WHEN A patron of the SPCA Benefit Shop on Carmel Rancho Lane bought a nice looking urn, the person ended up with more than an objet d'art. The piece still contained the ashes of a previous owner's family member, and the surprised buyer notified the shop, which called the Monterey County Sheriff's Office June 10.

'We get in so many donations, and a lot of people just drop off boxes and bags, so we don't know where the urn came from," SPCA spokeswoman Beth Brookhouser explained. "We contacted the sheriff's office to turn it over to them in hopes they could get the remains back to where they

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Beekeeper saves day for homeowner, hive

HER HOUSE was riddled with termites, and Big Sur resident Belinda Shoemaker needed to call an exterminator.

But tenting the house would also mean killing a colony of bees that were living in the roof — something she could not bring herself

But how do you get rid of thousands of honey bees in an inaccessible part of your house? Shoemaker did the time-honored Big Sur thing, and asked her neighbors to lend her a hand. But only after failing to get professional help: At the beginning of June, she contacted bee experts, television and radio stations, and even posted an ad on Craigslist. Unfortunately, she couldn't find anyone willing or able to take the bees away.

"Nobody wanted to make the journey to Big Sur," Shoemaker explained.

So Shoemaker started passing the word around Big Sur, and one of her neighbors, Blake Forrest, who turned out to be an amateur beekeeper, offered to help.

Neighbors to the rescue

A few days later, Forrest showed up Shoemaker's home, which overlooks Pfeiffer Beach. He brought along his two children — 16year-old Grace and 9-year-old Nandi — as well as another bee-savvy neighbor, Jack Koch, and another local youngster, 11-year-old Ryan

Dressed from head to toe in protective "bee wear," Forrest, Koch and Grace spent much of June 9 gaining access to Shoemaker's bees and moving them into bee boxes. Meanwhile, Shoemaker and the two youngsters safely watched the operation from inside the house.

Shoemaker's bee colony was located under her roof, so a few

Jury: Seaside florist did not cause RLS fire

FOLLOWING A two-week trial, a jury decided Monday that a small Seaside florist was not responsible for a 2007 fire that destroyed the Pebble Beach home of Robert Louis Stevenson School's headmaster.

Hartford Casualty Insurance Company paid RLS and its headmaster, Joe Wandke, for their losses in the April 26, 2007, fire. And then Hartford sued the flower shop, Design One Environments, claiming the florist caused the fire by putting an accent lamp close to a ficus

But a jury in a Monterey courtroom decided the florist, owned by Debbie and Jim Bovenzi, was not negligent and didn't cause the blaze.

"I think justice was served," Debbie Bovenzi told The Pine Cone after the verdict. "It was very frustrating for the last two years to have this [lawsuit] looming over us."

The Bovenzis were defended in the case by their insurance company, State Farm.

In the suit, filed Jan. 16, 2008, Hartford sought to reclaim \$2,080,367 it compensated

Supervisors agree to join search for regional water solution

THE MONTEREY County Board of Supervisors voted last week to collaborate with two other water agencies to study a plan for a regional water supply.

The memorandum supervisors approved Tuesday forges a partnership between the Monterey County Water Resources Agency, the Monterey Regional Water Pollution Control Agency and the Marina Coast Water

"We just made history," said Supervisor Lou Calcagno following approval of the agreement. "This is the first time there has been a regional plan put together in this county, and I think we should all be congrat-

The agreement will allow the agencies to work toward a water project that could ultimately mean a drought-free supply for the Monterey Peninsula and other areas including North Monterey County.

A publicly owned regional plan would include a variety of water projects, such as a desalination plant in North Marina, wastewater recycling and underground storage.

A regional plan is an alternative to California American Water's proposed Coastal Water Project, which would include a desal plant in Moss Landing.

The idea of a regional water plan has been

in the works since 2007, when a coalition now called Water for Monterey County was formed. The group meets every month in

Some critics, including Calcagno, have been leery of the group's intentions, contending the plan would not provide any water to North Monterey County and would divert water from Salinas Valley to the Monterey

But Calcagno said the memorandum of understanding supervisors approved last Tuesday would entitle "North County to be a vital part" of a regional water plan.

Supervisors were set to vote on the agreement in April when farmers, landowners and environmentalists opposed it, citing water rights and other issues.

Since then, Calcagno and county officials met with slow-growth group LandWatch and others to revise the memorandum.

Monterey County Water Resources Agency executive director Curtis Weeks said Tuesday the agency would ensure water rights were respected.

'Our job will be to protect every pumper in the basin," Weeks said.

On July 13, the California Public Utilities Commission is scheduled to weigh in on an environmental impact report that analyzes the coastal water project and the regional project drawn up by Water for Monterey

County.

At the June 16 meeting, just before supervisors were to consider the water agreement, the plan was in jeopardy of falling apart after Weeks proposed making last-minute changes that would have redefined some of agreement's language.

The proposed 11th-hour revisions prompted sharp criticism.

"I'm disappointed with the process today," LandWatch interim executive director Amy White told the supervisors. "Presenting changes last minute before the board vote is inappropriate."

Monterey County Farm Bureau executive director Bob Perkins said he was "alarmed" by the last-minute changes and suggested removing the revisions.

After the outcry, Water Resources Agency member Steve Collins admitted the changes were a mistake.

Fifth District Supervisor Dave Potter

"An 11th-hour change does not seem to me the proper way to go about good government," Potter said.

The supervisors approved the plan after the new language was stricken.

MPWMD files appeal challenging judge's decision over ecoresort

DEVELOPER ED Ghandour has encountered yet another legal speed bump in his quest to build a \$300 million ecoresort in Sand City.

Monterey Peninsula Water Management District this week appealed a judge's order that the district issue a water permit for Ghandour's proposed Monterey Bay Shores Ecoresort.

Ghandour, whose company, Security National Guaranty, Inc., is based in San Francisco, called the water district's move 'frivolous."

"It seems their action is more than just a concern for water," Ghandour told The Pine Cone Wednesday. "But evidence of the district's desire to stop the ecoresort while hiding behind water.'

Ghandour said he believed the appellate court would also rule in his favor. The appeal, approved by MPWMD directors, was filed in the Sixth District Court of Appeal in

"We are very confident the court will once again side with us and reflect the right side of the law," Ghandour said. "And we also expect sanctions against the district."

The 161-room ecoresort would be located across Highway 1 from Seaside High School on land that has long been zoned for a hotel. It would use state-of-the-art technology, including wind and solar power, to conserve resources, according to Ghandour.

The appeal by the water district, means more delays and more money spent, he

"It clearly demonstrates the abuse and disregard the [water] district has for the courts," Ghandour said.

During the April hearing before Monterey County Superior Court Judge Roger Randall, attorneys for the MPWMD argued water from the Seaside Aquifer would occasionally be commingled with water from the Carmel River, thereby having an impact on the Monterey Peninsula's overall water sup-

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City considers beach fire ban

BANNING BEACH fires will be the hot topic of discussion at a Carmel Forest and Beach Commission meeting next Thursday afternoon, according to city forester Mike Branson. The issue, which pits people who favor recreational bonfires against those who say they pollute and dirty the white sands, was recently raised by city councilwoman Paula Hazdovac.

"Why are we not looking at banning fires

on the beach?" she asked at the May 27 discussion of the city budget. "We're always going to be paying for cleaning it up.'

Her suggestion resonates with people like Carmel Residents Association member Skip Lloyd, who has long complained of the negative impacts of charcoal and other burned debris. In the past, he has provided stacks of photos showing expanses of charred wood and formerly pristine white sands tinted a

Cantinetta Luca loses menu monitor

A TRENDY Italian restaurant on Dolores Street can no longer use a video screen to advertise its menu and sister restaurant, the Carmel Design Review Board, which the city plans to dissolve, decided Wednesday.

Cantinetta Luca owner David Fink had already removed the TV from the alcove beside the restaurant's front door and replaced it with paper menus by the time the board made the ruling.

Assistant city planner Marc Wiener said the code-enforcement officer told him about the monitor six months ago.

"With regards to signs, the municipal code encourages avoiding 'unsightly, bizarre and/or out-of-scale visual impacts, including exterior lighting and lights from window displays," he wrote in his June 24 report for the board. "The code also recommends prohibiting, 'business signs incorporating lights, luminous or fluorescent paints, or movement."

He concluded the TV screen is inconsistent with the code and recommended denial. Neither the restaurant's owner, nor any

other member of the public, commented at the hearing.

Board member Michael Lynch pointed out that a few other businesses, such as realtors, use video screens to attract attention,

"We shouldn't allow it," DRB member Keith Paterson agreed. "But then, I think we should take action against others that are in town. Otherwise, I don't think it's fair.'

Board member Jonathan Sapp described his feelings as "mixed" and said he could see using a video display if it was simply an electronic version of the menu, though other board members doubted content could be restricted and monitored if such screens were permitted.

Chairman Michael LePage cited the city's desire for more "low-tech presentations" and questioned whether a TV monitor would

Sapp wondered what could be done about

'That's up to the city," LePage replied, and the board unanimously voted to deny Fink's application to keep the video screen outside his Dolores Street restaurant.

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
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

Farr seeks increase in Medicare payments for local doctors

NEW LEGISLATION that would increase the Medicare reimbursement rate for physicians could attract more doctors to the Monterey Peninsula, making it easier for local seniors to find healthcare, according to Rep. Sam Farr, who introduced the bill.

Farr maintains the cost of living in Monterey County is similar to urban areas such as Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Yet, according to a rating system from the 1960s, Medicare reimbursements are 12 percent to 24 percent lower for doctors in Monterey and a dozen other California counties than in more densely populated parts of the state.

That has created a shortage of doctors in the county willing to accept the governmentrun Medicare plan, which provides healthcare to seniors at little or no cost to them.

"As a consequence," said Anthony Chavis, Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula's vice president of medical affairs, "a growing number of patients who have government-funded healthcare are finding it difficult, if not impossible, to find primary care physicians willing to accept them into their practice."

In an interview in February, CHOMP president and CEO Steven Packer told The Pine there had been a "disturbing trend" in the lack of primary care physicians on the Peninsula

It's hoped that if Medicare increases its reimbursement rate, the physician pool will increase as more doctors are given an incentive to work in Monterey County.

"This bill will correct a glaring oversight and ensure that our families have the health coverage they need and the choice they deserve," Farr said in a statement. The bill, called the GPCI Justice Act, would not affect the reimbursement formula itself, but it would force the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid services — the agency that oversees Medicare — to update its geographic designations, which would put Monterey County into a higher-reimbursement category.

Designations would be immediately updated, and then reviewed every three years in order to keep reimbursements in line, according to the Farr's bill.

Medicare also compensates doctors less in Santa Cruz and San Benito counties.

Some doctors in Monterey County even turn away lower-paying Medicare patients in favor of those with higher-paying insurance.

"When reimbursements from Medicare and other government-payer sources barely cover the expense of running a private office practice," Chavis said, "few doctors are willing to continue providing that care at such a steeply discounted rate."

Doctors who accept Medicare are paid according a formula called the Geographic Practice Cost Index, which was drawn up in 1966 and designated counties either "rural" or "urban," with the expectation those designations would be updated every few years. But those updates never happened.

The shortage of doctors on the Peninsula is severe enough that CHOMP is opening a primary care physician center at the Crossroads shopping center it says will be able to treat thousands of new patients.

The hospital hopes to attract doctors to the clinic by paying them substantial salaries and even subsidizing their housing.

Farr said he hopes the bill will be incorporated into the comprehensive health care reform proposed by President Barack

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Karl W. Kunz, Capt. USN Ret.

January 27, 1916 – June 15, 2009

MONTEREY – Karl Kunz passed away on Monday, June 15, 2009 at the age of 93, 22 years to the day that his beloved Mary, wife of 47 years, passed away. He met and married Mary in 1939 while stationed in San Diego.

Karl was born in Kentucky to Lena and Charles Kunz, where his father worked in the coal mines. The family then moved to southern Illinois, where he was raised. As a teenager growing up during the Great Depression, he would ride the rails throughout the neighboring states during the summer months, finding work to help support his family.

Rising from these simple roots, Karl truly attained the "American Dream". His many accomplishments, service to his country, success as a businessman, husband and father, perfectly represent what it is to be an American.

After graduating from high school, he enlisted in the Navy and served our country for 23 years. As a Mustang, he rose from a MOMM1C to commissioned Ensign, retiring as a Captain. Karl was in Submarine Service in the Pacific Fleet and during his career served on the USS Lexington, Talbot, S-27, Scorpion, Snook, Blueback, Brill, Capitane, Boarfish, Segundo, Medregal, Mingo, and the Redfish, serving in 10 submarine war patrols. Karl was a decorated WWII veteran and received a Bronze Star "V" Medal for heroic and meritorious service during action in enemy-controlled waters. He was credited in this citation for sinking over 26,000 tons and damaging over 6,000 tons of enemy warships. He also received the following medals: American Defense - one Star, American Theater, Asiatic-Pacific Area - one Star, Philippine Campaign — one Star, World War II Victory Medal, Submarine Combat Pin (one Silver and one Bronze Star) and National Defense Service Medal. Karl attended George Washington University under the Holloway Plan. He was XO on the Medregal and worked on the Loon Missile launch program at Pt. Mugu. In May of '55 Karl trained a Japanese crew on the re-commissioned Mingo. After completion of their training, the Mingo was turned over to the Japanese. In October '55 he became Commanding Officer of the USS Redfish and in September '57 he was appointed Squadron 3 Engineer.

He owned and farmed an orange grove with the help of his brother-in-law, Ozzie Pollett, during the '50's in Camarillo, CA. Since boyhood, Karl loved hunting and fishing and introduced son, Rusty, to his favorite outdoor activities. Much to his eldest daughter's aversion, the family ate everything he caught or shot!

After retiring from the Navy in 1959, he worked at Lockheed on the Polaris missile program in Sunnyvale, CA. Karl moved his family to Carmel Valley in 1962, after purchasing the Carmel Valley Egg Ranch, which he and Mary ran for over four years. Finding it difficult to retire, Karl bought the Valley Hills Liquor store in Carmel Valley and Terrace Liquors in Seaside, which he and Mary operated for several years. He was also a Real Estate Broker on the Peninsula, keeping active well into his 70s.

When daughter, Dani (at the age of 5), fell in love with horses, he became active in the Carmel Valley Trail and Saddle Club until she left for college. Karl had been a member of the Elks in Monterey and the Carmel River Steelhead Association. He was active in the Sub-Vets of WWII, which then merged with US Submarine Veterans Association.


Karl married Doris Cooley of Pacific Grove in 1988. They lived in Pacific Grove, were active in their church and particularly enjoyed square dancing. Her death preceded his by two years.

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
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T-ball is baseball coach's new passion

would-be pros, Mike Kelly turned his attention to a level of baseball that rarely makes the headlines — t-ball.

"If you keep them busy, they all want to learn, but if they're standing around, that's when things start to go awry," said Kelly, whose 6-year-old son, Nicholas, plays on the Red Wings, the Carmel Youth Baseball team he coaches.

Kelly, who is married and also has two 4-year-old daughters, was pressed into duty by the league due to a shortage of coaches. A big fan of Carmel Youth Baseball, Kelly was happy to lend a hand.

"It's a great family atmosphere that gets everybody involved," said Kelly, who played baseball, football and basketball at Carmel High, and baseball and football at UC Berkeley. "The ultimate goal professed by Carmel Youth Baseball is, 'Show the kids a good time, and they'll play again next year.""

Instead of teaching players about the finer points of baseball, Kelly is sticking to the basics.

"We're just teaching them things like how to hold a bat," he explained.

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Motorcycle fans rushing to Peninsula for Laguna grand prix

THERE WON'T be any fireworks drawing crowds to the Monterey waterfront next weekend, but Laguna Seca is a different

The Monterey Peninsula's biggest — and

fastest and loudest - event will be held Independence Day weekend, when more than 100,000 fans are expected to watch the MotoGP world championship and the American national championship motorcycle races at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca. Featuring top racers from around the globe

and a handful of contestants from closer to home, the Red Bull U.S. Grand Prix begins with a free day Thursday and culminates with three races Sunday.

On July 2, former world champions Eddie Lawson, Wayne Rainey and Kenny Roberts Sr. will take on reigning champ Valentino Rossi in four-wheeled SuperKarts. The 250cc karts are quick and agile, making for great racing, and the exhibition will be the first time all four legends are on the track

Rossi holds eight Grand Prix world titles and had his first win at Laguna last year, after which he jumped off his Yamaha and kissed the Corkscrew. His three challengers all have multiple victories under their belts, as well, and Rainey — who lives locally and is a huge proponent of Laguna and grand prix motorcycle racing there — will operate a kart equipped with hand controls, given his paralysis below the waist.

Later that day, pro racers, their teams and members of the media will hit the track, but with pedal power instead of horsepower at their disposal. Specialized Bicycles will bring a trailer full of state-of-the-art road bicycles, support gear — and expertise.

Everyone is invited to watch the Thursday events at no cost.

Friday, July 3, will feature practice sessions for all three classes of AMA Pro Racing: SuperSport (for up-and-coming racers between the ages of 16 and 21), Daytona SportBike (featuring a large field of pro racers on a wide variety of motorcycles) and American SuperBike (utilizing the fastest bikes), as well as MotoGP practice.

The American SuperBike roster includes Carmel Valley resident Hawk Mazzotta, a devoted and tireless racer riding a Suzuki for Team Aussie Racing. Having competed on two wheels since he was a teenager, Mazzotta, now in his mid-20s, spent the winter working in order to help finance his efforts. He finished in 12th place at the end of last year's racing season and, despite missing the June 5-7 races at Road America in

was delayed after neighbor Bart Hancock complained about traffic and parking in the neighborhood, arguing the plans did not comply with the county's zoning and environmental rules.

The county's involvement also triggered a water-use survey and the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District's subsequent requirement of \$14,000 in watersaving fixtures on the campus.

Because of Hancock's complaints, county planning officials asked the school for a traffic analysis, and as a result, several measures designed to better accommodate parents as they drop off and pick up their children were added to the project, including a loading zone for buses and cars on Monte Verde Street and the elimination of the turnout on 15th Avenue. New striping, crosswalks and signs would also be installed.

But consultants and Carmel Unified School District officials were unable to come up with the minimum 110 parking spots the county said were required by local rules. (The state only requires 58.5, and the school plans call for 66.) County planner Elizabeth Gonzales recommended the planning commission "allow modifications of parking requirements due to the unusual characteristics of the site."

She also recommended it approve the rest of the project, including the 3,232-squarefoot classroom wing to replace three of the portable classrooms and the 5,400-squarefoot multipurpose auditorium to replace the other three temporary classrooms.

Representing the district, attorney Anthony Lombardo said the improvements will not increase enrollment at the school, which is already near capacity, and he objected to describing the traffic situation as

"In the last 19 years, there has been one accident, where someone backing out of a driveway bumped another car," he said.

Monterey County Superior Court Judge Adrienne Grover, whose child attended River School for six years, urged the commission to approve plans that would improve the school, including ingress and egress.

"The real parties of interest here are students ages 5 to 11 who do stand to benefit from the project," she said.

Many other parents pleaded with the commission to let the long delayed, bondfunded work commence, arguing that the children deserve well lit, high-tech, nicely ventilated classrooms, as well as the right to eat lunch and attend assemblies together inside. The current multipurpose room is not large enough for the 470 students to use at the same time, and kids eat lunch outside, often in cold and drizzle.

And then there are the seagulls.

"I was shocked one day when I was in the office, and a child came in crying, because his lunch had been stolen by a bird," said music teacher Mildred Kline. The gull had

taken the whole bag — a not-uncommon occurrence.

"They are well trained, attend that school regularly and are always on time," Kline said of the seagulls.

A young girl recalled the time one of the birds stole her lunch when her back was turned and ate it with its cronies on the roof, and she said attending class in a portable required leaving her lunch box and backpack outside.

"It would get wet," she said. "I would like a real classroom."

Her older brother, a fifth grader, said it seems unfair that students at other CUSD campuses can eat indoors, while those at River School don't.

Parent Gary Langford added, "The issue here is one of sacrifice," with parents and members of the community making sacrifices for the benefit of their children. "Some people bear the brunt of sacrifice more than others.'

Rep. Sam Farr, who lives near the school, submitted a letter in favor of the project.

"As to complaints about traffic, I heard those same concerns when the school was built, again when my sister attended the school in the 1950s, and yet again was I was county supervisor for the 5th District," he wrote, adding that traffic is at its worst only for a short time in the morning and a short time in the afternoon on weekdays

Only Hancock, in person and in writing, stated objections to the project, though he said he does not oppose the district's efforts to improve the school facilities. He questioned the location of parking spaces and an ADA-accessible ramp.

Planning commissioner Jay Brown remained unconvinced the new parking plan would provide much relief.

"It's a mess," he said. "I was disappointed that the applicant couldn't come up with more pickup and drop-off space."

Nonetheless, he and the rest of the commissioners unanimously approved the project, citing the need for the improvements on campus and asking parents to be extra courteous when driving through the neighbor-

"The concerns of neighbors around the school are valid," said commissioner Matthew Ottone. "I want to make sure parents understand that even though it's 15 or 20 minutes in the morning and 15 or 20 minutes in the afternoon, it is a challenge."

"The real issue is the classrooms," added commissioner Cosme Padilla. "They're going to improve the education of the kids. The traffic is going to be there, whether you like it or not."

RLS and the Wandkes for the loss of their 3,700-square-foot house and personal possessions. The Wandkes lived in the house, built in 1959, for about 24 years.

During the trial in Monterey County Superior Court, Hartford attorney Scott Loewe tried to convince the jury the fire was caused because Design One employees who took care of the plants at the Wandkes' home — by placing an accent lamp too close to a ficus plant, which caused the foliage to catch fire.

But attorney Dennis Howell, representing Design One and State Farm, argued the fire began when a reading lamp in the master bedroom shorted out, igniting a sofa.

"Somehow, the reading lamp shorted and created resistance heating, and a spark ignit-

ed the back of that couch," Howell told The Pine Cone Monday. "That was the only scenario that made any sense."

Hartford and Howell presented numerous high-paid expert witnesses during the trial, including electrical engineers and combustion experts.

In trying to disprove Hartford's contention the fire was caused by the accent light, the Bovenzis' insurance company hired a Sunnyvale combustion expert, who performed various tests, including placing the lamp's light bulb close to different parts of the ficus in an effort to cause a fire.

"He used ficus trees and identical accent lights," Howell said. "He spent about 80 hours trying to catch the plant on fire, and he couldn't do it. He videotaped it and nothing happened."

The low-wattage accent lamp and the ficus, which had a light ring of moss surrounding it, had been in the Wandkes' home

for five years before the fire.

Though Bovenzi is relieved the case is now put to rest, she was critical of Hartford's lawsuit against her modest floral business.

"I feel so angry and frustrated that a very large insurance company could go after a small business," she said. "And that they had a right to say such negative things about us."

A secretary for Loewe, based in Arizona, told The Pine Cone Monday that the Hartford attorney did not want to comment on the case. Howell said investigators should have

focused their inquiry on the reading lamp in the master bedroom — not the accent lamp as the potential cause of the fire.

"This was a case where there was a rush to judgment," Howell said. "The day after the fire, RLS sent out an email saying it was a plant light that caused the fire. Nobody from Hartford seriously looked at another cause."

According to a Pebble Beach Fire report at the time, Marilee Wandke was working at

home about 8:40 p.m. April 26, 2007, when she heard the smoke alarm sound at the other end of the house.

She discovered smoke and fire in a corner of the master bedroom, and by the time she had dialed 911 and gotten outside, the fire had spread down the hall.

Minutes later, when firefighters arrived from the station a little more than a mile away from the campus, the fire was coming out of the door.

Cypress Fire and Pacific Grove firefighters assisted and worked for about five hours to control the fire, which caused no injuries.

In its lawsuit, Hartford had also targeted The Homelighter, a lighting store in Pacific Grove that sold the accent lamp to Design One, and Cal Lighting, which manufactured the lamp.

But Howell said before the trial, both parties settled with Hartford by paying the insurance company \$250,000. Homelighter is no longer in business.

Reflections of a Big Sur Artist

A COLD SPRING

As an artist who comes from a prominent family, and who has spent most of her life in Big Sur, Erin Gafill is arguably the beneficiary of a blessed life. Yet, over the past year, a whirlwind of unexpected events have rattled her foundation.

Responding to the circumstances she faced, Gafill focused her many emotions into a new book, "Drinking from a Cold Spring."

"The year I wrote this book, my father died, my daughter went off to college and my son got married, we opened and closed a busi-

ness, and saw our home evacuated [as a result of the Basin Complex Fire] twice," explained Gafill, who will sign copies of her book Wednesday, July 1, at the Henry Miller Library. "It was a year when every time we seemed to be turning a corner, something else would come along and knock us off our feet," she said.

Gafill has discovered that when she expresses her most painful memories and feelings, her words resonate with peo-

"A few years back, I started sending out my e-letter, 'The Big Sur Fix,' to connect with far-flung friends and family," she said. "Stories that were particularly difficult or painful to get onto the page often received the biggest responses -

a dozen or so people writing to say that they had been moved

Dancing 'Barefoot' in Big Sur — again

NOW THAT Big Sur has emerged as a prime destination for touring musicians, it seems only reasonable that its most successful homegrown recording acts would want to get in on the action.

Dark Chocolate - known as Barefoot when the band recorded three LPs in the late 1980s and early 1990s — will present a CD release party Friday, June 26, at the Big Sur Spirit Garden. Just two weeks earlier, another onetime Big Sur resident, singer-songwriter Alisa Fineman, hosted a CD release event at the Henry Miller Library.

Formed in 1988 by longtime resident Barklie Henry, Barefoot took the concept of a drumming and dancing troupe and expanded the sound by bringing in world-class instrumentalists like new-age violinist Steve Kindler and an assortment of gifted jazz musicians. Barefoot recorded three LPs and packed local venues during its heyday.

Dark Chocolate's debut recording, "Island Gypsy," picks up where Barefoot left off, showcasing Caribbean-flavored

world-beat dance music. Playing on the record are original Barefoot members Henry, who plays percussion, and Brock Bradford, who plays dumbeki and talking drum. They will be joined by onetime Spyro Gyra and the Rippingtons bassist Kim Stone, guitarist Joe Lucido, pianists Alan Steinberger and Nico Georgis, flutist Ronnie Padilla, vocalist Jaqui Hope, cellist Nura Stone, and percussionists Aaron Stone and Jayson Fann.

"As a producer, Barklie has done a great job pulling in talent," suggested Fann, who owns the Big Sur Spirit Garden. "I think this is his best recording yet."

The concert starts at 9 p.m. Before Dark Chocolate takes the stage, the audience will be treated to a 7 p.m. performance by Selah, a fire- dancing and belly-dancing troupe from Big Sur.

Shannon has been performing for more than two decades, which is pretty remarkable since he's not even 40.



Animal group takes shelter dogs on tour to find them homes

AN ANIMAL welfare group is offering new hope for dogs in two Salinas animal shelters.

Volunteers with Shelter Outreach Support, or SOS, temporarily take dogs out of the City of Salinas and Monterey County animal shelters on Hitchcock Road and show them off in public so the pooches have a better chance of being adopted.

"There are thousands of dogs that go through these two shelters every year," said Gina Wolf, cofounder of SOS. "And the majority of the people don't even know they

For the past seven months, volunteers with SOS took shelter dogs to Maya Cinemas in Salinas. And beginning July 11, from noon to 3 p.m., the group will bring about six to eight dogs every month to the new Pet Food Express in the Crossroads shopping center.

Customers can interact with the dogs and ask volunteers questions. The SPCA for Monterey County also has a similar program of taking animals to high-foot-traffic areas such as Del Monte Shopping Center.

"We try to get the animals out in the community where people can see them," Wolf said. "Because there are many people — that no matter how nice a facility is - won't go to an animal shelter.'

Taking dogs from the two Salinas shelters and showing them in public allows people to see the pooches in a relaxed environment, not behind the bars of a cage, where animals might not be on their best behavior. Some of the dogs SOS helps have been at the shelters for a long time.

'We put nice collars and harnesses and an 'Adopt me' vest on the dogs," said Wolf, who founded the organization with friend Linda Shen. "We walk them around town and peo-



ple look at them differently. We have gotten a lot of dogs adopted through these events and it's really rewarding."

The downturn in the economy has boosted the number of orphaned animals, making the organization's efforts even more important.

"Unfortunately, because of the large numbers of home foreclosures, there are more animals in the shelters," she said. "Spaces that used to be available for these dogs are being

When that happens, it increases the chances animals will be euthanized.

Besides displaying the animals in public, SOS sends photos of the animals to people in its email database.

Karen Sonne, a Pine Cone account executive who volunteers for SOS, recalled finding a home for a sweet poodle mix named Mozart about two weeks ago. "I took a picture of Mozart and emailed it to my friend, Nancy," Sonne said. "She drove to Salinas from Santa Cruz and adopted him."

Sonne was able to find homes for several other dogs just by emailing friends, who in turn, emailed others.


SOS often takes dogs that are harder to adopt out, such as purebred and mixed pit bulls and Chihuahuas, breeds that end up in shelters in large numbers. The most difficult dogs to adopt out are the young, untrained ones. "We don't want to turn our backs on them just because they are of that group," Wolf said. All of the dogs SOS shows the public have been thoroughly evaluated and temperament tested by the shelters to be good pets.






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

"I can't find anything that says charcoal in general is polluting the environment, but without regular erosion, it tends to make the sands grayer," Branson said. During the past year, taxpayer funds covered the costs of extra help taking charcoal off the beach, which has somewhat mitigated the

"We get the bulk of it cleaned up regularly," he said. The CRA's monthly beach cleanup helps a lot toward the effort as

But those efforts may soon be unnecessary, if the city bans the fires — which are allowed on the sand south of 10th Avenue — altogether.

'The idea is for the forest and beach commission to make a recommendation," Branson said, as it only has an advisory role when it comes to laws, which must be enacted by the city

The forester has been researching the matter to see what other jurisdictions do, and he discovered some only permit the blazes in designated fire pits, while others issue permits or ban them outright.

"All those things require more enforcement and time, which is limited," he said. "Everything has its pros and cons."

The forest and beach commission is set to meet at 2 p.m. Thursday, July 2, in council chambers at Carmel City Hall.

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

council's June 2 meeting, but councilman Ken Talmage wanted to discuss it, arguing the additional study wasn't needed. The new fee was recommended in an earlier study by Nichols Engineering in February 2008.

"We've talked about doing this and I don't see why we need another study," Talmage said.

But when Nichols prepared its 2008 study and recommendations, its engineers used statistics from the City of Monterey, making them useless as justification for a fee.

"The initial study was based on inferences drawn from traffic patterns in another city on the Peninsula — it didn't even involve Carmel-by-the-Sea," pointed out councilman Gerard Rose.

"You have to have an analysis done in order to support your fee, and a traffic count is part of that," explained city attorney Don

"You have to have some basis for it. If you don't, you have an illegal fee, and you can't do it."

A legal challenge of a surcharge based on improper data "would be a nightmare, and very expensive," he added.

Talmage relented.

"If we need a piece of paper in the file, let's get it in the file and move on with it," he

The council unanimously OK'd the contract, which calls for a one-day manual count between 5 a.m. and 8 p.m. on Carpenter Street between Serra Avenue and Valley Way, and on Rio Road at Santa Lucia, "to distinguish construction truck traffic from other vehicles with the same number of axles.'

In addition, automated counters will be installed on a Monday and removed on a Friday in order to get three consecutive days' worth of traffic data.

The information will be used in calculating the fee to be attached to construction permits. In past discussions, the city council has considered a 1 percent charge.



"The guy passed away, and the urn and ashes were given to his next of kin, who then passed away," he explained. "The house was sold, and the new owner found the urn in the garage, or something, and donated it."

With no one alive to claim them, the ashes will probably be scattered in the county cemetery at the corner of Laurel and Natividad in Salinas after being blessed by a priest.

"We go to the county health department and get a permit to scatter the ashes," Ragan said.

The coroner's office routinely scatters the cremated remains of the indigent and other unknown, unclaimed decedents in the cemetery or on the ocean.

"I've been here a year-and-a-half, and we've just done it once, and there were several years' worth — close to 100 boxes of cremains to scatter at the county cemetery and out at sea," he said.

We wait a couple of years in case somebody finds out through the family grapevine that somebody has passed away. Most of the time, if we can't find the next of kin, nobody comes forward to claim them."

pieces of wood needed to be removed from the eaves. The next step involved removing the brood, which is the portion of the hive that contains the bees' eggs and larvae.

"When you bring along the brood, it guarantees the bees will come along with it," Forrest said. "They want to rear their young."

While Forrest and others worked, Shoemaker watched with amazement.

"They used hemp smoke to calm the bees, and then they took away thousands of them" she recalled. "They brushed the bees into a plastic container and they located the queen. I'd never seen anything like it. The whole experience was awe

Despite wearing protective clothing, the workers felt the wrath of an angry bee colony. "We got a few stings," Forrest

Over the course of the day, Forrest filled two boxes, which look like oversized file cabinets. According to Forrest, each box is able to hold about 4,000 bees.

Apparently, the whole process is quite traumatizing for the bees, and many don't survive.

"For me, to remove a hive is bittersweet," said Forrest. "It

looks like a massacre. But I remind myself that we saved most of the colony.'

When they were finished, Forrest transported the bees to his property on a nearby ranch, estimating that he took home between 7,000 and 8,000 bees. He also collected about 2.5 gallons of honey. The whole experience only increased his admiration for the industrious insects.

"They work so hard," Forrest said of the bees. "It takes something like 1,200 bees to make a teaspoon of honey."

So far, the bees seem to be adjusting to their new home.

'They seem to be doing quite well," he observed. "The foggy days seem to help keep them calm."

Forrest hopes others will be inspired by his example and consider relocating their unwanted bee colonies.

"It's nice for people to see that bees can be moved around," he added. "You don't need to call the exterminator."

The value of a life

THERE'S AN old RV that can frequently be seen around the Monterey Peninsula with a prominently displayed bumper sticker that reads, "All life is sacred." It's a nice-sounding sentiment, but hardly practical in the real world. Even the owner of the RV, no matter how much she thinks she reveres every living thing, would surely want to be treated with antibiotics if she had pneumonia or gangrene. And in killing the millions of bacteria that were invading her body, she would be putting her life above theirs, thereby admitting that some creatures are more sacred than others.


The point seems silly, but it's actually an issue that arises every day, whether the point under discussion is how much protection to give an endangered species, or how much to spend making cars safer.

And, in a different context, the question of the value of life made the front pages of the nation's newspapers this week after the Wall Street Journal reported that Apple CEO Steve Jobs recently had a liver transplant. Almost immediately, the question arose: Did Jobs somehow use his money or influence to move to the head of the transplant queue?

The most protected person in the world is President Barack Obama. Everywhere he goes, he is guarded not only by teams of armed men, but also by an elaborate security apparatus that spans the globe. Armored cars are flown to each destination on his travel itineraries; when he gets on a helicopter or an airplane, multi-million-dollar decoys are frequently used, along with other complicated and costly schemes to thwart anyone who would do him harm. And why all this trouble and expense? Because President Obama's life is very important to the nation, if not the entire world. More to the point: The people of the United States have decided that, while he is president, Obama's life is more valuable than anyone else's. And who could disagree?

Steve Jobs isn't exactly president. But the company he heads, Apple, has played a vital role in the American economy for the last 30 years, and can even be said to have transformed the world with the development of the Macintosh computer, the iPod and the iPhone. Randall didn't agree and said there was no need for a review under the California Environmental Quality Act to explore the water-mixing issue, as the district had sought.

Cal Am files lawsuit

In response to the MPWMD's appeal, Cal Am Monday filed its own lawsuit against the water district, challenging what the suit calls an "unlawful denial" of a water distribution permit to the ecoresort.

The suit, filed in Monterey County Superior Court, seeks a judge's order that the MPWMD can't restrict the company's ability to distribute water.

"Our concern is not whether the Sand City resort project is approved," said Cal Am spokeswoman Catherine Bowie. "We're concerned that the state and court-imposed restrictions on our water sources are not being interpreted correct-

Cal Am's lawsuit also addresses the district's concern about the commingling of water.

"The district objected to the possibility that the SNG development could receive molecules of Carmel River

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water," Bowie said. "The fact is that all of our customers receive a combination of Carmel River water and Seaside Basin water."

No date has yet been set to hear the water district's appeal, a process MPWMD attorney Dave Laredo said could take nine to 18 months.

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Your Gardener's Checklist for June 26 - July 9, 2009

- ☐ Tuberous begonias can give bountiful flower displays in summer and should be fed throughout the hot months.
- ☐ Fallen fruit, vegetables and flowers can play host to numerous pests, borers and larvae, so be sure to clean up regularly.
- ☐ Vegetable gardens need deep and thorough watering to reach roots deep below the soil surface.
- ☐ For many colored shades of foliage, consider planting the multi-colored coleus or gray foliaged artemisa, dusty miller, parrot's beak and others found at the local nursery.
- ☐ If crab grass has made an unwanted appearance in your lawn, treat it now with a selective control.
- ☐ Spring bulb foliage should be well dried and yellow by now. Cut if off only when it's fully dried.

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
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


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

He sleeps in the kitchen with his three siblings, each with his or her own bed, but when he wakes up, he's all set for a ride in the family Suburban. The cats stay home.



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
