending on how much) and installing a driveway of recycled-content aggregate (one point). Credit is also given for specific materials in the foundation, noninvasive species in landscaping, compost added to top soil, certified wood and recycled products, durable and fireproof siding, insulation on pipes, renewable energy sources, green flooring and countertops, energy-efficient appliances and myriad other measures.

On the commercial side, builders get points for items like facilities that encourage alternative transportation, good site selection, water-efficient landscaping, renewable energy, reuse and recycling in construction, and improved "indoor environmental quality" through daylight and views, air circulation and controlling indoor pollutants.

"The point requirements have been designed to be reasonably achievable by any applicant," planning and building services manager Sean Conroy said in his May 20 report to the commission. "The point requirements should also be reviewed on a regular basis to reflect changes in the industry and as green building practices become more commonplace."

According to the proposed law, city projects would be held to higher standards so they make strong examples, and exemptions would be allowed for reroofing; plumbing, electrical or mechanical work not associated with remodels or additions; seismic upgrades; repairs or maintenance of foundations; repairs and/or reconstruction of damage by fire, explosion, "acts of God, or acts of the public enemy;" and window replacement.

An exemption could also be granted if the applicant can prove the requirements would result in "unreasonable hardship."

Conroy said setting a January date for making the law involuntary "will allow for applicants to become acquainted the program prior to full implementation."

Following some discussion, the planning commission unanimously voted to forward the draft ordinance to the city council with a recommendation for approval. The council would also decide any incentives the program should include.

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

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
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Pacific Grove narrows list of city-manager candidates

A recruiter is handling the interview process, interim city manager Charlene Wiseman told The Pine Cone. "They have gone through the initial screening and have

There are indications one of the candidates is the well regarded director of management and budget, Jim Becklenberg.

Becklenberg told The Pine Cone he was unable to comment on the city manager hiring process. Mayor Dan Cort also said he couldn't comment specifically on the quest for city manager.

"It's very sensitive," Cort said.

The new city manager will have to tackle the city's dire financial problems, making Becklenberg or someone else with a financial background a good choice for the post.

Meanwhile, on Wednesday, council members met in closed session to discuss the candidates but did not announce a decision. Though Wiseman's contract is up in July, there is no time limit on when the city council must decide who is to be the next city

The recruiting company, Alliance Resource Consulting, put candidates through a rigorous vetting process, Wiseman said.

And a representative with the recruiting company interviewed each city council

"Each one had an opportunity to say what they felt about [the candidates], and what type of person was needed," Wiseman said.

Though the city doesn't have a salary range for city manager like it does for other employees, Colangelo earned about \$163,000 per year.

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

If granted, the order would require California American Water to curtail pumping from the Carmel River beginning June 9.

The Sierra Club contends increasing flows in the river is the only way to help save the steelhead.

"All of the experts agree," according to legal documents filed with the SWRCB, "that a significant curtailment of diversion will bring about habitat improvement that will promote recovery of the [steelhead]."

The Sierra Club also insists reducing pumping would "materially lower the chances of the steelhead becoming endangered."

According to figures provided in a 33-page declaration by John Williams, a former Monterey Peninsula Water Management District board director, "only 95 steelhead were counted at San Clemente Dam, and 21 passed over Los Padres Dam" this year.

Williams indicates the numbers are the lowest since 1994.

"It is obvious that if the recent trend in population continues," according to Williams, "the number of steelhead passing over San Clemente Dam will soon go to zero."

The Carmel River is the Monterey Peninsula's main water source. Cal Am delivers water to about 40,000 Peninsula customers.

Cut back more?

Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie said cutting back that much would severely impact water customers. Reducing pumping means "turning off the taps at homes and businesses throughout the Monterey Peninsula," she said.

Besides, she said, Peninsula residents use an average of only 70 gallons of water per person per day, considered to be the lowest in the state. The state average for water consumption is 192 gallons per person per day, while Sacramento residents use an average of 280 gallons per day, she said.

"To take this type of action before an alternate water supply is secured would be a great injustice to our customers who have done so much to save water," Bowie added.

Rationing could also have a serious impact on the Monterey Peninsula economy, as restaurants and hotels are forced to cut back

Though the Carmel River's steelhead trout population is classified as "threatened" under the Endangered Species Act, the species, *oncorhynchus mykiss*, is very common in rivers on the Pacific Coast of North America and around the world.

In January 2008, the state water board issued a draft cease and desist order calling for Cal Am to reduce pumping from the river by 15 to 50 percent within six years, but it has so far not imposed the order.

The Sierra Club's cease and desist request would act as an interim measure that would immediately help the steelhead population, Silver said.

Reducing pumping of the river would maintain flow in the steelhead's rearing habitat while allowing the fish to rear to the smolt stage, when they can make their journey to the ocean and avoid the "stress and mortality with being rescued and reared in artificial habitat," the Sierra Club said.

"Even for parts of the river that eventually go dry," according to the Sierra Club's request, "keeping water in the river longer will allow fish more time to grow before they are subjected to rescue."

Larger steelhead with better swimming ability can move better on their own away from the dry sections of the stream either into the lagoon downstream or the perennially wet habitat upstream, according to the Sierra Club.

Silver said the state water board has not yet responded to the notice, and no date has been set to hear the matter.

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Angry deer intimidate P.G. residents and dogs

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In the past several weeks, there have been five incidents of does squaring off with people and their pets.

"The deer are becoming move aggressive with people and dogs," said Elizabeth Conti-Yeo, P.G. animal control officer. "Because it's the fawning season, they perceive dogs as a threat or a predator."

The incidents have occurred in four different areas in P.G., including 11th Street and Ocean View Avenue, and Fourth Street and Central Avenue.

In one instance on Central Avenue, a deer aggressively stepped toward a couple walking their dog while drivers honked their horns to try stop the fearless doe.

So far, nobody has been injured by deer. But they can easily inflict injuries with their heads or hooves.

Conti-Yeo recommends people take a couple of precautionary measures when walking in P.G. with their dogs.

"We suggest people carry a walking stick to fan in front of them to keep the deer back, but not necessarily hit them,"

She also said people can put deer repellent in a spray bottle and use it on the deer if they come too close.

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
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Tests show CUSD schools in top 10 percent

STATE TEST scores released Thursday indicated three Carmel public schools improved over last year, while two experienced drops, but all finished in the 90th percentile. The Academic Performance Index ranks schools throughout the state and compares those that serve similar populations.

According to a report issued May 21 by Carmel Unified School District superintendent Marvin Biasotti, the district's overall score increased by 12 points, to 881. Tularcitos Elementary School students made the most progress, outdoing last year's score by 24 points to reach 928. Carmel Middle

School followed with a 22point gain over its 2007 score of 872, and Carmel High improved by 15 points, to 840. River School, already a high scorer, lost 12 points with a total 940, and Captain Cooper School in Big Sur dropped nine points from last year's score of 865.

All the schools exceeded the state target of 800 points, and all finished in the top 10 percent. River School topped the list in the 98th percentile (130th out of 5,776 elementary schools), CHS and Tularcitos were in the 95th (105th out of 1,954 and 264th out of 5,776, respectively), CMS was in the 94th (75th out of 1,354 middle schools) and Cooper was in the 90th, coming in 42nd out of 422 small elementary schools. Overall, the district placed in the top 97 percent, ranking 13th out of 387 unified school districts, according to Biasotti's report.

When ranked in comparison with schools that serve similar populations, CMS, River and Tularcitos remained in the top 10 percent, while CHS and Captain Cooper dropped into the top 20 percent. Biasotti lauded the students' and teachers' "excellent progress" toward the districtwide goal of having all schools ranked in the 90th percentile when compared with similar schools.

'Since 2004 (the baseline year when we set the goal), our schools have increased their similar-schools rankings by seven deciles for CHS, nine deciles for CMS, and one decile for Tular," Biasotti wrote. "When we initially set the goal, some questioned whether it was realistic for our secondary schools. The progress of those schools has been nothing short of remarkable."



Vocal duo brings harmonies, instruments and even a unicycle

SWEET AND lilting vocal harmonies and a quirky backing of musical instruments define the sound of Ma Muse, a California duo performing Friday, May 22, at the Big Sur Spirit Garden.

Showcasing the talents of Sarah Nutting and Karisha Longaker, Ma Muse blends folk, country, bluegrass and gospel influences to create a sound that is at once ethereal and down to earth.

"They're incredible," offered Jayson Fann, owner of the Spirit Garden. "They're currently traveling all around the country, performing at music festivals. They're highly accomplished musicians and vocalists, and they're very soulful."

Musically, Nutting and Longaker lean heavily on gospel-flavored harmonies,



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Chef Momo's Caribbean menu dazzles at Bahama Billy's

ANTHONY MOMO'S parents came from Bergamo and Piedmonte, Italy, in 1960 — which makes him a first-generation American, born in New York and raised in New Jersey.

So, with his culinary roots in Italy, it doesn't logically follow that for the past two years he's been executive chef/proprietor of Bahama Billy's, a Caribbean cuisine restau-

rant at The Barnyard. Nevertheless, it all came to pass quite naturally through a chain of events that carried him ever westward.

After going through school from kindergarten to 12th grade in Oradell, N.J. — just 30 minutes from Manhattan — Momo decided to attend Johnson & Wales School of Culinary Arts in Providence, R.I. He had worked in his parents' Italian-specialty gourmet delicatessen while he was growing up and felt at home in the kitchen.

At Johnson & Wales he completed a two-year curriculum in culinary arts, learning everything, from French technique, to service, while cooking in local American and Italian restaurants after classes.

Following graduation, he moved to Denver, Colo., to join his brother in several restaurant ventures. They first opened Cucina Colore, and then a second Italian restaurant they named Via. Chef Anthony did everything at the restaurants, from menu development, to operations, honing his chef/owner skills.

But during all this culinary activity, he didn't neglect his personal life, and in 1998 married his sweetheart, April, in the romantic ski resort of Vale.

Five years ago, little Anthony Jr. was born in Colorado with a heart defect. Because Denver's altitude exacerbated his condition, the Momos brought him to California in search

of the best medical treatment possible, which they found at Stanford University's hospital. Little Anthony is doing well with treatments there and is now a kindergarten student at Carmel's River School. A second son, Giancarlo, is a

preschooler.

Following a restaurant search up and down California, in April 2007, Anthony and April became owners of Bahama Billy's. Now April is a full-time mom and looks after the boys 24/7 while Anthony attends to the

restaurant.

Although Chef Anthony was not familiar with Caribbean cooking, he loved the concept and decided to continue what

founder Billy Quon started in 2001. "I wasn't about to reinvent things here," he said.

Jason White was executive chef with Quon for years and created virtually the whole successful menu. He stayed on for a month, when Momo bought the business, to demonstrate preparation to him and his sous chef, Joaquin Figuero.

Now Momo and Figuero try out and taste new recipes, and when they hit on something good, they continue with that concept. "I work out the specials of the day with Joaquin," he said. "We use only the freshest fish and produce, and buy them daily from Pacific Harvest and Del Monte Produce."

Although he's involved with the kitchen every day (with a total staff of 10), Chef Anthony now is more in the front of

Perfecting pasta, rat-a-too-e, cherries jubilee and Cannery Row partying

soup to nuts

SOMETIMES, THERE'S nothing more satisfying than a really good bowl of pasta or a perfectly prepared panino. Fortunately, the Monterey Peninsula is home to a number of Italian eateries, but separating the best from the rest can be a challenging — though quite enjoyable — task. While this column hardly professes to do that, it can highlight a few to put on your must-visit list.

For eating out, check out Joe Rombi's

charming La Mia Cucina on 17th Street in Pacific Grove. The lively restaurant, adorned with beautiful gigantic vintage prints, is

consistently good, from the bruschetta and focaccia served with olive oil and vinegar, to the strawberry shortcake that wins hearts no matter how full people's bellies are. Favorites include sand dabs, basil steak, and traditional and creative Italian specialties. Add to that a well appointed wine list, a gracious and hospitable Rombi, and a devoted and knowledgeable waitstaff, and it's hard to go wrong.

But Joe Rombi's is only open for dinner, which is why anyone in need of lunch or takeout (including entrées that can be finished in the oven at home) should not overlook Rombi's La Piccola Casa next door. In addition to good pizza served by the slice and the generous garden salad served with Rombi's signature dressing, La Piccola Casa offers a good selection of panini, a few salads, and eight pizzas adorned with tantalizing toppings like a blend of caramelized onions and leeks, wild mushrooms sautéed with onions and garlic, and various meats and cheeses. Calamari, sand dabs, a soup of the day, a pasta of the day, eggplant Parmesan and several desserts round out the menu, which tops out at \$13.95.

La Mia Cucina, 208 17th St., is open from 5 p.m. onward Wednesday through Sunday and can be reached at (831) 373-2416, while

La Piccola Casa, located at 212 17th St., is open Wednesday through Sunday from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. and can be reached by calling (831) 373-0129. For more information, visit www.joerombi.com.

Meanwhile, for eating in, get the tastiest pasta while doing the least amount of work by visiting Noe Manzano Cano, who owns and runs The Pasta Palate in Carmel. In business for a quarter century, the pasta maker supplies many local restaurants and resorts but also sells directly to the public.

Selections change daily, but customers are certain to find something to take home, whether it be the lemon pepper angel hair, tomato

basil fettuccini, scallion linguini, garlic tagliarini or plain pappardelle. In fact, the shop offers 18 flavors of noodles, as well as fusilli, penne, shells and sheets.

For the the freezer, the crew regularly prepares ravioli of three cheeses and spinach, butternut squash, artichoke, smoked salmon, seafood/crab, and goat cheese, as well as tricolor cheese tortellini. Other seasonal offerings and Noe's creations, like curry chicken, occasionally appear, and to make life really easy, he also sells marinara sauce, basil pesto and grated Parmesan cheese.

The Pasta Palate is located at the back of Stonehouse Terrace on the west side of San Carlos Street between Seventh and Eighth avenues, and is open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. For more information, call (831) 625-6508.

They recommend tasting before buying, as flavor and sweetness vary, and selecting plump, shiny fruit with fresh

green stems. Toss damaged or bruised cherries, and store the good ones unwashed, loosely covered in the coldest part of the fridge, or freeze them on cookie sheets and bag them for snacking in hot weather or munching in the dark of winter.



A writer who always has a project or two in the works, Hanger embarked on "Carmel's Heroes" in April, researching the fallen men through the local history room at the library, Carmel Pine Cone and Monterey Peninsula Herald articles and obituaries, the Internet, military records, genealogy, U.S. Census information, government reports and surviving family members. She learned about their units' histories and battles, and the men's service to their country.

As is often the case in historical records, Hanger found inconsistencies and inaccuracies in obituaries, personal accounts, and even government documents, but she carefully

decided what information could be considered the most reliable in conveying the men's stories.

"I took military records as being pretty accurate, and there usually were official logs of daily activities that I found were relatively reliable," she said. "The accounts are as accurate as I could make them."

In fact, she even found a few errors on the memorial stone itself. William Junkins' name is misspelled "Jenkins," and William Plein is listed incorrectly as belonging to the Marine Corps instead of the U.S. Army Air Force, while Frederick McIndoe's service is listed as U.S. Army Air Force instead of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Her writing illuminates the lives of men who perished more than six decades ago. At the time, many people did not discuss such tragedies, she recalled — not even her child-

hood friend, Linda Bain, whose brother had died.

"The two Dekker girls were in high school when their father, William Dekker, was killed," she added. "My husband dated one of them and he never knew her father was at that time missing in action and later declared dead. It really wasn't talked about."

Hanger said the efforts of researching and writing their stories have paid off already, even though many have yet to read "Carmel's Heroes."

"It was an exercise that expanded who I am immensely — I gained so much understanding of the actuality of what those men were doing when they were killed," Hanger said. "They all had hopes and dreams, they had family at home, children

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

at home, teenagers. I have had a hole in my heart for my brother since he died, but I gained a whole family of men and their families by recognizing what every single family went through."

She recalled the story of Bill Dickinson, who enlisted in the Merchant Marine because he "didn't want to hold a gun and kill someone," she said. He was assigned to a munitions ship as an oiler, and on Dec. 2. 1943, German Luftwaffe bombers attacked the harbor installations and ships at Bari, Italy, resulting in more than 1,000 dead and injured.

"Seaman Dickinson was among the casualties," Hanger wrote. "His obituary in The Carmel Pine Cone-Cymbal pictured him through these words: 'A cultured idealist, deeply imbued with a love of fine literature and music, an accomplished cellist and member of the Carmel Orchestra, Bill Dickinson was also a zealous worker toward the betterment of living conditions for the common man"

Hanger said the war stories may be decades old but are in many ways timeless.

"The citizens of Carmel hold these lost servicemen in the highest love and respect for their heroism and selfless devotion to their country in its time of greatest crisis. Twenty families felt their loss then, and still today these men are missed by family and friends. Their stories are poignant and inspiring, and although some remain elusive, their sacrifice is of no less consequence," she wrote in the conclusion of "Carmel's Heroes."

"Our hope has been to lift the names of these men up from the dusty records of history and refresh them with the color of their lives, remember them among their family and friends, hear of their hopes and dreams, honor their bravery and sacrifice with a sense of unbounded admiration and gratitude," she continued.

"Fred Bechdolt's words, however, touch us with the true spirit of the youth and dreams of these young men: 'And in the long run we will always find the greatest pride in remembering those who blossomed so quickly into the splendor of fighting manhood as they were when we saw them among us."

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Editorial

Misrepresenting the future

MAY 15 was the 120th anniversary of the opening of the Eiffel Tower, an event worth noting in these pages because of the remarkable similarity of the debate over the tower to our local development controversies.

As hard as it may seem to believe from the distance of more than a century
— and with the Eiffel Tower universally acclaimed all that time as one of the
world's most beautiful and elegant structures — when it was proposed, and even
as it was being built, the Eiffel Tower was reviled by numerous prominent
French architects and decried by many of the leading citizens of Paris.

According to Jill Jonnes, author of a new book, "Eiffel's Tower," opposition to the tower was particularly fierce among the upscale and politically connected residents of the streets overlooking the grounds where the Eiffel Tower was to be built. When they failed to stop it from being approved, several of them even sued, objecting to having the tower imposed on their views of the Paris skyline and claiming the colossal iron tower would degrade the value of their homes!

Their laughable shortsightedness and ignorance may have set an all-time record, but the opportunistic habit of predicting doom and gloom by people who aren't getting their way through the democratic process is something that happens a lot more nowadays than in the 19th century. And it happens in Monterey County all the time.


Some outstanding examples:

- In 1998, when the climbing lane was proposed for Highway 1 between Carmel Valley Road and Ocean Avenue, proponents of a freeway through Hatton Canyon bitterly opposed the lane, predicting it would do nothing to improve the gridlock that tied up roads at the mouth of the valley every afternoon. In fact, the climbing lane would make the traffic congestion worse, they confidently foretold. They were wrong on both counts.
- The next year, when a Carmel coffee shop owner asked for permission to sell soup and sandwiches, opponents said his request, if approved, would lead to the ruination of downtown Carmel. Litter would be everywhere and fast food restaurants would soon invade, they said. Neither of those things happened, of course.
- The addition of 73 homes to Spreckles, proposed in 2003 by the owner of adjacent agricultural land, would destroy the town, opponents said. The homes have since been built, and Spreckles is still a very nice place.

Because the state's environmental laws are stacked so heavily in their favor, opponents of anything usually get their way. That encourages them to oppose even the most worthwhile projects.

But, so common are predictions of wreckage and ruin, and so infrequently do they contain even a grain of truth, they can almost always be safely ignored.

DUI names should be reported Dear Editor,

After reading your May 15 editorial, "How important is a DUI?" I found my blood pressure rising almost to a boil.

In my opinion, choosing not to report the name of a person arrested for DUI is, at minimum, an "enabling" response to a serious incident. Reporting the name of every prominent person and even the common man/woman might become another deterrent to someone's poor choice to drive after drinking.

You also suggested that a first-time DUI is a relatively minor event. Let me take a moment to give you some statistics that indicate otherwise: According to a 2008 AAA poll, 88 percent of respondents felt that drunk driving is a "serious" traffic safety concern. The Pine Cone view seems to be in the minority.

Rating drunk driving as a minor event might be a gross understatement, considering it costs the public more than \$100 billion every year. In 2007, 31.6 percent of 41,059 fatalities occurred in crashes in which at least one driver or non-occupant had a BAC .08 or greater (12,998 deaths).

In California, the resulting deaths num-

bered 1,290 in 2006.

Granted, Marvin Biasotti was not in an accident, but a few feet or miles down the road the possibility of an accident was there if he had not been stopped. Think about the potential that his choice to drive after drinking could have caused the death of a Carmel Unified School District student.

A person with even a .08 percent BAC will have typical effects of muscle coordination becoming poor (e.g. balance, speech, vision, reaction time) and have harder ability to detect danger. A person's judgment, self-control, reasoning, and memory are impaired.

I believe the local media's choice not to report names of DUI arrests constitutes an enabling action. "Oh, don't worry, no one will find out about my arrest."

I do not get the Herald or consistently watch local news, so I needed to review the Herald's reporting on the Biasotti affair. The reporting tended to be fair. Article placement — front page — seemed appropriate considering Biasotti's prominence in the community.

I have had the opportunity work with Biasotti on several occasions and have the utmost respect for his ability to manage and negotiate in highly charged meetings. He was always able to validate opposing views and find a reasonably acceptable solution. Having said that, I can separate my high regard for his professional skills and his outside of work choices that affect the safety of others.

After learning of Bates' death Thursday morning, Mayor Sue McCloud told The Pine Cone he "set the tone as the town jester" with his humorous insight into Carmel life.


"Bill was able to define Carmel with all its unique points and step back, and not poke fun at it," McCloud said, "but highlight how different we are and how hard we work to remain different in our village.'

Bates' cartoons first appeared in The Pine Cone in 1972. Dennis Renault, Bates' longtime friend and a former Sacramento Bee political cartoonist who lives in Monterey, called him the "consummate freelancer, funny," and "astoundingly productive."

"His cartoons for The Pine Cone had a gentle touch but were satiric at the same time," Renault said, "poking fun at Carmel's tourists, residents, culture vultures and businesses

Bates' prominence in the village led the Carmel City Council in 1998 to make a zoning change in town declaring a "Bill Bates Humor Overlay District," a perpetual 2-foot radius around the personage of Bates.

"Those within the district are prohibited from having a bad day, are required to smile, and most importantly, are required to understand the punch line," according to then-

Mayor Ken White, who signed the proclamation.

Among his diverse endeavors, Bates had a career as a shipboard cartoonist, making numerous round-the-world voyages on luxury cruise ships. In 2000, he embarked on one such trip on the prestigious Queen Elizabeth II with his daughter, Chelsea, then 7, and Lei Lei, documenting the QE2's 106-day voyage around the world.

Bates noted that the atmosphere on the QE2 was formal and "very British."

He told a Pine Cone reporter after the cruise that if he had to pay for the cabin that he and his family called home, it would have cost \$267,000.

When Bates returned to his Carmel condo from the long trip, he found an eviction notice on his door because his landlord decided to sell the unit.

Bates also traveled with the Royal Viking cruise line and produced 23 cruise sketchbooks. He published several books of his cartoons, including several featuring Pine Cone cartoons and another entitled, "San Francisco, City by the

In the early 1960s, Bates illustrated the comic "Ping" for the San Francisco Examiner. He later wrote cartoons for The Big Sur Gazette.

Bates also painted what was dubbed the "zodiac love poster," which he later said many people had copied without giving him credit.

According to various accounts, Bates graduated from the University of Texas with a degree in advertising. Bates' career also included a stint as art director at an advertising agency, a technical illustrator and years of portrait work. Just before he became ill, Bates worked at Trader Joe's in Pacific Grove, including illustrating the grocery store's signs.

In 2006, Bates' cartoons made news when the U.S. Postal Service's "retail standardization team," unceremoniously removed his cartoons from the Carmel Post Office.

The move sparked anger from some Carmel residents and prompted former Carmel City Councilwoman Barbara Livingston to ask U.S. Rep. Sam Farr to intervene. Post office officials later placed some of the cartoons back in the building, where they remain on display.

Bates' friend, David Loye, who published a Bates book mocking President George W. Bush and had just begun working on his memoirs with the artist before his heart attack, said Bates was "sympathetic, caring and always ready to help."

"Such a great talent as an artist and as a friend rarely comes our way," Loye said. "He will be mourned and missed for a long time by all of us."

As a younger man, Bates traveled extensively throughout the South Pacific, including Fiji, where the people and the island itself remained close to his heart.

In early 2008, he recounted to Pine Cone employees his joy of discovering a long-lost son in his late 30s who lived in New Zealand.

Meanwhile, Loye said The Friends of Bill Bates, created to help raise money to pay for Bates' medical bills and other expenses, is meeting to discuss how to help Lei Lei and Chelsea.

The Carmel Art Association is organizing an art auction June 28 with books and Bates' originals' as a fundraiser for Chelsea's York School tuition.

"This will be especially meaningful to Bill, for I cannot help but feel he will still hover among us for a while," Loye said.

Carmel Pine Cone publisher Paul Miller, who has known Bates for 12 years, said he will be "impossible to replace."

"Bill was always a wonderful presence in our newsroom, and on the pages of The Pine Cone," Miller said. "He will be truly missed by all of us, and by our readers."

Before he was ill, nearly every week Bates visited The Pine Cone office and dropped off his artwork for that week's edition. He was always good natured and lighthearted.

Lei Lei said Bates remained a loyal follower of the newspaper and requested she read it to him every week. Bates was nominated twice by The Pine Cone for the Pulitzer Prize.

"Bill loved The Pine Cone," she said.

Several years ago, Bates began submitting cartoons to the Monterey County Herald. Departing from the colorful local subjects that were his specialty in The Pine Cone, he began tackling national political topics. He wasn't paid by the Herald, but it was hoped the exposure would help Bates' cartoons become syndicated to help him earn extra money. Unfortunately, that didn't happen.

Lei Lei said Bates requested his body be cremated and his ashes scattered in Carmel and in Fiji. Plans for a memorial service are pending.

Renault said his old friend will be remembered with other prominent cartoonists who have passed away.

"The laughter and joy generated by Bates' cartoons," Renault said, "put him in a comfortable spot within the memorial pantheon of Peninsula cartoonists like Jo Mora, Hank Ketcham, Eldon Dedini, Gus Arriola, Bob Barnes, and others who have gone to the great inkwell in the sky."



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


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
