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Local surgeon honored by Poland 65 years after heroic uprising

THE CANADIAN author Robertson Davies once wrote, "Extraordinary people survive under the most terrible circumstances, and they become more extraordinary because of it."

Davies' words could accurately describe the life of a retired local neurosurgeon, Dr. Jan Belza. Well known on the Monterey Peninsula for his surgical skills, Belza will travel July 24, to Warsaw, Poland, where he will be honored as a hero of the Warsaw Uprising of 1944.

Born in Warsaw in 1925, Belza was a teenager in September 1939 when the Nazis invaded. A member of a patriotic family and trained as a Boy Scout, Belza joined the Polish Home Army Underground resistance movement when he was just a teenager.

German rule was brutal and merciless, particularly where the city's sizable Jewish population was concerned. All of the country's universities were immediately closed and several hundred thousand Jews were herded into neighborhood that became known as the Warsaw Ghetto.

About to be massacred

In 1943, the jews in the ghetto — starving and facing the knowledge they were about to be massacred — revolted against the Germans. Outnumbered and outgunned, Jewish fighters held out for nearly a month before nearly all were killed

A year later, Germany's fortunes were declining and the Soviet Union's Red Army was camping on Warsaw's doorstep. Anticipating their moment of national liberation, Poland's government-in-exile encouraged the resistance fighters to stage the Warsaw Uprising of 1944, which was launched by surprise Aug. 1.

"There was initial enthusiasm to join the revolt and be part of it," remembered Belza, who turned 18 that year. "I was put on alert two days before the revolt. Not everybody had arms, but many obtained arms by attacking German soldiers. I had a pistol."

For nearly a month, the citizen army held its own against the Germans. "We fought them street to street, house to house and floor to floor," Belza explained.

Death camp

Despite the death and destruction surrounding them, the resistance fighters achieved small-scale victories. And, at one point, Belza's battalion reached a concentration camp on the edge of the city and freed about 300 Jewish prisoners, many of whom immediately volunteered to be part of the rebel army and eventually served on its front lines.

"They were about to be executed at any time," Belza said. "They were ecstatic to be liberated."

Eventually, though, as supplies dwindled and losses

Former supe tops growing list of C.V. council candidates

FORMER 5TH District Supervisor Karin Strasser Kauffman and outspoken incorporation proponent Glenn Robinson are among a slate of candidates who entered the race this week for Carmel Valley town council.

The vote for town council will happen Nov. 3, the same day Carmel Valley residents will decide if they want to incorporate their community.

"I am frustrated with the Monterey County Board of consistent Supervisors' approval of poorly planned development projects in Valley," Carmel Robinson, a professor at the Naval Postgraduate School, when asked why he's running for office. "As a council member, I pledge to work with the town council to control overdevelopment in the Town of Carmel Valley. The

board of supervisors and out-of-town developers have too much influence over the land-use decisions in our community."

Also announcing their candidacy as members of the proincorporation slate were Larry Bacon, Amy Anderson, and Priscilla Walton.

Bacon, a local business owner and former senior officer with Wells Fargo and Chase banks, insisted incorporation makes good business sense. "I have been working to create the town of Carmel Valley because it is a wise and fiscally responsible approach to gaining greater local control over our community, without a tax increase," Bacon explained.

Walton, like Robinson, is worried about what she says is

Prosecutor heads to Africa to do good

A MONTEREY County attorney who has spent the past five years prosecuting those who abuse the elderly has a new

calling in another part of the world.

As early as January, deputy district attorney Lisa Poll will leave her post as an elder-abuse prosecutor to travel to South Africa, where she will help orphans of AIDS victims.

"It's rewarding and challenging" prosecuting elder abuse cases, said Poll, 45. "But I felt that God was saying to me, 'There are people here to do this work, and the children need you there.""

Five years ago, Poll and some members of her Aptos

church went on a missionary effort to South Africa to help the humanitarian group, AFnet, or Africa Network Evangelism Task.

Among their tasks was visiting an AIDS orphan center, where they interacted with children and gave food and blan-

kets to those dying of AIDS.

"I just fell in love with Africa," Poll said. "I fell in love with the land and the people. It can't help but get to you. It has such a tremendously high level of poverty and disease, and yet the people have such joy for life. The children's smiles just melt your heart."

Killed in Big Sur accident, sailor remembered by Navy

AN ILLEGAL pass by a motorcyclist along Highway 1 in Big Sur turned deadly Saturday when his passenger — a 27-year-old Florida woman who was serving in the U.S. Navy — was thrown from his bike and killed.

Drew Edmonson, a 26-year-old resident of Guntersville, Ala., was driving north about 5 p.m. along Highway 1 between the Coast Gallery and Deetjen's when he attempted to pass a slower-moving RV over a double yellow line.

Tiny project, big obstacles

WHEN WILLIAM Edwards decided to install two light posts to mark the driveway of his 17 Mile Drive home, he thought it would be a simple enough task.

An engineer, Edwards figured he would design the posts and hire a contractor to install them.

Little did he know his bid to install two light posts would be a convoluted 10-month odyssey involving administrative nitpicking, detailed archeological and architect reports, and nearly \$9,000 in permitting fees.

Edwards' tale is a glaring example of how county-level bureaucracy can hamstring what should be the simplest of homeowner projects.

"The law has effectively removed the freedom of citizens to take some responsibility for their own homes, and for civil servants to make sensible decisions," Edwards said.

Edwards' saga began April 2008, when he decided to place two 6-foot posts, each with one light attached, to mark the driveway of his home on 17 Mile Drive.

WITH ONE of the partners \$1 million in the red, the Carmel Regional Fire Ambulance — a joint venture of the Carmel Valley Fire Protection District and the City of Carmel — came perilously close to dissolution. But a one-year contract signed by Carmel and CVFPD this month has put the ambulance company on life support.

What brought everything to a head is that the Carmel Valley Fire Protection District is essentially broke," city administrator Rich Guillen told the Carmel City Council July 7. "They recommended that within 12 to 15 days, we dissolve the ambulance authority."

But two weeks was far too little time to develop a plan to





fill the void, so fire and city officials, and the CRFA board, held several meetings to discuss its finances and the future. The resulting one-year agreement will give everyone involved enough time to analyze CRFA's operations and expenses, and determine whether and how it should continue to exist.

Short-term contact saves in-town ambulance — for now

One of the problems CVFPD Chief Michael Urquides uncovered was duplication of costs being paid by the district, which was handling administrative duties for CRFA, according to Guillen. Urquides' audit uncovered overpayment for overtime, uniform allowance, contract labor, telephone service, liability insurance, administrative staff, legal services, auditing and travel/training. Guillen said the duplicate expenses added up to \$93,000.

But according to the amended agreement, the city will take over administrative responsibilities for the ambulance authority, including fee collection, budgets, accounts payable, payroll, human resources and agenda preparation. The "shift of administrative oversight will take some careful stewardship by city staff," Guillen said in his report. City employees already on the payroll will handle the added

The new agreement will also ensure each partner pays a fair share of CRFA's expenses, rather than one subsidizing the other, according to Guillen, and it opens the door to other cities or agencies that might want to join.

Resident Carolyn Hardy wondered whether that was likely, especially considering Cal Fire, which runs the neighboring Cypress, Carmel Highlands and Pebble Beach fire districts, carries paramedics on its engines.

"They have a medic on every truck," she pointed out.

Councilman Gerard Rose, who represents the city on the CRFA board, said others have already asked about joining in

One likely draw is its consistent response times of about three minutes, while ambulances in the rest of the county

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
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

License: 270708224 COA #89 struggle to meet their nine-minute requirement for getting to the scene of an emergency in urban areas, according to Guillen. In rural areas, the acceptable time is longer.

Hardy also asked what will happen if Carmel Valley voters don't approve a \$75-and-up parcel tax in August to help pay for the ambulance.

"We do have a plan. If that tax is turned down, it will of course make things worse for Carmel Valley Fire Protection District, and I won't comment on their politics, except to say the amount of money they're in the red right now is staggering — well over \$1 million — and it's a horrendous situation," Rose said before characterizing the fire district as "near death."

"That's why I'm so pleased to put together an agreement with them, notwithstanding their travails," he said.

Guillen recommended the council adopt the agreement. "If managed appropriately, it is likely that the current city

subsidy of \$400,000 will be less in future years, without a reduction in the ambulance response time or a decline in ambulance service levels," he said.

The council unanimously agreed July 7 to approve the contract, which retroactively took effect July 1 and will expire June 30, 2010.




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Doctor tells jury he stopped when asked

THE SEXUAL encounter that led to the arrest of physician Carl Bergstrom on a charge of forcible sodomy April 14 left him "shocked and surprised," he said on the stand in a Salinas courtroom Wednesday.

In court last week, the woman who says Bergstrom assaulted her, Jane Doe 1, testified she went to his house that evening after encountering him at a local bar, because he seemed sympathetic to her personal problems. On his couch, they were kissing when she "faded out," only to come to the realization she was being sodomized. She said she repeatedly told him to stop, but he didn't.

But Bergstrom said everything that happened was consensual. When she uttered in quick succession, "Stop, stop, stop," he said he complied. When he started again after a bit, she objected and suddenly stood up, pulled up her jeans and then grabbed his coat, keys and cell phones, and ran out the door, he said.

He described his reactions of shock and surprise. "We were doing this wonderful thing," he said, and then all of a sudden, she fled. "I didn't understand what happened." He said he was unsure what she meant when she first told him to stop.

Bergstrom also told the jury he liked the woman and had not meant to hurt her. He dressed and went outside calling for her, but could not find her, he said, and then the police arrived in response to her 911 call from his phone.

Throughout his testimony, Bergstrom was matter-of-fact, descriptive and often in a rush to answer the questions from his attorney and the prosecutor. He frequently gestured with his hands while describing the sexual encounters.

To try to establish a pattern of behavior on Bergstrom's part, prosecutors brought two other women to court.

On Monday, Jane Doe 2 said Bergstrom forced himself on her on the couch at a

friend's house in 2007 after they had been out at a bar in Carmel. She said she cried the entire time, though she did not protest or yell after initially telling him she did not want to have sex. She also said she suspected she was drugged.

"I remember he had me by the back of my hair, and everything after that is kind of vague," she said. "I remember feeling numb, helpless, and I remember crying."

On Tuesday, a witness who came forward more recently, referred to as Jane Doe 3, reported he performed anal sex against her will following a blind date in 2007. She also said she thought she might have been drugged.

Under questioning from defense attorney Carolyn Keeley, Bergstrom first told the jury about the sexual encounters with those two women, whose testimony was permitted under a California law that allows such witnesses to testify regarding a suspect's past behavior in sex-crime cases.

Bergstrom, who admitted dating multiple women at the same time and engaging in anal sex with those who enjoy it, said both encounters were consensual, and he stopped when Jane Doe 3 objected.

Earlier in his questioning, Bergstrom, who was divorced in 1995 and is the father of two teenagers and one 20-year-old, admitted buying cocaine and "jokingly" offering it in exchange for sexual favors from a woman with whom he had been intimate for a few years. He also offered to sell some.

Earlier in the week, a witness called by the defense countered the testimony given by Sexual Assault Response Team nurse Sheree Goldman.

Cari Caruso, also a SART examiner, said the injuries to Jane Doe 1 identified by Goldman do not mean she did not consent to sex.

"Even consensual anal sex can result in injury," she said.

The jury was expected to get the case by the end of the week.

Candidates trickling in for many races in Nov. 3 election

Last monday marked the opening of the filing period for several important elected offices on the Monterey Peninsula, but so far, few candidates have signed up to run.

While some incumbents and a challenger or two have taken out the necessary forms to initiate campaigns for positions on local boards, the races for the Carmel and Pacific Grove unified school districts remain wide open. The filing period, by which time they must gather enough signatures and return their paperwork, closes Aug. 7.

On the Carmel Unified School District board of education, the seats occupied by trustees Dan Hightower and John Ellison are up for election. Ellison plans to run again, but Hightower said he is ready to retire from the board.

In Pacific Grove, positions occupied by Jessie Bray, Beth Shammas and Bill Phillips will be up for a vote. No one has taken out papers to run in that race.

Fire districts in Carmel Valley, Carmel and Cachagua, as well as several others throughout the county, are set to hold elections Nov. 3 as well.

Four incumbents — Ron Builta, Hugh R. Holtrop, Gaudenz Panholzer and Warren Poitras — will have the chance to defend their seats on the Carmel Valley Fire Protection District board, which is facing major money problems, and of them, only Builta has filled out papers with the elections department. Retired paralegal Sharon Waller, who has sought the office before, notified the elections department she intends to try again.. Realtor Susan Augustitus also wants to run.

Spots occupied by Robert Eaton, Rodney Lambert and Natalie Rodda will be up for election on the Cachagua Fire board, and in the Cypress Fire Protection District, which includes stations on Rio Road and in Pebble Beach, directors David Bates, Donel Geisen, Dale Denver and Edgar Dally have a chance to seek reelection. Geisen is the only one who has pulled papers stating an intent to run.

Special districts to appear on the November ballot include the Carmel Area Wastewater District, where three incumbents — Bob Kohn, Greg D'Ambrosio and Ken White — have already filed paperwork to vie for three seats. For the Carmel Valley Recreational and Park District, incumbent Randy Randazzo has applied, as has challenger Paul J. Ingram, a plastering contractor. Incumbents Dave Lyon and Sherrie May have not stated whether they will seek reelection. Del Monte Forest residents will choose two people for the Pebble Beach Community Service District, and incum-

Cmdr. announces plans to run for sheriff

Low morale, overspending, top-heavy management and a proliferation of pet projects plague the

Monterey County Sheriff's Office under Mike Kanalakis, according to Cmdr. Fred Garcia, a 28-year veteran who last week declared his plans to run against Kanalakis for sheriff in next June's election.

"Under the current administration, I have seen over the last seven years a complete lack of true commitment by the sheriff of this department," he said. "I have seen a great deal of wasteful spending."

And while management positions are filled, the front-line forces are significantly understaffed, according to Garcia, which interferes with

their ability to protect and serve Monterey County residents. Its lab, for instance, has a three-month backlog in processing evidence due to a lack of workers.

He called the continuing waste of money at the department "unbelievable," and said people working under Kanalakis are afraid of him.

"I've worked for four sheriffs, and I will tell you that I have never seen the morale so low," he said. "The employees, the deputies and the professional staff work in an atmosphere of fear."

As sheriff, Garcia said he would make fiscal responsibility, transparency, staffing, expansion of the jail to deal with overcrowding and morale his priorities.

Garcia, a Monterey County resident for 43 years, joined the sheriff's office in February 1981 and worked as a patrol deputy in Salinas for 14 years, during which he was a SWAT member and trained in civil disobedience and riot control. He also worked as a field training officer and received training

GROUP SEEKS WELCOMING HOMES FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS

A 17-YEAR-OLD from the Netherlands who enjoys cooking and a Swedish competitive swimmer are just a couple of the foreign exchange students looking for families to bunk with during this coming school year on the Monterey Peninsula, according to the nonprofit STS Foundation, which helps match visiting teens with local families.

The students "will integrate themselves into a Carmel area family with the goal of experiencing American culture as an American high-school student does," according to STS. "In turn, they will provide insight into their own culture."

STS regional coordinator Lillian Clemente said she would love to have five or six families host students, and she named two of the several teens who hope to stay in Carmel or elsewhere on the Peninsula.

Junus, 17, is from Groningen in the Netherlands and loves

playing and refereeing field hockey, according to STS, as well as cooking and participating in his school's debate club. Rebecka, also 17, hails from Vastervik, a small city in Sweden, and is a competitive swimmer who also teaches the sport to young children, according to Clemente. She reportedly enjoys photography, dance, animals and watching

According to STS, the teens are excellent students and will have their own spending money and health insurance.

Clemente said a host family is responsible for providing daily meals, a bed in an individual room or in the room of another child of the same gender, a quiet place to study, and a loving and caring home in a safe neighborhood. After hearing from someone interested in hosting, she obtains as much information as possible during a phone interview and then finds a student with similar interests and expectations.

"We encourage the family to include the student in the

family dinner, and to give them the same role as they do for their own kids," she said. "The student is supposed to respect them as they respect their own parents."

Many host families have children who are grown and have left home. But they don't necessarily have to have children at all, according to Clemente.

"If it is a family that has never had any kids, we go through everything with them," she said, noting that the group has rules about smoking, drinking, driving, curfew and other relevant issues, and the group explains those rules to

And coordinators are available for advice throughout the student's stay, she said.

Following the initial phone call, a potential host submits an application, references are checked and STS visits the home. The organization also makes sure the local public high school has space. To host a student, call (800) 522-4678.

Council renews parking contract

OVER STRENUOUS objections from one councilman, National Parking and Valet will receive \$45,000 to \$65,000 per year until June 30, 2012, to run the city's parking lot at the north end of Sunset Center and the tour-bus parking next to Carmel Plaza, the Carmel City Council decided July 7. The city first hired the company in 2005 and decided to renew the contract.

"I would like to see what the competitive situation is, and if the city could do it itself," councilman Ken Talmage said, after asking that the contract, which had been set for automatic approval on the council's consent agenda, be discussed.

City administrator Rich Guillen recommended sticking with the company, which will receive 31.5 percent of the revenues from the meters in the lot and on Junipero Street. He reminded the council he had compared in-house oversight and outsourcing of the paid-parking program.

"Outsourcing won out because of the benefit package," Guillen said, referring to the insurance and other benefits that accompany pay for city employees. "We can go through that analysis again, if that's what the council wants us to do."

Guillen also pointed out that administrative services director Joyce Giuffre negotiated the money paid to National down 3 percent, allowing the city to retain 68.5 percent of the revenues, compared with the 65 percent called for in the contract that ended June 30. Guillen estimated that change would amount to another \$6,000 to \$8,000 each year.

But Talmage wanted to see if there was a better option.

"We're fighting for every dollar in this budget," he said.

"Once we delved into it, it became clear it was more cost effective to outsource it," councilwoman Paula Hazdovac

Councilman Gerard Rose suggested Guillen "take a look at it," but Mayor Sue McCloud said there was no time to revisit the outsourcing arrangement, which has made the paid parking at the lot much more user friendly.

"There are no calls coming in anymore from irate people stymied by the kiosks, and that's because there's a human being down there who knows how the machines work," she

But Talmage was not mollified.

"If we're looking at paid parking in this community, and we're looking at a contract that gives a third of the revenues away, we're going to have to find a better solution than that,"

After Rose commented that the city would "almost have create a whole department" to oversee the paid parking the council voted 4-1 to approve the contract with National.

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City celebrates Fourth Ave. redo

MORE THAN five years after the huge eucalyptus trees lining Fourth Avenue were chopped down to make way for a prettier, safer street, residents and city officials gathered on the corner of Fourth and Casanova Wednesday to officially cut the ribbon on the new walking path, drainage ditches and landscaping that transformed the busy road. The work was completed in mid-April.

The group also celebrated the city's receipt of \$261,100 in tax dollars the state had pledged to the Fourth Avenue Riparian Habitat Project years ago. The plans went through multiple iterations in efforts to meet the state's changing requirements, and they were finally approved, and a land-scaper hired, last year.

The checks from the California Department of Parks and Recreation were received by the council July 7, leaving a balance of about \$70,000 in costs, which Mayor Sue McCloud said the city should also be able to recover.

Residents, members of the forest and beach commission, the mayor and all four

city council members, the city forester, administrative staff, the landscaper and others gathered at the corner for coffee, cookies and clapping as former city councilman Jim Wright cut the ribbon held by Fourth Avenue resident Wayne Kelley.

Afterward, McCloud explained to the landscape contrac-

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

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


When Dad emerges from his studio, Chipper is waiting 0by the door, pointy ears erect, a look of anticipation in his dark eyes – ready to hit the beach.

Sister Carlotta O'Donnell

October 13, 1924-July 19, 2009

Sister Carlotta O'Donnell was born Kathleen O'Donnell in Ortonville, Minnesota. From her father, Dr. Dennis Michael O'Donnell, her mother, Florence O'Donnell, a primary school teacher, and her loving aunt, Agnes Clarke, she acquired both her life-long love of education and her dedication to the service of others. After earning a BA in Spanish and history and a BS in library science from the

College of Saint Catherine in St. Paul, Minnesota, Sister Carlotta served on the library staff at the Catholic University in Washington, DC. In 1949 she came to California and began her religious life with the Dominican Sisters of San Rafael.

Sister Carlotta joined Santa Catalina School in February 1951, just five months after the School's inception under the direction of its first Head, Sister Mary Kieran Hannifan, O.P. It was an assignment that was to become her love and her life's work. She became Head of School upon the death of Sister Kieran in 1965 and, over the years, taught Spanish, history, Latin, and religion; served as the School's librarian; directed college counseling; lived in the dormitory with resident students; and, until her retirement in 2002, carried the myriad responsibilities of running an independent school.

Under Sister Carlotta's leadership Santa Catalina's campus saw decade-by-decade growth. The Sister Mary Kieran Memorial Library in conjunction with Sullivan Court was dedicated in 1967. Soon thereafter were the completion of the Countess Bernardine Murphy Donohue Memorial Science building in 1971 and the inauguration of the Santa Catalina Preschool and Kindergarten. The Sister Carlotta Performing Arts Center, the Edward E. Hills Dormitory, and two four-plexes of faculty housing were followed by The Bedford Family Gymnasium. The Mary L. Johnson Music Center and the Greer Family Dormitory concluded Santa Catalina's first 50 years. The first three years of the 21st century saw the completion of the Mary L. Johnson Recital Hall and the Salyer Aquatic Center. Sister Carlotta's firm hand and broad vision guided each step of Santa Catalina's

Sister Carlotta's contributions to the field of private education were numerous. Her active memberships included the National Association of Independent Schools, the National Association of Principals of Schools for Girls, and the National Coalition of Boarding Schools. She served as a Trustee to both the California Association of Independent Schools and to the Chapman Foundation. To each association Sister Carlotta gave generously of her time and insight.

The person of Sister Carlotta stood far above her many accomplishments. Woman of faith, purveyor of excellence, avid supporter of the arts, devoted patriot, confident believer in the potential of youth, particularly young women--all were part and parcel of her daily life. She was possessed of clarity of thought and purpose, incessant energy and determination, and a talent for viewing the big picture. All converged in an individual whose life was courageous and selfless. A loyal and caring friend to many, an intelligent, perceptive, and disciplined leader, Sister Carlotta was an educator who taught by example that each human interaction is important.

With all of this, Sister Carlotta was a keen font of humor and a nimble performer of the Irish jig. She loved her students. She loved her country. She loved each campus dog and her campus rose gardens. She loved baseball. Sister Carlotta loved life. She leaves behind Sister Jean, Sister Claire, and Sister Christine, who, together, shared her vision and her religious community at Santa Catalina.

We wish to thank Donna Zahn, Hospice of the Central Coast, and Victorian Home Care, all of whom assisted in the management of Sister Carlotta's comfort and welfare. In particular, we thank Dr. Benjamin Richards, Dr. Albert Bela Janko, and Dr. Hisashi Kajikuri for their devoted, gentle care. We thank June Muro for her untiring assistance and love, and we thank Dr. Walter Holz for his ongoing support during Sister Carlotta's declining years. Finally, Mr. Peter M. Folger has shared in the life of Santa Catalina and in the lives

of the Sisters for over forty years. He has been a dear friend to us all. His admiration and

love of Sister Carlotta were unbounded and his care for each of us unceasing. We offer him our deepest gratitude.

Sister Carlotta's life will be celebrated in a Vigil Service on Tuesday evening, July 28 at 7:00 pm and a Mass of the Resurrection on Wednesday, July 29 at 1:00 pm. Balancing art and science, surgeon finds his groove

WHILE THERE are many occupations that encourage creativity, a doctor generally isn't considered one of them. But that hasn't stopped Dr. David Morwood from exploring his artistic impulses — inside and outside the operating room.

A plastic surgeon with a practice in

Monterey, Morwood and his jazz band are regulars at the Hyatt Regency in Monterey, and they'll perform Friday, July 24, at Carmel Plaza.

Raised on a Vermont farm near Lake Champlain, Morwood discovered music long

before he ever considered becoming a doctor. He came from a musical family, starting with the violin when he was just 4 and quickly discovering another instrument that captured his attention.

"I was always attracted to the drums," Morwood recalled. "I got a set of bongoes at a church bazaar, and by the time I was 13, I was playing gigs."

For Morwood, playing music for money was a revelation. "I learned that I didn't have to work on the farm anymore," he said.

In the eighth grade, a teacher introduced Morwood to jazz, and his perception of music was changed forever. Specifically, it was a record of Oscar Peterson performing "Night Train" that hooked the young drummer on jazz.

"I was playing rock 'n' roll at the time," he explained. "We had a new music teacher, and he picked two of us with promise so he could jam with someone. We formed a little band, and I got turned onto jazz. I was glued to the groove."

Despite his natural gift for music, Morwood initially considered a career in politics when he started college. But as he began to learn more about the world outside of New England, he found himself drawn to medicine. Soon, he became fascinated with the possibilities of plastic surgery.

"Practicing medicine seemed like a creative mix of art and science," he said. "I remember the first time I saw a baby's cleft lip repair. I was just so startled to see the transformation. It was amazing to see the difference it made. I was so inspired."

Today, not only does Morwood maintain a private practice in Monterey, but each year, the Monterey Rotary Club sends him to a developing country, where he operates on the

Innovative marketing plan showcases fundraising art

IF CLEVER marketing can lead to creative success, Lenore Perez is certain to have a long and fruitful career as an artist.

After producing 100 pieces of multimedia art in 100 days, Perez will unveil the fruits of an ambitious project Friday, July 24, at the Sally Griffin Center in Pacific Grove.

While Perez conceded the idea of creating 100 works of art in 100 days wasn't original, her twist on the plan is surprisingly innova-

tive. Using photographs and negatives of retinas that she obtained from an opthamologist's office where she worked, Perez has created a large body of colorful multimedia work over a short period of time. And her use of retina images is particularly relevant — she is donating half the proceeds from selling the art to the Blind and Visually Impaired Center of Monterey County.

"I worked on each piece for two to eight hours," Perez explained. "I wanted to get my name out there, so I decided to go for it. But

by the 40th day, I began to feel like Van Gogh and I wanted to cut my ear off."

While she worked, Perez repeatedly listened to the music of Italian tenor Andrea Bocelli, not realizing the singer is blind until she was nearly halfway done with the massive project.

Perez' unconventional artistic approach is nothing new for her. Even as a young child she embraced creative ways of expressing herself.

"As a youngster, I made mosaic tile coasters," she explained. "I was making collages in the 1960s and creating papier-mâché objets d'art. I knit, sew, crochet, paint and create 3-D art pieces. I also recycle, reuse and restore many items in my art work."

In keeping with the "100" theme of her exhibit, Perez is offering each of her multimedia pieces for \$100 each.

Crispy crab, picked produce, and vacationing in the vines

HERE IN the land of Dungeness, soft-shell crab doesn't often get star billing, but Christopher Caul, chef and owner of Christopher's on Lincoln in downtown Carmel, has made the little crustacean a tradition. For a few months in the spring and summer, he offers it as a special appetizer.

Crispy on the outside, and tender and sweet on the inside, the fried crab is served whole over cool and crisp jicama slaw and garnished with avocado salsa. A crisped tortilla serves as its foundation. Get one while they last.

But even if you miss the crab special, the menu at Christopher's is extensive, listing dishes even the most picky eaters will enjoy in a restaurant that feels more like someone's comfortable, intimate living room. A two-person table placed in the middle of the street-side window is the most romantic spot, but the split-level room easily accommodates larger parties as well.

Highlights of the Starters section include pan-fried green tomatoes served with parmesan and herbs in a light tomato sauce (even people who hate tomatoes may very well like this dish) and the melt-in-your-mouth, citrusy sushi-grade albacore carpaccio served with a small mound of arugula that complements the fish's taste and texture.

When it comes to entrées, Caul offers special fish that can be prepared the same way as any fish on the menu, including the smoky French lentils and apple-wood bacon, tender braised greens and wild mushrooms that served as a nice foil for organically raised Scottish salmon Saturday night. (Just be sure to specify if you want the fish cooked rare.)

For an interesting Bayou twist on pasta, consider the Fettuccini Louisiana, which features large, tender sautéed sea scallops, tasso ham and fresh tomato served in a light — and spicy — lobster sauce.

The wine list is accessible, with plenty of bottles in the \$40-\$70 range, and includes the products of two dozen Monterey County vintners, as Caul likes to keep things local. But he also carries several favorites from outside the area, and nearly a dozen splurges. Customers who bring their own pay a \$20 corkage, though Caul will waive the fee for those who also purchase off the list.

Plenty of cocktails are crafted behind the small bar, such as the refreshingly not-too-sweet Hang Time Cosmo, and the potent and sweet Pina Tini with pineapple Cruzan rum, pineapple juice and fresh lime juice.

As for dessert, the Black & White Brownie with vanilla ice cream and caramel sauce is a perennial favorite, even if the brownie is more on the cakey side, and the vanilla bean Crème Brûlée is traditionally prepared and served with fresh

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

Daniel Rhodes Dixon May 15, 1925 - July 9, 2009

Daniel Rhodes Dixon was born May 15, 1925 and died July 9, 2009. The scion of two celebrated Californians, photographer Dorothea Lange and painter Maynard Dixon, Daniel was


Daniel did not like standard obituaries. He found them "lifeless" and "without heartbeat." As a journalist for the Monterey County Post, Mr. Dixon displayed witty self-deprecation in preparing his own obituary, "Autobiobit,"

wherein he quoted his famed mother, the late photographer, as describing her (first) son as "irregular." He admitted he was "an incorrigible truant who dropped out of school in the tenth grade to become a wandering delinquent." Mr. Dixon humorously boasted that he "was probably the only man ever to be offered and to turn down the job of picture editor for Playboy magazine."

Daniel's life and career were marked by excellence. His career ranged from writing articles for such publications as Pageant, Life, and Look Magazines to advertising for agencies that included Carson & Roberts and Doyle Dane Bernbach, rising to creative director at both McCann Erickson and Ogilvy &

Mather by the 1980s. Among his prize-winning campaigns were the famed Volkswagen ads of the early to mid-60s and the billboards and TV spots which defined the Bug as a charming and reliable, if eccentric, companion. Directing his creative talents into politics, Mr. Dixon helped shape campaigns for the House of Representatives, the U.S. Senate, mayors of New York and Chicago, and President of the United States.

Indeed, to his final days he maintained a remarkable acuity of mind, with an ability to bring to light the contours, values, and colors of life and relationships. In later years, he traveled the world giving presentations about his



parents' lives and work, describing his impressions of his mother as "perhaps blurred by emotion, but unclouded by scholarship." He wrote a memoir of his father called *The Thunderbird Remembered*.

While his father was a painter with pigments, Daniel was a painter with words. Cooking and communication were his main fortes. He had a unique friendship with the English language and used words with a courting nature. Of cooking, he wrote, "Beats writing - nobody dares tell you when it's lousy."

He also rejoiced in the company of his ukulele, which he believed had a mind and heart of its own. He played it proudly, mostly ditties from the 20s and 30s "guaranteed to induce groans of dismay." He was certain that his old comrade would miss him when he was gone. His last work, the capstone of his life as a writer, is a book on the ukulele.

Mr. Dixon described his wife as "his greatest joy and comfort in or out of this world." In "Autobiobit," he wrote that in death he is only temporarily apart from his wife Dixie. "Mr. Dixon did not know whether or not he believed in God, but he did believe that this marriage would last forever, even after death."

Daniel is also survived by his daughter, screenwriter Leslie Dixon, his brother John, his grandson Thomas, 3 stepchildren, 8 step-grandchildren, a niece, 2 nephews, and "at last count, more friends than enemies."

At the request of Daniel, no memorial services will be held. A smile upon his memory may be given in a moment of quiet reflection upon his words:

"From somewhere out yonder, Mr. Dixon says 'Hello!' Nobody there ever says goodbye."

The posts, more like columns with a light built in, were needed because a Monterey pine at the entrance of his prop-— which had lights on it — died.

Edwards first called an official with the Pebble Beach Company's architectural review department to arrange a meeting to discuss his plans for light posts with a stone facade. But Edwards said the PBC representative, whose name he did not disclose, told him the posts could not be on Pebble Beach property and that he needed a survey to prove they wouldn't be. "I got a survey and a \$600 surveyor's bill."

That was the first of many permitting expenses to come. "Since the light posts are 30 feet inside my property line," Edwards explained, "this survey was unnecessary, as anyone who visited the property could plainly see."

His next step was to get approval from Monterey County, and, in July 2008, Edwards was told by county officials he needed a plot plan of his 2-acre property, plus detailed plans of the light posts, before the county planning commission could consider his permit application.

He was also advised he should hire an architect and a contractor to help him with the permitting process, something Edwards now realizes was good advice. An electrical permit was also necessary, he was told. "I was getting the idea that this was going to be a complex, frustrating problem," Edwards said. "And all for two very simple light posts."

The architect said his bill would be \$1,000 to \$2,000, and that his reimbursable expenses would be about another \$1,100 for copies, printing, applications and permits, Edwards said. In September 2008, the architect submitted plans and an application to the county, but the next month an official with the Monterey County Resource Management Agency dropped a bombshell.

The agency informed Edwards planners had determined the project was "within 750 feet of a known archeological resource" and as a result, he needed a coastal development permit for his humble project.

"Stop and consider," Edwards said. "This is for two little light posts which are clearly needed to light and mark the entrance to a driveway. And I was going through the same





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process as if I were going to build a home."

Citing state law, county planners wouldn't tell Edwards details of the supposed archeological resource and informed him he would need an archeological survey.

"When my driveway was built in 1975, it was put in by a bulldozer," Edwards explained. "They clearly bladed right through the location of the posts. If it ever was an archeological site, it was already gone, so this survey was useless."

County planners also told Edwards they would give him a break by reducing the usual \$8,000 permit fee to \$2,475 because of the "small size" of his project.

To plead his case, Edwards set up a conference call with two planners and told them the supposed archeological site where his light posts would be located had been bulldozed decades ago. He received little sympathy. "Their response was a pleasant, 'We don't make the laws," he said.

Edwards then spent \$600 on an archeologist, who determined the "project should not be delayed for archeological reasons." In November 2008, Edwards, hoping planners would be satisfied with the archeologist's findings, resubmitted his application to install the light posts.

But in December 2008, Edwards was hit with another unpleasant surprise. The Monterey County Planning Department informed him that as part of his bid to install the light posts, the project would be subject to a public hearing. "What on earth are they thinking?" Edwards asked.

When the hearing was held, nobody from the public raised any objections to Edwards' plans, and his permit was approved. "Hallelujah," he said. "After 10 months of unnecessary effort, I had the permit to build two small light posts."

County planner Mike Novo described the entire process as "standard operating procedure."

"The Coastal Zone regulations are very protective of resources," he said. "In this case, the resource being protected is a known existing archaeological site near or on this property and required the more extensive Coastal Development Permit process to ensure that the resource would continue to be protected."

Edwards, who said he has detailed records of the process he had to go through, said the entire flap cost him \$8,689, which included fees to the county planning department, archeological and architect costs and other expenses. The construction of the light posts cost another \$8,000.

"I do not know what the taxpayers of Monterey County paid for all the time and effort civil servants put into this, but it must have been substantial," Edwards said.

Edwards doesn't blame the Pebble Beach Co. or county planners, who he said were all "fine people" caught up in "badly written laws." Instead, he believes county supervisors and the California Legislature are responsible, "since they are the ones who pass these laws."

"What should be done to prevent this sort of wasted time and money?" Edwards asked. "Government is intended to work for the citizens. Instead the building statutes are a model of micromanagement.'

He suggested a county ombudsman be appointed to represent citizens, so the laws can be redrawn to "advance the interest of citizens rather than impede them."

According to the California Highway Patrol, Edmonson's motorcycle clipped the RV, causing the rider to swerve back and forth as he tried to maintain his balance. As Edmonson

tried to control his motorcycle, his passenger, Melissa Jane Thornton of Clearwater, Fla., was ejected into the path of the RV.

Thornton was nounced dead at the scene as a result of the injuries she sustained. The occupants of the RV were uninjured, while Edmonson was treated for minor injuries at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula. The accident is still under investigation, and it is unknown if Edmonson will face criminal charges, said CHP spokesperson Brian Wiest.

"In most areas Highway 1 where there is a double yellow line, it's on a blind curve," explained Wiest, who served for a year as a highway patrolman in Big Sur. "Edmonson made a fatal mistake passing over a double yellow line. He gambled and he lost. It's never a good idea to pass over double yellow line, especially in Big Sur."

Edmonson serves in the U.S. Navy and is assigned to the U.S.S. Nimitz, which is in San Diego, its home port. Thornton also served on the U.S.S. Nimitz.

Just three weeks ago, Thornton was in Coronado for a ceremony in which she was reenlisted into the navy by 99-yearold John Finn, the oldest living Medal of Honor recipient. Finn suffered more than 20 wounds as he attempted to gun down Japanese aircraft during the Pearl Harbor attack on Dec. 7, 1941. The ceremony was part of Coronado's Independence Day parade.


Thornton's death had a profound impact on those who served with her.

"She had pride, happiness, a sense of belonging and a sense of understanding her place in life," said U.S. Navy Capt. Michael Manazir, commanding officer of the U.S.S. Nimitz. "She knew where she came from, where she was and where she wanted to go. She was a fine sailor and a fine shipmate. We will miss her as we head to sea."

By all accounts, Thornton was proud and happy to serve her country.

"She was a great sailor," added Chief Warrant Officer David "Goose" Nelson, a weapons division officer who serves on the U.S.S. Nimitz. "She loved the Navy, loved the Nimitz, and she loved her division. She left us way too early. She had a great future ahead of her, and that's something we talked about a lot. I know she was happy, because she told me a million times. We will always miss you. Thank you for letting us be a part of your life"

Thornton was honored Wednesday with a memorial service on the flight deck of the U.S.S. Nimitz.

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

She was so struck by her experience, when she got back, she and friends formed the group Santa Cruz Cares to raise money for AFnet Aid, the wing of the organization that raises money for orphan centers.

The group was able to secure sponsorships for nearly 100 children. Like some other humanitarian groups, sponsors pay a monthly fee and receive a photo of the child they sponsor. The Santa Cruz group raised enough money to build one orphan center and has plans for more.

The center, located in Shoshanguve, a township north of

Pretoria, is a day program that provides food, access to medical care, and daycare for younger siblings so their older brothers and sisters can go to school. Children are given a uniform and tuition for school (the government does not provide free education), and the center teaches them skills they can use to get a job.

"They are given a care package to bring home with them which has food and clothing," Poll said.

The orphan center is in an area with an estimated 85 percent unemployment rate and 30 percent AIDS rate.

Because all of the children who attend the orphan centers have lost one or both parents AIDS, and have experienced a host of other nightmarish scenarios such as sexual abuse, the center also provides trauma counseling.

instance, Poll has lost contact with two of the three children she's sponsored. "They have disappeared and left the center," she said. "I

Poll said she will be responsible for coordinating AFnet

orphan centers with schools and churches to make sure the

children who attend the centers are accounted for. For

want to find them."

She will also keep program donors updated with personal stories of their sponsored children's progress so they get to know the children they're sponsoring.

'I will be sending a monthly newsletter to supporters," she said. "I will take pictures of the kids and ask them how their lives have changed."

Raising funds

The CEO of AFnet, Johan Combrinck, offered Poll the one-year job, which she won't be paid for. Poll must come up with money for her stay in Africa, plus her expenses back home, which include student loans and a condominium mortgage. "I need \$4,000 per month," she said. "Half of that covers my living expenses in Africa, and the other half is to cover

Poll is about one-third of the way to meeting her goal. Friends and supporters have committed anywhere from \$10 to \$100 per month. Some have made one time donations to cover costs. And her church, Twin Lakes Church in Aptos, has committed \$1,000 per month for the 12 months she'll be in Africa.

Though Monterey County Deputy District Attorney Dean Flippo told Poll he would hire her back if there is an open position when she returns, Poll will be leaving a secure job in the midst of a global recession.

"If there is an open position, I can have it," she said. "If not, I'll be looking for a job."

But Poll said job uncertainty is outweighed by the work she will do to help children, who, with no parents around, are often forced to make money by any means necessary to sur-

During her first trip to South Africa, while driving to Zambia, her church group came across an infamous highway where truckers routinely pick up and pay girls as young as 10

"That's why you are willing to give a year of your life," she said. "If you can stop one little girl from doing that to feed her brothers and sisters, it's worth it."

mounted, the resistance began to falter. "We were poorly armed, and the Germans had devastating fire power," Belza explained.

Also, the Red Army stayed out of the city. Stalin, it turned out, preferred to let the Polish nationalists die at the hands of the Germans, thereby making it easier for him to turn Poland into a satellite of the USSR after the war.

As the Germans mounted a relentless counterattack, the resistance groups found themselves isolated from other rebels and surrounded. Desperate to escape, thousands poured into the Warsaw sewer system, where they walked for hours in the stench and darkness before reaching safer parts

Meanwhile, England Prime Minister Winston Churchill was unable to convince U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt that aiding Warsaw's residents was worth the price of offending Stalin, an important ally whose army bore the brunt of Germany's onslaught.

We were not aware of what was going on politically," Belza said. "We just kept on fighting and hoped we would

At one point in the fighting, Belza saw part of a building collapse after being hit by a bomb, burying about 30 of his fellow fighters. He rushed to their aid, but another bomb damaged the building further, and Belza found himself buried by rubble.

"I had broken bones and a head injury," he recalled. "Other soldiers came and dug me out. I never knew their

By now, the cause of the resistance fighters was lost.

"In one week, 50,000 people were killed," he said. "The losses were horrendous — whole families lost everybody and everything. There was no ammunition, no food, no medical supplies, and the city was destroyed. It was a real hell."

Because the Germans were also tired of fighting — and were faced with a hungry host of Russians soldiers waiting at



their door, the resistance fighters capitulated on conditional terms, and the survivors were shipped in box cars to prisoner-of-war camps in Germany.

"We were treated as soldiers," Belza explained. "I give a lot of credit to Churchill and Roosevelt, who put pressure on Hitler to grant us the rights of combatants."

Transported to Germany by train, Belza somehow managed to escape and made his way to Switzerland, where he was granted his freedom. The war in Europe ended a short time later, and soon Belza was attending medical school in Zurich, where he received a degree.

At medical school in Switzerland, he met a young woman from Carmel who became Joan Belza in 1950. The couple moved to the United States, where Belza was drafted into the U.S. Army, serving as a medical officer in Germany during the Korean War.

Belza later studied medicine at Stanford University and moved to Pebble Beach in 1967. He served on the staff at Community Hospital for the Monterey Peninsula for 40 years before retiring two years ago.

Belza and his wife still live in the same Pebble Beach house, and they have four children and two grandchildren. When he travels to Poland this week, Belza will be accompanied by his son, Mark, who is also a neurosurgeon.

Understandably, this week's visit to Poland will be an emotional experience for Belza.

"Our fight during the uprising was not in vain, because Poland has been liberated and is now democratic," he added. "It will be very moving for me to see the city rebuilt from its ashes, and I will pay tribute to all my comrades who lost their lives in that struggle."

Real candidates needed

THE FIRST two people to present themselves as candidates for the city council of the proposed Town of Carmel Valley immediately announced they were running because they don't think the town should exist at all, and that the purpose of their campaigns would be to encourage people to vote against incorporation Nov. 3. That's fine, because the benefits of citihood for the people of Carmel Valley are an open question, and it seems pretty obvious that sentiment in the valley is not strongly in favor of incorporation.

Nevertheless, with several months until election day, but only a few weeks until the filing period for candidates closes, it's important for incorporation opponents not to assume they have the election in the bag. The pro-incorporation side has announced a formidable slate, headed by Glenn Robinson and Karin Strasser Kauffman. Legitimate candidates who may oppose creation of a Town of Carmal Valley, but who also want to help the city be successful if it is created, are also needed.

The same work for less pay?

IT'S NOT only local headmasters who have profited handsomely in the nation's schools in recent years. Professors, administrators and many others who make their livings at colleges and universities benefitted as much as any working person as the U.S. economy boomed during the 1990s and mid-2000s.

You can tell because, while the nation's GDP grew by an average of 2.8 percent per year from 1988 until 2007, college tuitions rose by an average of 4.4 percent per year during that same period.

In other words, during those two decades, the share of the country's wealth that flowed to colleges and universities went way up. And, since the lion's share of any school's budget goes to employee salaries and benefits, it follows that the beneficiaries of that substantial diversion of national wealth were the people who get their paychecks from institutions of higher learning.

Of course, it's simple human nature to think that whatever number is on one's W-2 is something that's deserved, rather than being part of a debt-fueled national economic bubble that can't be sustained.


Nevertheless, with the Great Recession still under way and millions of Americans having to make do with less, it's important for everyone to rethink the relationship between how hard they work and what that work is worth.

That's news, apparently, to the head of the union representing workers at California's public colleges and universities. When a program of furloughs was announced to help deal with the schools' budget deficit, he said he wanted to make sure the furlough days were genuine days off.

"I'm concerned that our union members are being asked to do the same work for less pay," he said.

But isn't that exactly what they should be doing?

What is he afraid of? Certainly, he and his fellow opponents have tried hard for years to prevent us from voting on Carmel Valley's future, most recently through two lawsuits and a federal complaint. But vote we will, on November 3 — and we will win.

Creating a Town of Carmel Valley is the best and only way we can preserve the rural character and open spaces of our wonderful community, and without raising a dime of taxes. In fact, given that Carmel Valley is such a cash cow for the county, when we incorporate and our local taxes stay local, we will be able to afford more police protection and better road maintenance than we currently receive, with no increase in taxes.

Letting supervisors from Salinas, Moss Landing and King City decide our fate will only mean more subdivisions like September Ranch and Rancho San Carlos. If we don't incorporate, they'll also approve the 300house subdivision at Rancho Cañada. The choice is clear: Local control is the only answer to preserving Carmel Valley. Vote YES on November 3!
